

Just another day with dad

Ungar, decided to initiate a search for other guys like him. Not weekend jocks, computer geeks or stamp collectors, but dads, dads raising kids, everyday, all day.

The idea for a father's group surfaced when Ungar and his wife, Laura, were expecting their first child, 17-month-old Aaron. "I wanted to connect with other men who have made the same decision as I did," said Ungar.

After spreading the word through friends, children's activity groups and other venues, Ungar

recruited a group of dads who agreed to meet.

Now celebrating their one year anniversary, the Delaware At-Home Dads Association, or DADA, has about six fathers who meet regularly to hang out, take field trips or grab lunch.

Members admitted that their get-togethers offer a welcome respite from the sometimes isolated lifestyle of a stay-at-home parent.

"I wasn't getting out much," said John McIntyre, laughingly. "The first several months were the toughest for me."

McIntyre, whose wife Megan is a lawyer, has been a full-time dad to one-year-old daughter, Lydia, since shortly after her birth.

Parking changes approved

Pedestrian mall planned for Hullihen Circle

ity council approved an agreement this week between the city of Newark and the University of Delaware to eliminate some parking spaces along South College Avenue.

The agreement is part of a University plan which includes turning Hullihen Circle into a landscaped, pedestrian mall. The Circle, between Hullihen Hall and the Morris Library, previously has been used as a driveway and parking area.

"Our main concern is safety," explained UD government relations director Rick Armitage. "It has never been safe to have vehicles driving around that lot looking for parking spaces next to the library."

Armitage stated the University administration is also interested in adding green space in that area.

The change will displace approximately 50 parking spaces

Stabbing suspect identified

ewark Police are still investigating the stabbing of a Newark teen that occurred on Saturday, June 10, at the Newark Shopping Center.

According to Media Officer Mark Farrall, the police had positively identified the assailant and charges were pending, as of deadline on Wednesday,

The suspect, known as "Jay," was described in police reports as a 19-year-old white male, approximately six feet, one inch tall with a goatee.

At the time of the incident, he was wearing a white tank top and blue jean shorts. Police had not yet released additional informa-

Charges possible in fatal accident

Newark Police reported this week they are expecting to place charges in the fatal traffic accident on Elkton Road on May 25. Media Officer Mark Farrall said the police are awaiting a report from the State Attorney General's office.

Two teens died in the singlecar accident when the car in which they were passengers struck a utility pole near Otts Chapel Road. The driver of the vehicle and another passenger were injured in the crash but have since been released from the hospital.

Additional charges coming in robberies

Newark Police are investigating the second robbery in a week at Little Caesar's Pizza on New London Road.

According to police, Douglas Paul Anastasia, 23, of Landenburg, Pa., entered the pizza shop just as it was opening for business on Saturday, June 10, around 10:45 a.m.

Anastasia allegedly displayed a knife and demanded that the manager of the shop give him money from the the safe.

"The manager refused to turn over the money and became engaged in a fight with the suspect," stated Media Officer Mark Farrall.

Police reported Anastasia, with the manager in pursuit, left the shop and fled toward Fairfield Apartments where he was stopped in the parking lot.

Newark Police arrived on the scene and took Anastasia into custody. He was charged with robbery and possession of a deadly weapon in that incident.

The pizza shop was also robbed around 11:30 p.m. on Saturday. June 3, by a suspect

described as a white male in his 20s, 5 feet, 8 inches tall with a medium build. During the earlier incident, the suspect displayed what appeared to be a handgun in his waistband and fled with an undisclosed amount of cash.

Farrall said the police are investigating the possibility the two incidents as well as other robberies in the Newark area recently are related.

In a separate and unrelated investigation, Newark Police also report an unknown person took money from the timelock safe at the Little- Caesars sometime between 10 p.m. on June 4 and 10 a.m. on June 5.

Fairfield News also robbed

Fairfield Shopping Center was the scene of another robbery on Wednesday, June 7, around 7:50 p.m. According to Newark Police, an unknown white male, 20 to 25 years old, approximately 5 feet, 10 inches tall, 180 pounds, with blonde, close-cut hair with short "gelled spikes," wearing an orange shirt, baggy khaki pants and black boots, entered the Fairfield News and demanded money. Witnesses said he was armed with a black-handled steak knife. He fled on foot toward the Fairfield Apartments with several cartons of cigarettes and an undisclosed amount of money.

Graffiti losses continue to mount

Newark police report unknown persons painted graffiti on two Army vehicles parked at Newark Shopping Center between 7 p.m. on June 9 and 8:20 a.m. on June 10. Damage was estimated at \$1,000. In addition, two rental vehicles belonging to Enterprise Rent-A-Car were painted with graffiti during the same period. Damage to those vehicles was also estimated at \$1,000

Third DUI charge in five years

Newark Police charged Robert Justin Farraday, 27, of Newark, with his third DUI in five years after he was found slumped over the steering wheel of his vehicle which was still running. Police said the vehicle was observed in the middle of Kershaw Street with all the tires flat on the driver's side on June 4 around 3:10 a.m. Police do not know what happened to the tires. A third conviction for driving under the influence requires mandatory fines and jail time in Delaware.

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Cause of iron in city water is a mystery

City of Newark water department staff are still unsure what caused an increase in iron deposits in the water supply last week.

Wallace McCurdy, a resident of Dallas Avenue, said he called the city after his wife complained about the rusty spots on her washing.

"I went up to the municipal building and got the packet they give out to remove the spots," said McCurdy. "But I would like to know what happened and whether we could monitor the system to keep it from happening in the first place."

According to William Zimmerman, recently hired water quality engineer for the city, the typical reasons for the increase in iron were ruled out.

"It was very localized, affect-

ing about a quarter of the city," Zimmerman told city council. "We received about 60 phone calls – all in (the Dallas Avenue) area."

Zimmerman said water department staff opened 50 hydrants over Saturday and Sunday, June 10 and 11, and the high-iron water cleared out.

Zimmerman said a drop in water pressure accompanied and helped cause the iron problem.

In response to questions from residents, Zimmerman emphasized the problem did not arise from the city's interconnection with United Water Company.

with United Water Company.
"It was very perplexing," said city manager Carl Luft.

A proposed iron treatment plant is part of the city's longrange plan to deal with water supplies in Newark.

Public parking still available around Hullihen Circle

which will be relocated to a lot on the far side of Hullihen Hall where there will be spaces for handicapped drivers as well as University employees.

As a result, some parking spaces along the street have to be removed to allow access to the reconfigured lot. University officials initially proposed eliminating 10 parking spots and meters for which the city will be compensated at the rate of \$2,781 per space per year.

"This works out better than parking revenue," said city manager Carl Luft, "because the University is reimbursing the city for parking at the rate of 75 cents an hour, 12 hours a day, and those spaces aren't filled all the time."

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However, after further review by city staff, the agreement was amended to only eliminate six

"(Public Works director Rich Lapointe) and I agree that four, full-sized vehicle metered spaces could be installed along the east side of South College Avenue, approximately 50 feet south of Kent Way," said Police Chief Gerald Conway in a memo to the city manager. "The location of these meters should not interfere with the proposed entrance to the University of Delaware lot."

Armitage explained that the University and the Delaware Department of Transportation would also modify the signage and realign crossings at Amstel Avenue as part of the project.

other public parking for library patrons, Armitage noted people who come in the evening to the Morris Library can use the University Visitor's Lot across the street. "There are 162 spaces there," he said.

The metered lot on the west side of the library will also have public parking available.

Some city residents were concerned that the new parking locations would be inconvenient for the handicapped and more dangerous for everyone.


However, Armitage said the

distance to the new south lot is actually slightly shorter than the old parking lot.

In addition, statistics gathered from the University Public Safety records indicate most of the incidents in Hullihen Circle since 1997 have involved criminal mischief or larceny. "However, there were six (motor vehicle) accidents in the Circle in 1997, three in 1998 and three in 1999," said Armitage.

The only assaults in the area were one in 1997 and one in 1998 inside the Morris Library itself.





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
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
































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











































Stay-at-home dads support each other

Leaving his profession as a kindergarten teacher was the most logical decision financially, not to mention his experience as a child care provider. But the idea to join a father's group took some getting used to, McIntyre con-

"I was taking Lydia to gymboree class and Stuart was there," McIntyre said. "I was the only guy there and Stuart gave me his card and told me about the group but it took me a month or two before I actually called him back. I was a little apprehensive at first and I guess I didn't know what to

McIntyre is glad he decided to call just as his new-found peers

'We'll share our ideas and talk about what (our kids) are doing,' said Ungar adding, "They're all really pretty close in age and it's nice to see how they are (developing).

Not to mention, the kids are gaining socialization as well.

'We'll go home at night and Aaron will be talking about his day and he'll go through and name Lydia, Spencer and Katie Lou," said Ungar. "He's already developing friendships which is

Boyd Fleming, who stays home with 18-month-old Katie Lou, interjected, "We keep each other updated on our home projects, too.'

Being an all-male parent group offers even greater comfort for dads who are, in a way, pio-

Kevin Smead, who stays home with his 18-month-old son Spencer, said there is still sort of this stigma about a father hanging out among kids.

"Being with other fathers doing the same thing offers a good setting for us, as parents, to do and talk about what parents normally do 'and talk about.' Smead said matter-of-factly. "We are just parents who happen to stay at home with our kids.

Some of DADA's dads said they have been to other playgroups that primarily consist of moms, but the experience lacked the connection they gain from their male group.

"I went to this one playgroup that a lot of mothers go to, but I wasn't 100 percent comfortable there," Ungar said. "I am here."
As Fleming and Smead dis-

cussed their latest gardening projects and McIntyre spoke about Lydia's recent doctor's visit, the bond between this unique group of men was apparent.

They talked about when their spouses were going out of town, how much vocabulary their child has developed, what type of activity they wanted their child to participate in and how "Barney' shows can sometimes be appreci-

All the while, each father kept close tabs on the youngsters who wandered around the yard, tried to eat sand out of the sand box or took a vested interest in rocks lying on the pavement.

Guys can be a loving, caring and supportive role model to their kids that is completely normal," said Ungar. "I think there is kind of a line of progression for men where, for instance, I saw my father expressing more emotion than his father probably did."

Fleming said this experience also marks an evolution for society. His wife, Martha Buell, a human development professor at the University of Delaware, told research has shown that

when a dad stays home, the working mother is more involved with their child than a working father would be if the mother stayed home.

"I would like to think that if I was out working I would be as involved as she is, but I just don't know if I would have been," said

Although a couple of fathers in the group said they miss working, sometimes, they all agreed that having the opportunity to be closer to their children offered rewards that strongly outweighed the benefits of a paying job.

As for the work of cooking,

cleaning, and laundry, the fathers said they already performed those tasks anyway, so it wasn't such a harsh adjustment.

Society, however, has some catching up to do.

According to McIntyre, it would be nice to have changing tables in public mens' bathrooms, and all the fathers said it would be nice if people didn't assume they took a day off from work to spend time with their kids.

In the meantime, the DADA group continues to meet weekly and hold special events like pool parties, dad's night out, and trips to Longwood Gardens.

One of the most memorable events, Ungar recalled, was a trip to the Baltimore Aquarium. "I felt we all had a great time," said Ungar. "Aaron was saying 'fish', 'turtle' and 'dolphin', and he was intensely into the experience."

Their crowning achievement was that lunch went well that day to the amazement of the adults. "We ate at a nice small restaurant in little Italy," said Ungar. "Four dads with four toddlers, and it pretty much went without a hitch!"

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
HOMETOWN BOY ON GUARD







Red light 'runners' are high priority on local highways

plans to step up enforcement of red light runners along the Route 40 corridor.

Captain David L. Baylor said those looking around for a marked patrol car before running a light could be in for an unpleasant surprise.

Troopers will be positioned in unmarked vehicles that do not resemble police cruisers. Those running the lights will then be pulled over by other troopers.

Baylor recently took over as Commander of Troop 9 in Odessa, the jurisdiction that handles enforcement in the Bear-Glasgow area.

Baylor said the problem has worsened over the past year as traffic has grown along Route 40.

The situation has reached the point that a number of motorists are going beyond accelerating their vehicles through the latter stages of a yellow light to deliberately running a red signal, he

Among the worst areas is the Routes 40, 7 and 1 area.

The Delaware State Police Motorists routinely run lights in that area, including the left-hand turn signal out of the Eden Square Shopping Center. Often, the light on the westbound lane of Route 40 is green for several seconds before motorists turning left out of Eden Square clear the the intersection.

> Other problem areas, according to Baylor, is Route 72 and 40 and the intersection of Route 896 and Route 40.

At the 896 and 40 intersection, troopers are also looking for speeding cars and large trucks that zoom through the intersec-

The speed of the big trucks has drawn fire from local legislators and residents.

'Our purpose is not to raise revenue..it is to ensure that highways are safe," Baylor said of the stepped up enforcement, which is slated to get under way in the near future.

Enforcement at intersections has already been made a statewide priority of the Superintendent of the Delaware

State Police, Baylor noted.

The fine for running a light runs about \$50 — a low number when compared to the figure in other states. Baylor said. However, it is often a three-point violation, which when coupled with other violations can substantially raise car insurance costs.

Locally and nationally, accidents caused by those running lights are causing an increasing amount of concern.

Injuries and loss of life are heavy from such accidents because of side impact collisions. Sides of vehicles often do not have air bags or other sorts of protection from collisions, Baylor noted.

Delaware is now one of a number of states that can use cameras that take down the license plate numbers of those running red lights. Tickets are then mailed to the owners of the offending cars or trucks.

"It is now up to DelDOT to work out the system," Baylor

Math, Science and girls

Although the gender gap has narrowed over the years, boys continue to out-perform girls on standardized tests of math and science achieve-

ment. At the same time, girls' attitudes about math and science have become more negative. Many

that they

are not good at math and science and say that they do not like these subjects. These trends are troubling because girls' grades in math and science classes are often equal to or better than those of boys. In other words, girls can do math and science.

Nevertheless, in high school when students are allowed to choose courses, girls are more likely than boys to opt out of advanced math and science. As a result, girls are often less prepared for certain academic disciplines. This limits both their college major and career choices.

Until recently, it was believed that male-female differences in math and science were caused by biology. More recently, researchers have focused on the influence of the social environment on children's math and science achievement.

Very early on, boys are given the chance to tinker with toys or objects (for example, building blocks, racing cars, and simple machines) that involve many of the principles inherent in math and science.

Girls often lack these experiences, so they enter math and science classrooms feeling insecure about their abilities. Girls then begin to believe they cannot do math and science as well as boys.

It has been found that parents believe boys are better at math than girls, they are willing to let their daughters drop out of math class when the going gets tough. With sons, however, the same parents encourage persistence. The message girls get is that they are not as good as boys.

In response to the research findings, educators have tried to make math and science accessible, equitable, and exciting to all students. The idea is that students will learn more if teachers give them the chance to do math and science and not just to hear about it. Students will then feel more confident about their abilities and realize that math and science can be fun!

Parents, too, have become aware of the need to encour-

Connie Cox knew the house on Sunset Road in Newark long before she and her husband. Michael, had any thoughts about buying it. The perennial garden in the empty lot next door was the attraction.

It was the early '70s, the couple was living in student housing at The University of Delaware, and Cox would ride her bike along the street and just stop and look ... and dream.

By the time they became the owners years later, the lot next door had been built on, the perennial garden was gone, and the only visible plantings on their property were "a pear tree and an azalea," Cox relates. "We were sure in the spring that something would come up.

When her optimistic prediction didn't bear fruit, Cox took up her tools and began the process of converting the yard into a gardener's artwork.

Today, there's a lush, romantic cottage garden at the rear, complete with benches and a twolevel water garden.

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

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
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Local teams fare well throughout the season

Wrestling

Once again, our area grapplers were the best. Sixteen of the 26 individual championship finalists were from our area.

William Penn had four individual state champions in Greg Quailes, James Fromal, Joe Ferrara, and Ray Calloway. Hodgson had four champions in Jordan Sianni, Mike Welch, Ryan Smith and Derrick Davis. Three Silver Eagles pinned their opponents in the final match. St. Mark's had a champion in Andrew Donofrio, and Newark's Bram

Walker won an individual title for himself. William Penn and St. Mark's

packed the stands in a dual meet in Pike Creek where the Colonials reclaimed their stake to the number one division I ranking, 25-21, in a match with only one pin. The Spartan's Bobby Shaw was the only winner in the biggest and baddest wrestling tournament in the country, the Mid-Atlantic Wrestling Classic.

The Silver Eagles of Hodgson were beaten by William Penn head-to-head in the middle of

the year, but rallied to win the Blue Hen Conference team title, and the unofficial team title at the state championships.

Swimming and Diving

The Spartan girls swimming dynasty continued to roll on into the new century increasing their dual meet winning streak to 150 and winning their seventh consecutive state championship. The Spartans broke two state relay records; one in the 200 medley and the other in the 200 free. Girl's Indoor Track

Christiana's Danielle Bailey broke two state records in this year's championships; the 55 meter dash and the 200 meter dash. The junior Viking was the headliner in a cast of young sprinting talent throughout the state. Glasgow sophomore Kim Chase was the state's best jumper. She was a consistent winner in the long and triple jumps, and is already close to breaking the state record in the triple jump.

Bear's Jennifer Oakes can be seen laying on the ground at the end of nearly every event that she runs. The senior Panda from Padua Academy has her picture next to the word "heart" in the dictionary. Her come-from-behind photofinish victory in the 800 meters left the second place finisher in shock and in tears. The Colonial field team, coached by Brad Lane, were the key to William Penn success both indoors and outdoors. Stephanie Crawford, Lateefah and Tiaana Vaughn combined strength, quickness and technique to push their squad to a third place finish.

Spring

Tennis

Ok, so there wasn't a team championship to be had in tennis, but we had the number one girl's single champion in Katherine Bushey. Bushey mowed down her opponents all year. Danielle Bailey and Kristin Tunnell were individual state champions for Christiana. Kim Chase won an outdoor triple jump title for Glasgow. Daveneia Payne won the first ever state individual track championship for Caravel when she took in the Division II shot put.

The top six place finishers in all the events were littered with our athletes.





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
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Newarkers among St. Mark's 382 graduates
