Student access to e-reserves:

The library's e-reserves service allows students to access reserve readings of copyrighted material (if it complies with fair use) 24/7 online. This continues to be a very popular service, with students accessing e-reserves documents over 19,500 times in 2009-2010!

E-reserves materials are available through UDOnline/ UDTSlearning.net (Moodle). Once requests are processed (allow 7 business days), students simply go to their Moodle page to access readings. If you do not have a Moodle page for a course but wish to use e-reserves, library staff will arrange for a course page to be set up for you.
