From the President

Welcome to 2020! It has certainly been a challenging time for Australia. I hope all of you and your plants have coped with our unusual and unprecedented conditions.

On a more positive note, we now have 99 members in our society! An amazing milestone when you consider many orchid societies around Australia are declining. Please introduce yourself and make anyone you do not recognise at our meetings feel very welcome.

It is native terrestrial orchid potting time. These wonderful plants have been a passion of mine for nearly 30 years and it is great to see members using the tuber bank and attending our repotting workshop. Novice and experienced growers alike walked away with some promising pots. I'm very much looking forward to seeing some of these on the benches this year. A big thank you to Karen Groeneveld for hosting this event.

Our new approaches to benching (the same classes at each meeting and using benching slips) appears to be making things easier for everyone involved. These changes were based on a detailed analysis of our previous 20 meeting and aligns to other societies in NSW. Like all new things, we ask you to bear with us while we tweak it to make it as good as it can be. We will also review the whole approach in six months, to make sure we have it right.

Some of the benefits of benching slips are that your pot doesn't have to be shifted around to find or remove the label for reading. We can use the slips to tally our voting results and we have a record of what has been benched — not just the winners! See the list of plants that Jane has recorded at the end of this Bulletin.

Don't forget, if you need help putting your plant in the correct class (I honestly can't remember them all) ask our friendly Benching Marshal, Mark Fraser, or one of his helpers. Given how busy the benching area gets, it is also a good idea to step out of the way once you deliver your plant.

One thing I am excited to launch this year is electronic voting for the popular vote: something that will make the whole process much easier (see more detail on page 4). We will start this at the February meeting. But you do not have to vote this way, if you do not want too. Paper forms will still be available.

Your committee has been putting together the program for 2020. Dr Katharina Nargar from the Australian Tropical Herbarium in Cairns will be in Canberra for our next meeting and has agreed to talk on "Recent advances in Australian Orchid Taxonomy". We will also have talks on growing *Oncidiums*, *Miltoniopsis*, plus a travelogue and a review of historical tropical orchid hunting. Later in the year we are also planning a discussion and demonstration on de-flasking: a great way to build your collection and expand your orchid growing skills. Don't forget to check the bulletin or our website for all upcoming events.

Lastly, what you want helps drive the direction of our society, so give us feedback about how you think the society is going and what you want to see.

Culture tips November–December

- Provide extra shade to avoid sun damage and black pots heating up.
- Water regularly to ensure sufficient moisture for your growing conditions. Watering in the evening gives your plants time to absorb the water before the heat of the following day.
- Water Australian terrestrials sparingly (and lightly) until the new shoots emerge. Keep pots cool.
- Fertilise your plants to strengthen new growth. Use a fertiliser that orchids can tolerate. Always follow the instructions.
- Monitor for pests. Aphids and munching pests are out and about. Check your plants at night with a flashlight to do some on-the-spot extermination.
- Repot plants in active growth that have outgrown their current pot.
- Bring your plant along to our next meeting if you are unsure how to care for it.
- Check out our book 'Growing Orchids in Cool Climate Australia' for more cultural tips.

Terrestrials potting Workshop and Tuber bank January 2020

Eleven enthusiastic society members gathered at Karen Groeneveld's home in January to enjoy a fun afternoon of terrestrial orchid repotting.

Australian terrestrial orchids are a diverse and fascinating group that are easy to grow once you understand their requirements and respect their growing cycle. They generally survive our hot Australian summers as dormant underground storage organs, or tubers.

Workshop participants (new and experienced) learned how to sieve for dormant tubers, label correctly and

repot to the correct depth to ensure the best chance to show off.

Everyone took home experience and a handful of pots to grow on.



The workshop was timed for members to participate in the annual distribution of tubers by the Australasian Native orchid Society (ANOS) Tuber bank. This great resource is available to all our members, providing us with access to a range of interesting species. This year 9 members received packets of *Diuris* (donkey orchids), *Thelymitra* (sun orchids) and *Pterostylis* (greenhoods). Some additional packets of dormant tubers will also be available at the February meeting.

Native terrestrials, like all orchids, are protected and should never be collected from the wild. The tubers provided at the workshop and available through the tuber bank are all legally sourced.

Thanks to Karen for hosting, and for Bill and Karen for supplying tubers.

Why combine species and hybrid classes?

The committee had noticed that the setting up of the ad hoc classes each night was sometimes chaotic, with plants being moved around a lot with potential for damage. It decided to look at standardising the classes to make benching quicker and safer. The question then was, "what should the classes be".

Our society members grow a great diversity of orchids, which means that we would potentially have an enormous number of classes. We also grow a lot of species orchids and we take pride in that and always have lots of species classes in the show. To have a species and a hybrid class for each category of orchid means far too many classes for a monthly meeting. How to decide on a manageable number of fixed classes?

To work it out, I collated the results for 20 months (Feb 2018-Oct 2019) and recorded, for each month, for each class we made, whether it was species, hybrid or

both. Then I grouped them into standard classes (Laeliinae, Cypridioideae etc) in the manner of our show schedule. The following table summarises the results.

Some major groups were represented at most of the meetings, but a few (*) under 50% of the time. Committee discussed whether to include these as separate classes or dump those into Any Other, but decided to leave them separate, at least for now.

The surprising result, to me anyway, was that overall, we seldom subdivided a category into species and hybrids and most of time, the class was either all species, all hybrids or a combination anyway.

On that basis, the committee decided to go ahead with combined species and hybrid classes. Because we are now recording the names of all plants benched in each class each month (see the popular vote results in this bulletin for Nov 2019), we will be able to review the data in 6 months to see whether adjustments need to be made, if, for example, hybrids always trump species. It will be interesting to see. A work in progress

Electronic voting for the popular vote

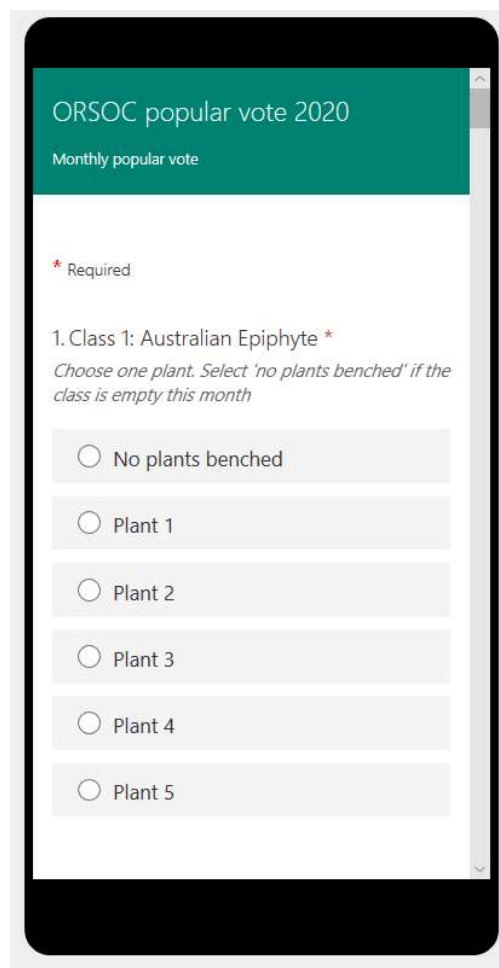
From the February meeting you will have the option to use your smart device to vote for each class and the Orchid of the Night categories.

This will not only save paper, but also the time our volunteers currently spend tallying all those paper forms. It is also super easy to use!

You do not need to download anything. You just use your phone's camera to scan a code and the popular vote appears. It is a simple touch and go style questionnaire.

Several members tested this new way of voting at our Christmas Party, with great feedback.

I encourage everyone to use electronic voting. The more people who do, the less paper tallying required and the quicker the results can be provided.



Some things to note:

- You do not have to use your phone; you can still use the paper forms.
- You will need a smart device and internet access (no images, so it doesn't use much)
- You do not need to download anything. The vote appears in your web browser.
- An instruction sheet will be provided, detailing how to use your phone and what to scan.
- Committee members are available to assist.

General Meeting, 6 November 2019

Members Present: 36; Apologies: 7; Visitors: 1

Society President, Mike Pieloor opened the meeting at 8:07pm. Mike welcomed one visitor, and a number of new members attending their first meeting.

Tonight's meeting did not feature a presentation, but three simultaneous discussion groups that shared tips on: growing cattleyas (discussion led by Geoff Dyne); zygopetalums (Mike Pieloor & Karen Groeneveld); and maintaining orchid health (Jane Wright). After 20 minutes, members rotated to a second group. Following is a summary of the key information shared on zygopetalums and maintaining orchid health:

Zygopetalum:

Zygopetalum is a small group of mainly terrestrial orchids that come from cool rainforests in mountainous regions of Central and South America. As such they are cool-growing and relatively easy to grow in Canberra. They often flower twice a year (spring/autumn) and the highly perfumed flowers can last 3-4 weeks. Many modern hybrids (including inter-generic hybrids) are now available, making these colourful orchids suitable for both beginners and advanced growers.

They grow in similar environmental conditions to native *Sarcochilus* hybrids, preferring:

- high humidity (40–80%)
- bright light, (50–60% shade), but no direct sun. (They tolerate less light than cymbidiums, but more than *Sarcochilus*.)
- good air movement, and
- temperatures between 5–8°C minimum up to 25–30°C during the day. They will tolerate higher day-time temperatures if the air is more humid, and lower night-time temperatures for short periods (must be protected from frost).

Canberra growers' experience is that they do quite well in shade-house conditions (protected from frost and excessive rain during winter) or on a balcony/patio where they have overhead cover from frost and can benefit from the heat retained by the building's walls.

Plants prefer to be kept uniformly moist, but not over-wet, throughout the year, with slightly less water in winter. They dislike cold, damp conditions, which increases unsightly leaf-spotting. Many of the modern hybrids are more resistant to leaf-spotting.

Potting: Zygos prefer deep pots (eg *Cymbidium* pots), to accommodate their vigorous root system. They require a well-drained potting medium, but are quite adaptable and will grow in bark, bark/perlite, coco-peat/perlite, and inorganic mixes. Choose according to your watering regime – the mix needs to retain moisture without becoming soggy.

They flower from the new growths, so fertilise to encourage growth during the growing season - feed from September to May with a balanced fertiliser, switching to a potassium- and phosphorus-rich fertiliser during Autumn to promote flowering. Alternatively, apply a slow-release fertiliser in Spring.

Orchid Health:

Plant health is maximised by providing the conditions that are as close as possible to what plants experience in nature. Our growing conditions are always a compromise between what we can provide and what the plant really needs.

Find out as much as possible about the environment from which the species come – light, temperature, humidity and annual cycles – and try your best to provide those.

If the growing conditions are flawed in some way (e.g. too humid and stale), provide some other condition to ameliorate it (e.g. run a fan).

One of the best resources for information on the environment of a huge number of species is OrchidWiz. The society owns a copy and has it on a small computer that is available to borrow from the library. Otherwise, Jay Pfahl's Internet Orchid Species Photo Encyclopedia at <http://www.orchidspecies.com/> is also a great resource. Our library contains many useful books on different groups of orchids.

Other Business

1. The Society is adopting a new system for the popular vote, which is being trialled tonight. It is hoped that using a standard set of classes will make it easier to bench plants, easier to count

votes and make for more consistent judging and recording of results. Jane Wright explained the analysis behind the 19 classes, which are similar to how plants are classified in our annual show schedule. Members benching plants will be required to fill out a benching slip for each plant they bench. These will make it much easier for the Popular Vote volunteers to collate results, and will be collected by Jane at the end of each meeting to record data on what is benched and when things flower — of use in planning displays.

2. Karen Groeneveld presented a short slide presentation on the Eurobodalla Orchid Spectacular, held in Moruya on the October long weekend. The Society won Champion Display, David Judge won Champion Orchid, and Krysia Szkiela won Champion Novice. Thanks to members for allowing us to take their plants for display – many were successful in winning first and second prizes.

3. A small number of *Zygoneria* seedlings were offered for members wishing to take part in a growing competition.

4. The Society is looking for a volunteer to house the orchid potting bench that we use for demonstrations at the annual show and/or some of the other supplies (pots etc). Please see Mike Pieloor if you can help.

5. Two rolls of the Sancell horticultural bubble wrap are still available – talk to Bill Ferris if you would like to purchase a length of this to insulate your greenhouse.

6. Geoff Dyne will open his greenhouse from 2–4 pm on 17 November. Details provided via email.

7. Karen Groeneveld will open her greenhouse this weekend for members wishing to see *Vanilla planifolia* in flower. Karen's phone number is in the Bulletin – please ring ahead to ensure flowers are open before you come.

8. The Horticultural Society of Canberra is holding their last spring show this weekend – Orchid Society members are encouraged to enter orchids to raise awareness of our society.

Next meeting: 4 December. Christmas Party. There will be party games and the Society will provide some chicken and soft drinks. Please bring a plate of food to share.
