

ARTICHOKE.

Sow early in April, in rich soil, in drills one inch deep, about twelve inches apart, and thin out the rows to four inches apart. When one year old transplant in rows three feet apart, and two feet in the rows. Protect during the winter with a covering of manure or leaves. The bed will remain in bearing for years. The fleshy substance above the stem, and the scales of the flowerhead are the edible parts of this plant.

ASPARAGUS.

Soak the seeds for a day in slightly warm water. Sow in fall or early in the spring, in drills one foot apart. Keep

free from weeds, and in the spring of the second year, transplant into permanent beds, which may be made as follows: The ground should not be too wet nor too strong, and should have a large supply of well-rotted manure, several inches thick, laid on, and then regularly trenched eighteen inches deep, mixing well with manure. The beds should be six feet wide, with walks two feet wide. Four rows of plants should be put in each bed, and the plants twelve inches distant in the rows. The crown of each plant should be about six inches below the level of the bed. Every fall cut the stalks down, afterward give a good dressing of manure, which turn under in the



spring without disturbing the roots. A slight dressing of salt in the early spring is very beneficial.



CAULIFLOWER.

The cauliflower is classified as one of our very best vegetables. It does not require, to be grown successfully, any more care or culture than the cabbage; but to insure success it needs a very rich, moist soil. Sow the seed in a cold-frame, early in the spring, for early, or in open ground for late use; transplant to 30-inch rows, fifteen inches apart; keep well watered while heading. Bone-meal or wellrotted cow-manure are the best fertilizers.



Cultivate deeply and thoroughly as soon as possible after the plants appear, and every few days until it tassels. Thorough cultivation, and warm, rich soil are the keys to success.

As fast as the cucumbers attain a suitable size they should be taken from the vine whether required for use or not, as any ripening on the vine soou' destroys their productiveness.



MUSHROOMS.

Mushrooms are grown in out-buildings, cellars, or wherever a uniform temperature of 50° to 60° can be maintained. Make beds of fermenting manure, which should be large enough to acquire a heat of about 70°. When at the proper temperature insert bits of mushroom spawn at intervals. As soon as signs of growing appear, place two inches of soil over them and cover all with straw. Mushrooms appear in six to eight weeks, and should be collected when at the proper size for the table.



TOMATOES.

The seed should be sown in a hot-bed, in drills five inches apart and half an inch deep. When the plants are about six inches high, set in the open ground in hills in which a good shovelful of rotten manure has been mixed. 



BRIEF HINTS ON SOWING AND CULTIVATING.

The Soil—A mellow loam, which is a medium earth between the extremes of clay and sand, enriched with a compost of rotten manner and leaf-mold, is adapted to the generality of flowering plants. Previons to digging flower-beds or borders, care must be taken that they are so arranged that the ground may be a little elevated in the middle, that the water may run off, and that the plants may show to better advantage.

Sowing the Seed—Nine-tenths of the failures in flower culture come from improper treatment of the seeds and young plants. We urge every purchaser to carefully study the cultural directions printed on each package, and the following general rules :

Do not plant any of the seeds when the ground is wet. Make the surface as fine and smooth as possible. Cover each sort of seed to a depth proportionate to its size. The finest, like Portnlaca, Campanula, Digitalis, etc., should be merely sprinkled on the surface of the ground, after making quite smooth with the back of the spade, and barely covered with finely sifted, light, mellow soil; press the soil down firmly over the seed with a brick or short-piece of board. For larger seeds the depth should be regulated according to the size of the seed, those of the size of a pin-head, one-half inch deep, and those the size of a pea, three-fourths of an inch.

Procure a bit of lath (it would be better if planed smooth) about two feet long, press the edge down into the soil evenly, so as to make a groove as deep as the seed is to be planted; scatter the seed along this, allowing four or five of the larger to fifteen or twenty of the smaller seeds to the space one plant is to occupy when grown. Cover the seed by pressing the earth together over it, then turn your lath flatwise, and press the soil down firmly and evenly.

Put a little stick at each end of each row, so as to mark it, then pull up all weeds that appear between the rows the first day they can be seen. Do not pull plants ont of the rows unless you are sure they are weeds.

All flowers raised from seed are usually known as Annuals, Biennials or Perennials,

Annuals are those plants which flower, or ripen their seeds or fruits the season they are sown, and then perish. This class of plants is again divided into two classes—the hardy and half-hardy, or tender kinds.

Hardy Annuals are those which require no artificial heat at any period of their growth, every stage of their development from germination to ripening of the seed being passed in the open ground.

They are the most easily cultivated of all plants; the number of their varieties is large, and their flowers, when properly grown, are frequently of the most attractive beanty and elegance. The seed may be sown along the border in little patches, four to six inches square, or in drills, on the spot where they are wanted to blossom; and in doing so, care should be taken to have the different varieties arranged in such a manner as to produce a pleasing effect when they are in bloom.

Half-hardy Annuals are those species which flower and ripen their seeds in the open air, but need the assistance of artificial heat in the earlier stages of their growth. They should be sown in a hot-bed, or in pots in a green-house, if one is available, or in a sunny window. Keep them well shaded, which will prevent absorption by the rays of the snn, and the consequent necessity of frequent watering, which bakes the soil and does much mischief to seeds of slow growth. Toward the middle or end of May, many of the seedlings will be ready for transplanting to borders, but previous to this exposure it will be necessary to harden them, preparatory to removal, by gradually admitting air to the frame both day and night.

Biennials and Perennials-Biennials are those plants which do not generally flower the first year, and are only in perfection one season. Perennials continue to flower several years in succession. The seed may be sown, as has already been stated, at times when the ground is moist, but not very wet, from the first of April to August. Many of them may be raised in the open ground, like hardy annuals, and transplanted, but tender or half-hardy kinds should be sown as directed for half-hardy annuals, as they do not generally bloom the first year. They may be thinned out or removed from the seed-bed as soon as they are well rooted, and planted either in different parts of the garden or in nursery-beds, in rows a foot apart. Tender perennials must be protected from frost by a cloth or mat being fastened or tied around them, and covered afterward with leaves or litter.

By following above directions, success will surely attend the planter.

THE CULTIVATION OF THE CAMELLIA.

In attempting the cultivation of Camellias, it is well to remember that they will not bear neglect in any form, their wants are not many, but they must be supplied and if they are properly cared for, no plants are as easily grown as the Camellia; one essential requisite is to keep their foliage perfectly clean and free from dust and insect pests, as it not only injures the beauty of the plant, but seriously affects its health.

Camellias do best when grown in compost composed of three parts loam, one part leaf mould with a slight admixture of sand. Mix thorougly and use the compost quite rough. Re-potting is best done after the plants cease blooming; but it is well to avoid re-potting too often, once every three years is enough, for while the plants should not be permitted to become pot-bound, too much root room may prove to be equally injurious. In potting be careful to select porous pots, and let them be well drained, filling them one-third full of drainage, for if the roots become injured, the health of the plant is gone, and many years must elapse ere it can be restored to beauty.

TEMPERATURE AND WATERING.

Camellias also require an even temperature and when in the growing state, an abundant supply of water both overhead and at the roots, and after growth ceases, a more moderate supply. They should be given plenty of air at all times, avoiding severe draughts. If large and perfect flowers are desired, not more than one flower-bud should be allowed on each stalk—all others being carefully removed before the buds begin to swell. Water must be given as often as necessary, being careful to thoroughly saturate the entire mass of earth, and the plant should be freely syringed two or three times a week. With a little attention to this as well as to watering, one will not be annoyed by dropping buds, imperfect flowers and sickly foliage. After the flowering season is over, a higher temperature and an abundant supply of water can be given them.

The only insect to which the Camellia is subject is the red spider, and to avoid this, the leaves and stems should be sponged with water and soap as above advised.

Propagation is effected by cuttings and grafting, but amateurs and others had better procure plants which can be obtained at a moderate price from any florist. In selecting plants, choose those of compact symetrical form, with dark green, healthy foliage, and examine the roots by turning the plants out of the pot to see that they are in a healthy state. The above applies to pot plants.

In California and the Southern States of the Union these lovely shrubs do best in the open air, where they love a half-shady situation.





THE BAMBOO.

There is probably no plant in the world that can be put to so many uses as the Bamboo. In the countries where it grows it is employed for houses, fences hedges, for furniture of every description, for vessels to contain water or other liquids, the knots rendering it easily adapted for the purpose, for boats and rafts, for fuel, while the young shoots are boiled and eaten as a vegetable. As a shade and ornamental tree it is unsurpassed in grace and beauty.

The Bamboo is found on the Eastern Coast of Asia, everywhere between the equator and the 30th or 40th degree of latitude. After disappearing from the Coast, it is still found on the islands north as far as Yokohama where the winters are as severe as in Southern Pennsylvania.

Of the many varieties, indigenous to the soil of Asia, the Mosotake is the most useful. This variety is the true Giant Bamboo, called so on account of its height, as it attains at times 30-40 feet. The thickness of stem depends on number of years the Bamboo is planted. Every year up to a certain thickness which it, does not surpass the shoots come out of the ground, stronger and thicker in girth. The variety Mosotake attains a thickness of from 6-8 inches in diameter. It takes from 5-8 years for a Bamboo plantation to establish itself thoroughly and get its full growth in size and dimension. The shoots the first year will appear about the size of a man's finger, the second and third year they will be from 1 to 2 inches in diameter, the fourth and fifth, from 3-4 inches and so on until the full size is reached. This Bamboo requires a rich, deep, loose soil, vegetable mould is the best. Moisture until well established is indispensable.

The Bamboo is a plant of incredible tenacity of life and vigor; once rooted in the soil, it is there for all time or until every vestige of root fibre is eradicated. It extends its roots in all directions and grows as fast, almost laterally under ground, as its shoots do above. When the shoots make their appearance so rapidly do they grow that the ground is raised and broken about them.

The usefulness of this grand plant is not by far acknowledged, the time will come, when, our timber getting scarcer, we will turn to the Bamboo in its stead and will then find it a faithful and valuable substitute.

For fences, for trellis work, vine stakes, hop poles, bridges over small water courses it is invaluable. They form the best "*wind break*" possible, and

FRUIT TREES.

At the head of Japanese fruits stands without doubt the Persimmon, whose value is getting wider known every year, as table fruit it is delicious, and dried it equals, if not excels the fig. We have discarded all varieties but the best, our stock is all raised in our own Nurseries, grafted upon seedlings raised from selected seed of particularly vigorous growth. We export valuable stock only, and are responsible for all we sell to our customers. Inferior stock has been exported from Japan and sold by unscrupulous parties, thereby discouraging many. The varieties purchased from us will in every case prove satisfactory. Varieties for table use which can be eaten fresh from the tree are:

1. Dai Dai Maru, round, red, very crisp and juicy.

2. Zenji Maru Fruit medium sized, round, skin red, marked with black at the end when quite ripe. Flesh crisp, rusty brown, best when touched some what by frost, one of the best for table use.

3. Kuro-Kume-fruit medium, large oblate, somewhat four sided, skin yellowish red, flesh orange, hardly any seeds; juicy and sweet. Excellent quality.

4. Hyakume—Fruit very large size, roundish oblate. Skin, vermilion red; shows black at the end when ripe. Fleshy, few seeds. Flesh, rusty brown with

many purplish brown dots, juicy, very delicious, superior to any other variety; ripens end of October.

5. Yedo-ichi-fruit large roundish oblate. Skin vermilion; one of the best.

6. Tsuru—Noko—a smaller fruit than the above, but very fine flavor and excellent for table use.

Yemon is a variety which, to lose its natural astrigency, and to become delicious, has to be placed in an empty liquor cask or barrel, after being taken off the tree, covered tightly with a lid, and left thus for ten or fifteen days, when they are fully ripe. A small quatity of strong liquor poured over them improves the flavor greatly, about a table-spoon full per gallon. The fruit ripens without this process in time, but never is as delicious.

Hachija fruit very large, oblong, skin rich red, black at the end when ripe almost seedless. Can be prepared like Yemon.

Tane Nashi or Seedless, very similar in shape to Hachija, skin a bright yelow, this variety as well as Hachija is exclusively used for drying.

The best soil for Persimmon is a clayey loam, they require manuring once in the middle of Winter; the manure is best applied in a circular furrow dug on the ground around the trunk of each tree, they must be pruned each alternate year in early Spring, or in the Autumn harvest season; the pruning may be done by breaking off the branches with the hand, not using any knife, as this tree should not be touched with iron. The best varieties of Persimmon are propagated by grafting only, seedlings are very slow in bearing, and the fruit they bear is very astringent.

It is most to be recommended for its superior hardiness, as, if once well established, a temperature of 20° to 15° above Zero Fahrenheit will not injure, it, as also for its early and profuse bearing capacity the branches being literally covered with fruit. The fruit itself is oblong, of a bright golden yellow, like a medium sized Egg plum, the rind almost as thin as a cherry's, sweet and juicy, can be eaten with the fruit, the pulp of which is juicy, subacid and very refreshing, it recommends itself mostly for crystallizing and preserving, but is also eaten fresh from the tree. Cut into halves it is used in Japan during summer as an ingredient for all cooling drinks to which it imparts a delicious flavor. As a plant for pot culture in Eastern climate it cannot be too highly recommended, not being as tender as the other Oranges.
