The adagio from SWAN LAKE Act II is probably the most famous of all the great "classical" duets. Petipa created Act I and Act III, while Ivanov (his assistant who worked largely in his famous master's shadow) created Act II and Act IV (the swan acts), where the exceptionally lyric choreography allied with Tchaikovsky's elegiac music became a perfect marriage of movement, narrative and musicality.

In this adagio the swan-maiden Odette discovers her emerging womanhood while fearing for the safety of Prince Siegfried who is both her captor and the man she loves.

The du Maurier Council for the Performing Arts, established in 1971, owes its successful origins to Senator Donald Cameron.

When Imperial Tobacco first decided to embark on a program of organized giving to the arts, company principals realized the need for input from an expert, and called upon the generosity of Senator Cameron, requesting that he examine their preliminary plans, offering whatever advice or direction he might be prepared to give. From the very first meeting, Senator Cameron expressed his total enthusiasm for a concept that would permit a marketing-oriented company to provide their expertise in that area, at the same time as they were prepared to permit an independent body of performing arts leaders to make the decisions as to where Imperial Tobacco's arts expenditure would fill the greatest need.

Donald Cameron not only agreed to serve on the first du Maurier Council for the Performing Arts board, but recommended all of the other original directors, and personally contacted them to invite them to share in his enthusiasm for the project. They all agreed and each of those original directors continues to act on the du Maurier Council today.

Over the years, Senator Cameron has moved form the chairman's role to that of honorary chairman, while one of his original directors, the Honorable Pauline McGibbon, has assumed the chairmanship.

The Council has added more members, to serve a more national need, so today a ten-person board administers the du Maurier Council arts budget.

Since its inception, the du Maurier Council for the Performing Arts has become one of the largest single sources of non-government funding to the performing arts in Canada. Over the past 13 years, Imperial Tobacco has, through the du Maurier Council, contributed more than four million dollars in cash grants to performing companies across Canada, supporting every facet of the arts -dance, opera, theatre, symphony and contemporary music. The Banff Centre has been the beneficiary of numerous du Maurier grants over the years of the council's operation.

In 1977, the du Maurier Council expanded its arts support program by establishing "The du Maurier Search for Stars', a nationwide audition program for individual performing artists in both the classical and contemporary fields of performance. The "Search" has since become an important talent development program, in which hundreds of individuals are auditioned annually by an adjudication panel which travels right across Canada to select Canada's future stars. Each receives a substantial du Maurier cash bursary and network television exposure.
