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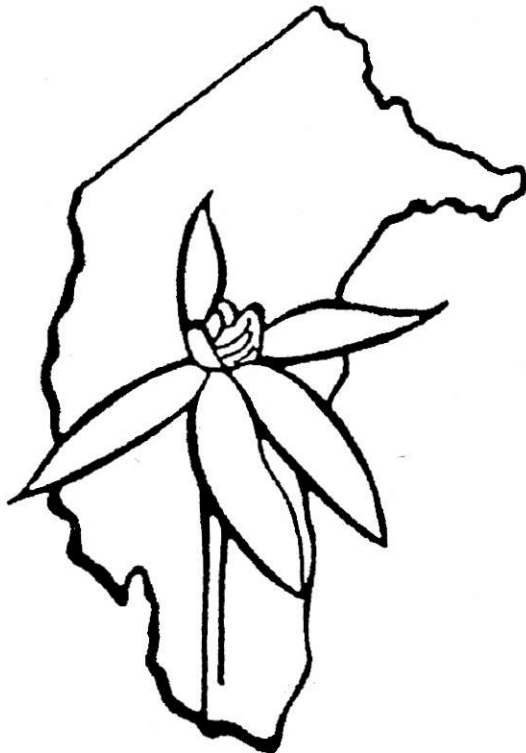
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REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING

He specialises mainly in intermediate cymbidiums, millionias, odontoglossums, cattleyas, Australian natives and masdevallias, and will be bringing other interesting plants also. We've replenished stocks of products for sale via our Sale Table. We now have new stocks of Campbell's Yellow fertilizer; and have extended our range of squat pots to include 165mm by popular request. Max/Min thermometers are available at a low price and there is also N.Z. pelletized sphagnum moss complete with instructions. An Easy Walk Up a Gully

Fifteen members of the Society accepted the very kind offer from the President of the Sapphire Coast Orchid Society, Norma Stafford, of a guided walk through the bush to see native orchids growing in situ.

Some members went down on the Sunday morning, whilst others used the opportunity for an overnight or extended stay. We were met by Les Humphries at the park in the town centre, and then proceeded in a dusty convoy to the forest area.

The easy walk turned out to be a climb, slip and slide up and back a dryish creek gully! (Occasional leeches as company) We were most ably guided by John Stubbs and Brian Blackley, their knowledge of and skill at locating orchids was outstanding. John also tried to teach us orchid spotting skills by challenging us to find them when we came to certain places. Unfortunately, I am not an experienced orchidologist so I can only name *Dendrobium speciosum* as one type we saw, but there were at least two terrestrials and several epiphytes found. I am sure Mark Fraser will reel off scientific names if asked! Jane Wright took photographs and I hope we will see them during one of her slide shows.

The walk and opportunity to meet fellow orchid lovers and discuss orchid things was very good. I can only hope that such events will occur again. Perhaps a reciprocal visit during Floriade with a dinner and a truly easy walk on Black Mountain?

From the President - When Worlds Collide

When admiring our splendid native orchid flora in the wild either here in Canberra or elsewhere, it is difficult not to reflect at times on the impact that we humans have had on the natural world in general, or on orchids in particular.

Much has been written about the depredations by orchid collectors of the last century in the rainforests of Asia and South America, but here in Australia, we have actually caused the extinction of 3 orchid species since European settlement. These orchids, all members of the genus *Prasophyllum* (leek-orchids) were the victims of urban expansion or clearing for agriculture or grazing. A good many others are either vulnerable or teetering on the brink of extinction. Take the case of the Bald-tip Beard-orchid, *Calochilus richae*, first described from near Whroo, Victoria in 1928. When surveyed in 1981, the entire known population of this species consisted of some 20 plants in an area of 50 square metres! Hardly a secure future.

Some species, such as the *Calochilus*, were probably always rare and localised; we have just given them a nudge in the direction of oblivion. Others, once abundant, have suffered because their habitats lay directly in the path of human expansion. I vividly recall as a youngster seeing *Phaius australis* in great numbers in the many swampy areas around Brisbane. Those swamps are gone now; drained for housing developments. Unfortunately, that orchid is further disadvantaged by being an attractive commodity and was (and probably still is) heavily collected in areas where it was not immediately threatened by other human enterprise.

In Western Australia, where a large proportion of the endangered plants of Australia are to be found, one of the last stands of the donkey-orchid, *Diuris purdei*, lies on the site of a proposed shopping complex carpark. The developers have suggested that the entire population should be transplanted elsewhere!

Australia does not have an enviable record in terms of its human-induced extinctions (the rate of extinction for our mammals, for example, has been the greatest on any continent). We seem to have been slow to learn that ours is an ancient, fragile land.

Most of the orchid populations growing in and around Canberra may not consist of particularly rare or endangered, but if they had been obliterated through short-sighted planning, we would be the poorer for it. Next time you view the orchids on Black Mountain, contemplate what might have been had not the prudence of our early town planners seen it reserved, while urban Canberra consumed the surrounding bushland that had not already cleared for grazing. It is easy to be wise in hindsight. Effective conservation will always entail having a vision beyond the immediacy of contemporary problems and demands. Only in this way will we ensure that when human and natural systems interact, that we will not be the losers in the long run.
