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

HEADLINES

OH, PRO TEMPORES City Council inauguration days aren't heavy on the headlines, but Monday evening the new Council was confirmed including brand-newbies Natasha Harper-Madison and Paige Ellis, and new Mayor Pro Tem Delia Garza, nominated by predecessor Kathie Tovo. On Tuesday, in the 86th Texas Legislature. Austin Sen. Kirk Watson was elected president pro tempore of the Senate.

DANNY AND DENNY Lite Guv Dan Patrick was absent on day one of the 86th session, reportedly attending a meeting on "border security" at the White House. Presumably, President Donald Trump was recruiting Patrick as a megaphone for this week's "border crisis" barnstorming tour of Texas. On the House side, as expected, Angleton Republican Dennis Bonnen was elected speaker, succeeding the retiring Joe Straus.

TORNILLO WITHOUT TENTS In somewhat better news, federal officials announced that they expect to close the **Tornillo** tent facility, near El Paso, by the end of January, as they succeed in finding sponsors and temporary homes for the hundreds of unaccompanied minor immigrants held there since the Trump administration's crackdown on immigrants seeking asylum. About 850 of the once 2,500 children remain to be placed, either with a sponsor or in another Office of Refugee Resettlement shelter.

HOWDY TO HIOTT Former Austin American-Statesman editor Debbie Hiott has been named as the new general manager and executive director of media operations for KUT and KUTX-FM. Starting as a college intern, Hiott spent 28 years at the Statesman, the last seven as editor-in-chief. After the paper was purchased by GateHouse Media, Hiott accepted a buyout offer in August.

NEW ELECTIONS CHIEF Geetha Lingham.

the former assistant director of the Elections Division at the Travis County Clerk's Office, has been promoted to lead the division effective Jan. 16. The clerk's office administers elections for approximately 150 governmental entities in Travis County, as well as state and federal contests. Lingham's predecessor and former boss. Michael Winn, is headed to Houston to bring the election team there - long stultified by incompetent demagogue Stan Stanart, the recently deposed Harris County Clerk - into the 21st century.

DOWNSIZING IN DALLAS Staffers at The Dallas Morning News learned Monday that the newspaper's parent company, the A.H. Belo Corporation, had opted to lay off 43 of their co-workers, including 24 newsroom staffers. DMN management blamed the cuts on lackluster advertising revenue and indicated a new focus on "becoming the best possible subscriber-first digital organization," said A.H. Belo CFO Katy Murray.



Fractured Fairy Tales

WILL NO PRINCE CHARMING COME TO SAVE OUR DISTRICT IN DISTRESS?

Wake up, sleepyheads! We have been dozing and dreaming in a land of make-believe for way too long, rather than face up to what we. Austinites, must do to save our own schools. Yes, the world is dark and spooky. Yes, we tend to lose ourselves in fear or fantasy when thinking about our pre-

cious children. But c'mon, already.

Elsewhere in this issue, you'll see members and watchers of the Legislature ready to take new Speaker Dennis Bonnen at his word that the time is now for school finance reform, which may help Austin ISD and probably

can't make its fiscal woes worse. You'll also see the district itself grapple with the realitv that, in the words of its Budget Stabilization Task Force, "only the most politically charged options to address the structural [budget] deficit remain."

That means, of course, closing schools, cutting popular stuff like magnet programs, redrawing attendance zones, and other things that have in the recent past provoked unrest in Austin's streets. And likely will again this time around, as the AISD Board of Trustees, which has until June to close a \$30-million-and-growing fiscal wound, pre-

pares for intense political pressure to stay the course and wait for the Lege to ride in on its white horse, saddlebags filled with gold.

But AISD is facing not just a structural deficit, but a structural weakness in its very bones of which its growing penury is but a symptom. Our district was built for a different city than it now serves. Austin is getting

richer, and thus more expensive. Families within the district are getting smaller, wealthier, and whiter, and new housing in the urban core is being designed to match. Poorer children of color are drifting toward the suburbs, or into cheaper outlying districts, or taking

a chance with charters. Enrollment is declining and will continue to, though maybe not as fast. And education itself, as a practice and vocation, looks different than it did when most of AISD's schools were built. Those aren't failings of the district or of Austin; they're simply realities that AISD and its families have to respond

to, instead of wasting more years and fears in dreamy deflection.

GIVE MORE POWER TO THE PEOPLE!

The district is shouting "Wake up!" while at the same time pleading "Don't hurt us!" But who is running "the district," really? CONTINUED ON P.8

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

Both board President Geronimo Rodriguez and Superintendent Paul Cruz - great and capable men with a lot in common - landed in their jobs at least partly by chance, and both need to take advantage of the opportunity AISD offers to lead, and be followed, now. Of late, the tightest hold on the reins of AISD power has been in the (also capable) hands of CFO Nicole Conley Johnson, upon whom great urgency has thrust great influence. But if you want, as Rodriguez does, to not just view AISD's challenges through the lens of scarcity, someone other than her will have to voice that vision.

IF WE PERSIST IN MAGICAL THINKING ABOUT HOW TO **AVOID CHANGES AND COSTS** WHILE PURSUING OUR DREAMS, WE'LL NOT LIVE HAPPILY EVER AFTER.

That someone could be on the school board, which reflects and responds to certain sources of pressure - the teachers' union, the PTA moms, the usual - but frankly does not channel the breadth and depth of the energies of thousands of vocal activists and engaged citizens, from throughout Austin's socioeconomic spectrum, who have really put their back into fighting for the kids. Why aren't those people better organized to actually guide and power the district forward, instead of haranguing it from outside the walls? Why aren't they running for school board? (Both Rodriguez and Yasmin Wagner ran unopposed in November, not the first time that's happened.) Do we need to pay the school board members? How 'bout we get on that?

CHOOSING OUR OWN ADVENTURE

There's more than enough willpower and brainpower in Austin to tackle the identity crisis at the heart of AISD's fiscal crisis. The Facilities Master Plan process that burst into flames under now-expelled Superintendent Meria Carstarphen had lots of flaws and left lots of scars, but it identified a ground truth that hasn't gone away: AISD has a 25%-or-so mismatch of kids and seats. To fix it you either need to move schools west (which means building new ones) or move kids east (which means renovating old schools). Neither is cheap.

All of our deeply held and thoroughly legitimate values about education - the value of neighborhood schools, the need for more attention and justice for students in deprived areas, the promise of technology in transforming teaching, and so much else - can still be held, and can be held more strongly, while we decide how to line up our kids and our schools. But we still have to do it. If we persist in magical thinking about how to avoid changes and costs while pursuing our dreams, we'll not live happily ever after. But if we suit up and saddle up for a quest to find AISD's future, we can turn our miserable realities into a great and worthy adventure.

The Speed of Trust

MOVING OFF DEAD CENTER IN THE LAND USE DEBATE

Three weeks ago, my colleague Mike Clark-Madison quoted new urbanist leader Doug Farr as saying that when it comes to land use, "change happens at the pace of trust." Last week in this very column (which is not generally considered urbanist fare), I opined that the path forward toward a land development code rewrite "begins by taking a step back and rebuilding community trust on all sides." And in this week's News feature previewing the new City Council (p.14), City Manager Spencer Cronk opines that "we can only move at the speed of trust" in fixing our growth and development issues.

Coincidence? Not likely. And I have a feeling it's a theme that we're going to be hearing a lot more of in coming months, though it may take a while to really produce results.

So it was discouraging, if not surprising, to hear other city leaders taking a more combative tone at the first City Council meeting of the new year and pushing the narrative that, with the NIMBY

bloc in retreat after the November election, the way toward more enlightened policies is now clear and obvious. It's likely that they actually believe that; it has been convenient to couch the argument over the past couple of years as being between those who were for **CodeNEXT** and those who were in favor of the status quo, but that was never really the case. The most vocal CodeNEXT opponents were also the people pushing for the most radical solutions to our land use problems and housing affordability woes (see "People's Housing Justice," April 13, 2018), and the way to a more effective Land Development Code has never seemed clear to anyone who has actually worked on the issue.

But for the past two years, at least, the "neighborhood" side of Council and its supporters have primarily been a party in opposition (rightly, as it turned out, because the product that was being peddled was clearly a lousy one, as everyone now admits). So their real challenge now is to become a party in favor of something. And that something will have to embrace change, and growth, and the principles laid out in the **Imagine Austin**

> comprehensive plan that include creating "a mix of housing types and land uses, affordable housing, and transportation options" in neighborhoods "across Austin." That's a goal that's not going to sit well with some of the core constituency, who really don't want renters and multifamily buildings in their neighborhoods. But it's one they're going to have to embrace,

or risk losing further credibility, and further electoral defeats.

The "urbanist" side has an inverse problem. Thus far, they've been able to press their argument as being anti-NIMBY: "If it weren't for the obstructionists on the other side, we could fix all our problems." Well, now that Mayor Adler has his electoral "mandate" (see p.14) and the balance of power on Council has shifted off center, the pressure will be on them to create a process, and then a product, that actually works. And that

product will have to embrace the principles laid out in the Imagine Austin comprehensive plan, including the first line of its mission statement: "One of Austin's foundations is its safe, well-maintained, stable, and attractive neighborhoods and places whose character and history are preserved." That's a goal that's not going to sit well with some of the core constituency, who really don't want historical preservation, or any sort of limit on development, in any neighborhood. But it's one they're going to have to embrace, or risk losing the fragile consensus they've managed to gain, by failing to gain the trust they need in order to govern.

Because "we can only move at the speed of trust," and if that is our measuring stick, the level of trust is not very high. As I noted immediately after the November election, "the fact that the 'anti-CodeNEXT' Proposition J ran 28 points better than [Laura] Morrison, despite its questionable provenance and legality, should at least give everyone pause." That's 48% of the populace who voted for Prop J for no other reason than that they do not trust City Council (or city staff) to properly regulate land use. And that's a lot of mistrust to be addressed.

NAKED CITY

OF COURSE, TROXCLAIR JOINS TPPF

It was only a matter of time. Just days before she departed from City Council, Ione Republican Ellen Troxclair reported for duty at her ideological mother ship, the **Texas Public Policy Foundation**, to advocate for property tax "reform" at the Capitol. Gov. Greg Abbott has called for a 2.5% annual cap on increases in property tax revenue going to cities, counties, and school districts, a move that those local entities fear would restrict their ability to provide basic services. Troxclair, who consistently voted against tax increases during her one term, is no stranger to TPPF, having spoken at events highlighting its opposition to measures approved by the Council on which she served, such as ride-hailing regulations. (She also, controversially, testified at the Capitol in support of bills that would overturn policies adopted by the Council.)

"While my service on #ATX Council is ending, the fight on behalf of families who are being forced out of their homes and businesses due to rising property taxes is not over," Troxclair tweeted. "I am excited to join with @TPPF as a Senior Fellow to continue this work." Now untethered by any shame over attacking the city government that paid her \$76,086 a year for that "service," Troxclair now has all the freedom and individual liberty (freedom! liberty!) she could desire to fight back against the nanny-state busybodies and ignorant wastewads whose politics are preferred by the vast majority of her fellow citizens. - Mary Tuma

HEGAR: DON'T GO CRAZY, Y'ALL

Texas State Comptroller Glenn Hegar, the most normal dude in the state GOP leadership, kicked off the 2019 legislative frenzy Monday with the release of his Biennial Revenue Estimate - the amount of money that lawmakers cannot exceed in the new state budget. The magic number for the 2020-21 biennium is \$119.1 billion, an 8.1% increase over his estimate from two years ago, as the state's tax collector reported healthy increases in sales tax revenue and levies on oil and gas production, motor vehicles and their fuels, and suchlike.

But don't go buy a new school system just yet! Hegar, as usual, sounded notes of caution in his BRE release, which for previous comptrollers has been an occasion for major grandstanding. "The Legislature will again face some difficult choices in balancing this budget," he said, citing both the need to close expected (Medicaid) and surprise (Harvey) shortfalls in the current biennium, as well as the inexorable pressure for "a potentially large boost in education spending to reduce the property tax burden and reform school finance."

That "large boost" could be only what's needed to plug the hole blasted into school funding by Gov. Greg Abbott's property tax "relief." or it could mean real new investment in education quality. In either event, it will likely involve going beyond the \$119.1 billion BRE into the state's ever-bloating rainy day fund, which would grow to \$15.4 billion by 2021 - even after voterapproved diversions for highway spending. This overstuffed mattress full of Texans' cash, just sitting there, clearly bothers Hegar, who's already gotten the Lege to let him invest some of it to at least keep up with inflation. This year, he continues his guest to create a "Texas Legacy Fund" to capitalize on the new energy boom, as long as it lasts, and build a permanent endowment that can generate higher returns to spend on, say, schools, or pensions. His plan already has support from both parties but still needs to make it through the legislative gauntlet. - Mike Clark-Madison

NEW LEADERS AT KUT. MONTHLY

Two of Austin's highest-profile legacy media outlets announced new hires to take their reins this week. Longtime Statesman fixture **Debbie Hiott**, who stepped down as editor-in-chief of the daily in November after taking a buyout from new owners GateHouse Media, will become the new general manager of KUT/ KUTX, which has been searching for a permanent CEO since **Stewart Vanderwilt** left more than six months ago. During that time, the beloved public-radio brand's newsroom culture and diversity came under an unflattering spotlight, leading to the departure of both interim GM Patti Smith and founding news director Emily **Donahue.** The stations "have talented teams, a great brand, and a critical local news and entertainment mission for the community," tweeted Hiott, a Texas State grad who labored in the Batcave for more than 25 years. "I am fortunate to have a role in that going forward. ... Being able to stay in Austin and continue to do this is a real thrill for me."

Meanwhile, Texas Monthly announced Dan Goodgame as its new editor-in-chief, replacing Hiott's Statesman predecessor Richard Oppel, who'd been drafted as an interim after former EIC Tim Taliaferro was ensnared in an ethically dubious deal with Austinbased dating app **Bumble**, whose CEO appeared on the Feb. 2018 TM cover. Goodgame's had a long career in journalism but has spent the last decade as a PR exec at San Antonio-based cloud storage firm Rack**space**; *Texas Monthly* owner **Paul Hobby** said he's been trying to hire Goodgame to be his EIC for more than two years (that is, since he bought the magazine, and before he hired Taliaferro, who still works at TM as the chief innovation officer).


SPIDER HOUSE SUIT CHALLENGED

Conrad Bejarano, co-owner of Spider House Cafe and Ballroom, has filed two responses to a lawsuit brought against him in October by business partner John Dorgan. On Dec. 21, a day after the Chronicle's cover story on Spider House was published. Beiarano filed a motion to dismiss - arguing that Dorgan's suit challenges Bejarano's right to free speech. The motion relies on the Texas Citizens Participation Act, which specifically protects free speech made in connection with a "matter of public concern."

Dorgan's suit was filed in response to two Facebook posts in October 2017 - one from former Spider House employee Jeremy Rogers alleging Dorgan attempted to "sexually assault" Rogers' wife in 2014, and a response from Bejarano claiming to know nothing of Rogers' story and promising to ban Dorgan from the property. Dorgan has accused both Beiarano and Rogers of libel and slander that he says hurt both him and the business. Bejarano disagrees: in his motion to dismiss, he claims his 2017 statement addressed the "protection of Spider House staff and patrons" without ever reaching a conclusion "as to the validity" of Rogers' claim. Instead, he argues, he was addressing a matter of "public concern as defined by the TCPA."

In a second filing, Bejarano denies all of Dorgan's allegations and "demands strict proof thereof by a preponderance of the credible evidence," requesting relief to which he's entitled, while Dorgan "take[s] nothing by his suit" and bears all costs. Both responses were filed by Bejarano's first lawyer Bernard Weldon Ponder Jr.; on Jan. 3, Bejarano requested that the court substitute counsel; he is now being represented by Paul K. Browder and Jared Greathouse of local law firm Blazier. Christensen, Browder & Virr. - Sarah Marloff







Only 139 Days to Go!

HOUSE. SENATE GAVEL IN WITH NEW LEADERSHIP

Ah, the calm before the storm. It was nothing but jovial, halcyon times at the Capitol on Tuesday, Jan. 8, the first day of the 86th Texas Legislature. The halls buzzed with advocates, spectators, and kids hoping to see how the sausage is made. In the House, bipartisanship reigned as both Democrats and Republicans lauded Rep. Dennis Bonnen, R-Angleton, the first new speaker of the House in a decade.

Reps including Lyle Larson, R-San Antonio, Mary Gonzalez, D-El Paso, and Senfronia Thompson, D-Houston, praised Bonnen's leadership style. "In his 22 years of experience, he has learned the ins and the outs of the Texas House as well as anyone I've ever served with," said Thompson, who has 24 more years of experience than Bonnen. "Dennis is a man who keeps his word. When Dennis says he wants the House to be united, I trust him."

Bonnen's ascension to speaker wasn't supported by all Dems from the outset. When former Speaker Joe Straus announced his exit after serving since 2009, among the names floated to replace him was Rep. Chris Turner, D-Grand Prairie, chair of the House Democratic Caucus. But before that caucus, now 12 members stronger, could huddle behind a Dem candidate, Bonnen had all but sealed the deal by November, announcing that he'd scored well over the 76 needed

Often described as "aggressive" and not shy about butting heads, Bonnen, who was only 24 when first elected in 1996, is more conservative than his predecessor. He voted for the contentious "Show Me Your Papers" amendment to 2017's anti-immigrant Senate Bill 4, allowing police officers to question the immigration status of anyone they pull over, and signed on as co-author of last session's anti-trans "bathroom bill." As such, his speakership is applauded by anti-choice group Texas Right to Life, who gave Bonnen a 100% score for the past four sessions. Yet in November, 31 of the 67 Dems had already signed on for a Bonnen speakership - time will tell if he lives up to their glowing hopes and expectations.


After being elected unanimously, Bonnen offered a call for unity and laid out his intentions and priorities before the House membership. Property tax and school finance reforms top the list, which also includes repair work for Child Protective Services, school safety and mental health, human trafficking, and benefits for retired teachers. Now in the spotlight, Bonnen established his personal narrative, as a dyslexic small-town kid growing up into a hardworking politician, tough but fair.

"When people call me 'challenging,' believe me, my dad is nodding his head in agreement from above," Bonnen told the packed House. "My dad always told us, 'Say what you mean and do what you say." (Bonnen's older brother Greg

also serves in the House, representing Galveston County.) "So I've never seen the point in sugarcoating things. Those of you who know me know that I operate with an efficiency and honesty that can leave a mark." Perhaps hinting he'll hold firm against culture-war antics, Bonnen assured members he didn't want them to get "caught up in things that don't lead to real results."

Meanwhile in the upper chamber, after heartfelt words, senators elected Kirk Watson, D-Austin, their president pro tempore, which puts Watson third in the line of suc-

cession and at the helm of the Senate when Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick is out of town – as he was on the first day of session. Rather than do his job – which in past years he's gleefully done with much grandstanding - the second most powerful man in Texas was at the White House, helping fabricate a foundation of fear about our state and nation's nonexistent border crisis. Priorities! In Patrick's absence, Sen. Jane Nelson, R-Flower Mound, led proceedings, marking the very first time a woman has done so in its history, underscoring the upper chamber's not-sexist-at-all tone.



While it was all celebratory feel-good vibes in both chambers this week, don't count on the kumbaya spirit to keep flowing for the next 139 days. At the Republicandominated Texas Legislature, it's not a question of whether a vulnerable population will get screwed over - it's a question of which one(s) this time and just how bad will it be. Because of that assured grim reality, sparks are bound to fly. Stay tuned. - Mary Tuma

"People's Lawsuit" Challenges **Texas Abortion Restrictions**

Imagine if nearly all of Texas' onerous and most restrictive abortion laws over the past two decades were struck down in one fell swoop. That's what abortion providers and funding groups are hoping to achieve with their latest suit, Whole Woman's Health Alliance v. Paxton, a sweeping challenge to dozens of the state's anti-choice laws.

Dubbed the "People's Lawsuit" by abortion rights advocates, the ambitious action filed in June argues that those burdensome laws, including the 24-hour pre-procedure sonogram and a rule that forces doctors to provide state-mandated misinformation about abortion, can now be undone in light of the 2016 Supreme Court **Hellerstedt** decision ("Groups File Expansive Suit to Challenge Dozens of Abortion Restrictions," June 14, 2018) that overturned Texas' House Bill 2.

But state officials are working to make sure that the People's Lawsuit never sees the legal light of day. In federal court in

Austin Monday, Jan. 7, providers including Whole Woman's Health Alliance, the Afiva Center, Fund Texas Choice, and the Lilith Fund, represented by the Austin attorney Patrick O'Connell and the Lawyering Project's **Stephanie Toti** – who brought you the SCOTUS victory in Hellerstedt – argued against the state's motion to dismiss the lawsuit in an hourlong hearing before U.S. District Judge Lee Yeakel.

Beth Klusmann, assistant solicitor general in the Texas Attorney General's Office, accused the plaintiffs of attempting to upend the "entire state regulatory system" with "meritless claims." Klusmann said it was "absurd" to argue that the slew of abortion rules in question pose an undue burden on women, and accused abortion funders - nonprofit assistance groups that help largely lowincome women obtain care, often on a volunteer basis – of being motivated by financial interests rather than their clients' best inter-



ests. They "want their dollar to stretch further," said Klusmann of the plaintiffs.

Meanwhile, Toti argued for the plaintiffs that the string of restrictive laws has caused abortion in Texas to be less affordable, more stigmatized, and further out of reach logistically, especially for low-income women and

people of color. The Hellerstedt ruling helped invalidate the grounds upon which several of Texas' prior laws were upheld by the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, making them now ripe for scrutiny. "Once upon a time, Texas had a reasonable regime to regulate abortion, but over time the state incrementally added more laws that became burdensome and unwieldy, making it incredibly difficult for patients and providers to navigate," said Toti.

Before a packed courtroom, Yeakel, who often finds himself the arbiter in the state's abortion wars, told both sides that their pleadings were a bit convoluted, although the oral arguments helped clear some of that confusion. Yeakel didn't indicate when he'd rule on the motion, but said another option might be for the parties to re-plead the case so they could lay out the issues more clearly.

"We are proud to lead another legal challenge in Texas," said Whole Woman's Health CEO Amy Hagstrom Miller, decrying the state's motion as "an evasive maneuver. ... Texans deserve better. Abortion care is health care, and we're ready to make our case and get back to what we do best - providing dignified and compassionate health

LAST-MINUTE APPEALS AIM TO STOP **FIRST EXECUTION OF 2019**

Blaine Milam, a young man from Rusk County, is scheduled to be the state's first execution of 2019. Unlike many death row inmates, Milam's case has moved relatively quickly through the court system; he was sentenced to death in 2011 for the brutal killing of Amora Carson - the 13-month-old daughter of Milam's girlfriend Jessica Carson – during an alleged exorcism in 2008. (Carson was given life in prison without parole, though Milam's trial counsel argued she was responsible for the murder.) The usual appeals were filed, but in September, a month before the U.S.

Supreme Court refused to hear Milam's final federal appeal, the state scheduled his execution for Tuesday, Jan. 15.

As his death date nears, Milam's recently appointed lawyer Jennae Swiergula with Texas **Defender Services filed**

an appeal and a stay request in the Texas Court of Criminal Appeals on Jan. 7 and 8, respectively. In an email statement, Swiergula accused the state of relying on "now discredited bite mark junk science" to obtain Milam's capital murder sentence while not possessing "any meaningful evidence that Mr. Milam played any role in causing" Amora's death. She also noted that the prosecution relied on Texas' law of parties, which allows a jury to convict a person based on the conduct of another, to convict Milam despite unpresented evidence that Carson had been experiencing a "psychotic illness involving delusions that her child was possessed by a demon." Swiergula concluded: "Mr. Milam's conviction is unreliable, and his death sentence is arbitrary."

Previously, Milam's appeal in the U.S. 5th Circuit Court of Appeals - filed in January

2018 by his former lawyer Donald Lee Bailey, who resigned in September - argued six claims. Four focused on the consequences, or lack of them, from "extensive testimony" at trial about Milam's drug use; at the time of Amora's murder, Milam was high on methamphetamine. Under the Texas Penal Code, "voluntary intoxication" can be used as a defense in certain crimes if the defendant can prove they were incapable of forming an "intent to commit a crime." In Milam's case, neither his trial nor appellate and habeas counsel, nor the trial court itself, addressed whether and how the jury could or should

> have addressed "voluntary intoxication" in the punishment phase.

Milam's 5th Circuit appeal also insisted there was a preponderance of evidence at trial to prove Milam "was, and is," intellectually disabled, though his

appellate and habeas counsel did not address the issue for state review. Additionally, the filing argued, since a doctor concluded that Milam, now 29, functions at an emotional level between an 8- and 16-year-old, he should be treated as a juvenile, in which case he cannot be sentenced to death. In May, the appellate court concluded "reasonable jurists could not disagree with the district court's disposition" and denied Milam's certificate of appealability, a decision that the Supreme Court let stand in October.

Unless his stay request is approved - or the governor's office intervenes - Milam will be the first man put to death by the state's hand this year, and the 559th inmate executed in Texas since the death penalty was reinstated in 1976. - Sarah Marloff

Sour Apples at AISD

BUDGET, DEMOGRAPHICS VEX SCHOOL BOARD

The Austin ISD Board of Trustees met for the first time in 2019 on Monday night, and the sometimes tense discussion gave a glimpse of the immense challenges district leaders face over the next six months as they sketch out and adopt next year's budget. The meeting was bookended by two comparatively celebratory moments: Arati Singh's swearing-in as At-Large Place 9 trustee, and the election of new board officers (District 6 Trustee Geronimo Rodriguez will remain board president, while At-Large Place 8 Trustee Cindy Anderson will become vice president, and D5 Trustee Amber Elenz will be secretary).

But two agenda items sandwiched between those moments highlighted the less pleasant work that lies ahead. The district's Budget Stabilization Task Force presented its likely-to-be-controversial recommendations for navigating through AISD's fiscal crisis, and a briefing from district demographers revealed that AISD expects to continue losing students for at least the next 10 years.

The presentation delivered by the BSTF tri-chairs outlined the group's ideas both for cutting costs and growing revenue; the task force report, released last Friday, garnered headlines (which in turn garnered ire from several trustees) for recommending closing 15 schools and making cuts to magnet schools - AISD's crown jewels for many in the district and on the board – among its 40-plus items.

A testy exchange between BSTF tri-chair Robert Thomas and Anderson foreshadowed the debate to come. Anderson said the task force's assessment that magnet schools stonewalled "resources from reaching a critical mass of students who are typically minorities, English Language Learners and/or receives special education services" was an "attack" on the popular programs. She said the report failed to account for dollars allocated for the district's other speciality academic programs, which don't exist as a separate line item in the budget the way magnet funding does.


Thomas responded: "There was no attack, Trustee Anderson Quite frankly, I find it a little offensive that you would say what we did is offensive." He said the task force was instructed to "look critically" at how the district prioritized its budget - a mandate that would undoubtedly create controversy among various stakeholder groups. In an interview Tuesday, Anderson added that magnets - essentially, hubs of specialized academic programs - must exist, because "it doesn't make financial sense to spread those programs out across the district." She also said that "our biggest bucket of opportunity is in driving enrollment' and that choice programs and magnets, across the board, are all doing that for us."

BSTF members spent untold hours, in meetings and on their own, researching and deliberating the final recommendations. Only ideas that received support from at least 50% of the 30 members were included in the final report. In addition to listing the percentage of support each idea received, a rationale for the recommendation, and dissenting opinions from members who did not support a particular idea, the BSTF report also included "safeguards" intended to protect historically underserved parts of the district from experiencing an inequitable share of the fallout from any one decision.

In the recommendation for closing schools, the BSTF report suggests redrawing attendance zones as one way of shoring up enrollment at the district's underenrolled schools - the majority of which are located in the eastern portions of the district. Doing so could shift students from overenrolled schools (most of which are on the district's west side) to underenrolled schools, but it would likely mean busing students for miles across town.

The task force urged district leaders to craft a "thoughtful, deliberative, wellplanned out process with a multi-year timeframe, done through the lens of equity" that avoids "[enhancing] segregation pat-

terns already present in the community by placing a disproportionate amount of the fallout from consolidating campuses on "racial minorities and the economically disadvantaged." District 7 Trustee Yasmin Wagner acknowledged at the meeting a need for the AISD community to "stretch the idea" that students must live within close proximity of their schools to succeed. But, Wagner said, "if we start talking about busing to alleviate those issues, that's where we start losing families."

And according to the demographic report presented to the board Monday night, AISD will continue losing families through at least 2029. Over the next 10 years, the report estimates that AISD will lose 9.2% of its current student population, or just over 7,000 students – although the pace of enrollment decline is expected to decrease. The largest losses are expected at the middle school level, as previous years have seen declining elementary populations (which illustrates one bright spot in the report: Kindergarten enrollment is expected to grow beginning in 2023, due to increased birth rates in 2016).

Templeton Demographics, the Dallas research firm that helped conduct the forecast, attributes the enrollment decline to a variety of factors, including competition from charter schools, unaffordable in-district housing markets, and "increasing urbanization." Roughly three-quarters of AISD students reside in single-family homes, according to the report, but Austin has seen development of smaller and/or more expensive housing units, which AISD Director for Planning Services Beth Wilson described in an interview Tuesday as "not the most family friendly" of housing types, a concern that's shared by much of the new pro-housing City Council. Wilson said district leaders are aware of the challenge urbanization could pose and are developing strategies to live in that potential new reality. "As the urban core gets more expensive, people are moving out, so we're seeing overcrowding in the peripherals of our district," Wilson said. "We're looking at shrinking in the middle and expanding at the edges."

ANTI-SOCCER PETITION FINALLY LIMPS IN

AUSTIN

Major League Soccer Commissioner Don **Garber** is expected to travel to Austin next week to officially recognize Austin FC as the league's 27th team. Garber will be alongside Mayor Steve Adler and Austin FC chairman/ CEO Anthony Precourt (the now-former owner of the Columbus Crew SC) at the Rustic Tap, as they announce what Austin soccer fans have been itching for since the ill-fated Austin Aztex went dormant in 2016.

But a group of dissatisfied neighbors near the team's future stadium site at McKalla Place hope to put a stop to everyone's fun with a petition submitted last week that could force the stadium deal between the city and Precourt - and other similar land use deals to the voters. In a press release sent

anonymously from a "Friends of McKalla" email account, the group announced the delivery of 29,000 signatures to the City Clerk's Office for validation. The McKalla Friends raised now-familiar complaints: It's a tax giveaway, the voters deserve a say, the McKalla lot deserves a proper

request for proposal process, etc. A "representative of Friends of McKalla Place" wrote in the email: "We are resolved to fight against big money, special interests and bad policy so Austin taxpayers get the fair deal we deserve."

The identity of who sent the email, however, remains a mystery. No one has responded to messages sent to "Friends of McKalla" by the Chronicle. One person named in the email, Craig Nazor (an environmental activist and vocal opponent of Precourt's stadium deal), told us that the group was started by various members of the Gracywoods Neighborhood Association and the North Austin Civic Association, both of which have likewise opposed the plan.

Whoever they are, the Friends of McKalla Place have picked up the pieces of the antisoccer petition drive begun by IndyAustin, before their campaign ended in anti-Semitic embarrassment. Following that debacle, the effort was backed by a new group called Fair Play Austin, founded by Circuit of the Americas Chairman Bobby Epstein. But after the deal between Precourt and the city was finalized, and the legal case against Precourt in Columbus faded away, Epstein did so himself - until Francoise Luca came knocking around Thanksgiving.

That's according to Nikelle Meade, a partner at the law firm Husch Blackwell and an adviser to the Fair Play Austin PAC. Meade said Luca called and asked what Fair Play planned to do with the signatures. The PAC had no plans for them, so Meade agreed to hand them over. Luca, president of the Gracy-

woods NA, confirmed Meade's account, adding that the Friends of McKalla group has no plans to organize as a formal political group, "because our volunteers don't have the time." Luca explained that the press release was sent anonymously because no member of the group has the capacity to be available to

the media. "I have a very busy personal life," Luca said. "I don't have a staff or a fancy office; we're talking grassroots here. It's not a lack of transparency, it's a lack of resources."

What happens next is unclear. First the signatures have to be validated, and even then an election might be delayed until November; the City Charter prevents citizendriven initiatives from coming to voters within six months of previous measures (we had two in November). As for Epstein's future involvement, Meade said: "Bobby did create the Fair Play PAC, and I think it will continue to be engaged in the petition effort if it goes to the ballot." Epstein, who is building his own stadium at COTA for the United Soccer League's Austin Bold FC franchise, declined to comment on any future plans he or the PAC may have regarding McKalla Place.

hen the brand-new 10-1 Austin City Council took office in 2015 with a grand vision of hope and change, it didn't anticipate how the next four years would actually play out. Efforts to guickly move the needle on hot-button city issues stalled out amid simmering discontent with then-City Manager Marc Ott, and then in the power vacuum created by his 2016 departure. As vacancies in the city's executive corps stacked up, the CodeNEXT land use code rewrite - inherited from the prior at-large Council – began to fragment, and relations between City Hall and the Austin Police Association soured to the point that Council opted to reject and renegotiate the union's contract.

Much of City Manager Spencer Cronk's first year in office, besides getting to know his new city (after coming from Minneapolis) and finding suitable digs, has been spent righting the ship. The police union and the city came to a new agreement Council could approve. Cronk has reorganized his shop, hired two new assistant city managers (to oversee development, health and human services, and parks and culture), and is currently looking for another pair (for mobility and public safety). He'll then hire a new deputy city manager to replace the retiring Elaine Hart, the longtime city chief financial officer who spent 16 months as interim city manager before Cronk was chosen. When Council finally scrapped CodeNEXT in August 2018, Cronk was assigned the task of figuring out how to proceed with factions of the city so at odds on the subject.

Cronk's also carrying out a revamp of how Council goes about its budgeting, and has been a public face of the city's response to the March bombings and the October Aquapocalypse. So the rookie city manager, who'll mark his first full year on the job next month, has had a crash course in adjustment. "I'm looking to build on that in 2019 and really take some of those key lessons about how to bring people together like we did for the police contract – and see how that can be leveraged for other big challenges that we're tackling, whether it's the land development code or how we address some of the affordability and mobility challenges our city is facing," Cronk said.

It's a good thing he's got his bearings, because the upcoming year, which formally began with Monday's swearing-in of both new (Paige Ellis and Natasha Harper-Madison) and returning (Mayor Steve Adler, Ann Kitchen, Pio Renteria, Kathie Tovo) council members, isn't likely to prove any lighter a load. He'll earn the pay raise Council gave him at the end of last year as he reinvents CodeNEXT, spends the money voters approved in the 2018 and 2016 bonds, implements the long-gestating Austin Strategic Mobility Plan in conjunction with Capital Metro's Project Connect, and tackles the homelessness crisis facing every corner of the city. And he'll have to play an impartial role in Council's fight over whether or not to expand the Austin Convention Center.

MOVING TOWARD A MANDATE

Cronk's bosses on the dais spent the break reckoning with the meaning of the November election results, which has fractured the preservationist bloc that coalesced around many decisions on land use, as well as big-ticket harbingers of change like Austin's nascent deal to bring Major League Soccer to town.

District 2 Council Member Delia Garza, who on Monday was chosen by her colleagues to succeed Tovo as mayor pro tem (the first Latina to hold that honor), told me, "I think this is an opportunity to really

think people indicated they want us to actually be doing stuff."

The passing of the mostly symbolic mayor pro tem torch from Tovo (in many ways the mayor's ideological antithesis) to Garza can't help but reflect the shift that Adler sees. While Tovo withheld judgment on the views of her returning and new colleagues, she noted to me that previous incarnations of Council - for instance, the 1997 "Green Machine" under then-Mayor Kirk Watson - have been plenty progressive. "I think Austin has had very progressive Councils, and this certainly will be

Rebooted City Hall gets a new chance to fix Austin

move the needle on how we manage growth and do it in a progressive way. I think this City Council will be one of the most progressive in terms of understanding the need to plan and manage our growth, and that we're no longer a little college town. ... We're a big city, and if we don't plan for that, we're hurting our most vulnerable."

For his part, Adler has been open about viewing his landslide re-election victory as a mandate. "I think the center of the Council has moved, not so much in a partisan kind of way, but just in terms of philosophy and perspective about what it's going to take to preserve what's special about the city," Adler said.

"I think the new council members lean away from the status quo and into making change," the mayor continued. "I hope I'm reading that correctly, because that's encouraging. On the campaign trail, there were voices that argued more for the status quo and against change, and most of those voices did not do well in the election. I one," she said. "I would not agree with an assessment that one perspective is 'progressive' on land use versus 'non-progressive.' Some would characterize various positions as very pro-development, which doesn't tend to be aligned with progressive issues."

At Monday night's inauguration, Ellis and Harper-Madison each gave a preview of how they might approach the upcoming term. Ellis kept it extremely light in her prepared remarks, which included an apparent olive branch to supporters of the prior District 8 regime under right-winger Ellen Troxclair. "As your Council member, I will be a representative for everyone in Southwest Austin," she said. Harper-Madison was much more animated, making the audience laugh more than once as she promised to focus on constituent services, workforce development, food access, and the mobility crisis. "I'm a rookie at this," she said. "But that means two things: It means I have a lot to learn, but it also means I have absolutely nothing to lose."

CODENEXT: THE SPEED OF TRUST

The mettle of these two new CMs will be tested as Council warily reapproaches the smoking pile of embers that was supposed to be our new, modern, simple, efficient, and inclusive land development code. Cronk and his office have spent time since the implosion of CodeNEXT looking at possible paths forward, but he emphasized the "healing" the community needs to go through before we can restart the dialogue. "I think it's important to make some key policy decisions or directions early on in the new year, but we can only move at the speed of trust," he said.

There's pretty general agreement that doing nothing about the city's nearly 40-year-old land use code isn't an option. It seems to many that breaking the process up into pieces - something that was advocated before, during, and after the six-year CodeNEXT rewrite effort - would be a natural move. "I'm still open to [discussing] how much we want to take on and how quickly we want to take that on," Cronk said, "but I know this will only be successful if we do those first two things: [That we make sure] there is some healing, and that we start building trust back into our community."

Adler remains hopeful that some of CodeNEXT can be salvaged. "There's a lot of work that's already done, and the issues that are difficult are pretty clearly identified given the process we've been through."

There'll be two new voices weighing in on those issues, with Ellis and Harper-Madison replacing Ellen Troxclair and Ora Houston, neither of whom did much to move CodeNEXT forward. While the new CMs' positions haven't yet been tested, Garza said, "They really do have an understanding of the need for different housing types, and the need for efficient public transit, and they understand that we're growing and if we don't plan for it, it hurts our environment and pushes our minority and lowincome families out."

MORE MOBILITY, MORE PROBLEMS

Adjacent to the land use overhaul, local transportation planners aim to chart a course that allows traffic-choked Central Texas to contemplate long-stalled efforts to improve mobility. Capital Metro continues to engage the community around its latest Project Connect vision, which it hopes will lead to a plan for high-capacity transit (maybe rail, maybe something else) being put to the voters in 2020. At the same time, the city is asking for feedback on its latest Austin Strategic Mobility Plan, updating the inaugural version adopted in 2014, which touches every street in the city and comprises initiatives on corridor planning, smart mobility, safe and complete streets, active transportation, and much else. "They're all interrelated, and we need to continue the work and work collaboratively with our Cap Metro partners," Cronk said. "It will only be successful if we both are leaning into addressing these challenges and getting buy-in from not only the policymakers but the public on how to

address some of the transportation challenges that we have."

As vice chair of the Capital Metro board, Garza (who serves on that eight-member body with her colleagues Renteria and Kitchen) often encounters the misconception by many in the public that the transit agency is a city department and therefore directly under Council's thumb. "I totally understand that misconception, but they aren't," she said. "So it's necessary for the two entities to coordinate, [including] with our land planning and where we put density and why it's important to put it on corridors – because without that density, we can't have a successful public transit agency."

Garza said she looks forward to the impending discussions on mass transit options, when both Council members and Cap Metro board members have all the information they need to begin making decisions – say, between light rail and autonomous buses. "As of right now, I want the improvements we can get as quickly as possible, because we need to improve our public transit desperately."

A MILLION HERE, A MILLION THERE

These conversations about mobility services and infrastructure are taking place on top of an unprecedented avalanche of public investment, also being managed by the new city manager and his Council bosses. Voters approved \$925 million in bond-funded capital spending in November, including a \$250 million cash injection to address the city's affordable housing shortage. "I'm putting a laser focus on ensuring that we can implement those [bond programs] well, and prove to the taxpayers that this was the right vote for that time," Cronk said.

That's on top of the \$720 million mobility bond voters OK'd in 2016, which is being implemented over eight years and has already produced miles of new sidewalks and improvements at some of the city's most dangerous intersections. The implementation process - one of the key political concerns confronted by Adler as he stumped for the measure and urged Austin to "go big" - has thus far exceeded the mayor's expectations, and he hopes that same process, especially its real-time project tracker, can serve as a model for the 2018 bond. "That said, this next year is going to be a real critical year," he said. "Because now this year we have to decide exactly what corridor work we do with that \$450 million piece." The Corridor Program actually accounts for \$482 million of the 2016 bond, to be invested in planning, designing, and building improvements in nine corridors. The first of those projects are expected to go out for bid in 2019.

DOWNTOWN CRISIS AND OPPORTUNITY

During budget discussions for the current fiscal year, which began Oct. 1, it was clear that homelessness throughout Austin, not just in its urban core, is rising higher and higher on the public's list of priorities. Council approved the Austin Action Plan to End Homelessness, spearheaded by Adler

and Tovo, in April; it'll be the new Council's job to execute on that plan, which involves a number of partnerships with nonprofit service providers and the private sector. Adler points to funding within the \$250 million housing bond as one component of that plan, plus funds generated within the Waller Creek Tax Increment Reinvestment Zone to fund permanent supportive housing. (City staff proposed a \$30 million investment plan in December for that Waller Creek money - on top of the \$110 million Council agreed to back in May to help construct the creek parks system.) "We have a lot of things that are aligning for us as a community to move forward on this," Adler

Tovo highlighted the upcoming service changes at the Austin Resource Center for the Homeless, for which the city is seeking a new nonprofit operator that could take the reins as early as April. This "housing first" relaunch, while ultimately aimed at improving services citywide, will mean the facility serves fewer individuals at that location. Tovo said one of Council's challenges as a result will be finding other options for emergency shelter beds throughout the city.

The Waller Creek TIRZ is fueled by increasing property values Downtown, especially near the Austin Convention Center (e.g., the Fairmont Hotel). Convention Center staff has complained it's too small to accommodate booking requests, and last year, Council established a Tourism Commission that spent most of its time fighting about how the now-plateauing flow of hotel occupancy tax dollars is divided among the folks legally allowed to get them (everybody wants more than they're currently getting), and whether to leverage that cash to fund an expansion. Adler and Tovo had an awkward clash of headlines after the elections when he said he took his trouncing of Laura Morrison, in part, as a sign that voters are with him on that subject. When asked about that pronouncement, Tovo disagreed, saying the expansion is still a controversial issue both on the dais and within the city.

Adler hopes that the study Council commissioned in April from the University of Texas School of Architecture will come back with results in the coming months and answer some of the basic factual questions. "I also hope they are going to come back with some design solutions or proposals that will be the convention center of the future, kind of like what the [Central] Library was when we opened that up," he said. "So I think some of the Council members have expressed some reservations, some of those were based on kind of disputed facts, and hopefully we'll resolve those."

Tovo is also looking forward to the results of the UTSOA study, noting that it wasn't commissioned to make an up-or-down recommendation on the expansion itself, but simply to answer the questions Council members have been bickering about. Regardless, she emphasized that the study – whatever it contains – will only help her make a decision, and won't dictate it.

Caleb De Casper (Jan. 2 at Empire Control Room): "I feel the most free whenever I'm onstage and I've had a few drinks and I'm able to just let it out. And the whole reason why I moved to Austin was to be able to let it out and have people receive it. It's for everyone. That's the whole point [of music], to transfer energy between individuals. If you're coming to one of my shows, I don't care who the fuck you are - you better be free."



Magna Carda (Jan. 3 at Stubb's): "When you're creating anything, you're the master, you're in control, [so] you can actually, literally be free," says MC Megz Kelli (left). "When you go and give that to people, or you show that to people, it also shows them that my work is boundless. So when you're here in this moment with us, in turn, you're boundless. There were no rules when we were making it, so obviously no rules apply when you're listening to it."

> SMiiLE (Jan. 4 at Swan Dive): "To me, there are moments of freedom that lie in whenever the music overcomes you. and that can happen while playing live or that can happen in the recording studio or practicing or writing," says frontman Jake Miles (middle). "If you're playing live, it's pretty psychedelic. The lights are flashing, you can feel the energy of the crowd, and you've sort of just become the music."

Night Glitter (Jan. 5 at Cheer Up Charlies): "I feel like Free Week brings this feeling of experimentation, like, try something new that you've never done before," says LouLou Ghelichkhani (right). "You want to get in that vibe where nothing really matters and you're just floating in sound. No one's trying to get signed. They're just playing, hoping that people who are reluctant to pay 10, 15, five dollars to come and see them are excited to just kind of tumble in."

A Great Print Run

Elisabet Ney Museum gives Austin's world-class press its historic due in "Women of Flatbed: A Retrospective"

Getting kicked out of your home is a helluva way to celebrate your 30th birthday. But hey, New Austin can't always be bothered with how many decades of cultural contributions you've made - not when there is land to be sold and condos to be built. So just as Flatbed Press hits the big 3-0 in 2019, it's being ushered out of its headquarters for the past 20 of those 30 years.

Well, at least some of Been-Here-Awhile Austin still has an appreciation for an arts institution's gifts to the city and has cooked up a cheerier way to mark this one's milestone anniversary. In the same month that Flatbed is preparing to vacate the large, renovated warehouse at 2832 E. MLK Jr., the Elisabet Ney Museum is hosting a commemorative look at art made by women at Flatbed. In a sense, the timing couldn't be better: With "Women of Flatbed: A Retrospective" opening in the midst of PrintAustin, the monthlong citywide salute to printmaking that kicks off each year (see "PrintAustin 2019"), the exhibition and the press it recognizes will receive a bit more attention than it might ordinarily. And the setting is as ideal as it gets: What space in this city is more closely identified with the achievements of a female artist than the museum honoring Ney, the Mother of All Art in Our Town?

The idea for the Flatbed show came from the Ney's museum site coordinator, Oliver Franklin, who pulled fellow Ney staffer Lindsay Barras in on the project, and they teamed with Flatbed Associate Director Annalise Gratovich and Preparator Mike Brimberry to review and select the works. Their aim was to show both the wide variety of art created through the years and the evolution of participation by women. "After all, there were only a couple of women working with Flatbed back in its early days, compared to nearly half of the printers today," says Franklin.

Flatbed owner-director and Austin Arts Hall of Famer Katherine Brimberry confirms the dearth of female artists at the press during its first years in the Warehouse District on Third Street. First came San Antonio artist Bettie Ward, who collaborated with Mark L. Smith. Flatbed co-founder and Brimberry's business partner at the time, on a series of monotypes in the summer of 1990. The next year, Brimberry worked with a female artist for the first time when former gallery owner and Chronicle Arts writer Rebecca Cohen sponsored a project with Sydney Yeager at Flatbed. "We created a suite of small etchings, two of which we will show in this exhibition," says Brimberry. "Julie Speed created her first print, a photogravure, with Byron Brauchli, at Flatbed that summer of 1991. Shortly afterward, in the fall, I collaborated with Melissa Miller. We created the etching Water Spirits for the Fort Worth Modern's Centennial Print Series. We worked together in 1991-92, and the print was published in 1992. Melissa was well-known by then and the Modern had invited her to be one of 19 artists making editions of prints for the museum. Of the 19 artists, there were only three female artists chosen: Melissa Miller, Julie Bozzi, and Nancy Graves. I think Modern's selection of artists is a good snapshot of the art world in general at the time. After Melissa, while we were at the first location on Third Street, we worked with Sandria Hu, Celia Muñoz, Beverly Penn, Lilian Garcia-Roig, Ann Conner, Mary Vernon, and Donna Howell-Sickles. Since moving to MLK, we have worked with many more artists, and at least 50% are female. It is also interesting that both of our master printers are female. Linda Ridgway, Suzi Davidoff, Joan Winter, Sharon Kopriva, Cynthia Camblin, Margo Sawyer, Ann Stautberg, Mary McCleary, Liliana Porter, Katie van Scherpenberg, Annalise Gratovich, Alice Leora Briggs, Judy Youngblood, as well as most of the artists

we had worked with at the Third Street location are women we published at MLK."

"Women of Flatbed: A Retrospective" may represent a closing of sorts, but it's definitely not an ending. Brimberry has secured a new home for Flatbed in Southeast Austin: suite 190 at 3701 Drossett. "We are in the process now of getting contractors to bid to build out the studio and gallery space there," she says. "The new Flatbed will have a dedicated gallery space, a community studio space for artist printmakers, and our professional studio. We will also have one large studio to lease and hope to find a compatible gallery or arts-related business to occupy that space. We hope to move in April, but this will depend on the contractor's progress." As they prep for the eventual move, Brimberry and crew will be looking to lighten their load through the Flatbed Goes South Moving Show and Sale. More than 250 works from Flatbed's framed inventory will be displayed salon-style and available for purchase. It may turn out that the best way you can help Flatbed celebrate turning 30 is to buy a present for yourself.

"Women of Flatbed: A Retrospective" runs Jan. 17-April 28 at the Elisabet Ney Museum, 304 E. 44th. An artists' talk will take place Sat., Jan. 26, 2pm, at the museum. For more information, visit www.elisabetneymuseum.org.

Anchoring the fest will be "The Contemporary Print," a juried survey of current work in Texas that runs Jan. 18-Feb. 16 at Big Medium Gallery at Canopy (916 Springdale); the PrintEXPO, an afternoon showcase for printmakers and publishers of fine art prints from across the state, with prints for sale and demonstrations of assorted printmaking techniques – including the ever-popular steamroller printmaking (Sat., Feb. 2, noon-5pm, Blue Genie Big Top, 6100 Airport); and making its debut is the Printmaker's Ball, a masquerade ball the night before the PrintEXPO (Fri., Feb. 1, 7-10pm, Blue Genie Big Top). 

Landscape Recording Static/ Dynamic by Erika Huddleston

In a small gallery within an architecture firm's headquarters in the urban heart of Austin, it's as if the apocalypse has already taken place. You know which apocalypse, of course: You've got Netflix or Hulu or whatever; hell, you've seen TV, you've been to the movies a few times in your life.

It's not that the Forsite Studio's building's interior has become any less tony, any less tidy, than its lovely exterior there on East Cesar Chavez. It's that the exhibition of visual art within this Atelier 1205 space has such a spot-on title for the works on display. It's called "Post-Apocalyptic Harvest," because it

seems like the apocalypse has come and gone, but it happened out there somewhere, beyond the fields we know, and now someone's been creatively reaping what disaster and collapse have sown – and bringing it back for us to appreciate.

That "someone" is three artists: Erika Huddleston, Tammy West, and Amy Scofield. The pieces they've provided complement each other visually and texturally - curator Saul Jerome San Juan knows what's up but there's also an implied sequential component that links these three discrete samplings of work.

Huddleston's oils on canvas and rougher materials capture the sort of viny, arboreal tangles that might proliferate during nature's resurgence after human achievement has been sundered. That many of her realist depictions of colorful botanical chaos are

actually plein air renderings from New York City's Central Park, well, that just makes the apocalypse conceit ring more true, doesn't it? Aren't the jungled ruins of our biggest metropolitan hubs usually what's depicted when the end of civilization comes a-calling?

West, according to this sequence we're proposing, has followed, gathering up some of the natural detritus that Huddleston's been depicting portions of. She's taken twigs and leaves and their ilk and arranged them in compelling patterns, bound them encaustically for preservation's sake, presented them in convenient shapes and sizes for gallery viewing

> - as if trying to compensate for the order that's been destroyed. Here are handsome records in wax, of what will remain after all our vainglorious industry's kaput.

And Scofield, ever the eschaton's busy magpie, has matched West's meth-

ods in a materially inverse fashion: gathering them, but wrangling up the fabricated remnants of our proud world – the bright plastics, the shiny metals, the tubing and wires and chains - and turning them savage, shunting them beyond workaday linearity and arranging them in evocations of a less purely machined existence. Everything sold is new again.

So there's a winning trinity of creative harvesting for you to encounter on Atelier 1205's walls right now, is our point, citizen. Always a good thing to see before the apocalypse, n'est-ce pas? - Wayne Alan Brenner

There's one sure way for art to make a lasting impression: when the marks comprising a work are made transferable and forced into contact with another surface. Then, suddenly, look - born from an industrial matrix still wet with ink, it's a print! It's the product of a woodcut, an engraving, an etching. It manifests as a mezzotint, an aquatint, an image of drypoint. Hell, maybe it's one of those screenprints that concert promoters use for pimping their bands, a bold AF poster created with the same sort of process that, when displayed in a Very Serious Museum, is called serigraphy.

There are so many different kinds of prints, we confess, that it's better to direct you to Wikipedia for a detailed background. But we wouldn't be surprised if an eye-popping majority of those kinds - to say nothing of the abundance of subjects depicted, the profusion of styles engaged – were available for viewing during the sixth annual PrintAustin celebration.

This year's iteration of PrintAustin runs from January 15 to February 15 and features more than 42 events throughout the city - including exhibitions, artist talks, demos, workshops, and more. We'll be highlighting several of those in your Chronicle listings as the fest continues, of course, but right now we want to make sure you know about two major things.

1) The bright anchor of this whole inkstained vehicle of wonders is a show called "The Contemporary Print" in the Big Medium Gallery at Canopy (916 Springdale). The exhibition presents a diversity of printmaking from 35 artists from around the world, juried by Anna Katherine Brodbeck of the Dallas Museum of Art. There will be an opening reception (Fri., Jan. 18, 7-10pm) sparked with artist awards and the usual refreshments and camaraderie in that welcoming space. Things are moving fast now on bringing pro soccer to Austin. Three weeks ago, Precourt Sports Ventures and the city announced that they had completed the contract for PSV to build an MLS stadium on city land at McKalla Place near the Domain. Last week, opponents turned in a petition to force a public vote before the city can enter into any such deal; we appear to be headed to a May referendum on the topic (see p.13). This week, PSV announced that they'll be making a "LEGENDARY Announcement" next Tue., Jan. 15, at a press conference featuring PSV CEO Anthony Precourt, Mayor Steve



Adler, and MLS Commissioner Don Garber. That's where they'll officially, finally, announce that PSV has been awarded the franchise to create an expansion team here, Austin FC.



Meanwhile, Circuit of the Americas has scheduled a presser for that same day, to introduce the squad, staff, and stadium for the first season of Austin Bold FC, which will begin play this March in the second-division USL Championship. COTA Chairman Bobby Epstein has been a backer of the anti-PSV petition, so there's no love lost there, and with the city and MLS now formally on the other side, it's hard to see the end game here: Though I'll savor and support his bringing pro soccer back to Austin, Epstein himself has opined that Austin can't support two pro soccer teams. More next week.

DAY TRIPS BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

Big Bend Brewing Co. in Alpine, a member of the top echelon of Texas craft brewers, ended the year by stopping production of its award-winning beers.

In a Dec. 21 Instagram post, the brewery announced that effective Dec. 31, 2018, it would "suspend operations" after six years "due to ... unforeseen hurdles." The brewery promised "two very special bottle releases ... one in January and one on Valentine's Day."

According to **Brewbound** (www.brewbound.com), the brewery was one of hundreds of companies that prepaid for brewing equipment from **Diversified Metal Engineering** of Canada that was not delivered. "DME's collapse was just one of the factors that forced Big Bend to suspend operations," Mahala Guevara, vice president of operations at BBBC, told Brewbound.

The West Texas brewery was in the process of building a new facility in San Antonio that was planned for a 2019 opening. The project has been halted, according to the post.

Whether the closing is permanent or temporary, it seems to be caused by a perfect storm of losses to DME, costs with the expansion, and a lack of deep-pocketed investors. There doesn't appear to be a shortage of public support for good beer.

Big Bend Brewing Co. had strong ties to the Austin area, not only with its many fans, but the founding brewmaster was Steve Anderson, who passed away on Nov. 25, 2015. Anderson opened Waterloo Brewing Company in Austin with Billy Forrester in 1993. When that brewpub closed in 2001, Anderson became



head brewer at Live Oak Brewing Company until 2012. From there he moved to Alpine to open the brewery with partner **Matt Kruger**.

Want to explore French culture or brush up on your parlez-vous? The Alliance Française d'Austin hosts regular meetups, film series, and pétanque games. Got your head above the clouds? Check out the UT Astronomy Department's free star parties on top of Robert Lee Moore Hall, held most Wednesdays when school is in session.

ARTS AND CRAFTS

Who says kids get to be the only ones nurturing their creative side? Besides, blowtorches are better fits for grownup hands. The casual crafter can combine easy DIY projects with adult beverages at Downtown's Upstairs Circus, while CRAFT studio offers training workshops in crafts like soapmaking, calligraphy, and floral arrangements, as well as just a real chill space (tools and materials included) for you to come craft to your heart's content. But back to those blowtorches. Blue Moon Glassworks is all about harnessing fire to make your own jewelry, glass mosaics, stained glass, and more. And "metalheads" will want to make a beeline for Greg Wenderski, aka the Sword Casting Guy, who teaches workshops on how to forge bronze or aluminum swords. If nothing else, you can make 2019 the year you win your office's Game of Thrones costume contest.

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Rollin' in the Deepa

Puli-Ra's chef Shridhar revamps her model but stays true to her vision

The spirit of Puli-Ra is playful and irreverent, but chef Deepa Shridhar is hardcore about her food and her supper clubs. After a fruitful food truck residency at Texas Keeper Cider, she discontinued daily service in October 2018, rang in the new year with Puli-Ra's largest event yet, and already has new pop-ups on the calendar. Shridhar shares the essence of her work, allowing us behind the scenes of a maverick small business providing a boldly experimental synthesis of South Indian and East Texas concepts to Austinites.

Though Shridhar's project has been rebranded over the years, a formative 2018 – along with a surge of new supporters – put fresh air in the sails of Puli-Ra. "I like to think of [it] as a teenager about to go to college – our ideas are wilder than most people. We just want to see what sticks to the wall.

and then kind of go for it," said Shridhar. "I'm a cook's cook for sure. You asked me about quality, and how do we keep that up. I don't think you actually can with daily service. I think if you do, you can for a short spurt of time, and then you burn out. That's essentially where I realized I was going.

"I like building my own fire, I like breaking down my own animals, I like using everything local. I realized that at the pace I was going, that I was

basically cutting off my timeline. So how do I make sure that every time I make a meal, I care about it like it's the first time I've made a meal? And how do I also make something focused, using certain ingredients, and being true to farmers? And I realized, I think, really, the only way I could do that was to do bomb-ass supper clubs without, you know, the twinkling Mason jar lights and all of that bullshit. I want to do something completely different."

Having weathered the years without investors ("We're definitely the brokest small business," Shridhar emphasized), her


creative control over the business remains untainted. Shridhar explains how bringing on her father, DS, as a business partner helped hone her focus. "It was the biggest blessing and the biggest curse I could give myself – like we're talking 5am phone calls – but he has changed my business for the better. He is the hardest person on me, and he also keeps me accountable. If I can convince him that one of my crazy ideas is worth doing, it has forced me to think it through in a way that I hadn't been able to. I have to justify my choices."

After a self-made journey from stage to chef, Shridhar engages with her audience in a way that feels authentic to her, focusing on Instagram to reach her "really cool following" of adventurous eaters. The antithesis of formulaic, whitewashed, and aesthetically angled food marketing, her online voice

Some days, Shridhar writes plainly about


the evolution of her brand's identity. "Some people ask if my food is Indian and sometimes I don't know how to answer them. Is it Indian in the way they know to be Indian? No. But it's Indian for two reasons: 1. I'm Indian. 2. I see Texas onions and I char the shit out of them because char is inherently important as a flavor in Indian cooking." In another post, she offers her way of honoring a beloved role model's life. "So I had a plan - like a menu you know. But then Bourdain died. And I'm out of my mind about it. So I changed it all cause cooking is cool like that. My cheese board is everything I would

Fondly recalling dining at Eleven Madison Park in New York City, Shridhar explained that the thoughtfulness of a customized take-home gift is an element of Michelinstarred hospitality she would like to introduce to her supper clubs. Experimenting with local dairy, honey, and herb-based hair and face masks to soothe herself after long hours in front of a fire, she came up with the idea of recycling products while promoting other local businesses. "People don't understand the struggle that farmers and producers go through ... and their products are immaculate, amazing. They toil and toil over it. I really want to find a way to essentially make the public aware of how great these products are, and how good they are for you, on the outside and the inside." Playing with the idea of special granolas, ghees, and possibly even zines, she wants the "consumer-forward" experience of Puli-Ra to follow guests home in the form of a "self-care swag bag."

While expanding palates and sharing authentic South Indian flavors is important, Shridhar is primarily committed to remaining truthful as a business and as a chef. As her project intersects with the public, this sometimes means reminding guests that their preferences for taste or price won't always come first. On the subject of the occasional picky eater, she laughed: "Yes, it is going to be too spicy, and no, we can not make it less spicy for you, I'm so sorry!" It also means playing hip-hop during her events, a nod to brown cooks everywhere and her childhood soundtrack as a fresh immigrant in Houston. "I'm not out to polarize," said

thought, labor, and tradition behind her food. "We've been on a pepper ferment spree," she'll write, sharing swipeable step-bysteps showing baked goods rising to life, a

lovingly rubbed hunk of meat before and after being smoked, and piles of local herbs and chiles becoming jars of category-bending ghees, aïolis, chutneys, and gremolatas. She also proudly credits every flower, herb, and chunk of honeycomb to its originator. "[Alejandra Rodriguez Boughton of La Flaca] and I had the very best time at the cidery," Shridhar writes. "She brought gorgeous flowers, lamb's quarters, banana leaves, herbs, coriander, lemon verbena. and much more. We burnt the banana leaves, and she showed me how to assemble a proper tamale and y'all. They are so good.

serve someone like him."

Shridhar is no stranger to small, hyperseasonal, special-menu affairs, having trained under Jesse Griffiths (Dai Due) and spent time at Lenoir before going solo. In fact, she enjoys giving guests themed feasts: a non-Christopher Columbus popup, Peruvian-Indian, Moghul Empire, and whole-table-as-a-charcuterie-board supper clubs. She hopes to normalize the "let's see what happens" attitude of adventurous diners who opt for a supper club meal over a brick-and-mortar restaurant meal, supporting small businesses (and their farm partners) with their dollars.

"Our supper clubs are a mixture of the experimental and the staples, because there are things that we do really well," said Shridhar. "I want to make sure that people do get some of the signature Puli-Ra stuff that they've come to know and love - it might be different pickles every time, but



Shridhar, "but I am out to make food that doesn't necessarily have a voice here in Austin, and I think that's going to rub some people the wrong way.

"I'm excited to maybe build a following where you have to put your trust in a small Indian immigrant, and hopefully it will be fine, you know?" said Shridhar. "I have had to look in the mirror sometimes and think, 'Who am I gonna be?' I think it's important to constantly have that conversation, though it doesn't make you perfect. I will be the first to tell you I've made mistakes, and been stupid, but at the end of the day, I really, really, really want to be a better chef than the day before. I want to be a better person. I want to have a better company. I want to, basically, try my hardest to build something cool and great for everyone involved. I think people lose sight of that, and they get into trouble when they do - chefs treating other people badly, opening lots of chains and then those chains shutting down, a high rate of suicide and sexual harassment, all of that stuff. We refuse to acknowledge the humanity in restaurants."

On her intentions for the future, Shridhar said with a smile, "I want this brand to go as big as it can, but I want to do it in an honest way. I want there to be a reason behind expansion. I want to take on problems and take on ideas truthfully, take on business in a way that is not just based on 'Let's take over this town!' I want people to feel good about the brand Puli-Ra. I want to be the best."

Chef Shridhar's next supper club, "Hunny and Wine," will be Feb. 24 at the Austin Winery. Set to a Mariah Carey-inspired playlist, they will serve a "completely muddled" four-course menu along with the exclusive first pours of the winery's new Tempranillo. A wood-fired lamb will be the star of the show, and yes, guests can expect a little swag in their bag at the end of the night. Feed Your Inner Survivalist

LUMBER SOCIETY TEACHES ANCIENT SKILLS IN A MODERN SETTING by Jessi Cape


On a Thursday lunch break, I learned how to make fire. Or, at least, I had the privilege of observing a highly trained expert demonstrate the techniques our ancestors used to keep themselves warm, fed, and alive. The miniclass was a sneak peek of an upcoming fire-building class (normally held in the evenings) at Buzz Mill Coffee through their survival school, Lumber Society. A sort of adult version of the Boy/Girl Scouts with Camp Master Chris Hyde at the helm, they teach hands-on basic survival skills such as knife carving, plant foraging, navigation, and water purification – and because it's hosted by Buzz Mill, there are options for coffee, adult beverages, and food galore. The best part? It's free, family-friendly, and open to anyone who's interested.

As the Lumber Society origin story goes, in 2013 or so, Sean "Peppy" Meyer was hosting wilderness-centric classes at Buzz Mill and hired Hyde to teach a few. After Peppy, who now raises goats at Jester King, moved on, Hyde successfully positioned himself as director of Lumber Society. Now the founder and director of Natureversity, Hyde has a laundry list of accomplishments, including work with Alamo Area Search & Rescue, a stint as a survival consultant for Discovery Channel's Dual Survival, becoming a certified specialist wildlife tracker and first responder, contributing to Texas Parks & Wildlife, and earning the titles of Master Naturalist and Nature Guide to name a few. His skills include bow-and-arrowmaking, basket weaving, flint knapping, hide tanning, pottery crafting, primitive hunting, and pretty much anything else you'd need to know to survive the great outdoors.

"I've always been under the impression that you can reach people with wilderness skills beyond a survival school. You can do it in a bar, you can do it at a public school, you can do it wherever, but you can reach people with these skills and it kind of sparks something within them that I think is inherently within all of us. It's like the first time I give a kid a bow and arrow and they pull it back, there's like this DNA that becomes active. The first time you light a fire and see it glow, and you did that, you just want to sit there and care for it. It's like your baby."

The three pillars of the Lumber Society - education, outreach, social - are clear in all they do. There are events like trivia and game nights, plant walks, and hikes, and every month Buzz Mill creates a special, themed menu that falls in line with the class. The focus is almost always local, but to correspond with January's fire-building class, a portion of these proceeds will go to the Sierra Nevada Camp Fire Relief Fund in California. Special menu items include the Campfire Burger from Plow Burger, s'mores cupcakes from Zucchini Kill Bakery, Buzz Mill's Red Hot Mocha and Smokev the Bear the latter an old fashioned made with houseinfused whiskey, tobacco bitters, cola, and a cherry - and the George Washington cheesesteak with cherry peppers and smoked cheese from 1776 Cheesesteak Co. Sierra Nevada Brewing Co. is also donating 100% of the sales from their Resilience IPA.

Another key part of the Lumber Society equation is keeping things bioregional. "We want to keep everything local, just like Buzz Mill is so keen on doing. Not only food and drinks, but education purposes and social outreach. So within the two-square-mile radius [around the compound], there's a wide variety of resources and opportunities to help us facilitate these experiences within the community. It's what we call the



Neighborwoods." (Same goes for the upcoming Buzz Mill location on Shady Lane.)

Hyde's office/workshop/classroom is anchored by a table of oddities: a found deer carcass he tanned with leftover innards, a rescued bobcat skull, birds of prey wings, crushed pigment and beeswax crayons in a buckskin bag, arrowheads, a pressed horn spoon, handwoven baskets. He strategically arranges his essential tools and begins the lesson, Fire by Friction, with a story his friend relayed from a trip to Africa: "She asked the oldest guy - he's, like, 88 - of a particular tribe what method they used to start the fire. 'Did you rub sticks, did you get it from another tribe or lightning - how did it start?' The man says, 'I don't know how it started because when I was born, it was already

"To have that type of relationship with an element is why. I think, Lumber Society exists. It's to establish those deep roots, those deep connections, and foster and

cultivate those types of relationships with the elements that surround us. When you start decoding [our landscape], you learn, like, 'Oh, this ash tree built my bow, it heals my psoriasis, it gives me opportunities to do these things,' then there's a relationship. Then you want to protect it. I think the more people who build relationships with nature, the more apt we are to say, 'Hey, let's not destroy all of this anymore and use it for terrible things. Let's protect it."

As he speaks, people start to gather around, absorbed by his genuine enthusiasm - apparently par for the course. Attendance and participation are free until the tangible resources are exhausted, but with a purchased ticket, you're guaranteed a spot that comes with a drink ticket and a relevant take-away like a carving knife, compass, or LifeStraw. Hyde is

mic'd with a PA so that even passersby can ioin. In a recent class, people joined until the space was almost at capacity, and latecomers were encouraged to remove their own shoelaces so they, too, could have a hands-on knot-tying lesson. Every completed class also earns students a custom woven badge that is not only a great humble-brag, but a conversation starter out in the urban wild.


And that's exactly the idea: to spark interactions. Show up as a group or as an individual. About 50-60% of participants are women, and while most are adults, kids are always welcome. Hyde says, "We're not just trying to educate people, we're trying to make it a social interaction. It creates a camaraderie when you're like, 'Dude! We just rubbed some sticks together and made fire!"

When the fire officially sparks, he says, "This is a very important moment: You have literally just given birth to an element, and it is to be revered and completely treated with respect. We simply turn it upside down and begin to give it little, tiny, baby food. We can't shove hamburgers and steaks in its mouth, so we start with small baby food [like furry kindling] and we let it grow. Once it's bigger, we can begin to feed it sticks and things. And that's how to make fire."

So Hyde is definitely the guy to pair up with during the imminent zombie apocalypse, right? "Maybe," he laughs. "I might want to take out a couple of you so I can eat! But, no, really, if there was actually to be a postapocalyptic, disaster-type scenario, the Buzz Mill would be the place to go and people to hang out with because of the resources and education and experiences we provide."

On Sat., Jan 26, the Lumber Society is partnering with the Austin Fire Department for a community outreach event to complement the fire-building class on Jan. 17.











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Austin Critics Love Beale Street

AFCA ANNOUNCES 2018 AWARD WINNERS by Richard Whittaker

If Beale Street Could Talk, Barry Jenkins' adaptation of James Baldwin's novel of black life in Seventies America, has swept the major awards from the Austin Film Critics Association, including Best Film, Best Adapted Screenplay, Best Director, and Best Supporting Actress. As is often the case with the AFCA. the Best Film award and the top film in the year's top 10 films list are different, reflecting differing voting methodologies. So while Beale Street picked up Best Film, the No. 1 slot this year goes to The Favourite, Yorgos Lanthimos' crackling black comedy about the court of Queen Anne - for which Olivia Colman also picked up the award for Best Actress.

As always, the other hotly anticipated prize is the Austin Film Award, open to films either made in Austin or by filmmakers resident here during production. 

HOW COSTUME DESIGNER EDITH HEAD CHANGED THE LOOK OF HOLLYWOOD

When I was about 9 years old, I received a large picture book of old Hollywood film stills as a Christmas gift. I remember it was impossibly dense with photographs of stars in wondrous clothes from the 1910s to the 1970s, butting up against each other, jostling for the most sublime single image on the page. I spent hours and hours with that book until the pages began to fall away from the spine and spill out onto the floor whenever I opened it. These static images, frozen outside of narrative and time, represented for me an escape hatch into glamour and mystery, and a world of women with a confidence and intensity that I longed to experience within myself. I remember Marlene Dietrich, her face framed by a bewitching circle of iridescent black feathers, and Clara Bow, grinning conspiratorially in satin cloches with matching bejeweled shoes. I was unaware that I was marveling at the effort of a woman who worked determinedly behind the scenes to dress such early Hollywood luminaries.

Edith Head began her long and extraordinary career in the 1920s, mainly under the tutelage and shadow of one of the great Hollywood costume designers, Travis Banton. When she was hired at Paramount, she had zero experience designing clothes

and an uneasy proficiency in drawing the human figure. Head later claimed that she never considered herself a design genius, but she used her instincts, industry savvy, deft efficiency, and the delicate arts of compromise and diplomacy to become the most successful and prolific costume designer in Hollywood history.

One of the joys of costume lies in its transformative powers. Head was one of the great arbiters of female character transformations onscreen, changing awkward women in ill-fitting clothes into individuals confident with a new carriage and awareness, like Olivia de Havilland in The Heiress (1949); or reverse-engineering those in extraordinary circumstances who longed to be ordinary, like Audrey Hepburn's princess in Roman Holiday (1953).

Many of Head's triumphs occurred during the 1950s, after wartime restrictions on silks, nylons, and yardage were lifted, and femmes fatales in fantasy gowns gave way to stunning yet pragmatic beauty. She considered the gold tissue lamé and breezy chiffon concoctions for Alfred Hitchcock's To Catch a Thief (1955) some of her best designs. Costume budgets were often high, and gorgeous yet accessible clothes frequently reigned.

Head enjoyed collaborating and determining costume details with her actors - she did not hand down her designs as unmovable decrees. Many of her creations were not only concerned with what was right for the character and storyline, but also about making stars look incredibly beautiful. As the 20th century progressed, the demand for meticulous, conventionally elegant wardrobes and sophisticated dressing waned. Head

soldiered on, continuing to design for film characters, organize fashion shows of her costumes, and dispense dressing advice to America's mere mortals.

Edith Head would ultimately receive eight Oscars; and yet design is a group effort. There were instances when her peers felt she failed to publicly acknowledge or credit her fellow wardrobe staff - or another designer's work. As head of the design department, her industry experience and responsibilities were enormous, and she had the last word in the approval and execution of any design. Head was a designer who was widely known as a celebrity, independent of the movies she helped create, and she was protective of her persona as supreme design expert and her topmost professional position (which was precarious at times throughout her career).

The designs she either birthed or appropriated continue to surprise and entrance us. She often remarked that costumes done well could convey the storyline independently, judiciously communicating silent clues to the audience. Most importantly, these costumes remind us that clothing can act as a portal to possibility, and are not so much a second skin as the only one we show to the world.

Once Upon a Time on the Border

Thriller *Tejano* is pure Tex-Mex Noir

Javi (Mackie) is a blue-eyed Tejano working with his grandfather (Uribe) on their chicken farm in South Texas, just a few miles from the Mexican border. He frequently takes trips to Matamoros to fill prescriptions at a pharmacy where his girlfriend Lorena (Leal) works - sort of a one-stop shop - while he's saving up some cash to bring her into the U.S. They plan on starting a new life in San Antonio, but to say "Things go awry" would be an understatement, and Javi finds himself plunged into the deep end of drug trafficking for Lorena's sleazy brother Adelio (Gonzalez) and his ruthless boss Gloria (Perez-Trevino).

The film is an action-packed thriller-Western hybrid, but it takes a dreamy pace in setting up the story (the first 20 minutes or so are rather languid). In the hands of Austinbased director David Blue Garcia (a veteran cinematographer who has worked on Owen Egerton's Blood Fest and SXSW 2009 favorite Artois the Goat) Tejano offers some truly gorgeous scenes. Every frame is a painting of a border town: Lines compose shots of the desolate roadways and fields, while matching the imposing border fence. A steady constant in the background is legion of wind turbines; they set a pace and keep time as a metronome does, even when that pace eventually speeds up. The factory Gloria owns and operates (her

"legitimate" business) feels like a torture chamber, featuring machine parts - brutal, threatening tools that facilitate workplace "accidents." The story (credited to Garcia and Artois co-writer/director Kyle Bogart) is riddled with subtleties that come to light later on.

There's a scene of a shopkeeper in Matamoros with a mop and bucket cleaning blood from the sidewalk while faint mariachi music filters the boy will go further than he can. There's a

in from a distance. The effect here is twofold: A wordless detail lets on that this is a dangerous place, and it's also a foreshadowing device - blood will most certainly be spilled. There's a more obvious metaphor with Javi and his grandfather sitting on a tractor peeling oranges (not an apple, but still perhaps a fruit of knowledge), and Abuelo tells Javi he hopes snake in the grass when a bad man is killed. The story itself slithers with twists and turns and unexpected betrayals. It's almost ridiculous how many characters die in this film. The finale is more of a horror-trope ending (which recalls a bit of Blood Fest dialogue), but it's also unmistakably Western. I don't want to give it away, but somebody is bound to ride off into that breathtaking South Texas sunset.

DESTROYER

Nicole Kidman goes slumming in Destroyer, a grimy cop drama about revenge and redemption that scratches the underbelly of Southern California with dirty fingernails. It's contemporary film noir, albeit in ugly daylight. Upon first sight, police detective Erin Bell (Kidman) shambles down a Los Angeles service road with the gait of the living dead. her ghastly appearance - sallow complexion, sunken eyes, blood-drained lips - so shockingly un-Kidman you may not recognize her at first. Or maybe you do, and that's the problem. Speaking in a barely audible rasp bordering on monotone, Kidman bravely submerges

herself in a performance with some genuinely harrowing emotional moments, and yet the unswerving conviction she brings to the role is conspicuous. Unlike, say, Charlize Theron in Monster, it's an ugly-duckling turn in which you always glimpse the swan.

The screenplay by Phil Hay and Matt Manfredi is structured like a curious puzzle as it chronologically switches back and forth between Bell's obsessive present-day effort to track down the members of a gang that committed a deadly armed bank robbery 17 vears ago, and the flashbacks revealing her compromised participation in that crime as an undercover policewoman working alongside her partner and love interest, played with effortless masculinity by Stan in a fairly limited role. (He's the movie's eye candy.) What initially plays like an odd subplot involving Bell's attempts to mend a strained relationship with

her wild-child 16-year-old daughter (Pettyjohn) eventually finds a narrative purpose, as the tortured policewoman struggles to right the wrong she committed almost two decades ago. But Bell's younger, shadow self is barely developed, an enigma recalled in a fuzzy backstory that fails to illuminate the character's capability to make a bad decision that will haunt her for the rest of her days. It's a narrative defect that throws the movie off balance, one in which the today doesn't fully reconcile with the yesterday.

The movie relishes making the audience squirm whenever possible. Aside from its ribcracking and gut-punching violence, there's an unseemly scene in which a disgusted Bell gives a hand job to a dying man in return for a critical piece of information. Perhaps the mercy wank demonstrates the extent of her resolve to find the cultlike leader of the criminal posse she's pursuing, but it comes off as nothing less than icky. Director Kusama (Girlfight, The Invitation) has the chops to fulfill the ambitions of this undertaking, but even her savvy can't justify the conflated, white-light ending that's disproportionately out of whack with everything before it. As they say, whenever you draw too much attention to something, you only magnify its defects.

Few anime have had a more consistent and determined fanbase than Dragon Ball: almost 33 years; multiple TV, theatrical, manga, card, and video game iterations; and a seemingly endless and complicated continuity.

Dragon Ball Super: Broly is the 20th film in the series, and dedicated fans (of which there are plenty, of the kind that will wonder if we truly get to see a glimpse of Goku in "Ultra Instinct" state) will undoubtedly be excited. Yet for newcomers what should have been a jumping-on point is like smashing into a brick wall. Not sure of what's a dragon ball,

or where's Vegeta, or what's the difference between Planet Vegeta, King Vegeta, and Prince Vegeta IV, or why exactly archvillain Frieza wants to be exactly five centimeters taller? There are no signposts here, and every time you think you might be getting thrown a narrative bone, forget it.

So what's going on? The Saiyans (a species of intergalactic, all-conquering space apes) become enslaved by the Frieza Force – then evil cosmic dictator Frieza (Ayres) destroys the Saivan homeworld as the only possible threat to his dominance. Years later, two of the survivors, amiable Goku (Schemmel) and spoiled prince in exile Vegeta (Sabat) are on Earth, when Broly (Mignogna) appears as one of Frieza's henchmen. Another Saiyan, he'd been exiled by Vegeta's father as a baby because his own power levels were exceeding Vegeta's, so his father, Paragus (Clarke), rears him to be the tool of his vengeance.

If that sounds complicated, that's because it is - not least since Broly has appeared in previous Dragon Ball films, but they weren't in continuity, so this is the first time that it's counted. Plus, that's before getting into any of the dozens of supporting characters who turn up for a spit and a cough. Will hardened Dragon Ballers be satisfied with directionless cameos from key figures like Piccolo and Bulma? Hopefully. Yet if this film is not for them, then it's hard to tell exactly who DBS: Broly is aimed at. The underlying narrative theme of sons who become greater - and better men - than their fathers is underdeveloped. Meanwhile, the animation feels oddly dated, as the decision to give visual continuity to three and a half decades of storytelling reinforces this as fan service. Still, with this many fans, is that a problem?

As for the rest of us, as Cheelai says, "I basically don't understand a single thing vou've said this whole time.'

ESCAPE ROOM

As far as months go. January is not particularly kind to studio horror films. Insidious: The Last Key underwhelmed in 2018, as did The Bye Bye Man in 2017, as did The Boy the year before that, and on, and on, and on, Even if January releases offer fans an opportunity to form their own opinions - avoiding the consensus-building that often happens in the wake of major film festivals - the juice here is rarely worth the squeeze.

So how will horror fans receive Escape Room, a film that promises little but packs a surprisingly effective punch? Zoey (Russell) is a college student with a head for puzzles and an empty social calendar. When she receives a cryptic invitation to participate in a new escape room, she finds herself among an odd assortment of teammates. One (Daredevil's Woll) is a former soldier looking for peace; another (Miller) is a local burnout just looking for a way to clear his head. As the full group discovers that this particular escape room is more dangerous than it looks, they must work together to survive, even if it means sharing their own personal traumas.

Given the formula the film seems determined to run with - a social trend already past its prime combined with an underwhelming PG-13 rating - it's easy to think you have Escape Room figured out. Not so fast. Adam Robitel, director of the aforementioned Insidious film, has created a multiplex-friendly version of Cube, right down to the mathematical puzzles and the moments of selfsacrifice. On top of that, Robitel and his production team manage to turn each separate room into a thrilling set-piece. The highlight is the third room, an upside-down pool hall with a collapsible floor that requires the survivors to climb their way across jukeboxes and bookshelves to find the clues. From a purely visual point of view, Escape Room is worth the price of admission.

What cements the film's status as a rocksolid studio horror release is the acting. While few cast members are recognizable outside of genre television shows, their collective talent creates a group of misfits likable enough to give the film bona fide emotional stakes; while the cast is without a weak link, Woll and the criminally underappreciated Labine are especially strong. And in rooting each character's backstory to his or her physical environment, Escape Room does something often forgotten by second-tier horror films: It makes people's reactions to life-or-death situations a direct response to the trauma they've overcome. By the time characters are forced to make hard decisions, everything feels like a natural extension of what we know about them, not a moment reverse-engineered for a set-piece.

Sure, Escape Room is not perfect, even by studio horror standards. The movie spends a bit too much time explaining in its final minutes while simultaneously setting itself up for a bigger and louder franchise. But if you're looking to cleanse your palate after December's litany of prestigious releases, you could do a helluva lot



Modest Heroes isn't really a film, or even a full-fledged anthology. Instead, it's a showcase for the nascent Studio Ponoc. Founded in 2015, the Japanese animation house pulled heavily on Studio Ghibli veterans (such as The Secret World of Arrietty director Hiromasa Yonebayashi) at a time when the venerable anime studio was restructuring in the wake of the (admittedly brief) retirement of Hayao Miyazaki. Ponoc's first full feature, Yonebayashi's Mary and the Witch's Flower, really felt like a Ghibli legacy project, a fantastical reimagining of a British children's novel (as with Arrietty and Howl's Moving Castle), which is why Modest Heroes really feels like the studio's first strike out into fresh territory.

Yonebayashi directs the first and argu-

ably safest installment, "Kanini & Kanino," a delightful tale that feels closest to his own Ghibli instincts. The adventure takes place in a small pond - which is a whole world. if you're tiny enough. A family of miniature people live under the water and in the rocks, avoiding the fish that patrol the shallows and hunting with spears made of crab claws. The merfolk speak a kind of gibberish, so the English language version keeps the original Japanese voice track, with Kimura as big brother Kanini and Suzuki as sibling Kanino. When their father is seemingly snapped up by a dead-eyed fishy predator, it's up to these two young warriors to step up and save the day.

It's the second chapter that feels like a break with the past. "Life Ain't Gonna Lose" (aka "Samurai Eggu") is a small family drama: Shun (Shinohara in the original version. Kaufman in the English dub) is a gradeschool kid with a life-threatening allergy to eggs, one from which his mother (Ono, with Divergent's Maggie Q as the anglophonic analog) struggles to keep him safe. That may not sound like big stakes, but this is a child who can't even eat a cookie without inspecting the ingredients list. After nearly 50 years behind the scenes, veteran animator-turned-director Momose delivers a short story that isn't just gorgeous but also an incredibly delicate piece of storytelling. In just a few tiny flourishes, he explains Mom's loving frustrations with the son for whom she put her dreams of dancing aside, or how Shun's classmates try to get him to be less afraid of the world.

Wrapping up the trio is the most narratively experimental and mature segment. "Invisible" is Yamashita's look at - or rather through - the life of a salaryman, the kind of mild-mannered figure who disappears into the background. In the case of the eponymous invisible man (Odagiri/O'Brien), that's literally true: He's an empty suit, ignored by his workmates and held to the ground only by a fire extinguisher. He could be blown away by one of his own heavy sighs, until a moment of heroism means he's finally seen by someone else.

That's where the title that binds this slight collection together comes in. Whether they're small, or young, or shy, these are all truly stories of modest heroes, their little braveries filling the screens as much as grand theatrics would. At the same time, the writer/ directors all give something unique - both visually and from a storytelling viewpoint and that's a bold and heartening sign for Ponoc's future.

Octogenarian star/director Clint Eastwood plays Earl, just your average folk who basically stumbles into running millions of dollars worth of drugs for a Mexican cartel. How'd that happen? Well, as the film (based on a New York Times story) tells it, he basically fell into it. The need for income eventually outweighs the risks, but isn't that how it often goes? With the requisite scenes of diners and Waffle Houses, the anticipation of his eventual fall is both something to look forward to, and yet something to lament. For all of the film's gloss of cartel bad guys with their elaborate and menacing facial hair, and the inevitable showdown that has to happen, this is a movie about people caught up in doing things for the wrong reasons. We Travel the Spaceways

SUN RA'S COSMIC JAZZ EPIC SPACE IS THE PLACE TOUCHES DOWN by Kahron Spearman

As the hero of the 1974 underground classic *Space Is the Place*, the late, esoteric, and polarizing jazz legend **Sun Ra** elucidates new possibilities to a set of disbelieving black youth in Oakland, who remain dubious as to why some new-age galactic pharaoh has any interest in their collective future. One young man questions if what he sees and hears is authentic, to which the Afrofuturist icon, in kind, suggests himself as a grand parable. "I don't come to you as reality," the alien to you as a myth, because that's

what black people are - myths." 4K @AFS Cinema. 6406 N. I-35 #3100. While drawing from Gnostic Jan. 11-12, 15. Fri., notions, Pan-African systems, Zen, 9:30pm; Sat., 9pm; and various mysticism sets, the Tue., 7pm. bulk of Ra's evolving "equation," as he called it, included the black struggle for freedom that had been fought for with vigor through the Civil Rights era. However, this had changed by 1970. Per John F. Szwed's biography, Space Is the Place: The Lives and Times of Sun Ra, the enigma (born Herman Poole Blount, in Birmingham, Ala.) didn't believe that black people could muster up the fortitude necessary for true freedom. "I couldn't approach black people with the truth because they like lies. ... At one time I felt that white people

were to blame for everything, but then I found out that they were just puppets and pawns of some greater force, which has been using them. ... Some force is having a good time [manipulating black and white people] and looking, enjoying itself in a reserved seat, wondering, 'I wonder when they're going to wake up.'"

By the time the **John Coney**-directed film and its accompanying soundtrack were made in 1972, Ra believed enough in black/human

salvation to star in and co-write the feature. The base plot sees Sun Ra, as an intergalactic traveler, matching wits with the Overseer (**Ray Johnson**) – a black overlord symbiote who functions as a symbolic establishment pimp-as-protector of white

supremacy. The game? A multidimensional tarot card game for the souls of black folk. The hokeyness begins early: The free jazz cacophony from a mystery piano man's solo in a Chicago club causes broad pandemonium. However, it becomes the announcement of Sun Ra's arrival to Earth, as the black man's guiding light who's found a resettlement planet for future generations.

Though Ra's **Arkestra** is shown and heard throughout, there are grounded rhythms and



rhymes everywhere. A black reporter (**Christopher Brooks**) has a proto-rap in his announcement of Ra's arrival via spaceship: "This is Jimmy Fey, Channel Five, stone jive, the all-black station for all black people, with all the news that grooves at noon." Perhaps the essential character in the film, Fey represents black entertainers and industry heads, co-opted by normalized white-led capitalism. Of course, all the while, two government agents plot to steal the hero's technology.

Like blaxploitation protagonists John Shaft

and Sweetback before him, Sun Ra's aim remains racial equity, and the space-age camp and effects and cheesy B-movie sci-fi added considerably to the genre. The use of space, vis-à-vis music as a vehicle, as the future speaks volumes, as Sun Ra's movie image stands nihilistic about the world's chances, especially those of its black people. "If the planet takes hold of an alter-destiny, there's hope for anyone. But otherwise the death sentence upon this planet still stands – everyone must die."

At 24 years old. Nadia Murad is a survivor. A member of the Yazidi faith - a pre-Islam religion whose practitioners are frequently the subject of religious violence Murad was uprooted from her northern Iraq village when ISIS forces invaded and murdered most of her familv. From there. Murad was enslaved and subjected to repeated sexual assaults before escaping; in her life as a refugee, she found her voice as an activist who worked tirelessly to raise public awareness for the plight of the Yazidi people. On Her Shoulders asks us to follow Murad in hellish loop of interviews and public speaking events on behalf of the Yazidi, reliving moments of personal trauma in the hope that government officials might legislate on her peoples' behalf. ON THE BASIS OF SEX

The second film about Supreme Court Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg in less than a year (after documentary RBG) forgoes the traditional biopic formula for a tidy, well-acted courtroom drama centered on Moritz v. Commissioner of Internal Revenue, the 1970 case that kicked off her decades-long career fighting against gender-based discrimination and for equal rights. Firsttime scriptwriter Daniel Stiepleman is keenly aware of the current #MeToo climate. As Ruth (Jones) is practicing for the courtroom, there's a knowing wink to audiences as her male cohorts suggest that she smile at the judges. Jones makes a fine Ginsburg - especially in the mouth, lips pursed expectantly - but something in Hammer's resigned manner paints husband Marty as ineffectual rather than stoic, and the chemistry between them is bland. More emotionally manipulative than RBG, it's another effort to solidify her sainthood, and a biting piece of herstory that we need right now. (01/04/2019)

SPIDER-MAN: INTO THE SPIDER-VERSE

Exit Peter Parker, the original Spider-Man. Enter his successor, Miles Morales, a 13-year-old kid from Brooklyn with an African-American father and a Puerto Rican mother, Just as Sam Raimi's Spider-Man II caught the classic 1960s Spidey, so Spider-Man: Into the Spider-Verse is exactly the Spider-Man movie we need now. The New York of Miles (Moore) is vibrant, splashed with color and dominated by the Kingpin (Schreiber). He's busy ripping a hole in the space-time continuum for his own reasons, but fortunately that same rift provides Miles with the allies he needs: the Spider-persons (and, in one case, pig) of other dimensions. Directors Bob Persichetti, Peter Ramsey, and Rodney Rothman have shepherded an extraordinary animated take on the Marvel universe that's gritty and lush, shadowy and colorful, epic and intimate - kind of like Miles Morales' NYC. Can you blame Adam McKay for turning from antic comedies like Anchorman: The Legend of Ron Burgundy to a savage political tract like 2015's The Big Short? He surely isn't the only one of us whose sense of humor has soured since Trump took office. In Vice, as he details Dick Cheney's shadow reign inside the 43rd president's administration, and the American people's willingness to turn a blind eye - everything is heavier: the stakes, and the filmmaker's hand. Christian Bale makes an asset of his tendency toward remoteness to play the cipher-like Cheney, capturing him in a way that feels almost molecular. It's one of the few subtle elements here, but McKay makes it clear that the time for a light touch is well behind us. Maybe the moment really does call for a bludgeon. (12/21/2018)

Pop Goes the Arts District

A large, empty swath of land sits behind an **H-E-B** near the intersection of Riverside Drive and Pleasant Valley Road. It's planned to house a new "**Pop-Up Riverside Arts District**," which was supposed to be up and running by Jan 1. Or at least that's what **Sun Radio** Founder **Daryl O'Neal** was told

when his station entered into an agreement with **Austin Creative Alliance** and the **Presidium Group** last year.

The partners have now informed O'Neal they face roadblocks from the city over the wind resistance of the planned structures, and are estimating a delay of three to six months. "The Pop" multibuilding complex planned to utilize temporary tent struc-

tures with enforced interior walls to occupy the site until permanent buildings were constructed, which would then be called the Riverside Arts District. Local groups including Austin Creative Alliance, **Pump Project**, **Soundwaves Art Foundation**, and **Tapestry Dance Company** announced plans to move to the district.

Located at 1600 S. Pleasant Valley, the lot's been vacant for over two years and now

stands as an ideological stomping ground for concerns over art space affordability, out-of-town developers, and anti-gentrification activism. O'Neal sums it up as "uniquely Austin, the entire situation," given that the project faces a boycott from local activist organization **Defend Our Hoodz**, which opposes Presidium.

Backed by L.A. investment firm **Nimes Capital**, the development company currently owns the **Ballpark Apartments**, four complexes that provide affordable housing for students and families.

The apartments could be destroyed if plans move forward for a new, **Domain**-style development on East Riverside.

"It isn't the art that matters to Presidium," shares Defend Our Hoodz member **Jessica Meza**, a student resident at Ballpark. "It's the look of the neighborhood that they want to promote. Then, they can push me and my neighbors out of our affordable living to bring in new **Oracle** employees and tech workers. All the connections that [the arts district] has throughout the city make it essentially the perfect aggregation of the gentrifying force that we have to fight."



Ahead of the **East Austin Studio Tour** in November, a large tent sponsored by Presidium appeared on the site to host arts events throughout the week. Defend Our Hoodz later celebrated the tent's removal on social media, but developers say it was planned to be taken down before construction began. Local artists, including musicians **Black Joe Lewis, Street Sects**, and **Smiile**, among others, signed onto the group's boycott. DJ collective **Chulita Vinyl Club** and cumbia artist **Kiko Villamizar** dropped out of an early-December **Almost Real Things**hosted "block party" in the temporary tent, which ceded the event to another venue.

While activists oppose the Riverside Arts District for ushering out area affordability, many of the district's future tenants cite rising rents and lease cutoffs elsewhere as their reason for relocating. Pump Project left their East Austin location after the building was sold, and O'Neal says the rent offered by Presidium is around half of what they paid for their previous station in Bee Cave. Due to the building delays, Sun Radio is now operating out of a conference room in the upscale **Edison** apartments, owned by Presidium.

Staff scrambled to relocate the station after their previous lease ended with 2018.

"Austin makes billions of dollars leveraging the art in our community, but there's no formal plans for these artists or anyone that supports them to live, work, and stay in the city," says O'Neal. "This district is trying to create an environment where the live music capital of the world can support artists, because the government certainly isn't doing it. There aren't a lot of choices out there."

Flipping the Record

Kana Harris' earliest memories are of taking apart her mom's CDs to memorize the liner notes. In high school, the media junkie toted a DJ's vinyl carrying bag to go buy records during lunch. Frontwoman of established local punk act **Xetas**, Harris now manifests that obsessive love into a new vinyl outpost. **Bluebonnet Records** opens early this spring in Lockhart's town square, adding to the community of music capital expats.

"When I started working at a record store, I was like, 'Oh my God, this is where I need to be,'" the Austin native recalls of her years managing at **Waterloo Records**. "When you're that kind of nerd, all your skills are useless in the normal world. To have someone come in and be like, 'Can I hum a song and you tell me what it is?' I get a thrill out of that."

The bassist/singer also observed the pitfalls of record collecting culture "worshiping the same five rock bands." While her shop will buy and sell used vinyl, Harris wants to emphasize new releases, as well as hip-hop and regional Texas music. She's building up stock on Lockhart-born Tejano legend **Augustin Ramirez** and adds "to sum it up, yes, I will have **Willie Nelson**, but I will probably push **Barbara Lynn** on you."

Harris resides in Lockhart with her partner **Cody Kimbell**, guitarist/vocalist of **Super Thief**. As a former elementary music teacher, he'll help out with community engagement efforts, including an electronic beat-making lab for local youth. "More musical librarian than salesperson," Harris plans to continue booking and assisting with music events at other Lockhart businesses. At Bluebonnet Records' small space, she hopes to curate a judgment-free zone for musical discovery.

"**Spotify** wins because people are too scared to interact and seem uncool," she says. "In my mind, the promise of a place where that won't ever happen is the ideal record store experience. That would be a destination for me."



BUT WHY BONNIE?

By the time they made it to Philly for a midtour basement gig, Austin dream-pop quintet **Why Bonnie** felt pretty blah. Despite sniffles, the stopover on the band's summer tour found a fan in a friend of indie rock wiz kid **Lindsey Jordan**, aka **Snail Mail**. Apparently, the Austinites' lush, melancholic tunes left a good impression.

Why Bonnie ultimately landed an opening spot with the rising guitar star for five out-of-state dates in early December. Every show sold out.

"On the plane, it was one of those sobering moments when you're literally realizing your dreams," adds **Blair Howerton**, provider of the locals' potent songwriting, billowing lead vox, and guitar accompaniment. "With music, you have to take every success as an achievement."

Why Bonnie reunites with Snail Mail on Jan. 19 at the **Mohawk**, and tickets went fast. Happily, the cap city crew brings its bright, bustling pop to **Cheer Up Charlies** this Sat., Jan. 12, for the release of **Peach Bloom Records**' *Lonestar: A Texas Friends & Family Compilation*. The statewide sadcore tape is assembled by **Alex Montenegro** of Dallas act **Skirts**, which joins Why Bonnie and local songwriting aesthete **Fuvk** for the show.

Howerton's band put out two excellent EPs in 2018 with NOLA mini-operation **Sports Day Records**. Latest *Nightgown* presents a grab-bag of the frontwoman's amassed songwriting material. She recorded lo-fi smidgen "In Parking Lots" solo years ago, before rounding up her current troupe of guitarist **Sam Houdek (Growl)**, bassist **Chance Williams (Dude Elsberry)**, drummer **Mitch Lamon**, and her lifelong best friend **Kendall Powell** on synth.

"For the longest time I was like, 'I don't want to be just another sad girl with a guitar," shares Howerton, reflecting on her postcollege jump to start a band. "Maybe that's what I was for a while, but if you work towards envisioning something bigger, you can surprise yourself."

FREE WEEK LIVE SHOTS

ABHI THE NOMAD, THE BISHOPS, MAGNA CARDA Stubb's, Jan. 3

Beginning with a line running down the block, Thursday night inside at Stubb's delivered a clear confirmation: Austin has caught on to Abhi the Nomad. Before rapper Abhi Sridharan Vaidehi, 25, kicked off a midnight set, Austin MC Megz Kelli and producer Dougie Do practiced soulful genre-bending as Magna Carda. Sibling synergists Cara and Troy Bishop followed by finding fresh, electronic footing without brother Chris in the mix.

To start, Abhi the Nomad requested sing-along backup to mask a sore throat. Settling into "Mama Bling," nonchalant opener to 2018 debut Marbled, the charismatic Spotify sensation needed zero assistance. Even so, a sizable chunk of the packed audience knew all the words.

Channeling the quirky magnetism of Childish Gambino, the MC freestyled effortlessly. Backed by drummer Poopie Sanchez and guitarist Travis Brown's hair-flipping energy, the natural performer held sway on the sold-out mass, which at his command bent down low before a sunny production buildup. Croons on "Somebody to Love" offered irresistible pop hooks, while hard lines in "Run" employed darker, hypnotic beats.

Abhi Vaidehi's 2019 is sure to be interstellar.

GRIVO, GLASSING, DEEP CROSS, ELL Beerland, Jan. 2

Walking the genre lines of heavy sonic expression, four local acts endeavored surprising plays in beauty and brutality.

Striking duo Ell alloyed sensitivity and doom, their self-proclaimed "precious metal" serving as opener. Synchronized by matching fluffy beards, duet Deep Cross processed avant-garde industrialism, endorsed by dark Austin collective Somatic. Queasy breakdowns drudged along under a drum machine's contrasting high tint, all sound eventually folding into ambient tones.

Metal trio Glassing packed the Wednesday night house, providing the engagement, theatricality, and the black garments you'd expect for such glamorously abrasive tracks. Roaring, hyper savagery settled easily into pensive space, united under bassist Dustin Coffman's resounding vocal hiss. Escalating throughout, the frontman made it a thing that he was beefing with the venue's sound engineer.

Holodeck Records delivery Grivo ended the second night of Free Week comparatively subdued, their slowcore distillations framed elegantly by warm, fluttering floodlights. Even in singer/guitarist Timothy Heck's most expansive shoegaze moments, the precise trio remained locked in by reassuring, straightforward drum and bass. Lending a steady hand to post-punk fans amid metal adornments, the group left the largest impact using the evening's simplest elements. - Rachel Rascoe

NINE MILE RECORDS SHOWCASE

Cheer Up Charlies, Jan. 3

Nine Mile Records amassed an admirable block of local releases over the past two years, so Cheer Up's double stages kept fast clip with a buffet sampling of the homegrown label's ranging roster.

Michael Booher's namesake quintet Booher unloaded edgy, tightly wound indie rock fairly bursting behind its frontman, who slid over to guitar in support of A. Sinclair's swirling,

city-bleached pop jams. Inside, Girling teased second EP Side One by blasting earnest but bitter odes reminiscent of Beulah and early Wilco facing off in divorce court. Löwin's building riff roar followed, lifted by Sarah Houser's vocals burning both breathy and powerful.

Tinnarose proved the night's most intriguing outfit. The septet capitivated behind two dancers syncing to Devon McDermott's high trill and the troupe's rhythm jams. As the Oysters closed outside, ripping early-Saddle Creek angst, the indoor stage roiled pop fury atop Go Fever's hooks and frontwoman Acey Monaro's Blondie edge on next month's extended play, Daydream Hawker.

The Reputations capped the showcase with a 25-minute blowout, Rockyanne Bullwinkel strutting the stage and into the crowd like Tina Turner as the sextet's psych-infused gutter glam screamed Austin's next breakout.

VAMPYRE, PLEASURE VENOM, BORZOI, **CHROMAGNUS**

Hole in the Wall, Jan. 5

Vampyre's a sadomasochistic exercise in violent volume and noisy brutality.

Where heavy, math-rocking openers Chromagnus aired songs with discernible melodies, Vampyre uncorked an unrelenting assault. It's literally white noise over a pummeling beat that left ears screaming a high C into the next day and physical bruising akin to having been taken out back and beaten with a two-by-four. The young audience loved it.

Midslot, Borzoi soundchecked with guitarist Zachary Wood pulling a Buzzcocks riff out of his Strat, then covered David Bowie's "Boys Keep Swinging" halfway through their kinetic set. Around these signposts, their turbo-boosted brace of a debut LP, last fall's aggro-funk A Prayer for War, revealed Taylor Browne's bass as the trio's lead instrument. On the literal and vocal percussion of singer/drummer Rhys Woodruff, Borzoi earned its mosh pit.

Pleasure Venom, now 4, essayed a vicious punk more Sonic Youth than the Ramones coated in feminist bile. The latter shot came courtesy of Audrey Campbell, whose wailing vocals and riot grrrl Tina Turner presence makes her the most compelling local frontperson that underground Austin's experienced since Sincola's Rebecca Cannon. Please welcome cap city punk's new star. - Tim Stegall

BLACKIE, INGEBRIGT HÅKER FLATEN, BLK OPS North Door, Jan. 5

Death metal, jazz, and industrial hip-hop slayed the North Door last Saturday, beginning with Austin's Blk Ops. Theremin abuser Champ Morgan hit himself in the face a few times before shouting in a low growl. That matched the emotional lead of Houston's Doula and Austin act Black Mercy's electroindustrial rock.

Experimental and avant-jazz, Ingebrigt Håker Flaten beat his electric bass guitar with a drumstick (wooden, not poultry) for

ZETTAJOULE, TROUBLE IN THE STREETS, SMIILE, CARRIE FUSSELL, ALI HOLDER

Swan Dive, Jan. 4

Behind a humble stage show of one drummer and her electric guitar, song siren Ali Holder ruminated on regret, disappointment, and Geminis in a warm, Southern voice. Standout went to her cover of Creedence Clearwater Revival's "Born on the Bayou," here softly strummed with grimy distortion. Carrie Fussell then ignited a full venue with charmed songcraft ("Kitty of the Year") and dynamic, soulful singing, her husband on drums and fellow chanteuse Lolita Lynne on bass before her own haunting set.

Smiile's musicians and two dancing vocalists plowed through rock, blues, and jazz influences next. The steady buzz builders' only musical constant proved their exuberant notes. Trouble in the Streets followed with fest-friendly electro, live drums, and Nnedi Nebula Agbaroji rapping self-acceptance. Finally, Zettajoule recalled the on-sale Peach Fuzz nude calendar in the corner, repeating "We are all vibrators" before Matthew Sheffer and Meggan Carney played 20 minutes of noisy, ad-libbed dance music and polished pop from 2018's Always Looking Up. "Posh Boys" sounded like an update of 1982 Taco hit "Puttin' on the Ritz" sans harpsichord, "Done With U" funneled the underwater vocal feel of Unknown Mortal Orchestra, and "No Thank You" vibrated Ladytron inspiration. - Christina Garcia

half an hour between thrash bands. Founder of Austin's Sonic Transmissions Festival, the Norwegian then sawed his double bass like a violin, slapped the instrument open-hand, scratched up the strings with various small objects, and all but bit the neck. Håker Flaten let his last effect die out slowly to the soft clanging of metal spatulas from the kitchen of Pueblo Viejo.

Houston's Blackie, born Michael LaCour, stood with the audience in a circle of darkness for his industrial hip-hop set. He shouted to the void and traded places with his saxophone on the floor, blowing it quickly before Håker Flaten took the stage again to add his free improvisations to the noisy punk set that delivered a couple folks to the napkin holders for improvised earplugs. - Christina Garcia

NOLAN POTTER'S NIGHTMARE BAND, TEMPLE OF ANGELS HIDDEN RITUAL, BOŔZOI, ANCIENT RIVER Hotel Vegas, Jan. 6

Though not presented by Levitation, last Sunday's deft mix of traditionalist psychedelia and psych-adjacent music operated

at Hotel Vegas in full effect. Sporting long hair, beards, denim, and bandannas, opener Ancient River looked like transplants from another time. The local group's shifts from jazzy Sixties jamming to Seventies acid crunch sealed the deal.

Borzoi couldn't have presented a bigger contrast. Except for a preoccupation with reverb, the threesome's dissonant postpunk - more a series of controlled explosions than song performances - shared nothing in common with their neo-hippie predecessors. Levitation favorite Hidden Ritual split the difference with spacey acid-pop that evolved over the course of 30 minutes into the dreamy side of Brit post-punk.

Fighting both lead singer illness and an unfortunately muddy mix, fivepiece Temple of Angels did its best to reach the rafters, building a sonic wall equal parts Pornography-era Cure and early Cult. Afterward, Nolan Potter's Nightmare Band, fronted by its flute-slinging bandleader, cast the widest net, blending jazz, hard rock, and acid pop into a phantasmagoria that revived that late-Sixties point where psychedelia mutated into prog rock. If psychedelia remains, as Jim DeRogatis once wrote, music that takes you to another place, NPNB delivered a wild galactic trip. - Michael Toland

KEELED SCALES SHOWCASE Beerland, Jan. 6

Keeled Scales' stacked Sunday evening Free Week bill at Beerland stayed true to the local label's ethos, showcasing a spectrum of songwriting. The start of the crowded evening skewed country; guitarist/vocalist Lizzie Buckley played Fifties breeziness with a lovesick twang, while Alex Dupree's deep voice reverberated through forthright lyricism and acoustic guitar brilliance. Monterrey, Mexico, quintet Oak Sun meandered folk-pop punctured by quivering accordion.

Daphne Tunes' slick, polished sheen of guitar rock drew warmth from a genuine sweetness, affability heightened via Josh Halpern's expressive drumming. Sun June teased their too-short set as their last 'til SXSW. but made it count. Helmed by Laura Colwell's expressive voice, the quintet mainly culled from the nuanced wistfulness of 2018's Years, sprinkling in new tracks including earworm "Singing."


Neil Lord's experimental Future Museums took the stage as a fivepiece nearing 1am, churning out a single, driving, 30-minute instrumental of drones and whirs. Anchored by an unwavering drum beat, the amalgamation of synths, pedals, and guitars held the remaining attendees rapt, like being submerged in an electronics tide pool. The cinematic intensity slowly came undone, petering out, the magic permeating Beerland shattered in typical Free Week fashion by an unruly attendee hollering, "One more song!" - Libby Webster



DaveFest 4

KICK BUTT COFFEE, FRIDAY 11 & SATURDAY 12

One of the ultimate mensches of Austin music, Dave Prewitt's been recording and disseminating live footage of local bands since 1986 and he's never tried to squeeze a penny out of anyone.

"I've actively avoided making any kind of money off it and still turn down employment in the field because it would kill my passion." admits the videographer and cable access personality behind CapZeveZ and Raw Time (1990-2007) and current host for ATX acts via DaveTV on Austin Public Access.

An enduring veteran of local DIY media, Prewitt's programs embody an unpretentious fan perspective on Austin music. For that, bands revere him. So much so that in 2015, Dereck Todd from scum punks Worthless Humans organized the first DaveFest, a fundraiser to cover the costs of DaveTV's production fees, against the wishes of Prewitt, who avoids asking for handouts.

Turns out there's plenty of homegrown artists eager to help raise money for DaveTV, so DaveFest became an annual benefit with two days of diverse lineups reflecting Prewitt's allover-the-map musical proclivities. The fourth iteration sponsors 27 bands on two stages this weekend at Kick Butt Coffee. Donations go to production fees and upgrading audiovisual gear.

"Everything we get, we put back into the show to try to get to the next level," says Prewitt.

Friday's lineup yields performances from Adrian & the Sickness/Beaux Cheveux frontwoman Adrian Conner (8:30pm), psych-punk quartet the **Dead Coats** (9:30pm), grinding crossover thrash act Hellfury (11:30pm), and punk 'n' roll ruffians Worm Suicide (1am). Night two summons former local anti-folk rambler

Hamell on Trial (7:30pm), whose excellent October LP, The Night Guy at the Apocalypse: Profiles of a Rushing Midnight, sounds like Shel Silverstein singing inner city tales of drugs and robbery that'd make Jim Carroll blush. For Prewitt, it'll be momentous.

"Hamell brought my infant child on TV in his arms in 1995," he recalls. "On Saturday, my son's band, Burn Ban, plays right after him, which will be cool for me."

DaveFest's Saturday bill also promises the acoustic prog of **Stupid Drama** (7pm), street-punk standouts Sniper 66 (10pm), witch-metal bashers Thunderhag (10:30pm), church-burning honky-tonkers the **Beaumonts** (11pm), pop-punkers the Butts (12mid), and H-Town freight folk favorites Days N Daze (12:30am).

- (6) Projects similar to those listed in (1) (5) above; and
- (7) Payment of costs associated with constructing and financing the public improvements listed in (1) (6) above, including costs of establishing, administering, and operating the District.

PROPOSED DISTRICT BOUNDARIES

The District is proposed to include approximately 324.695 acres of land located approximately in the southwest corner of the intersection of State Highway 71 and State Highway 130, and entirely within the corporate limits of the City of Austin as depicted on the inset map.

PROPOSED METHOD OF ASSESSMENT

Additionally, a report will be prepared showing the special benefits accruing to property in the District and how the costs of the public improvements are assessed to property on the basis of the special benefits. The assessment methodology will result in each parcel within the District that is subject to assessment paying its fair share of the costs of the public improvements provided with the assessments based on the special benefits received by the property from the public improvements and property equally situated paying equal shares of the costs of the public improvements.

PROPOSED APPORTIONMENT OF COSTS BETWEEN THE DISTRICT AND TRAVIS COUNTY

Travis County will not be obligated to provide any funds to finance the Authorized Improvements. All of the costs of the proposed public improvements will be paid by assessments of the property within the District and from other sources of funds, if any, available to the owner of the property within the District; however, no property owned by Travis County in the District shall be assessed. Any costs incurred by Travis County in administering the PID application and oversight process will be reimbursed through the assessment levied against property included within the District.
