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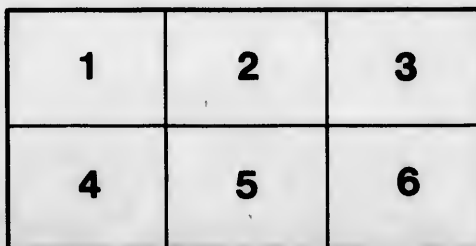
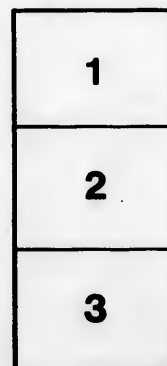
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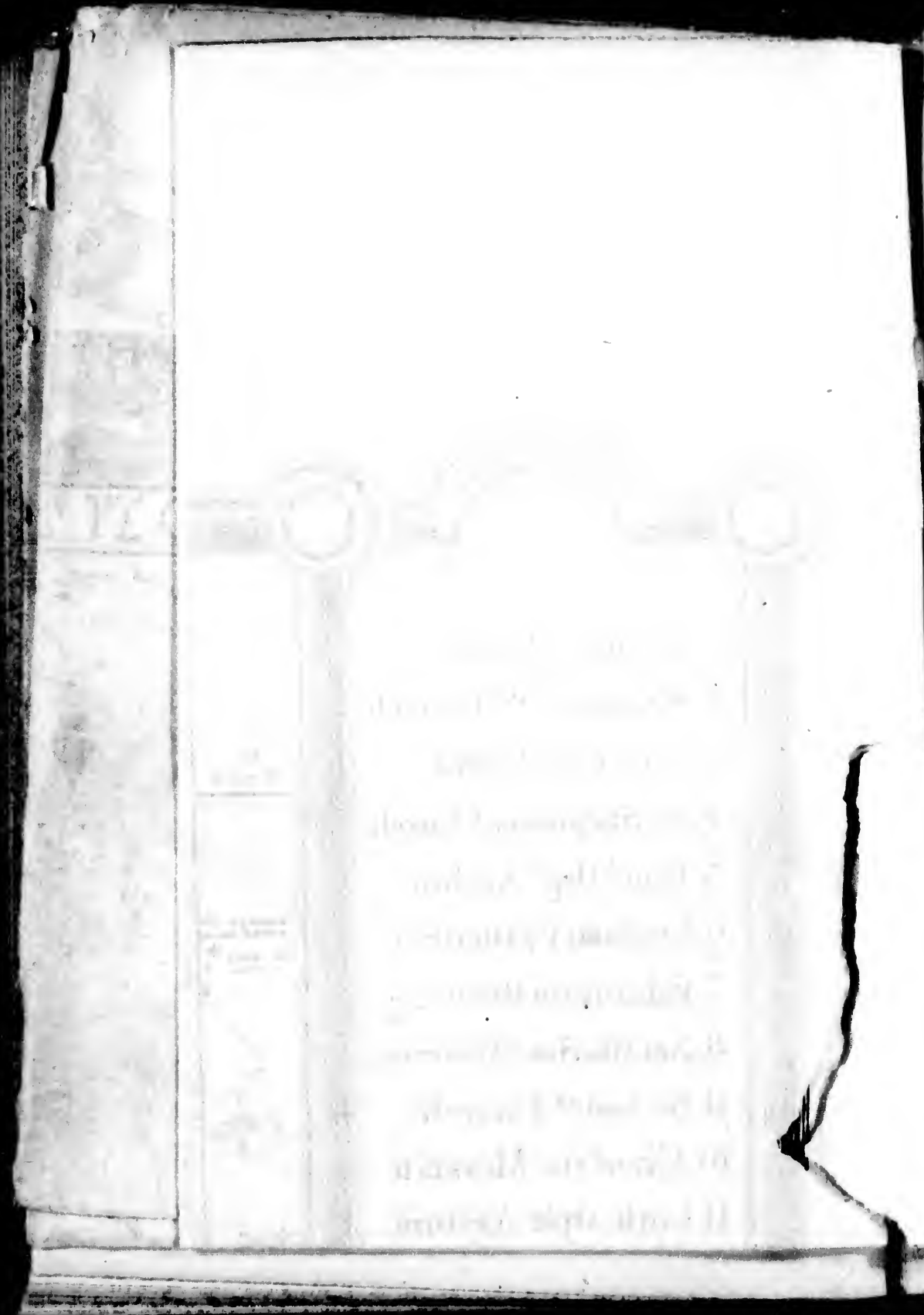

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The Royal Family.

THE QUEEN.

VICTORIA, Queen of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland; only daughter of His late Royal Highness Edward, Duke of Kent, and Victoria, late Duchess of Kent, daughter of Francis, Duke of Saxe Cobourg; born the 24th May, 1819; succeeded to the Throne on the decease of her Uncle, William IV., June 20th, 1837; Proclaimed June 21st, 1837; Crowned June 28th, 1838; Married February 10th, 1840, to Field-Marshal His Royal Highness Prince Albert Augustus Charles Emanuel, Prince of Saxe Cobourg and Gotha, Knight of the Most Noble Order of the Garter, &c.; &c., who died at Windsor Castle, December 14th, 1861.

ECLIPSES.

There will not be any Eclipse of the Moon for 1864.

I. Of the Sun there will be but two Eclipses and these will not be specially interesting to Canadian observers of Astronomical changes.

II. On the 5th of May, in the afternoon, there will be a Central Eclipse of the Sun. In Canada it will not be visible, but will be observed in the Western part of Illinois and Wisconsin about sunset. Those who dwell in California may have a fine view of it.

III. On the 30th of October there will be an Annular Eclipse of the Sun, not visible in Canada.

PLANETS.

Until July 18th, Venus will be morning star and the rest of the year evening star. Until August 18th, Mars will be morning star, and evening star the rest of the year. Until February 15th, Jupiter will be morning star, then until Nov 30th, evening star, then the rest of the year morning star. Until Jan. 8th, Saturn will be morning star, then until October 13th, evening star, then the rest of the year, morning star.

Summer Solstice : Summer begins June, 20d. 11h. 44m in the Evening.

Autumnal Equinox : Autumn begins September, 22d. 2h. 8m. in the Evening.

REGULATIONS AND RATES.

Letter Rates.—Letters posted in Canada addressed to any place within the Province pass, if prepaid, for 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., but if posted unpaid are charged 7 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz.

On letters to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island the rate is 5 cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., with optional pre-payment.

The rate on letters to the United Kingdom will be,

By Canadian Packet, 12 $\frac{1}{2}$ cents per $\frac{1}{2}$ ounce.

By Cunard " 17 " "

If a letter exceed 1 oz. in weight, it will be liable to *four* rates, as, after the first ounce, fractions are not recognized, the rate progressing by the ounce.

Letters for the United Kingdom must be prepaid, or they will be charged a fine of 6d. sterling in addition to the deficient postage on delivery in England.

The British Post Office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet sailing after the letter is posted, unless the letters bear a special direction—"by Canadian Packet" or "by British Packet"—and in that case they are kept over for the Packet designated. "By Canadian Mail" is not a distinctive superscription ; for any mail for Canada is a "Canadian Mail" by whatever Packet forwarded.

Letters for British Colonies and possessions, beyond sea, and for Foreign Countries, via England, must be prepaid.

One cent per ounce, payable in advance by postage stamp, is the rate on Printed Circulars, Prices Current, Hand Bills, and other Printed Matter of a like character, and on Books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charges upon Prices Current and Printed Circulars, when addressed to the United Kingdom, is 2 cents each and must be prepaid.

The charge upon Books, &c, by Book Post to England, is 7 cents on packets not exceeding $\frac{1}{4}$ ounces in weight ; $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents on $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. packets ; and $12\frac{1}{2}$ cents for every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. These charges must be prepaid.

Newspaper and Periodicals.—Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by Post from the office of publication, addressed to any place in Canada, at the following rates, *if paid quarterly in advance*, by either the publisher at the Post Office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at the delivering Post Office :

When the above rates are not paid in advance by either publisher or subscriber, such papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

Transient Newspapers.—Transient Newspapers, that is to say, Canadian Newspapers, posted otherwise than from the Office of Publication, and American or British Papers posted or reposted in Canada, must be prepaid one cent each, by Postage Stamp, or they cannot be forwarded ; except only *British Newspapers* distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian Booksellers and News Agents, such papers pass free, as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mail.

Newspapers by Mail from England or United States.—Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England, by the Cunard Packet Mails, are charged 2 cents each on delivery. (This is the American transit charge.)

United States Newspapers, brought by Mail into Canada, are charged 1 cent each on delivery.

Periodical Publications.—The rate on Periodical Publications, is, if not exceeding 3 ounces in weight, 1 cent ; over 3 ounces, 4 cents.

If prepaid by Postage Stamps from the Office of Publication, Periodicals, *published in Canada*, weighing over 3 ounces, may pass for 2 cents each.

Periodicals, *printed in this Province*, other than Newspapers when specially devoted to the Education of Youth (both religious and general), to Agriculture, to Temperance, or to any branch of Science, and addressed directly from the Office of Publication, to be transmitted to any Post Office in this Province, are exempt from charge.

Canadian booksellers and news agents may also post for transmission by mail in Canada small periodicals, whether Canadian, British or United States, weighing less than 1 oz., such as the Children's Paper, Child's Paper, The Sabbath School Visitor, The Evangelizer, The Gospel Message, The Good News, and others of a like description, in packages to one address, at the rate of 5 cents per pound, or fraction of a pound bulk weight, provided that the same news agents and booksellers pre-pay such packages by postage stamps. This must not be understood as imposing a charge on Canadian periodicals entitled to pass free.

Transient Periodicals, including Canadian Periodicals not prepaid the commuted rate from the Office of Publication, nor exempted by the preceding clause, and all other Periodical Publications posted in this Province, must be prepaid by Postage Stamps, the full rate, at the time of posting.

Periodicals received in the Mails from the United States are charged with the rates named in the first clause of this section.

Postage Stamps.—Postage Stamps of the respective values of 1 cent, for Newspapers; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial Letters; 10 cents for United States rate; 12½ cents for Canadian Packet; and 17 cents for Cunard Packet, are provided for sale to the public.

Letter Envelopes, impressed with Medallion Stamp, and equivalent to the prepayment of Postage to the amount of 5 and 10 cents respectively, are furnished for sale to the public at the following rates:

The 5 cent Envelope, at the rate of \$5.50 per 100, or 66 cents per dozen; the 10 cent Envelope, at \$10.50 per 100, or \$1.26 per dozen.

Penal Clause—The Act contains the following penal clause:

To inclose a letter, or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a Parcel posted for the Parcel Post, shall be a misdemeanor.

To inclose a letter, or any writing, or make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to enclose any other thing in a newspaper, posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers (except in the case of accounts and receipts of Newspaper Publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their Subscribers), shall be a misdemeanor.

N. B.—NO HALF CENTS to be introduced in the Money Orders.

Money Orders on England, Scotland and Ireland—Money Orders payable at any Money Order Office in Great Britain and Ireland, can be obtained at any Canadian Money Order Office. The Orders are drawn in sterling, the Commission chargeable being for £2 and under, 25 cts.; from £2 to £5, 50 cts.; from £5 to £7, 75 cts.; from £7 to £10, \$1. No order can be drawn for more than £10; but any number of orders for £10 each may be procured.

The following Articles are also permitted to be entered FREE, in certain circumstances or conditions, viz:—

Agricultural Societies' Seeds of all kinds, farming utensils and implements of husbandry, when especially imported by, for the encouragement of agriculture.

Apparel, Wearing and other personal effects, and implements of husbandry (not merchandise) in actual use of persons coming to settle in the Province, and accompanying the owner.

Arms for the Army and Navy and Indian Nations, provided the duty otherwise payable thereon would be paid or borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or of the Provinces.

Books, Maps, and Charts, imported not as merchandise, but as the personal effects of persons arriving in Canada to become *bonâ fide* residents of the Province.

Clothing for Army or Navy, or Indian Nations, or for gratuitous distribution by any charitable society.

Household Furniture and Effects, that have been in actual use for one month or more, of persons coming to settle in this Province, and in charge of the owner.

Household Effects, Personal, not merchandise, of subjects of Her Majesty domiciled in Canada but dying abroad.

Machinery, Models and Patterns of, provided the same be not put to actual use.

Military Clothing, for Her Majesty's troops or militia.

Military Stores, and Material for Military Clothing, imported for the use of the Provincial militia, under such restrictions as may be passed by the Governor in Council.

Packages containing *free goods*, in which they are usually imported.

Packages; viz, bales, trusses; cases covering casks of wine or brandy, in wood; cases and casks, containing dry goods, hardware, and cutlery; crates or casks, containing glass-ware or earthenware; cases, containing bottled wine or spirits; and other packages, in which goods of the kind imported in them are usually imported, and which do not necessarily or generally accompany such goods when sold in the Province.

Packages, of all other kinds, to pay same *ad valorem* duty as the goods they contain, unless the duty exceeds 30 per cent; in which case, the duty on the packages to be 30 per cent.

Packages containing specific goods, 20 per cent. *ad valorem*.

Tools and Implements of Trade of handicraftsmen arriving in Canada, when accompanied into the Province by the actual settler, and brought in by such settler for his own use, and not for sale; machinery excepted.

Table of Prohibitions.—The following articles are prohibited to be imported, under a penalty of fifty pounds, together with the forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found:—Books, Drawings, Paintings, and Prints, of an immoral or indecent character; Coin, base or counterfeit.

Free for Use of Her Majesty's Army in Canada.—Silver or plated Ware, Glassware, China Ware, Table Linen, and Cigars, for the use of any regimental mess of officers serving in Canada.

The phrase, "All importations for the use of Her Majesty's Army and Navy, or for the public uses of the Province," is, by the last Act, interpreted to mean, that such importations are only free when the duty, otherwise payable thereon, would be borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or this Province.

All goods not hereinbefore enumerated, subject to 20 per cent. duty.
