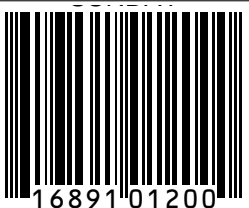

Michael will join 30 other killers now serving life

Michelle Michael will do her time at an all-women prison just outside of Point Pleasant.

Michael, 35, will report to Lakin Correctional

Center, in West Columbia, sometime after she is officially sentenced on first-degree murder and first-degree arson convictions.

She won't be the only woman at the prison to hold the title of convicted murderer. Thirty women out of 400-plus Lakin inmates are serving life sentences — some with mercy, some without — for first-degree murder.

Susan Wendelken, Lakin public information officer, said a majority of women at the facility, however, are there for drug

offenses, child abuse and financial crimes — not murder.

The facility, which began accepting inmates in 2003, houses about 410 women, Wendelken said. Its capacity is 462.

Michael is at South Central Regional Jail, where she was transferred for her Charleston trial. A booking employee there said she could be taken back to North Central Regional Jail for her sentencing hearing, which will be held in Morgantown, or might just stay at the South Central jail until she is taken to prison. Inmates can be transferred to prison immediately upon sentencing, but it can take several years.

Lakin, the state's only all-female prison,

has maximum- and minimum-security sections. Michael would be placed in a maximum-security section, Wendelken said.

At Lakin, Michael will sleep in a one- or two-bunk cell with a sink and a toilet.

Bunks are constructed from concrete and are covered with a plastic mattress, blankets and a pillow. Prisoners can have a TV in their cell, but only if they purchase it themselves, Wendelken said.

Prisoners are classified from 1 to 5, 5 being the worst, to determine activities and visitation procedures. Wendelken said factors such as prison behavior and criminal history come

Pension-fund challenge backfires?

Many teachers 'simply cannot afford to retire'

CHARLESTON — New figures suggest a group of teachers and school workers may rue the day they challenged the state's plan to merge their 401(k)-style retirement accounts into the main teachers' pension fund.

While the Consolidated Public

Retirement Board is appealing the ruling, a circuit judge has blocked the state from combining their Teacher Defined Contribution investments with the Teachers Retirement System.

Board actuary Harry Mandel told lawmakers Saturday that of the 19,851 employees with individual accounts, none of those age 60 or older have sufficient earnings in their accounts.

Of the 1,100 enrollees in that age group, only 23 have more than \$100,000. Mandel told a joint interim committee that the largest of

those accounts is \$157,000.

"These people simply cannot afford to retire unless they have significant sources of revenue beyond TDC," Mandel said.

Those enrolled in the traditional pension fund, meanwhile, can count on benefits of between \$200,000 and \$400,000, depending on life expectancy and whether they were teachers or service personnel, Mandel said.

"We're not hitting that target, even in the best case," Mandel said of the TDC accounts.

The older pension plan guaran-

tees a benefit based on final salaries and years of service. The TDC benefits depend on how well enrollees invest the set amount contributed each month from their paychecks and by their employers.

The overall average TDC account contains \$33,944, Mandel said. On average, TDC enrollees have earned less from their investments than either the national average for such retirement accounts or the Investment Management Board, which oversees the traditional pension fund.

Capitol falling apart

Cleanup uncovers another problem

CHARLESTON — Like layers of a rotting onion, West Virginia's 75-year-old state Capitol continues to yield new and even more costly problems as officials labor to repair and maintain the historic building and its campus.

The latest: Workers preparing to scrub down the 314,000 cubic foot exterior have discovered the Indiana select buff limestone is pulling away from the Capitol's steel skeleton.

"The facade is held in place by steel pins, and a lot of those pins are deteriorating," state General Services Director David Oliverio told lawmakers Saturday.

The repairs will more than double the cleaning project's \$1.5 million pricetag, Oliverio predicted during a meeting at the Legislature's joint interim session.

They also reflect but one of a series of cost overruns for the ongoing, five-year master plan for restoring the 54-acre Capitol Complex that is already budgeted for \$166

Daredevil, 17, faces trespassing charge for Md. bridge jump

HAGERSTOWN, Md. — A 17-year-old self-professed stuntman has been charged with trespassing. Authorities found online video of him jumping off bridges and dams and into the water.

Josh Broadwater has a page at the social networking site Myspace.com that lists his occupation as "stuntman" and his heroes as the stars of an MTV stunt show.

He acknowledged he trespassed to jump off a privately owned railroad bridge spanning the North Branch of the Potomac River for a video recorded May 8.

He was charged as a juvenile this past week and released to the custody of his mother, Tami Dolan.

Dolan said she has ordered him to stop doing dangerous tricks. "Josh just wants to be a professional stuntman. Basically, I don't think he actually knew how to go about it."

New schools, expanding hospitals and luxury housing are just some of the signs that development has become a booming business in Morgantown during the past five years, according to officials.

"It's an exciting time," said Chet Parsons, director of the Greater Morgantown Metropolitan Planning Organization. "We've seen a lot of growth in this area."

The past year has seen preliminary work on several projects, including West Run Apartments and The Augusta. West Run Apartments will house almost 1,000 residents in 322 units. According to Steve Davis, one of several developers for the project, Phase I of construction is on schedule for completion by mid-August.

West Run Apartments is just one of several new developments along West Run Road. Copper Beach Townhomes will

have about 400 units with about 1,100 beds, and The District plans to expand by nearly 1,000 beds, almost doubling its size. Parsons said 1,000-1,200 units are being built on West Run Road, an increase that may present a problem.

"That's really going to have an impact on traffic congestion," he said.

In the downtown area, construction began on The Augusta, a \$26 million development that is part of the \$300 million

The Square at Falling Run project, in March. The Augusta will have 158 apartments — 138 two-bedroom and 20 one-bedroom — and is scheduled for completion by August.

Morgantown Planning Director Chris Fletcher said future development likely will focus on the area between WVU's Evansdale and downtown campuses.

At a Morgantown City Council committee-of-the-whole meeting May 29, local developer

Monty Warner presented a plan for one such development. Pending council's approval, Grand Central Apartments, an 84-unit, multifamily housing facility, will be located on Ensign Avenue, behind Grand Central Station.

"We're going to see more redevelopment projects in the Sunnyside area," Fletcher said, noting that several projects along Beechurst Avenue have been or are in the process of being approved.

Car bomb kills 4 in Baghdad

BAGHDAD — A car bomb exploded in a busy shopping street in predominantly Shiite eastern Baghdad on Saturday, killing at least four people and wounding 10, police said.

The bomb was the latest in a series of explosions targeting commercial centers.

The blast struck about noon, a peak time for street vendors and nearby stores along the Maaskar al-Rashid street, a popular gathering point for people selling tires and spare parts for automobiles. Police who gave the casualty toll said several stores were damaged.

The attack came two days after explosions struck a Shiite market district in central Baghdad.

Pakistan's Musharraf, Bhutto talk amid reports of power-sharing deal

Former rivals meet for an hour, but no agreement made

ISLAMABAD, Pakistan — President Gen. Pervez Musharraf held secret talks with opposition leader and former Prime Minister Benazir Bhutto, a government minister said Saturday. Media widely reported that the once-bitter rivals had discussed a power-sharing deal.

The president, who is struggling with twin upsurges in Islamic militancy and calls for democracy, "held a successful meeting" with Bhutto in the Gulf emirate of Abu Dhabi on Friday, Minister for Railways Sheikh Rashid Ahmed said. He would not elaborate, but said "hopefully" Bhutto's secu-

lar, socially liberal Pakistan Peoples Party — Pakistan's largest opposition party — would decide to back Musharraf.

Pakistani media reported that Musharraf and Bhutto discussed a possible power-sharing deal for nearly an hour but ended without agreement.

Sher Afgan Khan Niazi, a minister in the coalition government that backs Musharraf, said it appeared the two were trying to strike a deal to secure another term for the general while paving the way for Bhutto to return as prime minister.

For that to happen, the government would have to change the constitution that prohibits anyone from becoming prime minister more than twice.

Musharraf also faces constitutional hurdles if he wants to cling onto his position as army chief

while staying on as president.

Musharraf, who seized power in a 1999 coup, is a key U.S. ally in the fight against terrorism. The general plans to seek reappointment from legislators for a new five-year presidential term this fall.

The Abu Dhabi talks faltered when Bhutto, who leads her party from self-imposed exile in London and the United Arab Emirates, refused to agree to support Musharraf if he did not resign from the military, Geo television reported, citing unidentified sources.

Musharraf is in the weakest position of his political career. He recently attempted, and failed, to oust Supreme Court Justice Iftikhar Mohammed Chaudhry, an independent-minded judge who could rule on expected legal challenges to Musharraf's plans for re-election.

Rising numbers of Venezuelans seek U.S. asylum

CARACAS, Venezuela — Gisela Parra started trembling behind the steering wheel and nearly hit another car when she heard the news over the radio: She had been charged with trying to overthrow President Hugo Chavez.

Fearing she would end up behind bars on what she says are trumped-up accusations, she boarded a private yacht in the middle of the night and escaped to the Dutch Caribbean island

of Curacao, her gateway to the United States and political asylum.

"I went into shock because I never imagined that something like that could happen to me," Parra told The Associated Press by phone from Palmetto Bay, Fla., where she is among a growing community of Venezuelan asylum-seekers in the Miami region. "It was at that moment that I understood the Cubans who leave on rafts."

Parra is among more than 3,700 Venezuelans who have been granted asylum in the United States since 1999 claiming political persecution. The U.S. government, no friend of Chavez, happily accepts many of them, but many more are in the United States illegally and could face deportation.

Chavez vehemently denies persecuting opponents, saying many have broken the law while trying to topple him. "Nobody is persecuted here," he said in a recent interview with the AP. Dozens of fugitives wanted for crimes in Venezuela are living in the U.S., he said, many of them "putting on the mask of saying, 'I'm being persecuted politically.'"

He accused the U.S. of granting

safe haven to hard-liners who publicly call for his assassination.

Five congressional Republicans — Jerry Weller, of Illinois, and Lincoln Diaz-Balart, Ileana Ros-Lehtinen, Mario Diaz-Balart and Connie Mack, of Florida — have asked President Bush to grant temporary legal status to Venezuelans living in the United States illegally.

"There's no doubt that some people from Venezuela may have very strong claims for asylum," said attorney Ira Kurzban, an immigration expert in Miami. But "many claims are simply based upon Chavez leading the country toward socialism, which in and of itself is not a basis for asylum," he said.

In 1998, the year Chavez was first elected, the U.S. granted political asylum to only 14 Venezuelans, according to the U.S. Office of Immigration Statistics. Last year the figure was 1,085, compared with 2,431 from Haiti and 1,508 from China.

Parra was chief of Venezuela's Judiciary Council — a government body that wields administrative control over the courts — until Chavez allies sacked her, in 1999. During a 2002 coup attempt, she and more than 20 others attended the swearing-in of a prominent business leader as interim president, but loyalists in the military thwarted the plot and restored Chavez to power.

In March 2005, she was charged with rebellion and decided to flee. "I was a good example, used so they could say to others: 'Look what happened to her,'" Parra said. She was granted political asylum in November.

Another exile in Florida is university professor Vilma Petrash, 48. She said that weeks after the coup, a Chavez supporter confronted her at a protest and warned that "something bad could happen" if she continued her political activism.

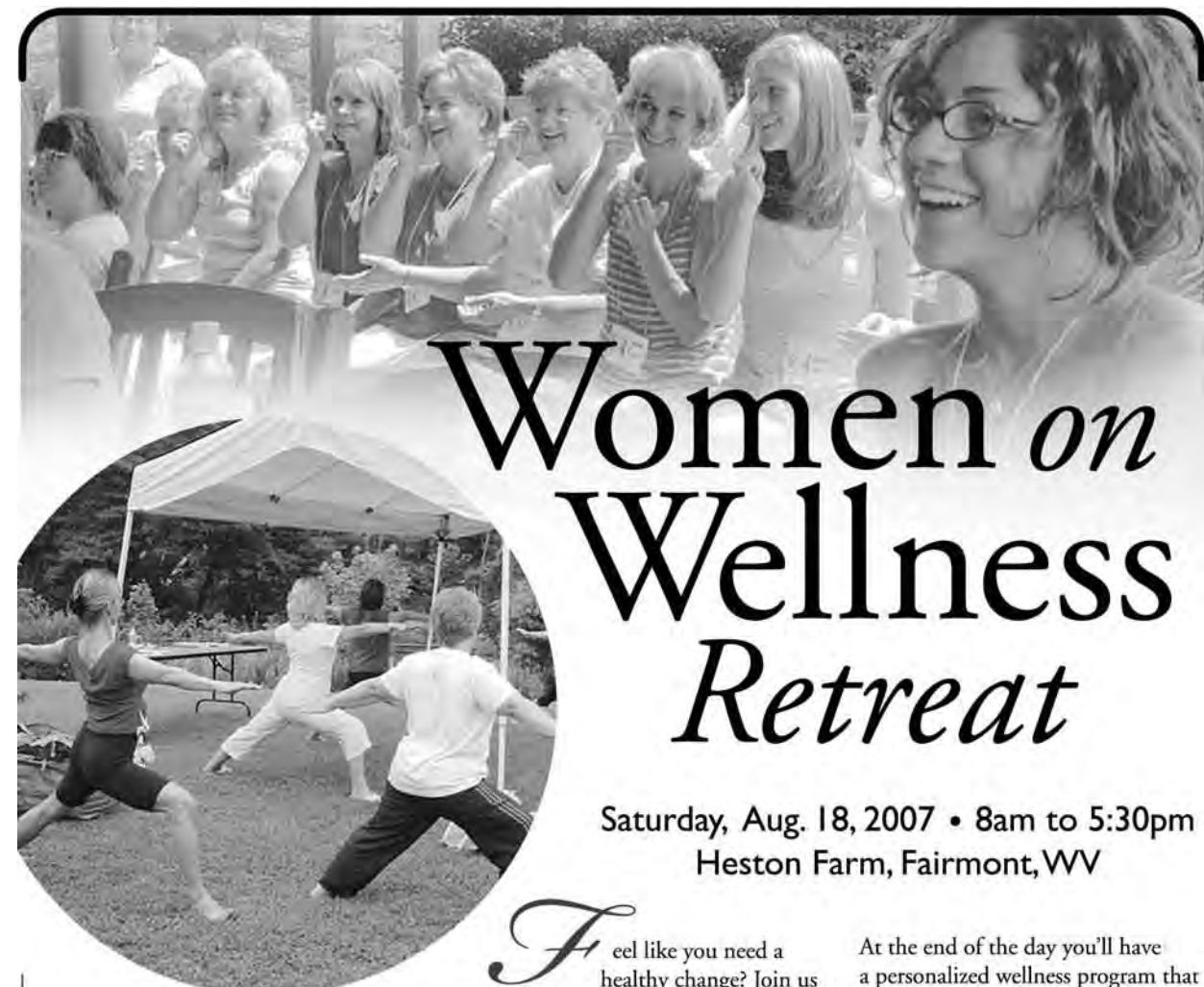

**Express E-ZPass Lane opens at
 Gateway Toll Plaza in Pennsylvania**

Pennsylvania Turnpike officials announced that one Express E-ZPass lane is open at the Gateway toll plaza (exit 2) in North Beaver Township, Lawrence County. It is separate from the regular toll plaza.

The express lane — where E-ZPass motorists can drive at highway speed (55 mph) while their toll is paid electronically — serves only eastbound traffic coming into Pennsylvania, since there is no westbound (or exiting) toll charged there.

The Gateway plaza is the Pennsylvania Turnpike's westernmost toll-collection facility, about 1.5 miles east of the Ohio border. It is Pennsylvania's third highway-speed

toll plaza. A second express lane will be added in about a year.

Other Express E-ZPass sites are at Warrendale toll plaza (No. 31) in Allegheny County, and Mid-County interchange (No. 20) in Montgomery County.

The Express E-ZPass means drivers don't have to slow down as they go through the toll plaza. Other E-ZPass lanes in the state require drivers to slow to 5 mph. Drivers should be cautious as they approach the Gateway plaza to make sure they are in the proper lane, turnpike officials said.

The turnpike manages 584,000 E-ZPass accounts with 860,000 Pennsylvania-issued transponders, or "tags," in use. It logs more than 7.5 million E-ZPass transactions a month or 240,000 daily. On average, about half of all toll transactions are E-ZPass transactions.

Practice put on hold during bookstore suit

STUDENTS WILL BE ABLE to use their financial aid money to buy books wherever they like this fall because a judge has temporarily suspended the university's practice of holding back some financial aid dollars in accounts that can only be used at WVU.

Previously, instead of having to opt-in to such a program, students had to opt-out or about \$400-\$500 (I've seen all kinds of different numbers reported) would be held for weeks. The Book Exchange, a private bookstore, says the convenience accounts have cost it millions in business.

I wrote earlier that if the university truly created this program to be a "convenience" for students and not a way to force students into spending their money at the university bookstore (operated by Barnes & Noble) — they would've made it opt-in.

That simple maneuver might've avoided what will likely be a very expensive, time-consuming lawsuit.

Or, let's be really creative. If this is about student convenience (and not enriching the coffers of the university and a private company), make those convenience accounts opt-in — then put the money into prepaid debit cards that students can take and use at whatever store they like. That'd be convenient.

But really. Does anyone believe that this is about anything other than money? I don't.

What I found curious this week was the university's press release announcing the suspension of the program: "We've decided to temporarily suspend the Reserve Convenience program for the fall, and will be notifying eligible students of our decision," says Dan Durbin, associate vice president of finance at WVU.

We've decided? I was under the impression that the judge decided that for them, but WVU seems to indicate they had some choice in the matter. Sure, it's probably just the usual PR spin, but I think someone gave the top an extra turn with that one.

The university does note that the injunction is only temporary. Nevertheless, if the school loses the lawsuit, it could be made permanent. Preliminary injunctions like this are designed to preserve the status quo, to put things back the way they were before the action that caused the lawsuit happened so that further damage is prevented while the case drags through the courts.

In a lot of jurisdictions, they're granted to parties who have a strong chance of winning when their case goes to trial. At the very least, it's an affirmation by the court that the claims, in this case the claims of the Book Exchange, have merit.

But having merit is still a long, long way from winning.

Students get the edge on college life

Program provides an intense introduction to WVU

"Tips for all freshmen: The steps around campus will wear out your shoes," advised David Freeman, of Charleston, after spending two weeks in WVU's nascent Seamless Transition Program.

Of course, Seamless Transition taught Freeman more than the importance of good footwear. Devised four years ago, STP, which ended Saturday, was open to all incoming freshmen. The program mimics college life by providing freshmen with a three-week intensive college class and University 101, all while residing in Stalaker Hall with an assigned roommate. During the time, students are also encouraged to explore and to familiarize themselves with the campus.

Representing Maryland, New York, New Jersey, Virginia, Pennsylvania, Ohio, Florida and West Virginia, 44 students enrolled in this year's program.

"I was surprised by the diversity. There are lots of ethnic students, so it's very diverse. From Rex Persinger representing Hometown, W.Va., to guys from Florida," said participant Hellen Nditsi, of New Jersey.

Taking a summer school course may sound like an easy grade booster, but be warned, said Professor Keith Garbutt, dean of the Honors College and co-director of STP.

"This is an intense experience for the students to find out how hard college can be taking a course in 3 weeks," Garbutt said. "You have to be on task and understand the type of studying. We don't guarantee As."

Participants start classes at 9 a.m., Monday thru Saturday, selecting from Humanities 101, Psychology 101, Mathematics 129 or Biology 115. At 11 a.m., students have three hours for lunch and recreation time before heading back for another two hours of the course in the afternoon. After dinner, University 101, the freshmen orientation course normally taken in the fall, is taught. A mandatory study hall period from 8-10 p.m. finally concludes the day.

"Honestly, I thought it would be easier. I've never taken a college class and psychology is harder and requires much more time, but it's your time and you can manipulate it," Freeman said.

"We would go over four sections a day, and it's hard to absorb much and get ready for a test," Rex Persinger said. "I have to get used to doing 70 problems in math."

"A lot of the students walk in experiencing culture shock, discovering they need to read 60 pages in one night. Normally in the fall, when a student is taking five classes, they do need to read 60 pages. The program tries to show students there is time for class work and for recreation. In fact, during their afternoon break, we encourage them to use the facilities at the Rec Center. We tell them to relax and then do the required at the homework recitation," Garbutt said.

Despite the hectic academic agenda, STP still fosters a unique, nurturing environment for students to socialize and bond. During their Sunday break, Adventure WV took the students to Coopers Rock for rock

climbing. One night after homework recitations, a group of students met in the hallways with their guitars and violins, playing "Fiddler on the Roof." Other school nights, residential advisors stop to chat with students or to play board games.

"They come from all different backgrounds, and it's amazing how close some were after the first day. The social pressure is off," said Buffy Vehse, assistant director of Undergraduate Academic Service Center.

"I'm a social person," Nditsi said, "and I wanted to get to know the people and professors. This program allowed me to do that. We have nicknames for each other, and people call me 'Giggles' because I'm always laughing."

Because the first group of STP students are graduating in 2008, it's still difficult to assess the academic success of the program participants. But, Garbutt said, "If we look back at students who took the program, the vast majority have progressed in their major and most do seem to be on track. I feel the program does provide important tools to give the students a little edge to get through the first year."

Coulson recalls devastating flood of 1985

KINGWOOD

IT DOESN'T TAKE AN Einstein to figure out everything is relative. Take the goings-on at Preston Country Club this weekend as the 60th Tri-State Men's Amateur is being contested.

On the first day it rained. It really rained, rained long enough and hard enough to wash out nine holes of play. To most, it seemed like a whole lot of rain. "Compared to what?" Tom Coulson asked. See Coulson, who is on hand watching the tournament he won way back in in 1973 when was playing out of Lexington, S.C., saw it really rain at Preston Country Club.

Back in November, 1985, Coulson was the head professional there. He remembers he was parked down towards the river listening to emergency services on the radio.

"They said the river would crest at about midnight," he recalled.

Around midnight he figured he'd better take his daughter home, just to be on the safe side.

Come morning, he awoke and drove over to the club. What he saw left him almost in a state of shock.

Preston Country Club was under water.

"I couldn't believe it. I looked up into the mountains and thought, 'It looks funny up there.' That was water," he said.

Water, water everywhere. Talk about a hazard.

In the bar and grill on the second floor of the clubhouse, they still have pictures of the flood.

Coulson carries pictures in his memory.

"The old clubhouse was completely under water," he said.

The pavilion in which he was standing Saturday was where his pro shop was then. You couldn't see it.

"Lost everything," he said.

Talk about relativity. On Friday this week they lost nine holes of golf to the rain.

In that storm they lost nine golf holes.

According to Coulson, two weather systems converged right over Preston and stalled out, dumping more than 20 inches of rain.

The Rowlesburg Bridge collapsed and that blocked off the river, forcing it out of its banks.

The devastation was incredible.

"We found golf carts three miles down river," Coulson recalled.

The maintenance building was saved because a contractor had parked two or three trucks and a grader in front of it, blocking the debris from spilling into it, according to Coulson.

The water receded quickly, after having done its damage, and Coulson recalls returning to see just how bad things were.

"I was stopped by some soldiers in Delta Force," he said.

"They asked me what I was doing there. They were looking for stuff they'd lost from Camp Dawson."

"It was," said Mike Contic, the tournament chairman and a member of the board at Preston Country Club then, "the 100-year flood."

The 1986 Tri-State was won by Bill Haddox, the East Fairmont football coach, although they had only nine holes open.

The tournament was held at nine holes until the final round when the championship flight played 18.

Coulson left, went to Clarksburg, then worked on the grounds crew at Augusta National for three years.

At 69, he is retired now in Bridgeport, doesn't play golf anymore and wonders when he hears heavy rain called for.

"It was there for the taking today," Whetsell said.

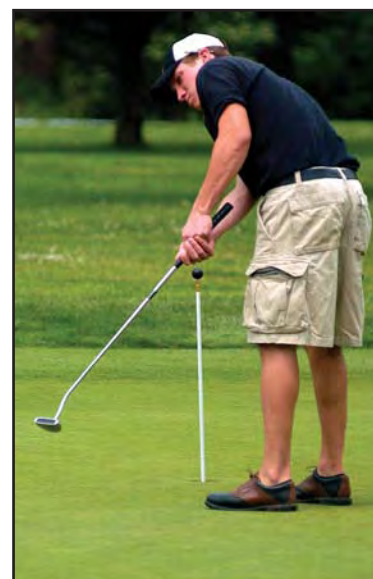
And he took it with what he believes to be his lowest score ever on the Preston Country Club course.

"It's just some of those frustrating things that didn't go well," he said. "Normally things click and you're in the groove, but it wasn't happening today."

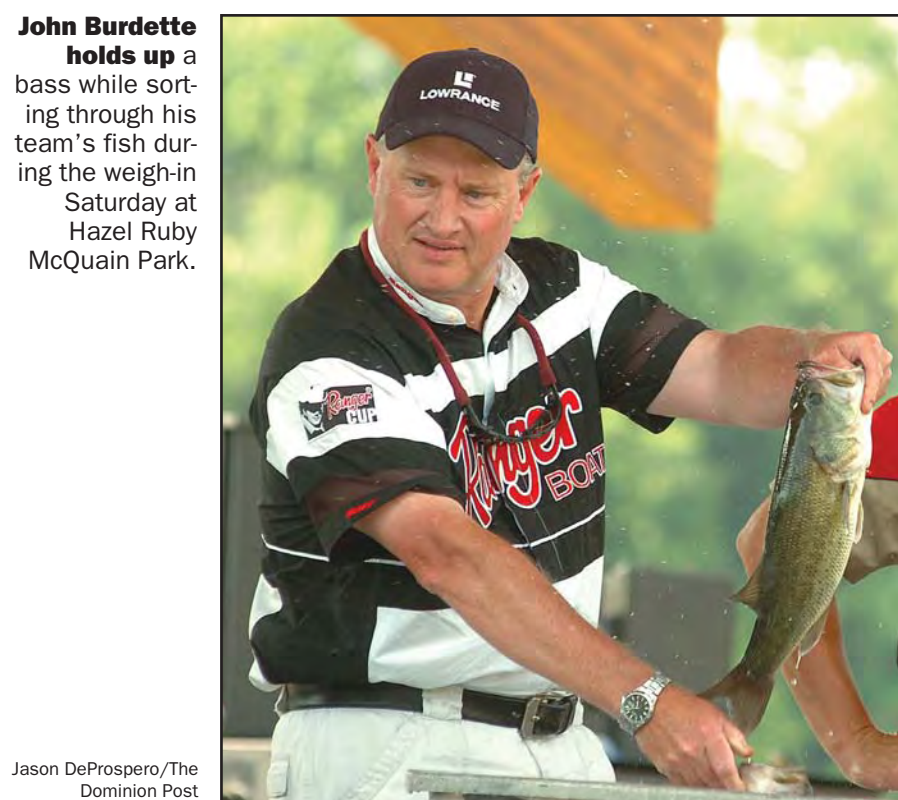
Burdette said despite the frustration, he and Matuga feel good about today.

Contador closes in on Tour title

Leipheimer wins the 19th stage

ANGOULEME, France — Alberto Contador of Spain all but locked up a Tour de France victory Saturday by holding off his top rival in the final time trial, though he became the latest rider to feel the sting of the doping allegations that have marred the race.

American rider Levi Leipheimer, a Discovery Channel teammate of Contador, won the 19th stage with a time of 1 hour, 2 minutes, 44 seconds in the 35-mile race against the clock from Cognac to Angoulême.

Contador lost most of his lead but still holds a 23-second advantage over Cadel Evans. Barring a crash or other mishap, the 24-year-old Spaniard is likely to bring home

the yellow jersey Sunday in the 20th and final stage — a 90.7-mile ride from Marcoussis to Paris' Champs-Élysées that is usually a processional ride with few chances for breakaways.

"I'm eager to go home and celebrate," said Contador, who was encouraged during the time trial by seven-time champion Lance Armstrong, who has ties to Discovery and was riding behind in a team car. "It wasn't an easy day."

The latest doping allegations didn't help.

French daily Le Monde, citing what it claimed was an investigation file it had access to, said Saturday that Contador's name, or initials, appeared in documents found at the apartment of Spanish doctor Eufemiano Fuentes, at the center of the Spanish doping probe known as Operation Puerto.

Contador said he was "sure" that he was not involved in the case, and insisted he was innocent. He said he

would give a DNA sample to prove it if asked, but wouldn't offer one if it wasn't requested "because I'm innocent and I don't have to prove anything to anyone," he said.

Contador inherited the leader's yellow jersey after former Michael Rasmussen was ousted Wednesday by his Rabobank team, which said the Dane had lied about where he was when he missed a doping test last month.

Italy's Cristian Moreni and pre-race favorite Alexandre Vinokourov were also ejected after testing positive for doping.

Evans, meanwhile, conceded that he had missed his chance to win, attributing his defeat to having fallen back in the Peyresourde climb in the Pyrenees at the beginning of the third week.

"I was close to winning the Tour de France," he said.

Contador's Discovery Channel teammates are likely to go all out Sunday to protect his lead, and ensure that rivals don't overtake

him on the ride up to the finish on the famed Paris avenue.

"We've won this Tour de France — barring a freak accident tomorrow," Leipheimer said of his team. "I am obviously very happy for Alberto."

A brief, discreet visit to Angoulême by Armstrong "motivated" the team, Leipheimer said.

If all holds, Contador will win with the second-closest margin of victory ever at the Tour. The record was American Greg Lemond's 8 second edge over France's Laurent Fignon in 1989.

"This Tour has been crazy, crazier than expected," Contador said.

Contador came into the stage with a 1 minute, 50 second lead over Evans — and Saturday's big question was whether he could hold off the Australian.

Leipheimer, who had come in 2:49 back of Contador in third place overall, now trails him by 31 seconds. It was his first stage win at the Tour.

Tour officials: McQuaid should resign

COGNAC, France — Tour de France officials launched a two-pronged assault on the cycling governing body Saturday, with the director saying the Tour will stop working with UCI and the owner calling for cycling chief Pat McQuaid to step down.

It's the latest move in a long-running feud between the two organizations, escalating this week after former Tour leader Michael Rasmussen and other cyclists were removed

Rasheed another Randle El

Ex-WVU star gives Steelers versatility

LATROBE, Pa. — Former WVU star Rasheed Marshall has been in the Pittsburgh Steelers' training camp only a week, yet he has heard the name Antwaan Randle El about, oh, a thousand times.

Randle El was the former Indiana quarterback who successfully shifted to wide receiver with the Steelers, playing four seasons with them before signing a big-money contract with Washington last year. Versatility was arguably Randle El's biggest asset, as evidenced by the 43-yard touchdown pass he threw to Hines Ward that sealed the Steelers' 21-10 Super Bowl victory over Seattle 15 months ago.

Marshall, a product of Pittsburgh's Hill District and a former City League star at Brashear High, watched that game following his first and only NFL season with San Francisco and couldn't help but wonder if he might make a play like that one day.

"If that's what the assignment may be, I definitely have a background in doing it," said Marshall, a three-year QB starter in high school and at WVU. "Running with the football in the open field, reverses, things like that. I'm sure when those things start up and I'm the guy called upon to do it, I'm going to step up and do it."

Marshall's size — the Steelers list him at 6-foot-1, but he was a quarter-inch short of 6 feet coming out of college — dictated the switch from career-long QB to wide receiver. The 49ers made him a fifth-round draft pick in 2005, but he caught only one pass that season. He was released at the end of training camp last year.

Marshall had trouble holding onto the ball while with San Francisco, even during practice, and he sat out the 2006 season before joining the Steelers in January. The signing attracted little attention because it came exactly a week after Bill Cowher's resignation and during the much-watched search that led to Mike Tomlin's hiring.

While his one season in San Francisco didn't work out well, Marshall expects to get a legitimate chance to make the Steelers' season-opening roster. They are not overloaded at receiver, and he might get the benefit of the doubt in any close competition because of his versatility. He can also return punts and kickoffs.

Uhh, remember that Randle El guy? While Randle El's statistics at Indiana are among the best for a quarterback in Big Ten history, Marshall's career at West Virginia was similar. A captain and team MVP, Marshall led the Mountaineers to a 24-12 record and was a Big East offensive player of the year. He ranks among the school and Big East career leaders in QB rushing (2,040 yards), touchdowns produced (68), career yards (7,598), TD passes (45) and passing yards (5,558).

Randle El and Marshall have spoken in the past, with Randle El offering advice to Marshall on how to make the position switch in the NFL.

"My agent was contacting a bunch of teams and had a lot of workouts set up, and he told me Pittsburgh was one of them," Marshall said, relating how he wound up with his hometown team. "I came here and did everything good and I'm pretty sure the scouting department liked what they seen."

With camp still not a week old, Marshall isn't letting himself think he must make more catches than this receiver or outrun that one to make the team.

"It's kind of early to look that far ahead," he said. "Right now, you're just trying to do everything you've got to do with your assignment. As the preseason goes along, you might start looking ahead a little bit. Right now I'm just trying to put my best foot forward and show case my talents."

Who is the real Vick?

Caring football star or brutal animal killer?

ATLANTA — There's more than one side to Michael Vick, the star quarterback.

This is a guy who can throw a football harder and farther than just about anyone on the planet, but that's only half the profile. He's one of the most thrilling runners the NFL has ever seen, slicing this way and cutting that way a la Barry Sanders, becoming the first at his position ever to gain 1,000 yards in a season with his legs.

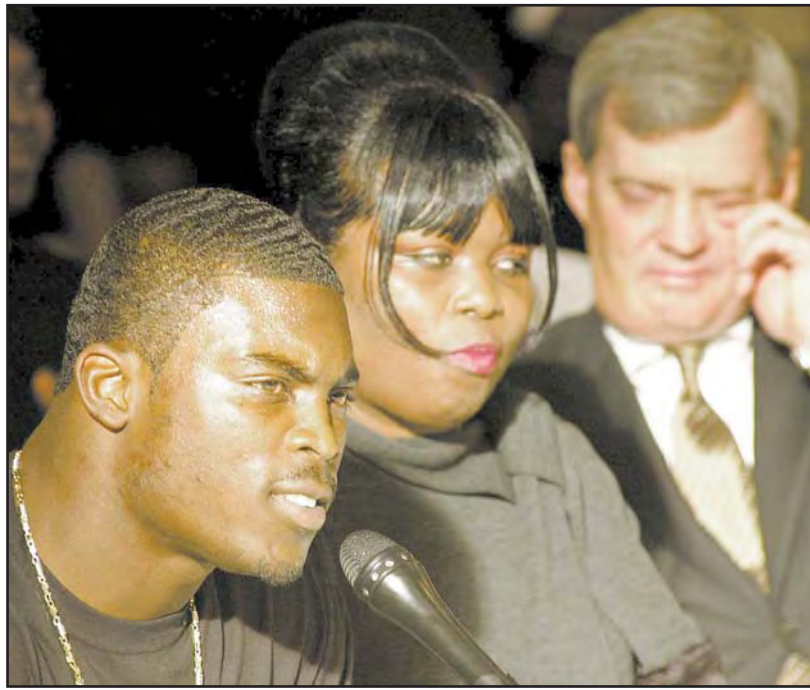
Maybe there's more than one side to Michael Vick, the person.

Everyone from family and friends to coaches and teammates describe him as a hard worker who cares for those around him, who never shows the sort of ego one would expect from someone of his staggering skills, who would rather hang out at home playing video games than go out on the town.

But a stomach-turning federal indictment portrays him as a sinister thug who used his big payday to satisfy a lust for blood, who turned dogs into killers and signed off on gruesome executions when they wouldn't fight, who never scrambled away from the shady friends or rites of manhood picked up on the hard-scrabble streets of Newport News, Va.

Who's the real Michael Vick? "There was no indication, no signs, no whispers that he could be involved in any of this kind of behavior," said Atlanta Falcons general Rich McKay, sounding as baffled as everyone else that Vick might have thrown it all away in the seedy underworld of dogfighting.

The charges still must be determined in court. If nothing else, though, it seems clear that Vick —

born 27 years ago to teenage parents and raised largely by his mother in a neighborhood where gangs and drugs and poverty were a constant reminder of one's standing in life — never quite shook off the code of the hood.

Machismo and loyalty help keep you alive from one day to the next. Not even a \$130 million contract, luxurious cars and a mansion in the suburbs can necessarily change that.

"It's difficult for people to understand, particularly the middle class and upper middle class," said Brian Colwell, a sociology professor at the

University of Missouri. "They just see it as a bad behavior, rather than a learned sense of how to survive."

Although the Falcons insist they had no indication Vick could be involved in dogfighting, there were warning signs from the beginning.

The first seeds of trouble were planted in an interview that Vick did shortly before he was drafted. He talked proudly of his interest in dogs and said he wanted to open his own kennel.

According to the feds, Vick did just that after signing with the Falcons, purchasing a house in rural Virginia and starting up "Bad Newz Kennels."

In 2005, he was sued by a woman who claimed Vick knowingly gave her a venereal disease and sought treatment under the alias of "Ron Mexico." In January, he was stopped at the Miami airport carrying a water bottle with a secret compartment that purportedly smelled of marijuana.

The lawsuit was settled out of court, and no charges were filed over the water bottle.

Of course, those incidents pale next to Vick's current troubles. If convicted, he could go to prison for five years, and his career likely would be over before he even reached his prime.

"He's like a brother," Falcons running back Warrick Dunn said. "It was definitely a surprise to me."

Coming out of high school, Vick wasn't even the most touted prospect in his own area, a coastal region known as the Tidewater. He was overshadowed by two-sport star Ronald Curry, who led his team to three straight state titles in football and one in basketball.

Vick was content to fly under the radar. He considered Syracuse but didn't want the pressure of trying to follow Donovan McNabb. He wound up staying closer to home at Virginia Tech after coach Frank Beamer assured Vick's handlers of a redshirt year to ease the transition to college.

"Mike became Mike at Virginia Tech," said Falcons cornerback DeAngelo Hall, another native of the Virginia coast who followed Vick to the Hokies.

"He didn't become Mike playing in Tidewater. Where we came up, it was all Ronald Curry. I think Mike would tell you the same thing. Ronald Curry was the guy everybody was going 'Wow' over."

pounds.

"This is the catch of a lifetime," Lilly said.

As the weights were tallied and large and small mouth bass flopped around, the day's leaders set the mark. The top three teams all had total weights of over seven pounds, while some unfortunate fishermen fell short at around one pound.

Some teams blamed recent storms for the muddy water, while others just cited bad luck.

"That's why it's called fishing and not catching," Lawrence said.

The rules for the competition are simple.

Fishermen have from 7 a.m. to 4 p.m. to fish the pools of the Monongahela for the two-day event. The limit is set at six fish, and a fish must be at least 12 inches long to qualify for the weigh-in. The cumulative two-day total determines which team will share the \$14,000 prize purse.

Arriving to the dock late, having a fish under minimum length and presenting a dead fish carry penalties.

Each dead fish takes eight ounces off a team's total weight, and each fish under 12 inches is a reduction of one pound. For each minute late, one pound is taken off the total catch weight, and any team more than 15 minutes late is disqualified.

When a team steps up to the stage to present their catch, they get to choose what they feel is the "big fish." Choosing the big fish wisely is important. There is a cash prize for the heaviest big fish each day, and if a tie occurs, the big fish is the deciding factor.

Emcee Chris Lawrence said competitors and officials do everything they can to keep the fish alive.

"We want to make sure [the fish] survive so we can fish for these beautiful bass for many years to come," Lawrence said.

Inkster soars, Wie sinks

After 3rd round of Evian Masters

EVIAN-LES-BAINS, France — Juli Inkster had a 3-under 69 Saturday for a two-shot lead and Michelle Wie ballooned to an 84 after the third round of the Evian Masters.

The 47-year-old Inkster is vying to become the oldest player to win an LPGA Tour event. She finished at 6-under 210 on a tough day for scoring because of swirling winds, tricky flag positions and difficult greens. Only seven players broke par.

"I played very well," said Inkster, who had five birdies and two bogeys. "I'm driving the ball well, I hit good irons and good wedges and I'm putting good."

Jang, Jeong of South Korea is second after a 72, followed another shot back by Sophie Gustafson of Sweden (72), Shin Ji-yai of South Korea (70) and Diana D'Alessio of the United States (76).

The 17-year-old Wie had the worst round of the day, shooting 12-over par to languish in 69th place. She had four double bogeys, five bogeys and one birdie in her round.

"It was frustrating," Wie said.

"My body would not do what my mind was telling it to do. I felt a little out of whack."

Wie, who is recovering from wrist injuries, shot a 71 on Friday. She had gone 24 consecutive rounds without breaking par. On Saturday, Wie hit only three of 14 fairways, five of 18 greens and had 32 putts.

"That is what happens when you recover, you have some bad days and you have some good days," she said. "But I'm still going to take some positives out if and work on it tomorrow. It was a very unfortunate round."

Two-time winner Annika Sorenstam (74), Natalie Gulbis (73) and Chung Il-mi (70) were four strokes

behind the leader.

Inkster, who won in 2003, needed only 26 putts, and credited her confidence on the greens to a recent putting lesson.

She laid up at the 18th hole with water in front of the green and hit a sand wedge to 3 feet for a birdie.

"If it was Sunday and I was behind by one, I'd go for it, but it was too risky a shot for Saturday," Inkster said.

If she wins Sunday, she'll top JoAnne Carner, who won the Safeco Classic at 46 in 1985. The Evian Masters became an official LPGA Tour event in 2000.

Defending champion Karrie Webb (73) and Laura Davies (74) were among four players five strokes back. Lorena Ochoa (75) is seven shots behind Inkster.

The 84th-ranked D'Alessio shared the second-round lead by three strokes with Jin-joo Hong, who struggled to an 80 Saturday. D'Alessio was leading the tournament at 8 under at the turn before she had a quadruple bogey at the 12th.

"What a nightmare," D'Alessio said. "I was cruising along then it was 'Welcome to reality.' The 12th was a comedy of errors ending with a four-putt."

Watson in hunt for Senior British title

Moves within one shot of leader Ginn

GULLANE, Scotland — Tom Watson showed flashes of his vintage links mastery with a 1-under 70 Saturday at Muirfield to put himself within one shot of leader Stewart Ginn after three rounds of the Senior British Open.

A five-time British Open winner at Carnoustie, Turnberry, Royal Troon and Royal Birkdale and the famous Muirfield links, Watson is a contender to win the title for the third time. He also won in 2003 and '05.

"It still burns a lot," Watson said of his hunger for winning titles, especially on links courses. "I said many times the reason I'm out here is to compete."

Ginn shot a 69 and stands at 3-under 210. Ginn, an Australian, bogeyed the first two holes but then didn't drop a shot in tricky wind. Former British Open champion Mark O'Meara is three strokes off the lead after a 70.

"It's not easy out there and you have to be patient and do the best you can," said Ginn, who won the Senior Players in 2002 but is looking for his first tournament victory in Europe. I've had a few chances over the years but I haven't nailed

one on the European Tour.

"I had a good time in America with that [Senior Players championship]. Those boys know how to play hard, so I feel this is a bit on our turf now. It's hard to beat them over there."

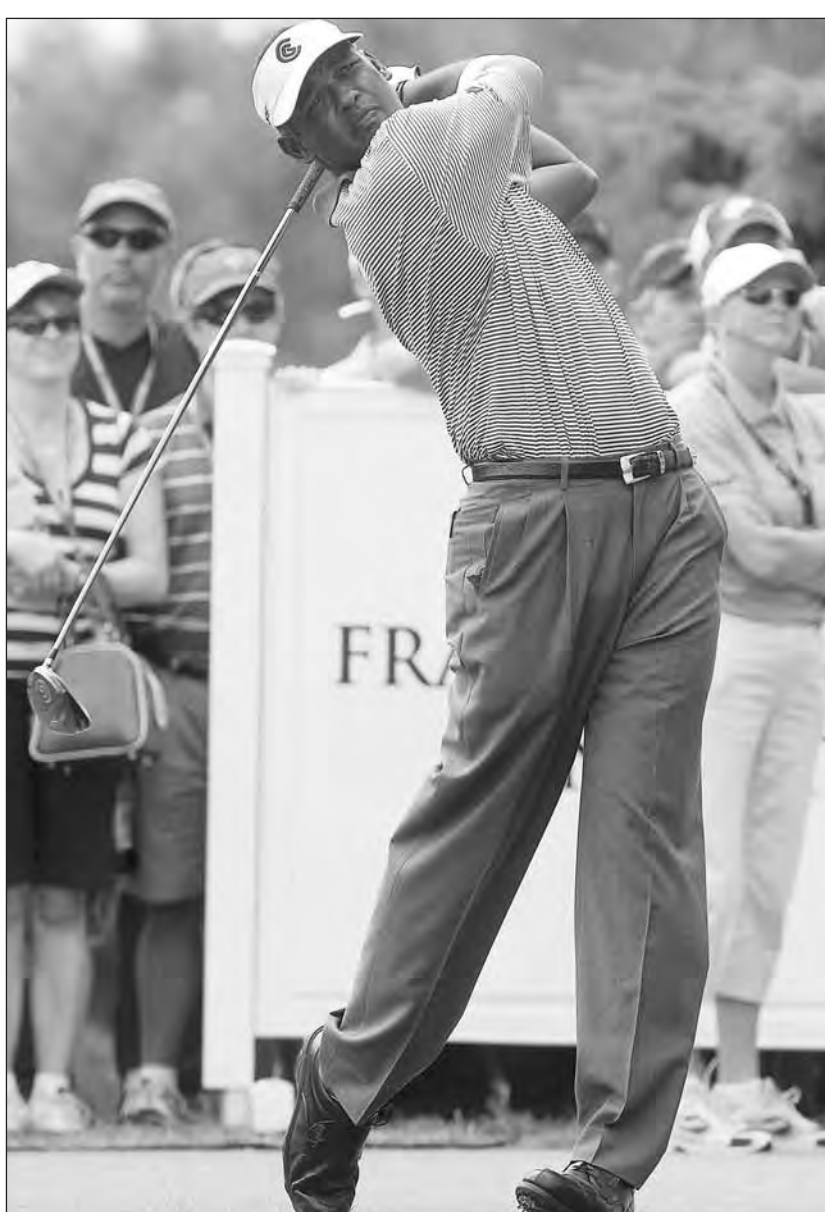
Nick Faldo, who is making his senior tour debut, slipped back for a share of 11th at 4 over after a 75. He was the co-leader after the first round.

Ginn, whose accurate approaches gave him birdie chances on most holes between the third and the 17th, is the only player to post a sub-70 round in two days. Watson has scored 70-71-70.

Watson began by firing his tee shot left into a fairway bunker for a bogey at the par-4 first, where only one player has birdied in the past two rounds. After that, he dropped only one more shot and made three birdies.

"I'm putting good again today. I'd like to make amends for what I did at the U.S. Senior Open," said Watson, who led after 10 holes of the final round at Whistling Straits but had a 43 on the back nine to finish fourth.

O'Meara, who won the British Open in 1998 to go with his Masters triumph that same year, has been consistent this week, finishing each round no worse than 1 over in strong wind made worse by deep, snagging rough.

Singh leads Open despite poor finish

Two late bogeys leave him with score of 68

MARKHAM, Ontario — Vijay Singh dropped his driver in disgust at the top of his backswing, thinking he'd hit into the lake down the left side of the 11th fairway.

But instead of dropping in the water, the ball skipped safely along the bank and he walked off the par-5 hole with an easy two-putt birdie.

The big Fijian wasn't as fortunate with some errant shots to the right, making two late bogeys en route to a 3-under 68 and a one-stroke lead Saturday in the Canadian Open. He had a 12-under 201 total on Angus Glen's North Course.

"I'm kind of disappointed with the way I finished," Singh said. "I thought I played better than a 68. I made a lot of mistakes that I normally wouldn't, but that's the way golf is. You know, you get good breaks out there as well. I got up and down a few times ... and got away with a bad tee shot on 11."

Singh, the 2004 winner at Glen Abbey in a playoff with Canadian star Mike Weir, won the Mercedes-Benz Championship and Arnold Palmer Invitational early this year to push his PGA Tour victory total

to 31. The three-time major champion has a tour-record 19 wins since turning 40 in February 2003.

"I've got to go out there tomorrow and play my game and make a lot of birdies and not make too many mistakes," Singh said. "I can't play conservative golf. There's so many birdie opportunities out there that I've got to attack the course, but smartly."

Steve Allan and John Mallingier, the second-round leaders at 10 under, were second after a pair of 70s in windy and hot conditions Saturday.

First-round leader Hunter Mahan (67) was 10 under, and Jim Furyk, the winner last year in Hamilton, had a 69 to join Pat Perez (66) at 9 under.

Allan took a share of the lead to the par-4 18th, but closed with a bogey after his second shot bounced over the green.

"Overall, I played well, but didn't hole enough putts," Allan said. "You know, I made a couple nice little par putts, but that's about it. That's my deal for tomorrow. Hopefully, I can keep hitting the ball well and hole some more putts."

The 33-year-old Australian is seeking his first PGA Tour victory after winning the 1998 German Open and 2002 Australian Open.

"If I could pull off a win on the PGA Tour, what better way to do it than with one of the best players?" Allan asked.

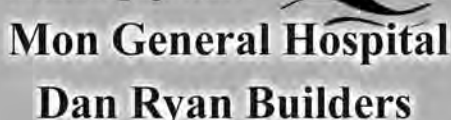

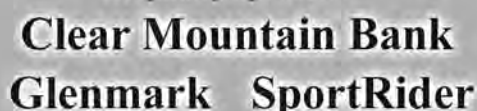

A French twist to shooting sporting clays

THERE IS ONE OTHER CLAY TARGET game that can be shot in a few places in this country. It's called FITASC (pronounced FEE-task).

It stands for Federation Internationale de Tri Aux Armes Sportives de Chasse. Yes, it's French and it has some rules that are much different than sporting clays.

FITASC came to this country after sporting clays. Other than in England, if you live in a European country, South Africa, or "down under" in Australia or New Zealand, and shoot clay targets, you would shoot FITASC. The targets are typically longer and faster than what you see in sporting clays.

One big difference between sporting clays and FITASC is the shotshell requirements. For 12 gauge sporting, you can use 1 1/8 ounce of shot in sizes from 7 1/2-to-9 with up to 3 1/4 dram equivalent of powder. About three years ago, FITASC changed the rule to allow no more than one ounce of shot. There has been some talk that sporting clays may go the same route.

A 100-bird FITASC course consists of

four parcours, or courses, with five or six traps each and three pegs or shooting stations, per parcours. Each parcours has 25 targets. Each of two pegs will have four single targets and two pairs. The third peg will have five singles. You can take two shots at the singles.

The game is usually shot with six people on a squad. The first person calls for the "show targets" so all of the shooters can see them before their turn to shoot. Then, all of the shooters shoot the single targets.

The next person in the order calls to view the pairs and he starts shooting first. The squad then moves to the second peg and the third person starts the singles. This rotation continues until all 25 targets

have been shot. The squad then moves to the next parcours and the rotation continues.

In sporting clays, you can call for the target with your gun already mounted. Not so in FITASC. Also, when it's your turn to shoot and you get on the station, you cannot practice mounting your gun. The gun must start from 25 cm, or 9.85 inches, down from the middle of the shoulder. Most shooting vests have a line on them just for this. If your vest doesn't have one, the judge will put one on with a piece of chalk. By the way, the French say that if this line is embroidered on your vest or coat, it can't be more than two centimeters wide.

When the shooter calls for the target, he can't mount the gun until the target is visible. If he mounts the gun when he hears the trap go off and can't see the target, he'll get a warning and has to shoot the target over. If he does it again or pre-mounts his gun on that parcours, he loses a target. Also, the gun must be touching the shooter's side prior to calling for the bird. FITASC shooting stations are not like

the "cages" or stands you shoot sporting clays from. All it is is a Hula Hoop-type circle on the ground. Once the shooter enters the circle, he can't leave unless he receives permission from the judge. Also, the shooter's feet can't touch the edge of the circle.

Also, if the rules are strictly enforced, there is no conversation among the shooters while someone is shooting. If the shooter misses a shot, the other shooters are not permitted to tell him why he missed such as, "You were behind it." The shooters can't discuss the targets amongst themselves until after everyone has shot.

Oh, it gets worse as only the French can do. This next rule is not too often enforced in this country, but you must shoot the game in long pants, shoes or boots, and have a shirt with a collar on it. No shorts, sandals, and T-shirts.

In sporting clays, when you call for the target, the trapper releases the bird. In FITASC, when the shooter calls for the target, the judge blows a whistle and the trapper releases the bird.

In sporting clays, you get to shoot the

same pairs of targets three or four times. If you miss the first ones, you have a chance to redeem yourself. This can't happen in FITASC because you only shoot each single once and the pairs once. The pairs consist of the singles, but you only get one try at each.

When shooting FITASC in England, shooters say their targets are faster than ours, but more straight forward in the sense that we often see closer and more curling targets than what are thrown across the pond. The English seem to do better in American competitions than vice versa. However, this is starting to change.

NOTE: If you've been thinking about a trip to Cabela's in Wheeling, come up on Sunday, Aug. 5, at 1 p.m. and take in the next DNR Commission meeting being held there. We will be voting on the 2008-2009 hunting, trapping, and fishing regulations.

Ayersman is right on target with his bow

WHEN I WAS A KID I LOVED shooting a bow, starting with a homemade stick bow, and moving up to a Bear Grizzly recurve when I was 10. My two brothers and I accompanied my dad and his friends to the local outdoor field range as often as possible. We shot bows in the evenings, weekends, summer, even winter.

The local archery club had an indoor winter range, and we shot there as well. All my extra allowance money went to pay to participate in summer bow shoots. I won some medals, and later some regional tournaments. We shot regular targets because there were no 3-dimensional animal targets that are so popular today. But it was still a lot of fun. And, if I do say so, I was a pretty good archer.

But not as good as Garrett Ayersman. Garrett is 13 years old and attends the Cheat Lake Middle School. He has been shooting a bow since he was six, and now shoots in the Cub Class of the International Bowhunting Organizations shoots. Garrett competed in the 2005 and 2006 IBO World Championships held at Snowshoe, placing 11th and 2nd, respectively, just one bullseye shy of 1st place at the World event. He has also competed in the IBO National Triple Crown Championships in 2006 and 2007, placing 3rd and 1st, respectively.

In order to qualify for an IBO National Triple Crown Championship title, you must participate in a total of 3 tournaments (legs). At each tournament you are required to shoot a total of 40 targets within a two day period. Going into the third leg of the event, the highest scoring 10-12 archers in each class are peer grouped meaning that these top scoring archers shoot together in groups arranged by the IBO. For the Cub Class, the animal targets range in distance from 5-to-27 yards, and the distances are unmarked. The center of each target varies from a spot the size of a dime, to one of 3 inches. Garrett hits the center on most of his shots.

The first leg of the 2007 IBO National Triple Crown was held in May in Bedford, Ind. Garrett took first place. The second leg was in June in Pennsylvania, and Garrett took first place. The third leg was in Nelsonville, Ohio on July 7th, and Garrett took first place, which made him the 2007 IBO National Triple Crown Champion in the Cub Division.

Shooting bows is fun, but winning

archery shoots is even more fun. Let me demonstrate how much fun Garrett has been having. Last year he won his Division of: the National Field Archery Association, WV State Indoor Championship; the Archery Shooters Association Delta Targets Pro/AM; the 2nd leg of the WV IBO Triple Crown; the WV State Championship of the Archery Shooters Assoc.; the Big East Challenge-3-Shoot Series; and the WV IBO State Championship.

In 2007 he has won the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd legs of the IBO Southern Triple Crown, the IBO Indoor Worlds, the NFAA WV State Indoor Championship, the Overall IBO Southern Triple Crown, the 1st, 2nd, and 3rd legs of the WV State IBO Triple Crown and the IBO National Triple Crown, as well as

the IBO National Triple Crown Championship.

Of interest is that the Cub Class 2006 IBO National Triple Crown Championship and IBO World Championship titles were won by Chance Graff of Burnsville while 3rd and 2nd place in each respective event was claimed by Garrett. The 2007 IBO National Triple Crown Championship was again won by a West Virginia youth (Garrett) with third place again going to a Parkersburg, youth, Taylor Campbell. Apparently our West Virginia youths are getting some great coaching and support from their parents. For winning the nationals, Garrett received a national champion jacket (that will look cool at Cheat Lake), a gold belt buckle, a plaque (of course), and a scholarship that

will cover in-state tuition for six quarters at Hocking Technical College.

His parents are Phil and Mary Ayersman, who own the Sportsman's Refuge sporting good shop and indoor archery range on Route 857. Does Garrett have any superstitions about shooting? Not really, but he has to have a big meal of barbecued ribs the night before a shoot. Garrett, you keep winning those college scholarships and your parents will gladly buy the ribs. Oh yes, lest I forget ... he shoots for the world championships in Anderson, Ind. Aug. 2-6. Good luck, Garrett.

GO FISH

MONONGAHELA RIVER — Fishing in the tailwaters has picked-up this week. Most species are attracted to the currents in the tailwaters of the locks and dams. Worms on a jig or with a sinker are easy to fish and have been very productive recently. Channel catfish can be caught on the Morgantown or Westover side of the dam using chicken liver or prepared stink baits. Start fishing for sauger and walleye about an hour before sunset because they will begin feeding at dusk. Jigs with minnows are particularly good baits but three-inch plastic grubs will also be productive. White or chartreuse are good colors. Large drum and carp are common along the shoreline between Deckers Creek and the dam. Warm water discharges at the Rivesville and Morgantown power plants are still attracting fish. A pier at the Morgantown plant makes fishing safe and convenient. This is also a good area for channel catfish and carp. The discharge at the sewage treatment plant below the Star City Bridge also attracts lots of fish, particularly carp. Largemouth bass anglers should fish the weed beds along the shoreline between Star City and the stone line.

CHEAT LAKE — The water temperature is 74 degrees at the surface, 72 degrees from 10 feet to 25 feet, 70 degrees at 35 feet and 63 degrees at 40 feet. Fish for yellow perch in 10-to-15 foot depths along the shoreline using a nightcrawler on a hook with a few split shot. Channel catfish are doing well and two-to-three pounders are abundant throughout the lake. The embayments at the Cheat Lake Park and Trail are good areas for bank anglers to catch sunfish and largemouth bass. The rock riprap on the lake side of the recreation area also holds lots of fish. Walleyes and channel catfish can be caught at night from the tailwater fishing pier. Jigs with minnows or three-inch power grubs are the best baits. White or chartreuse are good colors. Start fishing at dark when sauger and walleye begin feeding. Fishing from the pier is dependent upon power production, which can vary every few hours as the discharge location is changed from the turbines to the dam gates. The pier is located entirely in West Virginia about 25 minutes from Morgantown. Take U.S. Rt. 119 from Morgantown to Point Marion, Pa., turn right after crossing the Cheat River and proceed four miles to Cheat Dam. The parking lot is in Pennsylvania but the entire pier is in West Virginia. The pier is lighted for night fishing and is handicapped accessible. Keep track of the lake elevation and predicted daily changes in elevation on the Cheat Lake website at www.cheatlaketoday.com.

STONECOAL LAKE — The lake is five feet below summer pool, clear, and fishing has been good. Reports of trout being caught from boat and shore. All fish seem to be on the move. Bass have been caught in shallow water. Crappie and bluegill are hitting minnows around fish attractors. A few catfish have been caught in the evenings.

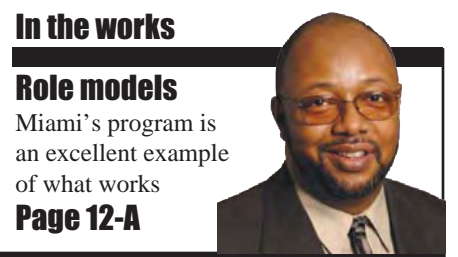

The trouble with being a parent

Teaching a teen about the truths in life can sometimes feel hypocritical

The conversation goes something like this: "Please don't wear your hat like that," the parent grumps. "People will get a bad impression." "I don't care what people think," the teenager shoots back, "especially if they aren't going to bother to get to know me." "You should care that they'll take one look and think you're something you aren't," the parent tries to reason. "But you've always told us not to judge a book by its cover," Mr. Smartypants one-ups again. "Rightly or wrongly, people do make judgments," you sigh. "That's the way life is. You've got to recognize that and try to live with it."

And then you feel bad, not just for reinforcing life's unfairness but for having to teach your kids that reality often contradicts principle.

Welcome to life with teenagers, that time when you get your words thrown back at you, get accused of hypocrisy and find yourself searching for Ward Cleaver wisdom in a world that June never imagined. (And we aren't even to driving yet.)

Even promoting the golden rule isn't always simple. You want your kids to believe that people are basically good and decent. And then you go to a sporting event and see teenagers innocently leaving their gear bags on bleacher seats. When I try to convey the concept of easy prey, my kids are certain that I'm paranoid and overprotective.

A couple of years ago, when my daughter's cell phone got swiped, I jumped all over her for leaving it in an open purse, inside an open gym locker while she retrieved some clothes. "But you ought to be able to trust your teammates," she cried. And how could I tell her she was wrong?

How do you teach that trust is one thing — a very good thing — but that obliviousness to lurking dangers is quite another?

We insist that our kids work hard because effort and merit will get them ahead. And then they discover on group school projects that there are slackers whose share of the work others have to pick up.

You could tell them it's different in the real world, but that would mean Dilbert had run out of material. And they need to know, don't they, that what you know is valuable but whom you know could prove priceless?

My teenagers resort to the "conflicting signals" defense when they feel stifled by my efforts to shepherd them through the minefields of adolescence.

When I recently objected to an expensive purchase that my son wanted to make, he parried with: "You tell me to act more mature. You say I need to take responsibility. But you won't let me decide how to spend my own money." Or words to that effect.

It's eerie how I channeled my own parents in response: "You don't get to make those kinds of decisions alone. You're still a minor, and I'm still in charge."

It's in the parental job description, you know, that you must check their seat belts, annoy them with checklists, consult with their friends' parents and repeat phrases you swore you'd never use.

I actually felt somewhat better about this after reading about growth spurts in teenage brains.

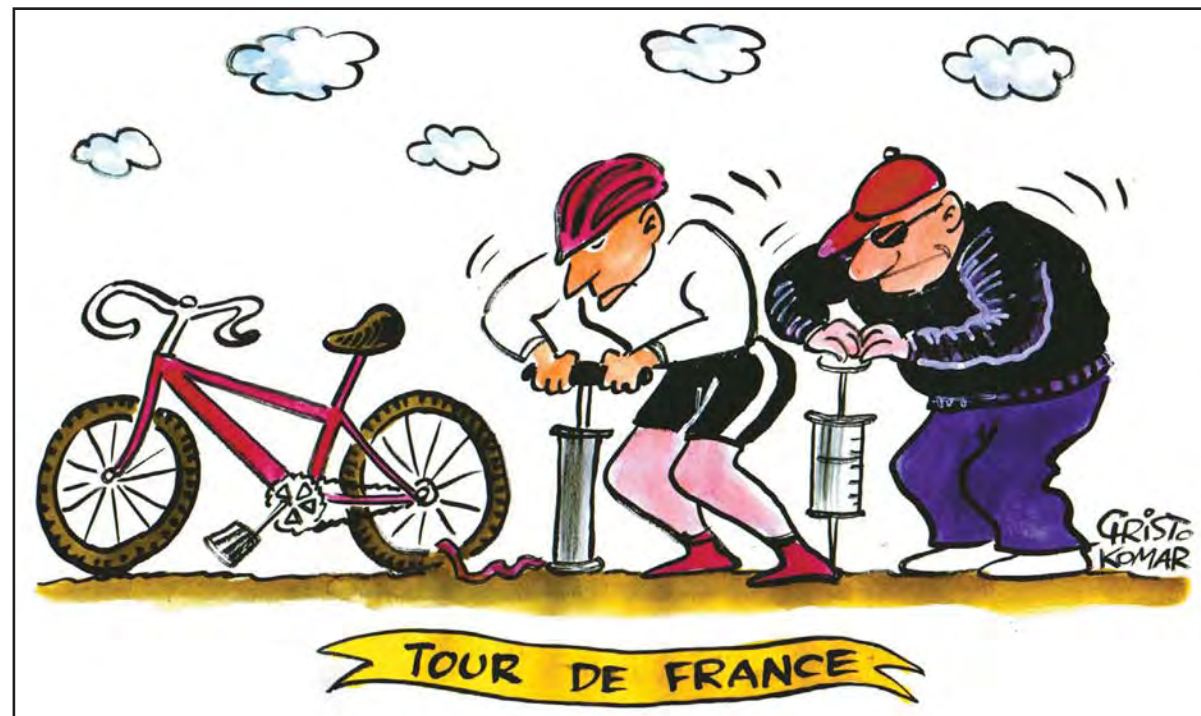
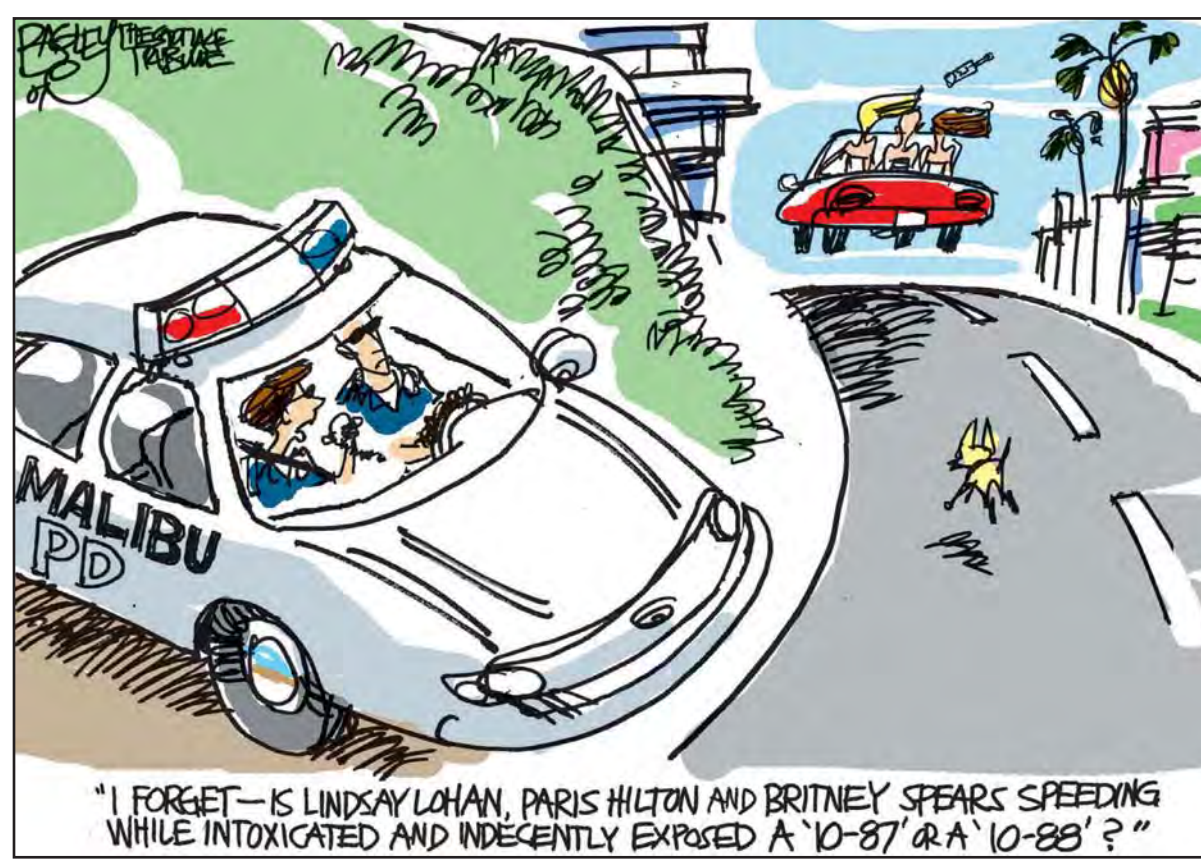
"It's the adolescent's job to keep pushing the boundaries. It's the parent's job to make sure those boundaries don't put a child in a place that is dangerous," said Andrew Brickman, a clinical researcher in Florida, in a piece by Jodi Mailander Farrell of *The Miami Herald*.

So you muddle through, trying to nurture their independence and individuality but making them comply with the dress code, play by the rules and appreciate the place of conformity in a free society.

You discuss (more often than they want to hear about it) how foolish short-term choices such as underage drinking, teenage sex, illegal drug use and text-messaging while driving can ruin long-term happiness.

And you trust — yes, trust — that they'll make sound choices even when you aren't hovering nearby.

Behind the smiles at YouTube debate

BY THE TIME JOHN EDWARDS got his first chance to speak in the latest Democratic debate, six of his seven rivals had answered questions, and both Barack Obama and Hillary Rodham Clinton had proclaimed themselves agents of "change."

Later, however, Edwards had some strong moments, including speaking out with emotion for universal health care and vowing to fight "big insurance companies, big drug companies, big oil companies." Yet most post-debate analysis focused on Clinton and Obama, a familiar pattern in the Democratic race.

When the former North Carolina senator began this presidential bid, it was widely believed that, like many repeat candidates, the experience of his unsuccessful first try would help him. But, like Sen. John McCain on the Republican side, the second time has not proved to be a charm.

His hopes depend almost entirely on keeping his tenuous lead in the Iowa caucuses, where he ran second in 2004. But that strategy is risky and could be disastrous if even a small number of his Iowa supporters decide later this year against voting for a candidate with dubious national prospects.

To be fair, only some of Edwards' problems are of his own making. Many reflect the changed circumstances of this political landscape compared with four years ago. They include:

■ In 2004, Edwards was the year's most attractive new face, dazzling crowds with his trial lawyer oratorical skills. But he was unimpressive as the party's

opposed the war from the start. Differences among the candidates seem fairly minor.

■ Edwards has handicapped his candidacy with mistakes. He undercut his effort to champion the fight on poverty by building a lavish North Carolina estate, accepting large fees from a New York hedge fund and for a college speech on poverty, and charging his campaign for the services of an expensive hair stylist.

Ironically, his campaign's biggest boost followed the disclosure by his wife, Elizabeth, in spring that her cancer had recurred. That may explain why the campaign has recently given Mrs. Edwards greater visibility, including unusual access for an interview about her fight against cancer in *The Wall Street Journal* and a starring role in a campaign commercial.

But her enhanced role backfired when Edwards said her husband was a better advocate on women's issues than Clinton.

Edwards' frustration over his inability to gain traction surfaced recently when he was overheard suggesting to Clinton the advantage of limiting the number of debate participants, presumably to front-runners. That prompted one rival, Rep. Dennis Kucinich of Ohio, to suggest they were trying to "rig" the election, a charge both denied.

Monday night's debate underscored his problem: the difficulty in sticking out in a field dominated by Clinton and Obama.

Democrats face off with the tipsters

IF YOU SEE SOMETHING, hire a lawyer. Then, perhaps, you can say something. That would be the new mantra for passenger vigilance — replacing the ubiquitous "If you see something, say something" — if Democrats get their way in Congress. They oppose an amendment to the homeland-security bill sponsored by Rep. Peter King, R-N.Y., that would protect anyone from civil lawsuits who, in good faith, offers a tip about suspicious activity on mass transit.

The case of the "flying imams" prompted King's amendment. On Nov. 20, six Islamic clerics were removed from a US Airways flight in Minneapolis, after passengers complained about behavior they considered suspicious. The imams prayed before boarding the plane, didn't sit in their assigned seats — arranging themselves in a pattern associated with the 9/11 hijackings — and asked for seatbelt extenders. Authorities questioned and eventually cleared them.

Twenty-first century America wouldn't be a boon to grievance-mongers of all varieties if such an incident didn't occasion a lawsuit. With the help of the Muslim pressure group the Council of American-Islamic Relations, the imams filed a discrimination suit against US Airways and the passengers who alerted the airline to their worries. The imams allege a "conspiracy to discriminate" against them that was "intentional, malicious, willful, wanton and callous."

This conspiracy was launched in the boarding area by "an older couple who was sitting behind them and purposely turning around to watch" them as they prayed. Then, the older gentlemen made a cell-phone call, and "while observing the Plaintiffs discretely, he kept talking into his cellular phone." We are supposed to believe that this man was just waiting to stumble upon a few Muslims whom he could arbitrarily inform on for no purpose other than denying them their rights under the 1964 Civil Rights Act.

Obviously, this wouldn't have happened if the men weren't Muslim, but fears of Islamic terrorism necessarily focus on Muslims. If the perpetrators of 9/11 and the Madrid, London and Bali bombings had been Episcopalian, a group of strange-acting priests traveling in their vestments would warrant an extra measure of suspicion. This is not discrimination, but a commonsense reaction to the facts of life.

Because we can't have police everywhere, civilian tips are indispensable. A video-store clerk alerted authorities to the Fort Dix plot after he saw a tape of men in Muslim attire firing guns — but not before he wondered, "Should I call someone or is that being racist?" Debra Burlingame points out that an airline employee who checked in two of the 9/11 passengers didn't ask for a special search of them because, "I was worried about being accused of being 'racist.'"

If the King amendment doesn't make it into law, people in such agonizing situations will have to worry not just about being called racist, but about being sued if their suspicions prove unfounded. The King amendment garnered 304 votes in the House and 57 in the Senate, but a majority of Democrats voted against it in both houses, and now Key Democrats are trying to keep it out of a House-Senate conference committee.

If only they took the terror threat as seriously as that man who may have to defend his cell-phone call in court.

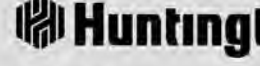

There are options when donating land to charities

LAND IS A COVETED and scarce asset in many parts of the world. In the United States, the average family's most valuable asset is its home. To carry out a special purpose they have in mind, some people decide to donate real estate to a favorite charitable or educational organization.

Another possibility is to donate a "remainder interest." That means the owner retains all lifetime rights and duties (such as maintaining the property), but the next owner will be the charitable organization.

This often works well when none of the heirs will be able to use the property after the owner dies. Using this method to make a charitable gift relieves the family of the effort of selling it.

Donating a primary residence, farm, vacation home or condo this way merely requires a new deed to transfer the remaining interest to the organization.

This is often an attractive choice for those who own rental property but no longer want to manage it. They can retain the income stream (and possibly increase it) through the donation but get rid of the "headaches."

Equally important is the benefit the organization will receive from your gift. The property can be used by the organization "as is" or it can be sold to fund a program or purpose that you feel is appropriate.

Think of all the good you can do! That's good planning.

Stockpiling for autumn and winter pays off

SUCCESSFUL AGRICULTURAL producers are hardworking, resourceful individuals. The originality and effort these folks use to overcome day to day challenges never ceases to amaze me. Yet, even those who overcome the current challenges of today don't fair nearly as well as those who also put some time and effort into planning for the next week, month or season.

Even though we are in the middle of the summer, "The time to plan for autumn and winter grazing is now," said Chris Penrose, Extension Agent, Athens County, Ohio. For years we have heard how much we can save by stockpiling forages for fall and winter grazing. Now is the time to consider your options for these crops to extend your grazing season.

Stockpiling fescue and orchard grass require the least effort and cost to extend the grazing season. Stockpiling can begin anytime from the middle of July through early September. The earlier you begin to stockpile, the higher the yields tend to be. You can use hayfields after second cutting or pasture fields after grazing and clipping. Simply let the grass grow until fall when the other pastures become short. Fifty pounds of nitrogen is an ideal amount of fertilizer to stimulate growth — the fertilizer should be applied when stockpiling begins.

The results should provide up to two tons per acre of forages that can be utilized during the winter months. Orchard grass should be grazed by the end of the year because it tends to deteriorate more rapidly than tall fescue. Fescue can be grazed in good years virtually through the winter. Cattle learn to graze through heavy snow accumulations. Cattle can graze through 18-20 inches of fresh snow as long as a good supply of ungrazed forage is available under the snow.

If you want to extend your grazing season this year, Dr. Ed Rayburn, forage specialist, WVU Extension Service, has a few management tips:

- Select a pasture or hay field, and graze or hay it off by late July or mid-August.

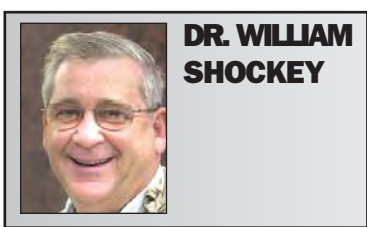
- Apply 50 to 60 pounds of nitrogen per acre using ammonia nitrate, ammonia sulfate or urea. If a recent soil test indicates that soil phosphorus is low, using diammonia phosphate at 100 to 200 pounds per acre will provide 18 to 36 pounds of nitrogen and 46 to 92 pounds of phosphate.

- Keep livestock out of the field until late October to early December, depending largely on when other pasture is grazed off and when your animals need the feed.

- If the field has predominant orchard grass or bluegrass, start grazing in October or November so that it will be eaten off before early December. These grasses are killed by freezing weather, and they brown down to where cattle will not eat them well past early December. Smooth brome grass and reeds and canary grass are even more sensitive than orchard grass to freezing and should be grazed off earlier.

- Tall fescue can be grazed from December through March, depending on when your animals need it. Strip grazing will allow you to get the most grazing days from an area of stockpiled grass.

- Give the animals only enough area to feed them for three to six days. If stockpiled tall fescue has been fertilized with nitrogen, its crude protein content will be adequate for beef cattle in December and January. If no nitrogen fertilizer is used or if there is a lot of rainy weather in December and January, the animals may need a protein supplement when grazing

fescue in February and March. Forage testing and knowing your animal's feed requirement will tell if and how much supplemental protein is needed.

For more information about the benefits of extended grazing and whether it's right for you, contact your local extension agent.

Garden Tips

- Tomato plants infected with late blight develop greenish-black, water-soaked blotches on the leaves. Under moist conditions, these blotches enlarge rapidly. A white, fuzzy growth of fungus may also be seen on the undersides of the leaves. Infected plants eventually wither and die. Elongated black cankers develop on the stem and leaf petioles.

- If disease symptoms are noticed, or if early or late blight has been a problem in the past, follow a 7-day fungicide spray schedule with Doconil, Mancozeb, copper fungicide, or other properly labeled fungicide. As always, if you use pesticides, follow the label directions.

(Hey, we grew up during the Cold War, and my dad was in the military. Russian spies were about as scary as it got.)

This all pales in comparison, however, to my friend Caren's big brother, who used to chase and corner her, then, looming inches in front of her tear-stained face, would mock her by belting out that Melissa Manchester tune:

"Don't crrryyyy oouuuu loouud/ Just keep it inside/ and learn how to hide your feelings..."

You can't make this stuff up. I mean, *Melissa Manchester*.

And these are the older siblings Norwegian scientists would have us believe are so much smarter than we are.

OK, granted, we did fall for this stuff. But we were little. What was their excuse for coming up with such bad material?

In case you missed it — which means you must not be the oldest in your family, as I'm sure every older sibling in America (and Norway, no doubt) has been quoting this study for weeks — scientists announced recently that they have conclusive proof that older siblings are more intelligent, tend to score better on standardized tests and, for the most part, go to better colleges.

Apparently, researchers looked at IQ scores in 250,000 men signing on for mandatory military service. In the pairs of siblings reporting for duty — 60,000 in all — they noticed that, in nearly every case, there was a "significant difference" in the brothers' scores. I may still be sketchy on what the heck an integer is exactly, but when it comes to common sense, I'd say that, for the most part, I've been blessed with a bit more.

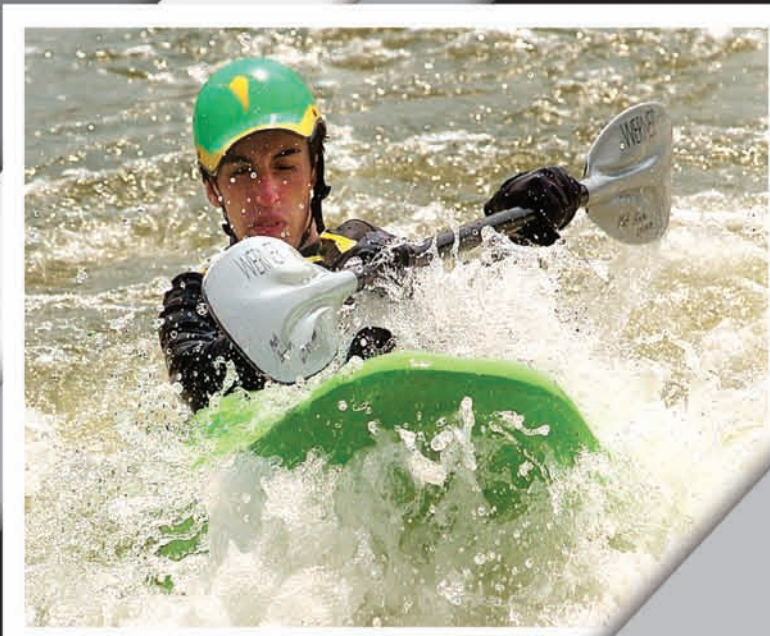

Whitewater RUSH



Adventure Sports Center offers man-made thrills

Have you ever set out on a whitewater rafting adventure only to learn the water wasn't right for your level of expertise? Have you ever wished for an adjustable whitewater river?

Well, there is one, and it's not far away.

The Adventure Sports Center International opened Memorial Day weekend near Wisp Mountain Resort in McHenry, Md. The unique course is man-made and offers all levels of whitewater adventure, from "take your grandmother" rafting to Olympic slalom runs.

The one-third mile course features six adjustable features — wave shapers and depth adjusters — that control the ferocity of the water. It drops 25 feet in elevation in that short distance.

Control of the water makes it ideal for beginners and it will likely also be used as a training facility for those aiming for Olympic whitewater competition.

The inspiration for the course came in 1989 when Olympic trials were held nearby on the Savage River, ASCI marketing coordinator Jesse Shimrock said. "There was a group that decided the sport could use an adjustment. Seventeen years later, here we are."

The "adjustment" Shimrock refers to is control of the course — something desperately needed in an Olympic slalom competition. When *The Dominion Post* visited the course on the day of its official opening, the pool was jammed with first-timers and Olympians. Two rafters just coming out of the water when we arrived could initially find only one word to describe their whitewater experience: "Awesome."

Maggie Lemak, of Deep Creek, and Lisa Hanson, who was visiting from Washington, D.C., found their voices after a few minutes, but very few new words.

Both had rafted before, but said the man-made course was just as exciting as the whitewater they'd experienced before. Hanson said she saw one clear advantage to the ASCI course — safety.

"I've rafted in a real river before," she said, "and this is real similar and a lot of fun. But this felt safer. Even when someone flew out [of the raft] it felt safe. I didn't ever feel like someone wouldn't have seen if we fell out. In fact, falling in was the best part."

"This was my first time here," Lemak said, "but I'll definitely

"McCormick, 17, of Springfield Township, started at 11:50 a.m. in Row N in right field. He finished around 3 p.m., two hours before gates opened for the game against the Newark Bears. " 'It'll hurt in the morning, but right now I don't feel anything,' McCormick said in the middle of his quest. "The Revolution said this would serve two purposes: It'll bring luck and I'll get to check all of the chairs. " 'Alas, the Revolution lost the game 7-4. " Did you know that if you Google the words "childhood," "innocence" and "useless activities" together, you'll get 54 matches, including an abstract on "The Paradox of Child Labor and Anthropology," a lot of mysticism references (most of them negative) and plenty of sermons about how God and humanity frown on frivolity. You know, the proverbial "idle mind is the devil's playground" sort of stuff. My uncle Norman had a story he loved to tell about my brother Ed and several hundred telephone poles. Two conditions had to be in place before he'd tell it, though. First, he had to have an audience. A half-dozen relatives sitting around reminiscing would do nicely. And second, Ed had to be among the reminiscers. After all, what fun is it reviving humiliating little childhood scenarios unless the subject is there to endure the revival? So the story goes that my uncle was driving around town running errands and my two brothers were in the front seat, just along for the ride. Ed was about 8 at the time. Joe was 9. And variations of the tale included an assortment of older cousins or other passengers in the backseat, too, but it didn't really matter. "The kids were all laughing and carrying on," Uncle Norm told his listeners every time. "But not Ed. He was sitting over there real quiet, just staring out the window, deep in thought. " "This went on for quite a while, and he was so serious I started to get a little concerned. " "Eddie," I said. "What are you doing?" "Countin' telephone poles." There was always laughter at that point in the story, and not the least of it from Ed. There was amusement at both the innocent uselessness of certain childhood activities and the way that my uncle, chuckling — with love and with clear admiration for my brother, the man — would put his arm around Ed's shoulder and kiss him on the cheek. "And right then and there," he always concluded, "I knew the kid was never gonna amount to much, you know what I mean?" If I've told this tale correctly, you'll understand that Eddie, Uncle Norm, the York Revolution's No. 1 Fan, and I see nothing whatsoever wrong with spending a little time on the less important things in life. It's a respite. It's a little like taking a yoga class, only cheaper.

Small loans help Mexico's working poor

SAN CRISTOBAL DE LAS CASAS, Mexico — Give a poor woman a loan to help her weave skirts or bake tortillas, and soon her business, her family and her self-image improve.

So it was with Esperanza Perez Garcie, 52, who sells tacos and other foods at her little restaurant in the artisans' marketplace here. Her one-room kitchen and dinette faces a covered patio that fills with noise as southern Mexico's rainy season sends its daily deluge spilling down the mountains. Customers welcome the shelter, and the quesadillas and chalupas sell for 50 cents apiece.

Garcie, her sister and her daughter have turned their \$600 loans from Al Sol (Alternativa Solidaria Chiapas A.C.), a lender supported by developer Lucy Billingsley and other Dallas women, into small profits. Interest on the loans works out to 36 percent a year — steep, but better than what the banks offered.

"Al Sol — bless them," Garcie said. "The banks don't want to help me. I don't know who they're helping. It's not the poor, or those who need it."

That may be changing. Small profits are, after all, profits. Commercial banks are beginning to show interest in uncollateralized small loans for the poor that until now were the province of philanthropists.

Some of the philanthropists, meanwhile, are working to lure profit-seeking capital.

"Over the next 10 years, I think this field is going to explode like crazy," said Roy Jacobowitz of Accion International, another nonprofit with hundreds of microfinance outlets across Latin America. It started making small loans in 1971 in Recife, Brazil.

This could be good news in the fight to reduce poverty around the world.

Microfinance is one of the few broadly successful strategies for helping the poor. It gives the poorest entrepreneurs access to the crucial financial tools of capitalism as well as the support of peers who offer advice, fellowship — and pressure to make sure the loans are paid back.

Money not repaid by one entrepreneur often must be raised from other members of the group.

Accion International has lent \$12.3 billion over the years to 4.9 million women and men.

Al Sol operates under the direction of the Grameen Foundation, a U.S. foundation inspired by Grameen Bank. The bank was started in 1976 by Muhammad Yunus of Bangladesh. Since then, Grameen has lent \$6.2 billion to more than 6 million borrowers. Last year's Nobel Peace Prize went to Yunus and his bank.

Although there's no collateral for such loans, both Grameen and Accion say repayments average better than 97 percent. Both groups target women rather than men, because women have proved more likely to invest their earnings in their families.

"A woman gets opportunity and responsibility hand in hand," said Billingsley, founder of Al Sol's Chiapas Project. The project gets its name from the poorest state in Mexico, where the town of San Cristobal de las Casas is located.

Billingsley is also one of the backers for a \$32 million guarantee fund for Grameen Foundation loans that's being administered by Citicorp. The Washington-based foundation hopes to attract enough backers for a

\$50 million guarantee fund by the end of the year.

Both Grameen and Accion also have microfinance chapters in Dallas, where they make small loans to low-income businessmen and women.

In 2003, Billingsley took 30 Dallas women to Chiapas to see the poverty and the work of Al Sol.

They went home and raised \$790,000 for Al Sol's lending capital, which now goes to more than 12,000 women in the state. The women use the loans to grow their businesses, from weaving skirts, to embroidering blouses, to running tacquerias.

"When she succeeds, she has increased self-worth," Billingsley said of the women Al Sol helps. "On the family side, when a mother is a success, her children see new opportunity and hope through her eyes."

Hundreds of millions of other poor people could benefit from programs like these, but they haven't spread that far because, some argue, microfinance has relied too much on donors for capital. If mainstream bankers are persuaded that microfinance is a profitable business, capital should no longer be a problem.

But there's a tension between the profit-seekers and those who feel it's morally



wrong to profit from the poor.

Donald Terry, with the Inter-American Development Bank, tries to persuade reluctant Latin American bankers to jump in by citing higher returns.

"What aren't you getting here?" he asks. "For the last several years microfinance has been the most profitable and least risky part of the Latin American financial sector."

But Alex Counts, president of the

Grameen Foundation in the United States, isn't so eager for the arrival of traditional banks: "I always wonder whether that's good news or bad news."

While commercial banks might skim off some microfinance customers who are less wealthy than their usual clients, Grameen affiliates go to the poorest first, Counts said. "We want to start at the absolute bottom and build up to where the banks left off," he said.

Vets attempt to solve quirky pet problems, behaviors

THE FOLLOWING READER questions were answered at the 144th Annual Convention of the American Veterinary Medical Association in Washington, D.C., July 16, during a meeting of the American College of Veterinary Behaviorists/American Veterinary Society Animal Behavior.

Q: My 10-year-old poodle continually walks around in circles when we walk her. Also, when we're watching TV or just sitting in the living room, she walks in circles around the room a dozen times and then decides to jump up on the sofa. What can we do about this? — C.S., Boynton Beach, Fla.

A: Dr. Sophia Yin, who serves on the AVSAB board of directors and is also an applied behaviorist, suggests teaching your dog how to walk with a Gentle Leader head halter collar. This would physically prevent her from circling. However, you also want to teach her an alternative behavior so she no longer even wants to circle. Teach her to sit when you put on the halter. Then, using treats, lure her to walk by your side.

Yin, who also teaches animal behavior at the University of California at Davis, says to put the same Gentle Leader on your dog indoors. Have your pup sit as you put on the

leader. Then, either immediately allow her up on the sofa (using a command such as, "jump"), or offer a Kong toy or some other toy with food stuffed inside to distract her.

Q: Our 4-year-old Pomeranian loves to pump pillows. We can't stop her unless I close the doors to every room where there's a pillow. She doesn't pump people's legs like most dogs; she just pumps pillows. How do we stop her? — S.T.M., Brooksville, Fla.

A: "First, you have to understand what's happening in the first place," says AVSAB member Dr. Wayne Hunthausen, of Westwood, KS. "This behavior isn't sexual in nature but she does like it; it feels good, it's self-rewarding."

Hunthausen's advice is to allow your dog to think about a pillow, look at a pillow, but not actually get within proximity to be able to "pump it." Just as she's about to walk up to a pillow, in a very excited voice, call your dog while you're holding a stinky

liver treat. Even if your voice doesn't get her attention, the smell will. When your dog turns around and pays attention, reward her. Tell her "sit," then offer the treat.

Here's what you're going for: Every time your pooch looks at a pillow, she'll think about the possibility of getting a treat. To be successful, you'll have to be sure to supervise whenever there's an available pillow. If you're not there to watch your dog, then close doors or remove pillows. While "pumping pillows" may be fun, odds are your dog will think eating treats is even better.

Hunthausen offers a second, far easier option: "Let the dog 'pump pillows.'" Why not? We all have our vices, right? Unless the pillows are getting smashed, there's no harm. If you're worried about what guests will think, remove pillows when you have company.

Q: My 6-year-old cat is attracted to tape. Whenever she hears tape being used, she comes running because she wants to eat it. Why does she crave tape, and is it harmful? — A.B., Cyberspace

A: Veterinary behaviorist Dr. Kelly Moffat, of Mesa, Ariz., admits that "sometimes there's no really good answer (for such behavior) except to say, your cat just likes it. A little piece of tape is probably not

harmful, but eating tape regularly is not a good idea."

When you need to use tape, either put yourself in a room and close the door, or put your cat in a room away from you and close that door. In fact, if your cat is never again exposed to tape, over time she may lose interest.

If you're trying to wrap some-

thing, you'll do better without your cat around anyway. It's pretty tough to wrap gifts with cats around.

Cataracts develop over time

CLOUDY VISION, difficulty reading or driving a car — especially at night — or sensitivity to light, are just some of the symptoms someone with cataracts may experience.

Clouding of the lens is a normal part of the aging process. Cataracts generally develop slowly over time and do not interfere with your vision in the early stages. Once the cataract has progressed and begins to interfere with your sight, you may need surgery to restore your vision. This is one of the safest and most effective surgical procedures.

Cataracts develop slowly and without pain. You may not even notice a change in your vision at first. As the cataract grows clouding your lens and allowing less light to reach the retina your vision may become impaired. Cataract symptoms include:

- clouded, blurred or dim vision
- increasing difficulty with vision at night
- the need for brighter light for reading or other activities
- halos around light
- fading or yellowing of colors
- frequent changes in eye-glass or contact lens prescriptions

Cataracts are generally not harmful to the health of your eye unless they become white. This condition is referred to as an overripe cataract or hypermature. Symptoms associated with this condition are inflammation, pain and headache and is very uncommon. Cataract removal is necessary if pain and inflammation are present.

With age being the greatest risk factor it appears that we all may be destined for cataracts at some point in our lives.

It is estimated that by age 65 about half of all Americans will develop some degree of lens clouding (mayoclinic.com).

Other risk factors include:

- family history of cataracts
- diabetes
- smoking
- excessive exposure to sunlight

- previous eye surgery, injury or inflammation

You might be asking, "What can I do?" Regular eye examinations are important for early detection. If you are over the age of 65, schedule an exam at least every other year or discuss this with your doctor. During the examination the following tests may be performed: visual acuity test, slit-lamp examination and a retinal examination.

Eating a balanced diet with plenty of fruits and vegetables, not smoking, wearing sunglasses when outdoors and taking care of other health problems (like diabetes), may help you slow the development of cataracts.

August is Cataract Awareness Month. What better time to schedule an appointment to be examined for cataracts especially if you are experiencing any of the symptoms or have any of the risk factors mentioned?

Sometimes the shoe doesn't fit

Specialized support depends on activities

MIAMI — You wouldn't dare wear flip-flops to go running, so why wear running shoes to play basketball?

Because they're comfortable? Bad answer. "Someone playing basketball wearing running shoes with no lateral support, or returning from jumping motion with no stability" could end up with a serious inversion ankle sprain, said Dr. James Losito, professor of podiatric biomechanics at Barry University in Miami Shores.

That is, the ankle rolls outward, ligaments stretch and tear and tendons can be damaged. It's a common sports injury Losito sees, but it can be avoided by wearing the right shoes.

In Morgantown, those wearing flip-flops during a summer evening walk up High Street or through the Morgantown Mall are making a mistake, said local podiatrist Dr. David Gleitzman.

"Flip-flops are not stable enough for those activities," Gleitzman said. "They are made for casual things like walking from the couch to the shower."

Especially not for playing soccer, Gleitzman added, and yes, he's seen patients who suffered sprained ankles from playing soccer in sandals.

Manufacturers put a lot of science into their products, especially running shoes, analyzing arch types, body frames and runners' weight and mileage, said Dave Marr, a sales running specialist at roadrunnersports.com.

The midsoles of running shoes tend to be more durable and more shock-absorbing than other athletic shoes. Asics, for example, uses gel in the heel and forefoot of its shoes for shock absorption.

"Most people pronate — roll in toward the big toe," Marr said. "They need cushioning and stability..." Someone with an average arch needs moderate stability. Runners with flat feet need more stability and motion control because they tend to over-pronate."

Specialty stores will take into account your mileage and pace and watch how your foot falls when you walk or jog. They'll also examine your old shoes.

"It really depends on their stance, if they over-pronate, under-pronate, how their stride is... whether they run long distances," said Anthony Gomez, a 20-mile-a-week runner.

Whatever your sport, "you should have a thumb-width of room from your longest toe to the end of the shoe — a half-inch to an inch," Losito said.

Consumers should look for several important qualities when shopping for shoes,

Shoe shopping

Shopping for athletic shoes? The American Podiatric Medical Association recommends you:

- Stand when having your feet measured.
- Try on both shoes and walk or jog around the store.
- Avoid shoes that are not comfortable.
- Go shopping later in the day because feet tend to swell during the day.
- Be sure that the widest part of your foot corresponds to the widest part of your shoe.
- Try on shoes while you're wearing the same kind of socks you expect to wear with the shoes.
- If you wear prescription orthotics, take them along to shoe fittings.

Gleitzman said. Comfort in shoes is typically dependent on the sole's leverage, stability and shock absorption. If feet occupy the wrong kind of shoe for too long, problems like plantar fasciitis and sprains can occur.

The Achilles' tendon may also tire during activity and create heel pain the following morning.

When it comes to buying shoes, Gleitzman confirmed a correlation between the cost and quality of the shoe. "A \$39.95 running shoe might not have all of the bells and whistles you may be looking for," he said. "You are getting something for your money."

Here are tips for buying the right shoe for your sport — courtesy of Losito and the American Podiatric Medical Association.

Running
Losito: Look for increased cushioning because the shock transmitted to the body is greater when running.

APMA: Maximum shock absorption helps runners avoid shin splints and knee pain. The shoe should control the way your heel strikes the ground. Know your foot type (high, medium, low arch) so you have the right shoe.

What to look for: Shop at a store so you can test them.

Cross trainers
Losito: Cross trainers are fine for someone doing minimal running.

What to look for: Stability. Most cross-trainers have a wider outsole than running shoes.

Walking
Losito: A walking shoe has a more curved shank to allow for rocking motion. If you're power walking, you can use a running shoe.

APMA: Look for a stiff heel, check for toe flexibility and make sure the shoe is rigid in the middle to accommodate the rocking motion.

What to look for: The shoe should bend at the ball of your foot, not the arch.

Basketball
Losito: A basketball shoe is designed to stabilize the ankle.

APMA: A thick, stiff sole gives support while running and landing from jumps. A basketball shoe should have the strongest support on each side of the ankle.

What to look for: Stability. Ankle protection. The shoe should match your arch type.

Cleats
Losito: Cleats are good for soccer, American football and baseball on dirt, artificial turf or grass, specifically bermuda grass. Cleats should be from one-sixteenth to one-half inch.

APMA: When wearing cleats or spikes for the first time, watch for blisters, redness or other irritation, which could indicate a biomechanical problem in the legs or feet. If cleats cause pain, stop wearing them. If the pain returns, see a podiatrist specializing in sports medicine for evaluation.

What to look for: Turf football shoes have rubber molded cleats for traction. Short metal studs are ideal for hard, dry surfaces; long studs for wet, muddy surfaces. Soccer cleats help keep the player's center of gravity low.

Beginners and intermediate players should wear molded cleats. Removable studs are suit-

Obviously a surgical approach to any problem — even one that unquestionably calls for surgery — poses extremely high risk.

Today's seniors proudly wear natural color

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — Once upon a time, women would curse their gray hair and reach for the dye to cover it up.

Or they'd eventually cave in and drench themselves in that ghostly purplish-blue rinse — the one that turns the shade of the Rocky Mountains at dusk. It was like the mark of the old-age beast.

But with salt falling on their heads like a blizzard, baby boomers are, as usual, opting to do it their way. So long, stigma, hello gray. It's a fashion statement showing up more and more, even in Hollywood (think of a classy-looking Meryl Streep in "The Devil Wears Prada" or the radiant Helen Mirren at the Oscars).

"Baby boomers aren't afraid. They led the way in coloring hair and now that they are older, they don't hesitate not to color their hair either," says Greg Chavez, owner of J.GREGORY, an upscale Colorado Springs, Colo., salon.

Greg (he uses only his first name professionally) and other stylists are even telling their baby boomer customers to flaunt their gray hair, even though they could make millions of dollars covering up the

gray every few weeks.

"Keeping the gray out is just too much trouble for most women," says Hillary Hand from J.GREGORY.

Gray hair is coarse, and although color products are a lot better than they used to be, it is hard to cover the gray — and keep it covered. It takes frequent trips to the salon to avoid looking as if a skunk were walking down your part line.

Besides, gray hair is like a trophy, showing off a woman's wisdom, confidence and elegance, Hand says.

"It's beautiful, and it is less maintenance" Greg says. "But you have to have a young hairdo to go with it, so it doesn't look like those old, set waves."

Marcia Wurm, 51, who works at Rich Designs Home in Colorado Springs, says she is stopped on the street by women wanting to know how she got her fabulous color. Turns out, she didn't do anything: It's naturally gray.

"I got sick of coloring it. I didn't know how much gray I had, so I cut my hair shorter and shorter as I let the gray grow out," she says.

If your hair is more than 75 percent gray, you should just let it go, Greg says. But that can be a problem; some women don't have any idea how much gray they have because they have colored their hair for so many years. The roots on the crown are often more gray than the rest of the hair, so it can be hard to tell just how gray you are without letting it grow a bit.

If you want to go gray, how do you avoid that incriminating color

Gray hair care

It can be tricky because gray hair has a stiffer texture than hair with color, and hair shafts thin out, so your usual routine may not work as well. Some tips:

■ Gray hair is usually more unruly, so use hair-care products that will tame those locks. A good conditioner is a must, as are gels that will give it style.

■ A good haircut is essential — one that will highlight your natural tones, whether they are white or pewter or silver.

■ When you wash your hair, give your scalp a good massage. It not only feels heavenly, it stimulates blood vessels that feed the hair follicles.

■ Do as Mom told you: Eat your vegetables. A good diet with essential vitamins and protein can give hair a healthful look.

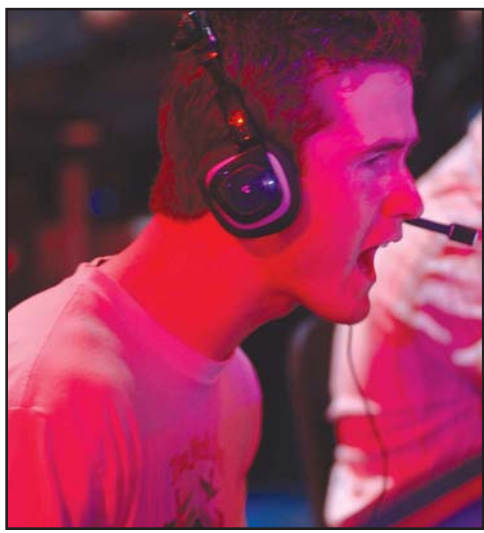

DirecTV, others form video-gaming league

LOS ANGELES — Four race cars barrel down a virtual track, jostling for position. Announcers shout their commentary over growling engines until a winner speeds past a checkered flag.

The frenetic race televised on DirecTV wasn't a NASCAR event. It was staged as part of a new video game league that aims to turn gaming into a full-fledged sport, as compelling to watch as the National Basketball Association.

The Championship Gaming Series debuted recently in the U.S. and has franchises around the world that pay top players base salaries of \$30,000 plus bonuses.

Organizers hope to attract an audience of the same young gamers who pushed computer and video game software sales to \$7.4 billion in 2006 — a 6 percent increase from 2005, according to the Entertainment Software Association.

Advertisers are eager to reach those 18- to 24-year-old consumers.

The challenge for the league is making the on-screen action compelling enough to persuade gamers to start watching.

"Are those guys willing to put down their controllers and pick up their remote control to watch their television?" asked Steve Lipscomb, founder and CEO of World Poker Tour Enterprises.

Lipscomb helped turn poker into a TV hit by placing cameras under tables to give viewers a look at the cards held by each player.

He said he turned down chances to start a video game league, fearing the challenges might be too great to overcome.

"If they can find a way to translate the experience of gaming into a great spectator sport, there is an opportunity there," Lipscomb said.

DirecTV is spending relatively little on the new league. It is one of several homegrown channels the company hopes will catch on.

"Today, it doesn't move the needle," said Steve Mather, an analyst at SMH Capital. "But strategically, it is in this basket of items that could develop into something. They're in the game, at least."

The two-hour video game matches, which began earlier this month, are staged twice a week on a movie sound stage in Manhattan Beach.

A studio audience of about 200 people cheers on cue while players face off in front of video screens. Team managers crouch nearby to offer encouragement.

Most games played in the league, such as "Dead or Alive 4" or the soccer game "FIFA 07," are one-on-one matches.

Others, like "Counter-Strike Source" involve five-person teams squaring off in multiple rounds.

The key feature of the broadcasts are the multiple "in game" cameras that follow the action, making viewers feel like they are on the soccer field or peeking over the shoulder of a gun-toting mercenary. Flashy graphics help tell the story of what is happening on the screen.

"It's got the elements of strategy, skill and the camaraderie of team sports that people love," said Dave "Moto" Geffon, general manager of New York 3D, one of six U.S. teams in the league.

The new league has six U.S. franchises — Chicago Chimera, Carolina Core, San Francisco Optix, Los Angeles Complexity, Dallas Venom and New York 3D.

Teams have also been created in Asia, Europe and South America. Regional winners will compete in a world championship later this year.

DirecTV owns the league with partners British Sky Broadcasting PLC and Asian satellite broadcaster Star.

Competitive video gaming isn't new. The Cyberathlete Professional League was formed in 1997 and hosts tournaments around the world that aren't televised. Organized matches are also popular in Europe and Asia.

In addition, the 2-year-old World Series of Video Games has a deal to air some of its matches on CBS.

The Championship Gaming Series hopes to differentiate itself by offering regular broadcasts of team competitions with high-tech showmanship.

Companies eye holidays, looking for big sales

CAN YOU HEAR those sleigh bells jingling? Video game console companies can, and in their boardrooms this summer they will fret about who will get a stocking full of profits and who gets the lump of coal this Christmas.

E3, or the Electronic Entertainment Expo, showed what was in the sleighs of Xbox 360, Nintendo's Wii and PlayStation 3 for the upcoming gift-giving season. Held earlier this month, these home console companies, along with video game publishers, assembled for a week in Santa Monica, Calif.

Coming into E3, Xbox 360 was boasting strong sales and a large game selection; gamers still had problems getting their hands on Wii consoles; and Sony announced that it would only produce only 80-gigabyte versions of its tanking unit.

Xbox 360 wanted all to know about its sequels to popular titles like "Halo 3" and "Madden." The console also boasts exclusive material for the newest "Grand Theft Auto" game, a title once only playable on PlayStation.

Wii had a mix of software and hardware to flaunt, with a Wii wheel, zapper and balance pad pushing the boundaries further past hand-held button controllers. Nintendo will also release new installments of their heavily established franchises, such as "Super Mario Galaxy," "Metroid Prime 3: Corruption" and "Super Smash Brothers Brawl."

PS3 will borrow from the Wii's motion-sensor game play with the PlayStationEye, compatible with the trading-card game "The Eye of Judgment." Action/adventure games like "Uncharted: Drake's Fortune," "Heavenly Sword" and "Ratchet & Clank Future: Tools of Destruction" will also appear on store shelves shortly.

Each company boasts a bounty of profits and popularity that would get anyone into the holiday spirit. From what we see here, it looks like we can expect more of the same from each console.

Xbox 360 will continue to dominate the traditional console race, while Sony edges closer to bankruptcy due to PS3's lack of sales. Microsoft has played it safe, offering plenty of online options for gameplay, a noticeable graphics improvement from the previous generation's

system, and features games we'll enjoy as long as the word "sequel" still has a spot in Merriam-Webster's dictionary.

But it won't be a Merry Christmas for the folks at Sony. No wonder, due to the fact that they record a loss on every PS3 console sold. The faults remain the same: too high of a price and plenty of other, cooler, cheaper options for consumers. In its third incarnation, Sony forgot that someone actually has to play a PlayStation for it to make it under the Christmas tree.

Wii will give us a winter wonderland full of Nintendo magic, which has come back in a big way. Who would have thought that an idea in the late '80s like the Power Glove could be resurrected as the Wii Remote? We get more creative motion play with a gun and steering wheel, plus new spins on old titles that have received gigantic amounts of positive press.

Yes, we'll see more of the same, but with the excitement seen from the industry and consumers in the last year, gamers can welcome the monotony. Santa will bring us old favorites in new wrapping paper, bang-bang guns and steering wheels.

And if you're really good — six-figure-salary good — you just might be able to get a PS3, too.

Cameron chooses Ubisoft to make 'Avatar' game

James Cameron and 20th Century Fox's high-tech sci-fi "Avatar" is leaping into the video game space with Ubisoft.

Capping an extensive yearlong runoff between four game companies that presented creative briefs, Cameron has selected the French game publisher to develop a next-generation video game to be released alongside the film in May 2009.

"I told the Ubisoft team I wanted them to be free to do their very best work and not think of this as a movie-based game," Cameron said. "They responded with a fully



realized presentation which captured the soul of the world and the characters, while promising to be a knockout game on its own terms."

For Ubisoft, the deal with Fox and Cameron represents the company's biggest bet yet on a movie property, even eclipsing the terms

of its landmark deal with Peter Jackson and Universal for the game based on "King Kong."

While other publishers offered even larger license fees, Avatar producer Jon Landau said that Ubisoft's concept was the clear creative choice.

"Avatar," Cameron's first feature film in more than a decade, tells the story of Jake (Sam Worthington), an ex-Marine who persists in an alien world as an avatar, a human mind in an alien body.

The concept is similar to many video games where a player creates a virtual manifestation of themselves, often referred to as an avatar.

The similarities are not lost on Ubisoft CEO Yves Guillemot, who believes the game will "let us see the world and ourselves from another angle, acting as a mirror that will help us understand the consequences of our choices."

Landau said the game's narrative will not be a strict retelling of the film but instead play out as a nonlinear story that shapes itself to the player's action inside the alien world.

While yet to be confirmed, it is expected that all the actors from the film, including Sigourney Weaver, will reprise their roles in the video game version.

Reading after Harry: Similar tales to try out

NOW WE KNOW what happened to Harry Potter. Now what?

Publishers say they are wary of anything pitched as "the next Harry Potter." True fans will likely deride or ignore imitators anyway. There will never be another Potter, but fantasy will continue to be big, they predict.

J.K. Rowling told NBC that she may write an encyclopedia to fill out her series. In the meantime, Potter fans looking for a story that's equally as engrossing should worry less about what's to come and find or rediscover some fantasies already in print.

"There are a few series I know off hand that are similar [to Potter] yet maybe not so well known," said Ellen Hathaway of the Morgantown Public Library. "They are for children and adults. 'Eragon' and 'Eldest' by Christopher Paolini, the Bartimaeus trilogy by Jonathan Stroud and titles by Cornelia Funke ['Inkspell' and 'Inkheart']."

"Inkheart," about a bookbinder and his daughter who can bring characters and objects out of stories when they read aloud, is scheduled for release as a movie in mid-March. In "Inkspell," the sequel, the heroine gets trapped in her favorite book.

"Eragon" is a story about a boy and his dragon, fighting in a war to free the empire from oppressive rule. "Eldest" picks up where "Eragon" leaves off with new adventures on the boy's quest to complete his training.

Lisa Dennis, a specialist in children's books for the Carnegie Library of Pittsburgh, told the *Post-Gazette* "I still think Lloyd Alexander and his 'Westmark Trilogy' is better written and has more original characters than the Potter books."

First published in 1982, "The Kestrel," "The Beggar Queen" and "The Firebird" draw on Welsh folklore about a mythical kingdom.

"It's a more serious set of books than 'Harry Potter,'" she said. "That age-old good vs. evil struggle is expressed more clearly, I think."

"Jonathan Strange and Mr. Norrell" by Susanna Clarke has been called "the grownups' Harry Potter" and its themes are decidedly not for children. Clarke created for her first novel an alternate England in which magic is revived and a full mythology — with explanatory footnotes — to support it. Good thing Potter fans are used to 700-page tomes. English teacher Erin Mak blogs "JS&MN" reads and references these materials much in the way that "The Lord of the Rings" might have read and been footnoted if Tolkien had written his appendices and "The Silmarillion" before ever beginning "The Hobbit."

Natalie Bellamy, co-founder of novel writing Web site, ToBoldlyNaNo.com, recommends the Fablehaven series by Brandon Mull. In this first novel, mystical creatures have been hidden in a refuge to prevent their extinction. But when the ancient rules that keep order in the sanctuary are broken, Fablehaven threatens to implode. And if you, like many Potter fans, were dissatisfied by "The Deathly Hallows," or if you just can't get enough of Harry, there are fanfiction Web sites to supply your fix. Fanfiction writers continue the storylines of their favorite books, TV shows, movies, even video games. You might even be inspired to write your own, like Elisha Dew of Fairmont, co-founder of ToBoldlyNaNo.com and a Harry Potter fan-ficcer. She said this story in particular got her hooked on the pastime: "Neville Longbottom, True Gryffindor" [checkmated.com/story.php?story=7480]. And this one got her started 'shipping [romantically pairing] George and Luna: "Love and Levity" [checkmated.com/story.php?story=7321].

Dew recommends simply undeniab.com/index.php and checkmated.com if you go looking for the rest of Potter's story as told by fans.

DIY dads make their own parenting model

CHICAGO — Brian Reid isn't one of those guys who can't take a compliment.

Still, you can't blame a fellow for taking umbrage at the following Mother's Day e-mail he received from Pampers.

"Dear Brian: From the moment you first held your newborn baby in your arms, you knew that things would never be the same again. Suddenly, you've become a teacher, a nurse, a coach, a playmate and a friend.

"But, above all, you are a mother."

News to him.

Sure, Reid buys diapers. And changes them. He also cooks and cleans and plays with his two kids. He has worked part time, he's worked full time. He has done the stay-at-home thing.

To a diaper company, that might make him look like a mother. In reality, it makes him look like a lot of modern fathers, a group that could fairly be labeled Do-It-Yourself Dads.

Dissatisfied with the traditional model for fathering, DIY Dads alter their careers to fit their family life, rather than the other way around. Fewer hours in the office, more hours at Gymboree. Less pay, more play.

"What we're going to see over the next decade is a much better spec-

trum of choices for fathers," said Reid, known as "rebealdad" to those who follow his parenting blog (rebealdad.com) and his regular contributions to *The Washington Post's* On Balance site (washingtonpost.com/onbalance).

"Some fathers are still going to work 80 hours a week," he said. "But with modern technology and more flexible workplaces, a lot more guys have the possibility of being at play group on Tuesday morning. Working fathers, stay-at-home fathers or some sort of combination — what unifies us all is wanting to play an active role in our children's lives."

According to the 2004 census, about 147,000 dads stay home full time, up from about 98,000 in 2003 — an almost 50 percent increase.

Mark Smithivas of Logan Square is one of them. Smithivas, 39, began staying home last year after juggling his job as an administrative assistant at Northwestern University, his wife's job as an environmental consultant and a host of less-than-appealing daycare options for their 3-year-old daughter, Amanda.

"I enjoyed my job," Smithivas said. "It was very fulfilling, and I enjoyed being at a university. But we got to a point where because of our values and how we feel about raising kids — we're very much attachment-focused — the idea of putting our daughter into full-time

day care just wasn't what we wanted."

Being with Amanda full time is fulfilling as well, Smithivas said. And it hasn't hurt things in the marriage department either.

"We've struck a good balance," he said. "I like to cook, she still does a lot of the cleaning. We try to do more of a model of shared parenting so it's not just a traditional inversion of roles. It's both of us trying to spend as much time as possible with our daughter."

Other DIY Dads opt to hold on to their careers but in a dramatically reduced capacity.

Uptown dad Josh Eisenberg, 32, left his job as a tour coordinator at the Chicago History Museum when his son, Andrew, was 6 months old. He still conducts history tours throughout the city, but he sets his own schedule and rarely works more than one full day per week.

"I get to see him speak, I get to see him walk," Eisenberg said of Andrew, now 2. "I get to do all the things that dad wanted to and didn't get to — or didn't care to — for centuries."

DIY Dads make up a growing presence on the Web. Chicago dads.com provides an online community for men looking for a place to chat about sports, arrange a play date or plan a Dads Night Out. Reid's rebealdad.com provides links to more than 100 other dad-specific

Web sites and blogs. The publishing world, however, is a little late to the game, with the majority of parenting magazines and books still aimed specifically at mothers. Reid hopes to see this change during the next few years.

"A reasonable goal is for the resources already out there to be a little more gender neutral, so if you're a man, you don't get the sense that parenthood is not for you," he said.

But Spiro Dousias, a 27-year-old DIY Dad who has juggled several part-time jobs teaching art since his daughter was born two years ago, says he's doing just fine without some so-called experts weighing in on his every move.

"I guess I don't need to be reaffirmed by a magazine telling me I'm a good dad," he said.

Dousias, who lives in Brighton Park, Ill., spends most of his time joining little Lori at her Gymboree classes, strapping her ladybug helmet on for long bike rides or pulling her in her little wagon to the grocery store. And Lori's happiness is affirmation enough for him.

"When we're at music class and there's a song with the word 'mommy' in it, the teacher always makes a point to say 'daddy' because I'm sitting there," Dousias chuckled. "That's nice, but I'm like, 'We can talk about mommies. It's OK.'" How very DIY.

Earth only small part of universe

Q: My question is, Why did God make other planets? I am 7 years old. — M., North Bellmore, N.Y.

A: God created the other planets so the people on Earth would not say that the Earth is all that matters and that people are all that matter. We're just a small part of the very big universe that God has made. This should make us all feel very humble and grateful to God that we were given such a nice planet where we could live and where we could enjoy fun things like eating ice cream.

Q: Is there a hell? I'm a senior citizen, brought up in the Catholic Church, parochial school, etc., as were my children. My elderly mother attended a mission program at church and came away with, "Hell is a state of mind, not a real physical place." My son, who's in his 50s and attends Mass regularly, tells me he used to believe in hell but no longer does. His view: When really bad people die, they cease to exist. Everybody else goes to heaven. What's going on? — S., Gainesville, Fla.

A: The Catholic Church, following the teachings of Jesus, believes in hell not as a state of mind but as a state of separation from God: "It is better for you to enter the kingdom of God with one eye than with two eyes to be thrown into hell, where the worm does not die, and the fire is not quenched." Mark 9:47-48 (see also Matthew 25:46).

Also, in Revelation 14:11: "And the smoke of their torment goes up for ever and ever; and they have no rest, day or night, these worshipers of the beast and its image, and whoever receives the mark of its name."

The catechism of the Catholic Church states: "The teaching of the Church affirms the existence of hell and its eternity. Immediately after death, the souls of those who die in a state of mortal sin descend into hell, where they suffer the punishments of hell, 'eternal fire.' The chief punishment of hell is eternal separation from God, in whom alone man can possess the life and happiness for which he was created and for which he longs" (CCC 1035).

In his 1994 book, "Crossing the Threshold of Hope," Pope John Paul II wrote that too often "preachers, catechists, teachers ... no longer have the courage to preach the threat of hell" (p. 183). The meaning and purpose of these teachings is not to scare people into being pious, but rather to give form to the abstract belief that evil is finally punished by God and that in the end we do reap what we sow.

Cute, colorful carousel craft is super-easy to make

Last week, I was surprised to see back-to-school craft ideas in my e-mail inbox. Didn't summer break just begin a few weeks ago?

Surely, it's too early to think about school, I thought.

Fortunately, I found summer still is in full swing at Michaels Arts and Crafts Store, where I saw posters for programs that help kids write as much fun out of all the vacation they have left.

Katie Billely is the person responsible for the Kids Camp events for the company's Montrose, Ohio, store. She said she still has exciting events planned through August, and classes each day will feature special themes, such as pirates, fairies, bugs and games.

I asked her about a cute carousel I saw on a display advertising Kids Camp that looked like it would be rather difficult to make. She explained that the carousel is constructed from a kit by Darice Inc., of Strongsville, Ohio, and is featured as one of the crafts they were making July 23, which is Circus Day. The kit is easy enough for small children to build using tiny sticky dots that make gluing a cinch

for the smallest of fingers. Michaels' summer Kids Camp classes run from 9:30-11:30 a.m. and 1:30-3:30 p.m. every weekday.

Call your local Michaels store for information.

If you can't attend a class, you can buy a kit and make a carousel as I did, using these instructions. Add a few extra plastic jewels for decorations, if you would like.

- 1 Foamies 3-D Carousel Foam Kit by Darice.
- Extra jewels and beads (optional).

The carousel base is already

assembled and comes with peel-and-stick foam accessories.

I found it helped to plan my design and place the decorations on the carousel in this order:

Place the triangles around the base of the carousel so the long sides are even with the bottom of the base. The tips do not need to touch.

Place the scallop shapes around the roof of the carousel, alternating the colors.

If you have a problem getting them to stay on, simply place a few glue dots on the straight edge

before you apply it to the roof.

Place the large red triangles on the roof, trying to line them up with the edges of the scallops. Stick the pointed ends down inside the hole in the roof.

Gently insert the flag pole in the hole in the roof. Press the edge of the flag on a sheet of sticky dots and place on the side of the pole. Glue the small pompom to the top of the pole.

Attach the horses to the poles and the stars and flowers to the horses using glue dots. Add decorations as you would like.

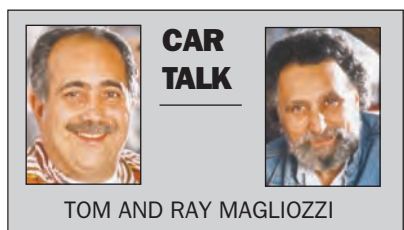

Learning how to drive a stick does get easier

DEAR TOM AND RAY:

My mom is teaching me how to drive her 2001 Honda Accord. It has a standard transmission. Actually, all the cars in our family have standard transmissions, so I am pretty much doomed to learn how to drive (I'm nearly 16) on a stick shift. My mom has taken me to an abandoned supermarket parking lot a few times to practice. I have yet to get out of first gear, though I'm pleased to say that I stalled the car only once during our last session. How am I ever going to get on the road, when I can hardly get the car rolling? Do you have any advice for me or my parents about how to help someone learn this very complicated skill? They keep telling me that I will get the feel eventually, but I'm beginning to have serious doubts. Help! — Maya

TOM: You might be further along than you think, Maya. You say you've never gotten beyond first gear. I get the impression from your letter that you think first gear is the easiest, and second, third, fourth and fifth get progressively harder. But the opposite is true.

RAY: Right. First is absolutely the hardest. Once the car is moving, the rest of the gears are cake. So if you're getting close to being able to reliably start the car in first gear from a dead stop, you're actually 90 percent of the way to learning to drive a stick shift. Don't you feel better now?

TOM: In terms of tips, one thing you can do is practice starting off without giving the car ANY gas. That's a lot harder. But it forces you to learn how to control the car using only the clutch pedal.

RAY: Once you can do that, adding the gas pedal back into the mix will only make starting easier. So, on a flat surface, push in the clutch, put the car in first and try to get the car going using only the clutch. There's a "feel" involved, like riding a bicycle. It seems impossible to do at first, and then all of a sudden it clicks and you can't do it wrong if you try.

TOM: Once you feel comfortable starting off in first gear and getting into second a few times in the parking lot, then you need to get out on the streets. Do it early on a Sunday morning, when there are fewer cars on the street. Plus, people tend to feel a little more guilty about honking at you and flipping you the bird when they're on their way to church, so it cuts down on the intimidation factor.

RAY: I agree with your parents. In time — and not much time — you'll develop a feel for the clutch and never look back. Write back and let us know how you're doing, Maya!

Brown. I'm headed south along Park Boulevard, just outside the town of Twentynine Palms, and everywhere I look it's the same: unrelentingly brown, brown, brown.

In town the dusty front yards of middle-class neighborhoods are nearly all without grass or landscaping. Along the highway the dirt is peppered by scrubby, drab bushes. The flat land gives way eventually to monochromatic mountains — crumbling dirt and rocks with few, if any, trees. When the wind picks up it creates a brown haze over the whole place.

Green does not seem to be on the palette here. But you take what you can get in the desert. So after three days, why is it that I just can't get enough of Joshua Tree National Park?

Imagine the day in 1918 when Bill Keys first brought his bride, Frances, out here from Los Angeles. Keys had been in the area, working as a foreman of the Desert Queen Ranch, since about 1910. But to Frances, a department store saleswoman, it must have seemed like a prison sentence.

There were rattlesnakes and bobcats, bighorn sheep and who knows what else. But not a lot of company. The nearest town, Joshua Tree, was 18 miles away; Twentynine Palms was even farther. A trip to the market took six days round-trip by freight wagon. They didn't make the trip often.

Still, Frances and Bill thrived. They raised seven children, including three daughters who still live in the area. Their homestead, now known as the Keys Ranch, is the park's most popular ranger-led attraction. It's listed on the National Register of Historic Places.

"When Bill Keys came out here, it was still the Old West," Ranger Pam Tripp tells a group of visitors, painting a vivid picture of life in the early 20th century. "It still was, even up till the 1940s and '50s."

For nearly 60 years in the desert, Keys did whatever he could to get by. He was a lawman, a cattleman, a miner, even an actor in his old age, appearing in some Walt Disney TV movies, including "Wild Burro of the West."

"They dubbed his voice," Tripp says. "They didn't think he sounded enough like a prospector."

The Keyeses built roads and planted a large garden. They had an orchard with peaches, plums, pears and other fruit. They dug wells. They built dams.

When their children were very young they were homeschooled, but the couple later built a small schoolhouse. Children attended from homesteads all over the area. It's still there, along with the Keys home and a handful of outbuildings.

Water was always an issue, and Keys was protective of his water sources, Tripp says.

"He once filed a claim on Cow Camp Dam, which belonged to another cattle company," she says. "So he made enemies."

One was a neighbor named Worth Bagley. His feud with Keys ended when Bagley was shot and killed. Keys "said it was self-defense, which it probably was," Tripp says. Still, he served five years in San Quentin. Years later the California governor pardoned him.

Keys had an entrepreneurial spirit. Or maybe he was just a pack rat. "If people needed a piece of equipment, they could come to Mr. Keys and purchase it," Tripp says. "Farm equipment, fencing, beds — they had lots of beds." Rusty metal bed frames still dot the property.

In the 1950s the couple opened a small store selling canned goods. Frances sold women's bonnets, too. After the area became a national monument they even leased cabins to tourists.

Frances Keys died in 1963, her husband in 1969. The federal government owns all of the land now, except one-tenth of an acre. It's the family cemetery.

I drive only a few miles into the desert before I begin to notice things. Either the landscape is changing or I am more aware of the complexities of the desert.

That's when the music begins in my head. Nothing from U2's "Joshua Tree" album, which brought a lot of attention to the park several years ago. I'm hearing America's "Horse With No Name."

"On the first part of the journey I was looking at all the life

"There were plants and birds and rocks and things

"There was sand and hills and ..."

Slowly I am seeing more than brown. There are mesquite trees and creosote bushes, brittle bush and yuccas. And with each mile, more and more of the park's eponymous Joshua trees appear — hundreds, thousands of them, dominating the landscape.

Strange thing. The wildflowers didn't bloom for the most part this year because it has been even drier than usual. But the

shaggy brown arms of the Joshuas look as if they're offering up clusters of creamy white blooms as gifts to heaven. This is an even bigger treat than you might think because the Joshua tree doesn't bloom every year.

Then rocks begin to rise up out of the landscape. Monstrous boulders of granite formed 85 million years ago when magma forced its way up through the earth.

The strange formations have been given irresistible names. I pull over when I see a sign that advertises Skull Rock and wander for a few minutes along a dusty gravel trail among the Mojave yuccas and desert oaks. I snap a couple pictures of an unmistakably pointy rock head with two huge indentations that suggest the creature's eyes.

For many, many visitors, the rock formations are the real attraction. Joshua Tree is a climber's paradise, a rock star.

In the parking lot of the Hidden Valley area, I meet Nick Burton of San Francisco and a couple of his climbing buddies. It's a windy day, with gusts up to 45 mph, but they are undeterred as they unload gear from their car.

"This is a huge climbing spot," says Burton, who's originally from Ireland. "I've been wanting to come here for years."

He's impressed by the range and quality of the climbs, as well as the overall friendliness of other climbers.

They're getting ready to tackle an ascent called Illusion Dweller, which

Burton says is a famous climb. He also says it's a 5.10b, which doesn't mean a lot to me, but I get that it's tough.

"It means I'm scared, that's what it means," he says. "It's long; it's sustained. It's about 180 feet up."

I decline the gracious offer to join them. I'm more into hiking, and fortunately Joshua Tree has miles and miles of trails and wide-open areas to explore and rock formations that are just as easy to appreciate from the ground.

Matt Stern of Simi Valley, Calif., has been visiting Joshua Tree for 20 years. He's here for spring break with his wife, Liann, and their daughters, Megan, 7 and Kaela, 5.

"The first time he brought me here was 11 years ago, and I hated it," Liann Stern says on the trail. "Now I love it. We come twice a year. It's magical."

So what's the draw? "For me it's the photography — walking and taking pictures," she says.

"For me it's the solitude, the quietness," says Matt.

For a place that seemed pretty unremarkable at first sight, Joshua Tree brings surprises with each mile. On the drive south toward the Cottonwood Visitor Center, I leave the Mojave Desert and cross into the Colorado Desert. When the Joshua trees disappear, you know you've switched deserts.

For awhile it seems pretty bleak again, until I see a sign for the Cholla Cactus Garden.

In California Desert Trails (1919), J.

If you go

GETTING THERE: Joshua Tree National Park is about 140 miles east of Los Angeles. From L.A., follow Interstate 10 east to California 62, then on to park entrances at Joshua Tree or Twentynine Palms. Twentynine Palms is about 50 miles from Palm Springs, Calif.

GETTING IN: A seven-day vehicle permit costs \$15; annual passes cost \$30. If you're going to be visiting several national parks in the next year, an annual Federal Lands Pass costs \$80 and permits access to national parks and other federal recreation sites. Call 1-888-ASK-USGS, or see store.usgs.gov/pass. A lifetime senior pass for citizens or permanent residents 62 and older costs \$10.

WHEN TO GO: Summers can be brutally hot in the desert, where temperatures rise above 105 degrees and drop only to 75 or so. Spring and fall are more comfortable, ranging from about 50 to 85 degrees. In winter, high temperatures often reach the 60s but drop below freezing at night.

WHERE TO STAY: Camping is offered on a first-come, first-served basis at nine campgrounds. Sites are primitive; water and flush toilets are offered only at the Black Rock and Cottonwood campgrounds. No showers are available, and there are no hookups for recreational vehicles. Fees start at \$10. Chain hotels can be found along the Twentynine Palms Highway (California 62) in Twentynine Palms, including: Holiday Inn Express, 71809 Twentynine Palms Highway, (760) 361-4009, hiexpress.com. Best Western Garden Inn, 71487 Twentynine Palms Highway, from about \$99. (760) 367-9141, Best western californiacom.

Smeaton Chase wrote: "If the [cholla cactus] bears any helpful or even innocent part in the scheme of things on this planet I should be glad to hear of it."

Be warned. On a sandy, quarter-mile loop trail, thousands of cacti rise from the desert ground. They are dark brown, with pale spiny branches that protrude along the ends and top. Some have little yellow blossoms.

Signs warn against touching the plants because they are so ... violent? The slightest touch, they say, can cause the cactus spines to penetrate the skin. Removing them can be difficult and painful.

I'm not tempted to get close. Unfortunately, the wind is persistent, so strong that I seriously worry it might knock me off balance as I innocently walk along the serpentine path. I hold my elbows in carefully as I stoop to take a few pictures.

A little farther south, the Ocotillo Patch offers a remarkable contrast. Here, the threatening yellow cacti have been supplanted by tall trees whose leafless branches are sprayed with delicate red flowers.

My goal lies farther on, toward the park's southern edge. It's the Cottonwood Spring oasis, whose name alone sounds inviting. It's one of Joshua Tree's five fan palm oases, among nearly 160 in North America.

They are a welcome sight, especially after a long hike through what seems, remarkably, like the most desolate section of the park yet. I feel almost like the parched desert soldier from Hollywood movies who finally comes upon some relief. Is it a mirage or the real thing?

The spring at Cottonwood Spring oasis, perhaps a few hundred yards wide and long, produces 30 gallons of water an hour, which, of course, is the key to the change in environment. The water apparently attracts many of the park's best-known animals, including Gambel's quail, bighorn sheep and coyotes. I don't see any, but I can hear a few of the 200 bird species that also are reported here.

I am especially struck by the presence of tall cottonwood trees whose green leaves glimmer in the wind. It seems a little like Kansas.

Refreshed, I'm back on the road, ready for more.

Cue the music in my head: "In the desert you can remember your name / 'Cause there ain't no one for to give you no pain

"La, la, la, la, la, la, la, la ..."

10 cheap fixes to boost your home's value

1. **MAKE YOUR KITCHEN** really cook. Potential home buyers make a beeline for this room when they first view a home for sale, so make sure your kitchen looks clean and reasonably updated. Perhaps update the kitchen faucet set, add new cabinet door handles, and update old lighting fixtures with brighter, more energy-efficient ones. If you have a slightly larger budget, you can give the cabinets themselves a makeover.
2. Give appliances a facelift. If your kitchen appliances don't match, order new doors or face panels for them. Many dishwasher panels are white on one side and black on the other.

6. Mind the mechanics. Hire a plumber or electrician for a couple of hours to check for and fix any water leaks, and look over your electrical services, wrap or fix loose wires, fix any faulty outlets. Those details tell a buyer that someone has really taken care of the home and can really influence its price.
7. Look underfoot. Carpeting is another detail that can quickly update a home and make it look cleaner. A professional carpet cleaning is an inexpensive investment, especially if your rugs are in good shape and are neutral colors.
8. Let there be light. If you have boring recessed lights in your dining and living rooms, consider replacing one of the room's lights with an eye-catching chandelier.
9. Reframe your entry. A nice, big piece of hardware on the front door signals to newcomers that this is a solid home.
10. Consider curb appeal. A nicely mowed lawn, a few well-placed shrubs and a swept walkway make a great first impression.

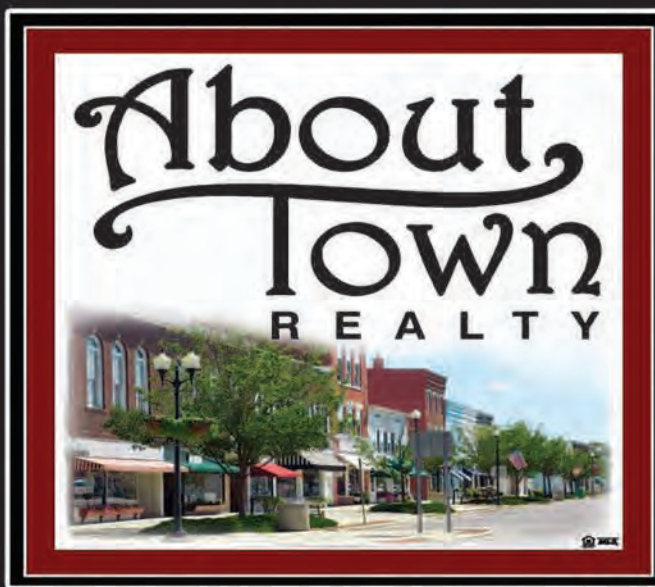

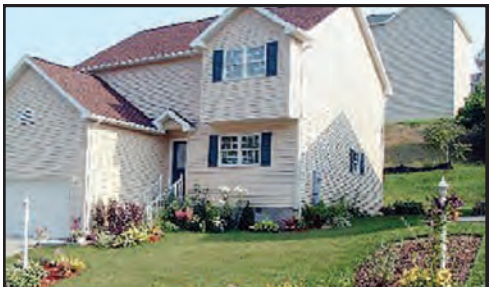

A solar fan is a good investment to keep your attic cooler

DEAR JIM: My roof gets direct sun from noon through late afternoon, and I imagine this is making the house hotter. I have some attic ventilation, but I thought about installing a solar attic vent fan. Will it do much?

let vents along or near the ridge (peak) of the roof.

With no fan to create air flow, much vent area is needed. Ridge vents are often installed when reroofing is done.

The other option is a power ventilator for the attic. Since your primary concern is for summer cooling, installing solar-powered attic fans can be effective.

What is nice about these is, on the sunniest days when the most ventilation is needed, these fans, powered by the sun, run very fast. On cool, cloudy days, less electricity is produced and they

run slower.

As with any outlet vent, a solar attic fan should be located near the peak of the roof. The diameter

of most solar attic fans is 12 or 16 inches, so you should not have a problem finding a location near the roof peak. It still is important

to install the cool air inlet vents in the soffits to allow for maximum ventilation through the solar attic fan.

Most solar attic fans include a built-in solar panel which produces about 10 to 12 watts of electric power providing a maximum of about 850 cfm (cubic feet per minute) of air flow.

A typical 10-watt solar panel is slightly smaller than the top area of the fan. Some of the larger 16-inch fans can handle a larger 20-watt solar panel and produce up to 1,200 cfm of ventilation.

It is not difficult to install a solar attic vent fan. Saw a 12- or 16-inch hole in the roof. All solar attic fans have built-in flashing.

Weave the flashing under the existing shingles and nail or screw the fan in place. Since it is solar-powered, it requires no 120-volt electric wiring. If you want to mount the vent

fan on a shady side of the roof for aesthetic reasons, select a model with a remote solar panel.

The small solar panel can be mounted on the sunny side of the roof with a small wire leading to the fan.

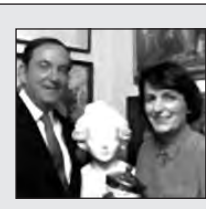
This remote design is also effective if a side of your roof does not face south or southwest. Another fan design has a hinged solar panel which can be tilted up to face the sun more directly.

Tea carts were popular in compact homes with smaller kitchens and dining tables

TEA WAS FIRST SERVED in Europe about 1650, and the caffeinated drink became a popular beverage in the centuries that followed. So it is not surprising that some Arts & Crafts furniture designers labeled a table with wheels and a handle a "tea cart," even though it was used as a cart to serve any type of food.

There were many servants in a well-to-do home of the 1800s. But by the 1900s, houses were smaller and there was less household help. A small table with wheels was used to bring in dishes, hold food and remove used dishes. A rectangular table with simple straight legs was preferred. Add two large front wheels, two small back wheels and a handle, and you had an easily moved table.

The cart or server on wheels was a 20th-century idea that remains popular today. Vintage tea carts in Arts & Crafts, deco or '50s styles can be found at moderate prices. They especially are useful in small apartments with compact kitchens and tiny dining tables. Most tea carts listed at Kovels.com sold for less than \$750.

Q: My mother gave me a 70-piece set of china in the 1940s. The dishes are decorated with pastel flowers and are marked on the back in green with the word "Versailles" and a crown over an "X" with an "R" on one side and a "C" on the other. Who made it?

A: RC with a crown in a Rosenthal mark used from about 1903 until 1956. "Versailles" refers to the shape, which was made with many different decorations. Porcelain floral dinnerware like yours has been popular since the beginning of the 20th century. Rosenthal was founded in Selb, Bavaria, in the early 1880s by Philipp Rosenthal. The German firm still makes fine porcelain dinnerware, figurines, Christmas plates, giftware and unusual art wares.

Q: I inherited a 15-inch Parian bust of Princess Alexandra from my great-grandmother. "Art Union of London, Mary Thornycroft" is incised on it and there is a

printed mark, "WT Copeland." What can you tell me about it?

A: Mary Thornycroft (1814-1895) was a British sculptor best known for

her figures of Queen Victoria's children. Your bust of Princess Alexandra made in the 1860s would sell for \$400 to \$500. The Art Union of London,

the first and largest art union in Britain, was founded in 1837 to encourage interest in the fine arts. It bought artworks and distributed them to its members through a lottery. William Taylor Copeland took over the Spode factory in Stoke-on-Trent in Staffordshire, England, and operated it as W.T. Copeland (& Sons) beginning in 1847. The company merged with Royal Worcester in 1976 and is now Royal Worcester Spode Ltd.

TIP: Invert your old glass cake stand and use it for chips and dip. The pedestal must be hollow to hold the dip; the top plate is fine for the chips.

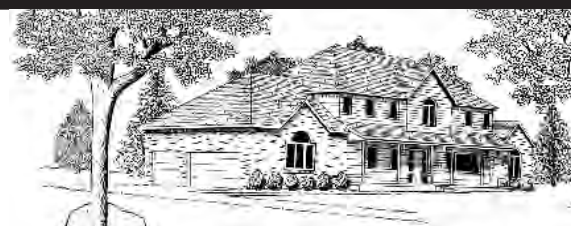

The contingency conundrum

MINNEAPOLIS — Amy Hyatt-Blat heard the horror stories of homebuyers who ended up paying mortgages on two houses, and wanted to avoid that when she decided to buy a bigger house. So when she made a full-price offer on a townhouse in south Minneapolis, the proposal was rejected.

The deal breaker? Her offer was contingent on selling her condo. She and her husband tried again by making a full-price offer on another Minneapolis townhouse, and while this offer was still contingent upon them selling their condo, they sweetened the deal by offering to lower the price on the condo to show the seller they were serious about selling.

Their strategy worked. Three months later, their condo sold and they have no regrets.

"There are so many things that are out of your control," Hyatt-Blat said. "But one thing you do have control over is whether or not you choose to gamble on how long your place will be on the market."

Contingencies have become a way of life for buyers and sellers in today's challenging housing market. Buyers don't want to take a chance getting stuck with two mortgages, and eager sellers are more willing to accept any offer, even if it includes a contingency.

Contingencies, however, are a gray area in the negotiating process, so both buyers and sellers should weigh their options before making or accepting them.

"Be very cautious and thoughtful about offers that are contingent," warned Faith McGown, an agent with Coldwell Banker Burnet. "During the strong sellers' market of recent years, contingencies were rare because buyers were confident they could sell before closing on their next home."

That's all changed. The average time it would take to sell the current supply of houses on the market is 8.4 months, according to the National Association of Realtors. The market is considered to be balanced between buyers and sellers when there is roughly a five-month supply of homes available.

Contingencies can be a conundrum for sellers, too. Realtor Steve Fiorella has a client who recently rejected an offer contingent on the sale of the buyer's northern Minnesota home. Fiorella and his client checked on the property and determined that it might be a difficult sale.

Fiorella, head of the Fiorella Group in Re/Max Results' Apple Valley, Minn.,

office, said it's common to stake out a buyer's home. "First and foremost, you want to make sure that the buyer of your home is marketing their home aggressively and pricing it accurately," he said.

McGown said it can be a smart move for buyers to make a full-price offer to make up for the contingency. To Fiorella, it's even better to offer more earnest money with a portion of it nonrefundable. "Additional earnest money will show that you're into making things happen," he said.

Contingencies can be confusing, stressful and complicated. Usually, there are many variables, such as the length of time that the buyer will have to sell their home before the contract expires, the potential of another buyer making a better offer and how comfortable the seller is with the buyer's ability to sell their home.

That's why McGown generally discourages buyers from making them.

"Get your house sold first, then make an offer. You have so much bargaining power when your house is sold and you're going in non-contingent," she said. "You need to sell your house before you can buy the new one anyway."

Contingencies can be a headache for developers, too. Most lenders won't count contingent offers as a legitimate purchase agreement, which is used to deter-

mine what the bank will set the interest rate at and when construction can begin.

"Contingencies have gone from being something of a nuisance to being a deal breaker for a lot of sellers," said Scott Parkin, marketing director for S.R. Hoffman & Associates in Minneapolis, which handles marketing for several condominium projects.

"They know that when someone has a home to sell, it's a crapshoot if that home is going to sell in any reasonable time in this market," Parkin said. "In this market, offers without contingencies are golden."

While contingencies can complicate a deal, they can also motivate buyers. Hyatt-Blat, for example, lowered the price on the condo she was trying to sell, hung color notices in coffee shops and at work, sent out personal invites and kept her condo in showing condition for three months until it sold.

"I was tempted" to make a non-contingent offer, Hyatt-Blat said. "But what I wanted more than that townhome was peace of mind. It's better to lose a place and wait than to roll the dice and gamble taking on a second mortgage."

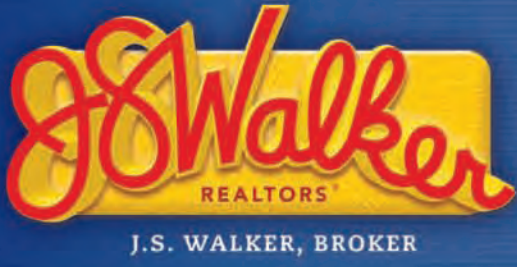

Give patio umbrellas the personal touch

 KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Until recently there weren't many choices in patio umbrellas. You were limited to solid colors and the occasional stripe.

Now hundreds of options are available, thanks to the proliferation of solution-dyed acrylic fabrics such as Sunbrella. The choices allow you to personalize your outdoor decor as never before. New designs this year include sophisticated black-and-white jacquards

and citrus-colored patterns. "I think someone who hasn't bought an umbrella in a few years would be surprised," says Phil Lancaster, director of merchandising for the home furnishings catalog Ballard

Designs. "You can really mix and match umbrellas with your outdoor furniture cushions." Reversible fabrics are becoming popular for umbrellas. For example, you can have an umbrella that's red with white

polka dots on top, while guests sitting underneath see white fabric with red polka dots. OutdoorFabrics.com, an online store based in Miami, carries more than 500 fabrics that can be used for umbrellas, says Crystal Simon, assistant operations manager. Umbrellas in blues and greens are traditionally the most popular, as they are for most furniture companies. Sunbrella's Aruba, a solid

aqua fabric, and Dolce Oasis, a multi-blue stripe, are top sellers. "This year people have been ordering umbrellas with a black, white and red fabric combination," Simon says. Umbrellas with your choice of fabric start at \$400. The home furnishings catalog Frontgate has an interactive online design gallery for personalizing patio umbrellas.

Step 1: Pick a fabric from choices that include Lilac, Gumdrop Butter or Mojito, to name a few. Step 2: Pick a size for the canopy, either 7- or 9-foot. And pick a pole material, teak or aluminum with black, bronze or champagne finish. Step 3: Pick a base, either smooth or ridged, or a faux stone table. Voila! You get to see a picture of your umbrella creation on a beach estate, but not in your own backyard. The customized price tag

doesn't flash up until you click "view final details." To really personalize an umbrella, you can have one hand-painted. Karen Badalucco, owner of the online store Sage Garden Style based in north Kansas City, takes orders for solid Sunbrella fabrics to be painted in the customer's choice of graphic design, monogram or scene. The acrylic paint is protected from the elements with a

marine-grade sealer. "People are only limited by their imagination," Badalucco says. She commissioned one for her deck that's painted with European bistro motifs. "People can choose a theme they like, like the beach, or replicate a pattern they like in a fabric, or base a design off a photograph."

Custom hand-painted designs start at \$650. Badalucco also can order unpainted umbrellas made from Sunbrella fabrics starting at \$300.

Badalucco has noticed a trend of people using more than one umbrella in the backyard. For example, one or two umbrellas might be different solid colors mixed with another that has a pattern. "Patio umbrellas not only provide shelter from the sun," Badalucco says, "they transport you to another time and place. They create great ambience."

All about umbrellas

Clean using a sponge and a solution of 2 ounces mild dishwashing soap and 1 gallon warm water. To clean off mildew, add 1 cup bleach to the solution. To clean off tree sap, use 100 percent turpentine.

Store upright inside during the winter.

If you're shopping for an umbrella, make sure it can tilt, not just open and close. Ask about fabrics' resistance to fading and stains and for warranty information. Fabrics that have designs woven into them will last longer than those that are screen printed on the surface.

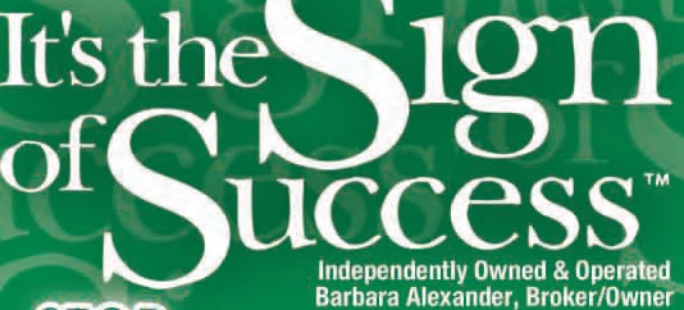

Can nonprofit workers serve as volunteers?

Q: One of my jobs at the nonprofit agency for which I work is organizing fund-raising events. A number of our hourly workers have asked about volunteering at our weekend fund-raisers, but I'm worried about letting them do it.

A: They're not asking to be paid, which we couldn't afford to do anyway, but I'm afraid that letting them work for free might violate both wage and overtime laws.

We already have plenty of people from the community who volunteer to help out at our events, though we can always find things to do for extra volunteers. Can we allow our hourly employees to work for us for free?

A: Yes, you can, as long as you abide by a few limitations, said James Brown, a labor-and-employment lawyer with Ford & Harrison in Orlando, Fla.

There are three basic tests involving hourly employees of nonprofit agencies working for free at those same agencies, Brown said, and it appears two of the tests have been met: The employees sincerely want to volunteer, rather than having been coerced into it, and the events for which they are volunteering take place outside their normal work hours.

The third test, which should be easy enough to meet, is that their volunteer duties are not the same or similar to their regular work duties.

Brown cautions that these tests apply only to the nonprofit sector.

Hourly employees at for-profit, private-sector companies in most cases must be paid for any work, volunteer or otherwise, that they do for their companies. Public-sector employees are generally allowed to perform volunteer work for their employers, but they operate under a different set of rules.

Most employers have strong policies aimed at preventing discrimination and sexual harassment, but they may be overlooking another serious problem: workplace bullying.

While 100 human resources executives were asked in June if an employee at their company had ever quit as a direct result of a workplace bully, 29 answered yes, while 33 said they had personally experienced or witnessed workplace bullying.

"Statistically, bullying is far more prevalent than sexual harassment, workplace violence or racial discrimination," said John Challenger, head of the consulting and research firm that conducted the survey, Challenger, Gray & Christmas.

While long-term costs to employers are significant, "bullying remains one of the most overlooked problems by management and the courts," Challenger said.

It's no secret that poor employee health affects the bottom line of companies, but a report out in this month's *Journal of Occupational and Environmental Medicine* says the cost may be four times greater than employers realize.

A study of four large employers, involving more than 15,000 employees, factored in not just the medical costs of health problems but the value of the productivity that's lost when employees are absent or working at impaired levels because of health problems.

WiFi and coffee Cafes with free Internet take the place of offices

DETROIT — Mark Yurich and Ralph Dor-Ghali, who work in sales at Sysco Food Services, took over a corner of Panera Bread in Troy, Mich., last week.

Their laptops were buzzing. Pastry remnants surrounded their tables. Steaming coffee cups were filled to the brim. They took calls and placed orders for clients from their computers, which were connected to wireless Internet that Panera provides its customers free.

"We know all the Paneras in metro Detroit," said Yurich, a district sales manager who has an office in Canton, Mich., which he acknowledges outright he rarely visits.

Yurich and Dor-Ghali are among a growing number of workers using coffee shops as offices. While there are no hard statistics showing how many workers are doing this, experts say an entrepreneurial boom is driving more people to use cafes. At the same time, more coffee shops are offering free wireless Internet, or WiFi, an attractive feature for workers on the go.

"It's a definite trend," said John A. Challenger, chief executive officer of the Chicago-based outplacement consultancy firm Challenger, Gray & Christmas Inc.

Challenger added that he works out of Chicago-area coffee shops when he needs to.

"There are also a lot more self-employed people these days who don't want to have the expense of an office," Challenger said. "It's also a way to cut back on gas spent during expensive commutes. And not only that, but commuting is a big waste of time. So, it cuts back on that, too."

Look in a coffee shop and you'll find a sea of workers ranging from sales people to pharmaceutical representatives. Not only do they work from laptops, they also meet with clients and hold meetings at coffee shops.

"It's nice to have a place to stop on the road to work," Yurich said. "It's a great place to meet clients. And, who can beat the baked goods and coffee? We definitely spend a lot of money here."

WiFi — which allows data to be transmitted via a wireless network — is a major draw for workers, observers say.

Of Panera's 1,056 locations in the country, 940 are equipped with free WiFi, said spokeswoman Liz Scales.

"We're the largest provider of free WiFi in the country," Scales said. "There are people that are there and don't want to buy anything and that's all right. But most people do and we have had nothing but positive remarks about this."

Jill Jordan, a career coach who

closed her office last year and went virtual, said working from coffee shops has helped business.

"Clients appreciate that you are virtual," she said. "They like knowing that they're not paying for your pretty chair, your pretty desk, your pretty paintings."

"We purposely decided not to have offices because we figured we

could save the dollars we would spend investing in an office and pump it directly into our business," she added.

Frank Rubino, a construction manager, said coffee shops are great to work from when he is moving from site to site.

"One of our sites is right across the street," he said, as he worked at

Memos and napkins

If you are using your local coffee shop as an office:

- Watch the sensitivity of company materials you are reviewing online. There's always potential for someone to looking at your materials on the shared WiFi system.
- Try to work there at less busy times of the day, to avoid big crowd noise on your cell phone during business calls.
- Scout out the costs of different coffee shops. Some places charge for wireless connections.
- You might want to give the manager a tip or at least ask if it's OK for you to plant yourself there all day.

Adults using networking Web sites to find jobs, trade financial advice

NEW YORK — These aren't your teenager's social networking sites.

Take a spin on MySpace and Friendster and most adults find amusement in the concept and technology, but relatively few practical reasons to keep coming back for more. They've been a boon to a mostly younger set of users looking to meet new friends, find a date, or just generally kill some time online.

An increasing number of professionals are tapping into a new breed of networking Web sites to do more than just boast about how many "friends" they have. Millions of users each day are using the Internet to compare investment techniques, correspond with job recruiters and find help in launching a business.

The same technology that lets members of social networking Web sites share blogs, photos, music and video has gained popularity among businesses. Not only have big

technology companies such as Cisco Systems Inc. bought firms that design social networking software, but some professionals have begun to use sites like Facebook as a way to link with co-workers.

Now, sites are also being designed specifically with professionals in mind. LinkedIn, a business-contact networking site, has seen its ranks swell to 12 million in just four years. And online brokers, including TradeKing and Zecco, are using social networking to let investors swap stock tips.

"The whole MySpace culture just passed me by, and there's a whole generation of people that feel the same," said Matana LePlae, 36, an advertising executive and mother of two daughters.

Then the New York City resident was invited by a colleague to join LinkedIn.

"For my kids, these networking Web sites will be part of their lives," she said. "I didn't think it would be part of mine."

In the past, Web sites like Monster.com and message boards were simply a space where members could post a resume or a stock tip and hope someone stumbled upon it. LinkedIn, and other business networking Web sites, allow for more relevant contacts and more private communications. They allow business people to share their network of contacts with others and share their contacts in return.

And that's exactly what Reid Hoffman envisioned when he and four others launched LinkedIn in 2003. The ad-driven Web site is now growing by about 700,000 new users each month, and is considered to be the model for a growing trend of business-oriented networking sites. Management said the privately-owned company is profitable, and revenue has doubled year-to-date.

The 1,294 contacts on Hoffman's LinkedIn profile read like a who's who of Silicon Valley elite — everyone from Internet executives to venture capitalists. Users on the site

who know Hoffman, or become one of his contacts, would have access to those names — and vice versa. On LinkedIn, members have to accept contacts — and unlock their lists to others they have approved.

"At this point, if you come in and upload your address book and connect with people that are here, it doesn't take much experimenting," he said. "You can be off to the races immediately, and that's one of the benefits of being at a scale of 12 million people."

Trade associations have long used the Internet to connect members within a particular industry. However, sites using social networking software allow them to post details on a profile, and use it to directly communicate and access information.

"For many people, these sites will mirror the way we behave offline," said Steven Jones, a professor at the University of Illinois, Chicago who specializes in new media. One popular niche is linking

investors, allowing online traders to boast about a shrewd trade or a hot stock tip, like the traders do on the floor of the New York Stock Exchange.

TradeKing, a discount brokerage based in Boca Raton, Fla., last year began allowing its customers to set up profiles and blogs. This allows investors to search out users with similar investment strategies, and dig up more information about them and their stocks before a trade.

Those discussions had taken place before in message boards where investors were vulnerable to so-called pump-and-dump schemes, where fraudsters posted messages anonymously touting stocks and then cashed in when shares moved higher.

TradeKing gives its members a "Certified Trades" designation that indicates the brokerage vouches for what was bought or sold. Rival brokerage Zecco, which offers free trades, has also introduced a way for investors to share information in forums and blogs.

Working the Web

Wanted: Business-to-business sales professional with five years experience in the financial services industry. Actual response to this online job posting: Beautyholic and luxury lifestyle expert is salivating to work for your company!
The lesson: Don't apply for a job just because you can submit your resume online with the click of a mouse.
"You really need to make sure, as a candidate, that you really read each job description and know what they're looking for," said Michael Jalbert, president of employment recruiter MRINetwork.

Then, find out who is in charge of hiring and address your cover letter that individual. Avoid "To whom it may concern."

Tailor your submission to reflect each job description, rather than blanketing companies with a generic form letter, Jalbert said. Look for key words in the posting like "sales" or "project management" and edit your cover letter and resume to reflect your suitability for the job.

"There's nothing wrong with applying for a dozen different jobs, just make sure you modify your address," Jalbert said.

Finally, target jobs within your skill and experience level, he said. Surely there's a company somewhere looking for just the right entry-level beautyholic.

New job regrets

Have you ever toiled to land a dream job, then dreamed of leaving after your first week? Many of us have regretted accepting a new job, but if your second thoughts persist for more than six months, it may not pay to stay.

Sticking it out with a job you hate could cause your performance and attitude to suffer, damaging your reputation and future job prospects, according to John Challenger of employment consultants Challenger, Gray & Christman.

Some of the most common reasons Challenger cites for regrets over a new position are that the job differs from what the jobseeker expected, or the new employee doesn't get along with co-workers or perform well.

To avoid winding up in the wrong job, Challenger offered the following tips:

Before starting your job search, identify "must have" and "like to have" characteristics of the position you hope to land. Once you receive an offer, evaluate how many of each would likely be fulfilled. Don't compromise on "must haves."

Avoid rushing to accept. Most companies will give job candidates time to consider a job offer.

Talk to friends and family about all aspects of the position and solicit their honest opinions. They know you better than the hiring manager who interviewed you.

Pricey parking

Finding a place to park your Pontiac is getting pricier. Parking costs have increased nationwide for the fourth year in a row, according to a new survey.

Leading the U.S. for the most expensive parking was midtown Manhattan, where the median rate was \$630 per month and the high a whopping \$925 per month.

Downtown Manhattan, Boston, San Francisco and Philadelphia, respectively, rounded out the top five in the seventh annual survey by real estate company Colliers International. Among the least expensive cities were Phoenix, Bakersfield, Calif., and Reno, Nev.

Parking prices in the U.S. paled in comparison with monthly rates in international cities such as London, where the average monthly rate rings up at \$1,198, and Tokyo, at \$702 per month, the study found.

With tight supply and ever-increasing demand, "It's highly unlikely that parking rates would come down," said Ross Moore, director of market and economic research for Colliers International. "I don't think there's any relief in sight."

Small businesses should take care in hiring lawyers and accountants

NEW YORK — Small business owners looking for lawyers or accountants need to approach their search with the same kind of care they'd use in hiring an employee — they need to be sure the professionals they hire are experienced enough to do the job and that they're a good fit with the company.

Many business owners and professionals believe the best way to come up with the right CPA or accountant is to get a referral from someone you trust. And, before you agree to work with a professional, ask plenty of questions and try to talk to other business owners who have experience with him or her.

Jeannette Boccini, a principal with LVM Group Inc., a New York-based public relations firm, said her company gets the names of accountants and lawyers either

through networking or referrals, and then starts to research the professionals by interviewing their clients and reading their Web sites.

Of course, it's critical to interview your prospects.

"It helps if there's a face to face meeting — you'll want to make sure there's some good personal chemistry there," said Fred Steingold, a business lawyer in Ann Arbor, Mich., and the author of several legal guides for small business.

You also need to be sure you're getting the right professional for your needs. Steingold noted, for example, that a lawyer who works only with larger corporations might not be knowledgeable about the issues that small businesses face. The same can also apply to accountants.

Many small business owners look for a professional with solid experience in their particular industry.

"We ask, 'Have you represented any companies like ours before? Do

you know PR firms?'" Boccini said. She said LVM also wants to know how big an accountant's or lawyer's practice is.

"It may make a difference in whether they treat us like big fish in a small pond or a minnow in the ocean," Boccini said. "As a small business, we want someone to be sensitive to the needs of a small business — we may need some additional hand-holding sometime."

Depending on what your needs are, you might require specialized services that not every attorney or CPA has, and that means you might have to seek out someone with a specialty, such as intellectual property law or dealing with IRS audits.

"A general business lawyer can help form entities like an LLC (limited liability company) help in drafting leases and contracts, buying and selling a business, but if you're going to get into something more complex, you're going to want to know a little more about their experience," Steingold said.

Similarly, most accountants are likely to periodically go over a company's books and prepare its tax returns. But you might also want a CPA who can help you with business planning.

It goes without saying that the discussion must include fees, and what services you can expect. You want to be sure you don't open a bill from your lawyer or accountant and find you've been charged for something you never expected to pay for. Boccini noted, for example, that some professionals will bill clients for even the shortest phone calls. That may or may not be OK with you.

Availability and coverage are two other issues a business should explore in an interview. If the accountant or lawyer is away or it's a busy season like tax time, who will be available to answer questions or do work for a business? If the professional has associates, just who in the

firm will be working with this client? "You want to be sure you're not relegated to the most junior associate," Boccini said.

Another question important in the high-tech era: How does the professional communicate? By telephone or e-mail or both? Boccini recalled that she and her partner, David Grant, asked an accountant they were interviewing, "Do you have a BlackBerry or Treo?"

Hiring a professional is also something that shouldn't be done in haste, unless you're faced with an emergency of some sort. But even then, the process should still be undertaken with care to avoid disappointment and even disaster down the line.

"I don't think these are rash decisions — you don't want to be changing from company to company," Boccini said.

But if it turns out you're not happy with the work you're getting, it probably is best to move on, and look for another professional.

Railroads look to youth as senior workers retire

SACRAMENTO, Calif.
For an idea of the labor shortage in today's railroad industry, click into Union Pacific's Web site. The railroad's plea is simple and direct: "We need good people and we need them now."

From Arkansas to Oregon, Iowa to Wyoming and in Northern California cities such as Oakland and Roseville, freight railroads are hanging the "Help Wanted" sign to meet the growing demand for rail service and to fill the gap opened as an aging work force rides the rails to retirement.

"The railroad career is not for everyone. There's traveling. You're away from home," said Kelly Donley, spokeswoman for the Association of American Railroads. "But there's no better-paying, secure industry, and it's not a job that's going to be out-sourced. The jobs are here in America."

The trouble is, when young people think of railroads, they might think of shoveling coal and billowing steam. That sepia-toned image, however, has given way to a mix of computers, electronics and mechanics.

Wages currently average slightly more than \$67,000 a year, according to the railroad association, which projects that 80,000 new rail technicians will be needed over the next five years even though technological advances will winnow the demand for labor.

Educational requirements vary widely, from a high school diploma or its equivalent in entry-level positions to two-year technical degrees or more for diesel mechanics, to engineering or science degrees for operations managers.

Union Pacific, the nation's largest railroad, looks for applicants with a journeyman's card, military training or on-the-job experience in most cases but will provide on-the-job training for entry-level positions.

The railroad also recruits college graduates with majors in accounting, computer science, marketing, production management and other fields.

The positions are in places such as Cheyenne, Wyo., and Pocatello, Idaho; and Roseville, Calif., home to one of the nation's largest train yards and the biggest one on the West Coast.

Nearly all of Northern California's rail freight traffic — 98 percent — rumbles through Union

Pacific's gargantuan J.W. Davis Yard in Roseville, where the sign at the locomotive yard's entrance boasts "The Pride of the Sierras."

Here, on a recent morning, rows and rows of hopper cars sat behind tracks dotted with Union Pacific's trademark mustard yellow locomotives lined up end to end and side by side. A long skein of cars crawled through the yard headed east: hoppers, lumber-laden flatbeds and tank cars filled with oil and gasoline.

As many as 2,300 cars a day roll along the switchboard of tracks on the 915-acre site, headed to and from the bustling Port of Oakland, the forests of the Pacific Northwest and to Midwestern cities such as Kansas City, St. Louis and Chicago.

Finding the talent needed to meet the demand of a multibillion-dollar industry, however, has been difficult.

"While people are interested in railroads (as a career), we're still searching for qualified employees," said Union Pacific spokesman Mark Davis.

Railroading provides the type of secure, steady pay that allows a worker to "buy a house, start a family, pay taxes," said Michael

Halbern, a Sierra College professor teaching a new wave of tech-savvy railroaders at the college's Computer Integrated Electronics-Mechanics Program.

Increasingly there are opportunities for women, who make up roughly 9 percent of the total industry work force, according to the U.S. Railroad Retirement Board, the Chicago-based pension authority for the nation's railroads.

While wages average \$67,000 a year, compensation rises to more than \$90,000 with benefits, according to the railroad association, based in Washington, D.C.

Oddly, that was part of the problem, say those in the rail industry. Workers enticed by the good pay and long-term job security grew gray in their jobs.

In 2001, employment law changed, allowing workers with 30 or more years of experience to retire at age 60. That triggered a wave of departures that the industry is still recovering from, said railroad officials.

When those workers retired, not only manpower disappeared but also years of experience on the tracks and in the locomotive.

The retirements were keenly felt because railroads had

trimmed their labor forces as freight shipments moved to air carriers and trucks, said Dan Williams, a Sacramento branch manager at the U.S. Railroad Retirement Board.

Myriad other factors also contributed to boosting the demand for railroad workers: the growth in container shipping; limits on how many hours long-haul truckers could drive; soaring gas prices; the Wyoming coal boom; and the demand for Midwestern corn for ethanol development.

Although freight traffic nationwide was down in May, compared with the same time last year, the nation's seven major freight railroads are hauling more freight than ever before and spending a record \$9.4 billion to increase rail capacity, according to the railroad association.

Through the first 18 weeks of 2007, U.S. railroads hauled 5.8 million carloads and more than 4 million trailers or containers. In total, those cars took 588 billion tons of freight over as many miles.

While lower than the same 18 weeks in 2006, the numbers still speak to a robust \$48 billion industry and to what has driven the demand for employees at

Union Pacific and other railroads in recent years.

Union Pacific found a few good men and women by looking to the military for recruits, Davis said. The railroad has been named top military-friendly employer the past two years by online career guide GJobs.net for its outreach to and hiring of former military personnel.

Still, the demanding, physical work, the long hours often miles from home and an outdated image of the industry discourage some prospects.

"The challenge has been getting young people to think about railroads as a career opportunity. When they think about railroads, they think about shoveling coal and steam engines," Donley of the railroad association, said.

Today, however, technology permeates the industry from the locomotive's cab to the way freight is handled and shipped.

"(The locomotive) is a rolling computer. ... This is not just 'grab a wrench and turn a nut,'" said Sierra College's Halbern. "The railroads have the same needs as other companies. They are trying to find a place where they can attract employees to keep the infrastructure alive."

Face up to who is really behind your credit problem and learn how to make it better

Q: I have learned that companies check your credit history when you apply for a job. Although I have a strong work record, no one will hire me because my credit isn't perfect. I can't even get a part-time position.

Like many good, hard-working people, I have gotten behind in my payments because of the tactics used by credit card companies. Credit card companies are slowly ruining people's lives. What can be done about this?

— Broke and Angry

A: Sounds like someone needs to take a long, hard look in the mirror. Credit card companies may provide the means, but people who run up large debts are ruining their own lives.

While denouncing the card

issuers may feel good, shifting blame keeps you from accepting responsibility. And until you own this problem, you won't be able to solve it. Having buried yourself in debt, you must now dig yourself out.

A non-profit financial counseling agency can help you develop a payoff plan for your current obligations. But the only long-term solution is to change your spending habits. Control your impulses and make purchases only when

you have the cash to cover them.

Although some employers check credit, not all of them do. Your best bet is to apply for positions that have nothing to do with money. If the job involves handling cash or keeping financial records, your credit history is likely to be an obstacle.

If an interviewer warns you that a credit check is coming, provide a heads-up about what the report will say. Then explain the specific steps you are taking to address the problem. If you have made a good impression otherwise, you may be hired despite your financial problems.

Q: One of my co-workers recently became my boss. She has been pressuring me, even threatening me, to get me to

confide in her about other employees the way I used to. I try to keep our conversations strictly professional, but that's not enough for her. She wants me to be her pal.

This woman is notorious for taking anything you say and turning it against you. I tried being her friend when we were co-workers, and that didn't work out too well for me. I don't trust her any farther than I can throw her, but now she's my supervisor. What should I do?

— In a Bind

A: Promotions always alter relationships. Your former colleague needs to realize that she can't be both a boss and a buddy. Even if you trusted her completely, I seriously doubt that you

would tell her everything.

Perhaps you can help her see how the situation has changed. For example: "Now that you're the boss, I know there are things that you won't be able to tell me. I'm sure your manager expects you to keep some information confidential."

"At the same time, I can't share everything that my co-workers say, because that wouldn't be fair to them and they would stop trusting me. But I hope we can still have a friendly relationship." Then continue to be pleasant, cooperative, and close-mouthed.

Firm puts campers online

BOISE, Idaho — Ahh, the rituals of camping.

Crawling out of the sleeping bag on a cool summer morning with the smell of sizzling bacon wafting from the skillet.

Grabbing that first cup of camp coffee and greeting the day by opening up your laptop to see if Wall Street is being kind to your stock portfolio.

Welcome to the new world of camping, where Internet access is almost as important as having enough firewood.

"It used to be that when campers would make reservations at an RV park they would ask if the park had water, electricity and sewer," said Kelly Hogan, CEO of Boise-based NomadISP. "But today it's water, electricity, sewer and Wi-Fi."

For Nomad, the call for the Internet in the wild has meant big money. Four years ago, it was one of the first companies to bring the Internet to RV parks and campgrounds. Now, having installed wireless Internet access in more than 300 parks, Nomad is on track to collect more than \$1.2 million this year in revenue.

"One of my interns summed it up best when he said, 'It's really cool. You can be in the woods and surfing the Web,'" Hogan said.

Nomad employs 12 people at its Boise headquarters. It is now one of the top companies that RV park and campground owners turn to when they want to bring the Internet to campers. The company recently landed a contract as a preferred provider of Internet access at KOA Campgrounds of America.

"From our standpoint it has gotten to the point from not just being nice to have but necessary to have at our RV parks," said Daniel Freedman, an owner of the Hi Valley RV Park in Boise and Ambassador RV Park in Caldwell, Idaho. NomadISP's first installation was in 2002 at Hi Valley, Idaho.

Hogan spent much of his career working for big tech companies such as IBM and Oracle before arriving in the Treasure Valley in 1995 to work for Micron Electronics, which is now MPC Corp.

His inspiration for NomadISP was his inability to get high-speed Internet access from his home on Lake Harbor in Boise to his office across the lake. He fabricated a wireless microwave system to bring wireless Internet from his home to his office.

After that, Hogan started exploring a way to bring similar systems to remote areas.

Since the company sold its first product, its customer base has increased tenfold. Hogan sees more growth ahead. He estimates that only about 18 percent of the RV parks and campgrounds in the country are now connected to the Internet, and Nomad dominates 40 percent of that market.

A park with 100-150 sites spends \$3,200 to \$4,500 for equipment and pays \$100 to \$200 a month for service. That price can go up dramatically in larger parks. A 350-acre park in New Hampshire spent \$25,000 on equipment, Hogan said.

Nomad stations trucks in key areas around the country. Employees from Boise fly to the areas and take the trucks to install or service systems.

In a 2006 KOA survey, 53 percent of campers said they brought their laptops camping, up from 32 percent in 2005.

"For us it's just become another amenity we like to offer to our campers," said C.J. Armstrong, a spokeswoman for the Billings, Mont-

based company.

Armstrong said about 80 percent of KOA's 3,000 campgrounds now have Wi-Fi access. Most parks include it in the nightly fee.

Freedman said a new generation of RV owners — primarily baby boomers and young families — has become accustomed to having Internet access no matter where they go.

"It's an important commodity," said Claudia Burnight, a year-round resident at the Ambassador RV Park in Caldwell, Idaho, who has been a full-time RVer for four years. "I pay most of my bills on line, keep up with my banking and keep in touch with my family and friends."

She said some people have turned their RVs into mobile offices and need Internet access for their work.

Most demand for Wi-Fi is at large and high-end RV parks, but Hogan expects smaller parks will have to follow.

Idaho's state parks don't have Wi-Fi service, but Jennifer Wernex, a spokeswoman for Idaho Parks and Recreation, said some customers ask for it. She said the agency is looking into testing it in a park.

Bob Schneider, the newly elected president of the Treasure Valley Good Sam Club, based

in Meridian, Idaho, said he brings his laptop along on every RV trip and looks for parks with Wi-Fi service.

"The ability to sit in your RV and surf the Internet, check e-mails and whatever else is a great convenience," he said.

Schneider said some parks charge too much for Wi-Fi. In March, Schneider said he took a trip to Nevada, where some parks charged up to \$8 a day. Freedman, the Boise and Caldwell park owner, said short-term residents don't pay for access, but long-term residents pay \$19.95 a month.

Hogan thinks parks eventually will have to provide the service at no extra charge. He said it's becoming more difficult to charge for a service that is free at so many locations. Hotels and coffee shops offer it free, and even some McDonald's have free access.

"The consumer has pretty much come to the conclusion that Internet access should be anywhere and free," he said.

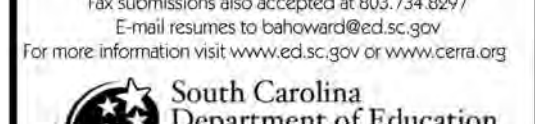

Volkswagen's Eos is three cars in one

You want clever? Volkswagen has clever.

It comes in the 2007 Eos, the German manufacturer's new hardtop convertible. In less than 30 seconds, it converts from a steel top coupe to an open-air cruiser.

But guess what? For those days when you don't want to drop the whole top, it also has built-in slide-open glass sunroof. So you get three ways to enjoy the car, all for the same price.

For Volkswagen, the Eos is a departure from the past, when VW convertibles invariably tilted toward the funky school of automobile design, from the old Bug convertibles of the 1960s and 1970s to the modern but still offbeat Cabriolet, Cabrio and New Beetle models.

There was only one exception to the funk. That was the gorgeous Karmann-Ghia ragtop, also from the 1960s and 1970s, which actually was enshrined in art museums.

The new Eos — named for the Greek goddess of dawn — has more in common with the Karmann-Ghia than the others, in the sense that it has slick styling. Top up or top down, it has flowing lines that make it look as

if it were designed in a wind tunnel.

It also has marvelously tidy dimensions, which makes it easy to park and maneuver in traffic. At 14 feet 6 inches, it's eight inches longer than

a VW Rabbit and six inches shorter than the new BMW 3-Series convertible. It's about a foot and a half longer than the Pontiac Solstice, but the Solstice is a two-seater.

The Eos has room for two in the back seat, as long as they are children or adults less than five feet seven inches tall. Headroom is restricted, but knee room is adequate if you

move the front seats forward a bit.

In fact, no doubt owing to the fact that the Eos has front-wheel drive, the back seat is slightly more accommodating than the one in the steel top 2007 BMW 3-Series convertible, which has rear drive.

Otherwise, the two cars are not comparable. The BMW is a high-performance car with a starting price just shy of \$44,000. The tested Eos, which has no high-performance pretensions, had a sticker price of \$30,620, which was for the 2.0T version with a six-speed manual gearbox and no options.

There are five versions of the EOS, with the base car starting at \$28,750. The top-of-the-line model has a 250-horsepower 3.2-liter V6 engine with a six-speed automatic transmission. It has a \$37,610 starting price and, with a full load of options, can be bumped north of \$40,000.

The tested 2.0T had a 2-liter four-cylinder engine linked to a six-speed manual gearbox. With a turbocharger, it spins out 200 horsepower, which is enough to chalk up a zero-to-60 mile an hour acceleration time of about seven seconds, which makes it competitive in the stop-light sprints.

Delphi may get \$2.55 billion to move ahead

DETROIT — Delphi Corp. announced a new financing plan that would invest up to \$2.55 billion in the auto supplier to bring it out of bankruptcy protection.

Appaloosa Management L.P. is the plan's lead investor, with Harbinger Capital Partners Master Fund I Ltd; Merrill Lynch; Pierce, Fenner & Smith Inc.; UBS Securities LLC; Goldman Sachs & Co. and Paribus Capital Management L.P.

The financing deal announced Wednesday comes after a previous \$3.4-billion plan fell through. In that plan, Cerberus Capital Management LP was the lead investor, along with Appaloosa, Harbinger and two other investment banks.

Delphi terminated that plan ear-

lier this month after warning that it expected Cerberus, which is in the process of buying a majority stake in Chrysler, would not be part of the deal.

Delphi plans to file motions with bankruptcy court today to schedule hearings to approve the deal.

"Today's equity purchase and commitment agreement — and the support that it has received from our statutory committees and GM — represents additional progress in our transformation and provides further evidence to customers and other stakeholders that Delphi should receive the financial support necessary to emerge successfully from Chapter 11 reorganization," said John Sheehan, Delphi chief restructuring officer.

The debate over diesels

DETROIT — Has Maximum Bob gone minimal on diesels?

Not really, but that's what a lot of folks assumed after General Motors Corp. Vice Chairman Bob Lutz recently pointed out some of the fuel-efficient engines' drawbacks.

In the same week that GM bought 50 percent of Italian diesel maker VM Motori and confirmed it will sell diesel versions of upcoming Cadillac and Saturn cars in the United States, Lutz seemed downright pessimistic in comments on fast lane.gmblogs.com.

"The real truth on diesel," Lutz said, is that the engines "are not the answer to a low-cost" way of meeting the 35-mpg fuel-economy standard Congress is considering.

He added that already approved 2010 emissions standards could add \$2,000 to \$2,800 to the price of a diesel engine. Current diesels cost more than equivalent gasoline engines, but the price premium is small enough that the engines quickly pay for themselves in lower fuel costs.

Lutz has a point — several, actually — but none have to do with GM not believing in diesels. It has diesels in the works for cars, pickups and SUVs throughout its model line.

Lutz can be one of the auto industry's most refreshingly candid executives, but he still leaves some room to read between the lines.

Welcome to Lutzology 101: —"Diesels aren't the low-cost solution to a 35-mpg CAFE requirement."

This is absolutely true, but it's also a smart defensive position. Americans can become so infatuated by the

great mileage diesels achieve in small European cars that we overlook the fact that Europeans drive small cars. The compact Opel Astra that I drove around Europe this spring got around 37 mpg in mixed highway and city driving. But a diesel Chrysler minivan gets 28 mpg in European testing, according to the German magazine Auto Bild.

That's good fuel economy, but not numbers that get you to a 35-mpg average for the entire vehicle fleet unless you build lots of small to tiny cars and few of the midsize to large cars Americans prefer.

Throwing cold water on the hype is a good way to make sure legislators and diesel fans don't hear about cars such as the little Astra or the minute Smart ForTwo and decide 35 mpg is easily attainable, so why not push for 50?

True, though the cost should fall as technology improves and automakers squeeze their suppliers.

More to the point, though, is whether the new limits that come into effect in 2010 are necessary.

They will make U.S. diesels by far the cleanest in the world, but accepting that the standards are necessary requires you to also believe that most of the nations in Europe are blithely poisoning their citizens, since half the cars sold there burn diesel.

Not likely, and applying those more easily attainable standards in the United States might help diesels become common enough to have a measurable impact on our petroleum intake and greenhouse-gas output.

A fading brand finds glamour once again

There was a time when Buicks were sought out by royalty, popes and movie stars, but that was back when Franklin D. Roosevelt was in the White House. Today, that sort of reverence is held only by the Chinese, who bought more Buicks last year than Americans.

Seeking once again to produce a Buick worthy of a close-up, General Motors is eliminating the Rainier SUV, Rendezvous crossover SUV and Terraza minivan for 2008 and replacing them with the Enclave crossover SUV.

It's a good move on GM's part, for the Enclave is the most memorable, and most glamorous, Buick fielded in many years.

Instead of the usual box-like SUV shell draped over a car platform, Buick has banished the banal for beautiful, endowing the Enclave with a curvaceous sexiness Buicks were once famous for. Up front, a large waterfall grille anchors a character line that trails rearward. Buick's classic venti-ports, one for each cylinder, accent the hood. Finished with a bit of bling, this distinctive crossover is ready for a night on the town, even if that's just a trip to Chuck E. Cheese. Inside, metallic and burled wood trim blends with art deco motifs, and high-quality materials lend the interior a rich feel.

But this Buick's star quality is more than skin-deep.

The Enclave shares its platform

with the Saturn Outlook and GMC Acadia.

It also shares its driveline, a 275-horsepower, double-overhead-cam 3.6-liter V6 mated to GM's new six-speed automatic transmission.

Like its siblings, the Enclave is sufficiently powered for most situations, and unlike the Outlook I recently drove, the Enclave's transmission proved very responsive. Shifting manually improved the engine's responsiveness.

Piloting the Enclave was a pleasant surprise, for it proved to be very responsive, quite a feat for a vehicle weighing in at 4,708 pounds and more than 200 inches long. Steer-

ing seems ideally weighted. The fully-independent suspension absorbed the rough stuff without the floaty ride you might expect from a Buick.

The polished performance was enhanced by Buick engineers' use of triple door seals, laminated windshield glass and other sound-deadening techniques. The interior is astonishingly quiet, making it the perfect concert hall for the optional Bose audio system with surround sound, or watching a movie on the optional rear-seat DVD player.

Speaking of the second and third rows, you'll find the second row

spacious. The third row is habitable by adults, if the second row slides forward a bit.

Safety gear includes four-wheel disc-brakes with anti-lock, traction control, stability control and front and side airbags.

Options include 19-inch wheels and tires, leather trim, sunroof, cargo shade, heavy-duty towing package, rear parking assist, remote vehicle starting and heated windshield washer fluid.

There are two trim levels, CX and CXL, available in front-wheel- or all-wheel-drive. The front-wheel-drive model returns 16 mpg in city driving, 24 mpg on the highway. The all-wheel-drive model returns identical city mileage, but yields 2 mpg on the interstate. Fuel economy was slightly better than SUVs, but still disappointing.

The test vehicle loaned by GM, a front-wheel-drive CX, was lightly optioned, featuring a \$980 Entertainment Package (six-disc CD changer/MP3 player, rear-seat audio controls, Bose speaker system), \$520 Driver Confidence Package (remote starting, rear parking assist, heated washer fluid), \$225 aluminum wheels and a \$495 credit for second- and third-row bench seats. Bottom line was \$34,020, about the same as many thirstier, ordinary SUVs.

This new Buick is true to its heritage of long ago, offering comfort, quality, style and substance at an affordable price.

On-off braking

Q. The guy who drives my daily vanpool insists that he must stop the vehicle by braking, releasing and braking again, rather than just pressing the brake steadily in order to stop. He mentioned something about this allowing the engine to downshift.

Is this true? I've never heard of this, and to tell you the truth, it's making me carsick. The van is a 2006 Dodge Caravan, which I believe has antilock brakes.

A. That driving habit is almost as annoying as an inattentive motorist who's constantly on and off the throttle while cruising down the road. It's frustrating and potentially nauseating.

There's no advantage to braking, coasting and braking while slowing for a routine stop, but then again there's no mechanical harm to the vehicle. In today's computer-controlled vehicles, downshifting is triggered by an electronic command from the powertrain or transmission control module based on sensor inputs including vehicle speed, throttle position, manifold pressure and engine rpm.

To my knowledge there's no direct input from the brake switch, meaning that downshift commands aren't based on brake application. **Q.** I have a 1990 Olds 98 Regency with 235,000 miles on it. My question: Is there any set schedule that tells when to replace front-wheel bearings? How do I tell if trouble is brewing? I would enjoy being able to drive this car to the 300,000-mile mark.

A. Drive on without worrying about front-wheel bearings. If you drove an older Olds rear-wheel drive sedan, you'd want to inspect and repack the "coaster" front-wheel bearings every 30,000 miles or so. But your front-wheel-drive Olds 98 is fitted with sealed front hub assemblies that bolt onto the suspension "knuckle," or upright. These hub-bearing units require no maintenance and may well last the life of the vehicle — even with the high mileage you're hoping for.

The fix is simple: Replace the entire hub assembly with a used, new or remanufactured unit. It's a bolt-on component, requiring removal of the wheel, brake caliper, rotor and drive axle.

Land Rover LR2: An elegant road-tamer

Say Land Rover to most folks, and you're likely to get this reaction: rugged luxury sport-utility vehicle out of my price range.

Well, OK, that's what you get with a vehicle lineup that includes the LR3 (priced at \$41,435-\$53,235), the Range Rover Sport (\$57,235-\$70,535) and the Range Rover (\$76,535-\$92,035).

But hold the phone. Land Rover has introduced an all-new 2008 model called the LR2 SE that starts at a relatively affordable \$34,700. And while it's not packed with scores of glorious goodies, it's not stripped for that price.

In fact, the tested LR2 more than upheld Land Rover's reputation as a producer of elegant SUVs that will roll over rocks, ford streams and tame off-road trails. And, yes, it handles pavement, too.

The compact, five-passenger LR2 replaces the Freelander in the lineup of the British-based SUV manufacturer under the Ford Motor Co. ownership umbrella. If you've longed for the upscale Land Rover experience without taking out a second mortgage, the LR2 shapes up as your best opportunity.

The first thing you should know is that it handles like a passenger car — easily more so than anything else Land Rover makes. This is by-design, with the LR2 rolling on a Ford car platform.

On paved surfaces, the tested LR2 with permanent all-wheel drive was a tad stiff, but otherwise nimble and responsive.

The monocoque construction of the LR2's body travels smoothly on straight roads and mountain twistlers, but stability and rigidity were especially evident on an off-road course.

I've always been amazed how a Land Rover SUV eats up an off-road trail while I sit comfortably in its genteel interior cabin. It's sort of like driving a tank outfitted inside like a five-star hotel.

The LR2 upholds this tradition nicely.

In off-pavement motoring, it felt utterly stable and sure-footed. While I went through the off-road paces, I was firmly situated and comfortable in my leather driver's seat, with the moderate "whoosh" of the

dual-zone climate control the only sound of note as the LR2 tackled the terrain. Impressive.

Kudos to Land Rover engineers on the LR2's four-wheel electronic traction control, continuously varying front/rear torque split system and the automaker's Terrain Response system that enables a driver to choose settings for grass, gravel, snow, mud, ruts and other off-road conditions.

Did I mention that the LR2 can roll through a stream nearly 20 inches deep with no problem? It can.

Exterior styling is pleasant. The LR2 rides high and has traditional Land Rover styling cues. Interior cargo space is good at nearly 59

cubic feet.

Please note that the LR2's engine — a 3.2-liter in-line 6 rated at 230 horsepower — is quite capable on and off-road, but it's no neck-snapper. Zero-to-60 miles per hour times run in the 8.5 seconds range. That should work for most; this 4,255-pound SUV is not the kind of vehicle in which you blast away at the turn of the green light.

Like I said, the LR2 in basic trim is not stripped. Standard features include a nine-speaker Alpine sound system, a six-disc CD changer, steering wheel-mounted controls, push-button engine start, trip computer, leather-wrapped steering wheel, power sunroof and a second, fixed-

position sunroof.

An exceptional safety package includes air bags all around, rain-sensing windshield wipers, rear-park distance monitor and front/rear fog lamps.

If you want some of the primo features, however, pay you must.

The tester included a \$3,500 Technology Package with a DVD-based navigation system and Bluetooth phone module, a \$1,050 Lighting Package with bi-xenon headlamps and memory driver's seat/exterior mirrors and a \$700 Cold Climate Package with heated windshield, front seats and windshield washer fluid.

These perks put the bottom line

on the tester at \$39,950 — still a pretty easy number to take in this high-end SUV segment.

However, I averaged only slightly more than 20 miles per gallon in combined city/highway driving, and Land Rover recommends premium unleaded for its LR2.

There are some things to get used to if you're sampling a Land Rover for the first time. Interior controls don't always follow the one-step logic of other makes. It might take you a couple extra steps to set the radio stations and some other functions, but these efforts are minor once you master the rhythm of the buttons and knobs.

Those who had bad experiences

Ford workers would like to see profit trickle down to them

DETROIT — After a year of watching their company lose billions of dollars and cut tens of thousands of jobs through buyouts, Ford Motor Co. workers were smiling Thursday and pleased to hear the Dearborn, Mich., automaker made money in the second quarter.

Bryan Rivera, a 33-year-old worker at Ford's Dearborn Truck Plant, is on his third plant because previous factories were closed or idled, but said he is hopeful that Ford is turning the corner.

"I'm trying to keep a positive outlook," Rivera said Thursday outside the plant. "With today's news, that's good news and we haven't had good news in a long time."

Ford's \$750 million in net income for the second quarter was a surprise to Wall Street analysts, who predicted the company would lose hundreds of millions in the quarter.

Workers like Rivera said they have seen improvement. In June, Ford topped five model categories, more than any other company, in the J.D. Power and Associates annual report on initial quality.

Ford is on the right track, but the recovery will not be easy, said John Wallbank, 60, a Ford millwright. Wallbank is assigned to a Wixom, Mich., plant that has stopped production. He is waiting to be transferred to a new job in Dearborn.

The company is trying to undo the missteps of Jacques Nasser, a Ford chief executive in 1999-2001 who created the Premier Automotive Group of luxury brands, Wallbank said. The luxury unit has never lived up to its billing, with Ford recently selling off Aston Martin and shopping around Land Rover and Jaguar for bidders.

"I think people have a considerable amount of certainty that the

company will be healthy and the company will do good things," Wallbank said. "They have new management — a new outlook. They've made some mistakes, but now they're correcting those."

Some workers, though, wanted to know when the profits would find their way to the rank-and-file employees.

Ford started contract talks this week with the UAW. Many industry experts have said all three Detroit automakers will seek wage and benefit concessions but that Ford in particular will need help to survive.

The second-quarter earnings add new context to Ford's talks with the UAW, said Gary Walkowicz, 57, a Ford repairman at Dearborn Truck.

"I think they won't be able to cry poor for negotiations the way they've been doing for the last number of months," Walkowicz said.

Clarifying alignment, balancing, struts, shocks

Q. I just returned from buying new tires and my head is spinning with the different terms they rattled off, telling me what I needed for my car or might need soon. Can you clear the air for me on alignments, balancing, struts and shocks? How do I know when I need any of these? How important are they? What can I defer until the money is there to spend?
—Angela Rasmussen, San Jose, Calif.

A. No problem, Angela. There are lots of folks who aren't so sure about this. Wheel alignment is important to insure proper tire wear and vehicle stability. Due to highly accurate design and assembly methods, most modern cars have only one alignment angle that might require adjustment.

This is called "toe" and is basically the parallelism of the two front or rear wheels. Should toe be incorrect, the tires will wear quickly, usually more so on one side of the tread.

Some vehicles might allow a camber and a caster adjustment. Camber is a measurement of the

vertical nature of the tire/wheel and caster is the angle of the suspension pivots. This is similar to the angle of a bicycle's front fork. Incorrect camber will increase wear to one side of the tire and might cause the vehicle to pull slightly to one side. Caster determines how well the vehicle tracks straight, and is not a tire-wear factor. If your tires are wearing quickly or oddly, or pulling is evident, it's a good idea to have a wheel alignment performed.

Wheel balance is important for driving comfort and suspension/steering component longevity. A shaking wheel, besides being annoying, can quickly wear tire-rod ends and other parts.

Wheel balancing always is done at the time of tire replacement and might be needed between replacement, should a weight fall off or shaking becomes evident. If you feel no vibration in the steering wheel or seat of your pants while driving at any/all speeds, wheel balance is probably fine.

Struts are shock absorbers that are integrated into the suspension system. They're a little more

expensive than traditional shocks, and require greater labor to renew. Shocks/struts dampen wheel-assembly motion and are important for maintaining vehicle stability.

When you encounter bumps, the suspension compresses, then extends repeatedly, like a bouncing ball. If the shock/strut were not there to minimize this motion, your tires could lose contact with the ground, affecting traction.

Excessive body roll and bouncing also can occur, upsetting stability. Shock absorber companies would like to sell you shocks/struts every 50,000 miles, but I think one can go a while further, as long as the vehicle feels nailed-down during bumpy turns, the tires show no signs of cupping wear, and no oil seepage is seen on the shocks/struts.

When it comes to prioritizing these services, they're all in the good-to-do category, unless symptoms indicate greater need.

Any clunking, shaking, or excessive looseness in one's steering should, of course, be taken seriously.

Multitasking drivers are everywhere

CHICAGO — If you aren't concerned about who shares the road with you and what they might be doing while driving, you should be.

Drivers around you are gabbing on a cell phone, eating, fiddling with the stereo, applying makeup or trying to retrieve a text message — at the least. Some could be doing two or more of those at once.

"Americans are doing just about everything in their car except focusing on driving," said Bill Windsor, associate vice president of safety for Nationwide Mutual Insurance Co.

A Nationwide survey finds that three-fourths of drivers admitted to driving while drowsy, 31 percent said they daydream and 38 percent said they had driven somewhere with no recollection of doing it.

There's someone behind the wheel of every vehicle, but there's not telling where their eyes and minds are.

"It really requires you to expect the unexpected and be a better defensive driver," Windsor said. "You don't know what others are going to do."

The National Highway Traffic Safety Administration says that in nearly 80 percent of accidents the driver was distracted three seconds or less before the crash.

That's not news to Nationwide. More than 80 percent of the 1,200 people who responded to its survey identified themselves as "multitaskers," drivers who do at least one other thing besides mind the helm. Motorists age 18 to 27 were the least focused on driving, with 35 percent saying they always multitask.

Cell phones are frequent culprits, with 73 percent saying they used them while driving. Only

adjusting the stereo (82 percent) and sipping a beverage (80 percent) topped phones among non-driving tasks.

A 2005 study by the Insurance Institute for Highway Safety concluded that using a cell phone increases the chances of having an injury-causing accident four times.

"More and more drivers expect their vehicles to be an office away from the office and an entertainment center. That's certainly not a good thing," said Anne McCartt, vice president of research for the institute.

And research by NHTSA and the insurance institute shows talking is as bad as dialing the call.

"The conversation is a major distraction," McCartt said "Hands-free phones don't eliminate the cognitive distractions."

But cell phones can't be singled out.

One out of five drivers in Nationwide's survey said they read and send text or instant messages. Among 18- to 27-year-olds, it was 37 percent, which Hudson finds particularly alarming because younger drivers have more accidents.

"Three seconds at 65 miles per hour will take you the length of a football field. Drivers won't see any of that if they're looking down," he said.

Multitasking has become routine, especially among youngsters who grew up with cell phones and e-mail. Kids often send messages while doing homework, for example, to maintain almost constant contact with friends.

"They're just carrying it over to the car," Hudson said. "But multitasking while driving is a lot different than when you're doing

Chrysler plans new 300s from Canada in 2010

DETROIT — While scrapping plans to build a luxury car at a plant near Toronto, Chrysler still plans to pump a lot of money into the facility to make Chrysler 300s.

Chrysler is expected to announce Thursday that it is moving up its timetable to begin production on a new version of the popular Chrysler 300, from 2011 to 2010, and that its

Brampton, Ontario, Canada, assembly facility will begin making versions of the 300 now made in Europe, Canadian Auto Workers union President Buzz Hargrove said.

Chrysler builds the 300 for North America at the Brampton facility and uses supplier Magna International to assemble the 300 for European markets.

Hargrove said the plant will

take over additional production of the 300s from Magna's assembly plant in Austria, meaning the Brampton plant will be making both right- and left-hand drive vehicles, as well as a diesel version.

The Brampton plant also makes the Dodge Charger and Magnum. The assembly and stamping operations employ 4,200 people, according to a Chrysler Web page.

Chrysler's warranty deal shows confidence

DETROIT — Chrysler, the automaker with the most recalls in the industry last year, announced Thursday that it has started offering a lifetime warranty on the engines, transmissions and drive systems for most of the vehicles it makes — the most aggressive guarantee to be offered by a carmaker. “It’s pretty incredible,” Alan Helfman, vice president of Helfman River Oaks Chrysler Jeep in Houston, said of the announcement to dealers, which took effect immediately for Chrysler, Dodge and Jeep brands.

Chrysler has struggled with the perception that its vehicles have lower quality compared to foreign automakers such as Toyota Motor Corp.

Chrysler did poorly in the recent J.D. Power and Associates annual study of new-vehicle quality, and in 2006, Chrysler had 2.3 million vehicles called back in 27 separate recall notices, which was three times as many as in 2005. Chrysler has recalled 975,443 vehicles this year.

Michael Omotoso, senior manager of global power train at J.D. Power, said Chrysler has made improvements, including the four-cylinder World Engine going into the Chrysler Sebring and other vehicles and the upcoming V6 Phoenix Engine.

“It’s a very big step,” Omotoso said. “They have had quality issues in the past. But they’ve improved their quality recently.”

He noted that the new warranty could be costly if the company continues to have quality problems.

“They must be confident or hoping they can take care of those quality issues in the next year or two,” he said. “This seems to show confidence.”

Chrysler is being acquired by private equity firm Cerberus Capital Management.

Dealers said this new move will strongly combat the perception that the quality isn’t there. “It will nullify all concerns. We have the best warranty in the business now. Toyota doesn’t give that. Nissan doesn’t give that. Put your money where your mouth is, big boy,” Helfman said.

Bill Golling of Golling Chrysler Jeep Dodge Inc. in Bloomfield Township, Mich., says the new warranty will help sell vehicles.

“It does say exactly what we all believe, which is that our products are as competitive as anybody out there,” he said. “I know the quality is good in them, and our

customers who own them know the quality is good in them. Now we are going to make sure everybody knows how much we believe in it.”

Chrysler said the lifetime warranty will cover the cost of all parts and labor needed to repair engine, transmission and drive systems on most 2006, 2007 and 2008 model-year vehicles. The warranty does not apply to diesel and SRT8 vehicles. It is limited to the first registered owner or retail lessee, the company said.

The owner must have the power train inspected — for free — by authorized Chrysler, Jeep or Dodge dealers every five years.

The warranty “is a statement of confidence to our customers to the reliability of their power train. It’s peace-of-mind reassurance for as long as they own the vehicle,” said Steven Landry, Chrysler executive vice president for North American sales.

It’s not a so-called bumper-to-bumper warranty, which covers all issues with a vehicle, but still deals with vehicle parts that are expensive to customers if trouble arises.

Landry said: “The power train is the most important part, that’s the go-to part of the vehicle that people are more concerned with versus light bulbs and stuff like that.”

Chrysler’s previous power train warranty was for three years or 36,000 miles.

Rebecca Lindland, analyst with Global Insight, said the new warranty is a good marketing campaign. “It is a great way to close a sale,” she said. “It is also a very effective way to sweeten the deal without necessarily piling on the incentives.”

Speaking of limiting the warranty to the original owners, Lindland added, “It does to a certain extent put a cap on it because it if you sell the vehicle it doesn’t go with it.”

Hyundai Motor Corp. is an example of an automaker introducing a warranty to help turn around its reputation. Introducing a 10-year, 100,000-mile warranty helped the automaker convince buyers that it was serious about quality.

Landry said Chrysler aimed to do even better.

“When we looked at the quality of our product, the quality of our power train and durability and reliability, we came to the decision that we don’t want to match everybody. We want to go way beyond that, we want to be unprecedented, we want to show the confidence we have in the product,” Landry said.

Rear-wheel-drive is again in vogue

CHICAGO — Rear-wheel-drive is making a comeback, and not just because it makes for a better experience than front-wheel-drive.

RWD also lends itself to classic design proportions that give a car a prestigious, powerful look that can send subliminal signals to consumers that make them want it.

“The public can’t tell you what lights are going off, but they like the performance-oriented proportions,” General Motors designer Michael Simcoe said of the look that includes a long hood with its large space between the dashboard and front axle.

The long hood dates to luxury cars of the 1920s and 1930s, when they accommodated the engines of the time, often inline 8-cylinder jobs.

“If you ask someone to draw a luxury car, I’ll bet you they would draw something with a long hood, big wheels and a small upper,” Simcoe said, the latter referring to the windows and roof. “Those are the traditional performance and luxury cues.”

GM is using those cues on two new RWD models, the 2008 Cadillac CTS and the 2009 Chevrolet Camaro.

GM introduced the RWD 2008 Pontiac G8 at the Chicago Auto Show. The next-generation Chevrolet Impala, due for 2009, was expected to be RWD as well before higher federal fuel economy regulations put it on hold.

RWD gives designers “the perfect architecture for lower, sleeker and wider,” said Bruce Campbell, vice president of Nissan Design America. “The head-turning cars will continue to have those qualities.”

Infiniti, Nissan’s luxury brand, dropped FWD models a few years ago to separate Infiniti’s packaging and powertrains from those of Nissan, whose only RWD model is the 350Z sports car.

On front-drive cars, the engine is usually mounted transversely, over the front axle, allowing the passenger compartment to be placed farther forward to maximize the space for people while trimming the vehicle’s length.

On rear-drive cars, the engine mounts longitudinally, usually farther back. Campbell says that allows the passenger compartment to be centered between the front and rear wheels, giving a car a more balanced appearance.

“The symbols and signals are different messages. Front-wheel-drive really celebrates the cabin,” Campbell said, but rear-wheel-drive emphasizes performance and styling. “The driver feels like he’s in the center of the car, where it gives the feeling of performance.”

John Wolkonowicz, an analyst with industry forecaster Global Insight, says the proportions of RWD cars, such those few more inches between the front axle and the dash, shine in the showroom.

“Those proportions are what makes a rear-wheel-drive car look like it’s in motion, gives it a very dynamic look,” he said, pointing to the BMW 3- and 5-Series and the



2008 Cadillac CTS.

Ford Mustang as examples. Unable to put their fingers on the attraction, consumers will “say they like the lines’ or the styling.”

By comparison, Wolkonowicz says most front-drive cars “look like somebody who is walking bent over.”

The long hood/short deck profile of the Mustang persuaded Terry Hebert to buy a used 1973 convertible nearly 30 years ago, a car he still owns.

“I just liked the style and look of the car,” said Hebert, president of the Northern Mustang Coral, a club based in Bourbonnais, Ill. “The long hood makes it look powerful. That’s where all the power is, up front.”

Hebert also owns a 1984 Mustang GT350 and a 2002 Dodge Intrepid, a front-wheel-drive sedan.

“It feels like you’re sitting right next to the front wheels,” Hebert said of the Intrepid, “but in the ‘73 Mustang it feels like the hood goes forever. A long hood means power and style.”

The industry’s sea change to front-wheel-drive happened in the 1980s to make cars smaller and more fuel-efficient. Packing the engine, transmission and drive axles into a small area let designers shrink the size and weight of cars without compromising passenger space.

Rear-wheel-drive survived mainly on luxury brands such as BMW and Mercedes-Benz, where size and weight weren’t as important. Those automakers didn’t feel the same pressure to boost fuel economy or the need to sacrifice RWD’s driving characteristics.

Wolkonowicz says that’s what helped give rear-wheel-drive an upscale image.

One of the knocks against RWD has been poor snow traction compared to FWD cars, but RWD cars can be designed to accommodate all-wheel-drive. Chrysler did that with

the 300, and Mercedes-Benz offers AWD on all its sedans to answer traction issues in the Snow Belt.

Traction control, which is widely available, also can improve grip on RWD cars. But Wolkonowicz still gives the nod to front-wheel drive in the snow — with amplification. “You have nothing to gain from front-wheel-drive unless you need snow traction.”

CNW Marketing Research, which studies what consumers want in their vehicles, reports that 30 percent of Americans say they are willing to switch to RWD. The highest interest is in the South (63 percent) and the lowest is in the Rocky Mountains (8 percent).

However, the benefits of a traditional selling point of RWD, improved handling, may be lost on many drivers, Wolkonowicz said. Putting the drive axles in the back improves the weight balance and takes a load off the front tires, which don’t have to steer and propel the car.

Wolkonowicz points out that

many drivers don’t know or care which wheels drive their car. “They know they don’t want bad traction in the snow, and they know they don’t want ugly cars,” he said.

Besides, front-wheel-drive doesn’t limit a car’s layout. But adding length to a car to improve its proportions runs counter to a key reason for FWD — more efficient use of space.

“That gets down to the skill of the people doing the packaging,” Simcoe said. “It’s a choice of the function of the vehicle in the end.”

For example, the Chevrolet Volt concept vehicle that was at the Chicago Auto Show is an aggressively styled FWD car with classic RWD proportions, yet it has an experimental plug-in electric propulsion system and a small gas engine.

“It certainly busts the myth that you need a big engine and a performance vehicle to do that,” Simcoe said. “We can pretty much do anything we want with any powertrain.”

New survey rates car dealers

SAN JOSE, Calif. — In an innovative study that evaluates how well car shoppers — not buyers — are treated in showrooms, Acura, Land Rover and Saturn dealers came out on top.

Brands such as Volkswagen, BMW, Dodge and Lexus also did well. Toyota and Honda ranked about average for the auto industry, while Ford, Chevy, Mazda and Scion were below average.

Evaluating the experiences of car shoppers is important, the study’s founder said, because 75 to 90 percent of car shoppers don’t buy a new car or truck the same day they visit a dealership.

Most surveys of customer satisfaction, including the well-known annual studies from J.D. Power & Associates, focus on car buyers, said Fran O’Hagan, whose Pied Piper Management in Pacific Grove, Calif., released its first auto-industry Prospect Satisfaction Index on July 16.

“Very few industries or businesses devote much time to tomorrow’s buyers,” said O’Hagan, a former executive with Indian Motorcycle in Gilroy, Calif., and a 15-year veteran of the auto industry with BMW, Land Rover and others.

In all, 21 brands ranked above average, four were at the industry average and 12 were below average. Like early J.D. Power studies, the Pied Piper report ranked those brands only at or above average. The below-average nameplates were listed alphabetically.

Power, based in Westlake Village, Calif., and now owned by McGraw-Hill, has been researching how satisfied car buyers are with brands, dealers and vehicles for decades. It now does studies on everything from mobile phones to new homes, and in places from Germany to Thailand as well as in the United States.

In its most recent Sales Satis-

faction Index, released in November, Jaguar, Cadillac, Lincoln and Porsche topped the study that measured factors including the sales staff, dealership facility and car-buying process.

In comparison, Pied Piper is an upstart. But O’Hagan believes he has found a niche. He envisions the automotive Prospect Satisfaction Index as an annual study. He has already conducted similar research on motorcycle and recreational vehicle dealers, where Harley-Davidson and Monoco came out on top, respectively.

He spent several years refining a process that adds empirical research to mystery-shopper interviews.

As a marketer, O’Hagan said he views mystery shoppers, anonymous people assigned to shop at a retail facility, “very, very positively.” Yet, there’s a caveat, he said. “The very nature of mystery shopping is hiring fake shoppers.”

And, sometimes, those fake shoppers act or react differently than real ones. An example, he said, is that mystery shoppers tend to grade whether they’re greeted and how nicely very highly. Regular shoppers don’t care as much, he said.

“In contrast, when a shopper wanted help, and a dealer provided help in a professional manner — whether it’s a particular model they’re looking at or ‘Where is the Coke machine?’ — that’s 10 times more important to a real shopper,” he said.

So he and his staff separated the auto-industry sales process into a list of 223 different factors and researched their importance with real car shoppers at dealerships throughout the country.

They then sent in hired mystery shoppers to the same locations, to compare their responses to the responses from the real car shoppers, and used the findings to narrow down the sales process factors into a 55-item survey.

House talk on plug-in cars erupts

WASHINGTON — A debate over the survival of Detroit’s automakers broke out during a congressional hearing Thursday on the future of plug-in hybrid vehicles, as advocates pressed for more action and a Detroit defender warned the industry was on the brink of collapse.

The hearing was a mix of sympathy, castigation and bluster that has become typical of any debate about the auto industry on Capitol Hill. While General Motors Corp., Ford Motor Co. and DaimlerChrysler are building prototype plug-in hybrid vehicles, none was invited to the hearing of the House Select Committee on Energy Independence and Global Warming.

Ford posts surprising second-quarter profit

DETROIT — As Ford Motor Co. celebrated its first quarterly profit in two years on Thursday, Chief Executive Officer Alan Mulally emphasized to anyone who would listen — including UAW members who might view the result as an economic turning point — that victory is still about a year and a half away.

Despite the company’s surprising \$750 million profit in the second quarter, a result of Ford’s strong performance overseas and intense cost-cutting in Dearborn, Mich., Mulally noted that the company’s

crucial North American division is still losing money.

“We have a long way to go,” he said of the company’s turnaround plan.

As Mulally talked to workers in a town hall meeting, analysts on a conference call and reporters in interviews, he sought to temper enthusiasm about the results with realism about Ford’s long-term situation — especially as the automaker and union sit down to negotiate a new labor contract.

“North America is losing a lot of money, and it’s projected to lose money in the third quarter, the

fourth quarter, year end, 2008,” Mulally told the Detroit Free Press. “We have a long way to go to get back to profitability and have a viable business. ... That’s what we have to focus on.”

Investors had been expecting the 104-year-old automaker to post about \$700 million in losses amid a tough North American market.

Instead, Ford posted profits that were substantial enough to offset its loss in the first quarter and put the company \$468 million in the black for the first half of the year.

What’s more, Ford has more available cash than expected, a total of

\$37.4 billion.

The good news caught investors’ eyes on a day when the stock market fell dramatically. Ford was the most-traded stock on the New York Stock Exchange, closing the day at \$8.09, up 12 cents, or 2 percent.

Dearborn Truck Plant worker Gary Walkowicz, 57, of Detroit, viewed the news as a relevant development as the UAW and Ford sit down to craft a new contract.

“There’s been a lot of talk about how Ford is doing poorly,” he said. “I think this shows to me more reasons why we should not be giving up anything.”

Witnesses at the panel — including actor Rob Lowe — urged Congress to back the nascent plug-in hybrid industry, citing the 150-mpg efficiency that prototypes can achieve in city driving because of their use of nightly recharging and driving up to 40 miles on electricity alone.

“Congress seems to be making a conscious decision to bankrupt Detroit,” Miller said.

Miller said after the hearing that Markey had enough votes to put his fuel economy proposal on the House energy bill, but had declined her requests to hold a hearing in Detroit on new technologies or invite auto executives to his panel.

Academy of Distinguished Alumni in 1991, also has honorary doctoral degrees from Harvard and Cambridge universities. He currently serves as president of the National Academy of Engineering.

Eugene Cileto, the Glen H. Hiner dean of WVU's College of Engineering and Mineral Resources, said he's pleased his school can lay claim to one of the country's top technological leaders.

"We are very proud and honored," he said, "to have such a distinguished alum who has achieved so much in his prestigious career to

be president emeritus of MIT, the new president of the National Academy and now to receive this highest level of recognition for technology innovation in the United States. It is richly deserved, and we look forward to his continuing leadership in technology education and research."

The technology medal honors America's leading innovators for their contributions to the nation's well-being, be it through the development of new products, processes and concepts. It is administered by the Department of Commerce, which established the award in 1980 through

an act of Congress.

"These individuals are some of the most innovative minds in America," Secretary of Commerce Carlos Gutierrez said. "They have done everything from improving the health of our nation to keeping our nation more secure, and they have inspired future generations of American inventors, discoverers, teachers and innovators."

The other technology honorees are: Leslie Geddes, Purdue University; Paul Kaminski, Technovation Inc.; Herwig Kogelnik, Alcatel-Lucent Bell Labs; and James West, Johns Hopkins University.

WVU Research Corp. announces Robert C. Byrd Professorship awards

The WVU Research Corp. has honored professors Mridul Gautam and Earl Scime, and Associate Professor Laura F. Gibson with Robert C. Byrd Professorship awards.

The awards were established and funded by the WVURC to acknowledge outstanding professional accomplishments and leadership of WVU faculty. The program recognizes faculty for their achievements in research and other scholarly activities, particularly the impact of their research and scholarly activities in their fields of study, including technology development, technology transfer and commercialization.

"The Robert C. Byrd Professorship is intended to be a prestigious award and based on distinction in one's field of scholarly work," said John D. Weete, vice president for research and economic development and president of WVURC. "Recipients are expected to hold the highest standards and values of academic scholarship."

Mridul Gautam, professor in the department of mechanical and aerospace engineering in the College of Engineering and Mineral Resources (CEMR), has been selected for a full professor award.

With an impressive record in both

research and teaching, Gautam has received numerous awards and honors from within the university, as well as national and international professional associations. Specifically, his career at WVU has produced international acclaimed work in gas-particle flows, combustion generated nanoparticles and exhaust emission formation, measurement, characterization and control.

Gautam's research has cut across disciplinary boundaries by folding in researchers from all over the world specializing in fields of medicine, toxicology, physics, chemistry and material science.

Over the past 19 years, Gautam has been the principal investigator or co-principal investigator on more than \$50 million in funded research, most of this through the Center for Alternative Fuels, Engines and Emissions.

Gautam's research sponsors include the U.S. Department of Energy, South Coast Air Quality Management District, U.S. Department of Transportation, National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health, Center for Advanced Research in Biotechnology, Coordinating Research Council, multiple engine manufacturers with oversight from the U.S. Environmental

Protection Agency, state of West Virginia and other state and federal agencies.

Guatam has a vision for advancing research in academic institutions, in general, and at WVU, in particular. His efforts have focused on establishing world-class centers that will conduct a mix of fundamental and applied-sponsored research, and will also serve as technology catalysts within their respective regional and state economies.

Initiatives launched include the Center for Advanced Research in Autonomous Technologies, Diesel Research Program, National Center for Mining Engines and Safety, Nanoparticle Toxicology Laboratory and Cooperative Research and Development Agreements.

Earl E. Scime, professor and chair of the department of physics in the Eberly College of Arts and Sciences, also has been selected for a full professor award. His research program in experimental physics is one of the few in the world that spans both laboratory and space plasma physics. His contributions to both of these research areas are significant and widely recognized in the plasma physics community and WVU.

As chair of the department of physics, his leadership has resulted

in the development of interdisciplinary research programs at WVU, including the WVNano Initiative and a new multidisciplinary astrophysics/radio astronomy research program.

Scime's research achievements have been recognized with the Claude Worthington Benedum Distinguished Scholar Award, Outstanding Research and Outstanding Teacher Award from the Eberly College of Arts and Sciences, a NASA Group Achievement Award for his work with the IMAGE spacecraft team, election to full membership in Commission H of the Union Radio-Scientifique Internationale and U.S. Department of Energy Plasma Physics Junior Faculty Research Grant.

Scime's accomplishments have enhanced both undergraduate and graduate education and research at WVU, providing outstanding opportunities for students and faculty alike. His mentorship of six undergraduate Goldwater Scholars is unprecedented at WVU and has elevated WVU's research mission with national visibility and acclaim.

In the area of sponsored research, Scime has an outstanding record of securing funds for his research program — having secured more than \$4 million in external funding from agencies including the National Sci-

ence Foundation, Department of Energy and NASA.

Laura F. Gibson, associate professor in the department of pediatrics at the WVU School of Medicine, has been honored with an associate professor award. Gibson is a National Institutes of Health-funded investigator and also serves as vice chair for research in the department of pediatrics and adjunct associate professor in the department of microbiology, immunology and cell biology.

During her tenure as associate professor, Gibson has published 17 manuscripts, 14 as senior author. All of the publications have appeared in well respected, peer-review journals in the field of hematopoiesis and transplantation. She also has published approximately 40 abstracts, several of which have received publication attention and honors.

While maintaining a well-funded and productive lab, Gibson also participates in student training at all levels — serving as a faculty mentor in summer fellowship and research programs, mentoring physician scientists with an interest in oncology and has participated in the training of more than 20 undergraduate, graduate and postdoctoral students.

"The names of these outstanding professors — Gibson, Gautam and

Scime — should be as lauded and well-known as any of the greats that ever sank a three-pointer or kicked a winning field goal for West Virginia University," Sen. Robert C. Byrd said. "Their groundbreaking work has helped to ensure WVU's place among the nation's top research universities. I take tremendous pride in pointing out that their achievements and academic excellence are further proof that American ingenuity thrives in abundance right here in West Virginia.. Up to four, four-year Robert C. Byrd Professorships will be awarded annually, until a total of 16 is reached. Each will carry an annual stipend of \$5,000 as a salary supplement for the four-year period of the award.

Past recipients are Thomas H. Myers, professor of physics in the Eberly College of Arts and Sciences; Bojan Cukic, associate professor of computer science and electrical engineering in CEMR; Larry Hornak, professor of computer science and electrical engineering in CEMR; Mark Keopke, professor of physics in the Eberly College; Roger Viadero, associate professor of civil and environmental engineering in CEMR; and Kimberly Horn, associate professor of community medicine in the School of Medicine.

Lawmaker tones down fuel-economy proposal

WASHINGTON — The leading backer of tougher fuel-economy standards in the U.S. House softened his proposal Thursday to win more undecided lawmakers, as automakers and environmentalists mounted an all-out lobbying march ahead of a key decision by House Speaker Nancy Pelosi expected by Monday.

That's when Pelosi, D-Calif., will likely have to reveal whether she will allow a fuel-economy debate on the floor of the House during a vote on a broader energy bill expected late next week. Proponents of tougher standards do not appear to have enough votes to guarantee a victory to Pelosi for now, and automakers

say they have gained momentum in the debate over the past few days.

Environmental groups back the bill by U.S. Rep. Edward Markey, D-Mass., that would require new vehicles to average 35 miles per gallon by 2018, with 4 percent annual increases thereafter, a bar Detroit automakers and Toyota Motor Co. call impossibly high.

But Markey spokeswoman Jessica Schaefer said the congressman was circulating several changes to his bill, including pushing back the deadline to 2019, leaving increases beyond that to federal regulators and carving an exemption in fuel-economy rules for large work trucks.

All such changes would bring

the Markey proposal closer to the fuel-economy increase passed by a comfortable margin in the Senate, which sets a 35 mpg standard by 2020.

"The idea is to preserve the 35 mpg standard but make some changes that move our drive forward," Schafer said. "We want to get these ideas in the mix to ensure there's a House proposal with strong support that's closer to the Senate."

The competing bill from Reps. Baron Hill, D-Ind., and Lee Terry, R-Neb., would require new vehicles to average between 32 and 35 mpg in 2022, and contains several other clauses favorable to the industry.

While Markey's bill has 149 cospon-

sors, the Hill-Terry bill has picked up 124 co-sponsors in a few weeks, including some of those who backed the Markey bill.

Detroit automakers have gone all-out for the Hill-Terry bill, which has the key support of Rep. John Dingell, D-Mich. General Motors Corp. has flown in executives from Detroit and parked the Chevrolet Volt on Capitol Hill as a calling card for future technologies. Cerberus Capital, the private equity fund buying Chrysler Corp., has hired David Hobbs, the former chief lobbyist for the White House.

And automakers reveled when UPS Inc. threw its weight behind the Hill-Terry bill on Tuesday; UPS

is a member of the Securing America's Future Energy Coalition, a group of corporations and retired military leaders that supported the Senate fuel-economy bill.

The auto industry's lobbying has been complicated somewhat by a third bill from Rep. Joe Barton, R-Texas, which sets lower standards than either the Hill-Terry or Markey proposal. That bill has the backing of Republican House leaders and was apparently meant to minimize any political benefits from the debate for Hill, whose district has been targeted by Republicans.

Sources on both sides of the debate say without enough votes to guarantee victory on the House floor,

Pelosi will likely refuse to let any fuel-economy amendments come up for debate next week. If Markey's changes bring enough new lawmakers into his fold, the industry will push for a vote on Hill-Terry as well.

Capitol Hill newspapers were full of full-page ads from both sides Thursday, with the lobbying expected to continue through the weekend.

The Level Field Institute, a group that promotes U.S. automakers and has financial ties to Ford Motor Co., ran ads touting Hill-Terry, while the Pew Campaign for Fuel Efficiency, a coalition of environmental groups, attacked Hill-Terry as too weak and bought radio ads in four states to press specific House members.

Car dealers accelerate Web use

ST. LOUIS, Mo. — It's easy to see why many auto dealers were hesitant to embrace the Internet in the early 1990s. As one analyst puts it, a salesman singing and dancing in front of a blow-up gorilla doesn't translate smoothly to the Internet.

To be sure, many businesses were hesitant about e-commerce at the time, but the delay for dealerships lasted a little longer. In 1997, just 47 percent of dealerships had Web sites, according to a poll by the National Automobile Dealers Association.

But most dealers today are driving confidently down the information superhighway. About 95 percent of dealerships have a Web presence, according to a 2006 poll of 375 dealerships by the dealers association. That same poll said 70 percent of dealers have completed a sale entirely on the Web, excluding payment and delivery of the vehicle.

Dealers are beginning to reach into budgets formerly allocated to print and broadcast ads. Many employ specialists to manage their sites and the customer leads gen-

erated online.

The adoption of the Internet was a long time coming for car dealers who were concerned over how it would change their businesses and profit models. The computer represented a cinder-block wall for a relationship-oriented business. Salespeople long have depended on personal contact to forge customers' trust over the second-largest purchase most of them will make.

Many dealers were uncomfortable — and some still resist — detailing prices over the Internet. They saw that the Internet would make price shopping easier for consumers — virtually eliminating the opportunity for dealers to haggle, said Doug Stoutner, new vehicle sales manager for Mc-Mahon Pontiac-GMC in St. Louis.

"The old-schoolers think if they give a price over the Internet, they can't maximize their profit over the invoice price," said Stoutner, who's been in auto sales for 12 years.

Stoutner, for one, said he has learned to appreciate his Web-based customers. For starters, the Web provides an expanded customer base.

The dealership rarely saw suburban customers before getting on the Web, but they are now common when the price is right.

Matt Boettigheimer, a sales manager at McMahon, said his dealership, like most, does not complete deals over the Internet. There is too much sensitive paperwork to be explained and signed in front of a witness.

But with the Internet, customers are able to do their research, and sometimes even test drive cars at nearby dealerships, before picking up the car of their choice at the dealer offering the right price.

One popular online feature is a searchable inventory of same-brand vehicles within a broad radius, sometimes as large as 300 miles, said Treff LaPlant, Internet sales manager for Don Brown Chevrolet.

LaPlant said he understands there's still hesitation to build a well-rounded site — which he estimates costs \$3,000 to \$6,000 a month to operate — mainly because such features keep customers from the showrooms and the sales force.

U.S. car buyers keep crossing over to crossovers

GRAND RAPIDS, Michigan — Ever since the debut of the Toyota RAV4 in 1996, U.S. car buyers have been crossing over to crossovers.

The success of crossover vehicles, which resemble sport utility vehicles but are smaller and built on car instead of truck frames, has been one of the few bright spots in recent years for the troubled domestic automotive industry.

Analysts and auto executives say that trend likely will continue when automakers release July U.S. sales figures on Wednesday, although the general market decline is likely to continue.

The Edmunds.com automotive Web site forecast that automakers will sell about 1.37 million vehicles in July, a 7.9 percent drop from a year ago.

In a note to investors released this week, Bank of America analyst Ronald Tadross said he expected General Motors Corp. to report a 12 percent drop in domestic sales from a year ago. He estimated a 6 percent dip in sales for Ford Motor Co., 5 percent decreases for Toyota Motor

Corp. and Honda Motor Co., and a 4 percent decline for Chrysler Group.

"We are not seeing any significant mid-month incentive actions" despite lagging sales, Tadross wrote.

The RAV4 was followed by other successful crossovers such as the Lexus RX300, Honda CR-V, Subaru Forester and Ford Escape. Foreign and domestic automakers developed 14 crossover models by 2000 and now offer more than 50. About 70 will be on the market by 2009, said George Pipas, Ford's top sales analyst.

It is the fastest-growing category in the industry, Pipas said. Ford's crossover sales for the first half of 2007 are up 40 percent versus a year ago — more than double the industry growth of 18 percent, he said.

On the other hand, industry-wide sales of SUVs this year are expected to fall below 2 million units for the first time since 1995, Pipas said.

Although high gasoline prices have not hurt sales of crossovers, which generally are more fuel efficient than SUVs, they are not the

sole reason for their success.

Crossovers are smaller and easier to get in and out of than SUVs, while offering better handling, a smoother ride and seating for up to eight people. They appeal to baby boomers who popularized minivans in the 1980s and SUVs in the 1990s but no longer need such large, cumbersome vehicles, he said.

"Many of us are becoming empty-nesters in this baby boomer generation," Pipas said. "We don't need a vehicle as big as we once had."

While Ford and GM dominated the SUV market during the 1990s, Honda and Toyota are contending for the top crossover title. In the first six months of 2007, crossover sales totaled 232,683 for Ford, 232,194 for GM, 230,012 for Honda and 201,114 for Toyota, according to data collected by Ward's Automotive Group.

Pete Nico, GM's vehicle line director for the Buick Enclave, Saturn Outlook and GMC Acadia crossovers, said they sold so well in June that the company couldn't make them quickly enough to satisfy demand. GM expects that trend to have continued in July.

Shark Week still has teeth

After all these years, what could possibly be left to say? Sharks, efficient eating machines with an ever-ready supply of new teeth, ferociously kill, and sometimes the gory deaths are documented.

Yet it seems that the public's fascination with the toothy terrors of the deep and

Discovery Channel's ability to plumb whatever depths necessary to find new angles are endless. And for this, the 20th anniversary of Shark Week, beginning Sunday, July 29, the cable channel manages to put a new spin on these ancient creatures with more than 130 hours of shows.

Les Stroud, the station's intrepid "Survivorman," hosts the weeklong series of specials. Stroud is delightfully enthusiastic about sharks, even though he was once bitten.

For a guy who finds shelter in caves, it seems incongruous talking to him in the gilded lobby of Manhattan's Ritz-Carlton, where he pours Earl Grey tea from a china teapot.

"It's brilliant," Stroud says of swimming with the sharks. "I've always been confident and comfortable with wild animals. The first time I went down (on a dive) in the Caribbean, I had 25 sharks around me."

He says this with the sort of gleeful awe that others would use if they went to a butterfly exhibit and swarms of monarchs fluttered nearby.

"They are no different than other wild animals," Stroud says. "They're just animals under water. Lions, bears, sharks, there's a way to deal with all of them."

Two weeks earlier, the adventurer took his first deep-sea dive. Of facing sharks, Stroud says, "Look, I get it. You can rip me apart! I know that and you know that. I just want to touch your dorsal fin."

And in the same sort of hitching a ride that tourists do with dolphins, Stroud sliced through the water while holding onto a 10-foot hammerhead. "It feels like a hard piece of rubber, with sandpaper on it," he says. "It was profound and addicting."

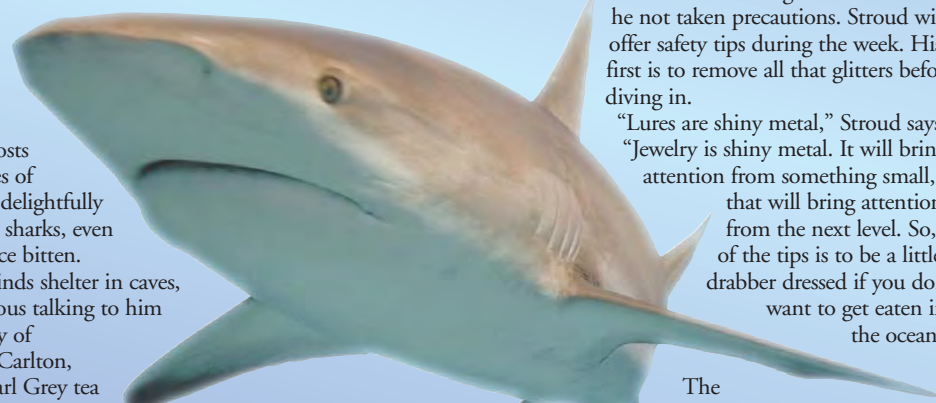
As cool as Stroud finds sharks, he certainly wouldn't have made it to 45 doing what he does had he not taken precautions. Stroud will offer safety tips during the week. His first is to remove all that glitters before diving in.

"Lures are shiny metal," Stroud says. "Jewelry is shiny metal. It will bring attention from something small, and that will bring attention from the next level. So, one of the tips is to be a little drabber dressed if you don't want to get eaten in the ocean."

The next tip, which he says is "extremely difficult" to do is, "Never let them out of your sight. The way a shark will attack you is from behind."

The next safety tip is hardest: Stay calm. "They sense fear," he says. Undoubtedly, but when sharks circle, finding that Zen moment could prove impossible.

"If you are panicking and thrashing about, that excites them," he says. "The worst thing you can do is turn and swim. That just indicates that you are prey."

This week, Discovery Channel takes a bite out of summer with the 20th edition of its wildly successful franchise, Shark Week. Les Stroud of the channel's "Survivorman" series is this year's host.

I'm a little worried for Shark Week with Stroud at the helm. The conceit of "Survivorman" is that Stroud is dumped into some desolate, harsh location and forced to survive, "MacGyver"-like, on an intentionally inadequate supply of useful stuff.

Shark Week opens up on Sunday with "Ocean of Fear: Worst Shark Attack Ever" (it's a working title), which tells this harrowing true story.

One hopes it will remind Stroud and other adventure seekers that the ocean is like the forest: It's a wild place filled

with hungry critters that do not have your best interests at heart.

There's an unfortunate tendency in modern wildlife-documentary filmmaking for the hosts to get up close and personal with the animals, offering the viewer a vicarious experience. I like to call it "wildlife pestering."

Call me old school, but I prefer the approach of Animal Planet's "Meerkat Manor," which launches a new season on Friday, August 3. The British filmmakers there just point the cameras at the little meerkats and watch them do their thing.

In one of the Shark Week specials, "Sharkman," an "expert" tries to hypnotize a great white. Let me see: What's it thinking? I'm going for "Eat the stupid human, eat the stupid ..."

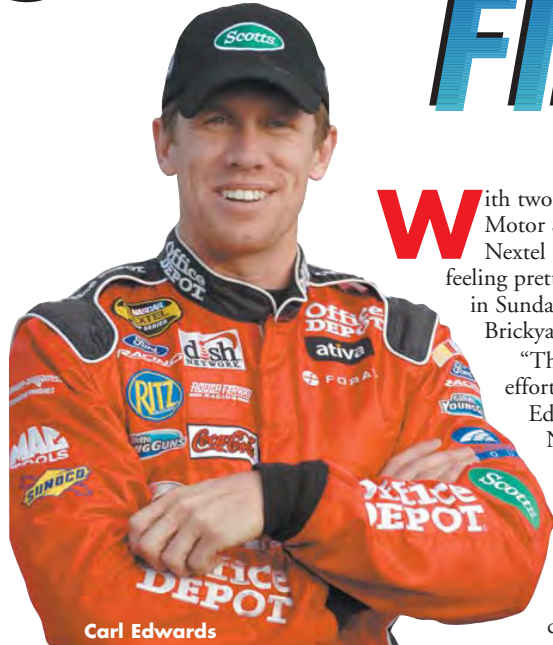

Flipping out at Indy

With two races at Indianapolis Motor Speedway under his belt, Nextel Cup driver Carl Edwards is feeling pretty good about his chances in Sunday's Allstate 400 at the Brickyard.

"This year we've put in a lot of effort into this race," says Edwards, who will drive the No. 99 Ford Fusion for Roush Fenway Racing when NASCAR returns to ESPN with the cable net's July 29 broadcast from Indy. "Bob (Osborne), my crew chief, said he's got a real

special car that they're building, and it's one that we're focusing on to try to win. You know, we're putting a lot of energy into it."

Edwards has run well at the Brickyard. As a rookie in 2005, he finished 12th in his Indy debut, a race won by archrival Tony Stewart. Returning in 2006, he ran in the top three for several laps and contended for the lead before finishing ninth.

"We ran pretty well," Edwards says of his two races on Indy's 2.5-mile oval. "(In the first race), I think we had a great car and then I blew a tire in practice, and I had to go to a backup car the first time. So we didn't run real great. But then the last time, last year, I felt like we could win the race because we had the fastest car for a portion of the race. At the end, we made some adjustments. Just being a rookie or a newer guy and not running at that track a lot, I made the wrong

adjustments. I asked for the wrong adjustments to the car But we had a chance to win it."

Like a handful of other Cup drivers, Edwards is pulling double duty, competing in both the Cup and Busch Series. And he's done well, recording points finishes of third and 12th in Cup in 2005 and 2006, respectively, and third and second in Busch. At this writing, he was sixth in the Cup standings and leading the Busch Series.

That places big demands on his time, but Edwards doesn't mind. "To me, two races a weekend is almost enough," says Edwards, the 2005 Busch Rookie of the Year. "I have a hard time getting enough racing. You know, I really enjoy it. ... It's just that I love racing. So to me, I get to race on Saturdays instead of sitting around doing nothing. I get to compete with some of the best drivers in the world, and that's fun."

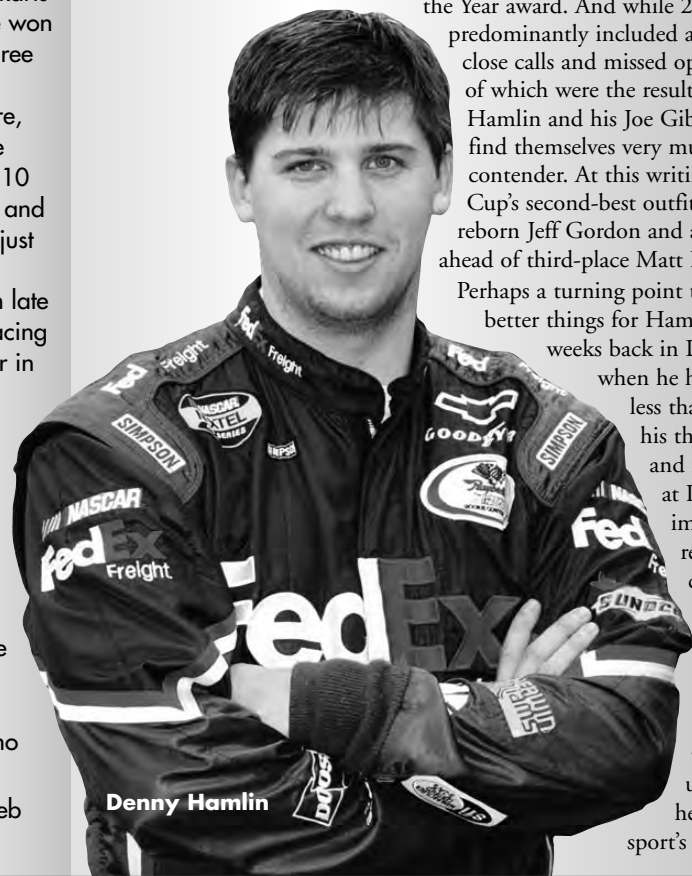

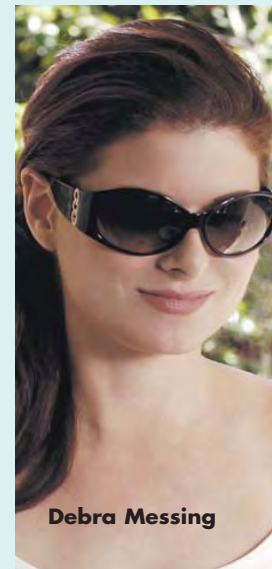

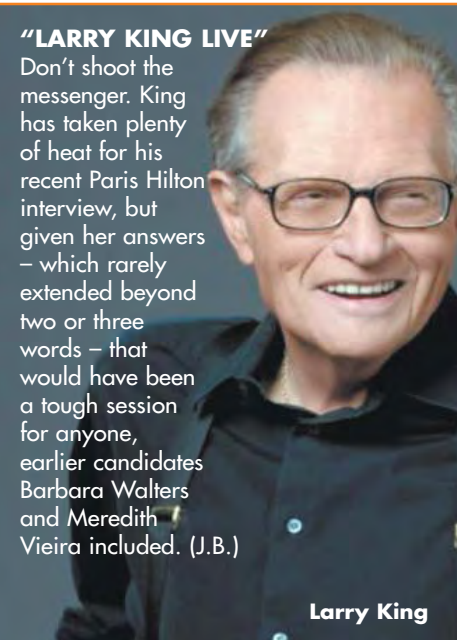

Every working day, somewhere in Hollywood, a screenwriter gets a "note" from a network or studio "suit."

Spend any time with one of these beleaguered scribes, and you'll hear a litany of silly, stupid, pointless or just plain weird notes (with the name of the guilty party carefully omitted). But with writers' egos being what they are, one thing you may never hear about is the good, helpful, useful note.

That's because every professional writer needs an editor. A good editor offers opinions on the material, perhaps suggesting word changes or cuts or even a shift of focus. As much as I love Stephen King novels, I get the feeling that because of his stature, he doesn't get edited much anymore – and a little trim here and there wouldn't hurt.

Writing isn't like painting or sculpture or music, in which the viewer or listener comes up with his or her own interpretation. To succeed, a writer must be understood, and that's a two-way street.

Like King, some TV writers who have attained a level of respect or even awe are given their heads and allowed to run free with their ideas. What's the result?

"John From Cincinnati," an intriguing, funny but meandering story that could have been tightened up.

"Studio 60 on the Sunset Strip," a promising but pretentious exercise in self-indulgence that could be as infuriating as it was entertaining.

The "Star Wars" prequels, which make one wonder what might have happened if a studio executive had forced George Lucas to hand over his grand vision to someone who could actually write dialogue that sounded like real conversation that humans (or even aliens) might have.

"The Black Donnellys," an incoherent mess that never would have been produced had not the names of "Crash" creators Paul Haggis and Bobby Moresco been attached to it.

I began to suspect there was something to network notes when "Buffy the Vampire Slayer" moved from The WB to UPN, and creator Joss Whedon suddenly had free rein. The result was a much darker show that lost a lot of its sense of fun. That might have happened anyway, but stories I heard in the years afterward made me think that WB execs are likely owed a bit of credit for how snappy and tight "Buffy" was under their stewardship.

We on the outside will never know how a show might have been better or worse for network notes, but I sure do wonder. After all, if no one but a show's creator gets it, that's going to make for pretty anemic ratings.

If you're having increasingly serious money problems, it might be time to stop looking for excuses and take a hard look in the nearest mirror.

That's the word from Larry Winget, the self-proclaimed "pit bull of personal finance" and host of "Big Spender," now in its second season Saturdays on A&E Network.

"I really believe that people don't have 'money problems' at all," Winget says. "They have problems with integrity, responsibility, priority setting, and they lack goals. They don't know what is important in their life, but they use shopping as an escape from the other areas of life."

"When people have run up their bills, and they don't feel a responsibility to pay those bills, that's an integrity issue. What I deal with are those life problems that just show up in their finances."

In each episode, Winget meets with a person or couple sinking deeper and deeper into debt and points out the tough and sometimes mortifying steps they have to take to repair their finances.

First, however, Winget doesn't mince words when it comes to making them see how grave their situation really is.

"I have yet to deal with one person who knows how bad it really is," he says. "Nobody knows how much money they make, and they certainly don't know how much money they owe. When I show them how bad it really is, they are shocked. Then you figure out a plan."

That plan includes sticking to a tough budget that cuts discretionary spending to the bone, a necessity that rankles many of these big spenders.

"I told one guy who was really upset with me, 'Listen, I sold plasma to make a child-support payment. I did what it took, and you're mad because I'm asking you to give up cable TV,'" Winget says.

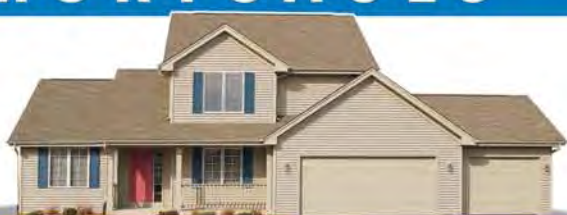

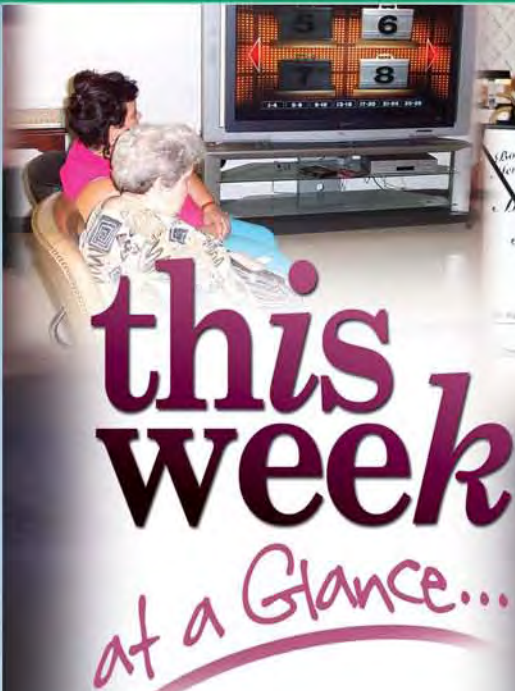

ONE-TIME "Welcome to Medicare" PHYSICAL EXAM

If your Medicare Part B coverage begins on or after January 1, 2005, Medicare will cover a one-time preventive physical exam within the first six months that you have Part B. The exam will include a thorough review of your health, education and counseling about the preventive services you need, like certain screenings, shots, and referrals for other care. The "Welcome to Medicare" physical exam is a great way to get up-to-date on important screenings and shots and to talk with your doctor about your family history and how to stay healthy.

During the exam, your doctor will record your medical history and check your blood pressure, weight and height. Your doctor may also give you a vision test and an Electrocardiogram (EKG). Your doctor will check to make sure that you are up-to-date with your shots. Depending on your general health and medical history, further tests may be ordered if necessary. Your doctor will also give you advice to help you prevent disease, improve your health and stay well. You will also get a written plan (such as a checklist) when you leave letting you know which screenings and other preventive services you should get.

Remember! Once you enroll in Part B, it's important to schedule your "Welcome to Medicare" physical right away. Medicare will only cover this physical exam if it occurs within the first six months that you have Part B. If your doctor thinks this six month period has passed, he or she should give you a notice that says Medicare probably won't pay for this service. If you still want to get the service, you will be asked to sign an agreement that you will pay for the service yourself if Medicare doesn't pay for it. This is called an Advance Beneficiary Notice.

You pay 20% of the Medicare-approved amount after you meet the yearly Part B deductible (\$131 for 2007). Since this may be your first Medicare-covered service, you may meet your entire Part B deductible at this visit.

You should bring the following things with you when you go to your "Welcome to Medicare" physical exam:

- Medical records, including immunization records (if you are seeing a new doctor for the first time).
- Family health history - try to learn as much as you can about your family's health history before your appointment. Any information you can give your doctor can help determine if you are at risk for certain diseases.
- A list of prescription drugs that you currently take, how often you take them, and why.
