REMOTE PHILIPPINES

11 – 28 FEBRUARY 2019

LEADER: PETE MORRIS

With more and more birds being split and 'available' in the Philippines, we have resurrected our Remote Philippines tour to give us a great shot at finding a good number of endemics not available on our Classic Philippines tour. The two dovetail perfectly and together really do form the Ultimate Philippines tour. Focusing mostly on the Visayas, Mindoro, and more remote areas of Luzon, the tour was never about a big species total, but purely about seeing those important birds. In total we recorded around 220 species (including half a dozen distinct

allospecies), a high percentage of which were 'diamond' birds. These included some truly spectacular species, none more so than the gorgeous Whiskered Pitta which bounded around us at close range! Other stunners included the delightful little Negros Scops Owl, lovely Camiguin and Cebu Hawk-Owls, exquisite Dimorphic Dwarf, Northern Silvery and Southern Indigo-banded Kingfishers, the incomparable Flame-templed Babbler, the very rare Isabela Oriole, and the skulking Bicol Ground Warbler to name just a few!

Our tour began when the Classic Philippines tour ended, and we were straight on to our next flight, this time to Bacolod on Negros, where we arrived in the evening for a comfortable overnight. We were up early the following morning, and arrived at Gawahon Ecopark in the dark, though failed to find any nightbirds before the first rays of light began to penetrate the forest. We found our first localized White-vented Whistlers still roosting and soon began to see other endemics in the mixed flocks including Visayan Bulbul, Lemon-throated Leaf-War-

blers, Visayan Drongo (the white-bellied form of Balicassiao), Elegant Tits, the attractive Visayan Fantail and Yellowish White-eyes, as well as the increasingly scarce Citrine Canary-Flycatcher. Our main focus however was on finding three rarities, and it took some time to track them down. First to fall was the rare White-throated Jungle Flycatcher which gave us a bit of a run-around. We followed this up with Negros's real star, the incredible Flame-templed Babbler, which showed well in a mixed flock, and then a long vigil eventually resulted in great views of a fantastic male Southern Indigo-banded Kingfisher. Flushed with success we headed south on the long drive to Dumaguete.

We then had two and a half days to explore the southern parts of Negros, and attempt to track down a few more key endemics, though rain did hamper our progress at times. It was pretty tough going, and some extra effort was required to see some of the birds! In the end we were pretty successful! One of the best experiences on Negros was our encounter with the beautiful Negros Scops Owl, which was seen virtually alongside a roosting Spotted Wood Kingfisher and a pair of Luzon Hawk-Owls! The visit would have been worth it to see them alone! Our quest for Negros Striped Babbler was somewhat easier this year, and we achieved some great views whilst barely leaving the vehicle! It took some effort to see the distinctive White-browed (Visayan)

Shama, whereas our intimate encounters with two recently split sunbirds, namely Magnificent Sunbird (split from Crimson) and the colourful Maroon-naped Sunbird (split from Flaming) were somewhat easier! Other targets seen included the endangered Visayan Hornbill, Blue-crowned Racket-tails, the rare White-winged Cuckooshrike, Philippine Tailorbird (endemic to the Visayas), and the delightful Black-belted (or Visayan) Flow-erpecker, as well as more widespread endemics such as Philippine Honey Buzzard, Philippine Serpent Eagle, Philippine Nightjar, Philippine Spine-tailed Swift, Philippine Hanging Parrot, Coleto, Bicolored Flowerpecker and Olive-backed (Garden) Sunbird. We also found the rare and very distinctive Grey-breasted (Amethyst) Brown Dove, which was surprisingly different to Amethyst Brown Doves elsewhere!

Next we travelled by express ferry to Tagbilaran on Bohol, and made our way up to Bilar our base from which to explore Rajah Sikatuna National Park and its surroundings. Pre-dawn we had some marvellous encounters with a cute Everett's Scops Owl and an unexpected pair of Chocolate Boobooks, though the stunning pair of

Philippine Frogmouths we saw were cunningly found on a day roost! Another favourite, though it took some effort, was the stunning Northern Silvery Kingfisher, and we also had great success tracking down the endemic Bohol Sunbird. Much of our time was spent scouring elusive flocks for the even more elusive Visayan Broadbill, and although we heard them, they slipped away, and we sadly missed this much-wanted though often tricky prize! The flocks held other goodies including Visayan Blue Fantails, Black-crowned Babblers, Brown Tit-Babblers, Philippine Leaf Warblers, Rufous-fronted Tailorbirds and Yellow-bellied Whistlers, whilst other species seen included Black-chinned Fruit Doves, Black-faced Coucal, Philippine Trogons, the endemic Samar Hornbill and the attractive endemic Yellow-breasted Tailorbird, as well as Philippine Bulbuls. We also enjoyed some fabulous Colugos (Philippine Flying-Lemurs), both at night and on day roosts!

After our final morning on Bohol, we took a boat across to Cebu City, and settled in for the night. The following day we were up early and made our way up to Tabunan, one of the very few areas with some native forest remaining on Cebu. After a short walk, we managed to find a thrilling pair of Cebu Hawk Owls, which were real show-offs! After a bit more scrambling, we managed some fantastic views of several endemic Black Shamas, as well as a frantic Philippine Hawk-Cuckoo, a smart Philippine Pitta, sultry Mangrove Blue Flycatchers, White-vented Whistlers and ultra-elusive Streak-breasted Bulbuls which eventually showed well to all after

a sickeningly long wait! Needless to say, the virtually extinct Cebu Flowerpecker was nowhere to be seen. There can be few wild birds now that are extant and have never been photographed!?

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The following morning we even had a lie-in, before taking a flight over to Camiguin Sur, a new island for Birdquest. Once checked-in and fed, we set about exploring some remnant forest areas to find the few specialities that the island has to offer. Over the course of the afternoon/evening, and the following morning, we did very well with these! Pride of place went to the superb Camiguin Hawk-Owls which showed so well at dusk! Not far behind was the delightful Dimorphic Dwarf Kingfisher and a perched Camiguin Hanging Parrot which posed at dusk and was surprisingly different! A few other interesting subspecies were noted, including the ultra-distinctive (Camiguin) Yellowish Bulbul, Black-naped Monarch and Yellowish and Everett's White-eyes to name a few, and we also had superb views of a cracking male Winchell's Kingfisher, Yellow-breasted Fruit Dove, (Southern) Rufous Paradise Flycatcher and Grey-throated and Purple-throated Sunbirds. After a flying visit, we made our way back to Cebu and on to Manila for a comfortable night and our favourite waist-destroying buffet!

As usual, it was an early start as we made our way to yet another island, this time Mindoro! By the time we'd arrived at our hotel, we had an afternoon and a morning to explore the remnant forest and find Mindoro's smart set of gettable endemics. We began by exploring around a lake where we found Wandering Whistling Ducks and Philippine Ducks, the local black form of Philippine Coucal and our first endemics in the shape of Min-

doro Hornbills, showy Mindoro Bulbuls and delightful Scarlet-collared Flowerpeckers that gave great views. Colourful Blue-naped Parrots and speedy Mindoro Racket-Tails sped by, and at dusk, we set about finding the endemic Mindoro Hawk Owl which proved straightforward as one posed in the spotlight for us!

On the second morning we explored some other forest patches and here we soon tracked down the critically endangered Black-hooded (or Steere's) Coucal, which we watched 'pooping' down at us from a vine tangle. We also enjoyed far better perched views of Mindoro Racket-Tails, and found Black-and-white Trillers and flowering trees full of Philippine Hanging Parrots.



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After a night in San José, we took a flight back to Manila, and our island hopping was over. All that remained was to explore a couple of sites on the main island of Luzon. We began by driving east into the southern Sierra Madre mountains. Although much of the accessible forest has been cleared in this area, there is still some good forest along the road, and this forest harboured some highly desired goodies. Perhaps most wanted was the chunky Whiskered Pitta, and although it took a real effort, we did get some stunning looks at this legendary bird. Cream-bellied FruitnDove, stunning Philippine Fairy Bluebirds and Bicol Ground Warbler were three other goodies which were much appreciated and the supporting cast included the amazing Scale-feathered Malkoha, Guaiaberos, Blue-headed Fantails, Yellow-wattled Bulbuls, sneaky Grey-backed Tailorbirds and Sulphur-billed Nuthatches. On one of our evenings we headed to Angono and enjoyed amazing views of the pair of Philippine Eagle Owls, a great catch up for those not on the Classic Philippines tour, and this theme continued when we headed back to Manila, and a successful Ashy Thrush detour trip was arranged for those that wanted, whilst the rest put their feet up for the final push!

No great surprise to find ourselves back at Manila Airport the following morning, this time for our delayed flight to Tuguegarao. At least Cebu Pacific were consistent! Upon arrival we drove further north to the Baggao area and checked in. We then had an afternoon, a full day and a morning to explore some forest patches near to Baggao. Our reason for travelling all this way was to track down the ultra-rare and poorly-known Isabela Oriole, and this we achieved successfully, with repeated great views. Also here were the much-wanted Luzon Striped Babbler and Golden-crowned Babbler, though the latter eluded many of us, and we also found an aptly-name Furtive Flycatcher which showed well to all. The Isabela Orioles were generally to be found in mixed flocks which also contained Rufous Coucals, Rough-crested Malkohas, Black-and-white Trillers and Bar-bellied Cuckooshrikes, and even a White-lored Oriole. Rufous-bellied Eagles were noted on a couple of



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occasions, Plain Bush-hens showed on the trail, Philippine Cuckoo-Doves, Philippine Green Pigeons, Spotted Imperial Pigeons and Green Imperial Pigeons (of the attractive local maroon-naped form) were all noted, and other goodies included Luzon Hornbill, (Northern) Sooty Woodpecker, Ashy Minivets, (Northern) Rufous Paradise Flycatchers, Trilling Tailorbirds, a Striped Flowerpecker and an unbelievably showy White-browed Shama.

All that remained was for our return journey to Manila and the predictably late Cebu Pacific flight. It had been a cracking and successful two and a bit weeks, and for some it concluded a six week odyssey around this endemic-rich country. You always miss a few, but I think we could hold our heads up high and be pleased with what we managed to see!

Species marked with the diamond symbol (◊) are either endemic to the country or local region or considered 'special' birds for some other reason (e.g. it is only seen on one or two Birdquest tours; it is difficult to see across all or most of its range; the local form is endemic or restricted-range and may in future be treated as a full species).

Species which were heard but not seen are indicated by the symbol (H). Species which were not personally recorded by the leader are indicated by the symbol (NL). Species which were only recorded by the leader are indicated by the symbol (LO).

For polytypic species, the subspecies seen on the tour, where known, is placed in parentheses at the end of the species comment. Generally, species listed with trinomials are not currently split by the IOC.

The species names and taxonomy used in the report mostly follows Gill, F & D Donsker (Eds). **2019. IOC World Bird List** (**v 9.1**). This list is updated twice annually and is available at <u>http://www.worldbirdnames.org</u>. Please note, this was the current version when the report checklist was created. Some alternative names are given in parentheses.

All of our checklists are powered by our partner iGoTerra (<u>www.igoterra.com</u>) who provide web and mobile applications for bird and wildlife enthusiasts and businesses. Their suite of services cover observations, rankings, lists, photos and trip management tools.

 A few seen along the Infanta Road, Luzon [validirostris].

 White-bellied Woodpecker Dryocopus javensis
 Three forms: philippinensis (Negros); pectoralis (Bohol); mindorensis (Mindoro).

 Buff-spotted Flameback ◊ Chrysocolaptes lucidus (H)
 Heard a few times on Bohol, but no luck [rufopunctatus].

 Luzon Flameback ◊ Chrysocolaptes haematribon (H)
 Heard along the Infanta Road, Luzon.

Sooty Woodpecker (Northern) *Mulleripicus [funebris] funebris* (NT) Heard and seen by some near Baggao, Luzon. Oriental Hobby *Falco severus* One seen briefly on Mindoro.

Mindoro Racket-Tail ◊ Prioniturus mindorensis (VU) Great views near to Sablayan, Mindoro.

Blue-crowned Racket-Tail (> Prioniturus discurus (VU) Good perched views on Negros [whiteheadi].

Blue-naped Parrot & Tanygnathus lucionensis (NT) Seen well on Mindoro [lucionensis].

Guaiabero ◊ Bolbopsittacus lunulatus Seen along the Infanta Road, Luzon.

Philippine Hanging Parrot & Loriculus philippensis See note.

Camiguin Hanging Parrot (Loriculus camiguinensis Great views of one on a palm spike on Camiguin Sur. Distinctive. Visayan Broadbill (Sarcophanops samarensis (H) Heard on Bohol, but sadly it slipped away rather quickly. Whiskered Pitta (Erythropitta kochi (NT) Brilliant views of one, and another briefly, along the Infanta Road, Luzon. Philippine Pitta (Erythropitta erythrogaster Excellent views of an adult on Cebu. Others heard [nominate]. Hooded Pitta Pitta sordida (H) Heard on the side excursion to La Mesa Ecopark.

Golden-bellied Gerygone Gerygone sulphurea (H) Heard on the side excursion to La Mesa Ecopark. [simplex].

White-breasted Woodswallow Artamus leucorynchus Quite common in open country [nominate]. Scarlet Minivet ◊ (Philippine M) Pericrocotus [speciosus] leytensis Seen by some at the Twin Lakes, Negros. Ashy Minivet Pericrocotus divaricatus Some big flocks seen on Mindoro and near Baggao, Luzon. Bar-bellied Cuckooshrike Coracina striata See note.

White-winged Cuckooshrike ◊ Edolisoma ostentum (VU) A few seen from the boat at the Twin Lakes, Negros.

Blackish Cuckooshrike & Edolisoma coerulescens (H) Heard near to Baggao, Luzon.

Black-and-white Triller (Northern B-a-w T) Lalage [melanoleuca] melanoleuca Brilliant views on Mindoro, and Luzon. Pied Triller Lalage nigra A few seen at Tubunan, Cebu [nominate].

White-vented Whistler (Cebu W-v W) Pachycephala [homeyeri] major Good views of a couple at Tabunan, Cebu. White-vented Whistler Pachycephala [homeyeri] winchelli Several seen very well on Negros, including roosting! Yellow-bellied Whistler Pachycephala philippinensis Two forms: boholensis on Bohol; fallax near Baggao, Luzon. Brown Shrike Lanius cristatus Common, first noted on Negros [lucionensis].

Long-tailed Shrike Lanius schach One seen along the Infanta Road. Several around Baggao [nasutus].

Philippine Oriole Oriolus [steerii] samarensis (H) Several heard on Bohol [samarensis].

White-lored Oriole ◊ Oriolus albiloris One seen near to Baggao, Luzon.

Isabela Oriole \diamond *Oriolus isabellae* (CR) Brilliant views of 3 or 4 near to Baggao, Luzon. A cracking Birdquest lifer. Black-naped Oriole Oriolus chinensis Two forms noted: *yamamurae* on Negros; nominate common on Mindoro. Balicassiao \diamond *Dicrurus [balicassius] balicassius* Several seen well on Mindoro and Luzon. **Balicassiao** (Visayan D) *Dicrurus [balicassius] mirabilis* Several white-bellied birds seen well on Negros. **Hair-crested Drongo** (*Dicrurus [hottentottus] samarensis* Several seen well at both sites on Bohol.

Visayan Blue Fantail \diamond *Rhipidura samarensis* Excellent views of several in mixed flocks in Rajah Sikatuna NP, Bohol. **Blue-headed Fantail** \diamond *Rhipidura cyaniceps* Several seen at both sites on Luzon.

Visayan Fantail & Rhipidura albiventris Excellent views of several at Gawahon Eco Park, Negros.

Philippine Pied Fantail & Rhipidura nigritorquis Plenty seen at various sites.

Black-naped Monarch Hypothymis azurea See note.

Rufous Paradise Flycatcher (Northern R P F) Terpsiphone [cinnamomea] unirufa Great views near to Baggao, Luzon. Rufous Paradise Flycatcher (Southern R P F) Terpsiphone [cinnamomea] cinnamomea Great views on Camiguin Sur. Slender-billed Crow (Palawan C) Corvus [enca] pusillus Several seen well on Mindoro.

Large-billed Crow Corvus macrorhynchos First noted on Negros [philippinus].

Citrine Canary-Flycatcher & Culicicapa helianthea Several seen well at Gawahon Eco Park, Negros [panayensis]. Elegant Tit & Pardaliparus elegans Three forms: albescens (Negros), visayanus (Cebu) and nominate (Luzon). Yellow-wattled Bulbul & Pycnonotus urostictus The form atricaudatus was heard on Bohol, the nominate seen on Luzon. Yellow-vented Bulbul Pycnonotus goiavier Common. Two forms: samarensis first on Negros; nominate on Luzon. Philippine Bulbul & Hypsipetes philippinus Two forms: saturatior first seen on Bohol; nominate common on Luzon. Mindoro Bulbul & Hypsipetes mindorensis Common at all sites on Mindoro with many seen well.

Visayan Bulbul & Hypsipetes guimarasensis Common on Negros. First seen at Gawahon Eco Park.

Streak-breasted Bulbul & Hypsipetes siquijorensis (EN) Good views in the end on Cebu. A nightmare to see well as usual!! Yellowish Bulbul & (Camiguin B) Hypsipetes [everetti] catarmanensis (NT) Great views on Camiguin Sur. Highly distinctive!



More goodies! Visayan Bulbul, Black-and-white Triller, Rufous Paradise Flycatcher and the rare Isabela Oriole (Pete Morris)



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Barn Swallow *Hirundo rustica* Common and widespread. First noted on Negros [gutturalis]. **Pacific Swallow** *Hirundo tahitica* First seen well along the Infanta Road, Luzon [javanica].

Striated Swallow Cecropis striolata A couple seen on Mindoro [nominate].

Philippine Leaf Warbler & Phylloscopus olivaceus Several seen well in the mixed flocks at Rajah Sikatuna NP.

Lemon-throated Leaf Warbler & Phylloscopus cebuensis A few seen well on Negros [nominate].

Kamchatka Leaf Warbler *Phylloscopus examinandus* Heard on Cebu; most likely seen on Camiguin Sur but no call heard! Arctic Warbler *Phylloscopus borealis* Seen and heard at Baggao, Luzon.

Negros Leaf Warbler (*Phylloscopus nigrorum* (NL) One for some of the group along the Infanta Road.

Bicol Ground Warbler (*Robsonius sorsogonensis* (NT) Great views of one, just metres away, along the Infanta Road. **Tawny Grassbird** *Cincloramphus timoriensis* (H) Two forms: *tweeddalei* heard on Negros; *alopex* heard on Cebu.

Striated Grassbird Megalurus palustris Particularly common on Mindoro [forbesi].

Golden-headed Cisticola Cisticola exilis (H) Heard on Mindoro [semirufus].

Philippine Tailorbird & Orthotomus castaneiceps Commonly heard and seen well on Negros [rabori].

Trilling Tailorbird \diamond **Orthotomus chloronotus** Commonly heard near to Baggao, Luzon, where several seen well.

Rufous-fronted Tailorbird ◊ Orthotomus frontalis A couple seen well in mixed flocks on Bohol.

Grey-backed Tailorbird ◊ Orthotomus derbianus Many heard and a few seen along the Infanta Road [nominate].

Yellow-breasted Tailorbird \diamond *Orthotomus samarensis* We enjoyed some excellent views in Rajah Sikatuna NP. **Brown Tit-Babbler** \diamond *Macronus striaticeps* A few seen in mixed flocks on Bohol *[mindanensis].*

Striated Wren-babbler ◊ Ptilocichla mindanensis (H) Only heard at both sites on Bohol [fortichi].

Luzon Striped Babbler ◊ Zosterornis striatus (NT) Excellent views of several near to Baggao, Luzon.

Negros Striped Babbler ◊ Zosterornis nigrorum (EN) Excellent views of a pair northwest of Dumaguete. No walk required! Flame-templed Babbler ◊ Dasycrotapha speciosa (EN) Great views of a pair, then a single at Gawahon, Negros. Golden-crowned Babbler ◊ Sterrhoptilus dennistouni (NT) (NL) Seen briefly in a mixed flock near to Baggao, Luzon. Black-crowned Babbler ◊ Sterrhoptilus nigrocapitatus Great in mixed flocks at Rajah Sikatuna NP [boholensis]. Warbling White-eye Zosterops japonicus A few seen high up near Dumaguete [pectoralis].

Everett's White-eye & Zosterops everetti See note.

Yellowish White-eye & Zosterops nigrorum See note.

Philippine Fairy-bluebird ◊ *Irena cyanogastra* Several seen well and more heard along the Infanta Road.

Sulphur-billed Nuthatch & Sitta oenochlamys A few seen along the Infanta Road, Luzon [isarog].

Asian Glossy Starling Aplonis panayensis Common in open country on Negros [panayensis].

Coleto & Sarcops calvus Two forms seen: melanonotus Negros, Bohol etc., nominate seen on Mindoro and Luzon. Ashy Thrush & Geokichla cinerea (VU) An unexpected taxi detour for one client led to excellent views at La Mesa. Philippine Magpie-Robin & Copsychus mindanensis Seen well on Negros, Cebu, and Camiguin Sur. White-browed Shama & Copsychus [luzoniensis] luzoniensis Brilliant views of a couple near to Baggao, Luzon. White-browed Shama & (Visayan S) Copsychus [luzoniensis] superciliaris Excellent views of a male on Negros. Black Shama & Copsychus cebuensis (EN) Brilliant views of at least four at Tabunan, Cebu. Grey-streaked Flycatcher Muscicapa griseisticta A few seen. First noted on Negros.

Mangrove Blue Flycatcher ◊ Cyornis rufigastra See note.

Turquoise Flycatcher & Eumyias panayensis One seen high up near Dumaguete, Negros [nominate].

White-browed Shortwing Brachypteryx montana (H) One heard high up near Dumaguete, Negros [brunneiceps].

White-throated Jungle Flycatcher & Vauriella albigularis (EN) After some effort, great views of one on Negros.

Furtive Flycatcher & Ficedula disposita (NT) Excellent views of one near to Baggao, Luzon.

Blue Rock Thrush (Red-bellied R T) *Monticola [solitarius] philippensis* One briefly along the Infanta Road, Luzon. **Pied Bush Chat** *Saxicola caprata* A singing male at Sablayan [nominate].

Philippine Leafbird & Chloropsis flavipennis (VU) (H) Heard at Rajah Sikatuna National Park, Bohol.

Striped Flowerpecker ◊ Dicaeum aeruginosum One seen near to Baggao, Luzon [striatissimum].

Bicolored Flowerpecker ◊ Dicaeum bicolor One scoped at the Twin Lakes, Negros [viridissimum].

Red-keeled Flowerpecker ◊ Dicaeum australe Seen at several sites, the first on Bohol.

Black-belted Flowerpecker ◊ Dicaeum haematostictum (VU) Great views of a couple on Negros.

Scarlet-collared Flowerpecker ◊ *Dicaeum retrocinctum* (VU) Stunning views of a couple at Sablayan, Mindoro. Orange-bellied Flowerpecker *Dicaeum trigonostigma* See note.

Buzzing Flowerpecker (> Dicaeum hypoleucum (H) Heard on Bohol [pontifex].

Pygmy Flowerpecker ◊ Dicaeum pygmaeum Good views of on Negros and several near to Baggao, Luzon [nominate].
 Grey-throated Sunbird ◊ Anthreptes griseigularis Nominate seen on Camiguin Sur, birgita near to Baggao, Luzon.
 Purple-throated Sunbird Leptocoma sperata First seen well on Negros. Conspicuous on Camiguin Sur [trochilus].
 Olive-backed Sunbird ◊ (Garden S) Cinnyris [jugularis] jugularis Several seen well on Negros, and Camiguin Sur.
 Flaming Sunbird ◊ Aethopyga flagrans (NL) A pair for some at the Infanta Road.

Maroon-naped Sunbird & Aethopyga guimarasensis Stunning views on Negros. A real belter [daphoenonota]. Bohol Sunbird & Aethopyga decorosa Brilliant views of several, including 2 males together, near Bilar, Bohol.

Magnificent Sunbird \diamond **Aethopyga magnifica** Several seen superbly on Negros, especially at the Twin Lakes. Eurasian Tree Sparrow Passer montanus Common and widespread.

Chestnut Munia Lonchura atricapilla Seen at a few spots including on Cebu [jagori].

Eastern Yellow Wagtail *Motacilla tschutschensis* A few on Bohol and Mindoro and several in paddies near Baggao, Luzon. Grey Wagtail *Motacilla cinerea* First seen near Dumaguete, Negros [nominate].

Paddyfield Pipit Anthus rufulus One seen on Mindoro [lugubris].

Philippine Flying Lemur Cynocephalus volans Some great looks on Bohol.
Crab-eating Macaque (Long-tailed M) Macaca fascicularis Seen at a few sites, the first on Negros.
Common Palm Civet Paradoxurus hermaphroditus One seen on Mindoro.
Golden-capped Fruit Bat (G-crowned Flying Fox) Acerodon jubatus A few seen at Tabunan.

Green Imperial Pigeon Ducula aenea

The nominate form was heard on Bohol and then several seen at Sablayan on Mindoro. The distinctive maroon-naped form, *nuchalis*, gave great views near to Baggao on Luzon.

Philippine Coucal Centropus viridis

The nominate form was first heard on Negros, and we saw a few seen along the road on Camiguin Sur. Of greater interest was the form on Mindoro *[mindorensis]* which are essentially all dark and in some ways quite similar to the endemic Black-hooded Coucal.

Coppersmith Barbet Psilopogon haemacephalus

We recorded three forms of this widespread species. The form *intermedius* was first heard on Negros, the form *cebuensis* was heard and seen in flight at Tabunan, Cebu, whilst the nominate form was seen on Mindoro and again near to Baggao on Luzon.

Philippine Hanging Parrot Loriculus philippensis

We noted five forms of this species during our wanderings. On Negros we saw the form *regulus*, *worcesteri* was seen well on Bohol, *chrysonotus* was heard and seen in flight at Tabunan, Cebu, we saw plenty of *mindorensis* near Sablayan, Mindoro, including nice males and one covered in yellow blotches, and the nominate form was recorded on Luzon.

Bar-bellied Cuckooshrike Coracina striata

We noted four forms of this widespread and variable species. We had good scope views of the form *panayensis* at the Twin Lakes, Negros, the form *boholensis* was heard and seen briefly on Bohol, the virtually unbarred form *mindorensis* was seen well on Mindoro, whilst the form *striata* was seen near to Baggao, Luzon.

Black-naped Monarch Hypothymis azurea

We first noted the nominate form at Gawahon Ecopark on Negros. On Camiguin Sur, we saw the distinctive form *catarmanensis* which lacks the black nape band.

Everett's White-eye Zosterops everetti

We noted three forms on the tour: *boholensis* was heard on Bohol; the nominate was seen on Cebu, and *basilanicus* was very common along the road on Camiguin Sur.

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Yellowish White-eye Zosterops nigrorum

Another species with seemingly a subspecies on every island! We first saw the nominate form on Negros, followed by *catarmanensis* on Camiguin Sur, and *innominatus* along the Infanta Road, Luzon.

Mangrove Blue Flycatcher Cyornis rufigastra

Brilliant views of several at Tabunan, Cebu. Also great views of several along the road on Camiguin Sur where the birds here looked a little whiter on their underparts. On both islands they are supposedly of the form *philippensis*. In addition, the form *blythi* was heard along the Infanta Road. I wouldn't be at all surprised if the birds in the Philippines were split off at some stage in the future.

Orange-bellied Flowerpecker Dicaeum trigonostigma

Another species with plenty of subspecies! We saw four of them on this tour alone: *dorsale* was seen on Negros, the first at Gawahon Ecopark; *cinereigulare* was first seen well on Bohol; *isidroi* quite a smart, and pale-throated form was seen well along the road on Camiguin Sur, and finally *xanthopygium* was seen well along the Infanta Road, Luzon.
