Distance Learning in 2020

We have just finished the first semester of distance learning of the 2020-21 school year. Faculty, staff, and students have settled into this new way of teaching, learning, and "being" together, virtually. For the newest members of the student body, there have been virtual meetings with Big Sisters and classmates, retreats, and a "Freshmen Flip" with an eye on community and friendship building. The Dads Club has successfully hosted drive-in movie nights to give our families an opportunity to get out of the house for a fun evening. As always, Louisville continues to utilize and update our technology to deliver academic excellence in accordance with the current distance learning orders. As we move into the second semester of the year, we strive to provide a schedule that benefits both the student and the educator, based on feedback from teachers, students, and families. The girls' second semester will consist of "attending" classes four times a week with Fridays reserved as "asynchronous" days, in which the students do not "attend" class, but work on class curriculum independently with the opportunity to visit teachers during office hours.

As always, our Counseling Department is available to all students; they have initiated a bi-monthly newsletter to offer updates and resources. In addition, clubs continue to meet virtually to plan activities, interact with one another, and advance their missions.



The Associated Student Body (ASB) has been actively showing leadership for the students with a weekly video series entitled "LvTV." New episodes are released on Mondays and feature school and club news, birthday greetings, upcoming events, and some fun segments which highlight our officers' personalities and video skills.

In an effort to ensure that the online learning experience Louisville provides for students is valuable and manageable, our Administration periodically conducts surveys to receive feedback from students, parents, and faculty. Student results are used to adjust individual courses while parent and faculty results are used to drive more global changes, as necessary. Recognizing that online learning and the restrictions brought on by the pandemic can be challenging for some students, Louisville offers support structures for students that include, but are not limited to:

- Offering extracurricular/co-curricular activities in a virtual format to encourage socialization
- Providing student-counselor check-ins
- Matching faculty with students to work on time management, organization, and accountability
- Offering workshops on relevant topics such as stress and time management.

Louisville is grateful to its faculty and staff for their arduous work in creating an online learning environment for students and are grateful to students and parents for their partnership and support.


Festival of the Arts

The first iteration of the annual Festival of the Arts show was held at the end of the school year in 1987. As it grew in popularity, the Performing Arts department was added into the mix. Alongside the art students, there were dancers, actors, and singers displaying their skills for the student body and community to experience and appreciate. It is and was a true celebration of Louisville students' creativity. To date there have been 25 art shows. "I put together the first Festival and it's been happening ever since," recalls Art Department Chair, Elizabeth Dupuy.

As with most of our traditional events, the Festival was yet another which was reimagined in order to stay COVID-19 compliant, while honoring the work of the students from the 2019-20 school year. Every student who is enrolled in an art class participates. AP seniors are required to have 10 pieces in the show. There isn't an overarching theme; instead, each student is required to submit one project from each semester.

Focus Program 2019 - 2020

Louisville's Focus Program for career exploration, our most popular distinctive academic program, expanded to five cohorts this past school year by separating the Medical/Health Sciences students from STEM. This enables us to better serve both groups by providing field trips and guest speakers more specifically related to their interests. For the second year in a row, all seniors in the Focus Program participated in a series of three Financial Workshops covering topics such as banking, loans, credit cards, budgets, and understanding credit scores.

The 2019-20 school year started off strong, with a field trip for STEM which put the students in the driver's seat of the Da Vinci surgical robot. Our host, Louisville Dad, Nick Kearin (father of Nikki Kearin '17 & Mary Kearin '21 and husband of Amy Screbant Kearin '90), invited the girls to an exclusive demonstration presented by the robot's creator, Intuitive, at West Hills Hospital. They began the tour by hearing from trained medical equipment engineers about the coding and physical materials involved in creating the equipment, valued at over one million dollars. After their introduction to the equipment, a surgeon taught the students about the advantages of using the robot for minimally invasive surgery. Everyone was given a turn practicing with the Da Vinci in two different simulations. It was a rare opportunity for students to try out a robot-assisted system that has revolutionized general laparoscopic surgery.

The Journalism and Media cohort toured KCRW's new 34,000 ft. thirty-eight million dollar radio station, which was hosted by Louisville alumna, Caleigh Wells '13. Caleigh is a producer and reporter, and she took the students on an amazing tour of the studios, sound editing rooms, music archives, the "green room," and the stage used for live performances. We met with several producers, radio show hosts, and the VP of Operations, before watching Caleigh produce a live interview for broadcast later in the day. KCRW, one of two NPR affiliates in the Los Angeles area, has been broadcasting from Santa Monica since 1945, and has hosted the U.S. debut for many famous artists in addition to its news, culture, and music content.

The Arts cohort had an unforgettable behind-the-scenes visit to the J. Paul Getty Museum with Louisville mom and Curator of Drawings, Stephanie Schrader, Ph.D. (mother of Lucy

Bailey '22). She gave the students a close-up look at drawings in the archives by Rembrandt, Bonnard, and Leonardo da Vinci. In the Design department the girls learned about the development of upcoming feature exhibits, including the scale model of the gallery known as the "doll house." Lastly, the cohort met three Conservators in the lab where pieces of art are preserved, repaired, and analyzed. Dr. Schrader explained to the students how a museum shares its art with the public, and its responsibility to protect and preserve protecting the valuable pieces.

Unfortunately, due to "stay at home" orders, field trips to Mamba Sports Medicine and Loyola Law School were canceled. Informational interviews have taken the place of on-site job shadowing for the near future.

Class of 2021 Profile: Kate Powledge

Louisville senior, Kate Powledge, is truly a

Renaissance woman – a wonderful example of
the student the Sisters of St. Louis have strived
to develop since the school's founding.

Kate's involvement at Louisville stretches to every corner of the campus, as do her accolades, and recently those stretched even further – all the way across the country. She was selected as one of just 16,000 semifinalists in the prestigious National Merit Scholarship competition out of a pool of over 1.5 million students across the country who entered the competition. This puts her in the top 1% of all qualified selection nationwide.

She will find out in February if she is selected as a finalist, which is based on a record of very high academic achievement (which she has), an impressive SAT score (which she has), and a recommendation from a school official (which she will have no problem getting).

Kate has had a huge impact at Louisville but remains humble in the face of her successes. "She pursues her interests (like philosophy, crafting, etc.) because of her innate curiosity," counselor, Marybeth, Competelli said of Powledge, "and then she finds a way to share them with others through clubs, community service, and even everyday interactions. She doesn't even have to try and she winds up in leadership positions because it's just who she is."

You will find Kate on stage in our productions, as stage manager backstage, and building sets and props in the Theatre Tech class. She is the founder and copresident of the Philosophy Club because she wanted to share her enthusiasm for the subject. She has completed hundreds of community service hours, beyond her graduation requirements, as a member of the leadership council for the National Charity League. She is on the school's highly regarded Mock Trial team, and in her free time, she plays Dungeons and Dragons. She is, of course, a dungeon master. And through it all, as Competelli says, "she is unabashedly herself, which is something I greatly admire."

She not only has an impressive academic record, but she shares her prodigious gifts and talents with her community, as well, and as lucky as Kate was to come to a school that could provide her the tools to grow and blossom, Louisville has been just as lucky to count her among our many amazing young women who shape the world.

The Robinson Family Aquatics Center

In October 2020, Crespi Carmelite High
School opened the doors to the new home of
Louisville and Celts aquatics, the Robinson
Family Aquatics Center. The Royals water
polo team has already begun practicing in the
state-of-the-art aquatics center, which will be
our home tank for water polo and home pool
for swimming and diving in the spring. The
pool is expected to be the home pool for all San
Fernando Valley Catholic Swim League meets
as well, which encompasses the parishes of
many of our families.

The beautiful new facility goes far beyond the six 25-yard lanes required for CIF swim competition, and boasts an Olympic-size 50-meter by 25-yard competition pool and a 60-feet by 30-feet restorative wellness plunge pool.

"While CIF events are specifically a 25-yard distance, the Myrtha competition pool will attract professional athletes in advance of the 2028 Los Angeles Olympics," remarked Louisville head swim coach Aaron Robinson.

Generous donations from the Louisville and Crespi communities made the dream of this facility a reality. In addition to the pools and ample deck space, there is a two-story pavilion which houses the Crespi and Louisville locker rooms, a first-aid center, and spectator

restrooms. The concrete bleachers form the roof of the extensive equipment room, and there is also an elevated deck between the pool and field to allow for viewing of swimming, diving, water polo, football, lacrosse, soccer, track and field, and other events.

"This is the beginning of a new era for our swimming and water polo teams," Crespi Carmelite High School President Dr. Kenneth Foersch noted. "We are excited to share this facility with our sister school, Louisville High School."

The pool itself is an innovative design, featuring waveless, deck-level gutters, state-of-the-art blocks and timing system, and high-tech pool surface materials that are more resistant to the harsh effects of pool chemicals than a normal pool surface.

Dr. Foersch went on to state, "I am convinced that the Robinson Family Aquatics Center will be a premier facility, not only for our Crespi and Louisville students, but also for the community and all competitive athletes seeking a complex of this level."

Mary Loffa A Royal Legacy

It's hard to remember a time when there was a Louisville without Mary Loffa.

Mary and her family joined the Louisville community when her eldest daughter, Mary Lenore Loffa Rohrs '97, was taught Algebra I by Kathy Vercillo as an 8th grader. Soon Elizabeth Loffa Schumacher '01 also became a Royal and the Loffa family was firmly ensconced on campus and in our hearts.

The youngest Loffa daughter graduated in 2001, but Mary's tenure at Louisville was just beginning. In the early 2000s, when she was about to retire from her family business, Mary, instead, took on the new and daunting role of Alumnae Director. She was on campus two days a week, collecting and compiling information on almost 40 years of graduates, shepherding alums through reunion planning, hosting Alumnae Teas and Inductions, planning Trunk or Treat festivities, and, generally speaking, supporting graduates and their families with all things Louisville.

Never one to have an empty schedule, Mary soon added Director of Admissions to her resume. In this role, which she held for the next 11 years and really enjoyed the most, Mary was the face of Louisville,. Mary's careful and detailed work ushered thousands of girls through Louisville's front doors and on to becoming Royals. Mary planned year-round for the annual recruitment process, which began with visiting prospective students in their 8th grade classrooms. From that early introduction, Mary planned countless 8th Grade Visit Days which provided prospective students with an opportunity to shadow current Royals and get a feel for the campus experience. Most Royals will say that this incredible day on the Louisville campus with our students is the day that solidified their desire to be a Royal. The

culmination of recruitment activities is the Open House, which Mary made special and fresh every year.

Former Louisville college counselor, Gail Devine, recalls that when Mary joined the staff, "she quickly became one of our most dedicated and talented colleagues. She brought a level of intelligence and creativity that immediately stood out. What impressed me the most was her generosity. No job was ever too small, no need or request too great. Mary took them all on with zest and unparalleled dedication. I am grateful to have worked with her, and I am deeply blessed to call her my friend."

Mary was instrumental in establishing and developing both the Admissions and Alumnae operational areas of school. Her loyalty, creativity, and countless hours of service to Louisville leaves a legacy shared in the hearts of all she encountered over the last 28 years.

This past June, Mary hung up the many hats she wore at Louisville and stepped happily into retirement. Mary's new chapter will enable her and her husband, Frank, to enjoy life with their children and grandchildren, and continue her weekly golf game. She is immensely appreciated and will be dearly missed. For those who have had the good fortune to know her, Mary is a friend, a Louisville historian, a great storyteller, a loyal and dedicated parent (and grandparent!), and leader in our community.

We are forever grateful for the contributions Mary made to Louisville. As we bid her farewell, we hold a special place in our hearts – and on campus – for her.

Commencement 2020: Reimagining Traditions

It will come as no surprise that the
Louisville graduation ceremony looked
different this year. With respect to current
restrictions on public gatherings, a modified
version of the traditional graduation was
realized on August 1.

Since the first class graduated in 1964,
Louisville High School has celebrated
the culmination of our seniors with a
ceremony steeped in tradition. "Pomp and
Circumstance" signifies the beginning of the
ceremony as the graduates process wearing
white formal attire and carrying a bouquet of
roses. The young women recite the Pledge
of Allegiance, sing the National Anthem, and
listen attentively to a speaker especially
chosen for their class. The graduates
also honor their faith with the crowning of
Mary and singing of the "Ave Maria." Every
movement is synchronized with military
precision, signifying the unity of the class for

their final ceremony together on campus.

In May 2020, it became clear that hosting this event, in the traditional manner, would not be possible. As schools scrambled to produce virtual drive-in and drive-thru graduations, the Administration surveyed the families about their preferences to mark the end of senior year. Graduates and their parents overwhelmingly wanted a live ceremony, as close to the traditional one as possible, even if they had to wait. By mid-July it was clear that we were unable to host the time-honored ceremony together on Senior Lawn. The faculty and administration, many of whom are Louisville alumnae and have experienced the traditional event, challenged themselves to create a graduation within the confines of social gathering restrictions. There was much uncertainty. Would the students want to participate? What should they wear? Would they attend?



Invitations were sent and the response was heartwarming. Of the eighty-two seniors, all but five were able to attend.

On Saturday, August 1st, in 100°+ heat, the first group of families arrived - students were scheduled to come to campus, eleven families at a time, in half-hour intervals, beginning at 3:00 p.m. "Pomp and Circumstance" played continuously. To comply with social distancing requirements, students exited their vehicles individually, wearing masks. Each graduate was given a bouquet of pink roses, heard her name announced by the Assistant Principal for Academics, Dr. Jennifer Aguilar, and walked proudly across the senior lawn to receive her diploma from Louisville President, Sr. Donna Hansen SSL '67, and, Principal, Kathy Vercillo. Parents watched from a prime vantage point and snapped as many pictures as possible. Each family then returned to their vehicle to allow the next graduate to have her moment.

As the sun set behind the hills above Mulholland, the final graduate accepted her diploma and made her way down senior lawn for the last time. Ways to Give to Louisville

Besides our more traditional ways of giving—via cash, check or online donation—there are some interesting new ways to support Louisville:

Louisville GEMs (Gives Every Month) is a no-hassle way to set up automatic payments that will establish you as a member of this new society. You designate the amount and the day of the month for the transaction. It just takes a few minutes to set this up but it will have a lifelong impact on Louisville students.

A Donor-Advised Fund (DAF) is a charitable giving vehicle that allows donors to support charitable organizations that are dear to their hearts. An individual is able to contribute cash, securities, or other assets to a donor-advised fund at any time, with an immediate tax benefit. Then those funds can be invested for tax-free growth and grants may be recommended to virtually any IRS-qualified public charity (such as Louisville!). Donor-advised funds are the fastest growing charitable giving vehicle in the United States because they are one of the easiest and most tax-advantageous ways to give to a charity.

Louisville Legacy Society

Louisville is proud to announce the creation of the Louisville Legacy Society. Membership in this special community is open to all individuals who have named Louisville in their long-term estate plans. Benefits include invitations to special recognition events, a commemorative pin, and acknowledgement in our Annual Report.



In addition to these new ways to give, The CARES Act has enacted the following changes which may affect your charitable giving in 2020:

- Temporary Universal Charitable Deduction: Taxpayers who do not itemize their deductions can take a one-time deduction of up to \$300 for gifts made to charitable organizations in 2020.
- Temporary suspension of the adjusted gross income limitation for individuals'
 charitable contributions for the year 2020: In a typical year, individuals can only take
 a charitable deduction of up to 60% of their adjusted gross income. For 2020, there
 is no limit, making cash contributions fully deductible up to 100% of AGI. Gifts of
 appreciated assets are generally deductible up to 30% of AGI and may be combined
 with cash gifts up to 100% of AGI.
- Required minimum distributions from IRAs waived for 2020: Charitable gifts from retirement plans for those 70 ½ or older can still be deducted from your income tax but minimum distributions are not required for this year.

Profile of an Alumna - Hannah Garcia-Park '13

Since the age of eleven. Hannah Garcia-Park '13 knew she wanted a career in space. "I applied to one college – the Air Force Academy. It was my plan A through Z." Hannah was an Oribtal Analyst in the United States Air Force, but over the past summer, she became the first Louisville alumna to work in the United States Space Force and the youngest First Lieutenant in charge of thirty Orbital Analysts, specialists who monitor satellite locations in relation to other satellites, in space.

How did a tennis player from Palmdale find herself on a secure floor at Vandenberg Air Force base in Lompoc?

Tennis was Hannah's passion for as long as she can remember. She was at the top of her game as a freshman at Desert High School on Edwards Air Force base, but was looking for more. She had

a cousin who was attending Crespi, which led her mom and aunt to consider Louisville, which was 1.5 hours from her home "on a good day," as an option for Hannah to further challenge herself, both academically and athletically.

After interviewing with principal, Kathy Vercillo, Hannah became a Royal in August of 2010, her sophomore year. Hannah and her mom were typically in the car by 5:30am to make the 60-mile, one-way drive from home to campus. After dropping off her daughter at school. Hannah's mom busied herself in the Valley by visiting family, shopping, or running her eBay business. When school was finished, the pair would head to Malibu for LvHS tennis practice and conditioning, which meant they were usually on the road home at

the peak of evening traffic. "I studied a lot in the car, which isn't good because I tend to sleep when I'm in the car," she laughed at the memory. Her first year, Hannah recalls the Royals victory over Notre Dame and Harvard Westlake. "We had never beaten either school before!" Hannah and her mom maintained this grueling schedule for the next three years.

Senior year, Hannah was laser-focused on her future. When the time came for college applications, with Mrs. Devine's support, Hannah applied to the Air Force Academy, according to her plan. She was raised Catholic, but had spent most of her life mastering her tennis game and succeeding in academics, leaving one bit of unfinished business. It was important to Hannah to take the next step as a Catholic woman before beginning her military career.

In her senior year, she received the sacrament of Confirmation, with Principal Vercillo by her side as her sponsor.

Hannah remembers fondly the encouragement she received from her religion teacher, Mrs. Nicholas, at this time. "Mrs. Nick" wrote a letter of recommendation to the Academy for her. Hannah was thrilled to be accepted in the Spring of 2013. On the day she left for basic training, with a special gift from her teacher packed in her bag, Hannah heard the news that Mrs. Nicholas had passed away. In the bittersweet moment. she knew her teacher and cheerleader was with her in spirit.

The Air Force Academy proved to be as challenging as one would expect. Hannah worked hard and her grades reflected her efforts. School was going well and she was on track to realize her goal of a career in space, when in a short span of time, she was assaulted twice – once by a person she considered a friend and once by a fellow classmate in

her squadron. Needless to say, these events sidelined her. Hannah chose to file charges against her classmate, which resulted in a drawn-out courtmartial at which she had to face and testify against her accuser. Much to her surprise and disappointment, the individual was cleared of all charges leaving Hannah exposed and suffering from depression and PTSD. As to be expected, her grades nosedived, which resulted in academic probation. This was her moment of truth. Hannah



was not going to let what happened define her, nor was she going to let her abuser steal her dream. During this time, she found a new purpose. She had earned a reputation for standing up and fighting for herself, and now she found herself advocating for and assisting people on other military bases who had similar experiences.

Hannah was fighting for her life and her dreams, and she had no other option but to win. "I had to dig deep and just do it." In her junior year she received the award for "Most Improved Scholar," bringing her GPA up from a 1.5 to a 3.97. In her senior year, she had a new commanding officer who believed in her, which was an apropos end to her time in the Academy. Hannah graduated from the United States Air Force Academy with the accolade of Distinct Graduate in 2018. She reflects on her college years

as the best and worst time of her life, however, noting the "Academy gave me my dreams. I wouldn't be who I am" without it.

Hannah will not rest on her already impressive accomplishments. She married her fiancé last September, who is also in the military and she aspires to work in the Pentagon. When children are in the picture, she is already planning for private education. Reflecting on her years at Louisville makes her happy. Time

spent with friends and just being together on campus brings a smile to her face. "Louisville provided so many opportunities. It solidified [me] in my faith and prepared me to overcome anything that comes my way."

Her advice to her fellow alumnae and current students is to never give up on your dreams. "God doesn't give you more than you can handle; trust God, trust yourself and good things will happen." Hannah carries with her the Louisville mission statement to "unify and transform." Her passion for helping others, coupled with her dedication to her dreams and finding strength in her faith, is the true embodiment of a Louisville woman.


