## BIBLIOGRAPHY, OTTO EMERY JENNINGS

DOROTHY L. PEARTH

Contained here are 302 titles, so far as can be determined a complete list, save for newspaper articles, of the published writings of the late botanist, naturalist, ecologist, and educator Dr. Otto E. Jennings.

Dr. Jennings, born in Olena, Ohio, in 1877, came to Carnegie Museum in 1904 as Custodian of Botanical Collections, and was made Curator in 1915. After a 60-year association with the Museum, he died on January 29, 1964, as Director Emeritus of Carnegie Museum and Professor Emeritus, Department of Biological Sciences, University of Pittsburgh.
