
Claytonia multiscapa Rydb. ssp. pacifica (McNeill) John M. Miller & K.C. Chambers

Pacific lanceleaved springbeauty Portulacaceae - purslane family

status: State Threatened, USFS sensitive - rank: G5T3 /

Floral Characteristics: Flowers (1-2) 3-20 in loose racemes, often on one side of the stem, usually with a single bract; pedicels 1-5 cm, usually recurved in fruit; sepals 2, 3-5 mm; petals 5, not notched at the tip, fused at the base for 1-2 mm, white or pinkish, 8-10 mm long; stamens 5, attached to the base of the petals; styles 3. Flowers in spring to early summer.

Fruits: Oval capsules about 4 mm long; seeds black and shining, 1-2 mm long. Fruits develop in early to mid summer.

Identification Tips: Claytonia multiscapa ssp. pacifica is distinguished from *C. lanceolata* by the latter's sessile stem leaves and notched petals.

Range: Vancouver Island and North Cascade Range of B.C.; Olympic Mts. of WA.

Habitat/Ecology: Wet subalpine to alpine meadows, often flowering near the edge of melting snowfields.
