

Pohlia ludwigii



A species of moist or wet, sandy and gritty soils on banks and by streams, on soil overlying rock, on rock ledges and in scree. It is particularly characteristic of bryophytedominated vegetation in late snowbeds, where it can form very large patches, and accompanies species such as Cephalozia bicuspidata, Marsupella sphacelata, Nardia scalaris, Pleurocladula albescens, Oligotrichum hercynicum, Pohlia drummondii and Polytrichastrum sexangulare. It is also locally frequent in montane bryophyte springs, in which associated species may include Anthelia julacea, Scapania uliginosa, Philonotis fontana, Pohlia wahlenbergii var. glacialis and Straminergon stramineum. Altitudinal range: 460–1340 m.

Dioicous; capsules are generally rare but can be locally abundant in some snowbed stands, mature in summer.



Circumpolar Arctic-montane. Northern and montane Europe, from Iceland, the Faeroes, N Fennoscandia and Arctic Russia, south to the Pyrenees, Alps and Balkan mountains (Serbia). Turkey, Caucasus, Iran. Himalaya, China, Japan. Western N America, Greenland.
