Dicranum flagellare

Whip Fork-moss







Identification Mid- to yellow-green cushions or patches to 5 cm tall. The leaves are about 3.5– 4 mm long, erect above, but rather more spreading below when moist, occasionally tending to point in one direction, crisped when dry. They are narrowly spearheadshaped and taper gradually to a long, fine, tubular tip. Small, erect, small-leaved branchlets are usually present at the tip of the shoots.

Similar species Of other Dicranum species, D. montanum (p. 386) occasionally has small-leaved branchlets, but it grows on the bark of living trees. Campylopus flexuosus (p. 395) is a similar size to D. flagellare, but the leaves of C. flexuosus have a much wider nerve near the leaf base. C. flexuosus has deciduous leaves and shoot apices, but does not have deciduous branches in the same way as D. flagellare.

Habitat Grows on decaying logs and stumps in woodland.
