Ch'entq'ena Species: Cornus canadensis

English Translation: "Bunchberry"

Bloom Season

May - September

Other Names


Used by all dialects

Meaning

'crunchy'

Uses

Edible, but not harvested due to lack of palatability



Ts'ink'nul'ay Kalajeła

Species: *Iris setosa*

English Translation: "Wild Iris"

Bloom Season

May - June

Other Names


Used by all dialects

Meaning

'The arctic tern's fish-rack pole'

Uses

Chewing on rootstock for cold and sinus problems, placed on sores for healing



Ełyes

Species: Betula nana

English Translation: "Dwarf Birch"

Bloom Season

April - May

Other Names


Used by all dialects

Meaning

'stem'

Uses

Used a barrier when laying meat and fish on the ground, or against clothing when carrying packed meat

Species: *Matteuccia struthiopteris* English Translation: "Ostrich Fern"




Inland dialects only

Firewood substitute where firewood is scarce



Heshkegh

Species: Rosa acicularis

English Translation: "Prickly Rose"

June - July

Other Names


Hesh (Inlet/Nondalton and Illiamna dialects)
Heshkegh (Inlet/Lime Village, Outer Inlet, and
Upper Inlet dialects)

Meaning

heshkegh 'thorn-big'
hesh 'thorn'

Uses

The fruit of the rose, or rosehip, may be used for tea; branches are boiled with water to make a tea to treat colds, fever, and stomach troubles



Heshkegh Ka'a

Species: *Oplopanax horridus*English Translation: "Devil's Club"

July


Hesh (Inlet and Illiamna dialects)
Heshkeghka'a, Heshkegh ka'a (Outer and Upper Inlet)

Meaning

Heshkegh Ka'a 'thorn-big big'
Heshkegh 'thorn-big'

Uses

Branches, stems, roots, or root's inner bark may be boiled with water for a tea used to treat many illnesses; root's inner bark may be pounded into to powder put on swollen glands and boils to draw out infection



Q'ey

Species: Betula papyrifera

English Translation: "Paper Birch"

Bloom Season

April

Q'ey (Upper Inlet dialect)

Chuq'eya (Outer Inlet dialect)

Q'eytsay (Inlet and Illiamna dialects)

Meaning

'stem'

Uses

Birch wood is used to make baskets, snowshoes, drum frames, armor, fish traps; bark used to make dye, as tarps, hats; sap used for food and as a salve



K'ela Tl'ila

Species: Linnaea borealis

English Translation: "Twinflower"

Bloom Season

June - September

Other Names


Outer Inlet dialect only

'mouse's rope'
