QUICK HITTERS

UNH head coach Sean McDonnell ranks No. 3 on the CAA football all-time wins list with 99 conference wins. Ahead of him on the list are Andy Talley (Villanova, 142) and Jimmie Laycock (William & Mary, 111). He needs just one victory to become the third head coach in CAA history with 100 career victories.

LAST TIME OUT: Sophomore quarterback Bret Edwards (Lowell, Mass.) tossed his first three career touchdown passes and the University of New Hampshire football team rode a huge start by its defense to a 27-21 win over Colonial Athletic Association rival Stony Brook on Thursday night in Kenneth LaValle Stadium. Edwards connected with sophomore tight end Kyle Lepkowski (Adamstown, Md.) for his first TD pass in the opening quarter and later hit senior Brian Espanet (Hopedale, Mass.) for two scores. The second score put UNH up 27-0 early in the third period. They held off a Stony Brook rally from there. Edwards completed 17 of his 25 passes for 233 yards in his second career start. He took over the starting job when sophomore Max Brosmer (Roswell, Ga.) suffered a season-ending knee injury during pre-season camp. The defense helped stake UNH to a 20-0 lead at the half. Besides keeping Stony Brook off the scoreboard, that unit came up with three turnovers in the second period, two of which set Edwards and the offense up inside the Stony Brook 6-yard line. Senior safety Pop Bush (Nocatee, Fla.) led the defense with 10 tackles, three of them for loss. He also intercepted a pass and returned it 65 yards, caused a fumble that led to the first UNH score in the second period and had a quarterback sack on a 4th down play from the Wildcat 5-yard line. Redshirt freshman linebacker Zedane Williams (Springfield, Mass.) recovered the fumble that Bush caused and redshirt freshman cornerback Jonathan Collins Jr. (Williamstown, N.J.) picked off a pass and returned it 26 yards to set up another UNH touchdown.

McDonnell coached UNH in the one game it played last March before the season was called because of COVID-19. He sat out the 2019 for medical reasons as he battled cancer.

THE MATCHUP: UNH vs. TOWSON

SERIES SYNOPSIS

The Wildcats own a 5-3 all-time record against Towson, which includes wins in each of the last two meetings in 2016 and 2017. The Tigers own the edge in the last five meetings with a 3-2 record. UNH won the first three meetings in the all-time series with victories in 2008, 2009 and 2010. The Wildcats have scored 40+ points in four of the eight all-time meetings in the series. UNH owns a 3-1 record against Towson all-time in Durham and are 1-0 all-time at Wildcat Stadium against the Tigers.

SCOUTING TOWSON

The Tigers are coming off a 31-0 win against Morgan State last Saturday. After 93 weeks waiting for its next game, the Towson University football team earned its first shutout since the 2017 season, defeating crosstown rival Morgan State 31-0 to bring the Battle for Greater Baltimore trophy back to Tiger Town. Towson scored a touchdown in every quarter and did not allow Morgan State past the Towson 32-yard line in the game. This is Towson's first shutout since Sept. 2, 2017, a 10-0 at home vs Morgan State. This is the first shutout on the road for Towson since Nov. 2, 2002 when the Tigers won at Monmouth 20-0. Towson wins its season opener for the fourth season in a row. The last three times were all on the road.

The Towson defense held Morgan State to seven three-and-out drives and 142 total yards as the Bears averaged three yards per offensive play. Towson held MSU to 79 yards passing and just six completions. S.J. Brown II led the team with five tackles. In his first-ever start, Nygil Johnson notched four tackles, a half-sack and two quarterback hurries while Bryce Lauer tallied two tackles, a sack and a forced fumble. As a team, Towson earned 432 yards of total offense, led by Chris Ferguson in his first game as a Tiger, throwing for 247 yards and two touchdowns. His top target was Caleb Smith, with six catches and 58 yards, while Darian Street made two catches for 91 yards, including a 73-yard breakaway touchdown catch. On the ground, Jerry Howard Jr. had 45 yards on seven carries for 6.4 yards a rush. Devin Matthews and Kobe Young each had rushing touchdowns in the game. In his first-ever collegiate game, Keegan Vaughan converted his lone field goal attempt of 29 yards. For Morgan State, Duce Taylor, one of three quarterbacks that played for the team, completed three passes out of nine for 68 yards. Jairus Grissom, another quarterback, rushed five times for 35 yards. On defense, Quri Hickman led all players with nine tackles, also breaking up a pass.

MOST RECENT MEETING (10/21/17)

DURHAM, N.H. – Junior quarterback Trevor Knight (Amherst, N.H.) passed for four touchdowns in the second quarter to break the game open and lead No. 18 New Hampshire to a 40-17 triumph over Towson University in front of a Wildcat Stadium crowd of 10,522 on Saturday afternoon. Knight completed 19 of 30 passes for 197 yards and the career-high four scores for the game. Redshirt freshman Nick Lorden (Milford, N.H.) caught a career-high two scoring passes of 6 and 4 yards. Redshirt freshman DeUnte Chatman (Houston, Texas) had a career high 22 carries for a career high 187 yards and career high two scores. The rushing yards were the high for a Wildcat this season. Sophomore Brandon Gallagher (Raynham, Mass.) rushed 12 times for 104 yards. Junior Neil O'Connor (Leominster, Mass.) caught a 5-yard TD pass for his ninth score of the season. Junior Kieran Presley (Amherst, Mass.) had the other touchdown catch of 14 yards. The UNH defense held Towson to 279 yards of offense, a low for the season, and allowed the Tigers to convert only one of 11 third down chances into a first down. Sophomore safety Rick Ellison (Rancho Santa Margarita, Calif.) led the defense with a career high 12 tackles. The Wildcats rushed for a season-high total of 299 yards and had a season-high 508 total yards of offense.

SCOUTING NEW HAMPSHIRE: The Wildcats opened their 2021 fall season with a 27-21 road victory at Stony Brook on Thursday night at Laval Stadium. UNH now owns a 13-9 record in season openers under head coach Sean McDonnell and the 'Cats are 6-3 lifetime in the all-time series against the Seawolves.

The Wildcats take on Towson for the first time since the 2017 season on Salute to Service Day, presented by Service Credit Union.

HOME OPENING DAY: The Wildcats own a 14-2 record in their past 16 home openers with the two losses coming last spring vs. UAlbany and in 2018 when Colgate earned a 10-3 win.

MAC NAMES QUAD CAPTAINS FOR 2021: UNH Head Coach Sean McDonnell announced four captains prior to the start of the Stony Brook game in seniors **Evan Horn, Elijah Lewis, Matt Mascia and Nick Lorden.**

POP BUSH NAMED FCS NATIONAL AND CAA DEFENSIVE PLAYER OF THE WEEK: Senior safety **Pop Bush** (Nocatee, Fla.) was named the FCS National and Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) Defensive Player of the Week, which was announced on Monday morning. Bush made plays all over the field in New Hampshire's 27-21 conference victory at Stony Brook last Thursday night in the season opener. He recorded a team-high 10 tackles, 3.0 tackles for loss (-17 yds.), one sack, two forced fumbles, two pass breakups and an interception, which he returned 65 yards. The 10 tackles tied a career high for Bush, while the interception was the second of his career. It marks the first time in his Wildcat career that he has won National or CAA Defensive Player of the Week honors.

EDWARDS SHINES IN SECOND CAREER START FOR THE 'CATS: Sophomore quarterback **Bret Edwards** (Lowell, Mass.) completed 17-of-25 passes (68%) for a career-high 233 yards and three touchdowns (0 INT) in the Wildcats 27-21 road win at Stony Brook on Thursday night in the season opener. Edwards, who was making his second career start for the Wildcats, threw two TD passes of 64 and three yards to Brian Espanet and one four-yard TD pass to Kyle Lepkowski for this first career TD catch.

ESPANET HITS 100: Junior wide receiver **Brian Espanet** (Hopedale, Mass.) notched 100 yards receiving for the first time in his Wildcat career with five receptions and two touchdowns, one which was a 64-yard bomb from quarterback Bret Edwards.

99 AND COUNTING: UNH head coach **Sean McDonnell** ranks No. 3 on the CAA football all-time conference wins list. McDonnell recorded his 99th win in the CAA Football conference in the season opener last Saturday at Stony Brook and he posted his 98th career CAA victory on Nov. 10, 2018, when the Wildcats defeated UAlbany, 24-20, at Wildcat Stadium. That victory moved McDonnell past his predecessor, **Bill Bowes**, who finished with 97 career wins in conference play. The top two on the CAA wins list are Andy Talley (Villanova, 142) and Jimmye Laycock (William & Mary, 111).

WILDCAT STADIUM: New Hampshire has an 18-6 lifetime record at Wildcat Stadium (opened in the 2016 season) and that includes 12-5 against conference opponents. UNH dropped its 2021 spring home opener, 24-20, to UAlbany on Friday, March 5. The 'Cats went 5-0 at home in 2019, and that included CAA victories against Rhode Island (27-24 on Sept. 21), Elon (26-10 on Oct. 5), No. 11 Villanova (28-20 on Nov. 2) and Maine (28-10 on Nov. 23).

HOME SWEET HOME: Since 2008, UNH has a 60-11 home record (.845 win percentage) in Durham, which includes 41-8 (.837) against CAA teams.

KNOCKING OFF NATIONALLY-RANKED TEAMS: UNH has gone 2-3 against nationally ranked teams in the last two seasons, including a 2-2 record against nationally-ranked teams in the 2019 season. UNH defeated No. 11 Villanova, 28-20, on Nov. 2 and was a 20-14 victor at No. 22 Stony Brook (Oct. 12). In 2018, the 'Cats toppled #3 James Madison, 35-24, at

EVAN HORN NAMED FCS PRESEASON ALL-AMERICAN: Senior safety **Evan Horn** (Lebanon, Pa.) of the University of New Hampshire football team was named to the STATS Perform FCS Preseason All-America Third Team for the second straight season and was also selected to the 2021 CAA Football Preseason All-Conference Team. The 6-foot, 220-pound safety enters the season as UNH's active leader in career tackles (174), interceptions (11), and sacks (7.0), as well as punt return yards (165). Horn has 23 consecutive starts and 30 career starts overall. In New Hampshire's only game of the Spring 2021 season, he recorded four tackles and a pass breakup vs. UAlbany. Horn was voted to the CAA All-Conference Second Team as a junior in the 2019 season, when he led UNH in both solo tackles (51) and total tackles (70), as well as interceptions (four). He also ranked third in pass breakups (five), tied for second in sacks (four) and tied for fourth in tackles for loss (seven); his other stats included two forced fumbles and two fumble recoveries. Horn was named a Hero Sports FCS Sophomore All-American in 2018. He recorded 28 solo tackles and 19 assisted tackles for a total of 57. He had four interceptions with 80 return yards and a pair of touchdowns.

COACH MAC IS BACK: In August 2019, one week before his 21st season as UNH head coach was to begin, UNH football head coach **Sean McDonnell** announced that he was taking a medical leave of absence. **Ricky Santos**, who had rejoined the staff as the associate head coach and quarterbacks coach months earlier, stepped in as interim head coach and led the 2019 Wildcats to a 6-5 overall record that included 5-3 in the CAA (tie for third place). During that time, coach McDonnell battled bladder cancer. After months of treatment and surgeries, he was given medical clearance and resumed his position as head coach March 1, 2020, and presided over a team workout that day. Less than two weeks later, the UNH students were sent home for spring break and resumed classes remotely, thereby ending spring football. On July 17, 2020, the UNH Department of Athletics announced that no Wildcat fall sports teams would compete in the fall '20 season because of the global COVID-19 pandemic. The football team returned to practice in the fall, and then came the Oct. 27 announcement of the tentative Spring 2021 schedule with UNH competing in the seven-team North Division and playing each divisional opponent once. The March 5 season opener was Coach Mac's first game patrolling the UNH sideline since Nov. 17, 2018 (a 24-21 loss at Rhode Island), which was a span of 839 days for Coach McDonnell.

Sean McDonnell (Class of '78) enters his 22nd season as head coach of his alma mater in the fall of 2021. The native of Saratoga Springs, N.Y., has a career record of 155-96 (.618 winning percentage) that includes a 99-66 conference mark (.600). McDonnell's 99 league wins ranks first among active coaches and third all-time.

McDonnell took an indefinite leave of absence for health-related reasons on Aug. 26, 2019 and returned to the sidelines March 1, 2020.

He guided the Wildcats to 14 consecutive winning seasons – with six double-digit win totals – spanning 2004-17. UNH advanced to the NCAA Division I FCS tournament each of those 14 years, including back-to-back semifinal appearances in 2013 and 2014. Coach Mac has led the 'Cats to three conference titles: 2005, 2012, 2014.

McDonnell's collegiate accolades include Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year (2005, 2014), AFCA National Coach of the Year (2014), AFCA District Coach of the Year (2004-05-12-14), CAA Coach of the Year ('04 & '14), New England Football Writers Coach of the Year (2005-08-10-12-14) and Gridiron Club of Greater Boston Head Coach of the Year (2000-04-09-12).

In his 20-year tenure as head coach, UNH has received a total of 50 All-America awards, four CAA Offensive Player of the Year awards, three CAA Rookie of the Year awards, two CAA Chuck Boone Leadership Award honors and 46 CAA All-Conference First Team selections.

New Hampshire won three of its last four games to end the 2017 season with a 4-7 overall record that included 3-5 in the CAA. The Wildcats' late resurgence began with a dominant 34-0 victory at Villanova University and continued with a 35-24 win against third-ranked James Madison at Wildcat Stadium. UNH then upended UAlbany, 24-10, on Senior Day to push its win streak to three games. In that three-game span, the 'Cats outscored the opposition 93-34.

UNH extended its nation-leading active streak of consecutive playoff appearances to 14 years in the 2017 season. After recording their first shutout in postseason history with a 14-0 win against Central Connecticut State University in the first round, the Wildcats traveled to third-ranked Central Arkansas and prevailed 21-15 to advance out of the second round and give McDonnell his 150th career victory. The 'Cats traveled even farther west to play fifth-ranked South Dakota State in the quarterfinals, and New Hampshire's season came to an end with a 9-5 record.

The 2017 season began with a 24-23 victory against Maine in the inaugural Thursday Night Throwdown to keep the Brice-Cowell Musket in Durham for the seventh consecutive year. The Wildcats improved to 2-0 by defeating FBS school Georgia Southern at the historic Iron Bowl (Birmingham, Ala.), and the 'Cats recorded another signature victory with a 16-6 win against top-10 team Elon in mid-November.

UNH football christened Wildcat Stadium against Holy Cross on Sept. 10, 2016 and fireworks lit up the Durham sky following a 39-28 victory. New Hampshire went 6-2 the last eight games of the regular season with victories against William & Mary and Stony Brook, both of whom were nationally ranked. UNH went on to defeat Lehigh, 64-21, in an NCAA first round game and ended the year with an 8-5 overall record that included 6-2 in the CAA.

The 2015 Wildcats rallied to win their final four regular-season games. The winning streak included an upset of No. 5 Richmond (30-25) and a convincing 22-6 defeat of rival Maine in the final regular-season home game in the 79-year history of Cowell Stadium. The 'Cats recorded victories in their final 15 regular season games in Cowell Stadium.

UNH put together a staggering streak of 162 straight weeks ranked in the STATS FCS Top 25, a streak that spanned Sept. 6, 2004 through Oct. 12, 2015.

Coach Mac guided the 2014 Wildcats to their second consecutive national semifinal appearance with a 12-2 record that included school records for most wins in a season and consecutive wins (12), as well as five wins against nationally-ranked teams, including four in the Top 10. The Wildcats posted a perfect 8-0 record in the CAA to claim their third league championship under McDonnell and first outright title since 1994.

In 2013, McDonnell was honored by the Joe Yukica-New Hampshire Chapter of the National Football Foundation with the Andy Mooradian Award for his contributions to amateur football. UNH won multiple playoff games (three) in a single season for the first time in program history en route to the Wildcats' first appearance in the FCS semifinals. The 'Cats recorded five wins against nationally-ranked foes, including three vs. the Top 10, to finish with a 10-5 overall record as well as a 6-2 CAA mark. New Hampshire recorded a six-game win streak for the second consecutive season and went a perfect 6-0 at home.

After a 1-3 start, the 2013 season turned when Coach Mac's Wildcats went for – and converted – a 2-point PAT with 14 seconds remaining in the fourth quarter to defeat 12th-ranked Villanova, 29-28. UNH closed the regular season with a convincing 24-3 win at Cowell Stadium against fourth-ranked Maine to retain the Brice-Cowell Musket before recording playoff wins against Lafayette (45-7 at home), eighth-ranked Maine (41-27) and seventh-ranked Southeastern Louisiana (20-17).

HEAD COACH SEAN MCDONNELL

The 2012 Wildcats earned a share of the CAA championship with a 6-2 league mark. The 'Cats compiled an 8-4 overall record that included an NCAA second-round game at Wofford. McDonnell reached coaching milestone victory No. 100 with a 44-21 win against Georgia State at the Georgia Dome on Oct. 6, 2012.

The 2011 Wildcats matched a school record for the second straight year by knocking off five ranked opponents en route to an 8-4 mark, including 6-2 in the CAA. The 'Cats put a bow on their rivalry with Massachusetts by knocking off the Minutemen, 27-21, in the second Colonial Clash at Gillette Stadium. UNH reclaimed the Brice-Cowell Musket with a 30-27 defeat of Maine in the regular-season finale and came within a blocked PAT of forcing overtime in a playoff loss at Montana State. Junior linebacker Matt Evans became the first Wildcat to ever be named the nation's top defensive player when he won the Buck Buchanan Award, and senior quarterback Kevin Decker was crowned the CAA Offensive Player of the Year.

In 2010, McDonnell's Wildcats collected victories against five ranked opponents en route to an 8-5 campaign. UNH advanced to the quarterfinal round of the NCAA postseason for the sixth time in seven years after dispatching Bethune-Cookman, 45-20, in the second round. UNH made history by topping No. 12 UMass, 39-13, in the inaugural Colonial Clash at Gillette Stadium. The game was witnessed by 32,848 fans, the largest football crowd in CAA history.

UNH finished 10-3 in 2009 and won its second straight CAA North Division championship. The Wildcats continued to be giant killers by knocking off an FBS opponent for the fifth straight time, securing a hard-fought 23-16 triumph at Ball State. Previous FBS opponents to feel the wrath of the Wildcats during the amazing upset run were Army (2008), Marshall ('07), Northwestern ('06) and Rutgers ('04). UNH was the only team to defeat eventual FCS national champion Villanova (28-24) on Homecoming. The Wildcats also posted an impressive win on the road at McNeese State, defeating the Cowboys, 49-13, in the first round of the NCAA playoffs.

New Hampshire notched a 10-3 record in 2008, including a defeat of Southern Illinois in the first round of the NCAAs. UNH finished the season ranked No. 7 in most national polls. In 2007, the Wildcats were 7-5 overall and just narrowly missed upsetting No. 1 Northern Iowa in the first round of the NCAAs, losing on a last-minute TD, 38-35, at the UNI Dome.

The Wildcats were ranked as high as No. 1 in the nation in 2006 and finished the season ranked sixth after defeating Hampton in the first round (41-38) of the NCAAs. Among the regular-season highlights was senior All-America wide receiver David Ball surpassing legendary Jerry Rice with 58 career TD receptions and junior quarterback Ricky Santos claiming the Walter Payton Award as the FCS football national player of the year.

In 2005, McDonnell was honored as the Eddie Robinson National Coach of the Year by The Sports Network after leading his Wildcats to a record-breaking 11-2 season, an Atlantic 10 Championship, a second straight NCAA appearance in the I-AA quarterfinals and the country's No. 1 ranking at the end of the regular season.

McDonnell's hard work rebuilding the program paid off in 2004 with a 10-3 overall record and a 6-2 mark in the Atlantic 10, which earned the team the Northern Division championship and a bid to the NCAA I-AA Championships for the first time since 1994. The 'Cats advanced to the quarterfinals for the first time in program history by winning its first-ever NCAA contest under McDonnell, a 27-23 upset at Georgia Southern.

In 2003, UNH began turning the corner by winning three of its last four contests, including an upset victory over nationally-ranked Maine. In 2002, McDonnell's offense was one of the most prolific in I-AA football and averaged 449.2 yards per contest and 36.7 ppg. UNH finished with a 4-7 overall record in 2001.

In 2000, the Wildcats were ranked as high as 23rd in the nation and knocked off three top-25 opponents. Injuries squashed UNH's chances for a playoff berth down the stretch.

In his rookie season, McDonnell led the Wildcats to a 5-6 overall record and oversaw a wide-open offensive attack that led the Atlantic 10 with an average of 457.3 yards per game.

McDonnell was named the 19th head coach of the UNH football program April 22, 1999. McDonnell replaced legendary head coach Bill Bowes, who retired after 27 years as the mentor of the Wildcats.

McDonnell served eight seasons as a Wildcat assistant and completed his fifth year as the team's offensive coordinator in 1998. McDonnell rejoined the Wildcats as an assistant coach before the 1991 spring camp and worked with the quarterbacks and receivers for his first three seasons. In 1997, McDonnell was named the recipient of "The College Assistant Coach Award" by the Gridiron Club of Greater Boston in recognition of his quality of performance, loyalty and longevity.

McDonnell was a standout defensive back for UNH. He started for the 1975 and 1976 Yankee Conference championship teams and came back to start for the 1978 squad. After his graduation from UNH, he spent one year as an assistant coach at Manchester (N.H.) Memorial High School and followed that up with a three-year stint at Manchester West (1980-82). McDonnell worked as the defensive coordinator at Hamilton College for two seasons (1983-84) and subsequently spent three years (1985-87) coaching the receivers and tight ends at former conference-rival Boston University. During the 1988 campaign, McDonnell served as a graduate assistant coach at Boston College. He spent two seasons as an assistant at Columbia (1989-90) prior to his coaching debut in Durham.

COACHING STAFF

RICKY SANTOS

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH / QUARTERBACKS

In March 2019, Ricky Santos '08 was hired as the Wildcats' associate head coach/quarterbacks coach, which returned the 2016 UNH Hall of Fame inductee to his alma mater in a coaching capacity for the second time. With head coach Sean McDonnell stepping aside indefinitely for health reasons on Aug. 26, 2019, Santos was promoted to interim head coach and led the 'Cats to a 6-5 record, including 5-0 at home. He returned to the roles of associate head coach and quarterbacks coach March 1, 2020. Santos spent three seasons (2016-18) as the QB coach at Columbia University. From 2013-15, Santos coached UNH's wide receivers. In 2014, he mentored R.J. Harris to the single greatest statistical season in program history. Harris tallied a school-record 100 catches and led the nation with 1,551 receiving yards, which tied UNH's all-time single-season benchmark. Santos, whose uniform No. 2 is one of four jerseys ever retired by the UNH football program, was a four-year starter at quarterback (2004-07), led the Wildcats to a career 37-14 record and four NCAA Division I-AA/FCS playoff appearances. Santos passed for 13,212 passing yards and 123 touchdown passes while accumulating 14,615 yards of total offense. In 2006, Santos won the Walter Payton Award as the most outstanding offensive player in FCS football. The then-junior, who finished a mere five points away from garnering the honor the previous season, threw for 3,125 yards and 29 touchdowns. Santos possesses the University's career records in pass attempts (1,498), completions (1,024) and passing yards (12,189). He holds the top two and four of the top six single-season records in completions, headlined by 301 in 2005. His '05 season included a school-high 3,797 passing yards.

MICHAEL FERZOCO

CO-OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Michael Ferzoco is in his 14th season on the UNH coaching staff and third as co-Offensive Coordinator in 2020-21. In 2018, he was the Wildcats' WR coach/pass game coordinator and primary play-caller, and in 2016-17, Ferzoco was the WR coach/special teams coordinator. Ferzoco spent six seasons (2010-15) as the running backs coach after serving as linebackers coach his first two seasons (2008-09). Under the tutelage of Ferzoco, Neil O'Connor finished his Wildcat career (2015-18) with 235 catches for 3,117 yards, both of which rank third on the program's leaderboard. In the 2017 season, O'Connor was named to a total of five All-America Teams and was a Walter Payton Award finalist. He had 97 receptions for 1,396 receiving yards and 10 TDs; with those numbers, he was No. 3 in the nation in receiving yards, and on UNH's list of single-season superlatives he ranked second in receptions and fourth in receiving yards. The 2015 Wildcats' backfield was led by junior Dalton Crossan, who rumbled for 885 yards on 172 carries and 13 of UNH's 19 rushing TDs. In 2014, the Wildcats' running game finished top three in the CAA in rushing offense for the third straight year. Senior Nico Steriti, who gained All-CAA honors for the third straight year, ranked first in the CAA with 14 rushing TDs. In 2013, the Wildcats featured a running game led by Steriti, who became the first UNH back since 2002 to eclipse 1,000 rushing yards.

BRIAN SCOTT

CO-OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR

Brian Scott enters his second season as co-Offensive Coordinator for the Wildcats in 2021. Scott will be responsible for game-planning with an emphasis on the Wildcats' running game. Scott's most recent stop was at Towson as the team's offensive line coach and run game coordinator. Prior to Towson, he spent 13 seasons at Old Dominion, serving as the team's offensive coordinator each year. He was the associate head coach from 2012-19 and the offensive line coach from 2007-11. In his time with the Monarchs, he helped Old Dominion transition from FCS to FBS into Conference USA, leading a team that was consistently one of the top offenses in college football. He was a 2009 and 2012 FootballScoop.com Coordinator of the Year. In 2016, he was a finalist for the Broyles Award for top assistant in college football. Previous to ODU, Scott spent three seasons at his alma mater, the University of Maine, as the recruiting coordinator as well as working with the offensive line, running backs and tight ends. He worked at the University of Tennessee-Martin in 2003, working with the wide receivers, tight ends and the special teams unit. Scott's first job as a college coach was in 2002 as the quarterbacks coach at UMass Lowell. Scott graduated from the University of Maine in 2000 with a degree in communications. He is a recipient of the Maine Sports Hall of Fame Special Achievement Award.

ED BORDEN

TIGHT ENDS

Borden is in his third season on the UNH coaching staff and second as tight ends coach in 2021. In 2019, he assisted with coaching the wide receivers. In 2018, Borden worked under head coach Mark Whipple at UMass as an offensive analyst for the Minutemen. He worked primarily with the team's quarterbacks. Borden previously coached at Curry College, the Massachusetts Maritime Academy and Mount Ida College. During his tenure as the offensive coordinator for Massachusetts Maritime, Borden oversaw one of the nation's most prolific offensive attacks, as the Buccaneers were ranked as high as second nationally in total offense while more than 13,000 yards. A 2009 graduate of Bentley University, Borden also worked under Jim Fassel with the Las Vegas Locomotives of the United Football League.

DREW BELCHER

RUNNING BACKS

Belcher Belcher enters his first season as assistant coach with the Wildcats, coaching the UNH running backs. He had a standout career at the University of Maine (2014-18) as a quarterback and tight end, and played one season in the National Football League (NFL). In 2019, Belcher broke into the NFL after graduating from UMaine by signing an undrafted free agent (UDFA) contract with the Arizona Cardinals to compete for a roster spot on the squad at tight end. Meanwhile, at UMaine, Belcher played a pivotal role in the Black Bears' historical 2018 season, which ended in the longest postseason run in program history. During that season, UMaine captured the Colonial Athletic Conference (CAA) Championship, appeared in the Football Championship Subdivision (FCS) National Semifinals, and finished the year with a

JOHN LYONS

DEFENSIVE COORDINATOR/DEFENSIVE BACKS

The 2020-21 season represents John Lyons' 11th year as UNH defensive coordinator/DB coach. In 2018, the Wildcats' defense led the CAA in both first downs allowed (185) and pass defense (181.3 yards allowed per game); UNH also ranked second in total defense (310.0 ypg) and sacks (36), as well as third in third-down conversion (28.8%) and fourth in scoring (22.8 points per game). In 2017, he oversaw a UNH defense that ranked No. 1 in the CAA in red zone as well as second in sacks and third in pass defense efficiency. In the 2016 CAA rankings, the Wildcats' defense was second in the red zone as well as fumble recoveries and interceptions, tied for second in sacks, and third in takeaways. Under Lyons' tutelage, senior cornerback Casey DeAndrade was named to a total of five All-America teams. Also of note, Prince Smith, Jr. was honored as the CAA Defensive Rookie of the Year. Lyons, the second-winningest head football coach in Dartmouth College history, was inducted into the Dartmouth Catholic (Conn.) High School Hall of Fame on April 27, 2013. In 2015, Lyons oversaw an opportunistic defensive unit that recovered 11 fumbles and tallied 12 interceptions to help the 'Cats to a +6 turnover margin (No. 3 in CAA). The stout defense racked up 31 sacks (No. 3 in CAA). In the 2014 national statistics, UNH ranked 22nd in scoring defense, 15th in sacks and 17th in turnovers gained, which included 15th in fumbles recovered. UNH's secondary was led by All-America honoree Casey DeAndrade, a sophomore who was one of six 'Cats to receive All-Conference recognition. In 2011, LB Matt Evans won the Buck Buchanan Award as the nation's top defensive player – the first Wildcat to ever accomplish that feat. As head coach at Dartmouth (1992-2004), Lyons earned 60 career wins and two Ivy League titles ('92, '96). He was named the 1996 Division I N.E. Coach of the Year by the Gridiron Club of Boston. Lyons worked at Kimball Union Academy as football coach (2005-10) and A.D. (2008-10). He spent three years (2005-07) in NFL Europe with the Cologne Centurions. He served as defensive coordinator at Boston U. (1985-87) and at his alma mater, Penn ('84). He played three years for the Quakers and was an All-Ivy League Second Team selection.

JOHN BOWES

SAFETIES

John Bowes enters his fourth year as the UNH safeties coach in 2021. In 2019, safeties Evan Horn and Pop Bush ranked 1-2 on the team in tackles. Under his tutelage in 2018, junior Pop Lacey tied for the team lead in total tackles and garnered All-CAA Second Team recognition; sophomore Evan Horn had a team-high four interceptions – scored on two of them – and ranked fourth in tackles. The corps of safeties helped UNH rank first in the CAA in pass defense, second in total defense and fourth in scoring defense. Bowes spent the 2017 season as the defensive coordinator/safeties coach at Fordham University. The previous three years (2013-16) were at Bucknell as the secondary coach/special teams coordinator. In 2015, he coached the Patriot League Defensive Player of the Year and a Third-Team All-American. Prior to Bucknell, Bowes spent five years (2008-13) as an assistant coach at William & Mary. A 2006 graduate of The Catholic University of America with a degree in finance, he was a three-year starter at cornerback and safety.

GARRETT GILLICK

LINEBACKERS

Garrett Gillick is in his eighth year as the linebackers coach at UNH in 2020-21. In 2018, the two starting linebackers were the top two Wildcats in tackles for loss; they also ranked first and third in sacks as well as first and fifth in total tackles, and they were credited with five of the team's 11 forced fumbles. The LBs helped New Hampshire's defense to CAA conference rankings of first in pass defense, second in total defense, tied for second in sacks, fourth in scoring defense, and fifth in rushing defense. In 2016, his proteges ranked 3-4-5 on the team in tackles and those three combined for 23 of the team's 76 tackles for loss. Senior DeVaughn Chollette earned a spot on the All-CAA Football Third Team. In 2015, Gillick's understudy Akil Anderson earned All-CAA Third Team and Wildcat team defensive MVP. Under Gillick's tutelage in the 2014 season, both Anderson and Shane McNeely earned CAA All-Conference honors as they ranked 1-2 on the team in tackles. The linebacking corps helped UNH rank second in the CAA in scoring defense (21.2 points/game). Prior to coming to Durham, Gillick had a three-season stint (2011-13) at Bentley University, including two years as defensive line coach and one year (2013) as secondary coach.

NYEEM WARTMAN-WHITE

DEFENSIVE LINE

Wartman-White joined the Wildcats as defensive line coach in March 2020. Wartman-White, a standout linebacker at Penn State University from 2012-16, spent the 2018 and 2019 seasons as a defensive graduate assistant at Mississippi State. During his playing days with the Nittany Lions, Wartman-White was a Butkus Award Preseason Watch List as a senior (2016), made a career- and team-high 11 tackles in the 2014 New Era Pinstripe Bowl victory against Boston College at Yankee Stadium, earned 2013 Academic All-Big Ten honors and was one of only six true freshmen to see game action in 2012.

GARRETT MCLAUGHLIN

DEFENSIVE ENDS/SPECIAL TEAMS

McLaughlin is in his second season with UNH, coaching the defensive ends and the special teams unit. Last season, he served as a volunteer assistant coach for the Wildcats. He spent the 2021 spring season coaching the running backs with UNH. He leads position meetings, individual drills, and assists in opponent breakdowns, self-scout, scout team operations, and transfer recruiting. Prior to UNH, he served as an assistant coach at Bates College for three seasons (2018-2021), as the special teams and defensive line coordinator. He also had coaching stops at Wagner College (2017), New Haven (2016) and SUNY Buffalo State (2012-2015).
