## HINTS FOR EXHIBITORS

## GENERAL

Read the schedule and rules carefully: if in doubt consult the Steward or Show Manager.
Specimens in an Exhibit should be clean, free from blemishes or pest damage and be uniform, i.e. matched for size, shape and colour.
Remember Judges look for quality: so size is a meritorious characteristic ONLY if accompanied by quality.
Take a few extra specimens to the Show in case of an 'accident' with your 'first choice' ones, but after staging check number of specimens in your exhibit to make sure it complies with Schedule.
An Exhibit is always improved if it is neatly labelled with the cultivar name.
KINDS - Carrots/peas/potatoes are different kinds of vegetables.
VARIETIES - Vanessa/Epicure are different varieties of potato

- otherwise known as CULTIVARS.


## POT PLANTS

Make sure pots are clean and of the required size.
Remember a Pot Plant is judged on the quality of its foliage as well as its flowers.
If stakes are needed to show the plant to its best advantage they should be neat and unobtrusive.

## FRUIT

Should not be over ripe or under ripe.
Should have stalks and 'bloom' intact (i.e.: don't polish them!)

## FLOWERS

Should be at their peak of flowering, with any damaged petals or leaves removed.
Don't cut Flowers during the heat of the day. Cut stems as long as possible and plunge them up to their necks in water overnight.

## VEGETABLES

Clean root vegetables by washing with a soft sponge in plenty of water - taking care not to damage the skin. Where appropriate, leave approx. 3 " of leaf stalks attached.
Avoid over skinning onions and shallots: these should have well ripened skins, their necks tied with raffia and roots trimmed back to the basal plate.
Ideal sizes: courgettes $-4 "-8 "$, beetroot - tennis ball size: $2 "-3 "$,
turnips - cricket ball size: $21 / 2 "-3$ ", potatoes $-6-8 o z$.

## CONSTITUTION AND MANAGEMENT RULES

1 The society shall be named the 'DUFFTOWN HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY'. Its object shall be the encouragement of horticulture, and domestic and handicraft skills.
2 The affairs of the Society shall be managed by a Committee of no fewer than ten Members, to be elected annually at a General Meeting of the Society to be held during October - December. A President, Vice-president, Secretary and Treasurer shall be appointed at a Committee meeting to be held immediately following the AGM.
3 To form a quorum ten Members must be present at any General Meeting (eight at a committee meeting) - the President to have a deliberate and a casting vote.
4 The Treasurer's books shall be examined before the date of the Annual General Meeting, at which a Financial Examiner shall be appointed for the following financial year.
5 Members shall pay the appropriate annual subscription and be provided with a membership ticket entitling that member to free admission to the show.
6 No alteration in the Constitution and Management Rules shall be made except at an Annual General Meeting or a Special General Meeting called for the purpose.

## RULES FOR COMPETITORS AND JUDGES

1 Anyone, on payment of their subscription, shall be a member. Entries will be accepted only from current members, except in the Children's Section. All classes are open to all members except where otherwise stated.
2 All articles presented for competition must have been grown/made by the competitor personally, and in the Horticultural Classes must have been in their possession for at least two months prior to the show.
3 No competitor shall stage more than ONE entry in any class. Only one competitor from any one household shall compete in any one class except in children's classes.
4 Entries, on the official entry form, must be lodged with the Secretary before staging. The Committee reserves the right to refuse any entry.
5 A competition label must be securely attached to each exhibit, with the competitor's number and class number marked thereon, except in the Children's Section, where exhibits should be accompanied by an envelope containing the age, name and address of the competitor, and bearing the class number on the outside.
6 Exhibits must be staged between 5pm and 9.30pm on the day prior to the show, or between 6.45am and 8.00am on the day of the show. Exhibits may be removed only after the show has closed. The arrangement of the exhibits shall be wholly under the control of the Show Manager
7 Except where specified otherwise, all Cut Flowers must be shown in water, in vases supplied by the Society. All exhibits should be correctly named. Where measurements are mentioned, metric equivalent will be accepted.
8 No person, unless specifically authorised by the Committee, shall be admitted to the exhibition while judging is taking place.
9 On the relative merits of the exhibits, the judges' decision shall be final, and they may withhold any prize if an exhibit is considered of insufficient merit.
10 Any member having a complaint about any Exhibit must lodge the same, in writing, by 3pm on the Saturday of the Show with the Secretary, who will then call a special meeting of the Committee, whose decision shall be final.
11 In determining winners of trophies or other awards, points will be awarded on the basis of $3-2-1$ for $1^{\text {st }}$, $2^{\text {nd }}$ and $3^{\text {rd }}$ respectively, unless specified otherwise. In the event of two or more competitors having the same points total, the award will go to the winner of the most first prizes; failing that of the most second prizes.
12 Prize-money will be paid in the Secretary's office after 2.00 pm on the Sunday of the Show. Prize-money not collected at the Show will be regarded as a donation to the Society.
13 The Society will not be responsible for the loss of, or damage to, any exhibit, although all reasonable care will be taken of them. Nor does it hold itself responsible if unable to pay full prize-money.
14 All Trophies are for annual competition unless otherwise stated.
