

# **IMPORTANT**

### CHIEF (B2)

#### most important or main:

• The chief problem we have in the area now is the spread of disease.

#### CRITICAL (B2)

# of the greatest importance to the way things might happen:

• The president's support is critical to this project.

#### CRUCIAL (B2)

#### extremely important or necessary:

# a crucial decision/question

• It is crucial that the problem is tackled immediately.

#### **FUNDAMENTAL** (C2)

### more important than anything else:

• Some understanding of grammar is fundamental to learning a language.

#### **IMPERATIVE** (C2)

#### extremely important or urgent:

• It's imperative to act now before the problem gets really serious.

# INSTRUMENTAL (C1)

# important in making something happen

• He was instrumental in bringing about an end to the conflict.

#### KEY (B2

# very important and having a lot of influence on other people or things:

• She was a key figure in the international art world.

### MAJOR (B2)

# more important, bigger, or more serious than others of the same type:

• All of her major plays have been translated into English.

#### OVERRIDING (C1)

#### more important than anything else:

• The government's overriding concern is to reduce inflation.

### PARAMOUNT (C2)

### more important than anything else:

• There are many priorities, but reducing the budget deficit is paramount/is of paramount importance.

#### PREPONDERANT - formal - (C2)

#### important or large:

 Music does not play a very preponderant role in the school's teaching.

# SALIENT (C1)

#### most important or easy to notice

• She pointed out the salient features of the new design.

#### SIGNIFICANT (B2)

#### important or noticeable:

• Your work has shown a significant improvement.

### VITAL (B2)

# necessary for the success or continued existence of something; extremely important:

• A strong opposition is vital to a healthy democracy.

# UNIMPORTANT

# FRIVOLOUS (B2)

# a frivolous activity or object is silly or not important rather than useful or serious:

- I feel like doing something completely frivolous today.
- They waste their time and money on frivolous things.

#### **INCONSEQUENTIAL (C1)**

#### not important:

- Most of what she said was pretty inconsequential.
- The speech was full of inconsequential details.

#### INESSENTIAL (B2)

#### not necessary:

• The additional decorations were deemed inessential to the party's theme.

# INSIGNIFICANT (C1)

# small or not noticeable, and therefore not considered important:

- Why bother arguing about such an insignificant amount of money?
- The difference between the two results was insignificant.

### MINOR (B2)

# having little importance, influence, or effect, especially when compared with other things of the same type:

- It's only a minor problem.
- She suffered only minor injuries.

#### NEGLIGIBLE (C1)

#### too slight or small in amount to be of importance:

- The difference between the two products is negligible.
- My knowledge of German is negligible

#### PERIPHERAL (C2)

# Something that is peripheral is not as important as something else:

• The book contains a great deal of peripheral detail.

#### PETTY (C2)

### not important and not worth giving attention to:

• Prisoners complain that they are subjected to too many petty rules and restrictions.

### SECONDARY (C1)

#### less important than related things:

- Her health is what matters the cost of the treatment is of secondary importance.
- The need for secrecy is secondary to the need to take immediate action.

#### TRIFLING - formal (C1)

### A trifling matter or amount of money is small or not important:

• It was such a trifling sum of money to argue about!

#### TRIVIAL (B2)

# having little value or importance:

- I don't know why he gets so upset about something so trivial.
- Sexual harassment in the workplace is not a trivial matter.
