Chagrin 26—Orange 13

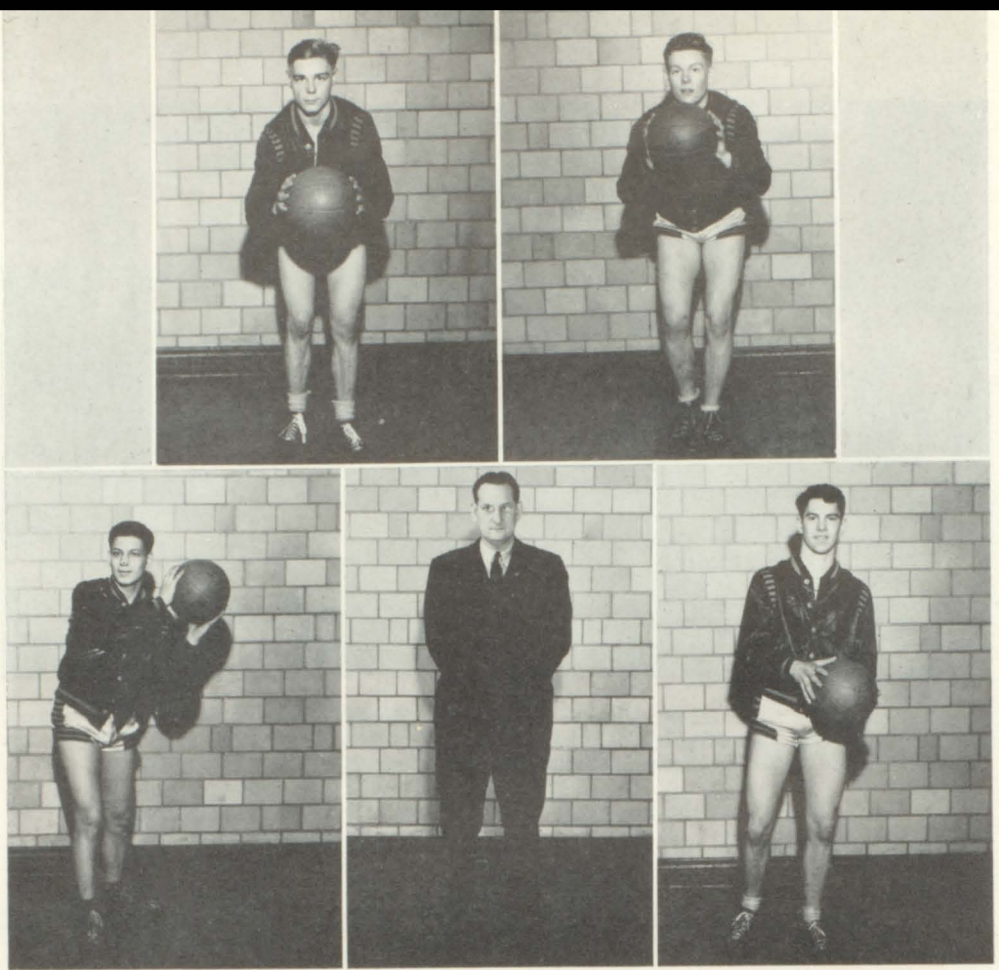
