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

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MESSAGE FROM THE FIRST UP TOMO-KAI PRESIDENT

This year we mark twenty years since the foundation of the U.P. Philippines-Japan Friendship Club, popularly known as UP Tomo-Kai. Two decades have passed since students got together at Rm 228-A of CSSP's Palma Hall in U.P. Diliman on 7 July 1990. On this occasion, perhaps the early days bear remembering. Even as the current members continue activities that have become traditions through the years, the steadiness of those traditions now does not mean that the club itself was built in a day.

Flush with enthusiasm after back-to-back experiences of the Aomori and Iwate Prefecture Youth Ships in 1988 and 1989, participants from U.P. then studying Japanese – Alvin, Kit, Eric, Daniel, Gay, Flor and me – decided to gather together kindred spirits to form the first student organization fully dedicated to deepening and expanding friendships with the Japanese as early as the second semester of 1989. However, that initial effort did not take and only one person responded to the invitation we posted for that first meeting. It would take another semester of learning from best practices and spreading by word-of-mouth that set the stage for the success of the following year.

It is no small feat that this kernel of an idea has survived through two decades, 20 batches of officers and members to become one of the most active and purposeful student groups in the university today. Just how much of an impact and example it has proven to be dawned upon me when a leading U.P. Administration official praised the students for their positive influence at the sidelines of an academic conference where I was working in Russia last year.

Many of the members, most certainly, have moved on elsewhere since, going on to jobs and starting families in the Philippines and abroad, from Japan and India to northern countries Canada and Russia. The dream of serving as bridges for young people between the Philippines and Japan stays the same.

From the early years, successive batches of officers and members have helped in continuing Tomo-Kai traditions, opening a branch of Tomo-Kai in a university in Japan and expanding cooperation with organizations in various universities in Japan. By looking back at the achievements of yesterday, both current members and alumni can look forward to the potentials for improvement for tomorrow.

It is with much pride and joy as one of the founders that I join all our members and alumni in congratulating Tomo-Kai on this momentous occasion. Twenty years of active participation in university life shows all of us that we can dream big for the future, that we can make all our ideas make a difference in promoting Philippine-Japan relations among the youth.

The exhibit consisted of booths showcasing the Filipino and Japanese culture: Origami (the Japanese art of paper folding); Kitsuke and Filipiniana (wearing Japanese and Filipino traditional clothes); Ikebana (Japanese art of flower arrangement); Shoudo and Baybayin (writing the names of the guests in Japanese and Filipino calligraphy); Toys (a variety of Filipino and Japanese toys for children); and Oshiruko, where the guests are served warm mochi (Japanese rice cake) in azuki broth (red beans).

This event was made possible in collaboration with Filipica, a group of Japanese housewives residing in the Philippines, and the Baybayin teachers.

To add to the traditional- feel during the exhibit, guests were made to write their wishes on paper before entering the event proper and hang them on a bamboo tree. This is in line with the Japanese festival, *Tanabata*, which is coincidentally celebrated on the organization’s founding day.

“The Interactive Exhibit has been an annual activity of UP Tomo-Kai in many years and I hope that this will continue to bring about cultural understanding and appreciation among us,” disclosed the president.

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


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PILIPINAS, GE-MU DESU KA?



UP AME





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

In 2004, the group was named "Outstanding Cultural Dance Group" by the Asia-Pacific Excellence Awards and "Family Entertainer Awards for Arts Culture" during the 2004 Joint Fathers and Mother's Day Awards.

The UPFDG have danced in the 1997 EURO-FOLK Festival in Italy aside from previous performances in France, Germany, Italy, Spain, US and Malaysia. Locally, the group holds the only three-consecutive championship titles of DANCELEBRATION (1996-1998), grand champion of



20 Tomo-Kai Milestones

July 7, 1990 : Founding of UP Tomo-Kai

This date also marks first general assembly of the club, auspiciously and coincidentally being the Japanese Tanabata Festival, and the anniversary of the founding of Andres Bonifacio's KKK. The joint efforts of seven students, fondly called the Seven Samurai with the organization, namely Derick, Eric, Alf, Kit, Flor, Gay and Daniel, pushed for the creation of the club.



September 1990: The beginning of sister-club ties with the South East Asian Club of Soka University.

This was agreed upon with SEAC's former president Okuno Tsuyoshi when he together with the first SEAC group visited the Philippines. Until this day, TK continues to keep this relationship alive by making friends with exchange students from Soka University who visit every year and of course this friendship does not end even when they go back to Japan.

June 1991: Establishment of the Tomo-Kai Dayori

A year after Tomo-Kai was founded, the organization released the first issue of its newsletter, the *Tomo-Kai Dayori*. It features news about the organization and its members, its accomplishments, and keeps record of significant activities of the organization. The word "dayori" is the Japanese word for "letter". It has since been renamed *Tomo-Kai Tayori*, the word "tayori" meaning "news" or "information".

September 25, 1993: First Participation in an Inter-School Theater Performance

The first Joint Japanese Language Drama was Tomo-Kai's first foray in an inter-school theater performance. In line with promoting Philippine-Japan relations, the Joint Japanese Language Drama was an event of Japan Information and Cultural Center (JICC), and the Japanese language schools and universities. TK performed "Comilon Farm".

July 9-12, 1996: First Animé Film Showing

This event was part of the 6th Anniversary celebration. Some movies shown were *Street Fighter the Animated Movie* and *Ranma 1/2* films. Although this event suggested that some TK members were animé fans, the organization didn't want to be seen only in that light. To quote then president Lucy Tabada: "Although we held an animé film showing, we don't want it [sic] to be misconstrued as an animé club."

July 23, 1997: First Japanese-Filipino Student Forum

Carrying the theme "Changes and Opportunities", speakers and participants discussed about Japanese studies, studying in Japan and their personal experiences. Guest speakers included Japanese nationals who had lived in the country and UP Tomo-Kai alumni Emmie Barrameda, and Alvin Tan, who are also Filipino Nihongo teachers based in UP.

September 13, 1997: First Filipino and Japanese Speech Contest

Tomo-Kai held its First Filipino and Japanese Speech Contest, unknowingly laying the ground for what would become an eight-year long annual event. Since the first speech contest was held, TK held similar events with different themes each year. TK's speech contest tested the abilities of Filipino and Japanese students in expressing themselves in another language.



September 16, 2006:
UP Dodgeball Showdown

This year marked UP Tomo-Kai's first venture in organizing a sporting event together with the Philippine Dodgeball Association (PDA) through the UP College of Human Kinetics: The UP Dodgeball Showdown. TK rallied sports enthu-

siasts to join the event through sign-up booths held at AS Walk. To show their support for UP Tomo-Kai, a group of Japanese exchange students entered the games and received the 2nd place award along with Php 7,000 prize money.

March 1, 2008:
Sulyap, First Nihongo short-film making competition

UP Tomo-Kai held its first ever "Sulyap: Sineng Pinoy na may Timplang Hapon". Short-films in Nihongo with English subtitles made by teams not only from UP but from other schools as well. They showcased their Nihongo skills, cinematic flair and acting prowess. The event was a huge success that for the next two years, Sulyap's 2 and 3 were held. Sulyap 2 (2009,) featured the theme "rice", after the country's infamous rice crisis that year. Sulyap 3 (2010) on the other hand, focused on promoting environmental awareness.

2008:
Launching of Balitayori

We are in the midst of the cybepage, and will Tomo-kai be left behind? Of course not! Harnessing the power of the world wide web, TK launches an online version of its newsletter Tayori. 2009 :
A Thousand Paper Cranes for World Peace

UP Tomo-Kai represented the Philippines in taking part in the 2009 Hiroshima Peace Memorial Ceremony by sending a thousand paper cranes made by the club's members and applicants to Hiroshima, Japan. A Hiroshima Peace Memorial Ceremony was dedicated in Hiroshima's Peace Park to the hundreds of child victims of the bombing as an eternal prayer for a peaceful world. April 24-25, 2010:
Saizen Summer Workshop

UP Tomo-Kai, in its various activities through the years, continues to broaden its reach to different audiences. One event that exemplified this was the summer workshop for children, organized with Saizen. Tomo-Kai members acted as *Senseis* to the kids, teaching them how to make simple origami, clay molding, calligraphy and fan painting. This affair was able to give Saizen a child-friendly image, and also made Tomo-Kai promote the Japanese culture.

July 7, 1998:
Interactive Museum

The year 1998 was the Philippines 100th year of independence. For the year's anniversary celebration, five important events that lead to the declaration of Philippine independence were staged and the characters posed in a *wax figure style* to illustrate the stories while they were being narrated. February 12, 2003:
First Outreach Program
