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
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The U.S. Swings Like a Pendulum Do

Many believe that the United States at its best, its very best, not just as a country but as a great country, is a state not geographically defined. The country is not just the land mass contained by our borders and a few outlying territories. Rather it is an idea, or a series of ideas, or a library of ideas about people, community, government, and our responsibilities to ourselves, to our families, to our communities, and to each other. In this version, to many, the defining document is the Constitution of the United States, which more than anything else argues not for a government ideology but a way of governing where all citizens are enfranchised. This universal citizenship does not mean a shared ideology by any means but rather is based on the expectation that citizens will routinely disagree with others, often to extremes and violently, denouncing cooperation and decrying compromise.

The Constitution does not lay out the rules of the country; it lays out a brilliant, impossibly difficult, probably largely unsatisfying to most way of governing. Not establishing ideas or championing laws or insisting on certain strict beliefs but rather a government structure - one that is not even vaguely dependent on hegemony. It is specifically designed to work amidst and regardless of controversy, hatred, and disagreement.

Currently, a lot of the country's most passionate self-proclaimed patriots have already thrown the baby out with the bathwater and are happily abandoning so many of the most difficult and seemingly impossible-to-make-work Constitutional guarantees and assumptions, in favor of simplistic solutions - most of which are not just ineffective but meaningless. Those claiming that they saved the country in this way are both right and completely wrong. Because the country they wish to save is not the United States of America, a democratic

Constitutional republic. It is a smaller, meaner, and more meaningless country, one that if it has not yet completely devoured itself is far along in that process.

The Trump administration is disturbing enough in and of itself, but what is even harsher to handle is the absolute glee of many of its most vocal supporters not that finally they are in

complete control of the government but rather at the despair and anguish of the left/ progressives/Democrats. They seem to be taking an untainted joy in those folks having their ideas and policies vanquished. It is not that they've won. It is that those they don't like have lost.

There is all this gloating, all the smug, self-assuring pleasure that this country's atheist, socialist, pro-Muslim, bleedingheart, anti-American left is having their faces rubbed in their own shit.

According to some: Two worldviews collided, the pure and righteous won, the evil and ill-intentioned have been destroyed. Glory, glory unto the Lord.

Except ... Nah, it just isn't going to work out that way. There are those of us fearful that Trump is the most disruptive president in the country's history, that he lacks philosophy, has no ideology, loves the country not at all but himself deeply and beyond understanding.

If we are right, who knows how or when

or why this administration will play out. Your guess is as good as the next person's as to what will happen.

Though if we are right ... and definitely if we are wrong — the genius of the Constitution is that it is not specific. It is not ideological. It is about process.

Those who tell you it is all about state's rights and small government have to

ignore Federalist Alexander Hamilton's crucial involvement. And they do. But they really can't.

Where the Constitution succeeds, where it has and does and will, is that it prescribes the structure for a government of regularly shifting focus, where politics are continually realigned. And realigned again.

Sometimes the country drifts left, but later will drift right. At times it drifts left but will go back to center and then on to the right. Which is a one-dimensional image of a four-dimensional model. It swings in every direction and in every direction it does move.

So to those gloating with glee at the left being vanquished: First, what most of the gloaters miss is how dependent they are and how they benefit from a rich array of laws, regulations, and policies that they deplore. Yes, we are free to think and vote the way we want, which doesn't mean we always or even ever act in our own best interests.

So the good giant ship Trump heads at previously unimagined speeds into the dark and unknown, that some claim is utopia or a previous greatness that never was nor was ever great. But then, watch as the giant thing of government reaches a limit. Reaches a limit and achingly, slowly begins to swing back. Watch it, and please get behind it, because as it comes slowly moving back and it will - there will be something to watch as you scramble to get out of its way.

And don't worry, those of us who hold ideas you so despise won't be gloating. Won't be smug and strutting. No, instead our sleeves will be rolled up, our bodies thrown into all the work that will need to be done given all the damage you are now so cheerfully greeting and enthusiastically championing.

Whether you like it or not, we are all in this together.

To quote Roger Miller, who once sang of nations swinging "like a pendulum do":

Dear Editor,

Our January was spent rehearsing for and performing The Bowie Project 3 at Ironwood Hall, 505 E. Seventh, directly across from the Austin Resource Center for the Homeless. Leaving aside whether or not the Austin Chronicle cover article, "It's Like a Jungle Sometimes," from Feb. 3 was insensitive in its description of the homeless, or whether the homeless person's perspective was not taken into account, the detailed description of the area around Red River and Seventh Street is accurate. If anything, the article undersells the human waste problem, possibly giving the misimpression that vomit, urine, and feces can be found only in the alleys. Discovering vomit in the gutter on Seventh Street, seeing urine flowing down the Seventh Street sidewalk, and the stench of shit wafting from the space between Ironwood and Caritas were all regular occurrences during our

time across from the ARCH. And if there was enforcement of a "no sit, no lie" ordinance, we saw none of that in our three weeks at the epicenter of Austin homelessness. In fact, we had to have two people push open the main front door from the inside at the end of one afternoon rehearsal because there was a person sleeping outside against it.

Having said all that, once the show opened and we had security out front, there was zero direct impact on the performances. Ironwood Hall is a beautiful event space with amazing amenities and an incredible staff. You should definitely book an event there!

My intention is not to communicate a lack of compassion for an individual's addiction, mental health, bad luck, life circumstances, judge any person in any way, or offer a solution. I do wish to confirm that the problem is as acute as Kevin Curtin wrote, probably worse.




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

FOR SALE NOW Negotiations have begun for sale or lease of the county-owned **300 block of**Guadalupe, the land originally intended for a new civil courthouse – until the November 2015 defeat of the proposed courthouse bond at the polls. Staff reports that there has been significant private interest in the tract, which the county purchased for \$22 million in 2010.

NEXT TO NOTHING Organizers of the Women's March on Washington set a **March 8** date for a **national general strike** against the Trump administration. Plans for a similar strike this Friday, Feb. 17, remain in effect.

A BIG BIRTHDAY Today, Feb. 16, Austin celebrates 10 years battling climate change. In 2007, former Mayor **Will Wynn** and then-City Council resolved to become a leading U.S. city "in the effort to reduce the negative impacts of global warming." Austin has since reduced greenhouse gas emissions by 75%, and 31% of the city's energy supply is renewable.

TRUMP'S TEXAN PUPPET Attorney General **Ken Paxton** became the first state AG to file a legal brief supporting **Trump's travel ban** Wednesday when he filed an amicus brief to the 9th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals. Paxton called the order a "lawful exercise of congressionally delegated executive power over foreign affairs and national security."

"THE LIBERAL MEDIA" Prosecutors want Paxton's trial for securities fraud moved out of Collin County because they claim that "Paxton's Posse" – including conservative lobby groups Empower Texans and Watchdog.org – deliberately tainted the local jury pool by using "an aggressive media strategy" against witnesses.

NO SEX ED in Texas: A new report from the Texas Freedom Network shows that 58.3% of Texas school districts taught abstinence-only classes in the 2015-16 school year, while 25.1% had no sex education classes at all. In 2015, Texas had the nation's fifth highest teen birth rate.

THE FAMILY RESEARCH COUNCIL, which the Southern Poverty Law Center has classified as a "hate group," spewed inaccuracies Wednesday when discussing the "Texas Privacy Act," aka the "bathroom bill" or SB 6, with Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick. Among the FRC's false claims was one about how marriage equality was not only forced upon the country by SCOTUS, but also paved the way for "fake" problems like the right for trans people to

use a bathroom aligning with their gender identity.

Living in Emergency

ONE DAY AT A TIME IN THE FORMER REPUBLIC

Well, it's been a very strange week in the Republic of Woebegone, formerly known as the U.S. of A. You remember that country, where as recently as December 2016, one

could pass a week or two without futilely attempting to suppress the thought that the world is about to end, or just trying to dodge the news cycle altogether. Life in America has become a version of that childhood mind game, Don't Think About a Hippopotamus. Except the hippopotamus is orange, he and his pathological cronies have been put in charge of

the country, and he won't go away.

Last week conservative pundit Andrew Sullivan (who spent far too much of the previous decade longing for the return of Imaginary Reaganism) managed to put his finger on the specific mental burden – the

"emergency" – of living in Trump World.
"One of the great achievements of free society in a stable democracy is that many people, for much of the time, need not think

about politics at all. The president of a free country may dominate the news cycle many days – but he is not omnipresent – and because we live under the rule of law, we can afford to turn the news off at times. A free society means being free of those who rule over you – to do the things you care about, your passions, your pastimes, your loves – to exult in that

blessed space where politics doesn't intervene. In that sense, it seems to me, we already live in a country with markedly less freedom than we did a month ago. It's less like living in a democracy than being a child trapped in a house where there is an abusive

and unpredictable father, who will brook no reason, respect no counter-argument, admit no error, and always, always up the ante until catastrophe inevitably strikes. This is what I mean by the idea that we are living through an emergency." ("The Madness of King Donald," *New York*, Feb. 10.)

THREATENING OUR NEIGHBORS

The emergency arrived home to Austin in a much more visceral and devastating way over last weekend, when many of our neighbors found themselves subject to the whims of a police state in a way that most of us can afford to ignore, most of the time. Mayor Steve Adler, in an open letter to the community, described the effects of arbitrary raids by Immigration and Customs Enforcement agents: "The overly broad way these ICE raids are being conducted is making our community less safe and causing disproportionate harm by dividing the families of

non-serious offenders and others who are of no threat and have been caught merely in the wrong place at the wrong time. ... These raids are sowing distrust, not just with ICE but even with local law enforcement, and that makes our community less safe." In a post to the online news site Mic (reposted on his Facebook page), City Council Member Greg Casar described some families in his District 4 as so frightened they're not leaving their houses, and keeping their children home from school. He called the raids "reprehensible," upholding neither the law nor public safety, but imposing a national political agenda of "scapegoating immigrants for our problems." Similar raids have been reported in at least five other cities.

FINDING A BALANCE

There's a substantial difference between devising some political response to the latest daily outrage, and wondering whether the hammer of deportation is about to descend upon and destroy your family. Yet every bit of public business is acquiring a shadowed, almost surreal double standard: Do we devote all our energies to the emergencies being manufactured in D.C. – from Muslim bans to immigration raids to Russian election hacking – or do we try to maintain daily sanity and only allot to politics its due proportion of attention, while we continue "to exult in that blessed space where politics doesn't intervene"? It's a question that won't have a single answer for everyone, or the same answer every day.

On a more minor scale, vou'll see the doubleness of our current predicament played out on the City Council dais. Mayor Adler, CM Casar, and the others will spend a bit of time Thursday employing admittedly minimal municipal powers - despite howls of rage emanating from the Capitol, nobody is offering anyone real "sanctuary" - to help defend a few families from the raids. Then they'll spend the rest of the afternoon and evening trying to adjudicate bitter neighborhood fights over "zoning variances" and "floor-to-area ratios." That's what city councils do - it's important work, and yet it increasingly seems inadequate to the times in which we are living.

Nevertheless, public official or ordinary Austin resident, we can all try to respond in whatever way possible to the mayor's heartfelt exhortation: "In this difficult situation, it is so important for us to show our neighbors and the world who we are and what we're made of. Let's take care of each other." Indeed.

Ted Talks

AISD TRUSTEE LAYS IT ON THE LINE ABOUT LBJ/LASA

The AISD Board of Trustees held a public hearing on Monday, Feb. 13, related to the update of the district's facility master plan. A number of people spoke against various school closures, but the board seemed most vexed by the proposal to move the LASA magnet school away from its shared campus with LBJ High, to a new campus, likely to be built on the site of the current Alternative Learning Center, the old Anderson High in East Austin, which Trustee **Ted Gordon** refers to as "Black Anderson." Toward the end of the meeting – just after midnight - Gordon summed up with an eloquent and poignant speech about the difficult decision the board will face:

"If ... the trustees decide that LASA is going to go there - and I guess there are reasons for doing so - I think that everybody

has to ... be cognizant of what that means. You know one of the things that is most painful to black folks in Austin is the fact that we're getting erased. Gentrification over the last 20 to 25 years has decimated the black community. We've done it ourselves. we've up and left, and we've been priced out, and schools haven't really been good enough to keep us here, etc.

But that move of LASA to ALC could be read as the ultimate step in gentrification of the city. It's taking a historic space that is an icon for what used to be a space of black autonomy in the city, and it's handing it over to what is read as ... there was a woman here who said LASA is not just elite white folks and I think that's probably true, but it's certainly read that way. And so as you take that community and if the idea is to tear

down Black Anderson and rebuild a citadel to elite educational practices, the symbology of it is deep. And so if that's what we decide to do then we're going to have to figure out how to do it in a way which is sensitive to the sensibilities of important components of the population. And the students themselves are going to have to understand what it means to sit on that high ground in East Austin."

While lauding LASA and LBJ for their respective successes, Gordon also called the shared campus an "unprecedented failure in terms of the ability of the different kind of factors and sectors of our community here in Austin to get along What we do when we move LASA out of LBJ is to admit defeat Is this the model for the way that we do diversity, we do social justice, and we do desegregation in this district?

Neighbors Demand Greater Density

NW Austin Neighbors, the neighborhood organization behind the valid petition recently filed with the city, opposing the Austin Oaks PUD, sent out a letter last week clarifying that their opposition is based on wanting "more residential housing, including affordable housing. ... Right now only 250 residential units and 25 affordable units are proposed on over 800,000 sq. ft. of office space." They'd like to see at least twice that much, or preferably, up to 1,000 units on another parcel of the project, essentially replacing a planned hotel. NWAN's valid petition opposing the PUD as proposed was accepted by the city this week, meaning it will take nine council votes to approve the PUD.

Cruz or Cornyn vs. Castro or O'Rourke?

The 2018 and 2020 elections got a little more interesting this week when Congressman Beto O'Rourke, D-El Paso, confirmed that he's eyeing a seat in the U.S. Senate. Ted Cruz is up for re-election in 2018; the term for John Cornyn, the state's senior senator, ends in 2020. There's also the issue of the other potential name in contention: San Antonio Democratic Congressman Joaquin Castro. who was recently elected chair of the Congressional Hispanic Caucus Institute, and has long been touted as a potential Senate candidate. This week Castro received his first endorsement, from U.S. Rep. Filemon Vela. D-Brownsville. The big wrinkle in all this is that Cruz may not even make it to 2018's general: Repeated speculation has it that the senator could face a serious primary challenge for next - Richard Whittaker March.

Updegrove Steps Down

The **LBJ Library** announced last week that Library Director Mark Updegrove will be resigning his directorship March 1, in order to accept a position as the CEO of the National Medal of Honor Museum, planned for Mt. Pleasant, S.C., at "Patriots Point" on Charleston Harbor. Updegrove has been the library director since 2009, and is credited with supervising the library's redesign and significantly increasing attendance. He has recruited prominent speakers among them Mikhail Gorbachev, Sandra Day O'Connor, John Lewis, Hank Aaron, et al. - and hosted memorable "summit" reconsiderations of historical periods, including the 2016 Vietnam War Summit and the 2014 Civil Rights Summit, featuring a keynote address by President Barack Obama. Said Updegrove, "Serving as director of the LBJ Library has been the greatest honor in my career to this point. I'm proud of the team I've led and all we've done to elevate the legacy of President Lyndon Johnson and enhance the library's reputation as a pre-eminent forum for thought leadership."

Building a Better School District

AISD's Facilities and Bond Planning Advisory Committee (FABPAC) presented trustees with its latest draft of suggested changes to the district's facility master plan on Monday, Feb. 13. After several months of community meetings, the document keeps pretty close to the original FMP, crafted in 2013. While there are minor tweaks suggested to multiple campuses, the FABPAC's biggest proposals are: moving the **Liberal Arts and** Science Academy away from LBJ High School and into its own facility; building a new facility for the Alternative Learning Center or moving it to the Sanchez Elementary campus; consolidating six campuses into two (Dawson, Brooke, Joslin, and Norman/Sims into one. and Ridgetop and Reilly into another); and early planning for a future bond election. The plan will now go through a fourth round of community feedback before returning to the board on March 6, with a final decision penciled in for June 19.

AISD on ICE

There's friction between Austin ISD's administration, employee union **Education Austin**, and certain board members over how to respond to recent U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement actions in Austin. On Feb. 10, Superintendent Paul Cruz provided a list of support services for refugee and immigrant students. That same day, Education Austin distributed fliers headlined "What to do if ICE comes to your door" to its members to hand out to students. The following day, EA hosted a "Know Your Rights" training session for teachers at Becker Elementary, to be followed by immigration clinics at Akins High on Feb. 25 and Dobie Middle School on March 11. On Monday, however, Cruz's office sent a memo to campus administrators indicating that AISD "activities, statements, and reactions are immensely scrutinized," and reminding them of existing policy that staff should not talk about "political affiliation, views, protests, advocacy or other controversial issues or topics that may arise while on District property." This induced the ire of both the union and Board Vice President Paul Saldaña, who criticized what he called "the conservative tone of the memorandum." Wednesday morning, EA representatives held a press conference to voice support for the school district's immigrant students. - R.W.

Divest in Chase

About 80 ralliers organized outside the **JPMorgan Chase Bank** on Sixth Street on Monday to demand that residents and the city alike divest from the financial titan. The lunchhour protest called on the city to follow Seattle's lead in divesting. One call-and-response repeated: "Hey Steve Adler/ Break up with Chase." Along with other big-name banks, Chase has loaned over \$300 million to **Energy Transfer Partners**, the company backing the Dakota Access Pipeline and the planned Trans-Pecos Pipeline in West Texas. The



city currently holds a \$1.16 million contract with the bank.

According to **Angie Holliday**, who organized the protest, at least seven attendees canceled their accounts and "several folks" are in the process of moving mortgages and other assets from Chase. Holliday said more protests encouraging divestments will come, but urged interested parties to attend City Council's March 2 meeting to show support for the divestment movement and encourage Council to look into "more socially and environmentally responsible" banks. - Sarah Marloff





Council: Promised Land Use

AUSTIN OAKS, PLAZA SALTILLO LOOM LARGE FOR THURSDAY

The last couple of City Council meetings have been relatively sedate, medium-length affairs, not triggering elaborate fireworks, and ending before 9pm. Judging only from some heavily contentious zoning matters returning to the 68-Item agenda, that's not likely to happen today (Feb. 16). Both the Plaza Saltillo case and the Austin Oaks PUD are set to return before the dais: the former with the public hearing still open after last week's first reading and several council members still unconvinced about the overall project plan; the latter also pending second and third readings, now with a valid neighborhood petition in opposition and a changed political context.

Looming above and beyond all this heated local material is the cloud of uncertainty emanating from Washington, most recently the Immigration and Customs Enforcement raids that have roiled Austin and reportedly five other cities over the last week. Several council members (notably Delia Garza and Greg Casar) have been closely following the raids, Austin Police Department Interim Chief Brian Manley has been demanding more information from ICE, and on Tuesday Mayor Steve Adler issued an open letter to Austinites, describing his city as a "welcoming, inclusive community" and defending APD's equal protection policies and those of Travis County Sheriff Sally Hernandez. ("Mayor Adler Addresses ICE Raids ...," Feb. 14).

The immigration battle appears twice on today's agenda - first with Item 18, a \$200,000 funding increase to Catholic Charities of Central Texas for "legal and counseling services to immigrants." This is in response to a December Council direction for staff to find emergency funding in



anticipation of Trump regime actions nobody knew that it would be needed this soon. It's on the consent agenda, and not likely to raise much opposition, but before passage it's likely to be the occasion for additional public and Council commentary.

The Plaza Saltillo matter (Items 57-59) returns after a week to allow D3 CM Pio **Renteria** to try to work his backstage magic to broker an agreement among landowner Capital Metro, developer Endeavor, and the nearby neighbors over a couple of outstanding issues, including a request for greater height on one (of three) tracts and a disagreement over just how much affordable housing is achievable on the site. ("Council: Committee on Committees," Feb. 13). And it appears council members have plenty of their own questions about how the project changed from announced parameters in 2014. As they say on the traffic alerts: Expect delays.

Austin Oaks promises its own donnybrook, as the development was already embattled last year. Along with the Grove at Shoal Creek, the PUD controversy bears considerable credit for the defeat of former D10 CM Sheri Gallo and her replacement





by newcomer Alison Alter. Alter requested the two-week delay that placed the matter on today's agenda, and the "time certain" of 6:30pm to allow a full complement of Northwest Austin witnesses. The outstanding questions run the gamut from traffic, density, retail and commercial elements, tree preservation, etc. - anticipate a rhetorical version of MoPac at rush hour.

And 6:30pm for that debate would seem quite optimistic. Among other matters that will consume the day:

· Contract Hold 'Em: Members have already posted questions about several sub-



stantial contracts currently on the consent agenda, including: the \$2.5 million reconstruction of the Convention Center kitchen (Item 6); \$4 million to Taser International for those long-delayed APD body cameras (Item 30; the original contract is in court over unfair competition issues, and state District Judge Karin Crump did not look kindly on the city's attempt to issue a new one - postponement seems likely).

- From See to See: Item 32, sponsored by CM Ora Houston, the mayor, and three other members (i.e., needing only one more domino) would initiate staff research to extend "Capitol View Corridor" protections to areas of East Austin. The apparent theory is that there is no sentimental Westside notion so dubiously nostalgic that it can't cross I-35, for reasons of "equity." You might think that Travis County's courthouse conundrum, and the city's bank-busting difficulties over the Waller **Creek Tunnel project** – both due in part to existing "View Corridor" restrictions might make folks hesitate to prevent tall buildings in the urban core. Then again, maybe that Plaza Saltillo tower-height issue is at the bottom of this one ...
- Incentives Tweak: The mayor and others hope to revise existing economic incentives policies (Item 33) to encourage companies to bring "middle-skill" jobs, especially to the Eastern Crescent, one aspiration of the Spirit of East Austin initiative.
- Executive Pondering: Executive session items seldom raise evebrows and often get withdrawn. But flies on the wall would certainly want to hear the discussion of Items 42 and 43 - possible city acquisition of "Muny" (Lions Municipal Golf Course) from UT-Austin - and Item 44, the legal issues affecting undocumented immigrants. We'll just have to wonder and wait.

There is plenty more to zone (Thrasher Lane, Elysium Park, Bouldin Courts, Villas at Vinson Oak), plenty to contend. The musical honorees are those festive folks from Honk!TX - expect them to blow their own horns. And former Mayor Will Wynn will be in the house to accept a proclamation celebrating 10 Years of Climate Leadership. Let's keep it clean ... and renewable. - Michael King

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Left in the Dark

tends to reign. As reports of immigration raids reached a fever pitch over the weekend, local lawmakers were left as confused as everybody else, and wondering why this city had seemingly become a priority target. At the Capitol, House Homeland Security & Public Safety Committee Member Gina Hinojosa, D-Austin, wondered, "Is it about public safety, or is it about politics?"

Like most Austinites, the Travis County delegation was left in the dark about what was going on, said Rep. Eddie Rodriguez, D-Austin. The five-day push from U.S. **Immigration and Customs Enforcement** to arrest undocumented migrants with criminal records netted 680 detainments nationally - 51 in Austin, San Antonio, and the surrounding region – according to statistics released by the federal agency. But very little had been reported publicly about the raids, identified after the weekend as Operation Cross Check. By Monday morning, Rodriguez was able to report "There's a better handle on it now.

"There's more ears to the ground and eyes on the street," he told the Chronicle. Rodriguez had been in contact with Austin Mayor Steve Adler and Travis County Sheriff Sally Hernandez: the three had made a commitment to share information as any became available. "I would be very careful when I would say something, because I was hearing different things," he said. "I didn't want to say anything publicly, on social media or otherwise, until we had a better idea of what was happening."

Rodriguez was very forthcoming about whom he blames for Austin being targeted: Gov. Greg Abbott. He saw the raids as a consequence of Abbott promising to "hammer" Travis County over Hernandez's adoption of a policy that her office will only accept ICE detainer requests in cases of violent crime or human trafficking, or if there is an accompanying judicial warrant or court order. "Our governor wanted to get on national television, and he ran with it,"

In the absence of information, confusion charged Rodriguez. "It drew the attention of our president, and it's evident to me that he decided that Austin would be just as good a place as any."

> Rep. Rafael Anchia, D-Dallas, who chairs the Mexican-American Legislative Caucus, said he had heard word of other arrests across the state, but nothing of the scale of what happened in Austin. He said, "If this is just execution of outstanding criminal warrants, I get it. But other people are getting

picked up too that are not subject to warrants, and I think that's what gives people concern."



ICE holds an operation like Cross Check annually. but the circling question is whether Cross Check 2017

is different from earlier iterations. Secretary of Homeland Security John Kelly called this iteration "routine" and "a targeted enforcement operation," but online, President Trump dubbed it a "crackdown." Making matters less clear is that the Mexican Consulate is reporting different numbers than ICE: They've indicated that 53 people were detained in Central Texas over the weekend.

The information vacuum has caused panic and confusion, with ICE having to issue a press release denying the use of roadblocks and sweeps. That vacuum also trapped local government and even the Legislature. Hinojosa said that there had been a trickle of calls about ICE operations for the last two weeks, but no one at the city or state level could confirm anything until Friday - and even then it was all secondhand reporting without direct acknowledgment from ICE. Hinojosa said during previous operations "we've always maintained communication," and that "the fact that none of our local officials or law enforcement, no one, knew what was going on" with last week's raids "is further destabilizing."

Like Adler and Brian Manley, interim chief of Austin Police, Rodriguez argued Monday that ICE's sweep may prove damaging to law enforcement. APD has spent years trying to forge relationships with undocumented communities, through programs like the **Restore Rundberg** initiative, so that arriving, and the impact is already obvious. There are already reports of fewer workers at day labor camps and students not turning up to school. The operation has also sparked concerns among legal permanent residents worried about sweeps, which could have an immediate economic effect. Rep. Paul Workman, R-Austin, stressed that most employers will want all their employees to be fully documented, but added, "I don't think there's any question that the construction industry, the hospitality industry, and a number of other industries depend upon migrant workers." Similarly, as a Realtor, Israel said she was "very familiar with the fact that the men

and women who are here without papers

are literally who we should be thanking for the growth we've been experiencing."

There also exists the very serious risk this may damage relations with Mexico, impacting Texas' vital cross-border trade. That's a big red flag for Rodriguez, who wondered aloud about Mexico taking its business elsewhere. "There's no reason why they absolutely have to do everything with us, and what kind of partnership is it when you're talking about building a wall?" he asked.

Yet while state lawmakers can respond to the ICE operation, there's very little they can do about it. They have their own immigration-related

concern in Senate Bill 4, the "sanctuary city" legislation being pushed by Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick. That was passed out of the Senate on party lines on Feb. 8 and sent to the House, though it's yet to be assigned to a committee. The smart money is that it will be heard either by State Affairs, on which Rodriguez sits, or by Homeland Security. At the moment, State Affairs seems to have the edge. So while Hinojosa said that she'd like to sit in on a first pass at the House response, she conceded that having it heard by the less vociferously conservative State Affairs may see the bill be subjected to more rigorous examination.

That means Rodriguez, who sits on State Affairs, may be one of the first House Democrats to get a crack at the bill. While he expects that some form of sanctuary city legislation will pass, the specifics have yet to be defined. Speaker Joe Straus has broken with Abbott and Patrick by not listing sanctuary cities as a legislative priority, which Rodriguez said presents an opportunity to craft "something that isn't as harmful and hateful to our immigrant population as it is currently." His concern is that SB 4 is just one of many pieces of state-level legislation - including bills on student financial aid and in-state tuition - that will hit undocumented residents and their communities hard. "They may be undocumented, but the vast, vast majority are law-abiding people," he said. "They're sending their kids to school. They're paying their taxes." - Richard Whittaker



those in the community would feel more comfortable reporting serious crimes against people or property. "In one stroke of a pen, our president blew it up, and the governor gave him the dynamite," Rodriguez said.

Rep. Celia Israel, D-Austin, suggested that if the feds had shared information about the scale of the operation, and whom it was targeting, local law enforcement and elected officials might be able to assuage those fears. She said, "There's a lot of disruption, a lot of unknowns, that could have been avoided with some upfront information to say, 'We're following the law, and here's our plan, and here's your point of contact if you have any concerns."

Voter Registration Made Easy?

House Bill 143. Author: Rep. Celia Israel, D-Austin

Next Austin City Limits Music Festival, don't be surprised if you spot local state Rep. and vice chair of the House Elections Committee Celia Israel at the entrance with her iPad, ready to register you to vote. Well, that's if the Texas Legislature passes her HB 143, a measure that would allow citizens to complete voter registration applications online. (Not online voting, only registering – a conflation that has caused some confusion.) At present, you can complete a voter registration form online but you still need to print it out and send it through snail mail, steps Israel says slow down potential voters, especially younger generations. "Right now, I can order a super mocha latte from Starbucks with my cell phone," Israel said. "I can pay taxes with my cell phone. But I can't go online and get registered to vote. We need to change that."

Israel's bill would reduce time and taxpayer costs associated with non-electronic registration. Travis County Tax Assessor-Collector **Bruce Elfant** says it

took county staff nearly two weeks to process all the voter registration forms received by deadline in 2014. And the County paid \$160,000 on temporary employee data entry jobs during the 2012 elections - \$100,000 could have been saved by electronic registration, said Israel.

Last session, Israel introduced similar legislation that garnered wide bipartisan support. But with vocal pushback from certain players (including the former Harris County tax assessor-collector), the bill didn't get very far. Israel is confident her HB 143 will fare better this time, as more and more states (including Republican ones such as Arizona and Kansas) have adopted online voter registration. To date, 34 states offer the option, according to the National Conference of State

Legislators, Rep. Carol Alvarado, D-Houston, has also filed a bill, HB 80, supporting online voter registration. "There's a lot of difficult issues to tackle this session, but this one's a pragmatic, good county government policy that should cut across party lines," said Israel. - Marv Tuma



Dell Med School Debate Continues

Last week, the simmering local argument resumed over the utility (and even the legality) of the still-under-construction **UT-Austin** Dell Medical School. A group of local activists calling itself **HEALTH for Travis County** issued a report describing the medical school as top-heavy with administrative and staffing expenses, thereby misspending the annual \$35 million in funding provided by the Central Health District and Travis County taxpayers.

The report, written by attorney Fred Lewis and essentially an expansion of his November 2016 presentation to the Travis County Commissioners Court, claims that "Central Health's millions in funding for the Medical School have been spent overwhelmingly for services that have nothing to do with providing health care for the poor." Dell Medical School Dean Clay Johnston responded, in part, "The Dell Medical School at UT-Austin has used local taxpayer funding exclusively to achieve the goals and meet the obligations specified by Central Health and set out by voters in the historic 2012 election to support the medical school." Central Health released a similar response, arguing the new school is already "making our community healthier - especially for people who are lowincome and lack insurance."

Based on his analysis of financial records provided by the medical school, Lewis concludes, broadly, that of \$105 million in Central Health district funding provided to the school through 2016, \$42 million has thus far been spent "overwhelmingly" on what Lewis considers "administrative, operational, and educational services for the Medical School - not health care services for the poor." (Notably, his report does not attempt to analyze - or even consider the clinical programs or direct benefits reported by the medical school in its work with local patients.)

Dell has not yet directly responded to the financial breakdown in the Lewis report, but a January Dell "Progress Report" concluded, "This year, the community's \$35 million commitment will result in an estimated \$62 million in benefit to Central Health, its target population, and taxpayers." The benefits cited by the school include: resident care in local clinics and hospitals; health maintenance and care design work; clinical services for vulnerable residents; and medical student educational costs. The Dell report also notes the fulfillment of a commitment to leverage Central Health funds for federal support: "Central Health leveraged funds from [2012

Travis County election] **Proposition 1** to draw down about \$67 million in federal funding this year - money that was used to provide direct services to low-income and uninsured residents across Travis County." Administrators have cited an innovative orthopedics project that has dramatically reduced wait lists for care, as well as direct improvements in obstetrics care for women.

When Lewis and HEALTH advocates made their argument at Commissioners Court in November, the court promised closer monitoring of Central Health, but not the "independent audit" demanded by the advocates. Moreover, commissioners did not concede the critics' more fundamental argument reiterated in the new report, and presented to the **UT Board of Regents** last week that the entire medical school project violates state law, which (as Lewis interprets it) forbids health district spending on anything other than "direct" medical care, strictly defined. The county attorney assured the commissioners that the district was operating in accordance with state law, and the county auditor reported that the medical school was in compliance with its Central Health affiliation agreement.

The regents were reportedly less responsive than the commissioners, but a new aspect in the dispute is the involvement of former Austin state Sen. Gonzalo Barrientos, author of the law that initially established Central Health. Barrientos told the regents, "My intention in passing this legislation is that it would be for indigent health care. Period." Afterward, he told the Chronicle, "I think it could all be worked out, but what's going on now is not suitable." As Barrientos reads the Lewis report, simply "too much money is going for administration, not for treatment." Barrientos said he'd be glad to hear from the medical school about its programs for indigent residents, but as he told the regents, "That means now. Not tomorrow. Not next month. Not five years from now."

Austin's current state senator, Kirk Watson, was the most prominent public voice of the Prop. 1 campaign, and in a statement reiterated his conviction that "the partnership between Central Health and Dell Medical School is on sound legal footing." He cited the approval of the county attorney, and reiterated the ultimate goal: "to improve the provision of health care so that we don't relegate the poor in our community to a second-class system of health care. ... We're already seeing results in a very short period of time, but systemic change takes time." - Michael King

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"I Don't Know Where I Would Go"

MEDICAID PATIENTS FACE A FUTURE WITHOUT PLANNED PARENTHOOD

J.D. grew up in Texas foster care and transferred to a group home when she moved to Austin. The 20-year-old Medicaid recipient needed birth control, but as a rape survivor, was forced to undergo an "unemphatic" and "unhelpful" examination by an emergency room physician. That made her anxious when she'd see doctors. Her group home roommates arranged an appointment for her at Planned Parenthood's North Austin center. At her first visit, she felt at ease

J.D. is a restaurant line cook with hectic work hours. She appreciates the scheduling flexibility Planned Parenthood provides for her, and usually calls in the morning to get an appointment that same day. Wait times are typically short. She has built a trusting relationship with the center's staff. If she could no longer receive services there through Medicaid, she said, "I do not know where I would go." That's why she and nine other Planned Parenthood patients filed a class action lawsuit against the state of Texas for attempting to strip Medicaid patients of their ability to visit their choice health provider. (J.D.'s full name has remained confidential in the court filings.) The block, they say, is not only illegal under the Social Security Act, which guarantees the freedom to choose any qualified health care provider, but will cause irreparable harm to their health and safety.

The state-led exclusion - temporarily halted by U.S. District Judge Sam Sparks in January - would prevent 11,000 Texans across 30 Planned Parenthood clinics (including at least 900 patients who visit three Austin locations) from obtaining basic preventive care at their health center of choice. The state's case rests on debunked undercover video taken at a PP center in Houston by radical anti-abortion group the Center for Medical Progress, purporting to



show the intent to change abortion procedures to profit from fetal tissue research. However, no health official who testified for the state in Sparks' courtroom could say the video showed any actual wrongdoing. (See "Planned Parenthood's Standoff to Save Medicaid Continues," Jan. 19.)

Since Medicaid is barred from paying for abortions, any removal would in reality block access to contraception, breast cancer screenings, STI testing, screenings and treatment for cervical cancer, physical exams, pregnancy testing and counseling, and certain procedures including biopsies and colposcopies - all services provided by Planned Parenthood – for the state's poorest women. Sparks plans to make a firmer preliminary ruling by Feb. 21 on whether or not to grant a temporary injunction. Both sides are expected to appeal the decision should they lose, leaving providers and patients in a limbo they now know too well.

"All these barriers that Texas lawmakers have created and the way they have

systematically dismantled women's health care in Texas creates confusion on a daily basis for the patients we serve," said Sarah Wheat of Planned Parenthood of Greater Texas, which serves 4,000 in a region that extends as far as Ft. Worth and Dallas. That confusion lingers for years: Wheat says PP phone staff still receive 10-15 calls per day from patients asking if they work with the Texas Women's Health Program, which the state excluded Planned Parenthood from four years ago.

"Whether it's the state of Texas or efforts by U.S. Congress to eliminate funding across the country, we are hearing from patients that they don't know what's going to happen next, and they're concerned about if they're still going to be able to count on Planned Parenthood," said Wheat.

"BAD" PUBLIC HEALTH POLICY

In an effort to discredit claims that Medicaid patients won't have anywhere to turn if they're not able to visit PP, state attorneys put Jami Snyder, associate commissioner for Medicaid at the Texas Health and Human Services Commission, on the stand during the January hearing. Snyder told the court that Medicaid patients could go to any of the 140,000 providers in a "robust network" for care, but conceded after questioning that she did not know if those providers offered walk-in appointments or weekend hours (like PP), or if they are accepting new Medicaid patients and offer the same services PP has made

available. What's more, Snyder could not guarantee that Texas' counties can claim a sufficient number of family planning providers, instead suggesting the severely impoverished women on Medicaid could easily find a new provider by using the state's internet database - ignoring the reality that many of those women don't online have access. Significantly, Snyder was also "not aware" of the alarming

rise in maternal mortality rates in Texas, a stunning admission from a leading public health official.

A basic search reaffirms the uncertainty of capacity: In a review of more than 9,500 available Medicaid providers in Travis County, the Chronicle found the only providers listed exclusively as family planning clinics were Planned Parenthood, with the exception of one controversial anti-choice organization, the Heidi Group, and one of its contractors in Marble Falls. (The state awarded Heidi founder Carol Everett \$1.65 million in taxpayer money to service public



Sekrit's Out?

Beau Reichert's Sekrit Theater appears closer than ever to shuttering. Even after extensive work to get his East Austin property up to code, Reichert hasn't yet found a solution that will allow him to continue hosting his larger parties and fundraisers in compliance with city ordinances – events Reichert says are vital to keeping the arts complex up

Six months ago, Reichert talked about ongoing efforts to save his sanctuary-turned-community hub ("When the Sekrit's Out," Sept. 2, 2016). Now, most of his talk focuses on who might purchase the property; what they might do with it; and where he intends to relocate. His first choice would be to sell the property to a New York-based company that would turn his vision into a private club for artists. Reichert declined to identify potential suitors from New York.

"These are the options: subdivision, condominiums, or an art institute [that] wants to take over my vision and preserve the property," he told the Chronicle. "The city will give us a conditional use permit for a nonprofit."

Reichert believes the only chance to keep his Sekrit Theater up and running would be if **City Council** decided to grant him a variance on the rule that prohibits gatherings of more than 49 people on a single lot. No such effort has materialized. Arts Commissioner Felipe Garza said that's likely because granting Reichert a variance would set a precedent for other projects throughout the city. "If you grant one company a variance, you basically have to grant one for everyone else, or just change the rules," said Garza.

Garza suggested that buyers take into account zoning rules when they're looking into a property – considering what they want to do with that property and what its potential uses might become. At the same time, Garza admitted Reichert's problem as an artist struggling to make ends meet is a common one in Austin. "Austin is no longer affordable, and people are moving out in droves," he said. "And the solution to that is something that is almost beyond our control."

No matter the final outcome, Reichert now turns his attention toward other cities that might have the space and enthusiasm for a similar project. He said he's considering moving to Arizona, New Mexico, or Fredericksburg. - Nina Hernandez

health ("Anti-Choice Group to Receive \$1.6 Million Health Grant," Aug. 15, 2016).

HHSC issued similar assurances in court and elsewhere when the state kicked PP from the Women's Health Program on Jan. 1, 2013, and over time they were proved embarrassingly wrong. A number of press reports highlighted the lack of available providers. (Patients were directed to pathology labs and orthopedic centers rather than family planning clinics on a state database). The outcome for women meant less birth control and more unintended pregnancies: Researchers with the UT-based Texas Policy Evaluation Project found a drop in long-acting, reversible contraceptives, and a rise in Medicaid (aka taxpayerfunded) births in counties affected by the PP ban.

Amanda Stevenson, a TxPEP researcher, thinks history will likely repeat itself – this time spawning an even more damaging public health crisis. "I would anticipate that there would be reduced access to long acting and reversible contraception, lower continuation of birth control, and likely higher rates of unintended pregnancy and birth for women unable to go to Planned Parenthood," she told the *Chronicle*. "That's not good public health. Those are adverse impacts."

She noted that while the Women's Health Program served low-income women, the eligibility bar for women to obtain Medicaid is much steeper. Medicaid serves an even poorer population, one that's less able to overcome certain barriers. For instance, for a woman with dependent children to qualify for Medicaid, she must have an income less than 15% of the federal poverty level, or \$3,756 annually for a family of three. "If women with more resources had trouble finding a new provider [under the Women's

Health Program] then I would anticipate very disadvantaged women are going to have at least that much trouble with the Medicaid exclusion," said Stevenson.

PART OF THE PUZZLE

Confidence in capacity grows increasingly suspect when considering that Planned Parenthood serves as specialists in family planning and sexual health, doing the work available community health centers are not designed to handle. Wheat considers PP's role part of the larger puzzle in Travis County's health network; without it there would be a domino effect on other "safety net" primary care providers such as CommUnityCare, Lone Star Circle of Care, or People's Community Clinic. "While our colleagues at federally qualified health centers provide outstanding care, we're all struggling because the need is high," said Wheat. "So, our part is seeing a patient population for sexual health care services which enables our colleagues to serve pediatric patients with asthma or patients with chronic diabetes, for example. It really takes all of us to make sure resources are available.'

If the city's federally qualified health centers were to start seeing displaced PP patients, they would need to offer services beyond just family planning, straining time and resources at the nearly 30 general clinic FQHCs. "Health care is not something you can just turn on and off," said an executive at one of Austin's community clinics. "If family planning patients are no longer seen at Planned Parenthood, other clinics would have to ramp up services and hire new staff. I'm not sure all the places in Travis County have the capacity to do that. So, there would be a big gap in care." — Mary Tuma



Agitators, disrupters, or "anarchists," the Red Guards represent a new facelessness of modern protest

It was the C3 and C4 vertebrae – right up top, behind the jaw – that fractured in Jared Roark's neck during an arrest near the Capitol a few days after Donald Trump got elected. That Sunday (Nov. 13, 2016), a couple hundred people had marched up Congress Avenue to protest the incoming president. As they made their way toward the Capitol's gates, a man wearing a "Make America Great Again" hat held a sign that read "Fuck Your Feelings" in his hands and shouted toward the marchers as they moved northbound. Most of the marchers continued to the Capitol, but a small group – many of whom had marched in masks - stayed behind to confront him.

Josh Pineda, a longtime member of the Peaceful Streets Project, the local copwatching collective, was on Congress with the marchers. He saw the small group converge. He said the "Make America Great Again" man was "intentionally there to disrupt."

"Somebody knocked [his] hat off," said Pineda. "Some people took his sign and ripped it up." But "absolutely nobody," he said, waged any bodily assault on the man.

Pineda said he witnessed other demonstrators rush over to a team of state troopers and ask that they intervene. Other witnesses said 12 troopers rushed the group and started pinning protesters and making arrests. It was clear to them that the troopers were going after those in masks.

One witness, who asked to not be named, recalled at one point seeing a masked protester trying to flee the rumble. "He got caught up on one of the fences," he said, "and got tackled by the cop ... chasing him." The trooper allegedly pinned the protester to the curb in what looked like an uncomfortable position. "I remember thinking he could get hurt," said the witness. Carlo Engel Nasisse, a UT student who was Downtown photographing the protest, ran over when he heard commotion. "I didn't see anything

specific happen," he told the Chronicle. "But I remember one of the protesters complaining about pain in his neck, and one of them was asking for medical help."

Roark, who was wearing a mask, was arrested that night, along with five other protesters. He didn't receive treatment for his neck injury until after his release from Travis County Jail the following evening. Roark has declined to comment, on the advice of his attorney. In an email, DPS press secretary Tom Vinger said Austin-Travis County Emergency Medical Services was called the night of Nov. 13 and offered to provide Roark with treatment, which Roark refused. "Protests are common at the State Capitol and participants usually refrain from violent or antagonistic behavior," wrote Vinger. "When violence or issues do take place, it is typically caused by the small number of agitators."

Shortly after that protest, organizers turned to a since-deleted Facebook account called "Protest Trump Austin Tx" to "remind everyone that this page only wishes to elicit peaceful protests. ... We don't associate with masked extremists. We are not enemies of the state. We are the state."

The group's distancing from masked protesters carried extra weight that week. A few days before the march, former Austin Police Chief Art Acevedo appeared on KEYE-TV to admonish those who chose to protest under the cover of any mask. "If you want to make your message heard and exercise your First Amendment right, take those masks off," he said. "Because historically, the only people who cover their faces are people who are agitators." Asst. Chief Frank Dixon later amended APD's official perspective, telling the Chronicle: "There could be some peaceful protesters who want to cover their faces. There could be some people who do not want to have their views known publicly." Dixon did, however, cite a

mounting sense of erratic activity and vague fluidity in recent protests, lobbing blame on a small group of masked activists.

"They call themselves the Red Guards," he said. "They're anarchists."

The Red Guards promote themselves as a "Marxist-Leninist-Maoist collective of community organizers and mass workers" who believe Dixon's label of "anarchist" is inaccurate. "Anarchists have absolutely no plan to take state power," a spokesperson with the group stated in response to the chief's assessment. "As communists, we intend to build a party that will seize power and form a new state."

FIGHT FOR YOUR RIGHT

The Red Guards operate in anonymity. Their lone spokesperson wouldn't go on the record, and declined to say how many people in Austin belonged to the activist group, or the range of ages of its membership though naked-eye indications suggest the group is younger than middle-aged. They have a Facebook page: Red Guards Austin; it's public, with 5,200 likes and just as many

followers. Organizers post notes and invitations for marches and other efforts, often in coordination with affiliated groups in Philadelphia and Los Angeles. They wear masks to "remove the individual face from the equation," said the spokesperson. "We're acting as a unit.

"We don't seek to come to power through elections. We believe in armed strug-

gle with mass participation." The group organized its first protest after the Michael Brown killing in Ferguson, and has been active locally ever since.

The Red Guards' emergence coincides with a marked shift in the personality of today's public protests. Occupy Wall Street, the global movement that exposed the enormous wealth disparity in the United States

and abroad, started with a small group taking over Zuccotti Park in New York City in September 2011. Kalle Lasn and Micah White from the Canadian publication Adbusters made a call for direct action earlier that year, in an online post titled "A Million Man March on Wall Street." Inspired by the "Arab Spring," uprisings in the Middle East that materialized in late 2010, Adbusters emailed its subscribers in June 2011 to declare that "America need[ed] its own Tahrir" (a reference to the Egyptian mass occupation of Tahrir Square in downtown Cairo). The Zuccotti occupation soon inspired hundreds of other occupations across the country and around the world.

Black Lives Matter, the largest mass movement to immediately follow Occupy, took off in 2013 after the acquittal of George Zimmerman for the death of Trayvon Martin, and grew rapidly after Brown was shot and killed by a police officer the next year. Unlike the stationary encampments that characterized Occupy protests, demonstrators in Ferguson took to the streets with energy. After a St. Louis

> County grand jury announced that the state would not indict Ferguson police officer Darren Wilson for causing Brown's death, a crowd stormed through the St. Louis suburb, hurling projectiles at police officers and smashing the windows of local businesses. In a now famous video, Brown's stepfather Louis Head can be heard yelling to the pro-

testers: "Burn this motherfucker down!"

Comparable outrage followed in April 2015 after a "rough ride" with the Baltimore police ended the life of Freddie Gray. In the months that followed, protesters destroyed property, injured police officers, and damaged police vehicles. Protests in solidarity with the three deaths materialized in other parts of the country, emulating the rebel-

lious spirit in Ferguson and Baltimore. Instead of occupying buildings or parks, demonstrations filled city streets and blocked highways.

Dixon said he has observed this transformation take hold locally. "There's a shift in dynamic," he said. "People show up at the Capitol wanting to march through the streets." The assistant chief said that lately the Red Guards have repeatedly commandeered these marches and led them outside the corridors created by police escort. The unpredictable direction forces law enforcement to rely on bike and motorcycle units that can quickly adapt to sudden turnabouts. These defiant tactics by the Red Guards slight the safety of most pro-

testers and undermine APD's efforts to coordinate "a secure platform for Austinites to express their constitutional rights," said Dixon. "APD is one of the few large police departments to reach out to organizers beforehand to see how we can work together in order to ensure that everyone stays safe." The Red Guards' disruptive leadership, he said, makes that more difficult.

The Red Guards' spokesperson said that the group's intentional disobedience is rooted in anti-police politics. "Our goal is to outflank them and force them to move all over the city and disrupt life as usual by shutting down streets," they said. "In Austin, [law enforcement] likes to provide permits and give organizers a police escort so that they can look good and pretend they're protecting the demonstrators' rights, but that's because they first seek to rule by consent. When that doesn't work, they rule by coercion."

That allegation manifested locally on Feb. 3, 2012, when APD forced Occupy protesters to abandon the encampment outside of City Hall that they had held for four months. "It was a surprise," said Ronnie Garza, one of the occupiers.

"They came around 11pm after the majority of people had left, and told the camp to clear out." Officers formed a line and gradually pushed occupants off of City Hall. One protester was hospitalized. Chronicle photographer John Anderson, an active participant in the Occupy movement, said he witnessed the woman being pushed. Within an hour, the protest that had persevered since the previous October was broken down and over.

For the majority of that occupation, however, Garza remembers interactions with police as being "fairly cordial." In the beginning, APD was generally seen by the group as supportive, at least compared to the law enforcement agencies who had come down harder on other practicing occupants, like NYPD. "It was a minority of people who saw

policing as the primary issue," Garza said. "Most of the people saw democracy or the economy as the primary issue."

Another occupier, who wished to remain anonymous, disagreed with that assessment, alleging that Occupy Austin was very anti-cop. "A lot of the time at various demonstrations [during the occupation], people would yell 'Fuck the police!" they said. "Especially if people were getting arrested or had been arrested." On Oct. 30, 2011, one day after 38 occupiers were arrested for refusing to comply with newly instituted camping restrictions, Chief Acevedo hosted a press conference in which he lauded those apprehended for engaging in civil disobedience without resorting to violence,

> evoking the spirit of Mahatma Gandhi and Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. "I'm proud of the fact that no force was used, no tear gas, no pepper spray, no batons," he said. "And that we were able to take the folks that chose to engage in civil disobedience into custody without injury to any officer or to any of the protesters."

Acevedo's stated respect for the Occupy protesters helped disguise APD's undercover infiltration of the camp, suggested Garza. APD seemed to be "fairly hands-off, but it was only after the fact that we learned how they really were involved." he said.

At least three undercover officers participated in surveillance of the camp, according to the testimony of one detective, Shannon G. Dowell, during a court hearing (see "APD Infiltrates Occupy," Sept. 7, 2012). "They were there from the beginning," Garza said. "They weren't causing trouble or anything. They were just doing their thing; being undercovers, just waiting for the ₹ right moment when they could screw us all over."

That came on Dec. 12, 2011. when Garza participated in a national solidarity action with the International Longshore

and Warehouse Union by blockading entrances to various American ports. Garza and six others used lockboxes to create a human barrier to the port of Houston, which resulted in each of them being arrested and charged with felonies. Detective Dowell, known around Occupy only as "Butch," had procured, constructed, and delivered the lockboxes to the protesters.

APD has yet to disclose any other details concerning the case outside of Dowell's testimony, which was subpoenaed by Garza's lawyer. "It felt like a pretty deep secret they were trying to keep," Garza said. "I'm not quite sure what their endgame was, but it seemed like they wanted to make an example of us."

To date, the Red Guards have not discovered APD infiltration of their own organization, but members did have a run-in with "alternative media outlet" InfoWars in 2015, which threatened some members' safety. That May, Alex Jones led a protest of Planned Parenthood under the banner #BlackLivesMatter. An InfoWars article published the following day said, "This issue has been completely overlooked by the #BlackLivesMatter movement, which apparently thinks little of the hundreds of thousands of black babies every year that never get a chance at life."

The Red Guards participated in a counterprotest of that event, which attempted to obscure the rally's "pro-life" message. Tensions between the two groups quickly escalated to the point where police at the scene asked the counterprotesters to leave the area or face arrest. Although the Red Guards escaped without injury, they had not been wearing masks during the encounter (such precautions wouldn't be taken until later), and in the following days their personal information was shared on rightwing forums. The group received threatening messages on their Facebook page. Some members ended up moving away from Austin to avoid retaliation.

On Feb. 17, 2016, several months after the incident, the Red Guards posted a message on the group's blog. "The right is well armed, well funded, has discipline and sometimes combat experience," it read. "In conditions such as these, the left simply cannot afford to ignore the question of armed self-defense."

On Nov. 19, 11 days after Trump's election, a White Lives Matter rally of roughly 20 protesters met a few hundred counterprotesters at the state Capitol. Standing a short distance away were four individuals in masks adorned with the red hammer and sickle, armed with semiautomatic rifles.

ONE RESISTANCE

The surveillance methods APD employed during Occupy Austin have not impeded the department's coordination efforts with most protests. Chris Harris, a freelance data analyst who works with for-profit-prison abolitionists Grassroots Leadership, said organizers behind the One Resistance protest on Inauguration Day began communicating with police one month before and negotiated the parameters of the march. In a press conference the week before Trump's inauguration, City Council Member Greg Casar, who helped convene One Resistance's coalition of 40-plus organizations, expressed pride in the city's policies protecting civil liberties. "This coalition has been working closely with various city departments, including the police department, to ensure that this is a safe and family-friendly event for everyone," he said.

Paula Rojas, an organizer from Communities of Color United, said the Inauguration Day march was not intended to be a disruption. "The point was to create a space for different directly impacted communities to speak, cross-pollinate, and connect," she said.

The Red Guards were critical of the One Resistance march, accusing organizers of sabotaging any meaningful resistance by collaborating with APD. "It's not resisting to ask permission and then only do what you were given permission to do," one member said. The group joined a larger group of masked protesters that night - a group that identified as an "anti-fascist bloc." Together, they gathered outside the rally and yelled slogans like, "Love doesn't trump hate! Punch a nazi in the face!" before merging with the larger march.

A Red Guards spokesperson said after inauguration weekend that the group participated in order to provide an alternative radical politics to the "liberal rhetoric" of One Resistance speakers.

While Rojas agreed that now marks a time for confrontational actions like never countries, demonstrators gathered at airports, where people had been detained in compliance with the order, to demand their release. Although no one was detained at Austin-Bergstrom International Airport, a solidarity protest was held there on Jan. 29. Harris believes those protests, in conjunction with several lawsuits filed by the ACLU and other civil rights organizations, resulted in the federal government backpedaling on the order. "That's huge, because it gives us momentum going forward," he said.

Following a late January executive order that cracks down on immigration enforcement in so-called "sanctuary cities," Rojas said she believes direct action tactics must be more creative. She referenced the "Sanctuary in the Streets" project currently being put together by ICE out of Austin and Austin Sanctuary Network ("Matters More

Garza shared Pineda's concerns of a coming crackdown against direct action. "During Occupy, we got very lucky in that we were able to find out about the [undercover] detectives without them telling us," he said. "Under Trump, I feel like [protesters] will be taking even greater risks. The president and Washington [D.C.] have an ability to reach into our neighborhoods in a much more profound way these days."

Ken Casaday, president of the Austin Police Association, told the Chronicle that he doesn't expect any big changes to APD's day-to-day response to public protest. "No matter who's [president], no matter if it was Hillary or Mr. Trump, we would still do the same job we do today," he said. He and the union's executive staff worry about the effect that protesting has on APD's rank and file; marches and demonstrations require a substantial reallocation of police resources, with patrol officers often pulled away from their usual beats to manage crowds and direct traffic. "If our City Council and county government want to continue encouraging protesting, they should reimburse the APD budget," he said, a notso-thinly veiled jab at the calls for resistance from members of local government.

Vinger said that DPS's goal concerning protests moving forward remains to provide security and ensure the safety of the public - both those participating and those in the vicinity. "We will take the necessary precautions, including deploying additional personnel and resources, in order to protect life, property, and to encourage voluntary compliance with the law," he said.

To that, Asst. Chief Dixon said APD has a long history of protecting civil liberties, and that the department intends to continue in that tradition. "On a national stage, our Special Response Team is recognized as being one of the most professional and best prepared," he said. Members of the SRT were in D.C. for Trump's inauguration. "The last thing we want to do is antagonize."

The Red Guards' spokesperson said their group will continue to challenge the image of law enforcement as protectors of the First Amendment and to keep alive their militant style of protest, pointing to the turbulent demonstrations against Milo Yiannopoulos at the University of California-Berkeley on Feb. 1. The group's goal remains to implement a sustainable communist movement in the United States. "The defeat of Hillary Clinton in the last election has spurred massive interest in communism," said the spokesperson. "The Democratic Party is dead in the water. So, what are you going to do if the right is antithetical to your existence and liberalism cannot serve you?"

The group believes that moving forward, law enforcement agencies will try to quash their organizing efforts as a part of a larger "repressive state apparatus."

"That's what they are," the spokesperson maintained. "And it's demonstrated clearly by how if we don't protest according to what they deem as acceptable, they try to break our necks. And in one case they succeeded."

before, she did not think the One Resistance march was the best space for such demonstrations. "It didn't make sense for [the masked protesters] to be disruptive next to a group of people who can't run," she said. "That compromises folks who are walking with walkers and strollers." (Incidentally, some of the masked protesters were in wheelchairs or used other mobility aids.)


"Personally, I would like to see more solidarity amongst the left," added Harris. "[The Red Guards] wanted to do their own thing and have their own message, which is fine. I think you see that at a lot of protests where groups come out for different reasons, but in support of the same cause."

A GREATER RISK

In the weeks following the inauguration, protests have continued in response to Trump's actions. After he signed an order banning entry from seven majority-Muslim Than the Law," Feb. 10), "It's a rapid response network," she said, "where the goal is to buy time for others to get away or for the media to arrive, with the risk of arrest, of course."

Malcolm Greenstein, a partner at the law firm Greenstein & Kolker, which specializes in civil rights litigation, told the Chronicle he "expect[s] to be a lot busier" these next four years. "I think there's going to be more protests as well as the government coming down on the defenseless," he said. "It's going to require a lot of people, including lawyers, to stand up and help those folks."

Pineda predicted an increased militarization of police, and protesters facing more serious charges for acts of civil disobedience. Pineda, who spends much of his free time documenting police activity, fears that the current administration may seek ways to make filming police illegal. "I'm anticipating the worst," he said.



What Goes Around, Comes Around: 1) In January, Jesse Denton, 24, driving a stolen truck, tried to flee police on Interstate 95 near Brunswick, Ga., but accidentally crashed head-on into another vehicle. Seconds later, Denton was then fatally hit by another motorist as he ran across the highway to escape the crash scene. 2) A 37-year-old Saanich, British Columbia, man did not die but nearly bled out before being heroically rescued following his parking-rage blunder. On Jan. 31, doctors at Stanley Medical College and Hospital in Chennai, India, removed a live, full-grown cockroach from the nasal cavity of a 42-year-old woman whose nose had been "itchy" earlier in the day. Zachary Bennett and Karen Nourse have found Manhattan quite affordable, reported the New York Post in January - by simply not paying, for six years now, the \$4,750 monthly rent on their loft-style apartment in the Chelsea neighborhood, citing New York state's "loft law," which they say technically forbids the landlord from collecting. Since the other eight units of their building are "commercial," the landlord believes it doesn't need a "residential certificate of occupancy," but Bennett and Nourse believe the law only exempts buildings with at least two residences, and for some reason, the landlord has obstinately declined to initiate eviction or, until recently, to sue (for back rent, fees, and electricity).

Update From "Big Porn"

The colossus PornHub.com, in its annual January rundown, reported its several sites had 23 billion "visits" in 2016 (about onefourth from females), during which time its videos were viewed 91 billion times. In all, earthlings spent 4.6 billion hours watching PornHub's inventory (that is 5.2 centuries' worth of time doing whatever people do when viewing porn). USA took home the gold for the most "page views" per capita, just nipping Iceland. Online visitors from the Philippines, for the third straight year, remained (per capita) on the sites the longest per visit. The top search term on PornHub from U.S. computers was "step mom."

Unclear on the Concept

Late last year, Oxford University professor Joshua Silver accused Britain's Home Secretary of a "hate" crime merely because the secretary had made a speech urging that unemployed Britons be given preference for jobs over people recruited overseas. Silver denounced this "discrimination" against "foreigners" and made a formal complaint to West Midlands police, which, after evaluation, absolved Secretary Amber Rudd but acknowledged that, under the law, the police were required to record the secretary's unemployment speech as a "non-crime hate incident."

The British Medical Association issued a formal caution to its staff in January not to use the term "expectant mothers" when referring

to pregnancy - because it might offend transgender people. Instead, the Association's memo (reported by the Daily Telegraph) suggested using "pregnant people." The BMA acknowledged that a "large majority" of such people are, in fact, "mothers," but wrote that there may be "intersex" and "trans men" who also could get pregnant.

Leading Economic Indicators

In 2001. Ouestcor Pharmaceuticals bought the rights to make Acthar Gel, a hormone injection to treat a rare form of infantile epilepsy, and gradually raised the price from \$40 to \$28,000 a vial. The British company Mallinckrodt bought Questcor in 2014 and apparently figured the vials were still too cheap, raising the price to \$34,000. However, the Federal Trade Commission noticed that Mallinckrodt also during the latter period bought out - and closed down - the only company manufacturing a similar, cheaper version of the product, thus ensuring that Mallinckrodt had totally cornered the market. In January, the FTC announced that Mallinckrodt agreed to a \$100 million settlement of the agency's charge of illegal anti-competitive practices. ("\$100 million" is only slightly more than the price of giving one vial to each infant expected to need it in the next year.)

Precocious: Girl Scout Charlotte McCourt, 11, of South Orange, N.J., saw her sales zoom recently when she posted "brutally honest" reviews of the Scouts' cookies she was selling - giving none of them a "10" and labeling some with dour descriptions. She was hoping to sell 300 boxes, but as of the end of January, had registered 16,430. For the record, the best cookie was - of course - the Samoa, rated 9, but longtime favorites like the Trefoil ("boring") rated 6 and the Do-Si-Do ("bland") 5. The new Toffee-tastic was simply a "bleak, flavorless, gluten-free wasteland."

"Less Cowbell!"

Applicants for passports in Switzerland are evaluated in part by neighbors of the applicant, and animal-rights campaigner Nancy Holten, 42, was rejected in January because townspeople view her as obnoxious, with, said a Swiss People's Party spokesperson, a "big mouth." Among Holten's "sins" was her constant criticism of the country's hallowed fascination with cowbells - that make, according to Holten, "hundred decibel," "pneumatic drill"-type sounds (though a hit song, "[Don't Fear] The Reaper," by the group Blue Öyster Cult, skillfully employed the cowbell - before it was satirized in an epic Saturday Night Live sketch starring Christopher Walken).

The Aristocrats!

In January, Texas District Judge Patrick Garcia was charged with misdemeanor disorderly conduct after a dispute outside the courthouse in El Paso. An April trial date was set for Garcia, who was accused of giving the middle finger, in public, to another judge.

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Maternal Turn

In The Nearness of You, novelist Amanda Eyre Ward writes about her most important topic yet: motherhood

When Amanda Eyre Ward got the call informing her that she'd placed third in the 1999 Austin Chronicle Short Story Contest, her co-worker at a Downtown tech company called for congratulations on Amanda's big publishing win in the Pennysaver. Her story reading at Borders was drowned out by the cafe's cappuccino machine, but it was still the best day of her life. Ward credits that validation with giving her the confidence to pursue her writing career, and Feb. 21 marks the release of her sixth novel - her favorite yet.

In The Nearness of You, Suzette, a world-class heart surgeon, is adept at repairing the cardiovascular muscle and dissociating from emotion. When her husband Hyland throws her the curveball of a lifetime, they embark on a journey to become parents via a surrogate named Dorrie. The question of what exactly makes a mother quickly rears its complicated head: Is it DNA or dedication, or a little from both columns? The ensuing betrayal, soulsearching, and hard-won self-awareness that come with the adjustments of motherhood make for a love story both fierce and tender. Ward tells this story - one stuffed with complex moral and social issues - from shifting perspectives because intentionally risking heartbreak is a labyrinthine knot of courage and vulnerability.

(Bonus moral of this story: The Short Story Contest changes lives.)

Austin Chronicle: The book opened guite an emotional floodgate for me, as a mother. Was the thematic element of motherhood and its challenging emotions intentional or just part of the story that came to you? Are you a mother?

Amanda Eyre Ward: I am a mother of three. They are 13, 10, and 5, and I have been avoiding writing about motherhood, to be honest, my entire career. I think it's because I went to graduate school in Montana, I was the only woman in the program, and I somehow got the message that the important things to write about included war and booze. Not middle-age motherhood, frankly. So I've written all these books about women's death row and war reporters in South Africa, but I finally hit a stage where I realized, at least for myself, that becoming a mother - and how completely it changed me - might be the

most important topic there is to write about. Certainly the most important topic for me.

AC: For your last book, The Same Sky, you interviewed many immigrants and families about their stories. Did you do the same type research here?

AEW: It started with the *Baby M* miniseries - the true story of a couple who hired a surrogate, Mary Beth Whitehead, who basically just couldn't give them the baby. She was kind of crazy, but the parents who were paying for the baby also had major issues. She went on the run, and I love people on the run, hiding in motel rooms, so that was the idea. Night after night of "It's my baby! I can't give up my baby!" Everybody I knew watched it. So I thought, "What if I tried to do a literary novel with that plot?"

I can understand as a biological mother how you could think at the beginning of

nine months, like, "Whatever, I'll take the money and I'll move along." And then once you give birth, it's a different game. I wanted to explore both sides of the issues. A lot of my friends are mothers or trying to be mothers or glad they're not mothers. Really, my life is the research for this book.

AC: My son was a NICU baby who had several surgeries. Pediatric surgery is amazing work. AEW: It's also an interesting brain, because to have the ability – like a war photographer - to just somehow be outside of their emotions, that was something I wanted to explore with Suzette. She's a control freak and com-

pletely divorced from what her hands are doing. She thinks she can just hire a surrogate and then wheel her on out when it's over because she controls everything and that's the way it goes. But the

heart and the body don't always work in such a simple way.

AC: Shifting a little bit, I read your recent Cosmopolitan essay, "Texas State Representative Wanted to Honor Me for My Novel. I Had a Better Idea." It's so important right now.


AEW: What's sad is, that article was about a week ago, and I was like, "We should meet these people and reach out our hands." Since then, it's gotten even more complicated!

AC: The opening line in that piece is, "I became a writer ... because I wanted to bring dark stories into the light." You do that

THE NEARNESS OF YOU

by Amanda Eyre Ward **Ballantine Books**, 240 pp., \$27

Elizabeth Stone, author of A Boy I Once Knew: What a Teacher Learned From Her Student, wrote, "Making the decision to have a child is momentous. It is to decide forever to have your heart go walking around outside



your body." Loving a child, as a parent in particular, transforms the human existence, and it can be a shock to the system. Ordinary individuals become warriors, being sleep deprived becomes a resting state, and sometimes that irrationally powerful love of a parent compels

a person to do strange things in the interest of the child - for better or worse.

In Amanda Eyre Ward's novel The Nearness of You. Dr. Suzette Kendall is a dedicated career woman, a renowned heart surgeon whose wobbly genetics and personal history solidified an agreement with her husband Hyland to remain childless. Fifteen years into their marriage, however, he announces he would very much, in fact, like to have a child with her. What about surrogacy? Fast-forward to Dorrie, their paid surrogate, and the gutwrenching possibility that a newborn child could become both bait and pawn. Dorrie acts on her newfound maternal connection and decides to "choose love." She runs. They follow. The story explodes from there. Ward's even hand guides the reader through many of the vulnerabilities associated with big love. Though much of the story is on cruise control, driven by the forward momentum of finding Dorrie, Ward jerks the wheel and intentionally veers off course. As in real life, the parental narrative gets hit with an unexpected plot twist. And then another and another.

It's worth noting that so often women, particularly in maternal roles, are painted as overly emotional. Refreshingly, Ward juxtaposes Suzette's stainless steel tendencies with Hyland's far more emotionally driven demeanor. "Do you feel anything?" he asks her. Suzette's armor has a crack now, though: She's made that momentous decision. Through the development of Suzette's character, Ward

explores many facets of the human condition: What makes a mother? What is a family? How do we protect ourselves while loving completely? The other characters fall somewhat flat, but Ward's interesting use of shifting perspectives affords the reader enough insight into the list of players swirling around baby Eloise to sustain interest. Long threads of medical jargon from the operating table balance what could've easily become a soggy, sappy Lifetime movie plot, a move that mirrors the main characters' marriage.

Despite minor bumps in the road. Ward encapsulates the journey: "You are a mother if you sit and wait. And even as your heart cries out for you to save yourself, to run, you do not. You don't leave the room." - J.C.

in this book, and it's poignant in real life right now, especially with the ideas tossed around recently that writers aren't valuable, journalism isn't valuable. How important is it for writers to speak out?

AEW: I think that now is the time for everyone to use every ounce of strength and talent and power they have to fight for what we believe is right in this country. One thing that we're able to do as novelists is bring one person's story to the audience. You can kind of trick people into hearing your viewpoints. For example, in The Same Sky, it's the first-person story of a girl named Carla who's coming to find her mother in Austin. You sort of enable people to, hopefully, empathize with one child. Then they can no longer look at a political issue the same way. It makes it harder for people to think, "Oh, all these waves of immigrant children." You think, "Okay, but one is named Carla and she's scared." I have had many amazing discussions in book clubs with people who came in there with very strong viewpoints, who said, "I guess it was really hard for me to remember that each kid has a name and a voice." That's our job - that's my job as a fiction writer - to give voice to these people's stories.

AC: That heartbreaking photograph of the little boy, the little refugee, who is face down on the beach has been resurfacing in my feed. It's so hard to see, but that's a good thing maybe because it puts an actual child in perspective. It narrows the scope.

AEW: I completely agree. I also think that all of us are tempted to look away, because it's painful to look right at some of the things that are happening, to look at some of the people who are being affected. [We have] to continue to look at these people and tell their stories and reach out to them. AC: Sometimes people don't realize how closed off their hearts are until they've opened up like that. Suzette was afraid: What could happen if she really tapped into all these intense emotions? Once she did, it was worth it, but that didn't make it any less difficult.

AEW: I had to examine how my own life had exploded when I became a mother, and how I slowly put myself back together into someone different. That was a really painful process. You second-guess yourself all the time. I have this really wonderful sense now that my youngest is 5 that I have sort of come out of a cave as a different person. A person who is willing to write about motherhood and say I believe it's important and I don't really care what the grad school people in my head think. I'm the type of person who's also going to come out as a political voice, because I think it's important. I know that's not where I belong, and [the publishers, et al.] would point out that my power is in being a storyteller and not marching in the streets, but you know, the time has come. We all have to march in the streets.

Trio of Re-Zisters

Salvage Vanguard Theater reanimates *Thr3e Zisters* right when we need women who will bite back at the patriarchy

How fitting for Austin to receive another visit from the revivified corpses of Olga, Masha, and Irina just as the Texas Lege has reconvened in the state Capitol and the man who made sexist, body-shaming, and assaultive comments against women while campaigning for the highest office in the land has been installed as our misogynist-inchief. For in Lola B. Pierson's deconstruction of Anton Chekhov's Three Sisters, first staged by Salvage Vanguard Theater in 2015, the siblings who famously pined for Moscow are, you could say, grabbed by the

pussy and yanked from the grave by a bunch of men who, like so many of those testosterone-fueled prigs in the statehouse and the White House, seek to possess and control women out of the belief it's their God-given right to do so.

The dudes doing the disinterring of the deceased Prozorov sisters here are the very ones who bedeviled them when they lived: the soldiers Tusenbach and Soleny, rivals for Irina's affections; and Vershinin, who had an affair with Masha but wouldn't leave his wife for her. They stand for not just the characters in the play but also the countless stage companies and directors that have revived Three Sisters over time and insist on reviving it again and again and again out of their adulation of Chekhov and desire for the titular siblings. As the men shear the shrouds off the zombified women and prep them for yet another round of the same old story (applying Kewpie-doll makeup while the women's necks are in stocks), Soleny also takes on the role of academic critic, loudly proclaiming the merits of the groundbreaking Anton and sneeringly dismissing attempts by Americans, and especially method actors, to do justice to the playwright's work onstage. (Noel Gaulin's pauses for emphasis and extreme volume give the material a steroid injection of pomposity.)

For the guys, this never-ending replay is all about getting their own rocks off - and that's no euphemism. We see it: as Jay Byrd's clinical Tusenbach has Irina ride him like a horse, an apple stuffed in his mouth; as Zac Crofford's pity-partying

> as that gasbag Soleny beats off under a book while pontificating to Olga. Even the Prozorov brother Andrei - Robert Matney, hitting Chekhovian notes of listlessness and haplessness with perfect pitch - treats his dead but not reanimated wife Natasha as nothing but

Vershinin lets Masha pour hot wax on his bare back; and

a sex toy. Moscow, Schmoscow – the city isn't even on their radar, any more than any of the women's other needs or wants are.

Having been through all this before - too many times before - the zisters are over it. As Olga, Masha, and Irina, Heather Hanna,

Shawn Sides, and Jenny Larson, respectively, swing back and forth between ennui and resentment. They're stuck in a Russian Groundhog Day, being objectified and manipulated by these self-serving pigs, only with no way to make the endless loop they're suffering through get any better.


Their misery, however, is our delight, as the revival of Thr3e Zisters contains the same elements that made the first production so exhilarating. While this staging feels smaller than the one in SVT's dearly departed space, it's lost none of the theatrical energy or ingenuity that made it an award winner: the beauty and creepiness of la Ensterä's set, with its shredded couches, parlor walls lined with hundreds of pages, and unmoored wall that hurtles at the audience; Natalie George's lights, moving from lush washes of color to blazing white spotlights from unexpected sources; the wit and intensity of Robert Fisher's sound; Jessica Gilzow's time-worn costumes, ranging from the sad to the sinister; and the innovative direction by Yury Urnov, utilizing the entire space to make every



moment visually dynamic and charged with sardonic humor.

It would be too much to expect the men working so hard to legislate what women can and can't do with their own bodies to see the wrong in what the men in the play are doing, but it might be instructive for them to see the show anyway, just for the ending. Because eventually, Olga, Masha, and Irina get fed up with their treatment by these patronizing men and show they can bite back. Literally. Their teeth sink deep into flesh, drawing from their abusers howls of pain and freshets of blood. It might give our own would-be masters of women pause to see the satisfied looks on the gore-soaked faces of the three zisters, looks that suggest revenge has never tasted so sweet.

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BELLE REDUX: A TALE OF BEAUTY & THE BEAST Dell Hall at the Long Center, 701 W. Riverside Feb. 12

In most stories involving Beauty and the Beast, it isn't difficult to tell which is which. Beauty is typically feminine, the Beast masculine. Her features conform to some traditional. ideal of human attractiveness; his are in some way inhuman, feral, grotesque. And that much applied to Ballet Austin's Belle Redux: A Tale of Beauty & the Beast, just remounted by the company for the first time since its 2015 premiere. Even without the fur and fangs of a literal representation of the name, the Beast in Artistic Director Stephen Mills' adaptation read as such: A thick scarlet stripe ran from the back of his shaved skull over the crown of his head and down the center of his face. throat, and bare torso - he was clearly Other. And Belle was all that her name signified: lovely, graceful, open. But once she and he met and felt that inexorable pull toward each other, those distinctions began to blur in unexpected ways. In dreams and before mirrors in the Beast's castle. Belle saw others marked with the same blood-red stripe as the Beast and saw herself marked with it, too. And she encountered a Beast who was unmarked, a man in white who appeared as good and virtuous as she had previously. Then at one point, all four - marked and unmarked - danced together. So which was in truth Beauty, which the Beast?

In that question, that mystery of identity and nature, lay the heart, magic, and brilliance of Mills' contemporary take on the tale. Rather than reiterating the standard narrative, wherein a young man's arrogance and cruelty brings upon him a curse broken only by the love of a young woman for him despite his monstrous form, Mills has played with the concept that we're all made up of light and shadow, good and evil, and thus each of us is both Beauty and Beast. It sacrificed the literal enchantment that we know from Disney and Jean Cocteau's wondrous 1946 film, but its message about love's power was every bit as potent and dramatic, perhaps more so since this telling calls on Belle to recognize her own shadow side and embrace it even as she embraces the Beast and his, which doesn't magically disappear. Both are flawed, both see their flaws, yet their love endures.

In its originality, execution, and fusion of story, movement, music, and design, *Belle*

Redux may well be Mills' most fully realized story ballet since Hamlet, first adapted in 2000. As with that work, here Mills really gets the characters, on a deep metaphorical level, and it's freed him from dealing with them just in narrative terms. He was able to tell the story and expose its mythic underpinnings through movement and design elements that made bold symbolic and psychological statements. That scarlet stripe marking the Beast was like a bloody gash that split him in half and was made more unsettling by running across so much exposed flesh, which signaled at once raw physicality, sensuality, and vulnerability. When he and Belle first danced together - a tension-filled pas de deux fueled by a bass solo in which each thick pluck of a string sent a low, heavy note slamming against our chests - we felt danger, not from any physical threat by the Beast but from the attraction communicated by Jaime Lynn Witts' Belle and Edward Carr's Beast, an attraction more felt than understood. And when Carr literally upended Witts, spinning her body until her head was at his feet, Mills was showing us what was happening to her world.

The visuals approached the striking images of Cocteau's film, which Mills has said was an inspiration, along with work by the late fashion designer Alexander McQueen. The world created by Michael Raiford, who designed the sets and costumes, was one of midnight intensity and unease, the space framed by heavy black walls scarred by graffiti and gouges; characters ferried to the Beast's castle by men in dark hoodies: Belle's sisters as alike and spooky as the twins in The Shining, but grown up and affecting a Bettie Page look. The rich, atmospheric score by Graham Revnolds reinforced the perpetual sense of menace, and even the monumental columns of white light provided by designer Tony Tucci couldn't seem to brighten it.

It was up to Beauty and the Beast to provide the light here. And in the choreography provided by Mills and dance with exceptional skill and feeling by Witts and Carr, they did. In the closing duet, they established the persistence of the bond between their characters, a love that accepted the good and the bad, the fair and the rough, shining through it all and letting this couple whose life would not be a perfect fairy tale still live blazingly ever after. – Robert Faires

"SALLY WEBER: FRACTURED"

One of the fantastic things about contemporary photography is that it can be almost anything. One of the fantastic things about photography in general is that it has historically been so difficult to pin down. Just for starters: What exactly is the relationship between a photograph and the person in the photograph? That conversation extends into the more basic, "What is a photograph?" A few years ago, artist Jason Lazarus made an installation that only displayed the writing on the backs of found photos. Are those photographs? Why not?

Photography began as a technological science rather than an art form. It is uniquely embedded with technology in the same way that, say, DJing is. Much of what photography has become is due to its relationship with the apparatus. In recent years, that has often meant scanners. For "Fractured," Sally Weber has taken dead leaves and plants dried out to shades of brown and gold, scanned them, and printed them to a large scale so that the minutest fibers and fluctuations in their surfaces are visible. The precision and detail of the images recall photography's roots as a science, a method of capturing what the human eye never could.

Here, the opportunity to look close is balanced with a sense of awe at the sculptural quality of the plants and leaves. They often float in the middle of the image, like asteroids. But they are not simple nature shots. We are talking about a scanner here, and scanners, if you've ever played with them this way, will tend to leave feedback, particularly in the places where the scanned object doesn't meet the scanner's

surface. What you end up with are various fuzzy streaks - distortion - places where the scanner tried but failed to pick up information that wasn't there to be picked up. The best example is Spared, a little curled-up leaf or seed casing hollowed out so that it looks like a lacy piece of gold jewelry with a stem. Rather than center it, like much of the other work, Weber chose to place the leaf toward the bottom of the image. The finished photograph looks a lot like a Rothko painting. The bottom half, where the leaf rests, is a darker gray with shades of black, and the top half is mostly white. Between the two halves is a dark bar like a chasm featuring computery streaks, a reminder of the digital origins of the piece that balances out the organic subject matter – the leaves and such that one might typically remove from the technological orbit.

It'd be easy for the artist to be apologetic about the scanner feedback, to try and downplay it unnecessarily, to spend too much time trying to use the scanner as a replacement for the camera. But the scanner and the modern camera are not interchangeable, just as the digital camera and the film camera are not, much less color film and black and white. The scanner has its own strengths, and the feedback, like Jimi Hendrix playing "The Star-Spangled Banner," is what makes it worthwhile. I don't need another precious image of a leaf - what is more useful is a fresh way to perceive a leaf. This is what Weber offers. In any event, the photograph and nature are more or less one anyway. The essential medium of a photograph is light. What's more natural than that? - Sam Anderson-Ramos





DAY TRIPS BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

John Bunker Sands Wetland Center sits on a hill outside of Seagoville overlooking one of the largest man-made wetlands in the U.S. On the other side of the 800-acre wetland two bald eagles and their two eggs have homesteaded on a large metal tower. The eaglets will hatch in March and head to cooler climates by June.

The wetlands are part of the North Texas Municipal Water District's water reuse system. Water discharged from wastewater treatment plants upriver is pumped through a series of marsh-like ponds where nature removes additional impurities before the water is recycled. A byproduct of the natural water treatment facility is that wetlands make excellent wildlife habitat. Bird-watching at the wetland is phenomenal.

It wasn't much of a surprise when the pair of eagles set up house near the wetlands in 2011. Unfortunately, they built their VW Bug-size nest on an electrical transmission line tower. After they left for the summer, the electric company unbolted the arm with the nest, and attached it to a decoy tower on the center's property a safe distance from the lines.

When the eagle couple returned in September they went straight for the original tower. Without much hesitation they moved into the old nest on the new tower and have been returning annually since.

The JBS Wetland Center is in Seagoville, 25 miles southwest of Dallas. The center and wetlands are open to the public on the first and third Saturdays of the month. At best, the closest visitors can get to the eagles' nest is still a good binocular view away, or you can find the livecam feed at www.wetlandcenter.com/eagles.html.

Bowled Over

A guide to Austin ramen

It's hard to believe that just five years ago, the only type of ramen found in Austin was of the instant persuasion. And while those color-coded stacks still dominate every grocery store soup aisle, Austin ramen has now graduated college.

Tatsu Aikawa and Takuya "Tako" Matsumoto, undoubtedly the ramen kings of Austin, grew up eating the noodles before working their way through kitchens from Japan to L.A. to Austin. In 2012, they decided to stop noodling around and opened the much-needed Ramen Tatsu-Ya.

"I just wanted to eat ramen, and the only way to do that was to make it for myself," says Aikawa, who worked at Michelinstarred kaiseki restaurant Urasawa before returning to Austin. "Ramen Tatsu-Ya was a way to eat what I wanted and to share my culture with Austinites."

Tatsu-Ya specializes in tonkotsu, a rich, silky broth made from pork bones and fat slow-cooked for hours, and typically served with thin, straight noodles. Though Aikawa grew up eating classic Tokyo-style ramen, which is made from a light chicken and sovbased broth, he never forgot his first time eating tonkotsu as a child, a visceral experience he hopes to share with his customers.


"You can taste the work you have to put in to make it," says Aikawa, who simmers his for almost 60 hours while playing music

through a boombox - from UGK to the Misfits, depending on what the broth wants to hear that day. "It took me months to get it right. When I did, I wanted to share it."

Now with two locations under their belt, the Ramen Tatsu-Ya chef duo recently opened a Texas-influenced izakaya called Kemuri Tatsu-Ya. A smoker came with the location, formerly the site of Live Oak Barbecue, so they smoke beef bones to make broth for their brisket-crowned Texas ramen and jalapeño lime-seasoned tsukemen. And so far, the restaurateurs have found a winning combination - and countless opportunities for creation - in joining the two cultures.

"People that are into ramen seem to be very passionate and opinionated about it and I think that's great," says Aikawa. "Kinda like barbecue!"

Not long after Ramen Tatsu-Ya made a splash in Austin, Kayo Asazu decided to open Daruma Ramen. Asazu, who grew up in Japan and came to Austin in the Nineties to study English and fine art, was seeing great success with Komé, the restaurant she opened in 2011 with her husband Také. Alamo Drafthouse founder and CEO Tim League was such a fan he invited Asazu to come open a ramen shop in his building on a section of Sixth Street in need of more good food options.



Asazu attended an intensive weeklong course at the Yamato Noodle School in Tokyo before going on research trips to New York and L.A. to see how other U.S. shops were running. She found this notion of gathering with friends for ramen over drinks and conversation to be a stark contrast to Japanese ramen culture, where lingering would almost be considered a faux pas. "To me, or to any Japanese person I guess, it's bad to take your time to eat ramen because it can get soggy and taste very different," she explains. "In Japan, ramen is more like a big construction worker's food. You go to a ramen shop and you sit at the tiny counter and see these big guys finishing up ramen within five minutes."

RAMEN GLOSSARY

Ramenya: ramen shop

Izakaya: a Japanese gastropub

Kotteri: classification for ramen made with opaque, white bone broths (also called paitan)

Assari: classification for broths that are clear and thin

Tare: the seasoning or sauce that defines what type of ramen you're being served (shoyu, miso, or shio are most common)

Shoyu: clear stock made with vegetables and chicken, seafood, pork and/ or beef broth, plus shoyu (soy sauce)

Miso: garlic-rich broth made with fermented sovbean and either chicken or beef stock, typically served kotteri topped with heavier toppings like sweet corn and pork belly

Shio: clear chicken broth with shio (salt) added, typically served assari-style

Dashi: a stock made with kombu (kelp) and katsuobushi (dried bonito and skipjack tuna); adds brininess and umami to ramen

Tonkotsu: a typically thick, rich pork broth made from slow-cooking pork bones and fat

Tondaku: ramen made with a combination of tonkotsu and dashi soup base

Tonkotsu-shio: ramen made with a combination of tonkotsu and shio

(salt) soup base

Tonkotsu-shoyu: ramen made with a combination of tonkotsu and shoyu (soy sauce) soup base

Tantanmen: an often spicy, sesame flavored broth usually served with green vegetables and ground pork (a Japanese version of Sichuan dandan noodles)

Tsukemen: a type of ramen where the noodles are served separately from the broth and are meant to be dipped and slurped (can be served hot or cold)

Hiyashi chūka: cold ramen salad made with chilled noodles and toppings

Mazemen: a "dry" style of ramen with plenty of toppings but no broth

Dear Glutton,

I'm a person who doesn't drink who recently started dating again after breaking up with my partner of five years. I've got my "I don't drink" spiel down, but I'd rather not have to trot it out every time someone on Tinder suggests meeting at a bar. Can you help me find a good go-to bar where I can get interesting nonalcoholic things that will also meet the beer needs of my prospective dates?

Dear Sober,

The appeal of meeting at a bar for a first date is obvious; people make each other nervous, alcohol

makes people less nervous, so we all just suggest drinks, then hold our breath and hope that these things cancel each other out. This is probably a little bit of a dysfunctional approach in a lot of ways, but it's what we do.

There's also the issue of practicality. No one wants to be that creep asking every Tinder stranger they match

with out for dinner. It either comes off like you're trying to scam a free meal (seriously, I had a friend who once went on a date with a guy who ordered two entrées then pulled the "I forgot my wallet") or like you think if you buy someone a 10-dollar sandwich you've somehow paid for permanent access to their underpants. Either way, not a good look. And coffee is OK, but it feels a little too platonic, the one-hour afternoon window feeling more like a business meeting or an awkward social



than an opportunity for romance. Bars tend to be cozily lit and full

of friendly strangers, and springing for a \$2 Lone Star won't leave anyone feeling like they're on the hook. It does make some sense.

So bars are a good first date spot after all. And you're the kind of non-drinking person that's OK with hanging around in bars, so I'm sure you have spots in town that you like, but I'd imagine that all that Topo Chico has to get old after a while. I called a few bars to ask on your behalf, and it turns out that most bartenders in today's artisanal ingredient-obsessed

landscape would be more than happy to make you something interesting off menu. In the past, you would have been stuck with a virgin margarita or some kind of horrible watered-down sour mix concoction, but nearly every bar in town has a rack full of small-batch bitters and a bowl of fresh citrus in back, ready and waiting for you. The good people at Weather Up are, in my experience, particularly good at finding out what flavors you like and making something interesting to match. But if you just want to order without having to give anyone the "I don't drink" talk, this isn't exactly what you're looking for.

Fortunately for you, the only thing this city has more of than bars are bar/coffee shops! Rio Rita is a good one, and their iced coffee, Bloody Marys, and the eclectic thrift store vibes are equally stellar. The spangled Victorian lampshades and disco balls give off a flattering glow, and if you sit close enough on those battered velvet settees you can amuse yourself by pretending you're a misbehaving visitor in the parlor of a women's boarding house. OK, I might be the only person who does that, but trust me, it's a good move. The new space on Chicon is a bit of a change for us old-timers, but the atmosphere is still inviting, the vibes are still on point, and their lemonade is still some of the best in town. So cozy up on that settee and ask your date some personal questions. Maybe next time they'll be brave enough to expose themselves to you in natural light.





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

Asazu decided to open up a cozy shop similar to what you'd find in Japan - turning down a bigger space League was offering her in favor of a small bar and communal tables.

"I pay more attention, not just in teaching my staff how to cook, but in adopting the culture itself," she says. "That way, they can give that experience to the people."

Though trained in making her own noodles, Asazu knew this wouldn't be costeffective for such a small space, so she works with Sun Noodle, the artisan noodle maker used by most U.S. ramen shops. The company, now with facilities in Honolulu, L.A., and New Jersey, works with each ramenya to customize their own shape and texture. Asazu uses tapioca powder in her noodles, which adds chewiness and texture to them, keeping them from soaking up liquid too quickly. She also uses a slightly curly noodle to accompany her light chicken, fish, and veggie broth-based ramen (which was the first veggie ramen in town).

"I think people have a misconception that tonkotsu is the only type of ramen," says Eric Silverstein, owner of the Peached Tortilla. "But there are all types of ramen and all types of noodles fit for different types of ramen. I think it's important to understand that. And there's not a right or wrong type of ramen so long as you treat your broth with respect."

Silverstein grew up in Japan before his family relocated to Georgia, and it is the flavors of both Asia and the American South that inspire his creative cuisine at



the Peached Tortilla. This fall, Silverstein started a weekly ramen night on Thursdays, where he'll be showcasing rotating specials.

His first creation was a chicken shoyu ramen topped with crispy pork shoulder, corn, green onions, nori, and an onsen egg. While some chicken shoyu ramen is very light, Silverstein makes his broth with chicken feet and bacon fat to achieve a rich smoky stock with a weightier mouthfeel. And he's not the only one exposing Austin foodies to new and inspired types of ramen. This summer, Hanabi launched a new menu featuring ramen offerings like tonkotsubased tsukemen, shiitake-based veggie ramen, and Korean-inspired bowls topped with bulgogi, kimchi, and mandoo.

"I decided to make ramen because it's delicious comfort food I grew up eating, and that fits in directly with the type of food we cook at the restaurant," he says. "It's a dish I take seriously, and it's one I had to test a lot to get right. I wanted to make sure I paid the dish the respect it deserves."

BEST BETS FOR AUSTIN RAMEN

Ramen Tatsu-Ya: You can't go wrong with the noodles at Austin's OG ramen shop, with one north and one south location. While Tatsu and Tako first earned their stripes with thick, savory tonkotsu broth (available in its original form or with the

addition of shoyu or shio), they also produce a lighter chicken shovu broth (called the Ol' Skool), as well as a veggie ramen made from a soy and mushroom broth. In addition to more traditional toppings, they offer extras like flash-fried brussels sprouts, 10-month aged Parmesan, and five different "butter bombs" to customize your bowl with added flavor.

Kemuri Tatsu-Ya: Though ramen isn't the main focus at this izakava, the two offerings on the menu are solid, and both are made with smoked brisket and broth made from smoked beef bones. Tatsu and Tako are

currently experimenting with mazemen and hope to soon add a chili cheese variation to the Texasinspired menu.

Daruma Ramen: For a lighter take on ramen, head to Daruma's Downtown shop, which serves shio and miso bowls made from a chicken broth, shoyu

made from half-chicken and half-seafood dashi, and two types of vegan ramen, both made with a fruit and veggie stock. Be sure to leave room for soft serve, which rotates between flavors like beet, miso butter, honey saké, wasabi, and more.

Michi Ramen

Michi Ramen: Now with three locations (north, south, and one behind Hole in the Wall on campus). Michi starts with a tonkotsu broth base for most of their ramen, seasoning it with flavors like shoyu, miso, lemongrass, and tomato - and they also offer shovu and miso shiitake broth. The Michi and Sapporo bowls lean toward more traditional toppings, while the Jungle spices things up with Thai chile and toasted lemongrass, and a Texas bowl represents with smoked barbecue pork ribs, vinegar slaw, pickles, Texas toast, and spicy barbecue sauce.



This Korean-owned sushi restaurant recently launched a ramen and kushiyaki-focused location in North Austin with eight different bowls, plus specials. Standouts include the tonkotsu, topped with kimchi mandoo or bulgogi, and a haemulinspired spicy seafood broth filled with cabbage, oysters, calamari, mussels, and shrimp.

Jinya Ramen Bar: This Tokyo-born and L.A.-bred ramen chain opened its first Austin location in the Domain last fall. Choose from six different varieties of tonkotsu, four types of chicken-based ramen, and two different bowls made with veggie broth. Specialty bowls include the Jinya Tonkotsu Black (which comes with garlic chips, garlic oil, and fried onion), wonton chicken ramen (served with wonton, spinach, and green onion), and Sprouting Up Ramen (which gets its name from both crispy brussels sprouts and spicy bean sprouts). Or customize your own bowl with toppings like pork soboro, chicken chashu, bok choy, broccoli, and more.

Kanji Ramen: This North Austin ramen shop features plenty of small plates (like gyoza, don katsu, and crispy tofu) to ready your palate for noodles. Then choose from the signature tonkotsu and its variations, or branch out and try the Murukai ramen, a spicy mussel soup topped with fried shrimp, or the Sukivaki ramen, which comes topped with sliced beef, vegetables, and an egg yolk. They even offer a kids'-sized ramen called Little Kanji.

The Peached Tortilla: The newest Asian soul food dish on the menu at this Burnet Road hangout is a chicken shoyu ramen topped with crispy pork shoulder, corn, green onions, nori, and an onsen egg – and only available each Thursday night. Next, they'll serve a tantanmen with ground pork, sesame paste, and bean paste, and as the days get warmer, they'll start experimenting with cold ramen dishes, too.

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


























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Exploring the Unsung Auteurs of Early Black Cinema

AFS SCREENS RARE SELECTIONS FROM PIONEERS OF AFRICAN-AMERICAN CINEMA by Kahron Spearman

On the next two Sundays, the Austin Film Society will screen pivotal selections from Pioneers of African-American Cinema, a war chest of seminal "race" films by early black filmmakers, recently released on Netflix. Released in July 2016 by Kino Lorber, the comprehensive box set contains

hours of rare shorts and feature-length films, stretching from the 1910s through the 1940s.

Among the numerous gems, The Bronze Buckaroo ranks as a standout, less for its inherent quality than for being one of the first films with black actors cast as overtly positive hero

archetypes – which contrasts the typical cinematic castration of black men, and degradation of black women.

"If there had been a black character in a Gene Autry Western, or a Republic Pictures Western, he would have been comic relief," says Lars Nilsen, programmer for the Austin Film Society, "He would have been, let's face it, a scared porter, who would have heard a cat walking through the room, and would have jumped, and have to be 'rescued.'"

Interestingly, the blue-eyed Herb Jeffries, star of the film, passed for black for the majority of his life and career, even darkening his skin with makeup to perform in film and jazz outfits. He'd later, however, elect to identify as white for economic purposes, including during his marriage to white burlesque star and actress Tempest Storm.

Another entry, presumed lost until a single print was discovered in 1993 in Madrid, within the archives of the Spanish government's cultural conservation institution Filmoteca Española, is pioneering auteur Oscar Micheaux's Within Our Gates. The film tells the story of Sylvia Landry, played by groundbreaking actor and Micheaux's longtime muse Evelyn Preer, who attempts to raise funding for an elementary school serving disadvantaged black youth in the Deep South, Preer portrays Landry as a black woman with self-perpetuating agency.

Micheaux's then-highly controversial opus requires even closer introspection, including eye-opening observations of racial identities and white supremacy, mixed-race relational outcomes of the period, peonage, black romance and masculinity, and wanton racial violence via lynching and rape. Yet even with the landmark achievements and literate provocations, arguably the most essential scenes belong to a supporting actor, a preacher named Old Ned, portrayed by an unknown player. Micheaux boldly deconstructs an oft-neglected vestige of overt white supremacy through the role of Christianity as a savior mechanism of black souls, and subsequently, the "black church" as individual entity. Old Ned finds himself roundly humiliated, trying to gather funds for his church, pacifying the bigots' egos: "Yes'm. White folks is mighty fine." After leaving, Ned shows nuance in his self-loathing: "Again, I've sold my birthright. All for a miserable mess of pottage. Negroes and Whites – all are equal. As for me, miserable sinner, hell is my destiny."

Judging by the kitchen sink approach, Micheaux – who likely would've recognized 2017 as a somewhat more tenable version of his own time - masterfully puts everything in the moment in front of you, especially if it includes a supremacypuncturing stake.

MY OBSESSION BY BOB BYINGTON

AUSTIN FILMMAKER SHARES HIS LOVE FOR NEW SKETCH-COMEDY SERIES 555

[Ed. note: Bob Byington is an Austin-based filmmaker whose new film, Infinity Baby, premieres at SXSW next month. Here, in our new rotating column, he discusses his love for Andrew DeYoung's Vimeo sketch-comedy series.]

It's not easy to find content you love. And then because a lot of content is designed to be binged, or feel sort of disposable, you're almost obliged to blast through the things you find that you like. 555 has a feel where, once you're about halfway done, you start to dread it running out, but you also want to keep watching.

The show, which is five episodes, gets a lot right. Everything in it is completely specific, but it also manages to give off a loose, improvisatory feel - it seems to anticipate the pleasure the viewer will take in how it's constructed, similar to how one gets pleasure from how well a great movie is made, for example. The director is unmistakably skilled, and one begins to understand that, feel it, and appreciate it. In this regard, 555 is similar to another Vimeo program, High Maintenance.

John Early and Kate Berlant in 555

555 is always two actors (John Early and Kate Berlant, both great), in cahoots or collision, portraying, variously: showbiz moms, agents, singers, dancers, extras - all manner of entertainers, in a dizzying array of contexts, and all very simply assured. They have anticipatory chemistry; you don't really run across a pair like them very often.

And an Austin connection - I asked Andrew DeYoung to name three of his favorite movies from the Seventies, and he cited Austin's own Terrence Malick (Badlands and Days of Heaven) for two, with Robert Altman's 3 Women as the third.

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

Who's Your Daddy?

A father and daughter reconnect in this beguiling German comedy

One of 2017's Oscar nominees for Best Foreign Language Film, this pleasantly rambling absurdist father/daughter drama is also one of the most strikingly unusual films of the year, period. It's a Teutonic take on ambition, loneliness. and the importance of switching things up now and again in order to retain some semblance of sanity in a workaday world that is TONI ERDMANN too often too driven, too hard, D: Maren Ade; with Peter and too much. beyond memorable). To put it another way, as one of the main characters bemusedly notes at one point, Toni Erdmann is interested in

the meaning of life, that is, a good life, and how easily that beguilingly simple yet seemingly arcane knowledge can slip through our fingers like so much sand.

> Simonischek is Winfried, a burly, perpetually unshaven middle-aged single father who, when we first meet him, is busy confounding a delivery

> > man by pretending to be two different people, badly. When his beloved dog Willi dies from old age, Winfried takes it upon himself to visit his estranged daughter Ines (Huller), as much a driven workaholic - she's a corporate consultant - as her father is a goofball. Things do

not go well with the entry of endearingly slobbish Dad into her buttoned-up, highly regimented world, and father and daughter part ways. Most other family relationship dramas

might leave things there, but not director and screenwriter Ade. This merely serves as a launching-off point for the emotional meat of the film as Winfried inexplicably reappears

in Ines' life sporting a patently ridiculous disguise comprised solely of a bad, shaggy wig and grimy false teeth. Calling himself by the titular moniker and adopting an unknowable accent, he introduces himself to Ines (who recognizes him right off but, surprisingly, plays along) and some of her friends at a bar, telling them he's a "life coach" in town for the funeral of a friend's pet turtle. Why not?

With its nearly three-hour running time and Bizarro World parent-child bonding themes, it feels impossible to describe just how thoroughly enjoyable and satisfying Toni Erdmann ends up being. Certainly it's not your average familial drama, not when Winfried's hairy alter ego begins showing up all over his daughter's life in exponentially increasingly oddball situations and outfits. Simonischek, all ruddy, playful bearishness, and the amazing Hüller allow themselves to sink deep within these two characters, and the end result is nothing short of unforgettable.

A CURE FOR WELLNESS

The only cure for this ludicrous exercise in Gothic mystery would be abstinence. It would curb the contagion and deprive the film of the oxygen it needs to survive. Even if an hour or so were to be trimmed from its overly long narrative frame, A Cure for Wellness would still arrive on life support, eliciting a reflexive Babinski sign only in response to a few grisly images (bathtub of eels, anyone?). Furthermore, this will not be the movie that sways popular opinion back in favor of Pirates of the Caribbean director Gore Verbinski following the creative and commercial disaster of his last film, The Lone Ranger. Not even the appearance of Johnny Depp with a dead crow on his head could provide A Cure for Wellness a pick-me-up.

Capitalizing on a sense of dread that's established in its confusing opening scene during which the story's MacGuffin keels over while drinking a glass of water from the office water cooler, A Cure for Wellness sends its real protagonist, young Mr. Lockhart (DeHaan) to a sanitarium in the Swiss Alps to retrieve the recuperating water imbiber, Mr. Pembroke (Groener). Only problem is that Pembroke doesn't want to leave his restorative Magic Mountain, a slightly sinister retreat headed by the very sinister Dr. Volmer (Isaacs). Further complications keep Lockhart in place when he awakes with a broken leg set in a full-limb cast, and also makes the acquaintance of

the strange, shoeless Hannah (Goth), who is not a patient but nevertheless lives at the sanitarium. Lockhart tries to solve the mystery that's contained by the Alpine castle and embraced by its docile residents, but it's a lot of toing and froing, alleviated only occasionally by vivid scenes of horror: most notably, the extended death throes of a wounded elk and an episode in a dentist's chair that rivals the one in Marathon Man.

Like The Lone Ranger, which was also written by A Cure for Wellness' screenwriter Justin Haythe, the worst misstep taken by Verbinski's new film is its lengthly running time. If it were short and shadowy like a Val Lewton horror film, A Cure for Wellness might have established an effective mood of foreboding. But at 146 minutes, there are just too many scenes with too few payoffs, and even fewer scenes that keep us guessing. The horror that lies at the heart of the film is fairly obvious, and with no characters for whom we have a rooting interest, A Cure for Wellness is as difficult to swallow as castor oil.

FIFTY SHADES DARKER D: James Foley; with Dakota Johnson, Jamie Dornan, Eric

There's something liberating about reviewing a film that is bulletproof. This franchise of novels that has struck a chord with the populace, and a thankfully waning punch line for latenight talk show hosts riffing on jokes about your mom reading bondage porn, is doing just fine, thank you very much. I don't have to actually write about the film, as anyone who wants to see it has already bought tickets. Case closed. So who's left? My five faithful readers? (I love you, mom!) Rubberneckers looking for a cheap thrill? (Nothing to see here.) Whoever you are, you are in for a disappointment, as this second installment of the trilogy is an epic snooze. Apart from a few moments of fleeting suspense, Fifty Shades Darker resembles a Facebook feed of someone you kind of knew in high school who maybe went on to have a glamorous future, but everything seems a little bit off and contrived. 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

FIST FIGHT

D: Richie Keen; with Ice Cube, Charlie Day, Dean Norris, JoAnna Garcia Swisher, Tracy Morgan, Jillian Bell, Kumail Nanjiani, Christina Hendricks, Dennis Haysbert. (R, 91 min.)

A movie whose premise can be boiled down to its hashtag - #teacherfight - Fist Fight aims for nothing more than fleeting laughs. On the last day of the semester, Roosevelt High School is overrun by an onslaught of student pranks, while English teacher Mr. Campbell (Day) anxiously awaits word of his re-employment for the upcoming school year. A mild-mannered man, Campbell soon crosses swords with the hothead history teacher Mr. Strickland (Ice Cube), who takes a fire axe to a student's desk. Strickland challenges Campbell to an afterschool throwdown, news of which spreads instantly via viral videos. Also complicating Campbell's afterschool plans is his promise to his daughter to perform with her at her grade school talent show, and his very pregnant wife (Swisher, an Amy Adams doppelgänger), who looks like she was ready to deliver weeks ago.

Day (It's Always Sunny in Philadelphia) is moderately amusing as a guy who just spins his wheels deeper as he tries to dig himself out of the mess he's created. Ice Cube does nothing but scowl. (Yes, it's his signature expression, but now he no longer attempts to do anything else as an actor; all he looks for is a comic foil.) Every few syllables of the film's dialogue are peppered with fourletter words, which instantly (and needlessly) ramps up the film's rating to "R." A Greek chorus of boneheads surround the two leads: Dean Norris is the aggravated school principal, Tracy Morgan the bizarro gym teacher, Jillian Bell the inappropriate guidance counselor who wants to seduce her students, Kumail Nanjiani a superfluous security guard, and Christina Hendricks ... it's hard to say what Hendricks is doing in this picture, so

poorly is her character conceived. Not even the blooper reel tacked to the end of the film garners many laughs. Fist Fight is not a complete dud, but it does grasp at the lowest hanging fruit for its humor.

NERUDA

D: Pablo Larraín; with Gael García Bernal, Luis Gnecco, Mercedes Morán, Emilio Gutiérrez Caba. (R, 107 min.)

The American audience likely didn't need a cheat sheet for Jackie, Chilean director Pablo Larraín's portrait of Jacqueline Kennedy in the aftermath of JFK's assassination, but the same audience could probably use a quick Wikipedia skim before diving into Neruda, his second dalliance with an icon released in the same calendar year. Even the rarer set that loves poetry and can recite by heart, "Tonight I can write the saddest lines," might have a blind spot when it comes to the poet Pablo Neruda's significant history as a political figure.

Larraín's film throws the viewer straight into the thrum, as the newly elected president Gabriel González Videla outlaws Communism and Neruda (Gnecco) is forced underground, Gael García Bernal plays chief of police Óscar Peluchonneau, tasked with hunting Neruda down; he also narrates, with a film noir detective's disdain for wealth and privilege, both of which this "man of the people" most assuredly enjoys. It's a cat and mouse story - only it's Neruda who so often wears the smirk of the cat who caught the cream, while the detective resembles nothing so much as a rat with a mustache.

The subtitles move fast; if you have to decide between pictures and words, choose the pictures: This is a gorgeously composed and shot (by Sergio Armstrong) film, languid and dreamy with purple winter twilights, solar flares, and bordello reveries. The story takes on shades of a darkly comic Western in its final stretch, anticipating a final showdown between Neruda and Peluchonneau as the former attempts to escape through a mountain pass into Argentina. The pulse quickens, but Larraín's commitment to a poetic aesthetic remains. This is a strange and beguiling film to the end.

O THE RED TURTLE D: Michaël Dudok de Wit. (PG. 80 min.)

The simple story told in the near-wordless animated feature film The Red Turtle is almost biblical. Without any backstory, it opens with a speck of a man bobbing in a great watery

expanse, buffeted by the waves of a stormravaged ocean that almost swallow him whole. Washed ashore on a deserted tropical island. the bedraggled castaway forages for food: his only companions are the scurrying crabs that shadow his every move on a lonely beach. Using bamboo cut from the island's interior, he builds a large raft and sets sail for an unknown destination, but the voyage is quickly thwarted by an unseen being that destroys his makeshift vessel, shattering it to pieces. A second attempt ends similarly, but on the third unsuccessful try, he finally comes eye to eye with the creature that keeps sabotaging his departure, a giant sea tortoise with a scarlet-hued shell, a majestic tortue rouge. The connection between them is fleeting, but powerful. Back on the island, the frustrated man sees his mystical adversary come ashore and vengefully flips it on its back, leaving it to die in the blazing sun. But like Botticelli's Venus sprung from a halfshell, a beautiful copper-haired woman later emerges from the split casing of the dead terrapin. She becomes his Eve, and the remainder of The Red Turtle recounts their years together on their secluded Eden. Who knows what it all means, or whether it's intended to mean anything it all. But it sounds like something from an ancient myth, doesn't it?

The film is directed and co-written by British-Dutch animator Michaël Dudok de Wit, who makes his feature-length film debut here. (De Wit won an animated short film Academy Award for "Father and Daughter" back in 2001; The Red Turtle is nominated this year in the category of animated feature film.) The animation is handsome and specific, and the colors (like Japanese watercolors) are evocatively peaceful, except for the sudden splash of red that marks the titular turtle's initial appearance and the monochromatic shades of the exile's dreams. Without the benefit of dialogue (the exclamation "Hey!" is the only word uttered in a handful of places in the film), The Red Turtle succeeds in conveying its narrative about devoted companionship without the need for language. Some may find the movie a bit obtuse in its innate lack of drama (though a devastating natural disaster occurs over midway through the film), while others may find poetic beauty in its guileless lack of complication. Whatever your perspective, there's one thing for sure: The Red Turtle is unlike anything else you've seen in a while. - Steve Davis

2017 OSCAR-NOMINATED SHORT **FILMS: ANIMATION**

D: Various. (NR. 90 min.)

As befits their nominations for an Academy Award, the five chosen short films all boast some excellence in whichever style of animation - CG, woodcut, traditional cel - and storytelling they employ. Andrew Coats and Lou Hamou-Lhadi's "Borrowed Time" features a battered old CG sheriff in the American West coming to terms with - for want of a better term - cowboy PTSD stemming from his reckless vouth, "Pearl," directed by Patrick Osborne, crams a whole lifetime's worth of father-daughter love and well-busked music into a brief six minutes. Theodore Ushev's "Blind Vaysha" tells the story of a young girl who sees the past in her left eye and the future in her right, while Pixar's predictably adorable "Piper" features a sandpiper mother teaching her hatchling how to dig for clams. Running at 35 minutes, "Pear Cider and Cigarettes" is a noirish story of a down-andout badly in need of a liver transplant. 2017 OSCAR-NOMINATED **SHORT FILMS: DOCUMENTARIES -PROGRAMS A & B**

D: Various. (NR. 80 min.)

Program A features Dan Krauss' "Extremis" and Kahane Cooperman's "Joe's Violin." The end-of-life decisions that are the subject of "Extremis" take place in the intensivecare unit of a single public hospital. The film highlights the choices made by patients and their families regarding the insertion of assistive breathing tubes to keep a patient alive when all signs of progressive organ failure are evident. It's a reminder that there really is no such thing as a good death. As "Joe's Violin" concerns the actions of a Holocaust survivor, it may stand the strongest chance for an Oscar win (as Holocaust subject matter is proven Oscar catnip). The subject, Joe Feingold, responds to a call from WQXR, New York City's classical radio station, for used musical instruments to be donated to public schoolchildren. Joe donates the violin he's owned since he traded a carton of cigarettes for it while living in a displaced persons camp after the war. He gets to meet the inspiring young girl who receives the instrument, and we learn about the unusual Bronx school for immigrant girls that she attends. In its way, it's another story about two refugee lives.

Program B features Orlando von Einsiedel's "The White Helmets" and Marcel Mettelsiefen's "Watani: My Homeland," both of which deal with the consequences of the Syrian civil war. Set in Aleppo as the violence there intensified in early 2016, "The White Helmets" highlights the work of this volunteer organization, whose members run into the rubble caused by airstrikes, digging out living and dead civilians. The film presents a ground-level view of their work. "Watani: My Homeland" also begins in Aleppo and reveals the harsh reality of a married couple and their four children. Devoted to the resistance, the parents try to shield their children from the daily bombardments by both the Syrian army and the ISIS fighters, but after the husband and father are taken captive, the mother makes a decision to flee with her children toward the hope of a better life in Germany. With this microcosmic look at one family, the filmmaker manages to reveal much about the modern-day refugee crisis. (02/10/2017) - Marjorie Baumgarten

D: Various, (NR, 134 min.)

When it comes to naming its best feature nominees, the Academy Awards famously has a bias against comedy. That bias trickles down to the live-action short films category, as well; this latest batch of nominees are worthy, certainly, if trending toward drear. What these shorts do very well is speak to our times, with stories of resistance, refugees, and anxiety over our ever-advancing technology. The highlight is Sélim Azzazi's "Ennemis Intérieurs," a monstrously tense

back-and-forth between two Arab men, as a seemingly innocent interview turns into a witch hunt. Still, I wouldn't be surprised if Timo von Gunten's softie "La Femme et le TGV" takes the prize - mainly due to star Jane Birkin, Namesake of the Hermès bag, former lover of Serge Gainsbourg, she sure curled a lot of toes with her whispery "le t'aime" back in the day, and it's a treat to see her onscreen again. Even playing a frumpy shut-in, she's luminous. (02/10/2017)

20TH CENTURY WOMEN

D: Mike Mills; with Annette Bening, Greta Gerwig, Lucas Jade Zumann, Elle Fanning, Billy Crudup, Alia Shawkat. (R, 119 min.)

A struggling single mother in Santa Barbara circa 1979, Dorothea (Bening) enlists others to chip in with the molding and moral education of her son Jamie (Zumann), including her twentysomething boarder Abbie (Gerwig), who turns him on to feminism and punk music; another boarder, William (Crudup), a hippie carpenter; and Jamie's best friend Julie (Fanning), who is diving headlong into the sexual revolution but keeps the besotted Jamie at arm's length. That's a lot of 20th century culture clash stuffed under one roof, though clash is too emphatic a word: more like gentle friction. Mike Mills is an uncommonly empathetic filmmaker, and his autobiographically close movie is delightful - funny and dreamy and sometimes desperately sad. He's gift wrapped Bening and Gerwig the best roles of their careers, and they return the favor in spades. They, and this tender, searching film, are something to be cherished. A DOG'S PURPOSE

D: Lasse Hallström; with K.J. Apa, Britt Robertson, Josh Gad, Juliet Rylance, Peggy Lipton, Bryce Gheisar. (PG, 100 min.)

This might be one of the most cloying and aggressively irritating films that I have ever been subjected to. Could Swedish director Lasse Hallström have foreseen that 32 years after he made the subtle, bittersweet coming-of-age drama My Life as a Dog (not about an actual dog), that his career trajectory would have him making not only a film about life as an actual dog, but lives as multiple actual dogs (all voiced by Josh Gad)? Chalk it up to either irony or merely the fault of some lazy studio executive who Googled "dog film director" (it works!). Whatever has led Hallström down this slippery slope to syrupy exploitation - which began, of course, with the gateway drug of a couple of Nicholas Sparks adaptations, blended with 2009's Hachi: A Dog's Tale - he has created a misguided and utterly tone-deaf Hallmark card to the canis lupus familiaris and the people who love them. This is Denzel Washington's third at bat behind the camera while directing himself and, holy smokes, does he knock it out of the park with a vicious, visceral performance that fairly sets the screen ablaze. Adapted from the canonical Pittsburgh-set play by August Wilson, Fences crackles with spitfire dialogue, blazing emotions, and worn-down, gut-punched humanity. It's an American tragedy through and through, a portrait of black life in the mid-20th century, and hands down Washington's finest hour yet. He plays Troy Maxson, once a Negro Leagues all-star baseballer, now an embittered garbageman, stuck in a self-made cage of steely regret and an inability to move forward in life. Viola Davis is his wife Rose, patient with her husband's gin-fueled tirades but also trapped in a marriage that has incrementally gone rancid. Caught between the two is their teenage son Cory (Adepo), who dreams of breaking through his family's metaphoric fences via a college football scholarship. (12/23/2016)

Dick (Offerman). Convinced of the restaurant's franchise potential, Kroc wins the reluctant brothers over with a rousing pitch: "Do it for your country. McDonald's can be the new American church." It's a chilling moment - pause to consider national obesity rates - and one of the few overt instances in which Robert Siegel's script encourages the viewer to connect the dots between these historical events depicted and the fast-food chain's now-ubiquity. Mostly Siegel and director John Lee Hancock (The Blind Side) stick to a "and-then-this-happened" account of how Kroc savvily expanded the brand and edged the original McDonald brothers out of the business. Delightful, informative, and engaging is this story about the black women mathematicians whose work helped NASA launch the first manned vessels into orbit. Taraji P. Henson, Octavia Spencer, and Janelle Monáe portray the three women at the core of the story, and each actress creates a captivating character. As the math prodigy Katherine Johnson, Henson plays both nerdy and feisty; Monáe is Mary Jackson, whose ambitions are stymied by her race, sex, and beauty; and Spencer is the computers' supervisor Dorothy Vaughan, who creates her own path to advancement by realizing the potential of the new IBM mainframe. While Hidden Figures is likable and illuminating, it is, nevertheless, routine and predictable. Competent and heartwarming, director Theodore Melfi's technique seems better suited to the TV-movie-of-the-week format than big-screen storytelling. When the great author, essayist, and public intellectual James Baldwin died in 1987, he left behind 30 pages of an unfinished manuscript that was to be titled Remember This House. The book was to be a personal account of the assassinations of his friends Medgar Evers, Malcolm X, and Martin Luther King Jr., which occurred over the course of five years (1963-68). I Am Not Your Negro uses the words of Baldwin's manuscript to explore the genesis and depths of America's so-called "Negro problem." Haitian filmmaker Peck blends an array of historical and contemporary footage, film and television clips, still photographs, written words onscreen, and music with Baldwin's words to excavate the roots of America's self-perpetuating fantasy of itself. Baldwin is a writer whose work belongs on every bookshelf in America, and now with this film, his words can be heard on every movie screen in the land. 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

Director/screenwriter Jenkins divides his focal character's life into three chapters, each corresponding to the name or nickname (Little, Chiron, Black) defining him at a specific age. While all of the performances in this movie are superb, Naomie Harris' turn as Chiron's mother in the third act is hands-down award-worthy. But the third act's final scene between the grown-up Chiron and former crush Kevin (Holland) is the film's beautiful centerpiece. It's a heartbreaking moment, and Jenkins stages the entire scene with a palpable sense of unrequited romance. Truly, madly, deeply: There's magic in this Moonlight. (11/04/2016)

To continue the thought experiment, the same film with gender-reversed roles is a tantalizing what-if. Overall, there's a disjointed feel to the proceedings as the fictional Saunders is inserted into this factual narrative. The film ends with David "Big Papi" Ortiz and his heartfelt shout-out to the Boston Strong mystique when he spoke before the first Red Sox game after the tragedy. RESIDENT EVIL: THE FINAL CHAPTER

Both Hideo Nakata's mind-blowing 1998 original Ringu and Gore Verbinski's surprisingly excellent 2002 remake had plenty to say about the craven nature of humanity when confronted with viral doom, but Rings has little beyond a spooky atmosphere. With this second pairing with horror revitalizers Blumhouse Productions, writer/director M. Night Shyamalan seems to have recovered some of his former mojo. Using minimal locations and few characters, Split relies on James McAvoy's central performance and Michael Gioulakis' expressive cinematography to tell its story about a man with dissociative identity disorder (DID), the three girls he abducts, and the therapist who tries to help him. Give McAvov an award (or 24) for his performance: the Scottish actor adopts so many different behaviors and speech patterns that it's impossible not to marvel at his versatility. Shyamalan (The Sixth Sense) also includes one of his signature surprise endings, although this one is something more like an in-joke than a shocker. The film's third act is somewhat wanting in tension and high-stakes emotions as the characters go through their

paces. Still, as far as cinema's long love affair with DID dramas goes, Split ain't a half-bad contribution. (01/20/2017)

Blood Wars spends too much time positioning explanations of what has come before, and indeed Underworld initiates are highly recommended to have at least a passing acquaintance of the previous four films to suss out exactly what the myriad power plays going on here are all about. Following the great war between the Lycans (as in "-thropes") and the varied clans of nosferatu, Selene (Beckinsale) is called to act as drill mistress to a whole new cadre of Death Dealers on the part of Semira (Pulver) and her protégé David (James). As popcorn-infused, lazyday genre fare, you could do a lot worse than watching Selene devour the scenery while both Lycans and the walking dead attempt to defeat and disembowel her at every turn. Nothing new there, of course, but still a fair amount of fun for followers of the misfortunes of the series. (01/13/2017)

In this so-so sequel resurrecting the extreme sports athlete turned NSA agent, the suits once again enlist a reluctant Cage (Diesel) for a mission, this time to retrieve a stolen doomsday device called Pandora's Box. (A depressingly miscast Collette oversees the operation.) The stunt work is the best thing going here, just as in the first film of the franchise in which Diesel originated the role of X back in 2002. The 2016/17 Austin Music Awards Reveal

In the war room, afternoons were spent spitballing, strategizing, scheming, and dreaming up performances for the 2016/17 Austin Music Awards. All the generals were there: Charlie Sexton - rock rovalty guitarist with a Rolodex on his phone likely second only to Rock & Roll Hall of Fame co-founder Jann Wenner; Celeste Quesada – the show's pragmatic organizer with a knack for bringing ideas to life and herding cats like ...; Louis Black - the boss of big-picture brilliance; and Raoul Hernandez - ruthless rock critic armed with a notepad of ideas and lofty standards safeguarding the event.

"They're puppy dog cute," he credited one

suggested band, "but not ready for the AMAs!"

It's this meeting of the minds from which springs forth Austin's equivalent to the **Grammys**.

Me? At best, I'm a midlevel adviser with a seat at the table - right next to the free snacks, tossing in my two cents where appropriate.

"Let's get Survive to play and have the blinking Christmas lights from Stranger Things in the background," I proposed.

Everyone thought it a good suggestion. After all, no Austin act had a bigger 2016 than the local synth quartet that soundtracked Netflix's smash hit and released an LP on Relapse. Alas, they said nyet.

One holy grail guest, Neil Young, isn't making the trip to Texas this South by Southwest, and George Strait already put in his March appearance last year at Ray Benson's GSD&M birthday bash. Organizing such a community event with a small budget isn't the biblical "ask and ye shall receive." Rather, it's a dog-eared yellow legal pad inked with scratches, circles, and too many question marks.

The method's madness, but the goal remains to create something special, memorable. In this year's case, that means an extravaganza representing both the moment and 35 years of history, appealing to oldschoolers and youth alike, and ultimately vanking artists out of their comfort zones for unique performances. In other words, an Austin showcase both for locals and global tourists. When the lineup's ready for press, the reaction better be, "Damn. That turned out good."

We nabbed some of the best Texans ever to emerge from the Lone Star State for a **Moody Theater** blowout Sunday, March 12. Masterful panhandle poet Terry Allen. who recently put on a mind-blowing performance at the **Paramount Theatre**, receives a new accolade honoring excellence in song: the Townes Van Zandt Award. He and at least one guest (Joe Ely) slot in after a Texas songwriters lineup featuring Lyle Lovett and Steve Earle, the former duetting with the vintage vocal ecstasy of Kat Edmonson.


That latter jazz sprite exited locally recently, which left no question that Sabrina Ellis is the greatest frontwoman in Austin today.

HALF NOTES

C3 PRESENTS DIVERSIFIES its entertainment empire with a record label. C3 Records has already signed one act - raspy-voiced youth Welles - and have contracts in the works with two other acts also managed by the Austin-based company, which sold a controlling stake to Live Nation in 2014. C3 Management **Division** President **Matt Shay**, a 15-year label veteran who worked A&R and marketing for Stone Gossard's Loosegroove Records and RCA Music Group, heads up the venture, which will utilize C3's existing radio staff. digital team, and creative department. He considers C3 Records another resource that artists working with the company can take advantage of. "It could be for major artists who need a label, developing artists that we're taking on as management clients, or anything in between," posits Shay.

DON PITTS shocked Austin's music community Tuesday by resigning as program manager for the city's Music & Entertainment Division, a position he's held since the office's formation in 2010. "I realize it is time for me to not work within a bureaucracy any longer." he wrote in his resignation letter. Pitts had been on administrative leave for a month while being investigated for what a high-placed civic source confirmed to "Playback" was whether he violated city procedure in the way he disciplined a former music office employee back in 2014 after he discovered wrongdoing on her part. That source was optimistic he'd be reinstated, but Pitts didn't stick around to wait for a judgment. He plans to continue music advocacy in the private sector.

MAMMOTH GRINDER signed to mega metal label Relapse Records. The Austin crust/death trio (formerly a quartet), fronted by mega-talented multi-instrumentalist Chris Ulsh (Power Trip, Impalers, Hatred Surge), proffers fourth LP Cosmic Crypt in the late fall.

SCOOT INN AND THE PARISH are once again working with C3 Presents for booking, confirms GM Mikey Wheeler. Both venues' calendars of ticketed shows have been unusually barren since last fall when parent company ATX Brands ceased working with outside promoters, such as C3, to utilize Nashville-based Madison Entertainment and in-house booker Austen Bailey, who soon left the company to book the Mohawk.

THOR HARRIS' TWITTER ACCOUNT was

temporarily suspended late last week after he posted a video about how to correctly punch a Nazi. "Don't do it. Peaceful protest is better," the charismatic percussionist - known for his work with Swans, Shearwater, Adam Torres, and (coincidently) Nazi Gold - advised, then offered three tips: hold your wrist straight, keep your elbow loose, and punch through the face. The clip was met with applause and controversy, including someone flagging his Twitter profile for featuring hand-drawn penis art, which caused his short-lived suspension.

SPEAKING OF NAZIS: An anti-racist group protested outside Grizzly Hall on Monday, raging against an appearance by black metal band Marduk. Protest organizers charged the Swedish group with having white supremacist ties and profiting off Nazi imagery, igniting an online debate about whether the group's frequently employed German World War II symbolism is ideological or artistic. Any specific pro-Nazi affiliation regarding Marduk remains significantly less clear than that of one current White House adviser. Despite calls for a boycott, the concert was well-attended.

WILLIE NELSON scored his 15th Grammy statuette last Sunday with a Best Traditional Pop Vocal Album win for **Summertime: Willie Nelson** Sings Gershwin. Meanwhile, Paula Nelson publically quashed rumors of her dad's recent illness being severe, posting: "He's fine and at this very moment recording a new album." In other Grammy news, Wimberley native Sarah Jarosz stacked two wins: Best American Roots Performance for "House of Mercy" and Best Folk Album for Undercurrent. Gary Clark Jr. collaborated in prime time with Stax man William Bell on "Born Under a Bad Sign," featuring horns recorded by Austin's Hard Proof.

JMBLYA, ScoreMore Shows' single-day festival, moves to Circuit of the Americas after easily selling out the Austin American-Statesman's 10,000-capacity parking lot last spring. Migos and Gucci Mane were also added to the May 6 event, already featuring Grammy magnet Chance the Rapper, Steve Aoki, and Lil Uzi Vert. Cue "Bad and Boujee."

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Loneliest Heart

Newcomer Molly Burch's quiet triumph

Sprawled sky creeping toward the rosy hues of dusk, an unseasonably warm winter afternoon begins wrapping on Manor Road. Molly Burch reminisces about her move from North Carolina to Texas in 2013, executed on a whim as the result of a post-collegiate identity crisis. A breakup in Asheville, a new relationship with the wrong person here, working three part-time jobs and doing it while friendlessly trying to settle into a new city, all of it comes rushing back.

"I remember seeing people and being like, 'Oh my god, that group of friends - I'll never have that!' I was so certain," laughs the soft-spoken singer, 26, under the nearly deafening clamor of a coffee shop patio. "It's hard to think back to that time. It was such a lonely time, and I didn't have a natural way of meeting anybody, so it was a really tough transition. But I grew a lot, and gained a lot of independence by doing it.

"I hope that comes out in the songs."

Please Be Mine colors the ennui of a life left behind for new beginnings. Overtly heartbroken narratives accompany. Out Feb. 17 on sought-after Brooklyn indie Captured Tracks, her debut also drums up Fifties pop touchstones.

Burch's aching, expressive vocals carry a velveteen husk from Patsy Cline, Roy Orbison's warble, and the dreamy wistfulness of Françoise Hardy. Drummer Ignacio Guerrero, Dailey Toliver on guitar, Caity Shaffer on bass, and keyboardist Paul Mitchell flesh out warm, gentle, vintage sounds. Pure, simple need takes care of the rest.

Her writing began immediately after moving to Austin, holed up with her voice and a ukulele. She didn't even play guitar yet. The idea of trying to form a band seemed too daunting, so Burch wrote about her broken heart in that first desolate year as catharsis.

Growing up in Los Angeles, she hadn't come from a musical household. A first band didn't come together until studying music during college. Her love of singing as an adolescent, discovering old jazz singers' voices, resonated loudest. Performing proved a struggle - Burch recounts failing choir in high school - so, like her songwriting on Please Be Mine, most of the process was confined to her bedroom, recording covers and keeping it to herself.

"My sister was the only person who knew I sang, because I was very private and didn't have a lot of friends," she explains. "She cast me in her plays in high school and would force me to sing. Any time we were at a family gathering, she would make me sing. I was so insecure, or shy, but I slowly felt like, 'Oh, maybe I can do this."

After a year composing Please Be Mine, Burch spent almost that long trying to land the right lineup for her band, a struggle that became an exercise in confidence, musicianship, and bandleading. By November 2015, the current group recorded most of Please Be Mine with Dan Duszynski of the band Cross Record at his idyllic Dripping Springs studio Dandy Sounds. Burch recalls the tall ceilings and large windows of her producer's home, where she looked out at the sprawl of land while recording the album.

Remarkably polished and bold-sounding masters in hand last March, its creator nervously sent the disc to

friends before soliciting labels. Independent imprints' email addresses for demo submissions are where most musicians' dreams go to die, a black hole of MP3s and Bandcamp links destined to be rejected, ignored, left unopened. Unless you're Molly Burch.

She emailed her own unsolicited demo to Captured Tracks in April. Founded in 2008, the label rapidly cemented itself as a tastemaker, curating a diverse roster that counts Dum Dum Girls and Thee Oh Sees amongst its alumni, and Mac DeMarco, DIIV, Wild Nothing, Naomi Punk, etc., on its current roster. Backing by such a cultural brand equals the coveted stamp of cool, of being an artist to watch, a rare piece of rightful hype.

Burch hit "send" on her email Tuesday. By Thursday, while at her hostessing job at an Eastside restaurant, she found a response in her inbox from label founder Mike Sniper, a simple, "We've been listening to the record and we really like it."

"It was so fast," recalls Burch, blue eyes widening in shock. "I'm such an anxious person, I was just like, 'What the fuck?""

She said thanks, unsure of what else to do. The next time she heard back, they wanted to sign her. And yet even more remarkable than said trajectory is Please Be Mine preserving Burch's first foray into songwriting at all.

Pitfall to many, miracle to others, the dynamic works in her favor. The songs are straightforward, unfussy, earnest. Exhibit A might be "Downhearted," the opening track: "I remembered recently that I've lost a few of my things/ My mind, my heart, my good intentions, and most everything."

As much as the songs could be (and are) about heartbreak, they're emboldened by a wistfulness born out of a more consuming, pervasive loss. They're love songs for the life she left behind, the person she used to be, songs tangled up in uncertainty that offers a sincere, immediate universality. Paradoxically, most of the tracks retain Burch's baseline hopefulness, as on "Loneliest Heart":

"I walk alone/ My days are still good."

As quickly as all this has happened for Burch, a totally unknown musician less than a year ago, for her it feels like a long time coming. To possess Please Be Mine at the end of a sprawl of uncertainty and finding her identity as a person - and a musician - counts as an unqualified triumph. She credits her move to Austin.

"When I first moved down, I remember feeling like there were so many possibilities here," recalls Burch. "It doesn't feel fast to me 'cause it's taken me so long. It's been such a long journey to confidence."

Molly Burch appears in-store at End of an Ear on Fri., Feb. 17, 6pm. Her album release party is the next night at Mohawk, Sat., Feb. 18, with Cross Record.

Austin transplant Molly Burch boasts experience her muses didn't: formal training. The singer decamped from her native Los Angeles for the University of North Carolina at Asheville, where she studied jazz vocal performance. The move pays off on LP debut Please Be Mine. Emulating her nonacademic counterparts while updating Fifties pop, she channels Dusty Springfield's willowy whispers and Patsy Cline's warble. On kickoff "Downhearted," Burch follows the lead of disco ball guitar, breathily cooing in one instance and dropping into a contralto in the next, turning again to punctuate the song with staccato quips. It sounds freewheeling but demonstrates incredible discipline. The title track showcases Burch's ability to tailor songcraft to her innate strengths, creating vocal com-

positions in a way that highlights a stylistic range touching on a barroom belt and folk croon. That's the most interesting facet of an album stuffed with wistful, glinting pop – Burch stealing the show so effortlessly with her golden throat.

"Fool" embodies this power structure as she manages to forge together all ranges of her nostalgic vocalizations and eclipse them outright with a full-on frontwoman wail. Feats such as that can only be pulled off with pedigree and talent, both of which Molly Burch debuts in spades on Please Be Mine.

I am the God of Hellfire and I bring vou ... F I R E."

Hell of an intro, that, fueling Arthur Brown's incendiary 1968 single to the top of the charts. "Fire" burned all the way to No. 1 in the singer's native England and reached the penultimate chart spot in America. Sales worldwide topped 1 million.

Wild theatrics, full face paint, and flames shooting from a helmet atop his head, stage shows by the Crazy World of Arthur Brown proved a first in popular music. Their macabre brand of avant-garde theatre, psychedelic soul, and proto-black metal spawned the likes of Alice Cooper, Kiss, King Diamond, and Marilyn Manson. Fan club heavies included David Bowie, Peter Gabriel, and George Clinton.

Now 74, the father of shock rock spent the better part of two decades in Austin (revisit "Fireman," Aug. 25, 1995) and still visits his son here for a month or two every year. He remains tall and lanky, with a gray beard and piercing green eyes. Beneath the flames and behind the makeup is a gentle, curious, introspective man. A devilish grin betrays an existentialist rather than satanist.

"When I started Crazy World I didn't want to sing about cars and girls and all that," he remembers. "I wanted to do a piece about an inner journey. My father had been in the war and had PTSD, as did my mother. Both houses we lived in were rendered into dust and family members killed, so they were both pretty shell-shocked.

"As a result, the family was a bit emotionally rough. One day my father said, 'I've brought a man who is going to teach you to empty your mind.' As a result of that, I was more interested in the inner journey in life.

"Of course, later on the outer journey became very enjoyable, indeed."

That psychic exploration along with romantic English poets like Shelley and Byron served as lyrical inspiration for the good and evil being grappled with on The Crazy World of Arthur Brown.

"It was all a quest for freedom," he says. Brown cribbed from early American blues artists and loved the exuberance of Little Richard. Witnessing James Brown live in 1965 resulted in covers of both Brown and Screamin' Jay Hawkins on the 1968 debut. While the act blossomed in England, the seeds for the band had been sown years prior in Paris.

"Where I was playing was a completely wild club and we became the big thing of Paris," he says. "People like Rahsaan Roland Kirk and Salvador Dalí would come down to watch. We were one of the main bands that perpetrated R&B in Paris at that time. It was the beginning of flower power, and the audience were in altered states. They were completely wild. I found a cardboard crown with candles on it outside my seedy hotel.

"That was the first version of the fire

Back in England, the headgear took on a life of its own.


"Next I had a vegetable colander with candles on it, but the wax used to go through the holes and trap my hair in it. From that we decided on a sort of pie dish full of petrol. The roadie who lit it would stand as far away as he possibly could because when it ignited, it caused quite a big whoooosh! The strap under my chin made it difficult to sing and there was a screw that held the plate onto the strap so the heat would come through the screw and onto my skull. It Hendrix, instead forming Kingdom Come, a pioneering prog band that released a trio of experimental LPs in the early Seventies and was among the very first groups to use a drum machine. Brown two-stepped to Austin in 1980 after marrying a Texas gal he chanced upon at the airport in Istanbul.

"I was told if you wanted to make money, New York and L.A. was the place to go, but

used to wobble and spill all over the place and I would catch fire, and the floor would catch fire. It was pandemonium.

"And the helmets used to be so heavy. It was like an elephant on my head, for chrissakes! Then we would end the act with sulfur smoke bombs.

"You'd come off every night with a headache and sore throat."

Crazy World arced one of rock's proverbial shooting stars and by 1969 had burned out. Brown turned down an invitation to start a group with label and tour mate Jimi if you're more interested in bringing up your family holistically then the place to go was Austin."

Naturally, the God of Hellfire followed in the professional footsteps of Jesus of Nazareth.

"In those days, if you played music in Austin there were always good audiences but you weren't gonna make any money," he acknowledges. "So lots of people went into construction or some alternative. I became a carpenter and played music at night with some local guys."

Those guys included Mothers of Invention drummer Jimmy Carl Black (with whom Brown had a house painting company), John and Al Staehely of psych-rock renowns Spirit, outlaw country bassist Dan del Santo, and, later, Poi Dog Pondering's Bruce Hughes and Susan Voelz. Brown also took counseling coursework at Southwest Texas State University (now Texas State) and founded Healing Songs Therapy with local therapist Jim Maxwell.

"Jim would lead the session, which left me free to listen for the deeper undertones floating around," recalls Brown. "Then I would improvise a song or poem, and at the end of the session we gave them a recording. I think it was People magazine that did an interview about it and the headline was, 'From God of Hellfire to Singing Shrink."

When not visiting Austin, Brown lives with his girlfriend in a yurt on the southern coast of England, a quiet and pleasant existence. There's the occasional European tour, but most days are filled with long walks, practicing yoga and qigong, and singing in the woods ("simple things, really"). Brown still relishes experimenting with new technology, as an ongoing collaboration with a pair of scientists indicates.

"We can attach [a helmet] to a synthesizer and it will make music depending on the rhythms of the brainwaves," he exclaims. "If you're improvising in music, every note is a decision. I wanted to control that decision-making area of the brain so that in real time, the sound that comes from my brain turns to music. If I think of a note, it comes out, and I can put it on whatever instrument I like.

"My dream is a dance club where it picks up your brainwaves when you walk in and forms them into sound. Your friend comes in and you have interactions, or even conversations, so you have interlocking sounds coming out. When you have about 10 people together, that's the music and you can dance to it, and there's nobody playing anything.

"They wanted to do away with performers and let DJs just do it, but now we can do away with them altogether too!"

Back-to-back nights headlining at Barracuda over a cache of openers who could fill the club themselves (Pallbearer!) marks a stop on the first stateside Crazy World of Arthur Brown tour since 1969. The GOH has a new modern and lightweight fire helmet, one that doesn't slosh gasoline everywhere, though he's still negotiating which venues allow pyrotechnics. Every night, Brown howls that infamously demonic intro, a one-hit wonder if ever there was one.

"The point of music is not to be famous but to have beautiful feelings expressed and convey that energy to the audience," offers Brown serenely. "If you get joy out of making music, that's far more important than chart success."

The Crazy World of Arthur Brown bursts at Barracuda Fri., Feb. 24, with support from Pallbearer and Pinkish Black, and also Sat., Feb. 25, openers including Acid King, Jex Thoth, and Electric Citizen.

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No Idea Festival

MUSEUM OF HUMAN ACHIEVEMENT/BLANTON MUSEUM OF ART. THURSDAY 16 - SUNDAY 19



In a festival-heavy town, Austin's No Idea Festival remains a breed apart. This year featuring anarchist French duo Lê Quan Ninh and Michel Doneda, Mexico City installationist Arthur Henry Fork, homegrown sound naturalist Rick Reed in collaboration with Norway's Kjell Bjørgeengen, guitarists Tom Carter, Kurt Newman, Aaron Russell, Lauren Gurgiolo, and more, the 14th iteration of No Idea celebrates collaborative free improvisation and experimentation like an alternative South by Southwest.

"I've always understood this music exists in community," explains NIF organizer and local percussion/electronics improviser Chris Cogburn at Jo's Coffee. "This festival

doesn't have anything to offer your career."

Edited by Mexico City's Andrea Ancira and instigated by Cogburn, new No Idea reader Ethics of Improvisation as Anarchic Utopia explores the philosophy behind the festival's raison d'être.

"All these people, they're making artistic choices throughout their lives, and there's an integrity," he says. "I think that's where the energy comes from, when musicians are invested in a real live moment that's giving them valuable information. A lot of the writing in the book talks about that. What ethics do you hold to create the capacity for an important live experience that allows freedom?"

Despite its high ideals, no one should perceive No Idea (www.noideafestival.com) as forbidding.

"It's not about being a specialist," stresses Cogburn. "A lot of times people are like, 'Oh, I just don't get it. I guess you have to know a lot about it.' It should be immediate, like punk.

"It doesn't necessitate prior knowledge. That's why it's like a lived experience. Whether it's the rockingest free jazz or microtonal tuba, there should be some immediacy and urgency that's accessible to everybody." - Michael Toland

Consider Alison Mosshart of trans-Atlantic due the Kills a seasoned veteran of rock & roll live tribute tradition Best Fest. Having already participated in their Tom Petty and Fleetwood Mac cover clusters, the Floridian siren now takes on Neil Young.

"There's something in his delivery and the sound of his voice that's very special," says Mosshart simply. "It carries me away and it doesn't sound contrived."

While the Grammy-winning two-time Rock & Roll Hall of Fame inductee boasts a half-century career spanning guitar god epics to introspective acoustic ballads, Mosshart appreciates Young's enduring sincerity.

"In the perspective of a songwriter and a listener, I trust that," contemplates Mosshart. "It's like when you hear Harvest or 'Old Man.' There's this authenticity in his lyrics and guitar playing that's so effortless."

Equally faithful to progressive politics, encapsulated in iconic hits such as "Ohio" and "Rockin' in the Free World," Neil Fest's namesake might even approve of proceeds from the show benefiting the Refuge Foundation for the Arts, a creative incubator housed inside a former monk enclave in Wisconsin.

"The way in which I resist this political environment today is by giving back to something similar that's helped me and potentially others, because the foundation is similar to a women writers' retreat called Hedgebrook off of the coast of Seattle," says Mosshart. "I stayed for 10 days in this tiny little log cabin in the woods often through long hours in isolation. I managed to make 16 songs, 75 paintings, and wrote 200-300 pages that I think could also be therapeutic for artists especially in times where everything seems so uncertain and bleak." - Alejandra Ramirez

As latest LP Elysium demonstrates, his lyrical touch and penchant for melodies accessible even to the untrained ear have lifted him above the fusion ghetto for nearly four decades. DELBERT MCCLINTON Paramount Theatre, Friday 17

Recovered from heart issues suffered three

years ago, Delbert McClinton, 76, retains Prick of the Litter status. Jazzier, almost crooning, the Lubbock/Ft. Worth/Austin R&B great broadened his musical palette on last month's new LP. That doesn't mean the singer's abandoning his trademark mix of country, rock, and blues, which live still adds grit to his everlasting Texas legend with an assist by longtime bandmates Self-Made Men.

EASTSIDE KINGS ALBUM RELEASE

Antone's, Saturday 18

Two weeks ago in Memphis, their Blues Foundation - keeper of the Blues Hall of Fame - bestowed upon Eddie Stout of Austin's Dialtone Records a Keeping the Blues Alive award, which goes to "individuals and organizations that have made significant contributions to the blues world." Eternal flame of our vintage R&B scene, he's minted another contemporary CD of historical significance in Eastside Kings. On it, local all-stars Birdlegg, Peewee Calvin, Soul Man Sam, Ray Reed, and more ply chitlin' circuit blues like World War II - Raoul Hernandez

TACOCAT, DADDY IS-SUES, TELE NOVELLA Barracuda, Saturday 18

Seattle's Tacocat coalesces twee, feminism, aliens, and surf rock into a shimmering, bubblegum-sweet package teetering precariously between serious and silly. Both Hardly Art LPs, 2016's Lost Time and NVM two years prior, spin unapologetically fun weirdo rock. from "Men Explain Things to Me" to menstrual anthems "FDP" and "Crimson Wave." Bratty Nashville trio Daddy Issues bangs out crude cuts laden with Nineties grunge, and Austin's Tele Novella makes three with psych-tinged - Libby Webster auirk.

BLIND PILOT Emo's, Saturday 18

Five years have passed between albums for Blind Pilot. Where breakthrough We Are the Tide featured the Portland, Ore., sextet's poppy side, And Then Like Lions now offers their subdued nature. A mix of the orchestral plus pleasing harmonies and acoustic/electronic instruments along with Israel Nebeker's uncanny head melodies makes joyful listening even when they're singing about loss and lam-- Jim Caligiuri

JONATHAN RICHMAN Continental Club, Saturday 18

Ionathan Richman puts on a show everyone should see at least once. Having jettisoned excess amplification in favor of a sparse canvas, the New England native and his longtime drummer Tommy Larkins captivate audiences with a well-honed mix of storytelling and stage

TAMARRON EP RELEASE

Cheer Up Charlies, Wednesday 22

Kicking off a spring tour, Tamarron unveils new EP Let's Get Out, further exploration of the locals' psych-rock circus. Despite the quintet not letting up on its blanket of reverb, the title cut to their four-song pop varnish follows hook sensibilities with shimmering bounce and soaring harmonies.
