She thanked all for attending and thanked our refreshment hostesses and host who were **Sue Botts**, **Malcolm McCorquodale** and **Faye Stansberry** for a wonderful array of tasty treats. Midge welcomed our guest Marc Ace Pamisa to our meeting.

Midge asked if we had read the minutes that were published in the Begonia Chatter and asked if there were any corrections or additions. There were none so the minutes were approved as written. Treasurer Tom Keepin reported that our bank balance was still healthy. We had expenses for Raffle, Name Tag and Door Prize plants (to JJ&L Greenhouses). A check for the club sponsorship of the People's Choice Award was sent to the Southwest Region.

Midge reminded us that the Southwest Region Get-together, 'Cowboys, Culture , and Begonias!' will be April 29th through May 2nd in Fort Worth, TX. Tom told us of a conflict on our meeting date in September. That is also the time for the ABS Convention, 'Begonias On My Mind' in Atlanta GA. It was decided that we will go ahead and

have the meeting anyway. Tom also told us that the seed fund is going well. He is receiving "thank-you" notes via via email and one hand written note (which he passed around for all to read).

Hospitality Hostess Chair Mel Babb said she needs people to bring food for the March meeting. Janet Carpenter, Kathleen Murphy, and Donna Williams offered to do this.

PROGRAM:

This month's program was a cutting party to put down cuttings of cane-like and shrub-like begonias and it was introduced and led by Tom Keepin. Members brought a lot of cuttings from

their gardens and Tom brought several plants for cuttings. Tom thanked everyone for bringing so many different varieties. He then demonstrated how to take the cutting and suggested we put 3-4 cuttings in each 4" pot. He reminded us that a leaf may root but will NOT produce a new plant. He stressed strongly that we label each pot and he showed how using a strip of clear packing tape on each label will keep the label from fading. We are to water the cuttings in and keep them moist but not soggy and keep them in bright light. Should a bloom appear it should be cut off until the cutting is well-rooted, and the plant has started growing. Any flowers on the cuttings should be removed and remaining leaves may be cut in half to conserve energy while the cuttings are trying to take root. This is always a fun meeting and members get to take their cuttings home and watch them grow out into new pants to enjoy and share.

WEATHER FORECAST FOR **MARCH 2020**

According to the United States Weather Service Houston and the surrounding areas fall in Region 7 of the National Weather Map. Here is what they predict our weather will be like for the month of March.

Our temperatures will be slightly above normal and precipitation will be slightly below normal. Our average temperatures should range from 48 degrees in the North to 59 degrees in the South. Our coolest March temperatures will be March 1st through 3rd, 8th through 11th, 15th thru 18th, 23rd through 25th and 30th & 31st. Our warmest March temperatures will be March 5th & 6th, 13th & 14th, 20th through 22nd and 27th thru 29th. There will be a good chance for scattered showers and thunderstorms about March 1st, 7th thru 9th, 14th thru 16^{th} , 22^{nd} thru 24^{th} and 29^{th} & 30^{th} . Severe storms most likely occur about March 7th, 14th & 15th. 21st & 22nd and 28th & 29th. Locally heavy precipitation can be expected.

Begonia 'Madame Butterfly'

This beautiful rhizomatous plant was created by Leslie Woodriff, a prolific hybridizer of begonias and other plants in 1977. He and his family used to operate a nursery, Fairyland Begonia Gardens, in McKinleyville, California. He passed away in the late 1980s.

It has large spiraled leaves and rose flowers in the spring. It is not a prolific bloomer.

B. 'Madame Butterfly' resulted from B. *conchifolia* var. *rubrimaculata* x B. 'Bowkit' X B. *carolineifolia*. Woodriff made at least 12 crosses using B.

'Bowkit.' (or 'Bokit'). It was registered with the ABS as #623.

From its parentage it would seem to had no special cultural requirements, but I am still trying to grow a large happy plant of it. (Perhaps I overwater it.)

It has been used as a pollen parent for hybridizing. In the early 1980s, Bob Cole crossed it onto B. 'Her Majesty Sylvia Leatherman' (a rex) and named four rex hybrids from the cross. In 1991, Walter Dworkin of New York is credited with crossing it onto B. 'Olei Silver Spot' and producing B. 'Winged Majesty.'
