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

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
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BIRDS, BEES, & BUTTERFLIES

Dear Editor,

As spring approaches, forgo spraying your lawn for mosquitoes to preserve our birds. bees and butterflies! Mosquitoes are annoving when enjoying the backyard, but treatment sprays kill almost all insects, including bees and butterflies. Killing off these insects reduces the food available to hungry birds trying to raise chicks. According to the National Wildlife Federation, "Most residential mosquito control companies use insecticides known as pyrethrins ... these are broad-spectrum insecticides that are highly toxic to a wide variety of insects, not just mosquitoes." As wilderness is ever reducing, your yard can be an important haven for nature. Mosquito treatments turn your yard into an ecological desert. Instead, put on some repellent, plant native flowers and enjoy the bees, butterflies and birds that will be attracted to your yard. Future of STEM Needs Collaboration and Diverse Voices

An estimated 400,000 people made their way to the Texas capital for the first in-person South by Southwest Conference since 2019. With high-profile tech executives, political thought leaders, and influencers in attendance, the Conference has outlined five key themes, including "the power of inclusivity."

It's important to commend SXSW's stance on "incorporating diverse viewpoints [that] will help lead us to a better society." However, we must ask ourselves the following: What can Texans do to ensure that we are truly tapping into the next generation's full potential in science, technology, engineering, and math (STEM) relat-

ed fields to foster a long-term environment that embraces diverse perspectives and experiences? The World Economic Forum's

"Future of Jobs" report found that "STEM subjects and soft skills like analytical thinking will be key for the jobs of tomorrow." However, the U.S. currently ranks 22nd among developed countries for mean science, reading, and math scores. Further, on average, 60% of U.S. employers take more than four months to fill STEM career openings.

That could change if businesses and local leaders continue to invest in STEMrelated education for Gen Z and young girls. Locally, there are too few programs that exist to empower young women and girls – specifically women of color – in STEM fields.

To help bridge the gap and to offer accessible and affordable education, I founded Latinitas, a nonprofit that empowers all girls to innovate through media and technology with a vision to create courageous leaders.

We offer girl-oriented camps, afterschool programs, one-day conferences focused on innovation, coding, and journalism certification programs for teens and Texas' only all-Latina robotics team – all focused on fostering positive self-esteem. With a variety of enriching experiences, girls discover their voice and use media and technology skills, skill sets that transcend all industries, to explore culture, identity, social justice, and more.

Even though 1 out of 6 American children are Latinx, to this day, our organization is the only bilingual STEM education program in Travis County and one of only a few nationally. As we tell our students, you can't be what you can't see. They need role models and mentors because we want them to be creators – not just consumers.

To effectively change the narrative, businesses and local leaders should collaborate to break through existing economic gaps and cultural stigmas so these young women can see their role models in action. While the pandemic made

in-person learning difficult for many

throughout the country, social media played a crucial role in sustaining and furthering our mission of building community allies and connections. We were able to utilize Meta's Ads for Local Impact program to amplify fundraising efforts on Facebook and promote local events. And we built out our virtual events, allowing Latinitas to reach thousands of young women in more than 25 states and five countries far beyond our traditional reach in Central Texas.

For our city and state to meet the demand of fulfilling

STEM jobs in the years to come, it will take all of us working together to ensure that students – regardless of race, ethnicity, or gender – are not forgotten.

It's personal for me. Whether it's through Latinitas or another organization that supports underrepresented communities, I implore business leaders and local officials to invest in the next generation of our workforce to create a sustainable and equitable future.

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

PAXTON STRIKES AGAIN Texas State Attorney General Ken Paxton directed his ire at Austin ISD Tuesday. March 22. saving in a letter to the district that holding Pride Week violated state law that restricts sex education. AISD Supt. Stephanie Elizaide took to Twitter to say she wants all LGBTQIA students to know AISD is proud of them and "will protect them against political attacks."

SIXTH STREET SHOOTING Four people were shot and sustained minor injuries on the 400 block on Sixth Street around 2am Sunday, March 20. The attack came nine months after the Sixth Street shooting that killed one and injured 13 and six months after "constitutional carry" went into effect in Texas. Austin Police Association President Ken Casaday said police had already made 31 arrests and seized 19 firearms Downtown, according to the Statesman.

STARBUCKS UNIONS STEAM AHEAD Starbucks




IT AIN'T NECESSARILY SO Gov. Greg Abbott and DPS

ONSTAGE WITH EV NATION

The SXSW transportation track, of which Buttigieg's town hall at the Convention Center was the midpoint, came after most conferees had switched their brains into film and music mode, and the panel I moderated on Friday. March 18, was at the very end of a five-day slog. So my three panelists and I (two entrepreneurs, one

U.S. Dept. of Transportation expert) expected an audience in the low double digits but were pleasantly surprised at how many people wanted to hear about the rapid evolution of charging infrastructure for electric vehicles, and what we need to do now to make sure people have enough confidence in chargeability to overcome "range anxiety" and buy a plug-in car.

This used to be a niche topic but all of a sudden. we're in another energy

shock and gas is \$4 per gallon and people look at the Tesla and Bolt drivers with envy. (Until we stop driving internal-combustion vehicles, we will never achieve "energy independence." Sorry, Ted Cruz!) But did you ever stop to think of the gas station ecosystem as infrastructure? It reflects a lot of choices made over 100 years, which led to it becoming a unique retail-trade subsector, which EV charging does not need to be, at all. The Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act, which everyone still calls the "bipartisan infrastructure deal," includes about \$7 billion (ironically, the same price tag for the all-electric Project Connect) for 500,000 EV charging stations, both along the highways and in community mobility hubs that could look like just about anything. A lot of choices need to be made now, and in the next five years, to make sure people have juice for their juicebox cars.

GETCHA-GET UR BADGE ON

Since my work duties were all nearer to the end of SXSW than the beginning, I got to spend the first few days as a normal Conference attendee, dropping in on media and civic-engagement panels that were alternately inspiring and frightening. One featured the secretaries of state of Michigan and Arizona (Jocelyn Benson and Katie Hobbs, respectively), who are familiar names if you had to cover the bizarritude of the weeks after Election Day 2020. Their message was pretty clear: The wave of "election integrity" maneuvering is designed to keep valid votes from being

counted. Stay awake. (I got some face time with Benson, who is amazing, to run through the Travis County Commissioner Pct. 4 primary scenario and how one would determine if the new Texas rules, which are about as "arbitrary and capricious" as vou can get, changed the outcome of that very close race. Stay tuned.)

That wasn't nearly as frightening as the one-on-one with Nicole Perlroth. The New York Times cyber-warfare expert

and now advisor to the U.S. Dept. of Homeland Security. Her book from 2021, This Is How They Tell Me the World Ends, dives into Russia's previous cyberattacks in Ukraine over the last several years, before the tanks showed up (including knocking out the power grid), as test cases for what Vladimir Putin or another bad actor could do to our American lives right now, as our nation is incredibly vulnerable to cyberwar attacks because we do everything

online. We could do the same to Putin, which interviewer Jonathan Reiber (who covered the cyber desk at the Pentagon under Obama) described as "mutually assured digital destruction." Yikes! Use strong passwords, people.

YEAH. I LIVE RIGHT OVER THERE

I can walk from my house to the Convention Center, and just being on foot and around town confirmed that yes, this was the scale of SXSW that makes it most accessible to locals. If it were as big as it had gotten pre-COVID, I would have joined the masses who ignore and avoid the whole thing whenever possible. At this size, it was fun again to drop in on the weird activations and listen to random acts and watch movies I'd otherwise never see, and also to see how Downtown has changed during the pandemic (the workers in the towers stayed home but the construction continued apace).

The unhoused who would normally be quite visible on Trinity and Red River instead found themselves a safe space on an alley in between the two. The weather cooperated up until the very last minute. There was, once again, a shooting on Sixth Street, which is not good news but should put some extra juice into the moves being made to make Dirty Sixth safer, which both public and private entities now realize is going to require some of those shot bars to be replaced to diversify the monoculture of the strip. By the time I'm back from vacation, there may also be news on that front.

Good Riddance

With CodeNext finally dead, can we finally move ahead?

It was almost two years coming, but an appeals court last Thursday rejected the city of Austin's appeal of a lower court ruling invalidating the Land Development Code rewrite originally known as CodeNext.

The decision is a pretty comprehensive dismissal of the city's claims, written by Tracy Christopher, chief justice of Texas' 14th District Court of Appeals. The court ruled that given the way the code was being enacted, the city did indeed fail to give proper **notice** to property owners regarding changes to their zoning, and that such owners have the right to formally protest the changes essentially requiring approval by a City Council supermajority rather than a simple majority. The 18-page ruling, unanimous by the three-judge PUBLIC panel, goes into some detail in NOTICE denying each of the city's claims as "not persuasive" or "beside the point," among other things, BARBARO adding that the cases the city cited are off point and thus "do not support their argument," and that, in short: "We can see no basis for the City Parties' position in the statutory text."

The city's official response was some mumbling about "reviewing the decision" and "deciding next steps," but this has almost certainly driven a stake through the heart of this Frankenstein's monster of a flawed and incomplete code rewrite, cobbled together out of political agendas and wishful thinking, almost killed two years ago by District Court Judge Jan Soifer's ruling in the original lawsuit (Acuña et al v. City of Austin), but kept on life support until now by this frivolous appeal.

Whatever its merits as a social engineering document - pushing city planning toward a much more urban future where condos and transit replace houses and cars - CodeNext was not well designed to achieve its central function. A land development code is there for one basic purpose: to tell property owners and developers what they can and can't build, as clearly as possible, thus smoothing the way for the review and permitting process to be easier and more predictable. The most universal complaint builders have about the current code, especially as it's been amended and re-amended over the years, has to do with its complexity and ambiguity, which in turn adds time and cost to virtually every project that has to walk through the doors at development review. So homeowners bend over backward to avoid having to pull a building permit, and every contractor has a horror story about a project that ground to a halt because of a code issue that wasn't discovered until late in the process. City staff

blame at least part of that on a patchwork code with overlays and addenda that make it hard to find all of the regs that may apply to a given property, but what was supposed to be a clean rewrite quickly got freighted with political baggage and pushed by political timelines, so that no iteration of the plan ever got quite finished, let alone scenario tested. What City Council was in the process of passing two years ago was still unfinished. with some fairly major blanks to be filled in later. And while real estate investors and developers were pleased with some of the upzonings and other provisions, many architects and builders were still raising red flags

about inconsistencies and unintended consequences, quite apart from the

headline arguments over housing density, compatibility requirements, parking, and the like.

But then the whole thing got derailed when its backers' own determination to ride a 7-4 City Council majority as far as it would take them went a couple of steps too

far in ignoring the rights of the minority voices. And after losing a couple of pro-development votes in the 2020 election, the supposedly "pro-housing" wing of the Council has been willing to essentially waste another two years on this pointless legal appeal - essentially sitting out an entire election cycle while hoping for a more development-friendly Council after November - and that tells you how much they're willing to treat housing as a political football, as opposed to actually trying to get a good policy result. Meanwhile the "opposition" wing that was pushing for small area planning to help preserve neighborhoods and target desired development tracts more precisely has been quiet as well, after hinting that they could help point the way to a kinder, gentler zoning solution, with just as much housing potential, better distributed to achieve the goal of "all kinds of housing in all parts of town." No such master vision has evolved, nor has anyone yet ventured to restart the LDC rewrite process until the final nail had been driven into the coffin of the old one. But to its credit, Council has made incremental progress on a few related fronts in that time, though there's much more they could do (see "Public Notice: For Further Consideration..." Oct. 8, 2021).

Case in point: a major proposed revision to the vertical mixed-use program that Planning Commission voted last night to pass along to City Council - on a split vote, after a public hearing at which I believe not one speaker spoke in favor of the proposal as it stands. Expect more on this soon.

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Twisted Priorities

No agreement on the underlying cause of sex trafficking scandal at DFPS-contracted Bastrop facility

Less than a week after news broke that minors had been sex trafficked at a **Texas Department of Family and Protective Services**-contracted home for formerly sex trafficked girls, the **Texas Department of Public Safety** pivoted to say there's no proof behind the allegations. The initial story garnered national attention for the

state of Texas' long-beleaguered child welfare system, which a federal judge has stated leaves children "more damaged than when they entered."

But the new information, revealed in a March 16 letter from DPS Director Steven McCraw to Gov. Greg Abbott, doesn't tell

the full story. On March 17, during a Texas Senate special committee hearing on child protective services, McCraw, DFPS Commissioner **Jaime Masters**, and others detailed misconduct at **The Refuge Ranch**, the Bastrop facility at the center of the scandal, which failed to ring alarm bells at several agencies even after concerns about sex trafficking came to the attention of supervisors.

According to Masters, a staffer at Refuge Ranch alerted a case worker that another staff member had naked photographs of two resident minors. On Jan. 24, that case worker alerted their supervisors at DFPS. Two days later, the case worker learned that the employee with nude photos also had close personal relationships with several other staffers at the facility. Despite this, a supervisor at DFPS failed to elevate the urgency of the case. It was not until March 11 that DFPS issued a closure order for The

Refuge Ranch. According to McCraw's letter, four staff members have been terminated, although nine were originally suspected of involvement. In the committee hearing, Masters laid blame on human error. "I do not think this was a failure of process," she told the committee, adding that

the supervisor who failed to elevate the incident has been terminated. "Naked pictures of children in our care should have rang every bell," she said.

That supervisor wasn't the only DFPS staffer who lost their job in the aftermath of the scandal. Sunday, Justin Lewis, who served as the director overseeing child care investigations for the agency, resigned after making sexist comments about U.S. District Judge Janis Jack via text message. Jack is presiding over a decadelong lawsuit filed against the agency. Lewis said "she needs to get hit by a bus."

According to McCraw, his agency's investigation of The Refuge Ranch vielded no proof of allegations or evidence that residents had been "sexually abused or assaulted by anyone." McCraw cited "inaccuracies" and "information that had not been properly verified" in a March 10 letter from DFPS to a federal court monitor that initially broke news of the situation. Besides the incident involving naked photos of two resident minors "for the alleged purpose of selling them for cash and/or drugs," the letter also reported a second incident, on Feb. 20, when two residents fled the facility. The letter says Refuge employees are accused of facilitating the escape.

At the end of the Thursday hearing, committee members concluded that clearly defined guidelines regarding nepotism at agency-contracted facilities and a more coherent interagency data system could have helped protect children at The Refuge Ranch by removing them from a potentially harmful environment weeks earlier. (Masters added that simply putting together a timeline for her presentation to the committee took seven hours because her staff had to check three different data systems for information).

Despite the new information, Democratic challengers to Texas' GOP leadership stand by criticism that longstanding mismanagement of state resources enables misconduct. Gov. **Greg Abbott** "has been in charge of this problem for two decades as the attorney general for 13 years and

AustinCoin? Council Considering Crypto

Mayor **Steve Adler** and Council Member **Mackenzie Kelly** are bringing two resolutions to the Council meeting today, March 24, asking staff to explore the potential use of **blockchain** and **cryptocurrency** technologies for a variety of official city of Austin uses. The proposals, which were posted on the Council message board two weeks ago, have been met with skepticism among members of the Austin community that have not already bought into the crypto/blockchain/ Web3 hype – including from the local tech community.

"It is not technophobic to be concerned about these proposals," **Courtney Rosenthal**, an Austin-based software engineer and tech blogger, wrote in a recent post. "Many technology experts are skeptical of blockchain and cryptocurrencies. The exuberant support for them tends to come from people who have a vested interest in crypto." In the post, Rosenthal homed in on three of her biggest concerns surrounding the technologies: environmental impact, the speculative nature of cryptocurrencies, and the lack of a central authority regulating either technology.

Rosenthal's skepticism is shared by several council members who voiced their concerns at Tuesday's work session, March 22. "At this point, given its relatively recent entry into [the tech sector] I am really cautious about the city adopting or using it," CM **Leslie Pool** said in reference to Adler's blockchain resolution, though she was equally concerned about the city lending its imprimatur to cryptocurrencies. "I'm concerned about this trusted institution, which is the city of Austin, leaping ahead to adopt a new technology" that even recent municipal backers, like the city of Miami, are backing off on. In February, just five months after Miami adopted a cryptocurrency, the price of MiamiCoin had dropped nearly 93% from its peak price of 6 cents a coin.

Both resolutions are purely exploratory in nature, a point emphasized by both Adler and Kelly in response to pushnow governor," said state Rep. Ann Johnson, D-Houston, in a press conference on March 16. "This sits squarely at his feet." Democratic gubernatorial candidate Beto O'Rourke – who spoke at the press conference alongside Johnson, state Sen. Sarah Eckhardt, and several Texans with firsthand experiences in the state's child welfare system – described the root of the problem as "twisted priorities." This latest DFPS scandal comes just weeks after Abbott ordered the DFPS to investigate reported instances of "abusive gendertransitioning procedures" on Texas children. "Instead of using the resources of those who work here in this building behind us to address the issue that we just found out about," O'Rourke said, "this governor is asking them to go after the parents of transgender children."

In 2017, the Texas Legislature passed reforms in response to the crisis of the state's struggling child welfare system that decentralized the state's foster care system and gave private and nonprofit charities. including The Refuge Ranch (run by a nonprofit called The Refuge for DMST, or Domestic Minor Sex Trafficking), primary responsibility for care and management of foster care. "Why are we privatizing the care for the most vulnerable in this state?" O'Rourke asked. "You are bound to have problems like this when you outsource the state of Texas' responsibility." Speakers suggested prioritizing placement of foster children with members of their extended family. According to the Texas Alliance of Child and Family Services, Texas could have received up to \$50 million from the Family First Prevention Services Act. a 2018 law that intended to encourage such placement. According to Will Francis of the National Association of Social Workers, Texas also did not accept funds that would have gone toward qualified residential treatment programs, which cater to youth with specialized treatment needs, such as victims of sex trafficking. "There was a lot we left on the table," Francis told the *Chronicle.* "Texas has not done anything close to the job they could have done with federal Family First funds." According to the DFPS website, the department deferred accepting large portions of that \$50 million to give the Lege time "to weigh-in on the policy and fiscal changes driven by this federal legislation."

According to a statement about the Thursday hearing by Lt. Gov. **Dan Patrick**, problems at DFPS aren't a result of flawed policy, but of DFPS failing to follow the Legislature's lead. "If the agency is not implementing those reforms, nothing has changed," Patrick said. "This committee will also be tasked with looking at all of the issues at DFPS relating to past legislative reforms, implementation of these reforms, and all ongoing work at the agency." State Sen. **Lois Kolkhorst**, R-Brenham, who authored a major piece of legislation as part of 2017's reforms, is chairing the committee conducting the hearing.


Nileh Irsan, 25, aged out of Texas' foster care system after living in a group home run by a private organization. Irsan was not a victim of sex trafficking or abuse, but said she knows how easily lines can blur within the system, and how difficult it can be to know whom to trust. "They will spend the rest of their lives figuring out, a) what [their caretakers] did and, b) why the people around them let that happen," Irsan said at the Wednesday press conference. "It's disgusting."

back from their colleagues. The most recent draft of Adler's resolution directs staff to "create an environment within city government and in the community generally that supports the creation and development of new technologies," including Web3 and blockchain technologies. Specific applications include, but are not limited to: arts and music, "municipal governance and functions," and identity verification. Recent changes to the resolution, which appear to be in response to community pushback, direct staff to explore the use of public payment platforms and public banking as well.

Kelly's crypto resolution would have staff explore the use of cryptocurrencies, perhaps an **AustinCoin**, as a way to pay for "municipal taxes, fees, and penalties" and improve the delivery of municipal services, as well as what it would take to allow the city to accept donations in the form of crypto. "I pushed back at some of the people in the community that are trying at this point to turn it into a debate about ... adopting these technologies for particular uses," Adler said during the work session. "Before we should ever consider doing anything like that, [we need] more research, and that's all [these resolutions] do."

In response, Mayor Pro Tem **Alison Alter** pointed out that research has already shown the technologies to be wildly speculative and a huge strain on the environment (operation of the current crypto market requires the equivalent of 19 coal plants operating continuously, according to the U.S. Energy Star program). "I'm not really sure that I need a fact-finding study to tell me there's a lot of financial risk or that there's environmental implications of using this [as a financial payment system]," Alter said of the resolutions. *– Austin Sanders*

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Building a Sustainable Future

ACCC creates green jobs, maintains underserved parks

A morning chorus of chainsaws greets the day at Montopolis Neighborhood Park in East Austin. A seven-member Austin Civilian Conservation Corps crew is here to remove an invasive species called Ligustrum japonicum, or Japanese privet, a small tree with glossy green leaves and dark-purplish berries. It may look pretty in fact, people plant *Ligustrum* in their yards for landscaping. But the hardy, adaptable plant quickly spreads and runs rampant through local forests, says ACCC crew member Lily Nylund. "It's taken over most of the city - it really messes with the nutrients in the soil and destroys biodiversity in Austin."

The crew will return to this site throughout their nine-months-long program, which began at the end of January. In addition to invasive species removal, they'll be restoring the park's trail network, which has become overgrown. The hope is that native plants will reclaim the land while Austinites reclaim the trail. "It's really obvious that a lot of these parks have been super underserviced," ACCC crew leader **Mars Lotus** said. "Trails have to be used, but this one hasn't seen as much use as it could, so hopefully we can make it more appealing to people."

The ACCC was established at the beginning of the pandemic, in May of 2020, and is evolving into a more permanent, equitable city initiative. It is funded in part by the **American Rescue Plan Act** – City Council allocated \$6 million of ARPA funding to ACCC programming last June.

The initiative began as a response to COVID-19, helping place Austinites economically impacted by the pandemic into seasonal, green, full-time jobs that pay \$15 to \$17 per hour. But Mayor Pro Tem Alison Alter, who authored the resolution creating the ACCC, says she envisions it as a longstanding program post-pandemic. "The ACCC was launched as a pandemic response but it has always been my goal and intent to make it an integral piece of how Austin completes necessary conservation work,



how we provide pathways to green jobs, and how we build a sustainable future for our city and our community."

Job opportunities range from wildfire mitigation to public art, all with an emphasis on sustainability and conservation. The program has created more than 100 jobs, and the number is growing, Alter said.

Nylund had been working at a grocery store to pay rent when she found an ACCC crew member opening. "It's really cool to not hate your job. Every job I've had before this has been miserable, but now I actually like coming to work every day," she said.

Lotus was part of the ACCC's first cohort in 2021, before returning this year as a crew leader. "I had been waiting tables for a while and the pandemic of course hit restaurants really hard. The place I was working at closed down for a time." Lotus, a lover of the outdoors, learned about the ACCC and jumped at the opportunity. "I get so much

Sound the Alarms: Does Central Texas Need a Storm Alert System?

Austinites struck by surprise when tornadoes swept the I-35 corridor on Monday

As at least **five tornadoes** swept through the greater Austin area late Monday afternoon, Central Texans took to social media to complain of yet another lag in regional infrastructure: Few **storm sirens** stood ready to warn residents of incoming disaster. Only a handful of sirens are located in Travis County, mostly on University of Texas property near Downtown Austin. In Williamson County, Georgetown has sirens installed at regular distances covering the Downtown area and north toward the municipal airport, but more rural areas of the county like Granger, where a tornado touched down from the natural spaces in Austin, it feels good to give something back to them."

The ACCC works in partnership with American YouthWorks' Texas Conservation **Corps** and divides crews into three groups across the city, explained Chris Gomon of AYW. There's a wildfire mitigation crew, a parks and preserves crew, and an Eastern Crescent crew - that's the team out at Montopolis Park – which focuses on the arc

of settlements around and beyond the SH 130 toll road. "We definitely want to ensure that we have a program that is really addressing the conservation needs as well as the economic development needs of Austin residents," Gomon said. "The intention of the crew, especially with the Eastern Crescent crew is to serve an area that has been disenfranchised for many years."

Alter says the ACCC was inspired in part by FDR's New Deal-era Civilian Conservation Corps, a federally funded program that put thousands of Americans to work during the Great Depression. But the ACCC has the opportunity to create a different, more equitable legacy than its predecessor, said ACCC Program Coordinator Kirsten Johansson: "The Civilian Conservation Corps of the 1930s was racially segregated, and that history still has current impacts, and of course Austin's racist history still

Although news reports from the previous weekend began to suggest the possibility of tornadoes on Monday, the warning issued shortly after 2pm Monday caught many people by surprise. As extreme weather events in the region seem to become more common. Central Texans said they'd like to see a better notification system. But storm sirens can cost upward of \$30,000, not including annual maintenance fees, and can generally be heard only within a radius of between 1 and 2 miles. Stacev Osborne. the communications manager for Taylor, 10 miles south of the tornado's path, said storm sirens aren't as necessary anymore because of the near ubiquity of cellphones. Emergency alert text services are offered by the offices of emergency management in both Travis and Williamson counties. by the National Weather Service, and by some municipalities including Taylor. But those solutions aren't 100% effective either; users have to ensure they're registered to receive the alerts. During the storm on Monday afternoon, some homeowners within a mile of where tornadoes struck complained that they

didn't receive text message alerts.

What's more, tornadoes are a rare occurrence in Central Texas. The tornado warning Monday afternoon was the first to be issued in Austin in a decade. But tornadoes have struck Central Texas with vicious force in the past. In 1997, a tornado outbreak with striking similarities to the one that happened Monday passed over the I-35 corridor; one touchdown that hit Jarrell, north of Georgetown, killed 27 people and injured dozens more. The disaster prompted several municipalities in the surrounding area, including nearby Hutto, to discuss installing sirens. Since that tornado hit in the late Nineties, the population of the Austin suburbs where tornadoes hit has boomed. Since 2010. the population of Williamson County, on the outskirts of Austin, has expanded nearly 8%. making it the fastest-growing county in the country in that period.

No fatalities have been reported due to storms that hit on Monday, but at least three people were injured in Elgin and one person was taken to a hospital in Austin. At a press conference Monday evening, Gov. Greg **Abbott** said it "may be a miracle" there was no loss of life. – Morgan O'Hanlon

Harm reduction advocates urge access to fentanyl testing strips by LINA FISHER

On March 10, after a weekend of a dozen overdoses and three deaths from fentanyl, a synthetic opioid 50 times more potent than heroin, public officials briefed the **Travis County Commissioners Court** in a work session. Chief Medical Examiner **Keith Pinckard** shared data showing that over-

doses have been steadily rising in the county for the last three years, with a 38% increase in accidental deaths from 2019 to 2020, and another 20% increase in 2021. From 2020 to 2021, fentanyl deaths tripled, even as deaths from other drugs, like heroin, were decreasing. Heidi Abraham. deputy medical director at Austin-Travis County EMS. said paramedics are responding to around 30 opioid overdoses a day. "Fentanyl is still by far the biggest threat what we're hearing from folks on the street is that everything is laced with fentanyl."

Abraham and Health Authority Dr. **Desmar Walkes** explained that the three most commonly laced drugs are heroin, cocaine, and pressed pills like Percocet or Xanax – and the people most likely to be taking pressed pills are teenagers. **Narcan**, the most common brand of the overdose-reversing drug **naloxone**, is one of the most

effective ways to prevent deaths, and EMS, community health paramedics, and **Austin Police Department** officers all carry it. Abraham encouraged the court to provide the Travis County Sheriff's Office with Narcan as well, especially as EMS response times are slower to the rest of the county

outside Austin. "Fentanyl makes patients stop breathing - if they're still alive when EMS gets there, they stay alive. The overdose deaths we're seeing are those who never make it to health care," explained Abraham. She warned that Narcan may wear off after a short time, requiring robust Good Samaritan laws that provide legal amnesty for 911 calls in an overdose scenario. The Travis County **District Attorney's Office** tweeted on March 19, as SXSW parties raged, "If you call 911 to help someone experiencing an overdose, you will NOT be prosecuted by our office."

All of these tactics – increased access to Narcan, a local **Good Samaritan law**, etc. – have been recommended by **Texas Harm Reduction Alliance**, which has provided lifesaving supplies to low-income users since 2019. "We have been asking for the

commissioners to convene this meeting long

before this surge happened," says **Paulette Soltani**, organizing director at THRA. Their key demands are for the court to declare a public health emergency; for methadone treatment to be expanded in addition to Central Health's current buprenorphine program (in which the court invested \$175,000 in the last budget); and most importantly, increased access to fentanyl **testing strips**, which are currently illegal in Texas.

Soltani says testing is one of the best ways to prevent an overdose, but in response to County Judge **Andy Brown**'s questions about it, Abraham and Walkes expressed skepticism. "Some of these people are desperate enough that they are willing to take the risk, even if they know there's fentanyl. [Testing strips] may help some, but I don't think it's gonna completely eliminate the problem," said Abraham. THRA tweeted that those comments left them "far from satisfied with the conversation" – Soltani says testing strips are "a very basic harm reduction tool that everybody should be on the same page about."

THRA lacks the resources to "do the work that's necessary in the way that it's necessary," she says. "We're doing patchwork for a worsening crisis. If the county and city leaders could come together, declare this a public health emergency, and put together a plan with some of the recommendations that we have," perhaps these spikes could be curbed in the future.

ACLU, LAMBDA LEGAL BACK IN COURT TO HALT TRANS "ABUSE" INVESTIGATIONS

The American Civil Liberties Union and Lambda Legal are back in court over Gov. Greg Abbott's "abuse" directive, after the state threatened to ignore a ruling that temporarily protected families with transgender children from unneccessary investigations by the Texas Department of Family and Protective Services.

On March 17, the two civil rights nonprofits asked the **Texas 3rd Circuit Court of Appeals** to issue an emergency order that would force the state to obey the lower court's ruling. Previously, Judge **Amy Clark Meachum** blocked Abbott's directive until at least July when the lawsuit is due to continue; meanwhile, Attorney General **Ken Paxton** claims the state can completely disregard Meachum's ruling while awaiting the results of an appeal.

Shelly Skeen, a senior attorney from Lambda Legal representing the plaintiffs, told the *Chronicle* that the appeals court could rule on both their emergency restraining order and the state's appeal any day now, or call for more hearings. Ultimately, she expects the courts to side with well-established medical science when it comes to gender affirming care. "CPS should not be investigating families that are simply trying to provide medically necessary care ... and to give their trans kids the best possible life," said Skeen.

Tracy Harting, an Austin attorney defending two families facing investigations under the directive, noted neither of her clients had heard from DFPS since Judge Meachum's temporary injunction but that their cases remain open. Since Abbott's directive forces DFPS employees to treat every abuse claim with equal weight, she told us she fears that they could continuously face frivolous, damaging investigations if the lawsuit fails. "Nothing would prevent people from making the same abuse referrals, over and over again." – *Kit O'Connell*

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Up the Pay, Medics Might Stay

Volunteers for overtime nearly doubled after EMS made OT pay double regular hourly wage **by AUSTIN SANDERS**

For the past two months, field medics and communications staff at **Austin-Travis County Emergency Medical Services** have earned double pay for all overtime shifts they volunteer to work. It's a financial incentive that

medics demanded for the past two years as they watched colleagues burn out from a combination of strenuous COVID-19 working conditions and relatively low wages.

The burnout created the same vicious cycle seen across many job fields: As the ATCEMS workforce dwindled, the need for medics to work mandatory overtime shifts grew. The increase in mandatory OT – which, until Dec.


20, 2021, was not guaranteed to pay even $1\frac{1}{2}$ times a medic's wage – accelerated burnout, which further diminished the department's ranks. Front-line medics had a simple solution: Offer double pay for volunteer OT

shifts. Medics argued doing so would boost morale and result in fewer holes in the department's scheduling policy, which aims to staff every ambulance with two medics, because people would line up at the chance

> for double pay. Moreover, all of this could be accomplished before the new contract between the **Austin EMS Association** and the city of Austin was finalized. (The contract is still being negotiated; AEMSA is awaiting a counteroffer from the city on their pay and benefits proposal.)

Sources told the *Chronicle* that morale improved immediately following then-interim

Chief **Jasper Brown**'s decision to finally offer double pay on Jan. 16 (the incentive expires April 15, but the department is even more short-staffed than when it was implemented, so it could be extended). Data we obtained

through an open records request backs up what we heard anecdotally: The number of medics volunteering to fill overtime shifts increased by 68% in the 30 days after double pay compared to the 30 days before, while the number of medics called in on mandatory overtime decreased by 69%. During each of the five weeks before double pay was offered, the ratio of volunteers to non-volunteers called in for overtime was about 1-to-1. In the four weeks following the pay increase, that ratio changed dramatically, with about five times as many volunteers as non-volunteers.

The data also showed that, following implementation of double pay, the department maintained a daily average of about 30 field medics who signed up for the volunteer overtime shift, which supervisors draw from before calling people assigned to the mandatory overtime list. The ATCEMS Public Information Office said the number of medics signing up for the volunteer list

Free Acupuncture for Weary ER & ICU Staff

Starting last summer, a group of volunteer acupuncturists, massage therapists, and Asian bodywork specialists from the **AOMA Graduate School of Integrative Medicine** offered their services free of charge to ICU and ER staff at **St. David's North Austin Medical Center**. The program began when **Pamela Ferguson**, former dean of AOMA, hashed out the idea with her partner **Bernadette Winiker**, who was a nurse manager at St. David's from 1996 to 2021.



The couple decided to set up shop in one of the waiting areas of the hospital, which was closed due to restricted visitor policies during the pandemic. All ER and ICU staff, from doctors to receptionists to members of the cleaning crew, could take breaks for acupuncture treatments to relieve some of the stress of the work environment. With COVID cases declining, the group has moved from their makeshift practice in the hospital, but they're still offering free services to St. David's hospital staff at the AOMA student clinics at both their north and south locations.

These days, stress in hospitals is high. For the first year and a half of the pandemic, St. David's had a no-visitor policy, which forced ICU staffers to play the role of family members in consoling sick patients. Visitor policies are ever-changing but always limited. "The past few years have been a very emotional time because of the amount of deaths we've had to endure," said **Lisa Jo Harrison**, the ICU manager at St. David's. "Just getting that little bit of solace was very beneficial." Ferguson worries about these workers, especially the overnight crew. It

was important to her that her volunteers offer services to all crews, not just the daytime staff, so she rallied a team to visit from 9pm to midnight on Saturdays. "The night crew is neglected. Everyone focuses on food donations for the day crews and they're left with crumbs at night."

So as not to intimidate, volunteer Connie Randolph likes to use an introductory method of acupuncture, the NADA protocol, which involves placing small needles on designated points on the ears. Volunteer shiatsu therapist Adriana Martins' patients are often surprised when she asks to do pressure points on their feet, but she said they're happy to kick off their shoes and relax (some even take a quick nap). Many patients have since shown up to AOMA's student clinics for treatments.


The partnership is not just practical, but philosophical. AOMA President Dr. **Mary Faria** explained, "Integrative care will change health care in this country. We need good integrative care models that combine the best of all the things that keep people healthy, and acupuncture plays an important part." Harrison, the ICU manager, echoed this sentiment: "Nurses don't just believe in Western medicine. We believe in any kind of therapy that will benefit the body, not only physically, but also spiritually."

In such a heavy environment, just a break in the day and the loving attention of another can heal. Ferguson, the program's organizer, was amazed at the impact the quick sessions had on the hospital workers: "In just 15-minute sessions, they would come in with one demeanor and go out with a lighter step." - Ellen Daly

before Jan. 16 was unavailable, due to a ransomware hack on Kronos, the time management system the department uses, which disrupted payroll management for more than 2,000 organizations. However, there's a stark difference in the number of people on the mandatory overtime list (a daily average of 16 medics before double pay compared to three after double pay), presumably because more medics were volunteering to fill shifts rather than waiting for their name to be selected from the mandatory list.

How the double pay affected separations from ATCEMS is less clear. According to AEMSA President **Selena Xie**, 14 employees separated from ATCEMS during the time period, with eight separations occurring before double pay and six occurring after. Only two of the employees hit full retirement eligibility; four others separated before working at ATCEMS for one year – a reflection of how hard it is for the department to retain employees under the current working conditions and pay offered to new hires. Xie said finalizing a new contract, with a higher base wage, will help this situation. "Every day we don't have a signed contract is another day we can't get to work on these critical issues facing our department," the union president told us.

"Having double pay has increased the willingness for our medics to work overtime," Xie said. "Obviously it shows that money is a huge motivator in reducing the holes we have in staffing, and if we increase our base wage, it will reduce the holes in our staff even further. As soon as we come up with an improved pay scale, it will encourage people to work for us."



Richard Linklater's childhood in space race-era Houston recalled through Austin-made animation in *Apollo 101*/2

How do you get to the moon? Well, first, you have to decide to go. Richard Linklater may be best known for his ambitious and often experimental live-action films like Slacker and Boyhood, but he's also pushed boundaries as an animation director with Waking Life and A Scanner Darkly. Now his third animated feature, Apollo 10¹/₂: A Space Age Childhood, pushes the limits of character animation. An evolution of rotoscoping. using live-action footage as reference, it places the audience in the subjective viewpoint of a young boy gazing up as rockets head into space. Yet what Linklater first proposed was a much more concrete recreation of space race-era Houston.

Producer Mike Blizzard recalled that Linklater first mentioned the idea of making a period live-action drama at an Austin Film Society board dinner. He wanted to tell a story "about Houston and growing up there, and what a trip it was to be around astronauts and think it was normal." A few months later they met up again; they were both at an AFS board meeting, "and [Linklater] turns to me and goes, 'I want to make this movie about a kid growing up in Houston in 1969, and he imagines he's the one who goes to moon.' I go, 'I'd be down with that,' and we went and got veggie food at the Mongolian BBQ."

That was 2012. Film production is notoriously slow, and even with the surprise critical and box office success of *Boyhood* elevating Linklater's star to new levels, it was still slow going. In 2017, the team put out a call for reference material, asking anyone with old photos or footage of Houston in the Sixties. Blizzard said, "We had the idea that we could use that as establishing shots, to have these dreamy home movies that would be playing as he's going to Astroworld, and then cut in really close to [Stan]."

But something was off. "Aesthetically," Linklater said, "it wasn't quite working." Moreover, any attempt to accurately recreate the time and the places, "it would have been \$100 million, and no one was going to give me \$100 million to make this film."

It was actually Toby Halbrooks, longtime producer for David Lowery (The Green Knight, A Ghost Story), who first proposed pivoting to animation. When he made the suggestion at an AFS intensive retreat at Linklater's Bastrop studio in 2019, that changed the trajectory of the film. Linklater explained, "The same thing happened 20-plus years ago with Waking Life. 'The film I'm making in my head doesn't quite work.' And then when it's animated, it's, 'Oh, it works." With Apollo, "it's such a weird fantasy-reality mash-up that the literalness of live action I don't think helps it. It engages your rational brain, where you'd go, 'Wait, are they saying this is real?' Whereas this, it pulls you into a dream state, memory state in the construct part of your brain."

For producer Tommy Pallotta, who worked with Linklater on both *Waking Life* and *A Scanner Darkly*, the unifying factor in Linklater's animated films is how they draw the audience into the character's viewpoint. "Everybody makes their own movies in their head," he said. "[*Apollo*] is a young person's perspective, told by the adult version of that person 50 years later looking back, so it's real-

ly about memory and perception, and it's incredibly subjective. I think that Rick intuitively understood that's sort of how *Waking Life* and *Scanner Darkly* worked as well."

About a decade ago, Linklater and Pallotta were developing a remake of *The Incredible Mr. Limpet*: Previously adapted from Theodore Pratt's novel in 1964 as a family-comedy vehicle for Don Knots, the new environmentally centered version would star Zach Galifianakis as the man who becomes a fish. Linklater said, "We got some R&D money from [Warner Bros.] to play around with it, and Tommy had been starting to use painted backgrounds, so I thought, 'Oh, we'll just paint the ocean."" Going through that experience "gave me

the confidence [that] there were new possibilities out there."

With the switch from live action to cartoon, Linklater reached out to Netflix Animation, who were quickly onboard. Next, he started shopping for animation houses. For his first two animated features he'd effectively assembled his own studios, with many firsttime animators. Linklater said, "When [programmer and filmmaker] Bob Sabiston was writing that software, he thought of it as just a new way to paint," and so there's a generation of Austin artists with only one IMDb

credit, as an animator on either *Waking Life* or *Scanner*. However, while he wanted the same level of character realism that he had achieved with *Scanner*, he felt that he'd gone as far as he could with that look, "and the demands of something like this and our environment were such that it needed top-shelf professional animators and compositors."

So Linklater started shopping around for different studios with different styles and

techniques, with even stop-motion and puppetry being discussed. Then, a giant leap. Blizzard recalled, "Rick called me one day and said, 'Have you seen *Undone*?""

In hindsight, what was to come seems inevitable. The 2019 Amazon Prime series, starring Rosa Salazar, was produced by Pallotta, used similar character animation techniques to Linklater's animated movies, and was being drawn by Amsterdam's Submarine and Austin's Minnow Mountain – the latter co-founded by Craig Staggs, who learned character animation as part of the art team on *A Scanner Darkly*. At the start of January 2020, Netflix approved the budget, Blizzard said, "and within just a few months, we were shooting." The project was a natural fit for Pallotta, who'd worked with both Staggs and Submarine for over a decade and had talked with Linklater about *Apollo* from back in its live-action days. A Houstonian and former elementary classmate of Linklater's, Pallotta said, "My neighbors were the astronauts and the engineers, as well as the cowboys, so of course I wanted to be involved, but I never presumed."

After almost a decade of development, the filmmaking process was incredibly speedy - by animated standards. The average big studio animated feature takes years: Apollo came in on a 20-day shoot and 21 months of animation, with only a twomonth delay from the original delivery date due to COVID affecting the process. That's not a one-off for Pallotta (A Scanner Darkly took 23 days of live-action location filming and 18 months of animation) but going in the deadlines seemed insane, especially since filming was scheduled to begin in February 2020. Pallotta recalled, "Rick said, 'Do you think that you can do this, without this proper preproduction?' and I said, 'I dunno, do you think that you can do this? You haven't even cast anybody yet, and we're supposed to start shooting in a month.' He said, 'Yeah, I think I can do it,' so I said, 'Yeah, I think I can do it, too.'"

The Minnow Mountain team was also more than ready. Staggs said, "I don't think that it's a secret that a Linklater movie was one of the goals when we started. Where we are, working in rotoscope, to be in the position that when he decided he wanted to make one ... we could be the team to do it."

"Actual literal dream come true," said Minnow co-founder and Producer of Animation Steph Swope. "Twenty years ago, I moved here hoping I'd get to work on a Linklater movie. It's magical."

But before the animators could take over, Linklater had to shoot the live-action



reference material from which they could (quite literally) draw, and this is where the team got really lucky. Shifting to animation meant filming on a green screen soundstage, and Austin Film Commission Director Brian Gannon suggested using Robert Rodriguez's Troublemaker Studios. "They said, 'Yes, we'd love to have you," Blizzard recalled, "but we have this annual South by Southwest party, and so you have to be out before that party."

Linklater added, "I remember telling Bruce Curtis, our production designer, 'Good news, bad news. We just have to design the world. There won't be set construction. The bad news? We shoot in six weeks."

Knowing that the animation phase would almost "be like reshooting the movie" when it came to issues like lighting allowed Linklater to concentrate on the performance side. He said, "The filmmaking process felt like you were filming a fun rehearsal. ... I wouldn't direct an actor any differently. I wouldn't say, 'You're an animated character, so act differently.' I did that a little bit on Scanner because that was a bit more drugged-out weird, but this was realism." The performances could be loose, but the actual filming needed to be precise. "Every shot we did was a special effect, and all the specificity of getting that just right. 'If the actor walks there, then they're walking through a car. Cut, do that again.""

The live shoot wrapped on March 8. Five days later, March 13, 2020, the entire film industry went into COVID lockdown, and the Minnow Mountain team was only just done loading the reference footage on their servers when they had to pack their computers to start working from home. Not only that, said Swope, but *Undone* season 2 had also gone into production, "so we started the movie and season 2 within a week of each other." Luckily, because they could hire animators from around the world to work remotely, it was surprisingly easy to crew up both projects at the same time. Plus, they'd already done *Undone* season 1 with Submarine, "so we really had a good working relationship."

"Everybody did a great job of communicating," Linklater said, "because we didn't have the time or the budget to lose."

In the division of labor between Minnow Mountain and Submarine, the Austin studio handled character design and line work, archival media footage ("Any time you're watching cinema," Staggs said, "you're watching frame-by-frame rotoscoping"), and, in the later stages of production, background work to flesh out the world. However, before that, they had to home in on the style and look of the film, to make it like that elusive vision in Linklater's head. Staggs said, "We started looking at period palettes, Kodachrome photography, and then starting to look at editorial illustrations from 1969. That sort of stuff became the jumping-off point." The footage collected in 2017 for the live-action montage version became reference material (per Blizzard, "A lot of that footage of [Stan] training, for instance, that's NASA footage"). The Texas animators also became a resource for Submarine on small specifics, "like the color of the water at Galveston," said Staggs, "and I remember explaining that 100% of the rocks at Astroworld were Styrofoam."

After all, this wasn't just any abstract version of Texas in the late Sixties. Linklater's idea was of a particular time, a specific moment, down to having the right commercials running during the right TV shows at historic moments. That's what made this the accurate version of Houston distorted through the lens of memory that Linklater wanted all along. He said, "It was kind of fun to create it the way we did, from archival footage and photographs, and to see animators build it out in these environments, 2D and 3D. In a way, it was even more satisfying seeing it coming to life."

An Animated Childhood

Milo Coy takes one giant leap in Richard Linklater's ADO//O 101/2 BY JENNY NULF

Milo Coy is living every homegrown artsy Austin kid's dream – for his first movie role, he was cast as the lead in a Richard Linklater movie. The director behind classics such as *Slacker* and *School of Rock* is finally back with a beautiful and incredibly personal coming-of-age comedy, where Coy stars as a kid growing up in Houston in 1969, when NASA and the space race were the talk of the town.

Apollo 10¹/₂: A Space Age Childhood is about Stan (voiced by Jack Black), who shares his surreal childhood experience growing up in the Houston suburb of El Lago. Cov plays the younger Stan of those reminiscences. a kid secretly recruited to test pilot the Apollo Lunar Module prior to the first moon landing. Young Stan goes through intensive training to get to the moon, but truly the heart of Linklater's film is his summertime memories before his mission, intertwined with his story of his space flight, and watching the Apollo 11 mission from his television.

"I'm pretty sure everybody's wanted to go to space at some point, but I never really wanted to go to space when I learned you have to do a bunch of school," Coy insisted very seriously. However, after a moment's thought, he rephrased his answer. "I like space [and] I would want to go to space, but I wouldn't want to do the preparation work."

Although Coy is young, and Apollo 10¹/₂ is his first film, he's always had his sights set on acting. "It was in pre-K, so I don't remember super well, but we were asked what we want our future job to be. I said that I wanted to be an actor because I wanted to be Bumblebee and drive down a building."

Starring in Apollo 101/2 is not far from off the dream of being a CGI Transformer. As in two of his earlier films, Waking Life and A Scanner Darkly, Linklater utilizes character animation to create his nostalgic vision of the Houston from his childhood. The experience was exciting for Coy: "It was awesome seeing myself animated. It was like a whole movie with me on an Instagram filter. It was just super cool and crazy."

Although Coy can't connect as much to the era the film is set in, he still found his character to be relatable. "It's a lot like how I've grown up, as I'm definitely a nerd, but not when it comes to schoolwork - when it comes to comics and stuff. Like how [Stan] is with NASA." Coy's love of nerd culture is quite sweet, but it's also pretty awesome to see that's he's also gotten into some of the same things his character Stan is into.

One of Coy's favorite moments in Apollo 101/2 related to another cinematic trip to space, when Stan's talking at a kid from school about 2001: A Space Odyssey, and his friend suddenly loses interest and walks away. Stanley Kubrick's classic was one of many films and shows of the era that Linklater encouraged his cast, including Coy, to watch, but it was the one that stood out to Coy the most. I loved that," he gushed, almost like Stan himself. (Coy's favorite part? The deactivation of HAL 9000.) "We watched a clip from that in school, in like *real* school, this year, it was cool.'

It's clear Coy is really into all things nerdy, sci-fi, and superhero. He's well versed in the world of comics, and hopes that someday he can even be in one. "Oh yeah, Old Man Logan - favorite comic of all time," Coy exclaimed, only to matter-of-factly clarify: "Probably was too young when I read it. It's

really gory." He divulged that someday he'd like to play the baby Hulk from the comic.

Coy, akin to his character Stan, is an extremely creative and imaginative kid. During the audition process for Apollo 10¹/₂, he was asked, "If you could make your own world, what would it be?" and his answer was brilliant: "I

said that I wanted a world where there was a part of it made of candy, and a part of it where it was a zombie apocalypse, because that would be awesome."

More in line with Stan, Coy also would embellish little details to make a story funny and entertaining, like insisting his father did not read the paperwork before signing him up for the film. "There are times whenever I'm trying to tell a story and my parents are like, 'That never happened,' and stuff, but ... I'm like pretty sure it happened," he says with an all-knowing grin.

One of Coy's favorite scenes to film was one of the prep scenes for Stan's mission to space. "It's the one where I'm in that plane and it's zero gravity or whatever. And I'm in that orange spacesuit ... and I got to be on wires and stuff." Coy preferred the orange test jumpsuit to the actual astronaut suit. "I hated that suit," he said deadpan. "Now, [the suit] was comfy, but it was melting ... they had to put ice packs in it." His dislike for the suit had no end, and he vented, "I had to, in between takes, unzip the back and take it off. All the time."


> Outside all the fun green screen tech and dreams of space, perhaps the most genuine part of Apollo 101/2 is how Linklater shapes growing up in a sprawling, big Texas city. There's none like him doing it, and even Coy mentioned that being in the film was special to not only him, but to his father, who grew up in

both Houston and Austin. "My dad has nostalgia from it because he was born in 1973, and he remembers a lot about it."

Like Boyhood, Apollo $10^{1/2}$ is a touchingly personal film, a true love letter to growing up and the cherished memories you keep. Cov said. "It was really cool being in this movie because [this] is a movie that Rick's wanted to do for a while is what I've gathered, and it's personal to him. I just think it's super cool that I got to be in it."





DAY TRIPS by gerald e. mcleod

Two new secret **fishing holes** have been added to the **Texas Parks and Wildlife Department**'s **River Access and Conservation Area** program, and they're awesome.

Rivers in Texas are public domain, but with 95% of the land privately owned, finding access to the streams can often be difficult or nonexistent.

That's where the RACA program comes in. TPWD negotiates leases with landowners for public use of their property. Some access points are close to urban centers, like the **Texas River School** on the **Colorado River** near Austin, but most are wonderfully remote and secluded, like the paddle-in camps on the **Devils River**. The majority of the access points require reservations, are day-use only, and are primarily for fishing and paddlers. A few of the spots require a nominal fee, but all require users to pack out their trash. Currently the program includes 21 sites on 10 rivers, but leases are added and ended all the time.

Access to a beautiful stretch of the **Blanco River** at **John Knox Ranch** outside of **Wimberley** was recently added. The children's summer camp offers entrance to an isolated part of the river lined with white limestone cliffs and towering cypress trees. This is the take-out point for a 3.6-mile paddling trip from **Fischer Store Road Bridge**.

The second access point announced this month is a scenic section of the **South Llano River** near **Junction**. **Cupgrass Cabins**



provides entry to a prime fishing hole on **Bailey Creek** as well as put-in for river paddlers. From here, the first take-out spot is 1-2 hours downstream, or **South Llano State Park** is a 4- to 6-hour float trip. This access has the added advantage of a gorgeous three-bedroom farmhouse for rent.

Austin FC Showing More Fight (Literally) in **Club's Second Season**

Through the first four games of Austin FC's sophomore year. it's hard to realistically imagine the Verde having had a better start to the season: two dominant - record-setting. even - victories against bad teams followed by a pair of hard-fought matches (one road loss and one home draw) against two of the league's best clubs, in which Austin FC was perhaps unlucky to come away with only 1 point total.

And yet, an awkward truth remains, which is that the club sits just 1 solitary point better in the MLS standings than it did through four matches (all on the road) last season, a season in which the Verde eventually lost 21 times. Given that reality, how big can the difference between the two iterations of Austin FC possibly be? The answer seems to have less to do with the play on the field – though that has been many levels better, especially in the 10-goal extravaganza across the first two matches of the season - and more to do with the intangibles.

"Togetherness." "Character." "Maturity." Those words and others like them are popping up left and right during press conferences with coach Josh Wolff and select players. That was hardly the case a year ago at any point, let alone just a month into the season.

Those sentiments were especially present after the club's latest result. a 1-1 draw at home with the Seattle Sounders in which Austin FC went down a goal but fought back to capture the draw and nearly more. Coming back when conceding first is something the Verde did just twice last season (resulting in one eventual win and one eventual loss). For Wolff, who calls it like he sees it probably

leads a pregame huddle ahead of last weekend's match vs.

more than he's given credit for, the basis of the comeback was simple: "This group has more spine to it. It has more character."

Wolff also pointed to a big difference in the atmosphere at training sessions this season compared to last. "We had some dustups in training, so you know you're in a good place when your guys are fighting and competing in training, and there's some little bit of fights going on, and that's a sign of a good team. We lost 20 games last year, there wasn't a dustup."

Fault Wolff as much as you like for the club lacking fight a year ago. He was the coach then, too. But also know that the expansion squad he helmed in 2021 lacked anything close to the experience, both individually and as a group, of this year's squad, and had only a fraction of the talent. Dani Pereira might be the best example. The player who last year was fresh out of college and getting exposed at times by some MLS veterans now looks mature beyond his years in midfield and has so far held top signing Jhojan Valencia out of the starting lineup.

Despite plenty of fair criticism of Wolff for leaving club stalwart Diego Fagúndez on the bench to begin Sunday's match, the move worked exactly as intended: One of the club's feistiest attackers came on as a substitute in the second half and tied the game with a goal.

"Last year I think it was hard, when we were going down a man or down a goal, our mindset maybe wasn't the same as this year," Fagúndez said. "You can tell we're a group [that is] united, everybody fights for each other. So we knew that we could come back."

Fighting for each other. Fighting with each other. Either way, it's working for Austin FC, which now has the weekend off before a trip to face budding rivals San Jose Earthquakes on April 2.



Moonage Daydream

Richard Linklater's animated reminiscence, Apollo 10½: A Space Age Childhood, brings space race Houston to life **BY TRACE SAUVEUR**

Levi. (PG-13, 108 min.)

Apollo 10¹/₂: A Space Age Childhood sees director Richard Linklater returning to his roots in more ways than one. The Texas icon whose oeuvre is so often defined by his nostalgic head trips and loose, freewheeling hangout structures has again crafted a story that allows him to

utilize those qualities in a film that mines material from his own coming of age, not unlike his seminal *Dazed and Confused*. Couple that with his return to rotoscope animation after *Waking Life* and *A Scanner Darkly*, and you have the most true-to-form Linklater film since 2016's *Everybody Wants Some!!*

Apollo, naturally, is set in Linklater's hometown of Houston. Playfully crossing historical revisionism and nostalgic waxing about the touchstones of his childhood, it follows a young boy named Stanley (Coy) as he grows up in the late 1960s under the shadow of NASA at the height of the growing excitement of space exploration, in anticipation of the eventual *Apollo* 11 moon landing. NASA is an inescapable part of everyday life for Stanley – practically everyone he knows works for or knows someone who works for them in one way or another. It isn't long before Stanley

The idea is something of a fantastical anchor to a film whose actual through line is more

concerned with the vivid depiction of specific time and place. The era and city in which Linklater grew up is depicted here as a time both simpler and more hazardous in ways a child wouldn't pick up on until years down the road – those anecdotes narrated by Jack Black as an older Stanley guide the film through its carousel of memories from an older perspective. A generous portion of the run time is devoted purely to fond descriptions of being a child in 1969 and what it was like going on a trip to the local amusement park, the family dynamic at home, escapades with other local kids around the neighborhood – anything and everything. Stanley's actual trip to the moon isn't necessarily an afterthought, but maybe more of a grace note the movie lands on as a culmination of Stanley's entire childhood as he takes one small step into his future.

The amorphous structure may be off-putting for those looking for something more traditional from the logline of "animated movie about a kid that goes to the moon," but this outline of a childhood is unburdened by conventional design. All of this is conveyed through the beautifully and uniquely drawn and rendered character animation, a style that allows the film to portray all of its bygone cultural hallmarks with a singular visual verisimilitude. It makes this vision of the past feel like personal manifestations of recollection, Linklater's preoccupation with time once again taking the ultimate forefront of what his projects are really about. It may feel somewhat slight when it's all said and done, but Apollo is packed with Linklater's unique voice and breezy attitude that makes you feel right at home. AFS CINEMA, ALAMO S. LAMAR

D: Daniel Kwan, Daniel Scheinert; with Michelle Yeoh, Ke Huy Quan, Jamie Lee Curtis, Stephanie Hsu, James Hong. (R, 140 min.)

Pandimensional surrealist comedy *Everything Everywhere All at Once* opens, suitably enough, with the camera going through the mirror. That's a not-so-subtle way for directing duo Daniels (aka Daniel Kwan and Daniel Scheinert) to say that, like Alice, you should expect the impossible.

Yes, at first glance, this alternate universe seems very mundane. What could be more prosaic than a family preparing dinner and taxes in their apartment over the family business? Everything is held together by Evelyn, or so she thinks. In fact, the matriarch (Yeoh) is part of the reason everything's falling apart. She's constantly passive-aggressive about daughter Eleanor (Hsu), consistently ignores her doting but increasingly distanced husband (Quan), and treats her visiting dad (Hong) as not just an invalid but constantly at death's door.

So when things start to get a little ... off-kilter, shall we say ... and not just her inability to make headway with a demon tax auditor (a mercilessly funny Curtis as a nightmare in mustard and beige), she's of course going to push back. How could her nebbish husband suddenly be a back-flipping, dimension-hopping warrior who has jumped into her reality to tell her that she's the savior of the entire multiverse?

Is it good or bad timing that Daniels have decided to make a movie about crowded parallel

realities just as Marvel and D.C. are doing exactly the same thing? Well, 1) it's not like they invented the concept; 2) Daniels have had this stewing for years; and 3) no one makes films like Daniels. The team behind the equally chaotic/ controlled *Swiss Army Man* are masters of density – visual, emotional, and character. The latter is important here because you have to keep a very close eye on who exactly is in the body you're looking at (parallel universes, remember?).

What's undoubted is that Daniels have mixed a heady cocktail of a movie, distilled from a deep love of cinema. At one level this is a cavalcade of references to Chinese, Taiwanese, Hong Kong, and Chinese American movies, but not in a clumsy way. You don't go, "Well, that's the Wong Kar-wai universe," or, "Hey, that's a Sammo Hung vibe." It's influence, not emulation; shorthand, not rip-off. At the same time, no one makes films that look like the Daniels'. The opening sequences prove that they can make even the most mundane environments seem bright and kinetic. Yet when they kick into high gear, throwing themselves between worlds that are like ours but just divergent enough to make an all-important difference, then no one packs in so many ideas and witty concepts with such grace and ease. Your pupils will be as wide as those on the googly eyes that become an omnipresent motif.

But where they really excel is as great directors of characters, actors, and emotion. Yeoh is Yeoh, in all the shades and aspects that she has ever shown in her prestigious career, and she gets to focus them through this cranky laundry owner. Her constant battles with her daughter will spark recognition in every parent and child because we've all been there, much as will her sparks with the perfectly irascible Hong. But she is matched, step for step, by the return to the screen of Quan. Steven Spielberg saw a monstrous charm and talent back in 1984 when he cast the young Quan as Short Round in *Indiana Jones and the Temple of Doom*, but in 38 years he never got the projects he deserved, and took nearly two decades away from the camera. Here, he gets to be that nebbish husband, but he also channels *Armor of God*-era Jackie Chan and turn-of-the-millennium Tony Leung. Like Yeoh, his performance is like a humble rainbow. They are never overshadowed by what Daniels do visually, nor do the directors ever try. It's synergy, baby, the music of the movie spheres.

Truly, Everything Everywhere All at Once does one thing: exactly what the title promises. ★★★↓ – Richard Whittaker ALAMO S. LAMAR

INFINITE STORM

D: Małgorzata Szumowska; with Naomi Watts, Billy Howle, Denis O'Hare. (R, 104 min.)

Infinite Storm is a survival film that tells the true story of a hazardous snowstorm rescue that contains incredible images of snow-covered mountains and perilous actions, which are coupled with a more psychologically interior story about survival from grief. Plus, the need to be indomitable in the face of each type of threat.

Based on the true experience of Pam Bales, Infinite Storm stars Naomi Watts, who once again opts for the kind of survival story that requires a display of physical and emotional grit that has become the actress' calling card (The Impossible, The Sea of Trees, Funny Games). Watts is well-suited to play Bales, the New Hampshire woman who we learn, bit by bit, is a nurse, a mother, and a search and rescue mountain guide. We observe Pam as she wakes to her predawn alarm clock, rises, and makes ready to depart her spare cabin for a day of climbing Mt. Washington, the tallest peak in New Hampshire's White Mountains and the eastern United States. The radio informs Pam and the viewers that a major storm is rolling in, and when she stops at her local cafe to fill her thermos with coffee, the proprietor also

reminds her that the day is not a good one for solo climbing. In response, Pam declares, "You know what day it is," which moves the mystery surrounding Pam front and center. A couple of close calls on her way up reveal Pam's aptitude, knowledge, and strength as a climber. In flashbacks during her struggles we witness two young girls who are presumably her daughters. The mystery is now established, yet remains unresolved 'til the end of the film.

Part of the way up the mountain, Pam decides to turn back due to the worsening weather, but then becomes aware of other footprints in the snow. She discovers another human being perched on the edge of a cliff who is wearing shorts and sneakers, unresponsive, and suffering from hypothermia and frostbite. He does not want to be rescued, but through force of will and survival skills, Pam forces this person, whom she calls John (Howle), down the mountain. This middle part of the film chronicles their dangerous descent. Once reaching the parking lot, he dashes away in his car. Days later, he reaches out and the two meet in the area cafe. He reveals the source of his sorrow and they commiserate and find common solace. The reason for their grief is not dwelled on.

The details of the story are emotionally draining, but that sensation derives mostly from the situation rather than the characters. This is primarily an environment vs. human beings story.

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Adventure and Romance Return in *The Lost City*

The Nee brothers praise the great clown, Sandra Bullock BY RICHARD WHITTAKER

In 2006, Adam and Aaron Nee caught the eyes of indie tastemakers when their debut feature, microbudget comedy *The Last Romantic*, played in the original Alamo Drafthouse on Colorado as part of South by Southwest. Looking back, Adam said, "That was our first movie, our first premiere, our first everything. I remember how welcomed we felt to Austin, to the festival to the community. There was a line around the block to see our \$20,000 indie movie, and it was a formative experience."

Sixteen years later, the writer/director siblings got another SXSW memory: watching *The Lost City*, their action rom-com, as the Saturday night headliner at SXSW 2022 in a packed Paramount Theatre. Adam said, "To be here, 16 years later, in a 1400-seat theatre with a movie with Sandra Bullock, Channing Tatum, Daniel Radcliffe, Brad Pitt, it's a beautiful coming-home kind of feeling."

Their star-studded studio picture, which arrives in cinemas this weekend, may seem a long way from what Aaron described as two kids from small town Florida maxing out their credit cards to get their movie made, but *The Lost City* is a different kind of daring. In an age of IP-driven cinema and risk-averse studios, "we don't take that for granted," said Aaron, who called the film "a scary leap into the dark that I really appreciate Paramount taking, because doing something on this scale – it's not a sequel, it's not based on an existing franchise or a hit comic book – it just doesn't happen."

In *The Lost City*, Bullock plays Loretta Sage, a former archaeologist turned romance novelist who may have inadvertently discovered a real missing civilization. When she's unwillingly dragged into adventure, it's up to her sweet-natured and lunkheaded cover model, Alan Caprison (Tatum), to rescue her – although it becomes pretty clear that he's the one that needs rescuing. Adam described it as a throwback to Eighties star-driven flicks like *Romancing the Stone*, "where you took the characters and put them in the jungle, and the romance works in the movie, the action works in the movie, the comedy works in the movie, and they're all taken equally seriously."

So how did they get the movie made? Two words, one name. "Sandra Bullock," said Adam. "Sandy is someone we've all been wanting to see in a movie like this for a long time ... so to be able be part of this as a filmmaker is something I'm exceptionally grateful for."

It turns out that it wasn't just the Nees and audiences that wanted to see Bullock go back to the slapstick antics of *Miss Congeniality* and *The Proposal.* "Sandy wants to look foolish as much as possible," said Adam. "She's like a classic clown. She's the beautiful sex symbol who relishes being funny.

"Channing's the same way," added Aaron. "You could look at him and go, 'He's beautiful, he's an athlete, this guy should be an action star, he should be the one taking himself seriously,' and he's all about, 'Make me look like a fool. Throw me in these situations.' That's the secret sauce that turns them into real people. They let you laugh at them, and you love them for it."

Directed by prominent Polish director Małgorzata Szumowska, *Infinite Storm* has Slovenia stand in for New Hampshire's Mt. Washington. The imagery by cinematographer Michal Englert is stupendous, but the dialogue and plot by actor-turned-screenwriter Joshua Rollins, who also has a small role in the film, are a bit too minimal. *Infinite Storm* always shows the perils we face but never explains them.

D: Aaron Nee, Adam Nee; with Sandra Bullock, Channing Tatum, Daniel Radcliffe, Da'Vine Joy Randolph, Brad Pitt. (PG-13, 112 min.)

Years ago, I took a Film 101 class, and the professor was doing a week on slapstick. Now, we all know slapstick when we see it: a comedy that uses exaggerated physical gags/broad humor. I thought we'd see something like Laurel and Hardy or Charlie Chaplin, but this professor showed us *Miss Congeniality*.

Hold the phone, what?! I was snobby and thought, "No way!" All these years later, though, Bullock has since perfected her schtick, and it's on full display in *The Lost City*.

Loretta Sage (Bullock) has a bestselling romance novel series with a deadline for the next book looming. She's grieving the loss of her spouse and hasn't left her house in years. Forced to go on a book tour shared with the popular cover model of her books, Alan Caprison (Tatum), Sage is kidnapped by Kendall Roy – er, by Abigail Fairfax (Radcliffe), a billionaire crybaby adventurer who is looking for the Lost City of D, which is, of course, the title/subject of Sage's latest book. Caprison, who imagines himself the character from the book series, Dash McMahon, hires Jack Trainer (Pitt) to find her and together they set off to somewhere in the Atlantic to get her back. Now, there'll be hundreds of reviews comparing this to films like *King Solomon's Mines* and *Romancing the Stone* – and they'd be right. It is exactly that. Why tamper with the formula when it works? And *The Lost City* does work. It's a fun two-hour romp that's not trying to be anything else but what it is: a good old-fashioned action-adventure romantic comedy.

Bullock might bungle her way through the jungle (that's all right by me) but it's Tatum who steals the show. Like Bullock, he knows what he's great at and does it well. His Alan/Dale is charming and, well, you get to see nearly all of that charm on display here. Radcliffe looks like he was having an absolute blast. Pitt is, well, Pitt, but it's limited Pitt, so viewers should enjoy him while they can.



OUT OF THE BLUE

D: Dennis Hopper; with Hopper, Linda Manz, Don Gordon, Sharon Farrell, Leon Ericksen, Raymond Burr. (R, 94 min.)

For sheer what-the-fuckery, it's hard to beat *Out of the Blue*'s opening scene: A drunk Dennis Hopper, Linda Manz in clown makeup riding shotgun, plows his 18-wheeler into the side of a school bus filled with children. The film gets darker and weirder from there. As Hopper's directorial debut, 1969's *Easy Rider* put the nail in the coffin of Sixties idealism, so his (until now) rarely available 1980 film tracked the decline of Seventies excess into





no-future nihilism. At least, that's what everyone says, anyway. Hopper the seer, once again reading the entrails of the zeitgeist. For this 4K restoration, there's even a nice bit of opening text providing that very context. History loves a comfortable trajectory. But even if you take the wild production stories from Out of the Blue with a grain of salt, there's no denying that, like the punk movement depicted in the film, there was a wholly unique convergence of forces that slammed together at just the right moment, and captured lightning on celluloid.

Most of that power comes from Linda Manz: the once-muse of Terrence Malick, forever the archetype of the Seventies tomboy, her wiseass, street urchin bravado often imitated but never duplicated. There is not an inauthentic bone in her body. Manz plays CeBe, a wayward 15-year-old obsessed with Elvis and punk rock, who lives with her mom Kathy (Farrell) in the outskirts of Vancouver. They both await the impending prison release of Don (Hopper), family patriarch, perpetual ne'er-do-well, inadvertent mass murderer. The restoration of the nuclear family brings no joy, however. Don is relegated to working a bulldozer at the town dump, a pint of cheap whiskey as co-pilot while Kathy continues her self-medication of intravenous drugs. This leaves CeBe to her own devices, which mostly involve wandering around town having conversations with her portable tape recorder or hitching a ride into the city for a run-in with a couple of sexual predators before the punk rock show.

There is a bleakness that permeates just about every frame of Out of the Blue. From the shithole diner Kathy works at to the spaces and street fronts CeBe wanders through, these environments don't just look lived in, they look lived in, torn up, and left for dead. Hopper is smart enough to point the camera at Manz and follow her with wonderful, extended tracking shots (the early days of the Steadicam were the best), as she weaves in and out of this wasteland. In this, it's reminiscent of Truffaut's The 400

Blows, with an added undercurrent of dread and violence. The film wildly flails on a precipice that constantly threatens to collapse, yet it never does. There's a scene in the punk club where this guy is running around with a film camera, shoving it into people's faces. "Say something legible!" he screams. Those days are over, kid. As anthropology, Out of the Blue is engrossing; as a social document, it is essential; but as undiluted raw power, it is absolute. No filter. **** - Josh Kupecki

7 DAYS

D: Roshan Sethi; with Karan Soni, Geraldine Viswanathan, Mark Duplass, Zenobia Shroff, Aparna Nancherla. (NR, 86 min.)

Say "arranged marriage" and there's an automatic gut reaction from a lot of audiences, riddled with visions of child brides, loveless partnerships, and the death of romance. Some of that response comes from racism, and some from a lack of depictions of what the process even means. So here comes wonderful, witty rom-com 7 Days to fill that gap.

Director Roshan Sethi throws Ravi (Soni, who co-wrote with Sethi) and Rita (Blockers standout Viswanathan) right into the maelstrom of the classic rom-com awkward date. It's pretty clear from moment one that it's going pretty much

nowhere, even if they work hard to keep up the facade that they've both built up (and had built up for them) through the series of video interviews and exchanges between them and, most importantly, their mothers.

Sethi and Soni's script immediately demystifies the modern arranged marriage as being sort of like e-dating, but with your parents having your passwords. Yet they also reinforce the on-ramp for non-Indian audiences by filtering the whole experience through the lens of an all-time classic rom-com: When Harry Met Sally The duo is forced together, and then stuck with each other due to a narrative obstruction. For Meg Ryan and Billy Crystal, it was that getting-toknow-you road trip. With Ravi and Rita, the date of their date gives everything away: March 2020. When they go back to her apartment to shake hands and never see each other again, automobile mishaps and California's COVID-19 shelterin-place order strike, and so they're forced into unwanted cohabitation. It's clear that neither's profile was accurate: Nebbish researcher Ravi is a very traditional guy who is looking for a traditional girl, but his e-presence overpromised and underdelivered. Rita's profile wasn't exactly on the level either, but that's mainly because of a few things she was keeping to herself. Being stuck in close confinement with Ravi means those secrets, like the chicken wings and beer in her fridge, won't stay secret for long.

The When Harry Met Sally ... resonances are very deliberate: Sethi even opens up with a series of video interviews of older couples in a direct nod to Rob Reiner's beloved Greek chorus of couples explaining their own romantic beginnings. The audience knows the timeline is compressed here: With only a few days of the shelter-in-place, or at least until Ravi can get a rental car and flee, the will-they-won't-they dance is more a breezy cha-cha-cha than a drifting waltz. But then, Nora Ephron was asking a different question: For Harry and Sally, it was about probing the lines between friendship, attraction, and love. For Sethi and Soni, it's about looking at all the arranged marriages that have worked and asking why. You can't just have two people meet and expect them to live together, Rita hurls at Ravi, who immediately counters that, well, isn't that what we're doing?

7 Days never blanches at its pandemic setting, and when COVID finally seeps through the door of Rita's messy apartment it's with the same game-changing weight as when Harry stares up at the ceiling in blank terror while Sally snuggles, tousle-haired, in his arms. But just because 7 Days knows the beats of the classic rom-com, that doesn't make it a cover version. Instead, it's a delightfully new riff, one filled with cultural specificities and timeliness. Can these two crazy kids make it work? That's what really matters, and Soni and Viswanathan's easy charm makes a week trapped with them breeze by. - Richard Whittaker

UMMA

D: Iris K. Shim; with Dermot Mulroney, Fivel Stewart, Odeya Rush, Sandra Oh, Tom Yi. (PG-13, 84 min.)

Sometimes the scariest ideas are simple: What if, after years of actively trying not to, you become your mother? In Umma, Sandra Oh plays Amanda, a beekeeper who lives off the grid with her daughter, Chris (Stewart). Amanda desperately tries to have a healthy, loving relationship with her daughter to make up for the abusive one she had with her own mother.

Based off of Oh's incredible involvement, both as the lead and as a producer. Umma should be a hit. However, there's something that never clicks throughout the film, which is an unfortunate disappointment. Iris K. Shim's script is predictable and only surface-level, never really digging deep into the weight of the generational trauma Shim desires to explore. Potentially exciting elements, like Amanda being scared of electricity, feel like they are thrown haphazardly into a blender.

Like many Sam Raimi-produced films, there's a staleness to the filmmaking with nothing particularly memorable as a sensory experience. Shim's direction feels trapped somewhere in the late 2000s, a bit too digital and flat. None of the numerous jump scares land, and visually Umma is bland and middling. The lighting is terrible, a combination of blacks, blues, and beiges intended to produce an eerie look, but the end result kind of just looks monotonous and dull. The music - a constant screech of sharp, harsh strings - is overplayed in an attempt to raise the intensity.

There is a lot of heart in Shim's script, though, which does make it a bit watchable. Oh's and Stewart's mother-daughter chemistry is sweet, even though their characters aren't given a lot of depth. Quieter moments when they're reading a book together, or Chris comforting Amanda during a lightning storm, feel genuine and lovely, because both actresses are so natural with each other. It's disheartening that their characters are so plastic, underdeveloped, and given clunky expository dialogue.

A common issue with a number of recent horror movies is this idea that the subtext needs to be at the forefront of the film, making it text. There's nothing to unpack when the film tells you exactly what it wants you to take away from it, nothing engaging that keeps you on your toes. Umma has this problem: Shim never lets her audience experience Amanda's grief and trauma, and instead has her characters guide the story by monologuing their thoughts and feelings without much depth or nuance. In addition to the lack of levity throughout the film, Umma feels like a drag, with its only saving grace being the short run time.

There are so many interesting components of Umma that never click, wasting a completely original idea on banality. Horror movies are allowed to be fun, but instead Umma feels like you're being talked at for its entirety, a hackneyed approach to what could have potentially been a cool addition to North American mainstream horror. ** - Jenny Nulf





For the Love of Fungi

Austin mycophiles drive growing taste for local

mushrooms by hannah uebele

You'd be forgiven for not thinking of Texas as a hot spot for wild mushrooms. But Austin is quickly making a name for itself as a place for fungi fans to unite their love of science and food.

Angel Schatz, who's part of the leadership circle for Central Texas Mycological Society, didn't even think about mushrooms when she moved to Austin, assuming that it was too dry for moisture-loving fungi. But when she learned that morels – a prized fungus among foodies due to their earthy, nutty flavor – grew within city limits, her perspective changed. "It just opens up a whole world, you're like, 'What?! There's chanterelles here too?' And then you just keep digging and finding all these other mushrooms."

Wild mushrooms abound within Austin city limits, including boletes, chanterelles, lion's mane, chicken of the woods, oysters, reishi, wood ear ... the list goes on.

FORAGING MUSHROOMS

McCartney Taylor describes mushroom hunting as "Easter eggs for adults." When Taylor got interested in foraging back in 2010, he looked for a group in Austin doing "mushrooming" but couldn't find any. "I was having so much fun, I said, 'You know what, I guess I'll make my own group." Taylor created the Texas Wild Mushrooming Group, which has now grown to more than 2,000 members on Meetup.

Morels are prized above all else, Taylor says. "And Texas has such a phenomenal morel season, if you know where to look."

Austin's morel season is currently underway. "Morels pop up in Austin when the redbuds bloom, which typically is somewhere between March 20 and April 15," Taylor says. A good morel season in Austin will last around three weeks, but on a bad year, you'll only have a one-week window, he added. Temperature, humidity, and rainfall all influence the outcome of a season.

Taylor won't give away the location of his prized "honey holes," tried-and-true spots where morels consistently appear each season. But he provides some helpful clues: Look under Ashe juniper trees that are situated close to a river, particularly groves that are on slanted terrain.

Chanterelle season follows morel season. "We had a really abundant chanterelle season last year," Schatz says. It's tricky to put an exact date on any mushroom season since it all comes down to climate. "When it feels like a sauna outside, when it's really sticky, with almost flash flood-style rain, that's when we get chanterelles," she says. "It really is weather-dependent and conditions have to be favorable for each kind of mushroom species."

Taylor is encouraged by the growing numbers of mycophiles and myco-curious people. "I am a citizen scientist and I'm happy when other people get excited about mushrooming," he says. Those who are interested in mushrooming should always join a foraging group so that they know what's edible and what's not. All types of folks are joining his Texas Wild Mushrooming Group – kids, adults, retirees – but the common thread are those interested in the natural sciences, he said.

MUSHROOMS AT NIGHT

The Central Texas Mycological Society has been active since 2019 and now has close to 700 members, Schatz notes. She hopes the society will help people appreciate local mushrooms through educational programming, cooking demos, forays, art programs, and other events centered on fungi.

In early March, the society led a New Moon Night Walk, attracting nocturnal naturalists from all over. We met at Red Bluff Neighborhood Park, a place with numerous hiking trails and a view of Downtown Austin that Schatz describes as "the Mount Bonnell of East Austin." Around 30 people attended, a mix of adults and families, using UV flashlights to illuminate mushrooms that would appear brown, beige, or white in the daylight. The fluorescing fungi produced diverse shades of reds, oranges, and purples. The enthusiasm was audible - each time a UV light connected with a fluorescent body, mushrooms were greeted with "oohs and aahs" from their human admirers.

"We want to show the magic of mushrooms in all facets," says Schatz. "We would not exist if we didn't have the fungi queendom doing all this work building our soil and transferring nutrients to our plants."

GROWING MUSHROOMS

But fungi love isn't limited to foraging. Local restaurants, and home cooks, are embracing the pronounced taste for specialty mushrooms, and many local businesses are cropping up to support demand.

Hi-Fi Mycology, Austin's first urban mushroom farm, has been selling mushrooms at farmers' markets across Central Texas since 2017. And then there's Smallhold, an urban mushroom farm company that began in Brooklyn and has bet big on Austin. It now has two warehouse mushroom farms in South Austin and Buda. Employees wearing hair nets, KN95 masks, and crisp, stylish uniforms reveal eye-popping, immaculate mushrooms in chambers that are humidity- and temperature-controlled based on each fungi species' preference.

"The bigger picture idea with Smallhold is getting people to eat more mushrooms and to change their perspective of mushrooms," says Andrew Carter, co-founder and CEO of Smallhold. "We want people to become mushroom people, and ... more people [making] that change in their diet can help drive bigger change on our planet and our ecosystem." The Buda farm opened just last summer and already processes around 6,000 pounds of mushrooms a week.

EATING MUSHROOMS

Local chef Philip Speer, of Comedor and Assembly, often collaborates with local mycology groups and frequently sources mushrooms from local farms to use in his restaurant.

Speer says that cooking with local mushrooms has "opened up the door for creativity" for him as a chef. His menu at Comedor features a rotating mix of local mushrooms based on the season. "All mushrooms are great for flavors, texture, beauty, creativity," he said. "There's just

all sorts of ways to use them and it's very exciting and very fun."

One of Speer's favorite ways to cook with mushrooms is making lion's mane birria tacos. "Birria tacos are this huge sensation right now and people often enjoy the mushroom ones more than they enjoy the short rib ones!" he said. "They're just always surprised at how delicious, satisfying, and fulfilling it can be even though it's not your typical protein."

Taylor also likes to cook with lion's mane that he forages himself. "It is absolutely delicious and if you cook it in butter, you will swear you're eating lobster." Taylor's favorite mushrooms to cook with are chanterelles. He shreds them, fries them up in a pan, and adds them to spaghetti carbonara, saying, "It is oh-so-good."

STUDYING (AND LOVING) MUSHROOMS

Mycophilic community continues to grow here in Austin. The UT Fungarium, a new fungi collection that will be preserved at the university, kicked off this month. Liz Bowman, a postdoctoral research associate at UT-Austin's Brackenridge Field Lab, said at the kickoff that Texas has a rich diversity of fungi that can now be properly documented. The UT Fungarium will do many things, including helping identify new fungi species and informing our under-

standing of why fungi look and behave the way they do. The UT Fungarium is collaborating with the Central Texas Mycological Society to include community volunteers and citizen scientists with the maintenance and growth of the collection.

A new student organization at UT-Austin called the Longhorn Mycological Society just popped up onto the scene in January. UT junior Ali Shirazi, the founder of the group, says they already

have close to 70 members. Shirazi attributes that number to a recent shift among his peers who have a fascination for fungi. "We hope to serve as a place for students who have any interest in mycology and be able to provide resources for that," he said. "I look forward to having the opportunities to lead our own forays into green spaces and to collect and do research as citizen scientists."



Music Dispatches From a New Decade of SXSW

The first South by Southwest to transpire this decade felt less like the hectic and celebrity-dominated Fests of the 2010's and more like the accessible Aughts. A strong middle-class of indie acts – loaded with buzzy newcomers, international bands, and cult-status dignitaries – brought out the ideal amount of fans to where the clubs were full, but long lines were scarce. Over six days, our bullpen of adventurous scribes reviewed performances by over 50 acts from roughly a dozen countries. Here are some highlights.

Cifika's Swirling Hydrovox 2.0

I emerged from the pews of Central Presbyterian with a slight dizzy feeling in my stomach, like the kind you get with a pretty good plane landing. Such is the woozy, pleasant impact of watching projected visuals swirl in a large cylindrical tube for 30 minutes.

Ambient vocal experimenter Cifika led the otherworldly deep-sea exhibition, created in collaboration with lighting designer Alex Griff. What began as a shapeshifting jellyfish, alien internal organ, or dragon's spine grew into a churning aquarium of amoebas and sea plankton, then a crystallized dandelion.

Cifika's "Hydrovox 2.0" installation, originally performed at the Arko Museum of Art

in the artist's home of Seoul, loosely mimics an industrial water tank with curved translucent plastic panels. After an introductory score of softly howling, windswept industrial rumble, the artist entered her upright tunnel to a control center of electronic musicmaking equipment. What began as a persistent click – akin to unsuccessfully starting a gas burner – grew slowly to entrancing, drone-leaning, loose pop structures, beckoned by reliable and unexpected club beats.

She appeared to control the light show with outstretched arms, as her and Griff's visual tech reacted live to the imputed audio. It all looked quite epic under the church's giant cross, SXSW's most memorable backdrop. After half an hour of passionate gesture, Cifika packed up her things and quietly walked out the back of her former container. - Rachel Rascoe

Wet Leg's Birthday Debut

A thousand butterfly wing-flap moments likely contributed to Wet Leg being the buzziest debut at SXSW, but I'm comfortable stating the main cause was a preternaturally good and fun song called "Chaise Longue." The debut single landed on Domino Recording last June. Since then, the English duo has risen to a level of interest attracting passersby cries of, "What is this huge line for?" and a handful of fans peeking over the fence from the bar next door during their packed first performance in Austin. A prior searing set by Sasami, at a showcase put on by both artists' label, brought Rainey's Half Step to capacity and beyond.

Wet Leg's leading Rhian Teasdale and Hester Chambers emerged happily with arms around each other's waists to walk-on soundtrack "Concerning Hobbits" before ripping into their own "Too Late Now." Later, an unreleased song impeccably captured their addictive formula: A sugary-sweet melodic portion ended with the saucy lyric "Why don't you just suck my dick?" Then, a shared group scream, and a series of contagiously smiley guitar-toting twirls from the frontpersons. New material, as their debut album isn't out until next month, proved the Wet Leg universe won't all be tightly wound, prickly post-punk. One slow jam harkened to Teasdale's past life as a piano-playing singer-songwriter in the vein of Regina Spektor.

Unfortunately, sound issues persisted throughout the set – especially interruptive for a band built on precision-cut vocal insertions and snappy combinations of bouncy pop and gritty guitar. Feedback appeared to deter Chambers from throwing in more of her singing parts, emphasizing the leading force of Teasdale's vocal charisma between the fuzz. A synth player/third guitarist in the quintet sang too, announcing midway that Wet Leg's Texas debut aligned with Teasdale's birthday, requiring a crowd chorus. (Teasdale joked, "I'm finally 16," in one of only a few words spoken by a surprisingly shy band considering their cheeky lyrics.) Naturally, the largest sing-along came for the finale, a perfect song for hopping along about laying on a chaise longue in your underwear. -R.R.

Thrashable Twee-Pop Band Pom Poko Leaves Critic in Pain

Until I ate a flying elbow while trying to bust a jig at the center of the Pom Poko circle pit, the spiritual affinity between traditional Norwegian folk dancing and traditional American moshing was not something I had considered.

Another fact previously unknown by me: Pom Poko – a technically gifted twee-pop band named after a Studio Ghibli anime on a label run by a Cocteau Twin – make music to thrash your fucking head to. Really! Heard on record, the group's inclination to run sugar-sweet melodies through squawky guitar dissonance and Bizarro World time signatures struck me as primarily aesthetic – a formula for scoring extra indie quirk points. From the sweaty center of a crowd that was going way too hard for Cheer Up Charlies' tiny inside floor, it became stupidly clear that, actually, Pom Poko's stop-start shuffle-punk rhythms are as mapped to incite dummy-rage-storms as any track on my beloved metalcore leg-day playlists.

Yet even as the band kept finding new pockets of twitchy calm to disrupt with bombastic fret breakdowns, never once did the earwormy songs misplace their core danceable thump. Likewise, overalls-clad frontwoman Ola Djupvik's delightfully strange stage presence was crucial in helping her ostentatiously talented bandmates set a breezy, crowd-pleasing tone. Though she'd often begin each song by standing stiff in a pose of stern, meditative focus, it was never long before some goofy dance whim - be it jogging in place or hopping on the amps to cling to the rafters - shattered her stone face. For a few songs she even came down to shove around with us in the pit. - Julian Towers

Los Bitchos Christen First U.S. Show With a Bottle of Tequila

The first thing you feel is the drums. Every one of Nic Crawshaw's snare hits registers loud, cracking, intentional through the packed-out Cedar Street Courtvard - powering Los Bitchos' pulsating, mostly instrumental exotica alongside wrench-tight bassist Josefine Jonsson. The London-based outfit, who's generated enough buzz off recently released LP Let the Festivities Begin! to get shine in *Rolling Stone* and headline the British Music Embassy showcase, thrives on joyous, approachable stage energy and crafty compositions that have cool part after cool part. Certainly the cumbia aspect of Los Bitchos feels lightweight in a city where you can hear authentic, masterful musicians playing even at a weekend flea market, but the UK quartet, rounded out last night with Ryan Fitzgibbon of erstwhile Austin no-wave act US Weekly, cast a wide stylistic net on

Tuesday, March 15, that equally indulged in Turkish psych, funk, and rock – all of it a playground for the basement shredder guitar heroism of Serra Petale. After passing around a fifth of tequila twice during their set, Petale celebrated this being Los Bitchos' "first time playing in the United fuckin' States of America" and local audience members were polite enough not to mention that Texas is its own country. They closed, appropriately, with "Tequila." – K.C.

With an Altar to "Sister Bobbie," Willie Nelson's Luck Reunion Returns

At the last Luck Reunion in 2019, a number of memorials to late songwriters were scattered throughout grounds, but this year only one was placed: an altar outside the tiny Luck chapel in memory of Bobbie Nelson.

The pianist passed away last week, and Thursday night marked Willie Nelson's first public show without his sister, the heart of the Family Band for nearly half a century.

The perennial Luck headliner's stage seemed sparse without Bobbie's piano, her black cowboy hat instead simply set atop a mic stand to the side. The closing set likewise struck more subdued, with Willie and sons Lukas and Micah seated center stage. Yet the entire day felt nonetheless celebratory and affirming, the Luck Reunion living up to its name as it returned following a two-year hiatus to finally mark its 10th anniversary.

Willie and his boys remain the main event, and the new set up served well as almost a song swap between them. "In

Loving Memory of Bobbie Nelson 1931-2022" projected on the back of the stage, and the more mellow arrangement fostered a sense of communion and even rejuvenation that extended to the crowd.

As the familiar closing, stage-packed round of "Will the Circle Be Unbroken/I'll Fly Away" swelled, it offered affirmation that Luck was indeed back, and that the Family Band endures. – Doug Freeman

Dolly Parton Brought Her Full Self to SXSW (and the Dollyverse)

The first thing you knew about the Dollyverse – Dolly Parton's much-hyped South by Southwest appearance – was that it was powered by blockchain: It was streamed on blockchain! In-person attendees got a free Dolly Parton-themed NFT! Blockchain Creative Labs promos were broadcast over giant screens!

The second was that Parton's appearance at the Moody Friday evening, March 18, was partly to tease a new novel she wrote with every grandparent's favorite writer James Patterson – Run, Rose, Run – and a companion album of the same name.

All of that sounds like a SXSW Mad Lib, an optimized amalgamation of the buzzy activations that have been crammed down attendees' throats since the Conference started last week. Of course SXSW was going to make hay about its first-ever Dolly appearance ("It never came up," she succinctly explained about why she'd never been on the bill). But Dolly the novelist hawking NFTs? This late in the week it's easy to get cynical that it's pure, sanitized promotion.

Until she walks on stage, that is.

Dolly could sell you a vacuum cleaner. Dolly could sell you a cheaply made set of encyclopedias. Dolly could sell you an NFT version of the album *Run, Rose, Run* even though – hand to God – you still couldn't explain an NFT if your life depended on it. And she could do it all without so much as a mention of any of those things at all. What made Parton's appearance so special is that, no matter what PR machine got her there, she showed up with her full self, blissfully untethered from anything but being Dolly Parton. Even powered by the blockchain, Parton at the Moody was still pure as the driven snow.

For that next hour, Parton poured it out on stage. The first three songs of the set were dedicated to *Run*, *Rose*, *Run* the album, performed by Parton – stalking the stage in backless rhinestone platform heels – with the same fervor as anything from her canon. But, of course, it was the mega hits that the packed crowd anticipated the most. Parton delivered: She did largely a capella versions of spiritual "Precious Memories" and "Smokey Mountain Memories," her crisp soprano untouched by time, soaring into every corner of the room. Speaking of memories, she peppered storytelling in between songs, tapping into her Appalachian upbringing and early career to lend context to some of her best-known cuts.

And those are the moments the crowd will remember: The roar of recognition from the syncopated keyboard chords that kick off "9 to 5," the stilling rendition of all-time great "I Will Always Love You," the breathless heart of "Coat of Many Colors." Parton embodied the urgency of "Jolene" and the satisfying lift of "Here You Come Again," fresh as the day she wrote them. If we needed the blockchain to take us there, sign me up. -Abby Johnston

The "Secret Password" Is Cymande

In the documentary *Getting It Back: The Story of Cymande*, Cut Chemist likened the band to a secret password. If you knew them, you were immediately part of a club of music-heads who were down with an almost invisible cornerstone of hip-hop. As the band readied to take the stage Friday night, a trio of young fans jockeyed for position near me, excitedly asking, "Do you *know* this band?!" "I do," I nodded affirmatively, as if giving a secret handshake.

After the film premiere and playing to a

capacity crowd on Rainey Street, it seems the secret is now out. The club may not be quite as exclusive as it once was, but everyone in it should be elated that Cymande is getting some long-overdue love after their trifecta of near-perfect albums from 1972 to 1974 never got the accolades they deserved.

From the unmistakable opening bass line of "Getting It Back," Caribbean-born founding members Patrick Patterson (guitar), Steve Scipio (bass), and Derrick Gibbs (saxophone) led the eightpiece London ensemble in a rare stateside performance, blending funk, reggae, psych, jazz, calypso, and more into their signature "nyah-rock."

"So we're gonna give you more songs than talking, yeah?" Patterson surveyed the crowd before launching into "Do It (This Time With Feeling)" from 2015 comeback LP *A Simple Act of Faith*. Let's just say that the folks familiar with this one were an even more exclusive club, possibly limited to the musicians onstage. Next came the percussive mellow mysticism of "For Baby Ooh" and the spirited breakbeat bonanza and crowd favorite "Bra."

"For those that didn't know, 'Bra' means brother, so I thought we'd give you a little bit of brotherly love," Patterson mused.

That was followed by the slick funk of "Brothers on the Slide" and set closer "The Message," mashed up with Bob Marley's "Get Up, Stand Up" for good measure.

Meet Casual Beck, He's Cool

The announcement of a solo acoustic concert from SXSW keynoter Beck made many of us expect a set of material from the "Sad Beck" canon of Sea Change and Morning *Phase*. He indicated as much upon his arrival to the stage: "All right, so let's have some fun ... actually, disclaimer on that, I'm going to play some really sad, slow songs." The ensuing performance turned out to be a remarkably loose, playful, and bravely unprepared two hours of Beck in a way we'd never seen him before. Material ranged from extreme rarities ("Canceled Check"), to an unreleased new song, to never-played-before covers (Hank Williams' "Lonesome Whistle"), all interspersed with legitimately hilarious storytelling and thought bubbles. For much of the set, he was backed on pedal steel by Austin's Jesse Ebaugh, who Beck had recruited off Mohawk's indoor stage the previous night at 2am. The Californian's voice sounded incredible throughout the show, which was often lovably shambolic with forgotten lyrics, restarted songs, and impromptu stage gags like deciding to "explore the space" by moving his mic to the other side of the stage, then immediately moving back. "Jesus, I just looked at the clock," he said, returning for a satisfying double encore of "Debra," "One Foot in the Grave," and Daniel Johnston's "True Love Will Find You in the End." "I've been playing for two hours!" Time flies. -KC

Ukrainian Pop Star Leads Community Catharsis

ACL Radio's Andy Langer asked the Speakeasy audience, as much as possible on Saturday of SXSW, to quiet down for Ukrainian artist Oleksandra "Sasha" Zaritska to share her harrowing story. Alternatively, the singer emerged onstage at Speakeasy twirling her national flag, prompting the crowd to amplify with an, "I can't hear you." Having overcome so many barriers to get to the Fest, including her two Kazka bandmates being drafted into military service, and spread the word on the tragic killing of Ukrainians by Russia's military – the magnetic, natural performer was eager to do what she does best.

To an excited crowd at the community-assembled "Austin Stands With Ukraine" showcase, Zaritska debuted her room-filling, dynamic vocals with a beautiful rendition of the Ukrainian national anthem in a moving crowd chorus.

Austin musicians Bryan Ray, Ryan Hagler, and Charlie Harper served as Zaritska's backing band, later joined by special guest Charlie Sexton for a finale edition of "Masters of War," before which Zaritska stated: "I have a message to Putin ... It's a song by Bob Dylan." As the only Ukrainian performer at SXSW, Kazka delivered its message, as well as an opportunity for community catharsis. -R.R.

Buffalo Nichols: Beyond the Blues

Confronting harsh realities with hard truths, singer/guitarist offers an invitation to reset musical preconceptions BY DOUG FREEMAN

Buffalo Nichols takes the stage alone at the Scoot Inn and doesn't say a word. In fact, he doesn't even acknowledge the soldout crowd at all. Bundled in a Bane sweatshirt and heavy stocking cap in the slight February chill, he silently picks up his resonator guitar and lets it do the talking.

It's an intense, extraordinary set. His voice scars with gruff tenderness, a raw weariness fused with burning fury. Nichols' fingers work over the guitar with an unsettling fluidity, at times erupting a sound so big that, eyes closed, you would swear he had a full band backing. The songs anchor in the blues, but expand out with an ambient, almost psychedelic wash, and fold in touches of world influences, from West African and Middle Eastern rhythms to Eastern European folkjazz. Traditions run parallel and then weave intoxicatingly together, while Nichols sings beat down ("Lost & Lonesome") and biting ("Living Hell," "Another Man"). What Nichols offers is an invitation, but he doesn't make it easy. He knows the crowd, packed into the Scoot's backyard for headliner Houndmouth, isn't his crowd. He's focused on being heard but doesn't have the patience to court those not willing to listen.

Never once does the artist even mention his name.

"I was annoyed, and I just didn't feel like putting on a fake smile," he offers of the show a few weeks later, sitting on the front porch of Hank's off of Berkman. "I just sort of lean into the emotion, and sometimes I just feel like being dramatic. Sometimes I'm trying to be like a stand-up comedian up there and just having fun, but sometimes something will bother me and I'm like, 'I'm just not going to do it.' Which to me, I'm just trying to put on a show one way or the other. If I feel good, I'm going to share that, and if I'm not feeling good, I'm going to share that, too, and just try to be as honest as I can. "With maybe a little bit of exaggeration," he adds with a slightly wry smile.

Carl Nichols doesn't even really seem to want to sit down for this interview. Born in Houston and raised in Milwaukee, the 30-year-old songwriter has kept a relatively low profile since moving to Austin over a year ago. He admits it's partly just his more introverted personality ("I don't really get out much, anyway") coupled, of course, with the pandemic. But there's also a sense of Nichols just trying to carve out a place for himself in the world, both physically and creatively, and feeling justifiably tired of the effort to be authentically heard.

He carries himself with assured confidence, and doesn't shy away from hard and important conversations. He's thoughtful and frank, but also seems wary and never fully comfortable at the table.

The hesitancy is understandable. Nichols has become – unintentionally, if willingly

- a leading voice in reclaiming the blues as Black culture from its longtime whitebread blues-rock mainstreaming. A *Rolling Stone* article last month cast Nichols at the forefront of this effort, not only because he's building on the blues in unique and provocative ways, but precisely because he is so unflinchingly direct and clear in talking about the problems of the genre.

"I get more attention now for my opinions than my music," he sighs as our conversation bends in that direction. "On one hand, if I would just keep my mouth shut and do what was expected of me, my career would probably be a lot easier. But I'm totally comfortable playing to 50 people who are all open-minded and diverse, [rather] than just being one of the many blues artists who remain opinionless and are rewarded for it. So as much as I get tired of the conversations, I realize they serve a purpose.

"I'm not afraid to ruffle some feathers if I know people are listening to me," he continues. "I really feel like what do you have to lose, and if you say nothing, then you don't deserve to have anybody's attention. I don't know if anything I do is going to influence anybody, but I know for a fact it won't if I don't try. I think artists are in denial about how much influence they have."

Nichols suffers neither illusions nor fools. Austin itself sits at the crux of this problematic dynamic, a town that can simultaneously revere Stevie Ray Vaughan and produce artists like Gary Clark Jr. and Jackie Venson, who both embrace and explode the notion of the blues in their music. Layered on top of Austin's deeply segregated history and contemporary racial challenges, the blues becomes a boiler for digesting the city's tensions socially and culturally.

As necessary as those discussions are, putting them on Nichols isn't fair either. In fact, he's ambivalent about the labels and expectations of being a blues artist altogether.

"I didn't want to be called a blues artist," he says. "As a fan, and to a certain extent as an artist, I'd seen what it means to attach that to yourself. And it's disgusting. It's just not creative, it's not inclusive, it's not diverse – it's not even good most of the time.

"But I've been leaning into it because I'm already in it, so I'm trying to see what I can do with it," he continues. "The blues to me means a lot culturally, but commercially as far as the world of blues festivals and labels, that doesn't interest me at all. The genres exist for selling music and writing about music, but the people that make it and listen to it don't care what you call it. It doesn't have to fit neatly in a box. So I was really hesitant to call myself a blues artist because I knew the baggage. Now I'm still very reluctant, but I'm trying to be proud of it."

Nichols' eponymous debut album, released last year, nonetheless marketed heavily to

his blues bona fides. Fat Possum touted its first solo blues artist signing in nearly two decades, and the album, made mostly from demos, undeniably digs deep into a traditional acoustic blues sound as a vehicle for confronting harsh realities with hard truths.

Yet seeing Nichols live, you realize he's on an entirely different trip – although blues may serve as the bedrock, the world on top of it bursts in myriad directions. The past decade of traveling everywhere from West Africa to Ukraine, his previous Americana-rooted duo Nickel & Rose with upright bassist Johanna Rose, and his early days in the Midwest punk and hardcore scenes serve just as influential for him.

"I am trying to do something different, and traveling outside of America was a big part of that," he acknowl-

edges. "The American music industry, and it's a global thing, but especially in America, it's very rigid. A lot of artists I look up to and respect, they have to do one or two genred albums before they are given permission to do what they want to do. I think a great example is

someone like Leon Bridges, who's doing all kinds of different stuff, but I don't think they would have let him do it out of the gate. He had to give them the classic soul album."

Nichols finds himself trying to navigate and leverage a genre-defined industry, yet not be confined by it. It's a position he's been in before. Nickel & Rose garnered attention in the equally fraught folk scene with their 2018 song "Americana," which called out the hypocrisies of the genre's gestures toward inclusivity and the realities of its overwhelmingly white hegemony.

The blues offers its own taut wire to walk, where expectations of the sound are already

complicated by generations of appropriation and exploitation. Nichols can rip traditional riffs, but as an artist he's more interested in genre transformation than traditional reclamation – it's just that the latter becomes a necessary component to opening the door for the former.

"I use the guitar as a tool, but even when I was in my teens I was really interested in electronic music and hip-hop on the production side," he says. "I never fully gave up on that and am always messing around with it. Especially during the pandemic, I kind of got tired of songs and lyrics, so I really dove into ambient music, the idea of the physical aspects of sonics. There's a meditative quality to sound. When you can feel the music, it just enters your brain in a

different way, so I'm trying to explore that.



and what changes and defines it is the technology. The difference between Son House and Muddy Waters is moving to Chicago and plugging in. So I don't think the genre has to be limited by what it was in 1930. Really it's just me exploring technology."

So the invitation that Nichols offers onstage is to reset your preconceptions of the blues, and then let them go altogether. It is, in fact, precisely what he's trying to do himself, with his music and within the industry. But he never promised to make it easy.






WHAT WE'RE LISTENING TO + CRUCIAL CONCERTS EDITED BY KEVIN CURTIN

DARDEN SMITH'S MULTIMEDIA TREASURE WESTERN SKIES

"Western Skies is a near perfect multimedia balancing act performed by poet, essayist, photographer, singer and songwriter Darden Smith," writes compositional Texas standard Rodney Crowell in the foreword to a stilling, ruminative, lyrical image journal from said Austin constant. "It's the kind of work that could, and should bring him recognition as one of the Lone Star State's finest landscape-and-sky artists." Houston's chinaberry kid never uttered a



false word and here states a truth four decades in the making: Smith belongs amongst the state's finest audio documentarians. Sunny melodies, an arid delivery, and the sanguine fusion of rootsy involubility – country, folk, and jazz seamlessly distilled into every drop – mark his dozen studio long-players, and *Western Skies* delivers pulse to a parched land-scape. Piano pensiveness sets the tempo to opener "The High Road," with "I Can't Explain" plucking the acoustic angularity of a hook digging into your ear until you decode its through line. Spur in your side, "I Don't Want to Dream Anymore" canters a desert shuffle, while "Running Out of Time" hums the obvious hit: *"There ain't nothing funny about getting older/ My soul aches, my body feels the strain/ The past sits heavy on my shoulder/ Tomorrow comes on like a train.*" Smith's book of Polaroids and verse reads like a West Texas road sign, and its audiobook seeps like a River City Iullaby. *Raoul Hernandez*

RAY WYLIE HUBBARD'S *CO-STARRING TOO*

Sequels are dicey propositions. Ray Wylie Hubbard's 2020 Co-Starring spun like a centrifuge, whirring together a range of artists under the raucous, rebellious influence of the Wimberley gypsy-poet's raw blues. Co-Starring Too feels like the afterparty to the main event – though hardly essential, it's still a name-checking good time.

Memorable moments still happen in the album that feels more vibe than purpose. It's a helluva fun party, though.

Ray Wylie brings Willie to open with the rough, worn prayer "Stone Blind Horses," Lloyd Maines' steel sweeping like fading memories. Likewise, the excavated George Reiff bassline behind "Groove" with Shinyribs strikes a high point among the rocked-out collaborations that follow.

Hayes Carll, James McMurtry, and Dalton Domino weigh in on Nashville "Fancy Boys," the Bluebonnets slay funky licks for "Only a Fool," and Steve Earle burns highway diesel on the LA.-escaping "Hellbent for Leather." But as with *Co-Starring*, Hubbard pairs best with his female duets, especially Lzzy Hale and John 5 roaring "Naturally Wild" and Wynonna Judd and Jaimee Harris smoking "Pretty Reckless" with Charlie Sexton and Gurf Morlix backing.

If anything, Too packs too many stars into the club. Hubbard's clearly having a blast as the center of gravity, but few moments are able to stand out in such a cosmos of talent. - Doug Freeman

FUVK RELIVES THE "WINTER STORM OF '21"

In a typical cycle: I missed prolific bedroom-pop songwriter Fuvk's latest low-key release rollout but went searching after a swirling, deceptively simple track stuck with me after a concert. Specifically, project head Shirley Zhu and the threepiece band performed last week at Elysium, at the afterparty for a new film by Kishi Bashi. The beautiful set confirmed the perfectly gentle blunt force of "Winter Storm of '21." Perhaps the first great song about our most recent tragic statewide bummer? The lovesick, emo-dusted track, featuring band vocalist/keyboardist Mitch Webb, stands out as a soft rocker on Fuvk's acoustic LP Split Death. Debuted this month with cassette preorder still available, the shared effort ends with three songs by local artist Mostyn Griffith (aka Throwing). *Rachel Rascoe*

PHOTOKEM LEANS INTO ART-Rock with "hard candy"

The melancholic, borderline mournful voice of Ghana-born singer Nana Acheampong bewitches "Hard Candy," the latest introspective journey from fivepiece band Photokem The spiraling crescendo of electronic beats creates an ambient framework that lies atop violin and cello accompaniment, displaying a more experimental art-rock sound compared to the straightforward soft-rock style of their 2021 EP, Like Riding a Bike Through Mud. The single concludes with spoken-word rock poetry reminiscent of Graeme Edge's "Late Lament" that served as the finale to the Moody Blues concept album Days of Future Passed, evoking parallel tones of disjointed uncertainty and ethereal cultural rumination. - Mars Salazai

CRUEL SUMMER TX'S "SHARP KNIVES" B/W "CITY STREETS"

Debut release for this 8-year-old garage punk fourpiece, transplanted to our shores from Corpus Christi in 2017. For an outfit rooted in the Sparkling City by the Sea and now firmly entrenched in River City rock culture, they certainly don't sound like it. Picture some of the earliest L.A. punk bands X and the Alley Cats, albeit with more psychedelic lead guitar. The vocal blend and gritty, urban songwriting of singer/guitarists Chris Ordonez and Kelly Sadler particularly recall that Masque ethic. A fierce introduction. - Tim Stegall

OLIVER TREE

The last time Oliver Tree graced an Austin stage, at ACL Fest 2019, the injured singer whirled around in a gold-painted wheelchair affixed with a microphone stand, wearing a giant foam cowboy hat. That novelty headwear could be seen as seminal imagery for the meme-keen artist, whose latest visual concept is a gratuitously crying cowboy.

"I cry a lot. I'm a very emotional guy. I don't really cry from being sad as much as I cry from being

moved," says Tree, who says his latest release – a collection of country-themed, pop punk-accented, acoustic guitar-driven sad boy bangers titled *Cowboy Tears* – addresses a stigma. "In America it's like, 'Don't cry, suck it up, toughen up,' and I think that's bullshit."

That masculinity complex gets lampooned with recent clips of his emotional cowboy face on the frame of a bodybuilder that Tree claims is actually him: "I was upset because I was working out with three different personal trainers, drinking Muscle Milk for breakfast and Muscle Milk for dinner, but I ended up essentially being tricked into taking steroids which, to me, was just not cool."

As for performing in Texas, where cowboys still exist, Tree says: "I've been seeing a lot of cowboys coming to these shows and some of them even have cowboy tears tattoos and customized hats and jackets. The country community has really embraced me." - *Kevin Curtin*

CHRISTIAN MCBRIDE'S NEW JAWN Dell Hall @ the Long Center, Friday 25

Trio-ing up with beat mage Questlove and key sage Uri Caine in repping his hometown on 2001's *The Philadelphia Experiment*, Christian McBride could well become the subject of a future documentary by the Roots drummer-turned-in-demand filmmaker (*The Summer of Soul*). Grammy-winning double bassist by way of load-bearing jazz support beams both historic (Freddie Hubbard, Sonny Rollins, Chick Corea) and modern (Brian Blade, Kenny Garrett, singer/spouse Melissa Walker), the soon-to-be half-century-old former prodigy here leads a foursome of trumpeter Josh Evans, sax blower Marcus Stickland, and kit hit Nasheet Waits. Expect the unexpected, and get there early for ATX dynamo the Brannen Temple Express. *Raoul Hernandez*

BEACH HOUSE Moody Amphitheater, Friday 25

Sufficiently succulent at 84 minutes, or twice the Baltimore duo's usual LP length, *Once Twice Melody* refused to be shortened. In a recent interview, Alex Scally said the self-produced pandemic album and eighth full-length needed space for "deep-cut boredom level," but those psychedelic, languid, faintly nightmarish waltzes with icy tones from organist Victoria Legrand, who warms up every song with her deep voice, though spare and more organic, are not dull. Try the online "setlist creator" to vote for your favorite dream-pop entries on their Austin stop. Ami Dang brings her sitar along for opening duties.

DANIEL FEARS, URBAN HEAT Far Out Lounge & Stage, Friday 25

Like many artists who grew up in God-fearing families, Houston-raised R&B crooner Daniel Fears discovered his talent for music on Sundays with his mama, who was Lakewood Church's music director. After intense classical music training from UT undergrad and Yale conservatory, where the trumpeter was sidelined with a lip injury. Fears turned his efforts from interpreting others' work to creating his own introspective, instrument-driven compositions with 2020 EP *Canopy*, a quietly profound cross between Frank Ocean and John Mayer. Gothic machine Urban Heat pounds with synth and drums that go harder than driving through Downtown during SXSW, while Torre Blake uplifts with dynamic R&B songcraft. – *Clara Wang*

DAYNE RELIFORD QUARTET Parker Jazz Club, Tuesday 29

Pianist Davne Reliford has been exploiting his bachelor's degree in jazz studies since moving to Austin to tickle the ivories for a living. The Houston native has manned the keyboard for Andre Hayward, Michael Hale/Mac McIntosh, Hannibal Lokumbe, Robin McKelle, Brian Donohoe, and supergroup JARS, with Progger's Matt Muehling. JARS bassist Ryan Hagler joins Reliford's quartet for this gig, alongside saxophonist Michael Malone and drum monster Brannen Temple, ATX jazz veterans both. Keeping that kind of company so early in his career tells you everything you need to know. Part of Parker Jazz Club's Texas Jazz Society-sponsored Live On-AIR - Michael Toland series.

KYDD JONES COMEDY JAM Antone's, Wednesday 30

After a busy South by Southwest, Kydd Jones picks back up his genre-mashing Comedy Jam - which the Austin musician/ organizer energetically compared to the Buddy vs. Reggie scene in The Nutty Professor. Fresh off exploratory 2022 hip-hop/R&B record Onyx D'Or, the artist performs alongside fluid, retro-inspired guitarist Yadin Kol. Austin comedy fixture LaRon Wright hosts the evening, featuring fellow locally sourced laughs from Lauren Compton, Andre Ricks, Symply Courtney, and Genivieve Clinton, DJ uLOVEi - regular of Barbarella, Mala Vida, and more - adds to the mix with an affinity for throwbacks. 


