EXPLANATIONS.

THE business location of individuals engaged in business for themselves, is first mentioned in connection with their names, and then their place of residence. Especial pains has been taken to ascertain the name, residence, and occupation of every male person, twenty-one years of age and upwards.

When two different numbers are given in connection with one name, and only one street mentioned, the number first given is the place of business, and the second the residence, and both in the same street.

Several streets in the city have not been numbered. This will account for the omission of numbers in connection with certain names. And the city having nearly quadrupled since it was numbered eighteen years ago, there are innumerable instances where the inhabitants of two and more dwellings, claim the same number.

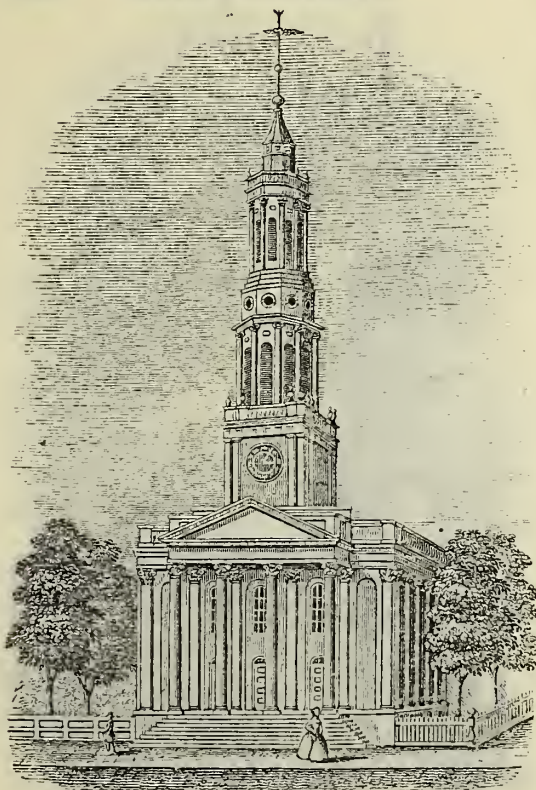

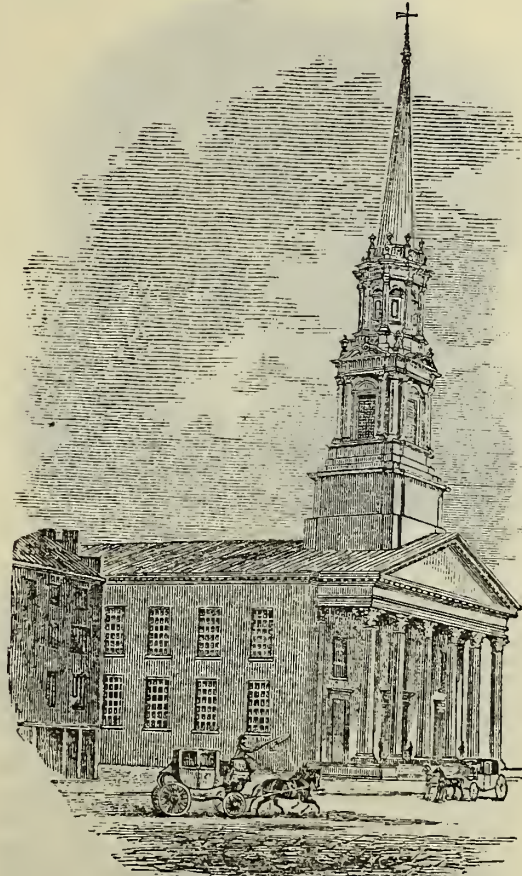

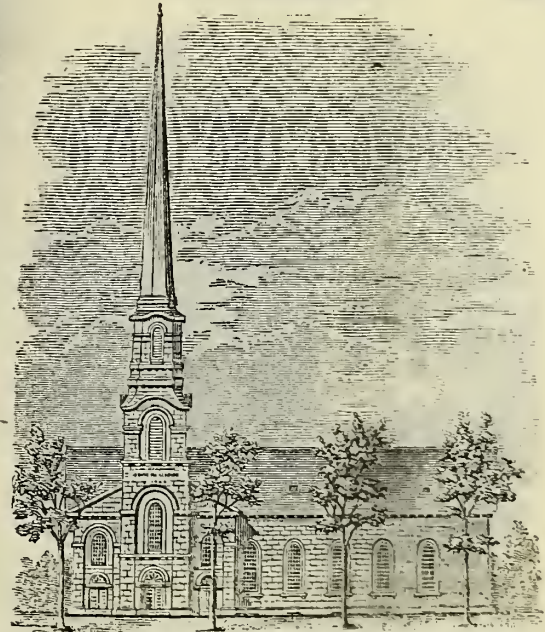

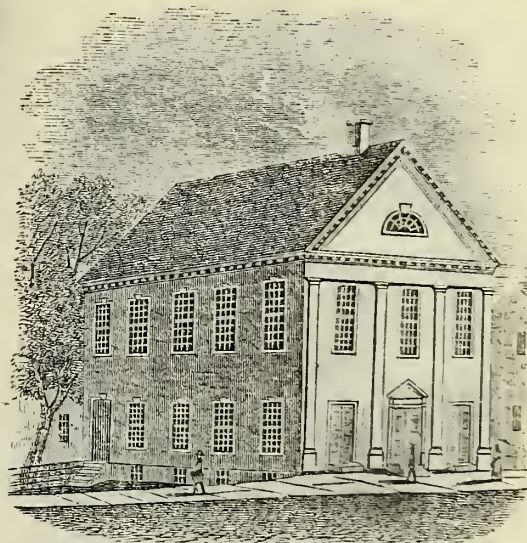

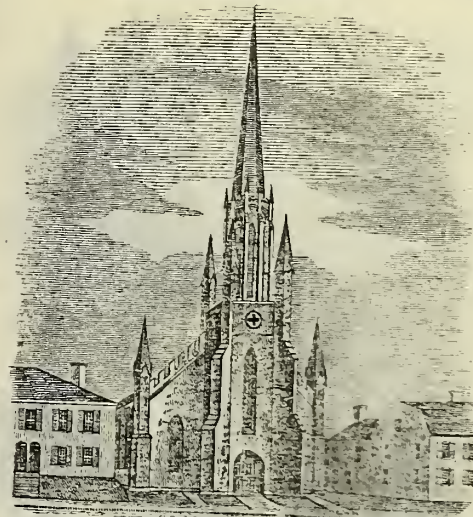


CHRIST CHURCH—EPISCOPAL.

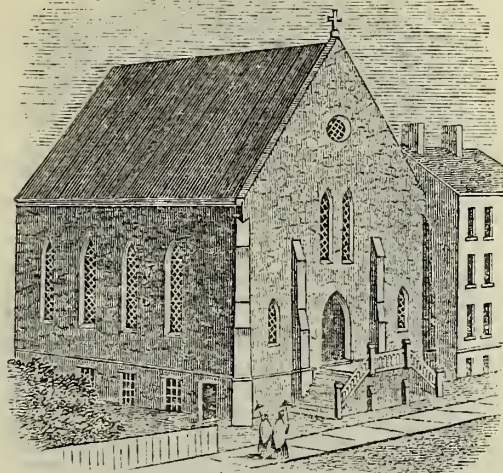

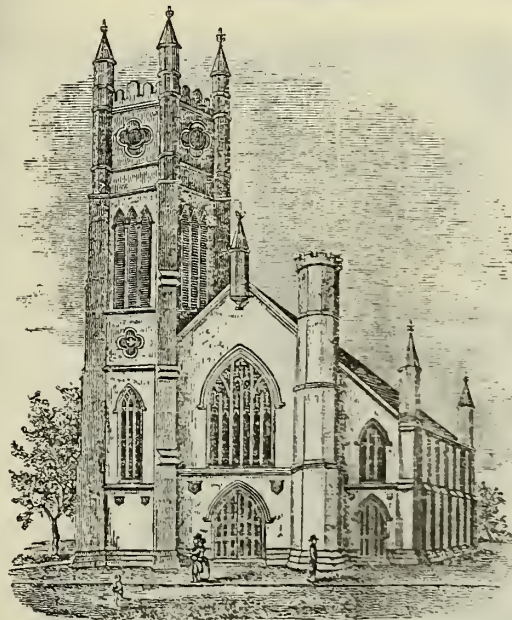

The corner-stone of this edifice was laid by Bi-hop Williams on the 25th of July, 1854, and the church completed in April, 1855. It contains 94-slips on the floor, and has a gallery only for the organ and choir. It contains, also, a large lecture room, for the accommodation of Sunday, Sewing Schools, &c., connected with this congregation. It is built upon land given by Geo. Beach, Esq., and exclusive of the land, cost only a little more than \$8000. The plans were furnished by Mr. W. T. Hallett, Architect, of Norwich, and Mr. Julius Young, of this city, was the builder.

The church will accommodate 500 persons. The Sunday School meets one hour before the afternoon service. The Sewing School meets on Saturday afternoons.



CHURCH OF THE SAVIOR.—UNITARIAN CONG.

Corner of Asylum and Turnbull sts. Organized July 27, 1844.

The corner stone of this edifice was laid May 24th, 1845, and was dedicated, April 22d, 1846. Its extreme length is 85 feet, and its width 65 feet. The height of the tower from the base to the top of the pinnacle is 130 feet, and is 24 feet square at its base; the diameter is reduced to 16 feet at the top. Built of brown Portland stone. 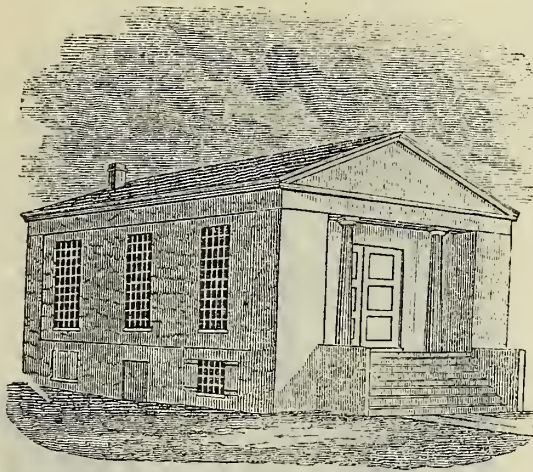

THE dimensions of this building are 96 feet in length, by 63 feet in breadth, with a portico in front, 42 by 12 feet, and a chapel in the rear, 36 by 80 feet, which makes the entire length of the building 144 feet. The porch is 60 by 16 feet. The height of spire is 180 feet. The present house of worship is the third which the Society has occupied. The first stood from seventy-five to eighty years, the second from seventy-two to seventy-three years—both wooden structures. The present edifice is of brick; the corner stone was laid May 25th, 1823, and the house was dedicated April 11, 1827. It was enlarged in 1853. The audience room is 60 by 77 feet, with galleries. There are 130 pews below, and 48 above, and is estimated to seat 1100 hearers. The chapel room is 35 by 67 feet, and will seat 350 persons.

THIS SECOND CHURCH in HARTFORD, was organized Feb. 12, 1669. [The Church in EAST HARTFORD, was also set off from the FIRST or CENTER CHURCH, and received a separate organization in May, 1702; and that in WEST HARTFORD, Feb. 1713; on the 23d of September, 1824, ninety-seven members received dismission from this Church, and were, with others, organized as the NORTH CHURCH; on the 10th of January, 1832, eighteen members of this Church, having received dismission, were organized with others, as the FREE CHURCH, now the FOURTH CHURCH. In 1852, a new church was formed,—the PEARL STREET CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH,—by 36 members from the Center, 15 from the South, 27 from the North, 3 from the 4th and 10 from churches out of the city.]

WADSWORTH ATHENAEUM,

111 Main Street, at the head of Mulberry Street,

Is a granite building of 100 feet in length, on Main street, and 80 feet in depth in center wings, and 70 feet in depth in outside wings, and is appropriated to four distinct Societies. Its architectural style is of the castellated structure, with central towers 70 feet in height, and corner buttresses 56 feet in height. The stone, which is a species of gneiss, was procured from the east part of Glastenbury, about nine miles South East of this city.

The North division, first story 13 feet high, second story 24 feet high, and both 35 feet long by 20 feet wide, is occupied by the YOUNG MEN'S INSTITUTE, for a reading room, quarterly and other meetings, and by their Library, of 10,000 volumes.

The South division is of the same dimensions as the North. THE CONNECTICUT HISTORICAL SOCIETY use this.

THE NATURAL HISTORY SOCIETY occupy a large room in the first story of the South division of the Athenaeum.

The central division of similar dimensions with the others, is used as a gallery of very valuable PAINTINGS and STATUARY.

The building was erected by voluntary contributions of citizens, and, with the land, cost \$59,557.38.

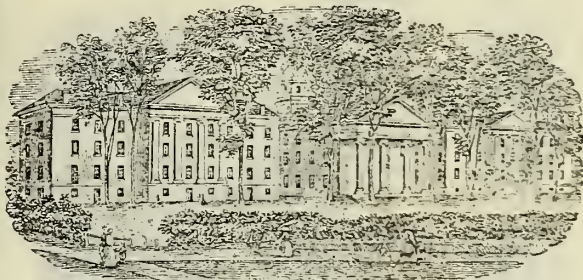

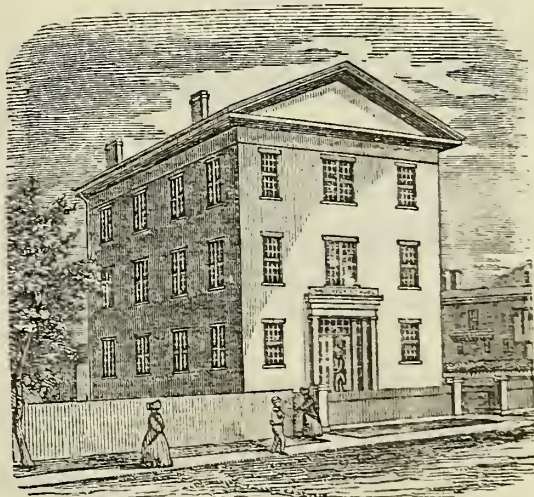

PASSENGER RAILROAD STATION.

THIS building, erected by the Hartford, New Haven and Springfield, and the Hartford, Providence and Fishkill Railroad Companies, is built of Portland stone, of the Italian Campenili style of Architecture, at an expense of \$60,000. Its entire length from North to South is 360 feet. The front faces to the South on Asylum street, and is 94 feet in width; the corner towers thereto are 23 feet square, and 76 feet in height; the smaller towers on the South are 8 feet square and 54 feet in height; the center over the arch is 32 feet wide on elevation of 42 feet; the span of the arches being 25 feet 5 inches; and the height of the arches from the track, 20 feet. The second and third stories of the front portion of the building are finished off into offices for the use of the several officers of these respective companies. The center of the first stories on both sides is handsomely fitted up into Passenger Saloons. The second story into two refectories 20 by 84 feet.



HARTFORD PUBLIC HIGH SCHOOL.

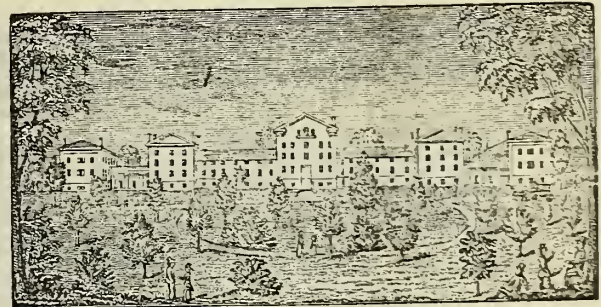

CONNECTICUT RETREAT FOR THE INSANE.

The Connecticut Retreat for the Insane was opened for the reception of patients, April 1, 1824. Since that period, 2804 have been received, of which 1335 were male, and 1469 female. About half of these have been restored to health, while a large number have been discharged with various degrees of improvement. 193 patients were remaining in the Institution, April 1, 1855. The house can accommodate 200 patients. Valuable additions have lately been made to its conveniences, and two buildings have also been erected for Lodges. The Retreat must depend chiefly for its means of usefulness, on the liberality of individuals who can appreciate the high benevolent objects it aims to accomplish.
