Carex magellanica Lam. ssp. irrigua (Wahlenb.) Hiitonen

synonym: *Carex paupercula* Michx. poor sedge

Cyperaceae - sedge family

status: State Sensitive, BLM sensitive, USFS sensitive

rank: G5T5 / S2S3

General Description: A dapted from Flora of North America (1993+): Perennial, rhizomatous sedge; stems loosely clustered, 1-8 dm high, mostly phyllopodic. Roots with yellowish brown felty covering. Leaf blades 1-4 mm wide, margins roughened and rolled downward.

Floral Characteristics: Bracts 3-15 cm, equaling or exceeding the inflorescences. Male spike solitary, terminal; occasionally with 1-8 female flowers above the male flowers. Lateral spikes female, usually with 1-3 male flowers at the base, $6-22 \times 4-8$ mm, with 5-20 perigynia. Female scales lanceolate, longer and narrower than the perigynia, with pointed tips, often with awns up to 3 mm. Perigynia 2.5-3.6 \times 1.8-2.5 mm, with rounded tips. Beak of the perigynium absent or up to 0.2 mm. Stigmas 3. Anthers 1.6-2.5 mm.

Fruits: A chenes 3-angled, 1.4-1.9 mm, almost as large as the perigynium body. Identifiable June to September.

Identification Tips: Carex limos a and C. macrochaeta also have roots with a yellowish brown feltlike covering. However, C. limos a is mostly aphyllopodic, has unawned female scales that are wider than the perigynia, and leaf blade margins inrolled over the upper surface. C. macrochaeta (also rare in WA) has perigynia 3.8-6.8 mm, female scale awns up to 12 mm, and anthers 3.3-5 mm.

Range: Throughout Eurasia, Canada, Greenland, AK, and parts of the northern U.S.

Habitat/Ecology: Fens, bogs, shady wet meadows, shrub wetlands, and marshes; often growing in peat soil. Elevations in WA: 500-2135 m (1640-7000 ft). Associated species include Sitka alder (Alnus viridis ssp. sinuata), lodgepole pine (Pinus contorta), willows (Salix spp.), spirea (Spiraea douglasii), bog Labrador tea (Ledum groenlandicum), tall cottongrass (Eriophorum angustifolium ssp. angustifolium), strawberryleaf raspberry (Rubus pedatus), purple marshlocks (Comarum palustre), elephanthead lousewort (Pedicularis groenlandica), sphagnum moss, sedges (Carex spp.), roundleaf sundew (Drosera rotundifolia), and rushes (Juncus spp.).

Comments: This taxon is also rare in ID, MT, WY, PA, and CT.
