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Equine Rabies: Should You Be Concerned?

abies, an uncommon disease in Colorado, began a steep rise starting in 2008. The first case in a horse was confirmed in Douglas County in 2009 and a sharp increase in the number of cases in skunks has been noted in 2010. Just this month, there were reported cases in skunks in Adams, Arapahoe, Douglas and Elbert counties. It is this sudden increase in the disease that is causing health officials and veterinarians to recommend vaccination of horses.

If you look at a U.S. map of the distribution of skunk rabies, it seems to stop right at the eastern Colorado state border. That is not the case anymore. Positive skunk rabies cases have been documented in several eastern Colorado counties. The concern is that the virus is moving westward towards the Front Range of Colorado. Counties along the Front Range are more populous in people and horses and so there is a potential risk to humans, dogs, cats, livestock, and horses.

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

- In 2005, there were 44 positive cases of rabies; all of these positives were bats.
- In 2006, there were 70 cases of rabies in Colorado all bats, no skunk cases.
- From January 2007 through August 2008, there have been 18 positive cases of skunk rabies.
- Skunks are the most common species involved in the transmission of rabies virus to horses.

So what's the deal with rabies? Is there a need for concern?

Maybe not concern as much as proactive prevention.

- 1. The disease is fatal to mammals. In people, the disease is fatal unless treated.
- 2. If your horse gets rabies, and has NOT been vaccinated, it is fatal.
- 3. You must be treated if your horse gets rabies.
- 4. If a horse gets the disease from a skunk or bat, the horse can contaminate you while the horse is acting normal, before showing signs of the disease.
- 5. The incidence of rabies has increased considerably in Colorado over the past two years.
- 6. Two cases were confirmed in horses in 2009, 2010, none for 30 years prior.
- 7. This disease is moving into the West.
- 8. Although previously it was the bat most likely positive for rabies, in 2009 and 2010, it is the skunk, meaning it is much more likely the horse can get the disease.

Symptoms and Transmission

If an animal becomes infected with the virus, they may show no disease symptoms for several days, but during that time they can transmit the disease through saliva to other mammals. Although rare, a horse could be infected and yet be free of clinical signs, but still be able to transmit the virus through his saliva into a cut on your hand. This disease is fatal in all animals unless treated. There is no treatment for horses, but there is for humans. If horses are vaccinated, the chance of them getting the disease is very rare.

A horse with rabies will die. The virus infects the central nervous system, causing brain disease and ultimately death. Clinical signs are extremely varied from colic to difficulty swallowing, depression with loss of appetite, a low-grade fever, lameness and/or incoordination, other neurological symptoms including convulsions, increased sensitivity to being touched, abdominal pain (straining to urinate or defecate), odd behavioral changes, nervousness, irritability, muscle contractions and finally death.

Prevention and Control of Possible Infected Animals

Controlling and preventing skunks from coming into contact with your horses is one of the best ways to avoid contamination (see link below on skunk protocol). Beware of unusual behavior including: wild mammals that show no fear of people and pets; nocturnal animals that are active in daylight; and bats found on the ground, in swimming pools or that have been caught by a pet. Rabid carnivores, such as skunks, foxes, bobcats, coyotes, dogs and cats, may become aggressive and may attempt to bite people, pets and livestock.

If you observe a wild mammal acting strangely, especially a skunk, or if you find a dead skunk that isn't on your property, stay away from it. Strange behavior for a skunk would include being out and about during daytime hours, and possibly looking unkempt and uncoordinated. If you must remove a dead skunk on your property, wear rubber gloves or lift the carcass with a shovel or other tool, and double-bag it for the trash.

Don't feed wild animals or allow your pets around them. Be sure to teach children to stay away from wild mammals. Contact your veterinarian if your dog or cat is bitten or scratched by a wild animal such as a skunk, bat, fox or raccoon. If you suspect you've been exposed to rabies, contact your physician without delay.

One of a veterinarian's primary responsibilities is the protection of human health in relation to animals. Discuss rabies vaccination of your livestock with your veterinarian. Vaccination should be considered for horses and other equines, breeding livestock, dairy cattle or other high-value livestock, especially in areas of the state where skunks have been diagnosed with rabies.

Diagnosis and Vaccination

Diagnosis is difficult in the course of the infection because the symptoms can mimic many other diseases. Even if you suspect a skunk bite, examining your horse can be very difficult – the bite is extremely small and easily hidden by hair. Rabies in horses is fairly rare but it would seem after considering the recommendations of veterinarians, the incidence of wildlife rabies, and the course of the disease, the benefits of vaccinating horses for rabies may outweigh other potential reasons for not vaccinating horses in Colorado.

So should you vaccinate? YES! Because the disease is fatal, because you can get the disease from a horse who appears completely normal, and because rabies is preventable.

The vaccination is an intramuscular injection, and no stall rest or special care is required after receiving it. The vaccination for a horse is a one dose shot, once a year. The cost of vaccination from Colorado Equine Clinic is \$20.


The Merits of Showing (or Not)

was either blessed or cursed with the competition gene, I'm not sure which. It's been in my blood my whole life, and at 52, I'm pretty sure it's not going to magically disappear. Frankly, this character flaw, or whatever you want to call it, has not served me well in the show ring. I've had to learn to manipulate it and use it to my advantage in order to reach my goals, which are simply to move up the levels, become a better rider, enjoy the journey and the people and horses in it.

Now I understand that showing is not for everyone. Many people simply want to spend time with their horse and learn to ride without being judged by someone. Believe me, I totally get that and on several occasions I've even threatened to turn in the white gloves. The first time was after not scoring above a 48% for an entire weekend. I cried for a week. Then of course there were the two or three years that I couldn't get out of second level. That's what my husband called the "beers and tears" era.

Making the decision not to show takes off a lot of pressure, in fact, probably all of it. The flip-side is, if you don't enter the show ring you miss out on an extremely valuable learning tool. Showing helps develop your riding skills and evaluate those

skills against an established standard. It tells you if you're improving or just going around in the same circle year after year. It forces you to clarify your aids, practice mental and physical discipline while receiving information about the quality of your training. There's no hiding from yourself or anyone else in the show ring.

If you're an amateur like me, the trick is to develop the mindset that the only people that are invested in what you do in the ring is you, your coach (if you have one) and the judge. It's only between the three of you, and you should remember you are paying the other two for their services. They are there to support you and to help you and your horse get better. That's it. I know it's hard, but you can't care about anyone else.

Also, you have to remember that even though you are in the same class with other riders and somebody will be pinned first and somebody will be last, it really isn't a level playing field. We're all dealt such a different set of cards that it's not fair to compare yourself with other people. Some people have been riding and showing longer, some have horses that are more talented, some can't afford a coach, some have physical limitations and some are just trying to control the personal demons that have kept them out of the ring in the past. Your only concern should be whether or not things are getting better for you and your horse.

This was a tough lesson for me. Tired of watching me fight my competitive nature, my husband gave me the gift of working with Melissa Creswick for a month in California. A long time friend, "S" judge and clinician, Melissa went to work on my brain. She helped erase my fear and focus on being judged and in getting a good score. Instead, she helped me create the mental mantra that "I'm just in here schooling my horse...I'm just schooling my horse."

Between Melissa's mental and physical handiwork, and my coach Margo Gogan's training and support, I've managed to earn my bronze and silver medals and am two scores away from my gold. It's been a painful journey at times, trying to wrestle my competitive instincts to the ground. But I've loved the personal challenges, my wonderful horse Shaka Zulu and the camaraderie of our barn community.

So if you can learn to develop a mindset that works for you, you might just learn to love the smell of competition in the morning as much as I do.





Pilates for Dressage Clinic: The Gift To My Horse and Me That Keeps on Giving!

What a unique and fabulous clinic to focus on correcting my position! With most clinics I attend I am balancing my brain between videotaping riders, and trying to be a sponge and soak up new information. After understanding the format of this clinic through Adult Amateur Chair extraordinaire Lori Mitchell's fabulous organization and communication talents for these 2 ½ days, I made the difficult decision to call a few clients to say I was sorry but I would not be offering Pro Horse Production video services. What a treat to take this weekend to be an adult amateur totally focused on taking in this great information!

It takes so much time to put on these clinics! I was so grateful for what A/A Chair Lori had invested in setting up last year's body position clinic with Leslie O'Neal Olsen. This year she did just as fabulous a job communicating expectations, preparing us for what to bring and wear, sending a map of Cappaleigh Farm, and requesting a bio of ourselves and our horses to be shared with the auditors. Once I arrived at Cappaleigh Farm, I was greeted with a big smile from the farm owner who showed me where to park and my horse's stall, as head trainer Patty LeBlanc and her mom were busy with final barn preparations. If you've not been to Cappaleigh, it is an ideal place to host a clinic: SUPER friendly trainer and owners, fabulous sound system, beautiful tack room, and a special room with plenty of seating for a lecture. I even noticed a reformer where they host regular pilates classes!

Author and instructor Janice Dulak kicked off the clinic with an hour-and-a-half lecture on her background in Pilates complete with an overview of the muscle groups involved. She challenged us that as riders we have a responsibility to be fit so we can articulate our body to communicate with our horses. The lecture seemed well received by a cozy room full of amateurs and professionals, many of us with previous pilates experience. I just loved how she said she calls herself a tour guide to your body! I've been on my own field trip with dressage rider Georgia Burleson at Nizoni Center for Pilates and Health in Elizabeth for 3 years now. A car accident and inability to jump due to a back injury brought me to her studio, but what I was learning about how to use my body, and the improvements in my riding kept me coming back for more! I can truly say that after 30 years of riding, it's been the pilates work on the reformers that has finally taught me how to use my leg aids independently as I feel my "core" muscles stabilize my body. I've experienced in just weeks of this work improved balance, symmetry, and as Georgia has said through the years, "power through softness" as I ride. With all I've learned in my 1 hour a week with Georgia, I was eager to spend an entire weekend submersed in this topic and learn even more about this discipline that has done so much for my riding!

This clinic incorporated 2 hours of "mat work" on Saturday and Sunday mornings under the watchful eye of Sarah Martin, Janice, and one of Janice's friends – a former dance teacher of hers. Janice and Sarah deepened my understanding of pilates related to riding as they described the muscles we were feeling during the mat exercises to what we should feel in the saddle!

One of the favorite nuggets I came away with was why we need to use our core muscles when we ride. Having a strong core that supports the movement of the horse's body is aligned with the main goal of giving our horses "one thing to carry on their backs." If we are not strong in our core, with all the movement our horses provide in their gaits, our horses are going to feel riders trying to find balance through their hands, shoulders, elbows, and possibly off-balance seat bones. Too much movement in our body will muddle up the non-verbal communication we have with our horse. Using our core to stabilize our bodies makes communication exponentially easier for our horses to clearly feel when we change our weight in a seat bone to communicate a leg-yield, shoulder-in, or halfpass.

As I was struggling to do some of the mat exercises, it was very powerful to imagine for a moment how our horses work so hard to understand what we are asking them to do! My horse is trying to lift his core – AND ME – on his back! And how much more complicated I make his carrying and movement if my body is shifting out of balance in my seat, my arms, my knees, my legs, and my head! I'm telling you – my Irish TB event horse I rode for the 8 years before pilates is an absolute saint for putting up with me!

I loved how Janice gave me a visual comparison between the beauty of a talented dance couple – we love to watch the grace of the woman dancing around the floor – and it's her strong partner that allows her to be so elegant. She said that that's what we want to be as riders – so people enjoy watching the

beauty of our horse move. But unlike a solid dance floor our floor (our horse) is always moving! The discipline of pilates gives the "how" to promote good posture. Better Seat equals Better Posture, and Better Posture equals a Better Seat. Most exercise programs don't offer anything for posture. Through pilates and our strong core and trunk muscles, we can enjoy better balance in our musculature and around joints, which allows us to fine tune our aids to our horse. During my private session with Sarah Martin, she helped me take another step forward in correcting my years of crookedness when riding to the right by telling me to think of my spine as a barber shop pole and my shoulders just turned to the inside around it as I made my circles to the right. The icing on the cake happened less than a week later when my trainer Gwen Ka'awaloa came to my place to give me a lesson and she said several times how she could not believe the improvement in my seat. She said she wished all of her students could invest in this clinic!

If you missed this opportunity Janice is coming back to Colorado later this summer for a few weeks, including a full three day clinic at Sarah's farm in Blanca, Colorado. 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Trainer Spotlight: Kelly (O'Leary) Boyd

e've all heard it. There are no shortcuts in dressage, but one of the most certain routes to deepening your skills, to becoming a more effective rider, is to spend time on the lunge line. This idea had filtered through my mind on occasion as I began a midlife transition to dressage, but it was Janet Foy's comments during the 2009 Judges' Continuing Education session that shoved me off my stoop of ambivalence to stride purposefully toward regular lunge lessons. Janet shared much wisdom that day and several times spoke about

Our year-and-a-half, to date, on the lunge line, which I've done predominantly on her horse Opus, has expanded and accelerated my understanding of this magnificent endeavor called dressage. Kelly started by assessing where my weaknesses were, using very effective exercises to isolate my upper body from my lower body, disassembling my seat, from my legs, from my hands. She instantly evaluated that my legs were a block which didn't allow my seat to act independently.

the critical importance of developing an influential seat, about what is evident in the horse's movement when that is present and when it is not. I went headlong in search of a lunge teacher. The only person I found who is both deeply experienced teaching lunge lessons and truly enjoys it, was Kelly.

Kellv an impressive has USand German-based training, clinic, and show resume. She has trained with Jan Ebeling, Sue Halasz and Scott Hassler. She has cliniced with Steffen Peters, Susan Jacoma, Leslie Webb, Michael Klimke, Axel Steiner,



We worked on lunge exercises like knee lifts, scissors, frog (you can just imagine!), adding punching, juggling, rope climbing, windmills, backstroke and many other forms of giggleinducing torture (for me) entertainment and (for her), all at the walk, trot and canter. Never did I feel silly or stupid. Kelly is a natural cheerleader who encourages you to correctly execute the exercise and voilà, like a key in a lock, she is able to isolate and dismantle blocked parts and reassemble them into a better coordinated and more effective whole.

Andras Szieberth, Siegfried Winkler, Randall Moore and Larry Fleming. She is two scores away from her USDF Gold Medal. Kelly studies dressage actively. She reads, researches, and listens to books-on-tape as she drives to lessons and clinics. Kelly has a steel-trap mind that retains masters' teachings, which she incorporates to support the needs of her students and their horses.

Kelly is perhaps best known for her partnership with JB Andrew, "Andy," who she rode from Training Level to Grand Prix, placed nationally at all levels shown, and who was the first Mustang to reach the FEI levels. Andy is not only the first horse to be inducted into the Wild Horse and Burro Foundation's Hall of Fame, he has his very own Breyer model!

All this, and she is authentically enthusiastic about taking me (no pedigree whatsoever!) back to the core principles of effective riding.

I've actually become much better at these exercises over time, an indication of developing the right muscle groups in balance, but the real magic is what it has done to my partnership with my horse. Because my lessons have not just been about working on the lunge line – Kelly is always talking about the training pyramid, about the goal of harmony between horse and rider, about illuminating the balance between being as subtle and gentle as possible but knowing when to be quietly firm - she has created easy pathways to reveal what sometimes feels mystical about dressage. While I do the equivalent of patting my head and rubbing my stomach through various exercises, Kelly is surreptitiously teaching me about timing. She has an uncanny ability to create fun and distraction from the sometimes body- and mind-gripping, self-imposed pressure of seeking dressage prowess, to help break through to the joys of improvement. Kelly can accurately read if something is not making sense, and come at it as many different ways as necessary to keep you relaxed and waiting for it not only to connect in your mind, but in your body. The number of "ahha" moments she has illuminated for me are innumerable. I have fun, I learn, my confidence has deepened, I take new understanding home to my mare, and she is happy.

Kelly keeps notes following every lesson, systematically planning for our next one. Just when I think I have something down, she'll challenge me and the horse by doing the exercise over cavalletti or low jumps. I have seen her work with mares and sensitive, complex horses in training with her, and these fairly talented horses grow mentally and physically, transforming into willing, huge-hearted, happy partners.

My initial plan was to do lunge lessons for a year. I know now that there is a lifetime of key-in-a-lock discoveries lunge lessons can deliver. With Kelly, that path will include plenty of warm encouragement and good-natured insistence on adherence to the classical principles.

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
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
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
