




Teacher Feature: Mr. Tuberty


Mr. Tuberty has been teaching for 14 years. He taught one year at Peru High School and has taught thirteen years at Western Middle School so far.

7th grade students in Mrs. Coulson's science recently completed a landform lab. Needless to say, things got a little messy!






