

By handing off the WTP4 file to Michael King, I'm sure you realized that you were faithfully assuring that the contents of the file - and the triple role of Slusher as former Chronicle reporter, former City Council member, and current Austin Water WTP4 salesman - remained unexamined by our successors.

Thank you, though, for being a nice guy and an engaging writer, and for revealing perhaps more about Austin than you intended.



History will recall that in late October 1944, in the height of World War II, the now famed Japanese-American 442nd Regimental Combat Team and the 100th Battalion were ordered to rescue the Lost (141st) Texas Battalion trapped

on all sides by German troops near Biffontaine, France. Tired and worn from previous days of combat, they slogged through freezing rain and mud, fighting their way to rescue the Texans. After five days and five nights of some of the fiercest combat ever seen, suffering more than 800 casualties, they rescued the 211 remaining Texans. For their gallantry, heroism, and sacrifices on this battlefield and many others, the Japanese-American soldiers became Americas most decorated men, garnering 21 Congressional Medals of Honor. I mention this because the vast majority of these men who served their country faithfully were of Buddhist faith. These Japanese-American soldiers fought to preserve Americans freedom, fought to bring justice for their families, and, yes, fought for the right to be respected for their faith.

Is it un-American to be not of Christian faith? Is it right to spend taxpayers money to promote our Christian faith? Many of us need to be reminded that America's greatness lies in the diversity of its people, people of different faiths and colors who contribute to make all lives better. Headlines

- City Council doesn't meet today (Thursday) but resumes work sessions Tuesday and has posted a draft agenda for Jan. 12, when the most highprofile matter will likely be the public hearing on Austin Energy's proposed new rates (scheduled for 4pm, but good luck with that). The morning briefing is a demo of the city's new website, currently in beta testing.
- In an abrupt turnaround, council is also expected to consider accepting \$900,000 in weatherization grant funds from the Texas Department of Housing & Community Affairs – including \$400,000 that the city had apparently lost last month because of a missed deadline. See "Weather-Beaten but Still Ticking," p.12.
- Perry whipped Michele Bachmann and nobody else. Gov. Rick Perry, coming in fifth in the lowa caucuses with a blistering 10%, announced he was returning to Texas to "reassess" his candidacy – mostly by calling deeppocketed GOP funders to see if they still care to bankroll this folly. Later, the Guv tweeted that he would return to the trail in South Carolina.
- Perry was not the only Texas Republican to have a disappointing trip to Iowa. Sometime-Libertarian U.S. Rep. Ron Paul was shoved into third place by a surprise last-minute rally by former Pennsylvania Sen. Rick Santorum, who only Iost to former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney by eight votes.
- Austin is reeling from its first two murders of the year: Esme Barrera, a 29-year-old assistant to students with special needs at Casis Elementary and volunteer at Girls Rock Camp Austin, was killed in her North Campus home Jan. 1 by an unknown intruder. On Jan. 2, the body of Stephanie Renee Harvey, a 34-year-old home-less woman, was found in a Dumpster off North Lamar. Police are treating both deaths as homicides. For more on the victim of the year's first homicide, see "Barrera Death a Great Loss," p.12.
- Williamson County District Attorney John Bradley – whose new campaign slogan should be "I'm Not Responsible" – escaped sanctions for misconduct from the Texas State Bar for his actions in the Michael Morton murder case, particularly that Bradley fought attempts by defense attorneys to have evidence tested for DNA that later exonerated Morton.
- Colony Park is to become home to a grand new green experiment. Using a \$3 million HUD Community Challenge planning grant, the city of Austin plans to convert 208 acres of vacant land into a mixed-use, mixed-income community of 500 single-family and 250 multifamily units, using sustainable, energy-efficient, and zerowaste technology.
- After splitting over the plan to let IDEA Public Schools take over Eastside Memorial and Allan Elementary, the Austin ISD board of trustees will try to patch itself back together for its first meeting of 2012: a Jan. 9 work session on the new North Central elementary school.
- There's a new person to resent as you write that property tax check. Travis County has appointed an interim tax assessor-collector, **Tina Morton**, who will serve for this calendar year; Morton previously served as the office's director of public information and training. **Nelda Wells Spears** stepped down from the post after almost two decades of duty, retiring Dec. 31. Checks in either name will be processed as the office transitions, but remember: The deadline for payment is Jan. 31.
- Governor Who? With both Rick Perry and Lt. Gov. David Dewhurst out of state over the holidays, Senate President Pro Tempore Mike "Inaction" Jackson, R-La Porte, filled in as acting governor from Dec. 27 to Jan. 4. No one seemed to notice.


Barrera Death a Great Loss

The Austin Police Department on Monday released the sketch of a man wanted for questioning in connection with an attack on a woman early on Jan. 1 – an attack that may be related to the murder of Esmeralda Barrera, who was found dead in her home just before 3am.

Barrera, known affectionately as Esme, was 29. She worked at Casis Elementary with kids with special needs and was a mentor at Girls Rock Camp, a dedicated fan of the Alternative Softball League, and an avid music lover. Friends of Barrera's including a number of Chronicle employees - all said that the petite young woman was vibrant and

enthusiastic and lived life to the fullest. "She was the most positive, loving person," said Chronicle Sports Editor Mark Fagan, who met Barrera two years ago when the pair were both working at Waterloo Records; they were fast friends. "Like most everyone else who crossed paths with her, our lives immediately became intertwined," he wrote in an email. "It would be rare for six hours to go by without receiving a text from her. I don't love Esme as a friend, I just flat-out love Esme. Which is the way everyone feels, even if they only met her once."

Barrera was at the 29th Street Ballroom for a New Year's Eve show and left after the festivities wound down, heading home on foot to her rented cottage in the 3100 block of King Street, about five

Bicycle Thief Deceased

In a strange conclusion to a strange Austin news story, **James Clayton**, the subject of a 2009 profile by **Rob D'Amico** – see "The Bicycle Thief," April 10, 2009 – is dead. In 2009, Clayton pled guilty to stealing thousands of dollars' worth of bicycles and bicycle parts from Austin cyclists and was sentenced to four years in prison under a plea bargain; paroled within a couple of years, he was living in the Phoenix area. Clayton was in his late 30s and apparently died as a consequence of a heart condition. D'Amico noticed a Facebook post lamenting his death by Clayton's current girlfriend and later confirmed the death with Maricopa County. Clayton's Austin crimes particularly angered the local cycling community because he targeted people he had befriended. Remarkably, he had found a job in a Phoenix bike shop, whose owner was apparently unaware of his criminal history. Michael King

PUT SOME 'MOVE' IN THAT MOVEMENT FOR 2012

At last, a new year cometh! I say "at last" because, politically, 2011 was a rough ride.

Let me just mention a few of the bigger bumps: nonstop congressional gridlock, Donald Trump, the workingclass depression, Obama's serial surrenders to raw Republican partisanship, Newt Gingrich, the re-emergence of Wall Street's Gordon Gekko arrogance, right-wing governors gone wild, Rick "Oops" Perry, more tax breaks for corporations, Newt Gingrich (again) - and, at year's end, both Sarah Palin and The Donald suggested that they might run for president (which could set up a titanic clash of big hairdos).

Yet, we should not despair about the many political downsides of the old year, for they have prompted a series of very promising uprisings at America's grassroots. Progressives in states like Wisconsin, Ohio, Montana, Colorado, and Mississippi (yes, Mississippi!) scored big gains, and the Occupy Wall Street eruption all across the country has lifted spirits, revitalized grassroots organizing, and put some real "move" in the movement as we head into 2012.

In January, for example, a strong and savvy coalition will mobilize a nationwide campaign for repealing corporate personhood and the Supreme Court's infamous Citizens United edict. Also, the rise of the noncorporate economy is booming, with millions of Americans turning to co-ops, credit unions, farmers' markets, Fair Trade shops, and other local enterprises that ordinary people control, not absentee profiteers. Plus, strong, genuinely populist candidates for the U.S. Senate and House are running next year, including Elizabeth Warren in Massachusetts, Tammy Baldwin in Wisconsin, Norman Solomon in California, Ilya Sheyman in Illinois, and Eric Griego in New Mexico.

We have important work to do, so don't moan about 2011 - organize for 2012.

Weather-Beaten but Still Ticking

Last week's surprise announcement that the city had regained financial footing in its weatherization program was followed by another surprise on Tuesday: Austin Energy's Karl Rábago, vice president for distributed energy services, is no longer overseeing the program. Anthony Snipes, chief of staff for City Manager Marc Ott, made the announcement at Tuesday's meeting of a weatherization subcommittee made up of minority business representatives. Snipes said the program for lowincome residents would be handled through the office of AE General Manager Larry Weis.

Meanwhile, at their first meeting of the year, Jan. 12, City Council members are expected to sign off on a large and unexpected sum of federal stimulus dollars that had been given up for dead in November because of a colossal misstep at City Hall. The \$900,000 in funds - \$500,000 more than what the city was initially set to receive - will cover the cost of weatherizing 182 low-income apartments, according to a memo Ott sent to the mayor and council Dec. 29. (See Ott's complete memo, posted Dec. 29, at austinchronicle.com/newsdesk.)

Besides the originally designated 54 units at Mt. Carmel Village Apartments in Central East Austin, the money will also fund weatherization work for 128 more at the Chase Village Apartments near Highway 183 and I-35. (The Tuesday meeting also included discussion about how the for-profit property owners appear to be benefitting from the program more than lowincome homeowners.) Ott said in his memo that he had assured the Texas Department of Housing & Community Affairs, which allocated the funds, that the city had resolved the conflicts leading up to the city losing \$400,000 to weatherize the Mt. Carmel apartments. The issues contributing to the funding loss are still rather murky, due largely to buck-passing and what appears to be strong personality and policy differences involving Austin Energy leadership, including Rábago; the City Manager's Office: environmentalists: and minority contracting representatives, who say the utility had not followed city procedures when awarding contracts for the weatherization work. For now, the respective players appear willing to cooperate and move ahead in a timely manner - the funds must be spent by March 31 - because nobody wants to be accused of losing nearly \$1 million. - Amy Smith

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
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Top 10 State Stories

1) WATER WATER NOWHERE It wasn't just the record high temperatures. It was the half-billion dead trees, the shrinking lakes, the 3.5 million acres lost to wild-fires, and the collapsing wildlife and farm animal populations. As climate change accelerates and Texas' multiyear drought worsens, the state's water policy experts are left wondering how to deal with the new normal.

2) WE ONLY COUNT BACKWARD Knowing it was \$27 billion short for current expenses, Texas legislators had three options: Find new revenue, slash spending, or balance the two. Guess which they picked? The results were school closures, service cuts, staff layoffs, and GOP chest-beating about balanced budgets.

3) WAR ON WOMEN Despite 1.5 million women needing services, lawmakers gutted funding for preventative health care and family planning. Only 15% of women in need were being served before, and with just \$38 million left for the biennium – after a two-thirds cut – hundreds of thousands more will lose their only source of health care.

4) SPREAD THOSE LEGS If that weren't enough, Gov. Rick Perry declared anti-abortion, mandatory ultrasound legislation an "emergency," and the Lege eagerly complied, officially introducing physical pecksniffery between a woman and her doctor. Federal Judge Sam Sparks has temporarily enjoined the law, pending the outcome of litigation brought by the Center for Reproductive Rights.

5) MAP WHITE ONLY One lesson of the 2011 legislative session: Gerrymander with haste; repent at leisure. The GOP's egregious attempts to write Democratic and minority voters off the map brought court cases, a delayed primary season, and no confirmed maps for the 2012 election season.

6) VOTE WHITE ONLY The GOP shoved through its most extreme voter ID – that is, voter-suppression – law, while dismissing Dem proposals for easier registration. They also drew the wrath of the U.S. Attorney General and Department of Justice, assuring a string of brutal court fights – but meanwhile they'll be happy to diminish turnout anyway.

7) WAR ON WOMEN, TOO The Women's Health Program had been a bright spot in a dark landscape, in 2010 serving more than 180,000 women with basic care. Now it's a target in the GOP's determination to defund Planned Parenthood, the only provider of health care for thousands of Texas women. Only the feds and honest Dems stand in the way – think you'll find time to vote this year?

8) TEA FALLS, OCCUPY RISES The fringe right dominated the 2010 elections, but this year tea party candidates are either standing down or facing strong challenges; it's awkward to govern by anti-governance. The new Occupy populism changed the national debate to inequality in wealth and power – can it sustain a long haul?

9) BRADLEY BOOTED After a nasty session at the Senate Nominations Committee, featuring Williamson County District Attorney John Bradley shamelessly sneering at Sen. Rodney Ellis, D-Houston, the senators declined to confirm Bradley as chair of the Forensic Science Commission that he had aggressively undermined. Neither his winning personality nor his naked loyalty to Gov. Perry was enough to save his seat.

10) ADIOS, MOFO Oh, yeah, Gov. Goodhair ran for prez. Neither his macho posturing, shameless gay-bashing, antiabortion extremism, nor empty sanctimony was enough to save the Perry campaign from his arrogant ignorance and sheer incompetence. Oops! He's coming back home ... please just shoot us now. (See also: "Top 10 Rick Perry Campaign Misfires," p.18.)

Top 10 City Council Stories BY WELLS DUNBAR

1) OPENED PANDORA'S BOX A "walking quorum" complaint to the County Attorney's Office from local activist Brian Rodgers – bolstered by flame-fanning by the Austin Bulldog – put council communications under microscopic scrutiny, changed the way meetings are held, and drowned city staff in a flood of open records requests, all while undermining cooperation among an already fractious council.

2) EMAIL ELECTION The only action on the May ballot, Kathie Tovo reminded voters it's not impossible to dislodge a sitting council member. Tovo seemed to be running against Formula One more than against Randi Shade, but unflattering remarks about local activists Shade had sent via email – culled from open-records fishing expeditions – certainly didn't help.

3) TROUBLED WATERS Water Treatment Plant No. 4 could be pumping 150 million gallons a day two decades from now, and there will still be calls to mothball it. Following Tovo's election, the WTP4 opponents and agnostics held sway on the dais, commissioning a report on the costs of a construction shutdown. Surprise – it reached into the hundreds of millions (dollars, not gallons).

4) BY ANY OTHER NAME With a name change (Austin Resource Recovery), adoption of a zero-waste master plan, and head-scratchingly protracted recycling contract negotiations with Texas Disposal Systems,

the department formerly known as Solid Waste Services had a big year – even if it didn't change its name to the Fred Durst Society of the Humanities and Arts.

5) FEW VOTES IS BEST In one particularly tense moment for a council that faced more than its share this year, the opportunity to move local elections from May to November failed on a 4-3 vote, with recriminations about disenfranchised voters, debate over the sacrosanct nature of the City Charter, and more polarization of the dais.

6) INFINITE FREE PARKING WTP4 wasn't council's only mulligan in 2011. The decision to revisit the admittedly unpopular decision to charge for public parking Downtown on weekend evenings showed that while parking is a limited resource, political posturing isn't.

7) CAGING SHARKS Starting where limited measures from the state ended, an ordinance by Council Member Bill Spelman put predatory lenders on a shorter leash – a concrete reminder that government can protect the most vulnerable.

8) IT'S RAINEY-ING BARS A stalled economy and relaxed zoning launched a brace of cocktail lounges along residential Rainey Street, instead of the mixed-use development (and parking?) the city hoped for. Lustre Pearl was a sound permit too far, as the city retreated to reconsider how to balance growth and neighborhood quality of life in the central city district.



9) NO PROFIT IN IT The biggest undertaking for council this year was also the most thankless, as the city competitively rebid social service nonprofit contracts for the first time in well over a decade – and made sausage in real time on council's Public Health and Human Services Committee. **10) BEST-LAID PLANS** The Downtown Austin Plan was adopted at long last, amid simmering questions over density in the urban core, redevelopment in the Warehouse District, and the future of the Red River music scene. The Imagine Austin Comprehensive Plan keeps working – along with a last-minute scrub dumped upon the beleaguered Planning Commission.

Top 10 Criminal Justice Stories

1) MICHAEL MORTON FRAMED? After nearly 25 years in prison, Michael Morton was cleared by DNA tests, released, and exonerated for the 1986 murder of his wife. Did then-Williamson County District Attorney Ken Anderson (now a district judge) withhold vital evidence at Morton's 1987 trial? Morton's attorneys have called for a court of inquiry; others are calling for sanctions or Anderson's resignation.

2) YOGURT UNSOLVED Twenty years after the brutal slaying of four girls, the infamous 1991 yogurt shop murders remain unsolved. A handful of defense attorneys and at least one of the original case investigators say that going back to square one – the scene of the grisly crime – is what's needed to find the solution.

3) SEE NO EVIL AT APA Austin Police Association members were riled by the purchase of a union hall without consultation and the use by an executive board member of officer-donated leave time for statewide union business. Nevertheless, the membership – in a record-low turnout – re-elected President Wayne Vincent and named Combined Law Enforcement Agencies of Texas President Todd Harrison second-in-command.

4) WE'D RATHER NOT KNOW The state's Forensic Science Commission closed its inquiry into the 2004 Cameron Todd Willingham capital arson case without ruling whether fire investigators were negligent during their initial review. Fire scientists have said that state investigators relied on outdated science and myths to conclude that the sinceexecuted Willingham was guilty of an arson that killed his three children – but Attorney General Greg Abbott limited the FSC's jurisdiction before the panel could rule.

5) ANOTHER APD SHOOTING At year's end, the May police shooting death of Byron Carter remained unresolved, though the cops implicated are back on the job. Police accused Carter and a companion of casing cars near Downtown when officers shot passenger Carter in self-defense; the Carter family attorney says the young men were doing nothing wrong and were shot in panic or negligence. A grand jury no-billed the juvenile for aggravated assault, and the APD and criminal investigations continue.

6) HE HAD A POINT After decades of replacing punctured tires, Hyde Park residents saw the arrest and prosecution of longtime neighborhood tire-slasher Tommy Kelley. The 56-year-old homeless man represented himself at trial and was sentenced to 10 years in prison, with more cases to come.

7) SUSPICION LINGERED Ten months after Maurice Pierce was shot and killed by APD Officer Frank Wilson after a foot chase, a Travis County grand jury cleared Wilson of wrongdoing in the death of the former suspect in the 1991 yogurt shop murders. Charges against Pierce were dropped in 2003 for lack of evidence, and though the shooting took place more than a year ago and the grand jury no-billed



Wilson this fall, Pierce's personal property has not yet been returned to his family.

8) THAT'S NOT THE GUY Faulty identification is the cause of most of the state's wrongful convictions, and Texas lawmakers finally passed a first step to reforming eyewitness ID procedures, although without enforcement mechanisms. The APD and Travis County D.A.'s Office released a study demonstrating that double-blind sequential lineups greatly reduce mistaken IDs.

9) DEREGISTERING ROMEOS After years of increasing criminal sanctions for sex offenses, legislators finally passed a modest measure to undo some injustices. The new law

allows some youthful offenders whose romantic liaisons have branded them as deviants a way to have their names removed from the state's exploding sex offender registry.

10) ONE INQUIRY ENDS ... The U.S. Deptartment of Justice officially ended its fouryear probe of APD practices, concluding there was "no reasonable cause to believe that APD has engaged in a pattern or practice" of illegal policing. The probe was requested in 2004 by the Texas Civil Rights Project and the Austin NAACP, based on accusations of excessive force against minority residents. The FBI has reportedly said it is now reviewing the APD shooting of Byron Carter.

Top 10 Education Stories BY RICHARD WHITTAKER



1) BAD IDEA The community doesn't want it, the board was split, and the research shows it's a weak proposal. Yet Austin ISD saw fit to hand Eastside Memorial High School and Allan Elementary over to IDEA Public Schools to run as an in-district charter.

2) FACILITIES FAIL AISD's Facility Master Plan was launched as a massive exercise in public consultation to guide property use and investment strategy for the next decade. It morphed into a portfolio of radical academic changes authored by Superintendent Meria Carstarphen, and no one really knows how that happened.

3) CUTS FIRST OR FIRST CUTS At the

beginning of the 82nd legislative session, there were two options: Raise taxes, or decimate school funds. By the end, it was clear no new money was coming, so lawmakers spent days discussing which combination of the terrible rival plans (authored by House Public Education Committee Chair Rob Eissler and Senate counterpart Florence Shapiro) they would inflict.

4) UT MEDIA STUDIES The Longhorn Network was supposed to be a cash cow for the University of Texas and ESPN. Instead, it turned into a running joke, nearly killing the Big 12, sending Texas A&M to the SEC, and featuring a statewide audience that on a good day may number in the dozens.

5) NO GOLD STAAR AT TEA Teachers had been expecting the new State of Texas Assessments of Academic Readiness for five years. Yet by the beginning of the school year, the Texas Education Agency had failed to provide even the simplest outlines, leaving them teaching to a test no one had seen.

6) ETHICS CLASSES NEEDED UT's Law School found itself in the court of public opinion in December when Dean Larry Sager resigned amid allegations surrounding gender pay inequality, huge forgivable loans to faculty, and a \$500,000 payment to himself. **7) REMEDIAL MATH** Thousands of students depend on the need-based TEXAS Grants to complete college. So when a huge financial miscalculation by the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board left thousands without the cash they deserved, it was more than just an abstract math problem.

8) TEXAS HISTORY LESSON "I am besieged, by a hundred or more of the Legislators under Rick Perry." With these words, echoing the famous Alamo letter, Perrin-Whitt Consolidated ISD Superintendent John Kuhn reframed the education finance and accountability debate and became an instant public school hero.

9) SOUND SCIENCE The State Board of Education has often been seen as a tool of the fringe right, but this year it refused to approve textbooks from Holt McDougal until the books treated evolution as fact. As the Texas Freedom Network put it, "That sound you hear is the collective heads of the anti-science lobby exploding."

10) VALERO DEVALUED As school districts bled, petrochemical giant Valero tried to add insult to injury by asking the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality to reinterpret its rules and create a massive tax break pillaged straight from school coffers. Even the TCEQ could not swallow that bitter a pill and ultimately rejected Valero's request.

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
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Top 10 Rick Perry Campaign Misfires BY RICHARD WHITTAKER



1) ONE, TWO ... HELP! Perry's main task at the CNBC debate was to remember which three federal agencies he would dismantle. His answer? "Commerce, Education, and the - what's the third one there?" (The correct answer was "Energy." Oops.)

2) DOUBLE DIPPIN' Just as he was launching a slash-and-burn budget that laid off thousands of state employees, Perry claimed his state pension while still pulling in his salary as governor and living in a \$10,000-a-month rented mansion.

3) BROKEBACK PERRY Falling back on a standard GOP tactic ("If all else fails, bash gays"). Perry issued an ad lamenting the end of "don't ask, don't tell." It soon became the most "disliked" video on YouTube.

4) HEAD FIGURE HEAD You've heard the rumors about Rick Perry's sex life for years. Now Glen Maxey, the only openly gay state rep in Texas history, has committed them to print. It quickly became the No. 1 gay and lesbian nonfiction title for the Kindle.

5) PRIMARY, WHAT PRIMARY? (PART 1) When the Republican Party of Texas agreed to move the primary date, it spared Texas the cost and strain of a bifurcated primary season, but by switching from March 6 to April 3. the GOP effectively denied Perry his only guaranteed Super Tuesday win.

6) LITERACY TEST NEEDED? In one speech in New Hampshire, Perry botched the date of the 2012 general election and the age (18) for federal voting. This is the man who has aggressively pushed for tougher voter registration laws.

7) RATS TO THE SINKING SHIP Perry's campaign was supposed to be given a shot in the arm when he hired Karl Rovewannabe Dave Carney and campaign capo Rob Johnson away from Newt Gingrich's camp. Then Gingrich's competent debate performances launched him to the top of the polls for weeks, while Carney and Johnson watched their new client's numbers flatline.

8) PRIMARY, WHAT PRIMARY? (PART 2)

It takes 10,000 signatures to get on the Virginia Republican primary ballot. In a startling lack of organization, Perry's camp missed that target; having failed to gain enough support to even get before voters, he sued.

9) **BUM STEERAGE** Conceding that many Texas journalists had tried to "circle the wagons" around Perry the candidate rather than acknowledge his sins on a national stage, Texas Monthly Editor Jake Silverstein awarded Perry the ultimate Texas political insult for his "oops" moment: Bum Steer of the Year. "We didn't want to," he sighed, "but we had to."

10) NUMBERS HARD In a last-ditch attempt to woo lowa voters, Perry pledged to cut \$5 trillion from the federal budget. The total budget is only \$3.7 trillion -\$1.3 trillion less than Perry wants to cut.

10) THE RACE TO ZERO WASTE One of City Council's last actions of 2011 was to approve a 30-year plan to whittle down the amount of trash sent to landfills; watch for pilot programs to help you figure out what to do with that old mattress.

Top 10 Joints

1) UNHAPPY **BIRTHDAY** 2011

marked the big 4-0 for the drug war, officially begun under President Richard Nixon on June 17, 1971. How

big it's grown! Unfortunately, like too many 40-year-olds, time has not granted this overgrown baby much wisdom.

2) JOINT CUSTODY By the time you finish reading this entry, at least one pot smoker will have been arrested. According to calculations made by Law Enforcement Against Prohibition based on FBI crime reports, one drug arrest is made in America every 19 seconds.

3) DO THEY VOTE? For the third year in a row, a majority of voters - 55% - say they favor legalizing pot. In the Angus-Reid poll, two-thirds of voters also said - vet again - that the drug war has been a complete failure. Don't expect elected officials to pay any attention.

4) SCARED OF NEEDLES Two years after the federal ban was lifted, congressional Republicans in December voted to reinstate a ban on funding for needle-exchange programs, one of the best available harm-reduction strategies to reduce the spread of communicable diseases.

5) OBAMA BLOWBACK After issuing a directive to federal law enforcement to cease raiding and prosecuting medi-pot patients and caregivers acting within state law parameters, the Obama Department of Justice has reversed itself and is ratcheting up the war on pot in California, leading Americans for Safe Access to sue.

6) HIGH WAY According to a new study from researchers in Colorado and Montana, both beer sales and the number of alcohol-related traffic fatalities have declined in states where medi-pot is legal. Overall, the research says, traffic fatalities in medi-pot states have declined by 9%.

7) **DEFINITION OF INSANITY** According to a memo from the U.S. Customs and Border Protection's Office of Intelligence and Operations Coordination, removing "key" cartel personnel through arrest or death has no effect on the amount of drugs smuggled into the U.S.

8) IGNORANCE IS FED BLISS Four years after a Drug Enforcement Administration judge told the agency head that she should license University of Massachusetts professor Lyle Craker to grow a test crop of pot, DEA Administrator Michele Leonhart rejected that finding, arguing that diversion of the test dope is too big a risk.

9) SMITH'S EXPORTS U.S. Rep. Lamar Smith believes the war on drugs has actually been successful. There's no other way to explain his push this fall to export it abroad via legislation that would allow federal prosecutors to charge American citizens with drug crimes for actions taken overseas - e.g., smoking pot in Amsterdam.

10) HYSTERICAL STAPLES Texas Agriculture Commissioner Todd Staples held a bizarre September press conference to announce that the Mexican border is all but lost to drug traffickers, trotting out two retired Army generals and a host of rancher types who told reporters that hundreds of dead bodies are scattered on the border region. These reports, they noted, are anecdotal - and immigrants often die for lack of water

- but should still drive U.S. policy.

Top 10 Environmental Stories

1) DROUGHT AND DESTRUCTION

Record-setting hot and dry conditions wreaked havoc across Central Texas, killing trees, crops, cattle, and wildlife and providing a landscape of kindling ripe for wildfires; our neighbors in Bastrop saw the worst of the catastrophic fires.

2) ROLLING ON COAL Enviros and public health advocates celebrated the Environmental Protection Agency's new safeguards to limit mercury pollution from coal-fired power plants. Gov. Rick Perry accused the EPA of killing Texas jobs.

3) PIPELINE POLITICS President

Obama gave opponents of the Canadato-Texas Keystone XL pipeline the gift of more time when he delayed a decision to green-light the project or seek an alternative route; GOP forced a deadline into the payroll tax extension.

4) WATER TORTURE With a new fourvote majority on City Council, the anti-Water Treatment Plant No. 4 contingent thought it'd have another shot at reviewing, then killing, the WTP4 project; they got the first part, but not the second, having decided construction was too far along to mothball the plant.

5) JUST PAINT IT GREEN The Formula One racing event in Austin gained some green momentum after the city inked a "landmark environmental partnership" that would make the F1 site the greenest motor-sports facility in the world.

6) PLASTIC FANTASTIC BAG BAN

It wasn't the most absolute stand, but City Council called for an end to plastic bags at retail and grocery store checkout lanes; city staffers are drafting a policy to kick-start the process of phasing out the bags. Paper, you're next.

7) SOMETHING IN THE WATER Fluoride opponents may have lost a battle in calling for a warning label on water bills, but the issue refuses to die, and in fact will be a council campaign topic with at least one anti-fluoridation candidate on the trail.

8) WHITHER WEATHERIZATION?

A miscue somewhere between Austin Energy and the City Manager's Office caused the city to lose a bundle of stimulus funds intended to cover the cost of weatherizing 54 low-income apartments.

9) RATE INCREASE VS.

CONSERVATION Austin Energy's new rate structure proposal carries a jackedup monthly fee that opponents say would

1) PERRY BLINDNESS In December, state media suddenly discovered that the Texas governor isn't very bright – and that he's lazy, too. It took a spectacular national campaign bungle for reporters to discover what was obvious 10 years ago: Rick Perry doesn't like to work very hard, doesn't care to campaign, and doesn't like reporters at all. So who's the slower learner?



2) TRAIL GONE COLE Management sent packing longtime KVET-FM talk-show host, country DJ, Longhorn bullhorn, and once dominating radio baritone Bob Cole, in a change that reflected ratings wars as well as changing Austin demographics. Opinionated, orotund, and connected, he'll likely radioresound again soon.

3) 'STATESMAN' SWITCHES In a curiously abrupt September departure, *Austin American-Statesman* Editor Fred Zipp announced his "passion for the job" had diminished and that it was time to do other things. Interim editor and longtime staffer Debbie Hiott assumed the permanent post in November. And John Kelso retired (sort of), and Ken Herman replaced him (sort of) – don't bother to send in the clowns.

4) ENTER LAUGHING Last year KGSR-FM went bouncing around the airwaves to much local consternation (depending on your location), a ratings boost from the burbs, and two (count 'em, two) frequencies. That ended last month when Emmis delivered 102.7FM to the aptly named Comedy 102.7, featuring two-minute bursts of every comic ever recorded – or at least a couple dozen – who seem to have more freedom of profane speech than ordinary announcers.

5) BULL WOOFS Local blogger and investigative reporter Ken Martin triggered a City Hall uproar via the Austin Bulldog, where he broke the story that City Council members *might* be privately meeting or emailing with one another more than the law strictly allows. The Travis County Attorney continues to mull the tea leaves, and Place 3's Kathie Tovo in part owes her seat to the Dog Man.


6) MAXEY BOOKS IT The most notable publication to erupt from the Perry campaign was not the governor's *Fed Up!* – an exercise in right-wing dog whistles and self-promotion – but former state Rep. Glen Maxey's self-published *Head Figure Head*, the record of Maxey's attempt to confirm the long-standing rumors about Rick Perry's closeted sex life. Maxey couldn't quite get his first-hand sources on the record, but the loud silence from media that trumpeted Herman Cain's hetero dalliances speaks volumes.



7) TRIBUNE SOARS "More Than 5 Million Reasons To Give" reads the headline on the end-of-year fundraising post by editor-in-chief and man-about-everywhere Evan Smith. He's not talking about money, but readers – 5 million unique visitors to the nonprofit news site in 2011. The Trib is not quite breaking even yet, but it's attracting readers and buzz to state political news. Can the site help mark the way to a renewed public journalism? We have to hope so

8) NPR SURVIVES Perennial GOP attempts to cut Corporation for Public Broadcasting funding – a greater threat to grant-dependent local stations than to the national network – gathered momentum after an NPR fundraiser was caught on tape dissing tea partiers. Despite lurid headlines, CPB survived – although the pressure didn't help NPR's already timid political coverage.

9) BAD STRATEGERY What's the forecast for a security intelligence company that can't maintain its own security? Austin-based Stratfor (Strategic Forecasting Inc.) – a "global intelligence" firm often cited for expertise on international politics, defense, and security – will find out in the new year, after it was hacked for client info, credit card numbers, and emails by Anonymous activists. Stratfor is repairing the financial and PR damage while waiting for more gigabytes to fall.



10) DUNBAR DEPARTS Last but definitely not least, the *Chronicle's* City Hall Hustler decided in December to hustle in a different direction, taking his political insight and acerbic wit to another Central Texas news venue – online at **www.kutnews.org**. (He also got married this year – holy smokes, he's a grownup!) We'll miss his columns, his blog posts, his videos, his newsletters, his reporting, and even some of his jokes – but the friendships remain forever. Happy New Year to Wells and Pam, and to all!

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THE ARTS SCENE PERSEVERES

Maybe you thought Oklahoma was the only place rattled by record quakes in 2011. Alas, for Austin's arts scene, the year was also full of shock waves, an unprecedented number that left our cultural landscape significantly changed by 2011's end. Where the city previously had two contemporary art museums, it has one. That annual arts celebration that drew more than 100,000 people Downtown on New Year's Eve? Gone. The opera company headquarters that helped usher in Austin's current cultural makeover? Sold. There were turnovers in leadership at more than a half-dozen major cultural institutions*, plus departures by several arts stalwarts from groups with which they'd long been associated**. Never has the city's arts community experienced so many profound shifts in a single year.

You can blame some of this seismic activity on the downturn, sure. But as bad as the economy was (and is), it's not the only fault line at fault here. In many of the cases where finances were an issue, organizational challenges and management struggles were contributing factors. And sometimes time played a major role, with artists feeling they'd logged enough of it in one place and choosing to move on.

Still, as notable as the upheavals themselves were the responses by the city's creatives. The dissolution of First Night Austin was the rare instance of an organization calling it quits. More common was the extraordinary effort to keep one going, whatever it took, as with the merger of Arthouse and the Austin Museum of Art, as well as the sale of Austin Lyric Opera's Heller Opera Center. And our artists typically exhibited the ingenuity that has earned them national attention. When East Austin Studio Tour artists caught heat from the city over home studios that weren't code compliant, the Austin Creative Alliance

sponsored sessions to educate artists about code issues and established the Frameworks EAST Fund, a microloan program to help artists upgrade their live/ work spaces. The Hidden Room Theatre took part in the Edinburgh Festival Fringe while staying at home via a Skype-based theatrical project that connected Texas and Scotland. With a creative mindset that can use new tech and social media to leapfrog oceans, Austin's arts scene proved that it has what it takes to handle a few guakes.

Top 10 Classical Music Treasures of 2011 by ROBERT FAIRES

1) 'RENAISSANCE & RESPONSE: POLYPHONY THEN &

NOW' (Conspirare) This breathtaking survey of early choral music in four concerts over three days was a massive challenge for Craig Hella Johnson's singers, but their voices showed no strain, only an ethereal unity and reverence that sounded centuries old.

2) 'FLIGHT' (Austin Lyric Opera) The travelers in Jonathan Dove's airport-set opera may be earthbound, but ALO's production took wing, its portrait of lives in transit interrupted by turns delightfully comic and lyrically poignant.

3) AUSTIN SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA WITH JOSHUA BELL (**ASO**) The symphony at play with a mockingbird, for when violinist Bell puts bow to strings, his song is as pure, lively, and masterful as the mocker's. The most astonishing sound all year.

4) AUSTIN SYMPHONY ORCHESTRA WITH ANNE AKIKO MEYERS (ASO) Local virtuoso Meyers attacked Prokofiev's *Violin Concerto No. 1* with such intensity, such fury, I couldn't unclench my hands throughout. A riveting turn, followed by Peter Bay leading ASO through an ebullient, winning run of Stravinsky's *Petrushka*.

5) ROSSINI: 'PETITE MESSE SOLENNELLE' (Austin Civic Chorus) No sober, bloodless Teutonic mass this, but rather a lusty Italian one, brimming with operatic drama and passion; Ryan Heller's choir and soloists made you feel the blood's pulse and heat.

6) 'OUT OF THE BACH'S' (Austin Chamber Music Center) This pairing of pianist Michelle Schumann and vibraphonist Graeme Francis bouncing between vintage Bach and composers inspired by him *was* inspired, with the piece from Keith Jarrett's *Köln Concert* absolutely melting me.



7) 'GOLDEN HORNET PROJECT PERCUSSION VII' (GHP) Restless experimenters Graham Reynolds and Peter Stopschinski at their mad-scientist best, cooking up new rhythms and sounds with anything they could pound. Yeah, they got the beat.

8) 'BACH'S HERD OF HARPSICHORDS' (La Follia) Keith Womer and his trio of collaborators not only revealed the variety of this early keyboard instrument, but with a little help from J.S. Bach, they seduced you with its sounds.

9) (TIE) 'SAMUEL BARBER: AMERICAN ROMANTIC'/'FROM THE BRITISH ISLES' (Conspirare) The great chorus covered both sides of the Atlantic this fall with the chamber choir shining a mighty light on Barber's gentle darkness and the youth choirs and symphonic choir's men bringing thundering majesty and sweet spirit to British hymns and folk songs.

10) ANTON NEL, PIANO, WITH MARTIN BURKE, ACTOR (Butler School of Music) The keyboard master at his most commanding, thundering out Beethoven and Debussy, and at his most whimsical, dancing through Poulenc's sketches of Babar as the irrepressible Burke narrated his elephantine tale.



Top 10 Theatrical Wonders of 2011

1) 'BLACK WATCH' (Texas Performing Arts) The National Theatre of Scotland used every weapon in theatre's arsenal – language, movement, light, sound, costume, theatricality – to put us in the boots of Scottish soldiers in Iraq, and the unforgettable images and sublime stagecraft brought home all the pride, anger, pain, and loyalty of those brave men.

2) 'SPIRITS TO ENFORCE' (Capital T Theatre) With a true sensitivity to language, serious comic chops, and seamless ensemble work, Gary Jaffe and his superteam of actors transformed *The Tempest* into something "rich and strange."

3) CONFIDENCE MEN: IMPROVISED DAVID MAMET

(Out of Bounds Comedy Festival) Holy Bard of fuckin' Avon, Batman! The C Men's testosterone-fueled spin on *Super Friends* had more laughs, surprises, and dramatic cohesion than many *scripted* plays, proving these all-stars possess powers and abilities far beyond those of mortal improvisers.

4) 'RED HOT PATRIOT: THE KICK-ASS WIT OF MOLLY IVINS' (Zach Theatre) If *Chronicle* readers voted her Austin's best actor, who am I to deny my wife a Top 10 spot – especially when she ripped up the stage embodying our bestbeloved social-conscience/ass-kicker? A perfect match of actor to role, with Barbara Chisholm's own vitality, charisma, wit, and political conviction fusing seamlessly with Ivins'.

5) ZACH THEATRE My wife notwithstanding, Zach kept the lushly designed, tightly acted hits coming all year. Its toe-tapping teens in crisis (*Hairspray*, *Spring Awakening*) and fraught families burnin' down the house (God of Carnage, August: Osage County, The Book of Grace) marked this theatre's strongest overall year in a decade.

6) 'THE TEMPEST' (Actors From the London Stage)

Prospero's island never seemed so close or his charms so potent as in this five-actor performance on a bare stage, with attention to language and physicality that made magic.

7) 'RAPPAHANNOCK COUNTY' (Texas Performing Arts) This new musical theatre work rendered the Civil War, our nation's epic tragedy, in miniature: two dozen art songs that gleamed like diamonds in sunlight – and cut like them, too.

8) LAUREN LANE When are we lucky enough to see one of our finest actors onstage *four* times in a year? In *A Writer's Vision(s), The Cherry Orchard, God of Carnage, and August: Osage County,* Lane gave master classes in versatility, comic finesse, and effortlessly sounding a character's depths.

9) IA ENSTARÄ'S SETS In *Flying, Uncle Vanya*, and *Ghosts*, this designer's spaces were characters in their own right, gorgeous and alive, whispering insights about the people in them through a huge frame, a tree, and weblike strings.

10) CHAMBER MUSICALS More troupes explored the growing repertoire of small-cast contemporary musicals with thoroughly engaging results, from the wry and sexy (Penfold Theatre Company's *I Love You Because*, TexARTS' [*title of show*]) to the utterly charming (Summer Stock Austin's *A Year With Frog and Toad*, Soubrette Productions' *The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee*) to the darkly original (the Vestige Group's *Di[verge]*).

Top 10 Arts Events of 2011 in No Particular Order

1) EAST AUSTIN STUDIO TOUR The 10th EAST – of which Big Medium is the instigator and the epicenter – was better than ever, with so many open studios and strange happenings all across the sunrise side of the ATX, no matter what one's haircut looked like for a while.

2) FUSEBOX FESTIVAL Ron Berry's precocious brainchild is becoming a multitrack performance festival worthy of being ranked with the best in the world – and the new foodie track is such a welcome phenomenom-nom.

3) OUT OF BOUNDS COMEDY FESTIVAL OOB is matching, in a funny-boned manner replete with improv and sketch and stand-up, the excitement and operational precision of the above two festivals – all praise that Bearded Lamb.

4) 'PRINTING MATTERS' (Slugfest Printmaking Workshop & Gallery) Artemio Rodriguez provided a stark display of graphic power with huge and brilliantly wrought tableaux of rampant human skeletons rendered via wood, blades, and ink so black it'd make a moonless midnight jealous.

5) 'SURPRISE ANNIE' (Rubber Repertory) This show was as much a treat for the attending public as it was for confessional performance artist Annie La Ganga, whom Rubber Rep presented in 12 different and unexpected locations (unknown, until the last moment, to La Ganga herself) over four weekends.

6) 'AS ABOVE SO BELOW' (Domy Books) Bruce Lee Webb's painstakingly curated show of the antique art and arcane props from various of this nation's secret societies and clandestine brotherhoods was a walk-through experience that eclipsed everything else ever shown in its venue – and in most places beyond.

7) 'YOU SEE ... THING IS ...' (Big Med-

ium) Jamie Panzer's exhibition showcased what happens when one talented man brings sculptural art to its zenith of wit and intellectual playfulness to the gambits of professional craft. His mind, we imagine, must be like a carnival midway; we're glad his creations let us see a few of the wild and wily rides.

8) 'RIDDLEY WALKER' (Trouble Puppet Theater Company) This theatrical adaptation of the (now) late Russell Hoban's postapocalyptic masterpiece was Connor Hopkins and company's valiant attempt at bringing the complexity of that novel to a puppeted stage: As compelling and enigmatic as a Eusa Show among the muck and mire of Inland.

9) CO-LAB Run by the indefatigable Sean Gaulager, this Eastside gallery mounts a new show – installation works, interactive performance pieces, multimedia spectacles, simple ol' exhibitions from local artists and out-of-state guests – about, what, every two weeks throughout the year? And wraps it up with a snazzy annual publication of photos and documentary text? Call us a canvas and color us impressed.

10) 'THEY'RE COMING TO GET YOU' (**FronteraFest**) Lowell Bartholomee's monologue, performed by Robert S. Fisher at Short Fringe way back at the beginning of 2011, was a hybrid of personal memoir and subjectively charged film critique (featuring Philip Kaufman's *Invasion of the Body Snatchers* and John Carpenter's *The Thing*) that was both riveting and illuminating; its memory lingers like a strange nightmare we can't (and don't want to) forget.

Top 10 Notable Theatrics of 2011



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
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
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The Year in Books

Thirty-one titles that got us talking this year

I'm a prejudiced reader. Maybe a bit of a snob, too. So say the words "genre fiction" – no, even worse, "Western novel" – and all my limited imagination coughs up is a moldering stack of Louis L'Amour paperbacks. Now The Sisters Brothers (Ecco) is in fact a very stylish-looking hardback, but still. It wasn't until Texas Book Festival Director Clay Smith took the book off my shelf, handed it to me, and said with real urgency, "You must read this now," that I considered reconsidering my position. It took me another three months to get around to discovering what a spitfire seduction is Patrick deWitt's black-comic, gold rush picaresque about an assassin with the soul of a poet.


I may have opinions about fantasy novels, too. Not really my bag. But I'd heard enough burbling about Erin Morgenstern's first novel, The Night Circus (Doubleday), to give the first chapter a once-over. About 12 hours later, I was done with the book, and powerfully tempted to turn back to page one and relive the novel's lyrical unfurling of a love story between rival magicians in the late 19th century.

Might as well continue the confessional: I started, but never finished, at least three of the year's most acclaimed books - Chad Harbach's The Art of Fielding (Little, Brown and Company), which was the victim of a hand-me-down Kindle crapping out on me midread; Téa Obreht's The Tiger's Wife (Random House), currently perched alongside my bathtub, a placement that suggests a sincere desire to forge on; and Benjamin Hale's The Evolution of Bruno Littlemore (Twelve), which did great things for my vocabulary but plinked another unavoidable prejudice of mine, which is that bestiality really icks me out. (I'm just trying to be honest here.)

There were nonfiction treats, though their pleasures were more piecemeal. The incandescent first chapter of Gabrielle Hamilton's memoir Blood, Bones & Butter: The Inadvertent Education of a Reluctant Chef (Random House). Jon Ronson's The Psychopath Test: A Journey Through the Madness Industry (Riverhead), a book that wisely contains itself to discrete chapters lest Ronson's distinctive voice - equal parts curmudgeon and paranoiac, pickled in a wicked sense of humor - overwhelm. John Jeremiah Sullivan's **Pulphead** (Farrar, Straus and Giroux) - a touch overpraised, but hats off to any essay collection that can span an encounter with Real World royalty the Miz and a heart-clutch personal essay about the electric shock that brought his brother near to death. And I suspect Rachel Polonsky's Molotov's Magic Lantern: A Journey in Russian History (Faber & Faber) might've been nearer the top of my list had I started it sooner than two nights ago.



There were other books that got under my skin, I'm sure of it, but I have a terrible memory, which is probably why I was so moved by Julian Barnes' Booker Prizewinner The Sense of an Ending (Knopf). Some critics called it slight, but its subject matter - the disconnect between how individuals remember a collective history dovetailed with my own reckoning with a faulty recollection. Barnes' novella was an eloquent reminder that there is no one truth, and no impartial observers, either.

eignty, leaving the possibility that faith could produce real marvels.

I almost always miss out on the big, revelatory novel of the year until it comes out in paperback, but I somehow managed to catch Alan Hollinghurst's The Stranger's Child (Knopf) in high cotton (and also while on layover in Dallas-Fort Worth). Hollinghurst presents some set-pieces that smack of other British novels - class disparity, familial estates crammed with secrets - but shifts the narrative architecture so radically it makes fresh tableaux of old finery.


The imaginative swerve of Dean Young's Fall Higher (Copper Canyon) is hardly the most amazing thing about the collection of poems; more to the point, it's his ninth full-length collection, and his work gets wiser and braver all the time. There are the blockbuster gorgeous poetry moments - "Mostly the world is lava's rhythm,/the impurities of darkness/sometimes called stars" - and also the unexpected stunners: "Something is always tumbling/down the steps in my chest/carrying a birthday cake"; "It's not that Monet cared that much about stacks of hay." No offense intended to "Free Will Astrology," but if you hand over the contemplation of your fate to these poems, you'll certainly emerge more edified. – Sarah Smith

Media academic Ian Bogost's 2011 might have been dominated by the surprise success of his Facebook game, Cow Clicker, about the insipid nature of Facebook games, but he also managed to write the year's best book on the subject of video games. Split into chapters that set out to elucidate the role of games in various areas of the average American's life, How To Do Things With Videogames (University of Minnesota Press) pulls some Malcolm Gladwell-grade insight out of its hat. Stating a fact and positing


a distant conclusion, Bogost builds sturdy and elegant bridges of logic between the two. The trip is often revelatory in fields outside of the interactive arts, but to do so with a medium as maligned in the art world as video games is doubly impressive. Not every chapter is solid gold, but more times than not you can feel your brain making connections that seem obvious, and that's Bogost's genius.

Two veteran Japanese authors also got their groove back, even if that groove is, in actuality, a simple, to-the-point writing style. Banana Yoshimoto released the slight but invigorating tale of burgeoning love in a time of personal strife with The Lake (Melville House). The lack of flash and focus on character made it a quick and altogether satisfying read. The first 500 pages of Haruki Murakami's **1Q84** (Knopf) feel like they are written by the same man who wrote The Wind-Up Bird Chronicle. Why only 500 pages? Because that's how many I've read so far, but they're strong enough to recommend the entire hulking novel. It's a mysterious and scary world Murakami paints, but I want to know every murky, surreal nook of that world. – James Renovitch

The perfect book kicked off a devastating year: Colm Tóibín's The Empty Family (Scribner) - gorgeous, affecting short stories set in various places but all calling back to Tóibín's native Ireland, Fiction held sway for the wind-down, too, with Jeffrey Eugenides' The Marriage Plot (Farrar, Straus and Giroux) - a novel that explores complex ideas of love within a winning, naturalistic plot. The bright light of spring and summer, though, brought an overdue and rewarding renaissance of my relationship with nonfiction. The Journals of Spalding Gray (Knopf), edited by Nell Casey, reminds us of how radically the troubled, pioneering monologist changed the concept of the one-person show; it also reveals how much artistry was involved in turning his life into art. Jonathan Lethem's The Ecstasy of Influence: Nonfictions, Etc. (Doubleday) is manna for lovers of the cultural essay - a "bloggish book," as Lethem calls it, that features pieces he's written on everyone from Philip K. Dick to Rick James. Funny that Lethem writes there that he "dread[s] reading or listening to the interviews" his fame required, as one could not find a better companion piece to that book than Conversations With Jonathan Lethem (University Press of Mississippi), edited by Jaime Clarke. Clarke's anthology continues the essays' dialogue with readers as well as capturing Lethem's charm and generosity as a participant in the contemporary cultural project. Chuck Eddy's Rock and Roll Always Forgets: A Quarter Century of Music Criticism (Duke University Press) could not be more different in style (and, for the most part, particular subjects) than Lethem's critical work, but both serve as antidotes to the current practice of stripping reviews down to something resembling Morse code: They're shining reminders that criticism can, and should, be much more than just an endless series of product reviews. - Cindy Widner continued on p.27






It's no wonder so many food-related metaphors extend into our reading nooks: Good books are not mere entertainment; they sustain, nourish, and enrich. I gleefully devoured these books, the bread and butter of my bookshelf, which made serving up

this recipe for reading success a piece of cake, no matter what your cup of literary tea. (I'll stop now.)

Feed your mind: My two favorite music writers, Austin Powell and Doug Freeman, The unleashed Austin Chronicle Music Anthology (University of Texas Press) this spring (see "Off the Record." Music, March 4, 2011). Despite having had this book for eight

months and having lived in this fair town six-plus years now, I know there's always something else in those pages I can learn about our collective musical history. It's a beautiful volume, and the only one I know of in which Joan Jett and Jay-Z make appearances five pages apart.

Luminarium (Soho Press), Alex Shakar's second novel, is a rewarding literary tribute to brotherly love, existentialism, and the possibilities of modern technology, with emotional and philosophical depths entangling you no less than the dark mystery of

a dead brother who seems to be communicating with his still-living twin via the (corporately stolen) video game the two of them created. Chester Brown's **Paying for It** (Drawn and Quarterly), the acclaimed cartoonist's unswerving account of his regular, ah, use of prostitutes over the past several years, doubles (or at least exhaustively tries to double) as an argument for the

rights of sex workers. Dave McKean's **Celluloid** (Fantagraphics), on the other hand, is an unfettered erotic fantasy told, wordlessly, with the sort of glorious imagery - a stunning mix of hand-drawn illustration and Photoshop wizardry - that made all those old Sandman covers such a mindblowing delight. Kenk, the first graphic

Feed your soul: Dean Young, the University of Texas' own preeminent contemporary poet, spent the first four months of 2011 awaiting a heart transplant (see "The Heartsick Poet," April 8, 2011), which made his spring

collection, Fall Higher (Copper Canyon), particularly poignant: "Maybe poems are made of breath, the way water,/cajoled to boil, says, This is my soul, freed." If this is what 8% of the heart can yield, brace yourself for Young's return to full-force.

3) BOLA BREAKFAST PIZZA AT THE DOWNTOWN FARMERS' MARKET The perfect way to start a Saturday morning of shopping. I'm excited about the rollout of its frozen pizza line.

4) APPETIZERS AT BARTLETT'S Memories of both the roasted artichokes with rémoulade and the cheese plate with roasted grapes and whisper-thin, house-made crackers stayed with me all year. 5) TERRY CONLAN'S FOUR-CHEESE FENNEL GRATIN TOPPED WITH TOASTED

PISTACHIOS It was fascinating to see how the seasonal food at my annual potluck birthday party changed when it was held belatedly in November. Chef Conlan's gratin was a showstopper.

6) PASTRAMI FROM NOBLE PIG Friends who are familiar with the best pastrami in the Big Apple swear this product is every bit as good. I don't know about that, but I do know this is great meat!

7) FRESH FLOUR TORTILLAS FROM BLANCO VALLEY FARMS Beware: One package of these delicious, delicate tortillas from the Barton Creek Farmers' Market could put you off all other flour tortillas forever.

8) RELLENO DE CAMARON AT EL ALMA Chef Alma Alcocer-Thomas' food is every bit as tasty as it is beautifully presented. This stunning plate made me hungry for more.

9) STUFFED PORK CHOP AT EVANGELINE CAFE These porcine behemoths are truly remarkable and priced more affordably than comparable dishes at upscale steak houses.



10) CHIPS AND HOT SAUCE AND BRISKET ENCHILADAS AT VIVO LAKE CREEK The chips and hot sauce were the best I tasted all year, and chef Paul Petersen's brisket enchiladas demonstrate his skill as a pit master and as a purveyor of authentic Tex-Mex dishes.

4) NATIONAL TELEVISION FEATURES AUSTIN! The Food Network, the Cooking Channel, the Travel Channel, and Bravo all shot multiple segments in Austin during 2011, highlighting our exhilarating and dynamic food scene.

5) AUSTIN CHARCUTERIE TAKES OFF IN A BIG WAY Noble Pig, with lines of eager diners out the door, added a deli and a charcuterie case and doubled its seating; Jesse Griffiths of Dai Due, besides rocking the Downtown Farmers' Market, has been conducting hunting and fishing schools to teach traditional techniques, writing a book, and planning a storefront location; and after a year of growth and expansion, Kocurek Family Artisanal Charcuterie announced at year's end that it is suspending operations.

CLAUDIA ALARCÓN'S TOP 10 FOOD AND DRINKS KEEPING AUSTIN (REAL) MEXICAN

As always, in no particular order:

OAXACAN CUISINE AT EL NARANJO

Heavenly *moles*, *pipianes*, and other seasonal Oaxacan specialties, including *real* tamales, have been attracting connoisseurs to this trailer, temporarily relocated to the Soular Food Garden on East 12th. I can't wait until the full-service restaurant opens on Rainey Street – at last – in February.

AMUSE-BOUCHE AT EL MESÓN Amusebouche at a Mexican restaurant? You bet. Chef Marisela Godinez welcomes every guest with a little something while they peruse the menu: a tiny bowl of *fideo* or lentil soup, street-style corn on the cob, homemade tamales, mango slices with lime and chile, or whatever seasonal whimsy seems fitting.

BACKWARD BRUNCH AT SAZÓN Can't get up in time for breakfast on Sunday mornings? No worries. Sazón's backward brunch from 3 to 6pm features *huevos benedictos*, Croque Madame à la Mexicana, and other loco specialties accompanied, of course, by micheladas, Bloody Marias, and Vampiros. Hells yeah. **MEXICAN WINE IN AUSTIN** About time some of Mexico's affordable, well-crafted wines found distribution, and local retailers, restaurants, and wine bars willing to take a chance. Look for wines from Villa Montefiori, L.A. Cetto, and Casa Madero around town, and if you can't find them, ask for them; hopefully more labels will be available in the near future.

WINE PAIRING DINNERS AT FONDA SAN MIGUEL Speaking of wine and Mexican food, nobody does it better than Fonda, whether through organized dinners with winemakers from various regions around the world or through its well-chosen wine list and a staff that can properly recommend what to drink

with those mole enchiladas.


LOBSTER TACO TUESDAYS AT ZANDUNGA One of my new favorite hangouts gets even better on Tuesdays with \$3 lobster tacos and \$3 frozen mojitos. Two of each and you're set. Alternately, try the guava-agave frozen margarita, and beg chef Edgar Torres to put his *mole verde* on the menu. Tell him I sent you.

AUSTIN TEQUILA SOCIETY AT CASA CHA-PALA Lupe Barragan, owner of Casa Chapala and one of the most unpretentious, warm, and friendly folks I have ever met, is the founder of this long-overdue tequila appreciation group that hosts events, tastings, and contests. Its location across the street from the Four Seasons is as welcoming as Barragan's smile, and its selection of 100plus tequilas is admirable.

MOLE WITH DUCK OR QUAIL AT EL ALMA Before there was chicken, pre-Hispanic Mexicans ate duck and quail in various preparations. While *mole* is definitely post-conquest, these tasty fowl are often found on the menus of some of Mexico City's best restaurants. Chef Alma Alcocer-Thomas' *mole de pasilla* is an ideal companion.

ANTOJITOS AT PANADERIA CHUY The pastries, *bolillos*, and cakes are the main draws at this traditional bakery, but I keep coming back for the *antojitos*: ginormous tortas, Mexico City-style tacos, and authentic *tlacoyos* and quesadillas made with blue corn masa.

PALETAS FROM MOM & POPS After splitting with their brief GoodPop partners, original owners Manuel and Laura Flores are still making the best, most traditional and deliciously weird (El Cucuy!) frozen pops and aguas frescas around. Small batch, family owned, real Austin. Give them your business!



RACHEL FEIT'S TOP 10 AUSTIN-TATIOUS SNACKS AND SIPS

In no particular order:

CHOLESTA ROLL AT ROLL ON SUSHI DINER Sushi meets chicken-fried steak. It looks Japanese but speaks Texas twang.

HAIR OF THE DOG AT MAN BITES DOG This is one dog you and your arteries will never forget. An all-beef frank wrapped in bacon and deep fried. Add some chili, cheddar cheese, a fried egg, and Tabasco, and you have one outrageous snack.

THE EXTRA-TRASHY TRAILER PARK TACO AT TORCHY'S TACOS When Torchy's opened

a few years ago, it set a high bar for Austintatious tastes. Its Trailer Park taco is fried chicken strips, green chilies, lettuce, and pico de gallo. "Get It Trashy" and replace the lettuce with plenty of gooey queso.

WES MARSHALL'S 10 BEST TEQUILAS OF THE YEAR

I'm always far more interested in a company's Blanco (aka Silver) tequila than its Reposado or Anejo versions. The latter are simply tequilas aged in wood, and granted, the wood does mellow the tequila. But it also robs the drink of some of its freshness. The floral and peppery aromas of the Mexican blue agave get subsumed by the wood's butterscotch smells. I prefer the liveliest agave aromas possible. That's why all of my favorite tequilas are Blanco versions. MICK VANN'S TOP 10 EVERYMAN'S BUDGET BITES FROM 2011 REVIEWS

In no particular order:

LA FRUTA FELIZ Goat (*chivo*) tacos and wonderful minced beef picadillo tacos on homemade corn tacos.

INDIAN SPICY KITCHEN Nepalese minced chicken and spinach *momo* dumplings, plus the incredible dry goat curry with popped rice (*taas*).

CUBAN SANDWICHES *Ropa vieja* sandwich and Cubano sandwich from **Mi Kfecito**, and the *pan con lechón* from **Cuban Sandwich Cafe**.

BARBECUE The barbecue pork ribs and chicken from **Live Oak Barbecue**, and the mind-boggling barbecue sausage, brisket, and ribs from **Franklin Barbecue**.

CHINA DYNASTY The rich and spicy hot and sour soup, the crispy and porky egg rolls, and the succulent pot stickers.

BUDA GROCERY & GRILL Easy on the wallet, juicy, and deliciously satisfying: the double bacon cheeseburger.

PHO DAN No. 27 on the menu: shrimp, pork slices, and chicken with rich, flat egg noodles, fried shallots, and scallions, and the broth on the side.

THREE LITTLE PIGS Cracklin' meat loaf wrapped in bacon with cheese grits and collard greens, a pork belly slider, and unctuous milk-braised pork with sage, from hizzoner Raymond Tatum.

MI RANCHITO TAQUERIA Pork with green sauce, carne asado with nopalitos, *caldo de res*, the *gringa* quesadilla with *suadero* (beef rib meat), chorizo cheeseburger, and pork tamales.

A+A SICHUAN GARDEN Stir-fried pork belly with sliced vegetables and green chiles in black bean sauce, beef with cumin sauce, *mapo doufu*, and dry bean curd with mustard greens.

HAM & EGGS ROLL AT UCHIKO Uchi and Uchiko have helped put Austin on the map of great culinary destinations. Uchiko's Ham & Eggs – crunchy pork belly and egg inside a maki roll – embodies the flavors that define the city's eclectic tastes.

DUCK FAT FRITES AT HANK'S GARAGE Double-fried hand-cut french fries are very chic these days, and the ones fried in duck fat at Hank's Garage are among the best I've tasted all year. Hank's smoked paprika and spicy Sriracha mayos put them over the top.

BUFFALO FRIED PICKLES AT SECOND BAR + KITCHEN Served with hot sauce and pungent bleu-cheese sauce, this bold snack is perfect for Sunday football but looks elegant enough to take to the opera.

TEXECUTIONER AT CONTIGO Made with mezcal, D'Aristi Xtabentun (a Mayan anise-flavored liquor), *cocchi americano*, and grapefruit, this drink has ingredients most people can't even pronounce. But the clean fruitiness is something Austinites will love when the mercury hits 110.

PORK BELLY SLIDERS AT ODD DUCK FARM TO TRAILER Austinites love bacon. And what better way to indulge than a house-cured pork belly slider topped with onions and liberally doused with paprika aioli at Bryce Gilmore's news-making trailer?

CHOCOLATE AND STILTON TART AT ELEVEN PLATES & WINE It's crunchy, it's bleu-cheesy, and ... that's right folks ... it's chocolaty. Not everyone will find it appealing, but those who do love it.

DOUGHNUTS AT GOURDOUGH'S It doesn't matter which you choose. These huge, freshly fried fritters are topped with sinful treats that satisfy whatever audacious food cravings your subconscious can conjure.

LEE NICHOLS' TOP 10 AUSTIN/TEXAS CRAFT BEER HAPPENINGS

1) PRO-BREWER LEGISLATION FAILED ... AGAIN For the third straight legislative session, microbrewers tried to change Texas' laws forbidding them from selling their product on the premises of their breweries, but the third time wasn't the charm. And this year, brewpub owners sought the opposite right: to sell their brews off-premises. Someday, perhaps our "pro-business" lawmakers will unshackle the beer business in Texas.

2) AND SO THE BREWERS TRIED THE

COURTROOM ROUTE Failing to change the law under the dome, Jester King Craft Brewery, along with Zax Restaurant & Bar and distributor Authentic Beverages, took the state to court. Besides the on-/off-premises laws, they also challenged laws forcing brewers to arbitrarily label anything under 4% alcohol as "beer" and anything over 4% as "ale." Jester King lost on the premises laws, but they did get the labeling laws – as well as laws forbidding them from saying where their beers can be purchased – overturned.

3) NEW BREWERIES Congrats to Austin Beerworks, Circle Brewing Co., Twisted X Brewing Company, and Hops & Grain Brewery for evolving from homebrewers' dreams to actual businesses and getting their products into stores and/or bars. (And to Black Star Co-op on reaching its first anniversary in style.) And 2012 holds the promise of even more new ventures taking flight.

4) THE TEXAS CRAFT BREWERS FESTIVAL RETURNED This on-again, off-again event was definitely on this year. Held in September at Fiesta Gardens, it was bigger and better than ever. While it may not be anywhere near a Great American Beer Festival or an Oregon Brewers Festival, it was a great coming-of-age moment for Texas' craft-brewing industry.

5) SO DID AUSTIN BEER WEEK Because a one-day festival just isn't enough. For the second straight year, this weeklong celebration of good beer – including some innovative, one-off brews – spread itself across the city, kind of like a South by Southwest for beer.



6) SO DID RAHR & SONS BREWING COMPANY In the great 2010 snowstorm, this Fort Worth brewery's roof collapsed, temporarily putting it out of business and off store shelves. A year later, Rahr is healthier than ever with more products, more distribution, and a 10,000-square-foot event space for weddings, brewery tours, and the like.

7) GREAT AMERICAN BEER FESTIVAL MEDALS Speaking of the Great American Beer Festival, Texas beers brought home four medals this year. Congrats to Dallas' Humperdinks Restaurant & Brewery, Austin Beerworks, Uncle Billy's Brew & Que Lake Travis, and North by Northwest Restaurant and Brewery.

8) CONVENIENCE STORES BECAME CRAFT COOL Okay, this one's actually been building for a while but seems to have reached critical mass this year. The little Stop 'n' Robs finally realize there is more to the world than Bud Light, Miller Lite, and Coors Light, and some have selections that compete with the superstores (see "Beer Convenience," June 24, 2011).

9) 'AUSTIN BEER GUIDE' LAUNCHED You know your beer scene is coming along when it has its own magazine. www.austinbeerguide.com.

10) PIERRE CELIS, R.I.P. The veteran brewer famous for saving the witbier ("white beer") style at Belgium's Hoegaarden brewery in the 1960s later moved to Austin and helped kick-start the Texas craft beer scene. Celis passed away April 9, 2011, at age 86. *Lee Nichols blogs about beer at* www.i-love-beer. blogspot.com.



Kind of Blue

Melancholia is the movie that eclipsed them all among the *Chronicle's* three regular film reviewers (Marc Savlov, Kimberley Jones, and myself, Marjorie Baumgarten). Coming in second on the *Chronicle* film critics' combined Top 10 list is another title that sounds as though it could be one of the cardinal humors of ancient medicine: *Shame*. Does this reveal something about us as a bunch? Does this mean we are bilious? Or phlegmatic? Or maybe even well-humored?

The Chronicle's overall Top 10 film list should not be read like tea leaves or tarot cards. Our combined list is simply a matter of numbers. Since *Melancholia* is the only film to appear on all three of our critics' lists of the Top 10 films of 2011, it comes as no surprise that Lars von Trier's Danish doomsday picture got the *Chronicle*'s top nod. It is the only film, however, about which all three of us are in accord. In fact, *Melancholia* ranked as either the first or second choice for each *Chronicle* critic. The film's hypnotic beauty and brooding tone clearly captivated our critical sensibilities. But before you start calling us a bunch of cheerless individuals, note that *Melancholia* is the only film that fostered unanimity. No other film received votes from all three critics, while several titles were able to make it into the *Chronicle*'s com-

bined Top 10 with votes from only one critic.

Still, the question of what it all means lingers. My answer is that it's all relative. *Melancholia* may be deemed by us to be the best movie of 2011, but does that make it the best movie of Lars von Trier's career? To that I say no, *Melancholia* is not as good as *Dancer in the Dark* or *Breaking the Waves*. Following this pattern, many international auteurs released excellent films

that found places on our various lists – Martin Scorsese's *Hugo*, Terrence Malick's *The Tree of Life*, David Fincher's *The Girl With the Dragon Tattoo* – but are these 2011 film releases really the best works of these directors' careers? So when we tally everything up, does that make 2011 a lesser year for great movies?

A survey of the *Chronicle*'s Top 10 films shows that at least half are foreign titles, which may indicate something about our feelings regarding Hollywood's overall output. In 2011, the majority of the top-grossing films in the U.S. were sequels in the *Harry Potter*, *Pirates of the Caribbean*, or *Twilight* vein. If that doesn't sit well with you, then batten down the hatches for 2012, which promises enough superhero sequels and franchise entries to make 2011 look like a bottomless pool of originality. Yet the *Chronicle*'s combined Top 10 list also has a couple spots for movies by first-time filmmakers – an encouraging sign that artistic renewal is at least as persistent as sequelitis.

So here comes the caveat about year-end lists: No one has seen it all. Our lists are snapshots or guidelines, but they are not gospel. These lists offer a peek into the individual tastes and preferences of the *Chronicle* reviewers and provide suggestions for movies to catch in the coming months. Remember, making lists is fun and safe to try at home.

Of Scrolls, Swords, and Ponycorn Adventures

THE YEAR IN GAMING by James Renovitch

1) *The Elder Scrolls V: Skyrim* (Bethesda Softworks) It might appear to be a standard role-playing game at first glance – what with all the dragons and swords and spells – but *Skyrim* merited and rewarded exploration. And with the amount of virtual square mileage at your disposal, it was easy to while away days, weeks, months, and probably years talking to everyone, discovering hidden loot, and conquering monstrous beasts. As scads of YouTube clips can attest, half the fun was finding the oddities and kinks in the system. However, the true test of any open-world game is that it feels all-encompassing. *Skyrim* succeeded in that regard, and how.

2) The Legend of Zelda: Skyward Sword (Nintendo) The last time we were put in charge of Link, he looked good but didn't fully comprehend the Wii's motion controller. *Skyward Sword* changes the design just enough to exploit the Wiimote's abilities without compromising the series' consistently flawless design. The swordplay felt natural, the puzzles were intriguing, and the overall effect was pure gaming joy. This is Nintendo firing on all cylinders.

3) Sword & Sworcery EP (Superbrothers) The release of S&S was a master class in how to develop and distribute a game outside the studio system. Social media spread word of this beautiful interactive story that managed to make players' hearts race and soar with the help of the most evocative sound-track and visuals of the year. All on your touchtronic device.



4) Super Mario 3D Land (Nintendo) It took just less than a year, but Nintendo finally released a game for the much-bally-hooed 3DS handheld system that lived up to its extra-dimensional promise. Leave it to Mario to make jumping exciting again.

5) *Portal* **2 (Valve)** While I'll admit to missing the isolation of the first *Portal*, it was impossible to resist revisiting the genius, nonlethal game mechanic that is the portal gun. The humor that accompanies the harrowing leaps and complex puzzles was unmatched, with J.K. Simmons and Stephen Merchant voicing unforgettable one-liners.

6) Bastion (Warner Bros. Interactive) Voiceover narration can be a crutch, but Bastion's deep-voiced, omnipotent guide

along your journey through a beautifully impressionistic world revealed just enough to keep players exploring and entertained. Watching the world literally rise to meet your feet made for deliberate steps and rapt eyes.

7) Batman: Arkham City (Warner Bros. Interactive) It's a big, dark world that Batman inhabits, and taking control of his supreme fighting skills and exhaustive arsenal of gadgets made swinging around the city and stomping henchmen all the more fun. And if Batman was a little too butch for you, you could get in touch with your feminine mystique as Catwoman.

8) *English Country Tune* (Increpare Games) Stephen Lavelle, aka Increpare, has been making simple puzzle games and releasing them on his website for years, but he finally put everything he's learned together into an oddly named app and wrapped it up with stunning minimalist art design. Your phone has never been so engaging or brain-bending.

9) Uncharted 3: Drake's Deception (Sony Computer Entertainment) It's about as big-budget as it gets, but when the money goes to a decent story, jaw-dropping set-pieces, and top-notch voice acting, you get what you pay for – in this case an adventure game that barrages all of the senses.

10) Sissy's Magical Ponycorn Adventure (Untold

Entertainment Inc.) It's not as if this supercute, simple, free-to-play game doesn't have enough going for it to make any Top 10 list, but the story behind the game will hopefully inspire other would-be developers to go for it. Dad Ryan Creighton and 5-year-old daughter Cassie made memorable characters out of some crayons and programming moxie.

Lifestyles of the Rich and Infamous

Twenty years after 'Nevermind' BY RAOUL HERNANDEZ

"You can try, but you'll never understand this. Try and try, but you'll never understand this. You can try, but you'll never understand this. The lifestyles of the rich and infamous."

– Ice-T, 1991

Tequila Fridays, at my house, were born out of abject exhaustion, emptiness.

No hat, no suit, no briefcase, but management + desk job = a middle-age lobotomy. Zombification. Not until the night Doug Sahm died in 1999 did tequila separate from the almighty margarita for me – at the Hole in the Wall, no less – and while Lou Grant kept a bottle of bourbon in his fictional newsroom desk drawer, a shot of anything at the office seemed antithetical to that which sought antidote: work. Still a four-letter word no matter your profession.

One Friday this past August, a board member for KOOP 91.7FM emailed me about possibly guesting on-air at the community radio station to discuss the 20th anniversary of Nirvana's *Nevermind*. "In terms of what it meant for music when it happened (here in Austin and beyond) and what the legacy is." Locally, personally, that meant a decade spent at Emo's on Red River, as well as at Liberty Lunch and the Electric Lounge – venues all now gone. It meant forgoing Nirvana in 1991 for grad school homework (see "Circle Sky," Feb. 18, 2011) and then again on New Year's Eve three years later in Oakland, Calif., with the Butthole Surfers opening because I couldn't afford a \$20 ticket. Two decades of regret it meant.

Weeks later, Tequila Friday beckoned like a compost bin to a scraped avocado peel. My significant other watched helplessly as I, catatonic from w-o-r-k and layoffs and Chronicle attrition, licked my white-collar wounds behind a closed home office door. Angst consumed me, but it wasn't the cure. Nirvana and Pearl Jam both broke on through to the other side in 1991, reviewed as such by me at the time, yet rap was my revolution. John Lennon + Sex Pistols = Kurt Cobain, but Public Enemy took Muddy Waters intergalactic. When push came to shove that Friday, 1991's OG Original Gangster by Ice-T got the call, and its apocalyptic fury and humor soothed my savage unhappiness.

Twenty years later, hip-hop's mainstream and indie rock can't assuage global occupancy. Metal peels back my contemporary blues now, and finding 20 (inter)national albums to list took twice as long as twice that many local discs. You say you want a revolution? It starts at home.

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A regional development commission in Michigan, purchasing equipment for 13 counties using Homeland Security grants in May, bought 13 machines that make sno-cones, at a total cost of \$11,700 (after rejecting one county's request for a popcorn machine). Pressed to justify the purchases, officials pointed out that the machines make shaved ice, which might be useful for medical situations from natural disasters and heat emergencies (but that they also make sno-cones to draw crowds at Homeland Security demonstrations).

LEAD STORY

Note: Once again this week, check out a few more recent instances of Recurring Themes of weird news (plus important updates of previous stories):

Another genius tried to pass a piece of U.S. currency in an amount not even close to being legal tender: a \$1 million bill. (The largest denomination is \$100.) Michael Fuller, 53, was arrested in Lexington, N.C., in November when a Walmart cashier turned him in when he attempted to buy electronics totaling \$475.78 (apparently expecting change of \$999,524.22).

Most "News of the Weird" epic "scorned" lovers who seemingly never give up obnoxiously stalking their exes are of Japanese women but dumped Americans surface occasionally. In October, Toni Jo Silvey, 49, was arrested in Houston when her ex (artist Peter Main) reported that she made 146 phone calls in one day and more than 1,000 calls (and 712 emails) in three months, following their 2009 breakup over him seeing a younger woman. She was also charged with attacking his home with a tire iron, eggs, and a sword.

"Take Your Daughter (Son) to Work" days are still popular at some companies as a way to introduce children to their parents' cultures. Inadvertently, even criminals mimic the phenomenon. Joseph Romano, with his 2-year-old son in tow, was allegedly selling drugs when police picked him up in September in Tunkhannock Township, Pa. And Edward Chatman Jr., 32, who was arrested for allegedly raping a woman in Oak Ridge, Tenn., in August, brought his 6-month-old baby with him when he climbed through the woman's window (though, police said, he stashed the kid in another room during the assault).

A cutting-edge treatment when "News of the Weird" first heard of it in 2000 is now mainstream for those suffering extreme diarrhea due to a lack of "predator bacteria" in the colon (perhaps caused by antibiotics). Among the primary treatments now is a transplant – a transfusion of "fecal flora" from the gut of a bacteria-normal person, to restore the natural balance (introduced by a colonoscope after the stool is liquified in a blender). Following months of failed alternatives, Jerry Grant, 33, said in October that his transplant, at the Mayo Clinic in Scottsdale, Ariz., worked remarkably well. (A recent study reported success in 70 of 77 patients.)

The law of child support changes slowly in the U.S. but maybe less so in Australia. American courts are reluctant to end payments even if the man later disproves paternity (citing the harm to the child if the payments stop). However, in October, the Federal Magistrates Court in Melbourne, Australia, acting on fertility-test results, ordered a mother to reimburse the man she swore was the father after he proved he had been sterile. The woman also "recalled," after extensive therapy, that she might have had a one-night stand with a stranger around the time of conception.

Forgetting to pay the monthly rental fees on a storage locker can have serious consequences if it was used to store embarrassing or even incriminating materials. "News of the Weird" reported one such hapless client in 2007: a central Florida political activist under investigation whose locker yielded a rich trove for a local reporter. Similarly, perhaps, Dr. Conrad Murray (then under suspicion in the death of Michael Jackson) reportedly missed three payments on a Las Vegas storage locker, and prosecutors recovered items that appeared to bolster to their case (although it is not clear that any of the items were ever presented in court).

A New York City jury awarded the family of a teenager \$1 million in November in a lawsuit against the city for mishandling the boy's brain after his 2005 death. Following "testing," the medical examiner kept the brain in a jar on a shelf, where it was inadvertently spotted by the victim's sister during a school field trip to the mortuary (treatment the family considered extremely disrespectful). The case calls to mind that of Arkansas rapist Wayne Dumond, who had been castrated by vigilantes in 1984 and whose genitals the local sheriff recovered and kept in a jar on a shelf in his office as a symbol of "justice." Dumond subsequently (in 1988) won \$110,000 in a "disrespect" lawsuit against the sheriff.

UPDATES

Jennifer Petkov of Trenton, Mich., is still charming her neighbors. An October 2010 Detroit News summary of a years-long feud between Petkov and various neighbors reported that she had been mercilessly taunting the family of Kathleen Edward, then 7 years old and suffering from the degenerating brain disorder Huntington's disease, which had taken her mother the year before. The more Kathleen's disability showed, the greater was Petkov's glee on her Facebook page. In October 2011, Petkov, after a short promise of civility, returned to mocking Kathleen and the memory of her mother, including recent Facebook posts such as: "You thought the (past) 4+ years were bad you (sic) haven't seen nothing yet!" and "Block party when that kid dies."

In October, Colorado state Sen, Suzanne Williams settled more serious 2010 traffic charges by pleading no contest to a misdemeanor and paying \$268 to a court in Amarillo, Texas. State troopers had accused Williams of driving her SUV with her grandchildren not wearing seat belts when it drifted across a center line and hit another vehicle, killing the driver and ejecting the kids. The Texas troopers suggested that Williams scooped up the worst injured grandchild, returned him to the SUV, and belted him into a child seat, which was especially significant because Williams had sponsored a mandatory child-safety seat belt in Colorado in 2010. However, the grand jury declined to indict her, and she refused to discuss the case further.





Day Trips

The year 2011 will go down as being hot and dry in historic proportions. Here's a guick rundown of events that affected day trippers.

How hot was it? Austin had a record-breaking 86 days of triple-digit heat. The rest of the state suffered under similar conditions.

How dry was it? Counties across the state instituted burn bans. Rainfall totals were more than a foot below average. Every lake in the state sported a bathtub ring where the water level used to be.

Then paradise burned. Wildfires burned more than a million acres across the state. Fort Davis, Possum Kingdom, and Bastrop were hit the hardest.

It was too hot and dry to go outdoors. With **attendance** down by a third, the state parks had to ask the public to donate \$4.6 million to help them get through 2012.

The good news: The number of whooping cranes wintering along the Texas coast increased to 281 and is expected to break the 300 mark in 2012. A record number of Kemp's ridley sea turtle nests, the most endangered sea turtle, were found on Texas beaches.



1) ABBY WAMBACH SHOCKS THE WORLD

(CUP) The American star's stunning header to tie Brazil in the 122nd minute – extra time of overtime, the latest goal ever scored in any World Cup – saved the U.S. in the Women's World Cup quarterfinal and galvanized the viewers back home. She followed it up with a late game-winner in the semifinal and an overtime goal in the final – a game that smashed various records for TV viewership and set a new world record of 7,196 tweets per second by game's end.

2) BUT, OH YEAH, JAPAN WON IT ALL Despite Wambach's heroics, the feel-good story of the tournament was the scrappy Japanese underdogs who upset Germany and then the U.S. to lift their first major trophy, which they dedicated to survivors of the tsunami that had devastated their homeland a few months earlier. Their short-passing, ball-control game was a revelation, earning them billing as "the Barcelona of women's fútbol" (see below).

3) BELOVED LEADER IS NOT AMUSED

The North Korean women came into the WWC ranked fifth in the world. After they failed to score a goal in a dismal three-andout performance and tested positive for steroids to boot, team officials had a novel excuse: They'd been done in by a bad batch of musk deer gland extract they took to get over being hit by lightning.

4) BARCELONA PLAYS A BEAUTIFUL GAME What Spain did for the 2010 World Cup, the


Catalans did for club soccer in 2011: prove that a team can win big by playing attractive, flowing soccer instead of the plodding, defensive, physical style that dominates the modern game. A 4-0 thrashing of South American champ Santos in the Club World Cup final capped a remarkable year for a remarkable team.

5) MEXICO IS BACK! A new generation of talented youngsters has the Mexican national team flying high after a few down years and some galling losses to their bitter rivals to *el norte*. A decisive 4-2 win over the U.S. in the June Gold Cup final served notice that the tables have turned. It also drew 954,000 cable viewers – more than double Fox Soccer's previous record audience – and outdrew ABC, CBS, and NBC among males in the 18-to-34 age range.

6) KLINSMANN TO THE RESCUE? Soon after the Gold Cup loss, U.S. Soccer fired head coach Bob Bradley – often criticized for his player selections and grinding style – and replaced him with Jürgen Klinsmann, once a World Cup winner as a striker for Germany, now a Southern California free spirit who led Bayern Munich through yoga classes in his last job. The report card remains out until World Cup qualifying starts this summer.

7) BECKHAM, GALAXY FINALLY WIN A TITLE In the last year of his five-year contract, David Beckham finally brought the L.A. Galaxy the MLS title they'd been banking on. Banking indeed: Beckham and fellow Galaxy superstars Robbie Keane and Landon Donovan made \$12,217,243 in base pay this year – more than the combined salaries of all the starters for all the MLS champions since they've been compiling such figures.

8) AZTEX RISE FROM THE ASHES Less than a year after the original Austin Aztex left town for swampier pastures, former minority owner David



9) THERE'S A NEW HEAD HORN IN TOWN The University of Texas announced a new soccer coach in December as Angela Kelly replaces 13-year veteran Chris Petrucelli. Kelly's been head coach at Tennessee for the past 12 years; her résumé as a player includes four national championships in college, two national titles as a pro, and nine years on the Canadian national team, including as a full-time starter in the 1995 World Cup. She takes over what Soccer America calls "one of the nation's plum jobs."

10) DALLAS GIRLS ROCK Dallas youth clubs won three of the six national titles up for grabs at the girls' U.S. Youth Soccer National Championships in July.

AND ONE TO GROW ON: EURO 2012 qualifying produced the strongest field assembled for any international tournament, with 12 of the top 15 teams in the world, plus relative long shots Ireland and the Czech Republic, as well as hosts Ukraine and Poland.

THE ADVENTURES OF TINTIN

D: Steven Spielberg; with Jamie Bell, Andy Serkis, Daniel Craig, Simon Pegg, Nick Frost, Cary Elwes, Toby Jones. (PG, 107 min.)

The Adventures of Tintin is a cracking good adventure film. Add to that the photorealistic animation and the wickedly immersive 3-D, and you've got a huge holiday smash on your hands. What you don't have, however, is a great movie. The film is adapted from Belgian artist Hergé's long-running, French-language comic book series about Tintin, an intrepid young Belgian journalist with a penchant for stumbling into mysteries. Director Spielberg mines several Hergé stories to create a typically complex series of risky, slapsticky adventures for the young hero as he searches for an elusive treasure of pirate gold, among many other items of value. Tintin, despite his titular role, comes off as blandly heroic as a Eisenhower-era Boy Scout. But that's Tintin for you, and there's no changing him. The Adventures of Tintin is a spectacle and a half, sure, but, unlike the original comic, it fails to inspire. (12/23/2011)

As the film begins, they are traveling to Europe on an ocean liner with their human surrogate dad, Dave (Lee), to collect a prize at the International Music Awards After they fall overboard and wind up stranded, things take a turn for the tedious. The entire payoff to the Chipmunks' gambit comes in those inevitable moments when Dave bellows in exasperation, "Alvin." Director Michel Hazanavicius' The Artist is an irresistible comic gem. It opens in 1927 when silent film star George Valentin (Dujardin) is the toast of all Hollywoodland. Utterly convinced that those newfangled talking pictures are just a fad, George's inability to rise to the challenge of speaking aloud (The Artist is silent except for a few inspired audio gags) provides much amusement and a certain bittersweet note in a film that glorifies the sheer imaginative heft of the silent era (the film is also shot in black and-white). As George's producer (Goodman) badgers him to speak, the silent actor and his firecracker paramour, Peppy Miller (Bejo), are steadily forced apart by the advent of sound. What's so intensely pleasurable about The Artist is the endless parade of smartly creative and self-referential gags. BENEATH THE DARKNESS

D: Martin Guigui; with Dennis Quaid, Tony Oller, Aimee Teegarden, Stephen Lunsford, Devon Werkheiser, Brett Cullen. (R, 96 min.)

Despite its release during the dreaded postholiday theatrical dumping grounds of January and February, this locally lensed (Smithville, Bastrop) thriller manages some wiggy, weird moments that might just haunt your dreams for days. That depends entirely, however, on how much of a Dennis Quaid fan you are. How often do we have the chance to experience the amiable Texan actor channeling not only The Texas Chain Saw Massacre's Edwin Neal but also a manic, Renfield-esque madman? Those are rare pleasures indeed, and Quaid, as Smithville town mortician Vaughn Ely, makes the most of this holiday ham with a wonderfully outrageous assortment of tics, grimaces, and outright faces of death (other people's, that is).

The rest of the film doesn't live up to Quaid's inspired and entirely appropriate *Grand Guignol* hamminess, and instead takes the easy out, investing its four teen leads with the task of unravelling the cause of their town's grave goings-on. Oller, likely to be voted Smithville High's Most Likely To Figure Things Out Before Anyone Else Does, is wellcast and perfectly natural as Travis, the kid with the spooky past in the small-town setting, as is *Friday Night Lights* alum Teegarden as Abby, his friend and confidante. Despite the intimations of the supernatural (the kids declare the mortuary "haunted" as they voyeuristically spy Ely dancing with, presumably, his dead wife), *Beneath the Darkness*, which also suffers from a bland, unremarkable title that makes it sound like any number of Nicole Kidman films, is less about horror than hauntings of the head and heart.

The pervading sense of loss and its accompanying guilt is underscored by an early classroom sequence in which the teacher strives, with some success, to underscore the self-inflicted madness inherent to Poe's "The Tell-Tale Heart." Travis, it turns out, earlier lost his sister to mysterious circumstances, which only reinforces his mounting belief that Ely's up to no good. Travis is correct - the movie shows us as much in its opening moments - but when it comes to creepy old buildings, overly attentive owners, and prying outsiders, Beneath the Darkness has nada on Don Coscarelli's epic Phantasm saga or, for that matter, Norman Bates' clear-eyed if psychotic shenanigans. ✿ A DANGEROUS METHOD

D: David Cronenberg; with Keira Knightley, Michael Fassbender, Viggo Mortensen, Vincent Cassel, Sarah Gadon. (R, 99 min.)

Canadian filmmaker David Cronenberg's period piece about the origins of psychoanalysis and the sexual confusions of its progenitors is eloquent and handsomely made, if never quite revelatory. The film opens with a Russian emigré named Sabina (Knightley) in howling, seizing distress, being taken against her will to a Zurich psychiatric hospital. She doesn't know it yet, but her life will in large part be defined by her shuttling between Zurich, the home of Carl Jung (Fassbender), her doctor and eventual lover, and Vienna, the home of Sigmund Freud (Mortensen), who once thought of Jung as his "son and heir." Sabina's influence loosens Jung from the rigors of Freud's strictly scientific method and nudges him toward a more speculative approach - the film positions her squarely at the center of Jung and Freud's famous break. It's a very particular film, one that takes some getting used to, but I was rather taken with it. (12/23/2011) - Kimberley Jones

THE DARKEST HOUR

The Darkest Hour is an alien-invasion film set in Moscow and produced by the same team that gave us the infinitely superior Russian horror fantasies Night Watch and Day Watch. Saddled with a truly weak script from Jon Spaihts, the story involves invisible aliens who feed on electricity and kill off humanity by turning them to ash via unimpressive, whiplike CGI weaponry. Populated by a pair of entrepreneurial Yanks (Hirsch and Minghella) on the loose in Moscow and their female counterparts/squeezes (Thirlby and Taylor), the film opens with a blackout - of power, information, and any idea what exactly is going on. That brief flicker of suspense in an otherwise suspense-free film quickly evaporates into a fairly standard alien-invasion plot that moves from Point A (What the hell are these things?) to Point B (How the hell do we stop them and save the world?) with nary an overused, expository cliché untapped. 
Did anyone ever look less Hawaiian than the dapper and poised George Clooney? It serves his Descendants character Matt King well. Those constitutionally ill-fitting, loud prints and pleated shorts and boat shoes embody how out of touch Matt has become as a husband and a father to 10-year-old Scottie (Miller) and 17-year-old Alex (Woodley). Voiceover opens the film and pops up occasionally, sometimes to describe the depths of the family's dysfunction. However, what we're told and what we're shown by director and co-writer Alexander Payne (Sideways, About Schmidt) don't always square: The girls seem more precociously rebellious than tyrannical, and Matt, who is publicly roasted for his failures as a family man, is never seen as anything less than a competent and loving caretaker. The Descendants is beautifully shot (by Phedon Papamichael) and compellingly performed, especially by its young stars, and it has moments of startling tenderness. Sawyer's affinity with the dolphin helps him emerge from his shell, as does support from his mother (Judd) and the Hasketts. Rooney Mara nails it, completely. The screenplay includes a handful of deviations from the Swedish version, but the main thing that establishes this as the superior film is Fincher's exacting directorial aesthetic. Investigating the decades-old murder of the favorite niece of industrialist Henrik Vanger (Plummer), Daniel Craig's damaged journalist crusader Mikael Blomkvist prowls around the snowbound Vanger estate, as bad things - and bodies - begin to pile up. What transfixes here isn't the labyrinthine plotting but Mara's Lisbeth. It's a knockout sucker punch of a performance. Mara's doomy gaze cuts through the hype and bores straight into your soul. 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HAPPY FEET TWO

Erik wants to find his own thing, so he takes off with some friends for lands beyond. Mumble soon rescues Erik, but upon their return, they find the penguins' habitat has shifted, leaving the flock trapped. Concurrently, we meet Will (Pitt) and Bill (Damon), a couple of krill who decide they're tired of being "one in a krillion" and set off on their own adventure. Although appealing to look at, Happy Feet Two is unable to spark much emotional involvement, and the film's near-constant peril may intimidate the young ones in the audience. 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

Scorsese steps outside his usual comfort zone here and winds up creating one of the most splendid and personal films of his career. A visual and technological stunner, Hugo manages to wrap an emotionally involving story about an orphaned boy in 1930s Paris around a passionate appeal for the practice of film preservation. In the process, Scorsese also schools other filmmakers and viewers in the use of 3-D as a potential enhancement to the art of storytelling rather than its contemporary bastardization as a requisite gewgaw. Hugo is perhaps not a story for the youngest of children but should work just fine for older kids, adolescents, and grown-ups. Robert Richardson's cinematography is most impressive. In fact, Scorsese's entire crew functions at the top of its game here. Henry Cavill plays Theseus, a blank-eyed, bastard-born villager who, unbeknownst to him, has been hand-picked by the Olympian gods to lead a revolt against the bloodthirsty King Hyperion (Rourke). There's more to the story - a magical bow, a sexy virgin oracle (Pinto), and caged Titans - none of it terribly interesting. The plot exists primarily to take us from one gruesome act to the next. Barbarity, of course, was the Greek gods' bread and butter, but there's more to thrill at in three lines of Homer than the whole of Singh's numbingly choreographed chaos and lascivious bloodletting. Wages are paid with added time to one's lifespan, while rent and bread money are subtracted, so the rich stockpile centuries and the poor drop dead in the street. There's concept, and then there's execution, and Niccol's cornball double entendres about time imbue the film with a hokeyness it never recovers from. Casting Justin Timberlake and Amanda Seyfried can only go so far to counteract the film's fundamental unhipness. 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

But soon Brandon's routine is upended by the sudden arrival of his needy, chancy younger sister, Sissy (Carey Mulligan). Where Brandon is ordered and emotionally closed off, Sissy is erratic, fairly lunging at any warm body that might warm her back. Indeterminate damage has been done to them both, and whatever it was, it has steered the course of all future emotional and physical entanglements, including the siblings' own provocative push-pull. Director Steve McQueen has stripped all fat from this dark, obsessively stylized story about sex addiction. SHERLOCK HOLMES: A GAME OF SHADOWS

Exactly like its titular detective, Guy Ritchie's follow-up to his steampunky 2009 take on Arthur Conan Doyle's peerlessly curious antihero is a gorgeous shambles. The whole film, which caroms from 1891 London to Paris, Vienna, and the inevitable Reichenbach Falls of Doyle's "The Final Problem," seems to have been subject to a strict diet of caffeine, nicotine, and coca leaves. Although the first half of A Game of Shadows is too chaotic for its own good and riddled with a multitude of subplots that appear irrelevant, the film picks up steam (literally) as Holmes (Downey Jr.) and Dr. Watson (Law) home in on their quarry: the inestimable "Napoleon of Crime," Professor Moriarty (Harris). The final 30 minutes of this revisionist Holmes explodathon are downright thrilling, and it should go without saying: Downey Ir, inhabits the role of Sherlock Holmes to a nearmolecular level. I hate to join the chorus of nags, but come on, Gordon Green: Stop dinking around. Green's latest feature exercise in backward-glancing, The Sitter, is a nonstarter. It recalls its genre antecedents (think After Hours and Adventures in Babysitting) in concept - here, Jonah Hill plays a reluctant babysitter lugging three kids in a minivan through Brooklyn while dodging a sulky drug dealer (Sam Rockwell) - but never gets at the same itchy spirit of anarchy. There's real energy to the way Green captures the nighttime cityscapes, but the film's set-pieces are static, built on predictable bits of cocaine explosions and kids mouthing off like minigangstas. I liked Hill's mellow-keyed delivery, and the emotional scenes are quite delicately played. I admit to about a half-dozen moments of high-pitched "heh!" - sort of a duck-honk approximation of amusement, I guess - but for a comedy, The Sitter is frightfully spare on full-bodied laughs. THE THREE MUSKETEERS

Have we retained nothing of the lessons of Hudson Hawk? Like that early Nineties comical disaster, The Three Musketeers hinges on the secret machinations of Leonardo da Vinci. It's worth pointing out that when the Musketeers - roll call: Porthos (Stevenson), Athos (Macfadyen), and Aramis (Evans) - raid Leonardo's vault for the schematics to a flying war machine, they flood the underground lair on their way out, destroying thousands of documents in the process. That carelessness doesn't so much as raise an eyebrow; I mention it here only to highlight the rancid taste of these early scenes, which are an indiscriminately violent bore to behold. Still, once you accept Paul W.S. Anderson's entirely unnecessary adaptation on its own terms (nonsensical, underachieving), it has its limited charms, which include a snigger-inducing alphabet soup of accents, a standout rooftop sword fight, and British comedian James Corden as the Musketeers' put-upon manservant.

TINKER TAILOR SOLDIER SPY

The modern movie spy has become defined by so much running and rappelling and cool seducing that it feels like a luxury to nestle in with the staid and resolutely unsuave George Smiley (Gary Oldman). The character created by John le Carré is a longtime operative in Her Maiesty's Secret Intelligence Service. Smilev is forced into early retirement at the film's outset, but ministry officials soon drag him back into the fray to investigate rumors of a Soviet mole burrowed deep in the SIS; the title, taken from a British nursery rhyme, is the shorthand for the suspect list devised by Smiley's former mentor, the cryptically named Control (Hurt). What a delectably tense-make ing game of Whac-a-Mole it all turns out to be. Where Alfredson's Tinker Tailor Soldier Spy bobbles is on the plotting level. One wishes for a chewier whodunit there aren't enough clues for the viewer to work with and the reveal of the mole is perversely anticlimactic. (12/23/2011)

While on honeymoon, their first attempt results in Edward splintering the bed and accidentally roughing up Bella. (When she reassures him she's fine and knows he didn't mean to bruise her, it creepily whiffs of battered-wife syndrome.) So Edward swears off all carnal pleasures; wouldn't she rather play another game of chess instead? With this film, the Twilight series officially makes the transition from essentially harmless Victorian-minded trash to something flatly pernicious. And boring, to boot. The filmmakers decided to break the fourth and final book of Meyer's series into two parts, ostensibly to accommodate its surfeit of action. They must be saving all that for Part 2. (11/25/2011)

Based on a popular 1982 novel by Michael Morpurgo, Spielberg's War Horse affords young viewers the opportunity to see the First World War through the perspective of Joey the horse. Raised on an English farm. Joev is sold into war in 1914 and has many a harrowing experience on the Western front. A horse is a horse (of course, of course), and it might be said that the folly of War Horse is its expectation of emotional resonance to derive from a fairly expressionless equine visage. The battle scenes, despite being bloodless, are powerfully wrenching and a keen reminder of what Spielberg is capable of. So he quits his job and moves the kids to the countryside. The home Mee buys is on property that houses a closed, ramshackle zoo that's maintained by workaholic zookeeper Kelly Foster (Johansson). Inevitable flare-ups occur regarding the children's acclimation, unexpected expenses, and Mee's grieving. NEW YEAR AND BETTER FINANCES - HOW DO I GET MY CREDIT SCORE?

My boyfriend recently applied for a home loan and learned that his credit score is horrible. It's got me a bit worried and makes me want to get my financial house in order as we move into 2012. How do I review my credit score?

The Fair Credit Reporting Act requires nationwide consumer reporting companies to provide you with a free copy of your credit report every 12 months upon request. You can get your free credit report by calling 877/322-8228. You can also purchase your credit report for a nominal fee from many other websites. Periodically checking your credit history is very important, primarily because it can help combat identity theft.

Identity theft, which leads to inaccuracies in your credit rating, can affect your ability to get credit, especially loans for major purchases like a house or a car. You should periodically check your credit report to ensure the information contained in it is accurate and up-to-date

Should you find inaccuracies in your credit report, you need to contact the consumer reporting company and the information provider (the person or organization that provided information about you to a consumer reporting company) in writing and dispute the inaccurate information. Consumer reporting companies generally must investigate the items in question and forward all the relevant data you provide about the inaccuracy to the person or organization that provided the information. After the information provider receives notice of the dispute from the consumer reporting company, it generally must investigate and report the results back to the consumer reporting company. If the information provider finds the disputed information is inaccurate, it must notify the nationwide consumer reporting companies so they can correct the information in your credit file. When the investigation is complete, the consumer reporting company should give you the written results of the investigation and a free copy of your credit report if the dispute results in any changes to your credit history.
