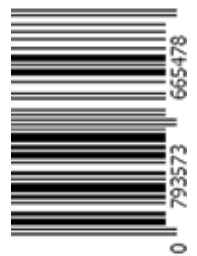

Churchill born nurse retires... at 80

The curtain has finally come down on the remarkable career of Nurse Mary Frances Meachin, originally from Churchill, after a record breaking career in the profession.

Now aged 80, Mary Frances has been a nurse in the UK health service for 62 years in Warrington. And in the final 42 years of her career she worked in the Intensive Care Unit of the local hospital.

She was a member of the Doherty family from The Rock, Church-

ill and along with her best friend Bridget Duddy, they set off from Drumacano on what she describes now as "an adventure".

But, there was pre-planning involved as both had applied to do General Nursing in Warrington. They took the boat to Liverpool and 18 miles later Mary Frances and Bridget were at their accommodation in the Cheshire town. While she has been a regular back to Churchill over the years, the permanent home for Mary Frances has been Warrington.

She said: "Myself and Bridget Duddy left Churchill, both of us setting out on an adventure. We hadn't a clue apart from knowing that we were going to start nurse training in Warrington. We didn't have a lot of money but life was good. We enjoyed dancing and the Irish bands that would come to Manchester which wasn't far from us.

Life is what you make of it and there was nothing much for us at home. I used to go back to Churchill regularly. I am planning to go there next month. My sisters Veronica, Ber-

nadette and Philomena are there as well as my brothers Eamonn, Vincent and Billy."

In an amazing career she spent her final 42 years nursing in intensive care at Warrington Hospital. And even more remarkably she has only retired at the age of 80. In England there is no upper age limit for retiring and even now, Mary Frances was sad to leave her post.

After qualifying as a general nurse Fran as she is better known to her work colleagues decided to do her

Milford sewer leaking effluent for 15 years

A faulty sewerage system has been discharging heavily polluted effluent from a housing estate in Milford to Mulroy Bay for the past fifteen years according to local residents of the area.

Cllr. Liam Blaney has said the delays in getting remedial action done is very frustrating for everyone in the area and he is working with Council officials to-

wards a new system being put in place sooner rather than later.

The effluent is reaching out well beyond the 'holding tank' serving the Grey Rock estate and it is spilling into a fast moving stream before reaching Mulroy Bay close to the former bakery and flour mills.

The Grey Rock estate has twenty houses and was constructed over twenty years ago by a private developer. This week, residents told the Tribune they

have given up on any immediate action by the authorities and they've revealed details

of communications with the Council as far back as 2010. Their original concerns relat-

ed to the completion of services on the estate. The vast majority of the unfinished work has

not been rectified, they said.

These unfinished works including a footpath: an open drain, kerbing and a leaking sewerage system that is long past being fit for purpose.

Cllr. Liam Blaney said that he found it very frustrating trying to find solution to the problem. He said Grey Rock was one of three 'unfinished estates' locally that he's been working for a solution along with Council officials for a number of

years.

He said: "While I'm frustrated with these delays I can fully understand the frustration of the residents of Grey Rock and indeed those living on two similar estates in the electoral area.

The smell of pollution is all around the 'holding tank' and I have every sympathy with the households nearby. This is one of the many unfinished estates around the country and the public purse

has been left to pick up the costs of restoring faults and damage. I think that is just not good enough that the private developers cannot be pursued for the cost of repairs.

It is not right that the developers can escape paying for the unfinished estates and the faulty sewer systems. But the cost of remedial works falls on local authorities and Irish

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Another Council meeting adjourned

Monday's meeting of Donegal County Council was adjourned with no business done after the Cathaoirleach Cllr. Jack Murray told members that he was taking the decision as some Cllrs and officials didn't feel safe as a result of 'certain issues' that happened. The Cathaoirleach did not elaborate further on what those issues were at that time - or afterwards. The meeting at the

Aura Leisure Centre in Letterkenny had been scheduled to start at 11 a.m. At 11.30, Cllr. Murray said he was adjourning the meeting for an hour as certain matters had arisen that required discussion with Party whips and members of the executive. Gardaí were called to the Aura on Monday and took statements from some staff members.

However, the meeting did not resume and has been rescheduled for next Wednesday. Since last autumn a number of Council meetings have been adjourned. In February the Council secured a High Court order restraining an elected representative from attending any of its meetings until the end of that month. That period has now elapsed.

Almost 15,000 new covid cases

The latest figure available from the HSE shows there was almost 15,000 new covid 19 cases were recorded on Tuesday. The health authority confirmed on March 29th that there were 5,962 PCR-confirmed cases, while 8,587 people registered a positive antigen test through the HSE portal - a total of 14,549 new cases of Covid19. Updated figures show that as of Wednesday, March 30th, there were 1,610 people in hospital and there were 49 people in ICU, which is down by 1 from the previous day.

Milford sewer leaking effluent for 15 years - claim

Water is the legacy that has been inherited from twenty years ago. I can assure the Grey Rock community that the Council has made progress and the new sewerage works is now at design stage for the first time. I hope the Council has overcome all the relevant issues because we have problems of this kind everywhere. I am assured that the Council can proceed urgently to replace the faulty system that has not been in working order for years and I will continue to add my voice to ensuring that the foul odour will finally be dealt with. Members of the community in nearby townlands said they've been aware of the foul smell from the sewer system for a number of years. They point to the 'holding tank' that's been oozing sewage into the nearby streams as it runs towards into Mulroy Bay, some 250 metres away. According to the local community the stench from the sewer chamber is totally unacceptable. Photographs reveal the heavily stained location as the cover of the tank is partially raised, either by pressure or incorrect replacement. Mulroy Bay has been building a reputation as a centre for many watersports and leisure activities. It is particularly well-known for family pursuits: canoeing and kayaking, and boating, but especially kayaking where participants are known get into the water in all weathers. Cllr. Blaney said the Council is engaging with

Irish Water in relation to the Grey Rock estate and they are currently examining a number of cost proposals for remedial works required, including a new foul water pump station for the estate to be funded by Irish Water. Liam Blaney made reference to a circular from the Dept. of the environment outlining the process to be followed by Local Authorities and Irish Water in relation to the Taking in Charge of Residential Developments. "This process clarified that any remediation costs associated with water services infrastructure will be addressed by Irish Water and remediation costs for roads, footpaths, public lighting and open space will be addressed by the Local Authority," added the response from County House. The Tribune understands that the Council's environment section has responded to queries raised only last week. The resident who declined to be named said he's been told that the actual ownership of the existing sewerage system isn't entirely clear due to circumstances of a previous time. The resident said that the information provided suggested there was no early solution in funding a replacement system and the position was unclear. Access to area with heaviest pollution is via a gateway on the Grey Rock estate and residents said this route had been used in the past to empty what they believe is a holding tank that is continually overloaded and not fit for purpose.

Fuel tax relief needed : Donal Mandy

Cllr Donal Kelly is to ask the Council to write to Minister for Transport, Eamon Ryan requesting that a commitment be made to implement a tax relief on fuel for the rest of this year as a matter of urgency for all transport companies, haulage companies, and agricultural contractors. Cllr Kelly will raise the matter at next Wednesday's reconvened meeting. "We all know this is a very serious situation for motorists, farmers, businesses, transport companies, builders and agricultural contractors. The rising cost of fuel has a knock-on effect on everything. There have been massive hikes in building material prices for concrete, timber, insulation and steel. Local bus companies who give such a good service to the community are badly impacted. Farmers are being hit with huge fertilisers and feedstuffs price rises as well as for medicines and vet call-outs. It's a really tough time too for agricultural contractors with the hike in fuel costs. The Government needs to give everyone a break here for the rest of the year by introducing a tax relief on fuel," Cllr Kelly said.

Hundreds set to "Climb Errigal Together"

Hundreds of people from the North West and beyond are set to scale Donegal's highest peak this Saturday, April 2nd, when they take part in the "Climb Errigal Together" event.

All proceeds from the challenge will go to the Irish Motor Neurone Disease Association and Pieta. The climb in the heart of the Donegal gaeltacht is one of 150 that has been organised nationally as part of "Climb with Charlie" - an initiative established by former RTE reporter, Charlie Bird, who was diagnosed with Motor Neurone Disease six months ago.

Mr Bird subsequently announced that he was going to climb Croagh Patrick with family and friends to raise funds for the two aforementioned charities. "Climb Errigal Together" was launched in February and the organisers are expecting a large turnout on Saturday.

"There's been quite a bit of planning and prepa-

ration done over the last few weeks and there has been a great buy-in from the community," commented the event's main coordinator, Eamon McGee.

"Everything is in place and the number one priority is to ensure everyone gets up and down safely. We are asking everyone taking part in the climb to register online and to sign on at Ionad Pobal Dhún Lúiche when they arrive in Dunlewey on Saturday. There will be no parking within a kilometre on either side of Errigal car park, and all traffic will be directed into the village where there will be ample parking. Once people have signed on, they will be taken by shuttle bus to the base of the mountain. After they've completed the climb, they'll be taken back to Pobal Dhún Lúiche by shuttle bus as well where they will be able to avail of some light refreshments. Our aim is to keep the flow of people steady in both directions for the

duration of the event," he added.

The first climbers will sign on at 8.30 on Saturday morning and the latest time for signing on will be 3.30 pm. All those who register will be given a goodie bag which will include a bottle of water, fruit, and a bag of sweets.

The distance up and down Errigal is around 4K and all climbers are advised to arrive at basecamp with suitable clothing and proper footwear. They are also asked to heed the guidance of the Gardaí, the Civil Defence, Donegal Mountain Rescue, and those from the clubs and sporting groups who will be deployed at points.

Everyone who takes on the "Climb Errigal Together" challenge will be presented with a medal sponsored by Michael Murphy Sports.

An investigation is underway after a woman was left badly shaken after she was assaulted by a man demanding she hand over her car keys to him.

Letterkenny Gardaí say the attempted robbery occurred on Saturday, March 26th at around 9.15pm at Slieve Sneacht.

They said the female victim had just parked her car at her home when she noticed a group of male youths pass by.

They stated: "She was then approached by one of the youths who demanded that she hand over the car keys. The lady refused to hand over the keys and was subsequently assaulted by the male. She did not require medical treatment but was understandably shaken as a result of the incident. The youth took off on foot. He is described as being in his late teens, of slight build, he wore a top with the hood up, which was possibly grey in colour. He had a very slight dark

FG Seanad Leader apologises to Doherty

Deputy Pearse Doherty, has received a public apology from the Leader of the Seanad in relation to comments made on social media on the funeral of the late Bobby Storey.

Fine Gael Senator Regina Doherty alleged in a message posted on Twitter that Deputy Doherty had encouraged others to break the law by attending the funeral of the well-known republican figure from Belfast who died in June 2020.

Last week the Fine Gael Senator posted a message on Twitter saying she retracted the accusation she made against the Donegal TD last month and apologised saying she regretted the upset caused.

It read: "An Apology: On February 1st, I published a tweet concerning Pearse Doherty TD in which I made an allegation that he encouraged others to break the law by attending the funeral of the late Bobby Storey. I retract the tweet unreservedly and the allegation I made about Mr. Doherty. I genuinely regret the upset I have caused him"

All change in 50 years for Stormont

The old Stormont Parliament is now 50 years gone. The British government abolished it at the end of March 1972.

That Northern Ireland Parliament existed for just under 51 years. For all that time there was single-party rule, or mis-ruld, by the Unionist Party. Constituencies were gerrymandered to keep Nationalist representation at a minimum. The first past the post system was implemented, to further keep dissenting voices silent – or at a minimum.

Over half a century, Nationalists only passed one piece of legislation. That regarded wildlife. In equal measure, that shows how Unionists excluded opposition, and how poor that opposition was.

The nature of the building shows how the Unionist rulers saw themselves. Parliament buildings at Stormont were completed in 1932. That was the low point of the Great Depression. Thousands in Belfast were starving, many more living in absolute poverty.

'Stormont' became the name meaning the Parliament. The building sits towards the summit of a hill on the eastern outskirts of Belfast. There is a spectacular view over the City, and into parts of the surrounding countryside. There is a drive a mile long leading up the hill from the main road. In London, the Houses of Parliament are far less impressive. They don't stand out from a jumble of buildings in the City Centre.

For all that the building was impressive, those who filled it were much less so. The first five Prime Ministers were all 'Big House Unionists', being wealthy landowners. Four were Church of Ireland. The only quirk was JM Andrews. While a wealthy landowner, Andrews was a member of the Non-Subscribing Presbyterian Church. Many feel that contributed to his being ousted after only three years in the early 1940s.

Post-World War Two Prime Minister Lord Brookeborough used disappear for long holidays. While a by-word for sectarianism, he was not as hostile to the Republic as his reputation. He is widely believed to have engaged in large-scale cattle-smuggling across the Border. Despite Presbyterians being the North's largest denominations, it was only in 1971 that there finally was a Presbyterian Prime Minister, Brian Faulkner.

The North's first Prime Minister, Sir James Craig, had a Catholic gardener at Stormont sacked. This was because of pressure from elements of the Orange Order. It was despite the man having a good army record and a reference from the (then) Prince of Wales.

According to itself, Stormont symbolised a Protestant Parliament for a Protestant People. In fact it was only for some Protestants. Working-class and small farmer Protestants got either very little or nothing at all.

Stormont did oversee systematic discrimination at all levels. At local government level, gerrymandering and discrimination were endemic. Nationalists only had a majority on 11 of 73 local authorities. The most notorious gerrymander was in Derry City. Sixty percent of the population was Catholic. However, that population was concentrated into one of three wards. Thus, the Corporation was Unionist.

The system meant there was discrimination at all levels. Across all local authorities, about 40% of manual workers were Catholic. Only 11.8% of senior staff were. The Stormont Government established the Cameron Commission to investigate the initial violence of 1968-9. One of the Commission's findings was: "In Dungannon Urban District none of the Council's administrative, clerical and technical employees was a Catholic." The North's first Prime Minister, Sir James Craig, had a Catholic gardener at Stormont sacked. This was because of pressure from elements of the Orange Order. It was despite the man having a good army record and a reference from the (then) Prince of Wales.

Housing was particularly controversial. In the years between World War Two and the 'Troubles', Fermanagh had a slight Catholic majority. In that quarter century, local authorities allocated 568 houses to Catholics, and 1,021 to Protestants. A Unionist Mayor of Portadown is reputed to have said that only one Catholic family had a Council house in the town "and that is one too bloody many."

Overall, the Unionist government's role in housebuilding was appalling. Few council houses were built between the establishment of the Northern State and the 1950s. Conditions across working-class Protestant Belfast were as appalling as anything in the City's Catholic

areas. In 1970, a survey found 30% of all houses lacked hot water, a fixed bath and an indoor toilet. Unfortunately, that misery was fairly evenly shared. The largest group lacking those facilities were Catholics. However, members of the Church of Ireland and then Presbyterians followed closely behind.

There was discrimination, too, in private employment. Given low wages and poor working conditions, that conferred little privilege on working-class Protestants. The now-closed Harland and Wolff Shipyard is often held up as an example of Protestant working-class privilege. The death rate from asbestosis is 16 times greater among former 'Yard' workers than among the general population. Such a death rate is hardly an advantage.

Of course, that whole society has changed. Two generations have grown up since Stormont was abolished. Since, the political scene has changed. All of the old political parties disappeared.

The name of the Ulster Unionist Party lives on. However, it is a different party. Fifty years ago it would have been unthinkable for former army private Doug Beattie, from a terraced house in Portadown, to be leader.

The Nationalist Party dominated Catholic areas outside of Belfast for 50 years. It disappeared like snow off a ditch. The Northern Ireland Labour Party was the Official Opposition, and won 100,000 votes in 1970. It imploded.

Ian 'Papa Doc' Paisley was coming to prominence at the

end of the Stormont Parliament. His Protestant Unionist Party was part of an eccentric fringe. His DUP is now the North's main party.

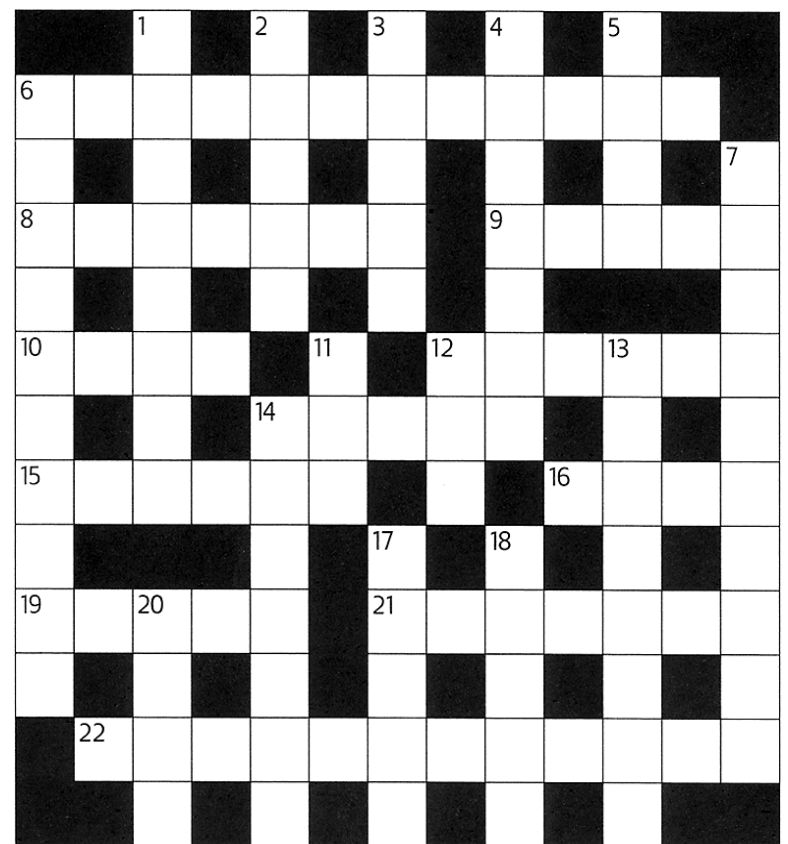
At that time, of course, even the most 'liberal' Unionists would have been horrified at sharing power with the most mild of Nationalists. Sharing power with the IRA's political descendants would have been unimaginable. Not only did the 'extremist' 'Papa Doc' do so. He built a close personal relationship with former IRA leader Martin McGuinness. Meanwhile, the DUP has done a deal to elect a Sinn Féin speaker.

Of course, in 50 years demographics have changed. The old Stormont fell because it became unviable. But the greatest condemnation of that government is that nobody wants its return.

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Liam Cassidy launches new book

Kilmacrennan native Liam Cassidy has launched his new book based on his vast experience as a business consultant who successfully turned around the fortunes of struggling factories across three continents since the late 1980's.

"Make Your Factory Great & Keep it That Way" is available now through all big online stores including Amazon. Known in the industry as the 'factory fixer' Liam is telling a totally different story here to his previous book published last year on his nightmare memories of being in a classroom with a sadistic National School teacher.

'Memories from a Village School & Other Tales' gave a graphic insight into the experiences of some pupils at the hands of a violent Principal teacher in the 1960s. The idea of writing a book about his business experiences across the globe surfaced seriously a decade ago but after putting considerable work into the publication he wasn't happy with it and decided to park it for a while. Then two years ago when Covid came along suddenly there was time to look at other things and so Liam put pen to paper again on his successful methods that transformed factories facing closure over three decades.

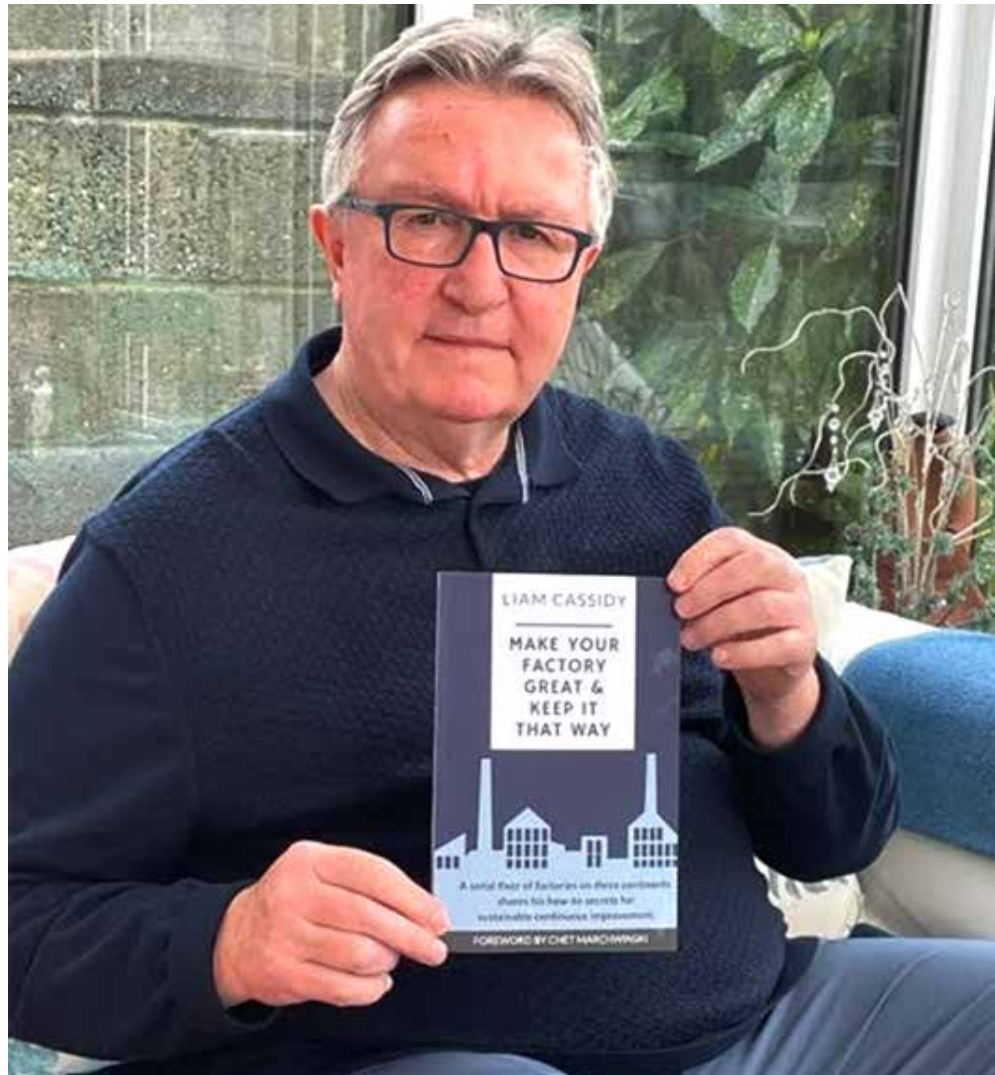
"The main motivation is to help factories facing possible closure. I wanted to share my experiences of going in and finding solutions to problems that in most cases saw the factories survive and then thrive. We all know of factories closing from Milford, Letterkenny, across Ireland to England, United States and China. It's all about getting the practices right and doing the right thing. If there are companies out there who are struggling or just need help to do things better then we are available to offer solutions.

We engage with every part of the operation from the owners, management and the employees on the ground. It's about making them aware of what is needed and getting their buy-in. There may not be the same number of staff when problems are fixed but you will have a business that is lean and operating to its best potential" Cassidy said.

In the late 1990s when Gillette announced that it was cutting a tenth of its global workforce of 43,000, Liam Cassidy was tasked with overseeing the winding down of one of its companies toothbrush maker Oral-B Laboratories in Iowa, USA. It was producing one million toothbrushes a day but was still struggling against competition from factories in China and Mexico. Cassidy's skills in changing work practices not only saved the Iowa factory but within two years it was the most productive Gillette manufacturing operation across the globe. It earned him the title of the 'factory fixer'. Hard decisions had to be made but it saved the factory. That included cutting the workforce by more than 250, introducing a two-year pay freeze, stability was brought to a previously unreliable supply chain and work practices were made more efficient embodying Cassidy's key principle of having a lean, productive operation.

No place for weak managers

He underlines the importance of manufacturing firms surviving not alone for the factories themselves but for the wider community. Jobs in the factory have a knock-on effect outside providing work for among others suppliers and the retail sector. Among the aspects of a business that Cassidy pays special attention to in his forensic analysis of the health of a factory is the state of its management layers. "An important thing when you go in is to look at management. You can't carry people at management level who are not contributing or doing the work. Workers on the ground know who they are so they have to go because otherwise it undermines the whole purpose of the project."

Efficient supply chains are crucial to the smooth operations of manufacturing enterprises and that is something that Cassidy pays very special attention to when examining issues that need to be addressed urgently in underperforming factories. "It's all about keeping solutions simple. Common sense is not so common nowadays. Times people look for complicated answers that aren't necessary. They can be expensive and often don't achieve the objective. It's partly down to people not using their heads anymore and depending on gadgets to get the solutions. There's too much data nowadays and trusting it can be an issue."

Liam had his own company, Dublin based LCL Consult firm for over a decade before selling it in 2020. It focused on lean transformation at manufacturing companies. He continues to work and is available to come in and offer advice and solutions to companies in the manufacturing industry primarily. Altix Consulting, a Cincinnati-area manufacturing consulting firm, has acquired LCL Consult.

Altix's acquisition of Cassidy's LCL Consulting gives the firm a physical presence in Ireland and allows it to provide lean implementation services to clients globally. LCL is the global leader in transforming traditional factories into lean benchmark sites across the automotive, aerospace, technology, and consumer packaged goods industries. LCL helped manufacturing companies transform underperforming operations, supply chains, and suppliers with the popular lean methodology. Liam Cassidy's firm has worked with clients across Europe, the US, and Asia.

Cassidy has more than 40 years of experience in manufacturing and supply chains. Prior to founding LCL in 2009, he was a general manager at Procter & Gamble, a factory manager at Gillette, and a materials manager at General Motors. LCL previously had an affiliation agreement with Altix. Liam Cassidy was born in Inishowen before the family moved to reside in Cottin just outside the village of Kilmacrennan. Liam loved the close knit rural community despite his horrible experience at the local national school. The

memories of the great characters and things they would get up to are still so special to a man who left the area nearly 50 years ago.

Despite leaving school early due to the actions of a violent headmaster Liam's working career has been hugely successful. He spent three years in the Defence Forces before heading to London. Quickly from the shop floor he moved into management with General Motors, followed by Braun and Oral-B before setting up his own consultancy business LCL. Married to Anne a native of Wexford the couple have three daughters Lisa an Environmental Scientist; Aoife is a Psychotherapist in the Social Care sector and Clare is an Assistant Psychologist.

The foreword to Liam Cassidy's new book was penned by Chet Marchwinski a former communications director at the Lean Enterprise Institute a nonprofit organisation based in Boston, Massachusetts, with a mission to make things better by advancing lean thinking and practice. "When I was communications director at the Lean Enterprise Institute, one of my most important - and enjoyable - responsibilities was to find companies and managers who were doing something new or notable, implementing lean management principles. That's how I met Liam Cassidy, author of this book.

"I had written many case studies of lean applications in metal-bashing industries, which is not surprising given lean's Toyota roots. But I heard that Liam had used lean principles and tools to save a highly automated toothbrush factory that included a pull system triggered by a packaging line. I had to get out to Iowa to see this. Liam was the new manager of the largest toothbrush manufacturing plant in the world, located in Iowa City. He was sent there to close it. Production would go to cheaper factories in China or Mexico.

Lean thinker and practitioner

"But Liam was a veteran lean thinker and practitioner who had turned around factories in the UK and his native Ireland. He knew that the competitive power of rapidly and diligently applying lean principles with the participation of

local management and employees could save almost any factory, including this one. It had some advantages. Product quality was good. A dedicated workforce met deadlines and got products out the door reliably. Plus, the factory was smack in the middle of the company's biggest market, North America, giving it a supply chain advantage over China and Mexico.

But there were serious hurdles to making a leap to lean management. Based on visits to the shop floor, Cassidy estimated that at any time at least 30% of the equipment was down awaiting raw materials, maintenance, or work orders. The supply chain from suppliers through the factory was unstable. There was no regular training for employees, except when new equipment arrived. There was some automation in the molding department, but the level of manual processes was high, higher than at factories in Asia and Mexico, where labor costs were much cheaper.

Cassidy began the transformation by meeting with the entire workforce to explain the dire competitive situation. He met privately to win over the union head by explaining what he would do and to share information about the closure plan. He didn't promise people that the corporate decision to shutter the factory would be changed. He explained that it had a shot at survival if everyone supported and participated in the lean transformation.

He promised to keep them informed through every step of the change. Next, he trained teams of employees, managers, and staff in lean principles and tools. And that's how the Oral-B Iowa plant was saved and transformed over a two-year period. Liam has used those core principles to save 10 plants in high-cost and low-cost countries on three continents during a career of 40 plus years.

Chet Marchwinski says that although Liam writes about his method for successfully initiating and sustaining change, this isn't a technical book. "There are plenty of excellent ones on the details of lean management concepts and tools. This reads more like a business memoir with practical and motivating reflections from a successful business leader and lifelong learner. Liam gives you a proven lean pathway for successful turnarounds but he includes insights for dealing with a myriad other business challenges that you face, such as improving toxic work cultures, managing change,

surviving mergers, rousing dispirited workforces, and dealing with today's downpour of data. Liam pays as much attention to the social side of implementing change as he does to the technical side. He shares many valuable insights about how to communicate, inspire, and involve managers and employees. He has a way of connecting transformations with people's instinct for survival and their desire for meaningful work that you can adopt. But he doesn't mince words about how to deal with truculent union officials or managers who stand in the way of change needed for the common good of saving a threatened factory.

A natural storyteller, Liam weaves in humorous or poignant anecdotes about some of the personalities and places he encountered in Europe, Asia, and the U.S. Make Your Factory Great & Keep It That Way is an informative, entertaining, and succinct book, perfect for reading on the plane ride to a factory you've been assigned to save.

IHFA Bursary Award for Catherine Grier

Congratulations to Catherine Grier on winning the IHFA Student Bursary 2021 at Gurteen Agricultural College graduation ceremony on Friday. Catherine is the first female to win the award which started in 2018.

And amazingly there is a link between the Grier family and Gurteen going back 50 years as her grandad Ivan and Richard Hamilton were both students at the Tipperary college in the 1970's. Richard went to be a lecturer at Gurteen and was one of the presentation party when Catherine received her award at the graduation on Friday.

Catherine, the daughter of Monica and Alastair Grier, Augnish, Ramelton is currently in the second year of a Bachelor of Science Honours Degree in Agriculture at Lyit year.

She is very well known in soccer circles as a former member of Swilly Rovers F.C. and has played with the Donegal Women's League.

Catherine has also represented the Republic of Ireland at international deaf football tournaments. As a toddler she was diagnosed with a significant hearing impairment.

Last April Catherine had a life changing experience following successful hearing implant surgery. She had been using hearing aids since she was five years of age managing very well all through school until the latter stages of her secondary education at Mulroy College, Milford. That's when her actual hearing began to deteriorate further and led to the family looking at the possibility of her getting a hearing implant.

The emergence of Covid-19 made life much more difficult as her expert lip reading skills were effectively made redundant as apart from her family almost everyone else was wearing face masks to stop the spread of the infection.

The option of going for the cochlear implant was

there for Catherine but there was only a 50/50 chance that it would be a success.

But with her hearing having deteriorated so much she simply felt she had nothing to lose by going for the procedure. The cochlear implant sends an electrical message through a wire called an electrode directly to the auditory nerve, bypassing the damaged or absent hair cells. This

means that, provided that the auditory nerve is still working, profoundly deaf people can hear sound.

The cochlear implant consists of two parts, a surgically implanted internal part and an externally worn part called a processor. Catherine has the implant in the right ear and the hearing aid in the left.

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Frank's mission to provide fertiliser alternative

A west-Downal businessman says he is working on setting up a meeting with the Agriculture Minister to highlight the benefits of an alternative to traditional fertiliser he has been importing from France.

Frank Sweeney who runs Foreland Electrical in Magheraroarty is also an avid gardener for many years and recently became an agent for the range of "Sobac" organic soil products he began using in his own garden a number of years ago with great results.

Based in Aveyron, Sobac say they develop environmentally friendly fertilisation techniques based on fast and natural production of humus, which is essential for growth. These agronomic solutions were developed in the 1980s by Marcel Mézy, a local farmer in Aveyron. They claim this boosts the naturally fertilising resources of the soil and reduces, or even eliminates, the need for chemical inputs, while maintaining the same yields.

Frank says he became a convert to the benefits of the material that contains live bacteria for his own use and since then he has seen many other benefits from it. He says this can be an alternative for Irish farmers who face spiraling fertiliser costs and he would like to see it subsidised to help promote the material that has a wide range of applications.

He explained: "This stuff is an organic matter with live bacteria. It goes into the soil and activates the micro organisms and regenerates the humus. Humus is what all plants grow on. It is ideal for anything that grows here. I did my research over the last three years as I wanted to see what organic products were out there as I'm really into gardening. I search and came across a company in France made contact and got a guy from Tipperary to come up and check a field that was full of rushes and you'll not see any rushes in there now. It puts the oxygen into the soil and it never leaves the soil then. A farmer can be putting other fertilisers on his soil today and after his first cut he'll do it again. With this it is just once a year." He said the matter should be explored further by the Department of Agriculture.

He added: "I've been trying to set up a meeting with Minister Charlie McConalogue but I've had no luck yet but we will get a meeting I'm sure. If they are trying to get farmers to go organic now, we have this stuff. I think the first thing to do is to subsidise it to help get the farmers to change."

He said its use is widespread in France and he would like to see more Irish farmers and gardeners as he sees it as "the only alternative" to traditional fertilisers.

Fertiliser prices continue to spike around the world following Russia's invasion of Ukraine with some reports indicating it has risen by over 40% in the last year.

Death of Mary McAteer widely mourned

The death occurred on Monday night of Mary McAteer, one of Rathmullan's best known citizens. Aged 92 Mary's death is mourned right across the local community where she was a very prominent figure.

She was born on the 24th of October 1929 to Frank and Mary Kathleen McMenamin who resided on Rathmullan's Main Street. Frank, a tailor, was a native of Creeve close to the village and Mary Kathleen was formerly a member of the Deeney family from Inishkill also near Rathmullan. The couple reared a family of six including Una, Fr. Willie, Kathleen, Brid, Ann and Sr Patricia (Cork).

After leaving National School at 14 she went to live with her aunt Mrs McCafferty in Kilmacrennan for four years. On December 30th, 1948 she took the boat to England after being accepted into a General Nursing training course in Manchester. After graduating, Mary returned to a staff nurse post at the Old Waterside Hospital Derry in 1953. Then it was back to the hospital in Letterkenny for a period before the marriage ban brought closure to her career in the caring profession. She had married Gerard McAteer who had taken ownership of the White Harte Bar in Rathmullan.

As Mary said. "I left nursing to become a barmaid!"

It was a change of career that she embraced, pulling the pints, enjoying the craic with customers and trying to make a living to rear her own children. As well as the pub, Mary ran a boarding house in the summer months. And she also did catering, providing meals for the men coming into Rathmullan on the IAWS, coal, potato and herring boats. There was also the occasional ocean liner that would dock and Mary was always ready to look after the passengers with meals or drinks in the White Harte.

Mary was passionate about football and her beloved Rathmullan Celtic. Her brother Fr. Willie was a top class player and her four sons all played for the club. Mary became a committee member at Rathmullan F.C. and that led to an invitation from Fr. Michael Sweeney to become involved with the Donegal Junior League where she was



to serve as a very diligent Treasurer for over 20 years. She was also a League Registrar and the Milford Area representative for a long period. Mary was the first woman to be an executive of the league committee.

Mary was a lifelong supporter of Liverpool Football Club and after that 30-year drought she was one happy woman when Jurgen Kloff delivered the Premiership title two years ago.

In October 2019 Mary celebrated her 90th birthday with family and friends with a Mass in St. Joseph's Church followed by a party in the Resource Centre. And it was then back to the White Harte where Mary had been such a welcoming host herself for five decades.

Like everyone else there were the sad times with the deaths of her daughter Geraldine, son Frank and her husband Gerard who passed away in the millennium year 2,000. The next 11 years were extremely challenging for Mary as she underwent four cancer operations. Remarkably she came out the other side. Pre-Covid she had a busy social life with bingo twice a week and card playing took up another two nights at least in the winter time

going to games in Otway, Glenvar and Gortahork courtesy of her two good driver friends Jimmy Joe Morrison and John Kelly.

Despite being in the pub business Mary never took alcohol and was a long time pioneer. As a volunteer support staff member she made the annual Raphoe Diocesan Pilgrimage to Lourdes, only missing one trip in 44 years due to cancer treatment. Mary was also up to date with the modern gadgets - on the laptop every day to check the bingo and lotto numbers.

Rathmullan Celtic pay tribute

In a Facebook post Rathmullan Football Club paid their special tribute to Mary McAteer. "It was perhaps fitting that a pall of fog sat over Rathmullan on Tuesday morning as we awoke to the news that Mary McAteer of the White Harte had gone to her eternal rest peacefully late on Monday night.

Mary's passing leaves Rathmullan under a cloud of sadness, with a void that just cannot be filled. We at Rathmullan Celtic are deeply saddened by her passing and will be forever grateful for all the things that Mary did for our club over many, many years.

The White Harte requires no introduction to anyone that knows Rathmullan. Long before the facilities we have now, the big building on the corner was everything to this club - dressing rooms, meeting room, social hub - it served all purposes and on a Sunday for our games the clatter of studs on the footpath would take players up to the old pitch for battle.

Aside from looking after administration, she drove buses to games, washed kits, provided tea and sandwiches and even ran the team herself in the early 1980s. She quite literally was a one-woman club for a time."

Her talents were spotted further afield and by the start of the 1990s she was persuaded by Fr Michael Sweeney into becoming Treasurer of the Donegal League - a role she held with tremendous distinction for two decades, side-by-side with her trusted assistant, the late Denis Martin.

She was a trailblazer in what was largely a man's world at the time.

In 2007, Mary was honoured with a Lifetime Achievement award by Rathmullan Celtic. In May 2017 she also received a Lifetime Achievement Award from the Donegal League - a richly deserved accolade as Nigel Ferry declared her the 'First Lady of the Donegal League' on the evening. It was an honour she was so clearly proud to be given.

Away from football, Mary led a busy life raising her family with her late husband Gerry and playing an active role in so many facets of community life in Rathmullan. She loved her bingo and was an avid card player, fit to mix it with anyone. No doubt one of her great friends in football, John Joe, will have a seat at a game of 25 reserved for her now.

"Mary supported every event as a proud past pupil of St Joseph's over the years and always had many great words of wisdom to spread onto the children and loved to see and hear their wee stories. We will miss Mary so much. Ar dheis Dé go raibh a hanam dílis."

Mary passed away on Monday night at her home, the White Harte, Rathmullan.

She was predeceased by her husband Gerard, son Frank, daughter Geraldine and her sister Una.

midwifery training. After that she also qualified as a psychiatric nurse to give herself more career options. Mary Frances returned to Warrington Hospital in 1980, after her stints training and staffing in hospitals in Manchester and London.

She also took some time out to look after her daughters, Vanessa, and Hayley when they were babies. The last 42 years have been spent in the Intensive Care Unit. On public health advice because of her age she did take time out during the lockdown periods of the pandemic. However, that was something Mary Frances hated doing. She wanted to be on the Unit supporting her colleagues.

She loved nursing and saw it as a vocation and that explains why had a career spanning 62 years in the health service. Her colleagues were always taken with her caring and compassionate bedside manner with patients and their families. Mary Frances also had a very special relationship with colleagues and she enjoyed their company while showing a genuine interest in them. When she looks back now on it all there is a great sense of pride of being part of the nursing service for such an extraordinary length of time.

There is no age limit in nursing in England so Mary Frances continued to work because that's what she enjoyed doing. "I thoroughly enjoyed my time in nursing and I wasn't looking forward

to retiring. But I have two daughters in Birmingham who I can now visit more. Vanessa studied law and she is a judge there. Hayley is a teacher and also works as a press officer. I also have a granddaughter Madeline who is at university in Nottingham. I also have lots of friends and I plan to do some voluntary work at the Coroner's Office supporting people who are going through difficult times."

Her lifelong friend Bridget Duddy sadly passed away in July 2020. "Bridget came back to live in Ballybofey with her husband Danny. She was great fun, a lovely singer and a great friend," she adds.

Mary Frances has no regrets whatsoever about her career choice and especially about spending such a long time in the intensive care unit. "It was a great place to work. There was always something different happening every couple of hours." She has no hesitation whatsoever in promoting it as an excellent career choice. "I would say to anyone interested that nursing is a great career. I felt that I was learning new things every day. Nursing is very rewarding and the job satisfaction is really good. I would highly recommend a career in nursing."

Mary Frances could have retired many years ago but her enthusiasm and passion for the healthcare service meant that was never going to happen. Her story would certainly inspire a much younger generation to think about nursing as a career.

Karen's mission for better Children's Mental Health

A redundancy from the corporate world just before the onset of the Covid-19 pandemic proved to be the catalyst for a major lifestyle change for one local woman.

Karen McHugh had worked in business and IT locally for over a decade, but just before the pandemic she was made redundant.

For the busy mother-of-three who was used to daily running around, a new, slower pace of life emerged, and with that came a new perspective.

A keen advocate of Mindfulness, she is now on a mission to promote the benefits of this calming practice to school children to promote positive mental health.

She explained: "I had always had an interest in mindfulness and with her own children experiencing the impact of lockdown, she decided to build on this. She is now a mindfulness practitioner and is behind 'Mind Over Matter Mindfulness', giving children and adults the tools in life to calm and relax their minds through creativity and meditation. "I want to help other parents and children that have been plunged into the same feelings of uncertainties because of the pandemic and lockdown restrictions."

She said Mindfulness for kids really appealed to her as a mother who has seen her own children come through the early stages of the pandemic. She added: "I knew I wanted a job that worked around my home life, I wanted that work-life balance that we all need in our lives. I teach creative mindfulness in primary and secondary schools and also facilitate private mindfulness sessions.

"In primary schools I teach The Mindful Heart Curriculum which is the first mindfulness based curriculum for Irish primary schools. The Mindful Heart curriculum is a perfect support for schools who wish to promote positive mental health and well being for both students and teachers alike and is aligned with the Irish Primary schools SPHE curriculum and links to the Aistear framework. Currently I am focusing on children's mindfulness



working with children aged between 5 and 12 years and young teenagers. I believe that if we give our children the opportunity to learn mindfulness and compassion based practices it will help them lead happier healthier lives.

Mindfulness is about people knowing there is no right or wrong way to feel, that all of our feelings are OK. It's about being present in the moment.

Through my engagement with children in schools I have found some were anxious about returning to school and are still trying to manage those feelings. Mindfulness helps make sense of those feelings. Children in the 5 to 9 years age category tend to talk about their feelings which is really positive."

I have been contacted by many parents whose children are experiencing anxiety.

A child's mental health is just so important - not only for the here and now but for their futures. Many parents are messaging me about how their children are feeling anxious, and unfortunately the age group seems to be getting younger. If I can help them just manage their emotions and feel a bit better I will be happy. If children can learn these coping skills at a young age then they can deal with whatever life throws at them.

Mindfulness is a powerful tool. Although mindfulness has been around for many years, often people don't really know what it is. It's really about being present in the moment, and incorporating that calmness into our daily lives."

She is running a three day Easter Children's Well-being Workshop at the Donegal Boardwalk from April 11th to 13th.

A Rathmullan woman in exile Mountnugent: a hotbed of intrigue just now!

My good aul friend John, in Wicklow is in a bit of bother again. The poor divil spent the last four months in hospital in Dublin getting the plumbing and filters fixed. Remember he has a go of thoroughbred horses to sell and the woman has dementia and she burned a load of the horse's passports...

I went back to work recently after the lambing and it was great to see the team again after a break of almost five weeks. There are a couple of them who have been a great support to me throughout the last year and I'd be lost without them. My "little friend from Castlerahan" lives in the same parish as me and we know a lot of people in common despite never having met before working together in the vaccination centre.

She's a gas article and a great source of local news. Then there's the "miserable little bitch from Ballyh****" (her description, not mine) who has the wickedest sense of humour and a very wry take on life. She's a rock of common sense wrapped up in a very small package. Work would be a dull chore without good friends to share the laughs and the tough times with.

Work itself is fairly quiet with the queues of clients and the long, hectic days just a distant memory. It's hard to believe that it's only a couple of weeks short of a year since it all began and now most of us have had three vaccinations and living with Covid is the new norm. I had to tax the big jeep the other day and I came very close to fixing the phone, the laptop and the jeep itself with the sledgehammer. It appears that there is absolutely no communication whatsoever between the mobile phone and the computer despite the two of them being within inches of each other. It took the guts of two hours waiting and waiting to get through to the "banking support team" and then the hoops that had to be jumped through to prove that I really wasn't trying to defraud myself of 333 euro! I hope that when I do turn to a life of bank fraud that I set my sights a little higher than that.

There are only seven fecks of straggler sheep left to lamb and one of them is a first timer so I still have to do the 4am yard check and it's been a long, tiring run without an unbroken sleep

since early February. The brat of a first timer is as fat as a harvest frog and I dread to think what's inside her but I'm pretty certain she'll find that she had more fun getting him in than she's going to have getting him out.

If she would only get on with it I'd let the gods do the check in the middle of the night after that. The bush is out of the gap with the other sheep and they know what the game is about; they can take their chances. Talking of fat frogs, I was in the new curio/gift shop that opened in Mountnugent recently and I got the loveliest pair of candle sticks in the shape of frogs. I was delighted to see a new business opening up and new life coming to the village and I wish Pauline the very best of good luck in the future. I have virtually no interest in shopping, especially for new things, but I do love the 2nd hand and "pre loved" shops where you can find all sorts of interesting things and bits and yokes.

There's been a spate of burglaries in the area since just before Christmas and what's particularly nasty about these ones is that they're all elderly people, mostly men, living alone who are being targeted. There's a large number of bachelor men living alone in the area and quite a few of them are gone a bit quare of themselves (single man syndrome!); you know the type... looking out from under their caps as they dother along on the tractor to feed a couple of bullocks and do the shopping, the trousers tied up with bale twine and the wellies turned down to the ankles in the summer.

They wouldn't be on close terms with soap and water and the face is like a shining mask on the otherwise black head in the back seat of the church on Sunday morning. They are harmless creatures who keep to themselves and bother nobody but they are being picked off one by one by these scumbags who prefer to prey on vulnerable old people rather than get off their cowardly arses and do a day's work. All these

burglaries are taking place in broad daylight, mostly in the mornings and the guards are meeting themselves coming they're around so much, for all the good it does.

Spring is well under way now and I need to stretch my wings and blow the cobwebs off the Caddy again. As John Steinbeck said, "a journey is a person in itself; no two are alike. And all plans, safeguards, policing and coercion are fruitless." Now it's ten to midnight and there's a cow calving on the slats so I have to go and give Himself a turn and bed the calving shed. It's still Mother's Day but a woman's work is never done!

I'm Not a Biologist

Can you describe microbial metabolism? What is the difference between a prokaryotic and a eukaryotic cell? For most of us, there is only one answer to these questions; "I'm not a biologist."

Other questions lie on the opposite end of the scale: the answers are so self-evident that to leave them unanswered raises eyebrows.

Eyebrows were certainly raised last week in the US Senate as confirmation hearings were held for Ketanji Brown Jackson, Joe Biden's nomination to fill a vacancy in the Supreme Court. For those who don't follow American politics, this is seen as one of the most important positions in the nation and when a slot opens up it's a really big deal.

Ms Jackson has been touted as a trailblazer and an inspiration to women across the country. I have no opinion on whether she is the best candidate for the job, but it seems clear that this narrative requires some further

inspection.

For someone who is portrayed as an inspiration to over a hundred million American women, Ms Brown received what should have been a real gimme question during her confirmation hearing. The question was simple; she was simply asked to provide a definition of a "woman". If you thought that this trailblazer would answer this question with ease, you thought wrong.

First some backstory. The issue of transgender athletes competing in women's sport has become a real hot button issue over the last few weeks, with the case of Lia Thomas being a particularly thorny one. Lia (born William), previously competed for men's swimming teams before coming out as a trans woman in 2019. Thomas now competes in women's events and has been wiping the floor with the competition. Many of those vanquished competitors see this as a woman's rights issue: the dreams they have worked towards have

been snatched away someone with a clear biological advantage. Others have warned these women to remain know their place, claiming that to speak out is to be transphobic. This is a tried and tested tactic that has been used to silence some of the most vulnerable women in society on this side of the Atlantic too.

So, how did Ms Jackson respond to a straight for-

ward question? If she is billed as a defender of and inspiration to women, how exactly does she define the term? The answer was a rather deflating one. "I'm not a biologist." Is Ms Jackson really suggesting that the concept is so complex as to require technical expertise? Of course not. She could have said the obvious, but the obvious has been deemed unacceptable.

Two paradoxes have reared their heads in this last week. The first is that it is supposedly impossible to define what a woman is but it is self evident that Lia Thomas is one. The second is that women are being told to know their place, and all in the name of equality. Ms Jackson had the opportunity to stand up for those who are sidelined in this way. It doesn't take a biologist to tell you that she missed her chance.

The cultivation of trees on farms and native woodlands

A European Innovation Partnership (EIP), 'Curaíocht an Phobail' managed by Lárionad Achmhainní Nádirtha - Cill Ulta, based in the North West Gaeltacht is to host a public presentation on Native Trees and Agroforestry, agriculture incorporating the cultivation of trees.

hear how we can learn from our past to grow our future. This evening presentation will leave you with a greater knowledge of our native trees, also how to plant and manage them to enhance your own land quality and the countryside that surrounds us. An Craoibhín's new venture hub

The official opening of the Co Work Plus and the G Tec Co working space at An Craoibhín in Termon took place on Monday afternoon.

Tracy Keogh from Grow Remote was given the honour of declaring the building open.

The project has been a great success since its inception and currently there are 9 permanent businesses renting space as well as a steady number of people using the hot desk and zoom facilities each month.

The Craoibhín Community & Enterprise Centre opened on 1st December 2008, over 13 years ago now. Since its opening by An Taoiseach Brian Cowan in 2008 the Centre has gone from strength to strength, mainly through a pro-active Board of Directors setting small attainable goals and once reached, they've moving on to the next one.

One of the driving forces on the Board is Chairman, Cllr. Michael McBride who was the MC for the afternoon.

He said: "The Childcare was the first area to open with just two children and 3 staff and today there have over 80 children enrolled and attending at least 2 days per week. They also have a waiting list for all childcare services but a huge demand for places for children under the age of 2.

Being across the road from Termon NS is a huge bonus for them and for parents who need wraparound childcare throughout the school term.

There are also two social enterprises from the Centre - The Grassroutes Bike Hire business which compliments the quieter season in the centre and provides employment during the summer months to local students. They are very fortunate to have Glenveagh Na-

tional Park on their doorstep with a steady number of visitors and locals alike using the Park and they trade from their grounds to provide Electric, Hybrid, Tandem and Children's and pull alongs from March to October.

They also have close links with the local secondary schools in the area providing Cycle Right courses and bike maintenance courses to TY students.

Their second social enterprise is CoWork plus.

This was the idea of Fred Gallagher from their Board of Directors, through a Leader group online Fred made contact with a French group who was looking for partners to join a Coworking project she was working on. Fred approached Donegal Local Development Company and Udaras Na Gaeltacha who agreed to become the Leader organisation in Ireland for this project. In hindsight now it was a concept well ahead of its time here locally and with the development of this project and the creation of the first 4 Community led Coworking spaces here in the county it has been a great asset to each of the groups and the people using them.

In our most recent census we have over 30 users in the hubs. Our own space here has been redeveloped with thanks to Connected Hubs funding to provide a bright, modern work place. We have 9 permanent businesses renting space from us and we have a steady and

recurrent number using hot desk and zoom room facilities monthly. We see a great opportunity to build on these users by helping them to expand and grow their businesses using Termon as their base.

To ensure this happens we need to secure capital grants from you the funders here today, you have seen the potential here in Termon now is your time to help us and these companies and companies like them to develop and grow right here in CoWork Plus An Termann.

The European element of this programme saw us working with partners from France, Germany, Spain, Latvia and Wales.

We have created a website and have toolkits created to help other organisations and companies set up coworking spaces www.colaboracoworking.eu

Craoibhin have been so successful in making our Coworking space a success down to the staff we have here, Mary Doherty, our manager inherited this project from Julianne Hayes who was without doubt the driving force that got this project to development and tender stage. Termon can be forever grateful to Julianne for all the hard work and research she put in at the start of this project," Cllr. McBride concluded. Deputy Joe McHugh described it as a fantastic facility, a great concept and the way forward and wished all the businesses every success in the future.

ern Development said the past 18 months has seen a sea change in employer. Its not enough that people come back and settle here, its time to change the narrative and let the rest of the country see what we have known for years that the West Coast is the best place to work and live.

Micheál Ó hÉanaigh of Udaras na Gaeltachta said that community is central to the success of this project and they are delighted to get behind it. Networking is vital and their Gteic has 35 hubs from Downings to Cape Clear off the coast of Cork and none of them works in isolation. They are learning from each other and don't have to reinvent the wheel - just learn from others. He concluded that this ties in with Udaras strategy of remote working and places like this are now on a level playing field with places in Dublin.

Tracy Keogh from Grow Remote said they support local communities to bring jobs into them. There are many brilliant companies who want to get talent wherever people live. We know that hubs make a massive difference to local communities and it is superb the work that is going on in An Craoibhin will give opportunities for your children and grandchildren with the work here.

Two of the businesses working there spoke of the benefits which they enjoy in An Craoibhin. Cormac Coughlan from Gigable used to work in Dublin. He is originally from Letterkenny and now lives in Dunfanaghy. Their business is part of the gig economy and they connect freelance workers with companies.

Last weekend he went surfing and hiking as well

as visiting his family in Letterkenny and his girlfriends family and was able to enjoy a few drinks on Saturday night. Something which he would not have been able to do in Dublin. He said the community aspect in An Craoibhin is great and the networking side is where he gets the main benefit.

Neil Sullivan from Hadfield Green said that it should not be a trade off when you want to grow your company outside the cities. His companies have offices in Dublin and London and he said that An Craoibhin is a state of the art facility and its great.

Noreen Trearty, An Craoibhin Treasurer spoke about the vision for the centre. "As with any project we undertake, we look at what works and what doesn't work. As you can see, CoWorking has taken off, the demand is strong, the employment market is changing, blended working (office and remote) is a reality, and we want to be part of that journey.

We have so much potential here. We have a childcare facility on site. We have the school across the road, geographically, we are at the gateway to west Donegal - 10 minutes from a University town and 10 minutes from Glenveagh National Park.

We have a wonderful and skilled staff, with expertise in project development, especially in Mary, our manager to help drive this vision through. I suppose all we need is the funding, we need to find the avenues to tap into to make this vision a reality."

Burtonport Co-op building demolished

It was the end of an era last week when the Burtonport Fishermen's Co-op Building was demolished to make way for a new development at the harbour which are aimed at improving access to Aranmore Island.

The building was a landmark in the area and in years gone by the building had a number of uses including a cinema, dance hall, auction hall and as a store in recent years, the building will be remembered as the place where the fish were landed. It was the money paid for the catches there that provided livelihoods for fishermen and their families not just in the Rosses but throughout northwest. The older and younger generation would gather to discuss the past night catch and to catch up on the local gossip.

In the 1960's, 1970's and 1980's there was a vibrant fishing industry in north west Donegal and Burtonport was one of the busiest harbours in the country. In the summer months the 'Port' lorry as it was known locally would travel around the smaller piers bringing

the salmon to Burtonport where they would be sold. The lorry also used to come around a couple of times a year looking for lost fish boxes.

In those days, the money raised by fishing kept many people from taking the emigrant boat and in the summers especially all the harbours would be a hive of activity but unfortunately in recent years Burtonport and these other small harbours have become a shadow of their former selves as the fishing industry has declined and the Auction House on Burtonport has become the latest casualty of this decline.

The old Auction Hall at Burtonport stood watch over the boom times for the fishing fleet at the Pier when big catches were landed and money made. It also stood watch over the tragic days at the Pier when trawlers and their crews left the Pier and did not return as happened with the tragic losses of the Evelyn Marie and Carrig Una in the mid 1970's and the Skifjord in 1981, so it has played a pivotal role in the life of the area for many many years.

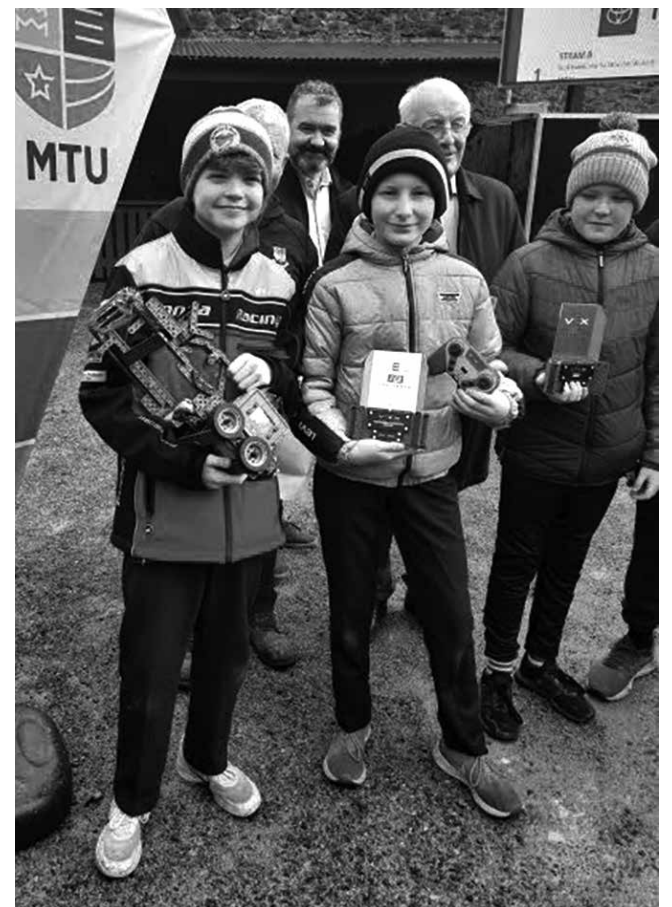
ural heritage.

Donegal flies feature in new book

Traditional Irish salmon flies from Donegal and across Ireland, commissioned one hundred and twenty years ago for the Cork International Exhibition in 1902, now feature in a new historical picture book from Inland Fisheries Ireland.

Fly tying involves the 'dressing' of a fishing hook to create an artificial fly, which is then used by anglers at the end of a rod and line to catch fish. It's a little-known part of Ireland's heritage but many angling shops in Ireland in the late 1800s and early 1900s employed 'fly dressers'. Some were considered masters of their craft, thanks to their skills, creativity and the traditional methods that they used.

For the 1902 Exhibition, the salmon flies for the Ballyshannon and Letterkenny districts were tied by the famous fly dresser Michael Rogan from Ballyshannon. A total of 20 flies for the Ballyshannon district and eight flies for the Letterkenny district were tied by the late Mr. Rogan and are now included in the new online book titled 'The 1902 Cork Collection of Salmon Flies'. One of the most renowned salmon flies

in Ireland is the 'Fiery Brown'. The fly is famous for the particular hue of the materials used by

Rogan, which were dyed a reddish brown colour known as 'Fiery Brown'. Many other fly-tyers tried to imitate this colour, and there has been much debate and intrigue over the years as to how he achieved this particular hue. Mr. Rogan's 'Fiery Brown' is amongst the best-known flies in the Letterkenny district, which also includes the 'Golden Olive' and the 'Olive & Claret'. These flies were tied for use on the River Owenea, River Gweedore, River Crolly, and the River Lennan.

Strategy for Black and Minority Ethnic Inclusion launched

The first ever Strategy for Black and Minority Ethnic Inclusion for County Donegal was launched by Cathaoirleach of Donegal Co Council, Cllr Jack Murray, and Nolunga Shologu Community Links Worker with Donegal Intercultural Platform on Friday.

This Strategy is the result of a two-year process that began with research by Donegal Intercultural Platform into the needs of Black and Minority Ethnic communities in the county. This was followed by the establishment of a multi-agency steering committee to develop a Strategy that would identify actions to deliver on the identified needs.

Speaking as he launched the Strategy, Cllr Jack Murray said that "Donegal has changed radically within one generation, the 2016 census indicated that 7.2% of the population of the county, or 11,477 people were born outside the state. When we carry out our census on the 3rd April, I fully expect that that percentage will have increased, and also that we will have people living with us from even more countries around the world"

The vision of the Strategy for Black and Minority Ethnic Inclusion for Donegal is the achievement of

equality for Black and Minority Ethnic communities in Donegal through securing their active inclusion in the community and full participation in the wider society". To achieve that vision the Strategy contains 47 actions with a capacity to realise the positive potential in an intercultural county. In this, it builds on a track record on initiatives across all sectors and agencies, and on a leadership and drive from across the Black and Minority Ethnic communities in the county.

Speaking on behalf of Donegal Intercultural Platform, Nolunga Shologu, noted that that the name of our county - Donegal - comes from the Gaelige for the Fort of the Foreigners, and she encouraged everyone to use this inclusion strategy, through its implementation, to make Donegal a Fortress of Safety, Care, Recognition and Community for everyone who lives here irrespective of their colour, their ethnicity, their faith or mother tongue, their ability, gender or their status.

Price increases... away with the fairies

On February 4th, Paschal Donohue ruled out cutting VAT on energy to deal with a spike in fuel prices, saying a €100 energy credit is the "priority". Yet on the day the Taoiseach was at an EU meeting attempting to negotiate a possible cut to VAT on fuel, Paschal popped up in the Dail to have a pop at SF as Micheál Martin was in Brussels trying to get a 4.5% cut in VAT rates.

Finance Minister Paschal Donohue has accused Sinn Féin of being "too busy deleting its policies" as he defended the Government's response to the cost-of-living crisis. So it is now official: the Shinners actually do have policies. I suspect that this was something the public had known before the general election in 2020.

Mr Donohue clashed with Sinn Féin's Deputy Pearse Doherty in the Dáil on Thursday who claimed that people are being forced to choose between keeping the heat on and buying food. Predictably, the spiral of price increases and inflation once again dominated Dail proceedings last Thursday as the Government resisted calls from Sinn Féin to go further to tackle inflation. It comes amid ever-growing concern about the impact of inflation on the poorest households. In the Dáil, Deputy Pearse Doherty also cited a study by the bank KBC, which calculated that Irish households may be €2,000 worse off due to inflation. "This is going to hit lower and middle income earners hardest. Workers and families cannot bear these costs without significant financial hardship. Rising prices doesn't affect everyone equally. They impact lower earners hardest." Doherty said that he understood the Government could not help

everyone, but said it "can and must do more". Pointing to the cost of home heating oil, he urged the finance minister to bring forward a package of social welfare measures. Act to protect those who are most vulnerable," he told Mr Donohue. Remember that as Finance Minister, Donohue handed out a fiver to everyone in the electorate and then in the New Year he backed the Cabinet for being brave as everyone in the audience got a rebate on electricity prices... from the poorest sector to the billionaires all got the same payment to compensate for the massive increases in electricity. Donohue is coming to terms with Government hand outs to all and sundry when they agreed to pay householders a pittance of the increasing costs of electricity. Never mind that begrudgers, the government did not discriminate as they tossed a crumb to the poorest and to the most wealthy sections of this country, all in the one fell swoop. How's that for policy decisions? Last Thursday, Mr Donohue defended the Government's response to the crisis, claiming it was a result of "circumstances outside of our control", citing the uncertain duration of the war in Ukraine. Whilst listing off the measures announced in recent weeks, including the cut to excise duty

and the €200 electricity grant, Mr Donohue told Deputy Doherty: "The difference between the deputies on this side of the house and you, Deputy Doherty, and your colleagues, is this government is busy trying to implement measures that we believe can make a difference. We are busy implementing measures to try to help," he said. How reassuring is that now! On February 4th, Paschal Donohue made things very clear for all of us. The Minister ruled out cutting VAT on energy to deal with a spike in fuel prices, saying a €100 energy credit is the "priority". "The energy credit is a far more effective way of dealing with the cost of energy than our VAT code because we are already taxing at a low rate of VAT," Mr Donohue told an event organised by accounting body CPA Ireland on February 4th. Yet on the day the Taoiseach was at an EU meeting attempting to negotiate a possible cut to VAT on fuel, Paschal popped up in the Dail to have a pop at SF as Micheál Martin was in Brussels trying to get a 4.5% cut in VAT rates. Rather odd when one consider the Finance Minister's ruling out any such cuts only weeks earlier. Some policy differences there obviously. Everything about Ireland relates to a high-debt country? That's one of the questions the Economic and Social Research Institute seeks to answer in its latest quarterly report. You might be tempted to conclude that, with a national debt fast approaching €240 billion, the answer is an overwhelming yes. But it depends on the size of the economy that's carrying it. In 2019, Ireland's debt-to-tax receipts ratio was 2.6. In terms of a euro zone comparison, this wasn't as high as Greece, Italy, Portugal or Spain but it was at the higher end of the distribution, suggesting Ireland is one of the more indebted countries in Europe. And we already know that inflation in the Irish economy is expected to surge in the coming months at a level not seen since the early 1980s. That's ac-

ording to the ESRI. Mind you, the think tanks have not been accurate since inflation got a grip here last Autumn, The ESRI prediction is for inflation of 8.5% while others are saying it will reach 10%. The ESRI report is projecting that a typical household will see its income decline by about €1,300 once the effects of inflation are accounted for. Other economists are predicting a decline of €2,000. The ESRI said Russia's invasion of Ukraine was having negative impacts on global economic activity and further exacerbating inflationary pressures, primarily through higher energy and commodity prices. It said Irish consumers could be facing into a period of energy rationing if the crisis worsens. "There is a considerable risk that, should tensions increase, further disruptions to gas and oil supplies might occur, and in a worst case, end-user rationing might be required in Europe," it said. The economic fallout from the conflict, the ESRI said, would result in lower-than-expected growth in the Irish economy of 6.2% this year and 4.3%. The think-tank had been forecasting growth of 13.6% for this year and the economy will run a modest budget surplus this year, the first since 2019. Energia's electricity prices are going up in a move that will cost the average customer an additional €247 a year. Energia gas customer bills will increase by 15% or an average of €3.45 per week. The increase for dual fuel customers will equate to an average of €8.20 per week, or €426 per year. Some mobile phone companies are also increasing their charges. And watching Netflix will also add to your monthly bill. The farm sector heavily reliant on fertiliser has seen prices rocket, reaching record highs and has more than doubled in a year. 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New agricultural prices figures from the Central Statistics Office show that fertiliser prices had risen by 127% in January 2022 compared to the same period the year before. However, these prices from January, before Russia launched a war on Ukraine, with both countries' major suppliers of fertiliser for Ireland. A recent price list for fertilisers posted on Reddit showed that since January the price of some fertilisers could have risen again to more than €1,000 a tonne in recent days, up from about €340 a tonne last year. This is expected to have a knock-on effect on food security as farmers will struggle to afford to grow crops as well as an almost certain rise in the price of food in Ireland - which would be passed on to consumers. CSO figures show the price of milk has risen by 29.7% compared to last year, as well as the price of cereals, increasing by 34%, and potatoes by 22.8%. That trend is unlikely to change, with inflation in the cost of production unlikely to ease quickly, leaving little incentive for farmers to drive for higher milk yields. "Input prices are sky-rocketing across Europe and the globe. Whether we like it or not, less fertiliser and other inputs will also mean less food output," said IFA President Tim Cullinan

However, Ireland may be one of the few dairy exporters with hopes of profitably increasing milk production. Even before dairy farming costs started to shoot upwards in 2021, more than 40% of dairy farmers globally already were unable to cover their full production costs, said the IFCN (International Farm Comparison Network) team of dairy farming systems researchers. And when the European Milk Board of 21 dairy farmer associations and farmers' lobbies commissioned a study last year of 2015-19 farming costs in Belgium, Denmark, France, Germany, Ireland, Lithuania, Luxembourg, and the Netherlands, it found it was only in Ireland, due to its lower production costs, that milk production generated an income. General inflation is being fuelled by oil prices dramatically increasing in 2021, and European electricity prices reached their highest level for years. The increase in milk prices has not been enough to offset the farming cost trends. The global cattle feed price is estimated to have increased 38% in 2021, and it is likely to remain at this high level for most of 2022. The Felons Club itself is another iconic building with an eclectic Membership. Anyone can wine and dine in the salubrious settings but Membership is restricted to those who opposed British rule in the 6 counties and were political prisoners in Crumlin Road, the Prison ship Maidstone and of course Long Kesh, I feel privileged to be a Member! Our final launch was in my spiritual home in Termon, held in the Lagoon bar and restaurant, close to my Mum's old home place, the blacksmith's cottage near Doon Well.

Each launch was selected to represent a significant period in my life; The Felons representing my youth in that city of conflict but my place of birth and always a place in my heart. The Lagoon representing my long 30 year sojourn in Termon where my children and grandchildren have Donegal as their home. Glasgow, a city I have visited for over 50 years and home to my Mum's sisters, the Donegal Diaspora, and my regular pilgrimage to 'Paradise' to follow the fortunes of the Irish team in Britain, Celtic, formed by Br. Walfrid and Irish migrants in the 1880's to help feed the poor Diaspora post Famine times.

And Charlie Byrne's in Galway, a bookshop par excellence similar to Shakespeare's on the West Bank in Paris. Galway has been my domicile for the past 20 years almost, Oranmore to be exact, it's a beautiful part of the world and like all men there was a beautiful lady to entice me down the West. In Charlie Byrne's, Dr Mary Harris and Dr John Cunningham from NUI Galway, Niall MacGiolla Bhui from Bookhub Publishing and Kernan Andrews (grandson of former NI PM John Andrews) from the Galway Advertiser all delivered various insights into the book.

In Belfast, barrister and former Lord Mayor of Dundalk Neil McCann; CEO of UISCE at Clinton House Enniskillen and former RUC man Keith McNair and Gerry Scullion, former political prisoner and Felons Sec; all gave fascinating observations on life in conflict and friendships created despite our differences.

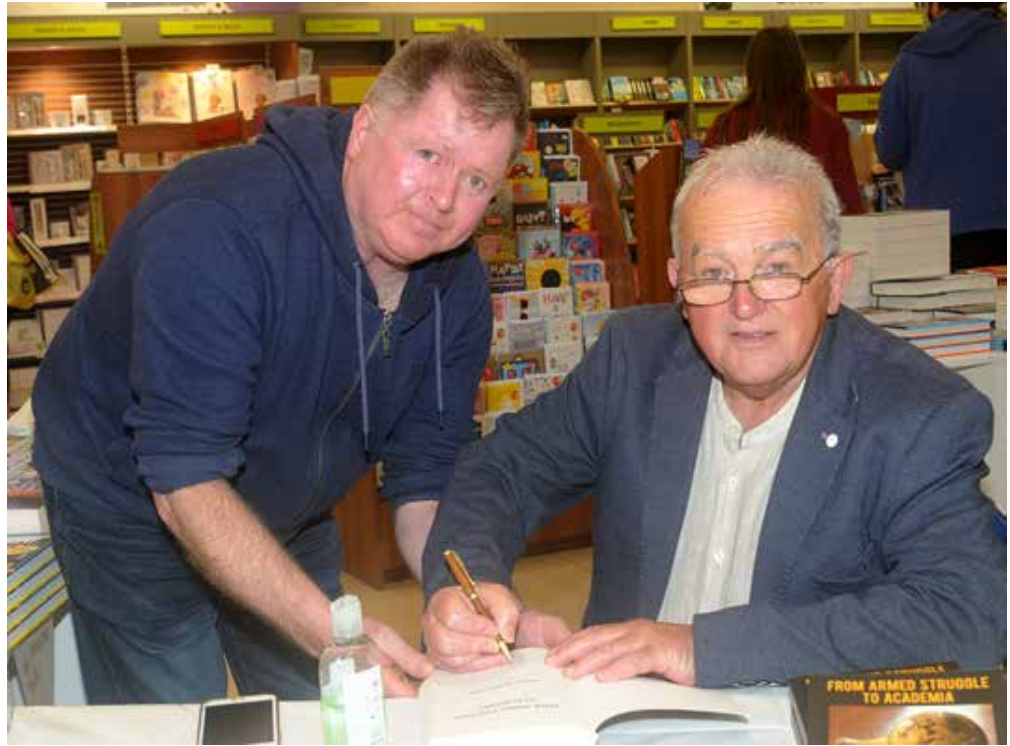
Finally in Termon, Tirconail Tribune Editor John McAteer

was his usual ebullient self as he defined the book from Belfast to Donegal and eventually Galway and the life story which prevailed. John of course was my editor for my weekly contribution to the Tribune every week for the past 4 years, he gave me a chance to get the written word out there and for that I will be eternally grateful, it might have been a rush every Sunday evening getting the 2000 words delivered before the deadline after 18 holes at Galway Bay and a few pints of black stuff at the '19th'; but Word processed it along with a glass of red wine and watching the Sunday Game at the same time.

Many a time it was midnight before it hit the electronic highway and made its way to the darkest outreaches of Fanad where John would have to spend half the night editing that week's article. But Shanagh's answer to Rupert Murdoch always produces the news on Main St, Milford, late on a Wednesday evening with a front page attacking whatever Govt was in power at the time!

The book, 'Armed Struggle to Academia' has been a work in progress I suppose for 50 years since those dark days I spent confined by a foreign Govt. for many years in their gaols and concentration camps; Crumlin Road, the Maidstone, Magilligan and of course Long Kesh. They were difficult times but I learned to type on an old black typewriter and edited a Cage paper and to be honest achieved my real education about life.

It gave me an interest in literature and writing and where I should have been in life but as they said about my fellow Belfast hero Georgie Best, 'where did it all go wrong?' With no qualifications, a family and a mortgage, a dead end job in a factory became reality and when you need money on the table on a Friday you can't be a

dreamer.

There was also the recognition that ordinary working class people don't write books or get above their station, that it's for those in the 'literati', the Generals, Businessmen, D4 spoil journalists in Ballsbridge, those with so many 'As' in their LC results that the Doctor in Trinity would have problems saying 'AAH'?

But the new Millennium and the 'noughties' brought a redundancy wave to Donegal and following the Unifi and Fruit of the Loom implosion I was able to extricate myself from Kirchoff and return to academia, well maybe 'return' is the wrong phrasal verb as I was never at 3rd Level previously. In fact, I had never been inside Queen's and didn't know anyone else who had. That's the way it was growing up where we lived in West Belfast, thankfully it's all changed now. Nationalist students make up 70% of the academic cohort, the Union Jack only flies on certain days and God Save the Queen isn't played at Graduations, that would definitely help when you receive your Parchment and your 2.1 from the President!

So redundancy brought me to NUI Galway and the rest as they say is history, a veritable alphabet of letters after my name and a Teacherman and now a published author into the bargain, I suppose I've come a long way from the time 45 years ago after arriving in Donegal and during après match drinks and I mentioned I had a dream of going to University and was asked in a derogatory manner, 'have you qualifications?' I suppose ignorance and small town parochialism is part of life, c'est la vie?

And now we have the book, actually a trilogy of sorts, the Covid Lockdown and lack of golf led me to put together two small booklets to raise funds for Pieta House; 'Walking through a story of life' and 'Political Status-Long Kesh' raised some much needed Euros for a charity close to my heart, and then the extended virus into a second year allowed me the time and space to scribble to my heart's content as I rattled the keyboard

on the laptop to the click click of 130,000 words. It was a memoir of sorts, a look back at life from the streets of Belfast to the green swards of Galway Bay golf resort and the Hills of Donegal in between.

It was difficult to write a lot of the stuff, many, many guys I knew had been killed during the conflict, as I said in the book; my story was as much their story. It was also therapeutic and I hope it was subjective

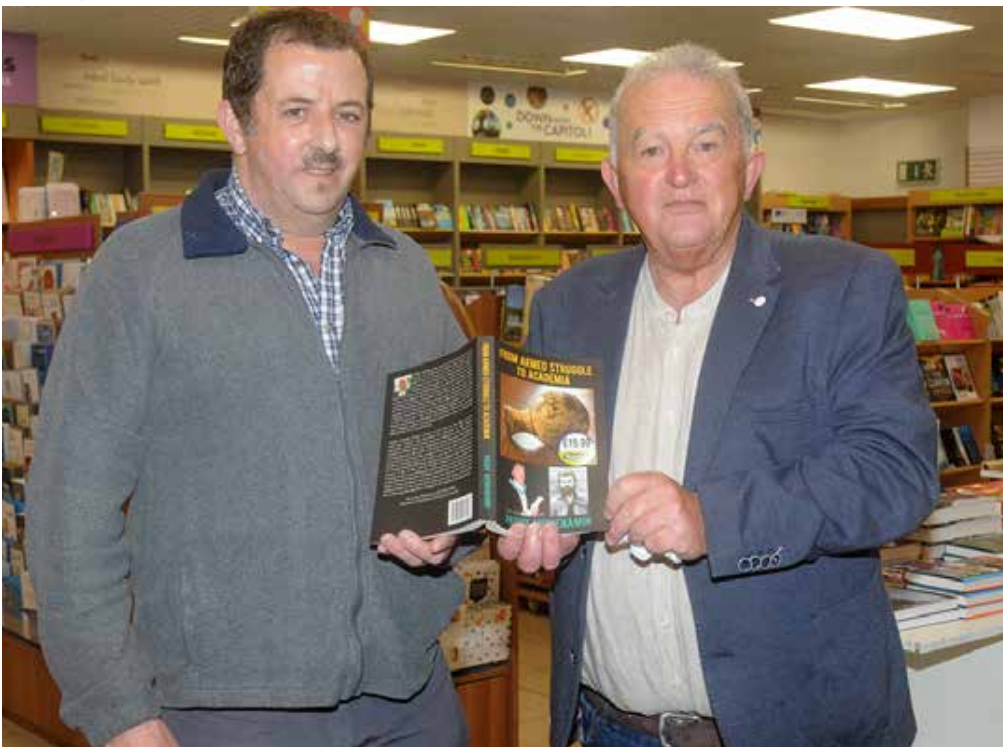
and thought provoking, and thankfully it has received a great response from those who have read the book.

As I said earlier it's been a hectic month or so, but the initial 500 published have been delivered to over 30 shops around the country and a second print in the offing, that's the first target achieved, and upward and onward we go! 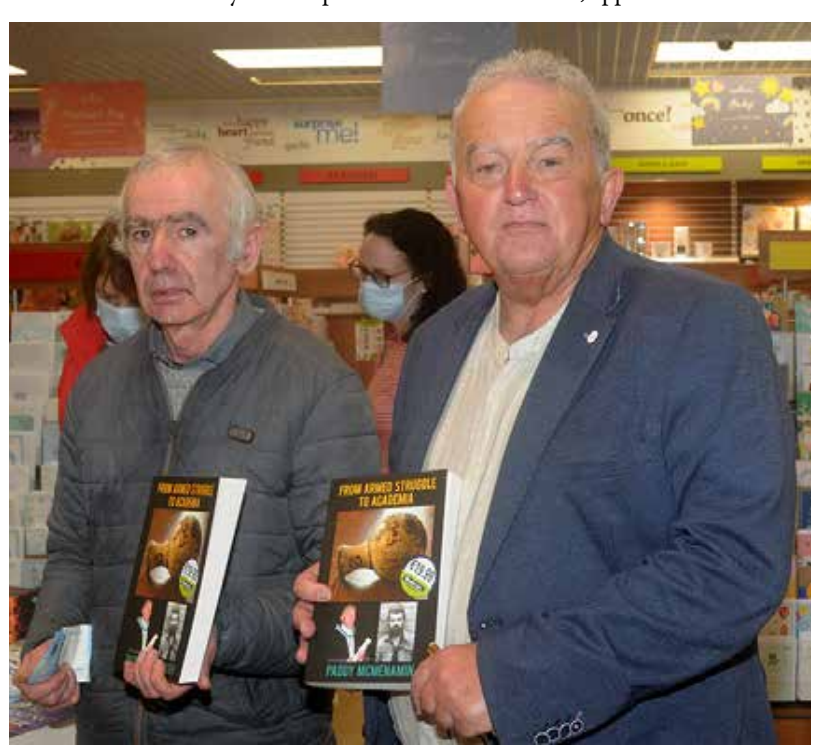
And for anyone who has attempted to get something out there in the print world they will understand that getting that publicity is essential.

Big deal for Ramelton

Ramelton has been designated a flagship conservation project in the county development plan: so said the County Manager in his report to Monday's meeting of the Council.

This comes at a time when the vast majority of Ramelton folk say that the lack of funding has been the real conversation project for over thirty years.

As the Mall buzzed to the sound of happy campers celebrating the wonderful news the whole place came to a total standstill as crowds gathered outside Whoriskey's Spar Supermarket to talk about their good fortune.

Innocent passers-by could be forgiven for thinking the town had collectively won the UK rollover Lotto of £27million... or else the price of WHO fuels on the international oil markets have gone through the floor again.

"When did Ramelton get such good news...never", I heard one owl woman say and she recalled the first plan to drain the Lennon in 1956. "That was our first shot at a panto," she added somewhat mockingly - I thought.

And some twenty years after being designated a Georgian town for immediate funding there is even more good news.

A sum of €5000 has been provided for a part of a pilot project. It seems that somebody, some where has now copped on that living in a Georgian town does not necessarily mean having tumble down buildings reminiscent of that era.

There is to be a programme of regeneration said the Manager on Monday. It is to be based on it's architectural heritage as a pilot project and a submission for funds was made to the people at the Heritage Council.

Now...lo and behold a sum of five grand in shining new Euros has been coughed up. It will be used to complete a detailed inventory of the town. The generosity is wonderful and everyone is chatting about it. We just wonder what might be coming next...on the doorsteps.

Readers of the Tribune will be very familiar with the lead into the general election of five years ago. Remember that very important picture taken on the quayside on a wonderfully sunny May afternoon? Well if we can take one sec to refresh your fading memory let me say that the snap of the good and the great was all about putting in a marina on the Lennon. It was seen as a magnificent idea by some...and by others it was seen as a total ball of fluff.

Council must declare war on potholes ... McGlinchey



Cllr Bernard McGlinchey has called on Donegal County Council to declare war on potholes. His comments were made in Lifford at Monday's Council meeting when he spoke during the debate on the Roads and Transportation SPC progress report. He said that it was an absolute emergency as some potholes were the size of small lakes.

He believed that the report had ignored the wishes of the committee who met earlier in the month. Cllr. McGlinchey thought that it was agreed to purchase six Velocity Patching Machine

for each of the electoral areas.

Cllr Thomas Pringle suggested the money could be spent on drainage. Cllr Jimmy Harte suggested if a law similar to that in the UK which made local authorities directly responsible for damage to cars caused by potholes was enforced here then the Donegal's legendary pothole problem could be a thing of the past. Ending the debate.

Cllr. McGlinchey believed that other methods of road repair should be analysed at the next committee meeting.

Don't call Lifford: ring Shaun Doherty

Those of you who are pestered with atrociously disgraceful roads and potholes can breathe a sigh of relief following Monday's meeting of the Council in Lifford.

There was another big debate on bad roads and it followed the normal pattern until Cllr. Francis Conaghan suggested that in future everyone with complaints should 'Ring Highland Radio'.

"Ring Highland Radio because it seems to be the only way to get things done," said Conaghan who said he had been encouraging his constituents to follow this course of action.

Gerry Crawford felt there was a certain irony to 'the bad roads debate' and wondered if the officials would take on board what the councillors were saying: "We have been raising the problems of the roads continuously and nothing has been done

about it. But when the public went on the local radio to air their grievances, some potholes have been fixed within two hours."

Cllr Sean Maloney said the poor state of the roads meant that no politician in their right mind will go to the radio to defend the Council. Well... with an election lurking in the long grass I just wonder if it will take wild horses to keep the politicians away from the microphones.

And the Council is to launch a new plan: (yes another one): it is to be formulated by the Roads Dept. Complaints have arisen over the condition of many roads in the aftermath of developments.

The new Council plan may not do much for those embarrassingly deep potholes and ruts that are the bane of our lives but sure it will stop you chatting and complaining about them (for at least ten minutes).

Rubbish fees up €15 a tonne

As expected since the Estimates meeting of the Council last November landfill charges are to be raised by a further €15 a tonne as part of the Environment Dept's waste management strategy. The charges will bring the cost of landfill charges to a record high

of €77 per tonne. And in each following year a further €5 increase will be imposed.

The increase will be introduced from June 1st and the Council is obliged to collect the levy for the Dept. It is to fund a range of initiatives including waste management: litter and other environmental issues.

Council officials are to meet with the waste collectors to discuss the increases and their impact on waste disposal and management.

McKenna lashes 'vested interests'

As Save the Swilly sends a 10,000 strong petition to the EU seeking a moratorium on further mariculture licenses in the Lough the Green MEP Patricia McKenna (pictured with John Mulcahy) has launched one of her strongest ever attacks on fish farming interests.



Speaking in Dublin during the launch of the STS petition this week McKenna strongly condemned, "the blatant conflict of interest at the heart of fish farming in Ireland.

She said "the same Minister who grants licences with minimal environmental protection is also responsible for encouraging the growth of the industry by allocating resources to the sector actively promoting it. This is a very serious problem and one which will have grave repercussions because our coasts will not take the pressure and in the end consumers will also be put at risk."

The STS book of signatures will be taken by McKenna to the Petitions Committee in Strasburg.

The petition calls on the Irish government to declare a moratorium on aquaculture licensing in Lough Swilly pending completion of a series of independent scientific studies on the lough. STS has commissioned the first of these, a Scoping Study now being conducted by the Coastal Studies Research Group at the University of Ulster's School of Environmental Studies in Coleraine. Once completed, the Scoping Study will be used as the basis for a comprehensive study into a proposed Inte-grated Coastal Zone Management (ICZM) strategy for Lough Swilly.

The STS petition, gathered over the past year, is critical of both the Irish government and the European Union for failing to protect the marine environment in Lough Swilly. The Irish government has ignored calls to commission a scientific study of the lough, while the EU continues to provide extensive grant aid to aquaculture operators in Lough Swilly, at the same time expressing grave concern about aquaculture licensing within SAC's and (SPA's).

"It is not good enough for the Department of the Marine to continue licensing aquaculture operations, while ignoring the threats to wild-fish stocks, to bird habitats and to the legitimate interests of other users of the lough," STS chairman Tony Morrison said. "The attitude of the Irish government authorities is completely biased in favour of the expansion of aquaculture, and our reasonable demand that a detailed assessment of the lough be carried out has fallen on

its part by withholding further funding of aquaculture activities in Lough Swilly until the series of scientific studies has been completed and assessed. EU funding for a comprehensive assessment of Lough Swilly would benefit all stakeholders, and not exclusively the aquaculture sector. Patricia McKenna lashed into Marine Minister Frank Fahey for allegedly promoting the unchecked growth of fish farming in Ireland while failing to comply with EU law to protect designated areas.

She co-hosted the press conference along with the Save the Swilly Campaign, An Taisce and Coastwatch and she demonstrated how Minister Fahey's plans of doubling the growth of this area by 2006 and allocating huge resources to promote this industry, "will have serious negative impacts on coastal environments and will deplete our natural fish stocks."

As a member of the Fisheries Committee in the European Parliament, she is calling for a total moratorium on all fish farming licensing in all designated areas until a proper assessment procedure is put in place for both fin fish and shell fish farming.

"There is €73 million earmarked for the development of fish farming in Ireland in the National Development Plan (2000-2006), of which €35 million is coming from the EU Structural Funds.

Minister Frank Fahey was quoted recently denouncing the Habitats and Wild Birds Directives as being 'too restrictive'. I find this quite extraordinary and terribly irresponsible of the Minister to say such a thing considering that he is actually not even complying with these major environmental laws. He has granted licences in SACs and SPAs without even any requirement for an assessment of the environmental impacts these have on the local wildlife and particularly the local fish stocks."

Council faced with €2m NRA shortfall

This week's meeting of Donegal County Council has been told that it is necessary to use their overdraft arrangements to fund the €2.04 million shortfall in the allocation from the National Roads Authority... a sum of €890,000 is needed to complete the Port Bridge Roundabout in Letterkenny. Speaking during Monday's meeting in Lifford the County Manager said he proposed to the Members that their overdraft facilities to accommodate the deficit. The Fine Gael Members said that in essence they would be borrowing from next year's budget and this would lead to an even greater deficit. Cllr. Bernard McGlinchly challenged the FG benches to tell him the extent of the NRA funding back in 1996. Obviously this meeting was a limbering up for the general election campaign.

The County Manager told the members that the Port Bridge needs a further €890,000 to bring it to completion later this summer. Other projects under construction include the Donegal Town Bypass and the Clar-Barnes Road.

The total cost of these three projects is €1.405 million. The manager said that another 635 thousand Euro is acquired to be spent on schemes that are in planning and design. The three projects under construction were not given allocations from the NRA this year. The total cost at the Port Bridge is currently €575,000 and the estimated cost of the outstanding works is €315,000 bringing the total unfunded allocation in 2002 to €890,000.

The remaining €635,000 borrowed will be used schemes in planning and design. €100,000 is required for preliminary design for the N14 Manorcunningham to Lifford Realignment.

Reacting, Fine Gael has laid the blame on the Government with Cllr McGinness suggesting the council send another delegation to the NRA.

Blaney demands facilities for Carrigart

Cllr Niall Blaney is to make representations to Donegal County Council to purchase the old health centre and adjacent land on Carrigart's Main Street to accommodate a range of essential services which he says are lacking in the village.

He has met with members of the local community and has agreed to pursue the Council with a view towards acquiring the property. Carrigart is to have a new health centre with construction works well under way and Niall Blaney says the premises being vacated can be of a huge benefit.

He says there is a need for a phone kiosk; a bank-link machine; public toilets and a car park on the main street.

Blaney says the property in question can fulfil accommodation for all these facilities.

Legendary Ramelton pub for sale

Mary's Bar on Castle Street in Ramelton is to be sold as the proprietor Mary McLaughlin has decided to retire.

It is one of the legendary pubs in the north west and after 35 years pulling pints Mary has finally decided that it's time to take life a bit easier.

Mary and her late husband Denis bought the premises from Mrs Martin in 1967: it was a small pub back then with a local clientele. The couple earned a living behind the bar but sadly Denis passed away twenty years ago.

This week Mary recalled those times: she was left with a family of twelve and four of them were very young. She has paid tribute to the community in Ramelton for helping through those difficult times and for the support to her business.

She recalled the pub being the home of Swilly Rovers: before the club had their own dressing rooms Mary's Bar was the changing rooms for both home and away teams. And after the game they all were served soup and sandwiches. That tradition still continues and Mary says that many a good night's singing took place with some of the Derry teams who came out to play in the summer cups.

Donegal features in House of Commons address

It's not often that Donegal features in the House of Commons but it most certainly did on St. Patrick's Day when Scottish MP Dave Doogan spoke with great pride about his Irish heritage in the parliament.

Dave is the son of Annie and the late Jim Doogan both natives of Kincasslagh. Both his parents emigrated separately to Scotland in the late 1950s. Jim went on to be a successful agricultural and building contractor in Perth where the family have been long time residents.

Jim Doogan who has been a Scottish National MP since 2019 spoke with great passion in the House of Commons about his family roots in Donegal and extolled the county's great beauty in terms of beaches, mountains and landscape and the history going

back to St. Colmcille a century and a half ago. Gonna O'Donnell resides in Kincasslagh and is connected to the Doogans through his wife who is a cousin. "Jim and Annie are both from here in Kincasslagh. She was Annie 'Joe' Walsh. They have a holiday home here and Dave was a regular visitor with the family for many years."

In the House of Commons Dave Doogan spoke about being one of six children growing up in Perth and going to the local Catholic school. He is very much a European and told his fellow MPs that he had just got his Irish passport to emphasise that and his love of his parents country. His mother always encouraged her six children in terms of education and instilled a confidence that they could do well in the world. The Scottish politician also spoke



about the unbelievable work of the Donegal Tunnel Tigers and gave a special mention to the Arranmore men who for 75 years did the underground works for hydro schemes and underground transport in Scotland and England. He expressed disappointment at the lack of recognition that these men had received in the official history of the huge infrastructural developments in mainland Britain for nearly a century.

After his address to the English Parliament Dave Doogan was out helping the Scottish Labour Party campaigning for the Scottish local council elections in Perth before taking in a superb Arbroath Football Club win.

David Michael Doogan was born on the 4th of March 1973. He studied at the University of Dundee. Dave was elected as the Member of Parliament (MP) for Angus in the 2019 United Kingdom general election, after defeating incumbent Conservative candidate Kirstene Hair. He had previously been a member of Perth and Kinross Council.

He had been a civilian in the Royal Navy from 1989 to 2007: Doogan served as an Apprentice Aircraft Engineer from 1989 to 1993, also working in repair and overhaul of Helicopter Transmission, specialising in Sea King Search and

Rescue Aircraft, as a surveyor, team leader, supervisor, operations planning manager, Sea King and Lynx Transmissions Production Manager and in Commercial Management.

A former aircraft engineer with the Ministry of Defence, Dave left his successful career in the civil service in 2007 to pursue a career in politics. Doogan graduated in 2011 from the University of Dundee with a First Class MA (Hons) in Politics and International Relations. From 2011 to 2016, he was a caseworker for the office of John Swinney MSP.

Dave was co-owner of Perthshire Garden and Property from 2016 to 2019. He first was elected to Perth and Kinross Council as a councillor for Perth City North in 2012, with the largest share of first preference votes in that ward. Dave was reelected to PKC in 2017, increasing his share of the vote by 4.02%. At the election he became the leader of the SNP group on Perth and Kinross Council, and as such, Leader of the Opposition.

In the House of Commons, Dave Doogan became the SNP Spokesperson for Agriculture and Rural Affairs in January 2020. Later that year he also became Spokesperson for Manufacturing. Dave is married to Gillian Kirk and the couple have two children.

Death of 100 year old Susan McBride

Susan McBride, (Nee Lambe) Duntinney, Fanad's most senior citizen, died last Thursday and she was in her 101th year. She celebrated her 100th birthday on May 31st last year and she was one Fanad's best loved citizens.

She passed away peacefully at the home of her daughter Pauline where she'd spent the last years of a very happy life.

Susan had great memories in Fanad: born during the War of Independence and surviving the Second World War and the rationing of food.

Susan was a member of the Lambe family originally. Her mother was Biddy Coyle who hailed from Gortnacor. Biddy emigrated to America in the eighteen hundreds to find a better way of life... and like so many of Ireland's exiles, she did.

It was while working in America that Biddy met and married a man from Monaghan. John Lambe and their early siblings were born before they returned to Ireland.

The family came back home on the day that Dublin's Custom House was razed in a fire and it was almost destroyed.

On Wednesday May 1921, during the War of Independence, the Dublin Brigade of the IRA attacked the building, setting it on fire.

These were the most difficult of years in our history: the signing of the Treaty: the War of Independence followed by the Civil War with the 1916 Rising, still a vivid memory for that generation.

It was something of shock return for the Lambe family and it was right in the face of the armed struggle.

Back home in Fanad the Lambe family hardly had time to get acquainted with their new surroundings in Duntinney when Susan arrived a week after their return. She was born on May 31st 1921 on a smallholding on the heart of the Fanad Peninsula.

A number of the Lambe children died in America. Jackie passed at six months of age: a daughter, Peggy died when only six. Back at home a son, Peter died from meningitis at the age of 18. James died in a farm accident when ploughing on the Barton estate at Portsalon, he was aged 21. Another son, John died from natural causes.

On their return to Donegal in 1921, the Lambe family bought 17 acres of land but only 4 acres were arable. Yet they survived despite all the odds and at many times luck was not on their side. All the more remarkable that Susan has lived to be a hundred years of age.



Susan McBride was among that last generation to live through 'Ireland's Emergency' in the nineteen forties. She was just 18 years old when World War Two began in 1939.

Back in earlier times, and despite rationing and the war, life carried on for Fanad folk and likewise for the Lambe family. Then in 1942/43 their home was destroyed in a fire and they might have been homeless, but fate decided otherwise.

Susan and her husband Packie came to live a nearby forge where they resided for a number of years. Their first son, Cathal was born in the forge, perhaps the last child in Fanad to have such a historic birthplace.

In fact, they moved into a new house on the day their second son, Josie was born. Sadly, Josie passed last year.

Susan became widowed when Packie passed away in 1984. They were married in 1948 and lived a very happy life in Fanad.

Another son, Patsy who was four years of age died on his way to hospital for appendicitis surgery in 1959. The other family members include: Martin, Margaret and Pauline: there are 21 grandchildren and 21 great grandchildren.

In many ways, Susan was part of a generation that had their own equal rights - they were all equally poor. Yet they had that steely determination and a big part of it was their own courage and ability to cope with all kinds of difficulties.

Susan was predeceased by her husband Packie, her sons Patsy and Josie, her granddaughter Michelle and her daughter-in-law Patricia.

She is survived by her sons Cathal and Martin and daughters Margaret (Gallagher) and Pauline (Dorrian), her grandchildren Fiona, Damien, Teresa, Tony, John, Pearse, Brid, Kieran, Susan, Barry, Brian, James, Matthew, Pauric, Gary, Kevin, Elisha, Declan, Shaun, Mark and Tanita and her much loved 22 great grandchildren: her her sons-in-law James Gallagher and Patrick Dorrian and daughter-in-law Ann, her extended family, neighbours and her large circle of friends to whom deepest sympathy is extended.

The number of mourners at the wake and funeral reflected Susan's popularity and her passing is deeply regretted. Her remains reposed at her late home in Duntinney and the Requiem Mass in St. Columba's Church Massmount on Saturday was celebrated by Fr. Pat McGarvey PP: interment followed in the adjoining cemetery.

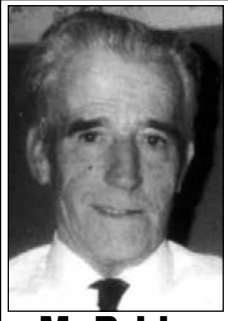

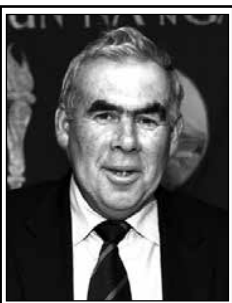

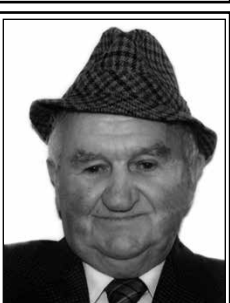

Unsavory scenes as Donegal survive in Div 1

Donegal 1-14 Armagh 1-13

It was mission accomplished at the O'Donnell Park on Sunday against Armagh as Donegal made sure of their Division 1 status for next season. But, there were unsavory scenes involving players from both sides and others from the touchline that lasted for around five minutes after the final whistle. Declan Bonner and Kieran McGeeney will be anxiously awaiting referee Paddy Neilan's report with the two sides meeting in the Ulster Championship on the 24th of April. Getting back to the match it could so easily have been their opponents Armagh taking the victory as the Orchard County squandered a couple of clear opportunities in the closing stages. But, it was Paddy McBrearty in the fifth minute of injury that landed the winning score for the hosts at the river end of the Letterkenny venue.

It was a match that had a bit of everything to entertain the attendance of 5,650 in glorious March sunshine. Donegal were by far the better side in the first half and should have been more than five points in front at the break. The concession of a soft 32nd minute goal didn't help Declan Bonner's side in that regard. Then Michael Murphy missed a penalty midway through the second half that would have given his side a seven-point lead. By that stage Neil McGee had been on and off the field as a temporary replacement for Brendan McCole who had a problem with a torn jersey. That happened in a tussle with Rian O'Neill and resulted in the

Armagh sub receiving some close attention from McGee. The Gweedore man ended up with a yellow card and left the field without touching the ball.

At the other end Conmaire Mackin missed a golden chance to make Murphy more miserable but the wing-back shot wide in a one-on-one with Patton. Donegal's grip on the game was slackening and Patton had a bad start to the final quarter as the visitors capitalised on two poor kick-outs to score points and in between O'Neill also converted. All of a sudden Armagh were just a point behind and the big travelling support was lifting the players. After a long period of possession McBrearty gave the home fans a bit of hope again with a white flag.

But, O'Neill left just a point in it again entering the final ten minutes. Armagh keeper Ethan Rafferty then shot a wide from a scorable position. Murphy's day wasn't getting any better as his attempt to catch a ball 30 yards from his own goal deflected off his hand and out for a 45m free which was converted. So the sides were level entering five minutes of injury time. Armagh had a couple of bad wides in the closing stages and paid the ultimate price when a good Donegal move left an unattended McBrearty with a simple chance by his standards to grab the late winner. Playing into the clubhouse end in the first half Declan Bonner and his mentors would have been happy with the display. Donegal led 1-4 to 0-3 at the

A minute later Patton's decision to fist rather than catch led to Armagh eventually finding the net through Aidan Nugent. That didn't rattle the home side really at all as a super Murphy 45 and another McBrearty free gave Donegal a 1-10 to 1-5 lead at the interval. The introduction of regulars like Rian O'Neill and Conor Grugan gave the Orchard County more of a cutting edge in the early stages of the second half. But, in the end it was their finishing in general that let them down and once again Paddy McBrearty stepped up to the plate and delivered the point that secured Donegal's survival in the top flight next season. Just at the final whistle a tussle and what appeared to be spot of verbals was tak-

ing place between Odhran McFadden Ferry and Armagh's Aidan Nugent which went on for a number of seconds and then players from both sides got involved and they were joined by others from the touchline. At the same time others were trying to restore calm. 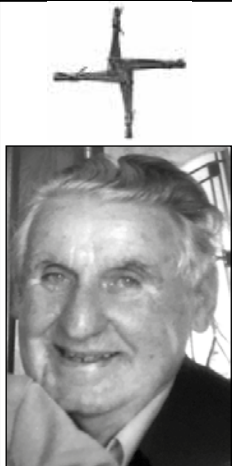
