hilst audio journalists (ourselves included!), manufacturers. Uncle Tom Coblev and all were bemoaning the death of the vinyl record, little did we really know how strong the old fella still was.

Thousands of vinyl records are bought each week throughout Europe, the vinyl presses at disc plants such as those at MPO's French HQ still churn out hundreds of the things day in, day out and to top it all, the sales of both DJ decks and 'hi-fi' turntables are very good indeed.

When record companies stopped manufacturing vinyl en-masse it didn't mean that stopped production altogether. You can still buy certain new releases on vinyl in larger music stores. Another saving grace of vinyl was the dance music boom. Most dance releases are one or two tracks per side however, signalling a move from the old style multitrack album (albums can now consist of up to six discs!). There are two reasons for this. One. DJs won't touch anything with more than two tracks on it. they're easier to mix. And two, you can get a higher level and more dynamics when the information is spread out.

Yes, you mostly have to play them at 45 rpm (remember that?) and you have to get up out of your chair a lot more frequently than you used to, but there is one advantage. More often than not the sound is absolutely cracking. Certain well-produced drum 'n bass tracks will have more mindblowingly low bass than you can shake a mucky stick at, and a wonderfully wide frequency range -LTJ Bukem's Earth compilations spring

Even if you don't like the music, you'll appreciate the sound. They seriously blow the majority of 'audiophile' cuts out of the water. And any large music store or specialst dance music shop will sell them (or try the internet). Give them a try, because if they sound great on a Technics SL1200, imagine what they're like on a top spec. hi-fi job!

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PHILIPS PUSH SACD

Philips used a recording session for Super Audio Compact Disc to brief journalists on its future. Held at Abbey Road Studios - made famous by the Beatles - a broad swathe of high technology recording equipment was being used to capture the work of Jerry Goldsmith who, with the London Symphony Orchestra, was making a compilation of his film scores.

Super Audio Compact Disc, or SACD for short, is being promoted by Philips and Sony as the eventual replacement for the CD. It offers improved sound quality, with surround sound as an option. Recording for SACD requires a mountain of advanced equipment, as this session showed. Just outside the main control room we saw no fewer than four different recording setups, for CD, for six channels of Dolby surround sound, for eight channels (stereo + surround sound) through a set of DSD convertors for SACD, and 24bit at 96kHz high resolution stereo.

Philips were keen to let us know that in Japan the Marantz SA1 SACD player became available at the end of 1999, priced at 550,000Y (£3200) and Sony were now releasing SACD discs in Japan. In Europe Philips expected to release a player after June 2000, in time for the winter season.

There seems to be confusion over discs. In Japan, Sony are selling single layer SACD discs we were told. They are easy to make and inexpensive, but will not play on ordinary CD players. In Europe Philips prefer hybrid discs that will play both on CD and SACD players, giving full quality on the latter. This avoids consumer confusion and the need for additional SACD stock at retailers. Trouble is, hybrid discs have two layers, making them difficult to manufacture and expen-



sive. Only one European plant can produce commercial quantities at present, Philips told us.

On price Philips could only say an SACD was around 30% more expensive to make than an ordinary CD. Since manufacturing cost is less than £1 this would seem to suggest a price increase of 30p. However, the music business is likely to put a hefty premium on SACDs, so expect to pay £18-£20 in the shops.

Music Business Comes Under Internet Pressure

EMI recently announced 50:50 merger with Time Warner, to form the world's largest music company. Time Warner will pay EMI shareholders £790m if the deal goes through; it would only fail if there is a hostile counterbid, but that's unlikely. Behind this merger lies fear of forthcoming changes in music distribution,

notably through the internet. EMI feels rationalisation of distribution will save in excess of £200m, but thousands of jobs are likely to go as the two companies merge their operations.

At the same time Virgin Megastores had some interesting observations to make about this part of the music market, claiming a 10% loss of sales would force many music retailers to close. At present, however, in spite of all the talk about sales of music on the internet, they said it accounted for just 1% of turnover in the USA. Pushing down CD prices in order to compete with this perceived threat was an over reaction, Virgin felt.

Mission Cut

LOOSE

Mission loudspeakers has gained its independence through a management buyout, ending its association with NXT. Rumours of its purchase by Wharfedale had been circulating, but a management team comprising D.C.Barkataki (managing & finance), David Marchant (sales) and Paul Swepstone (operations) eventually succeeded in gaining control.

The company was founded by Farad Azima in 1977, who built the brand steadily. During the 1990s, Mission was joined by Quad, Leak, Roksan, Premiere Drums and Wharfedale under the Verity Group banner. At the same time Farad embarked upon another quite different strategy, investing heavily in a new flat panel loudspeaker technology, NXT.

As NXT grew, drawing Farad away from specialist hi-fi, Quad, Leak and Wharfedale were sold; Roksan regained its independence. Of this latest divestment, Farad said: "With the development of NXT, its derivative technology SoundVu® and our new joint venture 2020Speech Limited gathering pace and taking up increased management time and financial resource, it is the Board's wish to see the Mission brand taken forward by a team with commitment and focus".

Mission was optimistic. The company's latest 78 series loudspeakers had been received well and new NXT Home Cinema loudspeakers, previewed at America's Winter Consumer Electronics Show, would "transform" the market they felt.

DVD-AUDIO HACKED OFF

All is not well for DVD-Audio, thanks to the work of Norwegian computer hackers. The Japanese electronics giants behind DVD, including Matsushita, Victor and Nippon Columbia, have announced that sales of DVD-Audio players and software are being suspended after technology enabling illegal copying of DVD videos appeared on the Internet in October of Jast year.

Hackers cracked DVD's Content Scrambling System (CSS) and uploaded the software onto an Internet website for the world to see. Although it was promptly shut down by motion picture industry lawyers, it has forced Matsushita and others to postpone the DVD Audio launch from December 1999 until June

The hack, called DeCSS, permits the digital extraction of DVD videos to computer hard disks via PC DVD-ROM drives. It's a pretty long-winded process and not really commercially viable for pirating, but it has important ramifications for DVD Audio. Because the latter disks con-

tain far less data than DVD videos, they're easier to pirate onto cheap CD-ROMs or distribute cheaply over the Internet

The revelation set alarm bells ringing in an already nervous music industry, the result being that most DVD-Audio hardware manufacturers agreed to postpone the release of the new format until a new copycoding system was developed. As a result, Nippon Columbia has had to throw out nearly 10,000 DVD Audio disks that it had produced to coincide with the December launch, and retool its manufacturing process for the new copyprotection format.

Pioneer, however, has taken a different



position. By announcing its intention to launch DVD-Audio players in its domestic market in early 2000 as originally intended, it has put itself at odds with the rest of the industry. It says the six months needed to develop a new copycode system "is not beneficial to the DVD-Audio industry" and is duly going ahead regard-

less. Pioneer will then upgrade all DVD-Audio players free of charge when the new system comes to market in mid-2000. Unfortunately it's unlikely that Pioneer will go ahead with DVD-Audio outside Japan due to the logistics of upgrading players outside its home market. The cost of sending players back to Japan for modification is thought to be prohibitive.

These developments have sent shockwaves around the entertainment and computer industries, and highlight the tensions between the two. Unlike CD, DVD was born primarily as a computer data storage medium with audio/visual applications. Being a computer based for-

mat with much of its operating system in software, it's open to hacking and ultimately there's nothing that high power entertainment industry lawyers can do to stop it. Now that CSS has been shown to be inadequate, the consortium of companies that develop DVD copy protection - Matsushita,

Toshiba, IBM and Intel - have egg on their faces. Music industry nerves, already frayed by the proliferation of Internet music distribution, are now in shreds. The postponement DVD-Audio, and all the industry upset it causes, is the result.

THAT HACK IN FULL

DeCSS is C++ software that reads DVD video from a computer DVD-ROM drive and saves it to hard disk minus the encryption. It takes around 10 minutes to process a DVD Video (.VOB) file on a 500MHz Pentium III personal computer. DeCSS uses code found in PC DVD playback software but bypasses the encryption system in the DVD decoder.

Once ripped to hard disk, the DVD

video files are too big to fit on CD-ROM (the average size is around 4GB), but there are various DVD conversion utilities on Internet DVD ripping sites which convert them to multiple CD-ROM discs. Once in CD-ROM format, the discs are easy to pirate. DeCSS almost happened by accident. While there are several Windows DVD players around, none exist for the Linux operating system. So a group of Norwegian computer programmers duly started to write one, and began by reverse-engineering the

existing Windows players. They found all the existing programs had encrypted decryption keys except XingDVD from Xing Technologies, which lacked one due to an oversight. A couple of hackers jumped on this and used the decryption key to write a program to strip DVD movies of their encryption. Thus was born DeCSS. It was promptly uploaded to the Internet and the rest was history!

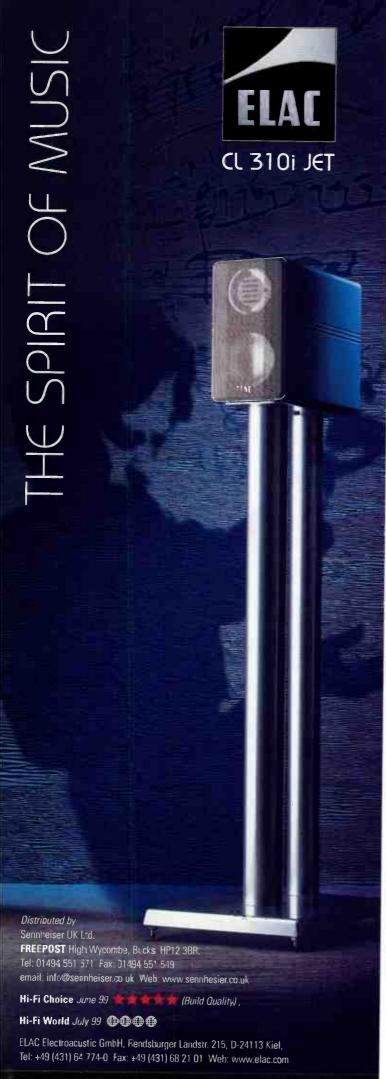

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WORLD-FIRST **DVD-RW MACHINE** FROM PIONEER

On a cold January afternoon at their UK HQ Pioneer gave the UK press a tempting little taster of the future (and the likely end of VHS) in the form of their breakthrough DVR-1000 DVD recorder. The unit is presently only available in Japan, where since its launch on December 3rd over 10,000 recorders have been sold for 250,000 Yen (about £1300) a piece. The system uses a 4.7GByte re-recordable disc that can apparently be recorded onto over 1,000 times without losing sound or visual quality. Joining Pioneer at the launch were TDK, who are producing DVD-RW discs.

The model currently available in Japan will not be same as the first European model, which is targetted to hit these shores by the end of the year, but looks a more likely proposition for 2001, at somewhere near the Japanese price.

The main difference will be that the European model will play ordainary audio CDs (but not DVD-Audio discs) whereas the Japanese version cannot. Pioneer are obviously seeing versatility as being an essential European selling point.

As far as features go, the DVR-1000 is jammed full of them. It uses MPEG compresssion to record real-time information, with extensive editing capabilities such as erase, combine, divide and move that are

trouble in programming it to record Last Of The Summer Wine or Songs Of Praise - this, however, remains to be seen. It looked a little complicated at first glance.

You may be wondering if discs recorded on the DVR-1000 will be compatible with existing DVD-V players. The answer is no. Players launched from now on by Pioneer, of course, will be compatible and others signed up to DVD-RW technology such as Kenwood, Sharp, JVC,

Hitachi and Mitsubishi could well be releasing compatible players in the near future.

DVD-RW: THE DISCS

As well as producing analogue tapes, the Japanese recording software giant TDK are at the forefront of optical disc technology and are currently supplying DVD-RW discs to the Japanese market.

The DVD-RW disc is a single layer 4.7GB disc just like a DVD-Video disc, except it's re-recordable due to a phase-change recording layer. It can store up to 2 hours in SP (highest quality) mode and 6 hours in manual mode (lesser quality). A disc can contain a mixture of both SP and manual mode information. It has a quoted lifetime of over 1,000 overwrite cycles and 30 years. Following its production launch in Japan, TDK are hoping to start manufacturing in Europe and the US to coincide with hardware launches.

DVD - CONFUSED?

The following are the international standards agreed by the DVD Forum:

DVD-Video

This was launched in 1996 in Japan and has now gained household recognition and is being hailed as the most succesful product of all time. DVD-Video players will play ordainary CDs and single layer 4.7 GByte DVD discs containing movies or 24 bit/96kHz audio. They will not at present play CD-RW discs.

DVD-Audio

This is an extremely high quality audio format (24 bit/192kHHz stereo) capable of mulit-channel information and video enhancement such as lyrics, performance clips, short documentaries etc. It's currently undergoing a few problems due to the music business.

Pioneer will apparently launch two players later this year. The more expensive of which (approx. £4000) is a box of tricks that will apparently play anything except the piano: DVD-A and SACD discs, as well as DVD-V, DVD-RW and bog-standard CD and CD-RW discs.

DVD-R

This is a professional standard which has been in use for a couple of years in studios and uses 4.7 GByte discs that will record only once. Recorders are confined to studios only.

DVD-RW

As DVD-R, but for domestic use and can be re-recorded onto.

DVD-RAM

A re-writable format for use in computer systems. The discs are in a caddy device but can be removed for playback only. Drives are available from Panasonic and Toshiba, amongst others. DVD-ROM drives are also quickly replacing CD drives in computers.



Julian Vereker 1945 - 2000

Julian Vereker, founder and managing director of Naim Audio, died of cancer on Friday 14th January 2000. Julian founded Naim in 1973. He promoted the idea that a high quality amplifier could justifiably be simple in terms of controls and facilities, improving sound quality by the elimination of unnecessary circuits and use of better components.

At a time when the UK hi-fi market was being taken over by



Japanese amplifiers laden with facilities it was a contrary view point. He pursued it successfully, building Naim against strong

Iulian was rewarded with an MBE for his efforts. Hard working, single minded and determined like anyone in his position, he was at the same time unassuming, honest and thoughtful about those around him. He was a bastion of the UK hi-fi business, showing that the pursuit of quality could be made to work in the face of fierce competition. Known widely and respected highly, his death came as a shock to Britain's hi-fi

PHILIPS LAUNCHES MP3

Philips have finally shown their first MP3 player, a tiny device called Rush! (that's with an exclamation mark - we didn't put it there). Looking strangely biscuit-like, Rush! is 7cm square and 1.7cm thick quite a lot smaller than most MP3s. All the same it houses two ANA batteries, from which Philips claim 12 hours use in Long Play mode. Rush! carries 32MB of on-board memory, giving one hour playing time.

Unusually, Philips supply a mains adapter, as well as headphones, parallel port PC cable, flash memory card and RealNetworks Reallukebox CD ROM software for archiving, playlist assembly and loading. They quoted a price of \$199 in the US, which suggests a UK price of around £125.

Budget amps are still big business. Hi-Fi World picks the cream of the current crop, all with phono stages, for a six-man shoot-out.

here is no doubt that we are at a crucial and exciting stage in the development/metamorphosis of hifi. The big names are concentrating on DVD's rise to household fame and most of their research and development efforts are seemingly being channelled into this. They have not forgotten the hand that once fed them, however, and many big manufacturers are still producing erstwhile main stays such as the budget amplifier. While lineinput only models have the upper hand, many still include accommodation for the old black stuff (usually MM).

Vinyl declines to decline, even at the budget end of the market. Many manufacturers are aware of this it seems. The halfdozen candidates we have gathered together here include both new models and old favourites. The new kid on the block from Marantz will take on the tough and reliable Denon, for example. We'll highlight their features, sound quality and build and tell you which we think is the best value all-round.

THE PHONO STAGE

The pickup cartridge of a record deck produces a weak signal, one-thousandth that from a CD player. So an additional amplifying stage is needed to play LP, called a "phono stage".

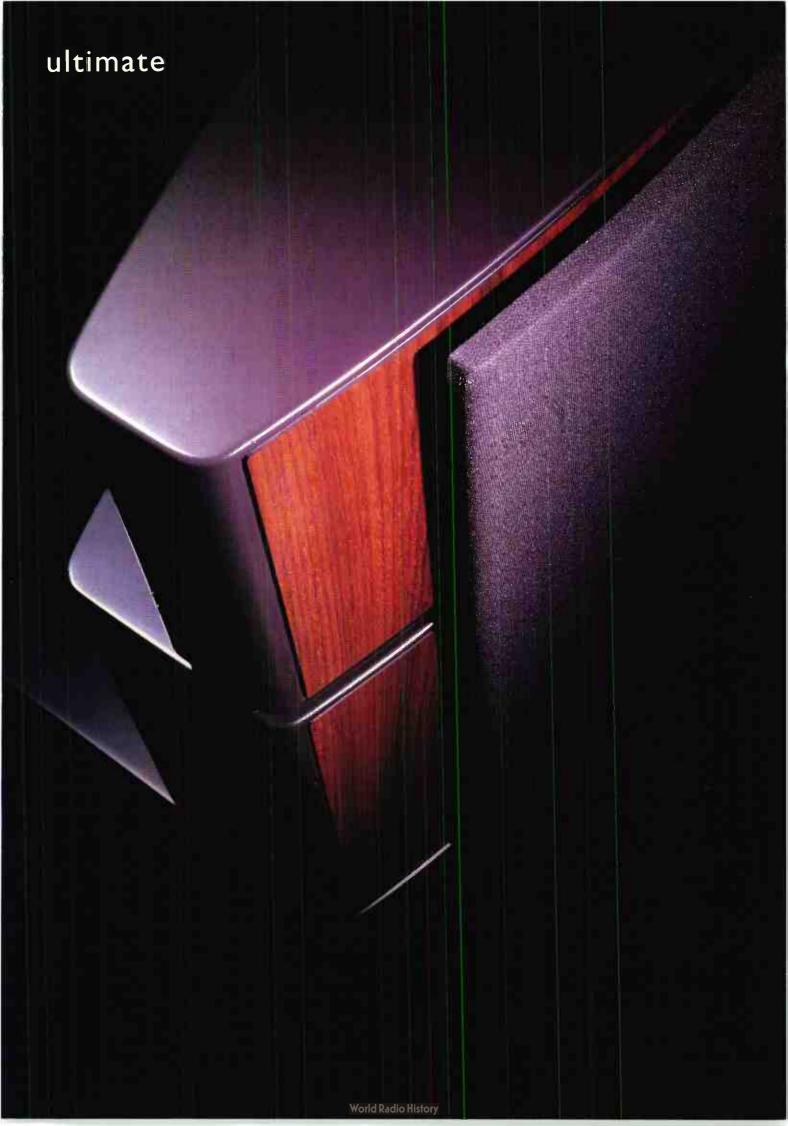
When LPs are cut, bass is reduced to extend playing time and treble boosted to lessen surface noise. The phono stage applies 'equalisation' to restore the original balance. In effect, it is a specialized preamplifier unusable for any other source.

Some phono stages have a Moving Coil (MC) option. It gives even more gain to cope with the minuscule output from high quality moving coil cartridges. External phono stages are available from many manufacturers (see feature P22 - P23)



"PS:"

It's not the whole truth that phono inputs will disappear with future models. Kenwood, for example, are currently working on a budget amp of around £250 that will apparently handle the extremely high frequencies of DVD-A (up to 1000 kHz) and guess what? It will also have a phono stage. So despite rumours to the contrary, manufacturers are still very much aware of vinyl's popularity.





Ithough provided with a remote sensor, unless there was

a mix-up at the warehouse, the Denon PMA-350SE is truly a hands-on experience. Like most of our group, the Denon has two pairs of loudspeaker terminals and is not recommended to drive two pairs of 40hms speakers, although it will output 50W/channel into two pairs of 80hms impedance. There are no tone controls and the front panel layout is simplicity personified - only the presence of a balance control might offend the purists. The version we tested was fitted internally with a 'phono card' but this is optional and should be checked before you buy.

Christa Ludwig needs no special favours to sound wonderful but the

nevertheless pulled out all the stops for her. The sheer immensity of the Wagnerian orchestration can leave some amplifiers sounding a little crowded, but whether it was the filigree of the woodwind or, quintessentially, the mammoth bass department, the Denon sounded as if it was enjoying the performance hugely. In certain places the modest output of the amplifier showed, when the volume knob was advanced to antisocial levels, but this should not be a consideration to outweigh the satisfying musicality

Marcello's 'Cello Sonatas were a real treat and quickly demonstrated that. optional extra or not, the Denon 'phono card' means business. Solo string lines sang away with a richness and absence of harshness which contradict-

of the reproduction.

ed the 'budget amp' label. All the little nuances of bow technique which contribute so much to the living quality of string music were presented without an ounce of superflu-

ous harshness. Harpsichord reproduction was crystal clear and very pleasant to listen to - this is a difficult coup to bring off with an inexpensive amplifier. Full marks here.

Best stereo demands good separation and should carry with it the promise of realistic soundstaging. The late Benny Waters was recorded in Stockholm in the full richness of his twilight years. Opus 3's CD issue of this found the Denon ready, willing and able to place any stereophonic event properly - laudspeakers permitting. Waters' huge alto sound and the casual 'clubby' audience resulted in the amplifier giving a very relaxed interpretation. Coupling this laid-back approach with the chink of glasses and murmur of conversation, the Denon reinforced its remarkably musical credentials.



his is the new budget amplifier in Marantz's

Century Range and replaces the wellrespected PM-57. It comes complete with full remote control, 30W/channel, three line inputs and an MM phono input. All the usual budget features are present, such as two speaker inputs, tone controls with defeat button and a natty rotary input selector.

Like everything else that Marantz have

over the years, it's sonically as good as you're going to get at the price. Marantz have made a name for themselves for having the knack of producing budget hi-fi that stands out among the crowd for its commendably up-front, yet neutral sound. So it is with the PM-4000. With Stravinsky's challenging Rite of Spring there is commendable control over the multiple layers of sound which lesser amps could make a mess of. Here everything was discernable which for this music is very rare at this price.

Paul Weller's Stanley Road album

showed that the PM-400 was as happy with studioprocessed material as it was with acoustic recordings. The syncopated rhythms of Walk On Gilded Splinters danced deftly through the

'speakers and the track became involving listening rather than merely a background toe-tapper. Talvin Singh's ultra-low bass lines on his OK album (on vinyl) showed that the PM-4000 isn't lacking where it matters. Although it hasn't quite the most obvious bass of the test it has

one of the most cohesive.

The one little gripe we'd have is that the treble could sometimes be a little crispy, due to the uncoloured sound of the PM-4000. This is just a symptom of a competitively-priced amplifier that doesn't put too much of a sonic stamp on the music. Other than this the PM-4000 is very hard to fault for the money.



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integrated in the 'budget' range. Its looks and facilities (but not weight) bear an uncanny resemblance to Sony's competition, except that the Onkyo is finished in metallic silver which manages to give it the look of Technics c. early 1980s. Like many others in the test, it comes complete with system-compatible remote control and 40W/channel. To produce optimum sound quality it uses discrete amplifiers to drive the channels

packs found elsewhere.

There are four line inputs plus MM phono stage and the usual knob/button fest of loudness, defeatable tone controls and balance. Couple this with remote control and you have everything you need to make listening life as easy as possible.

Whipping up a voodoo frenzy with Paul Weller's version of Walk On Gilded Splinters on CD saw the Onkyo providing good, deep bass with optimum control. The separation was impressively wide, highlighting the severely panned tape effects in the track, and the sound stage was also impressive, quite rare at the price. It has a very exciting, forward sound that has a negative

Guitar-heavy tracks could become a bit wearing on the old ear drums after a while, and Weller's vocals shrieked a bit at high volumes. This

didn't detract too much from the inherently exiting sound that the Onkyo

This excitement was again brought to the fore with Stravinsky's Rite Of Spring. Rhythms were punched out heavily, confirming suspicions that Stravinsky was some eighty years ahead of his time with the invention of drum and bass. Some of the more subtle sections of the piece didn't work in comparing light with heavy. Likewise, woodwind and upper strings were sometimes a little thin. But overall the performance was impressive.

The A-9211 has a very good phono input, as highlighted by Talvin Singh's 'OK' album. Bass was both smooth and tuneful and the wide frequency range found in this album was as good as can be expected. The Onkyo is a very good all rounder, as its higher price would hint.

side. Pioneer A-207R £150 t the price, the A-207R is as wellwork cut out. endowed with features as any of

its rivals: full remote control, 3 line inputs as well as the MM phono stage, tone controls with a bypass. Build is no worse than you'd expect at the price but it doesn't have the weight of Sony or Onkyo's amps.

Pioneer have a lot to live up to in the integrated amp stakes when you consider the glory days of the excellent A-300R, a classic that still maintains almost cult status along with the NAD's 3020.

Consequently Pioneer's subsequent affordable integrateds have always had their

Let's start by saying that the 207R isn't quite up there with the 300. It's not a duffer - with Paul Weller's Stanley Road it showed impressive excitement and verve. especially with the driving voodoo rhythms of Walk On Gilded Splinters. Whilst bass was deep and fast, the treble suffered from splashy cymbals and a cutting edge to higher midrange guitars and

Moving on to classical, Stravinsky's Rite Of Spring in the spacious Reference Records/Minnesota Orchestra version failed to budge the floodgates that other

amps prise open. We had the feeling that spaciousness was being slightly compressed, making woodwind and violins a tad lacklustre. On the plus side, this is exciting music and the Pioneer definitely homed in on this, banging out the harsh rhythms with aggression. With Talvin Singh's OK on vinyl, we found that the bass didn't quite reach the low levels that others could, but again attack and speed were the Pioneer's priorities and it showed good detail, highlighting a commendably good phono input.



RA931MkII is a neat and slim unit with a maximum output of 50W into 4, less than the 70-80W 'norm' of this group. For all its modest dimensions, the front panel is busy enough with function, volume, balance, tape monitor, defeatable tone controls and headphone socket. One of the 'speaker outputs is governed by a 'speaker remote' button on the front panel; it is recommended that loudspeakers are attached to the 'remote' terminals so that they can be switched of if headphones are in use. What are termed the 'direct' 'speakers are not switch-off-able under these circumstances. Not unexpectedly, the maximum load for both pairs of 'speaker outputs is >4, so two pairs of 4, should not be used.

Wagner is a tall order for any reproducing chain. Small-scale it ain't! The last

contrasts enough to satisfy most amplifier eager to show off their talents. The Rotel gave a well-balanced rendition, with the gargantuan orchestra splitting nicely into light and shade. Only on the most bass heavy sections did the amp seem to be choosing its words with care. Voice was

choosing its words with care. Voice was accorded full value but there was the teeniest feeling of compression in the scale of the orchestral accompaniment. For all that, the woodwind was given a very creditable slice of the action, with the complex reedy tones well sorted.

Spinning a 'proper' record - L'Oiseau-Lyre's Marcello 'Cello Sonatas - gave rise to a mixed response. On the one hand, the elusive tones of the solo 'cello and continuo harpsichord were given a welljudged musicality and realism. On the other, the breadth of emotion and delicacy which the 'cello possesses seemed just a little reined in. Possibly the frequency response of the phono stage is super-flat, but the result was a more than a little on the dry side with some recordings.

Jazz saxophone recorded live gave high marks for stereo accuracy and soundstaging. The Rotel placed the instrumentalists with care and, with this almost analytical recording from Opus 3, the amplifier's flatness proved no handicap at all. This tended to give a better all-round performance than the amplifier had managed with the previous classical titles.



he Sony model TA-FB730R is one of the bulkier items in this group and, as things went on, turned out to be one of the warmer jobs as well, which is not entirely unexpected with an output of 70W/channel into 4. To select function, the large knob can be turned in either direction indefinitely, the indicator lamp jumping from phono to DAT 1 without the need to reverse. Defeatable tone controls and a balance pot, plus a tape monitor switch and remote make this a well-specified item.

On the back panel two pairs of switchable loudspeaker terminals provide various combinations, although the fitting of two pairs of 4 'speakers is not recommended. The amplifier is also fitted

for EON remote control for tuners.

Seeking some complexity and drive, the last act of Gotterdammerung seemed about right. From the start, it was apparent that the Sony didn't reckon much to subtlety, but there was drive! The enormous sound of the double bass section made its presence very welcome. All the emotional power of Wagner's monster orchestration seemed meat and drink to the amplifier, although a little less top might have been beneficial. Christa Ludwig's staggering voice got full measure, which is a thumbsup for the midrange.

As a tough test for the phono stage, L'Oiseau-Lyre's excellent pressing of Marcello's 'Cello Sonatas combines the almost vocal sonorities of the solo instrument with the subtle transient sparkle of the Baroque harpsichord. Here the Sony was a little less lovable: although the 'cello tone was full, much of the detail such as the bowing sounds became rather too aggressive and perhaps sharp. The harpsichord was clear and bright, but for all that, a bit too forward. A sturdy workhorse maybe, but not the most winning of phono sections.

Benny Waters in Stockholm showed that the Sony was well endowed with stereo separation and soundstaging abilities. This first-class recording gave the amplifier the opportunity to reproduce the ambience of the Stockholm venue very well: you are there - and why didn't Benny tune up beforehand?!

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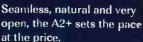
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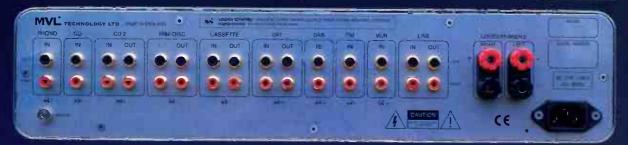

t's actually satisfying to say that, for once, the group test sprung very few surprises. This is to say that all of the amplifiers did their job more than adequately. As far as value for money is concerned, the Marantz PM-4000 has to take top honours. It's hard to imagine anything else at £130 bettering it. The sound is neutral and exciting, and above all, it's still hi-fi.

We were still impressed by the Denon's musicality and its exceptionally sweet phono stage. However, on the downside, it's no spring chicken and is therefore lacking the 'compulsory' facilities now found at the price, such as tone controls and a remote. But if it's sound you're after and you don't mind stretching to £200 for it, the PM350SE is a sensible choice.

The other contestants all have their strengths, starting with the Sony and Onkyo amps. These two similarly-priced amps also look and sound uncannily alike. Being nearer the £200 mark than the rest they are both more sturdily built too. Features are present in abundance and the sound of both is exciting and up front. The phono stage of the Onkyo had more presence, clarity and better dynamics, the Sony's being slightly down in level compared with other inputs. Nevertheless, both can be recommended, but may be tiring to listen to over a protracted period.

The Rotel is the replacement of the RA931 Mkl which is a favourite of ours. We found that the MkII sounded slightly 'flatter' than its predecessor, with less depth to the sound but still good value. The same goes for the Pioneer. Whilst not having quite the best hi-fi sound of the bunch, facilities were well thought out. Whilst overall detail is good, we found the bass slightly thin, depriving it of a bit of obvious power.

INPUT GUIDE

PHONO: For gramophone records only. Not always fitted nowadays. New chart material is becoming rare on LP, but there's a wonderful legacy of music that can be bought cheap, as people sell off their collections. CD: Universally known and used but, as sales slow there's a battle looming to cheapen and/or replace it.

For cheaper CDs go to sites like www.cdnow.com on the internet, where chart CDs are around £7.50, + VAT and postage.

For alternatives to CD consider getting a DVD -Video player that will play CDs and video DVDs with surround sound. DVD Audio and SACD will be available in the UK by the end of 2000. Both offer better quality than CD but both players and discs will be expensive to begin with.

Less well known, MP3 CD players are coming. They will play ordinary CDs or CDs carrying MP3 music files, compiled from the internet.

MINIDISC: Increasingly popular as a portable medium. Small, durable discs with CD sound quality. Cheap blank discs make recording inexpensive but pre-recordeds are expensive and scarce, coming mainly from the Sony Music catalogue. Competition is looming from MP3 but Minidisc has the edge on sound quality at the moment.

TUNER: Nowadays FM mostly, although AM sections are still thrown in for good measure. The Digital Audio Broadcast (DAB) tuners currently available offer similar quality to FM but have less hiss from indoor aerials. They're still expensive, as are the more useful in-car sets.

AUX: This input has the same characteristics as tuner and CD, effectively a line input without a specific designation.

CASSETTE: Cassette is fading away. For those with collections to play, Denon, Teac, Pioneer, Nakamichi or Technics are among the companies still offering this format.

THE VINYL ANAL

Who said that vinyl's dead? The Hi-Fi World editorial team shine the light on the resurgance of vinyl as a budget option, highlighting what's available new and old, hardware and software.

hen Henley Designs started distributing the Pro-ject Debut turntable in August last year not even they could have quite predicted how popular it would be. After all, some may be thinking, who plays records these days.? Well, quite a lot of people actually. The next sentance could bring on a coronary for many readers, especially other turntable manufacturers. According to Laurence Armstrong of Henley Designs they sell in excess of 1,000 Debut turntables a month. They would sell more if they could, but the factory simply can't make any more than this!

Now, if someone would have predicted this a year ago, many people, including us, would have laughed merrily and pointed at flying pigs. But it seems there's something inherent in mankind which simply stops you chucking out your old

records. The Debut phenomenon seems to be based around those who have read the rave reviews and promptly climbed the ladder to blow the cobwebs off the collection in the attic. There is consequently, in the microcosmic standards in hi-fi anyway, something of a resurgence of vinyl. Importantly though, it's as a secondary source. For one hundred quid you can relive all your teenage memories, providing that is, you're over 30!

Clubs, mastering studios and Technics have never been busier when it comes to the black stuff. In addition to Henley selling 1,000-plus Debuts a month, Technics sell roughly 1,800 SL-1200 DI turntables per month. This takes the tally up to almost 3,000 turntables being sold from just two manufacturers. And the dance craze hasn't waned. MPO, the French disc manufacturer still have vinyl record presses going ten to the dozen, day in, day out, banging out "bangin" tunes from all over Europe (especially UK and Germany). Not only is the whole industrial process of the vinyl record (and all it encompasses) in good shape, it's as fit as a butcher's dog.

Let's not forget those who wish to take up the vinyl addiction that don't have the hardware and don't realise that it's still available. Specialist shops can be found in many towns and cities throughout the nation, but if you don't wish to get off your butt the internet is a brillaint source for vinyl records.

Richard White Checks out some vinyl accessories

udget record accessories are no longer big business. In the heyday of the 1970s, pocket money could buy innumerable gadgets for the discerning collector. Having researched what is available, most of today's products fall down on their price - it's no longer a mass market and production costs reflect this. I have sourced some more reasonably priced bits and pieces, but bear in mind that these are in many cases new old stock and manufacturers' guarantees are unlikely to be worth the cardboard they're printed on!

Household dust is one of the great destroyers of gramophone records. For all its innocent looks, dust is usually heavy in silicates, an extremely abrasive group with a hardness co-efficient greater than steel. Get a pinch of this between the diamond and the soft vinyl and it's obvious which will be the first to suffer. Because the non-conductive stylus is very good at generating dust-attracting static charges, the chances of a record being dust-free are negligibly small.

The great acetate recording pioneer Cecil Watts investigated this problem with the aid of a groove microscope. The upshot of his research was the wellknown Dust Bug. This device employs a nylon brush to tickle the dust from the groove when it is then caught by a plush pad. With the practical development of carbon fibre, the Watts idea was adapted for several similar devices. The Microtrac and the Decca are good examples, both having negligible down-bearing force. It is surprising how much fluff they glean from a supposedly clean record. Both of these products claim de-staticizing action via the conductive carbon bristles and earth wire, but this is not fool-proof, particularly in a dry atmosphere.

Carbon fibre is again much used in record brushes. These all look the same to me, and appear to be 'badge engineered' from possibly a single source. Monacor and Altai are typical brands and are usually available at about £7 from high street electrical shops. Again, I have

yet to substantiate wholly the 'anti-static claims of this type of brush.

Another type of record brush relies on plush fabric. These work reasonably well, although there is a danger of previously captured dust being simply ground into the next record. Our illustration shows the Playfair Discoota which has an aperture for adding cleaning fluid. The only cleaning preparation I recommend is a 1:1 mixture of isopropyl alcohol and purified water. Both are available from chemists, although you may have to order the alcohol specially.

For a closer look at the grinding-in of your stylus, you could try the Metrocare Stylus 'microscope'. This lightweight gadget looks a bit like something out of a Christmas cracker but with patience and A Lot Of Care, it provides a useful x20 view of your diamond.

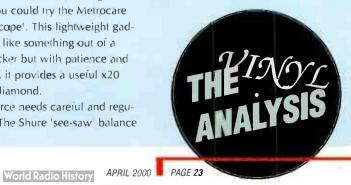
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is about the most practical of the mechanical devices, with an accuracy of about 1/20th gramme, if you're careful. Although by no stretch of the imagination can it be counted a budget accessory, Cartridge Man's Digital Stylus Gauge is the most accurate on the market (to 1/100th gramme) and is to be preferred if your pickup requires exact setting.

Pentacone's Gramophone mat is a simple device made from felted material. This is the logical first step beyond the sometimes indifferent mat supplied with the turntable, and has a gratifyingly good performance at the price.



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Hailed as 'among the best in the world' Musical Fidelity are set to shock the market with their new A3^{CR} pre and power amps. In this 'World exclusive' review Simon Pope gets first crack at the new pair.

erennially popular with both experienced listeners and 'first time buyers' alike, the Musical Fidelity wheel truly began to turn vigorously with the introduction of the X Series, and particularly the X-D10. At last, here was a range of hi-fi products with truly audiophile performance and esoteric sex appeal, but at an un-esoteric price! Take the X-A200s - a pair of funky-looking, 200W monoblocs that not only shook the rafters, if you wanted them shaken, but also impressed your mates, your wife, the cat and it's cousin and cost £1,000. Others would have charged £5,000 for a lesser product. This company make 'high-end' accessible, much to the annoyance, maybe, of some.

The latest series form the MF stable is the good, old-fashioned, rectangular A3 range which in true Musical Fidelity style embraces two integrateds (A3 and A300), a CD player, a tuner and now the A3CR dual mono pre and power amps (a few X-Series products and the awesome NuVista 300 power amplifier also sprang up during this period!) First let me get straight to the crux of these amplifiers. According to the press release, Musical Fidelity set out to make these the best amplifiers available anywhere, and at any price. Quite some claim, but still at the moment in the two-channel mould (although AV products are in the pipeline), there aren't many around who do it so successfully and with such verve.

The A3^{CR}s are SACD ready. This means they are designed to cope with the vast bandwidth that the new format incorporates, with frequencies up to 100kHz. The technical aims behind the amplifiers were to aim for very low distortions throughout



the frequency range, a vast dynamic range, excellent stereo separation, immunity from mains interference and finally enough power to drive anything except a combine harvester! The power amplifier employs a full choke regulation to eliminate capacitor/mains interference and both use dual mono power supplies incorporating huge transformers that weigh in not much lighter than a 747 full of Rhinos. They will hit the shops in March at an incredibly sensible and very deliberate price - £999 each.

SOUNDS EXPENSIVE

No matter how convincing the product bumf or specs though, the proof of the pudding is in the eating. And checking out the sonic attributes of this pair turned out to be a joyous and satisfying repast of many flavours.

There is always something slightly perverse in playing a string quartet or solo string music through really beefy gear. It has its place though. All the power is channelled into making that one sound as musical as possible and can often show the finesse of good equipment. It's not all just about out and out ballsy bass or earsplitting power. This is also something that Bach realised. The one line of music in his 'cello suites can often relay as much authority and power as a Bruckner symphony with 120 players going hell-forleather. Yo-Yo Ma on his Sony Classical recording tackles these jewels of sound with artistic aplomb, which this music needs to sound right. The MF amps sought something more in this music than mere notes. This was due to the exquisite detail present. There was a depth to the sound as the bow dug into the string that was frighteningly realistic. You could smell the

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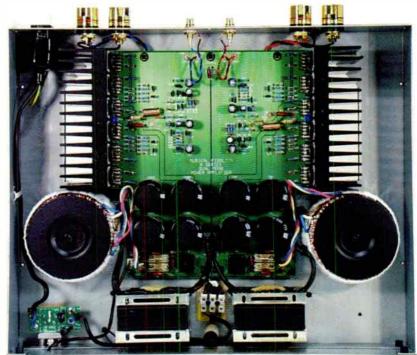
wood through my Mangeplanars. As I cranked the volume slightly, I was brought more into the music - something that actually doesn't happen that often. Instead of mere volume there was music here to be discovered. Every note and nuance demanded to be heard as the music was handled with grace, authority and sensitivity.

DYNAMIC PERFORMERS

With the big guns of Stravinsky's Rite Of Spring on Reference Recordings the MF pair showed that as well as clout and slam at the bottom end, as the bass drum was hit for all it was worth, there was an immense dynamic range there. This recording has one of the widest ranges you will find on any recording (the stuff that coronaries are made of) and the A3cRs really did it justice. Within one bar you go from light and quiet flute writing to outand-out GBH-assault in the percussion dept. Rarely does cacophony sound so good. As the timpani thumped and bass drum rumbled, my windows rattled and my mouth smiled in appreciation.

It was during this piece that the A3s showed one of their outstanding characteristics. They have an fully neutral and uncoloured sound and the ability to play recordings just as they are, bad recordings will undoubtedly sound bad, but for some reason I can't put my finger on (I'm sorry, I know it's my job to, but. . .) the music will shine through. There is an almost non-existent quality to the treble. It's neither sweet, shimmery nor harsh. In fact you hardly notice it at all - you actually feel it, it's so life-like. There's no point in me saying that the performance was exciting as this piece sounds exciting through a mono earpiece, but the MFs dug out the dance-like tribalism behind the music to

result in a consummate listening experience.

There are no real down sides to this pairing. Maybe they are so detailed that some could find the sound a little analytical, but that's only if you're an analytical person by nature. The only other thing that could put some off is the distinct styling of the knob on the preamp which has the trademark A3 'ship aboy' feel to it.

The best amps in the world. . .ever? Well I can't really answer that, as there's a lot I haven't heard. But they're among the best in this 'World, if you get my meaning. You'd be very silly not to give them a listen should you be in the market for a pre/power at any price. Heck, give them a listen even if you're not - you may even blow the 'new kitchen' money on them!

After this praise, however, it would be wrong to imagine there's no complaints to be had with the A3^{CR} pre and power. These amps are no good for putting on music to iron to, as your shirts will remain forever crumpled, such is the urge you have to sit down and really listen.

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In practice choke power supplies help produce a smooth, almost silky sound. Considered archaic, they are not normally used in solid-state amplifiers. Musical Fidelity's past experience with valve amplifiers and success with choke supply solid-state amplifiers, like the monstrous A-470, gives them a unique understanding of the benefits of a choke.

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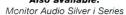
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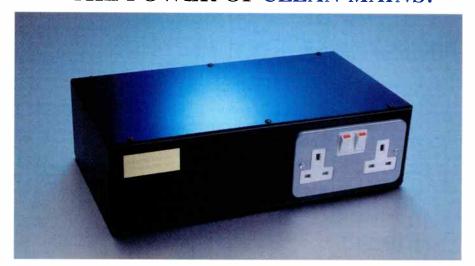
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If I Were A KICHMO

Not everyone's home is as spacious as a castle, Nouveau Pauvre Richard White finds a corner for the Castle Richmond bookshelf 'speaker.

astle's Richmond loudspeakers are small enough to qualify for the catch-all 'bookshelf' category. Manufactured in well-veneered 12mm board, the cabinets measure 13" by 61/2" by 71/2" (hwd) approx., and are suitably sturdy and non-resonant. High frequencies are in the hands of a one inch softdome tweeter, whereas the midrange and bass are provided by a 41/2" woven driver with a rudimentary 'bullet' phase plug. Like many drivers of this type, the plug is attached to the magnet pot, rather than to the cone and, as far as I can see, there is no dust cover to prevent airborne detritus from entering the gap between the coil and the magnet. A small point this, but it might encourage the user to retain the grille, especially if they're in the habit of flinging iron filings about. Completing the business side of the 'speaker is a narrow (and short) reflex port. All these are covered by the styled grille, which appears designed to allow at least a little of that veneer to show through.

Attachment to the 'speaker cable is by a single pair of 'safety banana' connectors - the plastic middle bung can be prised out for ordinary use. Failing this, the aperture for bare wire will accept a generous gauge of cable or plug; this is the preferable way of making the connections if you can stand the fiddliness. The Richmonds are rated 8Ω nominal and designed for 80W power, sensitivity being claimed at 88dB/W/m.

In Ye Olden Days, when high-fidelity was a concept rather than a label, the problem which confronted the new class of listener was the scarcity of recordings which would show off their new equipment to anything like the best of its abilities. This was the heyday of the pipe organ record. In addition to having the

broadest range of any acoustic instrument, the organ had other advantages; true it was

difficult to record successfully, but the hire of the church was cheap, and only one musician to pay at the end!

One of the more recent contributions to this long and honourable line is Opus 3's catchily titled Live at Vatnajökull disc, a feast of organ and percussion music played at the Icelandic town . . . no, it's true!! Ravel's Bolero receives this unusual instrumental treatment and gave the Richmonds plenty to think about in the bass region as the complexities built up. The repetitive pedal figures showed no sign of undue emphasis but were reproduced with an acceptable fullness from a 'speaker of this size. Percussion on Bolero is hardly rhythmically varied but the side drum in particular gave a very snappy account of itself.

Coming under the same one-man-band heading as the organ records but not quite so easy to come by are Bach's series of Sonatas for solo violin. These pretty gruelling tests of artistry and technique also make a wonderful ear test for the hi-fi fraternity. Relayed through the Richmonds, the instruments expressive tone was full and pointed; Gidon Kremer certainly pulls out all the stops on this Philips recording and the Castles let you hear the rosin fly.

Staying with Philips, their set of Schumann string quartets with double bass (instead of 'cello) furnished a good opportunity for the Richmonds. For a start, the stereo imaging was comfortable, although perhaps not a generous as could be expected. Prospective owners should try just a modest amount of toe-in rather than the classic isosceles arrangement, otherwise the soundstage could become a little cramped. With the wide tonal differ-



ences between the first and second violins, and the flat-footed grumblings of the bass, these recordings generally gave a good idea of the 'speakers virtues and limitations. When straight out of the box, the treble was more glassy than I like to hear, but this toned down in the course of my reviewing, and it's possible that the remaining taint would have disappeared completely in time.

A swift shuffle round some of the commercial stations on the radio revealed that these 'speakers are determined to tell the truth - happily without noticeable added oil-drum effects. All-in-all, the Richmonds gave good value for their size. Whilst not the most spacious sound ever, they managed to stick with the music from varied sources without seeming to favour any particular style unduly. The sum total of the sound is not exactly huge, but neither is it distorted in any direction. A hearty recommendation for the space-conscious - even if there's no room for pipe organ and percussion.

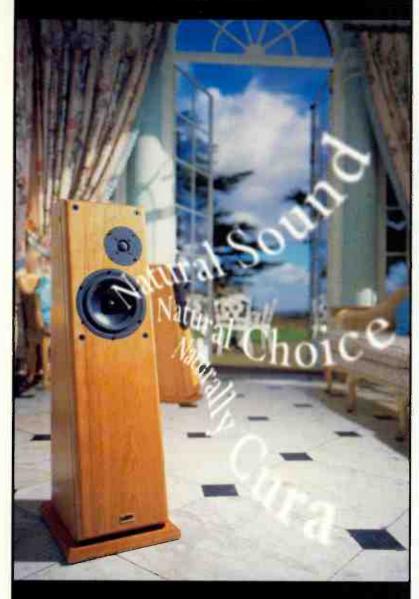

The original Audio Analogue Puccini amps have gained classic status over the last few years. Can their revamped, remote-control counterparts continue the tradition? John Marks finds out.

know it's my job as a hi-fi journalist to furrow my brow and burn the midnight oil in the quest to distil the essence of a component's sound. I know it's my job to get the best from any equipment, to discover what it can really do. I know it's my job to put pen to paper in a considered, rational, objective manner. So for what I am about to do, please forgive

Remotes. It's as simple as that. Audio Analogue's fresh take on the Puccini standard and Puccini SE integrateds comes with the sort of remote controls that style gurus and interior decorators would self their coffee tables for. In a world of flimsy plastic lumps that wouldn't survive 20 minutes on a warm radiator before flowing Dali-style, AA have come up with a device that armchair operators will be twitching to get their mits on.

Leading the Puccini revamp is a beautifully brushed and lacquered lozenge which allows you to alter the volume level (or mute it altogether) and switch inputs without that tiresome trek across the living room. Its reassuringly weighty and polished build is mirrored in the construction of both its partnering amps, whose fascias are now punctuated by a ladder of six red LEDs (to indicate the

input in use) between volume and source selector. The latter is no longer your basic rotary switch, but one of those trendy 'flick left, flick right' types that seemed to come in with MiniDisc. Every bit as alluring as it was before is the thick aluminium front panel where the remote receiver nestles next to the Power LED. Its opposite half, in the case of the pricier Puccini (£795 to the cheaper version's £575) is a sight for sore bi-wiring eyes with eight speaker terminals. On top of this, common to both is that favourite obsolescence-bypass, Pre-Amp Out sockets, obviously aimed at buyers with their hearts set on a matching Donizetti power

The refinement count rises with the addition of a Tape On/Off switch, but it's inside that the real changes have been wrought. A rise in reservoir capacitance and a change of capacitor manufacturer are intended to yield an amp with greater dynamic swing and clout. And the SE's twin toroidal mains transformers are rated at 200VA and come straight from the Donizetti parts bin.

THEORY INTO PRACTICE

10 more watts and some component

changes might sound as if it should offer more of a subtle evolution than arevolution, but the extra control the new Puccini SE possesses when compared to its predecessor is blindingly obvious. In a system of T+A CD 1210 R CD player and Jamo Concert 8s, son of original Puccini displayed a much better grip on the voice coils of the difficult Danes' magnesiumconed mid/bass units. Where MkI had been a bit like Quad 57s, all midrange and a bit of treble and bass, the MkII pulled a much firmer and more convincing bass (and a finer, more transparent treble) from the Concert 8s.

Even a brief spell with the meaty basslines of Presence's The Strength (Within) revealed an amplifier of greater confidence and load-handling ability. But that's not to say this incarnation has traded delicacy for smack - far from it. As with every other aspect of performance, insight, transparency and finesse are well above what they were before.

Shahen Shah is an album of devotional music from the mystical Sufi branch of Islam performed by the renowned Nusrat Fateh Ali Khan and party. Its combination of inspirational chanting, chorus, tablas and harmonium is a million miles away from most of today's electronic music,

The Puccini SE rose to the challenge, showing off its pedigree in a couple of key areas. Applause can be surprisingly difficult to render accurately, the bulk of equipment giving it a rough, spiky edge that lacks impact at lower frequencies. Not so this Italian, whose

way with clapping steered well clear of any resemblance to a bad burst of static. The chorus enjoyed similarly VIP treatment, as voices retained their individuality rather than being stirred together into an amorphous sonic blob. The icing on the cake with Shahen Shah was made up of superior imaging, sound staging and detailing, which allowed the music to blossom from the Concert 8s, the performers located within an acoustic where the sense of depth matched that of width.

If there was a couple of criticisms that could be levelled at the earlier Puccini SE, they probably revolved around a slightly cool disposition and an output whose 40watt limit could curtail the fire-



MM/MC stage. With a Trio L-07D/SME V/Ortofon MC 7500 doing duty on the Moving-Coil front, and a Technics SL-7 with matching 202C cartridge keeping the Moving-Magnet circuitry happy, the results were impressive. Communicating the musical spirit was the order of the day I found as Bruce Cockburn Live spun under the stylus. Accompanying his singing and the backing vocalists' was crisp, clear guitar and percussion free from any spit, sibilance or excessive surface noise. There was that 3-D imaging and tangibility which vinyl is so famous for too, providing the phono stage is up to it. Laibach's demented cover of The Beatles' Let It Be caused the Puccinis no

to involve regardless of genre and an openness that never restricted the recording to the confines of the loudspeakers' cabinets. As you'd expect with the price differential, there were bound to be differences between these two siblings. While the less costly offered an enjoyable and well-balanced presentation that puts it up at the front of the peer pack, those extrapounds are a wise investment. Delve that much deeper into your wallet and you'll be rewarded with an amplifier which is smoother and sweeter on cymbals, string instruments and vocals. Separation is also better, transparency a notch or two higher and bass tighter, punchier and more detailed.

Audio Analogue swiftly made a name for themselves when the Puccinis first arrived in the UK. Raising the standard higher still was always going to be hard, but they've managed to hit the mark, albeit with a price increase to cover the addition of remote control. Seeing as these latest designs are capable of handling loads that would formerly have been out of

the question, it looks as if AA are back to frighten the competition.

works on heavier Rock or larger scale Classical pieces unless the partnering loudspeakers were fairly efficient. The MkII, however, never gives the impression it's about to run out of steam into transducers in the 84-90dB bracket, and it has a speed and dynamic reach which leave the first-generation AA sounding gently compressed by comparison. On the other hand, this remains an amp that could never be labelled warm or valve-like, but rather one where the word 'neutral' would be more appropriate.

PLAYING WITH PLASTIC

If you prefer your music at 33.3rpm, there's good news on the phono front, as the improvements to the line inputs seem to have been carried over into the

problems either in spite of some of the most outrageous bass ever committed to LP. And thanks to these Italians' above-average separation, the densest of choruses avoided collapsing in on themselves.

KEEP IT IN THE FAMILY

The £795 Puccini SE is, alongside MVL's A2, one of the few integrateds which really pays its way at the price. Unfortunately, that's cold comfort if your budget won't stretch that far, so how does this Italian's smaller brother fare?

At the heart of the same system, the non-suffix version proved that it was very much a chip off the old block sonically. Present again was that new-found load tolerance and ability to handle the Jamos. Other shared traits included the capacity

aul Klipsch was in a position to retrospect his place in the audio world over forty years ago; in the late nineteen-fifties, he wrote: "A good design should not need to be subjected to major change or complete abandonment every few years . . . Steinway and Rolls Royce have endured well with only occasional changes . . . " That was then. As everybody knows, to everybody's cost, change of design has become one of the most powerful forces in economics in the intervening decades. While it's true that the 'classic Klipsches' like the La Scala and the famous Klipschorn have held their own almost regardless of this change, for day-to-day trading, the Klipsch company now makes This Year's Model along with the rest. As a consequence, on the firm's books are several species of loudspeaker which have little obvious connection with the Rolls Royces of the fifties.

The KG3.5 floorstander is a solidly constructed beast which tips the scales at a generous weight, and tips the purse at a reasonably affordable £595. These are not slimline models, and although the black ash vinyl gives a dignified appearance, it's possible that a shoe-box bedsit might be a bit over-full of them. One feature which I liked was the magnetic fixings for the grille - none of that rasping Velcro or, more usually, broken tenons - why isn't this more common? The sound itself is in the hands of a horn-loaded pressure unit for the high frequencies and a reflexloaded soft-domed mid-bass driver for the rest, with the port at the bottom of the front baffle. When I first fired up the KG3.5s, I was alarmed at the quite horrifying boom-tizz effects which burst forth. The truth, happily, was that these loudspeakers very definitely need running-in for several hours before a fair assessment of their merits can be made.

My first evening spent with them coincided with one of Trevor Pinnock's Bach Pilgrimage concerts on the BBC. In portraying the soprano soloist as bloodless

and 'twee' i was sure that the Klipsches were being a little unforgiving. There is a fine line to be trod between letting detail pass by and rubbing noses in it; the KG3.5s were on the whole just that little bit quick to point out the faults on this broadcast.

Elgar's First Symphony on

Decca is one of my measures for 'thickness' of texture, and the Klipsches gave splendid backing to the richly underlined 'cello and bass contributions, not to mention the beautifully slow-speaking orchestral bass drum. Undoubtedly the bass on these 'speakers is inclined to give value

for money. For my taste, the treble was still too forward, with the upper partial of the brass tending to slice through the huge ensemble. This was exhilarating but perhaps a bit exaggerated.

Not every loudspeaker is best at every job, of course; having played classical and called it a draw, I turned to some of the more populist radio channels. It was as if the Klipsches were saying "New, that's more like it!", spitting on then hands and getting right on down to it. he 'speakers' performance on Reggae was electrifying, with impressive bass drive and a sure touch with the electric organ timbre and the 'edge' of the vocals, which kept me listening beyond my usual limits of endurance.

For folk/rock fans, I tried out Eric Bibb's Where The Green Grass Grows. Ignoring the bewilderingly ham-fisted intro on an asthmatic reed organ (Klipsches have no mercy!) the 'speakers provided an entrancing performance of this MOR masterpiece, with crystal-clear lead vocal, firm double bass line and a very natural way with the old National resonator guitar. Experiments with the amount of toe-in required for best results showed that the KG3.5s allow a lot of leeway - even with the cabinets toed out,

there was still plenty of very solid stereo soundstaging to go round.

When considering the award of globes at the end of a review, I always refresh my memory as to what the various designations stand for quite literally. Four globes is 'something we'd use ourselves'. Given the reservations I've expressed, the KG3.5s don't qualify. On the other hand, if you customarily wince at my 'sissy' and 'undemocratic' musical tastes and wonder why I bother with hi-fi if I'm not going to boogie, look no further - these are for you!

DAB HANDS

I was interested in your reply in the February 2000 issue to the query from a reader David Watkins about the Leak Troughline. I understand that most of the UK will go digital in the near future. Will it be the case that radio reception will only be possible via a digital receiver and thus all non digital tuners become obsolete/unusable?

If this is so why, apart from curiosity, would anyone want to buy second-hand, shortly to be unusable, tuners?

This largely depends on what you mean by 'in the near future'. At present the vast majority of radios in this country operate on FM broadcasting and, if the cut-off were to come all of a sudden, all these would be redundant. I can't see this happening. For a start, there are only a few digital receivers for anything like domestic use (in-car may be another matter, but let's stick to hi-fi). These are at present expensive, the cheapest being a DAB/FM model from Technics at £500.

Despite the BBC's rather biassed endorsement, the sonic merits of Digital Radio over FM are not self-evident. Indeed as far as ears are concerned, first-class FM still has the (lack of) edge, in my opinion. When television changed to 625-line format, it took years and

years before there were few enough 504 sets left to permit pulling the plug. Even allowing for the metamorphosis of the word 'service' to mean "you'll have it and like it", change to Digital radio will not be a quick process.

Besides this, the wit of man is usually able to contrive something to help out, witness all the phono stages which have become available since amplifier manufacturers decided that the gramophone record was obsolete. A little add-on gadget to convert digital radio back into FM might seem a long way to go round the houses, but I shouldn't be surprised if something of the sort appears.

Is it worth buying now? Listen to a well-kept Troughline, Quad or Rogers, to name but three high-class vintage models. Sound per pound they are cheap. Even if FM is switched off in only five years' time, I believe every penny will have been well spent. RMW

SEEING RED

Lown a Crimson Elektrik pre and power amp, Heybrook HB1 speakers, Rotel RCD950, Denon TU-215RD tuner, JVC KD720 tape deck and Garrard SP25 Mark2 turntable. As you can see some is old and some is new but the sound is great.

Where can I find any information on Crimson Elektrik? I have bought the amp but cannot find anything anywhere. I have also got a pair of cordless Sony headphones.

Now the problem is I have no headphone socket and was wondering how I can connect them. Is there a box I could buy like a 'speaker separator into which I could plug them. Any help or tips would be much appreciated.

Crimson are still alive and very much kicking. In the UK, service and help is obtainable c/o Virtual Reality Audio Systems (01277 227355) who can, they inform me, deal with Crimson back to the year dot.

As an economical solution to your headphone question, I should be inclined to try a 'Y' lead from your pre-amplifier output. One lea should feed the power amp as usual (which you can switch off when

using the 'phones), and the other should go into your headphone transmitter. If this greatly reduces the volume from your loudspeakers, there is an impedance matching problem and you will have to think again. Similarly, if the gain is too low to operate the transmitter satisfactorily, curses! It's not usually a good idea to try lashing headphones to the output of a power amplifier. 'Y' leads are readily available cheaply from high street shops like Dixons. If it works, you can look to a better bit of wire as a fixed solution; if it doesn't, you've only lost £250 or so.

I do not consider that it's worth splashing out on a headphone amplifier for 'just' a cordless set but if you are of a different opinion, our own World Audio makes quite a satisfactory kit, and Musical Fidelity (see this issue) can oblige with a ready-made device. RMW

THE PANEL'S CHOICE

Hi-fi World is the only (British) magazine that has given some attention to Magneplanar speakers. A few months ago I bought the Magneplanar 2.7 speakers in a hifi store that used them as demonstration models. Because the 2.7 model is out of production I could have them for about half the price. And now I need a new CD-player and a new amplifier to go with them. I have about £2,500 to spend. Hike an open, detailed, clear, bright and dynamic sound. Could you give me some advice on good CD-player/amplifier combinations. I don't need any gadgets but the amplifier must have a balance control and lazy, as I am, a remote control would be welcomed. I hope you can give me a shortlist of equipment I can try. In Holland most hi-fi clealers have sold their souls to three or four brands and when you inform about other solutions they don't have an idea what you're talking about. That's why I ask for your advice!

Are the Magneplanars hard to work with and do I need a heavy amplifier? Some shops give me the creeps: they say that Magneplanars are very difficult to get to work and there is a very serious chance you blow them up when used with a 'normal' amplifier. Is this true? I thought that was is a problem with electrostatic speakers, not with Magneplanars. I also like the sound of tube-amplifiers, but all the hifi advisors tell me it is impossible to drive the Magneplanars with tube-amplifiers. Is this true?

True. Magneplanars are a little power hungry but I personally have run the smaller SMGa with a 50W per channel Audio Analogue Puccini and they sounded quite pukka (although I had to crank the volume knob a little) - so forget the creep-inducing dealers you have spoken

To get the full potential of the larger models that you have, however. I would recommend at least a healthy 100W per channel. Musical Fidelity's X-A200 monoblocs at £1000 for the pair will match the clean and open sound of the Magneplanars, maybe powered by a matching X-P100 at £800. This combination would give you a fair £700 spare to splash out on the excellent Creek CD43 at £600 or an Audio Analogue Paganini for a valve-like sound. And talking of valves, you may wish to try a good valve preamp such as the Croft Vitale at £350 which may add a little of the valve's roundness to the sound. SP

A CYNIC WRITES...

Like others, I await the arrival of new formats on CD with whetted appetite. At present, I am looking to buy a good quality CD player until SACD and DVD Audio are established. I have a system which was not inexpensive and I think standard CD sound has much to offer. However, I worry that some software manufacturers may be less inclined to provide all the quality possible on future CD recordings in order that SACD/DVD Audio pressings may impress more favourably. Am I being too cynical, or can anyone offer me some words of reassurance?

As far as recommended CD players go, there are many good value buys in the shops. You don't say how many shekels you have to spend, but if it's budget-to-mid you're after we would recommend Sony's excellent CDP-XB930E or Rotel's RCD-951, both of which give a performance well above their price range. If you're looking for something with better build and a more refined sound check out the Audio Analogue Paganini (£750), Musical Fidelity's X-Ray (£800), the Roksan Caspian (£895) or Naim's exciting CD3.5 (£1080). One of these four should deliver everthing you ought to crave in CD reproduction.

The second part of your question brings up some interesting top-

ics. Although in general record companies and the popular music business can be a difficult lot, they're actually quite dubious about taking the plunge with new formats. Like all other businesses, they're in it for the money. With new formats, they will only start making it if lots of people start buying it, and they will only start buying it if they have something to play it on!

Realistically, it will be sometime yet before players are priced low enough to get this amount of people interested. So I would think that scuppering the current software output in favour of future software is unlikely, as the music-buying majority of the British public won't be able to play SACD or DVD-A discs for quite some time yet. SP



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World Radio History

RACKED WITH GUILT!

I've been putting off buying a rack for a few years now. It's one of those purchases that I've wanted to make more for neatness than any real hope of improving the sound. Last week I finally made the decision and bought an all-black Soundstyle rack that I'm extremely pleased with. It looks good and it's as solid as the proverbial rock.

My set-up has previously rested on many tables, draws and shelves. Its last resting place was a not-too-stable set of free-standing pine shelves, from Ikea I believe. Here is my annoyance. On the wobbly shelves the Sondek never jumped. On the rigid stand, if you walk near it, the needle jumps. The new rack is placed in a part of the room I had lined up for it. However I wasn't prepared for a loose floor board. My undoing! I'm in a flat so I can't just rip up the floor and have the whole thing redone. I'm going to experiment with orientation and positioning to limit the problem. It is not possible to place it where the shelves are at present. This is real pity as the sound when undisturbed is a significant improvement. I'm loathe to throw more money at the problem by buying Sorbothane feet or any other gadgets. I'll just have to put up with it for now.

Put up with it?! This is not the spirit of Hi-Fi World speaking! Before we look at your possible options, let's make the all-too-often over-

looked point, that a rack is only as solid as the surface it's standing on.

If your problem is just one loose floor board, I should think that a few pennies spent in the odds-and-ends bin at a timber yard or DIY store would yield enough battening material to spread the weight of the rack over some of the adjacent floorboards as well.

By the same token, but rather better, is my old favourite, the pink concrete paving slab. These are usually about eighteen inches square and cost about £2 each at Wickes. Assuming your floorboards are of the standard eight-inch width, a couple of these slabs will spread the effective footprint of your rack over at least three boards. Better than this, the undeniable mass of the concrete will impart further unwillingness to wobble to your rack.

For those to whom the prospect of pink paving slabs in the sitting room seems monstrous, I can only state that I very rapidly got used to them - the colour is not strong enough to offend the eye - and that the real drawback I found was keeping my un-shod toes out of harm's way. This is something which has to be learned; there's little gain in saving pounds on a cheap stabilizing scheme only to have to blow it on a pair of industrial-strength, steel-clad slippers! RMW

MATCHING PAIR

I decided over the new year that it was about time I improved the sound of my system which consists of a NAD 3020A amplifier, a Kodak PCD-265 photo CD player, which is only used for sound, and a pair of very elderly Wharfedale Denton loudspeakers. For some reason I phoned up and ordered one of your Kit88 amplifier kit rather than considering the other components first! Clearly both the loudspeakers and CD player could be improved upon. My musical taste is very varied and changes radically from time to time but currently I listen mostly to temale vocal artists. I think I should have both a new CD player and speakers for the Kit88 amplifier but do not know where to start, I have a total budget of about £1000. I do not want to build a pair of speakers as I don't have room to carry out the work. How should I proportion the budget between the new components and what do you recommend, the room used is 12 ft by 24 ft ?

The KiT88 has plenty of drive and bass welly, so unlike a lot of valve amplification you don't need ultra-sensitive 'speakers to partner it. I personally would be tempted to spend a little more on 'speakers, as CD players are increasingly better at a lower price. You have a fairly large room, so a good floorstanding model such as Mission's 774 (£500) will do justice to the sound of the KiT88, providing an outlet for fast and tight bass with little coloration. Tannoy's Revolution r3s (£550) will also give a fine bass performance, with a

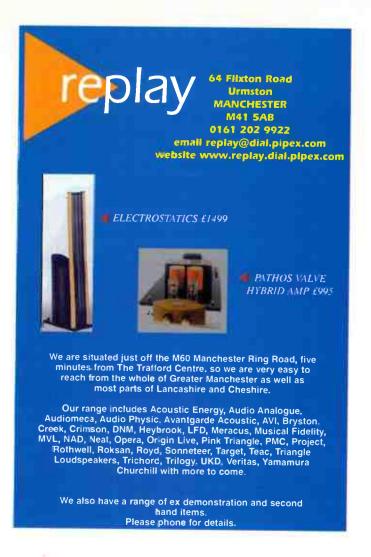
clean open sound throughout the frequency range.

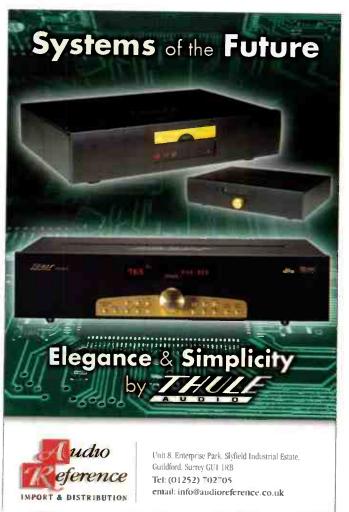
On the source front, you could do a lot worse than the Rotel RCD-951, giving you the added bonus of HDCD should you wish, or Sony's dynamic CDP-XB930E. Both are excellent value at £300. Any of these combinations will give you some beer money left over from your £1000! **SP**

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IT'S IN THE CAN

Complaining neighbours? Nagging partner? No headphone socket? Check out MFs latest X-ternal headphone amp. Simon Pope did just that.

s Musical Fidelity are launching some more products in the A Series, you would think it would be safe to walk the streets again without being hit by another 'X' product. Well, don't leave your door too soon. Cue the latest addition - the X-Can v2. Under the 'X-ponents' banner, this is the improved version of the X-Cans, and was originally conceived as a NuVista circuit. And like the rest of the range, they've (almost annoyingly) got it right again. At £150, the V2 is £20 more expensive than its predecessor, but you get a lot of improvement for your twenty-quid.

In partnership with a pair of Jecklin Float cans (great sound, daft look), the X-Can v2 aims (and succeeds) in giving a totally neutral sound. Everything from Bloch's elegiac Schelemo to the Foo Fighters new album, via a little unaccompanied choral music was open and detailed. Space between voices and instruments was even more pronounced than usual through the floats, so that a truly out of the head sound was experienced. You have to remember that headphone listening is vastly different to



stereo 'speakers, and the v2s take one step further in making the two closer by bringing depth and breadth to the picture rather than merely plaring music into your lug holes! Highly recommended!

SUPPORTIVE STUFF

Simon Pope checks out a high-end hi-fi support system with sex appeal.

I irstly I must admit to being, ini-I tially, a bit of a 'rack cynic'. And then I discovered that among the hoards of structures that are merely there to put your kit on (and a very good job they do too), there are a couple that really do make a sonic difference as well as merely looking cool. In other words: there are racks and there are racks. And Copulare make the latter!

Although the name implies that the manufacturer could be Italian (it could also imply a lot more to Latin scholars among you), this beautiful beast actually hails from the land of cuckoo clocks and naff gateaux - the Black Forest in Germany. Firstly it must be said that they are big, they take over your room in a way which signifies that hi-fi is important to you. A Copulare rack would even be the focal point in the Millennium Dome

(indeed, it might even raise the interest stakes). Racks, sexy? You'd better believe it. Copulare are great looking, with three



thick, sand-filled support legs topped with heavy machined-metal pucks. These are connected by thinner tubes, cross sectioned and supplied with spikes for resting however many (2-4) tiers of solid wood

support - finished in a unique striped marque- you require. The phrase "well-built" doesn't really do them justice. As I discov-

> ered transporting the support system up the stairs to my flat, they would stay rooted to the spot in the midst of Hurricane Floyd.

They also do wonders for the sound. The predominant area affected, of course, is the bass. Everything is tightened up and delivered with punch and verve and the sound as a whole is more neutral and controlled. If someone would have told me that an equipment stand could do this to the sound a couple of years ago I would have replied "poppycock!" Not

Of course, they're not cheap. A fully tooled-up 4-tier will set you back £1800, down to £950 for a two-tier. But if you've got the dosh and your willing to spend it on an equipment stand, look no further than the Black Forest!

long with the likes of Opera, Zingali, Diapason and many more, the Italian designers Chario (the 'ch' as in Chianti, incidently) take care in their cabinet work. The Academy Millennium 1s are no exception. No expense is spared in putting together the cabinet, components or drive units. The result is, as you would imagine not cheap, but compared to some rivals, very good value

First, that gorgeous ergonomic-looking cabinet. Appearing to be moulded naturally by the wind and sea, it follows Chario's criteria of using solid walnut staves which are constructed to firm what looks like one solid piece of hardwood, such is the quality of the joints. The Academy 1 uses the same drive units as its bigger brother, the 2. These consist of a carbon fibre/paper bass and mid driver which employs a powerful rare earth magnet. This is coupled on the thick baffle with perhaps one of the finest treble units I have heard, a Scanspeak Revelator, which has been specifically modified for the Chario Millennium range. Inside the cabinet, the crossover makes use of Linkwitz-Riley techniques resulting in an excellent interaction between the units.

With all this labour-intensive work and expense that has gone into the design you'd be right to think that 1) they either work superbly or are 2) a bit of a let down. Gladly I can report to you that it's the former. I tested them with two different ends of the power scale. Firstly with a fellow Italian smoothy, the Audio Analogue Puccini SE and later with the 'big guns' of a Musical Fidelity A1001 with their own X-LP2 monobloc phono preamplifier.

After a little experimentation which confirmed that they sound better toed in fairly sharply and with their 'own' heavy wooden stands, first in the Caspian CD

player was the Corydon Singers getting their tonsils around the demanding motets of Anton Bruckner. The first thing I noticed about these 'speakers were

their recognisable high-end characteristics

of smoothness, detail and most of all dynamic range. This recording ranges form 'sotto voce' whisperings right up to full blooded' plenty of welly', that well-

known musical marking. At no point did the Millenniums become shrill or crude at climaxes - which is the acid test for 'speakers with choral music. Often it can become unpleasant listening (however glorious the music) not in this case, however.

Changing tact with Paul Weller's Stanley Road on CD, and Talvin Singh's OK on vinyl confirmed that the neutrality I'd discovered with the Bruckner disc stayed with studio-processed material. In the Weller CD, vocals were well positioned between the 'speakers and the sound staging was excellent - the drums being placed well back creating a natural three-dimensional sound. Both here and in the Talvin Singh album, the tweeters showed what they could do with cymbals, presenting them as sweet as candy and glistening like a Regimental Sergeant Major's steel toe cap.

One of the biggest surprises of the Academy's was their bass response. They can dig deep into the frequencies to bring out the best in the low notes. Whilst it may not be the deepest bass response available from a pair of 'speakers, for their size. I don't think you get any better in the quality stakes. Cabinet coloration is virtually non-existent so everything you get is intended to be there!

I found that everything I chucked at them, from crappy mid-eighties mixes to demonstration-standard classical discs, from the rampant rock of the Foo Fighters to the graceful elegance of Schubert's chamber music was played with equal respect, making the Academy Millennium 1s the consummate musician. If you have a small listening room, enough cash, a bit of class and a good ear, they're just the job!

PANASONIC LF-D101 DVD RAM

Halfway house or easy upgrade? Noel Keywood investigates whether Panasonic's RAM is the way to go DVD.

uy a stand-alone DVD player, like those we tested last month, and you can watch movies and play CDs. Buy computer DVD drive and you can watch movies on your computer.

"early in 2000" with a version able to write nearly twice as much data to a disc - no less than 9.4GB in all. So LF-D101 price may fall - to around £299-£350 Panasonic told me.

What does buying a computer DVD RAM drive like this offer in contrast to a stand alone DVD player? Let's talk DVD video first. To watch DVD (MPEG 2 compressed)

on the computer's processor and gives better results, especially with lower spec. computers. Some manufacturers, like Philips, supply a dedicated DVD card with their DVD drives, but not Panasonic. nor do they provide decoding software. all for less than a stand alone player. Costing £80 for a drive alone to £180 for a drive with a DVD decoder card, they look like unbeatable value.

Too good to be true? Computers are rarely as straightforward, as I found whilst reviewing Panasonic's LF-D101 DVD RAM drive, which not only plays DVD but can record to a RAM cartridge as well

You pay more for a DVD RAM drive like this; the LF-D101 is commonly listed at £395 inc VAT. In return it offers a massive 5.2GB of storage, on a double-sided disc encased in a protective caddy. After just one year in the market, Panasonic have announced the 101's replacement

video you will need additional MPEG 2 decoding software, or better still, a DVD decoder card. Software decoding demands a lot of computing power to avoid jerky frames, loss of detail and coarse colouring; a Pentium II running at 350MHz being about the minimum for good results. Mediamatics DVD Express is one example; Panasonic quote Cyberlink Power DVD.

A DVD decoder card lightens the load

You do not face the problem of card

installation with a stand alone player of

Panasonic place emphasis on the DVD RAM capabilities of this drive. It comes with 'WriteDVD!' software on a CD, plus a double-sided UDF formatted 5.2GB blank cartridge. A novel loading tray can accept the cartridge or a bare CD (i.e.

120mm/5in disc). The cartridge has a writable CD inside that can be removed and played on a DVD ROM in fact, a little mentioned option. The cartridge case acts as protection, improving durability and extending life, useful in an office where perhaps Panasonic hope a format like this could replace Iomega's popular Zip (100MB/250MB), or even the Jazz (1GB/2GB). At 5.2GB DVD RAM has much greater capacity, and it is cheap at around £28 against a 2GB Jazz at £60. I suspect Panasonic have done themselves no favours by announcing a replacement within the short space of a year. Old discs may well play in new drives, but new discs will not transfer backward to old drives - an issue in an office where there are many machines in use, if not in the average home.

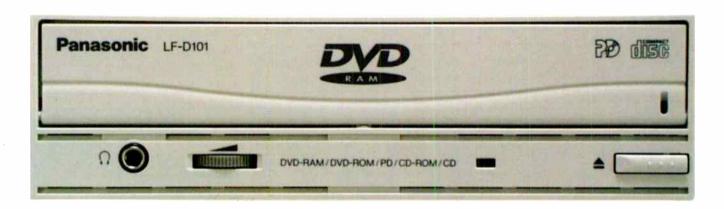
It was a surprise to find the LF-D101 conflicted with Easy CD Creator (v4) when the program was opened, if there was a CD or DVD cartridge in the drive. The analogue line had to be used instead for audio playback, the mechanism being run by a software controller such as Microsoft's 'CD player' or that supplied in Panasonic's own software. The drawback to this is that it provides only simple audio replay, eliminating digital manipulation. Panasonic UK said they had not experienced these problems; Adaptec eventually traced the fault - see below.

The LF-D101 outputs digital audio via SCSI and could be accessed by other programs, such as the excellent 'CD Copy', by Markus Barth (see mp3.com). As a work-around I used CD Copy to transfer digital audio files to the hard drive, open-

Eventually Adaptec in California identified the problem as a clash with the Software Architect drivers (three sai files in the iosubsys folder) supplied by Panasonic, sending a v1.4 update that cured the problem.

The drive's on-board DAC is specified for CD audio and will not handle DVD Audio (192kHz sampling rate) when it arrives. The drive can output 24bit/96kHz movie audio though - much higher quality than 16-bit/44.1kHz CD audio - if digitally connected via SCSI to a video card with 24/96 processing. The Panasonic is sensitive enough to read low reflectivity CD-RWs.

Out of the box Panasonic's LF-D101 DVD RAM drive offers instant mass storage, analogue audio playback and broadens a computer's media compatibility.



CD-R discs offer 650MB of storage for £1.50 or so, readable in any computer including a DVD-ROM drive, so CD-R has far broader compatibility. However, DVD RAM doesn't need to have a table of contents written before completion; it behaves like an ordinary computer hard drive in this respect.

I was most interested in the LF-D101's abilities as an audio drive and here it held some surprises. Panasonic supply a 50 pin SCSI-2 cable and an analogue audio cable. The LF-D101 uses SCSI-2 to communicate. It will work with Windows 95, Panasonic supplying the necessary software driver. Windows 98 Version 2 recognises it as a DVD ROM without loading this driver. It took no more than 15 minutes to get the 101 installed and running without difficulty, since I had a spare connector on my Ultra-Wide SCSI-2 line. If you do not have SCSI installed then a SCSI card will be needed (e.g. from Adaptec).

ing them with Easy CD Creator afterward. With the LF-D101 acting in effect as a CD ROM it transferred 49MB (one track) in 84 seconds, a healthy rate of 580kB/s, or 4x real time. This means a CD containing 40 minutes of music would transfer to the hard drive in a respectable 10 minutes.

The same 49MB again took 84 seconds to transfer into DVD RAM from my SCSI-2 connected hard drive, but just 35 seconds to transfer from DVD RAM back to the hard drive (i.e. 1.4MB/s), the latter figure being the sustained transfer rate quoted by Panasonic. This is a fast drive by today's standards; I didn't feel speed was an issue.

Because Easy CD Creator is one of the most popular audio manipulation programmes around it was unfortunate that the LF-D101 should clash with it. A Philips CDD3610 CD-R/RW writer and a Plextor CD ROM both use the same SCSI line and transfer digital audio direct to Easy CD Creator without problems.

With DVD in the title I was a little disappointed it could not play movies straight away, unlike DVD ROMs supplied with an MPEG 2 card. The clash with Easy CD Creator was unfortunate too. Panasonic emphasize its role as a mass storage device and sounded disappointed I should question it in other areas. So there you are. It's best seen as offering cheap mass storage for the time being. Perhaps other aspects of performance will be Improved in future models.

recious Metals Cables, distributed by Picture The Sound, have new interconnects on the market that feature their own AirTight RCA phono connector. They say this standard of 'professional grade' hasn't been seen on entry level interconnects before. The AirTight Series Alpha retail for £25 per metre pair, with extra metres at £10.

A lot of money and time has gone into the research and developmaent of the AirTight range. The design of the plug is a one piece and solder free. It creates a join which maintains constant impedance which Precious Metals say is not achieved with solder designs. It's a very simple but effective process of construction. The cable is prepared and then simply inserted into the plug and is 'crimped' into a hex shape that hermetically seals the join. The cable is kept in place by the use of two sprung jaws that cut into the

centre conductor so the elctrical connection is sealed. All this just for 25 guid! To top it all Precious Metals chuck in a ten year warranty, such is their confidence in the product.

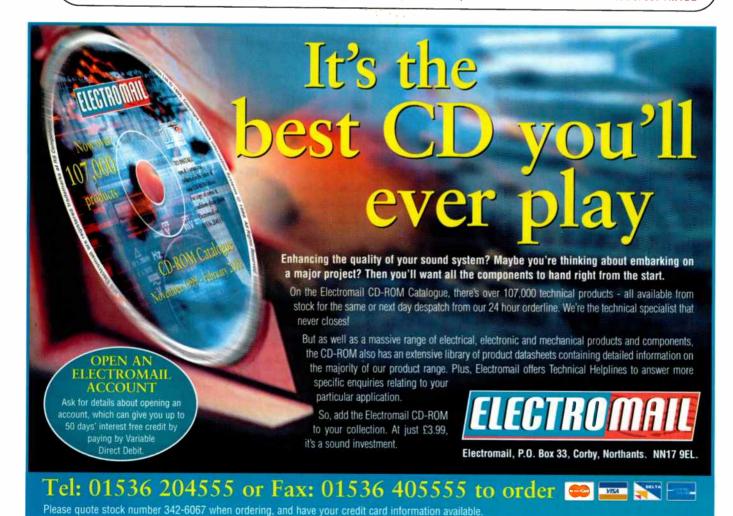
The main characteristics of the cable are a smooth and sweet treble. High percussion and cymbals have a 'glistening' quality that you usually only get from more expensive cable. This is matched by a tight and controlled bass that is also fast

and exciting. But most noticeable was the excellent deep sound stage, which is a rarity at this price level. After using these for a couple of days and reverting back to my usual cable, I have to admit that the difference in sound was marginal. The price, however, isn't! These interconnects are simply excellent value for money.

t's Saturday morning and I'm shopping at Whiteleys in Bayswater, West London, where there's a Virgin record store. Getting the basics in early on Saturday is one of those mechanical things for me; you can be in any state or all sorts of states, it just has to be done. Absent mindedly I wandered into Virgin and picked up a few CDs. I wasn't thinking about the price. "That'll be £34". For two CDs? Have I woken up

"You're getting old, Noel, prices go up" I was told when I got home. That might have been true, especially when it comes to the cost of music. The music business has aggressively raised prices over the years and defended its action vigorously, even when the increase outstrips inflation. But at last all this is

changing. On the internet at least, prices are half what I payed Virgin. Realising this, the Virgin group of stores, which includes Our Price records are demanding a price reduction of 20% from the

music companies, on the grounds that they can't compete against internet retailers - 'e-tailers' - who are getting better terms, they claim.

Buying from the net I could have picked up those CDs mail order for around £18 all in. The price difference is enormous, so large that it is starting to cause serious problems for everyone in the business, from bands through to retailers. Prices should tumble and choice broaden, which I know will delight Hi-Fi World readers. The cost of a CD has always been a hot issue.

The big music companies will fight hard to maintain their position in the world, which is not insignificant. Music sales in 1998 amounted to £24billion worldwide. This was shared by Polygram, Time Warner, EMI, Sony Music (formerly CBS), BMG (formerly RCA), Virgin and Universal. Time Warner are now merging with EMI, leapfrogging Polygram to become the number one company in size. There's talk that Sony music might tie up with German Bertlesman Music Group (BMG) to further consolidate power. Looking at their sales and profit figures I can understand why the price of a CD continues to rise. Sales of CDs are static in developed markets like Japan, America and the UK. Profits are falling steadily, so up goes price yet again.

Surfing into CDNow made me regret my Saturday morning trip into Virgin. Pity really, because I've been buying records for a long time and looking around a record shop has always been an enjoyment. From my student days, when rushing out to buy a new Beatles album was a major event, to being mesmerised by Janis Joplin singing Ball and Chain, going into a record shop has been more than just making a purchase. It's one of those small delights that more than repays the effort if you come away

> with a great new album. It's not an experience mail order can easily replace but CDNow prices are a clincher as far as I'm concerned. And if just 10% of purchasers decide likewise, Virgin stores warn, pretty soon there'll be no more record stores on the High

Virgin are pointing the finger at the big music groups, claiming they are offering better terms to internet companies than high street retailers. Scrolling down through the U.S. 'Top 100' listed at CDNow (www.cdnow.com) I can see what they mean. Most are priced at \$12.58 - just £7.80. Virgin would be buying in at prices higher than these. It's not as if CDNow's Top 100 is a lost leader either. Whilst some albums from big names like Queen and Pink Floyd cost \$22 (£13.75) many classics

from these same names are

offered at \$12.58. Buyers in the UK must pay VAT and carriage from a European warehouse, which bumps price up a bit, but CDNow remains competitive, especially if you buy in quantity. The company claims it is the largest internet music retailer, with a stock 500,000 titles. With offices around the U.S., a European warehouse and no fewer than 43 jobs advertised, CDNow already has clout and it's expanding rapidly.

The price differential between CDNow and a UK High Street store seems extraordinary. Why are the big music companies giving it such good terms, threatening traditional outlets? They will force consumers into the arms of some very large internet companies, not a situation that will benefit them, I would have thought. But who knows what story the sales graphs tell? CDNow started in 1994. Extrapolate six years of phenomenal growth forward and, as a record company executive you doubtless see a huge retailer able to expand the worldwide market for music by avoiding the costs associated with retailing and distribution. EMI claimed it could get rid of 3000 jobs by merging its distribution operation with Time Warner. By delivering into a few mega-warehouses, situated well away from busy

and expensive urban areas, perhaps EMI and its rivals see even greater savings. Are they hoping to kill off record stores? It looks like I won't be visiting mine anymore





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big hallo to those of you who've been counting the hours 'til there was room for my column to reappear. A more discreet hallo to those who were glad to see the back of it. Anyway, on with the motley and time for an incisive look at the world through sound-tinted ear-muffs.

The longer I look at the new audio technology, the more I wonder whether music will come unglued from reality. Is music now on its way, as never before, to becoming secondary to the technology which provides it? Is what we listen to about to become governed by the way it must be packaged?

Technology of itself seems to have a propensity for the trivial. In this respect, it is almost the opposite of Science.

Naturally, once the outline of a scientific discipline gains acceptance and mounts to the honour of Truism, there will be as many misapplication of the rules as there will be bulls-eyes.

In the Middle Ages, the re-discovery of formal logic, geometry and algebra seemed to offer a pattern for rationalizing the whole of the cosmos, if only the disciplines could either be bent to the rules or vice versa. Something of the same kind seems to me to be threatening music, taking away the elements of craft, art and performing skill and substituting a hybrid which any fool can do with the necessary time, technology and, for best results, money.

As an illustration, look at communications. Somehow one feels that the proliferation of the mobile 'phone and the internet would be a little more exciting if there was a bit more to say. Mobile 'phones are the Arabian Nights: Sinbad injured on a walking tour miles from anywhere can summon up the Genie of Help. I'm not so sure that the miracle seems quite so thrilling if it's just Sinbad ringing to say he's met Hagdad in the Bazaar and will be a bit late for his tea. Nation Shall Speak Peace Unto Nation, or Don't Forget It's Karaoke Tonight?

There is a sense of immense complication in pursuit of the trivial. This is

where, in my view, digital gets hold of the wrong end of the stick. I remember years ago visiting the museum of technology near Eindhoven, the centre of the Philips empire. One of the most telling exhibits was a then-and-now look at 'micro' processing. First came several cubic yards of valve flip-flops and critically poised switch circuitry. Stage two took up about the space of a tea chest; this was the transistorized version. Finally, under an outsize magnifying glass, was the microchip which performed the equivalent functions of either the valves or the tea-chest. As I noted, this was several years ago. A legion of these chips could probably dance on a pin-point by now.

As a demonstration of miniaturiza-

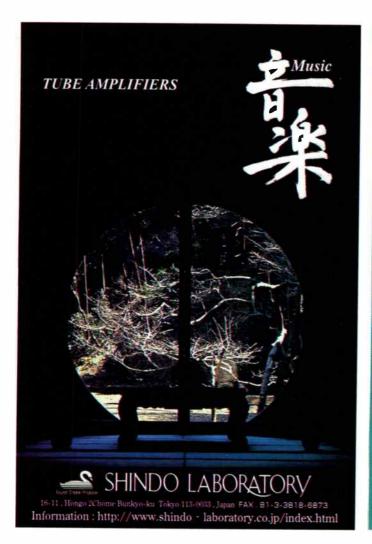
tion, the Eindhoven display was impressive. The obvious question should be 'what does it do, and is it worth doing?' Once the notion of computation had been re-shaped to fit the old one-two, or rather nought-one, there was no stopping the process. This is the root of the entire analogue/digital divide. For certain things, digital is the only answer, a tool which can be shaped into a key for the universe. For £12.99 at Argos, I can buy a pocket calculator which makes my old seven-figure mathematical tables instantly redundant. For other applications however, it seems to me to be an extraordinarily laborious way of

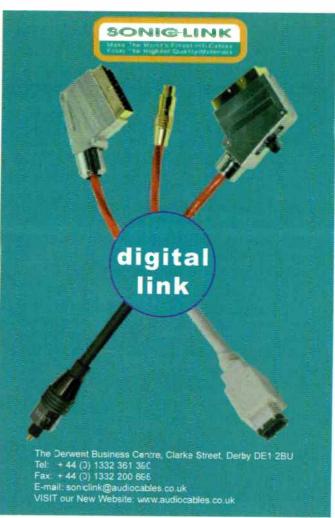
doing things. Alexander Graeme Bell was one of the first to work on the notion that sound could be expressed as a shape, which he discovered via the medium of his diaphragm, needle and sooty glass apparatus. Making the marks on a more permanent medium (folded paper tape to begin with), Edison carried the process a step further and managed to convert the shapes back to sounds. All recording media before digital used patterns of some sort to store sound; whether it was the transverse waves of a gramophone record, the patches of more or less magnetism on recording tape, or the variations in opacity on light-sensitive film. Essentially, the process converts one sort of wave into another. Although this all sounds laborious compared with the silent action of a minuscule chip, it is in fact a far simpler process.

Analogue recording and reproduction is akin to taking a mould or tracing of a sculpture. Digital, on the other hand, works by grinding things to dust, writing down the positions of the grains according to a chosen degree of particularity, then reassembling the powder into a statue form in less time than it takes to think. Were it not for this speed, the whole caboodle would be seen in open day as the staggeringly complicated technique that it is.

Digital technology is the present and the future, but the process lacks æsthetic appeal. According to physics, in cosmic terms waves are 'It'. Digital technology is an exceedingly hard-working slave compound but t'ain't natural!

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ith the seasonal sales well and truly over, and quieter times ahead for hi-fi retailers, it's time to take stock and see exactly what were the seasons movers and shakers. Continuing strong sales of amps, speakers and C.D. players came as no surprise. The sale of Compact Discs themselves may have peaked, but the effect doesn't appear to have hit the hardware side of things just yet. Equally less surprising was the continuing strength of MiniDisc which, combined with the gradual uptake of CDR, has completely demolished the cassette deck market. Sales of tape decks are now only marginally above record decks in the separates side of the business. This was

the year of DVD too. Yet, from my point of view, this doesn't seem to be at the expense of C.D, as some had predicted. As soon as recordable units come down in price, it looks as though it will be VCR not conven-

tional C.D. that takes a hammering.

This may all appear fairly predictable stuff, but one area of the market that proved a surprise was that of tuners. In percentage terms, tuners have never been strong sellers. Yet this year has seen no significant change to the sales pattern of separate tuners. This may not sound exceptional until you consider that, in its current form, it's a format whose future appears doomed. Are the public at large not aware of Digital Audio Broadcasting (DAB)? The format is hardly in it's infancy, with over 60% of the population now able to get a reception, and Radio's 1-5, amongst others, all broadcasting digitally. In addition extra sports and parliamentary channels are soon to be added and, in the future, there should also be news, travel, Asian, pop archive, and 'yet more' sport channels. Yet here's the catch. Take a visit to the BBC's online DAB site, and you'll read much about the future, but less of what's actually happening now. A look at the coverage map reveals that most of Scotland, Wales, and huge chunks of the east and southwest aren't even covered

yet. The statement that, "the BBC will be accelerating roll out along with market uptake", sounds rather ominous too. What happens if the "market uptake" just isn't there? Further more, many local stations haven't even been awarded licenses yet, with the schedule for awarding such licenses stretching late into 2001.

If it appears that little seems to be happening on the transmission front, the hardware side of things is equally languid. You can still count the number of manufacturers producing separate DAB tuners on one hand; Arcam, Cymbol, Tag Maclaran and Technics. Furthermore the cheapest offering, from Technics, is still priced at a rather stiff £500. The promise of a "semi portable", though,

It strikes me that DAB has two major problems on its hands, and the public aren't daft enough not to be aware of them.

> from the seminal manufacturer of portable radio, Roberts, in the autumn, may bring about an upturn in interest.

It strikes me that DAB has two major problems on its hands, and the public aren't dait enough not to be aware of them. The first, I'm sorry to say, is that of sound quality. Compressing a signal and sending a series of 0's and 1's via radio waves, may be fine for mobile phones, or even radio whilst on the move, but its results in a fixed environment are less than satisfactory. The MUSICAM compression system may sound like harmless marketing spiel, but it's a term that should strike horror into anyone passionate about music and dialogue over the airwaves. The BBC are quite blatant in explaining the system "chops out" subtle details that are "difficult to detect" over louder passages. Anyone reading this will know that it's these very details and subtleties that count in making a

hi-fi "breathe" the music rather

than simply "process" it. So, the system hasn't had the warmest responses from the hi-fi elite, but what about the rest of the population? Sadly, most of us aren't that bothered about the ultimate reproduction of sound quality so MUSICAM will hardly raise an eyebrow down at

Admittedly, for car or portable use, DAB would appear more convincing, vet even here, we can't rule out the possibility of the internet (mobile communication bandwidth permitting), entering the domain.

Personally speaking, I see DAB succeeding, yet its audience is going to far less than analogue radio's ever was. Such are the competing formats, and the state of uncertainty that I can hardly blame anyone buying a conventional tuner now. After all we've still got another 15-20 years to enjoy "difficult to detect" music and speech, before they switch all of the analogue transmitters off. Happy tuning! •

Saxophone had a wonderfully smooth, realistic character, and acoustic guitar mixed speed with harmonic richness to very impressive effect. Asian Dub Foundation and Moloko showed no sign at all of the sluggish, woolly bottom-end and poorly-delineated bass beats that most valve amps are to blame for. 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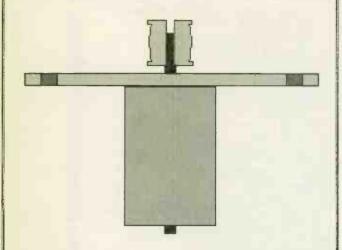
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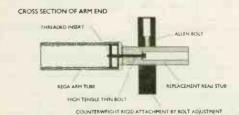
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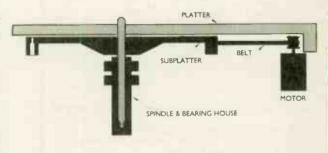
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MORE SYNERGY

I have referred recently to the most important Synergy between amplifiers and speakers, but another can happen with CD players. I probably come across this less frequently as I usually use my old AVI CD player as the front end anyway, as my other favoured Mephisto/Pulsar combo are temporarily indisposed. However a customer asked me the other day what speaker I would recommend for the Audio

Analogue Puccini amp for around £500, and as I had recently received two new speakers which I hadn't had time to listen to on Puccini, I would do some tests and let him know. The AVI CD was off in Scotland so I used the also recently arrived EMC-1 CD player by Electrocompaniet (£2250). Both the new speakers (Alon Rascal and Ruark Epilogue) sounded fine but the shock was when I put on the AVI Bigatron's, which have always sounded great with an all AVI front end, but now sounded remarkably close to my dear old Ruark Accolades (£2700), now, sadly no longer available. Alright the bass wasn't as extended, but for someone who can't manage a big speaker, here was a superb sound, on all types of music for £3600. Another combo which worked well was my Nakamichi DVD player playing CD's through the Harman Kardon AVR65 AV amp and the little Epilogues, referred to above. Surprisingly good music making from an AV setup. Meanwhile the Alon Rascal's also sound great with a normal AVI front end, but the extra bass afforded by monoblocs does help here. A very open and detailed speaker, with a typical big Alon sound; they also work great with AVR65 on home cinema Zorro had never sounded as good as it did the other night!

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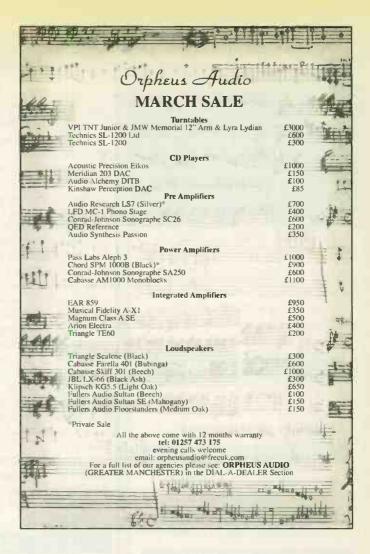
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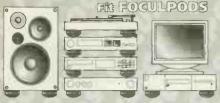

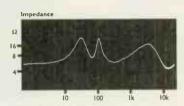

CASTLE RICHMOND

For a small loudspeaker the Richmond is relatively sensitive, producing 87.5dB Sound Pressure Level from one nominal watt on input (2.8V). Since impedance varies around 8Ω across the audio band, the nominal figure turned out to be just this value. Gentle slopes to the impedance curve signify low-ish reactance and energy storage, so overall the Richmond is an easy enough load and it will go louder than most rivals at any particular volume control setting.

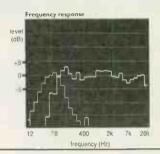
Frequency response is a little uneven by today's standards, but it stays within a few dB from 100Hz up to 18kHz all the

same. Our third octave response shows there's a midrange hump, likely to strengthen vocal projection and clarify enunciation. A roll-off in upper treble may usefully soften CD treble, the lift back at 16kHz probably not being too apparent against the forward midband. A small amount of bass speaking, common and necessary in small loudspeakers, will



liven the bottom end. The port is tuned high, to 70Hz, but extends bass output down to 35Hz (-6dB).

The Richmond works well and will go loud with Ittle power. It's well tailored for small systems. NK



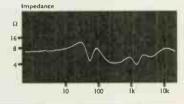
CHARIO ACADEMY MILLENIUM

The Academy has an almost academically flat frequency response, our analysis shows. A small crossover suckout at 5kHz will soften the sound just a little, but not with any great loss of apparent detail. The tweeter has a small peak that may add just a little hiss or spit, but again the effect will be small, if discernible at all.

Absence of smooth low-frequency lift is likely to make the Academy sound a little dry if it is mounted on a stand away from walls. It is probably best placed within a few feet of a rear wall. Forward radiation from the bass driver rolls off smoothly at low frequencies, a sign of

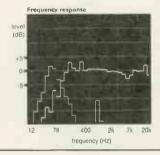
good damping. The port peaks narrowly at 50Hz, extending output down to 40Hz before rolling off. The Academy should sound fast in its bass, since it covers note fundamentals but not general subsonics.

Sensitivity was mediocre at 86dB, especially in view of the fact that impedance is low. A muscular amplifier is needed, the only saving grace being the load is



primarily resistive and will return little energy to the amplifier.

The Academy Millenium will sound dry and possibly a bit bright. It needs a powerful amplifier for good results. NK

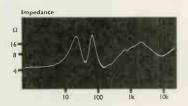


KLIPSCH KG 3.5

Although the KG3.5 has normal bass reflex loading, Klipsch like to give their 'speakers horn type properties. Amongst other things this means high sensitivity. The KG3.5 produced a very high 92dB sound pressure level from one nominal watt of input power. Since it has an overall impedance of 7Ω the nominal watt is in fact a true watt, so the K3.5 is very efficient. It will blow your head off with just a few watts, so amplifiers more powerful than around 60W are unnecessary.

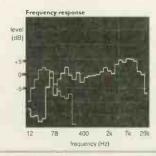
Being a fairly amenable resistive load across most of the audio band, the KG3.5 is easy for amplifiers to drive. At bass frequencies the port introduces massive phase swings, but this is the case with all reflex loudspeakers.

The port is tuned high, to around 40Hz. It extends output down to 20Hz, so the KG3.5 goes low enough all the same.



A steady climb in treble output will make the 'speaker sound very bright.

The Klipsch KG3.5 is not as accurate and balanced as smaller models we have tested. NK



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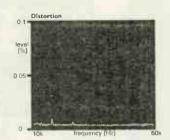
WORLD AUDIO DESIGNS ACTIVE LOUDSPEAKERS

The desktop power amplifier for these active loudspeakers produces 12W per channel. With a sensitivity of 86dB/watt from the loudspeakers themselves they will give 97dB SPL at 1 metre from 12W. Desktop monitors invariably sit close to a listener, within 1 metre, so there's plenty of volume available, since anything over 95dB is very loud.

Frequency response stays within a few dB from 80Hz up to 16kHz, up to monitor standards. With no sign of a crossover suckout or phase problems between the two drive units the 'speakers will convey a lot of detail. They are accurate.

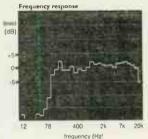
Bass has been well damped to suit positioning on a desk, close to a rear wall. Reflecting surfaces provide natural emphasis. Low frequency response has been tailored to keep bass sounding tight and well balanced.

The amplifier delivers full output from



350mV in, well within the output capabilities of computer sound cards. Distortion measures 0.01% and bandwidth is wide at 5Hz-160kHz.

These little monitors are very accurate and their desktop amplifier has enough power to make them go loud. They are proper hi-fi computer monitors. NK

A.A. PUCCINI SE

The Pucinni SE has excellent power supply regulation, enabling output power to almost double to 95W into a 4Ω load, compared with the 50W it can deliver to an 8Ω load. The Pucinni should have good bass slam as a result. It will handle demanding low impedance loudspeakers too. Power output is sufficient for good volume in the averaged sized room.

There was a fair amount of distortion. I measured 0.45%, a very high figure, just below full output in the mid-band. This is probably due to lower feedback than usual, in an attempt to open out the sound. At these levels distortion may well add some coarseness to treble.

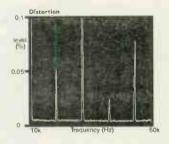
Both the CD input and the Phono input are band limited to 22kHz, to

reduce transient distortions. The disc stage reaches down to a low 6Hz but has a steep cut-off below this frequency. However, warps will still be a problem at

The Pucinni SE has high distortion. It may well benefit in some respects, but could also suffer too. It's best listened to carefully. NK

DENON 350SE

The Denon lacks tone controls but it has plenty of power, plus a good reputation. Denon's expertise shows in the phono stage, which at -79dB is very quiet. Low frequency response is extended, but not so far as to provide full gain for warps. Gain drops below 14Hz to reach -3dB at 8Hz. Accurate equalisation gives good tonal balance from LP.

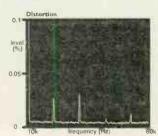
Power output measured 72W into 8Ω , rising to 110W into 4Ω . Bandwidth with CD was wide, distortion low and sensitivity normal at 200mV.

The Denon produces little distortion, even at high frequencies. Equal amounts of second and third harmonic are unlikely to be irritating.

The PMA-350SE is a well-honed design that measures well, but it is much simpler than effective rivals from Sony and Marantz, NK

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MARANTZ PM4000

Coming from an arm of Philips, I was not urprised the Marantz was the only ampliier to comply with European requirenents on disc stage equalisation. It has a warp filter that rolls off gain at exactly 10Hz, as specified by the IEC. It also had a roll-off above 40kHz. Equalisation across the audio band was accurate and noise low. The stage will give LP lighter sounding bass than most, but will suporess cone flap from warped discs.

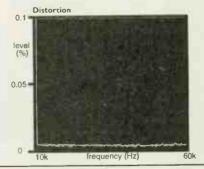
The CD input was also band limited, running from 7Hz to 34kHz. Steady-state distortion was just about non-existent at low power outputs, unusual in a solidstate amplifier. The Marantz will likely have clean and smooth sounding treble. Tone controls were well engineered,

having no effect out of their band of operation, whilst providing 10dB of lift and cut at spectrum extremes. Marantz fit a loudness button that applies a little bass and treble lift at low volumes only.

The PM4000 was neatly engineered, showing no weaknesses or peculiarities other than a fixed IEC warp filter on the phono input. NK

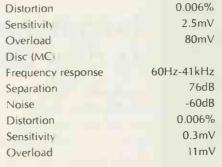

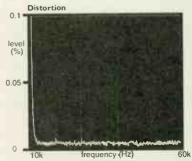
The A3 pre-amplifier has a switchable moving magnet (MM) or moving coil (MC) phono stage for vinyl lovers. The MM section had a very little hiss, less than most amplifiers, and the MC stage was quiet too, being close to the best. Ignore the dB figures, which look worse because of the large amounts of gain available; I'm talking equivalent input noise (e.i.n.), which takes gain and the volume control setting into account. The MC stage was sensitive at 0.3mV for full output, so this pre-amp will accomodate low output MCs. The only ambiguity was a difference in low frequency extension between MM (15Hz) and MC (60Hz). The latter is too high; it will result in perceptibly light bass.

The power amplifier produces a healthy 136W into 8Ω , rising to 225W into 4Ω . Regulation was excellent, something a choke can compromise it poorly specified. Distortion was minimal, even under the most difficult conditions.

The A3 CR is a powerful amplifier with a rine set of specifications. Choke regulation and low distortion give a sense of smoothness rare with solid-state. NK

The Onkyo produces a healthy 60W into 8Ω and 90W into 4Ω , plenty enough power to get high volume from any loudspeaker. There's some grunt too; the internal power supply is beefy.

Onkyo fit a capable phono stage, although it is 6dB hissier than the more sophisticated Denon and Rotel stages. The Onkyo has a lot of subsonic gain too, which will produce good subjective bass weight, the drawback being cone flap with warped records

Also fitted are well-engineered tone controls, plus a loudness control that's linked to volume level. Bass and treble boost decline as volume is wound up,

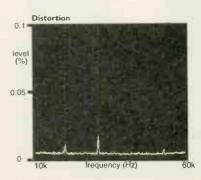

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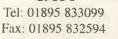
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PIONEER A-207R

The Pioneer A-207R has a buffered CD input that overloads at exactly 2V, producing 1.5% distortion - a peculiar and unusual problem. In practice music from CD peaks just below 2V and averages 1V or less so owners will not hear distortion. All the same it is a very poor specification. There's a line input that runs straight into the volume control, avoiding this problem.

Power output measured 50W into 8Ω and 81W into 4Ω , enough for good volume levels. Distortion levels were low, ignoring the CD headroom problem. The disc stage had low gain, input sensitivity measuring 4mV. There was very little hiss (e.i.n.), even taking low gain into account. Pioneer do not fit a warp filter so warped

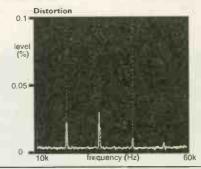
records will produce cone flap. Conversely bass will sound extended subiectively.

The tone controls were very carefully engineered, as was the loudness contour, which is volume related.

The A-207R worked well enough, although it does exhibit early input overload on CD. NK

ROTEL RA931

Rotel's RA-931 amplifier produces less power than many others in the group, turning out 50W into 8Ω and 72W into 4Ω . Distortion was low at just 0.005% in the midband, rising to 0.04% at high frequencies. There was a large rise to 0.3% into low loads, meaning the RA-931 will start to sound a little strained driving low impedance loudspeakers

The RA-931 has wide bandwidth through its CD input, measuring 9Hz-80kHz. Rotel have curtailed low frequency response through the equalised phono stage however, gain dropping -3dB at 11Hz. This is enough to provide a little warp suppression. Like the Denon, the Rotel was very quiet on phono, producing 6dB less hiss than the Onkyo for example.

Rotel fit an excellent set of tone controls, with over-ride switch. They produced lift only at extremes of the audio band, affecting the midband little.

This is a well designed amplifier, although it has more distortion than some rivals. This will not necessarily sound intolerable, but careful listening will be the only way to decide. NK

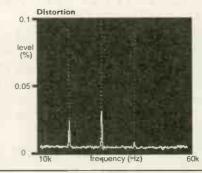

SONY TA-FB730R

The Sony has a large number of effective features. The tone controls worked very well, providing 10dB lift and cut at spectrum extremes. Switching them in by depressing an over-ride switch also makes available loudness compensation, which adds bass and treble lift at low levels. There's a subsonic filter too.

The filter cuts gain below 20Hz with CD and below 40Hz with LP, being a very effective warp filter that follows IEC requirements. Even without this, Sony roll down gain below 20Hz on the MM phono stage, so warped records will not be a problem with this amp. The phono stage was also unusually quiet, as well as sensitive. It measured very well in

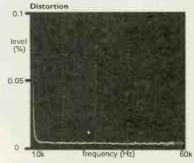
every respect.

The power amplifier produces 55W and Sony's use of MOSFETs allows plenty of feedback to be used at 20kHz, keeping high frequency distortion right down to just 0.007% at full output - a very low value. NK
