Platydictya jungermannioides Spruce's Leskea





- Identification This tiny pleurocarp forms very delicate, thin, hair-like, pale green patches or fine wefts of irregularly branched, fragile stems. Rhizoids, purplish when young, may be observed in some of the leaf axils. The leaves have a long, fine tip and are without a nerve, but are hard to see, being only about 0.3 mm long. They are held away from the stem when both wet and dry. Capsules are very rare.
- Similar species Purplish rhizoids in some leaf axils may help distinguish *P. jungermannioides* from other similarly small plants. *Amblystegium confervoides* (p. 705) is duller green with leaves that are appressed when dry, and it tends to grow appressed to rocks. *Heterocladium flaccidum* (p. 687) is darker, with larger, more shortly pointed leaves. Some forms of *Amblystegium serpens* (p. 702) are almost as slender, but a nerve is usually visible.
 - Habitat A moss of damp, shaded rock crevices, usually limestone, in woods or sheltered ravines.
