ADAGIO Each \$5.00

Large turk's cap flowers of brilliant crimson red. Reverse of petals is coppery gold, edged red. Up to 12 blooms on each stem. Excellent substance.

CORSAGE Each \$4.00

An entirely new type lily producing compact flower heads of 6 to 9 outward facing flowers ideal for flower arrangements or corsages. Light yellow buds change to pink as they open. Centers are ivory white with few dark speckles. A most charming lily possessing tremendous appeal.

#### CULTURE

#### Detailed cultural instructions will be included with every lily order

Lilies, unlike most other bulbs, resent disturbance at any time and deteriorate steadily when kept out of the ground. Also, lilies possess, in addition to the cluster of fleshy scales which compromise the bulbs, a system of live roots attached to the bulb base just like any other perennial. No gardener would be foolish enough to remove the roots from a perennial phlox or delphinium before planting it in the garden. Likewise, the live roots attached to a lily bulb should never be removed or allowed to die before planting if maximum results are desired. With exception of some imported stocks all lily bulbs we use for filling orders will arrive with attached live roots. This advantage guarantees our customers maximum vitality at planting time so necessary to get any plant or bulb off to a good start in a new garden.

#### TIME OF SHIPMENT

#### Late October to Early April (unless noted otherwise)

Most lilies may be planted in fall or early spring with equally good results. The only requirement is that the bulbs are properly cared for during the winter months. We have ideal facilities for winter storage and can supply vigorous fresh bulbs any time from October to early April. Please indicate when you prefer shipment and we'll ship as near that date as possible.

#### HOW WE PACK OUR LILIES

We pack all lilies in sealed moisture retentive polyethylene bags. If you cannot plant the bulbs when received, open the bags and inspect the bulbs for possible damage in transit, then replace and leave them in the bags until you can plant. Bulbs may remain in our sealed polyethylene bags for weeks with perfect safety. They will not lose one bit of their freshness or vigor.

#### AURATUM PLATYPHYLLUM Each 1.00; 3 for 2.75; 12 for 10.00

The giant of all Gold Banded Lilies. The illustration gives some idea of the colossal proportions that can be attained. The picture was taken of a specimen in our display garden which measured 10 feet in height and produced over 80 flowers. Such performance is perhaps phenomenal but 7 to 9 foot stems bearing 15 to 30 huge 10 inch flowers are not unusual. Color is clear white with a pale yellow midrib. The spots are fewer and much lighter than in other varieties. Our entire stock is propagated from annual seedling crops grown here and is guaranteed absolutely disease free. Aug. Sept.

#### AURATUM PLATYPHYLLUM, Red Band Strain Each 3.00; 3 for 8.50; 12 for 30.00

These highly colored Auratum selections are simply sensational. Visitors seeing them for the first time express words of awe and disbelief at their beauty and mammoth size. Actually they are quite similar to the pictum and rubrum forms of Auratum Platyphyllum except that considerable variation occurs in the degree of red and shades of red present in these selections. Each and every one is a beauty and sure to please every Lily fancier. All habits same as Auratum Platyphyllum. 5 to 7 feet. August.

### **Auratum Speciosum Hybrids**

This division includes hybrids having L. auratum or L. speciosum, or both in their ancestry and also these same lilies combined in any way with L. rubellum and either L. japonicum or L. japonicum var. platyfolium, which may be a natural hybrid between L. rubellum and L. japonicum. In our opinion this group includes the most beautiful lilies of all.

#### IMPERIAL CRIMSON STRAIN Each 3.75

The finest of the famous L. speciosum x L. auratum hybrids. Intensely rich crimson-red color; flowers fully eight inches across, carried on six-foot stems. August-flowering, most impressive novelty we have offered. Quantity limited. 5 to 7 feet. August. Picture page 5.

#### JAMBOREE STRAIN

Each 3.95; 3 for 9.50; 12 for 39.50

Spectacular strain of new hybrid lilies from Mr. Jan de Graaff. Flowers average larger than JILLIAN WALLACE and color ranges from snow white flowers dotted red to pure red. Blooming season is long, some flowering much earlier than JILLIAN WALLACE and others much later. With heads of 5 to 20 flowers during July, August and September this group should enjoy the greatest popularity just as soon as stock in quantity becomes available. Heights average 5 to 6 feet. #### JILLIAN WALLACE

Each 4.00; 3 for 10.00

An auratum x speciosum hybrid and the most beautiful large red lily in existence. Of an Australian origin, the large 10 inch flowers are brilliant crimson of slightly reflexed form. Very few bulbs. 3 to 4 feet. August.

### **Aurelian Hybrids**

Considered by many specialists as the most important of all new hybrid lily races. By successfully crossing Henryi with the trumpet lilies including centifolium, sargentiae and sulphureum an exciting new group of seedlings is now available to American gardens. The variation is complete in both form and color since the seedlings vary from straight Henryi types to almost straight trumpet lilies. The true intermediate group varies from huge, bowl shaped, white or cream flowers with yellow or apricot centers to widely flaring or slightly reflexed flowers usually yellow, orange or light apricot. The general habit and flower placement more closely resemble Henryi but all the seedlings bear much larger flowers than the species. These hybrids possess great vigor and are very hardy. As flowers fade a little in full sunshine we recommend planting where plants will receive light afternoon shade. Aurelian hybrids bloom in late July and early August.

#### AFRICAN QUEEN

Each 1.50; 3 for 4.00; 12 for 15.00

Among the thousands of experimental crosses made with Aurelian hybrids, a few plants showed up with warm apricot and orange-tinted trumpet-type flowers. These rare and beautiful plants have been selected so that we now can offer a small stock. Each plant is different from the other, but each one has that warm apricot coloring and is a tall vigorous Aurelian with good pyramidal inflorescence. We suggest that in warm climates they be planted in part shade. Winner of 2 awards abroad. 5 to 6 feet. Late July.

#### BRIGHT STAR Each 1.25

A most beautiful bi-color lily and one of the most striking of all the new Aurelian Hybrids. The large 5½ inch flaring flowers are silvery white with deepest yellow star-like centers. Strong stems with broad deep green foliage and up to 14 flowers on each stem. 4 to 5 feet. July flowering.

#### COPPER KING STRAIN

Each 2.00; 3 for 5.00; 12 for 18.00

Orange and apricot tinted trumpet lilies that have both the deep apricot inner coloring and a very dark, maroon-red reverse of each petal, thus giving a most unusual effect. We are offering a few of these plants for sale as we are anxious to have them tested and seen by lily fanciers in other parts of the country. Here in Oregon, the darker copper vein on the backs of these petals seems to diffuse color into the petals themselves, so that while in the center of the petals it is quite dark and pronounced, toward the outsides of the petals the color is deep orange-apricot. 5 to 6 feet. Late July.

#### CORALINE Each 5.

An Aurelian Hybrid of good form and with great vigor, carrying on its five to seven foot stems flowers of a delicate, soft apricot-coral shade. The broad petals stretch out and curl informally; the stems are erect and the nice, deep green, glossy foliage offers a good contrast to the beautifully tinted flowers. This plant is one of the very best Aurelian Hybrids yet seen. July-August.

#### EMERALD STRAIN

Each 1.25; 3 for 3.50; 12 for 12.50

Essentially a great improvement over the Green Mountain Hybrids, this lovely strain has flowers of an almost translucent, pure, cool, emerald green of startling beauty. The very large, beautifully shaped trumpets are borne in a pyramidal inflorescence of perfect form, on long pedicles and with stout stems that do not need staking. This strain is the result of crossing two known parents and hence does not come true from random seed and cannot be duplicated unless the same two parents are used. 4 to 6 feet. July.

#### GOLDEN CLARION (deGraaff)

Each 1.25; 3 for 3.50; 12 for 12.50

True trumpet Lilies in shades of yellow ranging from clear butteryellow down to warm cream. The most popular of all yellow trumpet lilies. 3 to 6 feet. July.

The true golden Aurelian Trumpet Lilies that have had such a sensational success wherever shown. These Lilies have been showered with honors and awards since their introduction. These Lilies usually flower in the last weeks of July; they stand five to seven feet tall when well-grown. The colors are a uniform, deep and intense golden yellow. #### **GOLDEN SUNBURST**

Very vigorous with strong upright stems 6 to 7 feet high. Among the most beautiful of all Aurelians. Blooms in late July and early August. Picture page 5.

#### IVODINE

An Aurelian Hybrid of impeccable form and habit. The large, broadly petaled flowers are of a warm ivory-white color. The stems are stiff and the plant holds its flowers horizontally so that they face the gardener. These immense ivory blooms make an unforgettable picture in the early autumn garden. When well-grown and established, IVORINE makes large clumps with many stems from six to eight feet tall, each carrying up to 20 full-sized flowers. 5 to 6 feet. August.

#### LIMELIGHT

#### NEW ERA

Selected as the most outstanding from a group of huge bowl shaped chartreuse and ivory white seedlings. A Lily of ethereal beauty, the immense flowers are perfectly spaced in massive pyramidal heads. One of the largest of all. 4 to 5 feet. July.

#### PAGODA BELL

Each 1.75; 3 for 4.50; 12 for 16.00

We saw an established planting of these tall growing Lilies in Mr. Yerex's garden last year and were greatly impressed by their beauty and delightful habit of growth. We believe nothing can surpass these Lilies for background planting or grouping for accent purposes. The dominant color is white with markings of pink and apricot mostly inside of petals. All are of extra robust growth attaining heights of 7 to 8 feet. The perfectly symmetrical flower heads of pagoda outline are made up of many pendant semi-flaring florets reminiscent of Lilium canadense. And there is a particular grace and daintiness here that is not evident in other Lilies of such towering stature. In bloom from mid-July into August. Picture page 4.

#### PINK SUNBURST

Each 5.00; 3 for 14.00

By intercossing the finest fuchsia-purple trumpet Lilies with selected clones of the true SUNBURST STRAIN, a new race of pink Lilies has come into being that is extremely attractive. More informal than the PINK PERFECTION Lilies, the lovely star-shaped flowers hold a unique charm—both in the garden and as cut flowers. They are also unusually effective when worn as corsages. The plants are tall, perhaps up to six feet under good conditions; the flowers are borne in lovely pyramids, and they all have good stiff stems, long pedicels and clean deep-green foliage. This is a new group of hybrids, originated by Jan de Graaff, that is bound to be immensely popular. Late July flowering.

#### SILVER SUNBURST STRAIN

Each 1.50; 3 for 4.00; 12 for 15.00

Silver flowers with dark brown papillae and golden throats which sparkle in the sun. Strong growing—often seven feet or more in height. Many secondary buds give a large number of flowers to prolong the flowering period. Outward facing, the flowers are borne on strong stems and as many as thirty flowers will show in a flower head. 5 to 8 feet. July-August.

#### SILVERINE

Each 3.00; 3 for 8.50; 12 for 30.00

An ivory-white flower that spaces its petals to show their full length. The petals, which are of good substance and texture, are one graceful curve from tip to toe. Where they join one another, they have each an orange-gold splash of color—which means the Lily has an orange-gold throat. Flowers are six and a half inches in diameter and stamens are thrown well clear of flowers, in fact, three inches from the very base of the flower. Flowers are downward and outward-facing on long pedicels coming from a stem which being strong and well-covered with leaves, seems just perfect for an informal garden. Height is 4 feet with 8 or more flowers, depending on the number of secondary buds present.

#### THUNDERBOLT

Each 2.00; 3 for 5.00; 12 for 18.00

The colors of this impressive Lily are difficult to describe. One might compare it, however, with that of the inside of a ripe cantaloupe melon. The flowers open right back to display the unusual color to best advantage. THUNDERBOLT will refresh the garden border during the hot summer months and even deeper colors can be obtained from it, if planted in light shade. Buds of light green, take on a purple tinge, which is retained on the backs of the narrow petals and confined to ribs on the wider petals which otherwise are the same color as the inside of the flower. Eighteen flowers or more are carried on the nicely formed flower head. Strong-stemmed, the inflorescence makes up one-third of the height which easily passes six feet. This Lily earned the coveted Award of Merit for the R.H.S. in 1961. July-August.

#### AURELIAN MIXED SUPERBA STRAIN

Each 1.25; 3 for 3.50; 12 for 12.50

Carlton Yerex, originator of the Aurelian Hybrids, personally selected all of our SUPERBA STRAIN Lilies from many thousands of Aurelian Hybrids he grew from controlled hand pollinated seed. The illustration on the cover is just a sample of the lovely shades and fascinating forms to be found in this group. THESE ARE NOT field seedlings. Every SUPERBA STRAIN Lily was tagged when in bloom for outstanding color, superior form and largest size. We can offer a limited quantity of large bulbs which will produce many blooms the first year. 3 to 8 feet. July-August. Picture page 9.

#### BELLINGHAM HYBRIDS

Each .85; 3 for 2.25; 12 for 7.50

Originated by and named in honor of the late Dr. David Griffiths whose work with Lilies at the U.S.D.A. experiment station at Bellingham, Washington, is well known to Lily fanciers. Ideally spaced on tall slender stems, the jaunty flowers are long lasting and usurpassed for cut flower purposes. The pyramidal flower heads bearing from 10 to 20 flowers may be cut as the first buds open and will remain fresh until the entire spike is in bloom. The color range is wide from light clear yellow through oranges to bright reds. Most are spotted deep brown or maroon. For the woodland garden in dappled shade these Lilies are ideal but they will also thrive in the ordinary garden. June-July. Height 5 to 6 feet. Mixed colors only. Picture page 9.

#### **AFTERGLOW**

Each 1.50; 3 for 4.00; 12 for 15.00

A new free-flowering Lily with huge flowers of startling rich red, heavily spotted on the inside. A real rival to the famous Sunset Lily Pardalinum giganteum and a vigorous grower that propagates freely and soon makes a permanent clump in the garden. 5 to 6 feet. MidJune.

#### BUTTERCUP

Graceful flowers of clear butter yellow with a few maroon spots. Established plants bear as many as 20 to 30 large flowers on 5 to 6 foot stems. #### CONCOLOR

A beautiful Lily closely related to giganteum himalaicum. Trumpet medium, greenish white, dotted maroon at throat and tips. Large heart shaped foliage. 2 to 4 feet. July.

#### FORMOSANUM WILSONI

Tall and free flowering, this white trumpet type strain is the latest of the popular Lilies to bloom. The small bulbs should be planted 5 to 6 inches deep since very heavy stem roots are developed. 3 to 6 feet. August-September.

A new strain of de Graaff hybrids in which all the harsh oranges and glaring red shades have been eliminated. Soft enchanting color shades of golden yellow and apricot orange. ### **ERYTHRONIUMS**

Erythroniums are known by many names: Lamb Tongue, Dog Tooth Violets, Trout Lilies—all proof of the poetic fancy they awaken in all of us.

Do you have a shaded spot in your garden—not quite the place for heavily massed color but rather for a few bright accents to make it come to life? Such is the ideal spot for Erythroniums. These endearing miniatures bloom in the early spring, from mid-February to mid-April in the West, beginning with April in the East, and their seemingly endless variations of elf-like shapes, colors, and combinations of both are like a gaily costumed woodland ballet out of fairyland. Colonies establish easily when planted in shade and woodsy soil with moderate moisture. If you like miniatures at all, they will delight younay, bewitch you.





# PEONIES FOR SPRING AS WELL AS FALL PLANTING may be ordered from this catalog

CULTURE: For best results be sure to plant only strong, healthy roots. They may be planted in any good garden soil that has sufficient drainage, with the buds on the crown of the plant about two inches below the soil surface. The soil in the bottom of the hole you dig to plant the root in, must be tamped so that the root will not sink below that level. Plants planted in September will show the first bloom the following spring. Hence Fall planting is recommend, although Peonies may also be planted in Spring, provided you do not expect blooms that same year.

SHIPPING TIME: Fall and early Spring to April 1st.

AUGUSTE DESSERT (Dessert, 1920)

When somebody says "pink peony," chances are that the full-blown bloom you remember is Auguste Dessert, for over a quarter of a century the epitome of a double Peony in pink. The lighter-bordered petals change from dark to light pink as the flower ages, attractive to the last. Late midseason. Picture page 25.

J. C. LEGG (Wild & Son, 1950)

Large bomb type flower with a lovely yellow cast when first open. The flower reminds one of a large Mum with every other petal in the bomb yellow in color when first open. It is a heavy bloomer and attracts considerable attention. Collar around the bomb is white. Medium height. Midseason. Double.

JOHN M. GOOD (Welsh, 1921)

Though normally listed with the whites, this large-blooming flower is a very pale pink in the outer petals, changing to ivory or pure white in the center and illuminated with a yellowish tint in the depth of the bloom. Vigorous grower, stiff tall stems. Midseason.

**KANSAS** (Bigger, 1941)

Bright red held high on one of the strongest stems in the field. The foliage is clean and dark green and the plant has always been healthy. The flower is full double with a few well hidden stamens. KANSAS makes a very good show flower as well as a good cut flower. Won best award of 1950 National Peony Show. Early. Double. Tall. Picture page 25.

KARL ROSENFIELD (Rosenfield, 1908)

It seems this one has all the virtues garden lovers hope for in a flower: it is a great show, garden and cut variety. The very large rose-type bloom is a good red with just a touch of blue; the outer petals waved, the center ones incurved and notched. Very striking. Late midseason.

No wonder this is a variety very much in demand. It's a white with surprises built in. The depth of the flower holds a diffusion of creamy tones and occasionally there will be some crimson on the center petals. A strong, rose-like fragrance enhances the bloom, carried on strong, free-flowering stems. Early midseason.

### **JAPANESE PEONIES**

Japanese Peonies come in many colors and hues and as plants their growth is very much like the Chinensis. They are just as hardy and the stems are strong, holding the flowers perfectly erect above the foliage. The blooms on the Japanese Peonies especially are valued in floral arrangements. They will last as long or longer than the full double type. Two or more layers of broad guard petals act as a cut to the mound center. Instead of pollen-bearing stamens, the anthers and stamens are enlarged into thick, often twisted petaloids of varied coloration, often forming a dense cushion in the center of the blossoms. The flowers are produced in unbelievable quantities one must see to believe.

ELMA (Kelsey, 1936)

Pale pink changing to white. Guards very shapely, cupped and crimped. Staminodes long and yellow. The striking characteristic of this variety is the cup-shaped guard petals which retain their shape until the bloom fades and the petals fall. Very early.

FUYAJO (Origin Unknown)

This is considered one of the five best and highest rated Japanese Peonies. The guard petals as well as the center petaloids are of the same dark rich mahogany red, only that the petaloids are tipped chamois, Midseason.

GAY PAREE

One of the most distinctive Japanese Peonies we have ever seen.

Guard petals are near lavender or orchid-rose with pure white center. Stiff wiry stems with flowers well above the foliage. Every Peony collection should include this one.

An irergular-shaped dark rose cup cradles a rather narrow center of whitish petaloids stained light pink and tipped yellow, while the carpels show a ruddy green with pink tips. Free-blooming and holds unusually well when cut. Medium high. Midseason.

MIKADO (Origin Unknown)

Truly majestic is the impact of this flower that bears the title of the Japanese emperors. It is only fitting that it is one of the best Japanese-type reds. The crimson guard petals surround a center of chamois faced with crimson. It's vibratingly alive. Midseason.

MRS. WILDER BANCROFT (Nicholls, 1935)

Very brilliant dark red with red staminodes tipped with yellow. One of the best red Japs. Early. Tall. Picture page 25.

A top achievement in clarity and refinement of color. The rich red petals are clearly segmented, while the red in the center petaloids is set off by deep yellow. A very handsome variety. Late.

ONAHAMA (Gumm, 1926)

Stock is scarce on this most attractive variety. The unusually large guard petals are cerise-red and the staminodes tipped deep yellow. Both size and color combine to make it a show piece; the blooms grow up to 8 inches across. Tall. Midseason.

PRAIRIE AFIRE (Brand, 1932)

This bloom offers a fascinating combination: deep pink guard petals closing around brilliant red petaloids. When a planting of this variety is in bloom and viewed from a distance, the impression of a piece of land on fire is very real indeed. Midseason.

PRIDE OF BLAISDELL (Kelsey, 1934)

An appealing variety with deep pink guard petals surrounding brilliant red petaloids. Green seed pods, rose tipped.

TATSUGASHIRA

One of the most popular Japanese Peonies with visitors to our gardens and our annual flower show. Large perfectly formed flowers of deep rose-pink. Centers are made up of red gold laced petaloids. Truly a beautiful Peony which we are pleased to be able to offer once again.

TOKIO (Japanese Origin)

The Japanese originator held this flower good enough to give it the name of the imperial city. It is a large deep rose-pink with broad, rounded guard petals, while the center is made up of loose staminodes, broad and crinkled and faced light pink. The dark, broad foliage has an excellence all its own. Midseason.

TORO-NO-MAKI (Origin Unknown)

Another white Japanese variety of great loveliness with a prominent yellow center very similar to ISANI-GUDUI, but this seems to be the stronger grower. The blooms are of great substance and held on strong stems. Midseason.

TORPILLEUR (Dessert, 1913)

This hauntingly beautiful flower is the living proof that it is not necessarily the highest price that brings you really great beauty. A double layer of open-faced deep rose petals (some may call it purplish-carmine) holds like a shallow bowl the staminodes in the center, tipped gold and flecked with white. One can hardly take his eyes off this bloom. A pleasing color combination whether used alone or in bouquets with white. Midseason.



## **Fabulous Tree Peonies**

Aristocrats of the floral world that have always been held in highest esteem by the proud owners. The huge 6 to 8inch flowers come in many brilliant shades on woody plants which do not die down like the herbaceous varieties but grow larger and produce more blooms each year. Fully matured bushes will average 3 to 4 feet in height.

culture: Tree Peonies may be grown in any good garden soil, the best being a well-drained loam or sandy loam. They may be grown as single specimens or in groups, in which case set them at least 2 to 3 feet apart. Any rotted manure is an excellent fertilizer and an application of lime is beneficial. Always keep plants and bed free of dead flowers and leaves to prevent possible disease. If you want maximum bloom, remove all dead flowers to prevent seed production which tends to weaken the plant. Pruning may be done in late summer to induce more side shoots. Cutting old leaves one inch from the stem also forces more growth of side shoots and produces a many-branched heavier bush. Plants remain undisturbed as long as good growth and bloom are in evidence. Transplanting should be done any time during their dormant season from September to very early spring.
