

ST. PETERSBURG IS '38 CONVENTION SITE

May 26th-28th

N OW IT CAN BE TOLD! This year's annual convention of the American Air Mail Society is to be held at St. Petersburg, Florida on the week-end immediately preceding Memorial Day, namely Thursday to Saturday May 26-28.

For weeks the Committee on Choice of Convention City has been considering the important matter of time and place of the Annual Convention. Its recommendation has now received the unanimous approval of the Board of Officers.

As discussed in a recent article, invitations were received from a number of cities. These sincere and much appreciated bids were carefully canvassed by the Committee in the full knowledge that whatever the choice, there would be a large measure of disappointment among the backers of those cities not chosen. The Society sends its thanks and appreciation to these cities and hopes that their invitations may be renewed at some future date. It is only fair to say that the warmth and enthusiasm of the St. Petersburg invitation somehow per-

meated the Committee members themselves and they report the expectation of one of the finest conventions yet held. A large majority of the post card preferences sent in favored the chosen city and the officers feel certain that their action represents the choice of the membership.

This will be the first Convention held in the far South. As such it should attract a large number of our members who have never had the opportunity to attend a Society Convention. We are also assured that many of our "regular attendants" plan to make the trip, this advance notice giving them ample time to make their summer plans.

We are assured, by those who know, that the weather is ideal in St. Petersburg at the chosen time. The average temperature for the month of May is 78 degrees and the cool breezes of the Gulf of Mexico are always in evidence. The flowers are in full bloom and the well known attractions of the Florida West Coast are in full swing, including deep water fishing for those who can "take it."

Our host at St. Petersburg will be the newly formed Branch Chapter of which York Briddell is President and Chairman of the Arrangement Committee. This Club will be actively assisted by all other Philatelic Clubs and club members in St. Petersburg. An open competitive exhibition of air mail stamps and covers will be held and it is expected that entries will be received from a large number of collectors. An announcement concerning this will be made at a later date.

The chosen date is particularly happy in that the Sunday and Monday following the closing day are both holidays permitting their use for traveling. A number of Convention visitors will doubtless plan side trips either before or after to other points of Florida, to Cuba, to Bahamas, to Gulf of Mexico points and to Mexico itself all of which are easily and speedily accessible.

"SANTA CLAUS" AIR MAIL

A lonely island, Fair Isle, in the north Atlantic, which gives its name to well known knitting products, benefited for the first time in its history by the arrival of an aeroplane on Christmas Eve. This special flight was made to take toys for the children on the island and the pilot alighted dressed as Santa Claus. A small unofficial mail was also carried but this bears adequate postmarks proving this flight. It is of interest to note that the arrangements for the flight could not be made until the last moment, as it is possible for an aeroplane to alight only when the wind is consistenly in one direction.

Another mail of special interest was the first mail-carrying flight between Aberdeen in Scotland and Lerwick, the capital of the Shetland Islands, an isolated group to the far north of Scotland. One special mail was carried during an emergency when, owing to stormy conditions, no mail boat had been able to call for several days. The first flight of this new regular service was inaugurated on November 23rd, 1937.—F. J. Field.

Baltimore-Bermuda

Pan AMERICAN AIRWAYS, pioneer fliers of oceans and continents, has been awarded the United States government contract for the official Baltimore-Bermuda service.

The first flight is scheduled to depart from Baltimore for Hamilton Wednesday, March 16, at 9:30 a, m.

Covers will be carried.

The air mail rate is 10 cents per half ounce.

The company is operating twice a week between Baltimore and Hamilton, leaving Baltimore Wednesday and Friday of each week and flying to Bermuda in about 6½ hours.

The post office department, cooperating with PAA and aero-philatelists, is arranging to handle first flight covers. A special cachet will be placed on all articles dispatched by the postmaster at Baltimore on the first flight. The postmaster at Hamilton will backstamp first flight covers and forward them by ordinary (steamer) means to the addressees.


For the first flight senders in country may address covers to themselves or to other persons at destinations in the United States or elsewhere, and send such covers with U. S. stamps affixed, in containers to the postmaster at Baltimore for mailing. Senders outside the United States may enclose their covers unstamped, accompanied by a postal money order of appropriate form, and made payable to the postmaster, Baltimore, Maryland. Covers should be sent in time to reach Baltimore not later than March 15. Arrangements have not been completed with the British Postal Administration for dispatch of mails on return flights by PAA planes. An early announcement regarding this is hoped for.

Stamp Cuts Legal

When and if the United States post office department issues one or more new air mail stamps, or envelopes they can be fully illustrated in The Airpost Journal, likewise in other philatelic publications of the nation.

Ordinary U. S. stamps—all postal adhesives in fact—are covered in the illustrations bill, sent to President Franklin D. Roosevelt, America's No. 1 philatelist, for his signature. Enactment of the measure by Congress followed years of agitation for a liberalized stamp law per-

mitting black and white reproductions of U. S. postage stamps. President Roosevelt has signed the measure.

Estimates are that 750 American dailies, weeklies and Sunday newspapers now carry stamp columns, in addition to the several straight philatelic publications in the field.

This new law will be of much value to The Airpost Journal and similar mediums, since it will permit the creating and use of attractive cuts and layouts to accompany articles, thereby greatly enhancing their attractiveness and news interest.

According to the regulation of the Treasury Department illustrations may be made either three-quarters or less than original size, or one and one-half or more times original size.



The Cairo-Baghdad Air Route

A Great Accomplishment in Pioneer Aviation.

T WAS FIRST determined in Cairo to operate the Cairo-Baghdad air route in March, 1921 at a conference of The Colonial Secretary of State (British), Chief of Air Staff, local British Army and Air Force Commanders. It was inaugurated by the Royal Air Force, but later became a commercial enterprise of Imperial Airways. The reasons given for the project, quoting Leslie S. Potter, Captain Royal Air Force are:

- A link in chain of communications between Europe and India, and later Australia.
- A line of rapid reinforcement from Egypt, or Palestine, to Iraq, both aircraft and personnel.
- A means of rapid communication by regular air service.
- 4. A form of training in long-distance flying.

Actual flights started in August 1921,

by the Royal Air Force on a bi-weekly schedule. The mail rate was 25 mil for letters of 20 grammes weight. The rate was changed to 27 milliemes some time prior to March 1926. This charge, or surtax, was in addition to the regular fee for ordinary postage.

Previously the 600 miles between Baghdad and Beyrout were traversed in 48 hours in Cadillac cars. Because of restless, wandering tribes of Bedouins the trip was hazardous—many shootings, robberies and murders in spite of the armoured car patrol of the Royal Air Force in territory under British jurisdiction. After the survey for this air route, two gasoline tanks of 600 gallons capacity were placed near two of the "mud flats" of the Syrian Desert. One was 179 miles from Baghdad and the other 457 miles.

The route was over diversified terran—first the intense cultivations of Egypt, then the sandy wastes of Palestines and over the mountainous regions of TransJordania, and the completely barren stretches of the Syrian desert; from 3,350 feet above sea level to 1,300 feet below sea level while crossing the Dead Sea.

First planes used were single-engined DeHaviland 9-A's, with 400 H. P. Libertys; then various Vickers planes, the

Vimy, the Vernon and later the Victoria, were used exclusively. Mail was almost always landed at Cairo but sometimes taken to Alexandria—180 miles farther.

Planes carried only 71/2 hours fuel, as the temperature, often as high as 120° in the shade, would not permit full loads. The Vickers-Victoria had two 500 H. P. engines, 2 pilots, 1 mechanic, 1 radio operator, 6 passengers and up to 500 lbs. of mail. Each passenger was allowed 50 pounds of luggage. The water situation was acute, so only two gallons was carried for each person. Extra plane parts were always carried but seldom had to be used. A radio mast and hand generator was on each plane for messages if forced to land, Baghdad to Ziza is 543 miles and from Ziza to Cairo 383 miles. The full trip was made usually in one day of 10 to 13 hours but not always in one hop because of retarding winds and resort to emergency tanks.

Imperial Airways took over the Mail Service on January 1, 1927 flying De-Haviland-Hercules tri-motored Jupiterengined planes and operated the first twelve months with 100% efficiency.

From December 31st, 1926 (or January 1st, 1927) to April 1927 the Imperial Airways extended and maintained the ser-

vice fortnightly to Basra. For the following year, 45 flights were made Cairo to Basra and 44 return flights, the total mail being 32,122 pounds. In 1928 the planes had an average of 61% of capacity and 99.37% of schedules completed. About the first of April, the Imperial again extended the line from Basra to Karachi as part of the weekly England to India air route. From London to Karachi the passenger, mail and express transport service was complete, making the trip in six days, five hours.

Thus was born the main link of the renouned England to Australia air line; for once the route was established to India, it was but a matter of further extensions until the regular air service was made available over the longest route in the world.

On March 10th, 1926 Egypt issued a postage stamp of 27 Milliemes to prepay the air fee on letters carried over this route from Cairo to Baghdad. In deep purple this stamp depicts a Royal Air Force DeHaviland 9-A plane with 400 H. P. Liberty motor in flight over what may well be the Nile Later, on July 25th, 1929, the color of the stamp was changed to brown. Both printings were by "Survey of Egypt."

While there are not many new issues for chronicle this month those few that have appeared are of interest • CANARY ISLANDS • Reversing the lineup we have the surcharge "Canarias-(Value)-Correo Aereo" in red, blue, and purple respectively. Values are: 50c. on 1c. green (Estado Espanol); 80c on 2c. brown (same type); and Pts. 1.25 on 10c green (El Cid). The 50c. is imperforate. Likewise we also have three high values: a "plus 2.30" on 60c. yellow GREEN overprint; a "plus 2.50" on 50c. blue in GREEN; and a "plus 5pts." on 1 pts. blue in BROWN al tihree on Isabela type stamp.

• COSTA RICA • As mentioned last month the other four values of the National Exposition issue came a little later and bear the imprint of English firm Waterlow & Sons, Ltd. These stamps are the 1c. Violet, 3c orange, 10c red, and 75c. sepia. For a common design they show the National Bank Building.

● ECUADOR ● February 22, 1938, Washington's birthday, was to have been the date of the release of the U. S. Constitution set according to latest advices. This set was promised last Fourth of July, then Sept. 17, Constitution day. We must merely wait and see.



Stop Press—As we go to press we are able to illustrate through the courtesy of Mr. Kessler, the new Ecuador Constitution set, which has just appeared. Further details on colors and values will be chronicled in our next issue.

• ITALIAN EAST AFRICA As was surmised last month there will be an airmail set for this newly formed political division of the Italian Empire. What were formerly known as Eritrea, Ethiopia, and Italian Somaliland will now bear the wording on their stamps which means Italian East Africa.

Values of the new set will be: 25c., 50c., 60c., 75c., 1L, 1.50L, 2L, 3L, 5L, and 10L. There will also be two special delivery airmails in 2L and 2.50L denominations.

• NICARAGUA • For the 75th Anniversary of the Post Office we have two sheets of four values each both perf. and imperf. All are lithographed and have the central portrait photoed in the design.

The sheet for INTERIOR service contains a 1c. orange, 5c. purple, 8c blue, and 16c. brown all bearing a view of General Tomas Martinez colored grey.

The sheet for the EXTERIOR is comprised of a 10c. green, 15c. light blue, 25c. purple, and 50c. red all bearing a

view of General Divisionario Somoza, The performation is 11. All bear the dates "1862-1937."

• PANAMA • In what appears to be a still more attractive miniature souvenir sheet than any which has before been issued, Panama has just released its airpost sheet for the commemoration of the Fourth Olympic Games for Central America. Five and one-half inches square,

the truly glittering sheet was produced by Harrison&Sons, Ltd., Printers of London. The face value of the five stamps represented is 33 cents, and with the added 2 cents surtax makes the tace of the sheet 35 cents. The coat of arms of the Republic of Panama, reproduced in the center of the sheet in six colors, is surrounded by five stamps in as many colors all depicting Olympic athletes. Lettering of fourteen Central American countries is done by the offset process in gold, together with an all-around bleed border in gold.

Reading from top left to right, the first stamp shown on the sheet is the 1 cent carmine, basketball player; the 2 cents green depicts a baseball player; the fifteen cents blue a soccer player; the 7 cents grey (in the lower half) a swimmer; and the 8 cents brown two boxers in the ring.

The same five stamps have also been issued individually.

< 1938 Convention

FOR THE FIRST TIME in the history of the American Air Mail Society the annual meeting and convention will be held in the deep South. After a poll of the membership, officers recently voted to accept the cordial invitation of St. Petersburg, Florida where a new branch chapter of the AAMS was already being organized and will sponsor the 1938 convention at that city May 26, 27 and 28.

Augmenting the decision of the society officers was the fact that it has been advisable to alternate the national meeting places of the group as much as is possible and practical. Several meetings

have been held in the east and the middle west. It is hoped the convention can be held in the far west within the next several years, giving members in all parts of the country a better opportunity to attend without maximum expense.

The Society is most thankful and appreciative of the numerous convention invitations received through chapters, members and civic groups. We hope to again consider many of the cities for future meetings.

ON TO ST. PETERSBURG

PLACE AND DATE, already set, members and interested collectors have nearly three months to plan to attend the St. Petersburg convention. We have a most

active new chapter now functioning in the Sunshine City and our officers are receiving regular reports on the progress of plans for the convention entertainment program, which promises to be among the most attractive and enjoyable ever prepared for our meetings. Make arrangements now to come to St. Petersburg and advise Secretary Angers in advance that you will be with us this year. Further details on the convention will be found in another part of this issue.

U. S. STAMP ILLUSTRATIONS

FOLLOWING years of controversy and defeat it is now finally legal to illustrate United States postage stamps in this country, with a few technical restrictions. The success of the bill, which was the result of much effort on the part of AAMS member William M. Stuart, passed the Congress and was signed by the president within the last several weeks. The Treasury department prepared regulations specified which were signed and approved by President Roosevelt on February 17, making that the first day on which the illustrations could be legally published in the newspapers and periodicals of this country.

We are informed the specifications for illustration provide the likeness be either three quarters or less in size than the original, or one and one-half times or more greater than the original in linear measurement. These sizes should not prove a hardship on publishers and we feel very happy to present this news of another great step forward in the more cordial and mutual understanding between government and collector.

In our next issue we hope to have a detailed account of the drafting and final passage of this bill from Mr. Stuart.

The United States airpost stamp illustrations used in this issue of the Journal are loaned through the courtesy of F. W. Kessler, and represent the initial publication of reproductions of our stamps in this magazine.

AIRPOSTS ON THE AIR
THE "CALLING ALL STAMP COLLEC-

THE "CALLING ALL STAMP COLLECTORS" program over the NBC Red network on Saturday, February 19 at 5:30 o'clock featured L. B. Gatchell, past president of the AAMS, and one of the world's most prominent airpost collectors. Interviewed by Robert Lincoln Graham, Mr. Gatchell told of the development of the air mail service, plus many interesting facts and experiences of airpost stamp and cover collecting. The broadcasts are featured through the cooperation of the National Federation of Stamp Clubs and are scheduled every Saturday afternoon at the same time. Well known philatelists are presented each week.

Ernest A. Kehr, New York newspaper man, has also devoted considerable time to philatelic radio work in recent months and has done much to help spread the word of the fascination of airposts.

SANABRIA'S AIR POST NEWS FREE TO APJ READERS

Sanabria's Air Post News, to be issued quarterly in 1938, beginning in March, will carry data on Air Post Stamps to supplement the 1938 Standard Catalogue of Air Post Stamps, and will be sent free to readers of this paper, by request on their part. The March issue will carry several "stories" on Air Post Stamps in addition to the data on New Stamps and Price Revisions.

BRITISH HONDURAS FIRST INTERNAL AIR MAILS

Until August 17, 1937, no mails had been flown between any two points in the British Honduras, but on that date a local operating company inaugurated an official service between the capital, Belize, and Cayo. A total of 129 letters was flown to Cayo, and 91 letters on the return trip to Belize. No special postmarks or cachets were used, and the flat rate was 3 cents, Coronation stamps being most generally used for franking. The mails were backstamped on arrival, on the same date.

Of these small mails, less than 30 have been traced from each terminus as, of course, aero-philately is almost unknown in that country. —F. J. Field.

A Review

Standard Catalogue of Airpost Stamps

STANDARD CATALOGUE OF AIRPOST STAMPS (8th Ed. 1938) Published by Nicolas Sanabria, Inc. @ \$2.00 Cloth bound and \$4 DeLuxe. Messrs. Nicolas Sanabria and Harry M. Konwiser co editors.

At first glance there does not seem to be much change between this edition and the one issued last year but further investigation shows the error of superficiality. Shall we says the "Rough Spots" have been polished and the whole made a more complete and finished product?

Aside from the mere statistics such as numbers of new issues added to last year's effort we note the following to be outstanding. The insertion of first day cover check list for U. S. Airmail stamps. The further listing of Air Mail Stationery under the proper countries. And finally the addition of several necessary improvements.

New countries listed are: Andorra, Canary Islands, French Equatorial Africa, Manchukuo, and Spanish Morocco.

A new corner in the semi-officials is an item under Portugal issued for a New York-Lisbon flight which ended in failure in Brazil.

The Lempira issues of Honduras are straightened out fairly well and the collector should have no trouble hereafter. The Ecuador U. S. Constitutional set is listed. Both the Spanish and Canary Islands issues are clearly defined and well illustrated. Collectors who have waited will now have a chance to rearrange these particular sections of their collections to advantage.

All of the Turkish Aviation Day stamps are given catalogue numbers and the wise collector who went after them some time ago can now sit back and relax well paid for his trouble.

The subject of prices is a moot question. No matter what is said about them there is always the other side to give

argument. However a few observations are pertinent. Most all of the Italian and Italian colonies issues are "off". This also holds true for some of the French issues. This is simply a reflection of monetary conditions. Both the Lira and the Franc have dropped considerably during the past year and it is only common sense that stamps bearing their valuation in terms of those currencies should reflect the downward trend. Coilectors who are small enough to haggle about higher catalogue values in spite of external circumstances will do well to reconcile themselves to their fate. It is well to keep in mind the remark in the "Foreward" that: "It is our purpose to present a Specialized Catalogue for collectors of Air Post Stamps to the point of usefulness in stamp detail, as also to the current market prices."

The publishers have shown much acumen in treating the Italian issues as they did rather than sitting idly by and closing one eye to a condition that is known thruout the stamp world.

May we make one suggestion for a future issue of this book?

Why not list, under a special section at the end of the book, all postal stationery as issued by the various governments? It would not be too much trouble. we feel, to reuse some of the cuts illustrative of the designs under their proper heading and list the denominations in their proper order. There are quite a number of items of interest that would benefit by such listing. Harking back to the "Foreward" we quote. "-as this Catalogue is aimed to be all embracing in its relation to the Air Post Stamps of the world," Surely Postal stationery plays a distinct part in this category Mr. Heartwell once listed a number in the Airpost Journal.

There is no reason why the beginner, the amateur, the dyed-in-the-wool, and the old-timer need be without this excellent little book.

Rate Changes To Produce New Varieties

One of the agreements reached by the participating countries in the recent Pan American Postal Union Congress is of interest to collectors of aerial adhesives.

It provides that ONLY the actual sum paid to the aviation companies is to be the airmail charge.

Therefore, since February 1, 1938, the postal rates on all mail must be paid in postal stamps and the surtax for the company in airmail stamps. This is the present system used in Colombia.

For example a letter of 5 grams or less to be flown from—say Caracas, Venezuela to the United States would take 45 centimos in airs and 25c, in postals.

With this new plan in operation a host of new airmail stamps will be the most certain result. The 21 members of the Pan American Union will of necessity have to issue them for a twofold reason. The first and most important is because of the change-lower-in rate; and second because of the new dual system. A good many new values must be provided.

To date it seems apparent that the United States is not interpreting the decree in the manner of the signatores of the agreement.

For example you go to any U. S. postoffice and mail a letter to Venezuela and the clerk will hand you a 25 cents stamp, provided it weighs a half ounce or less, and you paste it on the letter and that is all. If the postal official acted according to the provision of the pact he would have to hand you two stamps, one for the postage rate and the other for the air fee.

Our rates were lowered December 1, 1937, to the following schedule:

There will be no change in rates where the postage has heretofore been ten cents—the minimum postage to any country being ten cents per half ounce.

Air mail rates per half ounce on articles addressed to the countries indicated, will be reduced as follows:

From 15c to 12c per half ounce: Guatemala, Honduras, British Honduras, El Salvador, Nicaragua.

From 20c to 15c per half ounce: Costa Rica, Canal Zone, Panama, Leeward Islands, Guadeloupe, Martinique, Windward Islands, Barbados, Trinidad.

From 30c to 25c per half ounce: Venezuela, Curacao and adjacent Dutch Islands of Aruba and Bonaire.

From 40c to 30c per half ounce: Peru. From 40c to 35c per half ounce: Bo-

From 50c to 40c per half ounce: Chile and Brazil.

From 55c to 40c per half ounce: Argentine, Uruguay and Paraquay.

A quick review of the above list of U. S. foreign airmail rates will show that our government could use a 14 value set without difficulty. Denominations would be: 10, 12, 15, 20, 24, 25, 30, 35, 40, 50, 60, 70, 80 cents and one dollar. This ignores the domestic 6 cents rate. Of course we have airmails of 10c, 15c, 20c, (two types) 25c and 50c, values. We need a 24 for the double 12c rate as well as a 60, 70 and 80c for double the 30, 35 and 40c. The single dollar value is a necessity for other multiples.

Perhaps the end of 1938 will see our government lined up with the other members of the Pan American Union in the matter of multiple denomination airmail stamps.

Repercussions of the new system are already being felt in Venezuela. A glance at the list of rates for mail matter from Venezuela shows that there is a need for a 30c, 45c, 80c, 90c and Bs. 1.60 denomination. Even the new set just appearing—see Airs of the Month—does not contain them. Unless a last minute change was effected—which is extremely doubtful—the new set will have to be surcharged to make it usable. There will be little use for the up to now much used 70c., Bs. 1.80, and Bs. 1.95.

The multi-denomination set will be the thing this year rather than the short series of four or five values. It may be readily seen why Guatemala, Salvador, Peru and Uruguay have those long sets. They serve a real postal need.

NATIONAL AIR MAIL WEEK

Washington, February 15. - Second Assistant Postmaster General Harllee Branch announced today that the Post Office Department will celebrate Twentieth Anniversary of the inauguration of regular air mail service by observing the first National Air Mail Week from May 15 to May 21, 1938, Postmaster General James A. Farley will be honorary national chairman of the committee which will arrange for fitting observation. Paul R. Younts, a director of the National Association of Postmasters and master at Charlotte, North Carolina, will be active chairman of the campaign.

An official cachet will be authorized at Kitty Hawk, North Carolina, the birth-place of aviation, to honor the Wright Brothers. Every other post office in the United States. of which there are over 45,000, will be authorized to arrange for its own local cachet. Thousands of privately licensed pilots will be given the opportunity of becoming air mail pilots for a day to fly from interior offices to air mail stop points.

This set is steel engraved by the American Banknote Co. and will take the place of the provisional series issued Dec. 15, 1937. No doubt the rest of the set will have made its appearance by the time this appears in print.

A KRON, OHIO WILL be authorized as a stop on AM-1 in the immediate future as per announcement in the daily Postal Bulletin of January 14, 1938. A special official cachet will be furnished the Akron postoffice for use on first flight covers.

On account of airport conditions the inauguration of air mail service at Boulder City, Nev. via AM-2 and AM-37 scheduled for January 1, 1938 was delayed. However, it appears at this writing that service will be inaugurated about February 1st. Although the definite schedule has not yet been decided upon it is very probable that the first inbound and outbound planes to and from Boulder City eastward will make a stop at Winslow, Arizona, Should the stop not be made at Winslow it is possible that covers to or from that point for Boulder City will be dispatched through Albuquerque.

The daily Postal Bulletin of December 1. 1937 shows a schedule of AM-1 effective December 1, 1937 in which a new directional flight is noted by trip 18a from Denver to North Platte, Prior to this date service eastward from Denver was to or via. Omaha, the line of flight joining the main line at or near Lincoln, whereas this new flight is from Denver direct to North Platte. The editor of this column would appreciate hearing from any collectors who have covers of this flight for catalogue purposes.

Effective December 28, 1937 trips 1 and 2 resumed stopping at Mobile, Alabama. Effective January 1, 1938 service was resumed at Meridian, Miss. via. trips 1 and 2 on AM-24.

Service, which was temporarily suspended at Missoula, Mont. via. AM-3 on December 28, 1937 pending airport improvements, was resumed on January 2.

Walla Walla, Wash. dispatched 134 lbs. (7789 pieces) northward and 19 lbs. (771 pieces) southward via first flights over AM-12 on December 4, 1937, Ralph J. Gibbons was first flight pilot in both directions. Postmaster at Walla Walla is George B. Day. It is unofficially reported that Walla Walla dispatched most of its first flight mail northward and that this included most of the mail intended for southward first flight dispatch. Judging by the figures this unofficial report appears to be true inasmuch as more than ten times the number of pieces were dispatched northward as were dispatched southward. In addition it is unofficially reported that some first flight covers were cacheted in green, and green and magenta, instead of the normal magenta. The editor of this column would appreciate hearing from any collectors who have Walla Walla covers bearing either green, or green and magenta. cachets for catalogue purposes.

Lewistown, Mont. was embraced as a stop on AM-28 on December 24, 1937. and dispatched 53 lbs. southward and 9 lbs. northward via first flights. flights pilots were: northbound, R. V. Garsouthward. Joe Lefrink, Postmaster at Lewistown is Francis Crowley.

Orlando, Fla. embraced as a stop on AM-6 on December 15, 1937 dispatched 82 lbs. northward, trip 8, and 7 lbs. southward, trip 9, via first flights. First flight pilots were southbound, Capt. A. H. Comer, northbound, Capt. E. E. Ballough. First flight co-pilots were: northbound, C. O. Trest, southbound, H. D. Harmon. Postmaster at Orlando is James D. Beggs.

Yakima, Wash., dispatched 5 lbs. via first westward flight, trip 1, over AM-3 on October 10, 1937. First flight pilot was

St. Petersburg, Fla. dispatched 4 lbs. southward via trip 1 over AM-31 on Spetember 26, 1937. There were 2 lbs. pouched to Sarasota and 2 lbs. pouched to Miami. First flight pilot was Horton Hale. Postmaster at St. Petersburg is J. D. Pearce.

Mr. Henry M. Horn kindly submits a first flight eastbound Wilkes-Barre cover cancelled 3 P. M. instead of 9 A. M. His cover shows the correct closing time although most eastbound covers were cancelled the same as westbound covers. As previously mentioned in this column first flight covers of Wilkes-Barre were dispatched as addressed irregardless of time shown in cancellation. His cover was undoubtedly cancelled after those covers on hand had been cancelled prior to the flights.

It is unofficially reported that the Post Office Dept. has approved the extension of AM-3 from Yakima, Wash. to Portland, Oregon. This extension if placed in service will result in new first flights from Yakima to Portland and vise versa. However, as no definite information is at hand as to schedules it is possible that flights might be made from Spokane to Portland and vice versa with no stop at Yakima although the line of flight will no doubt be via. Yakima. Inasmuch as Portland has never been a stop on Am-3 it is possible that that point might be furnished with an official cachet and that advance notice will be given to collectors although there is nothing definite that such advance notice will

A number of months ago a request was made in this column for information from such collectors who had in their collection a Los Angeles first flight cover of CAM-4 of April 17, 1926 that bore a type 4 Los Angeles cachet. While some information has been received officially and from one collector in particular who has been kind enough to submit such a cover for inspection additional information is still required. This cover has never been listed and any information concerning either covers or cachets will be appreciated. How about you West Coast Collectors in or near Los Angeles checking up on this and writing in about it?

Many cities and larger towns at present without direct air mail service are now planning the construction of new and larger airports for the coming spring and summer or improvements to existing airposts with the hopes of obtaining direct air mail service. That many of these points will receive such service is without doubt a certainty. The addition of many of these points will further criss-cross the existing air mail map and also result in certain new directional first flights which many a lax Collector will overlook. 
