Course Description:

An exploration of the art, craft, and study of dramaturgy. The question 'What is a dramaturg?' will be answered. Who dramaturgs are, how dramaturgs work, and what dramaturgs do will be examined. Learning to think like a dramaturg means learning how to ask questions, when to ask questions - and learning what kind of questions to ask. In this course dramaturgical questions will be asked and answered.

Course Objectives

A) To deepen understanding of the field of dramaturgy

- B) To engage students in the practice of production dramaturgy
- C) To broaden the student's awareness and knowledge of classical and current dramaturgs
- D) To deepen student understanding of the role of the dramaturg in the production of new theatrical works

Student Learning Outcomes:

The student who successfully completes this course will:

A) Be able to define dramaturgy and the role of the dramaturg in the theatre

B) Demonstrate the skills of a production dramaturg and apply those skills in a theatrical collaboration

- C) Analyze a new theatrical work and collaborate with the creator of that work as a dramaturg
- D) Be familiar with the contribution of both classical and current dramaturgs on theatre

Course Requirements and Grading:

- 1. Attendance *and* participation, including preparedness to participate in class discussion. (20%)
- 2. Three (3) Major Projects (20% each)
- 3. Midterm Exam (10%)
- 4. Final Exam (10%)

Projects: (Must be presented on assigned date.)

- A presentation on a well-known dramaturg who worked with/does work with new plays. Presentations will be rigorously researched, well-organized, and concise. Each will include a brief biography, especially as it relates to education, training, and theatre work. Discuss who the dramaturg is, where he or she has worked, how he or she has worked, and what his or her ideas are about dramaturgy. A detailed bibliography is required. Additional details will be discussed in class.
- 2) A production dramaturgy casebook, assigned by instructor from a selection of plays in the current Coastal Carolina University Theatre season or chosen by the student with instructor approval. The criteria for the casebook will be discussed thoroughly in class.
- 3) A journal chronicling your dramaturgical work with a playwright crafting an original play paired with the student by the instructor. The criteria for the journal will be discussed thoroughly in class.

Course Policies:
