His Worship the Mayor, Commissioner, and Council:-

Gentlemen:

I herewith submit my 13th Annual Report covering Park, Playground, Boulevard, Golf and Cemetery Work carried out under your direction during 1926.

The past year has been one of substantial progress in the developement of Calgary's Park System. Work has been commenced on several new park areas, and developement work previously commenced on other areas has been advanced. Some four miles of parking strips have been built and planted on our streets, and guite a considerable amount of renovating to buildings etc. has been done where necessary on the older parks, thus extending and increasing the usefulness and beauty of our recreational facilities. Consequently the year has been a very busy one, there being an unusual number of matters that required careful attention.

"Due to the fact that advantage was taken of opportune conditions more has been done towards the establishment of a real park system in the last two or three years than in all the former years of the city's history. Much new land has been added to the system, and now it remains to establish connecting boulevards a nd driveways to link these areas together and to develope the whole in a systematic manner.

The care and maintenance of this rapidly developing system is a growing problem and calls for a steadily increasing force of trained men. Each year the parks that can no longer be properly cared for by ordinary common labor, are increased in number and the problem of obtaining the seasonal services of men of skill and dependability increased proportionately.

Provision of recreational facilities now proves by far the most important activity of the Department and there is a constantly increasing demand for more room, more facilities and the introduction of new ideas. Its great developement in recent years has created a problem of considerable magnitude, that of maintaining a proper balance between beauty and utility. On the one hand we have the demand that parks should be places of peace and restfulness and should be developed along lines of natural beauty, on the other hand there is the demand that they should be used to the utmost as playgrounds for the people even to the extent of sacrificing beauty of surroundings in • the promotion of athletic facilities.

One piece of land has been acquired for park purposes during the past year, namely--1.19 acres, situated near Eighth Avenue and Seventeenth Avenue N. W., and which can be very appropriately named Houndsfield Park. It is not intended to develope this area for some time to come. With reference to the movement that is on foot to

With reference to the movement that is on four wo develope a sightseeing drive within the city and to extend same into the surrounding district for the purpose of developing the tourist traffic may I respectfully suggest that no time be lost in boulevarding or at least planting trees on the main tourist traffic arteries within the city--for instance, such portions of the North and South Banff Trails, the Edmonton Trail from First Avenue, northwards, Eighth Avenue East beyond the Bow River, and the Macleod Trail from the Cemetery southwards. Under the best of conditions it takes newly planted trees several years to develope sufficiently to become effective, and for that reason, if for no other as early start should be made, I would further suggest that the tourist traffic routes within the city be so arranged as to pass by our river fronts and parks as much as possible and that these routes, where possible, be treed at once. The cost of this work would be comparatively light and would do more than any other factor to give visitors a good first impression. Possibly the entrance to the city from the south is the one that should have first attention. The first object that a visitor from this direction sees on reaching the city proper is the Cemetery. Whilst we hope that this will eventually be the most beautiful spot in Calgary, it is, perhaps not the most inspiring sight to **a** visitor and could very easily be screened from view by a planting of trees along this trail.

Another important matter in connection with this work is the improvement of our bridge approaches. The bridges being converging points for all traffic, tourist traffic must of necessity pass these places. Whilst the actual number of visitors who make use of

Whilst the actual number of visitors who make use of the parks is difficult to estimate, it is certain that the number is increasing steadily from year to year. Many more permits have been issued for picnics for organized socities, Sunday Schools, etc. and small parties and family picnics, for which no permits are issued, are also becoming more numerous.

The very open dry winter of 1925-26, the mildest winter experienced since records have been kept, had a curious effect on plant growth, many of the less hardy subjects wintering satisfactorily whilst some that had previously withstood extremely severe weather succumbed or were seriously injured. This may be due to the fact that these hardier subjects are more responsive to warm spells during the winter, the sap becomes active, and subsequent recurrence of cold weather is consequently more injurious. The Spring was a very early one, many flowers being a month ahead of their usual time of first appearance. Grass cutting started on April twenty-fourth as compared with May eighteenth 1925. The Spring was a very dry one, no measureable quantity of moisture falling between May first and June sixth, a very severe handicap during the planting

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season. June and July were normal, but August and September were unusually wet and cold. Whilst similar weather during the latter part of the summer of 1925 seriously affected the floral display of that year, the early spring of 1926 had so advanced growth, that the annuals were not prevented from full development and the display of flowers in the parks was well up to standard.

Abuse of the parks is a constant source of annoyance to those in charge. The destruction of trees, shrubbery, plants, fences and furniture goes on year after year. The greater part of this damage is done we believe, by boys between the ages of fifteen and eighteen years, certainly old enough to realize the harm they are doing. Hardly any park building is safe from injury without constant supervision, seats are pulled up and thrown about the lawns, whilst playground apparatus is maliciously destroyed. When offenders have been caught and found guilty they have generally been severely dealt with in court, but, as the greater part of the damage is done in the evening, after dark, and when the caretakers have left, we are seldom able to catch the offenders. It almost seems that, if the public property in the parks is to be properly protected, all night supervision will soon be necessary.

Another grievance that the Department has against certain frequenters of the parks is the litter of newspapers, picnic refuse, bottles, cans and other debris that are left to litter the parks, often dropped within a few feet of a refuse receptacle.

The office work of the Department was considerably disorganized during the early months of the year by changes of staff, but this condition was remedied we the year advanced. There is very considerable detail in this office work and it requires some time for a new employee to become familiar with it. The value of the uniform system of accounting and recording that has been followed for some years, has however, repeatedly proved its value, and is really necessary, for only by the comparison of the details of one year's expenditures, revenues, and statistics with another, can intelligent deductionss be made.

The general maintenance of the parks and playgrounds has been carried on as usual. This work entails a great variety of operations--such as grading, fertilizing, pruning, spraying and watering trees and shrubs, renovating and replacing those that have died, and gathering cuttings, fertilizing, cultivating, raking, regrading, and removing snow from roads, and paths, providing tables, repairing fireplaces, providing fuel, cleaning and burning refuse and assisting the public generally on the picnic grounds. Repairing and painting arbors, benches and other park furniture, playground equipment, lawn mowers and all other implements and tools, keeping comfort stations in a clean and sanitary condition, feeding and general care of animals in Zoo, raking, rolling and marking baseball and football fields, removing snow from, the scraping and flooding, hockey and skating rinks, cleaning and general supervision of all dressing and checking rooms. Much tree planting and a considerable amount of pruning and tree surgery must alwo be done each year on the parks and public streets.

CENTRAL PARK

This park has been regularly maintained and the arbors, so badly wrecked by the snowstorms of September 1925, have been removed. It is the intention to convert the area occupied by these arbors into herbaceous borders and it is hoped that the work of constructing thege borders may be commenced during the coming season.

Four trees and seventy-two shrubs were planted and the perennial flower border west of Library trenched and replanted, 14018 annuals, 418 perennial flowering plants and 1500 tulip bulbs were used in the floral display.

A portion of the Bandstand was enclosed and some oldtime relics, including a cart, canoe, sleigh, buffalo robe, and set of dog harness donated by Mr. William Pearce, placed therein. This is a valuable donation and these relics will become increasingly interesting as the years go by. The flagpole was painted two coats and furnished with new pape.

An experiment was made in the endication of dandelions with a special preparation that has recently been put on the market. This experiment was not completed, but was continued for sufficiently long a period to convince me that it can be made effective. At the present time, I am not in a position to state what the cost of complete eradication in a given area of lawn would be by this method.

lawn would be by this method. Owing to lack of money no further painting of the Bandstand was done.

It is very desirable that the lighting system in this park should be completed in the near future, and, in fact all our parks in the residential districts should be equipped with adequate lighting systems so that the public may have the fullest use and enjoyment of them during the evenings as well as in the daytime.

It is with very great pleasure that I have to record that the base of that very beautiful equestrian statue erected to the memory of the Veterans of the South African War, which base was, for so many years, a very great detraction from the beauty of this monument on account of its incomplete condition, has at last been suitably finished through the splendid efforts of the members of the Col. McLeod Chapter of the I. O. D. E. The thanks of the citizens as a whole, and this Department in particular, are due to these public-spirited ladies for their untiring efforts spread over a number of years to consummate this work.

MEWATA PARK

This park was again in intensive use throughout the season for Baseball and Football, and to some extent for Rugby and Lacrosse. 27 senior, 16 intermediate, 12 junior, and 18 juvenile baseball, 6 lacrosse, 9 senior, 9 intermediate and 12 junior interscholastic Rugby, 2 English Rugby, and 7 soccer games were played besides numerous practice matches.

In addition to the regular maintenance work, thirtyfour loads of soil for toodressing were used on the baseball diamonds, the backstop extended fifty feet on the north side, and the flag pole painted.

MEWATA PARK (CONT'D)

Trees and shrubs were planted along the banks of the Bow River also at the back of the bleacher fence, 20 trees and 160 shrubs being used.

160 shrubs being used. The $\frac{1}{2}$ water service to the comfort station was replaced with a $\frac{3}{4}$ service and 300 feet of $\frac{1}{2}$ pipe laid in extension of the park service.

HILLHURST ATHLETIC PARK

Soccer teams practiced in this park regularly each evening throughout the season.

Eight senior, 6 intermediate and 10 junior High School Rugby matches were played.

One hundred and fifty-five tree holes were dug inside the fence in readiness for planting next spring.

Considerable repairs to fence were made necessary due to decay of the fence posts.

The Paving Department has now removed its equipment from the park. It is therefore assumed that no more gravel is to be removed. The north west corner, where gravel was excavated, is, however, in a very untidy condition and needs attention very badly.

RILEY PARK

The work of paving the wading pool with cobbles was continued to the extent that the season and finances permitted. This work can be done only in the early spring and late fall when the pool is not in use.

Five trees and eighty-seven shrubs were planted. 352 peronnials and 11036 annual flowering plants were used. Some new flower beds were made and othersemlarged.

Six thousand square feet of sod was laid in badly worn spots around the pool.

The large peony bed was a wonderful sight this year, with its thousands of beautiful blooms, and was a great attraction to local residents as well as many visitors from outside the city. The Gladioli that were planted in the same bed were a great improvement, as they flowered after the peonies were over, thus prolonging the floral display. This bed has been enlarged, it being the intention to make this peony garden one of the principal features of the park.

The Rose bed planted in 1925, did well. This bed was also planted with gladioli which flowered throughout the season until cut down by frost. The North side of the park is gradually becoming very attractive as a flower garden, and is much admired by the visitors, who are always attracted by any unusual floral features.

Some over-grown perennial flower borders were replanted. Automobile traffic in this park is increasing annually and the problem both of road maintenance and traffic regulation increases correspondingly.

The cricket jitches are now all in good condition. The Cricket League subscribed \$18.75 for the improvement and upkeep of these.

RILEY PARK (CONT'D)

The Triplex Mower, used for the first time last season in this park, whilst it effected a great saving in labor, also enabled us to keep the lawns in better condition.

CAPITOL HILL PARK

A portion of this park was ploughed, thirty trees and sixteen shrubs planted, and a fence for their protection erected.

TUXEDO PARK

The football field was levelled, trails filled in, and the whole floated and rolled, and the grass cut twice during the season.

Rink sides for a hockey rink were supplied, the rink being constructed by the local Community Club.

CRESCENT PARK

Very little was done towards the development of this park beyond ploughing, preparing and planting with 753 trees and 103 shrubs, a strip 50 feet wide across the north boundary, keeping these trees watered and cutting and burning weeds in the fall. Fencing was also repaired. Much work is planned however, for the beautifying of this park in the near future.

beautifying of this park in the near future. A portion of this park has been leased to the local Community Club for a period of ten years.

With reference to this lease it was stated by officials of the Club that I was in favor of the proposal. This is not true and I want to take this opportunity to correct that statement, and place my views on the matter permanently on record. Whilst I have always been very favorably disposed and have given every encouragement to efforts by local organizations to provide athletic facilities that the city was not in financial position to supply, I have always been opposed to the lease of lands that are set aside for the use of all the citizens as a whole, and therefore should, in my opinion, remain in the control of, and be administered by, the representatives of all the people.

by, the representatives of all the people. In this connection I would like to quote a paragraph from the 31st Annual Report of the Commissioner of Niagara Falls Park which reads as follows:- "Practically every Park Commissioner has been subjected to an endless succession of demands--based upon worthy motives, plausibly argued, and difficult to resist, for the introduction of features good in themselves but sufficiently inharmonious as to render them disastrous to the ultimate developement of a park property.

MOUNT PLEASANT PARK

A twenty foot strip was ploughed, worked, and planted with sixty trees, 120 shrubs a nd 86 perennial plants as a boundary border to this park and the park was fenced, \$85.00 was subscribed by local residents towards the cost of this work.

ST. GEORGE'S ISLAND

Much time has been spent in providing facilities for large public picnics and celebrations of various kinds, which take place at frequent intervals at St. George's Island, also in removing debris and putting the park in order after such events. The principal feature of this kind was the Dominion Day Celebration held under the auspices of the Canadian Club of Calgary.

A number of picnic tables was added to the equipment, and these were arranged in three groups at locations suitable for picnic purposes.

Seven hundred and eighty perennials and 5,358 annuals were planted.

The driveway was patched, scarified, rolled and oiled early in the season, this work costing just about double what was provided for it. The expenditure was well worth while, however, for the roads were in excellent shape all season. The freedom from dust effected by the oiling was very favorably commented on by many picnic parties, who had previously found this dust an almost intolerable nuisance.

The water service was extended by 300 feet of **3**" pipe, the lawns immediately to the west and north of the Pavilion being now almost completely provided for as regards irrigating facilities. A well is being sunk at the present time near the re-

A well is being sunk at the present time near the refreshment building, for the purpose mainly of providing a supply of water for skating rink construction during the winter, when the regular supply from the city mains has to be cut off from the Island. It is the intention to install a suction pump to be operated by an electric motor. The supply of water obtained will not only serve to provide ice in winter time, but will be very useful as an auxiliary supply for irrigation purposes in the summer.

The roof of the Pavilion, which was previously leaking badly, was covered with canvas and painted, and new steps constructed. The kitchen and living quarters attached to Refreshment Building were remodelled and re-roofed and an additional room provided. The Dance Hall roof was shingled and painted, and buildings strengthened by straightening and reinforcing the girders.

The Zoo fence was completely renovated and strengthened and the owl pen rebuilt. Two young red-legged hawks and three long eared owls were added to the collection during the year, but, unfortunately, the hawks died in the early winter. All the other occupants appear to be thriving including the Kangarook which now seems to be thoroughly acclimatized.

There is unquestionably a considerable public interest in the small nucleus of a Zoo that we have at St. George's Island, and it is a source of considerable pleasure to the children. I hope that, in the near future, we will be able to undertake a programme of extension which will eventuate in the establishment of a worthwhile exhibit of a more or less complete collection of the fauna of this Province. Such a collection could be gathered and maintained at comparatively small cost and would be of considerable educational value.

The playground is very badly in need of resurfacing, deep holes which become full of water during rainy weather, having been worn around the apparatus.

VICTORIA PARK

Trees and shrubs were prused and assistance given in various ways during Stampede Week, and in preparing grounds for School Sports.

ELBOW BOULEVARD PARK

Several of the perennial flower beds were replanted, and the lawn reseeded where the grass was thin.

Grading of the river bank was completed and the whole planted and seeded with common perennial and annual flowering plants, which made a great display. 684 perennials, and 8,244 annual flowering plants were used in the beds.

MUNICIPAL GOLF COURSE

No single outdoor activity has taken hold of the popular fancy as has golf, due perhaps to the fact that whilst comparatively few can participate in most of the other popular sports and the majority must be spectators, golf is an uninteresting game to watch but intensely fascinating to play. For this reason alone, if for no other, it should have every encouragement for it is far more desirable for a municipality to have a large number of citizens actively participating in the forms of recreation provided than to have a few providing spectacles for a large crowd of onlookers.

The popularity of the game is attested to by the fact that there are within, or adjacent to, the city, no less than seven Courses. With a very few exceptions, which exceptions were due to abnormal weather conditions, golf has been played on the Mun-icipal Links, twelve months in the year since the Course was first opened in 1915.

The rather considerable reduction of the appropriation for the Golf Course left only sufficient for the general maintenance of the Course and therefore did not permit of any considerable improvement of the new area acquired in 1925. Six additional tees were laid with mats, making a total

of twelve now equipped in this manner.

The greens were resurfaced once during the season, and renovated with oiled sand weekly.

The old trails crossing Nos. 1 and 2 fairways were fill-Badly worn portions of these two faired with soil and seeded. ways were also reseeded.

A new grass practice putting green was constructed on the south side of the Golf House.

Bunkers and traps were renovated and sanded twice during the season.

A new fence was built along the main road and extended 300 feet along the south boundary of the Course. Heavy posts were placed around the auto parking enclosure to prevent cars encroaching on the Course, and extended along the road past No. 9 fairway. Two hundred and eighteen trees and 43 shrubs were planted

along the main driveway and for a distance of 300 feet along the Banff Coach Road.

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CITY HALL GARDENS

The fence was removed for the season by way of experiment, but will have to be replaced, as the flower beds were quite ruined by dogs, and lawns damaged by persons crossing them. One thousand and eighty-eight annuals were used in the floral display.

BRIDGE APPROACHES

Hillhurst Bridge Approaches Improvements made during the year include the work done on the small tracts of ground at the Hillhurst Bridge approaches. These were changed from rough ungraded and unsightly dumps into well kept lawn and shrubbery. This work is far from complete but a good start

Hillhurst Bridge Approaches (cont¹d) was made, and, tegether with the Elbow Boulevard Park afford an example of what can be done with our river banks, in the way of beautifying our city. It is also a splendid example of the public spirited generosity of one of Calgary's citizens who bore the cost of the improvements in both these locations.

Langevin Bridge Approaches Here also the Department was greatly assisted in its work by the efforts of the members of the Kiwanis Club who gave liberally of their time and money to improve this area by renovating the lawns, building a rockery on the river bank, planting a large number of trees and shrubs, installing a water service, and paying for the services of a man for several months to maintain the whole.

BOULEVARDS

The care of the trees during the past year was a heavy item owing to the damage done by the snow storms of September 1925. This work occupied a large staff of men till early spring, through a period of the year when there is usually no expenditure on boulevard work and thus used up a considerable portion of the years appropriation that could well have been used for grass cutting, etc. Aside from this special work the ordinary tree work of removing dead and deseased wood, thinning and shaping the trees by pruning limbs overhanging sidewalks, and dressing all wounds to prevent the spread of desease, was attended to.

Seven hundred and eighty-one trees were planted. This figure includes those planted on newly constructed boulevards.

Considerable staking and renewal of stakes had to be done, a man being steadily employed on this work throughout the season.

All boulevards were mown once during the summer and the central area of the city was povered a second time.

Approximately four miles of new boulevard was constructed, details of which are given on a later page of this report. The question of legislation prohibiting the enclosing of boulevards

boulevards, also regulations regarding the distance from the sidewalk at which hedges and fences may be planted was discussed on numerous occasions last year, and I was instructed to prepare the draft of a bylaw dealing with this matter. This was done some months ago and I would respectfully suggest that it have the attention of the Council at aan early date, so that we may be in a position to enforce definite regulations in the spring time, at which season this always becomes a very waxed question.

Advertising signs have appeared on Boulevard and Park properties several times recently. The firms advertising have in each instance been immediately notified to remove them, as it has been felt that the law in this regard must be strictly enforced in the interests of a City Beautiful. The sign and advertising business needs to be very carefully watched and controlled if it is not to prove a menace to our beauty spots. One of the latest moves of the advertixing agencies is to offer to provide municipalities with con-veniences of various kinds such as refuse receptacles, danger signs, etc. provided they can be used for advertising purposes. It is sin-cerely to be hoped that such will never be permitted to enter the parks.

MEMORIAL DRIVEWAY

Two hundred and two trees were planted on this Driveway, the trees, stakes, and loam being supplied by the Parks Department and the work of planting done by the members of the Kiwanis Club.

ATHLETICS

In addition to the items mentioned under the several parks, the following work was done:-

The cricket pitch on South Calgary Park was relaid and the grass cut twice during the season. Holes were filled, trails levelled, and a fence erected

along the south side of Elbow Park Athletic Ground.

Grass was cut once on the East Calgary Cricket Pitch. Considerable improvements were made to the City Hall Tennis Courts.

The Tennis Courts constructed some years ago on school property in Crescent Heights were removed.

Assistance was rendered in the entertainment of the Australian Cricket Team during its stay in Calgary, and also in the drive to Banff and Lake Louise.

PLAYGROUNDS

Beginning July 1st and continuing for eight weeks an intensive programme of directed play was conducted under the leadership of seven supervisors stationed at the principal playgrounds. Four of the staff were former workers, and several have been with us for a number of years. With this staff of well-qualified and conscientious leaders, organization was quickly

effected and activities planned. The schedule of inter-playground baseball, volley ball, basketball, and quoits was followed with enthusiasm and interest was keyed up until the closing day. The success of the league games was largely due to the planning and supervision of the general foreman, Mr. Ross, who arranged the programme, determined the eligability of the contestants, and acted as general umpire, settling all points when disputes arose, and there was marked improve-ment in sportsmanship of the players, as the season advanced. The following tabulation shows the attendance, list of

The "swimming holes" in Riley Park and on the Elbow River proved a boon to both kiddies and adults during the warm periods of the summer, and were well patronized. A caretaker was in attendance at the latter location.

The work done on the playgrounds consisted of the following:-All apparatus was overhauled and repaired several times during the season. The swings, teeter, etc. were removed from Elbow Boulevard Park to the vicinity of the Elbow River Dressing Room. The land around this building was ploughed and prepared for seeding, a border prepared at the base of the building for vines, and a fence built along the street railway track.

RINKS

The winter of 1925-26 was nan exceedingly poor one for rinks owing to the unusually mild weather, and the rinks were closed by the middle of February. This winter, so far, has been ideal and it is no exaggeration to say that thousands have daily enjoyed the rinks at Mewata and Hillhurst when weather permitted. The hockey rinks at these two parks have also been used to their fullest capacity.

A tink was also made this winter in the sunken garden in Victoria Park.

BAND CONCERTS

The practice of having band concerts in the parks on Sunday afternoons was revived to a small extent during the past summer as follows:

It would be a great forward step if band concerts could be continued, for it is one of Calgary's most pleasurable summer evening features, a feature that appeals alike to all ages and conditions of people and gives more wholesome pleasure to a larger number of people at one time than any other amusement we can provide.

CEMETERIES

The work of snow removal from the Cemetery roads was considered a big task during the early part of the winter of 1924-25, but it was small in comparison with the present winter. Very strenuous efforts had to be made on numerous occasions to make it possible for funerals to reach the grave sides. The location and contour of the Cemetery is such that there is very considerable drifting, and with 41,500 gquare yards of road to keep open, the task is no small one.

11,674 perennials and 23,563 annual flowering plants were used for the floral display in the two cemeteries.

I beg to recommend that the matter of the prices charged for perpetual care of graves have your early attention with a view to making the charges more equitable as between the Union and Burnsland Cemeteries. At the present time there is considerable difference in the rates for the two cemeteries.

Union Cemetery

Four thousand, six hundred square yards of the main driveway were given a two inch coating of gravel, and 3,750 yards of the south driveway was given a four inch dressing. One thousand, eight hundred and twelve yards of rock

One thousand, eight hundred and twelve yards of rock guttering was laid at a cost of $18\frac{1}{2}$ cents per yard, 220 gquare yards of rock retaining wall was constructed along the west side of Section X.

The heavy rains of September caused much striking in of graves and 286 loads of soil were used in refilling these.

Six hundred and eighteen trees, and 432 shrubs were planted. The water strugged was extended by 480 feet of 1" and 430 feet of 3" pipe.

The gates at Tuxedo Park that are serving no purpose and are slowly falling into decay could well be moved to the Burnsland Cemetery to serve the purpose of entrance gates.

New Cemetery Site

It being deemed advisable that provision for the future should at once be made in the matter of a cemetery site, I was instructed to make a survey of all available sites in the city and report on same. A report and recommendation was made accordingly.

New Cemetery Site (Cont'd)

If my recommendation is approved I beg to recommend that provision be made either by bylaw or through the annual appropriation of the Parks Department for the development and improvement of the new site, that this work may be started immediately.

I understand that that portion of Burnsland not yet in use is no longer to be reserved for cemetery purposes as it isnnow considered to have been a mistake to establish a cemetery on this area in the first instance. I would here remind you that both the Superintendent of the Land Department and myself advised against the use of this site at the time. It is unfortunate, however, that having used a part of the land for the purpose, there should again be a change of policy, as the area was planned and plotted with a view to the eventual use of the whole area, and if not used in its entirety, will always have a very unsatisfactory appearance, as an apparently partly developed scheme.

NURSERIES

One thousand and eighty seven trees, 1,612 shrubs and 18,503 perennial flowering plants were progagated during the past year, 1,329 of the flowering plants being propagated by division, and 17,174 raised from seed.

Stock shipped from the Nurseries during the season for use and sale consisted of the following:- 5,615 trees, 8,757 shrubs, 4,768 flowering plants.

shrubs, 4,768 flowering plants. Experiments with newly introduced species in all lines are being continued in a small way, and very encouraging results are being obtained, many of the subjects tested providing hardy.

Lifting of nursery stock began April 19, two weeks earlier than usual.

Further improvements to Fairways laid out on land newly acquired in 1925. Practice Putting Green constructed.

Elbow Boulevard Park .-

River bank graded and sown with wild flower seeds.

Hillhurst Bridge Approaches .-

Plots graded, loamed, seeded to grass and trees and shrubs planted (privately financed.)

Elbow River Swimming Pool-

Land at dressing room ploughed and graded and preparations mode for planting of trees, shrubs and vines.
