Austin Highlights

Globally, 445 cities from 47 countries participated in the 2022 City Nature Challenge. Austin ranked #15 for Observations, #11 for Species, and #10 for Observers globally, placing it in the top 3% of projects.

Cumulative Impact

48% of the observations recorded during the City Nature Challenge in the Austin metro area were **Research Grade** - observations of wild organisms with photo or sound vouchers of a quality to merit a species-level identification by the majority of identifiers.
