# Experts debate use of juvenile petitions

### 'Rotten tactic' used for special education students in W.Va.

KINGWOOD — For several weeks last spring, Josh Roberts was isolated from other students in an empty basement classroom, where the only window was in the door leading to a hillside ramp. The 11-year-old with Asperger's

Syndrome was put in the room after Preston County school officials were unable to control his hitting, kicking, biting and throwing things in his fifth-grade class.

When adults blocked the basement door, he charged at them, leading three male school employees and the town police chief — who was called to control Josh — to file juvenile petitions alleging the 78-pound boy had assaulted and injured

them, says his mother, Terri Roberts. Advocates and lawyers say schools are increasingly filing juvenile petitions against special education students they view as a threat, instead of dealing with behavior through individualized education plans. The trend is a

result of zero-tolerance policies and the federal Individuals with Disabilities in Education Act and No Child Left Behind laws, advocates say. Juvenile petitions can lead to

## Teachers urge early voting for pension bonds

### Manchin's plan aims to erase funding shortfalls

CHARLESTON — Fearing a low turnout for a June 25 special election on whether the state should sell up to \$5.5 billion in bonds, leaders of state education unions are urging their members to vote early.

While the timing of the election is a concern, the president of the state chapter of the American Fed-

eration of Teachers said she expects the measure to pass. "It's the end of the school year, and it might have an effect," said Judy Hale. "But if we can get the message out about how important this is to them as individuals, to our profession and the state, I think they will show up." The bonds are part of Gov. Joe Manchin III's plan to erase funding shortfalls in public pension funds for teachers, troopers and the judiciary.

Because the state constitution bars taking on debt, voters must amend it each time to allow the sale of bonds. Previous bond sales have funded schools, roads and veterans' bonuses. Charles DeLauder, who is scheduled to become president of the West Virginia Education Association just 10 days before the election, is also calling for early votes. "Teachers are burned out by the time school is over, and they don't

## Billboard disputes myth of Santa

GLASGOW, Scotland — A month after it ignited controversy, a billboard that questions the existence of Santa Claus went on display on a street corner Friday. Artist Darren Cullen, 22, found an alternative site for the 20-foot-by-10-foot work after Maiden Outdoor, which owns the billboard, refused to show it four weeks ago following media attention. Critics say the piece — which carries the slogans "Stop Lying

To Your Children About Santa Claus" and "Santa Gives More To Rich Kids Than Poor Kids" — is an attempt to ruin the magic of Christmas. Cullen insists it is his way of highlighting the dangers of consumerism, and said Santa Claus is a lie which teaches children that products will make them happy. "If you try and tell kids the truth about how they're being manipulated, you're the bad guy crushing their dreams," he said.

# Twin bombs kill 20

## Indonesia blasts also wound 40

JAKARTA, Indonesia — Suspected Muslim militants set off two bombs Saturday in a Christian-dominated town on the Indonesian island of Sulawesi, killing at least 20 people and wounding 40, police said. Witnesses said both bombs in the town of Tentena struck a busy meat and produce market near a police station. The first was followed 15 minutes later by a much larger one that flattened food stands. A Christian clergyman and a 3-year-old boy were among the dead, and two policemen were among the wounded, police said. Later, Saturday police found an unexploded bomb outside a church in the same town, part of an area where Muslim-Christian clashes have claimed hundreds of lives since 2000. "Clearly these bombs were aimed at disturbing the security situation in this region," said Brig. Gen. Aryanto Sutadi, chief of the Central Sulawesi Police. Saturday's blasts came two days after warnings of unspecified attacks that prompted the United States to close its embassy and other diplomatic offices in Indonesia until further notice. Muslims account for 90 percent and Christians about 8 percent of people in Indonesia, the world's most populous Muslim nation. But on Sulawesi, the Muslim and Christian populations are roughly equal. The vast majority of the country's Muslims practice a moderate version of the faith. But attacks against Christians have increased since dictator Suharto's downfall in 1998, and amid a global rise in Islamic radicalism. Suharto enforced secularism as part of national security policies. Four years ago, suspected militants from the al-Qaida-linked Jemaah Islamiyah terror group bombed 11 churches Christmas Eve, killing 19 people.



# Suicide bombers kill five, wound 40 in Iraq

BAGHDAD, Iraq — Two suicide attackers detonated car bombs in northern Iraq on Saturday, killing at least five Iraqis, and a Japanese hostage abducted weeks ago was confirmed dead by his family and officials after abductors released a gruesome videotape purporting to show his body.

The seven people killed by the car bombs, including the two attackers, raised the death toll in violence Friday and Saturday to at least 43.

A U.S. soldier also died from wounds sustained when a home-made bomb exploded near his vehicle earlier this week in western Iraq, the military said Saturday.

Three Iraqi soldiers also died and two were wounded Friday when

insurgents attacked an army patrol about 10 miles north of Hillah in an area controlled by the Polish-led multinational force, Maj. Wieslaw Adamski said Saturday.

Poland, a staunch U.S. ally, has about 1,700 soldiers in central Iraq, where it leads a multinational security and training force of about 4,600 troops. Poland plans to withdraw its main force at the end of the year when a United Nations mandate expires.

The dead hostage, Akihiko Saito, was among a group of five foreign workers — four of them earlier confirmed dead — that was ambushed May 8 in the vast Anbar province west of Baghdad.

More than 200 foreigners have been abducted, and at least 30 have been killed, in Iraq during the two-year insurgency, which U.S.-led forces and the new Shiite-led government have struggled to put down.

## French prepare for key referendum on EU constitution

PARIS — Europe's landmark new constitution faces a make-or-break referendum in France today, when a polarized nation decides whether to boost or block the next giant leap forward in a half-century of efforts to unite the continent.

After months of impassioned debate over the merits and drawbacks of the European Union's historic first charter, the complex business of getting 25 countries to agree on an ambitious roadmap for their future hangs on two simple words: "oui" and "non."

The latest poll gave the "no" camp 52 percent support and the "yes" camp 48 percent, meaning the treaty still could face a humiliating defeat in the nation that played a lead role in drafting it.

All 25 EU member states must ratify the constitution before it can take effect in 2006, and a French rejection would be the first in Europe.

A French "yes" — coupled with improbable approval in another referendum Wednesday in the Netherlands, where opposition is running at about 60 percent — could give the charter unstoppable momentum as a dozen other nations decide its fate in coming months.

#### Homicide suspect in custody after standoff

ATLANTA — Police used a Taser gun early Saturday to arrest a Florida homicide suspect who spent 56 hours perched on an 18-story construction crane and had threatened to kill himself by jumping, authorities said.

The man, identified as Carl Edward Roland, was arrested at about 12:30 a.m. Saturday, normally one of the busier times in the city's bustling Buckhead neighborhood, known for its numerous bars and restaurants.

Roland got onto the crane at about 5 p.m. Wednesday, said Atlanta police Sgt. John Quigley. The 41-year-old man brought Buckhead to a standstill for more than two days, shutting down the main road through the district.

#### Navy SEAL acquitted of abusing Iraqi who died

SAN DIEGO — A Navy SEAL who was acquitted of beating an Iraqi prisoner who later died said he wants to return to duty in the elite unit.

Jurors deliberated about three

hours before finding Lt. Andrew K. Ledford not guilty of all charges Friday. The 32-year-old SEAL had faced up to 11 years in military prison if he had been convicted of assault, dereliction of duty, conduct unbecoming an officer and making false statements.

#### Analysts linked to Iraq failures rewarded

WASHINGTON — Two Army analysts whose work has been connected to a major intelligence shortcoming on Iraq have received awards for job performance over the last few years, officials said.

The two civilian analysts work at the Army's National Ground Intelligence Center — one of three U.S. agencies criticized by the presidential commission that probed U.S. intelligence on Iraq.

Their work has been cited as part of a key intelligence failure on Iraq — the claim that aluminum tubes sought by the Baghdad government were most likely meant for a nuclear weapons program rather than for rockets.

The commission deemed their agency's assessment of the aluminum tubes as a "gross failure."

**At a Glance**

- ▶ **What's in a name:** When WVU was formed in 1867, it was known as "the Agricultural College of West Virginia," harkening back to the 1862 Morrill Act that established the institute of higher learning. That name only lasted one year, when West Virginia University was decided as a much more fitting name.
- ▶ **WVU's first president,** Alexander Martin, was paid \$1,600 per year. He forbade students from drinking, smoking and watching theatrical performances. He also awakened them each morning by firing a cannon.
- ▶ **The old Field House's** basketball court had a few wooden bleachers along the side of the court, with most of the seats in balcony bleachers running along one side and the ends. The court also served as WVU's concert hall, registration center and assembly hall until the Mountainlair and Creative Arts Center opened.
- ▶ **The road in front of** Woman's Hall, now known as Stalnaker Hall, has always been called Maiden Lane. It connects Campus Drive and North High Street.
- ▶ **WVU's first medical** campus was known as "The Hick House" due to a misunderstanding of the Latin word "Hic Jacet" from the burial phrase "Hic Jacet" (here lies). As a result, the cadavers became known locally as "hicks," instead of the more widely-used "stiffs."

# WVU changes dramatically over the years

The Downtown Campus of WVU was just a single, used building when the university was established in 1867. In 2005, it is composed of 40 buildings, 18 of them listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

It came into being as a result of the Morrill Act, signed by President Abraham Lincoln in 1862. The act offered land grants of 30,000 acres of federally-owned land to each state that agreed to establish a college to teach agriculture and the "mechanic arts" (engineering).

The state of West Virginia was formed the following year. The new legislature accepted those conditions to establish the Agricultural College of West Virginia.

WVU opened in September 1867 as an all-male institution with six faculty members, six college students and 118 Preparatory Department students (high school-aged students preparing to do college work).

In 1868, the name was changed to West Virginia University. Today, WVU is a major institution with more than 85 buildings on three campuses spread across town, with an enrollment approaching 25,000.

The first building actually on what's now known as the Downtown Campus was the former Woodburn Female Seminary, a girl's school. It was used as the first residence hall, and the university's first president, Alexander Martin, lived there with the students.

It was located where Woodburn Hall is today. Once it became part of WVU, the building's name was changed to College Hall. It was destroyed by fire in 1873. A replacement, first known as New Hall, was in use by 1876. It was renamed Woodburn Hall in 1901. The building was expanded with a north wing in 1900 and a south wing in 1910.

The first new building constructed on campus was University Hall, later known as Preparatory Hall and finally named Martin Hall, named after WVU's first President Alexander Martin. The bell tower originally housed a clock, which was moved to Woodburn Hall in the early 1900s.

What has for more than a century been known as Woodburn Circle was completed in 1893 when Science Hall (now called Chitwood Hall) was built.

Across the road, WVU had acquired the Fife farm and placed an agricultural experiment station there in 1888. It was later removed

to make way for other facilities.

At first, WVU was a "men only" institution. After years of debate, the first 10 women were admitted to WVU in 1889. Episcopal Hall became the first student dormitory in 1895.

The first Mechanical Hall, completed in 1892, was on Beechurst Avenue where the old Field House (now Stansbury Hall) is today. It was destroyed by fire in 1899. Two cottages on the Fife property were used for mechanical engineering while a new Mechanical Hall was being constructed. It was finished in 1902, facing the old athletic field north of Prospect Street. It also was destroyed by fire, in June 1956, and eventually was replaced by engineering facilities on the Evansdale Campus.

Commencement Hall (later Reynolds Hall), with a large theater, was built in 1892. The basement was used by the men's basketball team (along with the Armory built in 1902) until The Ark was constructed on Beechurst Avenue in 1918, and the Field House in 1928.

Reynolds Hall was renovated in 1939. Noted poet Carl Sandburg spoke there that year. The building was removed in 1965 to make way for the new Mountainlair.

The first library, now Stewart Hall, was built in 1902. The current library (Wise) was built in 1931. The old library became the administration building in 1936. A \$30 million, five-story addition to Wise Library was completed in 2001.

During the early years of medical education, the dissecting room was a problem for most medical schools, including WVU.

In 1892, in an effort to improve the school's facilities for anatomical study, WVU professor Dr. James W. Hartigan appeared before the Board of Regents and asked for a building for dissecting purposes. The 14-by-20 foot building on the hill next to Oglebay Hall was the first structure built by WVU solely for medical education.

The building was used for about 10 years and drew much local attention because of the nature of its contents and the nature of medical students to play gruesome pranks.

The building became known as "The Hick House" due to a misunderstanding of the Latin word "Hic" from the burial phrase "Hic Jacet" (here lies). The cadavers became known as "hicks" instead of the more widely used local term "stiffs."

In 1916, a Medical School building was erected on Beechurst Avenue, across from the Field House. It was razed in 1957, after a new medical center was well under construction on the Evansdale Campus.

The Puritan House, originally the President's Home, was finished in 1905. A new residence for the university's president was established on Riverview Drive in Evansdale in 1964. The 1949 home was purchased by WVU from attorney Benjamin G. Reeder.

Oglebay Hall was completed in 1918 as home of the College of Agriculture, and the Law School (now Colson Hall) was finished in 1923. Armstrong Hall and Brooks Hall were added in 1948.

Woman's Hall (Stalnaker) was built in 1918 on Maiden Lane, overlooking the athletic field and

ROTC drill field. Terrace Hall (Dadisman) was originally meant to house first-year women students when it was finished in 1942. Men's Hall (Boreman) was built in 1935. Arnold Hall and Arnold Apartments have since been added to the downtown housing complex.

The Mineral Industries Building (White Hall) was constructed in 1940-1941. Lying along Willey Street, it was near the former site of state geologist Dr. I.C. White's residence and large garden.

The first student activity center was a gray, frame building and Quonset hut obtained from the Navy. The building, known as the Mountainlair, was erected inside the Stadium Loop near old Mountaineer Field in 1948. It was removed in 1975.

The current Mountainlair and parking garage were dedicated in 1968. Construction of this building not only demolished the Armory and Reynolds Hall, but it caused the Student Health Center to be moved slightly eastward up College Avenue. A landscaped area in front of the Lair holds a life-size statue of the Mountaineer, installed in 1971.

Demolition of the Old Mountainlair and old Mountaineer Field opened the way for WVU to expand downtown facilities. Old Mountaineer Field, built in 1925, was abandoned in favor of the Evansdale stadium in 1980.

Now, the old stadium site houses a new Business and Economics Building, finished in 1991, and Life Sciences Building, completed in recent years.

As the Evansdale Campus was growing, the Downtown Campus

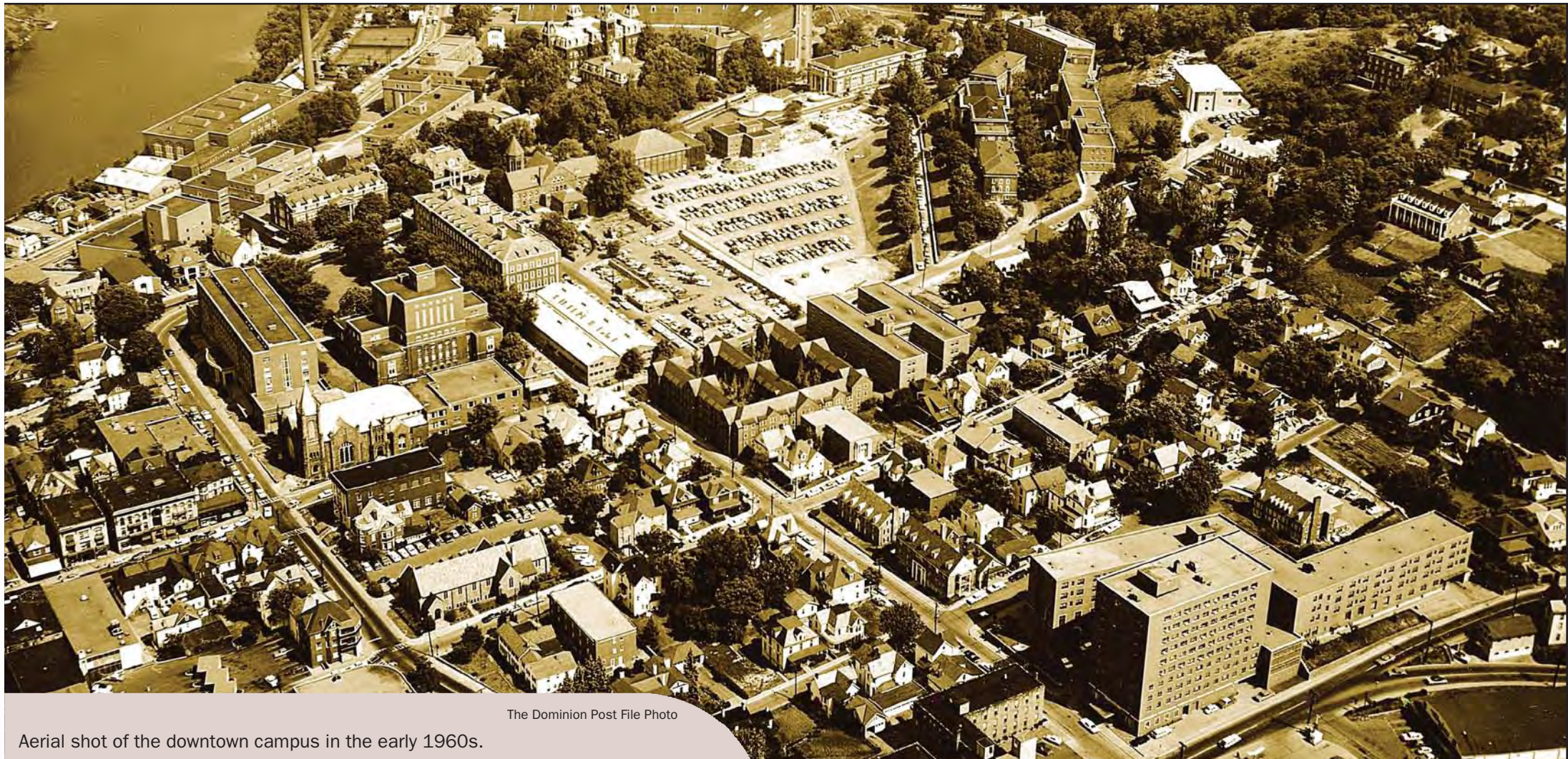
was changing. Ground was broken Oct. 9, 1971, for the first phase of the Personal Rapid Transit System, an electric monorail system that ties all three campuses together with downtown Morgantown. The main campus station is on University Avenue across from Stansbury Hall.

With studios in the Mountainlair, the university's radio station, WWVU-FM (U92) went on the air in 1982. *The Daily Athenaeum* student newspaper, once published by journalism students in Martin Hall, has its own facility on Prospect Street near Spruce Street. Nearby are the Spruce House and the Center for Black Culture and Research.

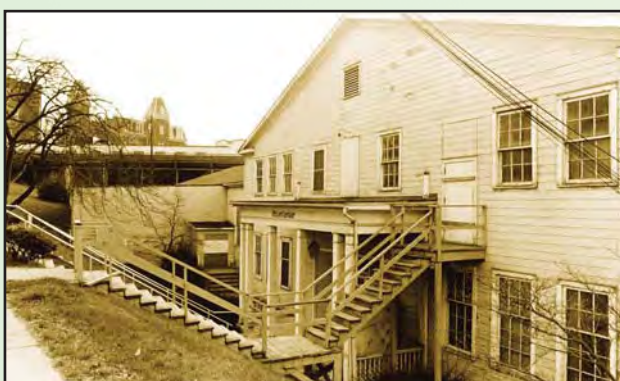
In the 1960s, a search made to find a permanent location for the most of the World War II battleship, the USS West Virginia. It finally found a home in Oglebay Plaza, in front of Oglebay Hall. The bell of the USS West Virginia cruiser also is at the plaza.

Although most of WVU's growth is in the north part of town, recent expansion has stayed on the main campus or ventured southward. White Hall also has a new computer addition. In 2000, One Waterfront Place in the new Wharf District opened, home to admissions and records, the WVU Foundation, the WVU visitors' center and New Student Services.

The master plan calls for future renovations to Brooks, Oglebay and White halls downtown. Additional properties acquired on Beechurst Avenue and in Sunnyside will figure in the future, along with developments along the University Avenue Loop and Falling Run Road.

The move to Evansdale began with baseball in 1953, when Hawley Field was built. Until then, the baseball team played its games on the Athletic Field between Reynolds Hall and the Armory, with a hillside in left field that led to Maiden Lane.

For about 50 years, baseball players contended with scaling the hill for fly balls, or chasing them to the Armory and North High Street.

The field originally was designated for ROTC drills. Before 1925, it had bleachers and was lined for WVU football games. Because of the wooden seats, it was known as "splinter stadium."



# Woodburn Circle is the traditional center of the university

Every traditional university needs that special landmark, a place that never changes and always says — this is my alma mater.

For WVU, that's Woodburn Circle, three buildings around a grassy quad that have signified West Virginia University since its beginning.

These are Woodburn Hall, Martin Hall and Chitwood Hall (for many years known as Science Hall.)

The circle traces its history to two private schools in Morgantown:

■ The Monongalia Academy, a private men's school founded in 1800, located at the corner of Walnut and Spruce streets.

■ Woodburn Female Seminary, affiliated with the Presbyterian Church, opened in 1858 but only lasted until 1866. It was purchased by Monongalia Academy.

In 1867, the academy's trustees turned these properties over to the new West Virginia legislature as the home of the Agricultural College of

West Virginia.

The first president, the Rev. Alexander Martin, changed the institution's name to WVU in 1868.

### Martin Hall

The Monongalia Academy building housed WVU's first classes, but was later sold for \$15,000 to pay for building University Hall on the Woodburn Seminary grounds in 1870.

University Hall later was known as Preparatory Hall before acquiring its present name, Martin Hall, in honor of WVU's first president. It is the oldest building on the Downtown Campus.

In 1884, a Seth Thomas clock purchased for \$500 was placed on top of Martin Hall, attached to the curfew bell.

In 1910, the clock was moved to Woodburn Hall's east tower.

Like Woodburn, Martin Hall is built of red bricks accented with tan stone. Ornamental dormer windows line the top of the building.

A cupola rises above the rooftop, making it visible from afar.

"I thought it was cool when I first saw it," said Professor John Temple.

On the exterior it looks like what you think of an old university building.

In 1939, the journalism program, chaired by Perley Isaac Reed, became an independent school housed in Martin Hall, where it remains today.

### Woodburn Hall

The main building of Woodburn Female Seminary, a WVU dormitory, burned down in 1893. WVU hired Klives, Kraft and Co. of Wheeling to construct New Hall in its place at a cost of \$41,500. It was completed in 1876.

The building that was New Hall makes up the center portion of today's Woodburn Hall, a name it received in 1901.

The north wing was completed in 1900, the south wing in 1910. Major interior renovations left the fundamental structure and architecture changed.

Ivy planted at Woodburn Hall by the classes of 1903 and 1930 was removed in 1993 because of the damage it was causing to the buildings. The ivy was a defining feature of Woodburn Circle throughout much of the 20th Century.

"Woodburn is the signature building on campus," said Professor John Temple.

Throughout the years, Woodburn Hall has housed nearly every discipline on campus, from law and medicine to music and home economics.

Today it is the home to the administrative offices for Eberly College of Arts and Sciences as well as the departments of history, political science, interdepartmental studies and public administration.

### Chitwood Hall

Science Hall was built in 1893,

on the right side of Woodburn Hall, completing Woodburn Circle. It was later named Chitwood Hall after the late Oliver P. Chitwood, a noted WVU history professor.

Chitwood Hall is a more traditional structure, with a massive archway over the entrance. An unused balcony above the archway is a "nice architectural element and gives a ceremonial aspect to the building," said Jeffrey Bruner, chair of the foreign languages department.

The roof line of Chitwood Hall gives it an unfinished appearance when compared to Martin and Woodburn Halls, Bruner observed.

"It doesn't fit the picture of Woodburn Circle in the sense that it doesn't have that crowning element on top of it," said Bruner. "In that sense it's kind of unique."

Chitwood Hall is now home to WVU's Department of Foreign Languages.

Efforts by President Charles Lawall to replace Woodburn Circle with more modern buildings were defeated by the Board of Governors in 1947.

The extensive preservation of

Woodburn Circle was recognized in 1974 when it was listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

According to Professor Jason Parker, a historical setting is a valuable asset for a university and its faculty and student body.

"Having taught in places that are much more industrial in the setting, to teaching in a place that's more classical in setting is not only a privilege and a treat," Parker said, "but I think on some level it has to convey to the students the importance of the past, the importance forming a sort of classical education in a broad humanities exposure."

Bruner agrees that it is a luxury to be located in the historical part of the downtown campus.

"It's a gorgeous place," Bruner said. "We're on the circle and in the historic center of the real heart of WVU."

"Woodburn Circle adds that old classic university feel," Temple said. "It gives the downtown campus a core."

Kennedy said specifics about the hire would be discussed during the next commission meeting Wednesday.

Until then, fire board members will continue compiling information about Mon and surrounding county VFDs, he said.

"We've been gathering various information from local and other fire departments like financial statements and equipment lists, but someone needs to put all we've collected in to a form we understand," Kennedy said. "There's just too much information to compile."

And he said the board plans to gather more data including what the departments' ratings are, how many residents they serve, and how much it costs to run them.

"There's a lot of stuff we need before we can put together a plan to see if we're going to implement a fire fee," Kennedy said.

"We're looking to get an exact figure or as close as we can, to make sure no resident is overcharged, and that the fire boards get what they need," said Commission President Bob Bell.

The fire board members are Kennedy; firefighters Jim Paugh of Cassville VFD, Jim Bowers of Cheat Lake VFD and Bob Dubois of Cool Springs VFD; and residents Vanessa Price of Core, Chuck Badger of Morgantown, and Bill Rice of north Morgantown.

The board meets the fourth Tuesday of each month.

fire-prevention cameras that can recognize smoke.

Getting those funds this year will be difficult, Yura said, because the current federal budget diverts money that would have gone to funding grants to improve school safety. He gave the school system a 30-percent chance of getting such funds this year.

The school board is searching for a full-time superintendent as Yura prepares to leave. Right now, Janice Christopher is serving as acting superintendent, but will retire in June. Yura said he has faith the search firm the board hired to find a new chief will succeed and the district will get the best superintendent available.

Yura said what matters is that the board hires the most qualified superintendent, regardless of where he or she is from, but it will be a bonus if the new leader comes from inside the state.

Yura said he is glad to be leaving his post when public interest and private support for the district is high. Recently, Yura announced last that the Hazel Ruby McQuain Foundation

was donating \$1.2 million to help fund construction of the new Mylan Park and Skyview elementary schools.

Those schools — which were until recently known as Cass and Westwood, respectively — were in danger of having major cuts made to their designs because the school system had underestimated how much it would cost to build them. Yura said he appealed to George Farmer, chairman of the foundation's board of trustees, for assistance on the schools and found a sympathetic ear.

"We spent a couple hours just talking about Hazel's concern for kids," Yura said. "We wanted to do what she would have wanted us to do." The foundation's generosity underscores the commitment private institutions have to the school system.

Under state law, Yura will be eligible to run for the board again in 2006 as a representative of the eastern district because the seat currently held by Steve Cook will be up for grabs.

Will he run again?  
"I've had a lot of requests to do that. I guess I'll just have to sit on that one."

**W.Va. administrator named to top job at UMPI**

PRESQUE ISLE, Maine — A college administrator from West Virginia has been named president of the University of Maine at Presque Isle.

Karl Burgher comes to northern Maine from Fairmont State University, where he has been serving as vice president of research and contracts and interim chief technology officer.

Burgher, who was chosen from among 48 candidates after a monthlong search, will replace William Shields, who became acting president after the resignation of Nancy Hensel.

In his announcement Thursday, University of Maine System Chancellor Joseph Westphal cited Burgher's experience in building partnerships and working with a diverse group of stakeholders.

**Medicaid prescription buying pool approved for W.Va.**

CHARLESTON (AP) — West Virginia and two other states have received federal approval to form a buying pool in an effort to lower the cost of prescription drugs for Medicaid recipients.

The state will form a consortium with Louisiana and Maryland under the proposal approved Friday by Mike Leavitt, the secretary of Health and Human Services.

The expected savings in Medicaid costs include \$16 million in West Virginia, \$27 million in Louisiana and \$19 million in Maryland. The program will cover more than 1.3 million people.

States rely on a private pharmacy benefit manager to negotiate manufacturers' discounts greater than those established by law for Medicaid. The discounts are based

on a list of preferred drugs provided by the state for their Medicaid recipients.

Five states — Michigan, Vermont, New Hampshire, Alaska and Nevada — formed a similar pool last year and have since added Hawaii, Minnesota and Montana.

"This approach builds on our efforts to help states use the best private-sector purchasing tools to lower costs, while assuring appropriate standards for proper access to medicines and quality care," said Mark McClellan, administrator for the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services.

In determining what drugs are on the preferred list, states use a committee of clinicians and pharmacists to review medical needs beyond considering the discounts offered by drug manufacturers.

"I love UHS," he said. "It's a great school."

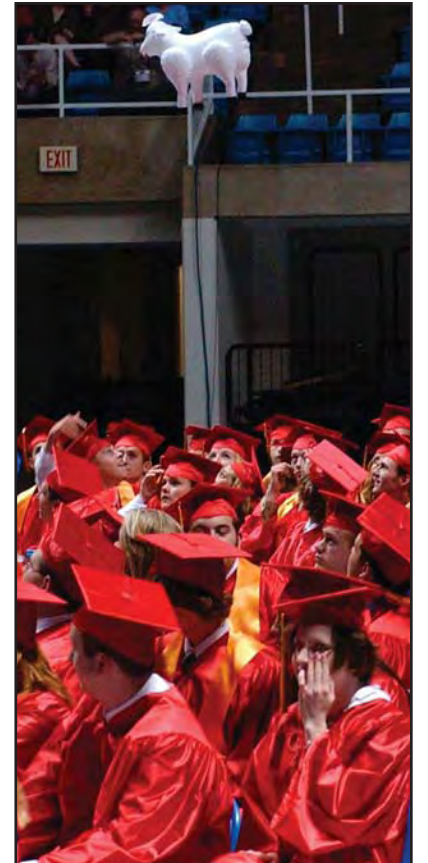

### \$4.8M grant goes to geology, geography

The department of geology and geography in the Eberly College of Arts and Sciences at WVU has received a three-year educational grant valued at \$4,819,192 from Landmark Graphics Corporation, a part of Halliburton's Digital and Consulting Solutions Division.

"Most Fulbright lecturers teach courses on American society, history and culture at universities abroad, but the courses that I will be teaching to Polish students will be about their own recent and often painful history within a regional context."

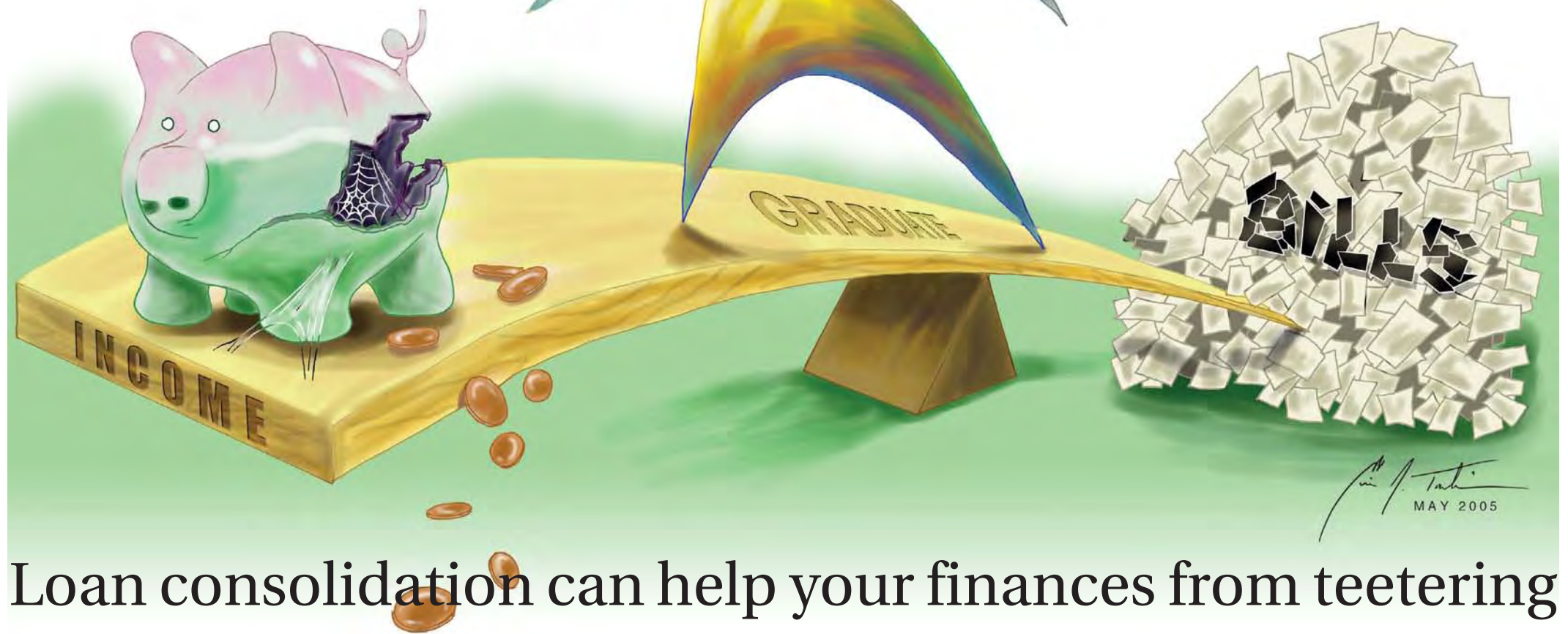
### Wright State dean to lead Eberly College

## Loan consolidation can help your finances from teetering

**R**ecent graduates are sometimes experts at waiting until the last minute to get things done but with their student loan repayments expected to begin in December, they can't afford to put off exploring the options of consolidating their student loans.

"If you're interested in consolidating loans you need to do it now," said Kaye Widney, director of Financial Aid at WVU. "Loan rates are historically low. Rates are set every July 1, and we are anticipating an increase. Students who consolidate prior to July will be able to get the consolidated loan rate."

Currently rates are as low as 2.77 percent for students who consolidate in-school or during their six-month grace period following graduation. The Federal Treasury Bill, which will announce the new rate at the end of May, is expected to increase these rates by as much as 2 percent.

Consolidation is a way for stu-

dents to save potentially thousands of dollars on interest. It combines all federal loans into one payment, avoiding the confusion of making several payments each month to multiple creditors. It also allows those on a tight budget to reduce their monthly payment. But, Widney said, even though the monthly payment is less, the interest is going to accrue over a longer period of time, which spreads the repayment during several years.

Consolidation is not the best option for everyone, she said. It depends on the individual's circumstances.

"There are some downsides to consolidation that students need to be aware of," said Keith New, vice president of communications for American Education Services. "The normal repayment period is 10 years. With loan consolidation it goes from anywhere from 12 to 30 years. As you spread those payments out, obviously your monthly payment may drop. But you're going to wind up paying a lot more in the long run even though you might be locking in a lower interest rate. Borrowers need to be very very careful finding the best thing for them when consolidating."

New advises borrowers to shop for the best deal.

"No two loan programs are the

same regardless of what the Feds set up," New said.

Many lenders offer various incentives, such as discounts on the interest rate after making 12, 36 or 48 consecutive on-time payments. Students should compare different lenders and consider if the interest rate, rebate and repayment plans are suited to their needs.

"Unfortunately, there is a single lender rule which is part of a federal legislation that prevents a lot of students from shopping around," New said. "If you have a loan with us then you can not consolidate that loan with another lender. However, if you have a loan with us and a loan with someone else, you can choose who you want to consolidate with. That is why it is very important to talk to the servicer of your loan to find out what is the best situation."

WVU is a Direct Loan school, a participant in the William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan program.

"If you're consolidating in-school you have to go through Direct Loans," Widney said. "After you've graduated you can go through any company."

Federal Direct Loans has its own consolidation program — Federal Direct Consolidation Loans.

Federal Direct Loans was not available for an interview.

According to their Web site, <http://loanconsolidation.ed.gov/>, Direct Consolidation Loan lets borrowers combine their federal education loans into a new loan that will allow them to benefit from a lower fixed interest rate. The U.S. Department of Education will be the lender for the life of the loan. Borrowers do not need to worry about the loan being sold to a secondary market. This is beneficial to borrowers who are responsible for making on-time payments even if they do not receive a bill or repayment notice.

Federal Direct Consolidation Loans offers four types of repayment plans: standard, extended, graduated and income contingent.

"They have a variety of repayment plans so you have flexibility with what you choose," Widney said.

"I picked the standard plan

because eventually I'll save more money. When you spread it out you pay more interest," said Eric Taylor, a soon-to-be graduate of the mechanical and aerospace engineering program at WVU. He has chosen to do an in-school consolidation to receive the lower interest rate on his loans.

Timing is important when considering consolidation. Students who are hoping to take advantage of the lower interest rate must have their application processed before June 30 in order to qualify.

"If you start the consolidation process keep on top of it," Widney said.

Borrowers should also speak to their lenders regarding their sixth-month grace period. The Federal Direct Consolidation Web site warns borrowers that "repayment begins within 60 days of the day the Direct Consolidation Loan is made. If a borrower's loans are consolidated during their second month of grace they would begin repayment within 60 days, thus forfeiting the remaining part of the grace period."

"It's important for students to really consider their options," New said. "AES has a tool for students to learn about loans and consolidation. They can go to [www.Youcandealwithit.com](http://www.Youcandealwithit.com) to find out as much as they possibly can."

## 'Just takes one week to turn things around'

LIGONIER, Pa.

**MOSTLY HIS LIFE HAS** been spent striking golf balls in towns no one has heard of on golf courses seemingly designed by Soupy Sales. It's that way in golf's minor leagues and that is where John Ross has mostly played.

The PGA Tour was as foreign to him as Lithuania is to a third-grader at Mountainview Elementary. His base of operations was something called the Teardrop Tour one year, the Space Coast Tour another and, of course, the obligatory stop on the Hooters Tour.

While the resume of many of the golfers here in the 66th Senior PGA Championship list victories in events such as the U.S. Open or the Masters, John Ross, of Freeman, W.Va., has to settle for a couple of victories in the West Virginia Open and a second-place finish in the 1991 Hawkeye Open.

The tall, slender, gray-haired Ross has had tastes of the big show, but has never been able to break through and have the one great moment he's chased. "It just takes one week to turn things around," he said.

He had hoped this would be the week. Holding conditional status on the 2005 Champions Tour has cracked the door, although he kept getting the door slammed in his face.

Forced into Monday qualifying rounds, he shot 68 at Birmingham. "It wasn't good enough," he said. Then he shot 67 at Austin. "I didn't get in. You needed 66," he said.

This week, though, he made his way into the Senior PGA, a major played on the course Arnie built in the mountains of western Pennsylvania.

And after 27 holes he had a shot at making the cut, having carded a 74 the first day and 38 on the front nine Friday.

"If I shot par on the back nine I make the cut easy," he said. "But I wasn't thinking that way. I was thinking of getting birdies and getting back down to par."

Birdies are elusive animals on a golf course used in a major tournament, especially with the wind swirling. Par got real small in the rear view mirror of his 41 over the final nine holes and while he can tell his grandchildren that he out-shot the legendary Arnold Palmer in a tournament, he will have to add that he failed to make the cut. "It's frustrating," he said of the tournament, of the situation in which he exists.

His life is a succession of road trips, some by car, some by plane. And if he fails to qualify on Monday, it was all for nothing.

You wonder why he does it as the years go by.

"It's what I want to do," Ross said. "It's not hard to stay with it. The Good Lord has given me a lot of inner peace to persevere."

And so he practices and plays, sleeps in hotels and eats in restaurants.

Complain? Not Ross. It's golf and it's a challenge.

"If it was easy, everyone would do it," he said. "A lot of people do think it's easy. Then let them come out and try what I do for a month. You've got to have a passion."

It's the passion that keeps him going and the idea that he has really been born again, moving into the senior ranks when he turned 50. No more banging heads with 20-year-old kids who hit the ball out into a new generation.

He's with his own and figures maybe that will even things out some. He'll find out over the next couple of weeks when he believes he's exempt from qualifying.

"That's a little less stressful, knowing you are in the field," he said.

And so by now, John Ross has moved on from here. Back home for a day, a home cooked meal, then on to the next venue, in Polk City, Iowa, then Kansas City.

One good week to turn things around, that's all he's looking for now.

**T**he 2004-'05 high school season was certainly a banner year for area schools.

And the season ended with another impressive run, by Preston High's Eric Ryan, who broke a 19-year-old state record by running the 1,600 meters (1 mile) in 4:14.03.

Who had the best run of the year? What was our top prep story of the 2004-'05 school year?

A ballot of 10 stories was handed out to the members of the sports department at *The Dominion Post* and they were asked to rank them from 1 to 10.

Here are those top 10 high school stories:

**10** Some things are just not supposed to happen in the world of sports. A Kenyan will not be beat in the Boston Marathon, the Chicago Cubs will not win another World Series, and the Morgantown High girls' soccer team will not lose to crosstown rival University High.

Yet, on Oct. 23, 2004, UHS star Stephanie Burgess scored a goal with 9:11 remaining in the second 10-minute overtime session to give the Hawks a 3-2 victory in the sectional tournament.

It was the Hawks' first victory against the Mohigans and it advanced UHS to its first-ever regional tournament. The Hawks went on to beat East Fairmont in the regional semifinal before losing in the regional championship game.

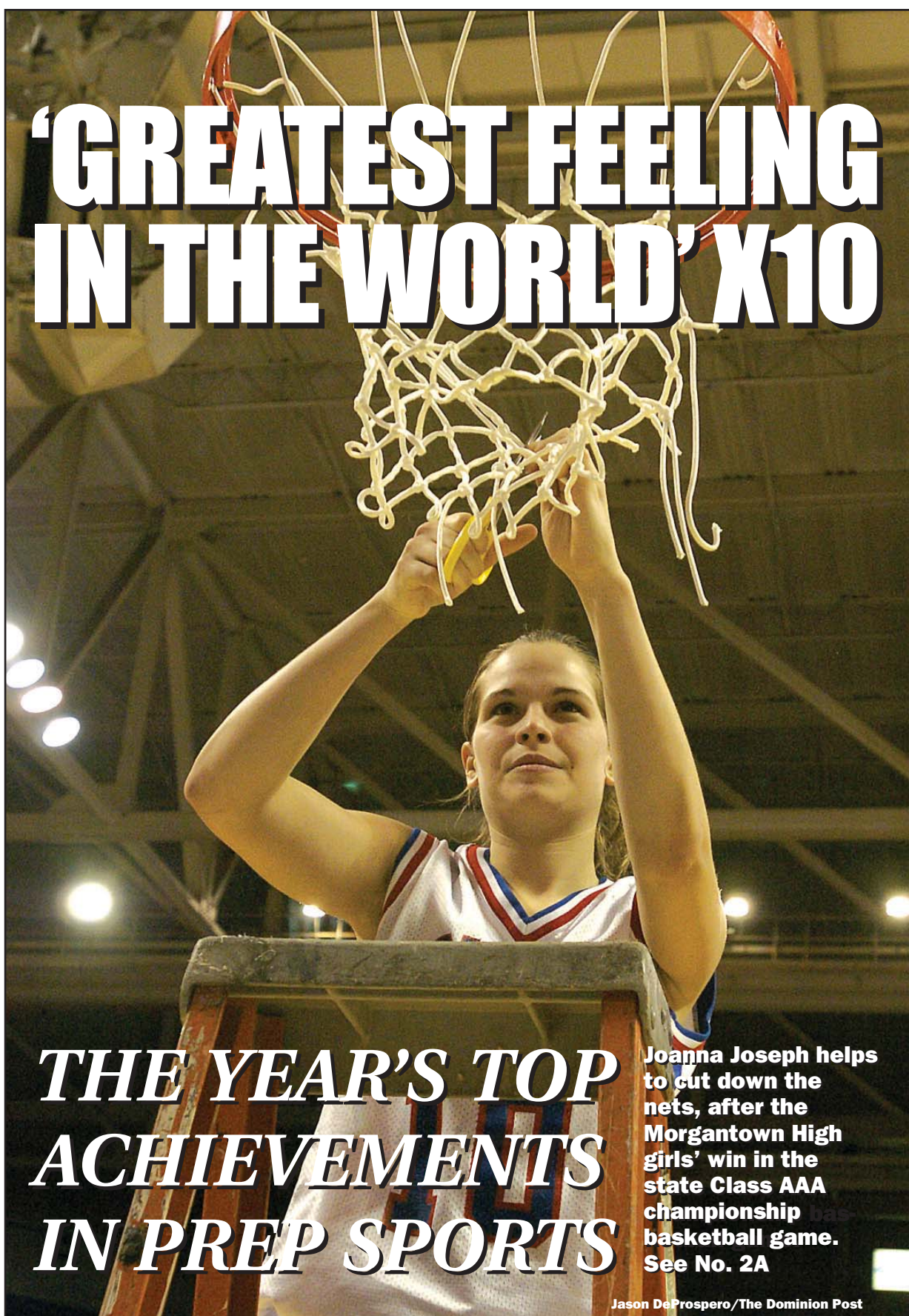
"For four years, I've been on the other side of this," Burgess said

## 3 share first at Sr. PGA

Rain ends the day with 33 on course

LIGONIER, Pa. — The Senior PGA field must have known the sunny sky and near-ideal weather just couldn't last.

Rain disrupted the Champions Tour major Saturday for the fifth consecutive year since its relocation from Florida, resulting in a scramble atop the leaderboard—and to get the tournament over by today.

With Dana Quigley, Mike Reid and second-round leader Jerry Pate tied for the lead at 5 under about midway through the third round, play was halted for the second and final time at 5:38 p.m. due to hard rain.

The 33 golfers still on the course will finish their rounds starting at 8:15 a.m. today, then go right into their final rounds, with all players off by 11 a.m. NBC's telecast is due to end at 3:30 p.m. today, and the PGA of America wants to see a winner determined on TV.

"I love to play golf, so it doesn't matter how many holes we play," Pate said. "I'm in pretty good shape so there won't be a fatigue factor—it's not going to come into my game. I'm looking forward to playing."

Pate, trying for his first tournament victory in 23 years, dropped two strokes to par through 10 holes to fall back into the tie with Quigley, the ever-present tour regular who had the best round of the day going when play was stopped. Quigley, who hasn't missed a tour event since 1997, was 3 under for the day through 11 holes.

Reid started at 4 under, birdied No. 1, then parred out through No. 10 before being pulled off the course.

The 2004 Senior PGA, at Valhalla, in Louisville, Ky., was pushed back to Monday because of bad weather before Hale Irwin won for the fourth time. Irwin all but shot himself out of contention Saturday, going 6 over through 14 holes to fall 11 shots off the lead.

Irwin was just a shot back after Thursday's first-round 69, but slumped to a 75 on Friday.

Quigley had little success on the PGA Tour from 1977-'82, but has won more than \$11 million and nine tournaments on the Champions Tour, though none was a major.

"I was intimidated by all the big stars," the 58-year-old Quigley said. "I didn't think I belonged, and I sabotaged myself with drinking and staying out. I had a lot of growing up to do to make myself believe I can

## Players leaving but you won't see us grieving

**BECAUSE LAUGHTER** is the best medicine ...

■ I don't know why, but recent events seem to have everyone feeling down about WVU's men's basketball team.

You say the Mountaineers won't see the Elite Eight any time soon. I say guess again.

With Kevin Pittsnogle's future uncertain, the next transfer out of the program — and if the pattern holds, one is due any day now — would leave WVU with only eight scholarship players guaranteed to be on next year's roster.

■ Then again, the optimists out there might say John Beilein continues to improve as he patiently builds the program.

In his first season, 2002-'03, he used just seven scholarship players.

■ Beilein will probably be out recruiting — again — real soon, perhaps visiting some of the players he passed over a while ago when he thought he'd have a power forward and a center for the next three seasons.

One wonders, though, if he's recruited a certain 6-11 center from Martinsburg.

■ For those of you thinking Gov. Joe Manchin owes WVU a favor, maybe you can convince him to intervene here and force the players to stay.

The dogmatic Democrat will certainly be interested when he discovers everyone's "left."

■ If Pittsnogle doesn't return to school, WVU will have one player taller than 6-foot-7, that being 7-foot Penn State transfer Rob Summers.

Beilein made a good point when he reminded us he didn't use more than one player at a time bigger than 6-7 this past season.

That, though, was countered when Jim Boeheim, Jim Calhoun, Jay Wright, Rick Pitino and Mike Brey reminded us that they did.

■ Beilein admitted he may have to adjust the style of the Mountaineers play.

That means WVU could — gasp! — shoot a lot of 3-pointers and play a lot of zone defense to make up for the size deficiency.

■ Safe to say the Big East and the television networks are keeping an eye on this situation.

The conference hasn't released its plans for scheduling because a lot of that is tied up in not just the new 16-team league, but also a number of underclassmen entering the NBA draft.

WVU was supposed to be a big factor in the scheduling process and receive a number of televised and high-profile conference games.

No Pittsnogle changes that for certain and a thinner team could cause similar problems.

■ The timing of the transfers is pretty bad, particularly when Beilein meets with one of the players and his parents in March and the four leave the meeting agreeing they all need to stay together for the next three years.

However, next season is perhaps Beilein's most important recruiting class ever and this transfer turnover can't help how things look on the outside.

Added to that, whatever reduced television exposure the Mountaineers may receive keeps them out of the vision of the recruits Beilein is trying to reach for the next class.

■ You can feel bad for Beilein, his staff and his players. For true sympathy, lend a shoulder to Chris Ostien and Greg Shock, the two men who painstakingly produced WVU's basketball highlight DVD to include footage of all the players.

■ For those of you keeping score at home, four of the six players Beilein recruited in his second and third classes — notable because Beilein had a full season under his belt — have transferred.

But the last time Beilein had to scramble to put together a class, he delivered Jarmon Durisseau-Collins, Joe Herber and Pat Beilein and kept Pittsnogle committed.

Not bad, huh?

**8** Possibly no team knew better the disappointment of losing a state championship in the final event of a competition. That was the story of the MHS girls' swim team in February 2004.

A year later, a determined team and a determined coach wouldn't let history repeat itself.

The Mohigans grabbed the lead on the first day of competition, just like the year before, but on final day of the meet, MHS not only held on to its lead but also extended it.

With state titles in the 200 medley relay, the 200 freestyle relay and the 400 freestyle relay, the Mohigans held off two-time defending champion George Washington High, 210<sup>7</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-176.

"This is so awesome," MHS swimmer Brittany Allen said. "We came up just eight points short last year and this time we came in focused and we wanted this so bad."

MHS coach Michael Deem was at a loss for words after the victory.

"Oh man, I feel ... I feel ... really exuberant," Deem said. "I want to go to Disney World."

**7** Imagine for a second, in a cross country race featuring 79 runners, how dominating it would be for one school to place all five of its scoring runners in the top 11.

That's exactly what the MHS girls did in November 2004.

Claire Berryman, the state's individual champion a year prior, took second, while Maria Dalzot was sixth, freshmen Aubrey Moskal and Emma Berry were eighth and ninth and Ahna Lewis was 11th.

The Mohigans' team score of 35 was the lowest total ever at the state meet.

"In my mind, Claire made a sacrifice for this team this year in the fact that she kept the team goals in mind instead of her own individual goals," MHS coach John Patti said. "At the beginning of the season, I thought we had too much distance between our top three and everybody else on the team. It was Claire who started to push everybody else. She started to pace the other girls and got their times down, while it probably hurt her own times."

On a side note, Preston High placed its five female runners in the top 21 and finished a close second, with 49 points.

"I've never heard of five girls in the top 10 before and I've never heard of five girls in the top 20 and finishing second," PHS coach Paul Martin said. "The best way I can put it is, we picked a bad year to be good."

**6** Maybe the Knights didn't pick a bad year after all. After coming up short in cross country, Preston's girls' track team saved its best for last and won the 2005 Class AAA state championship.

Holding a slim 52<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub>-52 lead on Jefferson High in the final event of the meet, the 4x400 relay, Preston's Karly Hamric gave the effort of a lifetime.

All the Knights had to do was

finish higher than Jefferson in the relay, but when Hamric began her anchor leg she was in fourth place and nearly 50 meters behind her Jefferson counterpart.

"In my first turn, I didn't think I could do it," Hamric said.

Then she started to make up ground. By the final 100 meters, she was mere feet behind the Jefferson runner and was continuing to come on strong.

"I just kept thinking this was going to be my last race in high school," Hamric said. "I couldn't let everybody down."

It came down to the final 30 meters. In a sprint to the finish line, Hamric not only passed the Jefferson runner but also the runner from John Marshall to take second place.

Preston had its first state track title.

"That right there (Hamric's finish) ... I don't know," Martin said. "It was unreal."

**5** Morgantown High wrestler Micah Gerasimovich had a wrestling career long on accomplishments.

He was a four-time North Central Athletic Conference champion, only the third wrestler in the conference's history to win that many. Gerasimovich had long surpassed the 100-win mark for his career and finished as the Monongalia County leader in victories.

But he had never won a state title.

That was, until Feb. 26, 2005, when Gerasimovich defeated Parkersburg South's Shaun Smith, 2-1, in the 145-pound state championship match.

Just how big of a victory was it for Gerasimovich? He finished his senior season with a 45-2 record — both losses were to Smith, who had been named the 2004 state tournament's Most Outstanding Wrestler.

"I didn't feel like I was the underdog," Gerasimovich said. "The way I saw it was, Shaun and I were both on clean slates going in. It was me against him and nothing else mattered."

The score was 1-1 entering the third and final period. With 35 seconds remaining, Gerasimovich picked up an escape point and then held off Smith for the final seconds to secure the victory. He was the first MHS state champion since 1974.

"To be honest, I really can't picture in my mind how it all went down," Gerasimovich said. "The only thing I can really remember is picturing myself late in the match having my arm raised and then it happened. Man, it

feels great."

**4** On a team with numerous individual standouts, Morgantown High's football coach, John Bowers, found a way to bring them all together to form the top team in the state.

Top-ranked MHS cruised to its third state title in five years with a 38-12 victory against No. 2 Martinsburg, at Wheeling Island Stadium.

The MHS offense grabbed the headlines throughout the season, averaging more than 40 points a game, but the defense stole the show on this championship day.

The Mohigans intercepted Martinsburg's Kennedy Award winning quarterback, Nate Sowers, five times and held Sowers to 194 total yards. He averaged 277 coming into the game.

In his final game, MHS tailback Spencer Farley rushed for 173 yards and three touchdowns.

"The defense today was great," Farley said. "We were able to get some pressure on them and I thought we did a good job of containing (Sowers) to the outside. Our secondary has a lot of speed and we were able pretty much to contain everything and force them to come right at us."

The Mohigans made the season look easy. The smallest margin of victory was 24 points and the defense finished the season allowing just 9.1 points per game.

**2B** Since former MHS running back Chris Yura set the state touchdown record at 50, in 1998, other Mohigans came close but weren't able to surpass it.

First there was Mark Wigal, who finished his senior season of 2000

with a state title and 41 touchdowns.

Two years later, Jeremy Rodamer led the Mohigans to another state title, but he fell short of the record with 48 touchdowns.

In 2004, Farley topped them all. He scored 37 touchdowns during the regular season, below the pace set by Yura. It was in the state playoffs where Farley really stepped it up.

In four playoff games, Farley accounted for 541 yards rushing and 17 touchdowns, giving him 54 total. He scored his 51st touchdown of the season in a semifinal victory, against Riverside, on a 79-yard run. It was his only rushing attempt of the second half.

"I guess it was a little more fun setting the record with a long run instead of a 1-yarder or something like that," Farley said. "I really didn't know that one was for the record until everybody jumped on me in the end zone. Then we all kneeled and prayed. It was a great feeling and I'm glad I got to share it with my teammates."

After the three scores in the title game, Farley also surpassed Yura's modern-era scoring record with 326 points. He finished his career with 4,849 yards rushing and 86 touchdowns.

**2A** The Morgantown High girls' basketball team was the pre-season No. 1 in the state. Only after two losses in a national tournament in Ohio did the Mohigans lose the top spot.

It would be the only two defeats the Mohigans suffered. MHS breezed through the postseason and recorded a 61-41 victory against South Charleston to win its first state title since 1993.

In the title game, MHS junior forward Keri Pryor scored 27 points

and added eight rebounds and six steals. She was named to the all-tournament team, as were teammates Lisa Lovett, Joanna Joseph and Brittney Whiting.

As for other highlights during the season, both Pryor and Joseph surpassed the career 1,000-point barrier.

"I don't think I've ever had two 1,000-point scorers on the same team before," MHS coach Allan Collins said.

Pryor will enter her senior season with 1,225 points, while Joseph finished with 1,030.

The state tournament run began with a 64-38 thrashing of Elkins. The semifinals saw the Mohigans (25-2) play their closest game in a 72-65 victory against Parkersburg South, which led MHS to the title game.

In the final, the MHS defense did a number on South Charleston's state Player of the Year, Renee Montgomery. The UConn signee scored 17 points and had three assists, but was unable to penetrate to the basket.

**1** Former Morgantown High runner Don DeCarlo set the state record of 4:17 in the 1,600 meters in 1986 — before Preston High's Eric Ryan was even born.

At times, the record seemed to be untouchable, but not to Ryan and Preston coach Paul Martin.

Before the track season began, Martin guaranteed in writing that Ryan would break the mark.

Ryan's one and only opportunity came on May 21, at Charleston's Laidley Field. He backed up Martin's boast with a final lap for the ages.

His plan was to run each of the four laps in 1:04 or less. Ryan did that on his first and third laps, but his second lap came in at 1:07, leaving him three seconds off the pace.

"He came around on that last lap and he looked over at me and winked," Martin said. "I knew he was good to go."

Ryan took off, running the last lap in an all-out sprint. He finished it in 59 seconds, five seconds faster than his first lap. His overall time was 4:14.03, breaking DeCarlo's record by three seconds.

"I felt like I had it, but I wasn't sure until I looked back (at the scoreboard)," Ryan said. "When I saw the time, it was the greatest feeling in the world."

# Safin wins war of words with self

## He earns gritty victory against Spain's Ferrero

PARIS — Cap backward, his dialogue with himself rarely pausing, Marat Safin negotiated around danger once more in his zigzag path through the French Open for a shot at a second straight Grand Slam title.

He didn't break a racket or even throw one. He kept his cursing to a mild mutter.

"It's a one-man conversation," he said. "Nobody's answering, which is good."

Down in each of the first two sets and thrashed in the third, the Russian escaped each time by calling on his full range of shots — serves in the 120 mph range; punishing, two-fist-

ed backhands; exquisite touch for a big man on lobs and drops; and more volleys than in the past — to post a 7-6 (5), 7-5, 1-6, 7-6 (2) victory Saturday against 2003 champion Juan Carlos Ferrero, of Spain.

"It was a great match, I will remember it, I will get it on video," said Safin, who spent much of his youth in Spain and still trains there part of the year. "A few years ago we were newcomers. Now we are 25 and we have spent a lot of time here. It's becoming a classic between us."

The third-seeded Safin, reaching the round of 16 along with 2004 runner-up and No. 8 seed Guillermo Coria, has been squeezed into the background the first week of the tournament by No. 1 Roger Federer's bid for a career Grand Slam and 18-year-old phenom Rafael Nadal's quest for a title in his French debut.

But the immensely talented, if

sometimes tempestuous 6-foot-4 Safin should not be overlooked as he tries to add the French title to the Australian he won in January, when he beat Federer in the semis and Lleyton Hewitt in the final, and the U.S. Open he won in 2000, when he downed Pete Sampras in a straight-sets final.

In a woman's third-rounder Saturday, No. 3 Amelie Mauresmo broke French fans' hearts, double-faulting on match point and losing, 6-4, 3-6, 6-4, to No. 29 Ana Ivanovic, a 17-year-old from Serbia-Montenegro.

Belgium's Justine Henin-Hardenne, the 2003 champion, won her 20th consecutive match, all on clay, when she beat Anabel Medina Garrigues, 4-6, 6-2, 6-3, to set up a meeting with reigning U.S. Open champion Svetlana Kuznetsova, a 6-1, 2-6, 6-0 winner against American Marissa Irvin. Top-ranked Lindsay Davenport is the only remaining American, male or female, among the 22 who entered the tournament.

No. 2 Maria Sharapova, trying to overtake Davenport for the No. 1 ranking and win the French for the first time, beat fellow 18-year-old Russian Anna Chakvetadze, 6-1, 6-4. Two other Russian women also advanced — No. 7 Nadia Petrova and No. 12 Elena Bovina. Sharapova will next play unseeded Nuria Llagostera Vives, who upset No. 13 Nathalie Dechy, of France, 7-6 (1), 6-3.

Safin and Ferrero have known each other since they were 14, practicing together at times, then playing against each other in the juniors. As pros, they've now split 10 matches. Each has been No. 1 in the rankings briefly and each has had ups and down because of injuries and illnesses.

This was their first match to go past three sets, and it featured fine shot-making by both players. Ferrero, the No. 32 seed, won three more total points, but lost key points when he was ahead in the first two sets. Serving for the first set at 5-4, Ferrero held off two break points before yielding.

play out here with these guys."

Seven others are within four shots of the lead, including 62-year-old Raymond Floyd, who is trying to become one of the oldest winners ever on the Champions Tour. He was 3 under through No. 12, two off the lead and one behind Dave Barr, who was alone at 4 under.

Floyd turns 63 in September, and could become the third-oldest tour winner behind Mike Fetchick, who won the 1985 Hilton Head Invitational at 63, and Gary Player, who was 62 years, 9 months when he took the 1998 Long Island Classic. Jock Hutchinson was 62 when he won the Senior PGA in 1947, long before the senior tour started.

Peter Jacobsen was tied with Floyd at 3 under, with Tom McKnight and R.W. Eaks at 2 under and Mark McNulty and Hajime Meshiai at 1 under.

Plenty of the golfers were feeling their age Saturday as a hard, heavy rain fell nearly all morning before play was halted for the first time just before noon for 1 hour, 45 minutes, before the leaders had started.

The rain was especially unfor- giving of 69-year-old Bob Charles, who was 8 over through eight holes while playing in the worst of the weather. He finished with a 10-under 82 at Laurel Valley Golf Club, his second round in the 80s of the tournament.

"Starting out this morning, it was pretty bad," said Des Smyth, who shrugged off the rain for a 70, his lowest round of the tournament. "And we had it for nearly 2½ hours."

The first two rounds were played under sunny conditions with temperatures in the low 70s, but temperatures never got out of the low 60s Saturday. The forecast for today is improved, with partly cloudy conditions, the chance of a thundershower and a high of 67.

The Senior PGA was played at various courses in Florida from 1940-00 before being moved north in 2001. Every year since, rain has fallen during the practice rounds or the tournament.

## Leonard ups his St. Jude edge to eight

# Red Sox crank Yanks

## Boston pounds out 27 hits in 17-1 romp

**NEW YORK** — Edgar Renteria, Manny Ramirez and the Boston Red Sox broke out of their slump with 27 hits and a satisfying rout.

Renteria hit a grand slam, Ramirez got four singles and Boston battered New York Yankees pitching Saturday for a 17-1 victory that snapped a four-game losing streak.

Trot Nixon homered and drove in five runs for the Red Sox, who backed Matt Clement (6-0) with their biggest offensive outburst of the year. Johnny Damon also had four hits and scored three times, and John Olerud had three hits in his first major league game since last fall.

Carl Pavano (4-3) and Paul Quantrill were roughed up for the Yankees, who had their five-game winning streak snapped and lost for only the third time in 19 games. They had won nine consecutive games at home.

The 27 hits were the most for the Red Sox since they tied the club record of 28 on June 27, 2003, against Florida. Pavano started that game as well, for the Marlins.

All the offense made it tough on the scoreboard operator at Yankee Stadium — the board went blank for a few moments in the eighth inning as the Red Sox piled on. Boston came one hit from of matching the Yankees' record for hits allowed.

The Red Sox had been held to three runs or fewer in three consecutive games for the first time since August 2003. But the Red Sox

had set a season high for hits by the fifth inning behind Ramirez and Renteria, who finished with five RBIs.

**CINCINNATI** — Dave Williams allowed only one hit in seven innings and Jason Bay hit a two-run home run in Pittsburgh's four-run first to lead the Pirates to a 9-2 victory against the Cincinnati Reds, on Saturday.

Ty Wigginton hit a two-run shot in the second and Humberto Cota added a solo homer in the third to boost Pittsburgh's lead to 7-0 and give Williams all the support he needed.

He didn't allow a hit until pinch-hitter Jacob Cruz doubled in Javier Valentin, who walked with two outs in the fifth.

That was the only hit Williams (5-4) gave up as he matched his longest outing of the season and won for the fourth time in five starts. He walked five and struck out five.

Pittsburgh jumped to a 4-0 lead with its biggest first inning of the season.

Freddy Sanchez doubled on Eric Milton's second pitch, and Bay followed one out later with his 11th homer — a 412-foot shot into the upper deck in left field. After Wigginton struck out, Jose Castillo singled and moved to third on Michael Restovich's ground-rule double to right-center. Both runners scored on Cota's bloop single to right.

The Pirates added two runs in the second on Sanchez's leadoff single and Wigginton's fifth homer

of the season. He has hit them all in his past eight starts.

Sanchez was playing with nine stitches in his left wrist after getting cut by Felipe Lopez's broken bat while fielding a grounder on the last play of Friday's game.

Cota made it 7-0 by leading off the third with his third homer. Milton (3-6), who has given up a major league-leading 20 home runs this season, allowed nine hits and seven runs in three innings — the shortest of his 11 starts this season.

The left-hander yielded an N.L.-leading 43 homers in 2004 with Philadelphia.

Lopez made it 7-2 in the eighth, when he hit his third home run in four games and eighth of the season.

# In Danica's hometown, anticipation for 500 high but beneath the surface

## Female driver will start fourth at Indianapolis

ROSCOE, Ill.

**D**anica Patrick's hometown isn't exactly awash in checkered flags, nor is it buzzing with anything more than the usual activity for a place that boasts all of 6,200 residents.

But only here can you order a "Danica's Lucky Charm" — a type of latte with vanilla and creme de menthe.

A little sweet, but with a definite kick.

Yep, the coffee-drink makers at Meg's Daily Grind clearly know a thing or two about their hometown hero.

The owners bought the place three years ago from Danica's parents, T.J. and Bev Patrick, who are daily customers.

"They still come in and are very supportive," owner Jodi Erickson said.

Meg's would seem to be Danica Central in this town that borders Wisconsin, about a five-hour drive from the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. On a counter, two interlocking checkered flags and clipped articles about Patrick are mounted on a wood board.

And while Roscoe has left a few steps un-pulled, locals are already getting anxious for today's Indianapolis 500.

"We can't wait," says Lindsay North, a hairstylist at Salon Bellezza, where a message on the greaseboard wishes Danica well.

North still does Patrick's hair when she's in town. "We keep it long for her photo shoots," North said. "We layer it, keep it dark. She's a really easy client."

Patrick has been the uncontested center of attention during the run-up to the Indy 500, in which she'll be the only female entrant. But unlike the other three women who have raced here, people seem to think this 23-year-old Indy rookie might have a real shot to win it.

"The whole craze thing is so odd," lifelong friend Kim Haynes said. "I hear her talking and I'm like, 'It's just Danica.'"

Even Patrick seems a little stunned by the level of attention.

"I was told that if I did well, this kind of thing would happen," Patrick said Friday, after turning the fastest lap in the field during practice. "But (my picture on) the top fold of the *USA Today* — twice? I never expected that."

She can keep expecting it as long as she keeps up this quick

pace: A bobble at the beginning of her qualifying run probably cost her the Indy pole position, but she made a nifty recovery and still qualified fourth — the best for a woman here.

None of this is shocking to the people who know Patrick and her family, who say she was always athletic, determined and needed to be challenged.

"She was feisty, (and) it's kind of funny how that played out," fifth-grade teacher Mike Rhines said.

Carol Allen, Danica's third-grade teacher, mentions "those

snapping black eyes. Even though she was little, nobody got anything over on her."

When Patrick is in town — a rarity given her schedule and the fact that she lives in Phoenix with her fiancé — it's "just another day. No one makes a big deal of her being in town," Haynes said.

She thinks that will change, but Danica won't.

"We're all proud of her," Allen said, "but I would have been proud of her no matter what she did."

# Gordon bad at song but team humming right along on track

## 3-time 600 winner aims to reclaim title

CONCORD, N.C. — Jeff Gordon is normally unflappable, able to jump with ease from the seat of a speeding race car to a gig hosting "Saturday Night Live."

Yet, there he was, butchering "Take Me Out to the Ball Game" with a garbled rendition that brought boos from Wrigley Field fans this week in Chicago.

The four-time NASCAR champion swears he didn't forget the words and denied accusations he was drunk. Turns out, the smoothest guy in the Nextel Cup series gets rattled every once in a while.

"The one thing that scares me the most is singing in front of anybody," Gordon said. "I was petrified. It was definitely a moment I'm not proud of, but it's a moment that's going to haunt me for a long time."

The one place Gordon is always calm is in a race car, where he'll be today, searching for a win in the Coca-Cola 600. He'll start second, behind pole-sitter Ryan Newman.

The race at Lowe's Motor Speedway has given Gordon his share of highs and lows. He scored the first of his 72 career victories in this race in 1994, and added wins in 1997 and 1998. But teammate Jimmie Johnson has emerged as the driver to beat at Lowe's. He is the two-time defending winner of this race, and he won in 2004 by leading 500 of the 600 miles.

Gordon, meanwhile, finished a whopping seven laps down, in 30th place.

But Gordon thinks he's since closed the gap on his teammate and is a legitimate threat to win the longest race on the NASCAR schedule. He's also buoyed by the fast start the No. 24 team is off to this season: Gordon already has three wins, including the Daytona 500.

"I think I picked up a lot on Jimmie when we were here in October," Gordon said, referring to his runner-up finish to Johnson. "Now it's just a question of whether or not that carries over into this next race. We're running really well right now."

Johnson's Hendrick Motorsports team has mastered this track. Aside from his back-to-back 600 wins,

Johnson also won this past October and finished fifth in this past weekend's All-Star race.

"We could probably take a Volkswagen Beetle over there and run pretty competitive," said Chad Knaus, Johnson's crew chief. "Jimmie's got a great feel for a race car and he's got a great feel for Lowe's Motor Speedway."

This time, however, all the drivers must adjust to a track whose surface was changed this spring. LMS president Humpy Wheeler used a diamond-grinding machine to smooth bumps in an effort to create better racing.

What he got was a remarkably fast race track — 18 drivers broke the track record in qualifying with Newman running a lap at 192.988 mph.

"That's not too fast," Newman said. "We go faster at Texas and Atlanta."

But Gordon thinks the removal of the bumps, once the trademark of this track, has made the racing too fast to permit passing and side-by-side racing.

"We're going too fast to put on a good race, but I don't think we're going too fast, safetywise," Gordon said. "The track has a lot of grip, and it's really smooth and fast. I just wish the tire gave up a little bit more under race conditions."

Drivers also must adjust to the changing conditions that come from beginning a race in the daylight and ending late into the night.

This is the one race on the schedule where a driver can't adapt to the way his car is driving at the moment. Rather, he must think about what changes need to be made once the sun goes down and the track begins to cool.

"You really don't pay attention to how many laps you've run. You pay attention to how many laps you have left," Tony Stewart said. "You know how many laps are in a segment and you know that when it comes to that last segment that you better have it right. And in the second to last segment, you better be working your way to the front so that you don't have to pass a lot of cars in that last green flag segment."

"Everything that we do pretty much works from the end of the race backward, and that's how we plan our strategy."

## Waiting on the Class of 2005

High school graduation is a big step on the path to the future

Graduation is not the end; or the beginning. Though it may be the end of formal schooling for some, their education started long ago and will continue forever.

The Monongalia Education Technology Center and the Mountaineer Challenge Academy's ceremonies are local graduations' bookends this year. METC's graduation was Wednesday and the Academy's is June 17.

Between those dates, thousands of other teenagers are also finding the courage to grow up and become who they really are — graduating from nine high schools in Marion, Monongalia and Taylor counties.

It hasn't been easy for most of them, maybe none of them. Today children graduate early — first from kindergarten — which is about far more than Kool-Aid, naps and Play-doh anymore.

Many children emerge from kindergarten actually reading, questioning and with an unbounded enthusiasm for learning, though they still prefer recess.

Around fifth or sixth grade they step up to the bigs — graduating to middle school or junior high.

There a transition occurs far more complex than remembering the combination to your locker and where your social studies classroom is located.

It's then they become more concerned with being someone — not something. And though career tracks and dreams are not shelved, a teen's identity is often embodied more in their appearance and acceptance than ambitions as a firefighter or dancer.

Suddenly, in a few short years high school looms large and they begin the daunting struggle to not only conquer advanced mathematics, but themselves.

And if that were not enough they face peer pressure and the knowledge high school is the end of something: their childhood. The realization they have to grow up, even if it's not fun acting that way.

If today's headlines make you less than eager for what's waiting for you remember — that's nothing new. The yellowed pages of newspapers from decades past would also give you that impression.

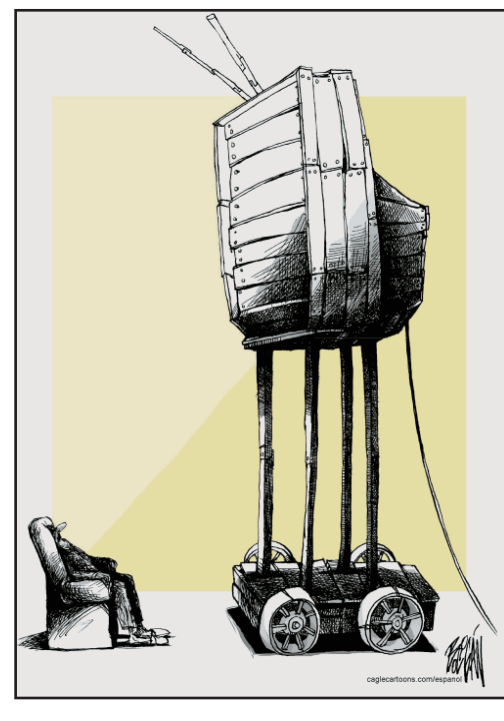
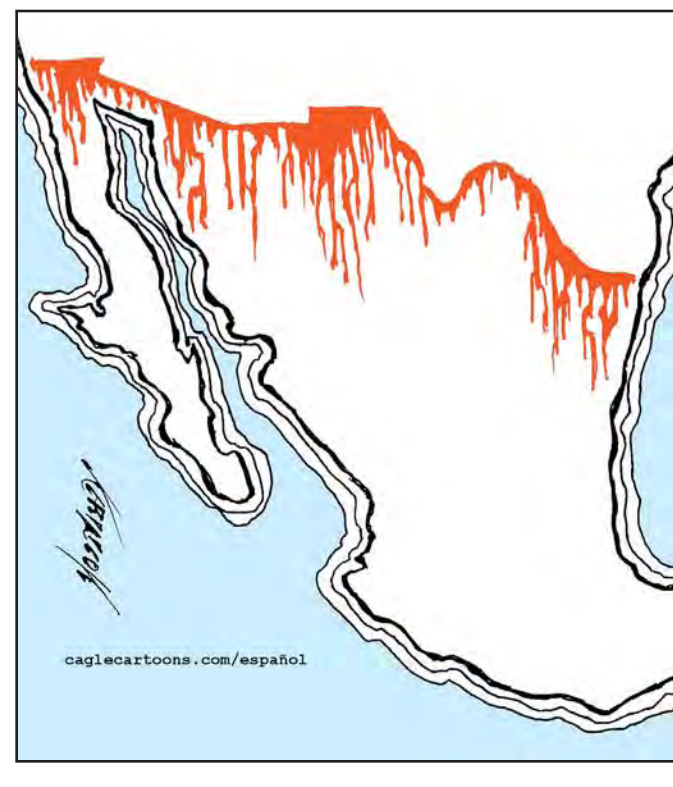
That's simply how it is and was. However, in the pages of some of these editions are stories about high school graduates, who never stopped questioning how it was.

## Amnesty borders on illegal

**THIS BIPARTISAN DEAL** cut by Sen. John McCain is noxious. No, the issue isn't judges. (Or campaign finance, or health care, or any number of other things.) It's illegal immigration and a proposal that has just been cooked up by the Arizona maverick and the Massachusetts non-maverick Sen. Ted Kennedy to grant an amnesty to millions of illegal immigrants.

Under the bill, illegals would have to work in the U.S. — which they are already doing — for six years as legal temporary workers, then they would be eligible to apply for green cards. Also, a new category of guest workers would be created who would work here for four years, then be eligible for green cards. This category will likely bring another 400,000 foreign workers a year into the country.

McCain and Kennedy argue that their legislation isn't an amnesty because illegals have to pay a \$1,000 fine prior to becoming temporary workers and another \$1,000 before getting their green cards. But an amnesty with a small fine is still amnesty. Mark Krikorian of the Washington-based Center for Immigration Studies calls the fine, in effect, "a retroactive smuggling fee paid to the U.S. government."

It applies to any illegal with a job, and to his spouse and children. There are roughly 10 million to 11 million illegals. Of them, 6 million to 7 million are employed, and the rest are generally spouses and children.

We've been here before. A 1986 amnesty gave 2.7 million illegals green cards. A man who would go on to be one of the terrorists in the first World Trade Center bombing, an Egyptian cabdriver working in New York, was legalized under the law as a farmworker.

The 1986 law caused a spike in the flow of illegals. It sent a message of tolerance for lawbreaking, and would-be illegal Mexican immigrants had a toehold in the U.S. in the form of their newly legal friends and family. Today, the illegal population is double what it was in 1986, and an estimated 800,000 new illegals come every year.

How did such disastrous legislation pass? 1986 was one of the great bait-and-switches of all time. The amnesty came upfront, and the enforcement was supposed to happen later. It never did.

The McCain-Kennedy bill has the hallmarks of continuing in the tradition of the 1986 legislation. The Department of Homeland Security has already started a program for employers to check an online database to see if a prospective employee is legal. McCain-Kennedy would tell the Social Security Administration to start the program from scratch. Oddly, it gives the job of auditing companies to ensure that they aren't hiring illegals to the ineffectual Labor Department instead of the perhaps slightly less ineffectual immigration service at DHS. "A lot of it seems intended actually to handcuff DHS enforcement people," says Krikorian. The rest of the enforcement provisions are a mishmash of calls for reports, coordination plans, advisory committees — in other words, the usual dodges when politicians want the public to think they are doing something they don't want to do.

The legislation stipulates it doesn't grant police more authority to enforce immigration laws, but it goes out of its way to include language about securing Mexico's border with Guatemala. This concern reflects a concept — banded about by the Bush administration as well — called the "North American security perimeter." It holds we can all be one happy family, and the U.S.-Mexico border won't matter so much, if we can keep those pesky Central Americans out of Mexico.

Of course, we should keep our focus about 1,600 miles north of the Mexico-Guatemala line, at our own border. The first step is defeating McCain-Kennedy.

## T-shirts glorify teen drinking

**THE STORY SOUNDED** matter of fact, almost flat, as if the father had worn it smooth from turning it over in his head every day for weeks now. His 16-year-old daughter, a sophomore at a California public school, was in Texas last month visiting her sister, a college student. The high school girl chugged herself into a drunken, self-destructive hysteria, threatening suicide, lashing out. When the sister took her to the hospital, her blood alcohol level was 0.21, nearly three times the legal limit.

The father learned his daughter had downed a margarita before heading to a fraternity party, where she threw back five to six shots of vodka, followed by beer and wine. It was the second time in a year the girl had landed in a hospital after a drinking binge. The parents had put her in counseling and monitored where she was and with whom. But now it had happened again.

"I thought she had gotten a grip," the father said.

I keep hearing these stories from parents, or at least from the parents who talk. And I remember my high school days, when I was a binge drinker myself. I shudder to think how lucky I am to be alive and intact, and I shudder again to imagine my teenage son someday putting himself in as much danger as I did.

So when a friend told me about the latest T-shirts at Abercrombie & Fitch, I figured she was exaggerating. As exploitive as this company is, with its history of employing whatever slithery tactics necessary to hook young customers, the T-shirts my friend described seemed too ignorant and irresponsible even for Abercrombie.

Yet there they were on a table at the San Francisco Centre store, just

as she had said: Stacks of adorable, "high-quality" T-shirts for the pre-teen and teen set, each one celebrating the pursuit of drunkenness. Well, not only drunkenness. Some celebrate the pursuit of sex and drunkenness.

"Don't Bother / I'm Not Drunk Yet," one says.

"Bad Girls Chug. Good Girls Drink Quickly."

"If You Can Read This You Need Another Cocktail."

"Sotally Tober."

Lovely.

OK, so drinking kills 1,400 college students a year through accidents, violence or poisoning. And parents of high school students sit up on weekend nights, barely exhaling until they hear the click of the front door. Never mind that. This multi-gazillion-dollar company — the standard bearer of cool for many teens — is telling kids that getting stumbling drunk is, like, totally awesome.

As I looked at the T-shirts on the table, and at two girls debating which one was funniest, I thought about the hundreds of sad e-mails I received in the past two weeks from parents, students and teachers about teens and alcohol, particularly about the connection between drinking and sexual assault. The e-mails arrived in response to a recent column about a high school girl in San Rafael who was raped after a party at which kids were drinking.

"This type of incident is all too frequent," wrote Greg Jacobs, an assistant district attorney from Sonoma County, which is addressing the problem through a program called the Teen Sexual Violence Initiative.

The column about the rape case touched a nerve. Marin, Calif., school districts immediately began to re-evaluate how well they educate students about the link between drinking and sexual assault.

Could this re-energized outreach help a girl like the one who landed in the hospital twice? Kids in their teenage years are dopes sometimes, most frequently on weekend nights. They're figuring it out as they go. They sometimes make bad decisions. They sometimes don't think about the consequences.

Today's teens have the best of everything and, in some ways, the worst of everything. They have amazing access to knowledge. They have conveniences we never dreamed of. But they also have been cheated of chunks of childhood, pulled by movies and television, music and marketing, into an adult world for which their brains are not developmentally ready. They are faced with decisions about sex and alcohol and drugs at ages when we were just beyond pushing around strollers and Tonka trucks.

The job of teenagers is to navigate a sea of expectations and temptations and arrive safely on the other side. It is a perilous enough journey without marketing mercenaries in New Albany, Ohio, luring them toward the roughest waters.

# The common sense of parental consent for teenagers' abortions

Do you know of any school that dispenses Tylenol without parental permission? For the most part, they can't. But in six states and the District of Columbia, it is currently legal for a child to get an abortion without a parent's permission. In 11 states, parental consent laws are bogged down in court rulings. The majority of states, 33, have working prohibitions on kids getting abortions without parental permission.

The debate over parental notification is red hot: Priscilla Owen's judicial nomination was partly held up by Democrats because of a parental-notification ruling she made on the Texas Supreme Court.

Now the nation's top court has agreed to get involved in the issue. The U.S. Supreme Court will hear a challenge to New Hampshire's parental-consent law in its fall term. The Granite State's law requires a girl's parents to be notified 48 hours before an abortion is performed. Last year, a federal appeals court found that the law was unconstitutional based on a 1992 Supreme Court precedent that forbids any "undue burden" on the exercise of (court-imposed) abortion rights.

The headlines about the New Hampshire case make the parental involvement issue seem so much more controversial and complicated than it should be. "Supreme Court Rejoins Fractious Abortion Debate," *The New*

*York Times* announced.

Take away the obvious frenzies that come with any abortion or Supreme Court-related matter (never mind the two combined), the big picture this time is as clear-cut common sense as you get in the abortion debate.

In New Hampshire - the state that now heads up the steps of the nation's highest Court to defend its right to require parental notice for minor abortions - children under 18 must have a parent's permission to use tanning machines. Tanning machines. If they're under age 14, they must also have a doctor's note.

Some of those other "free" states also have skewed priorities: In California, parental permission is also required for 14 to 17 year-

olds to use tanning machines, and children under 14 are prohibited from using them, period. These same kids can have abortions without so much as a peep to a parent.

In New York, where there is no abortion parental-consent or notice law, kids' can't get a nose ring or a tattoo without the folks' OK. Music to many parents ears, perhaps, but ludicrous when you realize a girl can get an abortion at the clinic across the street from the tattoo parlor without Mom or Dad knowing she is pregnant.

An April Fox News/Opinion Dynamics poll found 78 percent of respondents supporting requiring parental-notification for children obtaining abortions. Similar polls

have had similar results - including an April Quinnipiac University poll that had 73 percent in agreement with notification requirements.

Opponents who argue that consent requirements or mere notification further injures victims of incest, for instance, are a mere distraction, because most of these girls would get legal protection.

At the heart of the yelling against a common-sense attempt to keep kids away from making such a grave decision without parental inclusion comes down to the worry that guides a lot of the actions from the Left in America today: an opposition to anything that might in anyway restrict legal abortion in America.

Dems like Hillary Clinton talk

the talk about wanting to find a common ground on abortion, but then - as Senator Clinton has - oppose a bill now before the Senate that would prohibit a teen in a parental-consent state from obtaining an abortion in a "reproductively free" state.

Until abortion advocates like Hill walk the talk and embrace perfectly sensible restrictions on their sacred right to privacy, good luck reaching that majority of Americans who see parental consent laws as simply normal.

#### Seat belts save lives so buckle up for safety

Many people still don't take one of the simplest and most effective steps to stay safe: Buckling up. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration, of the 31,904 passenger vehicle occupants who were killed in crashes in 2003, 56 percent of them weren't wearing safety belts.

Teenagers and young adults, and those driving pickup trucks, and living in rural areas are particularly at risk.

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for teens and young adults in the United States from age 16 through 34, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and safety belt use by pickup truck occupants is about 70 percent, among the lowest for any demographic group.

Safety belt use in rural areas was a little better at 76 percent in 2004, but still below the national average.

Sometimes the fear of getting a traffic ticket is the only reason that someone will wear a safety belt. That's why law enforcement officers across the region and state joined together for the Click it or Ticket May 2005 Mobilization from May 23 through June 5, 2005. Officers will aggressively ticket unbelted drivers and passengers. High-visibility enforcement has proven effective in increasing



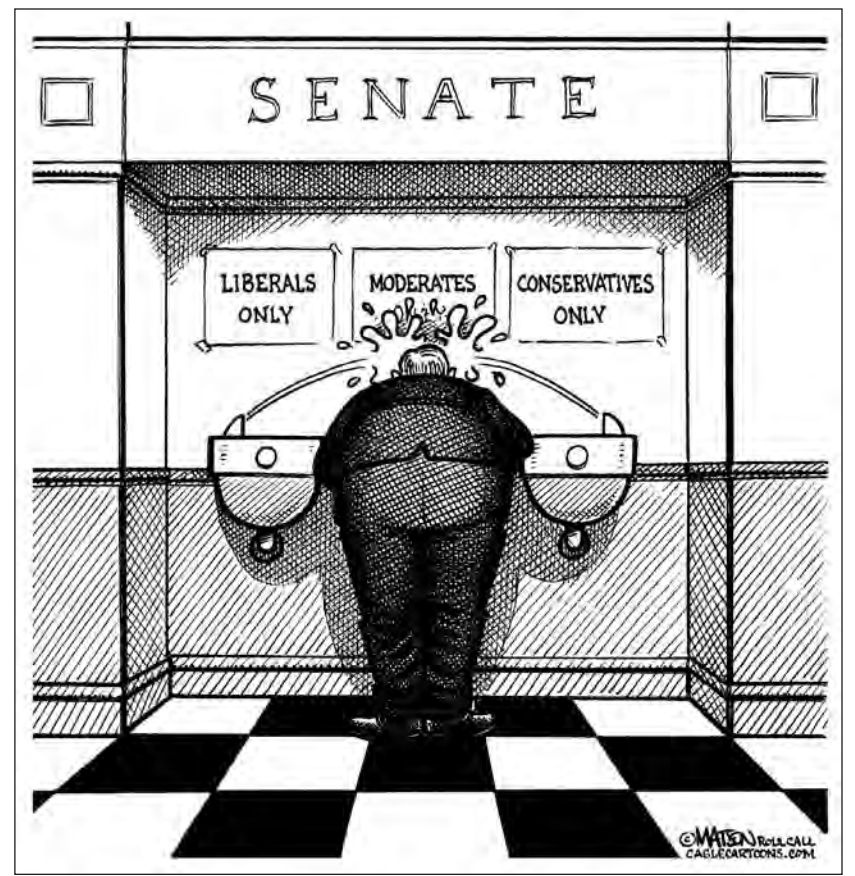

## Fox's insensitivity hurts blacks, Hispanics

By refusing to apologize for his inflammatory comment about blacks, Mexican President Vicente Fox has not only harmed his country's image but he has made it more difficult for the Mexican immigrants he is trying to help.

Earlier this month, Fox made headlines when he told a group of Texan businessmen, "There is no doubt that Mexicans, full of pride, will power and desire to work, are doing jobs over there that not even blacks want to do."

The statement is so clearly offensive that even the U.S. State Department deemed it "insensitive and inappropriate." It not only puts down blacks, but it draws a race-based dividing line between Mexicans and blacks, reinforcing tensions between them.

On Sunday, during an appearance on the Rev. Jesse Jackson's Chicago-area radio show, Fox would not back off. "I very much regret the misinterpretation," Fox said.

But when Jackson asked, "Why not apologize?" Fox merely claimed that

Mexico "has proven its high commitment to human rights" and that his conscience is clear because he is "a passionate defender of human rights and integration of minorities."

In a subsequent meeting with the Rev. Al Sharpton in Mexico City on Monday, Fox reiterated that his remark was misinterpreted, adding that he had great respect for the civil rights movement.

But many human rights groups have criticized the Mexican government's mistreatment of the country's indigenous groups.

What's more, Mexico's blacks,

although a tiny percentage, are marginalized, politically and culturally.

Fox's comment further complicates the relationship between blacks and Latinos in the United States.

Mexican and other immigrants from Latin America have become increasingly pitted against blacks in the labor market, and tensions have run high in communities from California to New Jersey.

He has only made it more difficult for Latinos and blacks to work together on political issues that would protect workers' and poor people's rights.

For the good of his own people, and for the majority of Americans who are struggling to hold on to decent jobs and decent health care, Fox should apologize the first chance he gets.

Firm to use grant money for farming research

There is a class action lawsuit pending in the Circuit Court of Kanawha County, West Virginia, Civil Action No. 03-C-134. The lawsuit was filed against H & R Block, Inc., four of its subsidiaries or related companies, and five individual tax preparers. Not all subsidiaries dealt directly with the public. No franchise owners are defendants in this case. This notice will refer to the defendants, including the individual defendants, as "H & R Block."

The complaint in this lawsuit alleges that H&R Block breached duties it owed to each person who obtained a refund anticipation loan by failing to disclose that H&R Block received fees from the lending bank for each loan, while acting as the tax payer's agent, loan broker, and fiduciary. The complaint also alleges H&R Block violated West Virginia law regulating credit services organizations, breached contracts with class members, was unjustly enriched by the fees they collected from class members, and engaged in unfair or deceptive acts or practices in violation of West Virginia law. On behalf of all class members, the class

representatives are seeking monetary damages, attorney fees, and court costs.

H&R Block contends its interaction with customers was lawful and fair in all respects. H&R Block specifically contests the allegations in this lawsuit, denies it has done anything wrong, denies that it had or breached any duties to class members, denies that it has violated any laws, and denies that it has done anything unfair or deceptive. H&R Block also denies that the class members are entitled to any recovery or relief. H&R Block has filed motions for judgment in its favor on all claims asserted in this matter.

The Court has not ruled on any of the claims in this case and does not express any opinions on the merits of the claims or defenses in this case. The Court has, however, ruled that this lawsuit may be maintained as a claim on behalf of a class of all West Virginia residents who obtained a RAL through an H & R Block office, in West Virginia, between January 1, 1994 and December 31, 2004, and has appointed Brian A. Glasser, Bailey & Glasser LLP, 227 Capitol Street, Charleston, West Virginia, 25301, as class counsel.

The hospital and the Universi-

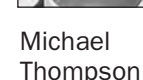

### PUBLIC WATER SYSTEM REGULATIONS AND STANDARDS

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, the EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by the public water systems. FDA regulations establish limits of contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may be reasonably expected to contain small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of these contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

The source of drinking water (both tap and bottled water) includes rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs and wells. As water travels over land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals, and in some cases radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Therefore, water testing standards are established and enforced by the State of West Virginia Department of Health and the EPA. The following definitions are the federally regulated standards of comparison for tested contaminants...

#### MAXIMUM CONTAMINANT LEVEL GOAL (MCLG)

The level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.

#### MAXIMUM CONTAMINANT LEVEL (MCL)

The highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology.

### INFORMATION ON YOUR WATER QUALITY

#### INORGANIC CHEMICALS

Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, may be naturally-occurring or the result of urban stormwater runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining and farming.

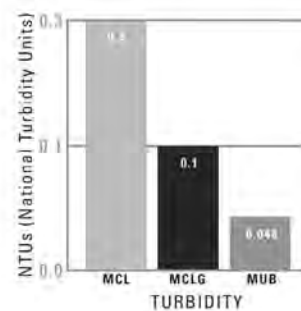

#### Turbidity

Turbidity is generally thought of as the cloudiness of water. It is one way to measure the removal or inactivation of certain targeted microorganisms. At high levels it can impair the disinfection process.



#### Total Organic Carbon

Total organic carbon is naturally present in the environment. Our finished water average for 2004 was 2.0 mg/l.

#### Lead and Copper

Lead and copper analysis is performed once every three years on water samples throughout our water distribution system. Our analysis for 2004 showed that the 90th percentile of the ranked analysis results were non-detectable. Actual results showed that all of the 30 samples obtained and analyzed in 2004 were below detection limit for copper, while only one sample for lead showed a very small amount (0.006 ppm). The next scheduled sampling for lead and copper is set for 2008.

#### Radiological

Certain naturally occurring minerals are radioactive and may emit a form of radiation known as alpha radiation. Typical sources include oil and gas drilling operations, as well as mining activities. MUB's most recent testing for alpha activity was non-detectable.

#### COLIFORM BACTERIA

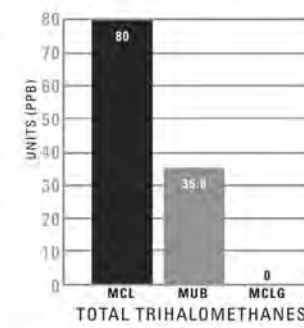
Coliform bacteria is generally thought of as an indicator bacteria. Its presence indicates that other potentially harmful bacteria may be present. Of the 600 samples taken during 2004, all showed 0% presence of coliform bacteria.

#### ORGANIC CONTAMINANTS

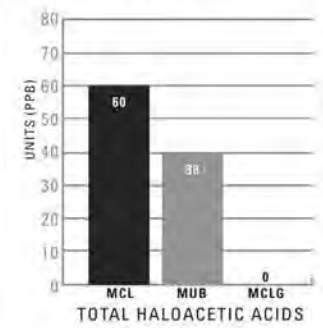
Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, may be by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production. They may also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff and septic tanks.

#### Regulated Volatile Organic Contaminants

Regulated volatile organic chemicals are required to be tested once every year. Of the 21 regulated VOCs required to be tested all were non-detectable for the 2004 analysis.



THMs (Total trihalomethanes) are by-products of drinking water chlorination.



HAA5s (Haloacetic acids) are also a by-product of drinking water chlorination.

#### Unregulated Contaminants

Unregulated contaminants (list 1) were sampled once during each quarter of 2001. In all quarters none of the listed contaminants were detected.

#### Regulated Synthetic Organic Contaminants (Pesticides, PCBs, Herbicides, etc.)

These contaminants are tested in duplicate once every three years. Our 2003 analysis showed all such chemicals analyzed in our raw water test were non-detectable, except that Di(2-ethylhexyl) phthalate was detected in the raw water at an extremely low concentration of 0.001mg/l. The compound was not found on our immediate sampling of finished (treated) water, nor was it found in subsequent raw water samples.

### FROM OUR WATER SOURCE

The main source of drinking water for the Morgantown area is surface water from the Monongahela River, which supplies over four-fifths of the area's water supply. Water is also provided from the Cobun Creek reservoir which stores surface water from the Cobun Creek watershed.

In 2004, MUB produced 3.59 billion gallons of treated water, an average of 9.81 million gallons per day.

#### Source Water Assessment

The MUB water plant operators continuously monitor and test the raw water intake into the water treatment plant for the presence of likely contaminants. Because our water is supplied from surface water, it is susceptible to natural or man-made contamination. This does not mean that the water has been or will be contaminated, only that conditions are such that the surface water could be impacted by a potential contaminate source. A source water assessment report of our water supply has been prepared by the West Virginia Bureau of Public Health, and is available from the Bureau (304-558-2981) or MUB (Greg Shellito at 599-2111).

#### IMPORTANT NOTE

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Parents fret when doing nothing is the answer

**Q:** Our 29-month-old son is mostly well-behaved; however, when he doesn't get his way or becomes frustrated for whatever reason, he will usually swat whatever is in his way. Thankfully, this doesn't include me or his 15-month-old brother; rather, he will swat a table, chair, toy, book or whatever is handy. Sometimes, when he swats, he will scream something incoherent. If I say "No!" he will look at me defiantly and do it again. He gets over his little tantrum fairly quickly, but not until he has swatted something and screamed. How should I deal with this? I have tried time out, and he will stay put for as long as I tell him, but it doesn't really seem to help.

**A:** I recommend that you deal with your son's swatting by completely ignoring it. As it stands, he is not hurting anything other than perhaps his hand, but if you continue paying a lot of attention to this, he may soon begin throwing things, breaking things and even turning his aggressions on his younger brother. Ignored, this too will likely pass. Otherwise, this molehill may quickly grow into a mountain.

**Q:** For various reasons, we recently moved our 4-year-old daughter to a new Pre-K program. The first couple of weeks were fine, but now she cries and doesn't want to go. She attends three days a week, from 8:30 in the morning until 3 in the afternoon. I'm a stay-at-home-mom, so she doesn't have to attend at all, but we thought it would be good for her to have social time with other kids her age. Her older sister, age 5, also attends kindergarten at the same school, and we have decided that both of them will continue their elementary education there. She says she wants to go back to her former school, which a good friend of hers attends. Will I be making a grave mistake by making her stay where she is or should I move her back to her old preschool for this school year and back to this new school for kindergarten? By the way, her teacher assures me that after I leave, she stops crying and within 15 minutes is playing and participating and seems to be enjoying herself.

**A:** Transitions of this sort often cause temporary upset in children this age. They usually adjust fine within a week or so, given adults who keep their cool.

Obviously, your daughter's upset has upset you and caused you to question your decision. Under those circumstances, she will continue to be upset for who knows how long. It is imperative that you take the lead here and begin acting like you have confidence in your decision.

I would imagine that you have said everything there is to say about this to your daughter, so I urge you to simply tell her, "I've said everything I have to say about this. I've made my decision, and that's that, and we're not going to talk about it any more. I'm going to drop you off at school and leave. If you need to cry for a while, that's okay with me and with your teachers, but it's not going to change anything. I love you!"

At that point, simply turn and walk away. In a situation of this sort, the best medicine is parents who act like they know what they are doing.

Adults suffer with attention disorder, too

They put off paying bills, filing taxes and completing other complex paperwork.

They may have a lot of speeding tickets or have been in a lot of traffic accidents.

They interrupt conversations to finish another person's sentence.

They are easily distracted, impulsive, restless, depressed and anxious.

They are the estimated 9 million U.S. adults who live with attention deficit hyperactivity disorder, and most don't even know they have it.

Sufferers are powerless to concentrate, stereotyped as scatterbrained or worse, incapable of working up to their full potential. But medication can change their lives dramatically.

The condition costs them more than self-esteem and interpersonal relationships.

A survey by Dr. Joseph Biederman, professor of psychiatry at Harvard Medical School, found they are losing \$77 billion in income each year. Directly, they make less money than people who don't have ADHD. Indirectly, the disorder costs sufferers when they self-medicate with drugs and alcohol, or get depressed.

"People around them say 'You should be able to focus on this,'" said Dr. John Vanin, who oversees the care of students with ADHD as director of Mental Health Services at WVU's Student Health Service.

"It's a common myth that they are lazy and unmotivated," noted his colleague, Dr. David Morgan, a staff psychiatrist at WVU.

"You really can't handle this. It's a medical disorder," said Vanin, who was recently appointed to a national task force on college mental health by the American Psychiatric Association.

- Distractibility

The symptoms of ADHD can be variable and situational, or constant. Some people with ADHD can concentrate if they are interested or excited, while others have difficulty concentrating under any circumstances. Some avidly seek stimulation, while others avoid it. Some become oppositional, ill-behaved and, later, antisocial; others may become ardent people-pleasers. Some are outgoing, and others, withdrawn.

Attention disorders involve inattention and impulsiveness but hyperactivity is present only some of the time. And in adults, the hyperactivity manifests itself differently. They may shake their legs or pick at their fingers, but not run around the room inappropriately like children with the condition sometimes do.

Adults who have attention disorders are not irresponsible, said Richard Loren, Ph.D., a clinical child psychologist at WVU's School of Medicine.

"This really is real. It's not something people are using as an excuse or a crutch," Loren said.

ADHD sufferers find it particularly hard to motivate themselves to do mundane

tasks, Loren said. And once they start, it's easy for something more interesting to distract them.

He said patients tell him it's like watching a TV where the channels are randomly and unexpectedly changing. They don't know how long they'll be watching that channel before it changes again. The distractions are coming from inside their heads, not necessarily their environment.

Traits of the condition include a long history of inattention, lack of focus, underachievement and low self-esteem.

Before readers go thinking they have it, Loren said, they should consider how often they have symptoms.

"All of us have periods where we're as distracted as a person with ADHD, such as from not getting a good night's sleep," he said.

No one knows for sure what causes ADHD but studies suggest it is caused by an imbalance or deficiency in certain chemicals in the brain. In many cases the disorder is genetically transmitted.

Three out of four adults with an attention disorder have another mental health condition.

Adults who are diagnosed later in life had ADHD when they were children, it just wasn't diagnosed then, Vanin said. They coped with it.

In fact, many adults are diagnosed with the disorder when their children are diagnosed, Loren said.

Experts once thought that children outgrow ADHD; now they know that at least 60 percent (some say 75 percent) of people who have ADHD as children, have it as adults.

Vanin and Morgan treat the WVU students who didn't outgrow it. Sometimes they diagnose a student.

Students will come to their office because they're struggling academically. They read but they can't absorb the material they're studying. Their minds wander in class. They feel like they're spinning their wheels. If they have a job, they can't focus on their work, the doctors said.

The students might wonder how they made it through school until now. Chances are, the doctors said, they were very bright

and they learned to cope with the disorder, until they got into a more unstructured setting.

Some doctors don't believe adult ADHD exists; others fear prescribing addictive substances and are reluctant to treat patients with stimulants.

"I've never seen an ADHD person crave the medication," Morgan said. "If you don't have enough dopamine or norepinephrine, the medicine will bring the levels back to normal."

Treatment, if adults can get it, is in the form of stimulant or nonstimulant drugs. All versions of attention disorder are likely to involve deficiencies in dopamine and norepinephrine, the chemicals that carry messages through the brain when you think. In an addled brain, the cells that transport those neurochemicals may be working overtime, sucking up the neurotransmitters. Some stimulant medications like Ritalin, Concerta and Metadate may slow down that vacuum cleaner and increase the amount of available dopamine. Amphetamines like Adderall increase the amount of available dopamine so that even overactive cells can't suck it all up. The recent nonstimulant medications, like Strattera, act on norepinephrine.

Some of the medications can be taken as needed.

"ADHD is an everyday problem," Morgan said. "The worse you are, the more it gets into your driving and social interactions."

That's what perpetuates some myths and controversy in the medical community. Doctors say "if you don't need it regularly, you don't have it," Vanin said.

"It's a very unusual, very complicated disorder," Morgan said.

When they take medicine, patients say it's like flipping a light switch. Everything comes into focus. It's dramatically life-altering, the doctors said.

"I have been a psychiatrist for 30 years," Morgan said, "and while I don't have a preference for one diagnosis or condition, when you properly diagnose somebody with ADHD, it's one of the most gratifying things."

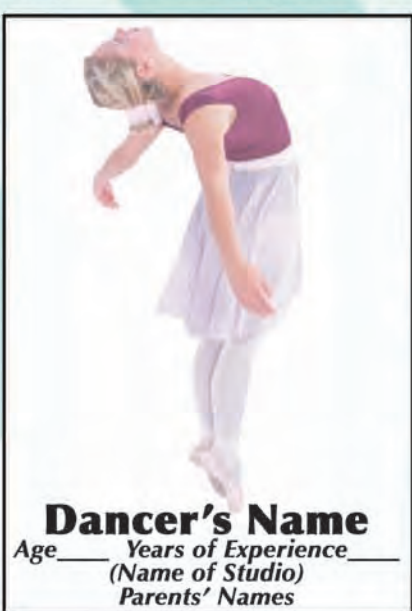

**MY DAD HAS** a lot of stories from his time in Vietnam. My favorite goes something like this: My dad was getting ready to ship out and his brother-in-law, who had been a patient of his at the 93rd Evac Hospital, came to see him off and take him for a drink. But when they showed up at the Officer's Club, they were turned away because Joe wasn't an officer (he was a sergeant). And when they tried to go to the NCO's (non-commissioned officers) club, they were turned away again, because my dad was a captain. So they decided to split the difference, grab a cocktail from each respective club and meet in the center of a bridge halfway between the two taverns. And, there, standing on a bridge, in the middle of a war, they toasted one another. My dad has a lot of other stories, too — ones without the happy ending. Most of these I've never heard, whether because he can't find the words to tell his little girl or because he just can't find the words, period. And while many of us may think these kinds of depressing stories have no place at our Memorial Day picnic, alongside our party drinks and potato salad, we should probably all stop for a moment and reflect on what Memorial Day is really about. Originally called Decoration Day, the day was designed to be a mark of remembrance for those who died in our nation's service. Traditionally, graves of fallen servicemen and women have been decorated with flow-

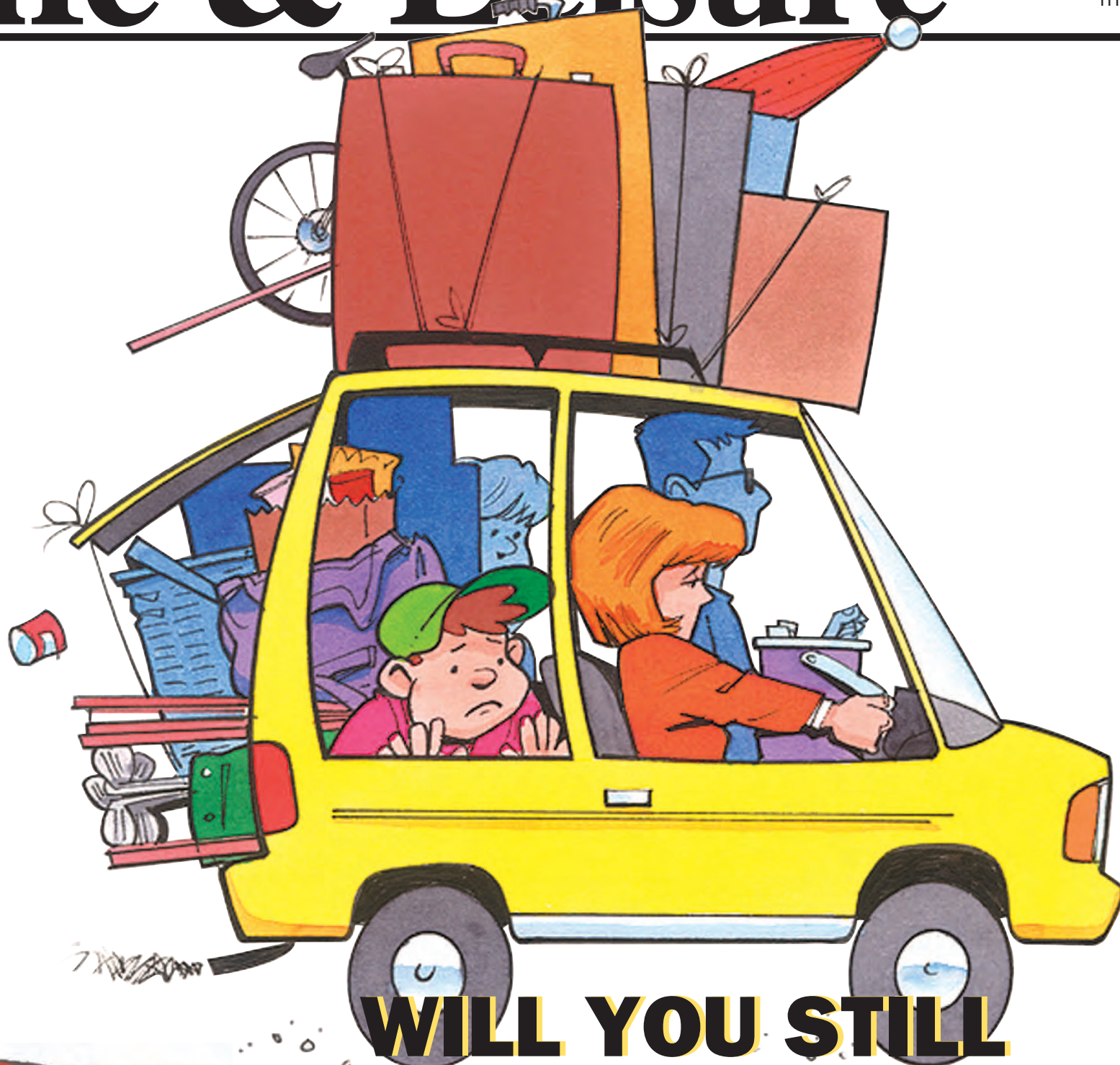

# WILL YOU STILL up and go?

**W**ell, Memorial Day weekend is finally upon us — signaling the unofficial start of summer and kicking off the vacation season. We wondered if some folks' travel plans might not be put on hold — or at least downsized — because of gas prices. So we asked our readers: Are the rising costs at the pumps going to leave your vacation plans running on empty? While some readers said yes, the pricey status of gasoline had caused them to curtail their traveling, others said the chance to get away far outweighed any extra costs they may incur. Susan C. Fearer of Hazelton said she and her husband would be heading to Stonewall Jackson Lake State Park — no matter what. The two camp there regularly, bringing with them a 33-foot fifth wheel camper and a pontoon boat — which means at least four trips each way, driving a four-wheel drive pickup that costs about 50 bucks to fill up. "When we go to Stonewall to camp we not only have to take the camper down, we have to come back home to get the boat," she said. "Same scenario when we leave camp to come home. For us, it's nearly 100 miles one way from Hazelton to Stonewall, so we're talking 600 miles each reservation — and right now we have reservations for three trips this summer and intend to use them all." Fearer said she and her husband

band will find other ways to cut costs — besides cutting out their vacation. "We both work full-time jobs and have a small business on the side," she said. "Even with the high gas prices, we need to get away and will do so even if it costs an arm and a leg to do it. We'll just eat more hot dogs and less steak. Some things are worth it — and for us, the peace of mind we get out of getting away far offsets the higher cost." Like the Fearers, Joseph Page Adams and his wife have chosen not to forgo their vacation plans — though they have picked a destination a little closer to home. Having first decided to visit Branson, Mo., to take in a few shows — along with visiting some relatives in Illinois and the Clinton Library in Little Rock,



Ark., along the way — the Adamses changed their plans once they'd learned that most of the big stars don't sing in Branson during the summer. "We began a discussion of the Outer Banks of North Carolina," said Adams, "since it was a little closer and therefore less costly. We really don't need anything pretentious. After all, last year we had gone to England and France for our vacation. The beach began to sound restful and comfortable. Gasoline (prices) continued to rise and (it) was beginning to look like (it) was going to make all travel prohibitive." In the end, the Adamses decided to keep it closer to home — they will visit Virginia Beach and the Richmond, Va., area this summer. At about 880 miles to Branson and 410 to Virginia Beach, they've essentially cut their trip in half — instead of their vacation. Brian Schreurs has found another way around the hefty price of fuel — he's decided to leave the car at home and go across country on his Kawasaki ZZR-1200 sport/tourer motorcycle. His father, riding a Honda Shadow Aero touring cruiser cycle, will be joining him. Schreurs said he will ride up to Delaware, where he will meet up with his dad at Rehoboth Beach. The two will then take to the open road, avoiding interstates and traveling solely on the old federal system and state highways. The trip, Schreurs estimates, will cover about 8,000 miles. "Mostly we'll be on our own, camping where we can to save money," he said. "We don't have any reservations along the way, so we

can take each day as it comes. I figure my machine will use about 180 gallons of regular during the round-trip, and dad's bike (with a smaller engine) probably will do better at only 150 gallons. My bike is a gas hog at 40 mpg, thus, I pay a penalty. I'll probably pay just under \$400 for fuel at the current average; dad will do better at \$325. "The price of gas, though annoying, simply is not the most expensive component of a travel vacation. It is a factor, but not a determinant. Lodging and activities are typically the most expensive items; we're mitigating that as much as possible by camping in state and federal parklands rather than paying for motels." Bob Johnstone, chair of the anesthesiology department at WVU Hospitals, will also be leaving his car at the curb this summer (well, once he gets to Vermont). Instead of driving all over the place, Johnstone will hoof it instead — he plans to walk as much as he can (if not all) of the 250 miles of the Long Trail, which runs through the Green Mountains, from the Massachusetts to the Canadian border. Getting out of the house — and the car — and into the fresh air of the mountains will allow him to reflect on things far more important than fluctuating gas prices. "Hiking the Long Trail this summer would combine healthy exercise, new challenges and opportunities to think," he said. "I'd reflect upon many short treks on the Long Trail, with friends, my father, my wife who has died, and children. Seems like if I can do this I might end up with new goals and the energy to achieve them. "I know this sounds a little heavy for a summer vacation, but it's my current reality."

ers and with flags. Parades have been held to honor those vets who have fallen — and those who are still standing.

But in recent years, parties have taken precedence. Long weekends off work, 50-percent-off sales. These are the trappings of modern-day Memorial Day.

Of course, not everyone has forgotten the holiday's true meaning. The loved ones of those lying in the ground certainly will recall the sacrifices their family members made.

And, according to www.usmemorialday.org, since the 1950s, soldiers from the 3rd U.S. Infantry have placed small American flags at each of the more than 260,000 gravestones at Arlington National Cemetery the Thursday before Memorial Day. They then patrol 24 hours a day throughout the weekend, to make sure each flag remains standing.

In 1998, the Boy and Girl Scouts began placing candles at each of the approximately 15,300 grave sites of soldiers buried at Fredericksburg and Spotsylvania National Military Park.

Then just last year, in 2004, Washington, D.C., held its first Memorial Day Parade in more than 60 years.

Obviously no one's asking you to cancel your vacation or tear down your camper. But it can't hurt to just take a small pause — maybe at 3 p.m. tomorrow, the National Moment of Remembrance — and think about those for whom the wars weren't just on TV.

And if, at that moment, you happen to have a glass in your hand, why not just raise it up and make a toast? To freedom. And those who fought for it.

With the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs estimating a total of more than 1 million deaths in American-fought wars, we've got a lot of toasting to do.

# Goofy Degeneres unites people

As the host of her own daytime talk show, Ellen DeGeneres is as warm and goofy as she is intelligent and endearing. She asks her guests the questions that are likely running through her viewers' minds.

Indeed, on "The Ellen DeGeneres Show," the guests — an eclectic and colorful bunch — feel welcome and appreciated. For DeGeneres, who supplied the voice of Dory in the Disney/Pixar-animated hit film "Finding Nemo," it's about having a good time and bringing people together. The Louisiana native's feel-good vibe rubs off on her guests, studio audience and those watching at home.

DeGeneres' many disciples know that the stand-up-comedian-turned-author-turned-talk-show-host loves music. Whether it's rapping along to a 50 Cent jam or dancing to one of Madonna's grooves — played by the show's DJ, Tony Okungbowa — DeGeneres appears genuinely interested in music and the artists who create it.

All of which helps to explain why her syndicated show has become a magnet for recording artists. It does not hurt that the program, launched in 2003, has won several Daytime Emmy Awards and, according to Nielsen Media Research, ranks No. 7 against other syndicated talk shows. It averages 2.6 million total viewers.

In May alone, DeGeneres' musical guests have included Gwen Stefani, Neil Diamond, Mariah Carey, the Backstreet Boys and a number of "American Idol" castoffs. Oh, Jennifer Lopez and Britney Spears stopped by, too. Upcoming guests include Gretchen Wilson, Nelly, Lee Ann Womack and Il Divo.

In Carey's case, DeGeneres — in her playful quest to bring glamour back to daytime TV — had the singer perform at a high-school prom.

DeGeneres also shines the light on newcomers. Atlantic Records artist Ellie Lawson, whose debut album is due later this year, and Geffen duo Ringside have appeared.

Later this month, "The Ellen DeGeneres Show" will go dark for the



summer. But right now, the out, loud and proud DeGeneres is very much on *Billboard* and its readers.

**Q:** Music is an integral part of your TV show. Was it a conscious decision, from the start, to incorporate music and artists?

**A:** I always wanted a DJ from the beginning. And I thought the more types of music we played, the more types of viewers we'd get. Oh, I almost forgot. It was originally supposed to be a dance show, but I love to talk.

**Q:** You champion veterans and newcomers alike from Rob Thomas and Elton John to Ringside and Ciara. In booking is there an "Ellen philosophy"?

**A:** I've adopted the philosophy of Socrates: "If it sounds good in my car, it'll sound good on the show." I think he said that.

**Q:** What do you look for in an artist or group? What type of artist is a perfect fit for your TV audience?

**A:** We've had every genre ... every generation. The only thing we really haven't

had is heavy metal. We're scared our studio audience will hurt themselves banging their heads.

**Q:** Have there been any surprises — good or not so good — with regard to artists that have appeared on the show? A once-in-a-lifetime happening that you won't soon forget?

**A:** Well, I think laying on Elton John's piano while he's singing will probably never happen again. I hope it does. But really, what are the chances? Fifty-fifty at best.

**Q:** Are there any acts that you have yet to have on the show but still desperately want?

**A:** U2 and Coldplay. It just hasn't happened yet. I sent them a candygram, so they should be on anytime now.

**Q:** What is your fan mail saying about your musical guests?

**A:** They're saying, "Ellen, we love the music ... keep it up, and also can you get George Clooney to come on, even though he isn't a musician?"

# David Sedaris is in full downplay mode

Lied Center was filled with howls as he read his humorous work. His admirers remembered when they first heard or read Sedaris or how they almost

wrecked their car, laughing so hard at his radio readings.

"We think he's a genius," said Denise Dillinger, 47, who flew in from Denver for the reading. "It's just like we get him. We just got hooked."

On tour, Sedaris displays a genuine humility and likability. He poses for photographs even though he hates them, draws pictures inside books, suggests a marinette show to a couple planning a trip to Paris and digs through his huge green bag to offer an occasional fan a gift of ChapStick or breath mints. He wants to know what his supporters do for a living, how they met their spouse, whether they get along with their kids.

Sedaris has been going on tour since 1996. For the last four or five years, he's made 30-or-so stops in 30-or-so days twice annually, appearing before sellout crowds of 2,000 to

3,000 people. He's careful not to run up hotel phone bills his publisher must pay. His request when a promoter asks him about dinner is simply a ham-and-cheese sandwich and some milk. He flies coach.

Despite his success — 4 million copies of his books have been sold in the United States alone — 48-year-old Sedaris remains skeptical of his own talents and the longevity of his fame.

"One day I'll go on these tours and nobody will come," he says. "When I sign books, I'm genuinely thanking people for coming. It means the world to me, it really does. And I guess I think that because I don't want that day to come when people don't show up."

The second of six children, Sedaris grew up in upstate New York and Raleigh, N.C., and graduated from the Art Institute of Chicago. He moved to New York City in 1991 and picked up odd jobs as a housekeeper and as a Christmas elf at Macy's.

The latter experience inspired "SantaLand Diaries," which launched his career when his reading appeared on National Public Radio on Dec. 23, 1992. (Recounting the visit of ill children, including one without a nose, he writes: "Missing a nose. With these children Santa has to be careful not to ask, 'And

what would you like for Christmas?")

Since then, such compilations as "Barrel Fever," "Naked," "Me Talk Pretty One Day" and "Dress Your Family in Corduroy and Denim," which is to be released in paperback May 31, have barely kept up with reader demand.

Sedaris writes not only about painfully funny experiences, like finding himself at the center of a dinner party's clogged-toilet incident,

but also the obsessive tics that marked his childhood and a poignant account of the loss of his mother to cancer.

These short stories — the only form in which Sedaris writes because he says he only has a 10-page attention span — typically begin with an experience in the author's own life. They end up in his diary, then remain there for a while before going through what he calls the "story mill" to make them more palatable to readers.

## Health Notes

### Play it safe in the sun



Did you know that just a few serious sunburns can increase your risk of skin cancer later in life? Unprotected skin can be damaged by the sun's UV rays in as little as 15 minutes. Yet it can take up to 12 hours for skin to show the full effect of sun exposure. Any change in the color of your skin after time outside - whether sunburn or suntan - indicates damage from UV rays. UV rays, not the temperature, do the damage. Clouds do not block UV rays, they filter them, and sometimes only slightly. By following a few simple rules, you can have a safe summer in the sun.

- Apply sunscreen thoroughly, at least 30 minutes before being in the sun so it has time to be absorbed by the skin. As a rule of thumb, use an ounce to cover your entire body.
- Reapply sunscreen throughout the day and after swimming or strenuous exercise. This applies to "waterproof" and "water resistant" products as well.
- Don't forget to use sunscreen on all parts of your exposed skin, including the ears, nose, back, shoulders, the tops of your feet, and the backs of your knees and legs.
- Pick a broad spectrum sunscreen that protects against UV-A and UV-B rays and has a sun protection factor (SPF) of at least 15.

## Let the investor beware during housing boom

**THE PAST FIVE YEARS** have seen a housing boom both nationwide as well as locally. Overall, home values have risen by an average of 50 percent.

Houses in our area now sell for more than twice what they sold for only a decade ago. And the local building boom will add hundreds of units to our housing stock. What do these facts portend for the real estate investor? Will the boom times continue, or will there be a housing glut, accompanied by falling rents and long vacancy rates?

The National Real Estate Investors Association (www.nationalreia.com) recently reported that it now has 177 affiliated real estate investment clubs, up from 44 in 2002. At the same time, stock investor clubs have fallen approximately 46 percent, from 36,151 in 1999 to 19,646 in 2004. Enthusiasm for making money by buying and selling real estate has therefore obviously grown in popularity, just as the stock market has fallen on hard times.

Whether this trend means a rosy outlook or a gloomy one for the investor, only time will tell, of course. Even so, investors who proceed with caution have little to fear. The real estate market is not the stock market. Buying and selling real property is far slower than buying and selling shares of stock. And historically, real estate is one of the safest investments with the surest return. Just remember that real estate is not a get-rich-quick scheme, but a way to make solid profits over time.

## 'Natchez on the Monongahela'

### Suncrest home wins beauty award

Don't get him wrong. Ben Freedman is proud of the garden he and his wife, Florence, have installed at their Suncrest home. He doesn't deny the home deserves the Proud of Our Town award it recently won from the Morgantown Beautification Commission.

He just doesn't want to take credit for it. "I cannot tell you it's my garden," he said. "It's really been a community effort." Countless friends, neighbors, colleagues, students (before their retirement, Ben taught for many years in the WVU art department while Florence was an elementary school teacher) pitched in with ideas and, often, labor to create the truly spectacular display that lasts from early spring through the fall.

"I think of it as the experience of many, many people in our lives," he said.

Last week, irises and daisies were in their prime. They had taken over from the centerpiece of the Freedmans' plantings, the azaleas. They were a riot of reds, purples, pinks and almost-whites during the first half of May, but were now spent.

The Freedmans bought the modest, red-clapboard frame house at 377 Laurel St. in 1986, relocating from a home on Willowdale Road after growing tired of the stadium traffic and noise. Ben, a painter, also wanted to have a studio in his home. The Freedmans were able to build one onto the Laurel Street home.

It was at that point they discovered the lot was much bigger than they had previously thought. There was a big, treeless strip behind the house, about 150 feet long and 30 feet wide, where electrical transmission lines passed overhead. The land was theirs, but the power company owned a right-of-way and the Freedmans were limited in what they could do there. They couldn't dig it up or put in any structures.

"I kind of got upset," Freedman said, dismayed at the responsibility to take care of the strip. "The only thing we could do was build a garden."

The lot sloped sharply downward from the house at the back. "It was the dickens to garden," Freed-

man recalled, leading them to build a terrace. It was the first of several engineering projects the Freedmans would undertake.

Chief among them is a multi-tiered stone patio, built primarily by a young acquaintance. "In the warm weather, if we ever have any this year, we'll sit out there and enjoy everything," he said on one of last week's raw, drizzly days.

Bordering the patio is a cascading fountain with five levels. A pool at the bottom is home to several goldfish, who can live there year-round. On the coldest winter days the pool's surface may ice over, but the moving water never freezes completely.

Freedman doesn't pretend to be an expert on horticulture. The West Virginia Botanic Garden will include the Freedmans' home on its annual "open gardens" tour next month, and Freedman was looking forward to having someone from the group act as tour guide at the event. "I can't remember the names (of the plants)

and I don't want to be asked. I just put them in the ground," he joked.

But he does know what he likes, and more than anything that's azaleas. "I'm a native of New Orleans, and I have a thing about azaleas. My hope and plan was to make it a bit of Natchez on the Monongahela," he said with a grin. The town of Natchez, La., is known for its azaleas.

Spectacular though the azaleas are in season, the Freedmans have another passion for collecting that may be more impressive.

Their living and dining rooms are crammed with more than 150 genuine African ceremonial masks and carved figures. Most show the patina of age and wear that sets them apart from tourist reproductions.

It may be the most extensive collection of African tribal art in West Virginia, yet the Freedmans have never been to Africa. They began collecting the masks and other objects after one of Florence's relatives, a Peace Corps volunteer in Liberia, brought some

back as souvenirs. The Freedmans have gone as far as France to buy pieces at auction, with most of their collection coming from trusted dealers and other connections.

Recently the Freedmans began thinking about donating the collection to a university. After checking around, they struck a tentative deal with Howard University in Washington, D.C., which has a substantial African studies department. (Freedman said WVU, which doesn't have an African studies program, did not show much interest.) "This fall, if we get the OK from Howard, they will come pack up about half the collection," he said. The university will take most of the remainder later on.

That won't be the end of the Laurel Street collection, though. The couple will continue to buy pieces, and will keep a few treasured items they can't bear to part with.

The Proud of Our Town award given to the Freedmans is a regular

project of the Morgantown Beautification Commission. It's given about every three months to some commercial or residential property that's particularly attractive. Assistant City Manager Jeff Mikorski said it was a way for Morgantown to say "thank you for beautifying the city by beautifying your personal property."

A selection committee from the Beautification Commission reviews nominations and visits each site before choosing a winner, who receives a certificate and publicity on the city's Web site and cable channel 15. In addition to esthetic values, environmental impacts and sustainability are criteria in the selection, Mikorski said.

Mikorski said the nomination process had recently been simplified. Nomination forms are available on the city's Web page, www.morgantown.com/proud-of-our-town-form.htm, or from the city manager's office at City Hall.

# Check the Energy Star rating before buying a refrigerator

**DEAR JIM:** I need to replace my old refrigerator/freezer with a more modern and efficient one. I have plenty of room in my kitchen, but I am not sure what configuration to get. Which ones are most convenient and efficient?

— Penny L.

Dear Penny: Any new refrigerator/freezer you purchase will use less than half as much electricity as your old one, but some designs are inherently better than others.

To get an Energy Star rating (www.energystar.gov), new refrigerators must now use 15 percent (it used to be 10 percent) less electricity than the federal energy efficiency standards.

Your budget will be the primary factor in determining what design of refrigerator you select. For a typical size model, prices can range from about \$500 for a top-freezer model to more than

\$5,000 for a built-in model with all the bells and whistles. The difference in annual electricity usage is about \$20.

A top-freezer model is the most popular and efficient configuration. The primary advantage is easy access to the freezer and the highest percentage of usable interior space. These use a single compressor for lower cost and the cold freezer air naturally drops to keep the refrigerator portion cool.

Other configurations, such as a side-by-side, require more exterior space for the same interior space. To make things worse, the usable interior space may be con-

siderably less than the advertised amount. Much space may be used for hardware, shelf brackets and unusable corners.

Side-by-side models are convenient to use and the narrower doors require less space when opened. If you do not often use

frozen items, a bottom-freezer model raises the refrigerator portion higher for easier access. Some new designs use a side-by-side refrigerator with narrow doors above the freezer compartment.

Built-in models are the most attractive, but also the most expensive. They are tall to match the cabinet height and to provide adequate capacity since they are more shallow to match the cabinet depth. The newest refrigerator designs are freestanding "cabinet-depth" models to simulate the built-in appearance at about half the cost.

To maintain the proper refrigerator (37 degrees) and freezer (0 degrees) temperatures, a two-compressor model is best. It has two totally independent cooling systems for precise temperature control in each compartment. In a one-compressor model, the compartments are connected.

Digital temperature controls and readouts are more convenient than just turning a knob and waiting to see if the orange juice freezes.

New glass door models are also convenient and allow you to graze without having to hold the door open and waste electricity. Through-the-door water and ice dispensers are a plus, but they are a frequent cause of service calls.

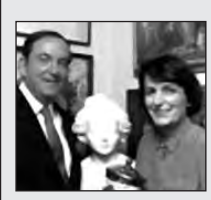

# Rustic furniture made from roots, old grapevines is often in great demand

**CREATIVE CRAFTSMEN** seem attracted to the possibilities of twisting, bending or assembling natural materials into a chair. Bamboo and wicker have been used for formal and folk-art furniture since the 1800s.

Cowhorn chairs from the late 1890s went well with ornate, more traditional wooden pieces in the Victorian style. Western ranch houses featured chairs made of tangled moose horns. The early-20th-century Adirondack lodges had furnishings made from logs, branches that still had bark or even mosaiclike decorations made of small twigs. Huge tree stumps were carved into chairs in Wisconsin. But the strangest 20th-century rustic furniture seen recently is made from roots or large, old grapevines assembled into recognizable chairs and tables. A set made of vines, consisting of a sofa, chair and table, sold recently for almost \$800.

**Q:** For years, my family has passed along brass candlesticks that are engraved on the base with the phrase "The King of Diamonds." The middle of the candlestick column is a ball with diamond shapes going around the column. The candlesticks are 12 1/2 inches tall. Can you tell

me anything about them?

A: Your candlesticks were manufactured in England as souvenirs of Queen Victoria's diamond jubilee in 1897. The country was celebrating the queen's 60 years on the throne. The candlesticks were made in three sizes: Ace, 14 inches tall; your King, 12 1/2 inches; and Queen, 11 1/2 inches. Sometime after Queen Victoria died in 1901, two other "diamond" sets were made, the Prince, 11 3/4 inches; and Princess, 10 3/4 inches. A pair of Kings sells in this country for \$500 or more.

**Q:** I have a miniature stoneware jug with a brown glazed top and an unglazed bottom. A large label stenciled on the bottom reads: "Motto Jug, If You Try Me Once You Will Try Me Again, Detrick Distilling Co., Dayton, O." Can you tell me anything about this jug?

A: The Detrick Distilling Co. offered miniature "motto jugs" like

yours as promotional items around the turn of the 20th century. Customers who ordered a gallon of any of Detrick's three brands of whiskey could choose one of 12 motto jugs as a souvenir. The purchase of two gallons earned three motto jugs, and the purchase of three gallons earned four mugs. They were advertised

as "very acceptable ornaments for your library, den, or dining room." The jugs were not empty, either—they were filled with whiskey. It appears that Detrick gave away two different styles of jugs. Some mottos and styles are easier to find than others. In general, a Detrick advertising jug sells for \$85 to \$100.

**Tip:** Don't soak old ceramic pieces in water for a long time. Old repairs might be loosened.

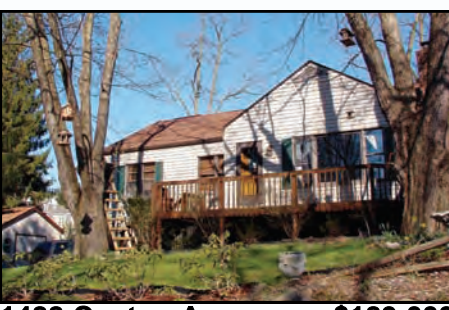

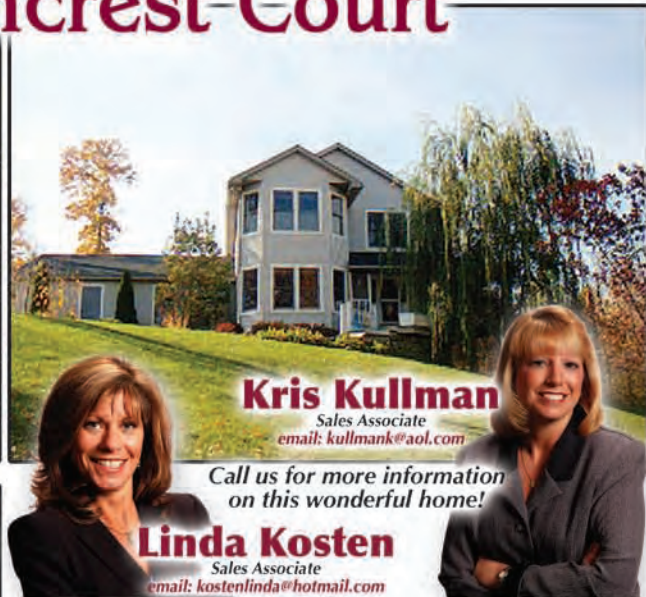

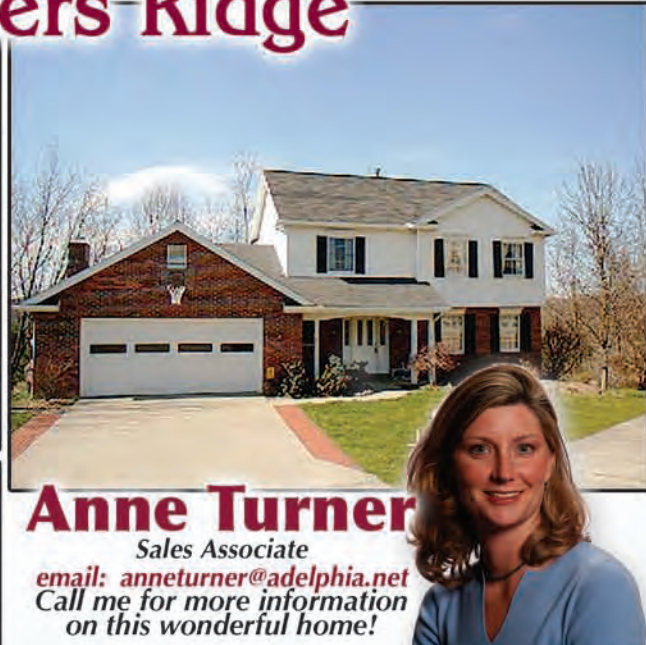

## Web reference sites helps sort work/life words

**THE STATED GOAL** of Work & Family Connection, founded in 1984, has been "to help employers create an effective workforce of human beings, people with important personal responsibilities."

The work/life consulting and training firm, based in Minnetonka, Minn., has long been known for its innovative approach to spreading the word about the advantages of having a life for employees and the companies they work for. Now the organization has a new — and free — service to support its philosophy:

It has created an Internet reference service, the Work-Life Bookstore. The virtual bookstore includes more than 200 titles pertaining to work/life issues, arranged by topic. (The bookstore can be accessed at [www.workfamily.com/open/work-life-bookstore.asp](http://www.workfamily.com/open/work-life-bookstore.asp).)

According to Rachel Hastings, vice president, the online clearinghouse was created "because we're asked so often to recommend useful reading. We wanted to cut through the myriad of titles out there and classify them for our readers."

Hastings explains that the online bookstore "is partnered with Amazon.com., so that is where you ultimately end up making a purchase."

She adds that her organization makes "a teeny bit of money" from forwarding traffic to Amazon—but only if a book actually is purchased. "The benefit to the reader is that we've already done the search ... and have filtered books that are up to date and relevant on a number of work/life-related categories."

The categories are to the point for both employers and employees: work/life strategies for human resource professionals; flexible work arrangements; supportive culture; retention; families and children, diversity, caregiving; health and wellness; stress; personal development and training; and work/life balance.

Among the titles screened by the group are "Reinventing Work," by Barbara E. Miller; "Work/Life Effectiveness," by Karol Rose; "Work/Family: Allies or Enemies?" by Stewart Friedman and Jeffrey Greenhaus; "Beyond Work/Family Balance," by Rhona Rapoport and others; and "Contented Cows Give Better Milk," by Bill Catlette and Richard Hadden.

The plethora of literature about having a life and a job is indicative of the increasing interest in work/life balance and of the growth of work/life as an area of work and study. Here are excerpts from books on the subject that have crossed my desk:

From "Be Happy at Work: 100 Women Who Love Their Jobs, and Why," by Joanne Gordon (Ballantine Books, \$24.95): "Women deserve to feel good about how they earn a living—not just that they can earn a living. Expecting to garner joy—not merely wages—from her job should become as entrenched in a woman's psyche as expecting fair pay, health-care benefits or a family-friendly schedule."

From "Joy at Work: A Revolutionary Approach to Fun On the Job," by Dennis W. Bakke (PVG, \$24.95): "Why do so many people work so hard so they can escape to Disneyland? ... Why do many workers spend years dreaming about and planning for retirement? The reason is simple and dispiriting: We have made the workplace a frustrating and joyless place where people do what they're told. ... As a result, they naturally gravitate to pursuits in which they can exercise a measure of control over their lives."

# Job injury leads to invention

## Man hopes cart will make work sites a safer place

Three years ago Carl Croscio threw out his back while loading tools on a construction site. The former construction worker went through a lengthy rehabilitation and is now self-employed recycling computers.

Croscio's ordeal wasn't entirely a loss, however.

It spurred him on to build a new kind of construction cart he invented to carry heavy tools on work sites. Last month, Croscio received a patent for the "Croscio Services Cart," which he plans to sell next month at a construction trade show in Pennsylvania.

"I just said, 'There's got to be a better way of doing this,'" Croscio said of his invention. "It's a quicker way of getting the tools out there. It's an easy way of keeping inventory. It makes life easier."

Croscio's cart is designed with a metal frame base with two curved arms that connect at each of the corners. Stretched between the arms are two metal rods to hang tools like chain hoists and come-alongs, both of which have metal hooks on both ends.

Croscio estimates that about 20 of the heavy hoists can hang from his cart, and can be wheeled around a construction site. The entire cart can then be loaded onto a tractor-trailer for hauling to the next job.

The cart can also be hitched onto a truck and driven from one place to another, Croscio said. Several carts can be linked together in order to pull them to a work area.

Croscio said he got the idea for the cart after working for 23 years on various jobs around the country. Croscio mostly worked as a boilermaker on power plants and oil refineries. He even did a stint working in Jordan in the Middle East.

Croscio's path to selling his cart took him to InventHelp, a Pittsburgh-based company that assists inventors with registering and marketing their products. InventHelp Communications Manager Nicole Hait said Croscio is further along than many inventors that come to the company because he already has a working prototype.

InventHelp gives advice while the inventor is developing a product by linking them with companies in the field, Hait said. The company also submits the products to companies for licensing and hosts a trade show to showcase new ideas.

"We're really here to try to help the inventor along the way," Hait said.

Croscio's cart could be useful for local contractors.

Cory Kourtsis, project manager for Commercial Builders Inc. in Morgantown, said that job sites can be a messy place for tools.

Typically on his construction jobs, workers pick up tools like chain hoists from long lockers, and carry individual tools to their workspace. At the end of the day they pile them back in, which can end up getting chains tangled.

Kourtsis said he wasn't familiar with Croscio's cart, but gave some suggestions for making it useful for construction jobs.

He said that for the cart to work on a job site it would need to be maneuverable on uneven surfaces, like gravel or dirt. He said if it were able to carry heavier tools, like compound miter saws, it would take the strain out of moving tools around.

He also thought it would be important to make the cart secure so that tools don't get stolen.

He said theft is a major problem on construction sites, and companies are constantly battling against lost tools.

"If you're building a new building, and you don't have any way to lock it up, you don't want this cart that people can get to," Kourtsis said. "Make sure you're able to lock that thing down."

Croscio said he is continually improving the cart design. One of the new features he's adding is a lockable plate to deter theft. The plate might also have a vice on one end to serve as a workbench.

He's also working on a way to store oxygen tanks in the same way as tools.

Croscio said working on the cart has been fun and he hopes to eventually license the cart to a large manufacturing company that will mass-produce it. Though his injury could have sidetracked his plans, he decided that he would continue with the invention and hopefully give workers a better way to haul tools.

"When you think of something you want to do, you go ahead and do it," Croscio said. "You have to be positive about it. I just like to do that. I like to be creative."

# Summer job market for young workers looks bleak

SEATTLE — If the job market is improving again, why can't Barbara Sims get a job at McDonald's?

Other young workers may be wondering the same thing. Despite two years of job gains across the nation, the dramatic drop in youth employment shows no signs of reversing.

Only 36.7 percent of U.S. teenagers will find work this summer, according to the latest forecast from Northeastern University's Center for Labor Market Studies.

That estimate may be optimistic, however. In the past three years actual employment numbers fell below economists' predictions. If this summer follows that pattern, it could be the worst teen job market on record.

"Normally, 20 months into the jobs recovery teenagers would

not only gain jobs, but they would begin to gain disproportionately," said Andrew Sum, an economist and author of the study released this month. "This time around they've got zero."

In Washington state, 40 percent of teens held jobs in 2004, compared with 56 percent in 2000. The numbers are better for 20- to 24-year-olds, but still below typical youth employment levels, despite Washington gaining 116,000 new jobs over the past two years.

"The lower-wage, entry-level jobs are now being taken by adults," says Caroline Maillard, who heads youth programs for the Workforce Development Council of Seattle-King County. "And when you talk about teens and young adults who don't have a lot of education under their belts, the trends get more severe."

Sims, a 20-year-old former fos-

ter child whose frequent moves cost her a high-school diploma, is aiming for retail jobs, but she's had no success.

"I've applied everywhere. Starbucks, the Bon, McDonald's, Safeway. They're like, we'll call and let you know."

Even with the GED she plans to get soon, she worries about the competition.

"If you have high-school diploma or a GED, they're going to pick the person with the high-school diploma."

Stung by shrinking retirement benefits and lured by retailers and other low-wage employers, older workers are taking a chunk out of the teen job market.

Just as teenage employment has dropped, the number of over-55 workers in the state has climbed, from 149,500 in 2001 to 181,194 in 2004, in part because baby boomers have hit their 50s.

Other competition for low-wage jobs is coming from across the borders. The United States gained 3 million immigrant workers over the past five years, more than half of them under 30.

In this state they account for roughly 73 percent of the employment growth between 2000 and 2004, according to the labor center's analysis.

"A lot are young, a lot don't have a diploma," Sum said, "and they'll compete for the same jobs young Americans do."

There is one encouraging spot on the summer-job landscape: Hiring is finally picking up for college students and grads.

Employers plan to increase their college hiring 13 percent over last year, according to the National Association of Colleges and Employers.

"It's getting a little bit richer," said Susan Terry, who manages

University of Washington's career center. "Not a lot — I don't want to exaggerate."

Graduates who majored in computer engineering or accounting, are more likely to find work than they were three years ago. Others, however, may still find it hard to land a career job.

Brendan Malec recently graduated from DePaul University with a degree in English.

"I'd heard jokes like, 'You're going to end up flipping burgers.' But I didn't know they were kind of true," he said.

The 24-year-old, who relocated from Chicago, had hoped to land a \$30,000-a-year job with a non-profit where he could use his writing skills.

Two months into his search, he's ratcheted down his expectations.

"Now I'm just trying to get any job that I can make money with."

## Macs' glitches fewer, but no less painful

**Q: I thank the Good Lord and Steve Jobs that I use a Mac each time I see one of your solutions to a Windows problem with advice like "type in awdsvf.exe and use the one called /c that converts files and then type awdsvf.exe/c filename.awd ..."** My days are a great deal easier than those of the baffled Windows users who fill up your column each week. I also enjoy your occasional jabs at Microsoft.

**A:** Does one spell schadenfreude with a capital "s" or a small one, Mr. J?

I thought of your note and schadenfreude while attempting to get my Apple AirPort Extreme card to communicate with my wireless network after installing Apple's new OS X 10.4. I clicked on the Apple menu and went to System Preferences and then Show All and finally saw the Network icon.

There I was told to input the proper DNS and IP and Subnet Mask. When that was fixed I found that the icons for all of my iMovie files no longer looked like iMovie icons. They work but I couldn't find a fix, so I worry that the lack of proper icons means the files also are corrupted somehow.

The point is that while nobody is going to quarrel with the claim that Macs have fewer problems than Windows computers, Macs too become terribly complicated when something goes wrong. Computers of all flavors have become so complex that we poor humans can only hope to cope rather than master any of them.

If Mac OS X 10.4 owners don't know the word schadenfreude they can always hit F12 to call up the Dashboard and then open the dictionary widget. That is, of course, if they have figured out how to find widgets for the Dashboard in Mac OS X 10.4.

The widgets menu opens by clicking a small plus sign hidden in the lower right-hand corner of the opening Dashboard display that comes up when F12 is pushed. Or is that Apple + F12? Maybe it's Option + F12.

Once that is figured out, the neat built-in dictionary will tell you that schadenfreude is the practice of taking delight at the misfortune of others.

**Q: After I reinstalled Windows XP Home, the cursor jumps to the position of the mouse pointer. How do I turn off this feature? It makes typing very time-consuming. I have to make sure the mouse pointer is always in front of what I am typing.**

**A:** There are a number of optional features for mice built into Windows that all users should know about, including this one, Ms. L.

Click on the Start button and go to the Control Panel icon. Click it open and then click on the icon for Mouse in the folder this opens.

There you will get a tabbed menu with a large number of settings to tweak the performance of one's pointer rodent — or mouse. Open the Pointer Options tab and you will find a click box that will warm your heart: "Hide cursor while typing," it says. One click and your problem is over.

Perhaps equally as useful is an option that will display a large circle at the cursor's location in case one loses track of it, which gets to be ever more of a problem as monitor screens get larger and software becomes more complex. With this enabled you can simply tap the Control key to make the circle appear.

A final option that I prefer (and others detest) will create a trail of ghost images of the pointer arrow as it sweeps across the screen. This is a godsend when lighting conditions mess up screen visibility.

# Pittsburgh restaurant service serving up competition

PITTSBURGH — Bikki Kochhar says he didn't set out to start a war.

But a battle is set to begin in the city's East End later this month, and this one takes the cake — literally. And delivers it to your door.

Kochhar and nephew Didar Singh — both restaurateurs with a half dozen restaurants between them — are set to launch Meals Delivered, a multi-restaurant delivery service that will focus on the city's East End, beginning May 25.

Sound familiar? That's because the already established Wheel Deliver has been delivering restaurant food to hungry Pittsburghers for nearly 16 years.

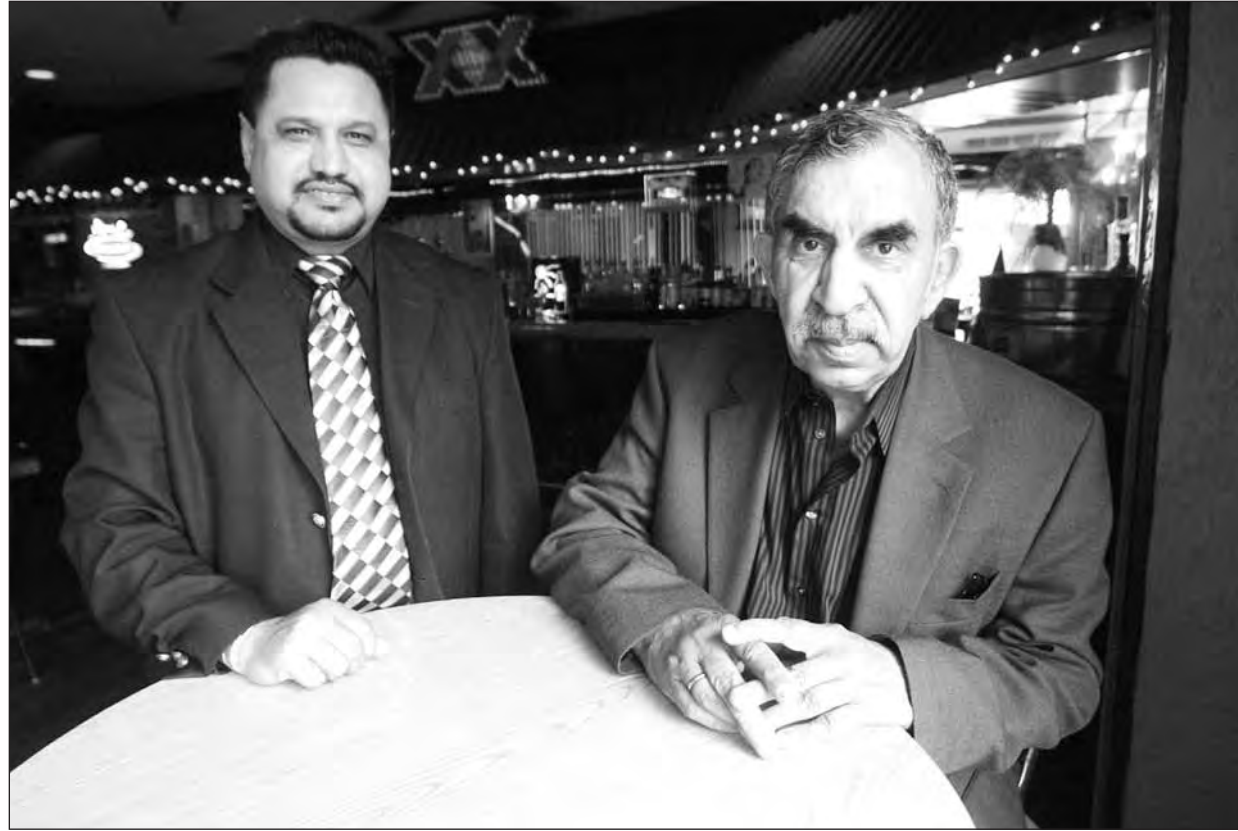
"We had problems (with Wheel Deliver)," Kochhar said. "That's why we decided to open Meals Delivered. We are in the restaurant business, and we know how the restaurant side operates."

It wasn't always this way. Kochhar — who has 22 years' experience in the local restaurant industry — was one of the first restaurant owners to join the fledgling delivery service owned by Tom Baron and Mike Hanley in 1989.

Baron has since moved on to head the Big Burrito Group, while restaurateur Mike Hanley operates Fuel and Fuddle, Uncle Sam's Subs and Joe Mama's.

Kochhar said Wheel Deliver brought in thousands of dollars a month to his restaurants, but drivers who were "not gracious" and problems with the deliveries left him unhappy with the service.

Singh approached him with the idea to start a new delivery business. Kochhar agreed,

and began signing up restaurants.

Wheel Deliver responded by dropping Cozumel, a Kochhar restaurant, from its service. India Garden and La Fiesta, owned by Singh and Kochhar, respectively, remain on the list — for now.

Wheel Deliver owner Steve Makoroff, who bought the business from Hanley and Baron 11 years ago, is diplomatic about Kochhar's new venture.

"Competition is good for everybody," Makoroff said, adding that he has seen other delivery services come and go in the region.

Wheel Deliver's premise is simple. Customers pick items from different menus and pay a 15 percent delivery fee based on the total order. Wheel Deliver keeps the money from

customers and issues biweekly checks to the restaurants for the food, minus 25 percent — Wheel Deliver's fee for the restaurant.

Makoroff said some restaurants balk at the 25 percent charge, but must realize that it's business they might not get otherwise.

"They're ordering out anyway. They're not coming to the restaurant," he said. "If they don't order with me, they'll order Pizza Hut or Chinese, so they might as well take the business," Makoroff said.

Kochhar said Meals Delivered plans to operate similarly, but charge a flat delivery fee and charge restaurants 17 percent of the bill.

Vic Bovalino, director of operations for Fuel and Fuddle, Uncle Sam's and Joe

Mama's, said outsourcing delivery has been a boon to those restaurants.

For Fuel and Fuddle, for instance, Wheel Deliver adds another 5 to 10 percent to its overall sales, he said.

Wheel Deliver has sparked a loyal following, some who order as frequently as four or five nights a week, Makoroff said.

Kim Daboo said she and her husband are loyal users of Wheel Deliver. The Squirrel Hill couple use the service about once a week.

"My husband said when we were looking for a house that he didn't want to look outside the Wheel Deliver area," said Daboo, 39. "He wasn't kidding."

"We like not having to go out, not having to find parking. Now that we have a baby,

it's really nice to not have to go out," she said.

Kochhar said he doesn't see Meals Delivered as competition with Wheel Deliver, although he acknowledged that Makoroff might disagree.

Kochhar's restaurants — Cozumel, La Fiesta and Simply French — will be part of Meals Delivered, along with Singh's India Garden and Spice Cafe. Kochhar said he's targeting restaurants not currently on Wheel Deliver's list, including what he called "upscale" restaurants.

The list includes Mallorca, Cafe Allegro on the South Side and Union Grill in Oakland.

Wheel Deliver includes some 34 different restaurants, including Mad Mex, Poli and Lu Lu's Noodles.

"Competition would be the same restaurants," Kochhar said. "The restaurants are different. It benefits the people who have more of a selection now."

Zyng Asian Grill in Squirrel Hill intends to use both services, said co-owner Raji Sankhar. The restaurant opened in October and has worked with Wheel Deliver since March.

"I'm most excited about more options being available to the customers — better services, better prices," Sankhar said of the dueling delivery services. "Everyone takes their game to the next level when there's healthy competition."

## States work to create national employee 'soft skill' credentials

### Many jobseekers cannot function in the workplace

NEW YORK — As lawmakers and educators struggle to improve high schools in the United States, businesses and labor unions say they are alarmed that even job seekers with a diploma can't function in the workplace.

It's a problem, they say, that threatens to cripple American productivity at home and competition abroad.

Discouraged by the work habits of many new employees, a handful of states, led by New York, are working to create a nationally recognized "work readiness" credential. Proponents say the credential would certify that a prospective employee understands the importance of "soft skills" such as punctuality, a willingness to accept supervision and an ability to work in a group.

"You'd think people would know to call in sick when they're not coming to work, but that's not always the case," said Michael Kauffman, an executive at Anoplate Corp., a 175-person metal manufacturer in Syracuse, N.Y. "We're having many more problems than in the past getting people who understand what it means to work in an office or a factory."

At a state job training and education center in New York City, the state's Workforce Investment Board recently began testing a "work readiness" exam developed by SRI International, a research group based in California.

Tests will also be held in Florida, New Jersey, Washington and Rhode Island, as well as the District of Columbia, which all contributed funds to develop the exam.

Job seekers enrolled at the Brooklyn Educational Opportunity Center will be given a two- to three-hour exam that will check for reading and math skills in addition to speaking and listening habits. They will also be given "situational judgment" questions to gauge probable work performance.

Organizers say the credential should be ready by spring 2006 and

would be administered by the U.S. Chamber of Commerce in conjunction with local chapters and state agencies. Whether it would be required for high school students, said the Chamber's Sondra Stein, would be up to individual states.

Aaron Harewood, 20, entered the Brooklyn center last year after graduating from George Wingate High School, one of seven Brooklyn high schools scheduled to close in June 2006 after the state Department of Education classified it as "low performing."

Harewood, who has never had a job and is studying to receive a certificate at the center in computer technology, said a work readiness credential would probably help him find employment.

"In high school, they only focused on the work you normally do in college — not on work skills," he said. "You realize afterward that it would have been nice if you'd ever been aware of all this so when you face the real world you wouldn't be so unprepared."

The test, its proponents say, would also be used to evaluate job-training programs like the Brooklyn center that receive federal and state funding.

In Illinois, the Chicago Public Schools' Office of Education 'To Careers has campaigned for the state to join the fledgling national effort.

Jill Wine-Banks, the program's director and a former Maytag Corp. and Motorola Inc. executive, joined

the city's school system two years ago with a mandate to incorporate "work readiness" skills into the high school curriculum.

Since September, she said 60 Chicago high schools with about 55,000 students have begun to use short videos and workshops in classes as a means to discuss how to negotiate with a co-worker, speak to a client or carefully follow directions.

"Unions and business leaders told us we were doing a good job training students in technical areas but that it was these 'soft skills' that we take for granted that they were missing," Wine-Banks said.

In November, at Wine-Banks' invitation, the director of a federal program called Equipped for the Future, which has spearheaded a "work readiness" credential, met with members of the Chicagoland Chamber of Commerce and the Chicago Workforce Board to gather statewide support for the certificate.

Illinois has yet to decide whether to endorse the credential.

Julio Rodriguez of the Bureau of Workforce Development at the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity, said Illinois already teaches job readiness through its One-Stop Career Centers, local offices that coordinate federal and state employment services.

"Behavioral skills are hard to quantify," he said. "We're all kind

of watching "the pilot tests" to see what develops."

In March, the U.S. Chamber of Commerce took over responsibility for Equipped for the Future, hiring the Department of Labor official who had previously administered it.

With the chamber as the project's sponsor, Sherryl Weems, executive director of the Educational Opportunity Center at the University of Buffalo, said she is optimistic that more states will endorse the credential.

"We didn't want this to be a labor or education thing but rather to be an employer thing," she said. "So, it made sense for the chamber to act as an umbrella."

Skeptics of a work readiness credential warn that it could distract students and educators away from "hard skills."

In Virginia, Gov. Mark Warner has taken a slightly different approach to the problem. Warner helped create a Career Readiness Certificate, which tests for math, applied math and reading for information but leaves out soft skills.

Three states in addition to Virginia use the certificate, which is administered by WorkKeys, a program of ACT Inc., the Iowa City, Iowa-based research group.

Barbara Bolin, Warner's special adviser on workforce development, said she is skeptical of the chamber's project. She said soft skills would be "extraordinarily difficult to assess."

Others caution against integrating new programs into high school curricula.

"Schools should be focused on getting kids to read, and these other things like understanding authority and showing up on time will take care of themselves," said Jay Greene, a senior fellow at the Manhattan Institute for Policy Research, a New York City think tank.

Phyllis Eisen of the Washington-based National Association of Manufacturers, counters that while schools should always focus first on hard skills, those alone are no guarantee that younger workers can move into high-tech factory jobs.

She pointed to a 2001 National Association of Manufacturers survey of its members, later dubbed the "Skills Gap," as support for a work readiness credential.

Employers surveyed in the study reported that while 32 percent of job applicants possessed inadequate reading and writing skills, 69 percent lacked basic employability skills such as reading with understanding, speaking clearly, actively listening and resolving conflict.

"It's not an either-or proposition," Eisen said, referring to hard and soft skills. "For generations, the historic advantage of the U.S. economy was its skilled workforce, and right now, that's slipping away."

While the AFL-CIO and National Association of Manufacturers have clashed over wage issues and foreign trade, Paul Cole, secretary-treasurer of the New York State AFL-CIO said the two groups agree that a more efficient and higher-skilled workforce can ensure that well-paying jobs are not exported.

"If we infuse education and job-training with an emphasis on 'employability skills,' then we develop workers who not only can get jobs, they can keep them as well," he said.

That's a point that resonates with Ana Rosado, 20, who dropped out in 9th grade and now studies at the Brooklyn Educational Opportunity Center.

"If you're not punctual or (don't) communicate well, you're not going to stay employed," she said. "I'd like to work a while, and afterward I would like to go to college."

# Prospective direct salespeople can find opportunities in almost any area

Job hunters interested in direct sales need look no further than a hobby or favorite interest to find something to sell.

Today, opportunities in direct selling have cropped up for a wide range of products and services.

"There are all kinds of products that are being marketed via direct sales," said Amy Robinson, spokesman for the Direct Selling Association in Washington.

"That's one of the major trends in the business right now."

Once dominated by "lotions and potions" — cosmetics and nutrition products — the direct sales business now includes product lines ranging from scrapbook supplies (Creative Memories), cooking products (Pampered Chef), in-home photo portraits (Cooksey

Keepsakes) and even golf supplies.

Expanding the direct sales spectrum, established businesses in other retail channels are adding product lines sold only through direct sales.

Southern Living magazine now offers Southern Living at Home — home accessories sold through home parties. Binney & Smith, manufacturer of Crayola crayons, added its Big Yellow Box business, a direct-marketed line of activity kits for families.

Mail-order giant Lillian Vernon has a direct selling arm, as has the Body Shop, a retailer of bath and body products.

"Direct sales represents about 1 percent of all sales in the U.S.," Robinson said. "That's a small percentage, but it's still a very large market, and many large companies want to tap into that."

All this means that prospective direct salespeople can find opportunities in almost any area of interest.

When a job hunter represents products for a hobby or area of interest, "that's an excellent scenario," Robinson said. "You'll know the product, and you'll know people who are interested in purchasing the product."

Regardless of the product line, any prospective sales representative should carefully

research business opportunities. Promises of easy money are usually too good to be true.

Robinson of the Direct Selling Association advises job seekers to be wary of firms that require a large upfront investment.

"If you need to invest \$150, you should get something reasonable in return, whether it's samples, catalogs or training materials," she said.

"If you have to pay \$4,000 just for the right to recruit other salespeople, that's a huge red flag."

Also, make sure there's an actual product that's being sold to the ultimate consumer of that product.

"You should be compensated primarily on what you sell or what your recruits sell," she said. If compensation is based only on how many people you bring into the business, that's another red flag.

Ask about the company's buyback policy for unused merchandise.

The association requires its members to repurchase at least 90 percent of unused inventory.

Visit the association's Web site, [www.dsa.org](http://www.dsa.org), for more information on choosing a reputable firm.

Finally, be realistic about the earning potential in direct sales — and the work required.

The median income in direct sales is about \$2,500 a year.

"Most people in direct sales only work a few hours a week, with a goal of making a couple of hundred dollars a month, so that's not surprising," Robinson said.

Those who work full time average about \$44,000 a year.

"Direct sales can be a great opportunity, but you need to do your homework and you need to trust your gut," she said.

# Farmers: High cost of fuel is affecting the industry

## Some say prices could put them out of business

FRESNO, Calif. (AP) — The farmers who grow many of the fresh fruit and vegetables for the nation's dinner tables say the rising cost of oil is making this one of their toughest planting seasons yet.

And some say the cost just might shove them out of business.

Drivers nationwide have had to pay more as political volatility and increased demand worldwide push up gas prices, said Ron Planting, an economist with the American Petroleum Institute. A barrel of crude oil sells for as much as \$55, up from \$35 this time last year.

But farmers are caught in a "three-way whammy," said Keith Nilmeier, who just finished harvesting his 185 acres of oranges outside Fresno. He cites the costs of the diesel that runs farming equipment, the fertilizer made by combining nitrogen with the hydrogen in natural gas, and the transportation of crops to the local supermarket.

"We're the bottom link on this whole chain, and we have no one to pass our costs on to," Nilmeier said. "We just have to take it and try to keep going."

California has led the nation in agricultural production since World War II. The state's vast Central Valley, more than twice the size of Massachusetts, grows most of the world's almonds, and most U.S.-grown nectarines, walnuts and raisins.

But farmers have watched as the price of fuel in the United States has more than doubled, from 96 cents a gallon in April 2002 to \$1.97 in April 2005. In California alone, farmers use more than 1.5 million gallons of diesel a day at the peak of harvest.

Farmers across the country will

spend about 10 percent more this year, or about \$3 billion, on costs including fuel and fertilizer, even as the price consumers pay for produce remains relatively stable, said Terry Francl, senior economist with the American Farm Bureau Federation, a Washington-based group representing farm interests.

"Farmers are price takers, not

price makers," he said. "This means they've just had their income reduced by \$3 billion."

The pain of higher fuel prices is being felt throughout the food industry.

Many of the truckers who distribute produce are charging higher prices or getting out of the business, making it harder for farmers

to get their crops to wholesalers. Distributors providing fuel directly to small farmers are finding it hard to buy fuel and sell it at a profit in such a volatile market.

Fertilizer manufacturers are also facing much higher domestic natural gas prices, driving the prices they charge higher. The fertilizer's basic component, anhydrous ammonia,

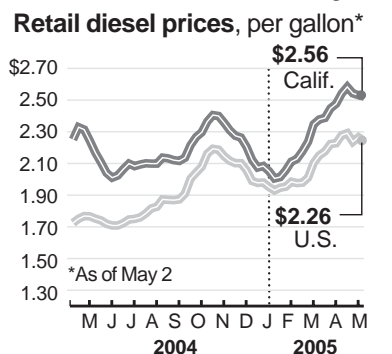
is made by combining natural gas and air at high temperature and pressure. The chemical sells for about \$416 a ton — up from \$250 a ton three years ago.

"Fertilizer prices went crazy," said Craig Ito, who grows fruit in Fresno, the county with the country's highest farming grosses.

Produce truckers are also charg-

ing more. Nilmeier, who also owns a small fleet of diesel trucks and does harvesting and hauling for other farmers, is charging a 24 percent fuel service surcharge, "and that's just to keep me at parity," he said.

But diesel prices are climbing so high that many farmers are hard-pressed to find truckers willing to carry their produce, even at a higher price. Truckers in California, which has the highest fuel prices in the country, pay about \$2.56 a gallon for diesel. The national average is about \$2.26.

"We've always had truck shortages in June. Now it's a season-long thing," said peach farmer Cliff Sadoian.

Farmers say they are doing what they can to reduce their costs — cutting down on tractor use, using less fertilizer and stopping diesel thieves who have stolen 12,971 gallons of fuel from California farms this year, according to state law enforcement.

"Without us ... there's nothing to pick, to haul, to process, to sell. There's nothing to eat," Nilmeier said. "If we don't make it, no one does."

# Workers' unhealthy habits could cost them; companies look to save on insurance

DETROIT — Smoke, eat, sit on the sofa. You'll probably keep your job, but you're likely to pay more for your health insurance.

With health insurance costs rising an average of 12 percent last year and 8 percent this year, employers across the country are struggling for some way to continue offering medical coverage without going broke.

That has companies taking a long, hard look at some of their most costly workers — those who smoke, overeat and don't exercise.

Most businesses have rejected a Michigan company's controversial solution to simply fire all of its smokers early this year. But the idea of requiring employees to change their unhealthy habits — or pay more for their insurance — is gaining favor.

At some companies, such as Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Co. and Navistar International Corp., smokers pay more for health and life insurance. At others, workers who participate in healthy-living programs get discounts.

At Jackson, Mich.-based manufacturer Orbitform, for example, workers can have their health insurance premiums cut in half if they take a health-risk appraisal and agree to meet with a health coach

twice a year on company time to work on monitoring and improving their health.

"They can choose not to take" the appraisal, "but then they pay 100 percent of their health care benefit," Orbitform President Mike Shirkey said. "There's no one telling you you have to do this. ... We have 100 percent participation."

Helen Darling, president of the National Business Group on Health in Washington, expects the majority of U.S. companies to go the way of Orbitform in the next five years and encourage people to live healthier lives by offering incentives that include paying more of their health insurance premiums.

"We're just on the cusp of an explosion of employers and employees saying we want healthy lifestyles," Darling said.

Beset by ruthless pressure to keep health insurance costs down, employers are using incentives to reward employees who eliminate unhealthy habits, or at least improve upon their behaviors.

Technically, that's what Okemos-based Weyco Inc. did when it gave employees a choice between smoking and their jobs.

Weyco founder Harold Weyers told workers they had 15 months to quit smoking or they would lose their jobs as of Jan. 1, 2005. Weyco provided whatever smoking-cessation programs employees wanted,

including hypnosis and acupuncture, Weyers said. But in the end, four employees chose smoking over their jobs.

Employers have targeted smokers for years.

Since the 1980s, Alaska Airlines has required new hires to take a urine test to prove they are tobacco-free.

Investors Property Management in Seattle hasn't hired smokers for two years, and smokers already employed by the company can't smoke on Investors' time or purchase health insurance through the company.

Northwestern Mutual Life Insurance Co. in Milwaukee plans to begin charging smokers an extra \$25 a month, or \$300 per year, for health insurance. Navistar International Corp., based in Warrenville, Ill., plans to charge smokers an extra \$50 per month, or \$600 per year, for their health care coverage, beginning in July.

And health-benefit researchers expect to see the practice grow in popularity.

The reason is that employers are struggling to cope with health insurance premiums that have increased at double-digit rates for half a decade. Until now, they've dealt with them by taking such steps as increasing copays, eliminating prescription drug coverage and switching to plans with deductibles in the thou-

sands of dollars.

Even the United Auto Workers union, which in some states has negotiated for workers to be allowed to smoke in plants, is under pressure to promote healthier lifestyles. It supports smoking cessation and other health programs.

Employers say it's not enough. The cost to provide insurance rose an average of \$582 per employee this year, according to the consulting firm Towers Perrin, and the average annual cost to insure a single employee rose to \$3,936, the firm said.

Under the weight of those costs, many employers have dropped coverage in the past couple of years.

Metro Detroit's free clinics report a drastic increase this year in the number of working adults whose employers have dropped medical coverage.

One way to keep insurance inflation in check is to keep employees healthy. But traditional employer-sponsored plans encouraging exercise, nonsmoking and healthy eating habits have fallen flat.

Orbitform built a workout facility on the company campus, but Shirkey said he's disappointed by the low use of the center.

Many employers have expressed similar frustrations.

But now, some are looking for ways to reward employees who take better care of themselves. Companies

are beginning to charge lower health insurance premiums to people who exercise, have annual physicals, don't smoke and let their employers monitor their health.

The new trend toward offering financial incentives could improve participation in company-sponsored programs and drastically cut costs, said Dee Eddington, director of the Health Management Research Center at the University of Michigan.

Eddington has been tracking health risks and costs for 25 years. His database includes 2 million people from such places as General Motors Corp. and W.A. Foote Memorial Hospital in Jackson.

He's been studying GM's health costs since 1993 and is convinced that the automaker could cut 25 percent of its health costs by making its workers just a little bit healthier.

Eddington, who has studied health care use and costs for 300,000 GM workers, said the average GM worker has 2.6 risk factors, which include such factors as smoking, being overweight and having high cholesterol.

GM says 26 percent of its 1.1 million beneficiaries, slightly less than the national average, are considered obese, and that those people cost the company about \$1,500 a year more in health services on average than beneficiaries who aren't obese.

"We have data that shows if you could move all of those people from

2.6 risk factors to 2 risk factors, that 25 percent of GM's "health costs could be reduced," Eddington said.

To move everyone to that lower risk level would probably take five to 10 years, he said.

"Over a three-year period, I think we could see up to a 5 percent reduction in health care costs," Eddington said.

The Detroit law firm of Miller, Canfield, Paddock and Stone reports that 75 percent of its staff participates in its health and fitness program since it began offering free health screenings during work hours, reimbursing employees for \$100 of their annual health club dues, providing free annual physicals and offering weight-loss and smoking-cessation programs.

Even better, the firm reports that it has seen a 30 percent reduction in five risk factors: poor fitness, obesity, high blood pressure, elevated cholesterol and smoking.

Reducing the spending on tobacco- and obesity-related diseases alone could take a significant bite out of health-cost inflation, said Tommy Thompson, the former Health and Human Services secretary.

Nearly 442,000 deaths and \$159 billion in spending annually are linked to tobacco-related diseases, Thompson said.

If trends continue as they have, the cost of obesity-related disease soon could surpass that, he said.

# Flat world fatigue: Globalization breeds interminable work day

SANTA CLARA, Calif. (AP) — The traffic jam ended hours ago, the parking lot is nearly empty and fluorescent lights are dimmed at PortalPlayer Inc., where the nightly brainstorming session is about to begin.

Instead of gathering the few remaining souls from their cubicles, three managers move into a conference room to dial India, where engineers 12 1/2 time zones ahead are just arriving in Hyderabad.

As colleagues on opposite sides of the globe discuss circuit board configurations and debugging strategies for a project code-named "Doppelganger," it's just the start of another endless day for the company. Within twelve hours, Indian workers will end their day with calls and e-mails to California, where managers in the Santa Clara headquarters will just be waking up.

"We keep passing the baton between California and India, and that way we can cram a lot more work into a 24-hour period," said Jeff Hawkey, vice president of hardware engineering, who conducts evening meetings from the office or on his laptop at home. "A lot of nights, I go home, tuck the kids into bed and then get on the conference call."

Executives at PortalPlayer, which makes chips and software for portable music devices such as the iPod, say having 90 employees in Hyderabad nearly doubles the amount of engineering work that gets done in 24 hours. That shrinks production cycles and lets the 6-year-old company stay ahead of bigger semiconductor rivals.

Thousands of other tech companies have similar baton-passing rituals. "Offshoring" — the migration of jobs to lower-cost countries such as India, China and Russia — remains politically sensitive because of the tepid U.S. job market. But executives insist that cheaper labor and faster work flow have made offshoring a fact of life for everyone in the industry.

Even the most unapologetic globalization proponents nevertheless acknowledge that offshoring has resulted in longer, stranger hours for white-collar workers in the United States. Some business experts worry that the trend could result in massive burnout if offshoring isn't properly managed.

Silicon Valley workers grumble that communicating with colleagues overseas requires midnight teleconferences, 6 a.m. video meetings and the annoying "pling" of instant messages and twittering cell phones all night long. Although many techies swapped social lives for 80-hour weeks during the ephemeral dot-com boom, the 24-hour business cycle seems even more stressful than the caffeinated '90s: Today's long hours are less likely to result in windfall bonuses or stock options,

and there's no end in sight.

"It's definitely a case of work creep — everyone in this industry is working harder right now because of e-mail, wireless access and globalization," said Christopher Lockhead, chief marketing officer of Mercury Interactive Inc., a Mountain View-based consulting firm in 35 countries, including Israel, where Sunday is a normal working day.

"You can't even get a rest on the weekend," Lockhead said from his cell phone in the Dallas airport after

sales meetings in Mexico. "The reality is that when you do business globally, somebody working for you is always on the clock."

Some executives who ask workers to burn the midnight oil offer flexibility — longer lunch breaks, telecommuting privileges and complimentary dinner if you work past 6 p.m. Others dismiss complainers as spoiled or provincial — after all, customer service representatives in Asia have worked on U.S. schedules for more than a decade, so why

shouldn't Americans deal with time-zone challenges as the industry globalizes?

The staunchest advocates say whiners should find new professions. Richard Spitz, who leads the technology division of the recruiting firm Korn/Ferry International, says corporate clients want employees who embrace a 24-hour business cycle.

"If you want to play in the A league, you have to take on some additional challenges," Spitz said. "It

might not mean that you have to work around the clock for your entire career — at some point, you can step off the treadmill. But if you want to be in the business, then you have to commit to this schedule for some period of time."

At what cost, however?

Some worry that the extra hours and unrelenting pace could have dire consequences — namely, widespread fatigue and brain drain in the technology and financial services industries, the most aggressive exporters of white-collar jobs. Steep turnover among sleep-deprived managers could eventually lead senior executives to re-evaluate the benefits of offshoring, said Peter Morici, an international business professor at Robert H. Smith School of Business at University of Maryland.

"You simply can't keep working a full day, put the kids to bed, take a call from Malaysia, then go back fresh the next morning — it's one thing to do it for a couple weeks, but it's another to put up with this pain in the neck permanently," Morici said. "When executives talk about the efficiencies of offshoring, they're often not factoring in the long-term human toll on management."

Staffing challenges may already be taking a toll. According to a study released in April by Deloitte Consulting LLP, 62 percent of senior executives interviewed at 25 large corporations said offshoring required more management effort than they had originally thought. More than half said they couldn't free up enough managers to supervise projects.

Worker advocates compare the trend to the automobile industry phenomenon of "speedup" in the 1920s, when Henry Ford increased assembly line speed without paying workers more. Turnover mushroomed to 400 percent per year in some Detroit-area plants, and the frenzied pace helped the 1930s union movement.

Marcus Courtney, president and organizer of WashTech, the Seattle-based branch of the Communication Workers of America, said few employers pay overtime for midnight meetings or red-eyes to Shanghai. And while many techies are proud workaholics, dawn teleconferences and 9 p.m. hand-off meetings have stretched shifts to absurd lengths.

## Acclaimed poet keeps his day job, grounded by his daily toil in retail

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — Amid the shelves of precisely folded dress shirts, in the routine and punctuality required of a Brooks Brothers clerk, Spencer Reece found the perfect antidote to a life of emotional turmoil.

Grounded by his daily toil in retail, he started a savings account, took a lover and finished a collection of poems 15 years in the making.

But don't suppose, just because the gangly Juno Beach, Fla., resident has been hailed by The New Yorker, won a prestigious poetry prize and published a first book greeted with acclaim, that he will quit his day job at The Gardens mall in Palm Beach Gardens, Fla.

"I need my job," said Reece, 41. "It taught me about life, to be a team player, to work with others. I know it seems pedestrian. But it suits me."

Published last year by Houghton Mifflin Co., "The Clerk's Tale" is as thin and spare as its author, yet eloquent in its spot-on depiction of life shot through with longing and loss.

"I do not know a contemporary book in which poems so dazzlingly entertaining contain, tacitly, so

much sorrow," wrote former U.S. poet laureate Louise Gluck in the book's introduction.

Gluck recommended Reece's work to New Yorker poetry editor Alice Quinn, who in June 2003 devoted the entire back page of the magazine's fiction issue to the title poem of the collection. She said his collection is "one of the most moving and unified first books I've read."

In the past few months, Reece has done readings at the Library of Congress and at book fairs in Los Angeles and Texas, and won grants from the Guggenheim Memorial Foundation and the National Endowment for the Arts. And he has begun several new poems.

Still, Reece is a poet and a clerk, as much at home now with pinpoint and broadcloth as with the meter and rhyme.

"Poetry is meditative, and requires an amount of silence," Reece said, "and the store is all noise, movement and fractured interchanges."

In a world where too few read, and fewer still read verse, poetry does not pay. But Brooks Brothers does — about \$30,000 a year for an assistant manager.

The life of a poet has never been

easy. As a youth, Lord Alfred Tennyson was dogged by poverty. W.B. Yeats suffered from unrequited love. Ezra Pound and Robert Lowell were haunted by madness.

From a privileged beginning, as the son of a well-to-do Minnesota physician, Reece, too, found anguish. After studying at Bowdoin College and Wesleyan University, he earned a master's degree in English Renaissance poetry in York, England, and then entered Harvard Divinity School. Headed toward a career in the ministry, he was awarded a master's degree in theology in 1990.

After returning to Minnesota to live on the family farm, Reece's world crumbled. His parents went bankrupt and could not accept their son's homosexuality. He became estranged from his younger brother.

Nearing a breakdown, Reece said he committed himself to a mental hospital in 1994. "When I speak of the weather, is it because I cannot speak of my days spent in the nuthouse?" he writes in his poem Florida Ghazals.

After his hospital stay, Reece needed a job, and found it at Brooks Brothers in the Mall of America outside Minneapolis.

Reece transferred to the Palm

Beach store in 1998, and four years ago moved to The Gardens, store No. 52, where he rose to assistant manager.

His boss, store manager Ellen Morris, said Reece's success as a poet has not infringed on his role as a valued employee. "I think he is humbled by what's happened to him after all these years of trying to get published," she said. "It has not changed him. He's a good person."

Reece's partner, Paul McNamara, 52, who has a business repairing car interiors, admits, "I'm not a literary guy." Yet, said McNamara, Reece "has an open heart. He can really engage the audience. I like watching him perform."

Like Prufrock in the T.S. Eliot poem, which has served as one of his touchstones, Reece worries aloud about growing old, about estrangements and opportunities lost.

Yet he is happy where he is, being of service and working with others. Pausing near a dock on the Intracoastal Waterway, Reece recalled a store party the staff threw for him when his book was published.

"They are not readers," he said. "But they had a party and I cried. I didn't think they cared that much. But they do."

## Survey says workers' 401(k) accounts too invested in own company's stock

CHICAGO — Only 21 years old, Robert Trevino knows the future of his retirement lies in his hands.

So, he's already socking money away — in certificates of deposit.

"I just like to have a sense of security about money," said Trevino, a student who works from time to time as a music conductor.

As he gets older and his income grows, Trevino says he plans to increase his savings but may shy away from the corporate 401(k) plan.

He is haunted by tales of employees watching their nest eggs, heavily fortified by corporate stock, rot away when a company is gutted by corporate greed.

Fear of losing hard-earned dollars to tanking stock prices a la Enron Corp. and WorldCom Inc. could be one reason why 401(k) participa-

tion rates have only modestly increased since 2002. That's according to an annual benchmark report, "How Well Are Employees Saving and Investing in 401(k) Plans," released Tuesday by Hewitt Associates Inc.

Also troublesome is that one out of four 401(k) participants have half or more of their plan balances in company stock, according to the survey.

"You don't want your job and your retirement assets tied to the same ship," said Mike Francis, president of Francis Investment Counsel in Hartland, Wis.

Many people get into 401(k) plans because some employers match employee contributions with corporate shares.

"For many people it's all they can do to get money in the plan," said Francis. "Once they do that, they think their job is over. (But) Most

financial advisers recommend having no more than 20 percent exposure to any one stock."

Hewitt's survey of 2.5 million employees determined that roughly 70 percent of workers eligible for 401(k) plans in 2004 took advantage of the program compared with 68.2 percent in 2002.

"Year after year, 30 percent of those eligible aren't participating," said Lori Lucas, director of participant research for Hewitt Associates in Lincolnshire, Ill. "And they are the individuals who are most difficult to reach."

To combat that, an estimated 59 percent of companies have created automatic 401(k) enrollment programs where workers must opt out of saving.

Workers between the ages of 20 and 29 represent the largest non-participating segment — only 46 percent are currently enrolled in

401(k) programs.

Keaton Durham, 26, is among those in his generation who have been prodded into saving for retirement by his father and brother-in-law. He puts 15 percent of his paycheck into his 401(k) plan and also contributes to a Roth IRA.

"It seems like it's growing," Durham said. "If it goes down, it goes up. It's for such a long-term (investment)."

Meanwhile, employees between 50 and 59, like Ken Dennis, have the highest participation rate of any age group at 72.3 percent.

"I'm one of those investment geeks," said Dennis, 53, of the Department of Veteran Affairs.

He bought his first stock, with his father's help, in high school. Now he contributes the maximum allowable in both his 401(k) and Roth IRA. In addition, he's put money

in certificates of deposit, has a thrift savings plan through work, holds corporate and government bonds, stocks and some land in Michigan. His goal: early retirement.

"I could do more," he said.

Savings proponents are encouraged by the annual growth in participation rates, regardless of the slight increase, but they worry about converting those on the sidelines into savers and spurring those who do save money to save even more.

"It's truly a good news, bad news scenario," said James Klein, president of the American Benefits Council in Washington, D.C. "We still have millions of people who are not covered by a plan or participants who are not saving enough."

Hewitt's survey found that the average 401(k) balance was \$69,000 and nearly one in four participants

had a total balance of less than \$5,000. Other studies show that among workers in their 50s and 60s the average 401(k) balance is \$100,000. That allows for an annual distribution of \$5,000 for 20 years assuming the pot doesn't grow.

The inability to set a savings goal could be keeping many workers out of the game.

"People throw up their hands and say, 'I can't do that, so why bother?' A lot of people are not thinking ahead," said Steve Vernon, a vice president at Watson Wyatt and author of "Live Long and Prosper: Invest in Your Happiness, Health and Wealth for Retirement and Beyond" (John Wiley & Sons, \$19.95). "They are just living paycheck to paycheck and spending it all."

Vernon's advice for late starters: "If you're not saving for retirement, plan on working longer," he said.

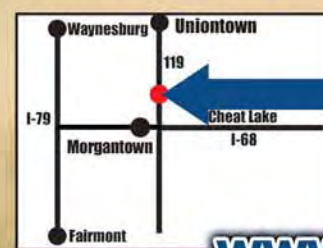

## Nissan introduces grown-up Pathfinder

When the first Nissan Pathfinder arrived nearly two decades ago, it was a rugged two-door sport-utility meant to battle the similar Ford Bronco II, Toyota 4Runner and Chevy S-10 Blazer.

Its evolution throughout the years has been a bit head-spinning. A four-door model arrived in 1990, and the two-door was dropped in 1991. First sold with either four- or six-cylinder engines, the four was dropped for the 1990 model year.

In 1996, the Pathfinder got a new chassis, a bigger V-6 and grew by more than a half-foot.

In 2004, Nissan shifted Pathfinder production from Japan to Tennessee. That same year, Nissan attached the Pathfinder name to its new full-size SUV, the Armada, but quickly backpedaled from that market-muddling decision.

All this serves as a preface. There's an all-new Pathfinder for 2005, and you need to forget about what you might have thought about that boxy, old-fashioned truck of the past.

This is, quite simply, one of the

is about 188 inches long. That early V-6 engine made 145 horsepower. This one cranks out 270 horsepower and 291 pound-feet of torque.

Of course, that 1987 model costs about half of what you'd pay for the 2005 model, but there aren't many \$12,524 sport-utilities on the market these days.

Our test vehicle, the midlevel SE Off-Road version, came stuffed with niceties, including a power sunroof, dual-zone air conditioning, leather and heated seats, a Bose stereo with nine speakers and a six-disc CD changer.

Priced at about \$34,000, the Pathfinder offered dual front air bags, anti-lock brakes and even a stability control system that Nissan calls Vehicle Dynamic Control.

Missing, though, were side air bags and side-curtain air bags. Both are options but weren't added to the test vehicle.

The off-road package added skid plates, special tires and technologies that help going up and coming down a hill (hill descent control and hill start assist).

The Pathfinder's exterior is more refined than the rugged box of the

past, and it now shares the face of all the other Nissan trucks. Its smooth sides, exaggerated wheel wells and roof rails confirm that it's a purposeful vehicle.

The cabin, too, is the strong, simple type. The shift knob and climate-control buttons are large and easy to grab. The vehicle, even though it was a four-by-four, wasn't too hard to step into.

Roomy, even in the third row, the Pathfinder was well suited to my family's weekly sports and grocery needs.

What I liked best, however, was its smooth, on-road feel. I hadn't expected this from a Pathfinder, but its larger chassis, new V-6 and five-speed automatic transmission contributed to a ride that felt secure and acceleration that was altogether pleasant.

**Toyota's Land Cruiser remains true to its 50-year heritage**

Many sport utility vehicles are going soft, mellowing their truckish rides for more car-like cruising and lowering their ride height to help passengers get in and out easier. Not Toyota's Land Cruiser, which remains true to its 50-year heritage as an around-the-world, go-anywhere SUV.

Arguably Toyota's most brutish sport utility, the Land Cruiser remains a stalwart eight-seater with full-time four-wheel-drive, considerable torque for towing and off-roading, truck-like body-on-frame construction and a ground clearance of nearly 10 inches.

Sold in some 150 countries, the Land Cruiser remains the Toyota-branded vehicle with the highest base price in the United States. Starting manufacturer's suggested retail price, including destination charge, for the 2005 model is \$55,890.

Competitors include the 2005 Jeep Grand Cherokee Limited with V8, which starts at \$32,575, including destination charge, and the 2005 Ford Expedition, which starts at \$36,850 for a four-wheel-drive model.

The price also can be high for fueling the Land Cruiser, which is Toyota's worst performer in fuel economy.

According to Environmental Protection Agency figures, this nearly 3-ton vehicle is rated at just 13 miles a gallon in city driving and 17 mpg on the highway.

Most buyers are affluent men, with some three-quarters of them college-educated, according to Toyota. Median age is in the high 40s, and nearly all are married.

Toyota research shows they purchase the Land Cruiser because of its reputation for reliability, durability and longevity. Developed in the 1950s, the Land Cruiser was first sold in the United States by Toyota in 1958.

"If you travel to the harshest environments on Earth, you will likely see people getting around in Toyota Land Cruisers," said Don Esmond, senior vice president of automotive operations at Toyota Motor Sales U.S.A.

In this country, the Land Cruiser is a "recommended" buy of Consumer Reports, which lists its predicted reliability as "excellent."

The vehicle also has a sterling record for having no U.S. safety recall of the current, fifth-generation model, which dates to 1998, according to records of the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration.

The Land Cruiser has traditional SUV looks — tall, boxy and no-nonsense. Riding on new-for-2005 18-inch wheels and tires, it stands 6 feet, 1 inch.

Climbing up and aboard puts a driver and passengers in positions where they can look down on cars and many pickups and SUVs in traffic. I even could look over the fence into a neighbor's yard as I drove past in the Land Cruiser.

But I noticed that some other drivers seemed to detest driving behind the blocky Land Cruiser. The Land Cruiser isn't the largest Toyota SUV overall. This honor goes to the full-size Sequoia, which, like the Land Cruiser, can seat eight people. But the Sequoia is nearly a foot longer than the Land Cruiser and can accommodate more cargo.

Maximum cargo room behind the front seats of the Land Cruiser is 90.8 cubic feet and is available only when the third-row seats are removed and left behind somewhere. Second-row seats fold down. This compares with 110.5 cubic feet of maximum cargo room in the Expedition with second- and third-row seats folded down. The Expedition seats easily fold flat into the floor and do not need to be removed.

When the third-row seats in the Land Cruiser are retained and folded, there's only 59.7 cubic feet of storage room behind the second-row seats. This is because the Land Cruiser third-row seats, which split 50-50, fold up against the sides of the cargo area, not down into the floor.

The resulting cargo room is less than the 67.4 cubic feet in back of the second-row seats in the Grand Cherokee. The Grand Cherokee does not offer third-row seating.

On the outside, the Land Cruiser doesn't look luxurious. But standard amenities inside include leather-trimmed seats, premium JBL stereo, power moonroof, remote garage/gate opener, power-

operated front seats, keyless remote entry and rear-seat climate control.

Controls are easy to operate, with sizable knobs and buttons. There are nine cupholders — more than there are passenger seats.

The optional navigation system in the test vehicle had a colorful, good-sized display screen. It doubled as the screen for the backup camera that activated whenever the Land Cruiser was shifted into reverse.

Too bad this helpful backup camera is part of a \$3,350 option package. It's really needed to help Land Cruiser drivers see what's behind this tall vehicle as they back up.

Several other safety aides are standard, however. These include stability control, antilock brakes, traction control and Brake Assist.

I wish, though, that curtain airbags, which are becoming standard on some low-priced SUVs, were standard equipment on the pricey Land Cruiser. These airbags are part of a \$650 option that includes side airbags mounted in the front seats.

There's only one engine for the Land Cruiser: A 4.7-liter, double overhead cam V8 that puts out 235 horsepower. It's adequate for this kind of vehicle, and I appreciated the smooth shifts that came from the five-speed automatic transmission.

But the power is less than what's offered in some competitors. Jeep's Grand Cherokee, for example, has an uplevel Hemi V8 capable of 325 horsepower, and Ford's Expedition has a standard V8 that generates 300 horsepower.

The Land Cruiser's 320 foot-pounds of torque at 3,400 rpm is palatable and well-suited for off-roading, where the center differential can be locked via a button on the dashboard. Drivers also can shift into low mode. Towing capacity is a maximum 6,500 pounds.

But other V8 SUVs offer more torque. The Expedition's standard V8 provides 365 foot-pounds at 3,750 rpm and can tow up to 8,600 pounds as a four-wheel-drive model, for example.

The ride in the Land Cruiser is somewhat truckish, with some bounciness felt even over potholes on city streets. The vehicle manages lesser road bumps with just a slight rippling sensation.

The vehicle feels a bit top-heavy when traveling through sweeping curves, but it moves straight across fields and down dirt paths with authority.

There's wind noise at highway speeds. Sales of SUVs in the over-\$50,000 range aren't large, and Land Cruiser sales are the lowest of all five of Toyota's SUVs.

Last year, 6,778 Land Cruisers were sold in the States, up slightly from 6,671 in calendar 2003.

But perhaps because of high gas prices, Land Cruiser sales through the first four months of this year are down 14.4 percent from the same period in 2004, to 1,742.

NHTSA has no crash test ratings for the low-volume Land Cruiser.

A final note: The Lexus LX 470 SUV uses the basic design and many of the same components of the Land Cruiser but is more luxuriously appointed. Starting MSRP, including destination charge, for the 2005 LX 470 is \$65,875. Lexus is the luxury division of Toyota.

# With Hyundai's new Alabama plant, foreign automakers still fuel South

**Experts: Properties, employees cheaper in southern states**

MONTGOMERY, Ala. (AP) — Hyundai's new plant is the latest sign that the Mercedes-Benz decision to locate in Alabama a decade ago turned the state — like much of the South — into a new automotive frontier.

Despite early skepticism that tax breaks and incentives given to the German automaker were overly lavish, it helped Alabama emerge as a major Southern contender for jobs-rich vehicle assembly plants and related industry.

Amid rolling fields and forests west of Alabama's capital, Hyundai is opening a 2 million-square-foot plant that's expected to employ 2,000, the Korean auto company's first assembly line in the United States. When Mercedes picked a site near Tuscaloosa in 1993, it also was placing its first U.S. assembly plant in Alabama.

In the following years, Honda put a vehicle and engine manufacturing plant in Talladega County and expanded its work force to 4,400, and Toyota bolstered its Huntsville engine factory to 800 workers. Mercedes recently celebrated an expansion that increased its Alabama work force to 4,000.

Alabama's success in luring automakers is reflected throughout Southern states — some 25 domestic and foreign-based plants have popped up in the region from Texas through Kentucky in just as many years. Economic and automotive experts say plant properties are cheaper in the Southern states, as are their employees.

The South's right-to-work states are especially tempting to foreign automakers who don't want to deal with the costly retirement and health-care packages demanded by union workers in

said the plant would indirectly create 6,246 jobs, not the 14,285 estimated originally, and would pump \$347 million into Alabama's economy, not the \$623 million claimed by the state's projections.

Criticism has dwindled in recent years, though the incentives haven't. For example, the state provided \$252 million in tax breaks and incentives to attract Hyundai to Montgomery.

Now Alabama has fulfilled its financial obligations to Mercedes and other plants through payment plans and, in the meantime, has seen the automotive industry account for nearly 80,000 jobs in the state, Wade said.

Researchers at The Midwest Center are even considering whether to revisit their Alabama study, citing concerns over accuracy and the notable improvements to the state's economy.

"Perhaps the whole Mercedes-Benz situation was positive. I'm not sure, but I'm intrigued by the question," said Dan Swinney, executive director of The Midwest Center.

Still, the plant victories are bittersweet.

Wade conceded that the jobs created by the automakers and their accompanying suppliers don't always fill holes left by Alabama's diminished apparel industry. The state has lost more than 58,000 manufacturing jobs since 2000.

"It's not replacing those jobs, but it kind of cushions the impact of losing those jobs," said Ahmad Ijaz, an economist with the University of Alabama's Center for Business and Economic Research.

He added that the positive impacts of the auto manufacturing plants were never overstated. "If nothing else, they might of been understated, because future expansions were not taken into account," he said.

the Great Lakes area, said Michael Randle, publisher of Southern Business & Development magazine.

"The manufacturing segment of the automotive industry has been moving south in the last 20 years, and in the last three, four years that movement has accelerated," Randle said. "Twenty years ago, if you said that the activity in the South on automobiles would quadruple that of Detroit, people would have said you're crazy."

About a third of the nation's automotive production is in the South, according to the Washington-based American International Auto Dealers Association.

Alabama ranks third in the South in potential vehicle assembly employment, claiming 16.25 percent of the region's jobs behind top-ranked Tennessee (25.55 percent) and second-ranked Kentucky (25.08 percent), according to the Economic Development Partnership of Alabama.

"Once you look at how much payroll the industry is generating, there's absolutely no doubt they're going to have an enormous impact," said Keivan Deravi, an economist at Auburn University-Montgomery.

Hourly wages on the production line at the Hyundai plant in Montgomery range from \$14.40 to \$22 an hour, based on the level of

the worker's experience. That's on par with the \$16.21 national average wage for non-union auto workers, while union workers make an average \$20.32 an hour, according to the United Auto Workers.

"You grow savvier with every project you work and what we have learned is we've been very successful in bringing in four automotive companies to our state," said Alabama Development Office Director Neal Wade.

He said the state has been so successful in the automotive game that it is shifting the focus from attracting companies to helping the present ones expand — as indicated by Mercedes-Benz,

Honda and Toyota all announcing expansions in the past seven months.

Initially, industry newcomer Alabama wasn't expected to reap all the economic benefits anticipated from the Mercedes deal. The state promised a whopping \$253 million in incentives to open Alabama's first automotive plant in Vance, originally projected to employ 1,500.

A study by The Midwest Center for Labor Research, a Chicago firm that studies economic policy and private industry, said the Alabama Development Office and Troy State University greatly overstated the ripple effect of the plant.

The Midwest Center's report

# All-new Volkswagon Jetta a solid, capable little sedan

On the sitcom "Mad About You," Helen Hunt and Paul Reiser owned a dog named Murray. He was not a particularly bright or obedient dog, but they loved him nonetheless.

Hunt lost Murray in the park one day. Amazingly, she found another dog that was identical to Murray in all ways except that he was perfectly trained and did amusing tricks.

The new dog was objectively better in all ways, but they wanted their dog back. They missed some indefinable but vital quality they could only call "Murray-ness."

The brand new 2005 Volkswagen Jetta lacks Murray-ness. The solid little compact sedan is thoroughly capable but completely uninvolved to drive. There's not a hint of the sprightly character that encouraged you to take the long way home just so you could enjoy it a little longer.

The car is roomier, more powerful and better equipped, but it has lost the hard-to-define characteristics that made the old Jetta stand out from the pack.

Prices for the new Jetta start at \$17,900 for a Value Edition model with a 150-horsepower, 2.5-liter, five-cylinder gas engine and a five-speed manual transmission. The top model, equipped with a 100-horsepower turbocharged 1.9-liter four-cylinder diesel and a six-speed automatic transmission, has a base price of \$22,460.

The extremely well-equipped model I tested had the gasoline engine, automatic transmission and many options and carried a sticker price of \$26,125. All prices exclude destination charges.

Even the base price places the Jetta high among compact sedans. The heavily optioned model I drove dwells in the stratosphere with compacts such as the Audi A4, BMW 3-series, Mercedes-Benz C-class, Saab

9-3 Subaru Impreza and Volvo S40 T5. That's rarefied territory, and the successful cars in the class all have some special attribute, whether it be Subaru's standard all-wheel drive, BMW's style and performance or Mercedes' legendary appeal.

That's a long walk up from VW's heritage of quirky high-value cars. Germany's largest automaker is determined to get there.

It's been a wandering journey so far, marked by detours like the dead-on-arrival Passat W8 and the impressive but baffling Phaeton luxury sedan.

The Jetta is VW's best-selling car in the United States and the new model must succeed for the company to return to growth and profitability here.

The car is seven inches longer than the old model and rides on a wheelbase that's 2.6 inches longer. Width and height have increased one inch and 0.44 inches, respectively.

Interior room has also grown, particularly the trunk, which goes from being undersize to a 16-cubic-foot maw. That's larger than the trunk of the Chrysler 300, a large car that's nearly a foot-and-a-half longer than the Jetta.

I found the front seat to be roomy and comfortable with good, supportive seats. Back seat room was only adequate. The rear seat is as flat as a park bench, which is useful for the rare occasions the Jetta has three passengers there, but I'd prefer a little sculpting for the comfort of its more likely complement of one or two people.

The interior materials are lovely to see and feel and have VW's usual excellent fit and finish. The only shortcoming I found was a center armrest that feels flimsy and blocks access to one of the two front cup holders.

The quiet and refined interior is

The top model, equipped with a 100-horsepower turbocharged 1.9-liter four-cylinder diesel and a six-speed automatic transmission, has a base price of \$22,460.

unmistakably VW, but the exterior styling is amazingly anonymous.

I repeatedly walked past the Jetta in parking lots because its trunk and taillights have a sort of generic Japanese look.

I've never seen a car with so much chrome on its nose that's so easy to overlook. I suspect that's because the

hood and grille slope so steeply that the acreage of brightwork is simply too far below your line of sight.

The Jetta's new 2.5-liter, five-cylinder engine produces a relatively meager 150 horsepower. By comparison, the Nissan Altima's 2.5-liter, four-cylinder engine produces 175 horsepower and Volvo S4

2.4i's 2.4-liter four-cylinder generates 168 horsepower.

VW's excellent six-speed transmission provides very good acceleration. The transmission's shifts are quick and precise, although it was less responsive in manual mode than I'd like in a car with sporting aspirations.

# Ford vows almost no compensation for himself until auto profit made

WILMINGTON, Del. — Bill Ford told shareholders on Thursday that he would take almost no compensation for his services as chairman and CEO of Ford Motor Co. until the company's automotive business is profitable.

Ford Motor has long made the majority of its profits from its Ford Credit lending unit, not from making and selling cars and trucks. Bill Ford warned last month that the automotive unit would break even at best this year, due to higher prices for raw materials and plunging demand for profitable SUVs.

"That's certainly not acceptable to me, and I'm sure it's not acceptable to you, either," he said at the company's 50th annual shareholders meeting, held in the theater of the DuPont Hotel in Wilmington. Calling automotive profit "one of the most critical measures" of the company's performance, he said he would continue to eschew a cash salary and that he would seek to have his future compensation tied more closely with automotive profits instead of overall profits.

"I will also forego any compensation — at all — until the compensation committee and I are satisfied that the company has achieved a sustaining profitability" in the automotive business, he said.

The company did not provide a precise definition of the terms of success. "That'll be a judgment call," said spokesman Jon Pepper.

Bill Ford would still have to accept the value of certain company-required benefits, such as use of company aircraft, Pepper said, and Ford will receive the compensation he has already been awarded, such as a \$3 million bonus for last year's performance.

That money has already been committed to providing scholarships to children of Ford employees and to other local charities.

Ford gave his \$1.5 million bonus from the previous year to establish the scholarship program. Future scholarships would appear to depend on Ford Motor Co. producing profits from its automotive business.

Bill Ford's position represents a slight change in attitude. He had criticized Standard & Poor's Corp. decision in 2003 to link the company's credit rating to automotive profits, arguing that Ford Credit's profits are largely attributable to sales of Ford, Lincoln and Mercury vehicles.

At that time, Ford was still expecting the company to meet its longstanding goal of earning \$7 billion by 2006, which implied that the majority of those profits would come from automotive operations.

But since the lack of automotive profits have led the management team to delay the \$7 billion target indefinitely, the focus is now on automotive profits and Bill Ford is tying his compensation to that.

It won't be easy. Ford's outlook has gotten gloomier as sales and profits of midsize and large SUVs has tumbled.

And more trouble could be on the horizon, said Scott Sprinzen, the lead automotive analyst at Standard & Poor's

# Acura RSX updated with power, freshened styling

Acura's least-expensive car, the RSX, is an anomaly.

The base RSX holds the top fuel economy ranking of all 2005 "sports/sporty cars," according to the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, with a rating of 27 miles a gallon in city driving and 34 mpg on the highway for a manual transmission model.

Meantime, the top-level Acura RSX Type-S, with higher-powered engine and sport-oriented suspension, is well-known to "tuners" — people who like to tune or customize their vehicles for enhanced performance and looks.

Indeed, the RSX Type-S was named "Tastiest Tuner" for 2005 in Spike TV's first-ever award for best tuner vehicle at the inaugural AutoRox program this year.

Acura, the luxury brand of Honda, updated the RSX for 2005 with more engine power, suspension improvements and freshened styling.

Starting manufacturer's suggested retail price, including destination charge, for the base 2005 RSX

is \$20,845.

Competitors in the sporty hatchback/coupe segment include the 2005 Ford Mustang, which starts at \$19,840 for a base coupe with manual transmission, and the 2005 Scion tC, which starts at \$16,515 for a base model with manual transmission.

Note that the RSX is America's lowest-priced new car that wears a luxury badge. Other luxury car brands such as Lexus, Mercedes-Benz, Audi, Infiniti and Cadillac don't offer any new models whose starting price is this low.

The RSX debuted some four years ago as a replacement for Acura's Integra and developed a reputation as a sporty, competent, front-wheel-drive, four-cylinder-powered hatchback coupe.

It also has a sterling record for having no U.S. safety recalls, and it's a "recommended" buy of Consumer Reports, which lists its predicted reliability as "excellent."

Buyers of this subcompact, three-door car are predominantly young and single. Median age is 35, and just 33 percent are married, Acura spokeswoman Jessica Fini said.

bad at idle, but it could become boomy in the 7,000-rpm range.

Note that while the base RSX is available with five-speed manual or five-speed automatic, the Type-S comes only with a six-speed manual.

It had short, quick throws in the test car. Gears were easy to find, and I could drive as smoothly or as aggressively as I wanted.

The 160 horses and 143 foot-pounds of torque might not sound like a lot.

After all, the Scion tC's 2.4-liter four-cylinder engine puts out the same horsepower and 20 more foot-pounds. But the tC's maximum torque arrives at 4,000 rpm, while the Type-S is still pulling strongly at that point.

In addition, the Type-S is a lightweight 2,840 pounds, which is 65 pounds less than the tC.

Ford's Mustang weighs at least 460 pounds heavier than the Type-S, and this is for a Mustang with a 4.6-liter V6 that delivers 210 horses and 240 foot-pounds of torque. The Mustang isn't offered with a four-cylinder engine but has a 300-horsepower V8 available.

Fuel economy in the RSX Type-S isn't quite as high as for the base RSX, but it's still in the top 10 of the EPA's sporty/sports car category with a rating of 23/31-mpg in city/highway driving.

Note that pricier premium gasoline is recommended for peak performance in the Type-S, while regular gas is recommended for the non-Type-S RSX.

The grille, headlamps and tail-lights are new for 2005. Front air ducts are redone and seem to make the RSX look like it's sitting low to the ground. The look is sporty, but not overly done or weird.

The car is not even 5 feet tall, so passengers drop down onto the low, redesigned seats. In the Type-S test car, front sport seats were decently cushioned and had sizable side bolsters to keep riders in place.

More than half of buyers are men, and median annual household income for RSX buyers is \$79,000, she

said, adding that about 12 percent of RSX buyers are computer programmers/computer consultants.

Even the base RSX isn't a stripped model. Standard features include halogen headlights, power moonroof, tilt, leather-wrapped steering wheel, carpeted floor mats, power windows, outside mirrors and door locks, side-mounted airbags, antilock brakes and automatic climate control with air conditioning.

The base engine is a 2-liter, double overhead cam, inline four capable of 160 horsepower and 141 foot-pounds of torque at 6,500 rpm. It has Honda's i-VTEC system for variable valve timing.

But the test car, the Type-S, comes with a racier, high-output version of this engine that pushes horsepower to 210, which is up from 200 last year. Torque is increased a bit, to 143 foot-pounds at 7,000 rpm.

This powerplant revs high and readily. Indeed, redline is 8,100 rpm.

So, I heard engine sounds right from startup. The sound wasn't too

## Saturn L-Series, 2000-04

**HISTORY**

For this General Motors division, the L-Series sedan and wagon represented Saturn's first foray into the larger mid-sized market. The "L" was based on GM's European Opel Vectra, but featured its own styling along with ding- and rust-resistant polymer body panels similar in construction to those used on Saturn's smaller S-Series. Under the hood was a 135-horsepower 2.2-liter four-cylinder engine or an optional 182-horsepower 3.0-liter V6 that was actually borrowed from the Cadillac Catera, predecessor of the CTS. The four-cylinder version could be ordered with a five-speed manual transmission or an optional four-speed automatic, while V6-powered models were only built with automatics. After five years of sluggish sales and progressive lineup trimming, the L-Series was finally removed from Saturn's roster.

**THE GOOD STUFF**

The five-passenger L-Series represented a major step-up from the compact dimensions of the S-Series. Even the most basic L100 sedan or L200 wagon contained air conditioning, tilt steering and a decent audio system. Sedan trunk space was impressive, rivaling that of full-size four-doors. The real champion of the space race was the wagon, however, which featured a tall roofline that gave it plenty of capacity. On the road, the L-Series provided a quiet, comfortable ride, even when loaded up, along with precise steering. Buy a used L-Series and, with the plastic doors and front fenders, you should be rewarded with a good looking vehicle for many years to come.

**HEADS UP!**

The anonymous look of the L-Series was amplified in 2003 with revisions to the front-end styling. The base four-cylinder powerplant generated only a barely adequate level of thrust when functioning with a full load of passengers and/or cargo. A better choice would be the smooth V6, especially if you're considering a wagon. The plastic body panels, while quite durable, do only a fair job of holding road and mechanical noises at bay. Except for the price-leader L100 sedan, all models purchased after 2001 came with side-curtain airbags, anti-lock brakes and traction control.

**PRICES**

Buying a used L-Series is a relatively inexpensive proposition. First-year 2000 models sell for \$6,000-\$8,500 with these numbers swelling to between \$7,000 and \$10,000 for an '01 unit. The deal for a 2002 L-Series will take about \$8,500-\$11,500 to put together, while you'll need about \$10,500-\$13,000 to get your hands on an '03 model. Final-year 2004 models range from about \$14,500-\$20,000. For each year, the higher amounts represent a fully loaded wagon.

**OVERALL**

The L-Series earns high marks for roominess, competent handling and damage-resistant doors and front fenders. Ride comfort and braking also make the list of significant virtues, as does the car's general build quality. The L-Series competes in a tough category that includes the Chevrolet Malibu, Toyota Camry, Honda Accord, Nissan Altima and Chrysler Sebring, to name just a few. Even still, if you don't mind travelling in relative anonymity, the L-Series shapes up as a solid used value.

# Chevy's 2005 SSR shows improvement over last year's model

Customers who bought a 2004 Pontiac GTO or Chevrolet SSR had good reason to be annoyed when General Motors introduced the 2005 versions of the two vehicles.

The V-8 engine in the GTO grew from 5.7 liters and 350 horsepower in '04, to 6.0 liters and 400 horsepower for '05. But the performance difference in the SSR, Chevy's retro-looking pickup truck, was even greater: The 5.3-liter, 300-horsepower V-8 had become a 390-horsepower, 6.0-liter V-8.

Essentially, the SSR's engine in 2004 was a regular V-8 from the pickup line. But for 2005, the SSR got the same engine as the all-new 2005 Chevrolet Corvette, though Chevy claims 10 more horsepower for the Corvette power plant.

Also, the 2004 SSR was offered only with a four-speed automatic transmission. That transmission is still standard, but the 2005 SSR gets a six-speed manual as an option for an extra \$815.

Is this a big deal? If you bought your SSR for just plain ol' daily transportation, no, but I wonder if anyone, anywhere spent more than \$40,000 on an SSR just because they think it's practical. Because it isn't. It is one of the least practical vehicles you can buy. The SSR is about fun, and 90 extra horsepower is just that much more fun, right?

It's also about performance. One magazine tested a 2004 SSR and got a 0-to-60 mph time of 7 seconds, and a quarter-mile time of 15.4 seconds.

The 2005 SSR it tested ran to 60

mph in 5.5 seconds and did the quarter-mile in 14.1 seconds. So the performance difference is substantial, and as a result, likely the difference in resale value will be, too.

Chevrolet upped the price for 2005, but not by much — base price in '04 was \$41,620, and for 2005, it's \$42,430. Add in the six-speed manual transmission and a few

other features, and our test SSR's list price was \$47,500, including shipping. By comparison, the base price of a 2005 Chevrolet Corvette is \$43,710.

The SSR debuted in January 2000, at the North American International Auto Show in Detroit, as a concept. It was such a hit that Chevrolet quickly made plans to build it and subsequently elevated its designer,

Ed Welburn, to the chief of design for all of General Motors.

Between 2000 and 2004, though, a few things happened: The original SSR was built on the platform of the antiquated S-10 Blazer, but it seemed just the right size at a length

of 186.1 inches and a weight of just more than 3,500 pounds.

But Chevy decided to build the production version on the larger platform created for the TrailBlazer SUV, and the SSR grew to 191.4 inches and a weight of more than

4,700 pounds. The SSR concept had a 6.0-liter V-8, and when the production model showed up larger and heavier with a 5.3-liter V-8 engine, it was — well, a bit of a let-down.

The 2005 model, though it's no smaller or lighter, is a lot faster than last year's. The 6.0-liter V-8 sounds just right, and with the six-speed manual transmission, the SSR has the hot-rod feel that its looks suggest.

As for those looks: Chevrolet thankfully kept the cool but complicated retractable hardtop that, at the touch of one button, disappears behind the driver and passenger seats. Another button pops open the cover on the bed, and you'll need that space for anything larger than a loaf of bread. The bed is carpeted, though, so borrow a neighbor's pickup if you need to haul a load of manure.

The build quality on the 2005 test SSR was the best yet, but that might sound like I'm damning it with faint praise, as some of the early '04 SSRs had copious squeaks, rattles and, with the top down, cowl shake. None of that with the '05.

There is still nothing practical about the 2005 Chevrolet SSR, the most outrageous factory-built hot rod since the Plymouth Prowler.

The extra power and manual transmission in the '05 model don't make that much difference in the ultimate success of the SSR's central mission, which is rumbling around town with the top down, thus making its owners, who are mostly mature, feel a little less mature.

But the extra 90 horsepower does shave off a couple more years.

# Toyota Prius hybrid cars selling above sticker price due to great demand

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Sheila Catoira wanted a fuel-efficient Toyota Prius hybrid so badly, she found a used model online and paid \$1,000 more than the car would have cost new.

With the demand for a gas-electric Prius far outstripping supply, some buyers are plunking down a premium for cars that are thousands of miles old. The trade-off: They don't have to wait for months on dealers' waiting lists.

"I figured that if I can get it right away, it was well worth it," said

Catoira, 31, a teacher and self-described environmentalist in San Diego.

Other desperate buyers offered more than the \$27,000 Catoira paid, but seller Sev MacPete said he refused to fully exploit the frenzy.

"I could have sold it for a lot over list, but I didn't feel like I can do it in good conscience," said MacPete, who happens to be the president of the Prius Club of San Diego. He wanted to sell the 2004 model after only 5,000 miles because he had just

paid sticker price for his second Prius, this one fully loaded with options.

Far from sticker shocked, buyers have in the past year have paid private sellers and used car dealers \$1,000 to \$3,000 above the advertised price of a new 2004 or 2005 model, according to Irvine-based Kelley Blue Book, which tracks used car prices. Older Prius models are not seeing the same phenomenon.

"There are some people who want

to be the first one on the block to own a Prius and to them, it's worth paying a couple of thousand dollars over sticker," said Jack Nerad, Kelley Blue Book's editorial director.

Rarely do second-hand cars sell for more than their new counterparts, since cars typically lose value almost immediately. The only other instances automotive experts cite are luxury vehicles such as the Ferrari and hot new releases. The Mazda Miata and Mini Cooper, for example,

were so popular when they first came out that buyers paid a premium for used models.

The Prius, which lists for between \$21,000 and \$26,000, is the first economy car with a higher resale value, according to automotive experts. Its hybrid competitors, such as Honda's Insight and Civic, haven't seen the same resale boom because they aren't in such demand. The Prius, which underwent a makeover last year, is considered by many to

be more better-looking and versatile than its competitors.

When the Prius first rolled out in the U.S. in 2000, buyers had to wait six months on average because Toyota underestimated demand. As Toyota increases its production schedule — the automaker plans to double to 100,000 the number of Prius cars for the North American market this year — the wait has dropped to an average of two months, depending on where a buyer lives.

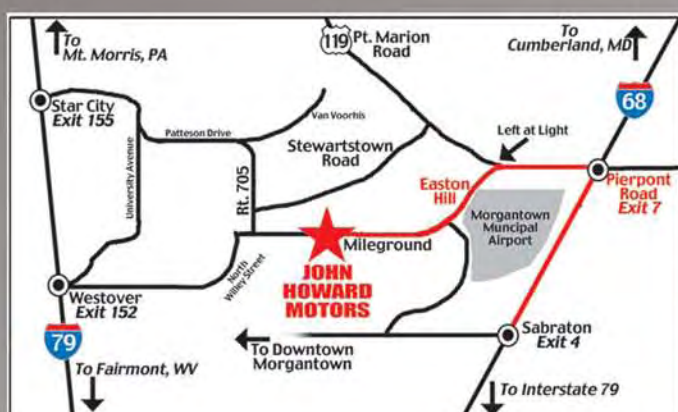

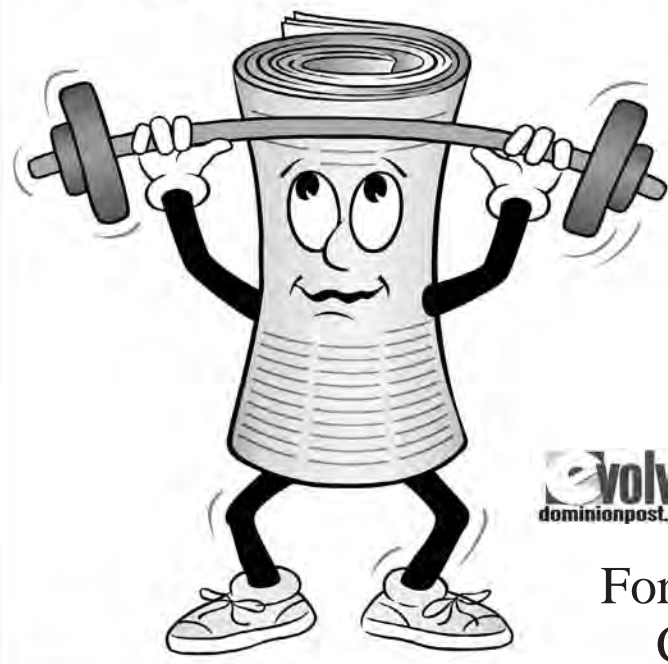

# Indy 500 champ Rice hopes for victory tour

Win the Indianapolis 500; appear on your boss's talk show.

No, it's not exactly a trip to Walt Disney World that Buddy Rice got after winning the 'Greatest Spectacle in Racing' last year, but he'll take meeting President Bush, talking cars with Reggie Jackson and appearing on 'Late Show With David Letterman' any day.

'I mean, the guy's awesome,' Rice says of Letterman, a die-hard racing fan and co-owner of Rahal Letterman Racing, the team for which Rice drives. 'He's so easy to talk to. He's down to earth, and obviously I've had to do some other little things with him and been on the show now twice. I like him. He's really a good guy. I mean, even before he was

my boss, I always thought highly of him.'

On Sunday, May 29, a field that includes former Indy 500 champs Helio Castroneves and Buddy Lazier, as well as Tony Kanaan, Scott Dixon, Sam Hornish Jr., Dan Wheldon and Danica Patrick, Rice's RLR teammate and the fourth woman in history to vie in the storied open-wheel race, will take to the 2.5-mile oval at Indianapolis Motor Speedway to vie in the 89th Indianapolis 500, coverage of which airs on ABC. Rice, however, will not be among them, as he's been sidelined by a back injury sustained in a practice-run crash at Indy on May 11.

So while he won't be competing this year, his memories of 2004 are still fresh. Last year, one of Rice's more noteworthy experiences came at Yankee

Stadium, where he was to throw out the first pitch before a game. Rain delayed his mound appearance and allowed him to get acquainted with Yankee players and coaches.

'The Yankee Stadium thing was insane,' he says. 'That was crazy. It rained, and I ended up hanging out, because there was a 30-45 minute delay. So I ended up talking with Reggie Jackson for a while about cars, and a bunch of players came out, and I talked to them. And their trainer there is a huge IndyCar racing fan, so he came out. And I ended up talking with Joe Torre. I ended up standing there right outside the clubhouse and hanging out and talking to a bunch of different people. So that was superawesome for me to be there and hang out and meet those guys.'

Jackson, an avid car collector, took particular interest in Rice's presence. 'He likes all kinds of racing,' Rice says. 'We talked for probably 20-30 minutes just about all different kinds of cars and different things and what's going on. I mean, most of the time you don't get to do that because most of those guys are getting ready for the game and doing their stuff. And so because of the delay, it allowed that to happen.'

Rice may be in the history books now, but he's still far from being a household name, at least by his own reckoning. 'I mean, it's not like you go down the street and get mobbed or anything like that,' he says. 'A lot of people obviously know about the Indy 500, so it's definitely a little different, for sure.'

**Q.** I have always enjoyed the series "Quantum Leap" with Scott Bakula. I tried never to miss an episode, but I fear I may have missed a couple. Can you tell me if it ever will come out on DVD? -Becke Parks, Wichita, Kan.

## Bledel charts new territory on 'Gilmore Girls'

Alexis Bledel still enjoys being a girl, or more to the television point, one of the 'Gilmore Girls.'

About to appear on movie screens in 'The Sisterhood of the Traveling Pants,' the young actress has just finished her fifth season on The WB Network's comedy-drama about a close mother-daughter relationship. Besides continuing in summer repeats in its traditional Tuesday slot, the series is repeating earlier episodes virtually every day on ABC Family. The first three sea-

sons are also available on DVD.

Those chart the growth of wiser-than-her-years Rory Gilmore (Bledel), who keeps pace mentally and verbally with her single mother, Lorelai (Lauren Graham), but is at an emotional crossroads as the show heads toward its sixth year.

In the season finale that aired two weeks ago, the normally driven Rory abandoned her plans to pursue a journalistic career after receiving a discouraging critique from the publisher father of her current beau, Logan

Huntzberger (Matt Czuchry). She also decided to abandon Yale University, panicking Lorelai, who also wasn't happy that Rory's ultra-conservative grandparents (Edward Herrmann, Kelly Bishop) had agreed to let Rory reside with them for now.

'Rory has been on a very specific path for most of her young life,' Bledel, 23, reasons, 'so last season was the year that sort of opened her eyes to the fact that there are so many other things. She realized how competitive the field she was trying to get into is, and how slim her chances actu-

ally were, and how hard she'd have to work ... when she already was working hard. We saw more about her than her academic goals, and it was fun to see where it would go.'

Executive producer Amy Sherman-Palladino determined, according to Bledel, that viewers had 'never really seen (Rory) mess up too much. She was almost annoyingly perfect. You just never saw her do anything normal teenagers do, and Amy said when Rory messes up, it's big. That's like her affair, if you can call it that, with Dean (Rory's ex-

boyfriend, with whom she became intimate while he was separated from his wife). I certainly don't want to judge Rory, but it was an interesting surprise when I got that script.'

Sending Rory to Yale could have altered the show's premise by separating her from Lorelai, but frequent phone calls and visits home kept the relatives united. 'I think it's been done as smoothly as possible,' Bledel says. 'For a while, it seemed like they were on the phone a lot, but they're so important to each other, they always go back to each other at the end of the day

with whatever they've experienced.'

Bledel moonlighted by playing a young prostitute in the recent highly stylized movie 'Sin City,' for which she worked in front of a blank 'green screen' for directors Robert Rodriguez and Frank Miller.

'It was unlike anything I'd ever done or seen,' she reflects. 'It's stunning visually, really amazing to watch. Making it was challenging but kind of fun at the same time. You basically have only your costume and the other actors to help get you into character. Working with two directors was a great experience; they were harmonious

as a team, and you got double the input.'

Last summer was busy for Bledel, since 'Sin City' was filmed at the same time as 'The Sisterhood of the Traveling Pants,' based on the Ann Brashares novel and opening nationwide Wednesday, June 1. Among those playing her best friends in the new film is Amber Tamblyn ('Joan of Arcadia'), and Bledel says 'it was fun working with people my own age or close to it. We just had a blast. The director (Ken Kwapis) would be like, 'OK, girls, it's time to shoot. Girls? Hello?''

'Gilmore Girls' frequently places Bledel opposite older actors, and she says, 'I love working with people I can

learn a lot from, but it's a whole new experience to co-star with people my age. You're all on the same page in a lot of ways. Since Amber also has done a series, it was cool because we could commiserate about the long hours. That's something nobody wants to hear you complain about, but when you know someone else has been going through the same thing, you can at least complain to each other.'

When her lengthy stint as Rory is finally finished, Bledel admits she'd have to think long and hard about doing another series after playing someone so tailored to her.

This hourlong documentary looks at how those movies — "Full Metal Jacket," "Hamburger Hill," "Platoon," "Apocalypse Now" and more — affected our perception of the conflict. Those interviewed include Vietnam veterans as well as people involved with the films.

# ‘Beauty and the Geek’ reflects both sides of Ashton

Of all the words that jump to mind when Ashton Kutcher's name is mentioned, 'geek' is not among them. Yet the hunky star swears he was one, which helps him as co-producer of The WB Network's 'Beauty and the Geek,' premiering Wednesday, June 1.

The reality show, which could easily devolve into a humiliation festival, is surprisingly sweet. Seven women, who fill out bikinis perfectly and actually say a silver dollar is worth 50 cents, are paired with seven guys who aced their SATs

yet are clueless in the ways of women and the world.

One guy, Joe, says he is a virgin but is not saving himself for anyone. Another, Richard, says he has never kissed a woman; there is no reason to doubt him. He makes Jerry Lewis at his zaniest look like Cary Grant at his suavest.

It seems improbable that one of Hollywood's hotties could be simpatico with this crew, but Kutcher seems sincere. Although he now is 6 feet 3 inches tall, in high school, 'I was the very, very little kid,' Kutcher says. 'I wrestled at 103 pounds freshman year of high school.'

'I don't think anybody feels like they belong,' Kutcher says of the teen years. 'You watch these supermodels, and they always say, 'I was a dork in high school.''

And so Kutcher, who produces this reality show with Jason Goldberg, co-producer of 'Punk'd' and 'Guess Who,' says he relates to the guys. The men, including a medical-school student and 'The Dukes of Hazzard' fan club president, are paired with women who work as a lingerie model and an NBA dancer.

'You take two extremely opposite groups of people and make them work to-

gether,' Goldberg says. 'We kept calling it a social experiment.'

The premise is that each side can teach the other something. And so the guys, many of whom may have last danced with an aunt at a family wedding, learn to dance with partners whose hips are constantly in motion. The women, who apparently never suffer the pangs of modesty, dress suggestively as they struggle with fifth-grade geography and spelling.

Despite dropping out to become a model in New York, then heading west to act, Kutcher retains an interest in the sciences.

An edited version of that video airs as the two-hour NBC special 'Eagles Farewell I Tour' Wednesday, June 1, showcasing classic songs from 'Lyn' Eyes' and 'One of These Nights' to 'Hotel California' and 'The Long Run' in an Australia performance.

Henley reteams with Glenn Frey - with whom he formed the Eagles in 1971 - and Joe Walsh, who joined the band in 1976, at Melbourne's Rod Laver Arena to render some of their solo hits as well as ones they've had collectively. Right from the special's opening seconds, it's clear that Eagles music still appeals to a wide age range; as the show progresses, even the youngest attendees are seen dancing enthusiastically to such tunes as 'Take It Easy' and 'Life in the Fast Lane.'

'We are extremely grateful and amazed that we still have such a following,' says Henley, who notes that the Eagles' fan base is as strong in Australia as in the States. 'We have noticed that our audience is primarily baby boomers, but younger people are starting to come and see us, and that's really gratifying. We like that a lot. When I'm on-stage and I see them, I al-

ways hope they have earplugs, having lost part of my hearing. If the kids are up front, it's always fun to give them drumsticks and guitar picks and things like that. It's good to have cross-generational appeal.'

As to whether the Eagles will stage a 'Farewell II Tour,' Henley says, 'At the beginning of every year, we have a band meeting and discuss the requirements we all have for continuing. It all boils down to how much sleep someone got the night before, as I'm fond of saying, or how long we've been away from each other. The mood and the intentions tend to change as time goes by.'

'I'm not definitely saying the group is over,' Henley adds, 'but there's more of a possibility than ever that this could be the end. We never want to become stale, and we've always wanted to make a graceful exit.'

The Eagles' current concerts encompass some of the members' solo successes, such as Henley's 'Dirty Laundry' and 'The Boys of Summer.' Newer group material was included for a while, but Henley concedes the band 'decided to stop, partially because of the possibility of bootlegging. You play something now, and it ends up on the Internet the next morning.'

If a new song does make its way into an Eagles set from time to time, Henley is 'not really expecting much of a reaction. Until people hear a song on the radio, or play it on their iPods or whatever technology they have, they're simply not going to react to it if they're hearing it for the first time ... especially not in a large venue.'

For many fans, the Eagles' songs primarily evoke the sound and feel of the 1970s, but Henley notes the band's influences date back

much earlier. 'We have always been historians. We've always been curious about artists who came before us, going back to the '40s and beyond. We've been very influenced by country music and blues music, and I think that's a healthy thing. I hear some of the newer bands, and it sounds like their influences don't go back past 1978, if they go back at all.'

If a ticket to an Eagles concert can be on the pricey side - well over \$100 isn't uncommon - Henley reasons, 'Antiques cost more.' He adds the current tour offers some \$25 tickets, but whatever patrons pay, he guarantees they get their money's worth.
