Region 4 Stanley Saxton Seedling Award

Request for Seedlings

The Finger Lakes Daylily Society (FIELDS) invites Region 4 hybridizers to submit their most promising unregistered daylily seedlings to compete for the 2022 Stanley Saxton Seedling Award. These plants will be featured in a Stanley Saxton Seedling Award bed at the 2022 Region 4 meeting to be held in the greater Rochester area in midJuly 2022. The regional will be hosted by FIELDS. Specific dates and details, including tour and open gardens of the 2022 summer meeting, will be announced later in 2021.

What follows is a summary of the key points from that web page.

The Stanley Saxton Seedling Award was first proposed by the Hudson-Adirondack Daylily Society as a means of focusing increased attention on R4 hybridizing. The intent is to identify high-quality seedlings that perform well in the growing conditions found in R4.

The award is for the best unregistered seedling seen growing at the yearly regional meeting. All seedlings will be planted in one location in one tour garden for easy evaluation and to ensure that all have the same growing conditions. Seedlings from purchased seed are not eligible, nor are purchased seedlings.

All seedlings will be grown under number with no hybridizer or name on the label. No pollen will be taken, nor will pods be set during the plant's stay in the guest garden. Flower scapes will be removed the season before the regional to encourage increase. The winner will be decided by the votes of those attending the regional meeting. After the meeting, plants will be returned to the hybridizer unless the hybridizer opts to auction them or donate them.

How to Submit Your Seedlings

First, please notify Jane Ryan---by phone or text at the number shown below, or e-mail---BEFORE you send her anything so she knows what to expect and when.

Each hybridizer may submit one or two unregistered seedlings for the competition bed. They must be shipped bareroot, sent by USPS Priority shipping or Fed Ex or UPS to Jane at the address below.

Each seedling shipped should have at least two (2) fans but may have no more than five (5) fans. Be sure to label your seedling(s) with your identifying number and include a brief description, especially the height. This will help ensure that mini and short seedlings are planted where they can best be seen.

Some seedlings were received and planted in the fall of 2020 based on our open invitation sent at that time. However, there is still PLENTY of room for more entries. Those received this spring will still have a full year to grow and acclimate.

Please send your seedlings to arrive on or after May

1, 2021. If the ground is still frozen (!), they will be heeled in until they can be properly planted. If you have any questions, please let me know. We look forward to hosting your seedlings and seeing you at the 2022 Regional in Rochester!



Conducting both the regional business meeting and the garden judge workshop are in keeping with AHS policy and procedure.





Celebrating the Society's Diamond Anniversary – our 75th

A look back at the journey of Elliot Turkiew - one of our members in AHS

This year the AHS is celebrating its 75th anniversary and as I've looked back through our history, I found this anecdote that will take you back to the 2006 National Convention. That convention was hosted by our friends in the Long Island Daylily Society.

2006 was the first National Convention that LIDS youth member, Elliot Turkiew attended. How great that it was right in his own backyard! He wrote an article about his experiences in the *Day-lily Journal* and I'd like to share a little bit of it with you.

Elliot wrote, "why do I enjoy being such an active member of LIDS and AHS? One of the main reasons is that I am never treated as a kid. In my club, I feel like I have been recognized for what I can do and trusted with responsibilities like an adult member might be. I also like how people respect my knowledge of daylilies and often ask my opinions. I enjoy the mentoring of more experienced members but like to think that I can hold a conversation comfortably and ask relevant questions" (Volume 61, Number 4, pl. 407).

At that 2006 National Convention, Elliot won the Christine Erin Stamile Award. He was awarded the Mabel Matthews Scholarship in 2010, 2011, and 2019. He continues to be involved in Region 4 as Exhibition Judges Liaison and Youth Liaison.

Labeling on landscape photos: Garden name/owner name, your name.jpg

Cultivar names need not be capitalized.

Use digital photography software sparingly when editing your images; please do not make alterations to your original images other than to crop or make subtle color corrections. Please do not put borders around images.

An independent panel of three judges will consider all entries and select the winning photos. AHS Region 4 Garden Judge Liaison

Shortly after the annual Fall Board meeting of the American Hemerocallis Society, the new Stout Medal Winning Daylily / Hybridizer is announced I am not sure whether the winner is the daylily or the hybridizer, but the award and the acclaim go to the hybridizer! We daylily afficionados eagerly anticipate this announcement every year.

The AHS Board does not choose the winner. The winner is voted by members of the society who have taken the opportunity to become garden judges. This process is the part of the AHS Awards and Honors Program where any AHS member can attend a couple of workshops, and qualify to serve as one of the electors voting daylilies through the awards program. If you have been a member of the organization two years and your dues are paid up, you to can take part in the fun!

Yes, there is a commitment.

- You need to get out and see daylilies regularly, 25 gardens in five years' time.
- You need to attend regional and or national conventions on occasion.
- You need to grow a nice selection of daylilies in your garden.
- The first workshop is a classroom PowerPoint followed by a brief exam to show your commitment. This workshop can be taken as an online course from time to time, or taught in a classroom setting by a qualified instructor.
- The second workshop must take place in an actual garden where you will practice a system of point scoring daylilies. If you complete both workshops successfully, complete the next steps:
- You will need to apply for a five-year garden judgeship, and you will need to renew your credentials your-self once every five years by attending an additional in-garden worship as a refresher. The program is not for a hybridizer who only wants to vote for their own daylilies.
- You will need to get out, and travel to other gardens, to see, and talk, daylilies, with others.
- It is important that you acquire a copy of the publication 'Judging Daylilies in the Garden" which can be ordered from Amzaon.com, or downloaded free from the AHS Portal.
- It is suggested you read through it before taking your first workshop.

We are fortunate here in Region 4 to have at least ten garden judging instructors throughout the region, and each can arrange to offer either workshop. If you would rather attend 'Workshop 1' online, contact the AHS Judges Education Chair Debbie Smith, whose contact information appears in the AHS Journal. The Region 4 instructors are noted in the list of Region 4 Garden Judges appearing elsewhere in this issue.

A Central Massachusetts Garden—by Elisabeth Murphy

Soon I joined the New England Daylily Society and learned about the Stout Medal Winners. I started to collecting them too and now have the complete series in my garden. It is always amazing to hear from my visitors that nobody knows about the Stout Medal Winners, but are immediately interested in them. I have started to hybridize daylilies, but have not registered anything. It is however a lot of fun to see the first blooms of my crossings every year. I hope to open my garden again this year with less anxiety and lots of fun. Stay safe and healthy!

Region 4 Hybridizer Award Nominations

The nominating process for this award is controlled by the hybridizer, much like the AHS Honorable Mention award. Every eligible hybridizer in Region 4 may enter ONE of his/her registrations.

Official guidelines:

Each hybridizer residing in Region 4 may nominate one of his/her cultivars in a given year.**

Eligible cultivars must have been hybridized in Region 4, registered with the AHS within the last ten years (including the year in which nominated) and been introduced by a hybridizer still residing, or deceased while residing, in Region 4.

(Nomination of a cultivar on behalf of a deceased Region 4 hybridizer may be made by the Awards Committee.)

A cultivar may be nominated for up to three consecutive years and then becomes ineligible.

A winning cultivar may not be re-entered.

**The hybridizer who wins is not eligible to enter this contest again in the next three calendar years.

Only Region 4 AHS members are eligible to vote and they may vote once for a single cultivar on the ballot.

All votes must be cast by October 1st, 2021

Announcement of the winning cultivar will be made on the Region 4 website. A photograph of both the cultivar and hybridizer will appear in the next issue of Daylilies in the Great Northeast.

The award shall be presented at the following Regional summer meeting and shall consist of an engraved plate or plaque containing the name of the cultivar, its registration date and the name of its hybridizer.

All AHS members are permitted to vote. One vote per member.




