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
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You Go Where You Have to Go

Welcome to the new year ... same as the old year?

"I wake to sleep, and take my waking slow, I feel my fate in what I cannot fear. I learn by going where I have to go,

"We think by feeling. What is there to know? I hear my being dance from ear to ear. I wake to sleep, and take my waking slow." - "The Waking," Theodore Roethke

"I hear my being dance from ear to ear." I live in a world with strange boundaries. Some have to do with work – my work and the work required for business - others with family, friends, interests, and small realities. But as often as I can, I enter into sleep, living in the world of dream songs and imagined journeys, all of which make absolute sense when you are in the midst of them, only to fade like disappearing ink when you wake.

Don't believe what you might have heard; life never gets simpler. It always gets more complicated. It never gets familiar but always insists on slapping you upside your head with the strange. Sure, this doesn't have to happen. Life can be homogenized and pasteurized until it is void of surprise and discomfort. But why? Bleeding the uncertainty, unexpected, disorienting, and mysterious out of life can offer one some grounded sense of security, but then doesn't the fun bleed out as well?

"I learn by going where I have to go." Nothing else makes nearly as much sense. You go where

you have to go. And you know where that is. I'm not amazed, exactly, but maybe disappointed at the pervasiveness of the surface-skimming, anti-technology view commonly espoused by too many new Luddites. Or is it the Luddites reborn? "Luddite" refers to an Englishman who destroyed a knitting frame, fearing the mechanized future was designed to make him obsolete.

"New Luddites" does sound like an oxymoron. I bring this up because the positives of technology seem to far outweigh the negatives. Most of the strongest Luddite sentiment always seems to have to do more with a nostalgia for a phony past than real hatred of new technology. The addiction to this past that was supposedly so much better than today comes out of no reality but rather opium dreams and personalized hallucinations. In many ways, this is the worst epidemic of our time, a disconnect from reality that has many arguing that civilization and the world as we know it are plunging straight into hell.

Everything is getting worse, according to this point of view. It's not that we are no longer in Kansas (because we very much are) but that we're no longer in Oz. Talking about the perfect past is like arguing that if cows could fly, it would be easier to move them around. But cows can't and never could fly. The past was just as much occupied by humans as the world today is, so thinking things were better - politics were cleaner, communication was more honest, decency and civility prevailed, and people were more educated, engaged, and understanding – is like arguing for those wings on our bovine friends.

What is amazing is the amount of time and energy some people put into constructing their own roadblocks - which, no matter how flawed in the construction, they find insurmountable. Pointing this out or suggesting easy ways around just incurs wrath.

Now, I don't block myself in obsessively or professionally, but on those occasions when I do, I'm far more interested in mourning my fate and lamenting my predicament than in entertaining ideas of ways to bypass the

blockade I've just built to hinder myself. These blockades are always more of

one's own making than real, but they may well serve a purpose. Sometimes, staying still is not only what is desired but also what is needed.

We all tell ourselves stories. Most of us live in the stories we tell. Most other people exist in the stories we think they are living.

There are many who insist on darkness, who desire that the road forward be treacherous, discouraging any movement forward. The favorite emotional weather report each morning is for doom and gloom all day long. In this state, the necessary belief is that the very existential hopelessness of life is from the outside imposed on the individual. Gamblers know the run; they've practiced the two-step, and they don't buy it but are willing to sell any vision that gives them an edge. Con men and poets drink and laugh, musicians make music, and dancers dance - all around this mythic darkness, not overwhelmed but perhaps entertained.

In the darkest of times, eyes adjust. In the worst of times, resilience is the antidote for despair, simply moving forward the solution for drowning. Surrender is easy – especially if it is not just unnecessary, but when there is nothing to surrender and no one to surrender to.

In my dream fevers, I dance like Fred Astaire. In life, I make Babar seem graceful and legitimize the ballet-dancing hippos in Fantasia as being not surreal but all too mimetic.

"Dark, dark my light, and darker my desire. My soul, like some heat-maddened summer fly,

Keeps buzzing at the sill. Which I is I? A fallen man, I climb out of my fear."

You play the black, and the red comes up. You feel lucky, so you bet it all and lose everything. Never put more on the table than you can readily afford to lose. Caution in the midst of daring, and even during the most insane adventures, provides security no matter how crazed the storm. I don't gamble, since I not only expect to lose but know I will - then it's not really gambling, is it? I expect the universe to be against me, though really in my life it's been more disinterested than anything else.

The idea is that we all "learn by going where [we] have to go." Not only should we not stop ourselves, but in addition, we should learn not to try to stop others as well. Building walls is easy, hating others easier, and hating the unknown (the future) the easiest.

I'm glad I went north when I did some number of decades back. Moving to Vermont was a way to breathe after I had been buried for so long that not breathing had become breathing. Late at night, I would take long walks down deserted country roads where cars were more infrequent than falling stars. Walking in the deep dark, I would lose track - of time, of where I was, and of where I was going.

The dark everywhere, lost inside my head, I'd sometimes think that the time might be autumn, with the leaves changing colors so that mountains would look as though they'd been styled by a crazed kaleidoscope. It could have been autumn, but it was dark, and I couldn't remember. It was night; I couldn't see and didn't want to.

Often I'd just walk, not even thinking about leaves or color or autumn, not thinking about her back in the city or love or even about any kind of romance. I'd just walk down the road, alone, not going anywhere but still leaving despair far behind. I remembered how those nights smelled and tasted, though I don't remember where I was.

Sometimes knowing where you are is the most important thing in the world, but other times it doesn't matter at all.

Best to just take it as the march of time, the progress of days. The one thing I promise is that at some point soon in this column, I'll finish the series I'm writing on Otto Binder.









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

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4) WALKING IS A MAJOR FORM OF **TRANSPORTATION (NOV. 13)**

Dear Editor,

When will the city of Austin recognize that walking is a major means of transportation? The simplest, cheapest, and cleanest way to move around is eternally neglected here.

For the price of the recently approved water plant, Austin could have sidewalks - legitimate walking space - on both sides of every street block. But it seems that we will never have this.

"Green transportation" in Austin means a few hybrid cars, a not-yet-operable dieselpowered train, and too-narrow bicycle lanes on a few streets. It does not include safe, comfortable space for walking around the city.

In the picture accompanying the latest of Copenhagen article ["Climate, Meet Mobility," News, Nov. 6], we can see that pedestrians get as much street space as cars, bicyclists get a full-sized street lane, and buses get their own lane. The Austin system is to block every single street lane with cars, and on most streets to give pedestrians no space at all.

There are no plans to finish Austin's sidewalk system in less than 200 years. Nor are there any plans to allocate street space to pedestrians. Even right next to elementary schools there are no sidewalks. Unlike most U.S. cities of our size, we don't regularly close park roads to motor traffic on weekends. When it comes to transportation. Austin is stuck in the 1950s.

This is a sad waste of resources. Austin has an excellent climate and natural landscape for walking and bicycling. Yet cities without our natural advantages devote much more space to human-powered transportation. Why are we so backwards and at the same time so selfcongratulatory?

It is contradictory nonsense to praise "green transportation" while ignoring its greenest and most basic form. Walking is fundamental. Let's start recognizing that. Finish the sidewalks. Help people cross streets. Without these basic steps, "green transportation" is empty talk.


6) FILM SUPPORT LIKE A COOL SHOWER (AUG. 27)



- City Council doesn't meet again until Jan. 14. The meeting is the first since new notification rules from Mayor Lee Leffingwell took effect, meaning the council agenda will be publicly posted nearly two weeks in advance (as opposed to less than a week, previously).
- After pressure from investors, controversial Whole Foods Market CEO John Mackey has announced that he will be relinquishing his role as chairman of the Austin-based company's board of



directors. CtW Investment Group, a shareholder advocacy group dealing in union pension funds, had previously called him "a liability" to the firm because of his attacks on health care reform.

- > Another Austin institution bids farewell. The Ski Shores Waterfront Cafe, a Lake Austin burger and live music joint, is closing its doors after many decades. Owners George and Dianne Levy notified patrons and friends of the closing in a mass e-mail Tuesday, signing off, "Goodbye to all, good health and god speed."
- Rep. Elliott Naishtat, D-Austin, became the last member of the Travis County legislative delegation to file for re-election when he submitted his paperwork on Dec. 23, 2009. Filing for the March 2 primaries closes at 6pm on Jan. 4.
- > Former White House counsel and loyal Bushie Karl Rove has been granted a divorce from his wife, Darby, after 24 years of marriage. Family spokesperson and former White House press secretary Dana Perino told Politico.com that it was a mutual decision. Rove, whose autobiography is due out in March, is rumored to be heading back on the Texas campaign trail.
- ▶ Je t'aime: Embarrassment for U.S. Rep. Pete Sessions after The Miami Herald uncovered an e-mail from the Republican Texas congressman to banker Allen Stanford that said, "I love you and believe in you," sent seven hours after the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission charged the financier with defrauding investors of \$7 billion.
- Democrats are scrambling to find a candidate for the 10th Congressional District after front-runner Jack McDonald unexpectedly dropped out. The 2008 Democratic nominee, attorney Larry Joe Doherty, said he is considering another shot at incumbent GOPer Mike McCaul

- > TXI DUST NOT YET SETTLED Residents of the Hornsby Bend area got at least an acknowledgement of their concerns regarding a proposed sand and gravel mining project in their neighborhood last week, but not much else. Travis County commissioners, knowing their hands are essentially tied by state laws, called for the formation of a committee to monitor environmental conditions at the guarry owned by Texas Industries Inc., to be composed of neighbors and staffers from TXI and the county. TXI spokesman David Perkins emphasized that the county has "no statutory authority" on the quarry but said the company will try to address neighbors' concerns. "We don't even know if they will go through with it," worried Suzanne McEndree, whose property would be surrounded on two sides by the project. McEndree said she and her neighbors are particularly worried about silica dust and that any health problems it causes might not show up for years - and the TXI quarry is expected to be a 20-year project. "Kids live out here," McEndree said, TXI's Perkins said that the material being mined will already have a great deal of water in it, and he doesn't expect dust to be a major concern. "The bottom line in all this, if it's not gonna be this, it's the ethanol," said 1st Precinct Commissioner Ron Davis, referring to another recent industrial project in eastern Travis. "All these unwanted land uses happening in the unincorporated areas of Precinct 1 has to stop. Unfortunately, it's a case-by-case basis as far as the county because the state Legislature will not - Lee Nichols grant counties enough authority."
- > PRIMARY DEADLINE LOOMS With less than a week to go before the Jan. 4, 6pm, deadline for a slot on the March 2 primary ballot - and little indication of a last-minute flood of applications - the opportunity for announced candidates to become real contenders is shrinking. At the state level, retiring Sen. Eliot Shapleigh, D-El Paso, removed his name from the list of potential candidates for higher office when he announced Dec. 22, 2009, that he will not be on the 2010 ballot. However, Marc Katz, owner of the neverklozing Katz's Deli & Bar on Sixth Street, confirmed that he will be filing Dec. 30, 2009, to run against former Travis County District Attorney Ronnie Earle for the right to challenge incumbent Republican Lieutenant Governor David Dewhurst next November. Over in the House, travel consultant Marilyn Jackson filed Dec. 22, 2009, to become the first Republican challenger ever to face Rep. Eddie Rodriguez, D-Austin, in his House District 51 seat. Yet the busiest local primary remains the Democratic race for State Board of Education Place 5, with four candidates filed so far. Richard Whittaker
- > CRIME DROP IN EARLY 2009 According to early numbers released this week by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, violent crime in the U.S. dropped more than 4% during the first six months of 2009. The preliminary half-year uniform crime report also reflects a 6% decline in property crime, including burglary and auto theft. A 10% drop in murder led the decrease in violent crime, while a whopping 18.7% decline in motor vehicle theft led the drop in property crime. The newest crime report does not contain information from the Austin Police **Department**. APD wants to make sure its crime reporting is as accurate as possible, spokesman Cpl. Scott Perry told us in an e-mail, and as such only submits a year-end report "when we know that the data is finalized and accurate." Meanwhile, federal prosecutions rose 9% in 2009, according to the Transactional Records Access Clearinghouse at Syracuse University. The number of federal prosecutions this year (a total of 169,612 cases) reached an all-time high, up 42% from five years ago and an increase of nearly 90% since 1999. A 15.7% increase in immigration cases led this year's increase, with charges of illegal entry and re-entry to the U.S. making up the vast majority of cases, TRAC reports. Interestingly, the number of nonimmigration crimes has actually dropped over the last five years. Drug crimes, for example, currently make up just 16% of all prosecuted federal crimes. - Jordan Smith
- THE MORE TEXANS THE MERRIER? Texas gets a little fuller but no richer: In its last population esti-
- mate before the 2010 census, the ${\it U.S. Census}$ Bureau reported Dec. 23, 2009, that Texas gained 478,000 residents between July 2008 and July 2009, bringing the total population to 24.8 million an increase of 1.97%. While that was the largest number of new residents for any state, Wyoming had the largest percentage population growth (2.12% over the period), and California remains the nation's most populous state with 37 million residents. Texas now has its largest ever employable population, with the Texas Workforce Commission estimating a civilian labor force of 12.1 million. However, that population increase may not have translated into a stronger economy. While the seasonally adjusted unemployment rate dropped in November from 8.3% to 8%, sales tax collections fell 14.4% between November 2008 and November 2009, and dropped 5.1% in total for the year to date. That will put more pressure than normal on the pre-Christmas receipts for December, due in early January.

Dems' District 10 Disappointment

The great knight who was supposed to rescue the kingdom apparently decided the dragon's breath is a little too hot: last week Democrat **Jack McDonald**, CEO of the technology consulting company

Perficient, backed out of

his challenge to Republican Congressman Michael McCaul. Texas Democratic Party Chairman Boyd Richie was unavailable for comment, but the move no doubt stunned the party - McDonald was seen as a serious candidate who could actually raise the kind of money it would take to eke out a win against überwealthy McCaul in District 10, one of the Tom DeLaygerrymandered districts, stretching from West Lake Hills through Pflugerville and east to the suburbs of Houston.

Indeed, McDonald had already raised almost \$1 million, nearly the entire sum that the 2008 Democrat, Larry Joe Doherty, raised for that election. Why would the seeming golden boy drop out? McDonald isn't saying, other than an opaque statement: "After careful consideration, and with the January 4 filing deadline approaching, I have decided that this is not the right time for me to run and I

will not be filing to enter the race. This was a difficult decision for me and one I did not make lightly."

McDonald said he would attempt to return the contributions he had received thus far.

So is it guaranteed that **Northwest Austin Democrats**, missing the pregerry-

mander District 10 when they were represented by **Lloyd Doggett**, are stuck with McCaul for another two years? TDP deputy spokesman **Rick Guerrero** tried to put a brave face on it: "Michael McCaul has proven to be ineffective for Texas, and others know that, and we do expect there will be another Democrat who will challenge him."

On Sunday, Austin
Democratic blogger Rachel
Farris (aka "Mean Rachel")
reported that she had
received an e-mail from
Doherty saying that he is
looking at polling data and
might himself take another
crack at McCaul. "You may
tell all interested that I'm
interested," he wrote. Farris
has since created a "Draft
Doherty" page on Facebook.

But to win, Doherty will have to establish quick access to tons of cash. So far, his was the best attempt to unseat McCaul, first elected in 2004, and even Doherty couldn't do better than 43% (to McCaul's 54%). Following his defeat, Doherty estimated that, to knock off the Republican, it would take

twice the \$1.2 million he had raised.

Doherty will have to decide quickly: The filing period ends Jan. 4.

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1) WET OR DRY? For it or agin' it, the 25-years-in-the-planning Water Treatment Plant No. 4 dominated city politics for several months, with City Council finally voting narrowly to move forward with the massive multiphase project. Come hell or high water — more likely both — something tells us we haven't heard the last of the local water wars.

2) TEA-BAGGED "Tea Party Patriots" opposing health care reform (etc.) disrupted town hall meetings around the nation, including Austin, where angry wingers shouted down Congressman Lloyd Doggett. YouTubing of the

event and similar episodes elsewhere made national news; the tea-baggers' tactics left them looking like asses but provided Fox News the illusion of a grassroots uprising.

3) SEEKING NEW COUNCIL The biennial City Council changeover resulted in a new mix but no grand break with precedent: Mayor Lee Leffingwell joins veterans Mike Martinez, Sheryl Cole, Randi Shade, and Laura Morrison with newcomers Bill Spelman (a return trip) and Chris Riley. In a very tough budget year, Shade has emerged as a swing vote on a handful of vexing questions.

4) POLICE THE AREA The Austin Police Department garnered more than its share of headlines in 2009, centered on the clouded shooting of Nathaniel Sanders II, rumbling through the federal lawsuit over the termination of Ramon Perez, and sustained in December by the APD's response to a Department of Justice official review – Chief Art Acevedo moved to install DOJ reforms for the new year.

5) IS MUSSOLINI AVAILABLE? Hard to know where to begin summarizing the 2009 Capital Metro "story": financial desperation, labor tension, managerial chaos, board inanition, or just the perennial "rail will be here ... eventually." Now it's looking for a permanent fearless leader to make the trains run on time.

6) RACING THE RELAYS The city took a PR bruising in April when Highland Mall – already in a financial nosedive – announced it would close during the Texas Relays rather than welcome crowds of mostly African-American visitors. The NAACP and city leaders responded with a street demo and an education campaign – quickly obscured in the aftermath of the Nate Sanders shooting. The various groups insist they intend to pick up the baton for 2010.

7) BUILDING BREATHER The city's relentless growth slowed in response to what seems to be the only antidote: a nationwide recession. With a few less cranes on the skyline, City Council considered how to sustain affordable-housing initiatives amidst booming real estate prices. It's made a few baby steps, but there's much left to do.

8) TRAGIC FALL Speaking of building, in June three high-rise construction workers

died when their scaffold collapsed under them. In December 2009, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration ruled neglect on the part of four contractors, and the APD continues a criminal investigation. The men's legacy may be increasing vigilance on worker safety and perhaps a renewed local union movement.

9) TEXAS MUSIC MATTERS NOT KUT 90.5FM radio management cut the hours of veteran deejays and local radio legends Paul Ray and Larry Monroe, sparking a "Save KUT" movement to which the business planners largely remain deaf, insisting they're focused on the long-term future of the station. A future that apparently doesn't include the folks who over many years made the station and its locally steeped sound. Ostensibly about music, money, and planning, it was also a story about lifelong loyal staffers thrown away like worn-out transmitters.

Honorable Mention: ARA BLUES REVIEW

The Austin Revitalization Authority has come under steady criticism over the years for accomplishing too little Eastside redevelopment with city resources, and a city audit this year formalized that judgment, albeit without a resolution. The city manager's office said it is "not advisable to continue the relationship as currently structured nor to bring to close our partnership." Meanwhile, longtime President Byron Marshall debarked for Richmond, Va., and what the refigured "partnership" should look like is yet to be determined; City Council should decide on that sometime in the next few months.

1) GOODBYE, WILL Anticlimax was the order of election day, as Lee Leffingwell took the mayor's office. Brewster McCracken's forward-thinking campaign couldn't coalesce constituencies, and his endgame had no game. (Brewster Nation, anyone?) Carole Keeton Strayhorn was a nonstory, and downballot was even less exciting, with Bill Spelman running unopposed and Chris Riley blowing Perla Cavazos outta the water.

2) WTP4 ON TAP After dozens of years, millions of dollars, and innumerable arguments, Water Treatment Plant No. 4 is finally in the pipeline. An unprecedented town hall debate was a highlight, but Spelman's subsequent dizzying, 25-minute dissertation from the dais against the plant – held before the final 4-3 vote – was the defining moment in the new council year.

3) STRIPPING THE CITY BUDGET Forgive the mixed Eastern metaphors, but this year opened the kimono on the Kabuki theatre of budget planning. Public forums in which citizens prioritized city services were both praised for transparency and panned as

cover for controversial cuts. However, with a last-minute windfall, the city closed the estimated \$30 million gap with minimum service cuts, just like last year ... and the year before last ... and

4) (DON'T) STOP THE MUSIC Despite the "live music capital" sloganeering, the city repeatedly hit sour notes. Changes to outdoor sound permitting flared up right around South by Southwest, allowing neighbor-

hood opposition to threaten various long-running concert series, and

council efforts to create a city music department were rebuffed at every turn. No encore, please.

5) CITY WEBSITE RE-RE-REBOOT One day we'll have a new city website. We already kinda do, thanks to an in-house streamlining. But a long-delayed,

ground-up redesign, slated for award last spring, was halted by council – when local techies learned a California firm would land the contract – creating talk of a local, cloudbuilt relaunch. After another round of rebids, in December the council hired a local company.

6) CONSERVATION
CONUNDRUMS Former
Solid Waste Services
head Willie Rhodes –
considered behind the
city's evolving, ecofriendly reimagining of
SWS – fell upward to
helm the new Code
Compliance Department, so the city could
get cracking on its zerowaste goals. Mean-

while, inspired by the WTP4 debate, council tasked the Austin Water Utility with getting serious about saving water.

7) PULLING OUR PUDS Omnibus development projects preoccupied the zoning agenda, with the now approved South Shore/ Grayco planned unit development evolving from a waterfront setback skirmish to a fight over affordable housing – resolved in December. Similarly, questions over development fees – like affordable housing in the still-in-draft Downtown Austin Plan – hung over the dais. One knuckle-duster didn't happen: Wildflower Commons, which quietly dropped off the agenda.



8) THE HUSTLE GETS MOHAWKED This column's personal campaign trail highlight was the *Chronicle*'s own "Hustle for Mayor" forum at the Mohawk, where Leffingwell, McCracken, and yours truly traded questions and, yes, rhymes on the issues facing Austin. If only Brewster's freestyles had come a little harder

9) HELLO, LEE The new mayor came in with a lengthy laundry list of meeting efficiencies. Some – like capping staff presentations and breezing through the consent agenda – proved uncontroversial, but moving zoning hearings to 2pm (while moving controversial cases later in the day) garnered grumbles, and limiting regular citizen communication speakers to one in three meetings produced howls of protest – from the speakers, natch.



- 1) DING, DONG, THE WITCH IS DEAD The seven-year tenure of Fred Gilliam as Capital Metro's president/CEO saw a labor strike, a financial crisis, and a commuter rail system that still hasn't debuted two years after its originally scheduled start date - few tears were shed when he waved goodbye.
- 2) NO. THIS TIME WE MEAN IT The debut of MetroRail has had so many delays and setbacks that for a while. Cap Metro quit predicting a date. Now it's shooting for the first quarter of 2010.
- 3) BROTHER, CAN YOU SPARE A FEW MILLION? The quick spend-down of Cap Metro's reserves unfortunately coincided with a global economic crisis and downturn in tax revenues. Oops.
- 4) NEW MOTTO: LESS FOR MORE In keeping with No. 3, Cap Metro hiked fares while simultaneously cutting back on some routes to balance the budget.
- 5) KILLING THE 'DILLO If the new rail ever starts. Cap Metro will need a Downtown cir-

culator more than ever - yet it chose this moment to "suspend" the 'Dillo service.

- 6) STICKING IT TO LABOR I In a naked move to pay workers less, routes were shifted from the better-paying StarTran labor contractor to the lower-wage Veolia Transportation and First Transit.
- 7) STICKING IT TO LABOR II Almost as bold: The transit agency fired the union leader, Jay Wyatt, on some murky charges of sexual harassment - still to be reviewed.
- 8) NONPROFITS NONINTERESTED The agency wants to start a nonprofit to see to the needs of low-income, transit-dependent citizens. Charities reply: "Isn't that your job?"
- 9) BEAT IT Depending on who you believe, contractor Veolia Transportation has either been a cause of MetroRail's delays or a scapegoat. Cap Metro says firing the France-based company in December will ensure MetroRail gets launched in time;







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
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




TOP 9 STATE STORIES

- 1) FORT HOOD RAMPAGE A routine day at a Central Texas Army base turned deadly Nov. 5, when a gunman suddenly fired on a crowd of people in a processing center. Maj. Nidal Malik Hasan, an Army psychiatrist, has since been charged with 13 counts of premeditated murder and 32 counts of attempted premeditated murder.
- 2) TEXAS TUMBLE It turns out Texas wasn't so recessionproof after all. Unemployment hit 8.3% by October, the backlog of food stamp applications swelled beyond control, and sales-tax receipts started a yearlong decline, dropping more than 14% between November 2008 and November 2009.
- 3) TEA. ANYONE? The secession question took center stage when Gov. Rick Perry, toying with the emotions and votes of reactionary tea-partiers, mused about the prospect of an independent Texas. Unfortunately for him, the Constitution says no dice, so the tea party crowd pinned its hopes on the God-'n'guns stylings of primary challenger Debra Medina instead.
- 4) DECK CHAIRS ON THE TITANIC The 2010 primaries turned into the Mad Hatter's tea party. U.S. Sen. Kay Bailey Hutchison filed to run for governor but refused to give up her seat in D.C.; Ambassador Tom Schieffer jumped into the governor's race, then jumped out; Houston Mayor Bill White wanted to be a U.S. senator, and now he wants to be governor; and ex-gubernatorial hopefuls Hank Gilbert and Kinky Friedman are fighting to be ag commissioner.
- 5) COMMUNIST PLOT State conservatives wrapped their tinfoil hats extra tight when President Barack Obama's back-toschool speech was broadcast to students Sept. 8. Claiming it was some form of indoctrination, they went on to picket his Oct. 16 speech on volunteerism to Texas A&M students.
- 6) STATE BOARD OF WHAT? Fundamentalists on the State Board of Education tried to push through language watering down the teaching of evolution back in the spring, making Texas a national laughingstock. They were only partially suc-



cessful. Now they're setting their sights on social studies, and the culture wars rage on.

7) NICE TRADE-OFF One of the biggest perks of Texas governors is their ability to turn campaign contributors into powerful appointees, regardless of their lack of qualifications. In Rick Perry's case, the guv denies that the \$5 million he'd received in donations from several of his 2009 appointees affected his decision to reward them for their generosity.

- 8) PANDEMIC OR PANIC? Protective face masks became the wardrobe accessory of the year as swine flu swept across Texas with a vengeance, prompting schools to temporarily shutter their doors and cancel sporting events.
- 9) DANCING WITH THE (FALLEN) CZAR You can't keep a bad man down, especially if he's light on his feet, as former U.S. House Majority Leader Tom DeLay demonstrated during his brief tenure on Dancing With the Stars.

TOP 9 LEGE STORIES

- 1) TIME TO KILL THE KING With the House split 76-74, the imperial rule of Speaker Tom Craddick came to an end. When it became clear that he wouldn't survive the bipartisan ABC (Anyone But Craddick) Alliance, he withdrew, yielding the gavel to user-friendly Rep. Joe Straus, R-San Antonio.
- 2) SHIFTY RICK Gov. Rick Perry made a big deal about rejecting \$555 million in federal stimulus cash for unemployment benefits and then seemingly without irony - touted his signing of a supposedly balanced state budget that was backfilled with \$16 billion in stimulus dollars.
- 3) WAS IT SOMETHING SHE SAID? Rep. Betty Brown, R-Terrell, left jaws on the floor of the House Elections Committee when she asked Ramey Ko of the Organization of Chinese Americans, "Do you think that it would behoove you and your citizens to adopt a name that we could deal with more readily here?"
- 4) SPARING THE ROD Reports of the death of Austin-bashing at the Lege may be greatly exaggerated, but the constant criticism of the capital city faded a bit under the dome in the 2009 session.
- 5) THE AGE OF DINOSAURS How to suitably celebrate changing the official state dinosaur from Brachiosaur Sauropod, Pleurocoelus to Paluxysaurus jonesi? By having Reps. Mark Homer and Mike "Tuffy" Hamilton dress up as dinosaurs on the House floor while the resolution is read. A memorable moment in a session most people are still trying to forget.

- 6) BACK SO SOON? The House gaveled out June 1, thinking everything was settled. But the Senate pulled a fast one, rejecting House measures to keep state agencies operating and provide \$2 billion in transportation bonds, thus forcing a special session. Sine die? Sine don't.
- 7) NOT SO SPECIAL With the main session chubbed to death, there was a load of pending business that the Legislature could have settled in a special session. Instead, Gov. Rick Perry called lawmakers back for only four issues. They returned on July 1, passed two of the four, and fled the midsummer heat wave after 31 hours.
- 8) IDENTITY ISSUES The Republicans were determined to stop the phantom voter impersonation problem, even if it meant grinding the Lege to a halt. First they forced an all-nighter to suspend venerable Senate rules to get voter ID through the Senate, then they nearly killed the entire session in the House when they forced Democrats to endlessly chub to protect
- 9) HALF-COCKED Lawmakers came dangerously close to overturning the ban on firearms at state university campuses, but sanity ultimately prevailed. Gun-toting Garland Rep. Joe Driver was among those angling to reverse the ban, arguing: "If it's a concealed handgun license, nobody's gonna know who has a weapon. That's part of the beauty of the concealed handgun license."

TOP 9 MEDIA STORIES

1) WETBACK SETBACKS KLBJ-AM morning hosts Todd Jeffries and Don Pryor were suspended after Pryor repeatedly used the term "wetback" on the air. Faced with protests from the Hispanic community, parent company Emmis Communications condemned the language and vowed to become more culturally sensitive. A few months later, Emmis management proved its politically correct resolve by suspending 101X's The Morning X deejays, Jason Dick and Deb O'Keefe, for joking about "wet vacs."

2) 'STATESMAN' NOT FOR SALE For a year, Cox Newspapers entertained offers for the Austin American-Statesman. But with the newspaper industry in full spiral, Cox didn't like the lowball bids and ultimately decided to take the paper off the market. Staffers applauded. Readers vawned.

3) BMP IMPLODES In a tumultuous year for local radio, not one element affected Austin more than the collapse of Border Media Partners, which dreamed of creating an empire of Spanish-language stations, including seven in Austin. BMP moved to create a Mexican-flavored edge to the local dial, with new formats like La Ley. Instead the company was taken over by its lenders in 2009 and La Ley was La Bye Bye.

4) KLRU WOES Public broadcasting affiliate KLRU's financial issues were hardly a surprise, but few knew the extent of the problem. In the spring, the station said it was facing a shortfall of almost \$1 million; 20% of the staff was jettisoned, and a chunk of the station's slim roster of local programming was suspended while management tried to regroup.

5) TV NEWS LITE The slimming down of local TV news continued with CBS-affiliate KEYE and Fox affiliate KTBC both trimming staff. KEYE dropped its morning show in favor of the *JB* & Sandy Morning Show and added a 4pm show apparently geared for viewers with a fifth-grade edu-

cation. The exception to the trend: NBC affiliate KXAN, which actually moved to bolster its government coverage and indepth reporting.

6) WHEN THE MUSIC STOPS ... As the year drew to a close, the local radio stations exploded into a game of musical chairs. Jammin' was toast. The Beat was back. Sports talk appeared on the FM dial. Crusty Sammy Allred returned to the air. KGSR switched frequencies. And, strangely, when all the moves were done, radio still sounded the same.

7) KUT CONTROVERSY Perhaps management of the public radio station thought no one would notice when they decided to cut back longtime disc jockeys Larry Monroe and Paul Ray. Instead fans organized a protest against the station, raised money, staged events, and recruited more than 1,700 Facebook fans. Management said the protests didn't affect fundraising, but the controversy raised serious issues about the

station's direction and the broader

8) DENBERG DEPARTS Jody Denberg's voluntary exit from KGSR signaled the end of an era. For 19 years he represented the blend of blues, rock, and country that has developed into a distinctly Austin sound. Low-key, knowledgeable, and well-connected, he was an Austin fixture and undoubtedly the only local deejay who could get Yoko Ono on the phone.

role of public radio.

9) TEXAS TRIBUNE LAUNCHES In a bleak landscape for news organizations, the Texas Tribune emerged to offer hope for the future. A nonprofit with serious sugar daddy funding and former Texas Monthly Editor Evan Smith at the helm, the Tribune hired a roster of veteran reporters and launched into the world. The result is a good-looking site and a stream of interesting stories, suggesting that an alternative model might emerge to develop serious news for serious people.



















TOP 9 DEVELOPING STORIES BY KATHERINE GREGOR

1) PLANNING-A-GO-GO This year saw a harmonic convergence of major planning efforts shaping the region. If properly synced up, they could herald a tipping point – a course correction for Central Texas' future. The city of Austin is progressing on a comprehensive plan, Strategic Mobility Plan, Downtown Austin Plan, and Waller Creek District Master Plan; it also completed a Comprehensive Housing Market Study. Travis County embarked on a comprehensive planning effort too, and it's preparing a master plan for its central campus Downtown and other facilities. To aid in wise land conservation, we also gained the completed Central Texas Greenprint for Growth.

2) THINKING COMPREHENSIVELY Notable unto itself, Austin finally began the process of creating a new comprehensive plan. The last one was adopted in 1979. Consultant WRT was hired and began work, a citizens' advisory group (which ballooned to 38 members) was named, and an Imagine Austin campaign kicked off.

3) MULLING 'GOOD' DEVELOPMENT Are central Austinites determined to remain anti-developer, no matter what? That's still a question as we uneasily embrace new development patterns. This year saw increased acceptance (or at least discussion) of national models for density-oversprawl embraced elsewhere: New Urbanism, transit-oriented development, and form-based code.

4) SPRAWL AND GROW Round Rock grew by 8.6% making it the second fastest-growing city in the nation, according to U.S. Census Bureau figures released in July. Other 'burbs grew fast, too. The change for Austin was just 2.5%; that translated to a net gain of more than 18,000 people, making us the No. 9 city for population gains nationwide, and now the 15th largest U.S. city, according to U.S. Census Bureau 2007-2008 data released in August.

5) DODGING THE BUBBLE Development was mostly not happening in 2009, thanks to the financial market's meltdown. Building cranes are becoming an endangered species Downtown. Nevertheless, Austin enjoyed some of the most stable home values in the U.S.

6) PUBLIC-PRIVATE PROJECTS PLOD ALONG Mueller, which took more than 15 years to break ground, enjoyed steady 2009 progress and earned sustainable neighborhood certification. The design process for the new Central Austin Library began – after the city took nearly 10 months to finalize the architects' contract. The \$300 million W Austin Hotel & Residences project on Block 21 finally started construction, then lost its financing, then found replacement financing. All is silent on the Green Water

> Treatment Plant redevelopment, awarded to a Trammell Crow team: sealed negotiations continue, but no deal

was inked. Worst of all, Seaholm is still a year away from breaking ground. The city's public-private deals drag out forever - suggesting the need for tougher "do it or lose it" contracts.

7) A TRANSPORTING YEAR The new Austin Transportation Department made rapid strides on mobility: a more sustainable roadway, bikeway, walkway, and transit system. It completed a circulation study of Central Austin that confirms roads leading into Downtown can't handle any more cars - we need other modes. It launched a Strategic Mobility Plan and an Urban Rail Program. We gained miles and miles of bike lanes. In progress: preliminary engineering and environmental work needed to allow a November 2010 transportation referendum, to include rail and other projects.

8) DOWNTOWN PERCOLATES Despite the recession, loads of people still patronize Downtown entertainment, dining, and drinking venues. Only about 400 under-construction condo units remain unsold. On the Downtown Austin Plan, major compo-

nents completed in 2009 include a parks and open space plan, a transportation framework plan, an affordable housing and density bonus strategy, and a proposal to protect the Warehouse District. But the 'Dillo died, commuter rail never arrived, and the long-discussed rail transit for the central city remains uncertain.

9) PARKS AND OPEN SPACE BLOOM New director Sara Hensley hit her stride in the Parks and Recreation Department; she even managed to forge an amicable resolution of the controversy over removing aged Barton Springs trees. The Walk for a Day trail became real, receiving more than \$400,000 in federal funds. The Lady Bird Lake Trail saw many improvements; the boardwalk plan progressed – but wasn't awarded any federal funds. The new PARD boathouse got a design rehash and a promise to open bidding to more potential users. The Austin Parks Foundation completed Phase I renovations of Republic Park, while Waterloo Park began a place-making intervention from Project for Public Spaces. Plant a New Year's tree, people!



1) DROUGHT DEVASTATION A hotter 'n hell summer and the driest period since the Fifties prompted city and regional utilities to enforce mandatory water restrictions - until steady autumn rains washed us out of the danger zone. Meanwhile, the Lower Colorado River Authority set about fashioning a forward-looking regional water plan with a special emphasis on conservation.

2) WTP4 DEBATE The half-billion-dollar Water Treatment Plant No. 4 got the City Council goahead despite a recession, a record-breaking drought, an incomplete environmental-impact study, and opposition from environmentalists and Lake Travis businesses. Great news for supporters of the plant; not so great for those who believe conservation could do the trick without the price tag - and without the hit to a waning precious resource.

- 3) TIME TO ROLL ON COAL? Austin Energy's proposed generation plan sparked debate about how soon is too soon to get out of coal and how much is too much to invest in a clean energy future. City Council will address that question in 2010.
- 4) SAVING THE TREES All hell broke loose when city parks officials announced that 28 trees at Barton Springs Pool would get the axe because their aged and diseased state threatened the health and safety of the public. After loud protests, Parks and Recreation Director Sara Hensley did something different: She listened and compromised. In the end, only three trees had to come down.
- 5) NOW THAT'S SOLID Acknowledging a serious lack of progress on Austin's recycling program, the city booted its old-school Solid Waste Services director upstairs and hired a new green-minded leader to revamp the department.
- 6) FLUSH IT The Austin Water Utility yanked the reins on rebating apartments and businesses for low-flow toilets, and Austin Energy was forced to rethink its solar rebate program, as the number of rebate applications

exceeded the cash available to fund the popular subsidy programs.

- 7) GRIDDING FOR THE FUTURE It may have started out as a pipe dream, but the ambitious Pecan Street Project picked up a \$10.4 million boost from the U.S. Department of Energy to develop a smartgrid demonstration in the Mueller neighborhood: former City Council Member Brewster McCracken will lead the PSP effort.
- 8) A HEAP OF TIRE TROUBLE The state environmental agency and the Austin Police Department launched investigations into cityowned scrap tires languishing in a field southeast of Downtown, in violation of state law. The man-made paradise for mosquitoes and snakes is also a sign of deeper management trouble at the Fleet Services Division.
- 9) QUARRY NOT SO HUNKY-DORY Travis County commissioners punted a decision on the proposed TXI gravel quarry into the new year; meanwhile, a committee will review the quarry's potential impact on nearby subdivisions in this unincorporated area east of Austin, hoping for mediation where the county has few regulatory tools.

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TOP 9 CRIMINAL JUSTICE STORIES

- 1) ANOTHER EASTSIDE SHOOTING In May, Austin Police Officer Leonardo Quintana fatally shot 18-year-old Nathaniel Sanders II in the parking lot of the Walnut Creek apartments. With a federal civil lawsuit pending, this story will linger in 2010.
- 2) **DAMAGED GOODS** In the fallout from the Sanders shooting, Police Chief Art Acevedo fired Internal Affairs Detective Chris Dunn, for two e-mails demonstrating his bias toward Quintana in the shooting investigation. Dunn will appeal, so expect to read this, too, in the new year.
- 3) AN END TO THE NEVER-ENDING CRIME STORY? Eighteen years after the grisly murder of four teen girls at a North Austin yogurt shop, new DNA evidence forced District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg to dismiss all charges against the two remaining defendants in the case, Robert Springsteen and Michael Scott.
- **4) ROBES OFF, ROBES ON** After her handy 2008 victory, in January Lehmberg was sworn in as the county's first female district attorney. As the year closed, Criminal District Judges Wilford Flowers, Bob Perkins, and Charlie Baird all announced they would retire in 2010, heating up the spring race for the benches
- **5) THOU SHALT NOT DISCRIMINATE** After three years of legal wrangling, the city won the lawsuit brought by former APD Officer Ramon Perez, who alleged he was forced to resign not because he underperformed but because his supervisors didn't care for his religious beliefs. A federal jury just didn't agree.
- 6) NEVER TOO LATE TO CORRECT THE RECORD In February, Judge Charlie Baird handed down the state's first posthumous exoneration of a wrongfully convicted man. Timothy Cole was convicted for a 1985 rape in Lubbock that he did not commit; he had died in prison before he could clear his name. Gov. Rick Perry has said Texas law prohibits him from formally pardoning Cole, much to the consternation of Cole's family brother Cory Session says he'll dog the governor until his brother is officially cleared.





7) THE FIRE THIS TIME Did the state of Texas execute an innocent man based on junk fire-science? That's the question in the case of Cameron Todd Willingham, executed in 2004 for the arson-murder of his three young children. The state's Forensic Science Commission was about to address that question when Perry replaced three members of the commission just two days before it was slated to hear expert testimony. Adding oxygen to the flames, Perry appointed as chair Williamson County District Attorney John Bradley; unsurprisingly, Bradley has put on indefinite hold the commission's review of the use of fire science in Texas courts.

8) LEGITIMATE PUBLIC CONCERN In

March, the *Chronicle* won a lawsuit against the city of Austin, forcing the release of the Austin Police Department offense report connected to the infamous 1991-1992 Fran and Dan Keller day-care child abuse case. The report revealed a shoddy inquiry by credulous investigators who believed every allegation a child made – no matter how ludicrous or impossible.

9) SHOOTING FANS IN A BARREL Angry about missing their stage time at the now-

defunct Spiros nightclub, Brandon and LaBaaron Hutchison, two Central Texas rappers with the LG Allstarz, got rough with the promoter and then, ejected, retaliated by brandishing pistols and shooting randomly into the crowd of fans trying to leave the club. Eight people were shot; all recovered. That was that for the Hutchison boys - and for Spiros, which surrendered its liquor license and was soon shuttered.

TOP 9 JOINTS

1) PATIENTS FREE TO INHALE

Keeping a presidential campaign promise, President Barack Obama's Department of Justice sent out an official memo to federal prosecutors in October advising them to end raids on patients using medi-pot in compliance with state law.

2) **SOME LIKE IT POT** A home movie of Marilyn Monroe that purports to show the blond bombshell toking a joint while lounging on the couch hit the Internet this fall. Suffice to say, the sleepy-eyed actress can even make sniffing an armpit look sexy.

3) DON'T KNOW WHAT HE'S SMOKING Rep. Charles "Doc"

Anderson, R-Waco, did his rootin' tootin' best to criminalize the sale of Salvia divinorum – the most potent naturally occurring hallucinogen – but his colleagues just weren't buying it. Researchers think the plant might have potential to treat schizophrenia and other mental illnesses, which is why they want to ward off threats to its availability. In the end, lawmakers made

4) FRUSTRATED FARMERS JAILED Hemp farmer hopefuls were arrested in October for digging up the lawn at the headquarters of the Drug Enforcement Administration to plant industrial hemp, a non-narcotic crop the DEA considers to be nothing more than dope. Among those arrested was North Dakota farmer Wayne Hauge, who is licensed to grow the crop but whose efforts to do so have been stymied by the DEA. Hauge has been battling the DEA for several years in federal court, and now the farmers are looking to Congress to take action. You can bet this story will germi-

5) CRACKING THE COCAINE DISPARITY

nate through 2010.

Congress finally voted in favor of ending the infamous 100-to-one crack-to-powder cocaine sentencing disparity codified in 1986. The new law would eliminate any distinction between crack and powder in federal law and significantly do away with the mandatory minimum five-year turn in the clink for possession of just 5 grams of crack. The change in law isn't final yet – and there's certainly more hand-wringing on tap from lawmakers who don't want to appear soft on drugs – but it's as close to a done deal as you'll find on the otherwise grim drug war landscape.

6) PRICKS KILL NEEDLES ... AGAIN Once again, a bill that would let local health departments establish anonymous one-for-one needle exchange programs died a frustratingly slow death at the Capitol, meaning Texas remains the only state in the country without some form of legal needle exchange to combat the spread of communicable disease.



7) WE DON'T TALK LIKE THAT IN EL

PASO Apparently there are some things not up for debate in El Paso – at least that's the lesson members of the City Council learned this year when they tried to jump-start a conversation about drug prohibition. On the front line of the drug war, the city was looking to offer support to its sister city, Ciudad Juárez, Mexico. But that ain't cool, said members of the city's Lege delegation, who said such a discussion would be embarrassing to the city. As it turned out, with the story gaining national attention, the truncating of open debate was far more shameful.

8) POT FROM COAST TO COAST In

an effort to boost the state's seriously ailing budget, drug-law reformers in California worked to get a legalize-and-tax-and-regulate pot initiative onto next year's ballot, and Gov. Arnold Schwarzenegger even said it's time to debate the merits of legalization. Meanwhile in D.C., federal lawmakers put the district one step closer to enacting a

medi-pot law that voters there approved in 1998. At the time, Rep. Bob Barr, R-Georgia (now a flaming Libertarian) penned a measure that would strip the city of its budget should it try to implement the law. This summer, lawmakers finally voted to revoke the Barr Amendment, restoring at least a modicum of sovereignty to the city.

9) YOUR CHOICE: TREATMENT OR JAIL

After years of hearing the nation's drug czar jaw on and on about how potent pot is sending more tokers in search of medical help to quit their habit, the feds this year released a new set of statistics showing that – surprise, surprise! – 56% of people admitted to rehab for pot use have actually been sent there by the criminal justice system, as an alternative to going to jail for drug possession. Back to the drawing board, Mr. Czar.

POUTING POLITICAL FUNDERS

People are miffed. Many of Barack Obama's strongest supporters are getting angry at his policies, and they are beginning to speak out about their frustrations.

I don't mean those of us who are somewhere between dismayed and outraged about Obama's equivocating, establishmentappeasing policies on such huge issues as health insurance reform, the Wall Street bailout, and the escalation of his Afghanistan war. No, I'm talking about some of his wealthiest campaign funders.

An exercise in "know thyself": List the Top 10 cultural artifacts that shaped you most. Be honest and unembarrassed. That's the dare. Try it first thing this New Year's.

Here I go, listed in reverse order. (Should it concern me that my Top 10 all found me by

10) '100 SELECTED POEMS' BY E.E. **CUMMINGS** At 14, I began to explore the cacophonous funkiness that was Times Square. There was this bookstore, half porn, half not. The counterman's weary eyes didn't care I was a kid. In that neighborhood, child molestation was a misdemeanor, but the human wreckage in this joint posed

no threat. Why did I pick up Cummings? To pretend interest in a real book while ogling dirty mags. Read a page for show. Wow. Fairly skilled at petty theft, I filched the book. What a find. Language could misbehave! Language could play! Language could dance burlesque or ballet. And they called that "poetry." And it opened worlds.

- 9) 'THE WAR OF THE WORLDS' (1953), **DIRECTED BY BYRON HASKIN** Scientists find the key to defeating the Martians just as the death machines descend on Los Angeles. They pile stuff into two trucks for a getaway to finish research that is Earth's last chance. A mob jumps the trucks, pummels the scientists, smashes their devices. Hope is lost. I'm 7 or 8 years old. Utterly shocked. The behavior onscreen feels genuine. I look about the dark theatre with a wordless "You can't trust these muthafuckas!" - sensing for the first time the disconnect between our intelligence and our fear.
- 8) At age 12, in one gulp, I read ANDRE NORTON'S 'STAR MAN'S SON,' 'STAR BORN.' 'THE STARS ARE OURS!.' AND 'STAR GUARD.' On every page I'm thinking, "She's way better than Robert Heinlein!" It's her prose. Nuanced, sonorous, not flat like Heinlein's. By 12, I wanted to be a writer, and this was my first great discovery: How you shape a sentence matters. Rhythm and sound are one with meaning. That's when I began to understand my mother's instruction: "Remember, words are music."
- 7) TV'S 'HAVE GUN WILL TRAVEL' Richard Boone played the gunfighter Paladin. He wasn't a WASP! He looked like my people. And he wasn't tacitum. Paladin was intellectual and spoke well. Ideas mattered to him (many scripts were by Gene Roddenberry). Intellectuals could be tough! I'm 12. For the first time onscreen, here was someone I could imagine as me. It gave me a sense (boyish as it was) of the man I wanted to be.

6) 'MINGUS AH UM' Louis Armstrong's music (see below) was all the worlds that are. Rock & roll was a piece of my world. The music of Charles Mingus was the world, the world of any room or street I knew. Madness, violence, tenderness, thought, love, hate, depth: It was all in his music, a survivor's jazz, a jazz of survival, sounds I grasped but couldn't articulate, hearing Mingus while getting drunk for the first time with Dave, age 15. Mingus meant for his music to teach, and this it taught me: To be a survivor doesn't mean merely to survive; it means you survive and remember and make your remembrance matter.

5) TV'S 'THE BIG BEAT' AND 'AMERICAN BANDSTAND'

You came home from school, turned on the TV, and watched those kids dance. Alan Freed's The Big Beat had black and white kids on the same dance floor which is why he was canceled. Dick Clark's American Bandstand Dick Clark's American Bandstand had white dancers but black and

white performers (Jackie Wilson, Wanda Jackson, Chuck Berry), and the integrated group, the Impalas ("Sorry (I Ran All the Way Home)"). It was the late Fifties, early Sixties. Rock & roll hadn't fragmented into niches. You heard and saw it all, live, every weekday. Watching kids your age dance, imitating the dances, inventing your own moves - there was something to it, a thrilling bodily communication that has gone largely unheralded (perhaps because most critics I know can't dance a lick). Elvis had been the breakthrough, moving in public as no white man had dared, but this daily dancing, this almost-taken-for-granted celebration, set something free. By age 14 I could really dance. You can't learn anything more wonderful. To dance is, as Lawrence Durrell put it, "a beautiful behavior."

4) 'THE FIVE PENNIES' (1959), **DIRECTED BY MELVILLE SHAVELSON** A corny biopic with Danny Kaye as bandleader Red Nichols, but, oh my God, Louis Armstrong. His horn went right through me. That is not a cliché. His sound tuned and realigned my spinal cord (which I typed just now as "chord" - more to the point). Armstrong is, to use Duke Ellington's highest phrase of praise, "beyond category." His tone astounds. His liberty is absolute. What he does rises so far above its source it exists on another plane entirely. Used any money I'd earn or steal to buy Armstrong records, and, on the way, any record with a trumpet on the jacket, such as Miles Davis' Kind of Blue. My first serious tries at writing were prose poems about jazz. Jazz became my template for how I try to play the page.



3) 'HONDO' (1953), DIRECTED BY JOHN FARROW I'm this effeminate kid, very fey, never won a fight. I won't survive unhumiliated on the mean streets of home the way my Creator made me. But look at John Wayne in Hondo. How he walks, how he looks people in the eye - not defiantly, just evenly, almost solemnly. Westerns rated my serious attention. Wayne, Gary Cooper, Randolph Scott. I see they're not messed with because they know how to walk, how to stand, how to look eye to eye. Starting with Hondo, I imitate them. Took me a while, but once I got it down, the bad boys stopped messing with me. Which, in a way, was comical. I still couldn't win if they fought me, but they didn't know that anymore. If you stand a good stance and can meet a guy's eyes not challenging, just meeting - you likely won't have to fight him. Where I've been, where I still sometimes go, that's important. Blessings on John Wayne. He showed me how to save my own life.

2) TV'S 'ROUTE 66' (1960-1964), WRITTEN BY STIRLING SILLIPHANT BEFORE HE WENT SAPPY In 1956 Gogi Grant had a No. 1 hit with "The Wayward Wind," a song about a rambler. It stirred me – even at age 10 or 11, I wanted to get out, get away, somewhere, somehow. To make the break, I needed a story, a model. Jack Kerouac's On the Road was fine, but I couldn't see myself in its characters. I was after something more than Kerouac's

"kicks." Route 66's Tod (Martin Milner) and Buz (George Maharis) took to the road in search of meaning. Worked odd jobs wherever they went. Met incredible, marvelously crazy women - Lois Smith, Lois Nettleton, Julie Newmar, Tuesday Weld. And everywhere they went they found a piece of meaning, a fragment. Insights, not answers. Silliphant's Tennessee-Williamson-the-jukebox dialogue blew my young mind. Tod saying: "We have to become lost before we can find ourselves, Buz. That's the kind of map you make up as you go along." So in high school they're asking me about careers: "I want to roam the country, work as I find work, meet gloriously crazy women, and write." They said I wasn't being practical. But I wanted nothing else, and it's what I finally did. All in all, it's worked out pretty well.

1) A WESTERN PROGRAM ON THE RADIO Learned to tell time waiting for it. Maybe Red Ryder? Can't recall. I'm 3, 4 years old. Mama and I would listen, so intent, while she smoked and I had milk and cake. Program over, we rearrange the furniture, act out what we'd heard, playing all the roles. She was 29-ish, gorgeous, brilliant. Nothing is more beautiful or more fraught with danger than a mother with her firstborn. I remember no details, only the cushiony sofa arm that was my horse. But my wee imagination in play with her wondrously strange mind - I suspect I learned more then than I'd ever learn again.



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


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

MORE THAN SURVIVED

In dismal 2009, Austin's arts scene fared better than you might think

Well, that wasn't a very good year, was it? So goes the thinking of most people, in the arts community and outside it, and considering the economic shitstorm we were all in throughout 2009, who can blame them? Still, the final year of the Distraught Aughts was not quite the calamity for Austin's cultural scene that many feared. Our larger institutions are still standing - are, in fact, still on pretty solid footing financially. There have been painful cutbacks and layoffs, yes, but no tsunamis of red ink swamping them as in many other cities. What losses Austin suffered were regrettable but not catastrophic: the Austin Museum of Art's cancellation (again) of its new Downtown home, Conspirare's postponement of a new work, testsite going into hibernation, Geppetto Dreams Puppet Company closing shop. We lost Arturo Palacios' gallery Art Palace, true, but to Houston, where he moved it, not to a treacherous economy.

When you review the year. Austin's arts scene was full of more good news than bad: Bass Concert Hall reopening after its 20-month shutdown; Arthouse breaking ground for its renovation: the University of Texas Department of Art and Art History building its new Lake Flatodesigned Visual Arts Center; Zach Theatre expanding its campus and getting designs for the Topfer Theatre: the hirings of Ned Rifkin at the Blanton Museum of Art, Kathy Panoff at the UT Performing Arts Center (now Texas Performing Arts), and Ann Hume Wilson at Conspirare; and more flurries of national recognition for local creatives: Conspirare's PBS special and fifth Grammy nomination, Latino Comedy Project's Emmy nomination, David Bologna's Tony nomination, Okay Mountain's Pulse Contemporary Art Fair prize, Cap City Comedy Club's Best Club to Work nod at the Aspen Rooftop Comedy Festival, UT grad student Frances Ya-Chu Cowhig's two major playwriting prizes.

Our true losses were people – those who gave so much to make our creative scene one to which the rest of the country increasingly pays attention: Tina Marsh, Bill Narum, Robert Dale Anderson, Lou Perryman, Bernard Gastler, Lucia Rodriguez, Gina Ducloux, Emma Barrientos, Sara Medina-Pape, Carlos Rivera Pineda, and Shekhar Govind. They will be deeply missed, but the work they did – and the work being done by so many – helped ensure that our cultural community did more than survive this past year. It thrived.





TOP 9 THEATRE PRODUCTIONS OF 2009 THAT DID ASCEND THE BRIGHTEST HEAVEN OF INVENTION BY ROBERT FAIRES

1) 'BOBRAUSCHENBERGAMERICA' (MARY MOODY NORTHEN THEATRE) Modern art's master of collage celebrated in a theatrical mash-up of chicken jokes, picnics, pingpong ball cloud-bursts, lovers' spats, boot-scootin' Whitmanesque rhapsodies, and more. As offbeat, vibrant, and eager to see wonder in the mundane as Rauschenberg's work, this boisterous joyride was so exhilarating that when it ended, I wanted it to start all over again.

2) 'SPRING AWAKENING' (TEXAS PERFORMING ARTS) Even the vastness of Bass Concert Hall couldn't diffuse the raw, intensely personal energy of this Broadway touring show as its 19th century teens suffered their adolescent angst and sexual confusion. Duncan Sheik's pumping pop/rock score and Bill T. Jones' thumping choreography caught the racing pulse of youth in revolt.

3) 'DIONYSUS IN 69' (RUDE MECHANICALS)
The Rudes' archaeological expedition into
Sixties avant-garde theatre – re-creating, move
for move, the Performance Group's boundarybusting original production – proved as full of
life as the group's original works, drawing us
inside an ancient Greek drama to experience its
tragedy personally. Bravely performed by a committed cast.

4) 'HOUSE OF SEVERAL STORIES' (IMAGINE THAT PRODUCTIONS) A family portrait from the Albee album, i.e., caustic verbal combat drenched in booze with a double shot of absurdism. John Boulanger's homegrown prize-winning script was made thrilling by Lauren Lane, Martin Burke, and Meredith McCall, three of our top actors, playing off one another in breathtaking style.

5) 'THE PSYCHE PROJECT' (UT DEPARTMENT OF THEATRE & DANCE) The mythic romance of a mortal and the god of love rebooted in modern times with an irreverent wit and a questioning air. This imaginative, whip-smart, wickedly funny student work wondered provocatively if an ancient myth of love still has meaning in 21st century America.

6) 'CYRANO DE BERGERAC' (MARY MOODY NORTHEN THEATRE) A grand romantic adventure grandly realized. Michelle Polgar's staging flowed as smoothly as poetry from the lips of Rostand's hero with the prodigious proboscis, played here with rousing verve and panache by David M. Long.

7) 'THE JUNGLE' (TROUBLE PUPPET THEATRE COMPANY) Connor Hopkins distilled Upton Sinclair's novel of immigrants ground up by the meatpacking industry into a sepia-tinted tone poem, made hauntingly human by puppets of paper and string.

8) 'BLACK SNOW' (TUTTO THEATRE COMPANY)/'MURDER BALLAD MURDER MYSTERY' (TUTTO THEATRE COMPANY/ VORTEX REPERTORY COMPANY) The link is director Dustin Wills, who seems able to forge theatrically ingenious, tautly acted ensemble pieces from any work, be it a dusty satire of show folk in Moscow or a new musical of ghost-faced killers in the swamp.

9) 'THE LAST FIVE YEARS' (PENFOLD THEATRE COMPANY/AUSTIN PLAYHOUSE)/'SHOOTING STAR' (ZACH THEATRE) A pair of two-handers, each an anatomy of a failed romance etched in performances of heartbreaking virtuosity, the former by David Gallagher and Annika Johansson, the latter by Jamie Goodwin and Barbara Chisholm (full disclosure: my wife).

1) 'THE TRASH PROJECT' (FORKLIFT DANCEWORKS) Allison Orr's epic team-up with Solid Waste Services yielded so much loveliness: garbage trucks like elephants on parade, stunningly graceful cranes, poignant odes to creatures killed by cars, Graham Reynolds' funky and tender score, and, best of all, thousands of Austinites crowding onto the Austin Studios tarmac to celebrate and honor the sanitation workers of our city.

2) WELCHER: 'SYMPHONY NO. 5' (AUSTIN

SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA) A symphony of the old school – sweeping, lush, robust – scored with notable complexity by local hero Dan Welcher, whose dear friend Peter Bay propelled its premiere to stirring heights through ASO's full-bodied performance. A work I'm eager to hear again.

3) RACHMANINOFF: 'VESPERS'
(CONSPIRARE) The acclaimed choir at its most focused: three dozen vocalists crafting sounds as exactingly as master jewelers carving gems. Their meticulous treatment of

these chants transported me to the heart of Mother Russia, into an ancient chapel hushed and holy.

4) 'HAMLET' (BALLET AUSTIN) In the 2009 revival, Stephen Mills' Shakespearean ballet proved more powerful than I remembered, its portrait of a court awash in grief and rage visually arresting and emotionally intense.

5) 'DIALOGUES OF THE CARMELITES' (AUSTIN LYRIC OPERA) In a fine season for ALO, the finest work. This test of faith in the fires of the French Revolution was exquisitely staged and sung, its music and drama building as one to a theatrically stunning finale.

6) 'IMPERMANENCE' (BLUE LAPIS LIGHT)
In sending more aerial dancers skyward than ever before and having more of them partner together, choreographer Sally Jacques created new wonders in the heavens, airborne duets that intertwined mortality and infinity.
7) ANTON NEL (LONG CENTER) One man, one piano, one recital, and more pleasures than I can count. Nel's virtuosic readings of

Haydn, Mendelssohn, Schubert, and Brahms enchanted and amazed, carrying us through sunshine and storms with peerless artistry.

8) RATCLIFF: 'ODE TO COMMON THINGS'
(AUSTIN SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA/
CONSPIRARE) Poems by Neruda in a most
uncommon setting – a choral-orchestral work
of monumental sound and musical complexity – delivered by ASO and Conspirare with a
force and majesty to blow Dell Hall's roof off.
9) 'BODIES IN URBAN SPACES' (FUSEBOX
FESTIVAL) Scampering through Downtown

FESTIVAL) Scampering through Downtown after a crew of daredevil performers to find where they'd wedged themselves into parking garages and trash cans coupled the thrill of new dance and the joy of an Easter egg hunt.

9.1) REYNOLDS/FOUNTAIN: 'BETWEEN STEEL AND STARDUST (SONGS OF TEXAS WOMEN)' (BUTLER SCHOOL OF MUSIC) Its playful way of honoring state heroines from Barbara Jordan to Mary Kay Ash made this song cycle a five (Lone) Star delight. Yee-haw!

TOP 9 CREATIVE ARTS, AH, THINGS I WAS LUCKY ENOUGH TO EXPERIENCE THIS YEAR

1) 'THE METHOD GUN' (RUDE

MECHANICALS) Even after all the months of hype and the international changes wrought by the show's restless creators, this deconstruction-and-extension-of-A Streetcar Named Desire-by-way-of-investigating-methods-ofperformance-and-theatre-myth surpassed expectations and proved to be a brilliant distillation of all the gambits the Rudes had succeeded with before.

2) 'HERE WE ARE: CHRISTA PALAZZOLO AND BRIAN HALLORAN' (BIG MEDIUM)

Stunning figurative studies in pigmented oil, rendered in ways that could make actual photographs seem lacking in soul or something otherwise human.

3) 'LORDY RODRIGUEZ: STATES OF **AMERICA' (AUSTIN MUSEUM OF ART)**

Cartographic renditions of our country's various states - psychological states, mythological states, joined with permutations of actual border-bound geographical entities – were as gorgeous and intriguing as they were huge.

4) OUT OF BOUNDS COMEDY FESTIVAL

Seven nights, four venues, and more than 75 troupes from all over the country. Somehow it all ran smoothly(!), with the usual core of

improv and the expanded sections of sketch and stand-up comedy thrilling many standingroom-only crowds.

5) 'GUILDS OF STEEL'/'DUSK' (GNAP!

THEATER PROJECTS) Gnap! pwned the local improv scene with Guilds of Steel - a serial set among the players and avatars of a World of Warcraft-like virtual reality, as directed by Bryan Roberts and Michael Joplin – and with Dusk, the Shana Merlin-led take on the Twilight series of vampire soap-operatics.

6) 'MISTER Z LOVES COMPANY' (RUBBER REPERTORY) Matt Hislope and Josh Meyer led a fearless Rubber Rep cast in this reprise, a physical-comedy (and musical!) exploration of identity confusion and anal violation that had audiences squealing, covering their eyes, applauding, and tapping their toes.


7) 'THE JUNGLE' (TROUBLE PUPPET THEATER COMPANY) Upton Sinclair's 1906 expose of the meatpacking industry was brought to dark, violent life by Connor Hopkins and his highly professional Trouble Puppet Theater. We can't make the italics bend far enough for sufficient emphasis here: It was only a workshop production and will return, even stronger, in 2010.



8) ARTHUR SIMONE'S 'DEAR FRAILTY'

ColdTowne Theater's darkest part took the stage alone for an hour and brought the audience into a world of twitchy paranoids and quirky malcontents, giving Austin a view of what an ex-Nawlins improviser and abstract painter and Air Sex champion can do with a self-written script.

9) 'LAUREN LEVY: BENEATH THE PALM OF MY HAND' (D BERMAN GALLERY) In this exhibition, the artist's most recent three-dimensional marvels of buttons and wire and fabric were joined by flatter works evoking many-eddied rivers, scissors and their bizarre variations, and more. We eagerly await the territories of stitching and design that Levy's careful explorations discover next.



1) 'DIONYSUS IN 69' (RUDE MECHANICALS) Ritual performance. Sensuality, nudity, birthing. Group dancing, heterosexuality, homosexuality, orgy. A fitting dismemberment. Cunning. Joyful. Transcendent. Theatre at its absolute best. Directed by Madge Darlington and Shawn Sides.

2) 'MURDER BALLAD MURDER **MYSTERY' (TUTTO THEATRE COMPANY/VORTEX REPERTORY** COMPANY) A hillbilly band, a pool of water, a fire in a night yard. Ladders and ramps, people swingin' from the ceilin', dancin',

singin', murderin', and livin' to tell about it. Directed by Dustin Wills.

3) 'HOUSE OF SEVERAL STORIES' (IMAGINE THAT **PRODUCTIONS)** A mother (Lauren Lane), a daughter (Meredith McCall), and a son (Martin Burke) bouncing like absurd, comic human bullets around the walls of a Thanksgiving suburban home. Directed by John Boulanger.

4) 'SHOOTING STAR' (ZACH THEATRE) A really sweet and simple Steven Dietz story about love lost, then found, then lost again, with two oh-so-sweet performances by Barbara Chisholm and Jamie Goodwin. Directed by Dietz.

5) 'KILLER JOE' (CAPITAL T **THEATRE)** Disgusting, repulsive, irredeemable - but what would you expect from a trailer trash odyssey like this? What I won't forget: Joe Reynolds as the patriarch and Travis Dean's ultraviolent fight choreography. Directed by Mark Pickell.

6) 'LA BOHÈME' (AUSTIN LYRIC **OPERA)** Few things can compete with pure spectacle, and few companies in Austin can produce a spectacle so worthy of Puccini's famous tragedy. Directed by Garnett Bruce and conducted by Richard Buckley.

7) 'RABBIT HOLE' (CITY THEATRE COMPANY) A Pulitzer Prize-winning script and an ensemble of able actors, especially Michael Schnick, treated death gently and wisely. Directed by Stacey Glazer.

8) 'THE PAJAMA GAME' (MARY **MOODY NORTHEN THEATRE)**

Boys! Girls! Love in a pajama factory and all of the usual Broadway song and dance, pulled off neatly by a cast of students. Directed by Michael McKelvey.

9) 'AS YOU LIKE IT' (SCOTTISH RITE THEATRE) Lovers. Clowns. Shakespeare! What more could you require? Well, how about the perfectly set Scottish Rite Theatre and Robert Matney as Jaques? Directed by Beth Burns.

- 3) STEPHEN PRUITT FOR 'CYRANO DE BERGERAC' (MARY MOODY NORTHEN THEATRE) Mirrors, mirrors everywhere! Plus, Kim H. Ngo's costumes were to die for.
- 4) MICHAEL RAIFORD FOR 'THE 25TH ANNUAL PUTNAM COUNTY SPELLING BEE' (ZACH THEATRE) The cafeteria table alone was enough to take you back to your days of sixth grade lunchroom hell.



5) 'BODIES IN URBAN SPACES' (FUSEBOX
FESTIVAL) How fun it was to hurry through the city, chasing brightly clothed performers to their next sculpture spot, whether it be upended in a trash can or perched several stories up on the side of a parking garage.

6) AARA KRUMPE AS THE TITLE ROLE IN 'THE FIREBIRD' (BALLET AUSTIN) Krumpe brought exoticism, refinement, and power to the role, making it her own while honoring its history.

7) PROGRAM C, IMPROVISATION (BIG RANGE AUSTIN) Director Adam Sultan and a group of diverse and interesting dancers created a wholly fun and surprising evening.







Was It Good for You?

The year in books

I read half of A Truth Universally Acknowledged: 33 Great Writers on Why We Read Jane Austen (Random House) before I kicked it under my bed, bored and peevish. The essayists tended to say the same glowing things about Jane Austen and her books; the unintended effect was to send me away from the book and straight to my shelf to reread the real deal. Because, really: Life is short, and reading is so often a luxury. If you've got the time, why waste it on books that don't give you pleasure?

So then, in no particular order, the nine books that got me most jazzed this year:

Wells Tower's debut collection Everything Ravaged, Everything Burned: Stories, for one. The North Carolina native did surprising things with plot (Viking marauders? Really?) and downright shocking things with language, putting words together in a wondrous way (did I imagine the kinship with Saul Bellow?). Language was key, too, in Thomas Fallon's erudite, hugely enjoyable study Yours Ever: People and Their Letters (Random House), but it was the pictures that rose to the fore in David Mazzucchelli's graphic rumination Asterios Polyp (Pantheon).

Most critics called the history-bending novel Homer & Langley (Random House) lesser E.L. Doctorow, but most critics, frankly, can go suck it: Doctorow's final lines read like Greek tragedy to me. For actual Greek tragedy, there was Anne Carson's lively new translation of **An Oresteia** (Faber & Faber). Even Lorrie Moore's A Gate at the Stairs (Knopf) spelled katastrophe in a post-9/11 Midwest and rejiggered to Moore's signature wordplay.

Lev Grossman's The Magicians: A Novel (Viking Press) fell short of the fun implied in the advance buzz – "it's like Harry Potter for grownups!" - but, still, it was nicely fourlettered and moody, a welcome spot of darkness to the summer reading list. Certainly



you'd expect Lit, Mary Karr's memoir about addiction and religious conversion, to be pitch-black, and it was; it was also lippy and

comic and, naturally, poetic.

And then there was Padgett Powell's The Interrogative Mood: A Novel? (Ecco). A curiosity in every sense of the word, it surely doesn't qualify as a novel; novels tend to have plots. And periods. Powell's cheeky query. on the other hand, consisted of 164 pages of questions - "Do you miss Tab and do you fully comprehend its disappearance? ... Are you surprised at the low number of people crazy or the high number of people crazy? Do you know offhand whether a hippopotamus sweats?" - with nary an answer in sight. It's the world's weirdest conversation starter (that is, for a conversation with yourself), and every few pages you'll want to pause to pursue a path some question turned you onto. Is it exhausting? A little frustrating? But also a pleasure?

Would I have mentioned it otherwise?

Rock, Bebop, Etc.

Arthur Phillips' The Song Is You (Random House) opens with a riveting prologue that not only stands on its own as a brilliant short story about musical obsession but also sets the stage for similar mania in our iPod generation. While the

novel works on many levels, at its core this is a story about music. In this case, rock & roll, but any music, really: how it affects us emotionally and psychologically; how we obsess over it, surrender to it; how the artists who create it cast a spell over us. It's a lesson about why music matters in our lives and why it plays such a powerful role in chronicling our lives.


The German Mujahid (Europa Editions) by Algeria's Boualem Sansal has been called "the first Arab novel to confront the Holocaust." The author also draws direct parallels from Nazism to modern Muslim fundamentalism. Banned in Sansal's home country, this award-winning novel tells the story of how two Algerian-born brothers, who grew up in the Arab ghettos outside of Paris, deal with the realization that their father, a hero in Algeria's War of Independence, was a Nazi war criminal during World War II.

Thelonious Monk was the first jazz musician to really capture my imagination, and so I absolutely luxuriated in all 588 pages of Thelonious Monk: The Life and Times of an American Original (Free Press) by Robin D.G. Kelley. In what is surely the most exacting and comprehensive biography to date on this thoroughly fascinating and monumentally creative pianist/composer, we come to understand how his idiosyncratic innovations laid the foundation for modern jazz.

Most Arduous Read: Rudyard Kipling's Kim. So much for some historical insight into our endeavor along the Afghan/ Pakistani borderlands.

Guilty Pleasure: Rereading Jack Kerouac's On The Road after 30 years. His frenetic, bebop prose is still a rush.

Lin and the Tramp

Maybe I'll choose Thomas Pynchon's **Inherent Vice** (Penguin Press) as my book of the year. Writing a detective novel (not to mention voicing your own book trailer) was an inspired move by one of America's great novelists. Who wouldn't root for a Pynchon who dropped some of his more elliptical tendencies for something more like The Big Lebowski? But I didn't read Inherent Vice, which I'm told excludes it from inclusion.

Tao Lin's Shoplifting From American Apparel (Melville House) is inspired. With his fresh approaches to financing his work, not to mention the sheer depth of his blog, Lin marks quite possibly the future, or death, of print literature. However, discussing the life or death of print culture is passé. If only this were 2004.

So then, why not choose the one book I read this year that I'd hap-

pily read again: Glen David Gold's Sunnyside (Knopf). In his historical novel, Gold spins several memorable yarns with Charlie Chaplin at their centers. By creating believable human characters - even if they do have recognizable names like Mary Pickford and William McAdoo -Gold draws parallels between the cult of celebrity in the early 20th century and in the early 21st century. From there, he links these cults to nationalism and how that can lead to wars (in Sunnyside's

case, World War I). This is a long way of saying that Gold has some literary tricks up his sleeve that can easily go unnoticed. And that's his greatest trick.

Going Underground

Could be my burrowing tendencies talking, but two of my favorite books this year seem to have excavation at their cores. Jonathan Lethem's Chronic City (Doubleday) foregrounds the havoc wreaked by a wayward tunneling machine (or possibly a giant tiger) in an off-kilter Manhattan and provides endless layers of identity, reality, and high-wire flurries of cultural signifying to dig into. Alice Munro's Too Much Happiness: Stories (Knopf) tucks into a different brand of subterranean horror and, occasionally, cautious wonder; her masterful stories unearth the kinds of buried experience that make all the difference in a life. The oddest and most surprisingly fascinating read - Leann Shapton's Important Artifacts and Personal

Property From the Collection of Lenore Doolan and Harold Morris, Including Books, Street Fashion, and Jewelry (Farrar, Straus and Giroux) – also has an archaeological bent: It's a literal if fictional catalog of a romance between a freelance photographer and the author of a New York Times column dedicated to (yes) cake. The detail and knowingness that Sharpton put to the project blow past the conceit's preciousness; her perfectly pitched document of a relationship's arc - from mix CDs and vintage lingerie to a hammer-damaged white-noise machine and angry, handwritten notes on the back of gallery invitations, photographed, described, and priced as if for a post-breakup auction unspools a suspenseful, human story, well-told.

On the home(ish) front, Michener Center grad James Hannaham's tale of a closeted gay man's stabs at new identity, God Says No (McSweeney's), captures a rarely heard voice with empathy and wit. Family memoir The Kids Are All Right (Harmony), co-written by former Chron colleague Diana Welch and her siblings, is unpretentious, entertaining, and touching. And the devastating honesty and surprising imag-


ery of An Ocean of Despair (Monofonus Press), Thor Harris' account of debilitating depression - illustrated and packaged with his instrumental soundtrack - moved me to - Cindy Widner my soul.

Listomania

The year in books, sure, we can wrap it up just like that, all lickety-split and Chaucer'syour-uncle, right? Readah, please.

Remember, though, the Harry Ransom Center's exhaustive and illuminating "From Out That Shadow" exhibition (presented in conjunction with the University of Virginia but built mostly from the HRC's vast holdings) documenting the life and works and death of that genre genius and social reprobate Edgar Allan Poe; recall literary fabulist Margaret Atwood headlining (as they say in the biz) the Texas Book Festival in support of her postapocalyptic thriller The Year of the Flood: A Novel (Nan A. Talese); access memory of a new Thomas Pynchon opus (Inherent Vice: A Novel) with a plot carousing its quirky characters through a Seventies version of Raymond Chandlerland, the ubiquitous and seemingly eternal Kirkus Reviews going belly up among other gasping concerns in the economy's fetid fish tank, former Austinite Michael Schaub editing his first issue of Bookslut.com, the garish travesty of celluloid adaptation visited upon Alan Moore's acclaimed Watchmen, the milieu of Charles Dickens brought vividly to local stages via improvisations by Parallelogramophonograph, and e-books finally coming into their own with the Kindle and other user-friendly devices.

Also, despite that much of the year was spent in intense training under the mentorship



of a voodoo houngan and in the informative company of several aged herbalists, the bio-mystical machinations undertaken after those studies proved insufficient to restore vitality to even the most potentially viable corpse, and so our plans, our grand scheme toward organic reanimation, has failed, and thus David Foster Wallace is still dead and will likely remain so and, as far as modern letters go, oh, how that continues to totally, relentlessly suck. – Wayne Alan Brenner

Fire It Up

I'm aghast that some people are calling 2009 the year of the Kindle, but apparently some people - not booksellers, mind you - would like us to think that the demise of the traditional paper-and-glue variety of book is at hand (a hand I gladly and ferociously bite). For me, a born reader since Richard Scarry and A.A. Milne, the Kindle represents neither progress nor some sort of

literary evolution, but a cheap po-cultural power grab by an already insanely wealthy and far too influential corporation desperate to keep ahead of some imagined bottom-line curvature. Its bland design puts one in mind of a cheapie B-movie sci-fi prop, or a Soviet-era not-so-great leaps forward. Even Ray Bradbury, who wrote the classic novel of a bookless future society, Fahrenheit 451, has chimed in

on the debate, saying that "E-books smell like burned fuel." (As opposed, one assumes, to the headier and more melancholically aged smokiness of printed matter. Oh, the irony.) The most salient - and potentially fun to explore - question is this: At what degree Fahrenheit does the Kindle auto-ignite? Buy me one, and I'll let you know via YouTube.

Enough hating, though. One honestto-goodness book that rocked my world this year was Ron Currie Jr.'s Everything Matters! (Viking), a strange and beautiful novel about a young man who learns while in utero that the Earth will cease to exist in 36 years, 168 days, 14 hours, and 23 seconds, thanks to a rogue comet that will impact the planet. Currie previously wrote the excellent short story collection God Is Dead, and his nuanced characterizations, darkly comic asides, and sheer


> powers of imagination render this debut novel less a doomstruck downer than a celebration of a life lived in the shadow of mortal inevitability. Highly recommended, this one.

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

Mick Vann's Top Sandwiches of 2009

With the economy being in the dumps this past year and my having even less free time than normal, I found myself eating more sandwiches than usual. The examples below, in no particular order, prove you don't have to sacrifice flavor to save a little money and get portable eats.



1) TÂM DELI & CAFE (8222 N. Lamar Ste. D-33, 834-6458) Rich, spiced, grilled lemongrass beef; cucumber; jalapeño slivers; pickled carrot; cilantro; and tart mayo, all wrapped in crispy, crusty fresh bread for \$4.99. The best banh mi in town. Available in many other delicious versions also.

2) SPEC'S (4978 Hwy. 290 W., 366-8260) The Reuben-to-Die-For and the muffaletta and the Texas BLT and the Hermenater Burger (1-pound patty on a muffaletta bun for \$8.99) are all freakin' deelish! The biggest selection of booze in town also comes with great eats.

3) FLYING FALAFEL (2001 Guadalupe Ste. A-1, 494-1400) With family roots sprouting directly from the Middle East and New Orleans, you know that both sides of the menu rock, but the Cajun-style roast beef po'boy with extra "debris" and the crawdad-and-oyster po'boy are both so over the top.

4) FRICANO'S DELI (104-C E. 31st, 482-9980) Picture a Reuben Dog: a quality frank wrapped in corned beef, topped with sauerkraut, Thousand Island dressing, and Swiss cheese. How about the Jonah: a grilled Italian club with spinach, onions, pepperoncinis, and olive tapenade. A small, very friendly spot with huge, quality sandwiches.

5) LONGHORN PO-BOYS & FALAFEL

(2901-B Medical Arts, 495-9228) With its huge menu, these can't help but stand out: the Puerco Manchego, with roasted and pulled pork tenderloin, *jamón* serrano, Manchego cheese, green-apple slices, paprika aioli, sautéed shallots, and mesclun mix, and its first cousin, the Don Corleone Burger, with a half-pound patty, jamón serrano, roasted shallots, roasted tomato, fresh mozzarella, and arugula.

6) PHOENICIA BAKERY & DELI

(2912 S. Lamar, 447-4444) Ed Ward had it right years ago, this is (still) the best chicken sandwich on the planet. The roasted chicken shawarma features moist, spicy chicken; tomatoes; and lettuce in the freshest of warm flatbreads, all of it literally dripping with Malek's amazing garlic sauce. Superb, and it could be the least expensive of the whole list.

7) FOODHEADS (616 W. 34th, 420-8400) Quirky FoodHeads offers two must-have faves: garlic-and-herb-roasted leg of lamb (toasted ciabatta with lettuce, tomato, grilled eggplant, feta cheese, and *tzatziki*) and the spicy apple pork tenderloin sandwich (grilled pork tenderloin on a toasted baguette with smoked Gouda, spinach, spicy apple relish, and honey dijon).

8) COUNTER CAFE (626 N. Lamar, 708-8800) This place has a great burger, but we love the grilled pimento cheese (toasty nine-grain bread, a mix of cheeses and roasted peppers, topped with tomato, red onion, and lettuce), perfect with a side of its excellent sweet spud fries.

9) LITTLE DELI & PIZZERIA (7101-A Woodrow, 467-7402) Great hot and cold sammies and dynamite pizza too, but when I want to get my veggie on, this is it: the Vegetarian (avocado, artichoke hearts, roasted eggplant, mozzarella, Swiss, provolone, cheddar, Parmesan, onions, tomatoes, lettuce, and tapenade, served on a toasted kaiser roll).

10) EL PRIMO TACO TRUCK (2101 S. First, north of Live Oak, in the convenience store parking lot) Tacos be damned! Go here for the al pastor torta: a bolillo roll sliced open, slathered with some mayo and refried beans, and topped generously with sweet and spicy al pastor pork and then avocado, queso, lettuce, tomato, onion, and cilantro. Messy and mucho sabroso.

Claudia Alarcón's Top Cocktails of 2009

To the delight of those of us who are always on the lookout for exciting flavor combinations, Austin has evolved into a mixologist mecca. While there are many capable bartenders who can make a perfect margarita or dry martini, my quest here was for unique signature drinks that inspire, quench a thirst, or instigate an appetite. Congrats to all the creative forces behind these drinks. Keep 'em coming!

- 1) REDBUD AT PAGGI HOUSE Homegrown mariachi peppers muddled with sea salt, mixed with Tito's vodka, grapefruit bitters, house-made grenadine, and lime juice, garnished with fresh pomegranate seeds. My No. 1 at the Austin Cocktail Throwdown.
- **2) GAZPACHO MARTINI AT FINO** El Jimador tequila infused with a mélange of roasted vegetables, mixed with tomato juice and lime. They go down *way* too easy on a summer afternoon.
- **3) ZANAHORITA AT EAST SIDE SHOW ROOM** Tequila *reposado*, fresh carrot juice, agave nectar, cilantro, served on the rocks in a mason jar with a Turkish salt rim. Gorgeous, good, and good for you. Love the play on words!
- **4) ALMA BLANCA AT LA CONDESA** Habanero-infused Siembra Azul *blanco* tequila, Domaine de Canton ginger liqueur, agave nectar, pineapple juice, muddled fresh corn and *hoja de hierba santa*, with a hibiscus-rose-infused salt rim. Just try it.
- **5) YULE THYME MARTINI AT THE FOUR SEASONS LOBBY LOUNGE** Dripping Springs vodka infused with fresh sage and thyme, topped with a dash of Oban scotch and a slice of smoked maitake mushroom. Killer aperitif, inspired by the flavors of turkey stuffing. Wow.
- **6) CAESAR AT PERLA'S** A classic drink up north, unfortunately bypassed around these parts. The combination of Tito's vodka with Clamato, lime juice, and spic-

es, garnished with pickled green beans and a celery salt rim, is lighter than a Bloody Mary, so you can actually enjoy more than one. Great with seafood!

- **7) FRENCH 75 AT JUSTINE'S** While many local bars offer this newly popularized classic, Justine's is right on not too fizzy, balanced on the citrus, and boozy enough. Plus, it comes in a large martini glass. *Pas mal*!
- **8) ENDLESS SUMMER AT THE GOOD KNIGHT** I don't think they make a bad cocktail at this awesome gastropub, but the combination of smoky mescal, muddled pear and fresh jalapeño, pear brandy, and sparkling wine was just incredible. Garnished with thin slices of fresh pears and seedless jalapeño strips, it's refreshing like a summer drink but made with seasonal fall pears.
- **9) RED HEADED STRANGER AT FRANK** Bacon-infused Dripping Springs vodka mixed with house-made Bloody Mary mix, garnished with a celery-salt rim and a skewered jalapeño-stuffed olive, pepperoncino, and a cheddar cheese cube, with a strip of crispy bacon as a "stirring stick." It has a double dose of bacon, people!
- **10) WATERMELON SAKE COOLER AT TOMODACHI SUSHI** Simple, refreshing, palate-cleansing mix of fresh pressed watermelon juice, chilled *sake*, a touch of citrus, and a *shiso* leaf garnish. Another one that goes down easy and pairs incredibly well with Tomodachi's fabulous fish fare.


Top Tequila Blancos

The extra fruitiness and agave intensity is muted in the aged versions. I'm sure to get plenty of guff about this from the tequila conservatives. Sorry, give me a young, vibrant blanco, and I'll be a happy *bebedor*. By the way, if price is an absolute issue, the Jose Cuervo silver at \$17 is a great bottle of tequila. In a price-is-no-object world, these are the 10 best blanco tequilas I've tried this year, arranged alphabetically.

Instead of breaking up this year's list into comedies and dramas, I'm lumping them into one master list. Why? Because dramedies like *Nurse Jackie* make the dichotomy bothersome. Good is good, isn't it? We'll see what you think after you've taken a glance at my list of the best TV had to offer in 2009.

1) 'MAD MEN' (AMC) There is simply no comparison. Yes, my Breaking Bad "TV Eye" readers, I still can't say enough about this drama. No, I don't think it will solve the world's problems, but it makes me forget about them for one glorious hour. Honorable mention: Damages (FX). The second season is not as brilliant as the first. 
8) 'COMMUNITY' (NBC)

9) 'MERCY' (NBC) Here are the interesting, positive female characters on TV. Less ooky than *Saving Grace* (there is no tobacco-chewing guardian angel) and more serious than *Grey's Anatomy*, this hospital drama features a likable, complicated lead (**Taylor Schilling** as Nurse Veronica Callahan), who is all too human without being overwhelming bitchy or cloy.

In the world of film, it was the year of the number nine. There was the animated film 9, the sci-fi parable *District* 9, and the musical *Nine* (itself an outgrowth of the movie $8\frac{1}{2}$). All these films are worthwhile projects, one was among our top picks, and each is aimed at moviegoers older than the age of 9. For these things we are grateful, but here's the rub: We are ready to move beyond nine. 

■ Just to make things more confusing, I've decided to choose the Top 5 video games for our No. 9-themed Top 10s issue. Don't worry, everything's numbered.

1) FREE BROWSER GAMES Cop-out? Maybe. It could be that I have a weekly blog column covering the world of games readily playable with a working Internet browser



and an updated version of Flash. However, 2009 was not kind to the major players in the gaming world despite what you might infer from the Call of Duty sales figures. Most developers played it safe with their franchises. Meanwhile indie gamemakers were giving the year's best titles away. Some, such as Canabalt, were lightning-quick retro excursions and quickly grabbed up by the iPhone App Store. Others had one-of-a-kind gameplay, like Closure. But the real gem this year was from the mind of Edmund McMillen (among others), creator of list-worthy games like Meat Boy and Aether. Time Fcuk is an eerie 8-bit trek through time, space, and insanity with the standard run-and-jump archetype turned on its ear. Add the ability to create levels for others to play, and you have my favorite game of the year. Did I mention that it's free? See for yourself: www.newgrounds.com/portal/view/511754.

- **2) 'DJ HERO'** All I need to say to piss everyone off is that *DJ Hero* is better than similar guitar-based games I'm talking to you, *The Beatles Rock Band*. The creators of *Guitar Hero* didn't cut any corners on the quality of the original mixes (from DJ Shadow, for chrissakes!) or the plastic turntable peripheral. Take the financial plunge at \$100, and play a rhythm-based game with music that is actually rhythm-based.
- **3) 'NEW SUPER MARIO BROS. WII'** However many mediocre games are released for the Wii, Nintendo can always count on two Italian brothers to save the day. It's a dash of the original game mixed with *Super Mario Bros.* 3, except four people can play at a time. It also balances absurdly difficult levels with the ability to have Luigi (aka the computer) finish the level for you. It may be the weak person's way out, but, trust me, you'll want the option at some point.
- **4) 'UNCHARTED 2: AMONG THIEVES'** Everyone's talking about *Call of Duty: Modern Warfare 2*, but *Uncharted 2* was sexier, more engrossing, and just more fun. It's not the missing link between gaming and movies that some critics have called it, but it still deserves end-of-the-year accolades. And, be honest with yourself, when you want to have fun in front of your TV, do you want to play the gaming equivalent of *Saving Private Ryan* or *Indiana Jones*?
- **5) 'SCRIBBLENAUTS'** This one gets the spirit award. The execution isn't perfect, but the audacity of the game's creators is laudable. Every level has a simple goal, but the fun is that you can write anything on your Nintendo DS to get you there. Anything. Think a cantaloupe can get that star out of the tree? Write it. Need a dinosaur to get you across a puddle? Why not? If you can think it and spell it you can play it.

Top 10 Events That Defined the Decade in Austin Music

1) UP IN SMOKE

The most visible example of Austin's backhanded support of the live music scene, the smoking ban prohibited the use of a perfectly legal substance in private businesses (see "Smoke Signals," April 15, 2005), resulting in a lot more outdoor patios and the closure of at least one music venue. "The fact that I didn't shut down during the smoking ban gave people the belief that we weren't scarred by it," bemoaned **Room 710** owner **Asher Garber** to the *Chronicle* in June, shortly before the club shuttered. "We lost half of our business to that."

2) CLIFFORD ANTONE DIES

In the same way that the loss of **Stevie Ray Vaughan** and **Doug Sahm** bookended the previous decade, the passing of Austin's blues godfather and chief ambassador left a hole in the soul of the local music community (see "Okie Dokie Stomp," May 26, 2006).

3) AUSTIN CITY LIMITS MUSIC FESTIVAL

Arc Angels, Wilco, Robert Randolph, and Ryan Adams, among others, help establish this first-class annual festival at **Zilker Park**, elevating the local scene and promoter **C3 Presents** to national prominence (see "A2K Meets 'ACL," Sept. 20, 2002).

4) THE LEVEE BREAKS

"What happened during Katrina was not an evacuation as much as a round-up and a forced displacement," **Cyril Neville** fumed to the *Chronicle* (see "Tell It Like It Is," April 28, 2006). "It was the height of arrogance, greed, conceit, and disdain for a people who you think are less human than you." Thankfully, countless New Orleans musicians found comfort and redemption here.

5) THE ROLLING STONES PAINT ZILKER PARK BLACK

The show of the decade, the World's Greatest Rock & Roll Band's first and presumably last local appearance proved worth the wait and paid dues to **Waylon Jennings**' "Bob Wills Is Still the King" and **Buddy Holly**'s "Learning the Game." Relive the circus on the immaculate 4-DVD set, *The Biggest Bang*.

6) BEGIN TRANSMISSION (ENTERTAINMENT)

When **Graham Williams** left **Emo's** in June 2005 and formed Transmission Entertainment – a booking and promotion enterprise with **Mohawk** owner **James Moody** and **Club de Ville's Michael Terrazas** – it caused a seismic power struggle on Red River, heightened by the promotion's expansion to **Red 7** and fostering of **Fun Fun Fun Fest**.

CHRONGLE MURDER INCORPORATED WHO WILL THE SAME AND KILLY ASSESSED TO SAME AND KILLY

7) METALLICA RIDES THE LIGHTNING AT STUBB'S

Dubbed by **James Hetfield** as "the worst kept secret in rock & roll history" (sorry about that), thrash metal's Four Horsemen evinced the promotional magnitude of the **South by Southwest Music Conference** with 80 minutes of apocalyptic ecstasy (see "Off the Record," March 20, 2009).

8) RED RIVER SHOOT-UP

This time it wasn't "fireworks." At 2:15am, on May 29, Crips affiliates **Brandon** and **LaBaaron Hutchison** of the Central Texas hip-hop outfit **LG Allstarz** opened fire outside Spiros, wounding eight patrons and exemplifying the upswing in violence Downtown (see "Crime and the City Solution," June 26, 2009).

9) ROKY ERICKSON'S RESURRECTION

The **13th Floor Elevators'** howler's long, strange downward spiral – painfully detailed in the 2005 documentary *You're Gonna Miss Me* – led to the most miraculous rock & roll triumph in recent memory (see "Starry Eyes," Dec. 30, 2005), a feat that continues this year via a full-length collaboration with **Okkervil River**.

10) X MARKS THE SPOT

More than a decade after similar legislation passed in the UK, the **Ecstasy Prevention Act of 2001**, coupled with a crackdown by the Austin Police Department on venue owners and promoters, kills the last traces of the nascent local rave scene (see "The Agony of the Ecstasy," Nov. 16, 2001).



LEAD STORY

But What If the Device Falls Into the Wrong Hands? A 55-year-old British man whose bowel was ruptured in a nearly catastrophic traffic accident has been fitted with a bionic sphincter that opens and closes with a remote controller. Ged Galvin had originally endured 13 surgeries in a 13-week hospital stay and had grown frustrated with using a colostomy bag until surgeon Norman Williams of the Royal London Hospital proposed the imaginative operation. Dr. Williams, who was interviewed along with Galvin for a November feature in London's Daily Mail, wrapped a muscle transplanted from Galvin's leg around the sphincter and attached electrodes to tighten or loosen the muscle's grip.

UNREFORMED HEALTH CARE SYSTEM

The Wisconsin Department of Corrections decided in October that it (i.e., taxpayers) should fund complex facial reconstruction surgery for inmate Daryl Strenke, who is serving 30 years after pleading guilty to murdering his girlfriend. Strenke had shot himself in the face in apparent remorse for the killing, severely disfiguring his mouth and jaw and making it nearly impossible for him to eat or speak normally.

BRITAIN'S SAFETY WEENIES

In November, the Solihull Council in Britain's West Midlands county ordered a flooring store to remove the festive balloons it had pinned out front to attract business, calling them hazards. One councilor explained that drivers may be distracted by the colors, and another was concerned that if a balloon came loose, it might possibly float into traffic and lure a child to follow it.

In October, Britain's Association of Chief Police Officers prepared a guidebook of instructions for bicycle-duty officers on how to ride a bike. The book was 93 pages long, containing such assistance as a diagram on how to turn left or right ("deployment into a junction"). Following widespread ridicule, the association decided in November not to release it.

Examiners from Britain's Health and Safety Executive, inspecting bowling alleys for hazards, considered recommendations (according to a November *Daily Mail* report) that included erecting barriers over the lanes to prevent bowlers from wandering the alleys and perhaps getting caught in pin-setting machines or, feared one inspector, bowlers injuring themselves trying to knock over pins by hand. The barriers would leave space for the ball to roll under.

THINGS YOU THOUGHT DIDN'T HAPPEN

British Museum officials announced in September that the hoard of 7th century Anglo-Saxon gold and silver treasure discovered on land in Staffordshire (at least 1,500 pieces, including crosses and parts of helmets and daggers) would take a year to evaluate fully but could be worth "many times" the 1 million pounds (\$1.6 million) archaeologists initially estimated. The treasure was discovered by an unemployed 55-year-old man using one of the widely ridiculed, handheld metal detectors that beachcombers favor to recover loose coins in the sand.

LEAST COMPETENT CRIMINALS

Better Planning Needed: 1) Brier Cutlip, 22, and Paul Bragg, 25, who were on parole and prohibited from possessing firearms, were rearrested in December in Elkins, W. Va., when they showed up for a parole appointment. However, they had just come in from a day of hunting and were still wearing orange vests, alerting the parole officer to the fact that they had been firing guns all day. 2) Grandville Lindsey, 30, on probation in Beaumont, Texas, after a child-sex conviction and prohibited from visiting any "social" websites, was rearrested in November when he sent a Twitter alert to a woman he had met while in the probation office, asking to include her as an online "friend."

MUST BE SOMETHING ABOUT SEPTIC SYSTEMS

After six years of total obstinacy, Janet and Lowell Carlson finally agreed in October to upgrade their farm's septic system in Camden Township, Minn. Until then, the couple had ignored numerous inspections, sheriff's visits, and court orders even though a new system had already been paid for (by escrow funds left by the owner who sold them the farm). The Carlsons' inspiring principle throughout the six years of living with failed plumbing was to challenge the county for its "inconsistent" enforcement of septic upgrades.

Scottish pig farmer Peter Roy, 72, is embroiled in a longstanding dispute with the Perth and Kinross Council over who has the responsibility for repairing the sewage system on his farm in Craigmuir, but has taken a more hardcore approach than the Carlsons. He has saved his sewage in oil barrels stored on his property (now numbering about 80) to the outrage of neighbors. Roy has also periodically stepped up his protests to include leaving full barrels around town.

THE SCIENCE OF SEX

Wake Forest University's Institute for Regenerative Medicine, which has successfully grown human bladders in the lab using only a few extracted cells sprayed onto a chemical frame that mimics the body's tissues, has so far been unsuccessful at regenerating penises because of the organ's complexity. However, it announced in a November journal article a success with rabbit penises. Four of the 12 rabbits with lab-grown phalluses successfully impregnated females, and in an unexpected finding, the new penises appear not to lessen sexual desire, in that all 12 of the rabbits began mating within one minute of meeting females.

Occasionally, people lose their short-term memory following vigorous sex, according to doctors interviewed for a November CNN report on "transient global amnesia." The condition occurs because blood flow to the brain is restricted by the strenuous activity, temporarily disabling the hippocampus from recording new memory. One sufferer, "Alice," recalled her experience, recounting how she initially cracked a joke about being unable to remember how good the sex was that she just had, and then supposedly repeated the joke over and over, each time as if she had just thought of it.

PEOPLE WITH TOO MUCH MONEY

After Nicolas Cage filed a lawsuit against him for mismanaging the actor's money, Cage's former business manager Samuel Levin filed his defense in November, charging Cage with creating his own problems by disregarding Levin's budgetary advice. According to Levin, Cage's 2007 purchases included three houses (costing \$33 million), 22 cars (including nine Rolls-Royces) and 47 works of art. By 2008, said Levin, Cage owned 15 houses, four yachts, a Gulfstream jet, and an island in the Bahamas.

A 'NEWS OF THE WEIRD' CLASSIC (APRIL 2001)

Hillsborough, England, was the site of a soccer stadium disaster in 1989, in which 96 fans were crushed to death. In March 2001, the government revealed that a police officer who worked at that site beginning in 1998 nonetheless acquired post-traumatic stress disorder from continually imagining the 1989 carnage and for that received a disability settlement from the government of the equivalent of about \$560,000. That amount, according to a report in London's *Guardian*, is more than 100 times what was paid to any of the families of the 96 people who were killed at the site.

Janette Grainger was an adventuresome spirit; her hyper-intelligence, riotous sense of humor and regard for all life cultivated 50 years of progressive accomplishments around the world. At 15 years old Janette escaped the confines of conservative London, England and embarked on what would be a rich and uninhibited life as a global citizen, journalist, activist, and mother. In the late 1950s, Janette worked at New York University and with the civil rights movement; during the 60s she traveled to Vietnam as a journalist; in Amsterdam during the 70s, she immersed herself in the counter-culture

movement, started the world's first head shop, and contributed to the local porn magazine 'Suck.' Here, Janette authored the book 'Living Guide to Amsterdam,' and her two homes operated under an open door policy for travelers, hippies and musicians.

Janette's fierce presence prevailed despite ever-changing environments, each episode of her life instigating the next. In 1977 she brought her worldly knowledge, and newborn son Jonah Mesritz, to Austin, Texas, where she resided until 1997. Perhaps the city she most considered 'home,' in Austin Janette was a flagship video-journalist, environmental activist and mainstay within the 'Keep Austin Weird' movement. She donated office space to Austin Public Television, mentored local journalists, organized political action committees, and dedicated herself to environmental protection causes including the preservation of Barton Springs, the Edwards Aquifer, and the overall improvement of Austin environmental causes. Janette worked endless hours composing educational tabloids and making TV commercials urging the defeat of bond issues that would result in infrastructure harmful to the environment, all the while urging Austin citizens to elect political candidates who promised earth-friendly agendas. One of her greatest protests involved preventing a waste-to-energy incinerator from being built; through persuasive writing, activism, and organization, the Austin City Council abandoned its \$34 million dollar project, convinced of the harmful effects it would pose to the environment.

Janette wasn't only a committed civil servant, but a woman passionate about music, the arts and animals. In both Holland and Austin, her specialty store Folk Toys featured the artisanal dollhouses, trains and other educational toys. Also in Austin, she co-authored the book 'Natural Insect Repellents for Pets, People and Plants' which served as a guide to living free of chemicals. In 1997 Janette moved from Austin to Hawaii and then to San Diego for a short period; during this time she bought and sold Thai Hill Tribe jewelry, operating a lucrative e-commerce business.

In 2006, Janette traveled one last time to Chiang Mai, Thailand. Here Janette lived in a mostly male ex patriot community, where she was accepted as confidant and teacher. No matter where in the world Janette Grainger was, her tenacity didn't just touch people's lives, it changed them; she voyaged through life resolute, and surrendered to death with similar fearlessness in May of 2009.

Looking back at 2009, it was a year of drought, change, and some exciting new opportunities for day-trippers.

1) A DROUGHT OF HISTORIC PROPORTIONS scorched much of the Southwest, drying up swimming holes and burning crops. In Texas, the hardest hit area stretched from the Hill Country to the Gulf Coast. By mid-August, all of the public boat ramps on Lake Travis were closed. The Texas Parks & Wildlife Department reported that wildlife from the pronghorn antelope in West Texas to alligators and ducks on the upper Texas coast were severely affected. For the first time in seven years, the number of endangered whooping cranes at the Aransas National Wildlife Refuge declined.

2) PASSPORTS or other approved travel documents are now required when returning from excursions to Mexico. The U.S. Department of Homeland Security's rules drove another spike into the already depressed border economy. Between the threat of violence from



warring drug cartels and the new travel restrictions, many small businesses in border towns that cater to tourists are being forced to close.

- 3) THE TEXAS DISCOVERY GARDENS AT FAIR PARK was already a hidden jewel in Dallas, and it got better with the addition of the new Rosine Smith Sammons Butterfly House and Insectarium.
- 4) THE WACO MAMMOTH SITE, discovered in 1978, finally opened to the public. The new climate-controlled pavilion provides viewing of the largest known concentration of prehistoric mammoths that died in the same event.
- 5) THE PEDERNALES RIVER NATURE PARK opened for limited day use as the Lower Colorado River Authority's newest park. The 222-acre riverfront tract will ultimately be developed with a range of recreational facilities.
- 6) THE TEXAS STATE HISTORICAL ASSOCIATION moved to Denton from Austin. This by itself had little effect on day-trippers, but the organization's plea for funds to continue the Handbook of Texas Online was a scare for explorers who like to get the history behind the places they visit. The handbook is also a great place to find the hidden treasures of Texas.
- 7) 'TERRA COTTA WARRIORS: GUARDIANS OF CHINA'S FIRST EMPEROR' visited the Houston Museum of Natural Science. Not only was this a great exhibit with limited appearances in the U.S., but it shows what world-class museums we have in Texas.
- 8) PHIL DUROCHER RETIRED from the Texas Parks & Wildlife Department after 35 years of service to wildlife and recreation in Texas. As director of the Inland Fisheries Division, he implemented limits on catches and increased the role of the state's fish hatcheries.
- 9) MARGARET CAMPBELL BAMBERGER was a teacher, environmentalist, and the soul of Bamberger Ranch Preserve outside of Johnson City. Along with husband J. David Bamberger, they turned an abused piece of the Hill Country into a garden and showed thousands of others how it could be done.

Charles Dickens Unleashed

The Hideout Theatre

"Unleashed" is precisely right, as in "Cry Dickens and let slip the dogs of improv!" This just-passed December brought to the Hideout Theatre a Victorian serial drama in full costume, featuring the madcaps of Parallelogramophonograph and their cronies

performing a brand-new Dickensian tale of orphans-and-their-plucky-triumphs each night, with each show made up, naturally, on the spot.

We were fortunate to catch the final show of the run; we offer this review for your interest and in case the troupe decides – yes, please, just a bit more – to bring the format back next Yuletide.

There were six (or was it seven?) improvisers creating tangle-plotted, long-form antics from the audience suggestion of "bookbinder" as the protagonist's occupation. The story raveled and unraveled onstage boisterously and goofily, the players committing scenes in pairs, trios, and quartets, relaying the story of a young adopted boy (Kareem Badr, resplendent in fancy suit and Pickwickian muttonchops) turned out of his strict and well-to-do adoptive family to seek his own way in the big dirty city of London. Helping guide the narrative, when necessary or opportune, was the Narrator, the wisely chosen Curtis Luciani: He interceded during momentary lulls or when inspiration struck him, shifting the coalescing plot and sparking scenes with lunatic gambits, moving the action toward wherever his and the players' choices would finally take it.

(It was a skillful give-and-take, the interplay between the narrator and the players, especially given the subject – the works of Mr.

Dickens – being paid a twisted homage. As the *Statesman*'s own arts critic Jeanne Claire van Ryzin has cannily noted, the progression of the improv worked much like the progression of an actual Dickens serial, in which that author would often pull wacky coincidences from nowhere and warp plot and circumstance as necessary to gain the most powerful, emotional, audience-impacting punch.)

Thus did we learn of the orphan Michael Leatherbinder's tribulations in the harsh factory where books were stripped of leather (to be fashioned into whips!) and of his rescue by an officer of the London police force, of his growing romance with that police officer's daughter, of his eventual revenge against the evil proprietor of the whip factory, and of the discovery that said proprietor was, in fact, his own presumed-dead father! Of course he was!

So, yes, this evening of impromptu narrative – with exceptional performances by Valerie Ward, Mark Majcher, and Roy Janik – was enjoyed by all. Well, except for one dubious, frowning couple in the front row who seem to have been expecting *Larry the Cable Guy's Git-R-Done Xmas Hoedown* instead. Cor blimey, no: This was schmaltzy Victorian costume-drama improv, gamely and rather adroitly rendered – and God bless us, every one. – *Wayne Alan Brenner*

Kasey Moore, and Jill Gilbeau) making a living this year in Women's Professional Soccer, it's little surprise that this was a rebuilding season for the Horns.



Perhaps because we can't see it in its common state, streaming through the air, we don't tend to think of light as one of the more valuable implements in a visual artist's toolkit. But when you look at Teresita Fernández's art, well, it's all about the light.

As is evident in the solo exhibition "Blind Landscape," many of the other materials that the artist employs - graphite, polished steel, aluminum, glass beads - are meant to catch the light and play off it, to glint or glimmer as you pass by, to draw your attention with that flash of radiance, to suggest that in some unlikely way, a fixed and solid object is fluid, capable of motion. Glance down into the floor-mounted circle of Eruption, with its miniscule glass beads of orange, vellow. red, and violet, and the colors appear to shift, as if this were indeed a pool of lava you're peering into, its thick, volcanic stew an angry swirl. Move past Projection Screen. with its onyx beads loosely organized into a rectangle on the wall, and the pinprick reflections that follow you in a lazy arc over the surface of the beads work with their arrangement and the negative space between them to create a buzzing field of atoms, constantly vibrating and jostling themselves into new patterns. Reproduce these works in flat, dull hues, remove the source of illumination, and they would likely be static. Light is the invisible conspirator behind their animation, the intangible catalyst that brings Fernández's work to life. It's what causes the 14,000 graphite pebbles of Epic, set high along one wall of the gallery, to sparkle as you stroll from one end to the other, transforming it from an interior installation of unliving stone to a galaxy of dark stars against a bright sky - the Milky Way in negative. It's what makes the irregular, foliagelike cut metal of Portrait (Blind Landscape), Portrait (Blind Water), and Vertigo (Sotto in su) look like parts of trees lightly stirred by a breeze, the gaps between leaves opening and closing, the shadows stretching and shrinking.

Of course, light isn't the only agent responsible for this illusion of motion. There

is the thing that's actually moving around these works: you, the viewer. But as we tend not to think of light as a tool of the artist, we tend not to think of ourselves as part of the artist's toolkit. And yet we are. It's our movement toward, past, and away from this art that allows the light to play off these reflective surfaces the way it does. We are as integral to the effects that Fernández is after as graphite or glass. And she happily reminds us of that repeatedly in this show. The layers of steel in Vertigo (Sotto in su) extend from a wall horizontally just above most people's heads, creating a small arbor that you're simply drawn to step under. And when you do and you look up (as you're bound to do), you see yourself hanging in the "tree" above you, the polished metal as reflective as the surface of a pool. With Ink Mirror (Landscape), the artist is considerably more straightforward about it; you stare at the long, tall slab of black fiberglass set in a snowbank of marble dust for any length of time, and you wind up staring at yourself.

It can be a bit startling and even disconcerting to catch your reflection in a work of art, but it's useful. We can all stand to be reminded that where art is concerned - and by that, I mean any creative endeavor - our role is not just to be a consumer, ingesting what someone else has produced; we're completing a circle that began with the creative spark within the artist's mind, closing a circuit that, just like an electrical connection, creates a charge. Like the light that plays across the works in "Blind Landscape" - and in Stacked Waters. Fernández's marvelous installation of liquid blue and white tiles that fills the Blanton Museum's atrium - we activate the art. It's something to ponder as you regard Epic's epic gray constellation or go swimming in the atrium's liquid expanse. - Robert Faires **COMEDYSPORTZ** Competitive improv? ALVIN AND THE CHIPMUNKS: THE SOUEAKOUEL D: Betty Thomas; with Zachary Levi, David Cross, Jason Lee, Wendie Malick; with the voices of Justin

Long, Matthew Gray Gubler, Jesse McCartney, Anna Faris, Christina Applegate, Amy Poehler. (PG, 88 min.)

It's a rare but not unheard-of event for a sequel to top its predecessor. This is not one of those sequels, however, and director Thomas, working from a script by returning screenwriter Jon Vitti and Kung Fu Panda scribe Jonathan Aibel, does little to improve on 2007's original "film/rebranding event." While The Squeakquel might be appreciated by filmgoers ages 10 or younger, the rest of us should be investing heavily in d-CON and working feverishly through the night to build a better rodent trap. This time out, the all-singing, all-dancing, all-CGI chipmunks - rebel with paws Alvin (Long). wise guy Simon (Gubler), and tubby emo vermin Theodore (McCartney) - wind up in a contrived "squeak-off" with a new trio of singing female chipmunks, cruelly dubbed the "Chipettes" by downon-his-luck record exec Ian Hawk (Cross, returning from the original in search of a paycheck and not much else). Possibly the best argument against couples therapy ever, Antichrist is a tour-de-force trip inside the mind of a dangerously depressed man. That man is von Trier, and his film speaks the language of madness with astonishing fluency. Dreamlike and possessed of a terrible, doom-laden beauty, Antichrist is a flawed masterniece and an example of highly personal auteurism that will either make you mad or drive you mad; either way, you're complicit in von Trier's vigorously compelling nightmare of love, death, and despair. Dafoe and Gainsbourg are fearless in their absolute commitment to their respective roles as He and She, a couple in the throes of immense, obliterating grief. They seek therapeutic escape at their cabin in the woods. He is a therapist and arrogantly assumes he can assuage She's pain in this act of withdrawal. But She is beyond such psychological salves, and, as von Trier steers his couple into the dark forest primeval. Antichrist becomes a genuine horror movie. (11/20/2009) - Marc Savlov **** Dobie

Neither the best heist movie of the new millennium (that would be The Bank Job) nor the worst (Tony Scott's snoozy remake of The Taking of Pelham 1 2 3 gets that honor), Armored is a serviceable and solid slab of testosterone, gunfire, and seriously impregnable trucks that aims low and scores higher than you'd think. It's like the Schlitz of caper movies – it goes down easily, buzzes around your brainpan for a couple of hours, and then vanishes from your memory within 24. Armored continues Antal's penchant for generic, single-word film titles, but it's such a streamlined suspenser that you can forgive the dopey bits and go with the good-men-gone-bad flow of the film. Dillon plays an armored-car guard who,

together with a crew of five others (among them Fishburne, who appears to be having a ball, and *The Professional's Reno*), plans an inside job worth a cool \$42 million. (12/11/2009) - Marc Savlov *** Tinseltown South

Osamu Tezuka's pioneering Japanese manga and animé series about the coolest robot kid ever finally achieves Americanized big-screen status. Although something has been lost in the translation, this Astro Boy remains true to the heart and soul of the original. Screenwriter Timothy Harris comes up with a few new twists on Tezuka's original - most notably the nascent romance between Astro and plucky surface-dweller Cora (Bell) - and this Astro Boy moves along at least as snappily as its rocket-powered protagonist. But ultimately, Bowers' take on the animé legend feels too indebted to the far superior The Iron Giant and overstreamlined in both story and animation. It's a totally serviceable reboot for young people who are just discovering the joys of manga, but I can't help but miss the raw animation and even rawer emotional aesthetics of the original televised animé series. At 162 minutes and a cost of somewhere between \$250 million and \$300 million, Cameron's ne plus ultra of futuristic mechanized mayhem and seamless CGI trickery is both a cinematically spectacular slab of virtually nonstop action and an unmistakable diatribe against corporatized American imperialism. There are the usual muscled-up boys (and equally powerful girls) with big-bang toys, crying havoc and letting slip the dogs

of war, to be sure, but at its heart this mammoth film is ... a chick flick. Despite a script that at times leaves its most interesting characters delivering some of the most banal lines in a Cameron film thus far, somehow it all holds together. As a purely visual experience, it's like nothing you've ever seen before: a lush, sexy, primal world created entirely by Cameron's legions of CGI masters. The singular talents of director Herzog and star Cage coalesce here into something mercurial, creating a movie that is mutable, unpredictable and, above all, original. Bad Lieutenant: Port of Call New Orleans, is not a sequel, prequel, remake, or follow-up to Abel Ferrara's 1992 film. This new "bad lieutenant" is bad in many of the same ways as Ferrara's (rampant cocaine and narcotics use, gambling addiction, and flagrant abuse of the badge), but gone are the Catholic guilt, the New York City streets, and the naked, howling Harvey Keitel. The new film is set in New Orleans in the wake of Hurricane Katrina. It seems to be on the constant verge of going off the rails, which makes the film a gas to watch. However, it's somewhat disconcerting for a movie about debasement and redemption to be so entertaining. Still, Cage delivers his best performance in ages, and Herzog demonstrates, once again, that he is capable of virtually anything. (12/11/2009) - Marjorie Baumgarten

Writer/director Hancock (The Rookie) overcomes most of the built-in problems inherent to inspirational sports dramas. Also in the film's plus column are two standout performances: from Aaron, as the sweet-mannered but largely uncommunicative football player Michael (Aaron does some very subtle body work, using the way he carries his heft as an emotional signpost), and Bullock, as the prickly, straight-talking Memphis socialite who welcomes Michael into her home and eventually makes him a part of the family. This is a dream role for Bullock - finally, a job that requires her to be adult, tart, and smart, all at once - and she makes good use of it. It's not an altogether convincing portrait, but it is an entertaining, even moving one, and the forcefulness of her presence goes a long way in pulling the film back from the brink of cuddliness. THE BOONDOCK SAINTS II: ALL

SAINTS DAY D: Troy Duffy; with Sean Patrick Flanery, Norman Reedus, Billy Connolly, Clifton Collins Jr., Julie Benz, Judd Nelson, David Della Rocco, Bob Marley, Brian Mahoney, David Ferry. (R, 118 min.)

Director Duffy's wickedly bloodthirsty and strangely humorous *The Boondock Saints* was a cult hit waiting to happen that somehow didn't. As a post-post-Tarantino hipster-shoot-'em-up, it seemed oddly dated back when it received a microrelease from Miramax before heading straight to video and developing a substantial following, in part due to the canny documentary Overnight, which chronicles the Boondock director's meteoric nonrise to and ego-fueled fall from indie cinema heaven. The original is all muzzle flash and zero smarts, but its loopy storyline, which has hard-drinking, harder-fighting Boston-Irish sibling vigilantes Connor and Murphy MacManus (Flanery and Reedus) laying waste to both the Italian and Russian mobs in modern-day Beantown, is delirious, brutish, testosteronefueled un-fun. All Saints Day, from its dullish title on down to its final bullet, is the sort of outrageously bad filmmaking that defines the phrase unnecessary sequel." Inferior in practically every way to Danish director Susanne Bier's original Brødre - but now with more U2! - Brothers draws from two rampaging traditions, Greek tragedy and romantic melodrama, and renders both weirdly inert. Maguire plays the elder Cahill brother, Sam, a captain in the Marines; an attentive husband to his high school sweetheart, Grace (Portman); and a devoted father to two little girls. Brothers, in its most effective and engrossing stretches, examines the malleability of the roles the various Cahills are assigned, either by themselves or by others. All the actors do well enough, but they don't mesh at all – it's as if everyone's acting in his or her own movie - and there's simply no lived-in quality to the film. Sheridan and scripter David Benioff stick closely to the bullet points of the original but can't seem to translate the rich complexity of the characters and the choices they make. The smart, lightly snarky Cloudy With a Chance of Meatballs is a visual feast, impressively rendering in 3-D ingenious sights such as a spaghetti tornado and a Jell-O funhouse. And the sounds - including cheeky voice work by Mr. T, Harris, and Bratt – are a blast. All told, this is spirited play with unlabored lessons about good citizenship and the power of pluck that slide down as easily as the ice cream snowdrifts that blanket the ground. Random sequences follow in succession: a badly choreographed shark attack, a massage that requires a self-serve happy ending, ridiculous therapy sessions, a Fabio look-alike yoga instructor (Ponce) who provides the requisite homophobic sight gags, and a renegade excursion to the singles' side of the resort where, magically, everything resolves. Logic and credibility are defied at almost every opportunity. Even so, some of this might have worked if the script was, say, funny. The scenery looks good enough to be a screensaver, as one of the characters exclaims, and of course, the background offers an endless array of scantily clad hardbodies. 
DID YOU HEAR ABOUT THE

From its difficult-to-remember title on down, Did You Hear About the Morgans? is a forgettable and lackluster fish-out-of-water rom-com. The film exploits tired stereotypes about city and country folks while being propped up by the kind of irrational narrative logic that can only exist in the movies. Paul and Meryl Morgan (Grant and Parker) are a New York City couple who, though separated, together witness a homicide. The authorities decide to place the Morgans in the Witness Protection Program and ship them to Wyoming. Of course, a week cooped up together out West reminds the couple of how much they still love each other. The movie's wan script by writer-director Lawrence almost makes the viewer wish that actors Grant and Parker, who each here underplay their signature stammering and bubbliness, were allowed free reign to infuse their characters with greater liveliness. The initial "gee, whillikers" reaction to Zemeckis' motion-capture rendition of the Dickens classic eventually turns to "bah, humbug" as the film's technological novelty gives way to narrative mundanity. So absent is any emotional content that it's as though Dickens' ultimate cautionary tale is a mere afterthought onto which Zemeckis can drape his live-action/computer-animated visual hybrid that he has now used on his third sequential movie (following Beowulf and The Polar Express), Scrooge (Carrey) is still the same miserly old coot we know him to be, but instead of the transformative effect of Scrooge's glimpses into his past, present, and future, this film emphasizes the phantasmic elements of the ghosts and the pliable mechanics they use to show Scrooge such privileged viewpoints of his life. Carrey, never a slouch when it comes to his output, plays all three ghosts in addition to Scrooge. The actor sheds his usual silliness and adopts more of the tone and breeding of a British thespian. PRECIOUS: BASED ON THE NOVEL 'PUSH' BY SAPPHIRE

Newcomer Sidibe is a real find and not just a looming presence and narrative device. Daniels has also done a marvelous job of casting famous friends of his and getting heart-stirring, stripped-down performances from them all. Life is simple in Emmerich's films. Confronted with unprecedented perils, the characters in his disaster epics manage to reaffirm their broken loves, make amends for slipshod parenting, and, most impressively, outrun fireballs and certain death with their hides and wits intact. Emmerich takes the disaster-movie genre to its logical conclusion in 2012, obliterating or reconfiguring vast swaths of the planet's surface (solar storms boil the Earth's core; tectonic havoc ensues) and providing a 158-minute thrill ride that zips by like the real thing. Over the duration, there are homages (or lifts) to apocalyptic exercises of decades past (particularly When Worlds Collide) and plenty of cheeky references to Emmerich's own résumé. 2012 is PTSD - Popcorn Thrills and Sappy meloDrama - supersized to counter current real-world terrors, and it is, by turns, thrilling, ridiculous (the script, by Emmerich and longtime co-writer Harald Kloser, is riddled with howlingly goofy lines and seriously improbable deus-ex-machina moments), and just plain big, dumb fun. UP IN THE AIR D: Jason Reitman; with George Clooney, Vera Farmiga, Anna Kendrick, Jason Bateman, Amy Morton, Melanie Lynskey, J.K. Simmons, Sam Elliott, Danny McBride. (R. 109 min.)

Either by design or default, Reitman has customed a film perfectly in tune with these economically distressed, tetchy times, which may explain the near-universal hosannas with which *Up in the Air* has been met. Reitman sets the film in motion with an opening-credit sequence that highlights how America's vistas look from up above – apropros, considering that's where "career transition counselor" Ryan Bingham (Clooney) spends most of his time. Bingham, by choice, is a man without country or close ties, but very quickly two women (Farmiga and Kendrick) arrive in his life to shake up the status quo. Reitman's instincts, of both timing and tone, can feel just a hair off in the film's imperfect first and third acts. But the middle is

WHERE THE WILD

This is a freewheeling but tonally and aesthetically true adaptation of Maurice Sendak's 1963 children's book. Jonze, in collaboration with co-screenwriter Dave Eggers, seems to have tapped every primal feeling along the spectrum - joy, grief, rage, a relish for mayhem - and put it onscreen for our viewing pleasure. And a pleasure it is - the rare children's film that isn't coded for adults or made corny and flip for kids. Working with Jim Henson's Creature Shop and adapting quite literally Sendak's original etchings, Jonze has put to film what generations of children have only dreamed about: the nearness and dearness of Sendak's woolly beasts. One of the many delights of the film is in how physical it is (somebody is always pummeling somebody else and then following the beating with a bruising bear hug). There are minor grievances with the film, all technical, but they frankly feel inconsequential when put next to the film's over-- Kimberley Jones all effect. (10/16/2009) ★★★★ Movies 8

THE YOUNG VICTORIA

How young is young Victoria? At the film's beginning, she's just 17, with all the sullenness you would expect from a shut-in future queen fending off attack from her maman and prospective suitors cherry-picked by two kings. Blunt convincingly portrays the Princess Victoria as bullied, slightly silly, but most of all, desperately alone. Scriptwriter Julian Fellowes makes admirable work of shorthanding the complicated lineages and motives and manueverings. Director Vallée leans on candelight for several key scenes, and the effect is not only gorgeous but also intimates the deepening attachment between Victoria and Albert - one that was mutually felt, but not spoken about plainly. (Having just earned her independence, Victoria isn't keen on giving it up again so soon.) All told, *The Young Victoria* is a very well-made if not especially memorable picture, moving with all the grace and steadfastness of a waltz Victoria and Albert share, but absent any urgency or anything particularly exclamatory. 
No spoilers here, but first things first: Zombieland has the single most outrageously entertaining and unexpected celebrity cameo of any film - genre or otherwise - this filmgoer has seen in a long, long time. It's not a sequence that makes or breaks the film, but it does tip Zombieland over the edge of zomcom ordinariness into something considerably weirder and therefore more fun. Debuting director Fleischer's action-and-innards-drenched film dials it all up to 11 from the opening credits sequence - which uses popmusic-backed mayhem to smart expository and staggeringly kickass effect - and only slows down for a breather for the length of the aforementioned cameo. Storywise, there's precious little going on here that we haven't seen before, but Rhett Reese and Paul Wernick's archly hip and often downright hilarious script, combined with a quartet of seamless performances and enough cranial destruction to sate even the most diehard Fangoria reader, makes for one hell of a wild ride. "I thought it was a good idea to go somewhere energized, and I got a lot more than I bargained for," Chuck Prophet explains. "I did some resonance

[on the guitar], and you could feel it as soon as you step on the sidewalk, feel it vibrating under your feet. So I knew it would be energized. I didn't know we would be walking into the black plague."

He's referring to the swine flu scare this past summer in Mexico City, where he recorded his latest, ¡Let Freedom Ring! (Yep Roc). "I blame the cable news for a lot of the hysteria," he adds. "We were in a city of 27 million people, and they managed to shut it down. They passed out blue masks, so we put them on and went to work every day, but most public places were closed. It was not cool."

Having avoided the sickness, the thinking man's roots-rocker returns to the Continental for two nights of his most politically charged songs yet.

"I'm not really a political person," Prophet claims, "but the thing the songs all have in common, at least the characters, is they're all living in an anxious time. So, in that respect, I guess it's as political as I get. I'm not really for this or against that. I don't even agree with all the characters in the songs. I'm just like a photographer in a sense. I did write a lot of those songs in one sitting during a heat wave, and I think that kind of floated into some of the songs. If it's somewhere I haven't been, it gets me excited about writing an album."

He's also excited about returning to Austin. "Everybody in the band likes to eat tacos. Who doesn't like tacos? If there's somebody out there who doesn't like tacos, I just don't want to know 'em." – Jim Caliguiri

MILEAGE RATING DISCREPANCIES EXPLAINED

Dear Tom and Ray:

Can you explain why equivalent cars sold in Europe get much better fuel economy compared with those sold in the U.S.? As an example, I was looking - I suppose out of boredom - at the Honda UK website. It shows the mileage for the Honda Jazz (which is called the Honda Fit here) at around 50 miles per gallon, just as is, off the showroom floor. It's not a hybrid version, just the regular car! The equivalent base model in the U.S. comes in somewhere in the 30s for miles per gallon. What's up? And yes, I know that an imperial gallon is slightly bigger than a U.S. gallon. But the 10% difference in volume alone cannot explain the discrepancy in mileage. Lawrence

TOM: Boy, you were bored, Lawrence! RAY: There are several factors at work

here. The first is, as you mention, the imperial gallon. The British use a gallon that is 20% larger than a U.S. gallon, not 10% larger. So right there, you increase the mileage rating by 20%.

TOM: The second factor is engine size. The base model Fit in the U.S. comes with a 1.5-liter engine. Because Europeans prize fuel economy over power, the base model Fit/Jazz in Europe comes with a 1.2-liter engine. That's true of a lot of cars sold in Europe. They often have smaller engine options not offered here.

RAY: And the third factor is the testing. The Environmental Protection Agency mileage tests here in the United States are more realistic. They were changed a few years ago to factor in things that real drivers do - like accelerate and turn on their air conditioners. European mileage tests are still less reflective of real-world driving.

TOM: Add it all up, and the same car can get a combined rating of 53 miles per gallon across the pond and 31 over here.

RAY: Hey, if we send my brother over there, would his IQ rating be higher?



Now we're 10% unemployed and in the hole for trillions of dollars - most likely to the Chinese. In 2000 we had a \$230 billion surplus. Right now the deficit is \$1.84trillion. 

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
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


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
