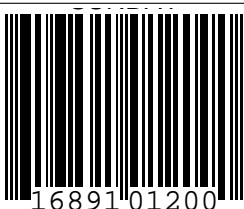

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WVU mum on Lang case

Former provost calls proceeding corrupt, invalid

week on pending academic integrity hearings for former WVU Provost Gerald Lang and others.

Former WVU President Mike Garrison and former Vice President for Legal Affairs Alexander

Macia said they haven't heard from WVU on the matter.

In a petition Lang filed in Monongalia County Circuit Court this week to stop an academic integrity hearing, he alleges conflicts of interest among several current and former university officials, says he's been denied due process, and calls the proceeding "corrupt and invalid."

The petition indicates that Lang "and others" are scheduled for a final hearing before a "hearing

panel" in accordance with the [university's] Policies and Procedures for Responding to Allegations of Academic Misconduct."

The hearing is related to Lang's involvement in the university's decision to retroactively award Bresch, the daughter of Gov. Joe Manchin and chief operating officer of Mylan Inc., an executive MBA degree that an investigative panel later concluded she did not earn.

In his petition, Lang notes that

Macia; Marjorie McDiarmid, a law professor who serves as WVU's academic integrity officer; Mary Roberta Brandt, now vice president for legal affairs and general counsel at WVU; and Beverly D. Kerr, deputy general counsel for WVU, all have a conflict of interest in the matter because of their involvement in the Bresch matter.

WVU spends at least \$798,750 a year to lease plane

WVU officials have used the university's leased plane for more than 300 trips within the U.S. in the past two years — at an annual cost of \$798,750.

A WVU spokeswoman said the plane helps WVU employees use their time more efficiently.

Between Jan. 1, 2007, and Sept. 30, 2008, WVU officials took a total of 306 trips on the university's leased plane, according to records requested by The Dominion Post under the Freedom of Information Act.

Not all schools are willing to pay for the convenience of plane service. Neither the University of

Kentucky, the University of Louisville or the University of Maryland — three of WVU's 20 peer institutions approved by the West Virginia Higher Education Policy Commission — owns or leases a plane.

WVU spokeswoman Becky Lofstead said all the trips were for university business, including administrative meetings, alumni events and professional conferences. She added that the plane helps WVU officials conduct business in "an efficient and effective manner."

As an example, Lofstead said a WVU administrator might report to the office in the morning for meetings, fly to Charleston

for business and return later that day for other university activities.

"It's a business tool, really," Lofstead said. "It's a way to maximize — and value — a person's time in multiple venues and with multiple constituents in a given day."

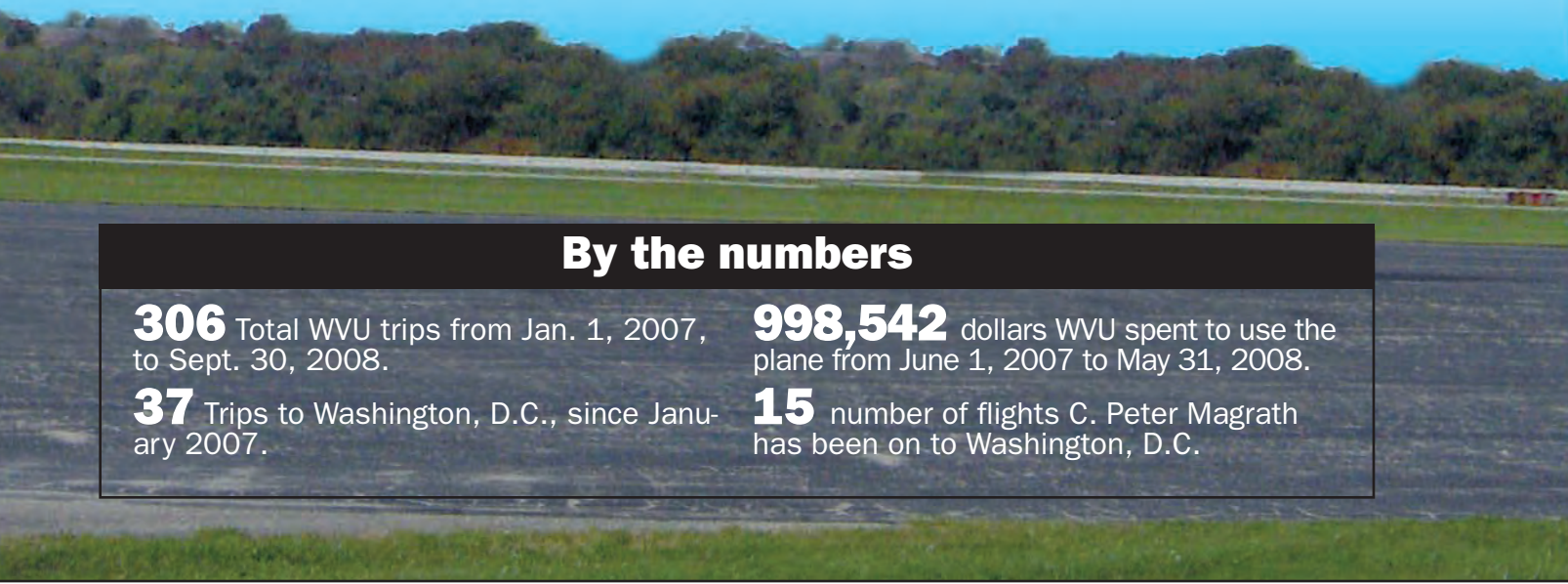
Kentucky, Louisville and Maryland handle their air travel through other means.

"Air travel is conducted through commercial carriers, and on very rare occasions, through a chartered flight for small groups of faculty or administrators," said Jimmy Stanton, executive director of public relations and marketing for Ken-

tucky. The UK Athletics Association — an organization that does not receive public funding — does lease plane time, Stanton said, but only for coaches and athletic department administrators.

John Drees, associate vice president of communications and marketing for Louisville, said officials use commercial airlines

Obama's balancing act on Iraq withdrawal strategy

WASHINGTON — President Barack Obama leaned heavily toward field commanders' preferences in setting a time frame for an Iraq pull-out, weighing the fervent desires of anti-war supporters who propelled him into office and the equally strong worries of war generals.

"To this very day, there are some Americans who want to stay in Iraq longer, and some who want to leave faster," Obama said in his announcement Friday, summing up a debate that has divided the country like no other since former President George W. Bush launched the U.S. invasion six years ago.

Obama's description suggests he arrived at a split-down-the-middle compromise with one of the

first and most important tasks of his young presidency.

But accounts of the process from officials in the White House, at the Pentagon and across the administration, who all requested anonymity so they could speak more candidly about behind-the-scenes discussions, show otherwise.

At stake was the promise that most defined and drove Obama's presidential bid: to bring all combat troops home — effectively, to end one of the nation's longest and most controversial wars — 16 months after taking office. The details he offered in an appearance Friday before Marines at Camp Lejeune, N.C., depart from that pledge in several ways:

■ The combat withdrawal will take three months longer than he promised. It is now to be completed by the end of August 2010, 19 months after Obama's inau-

guration. Though what Obama emphasized most as a candidate was his determination to bring about a quick end to the war, in the fine print of almost all his statements was a commitment to flexibility.

■ The withdrawal will not happen at an even pace of one combat brigade per month, as he had repeatedly said. Instead, it will be backloaded. The force posture for this year and into the first few months of 2010 probably will be essentially the same as it would have been under Bush. Under Obama's plan, troops will start leaving in large numbers probably only next spring or summer. The president intends to leave decisions about the pace to field commanders.

■ Even after the drawdown, a large force of as many as 50,000 troops — about a third of what is there now — will remain, causing

heartache among anti-war Democrats who wanted a fuller pullout.

This residual force will have a new, technically noncombat mission: train Iraqis, protect U.S. assets and personnel, and conduct anti-terror operations. But those soldiers and Marines will remain in harm's way and engage at times in some form of fighting.

Understanding how Obama, his aides and his generals came to this plan must start with how the candidate arrived at his campaign promise.

According to one administration official, there was never any magic to the 16-month period. At the time Obama first made the pledge, there were about 16 combat brigades in Iraq, and military experts told the candidate that Iraq was too fragile for a drawdown much faster than one combat brigade per month.

Cell phone driving ban advances

Last year's bill failed to make it out of state Senate committee

West Virginia drivers again face the possibility of fines for using cell phones on the road.

Members of the House Roads and Transportation Committee on Wednesday unanimously passed a bill (HB2621) that would impose a fine up to \$25 on people who use cell phones or other wireless communications devices while driving. The House Judiciary Committee will now take up the bill.

Last year, the House of Delegates passed the same proposal, but the bill got tied up in a state Senate committee.

This year, "I think it has a good chance," said Steve Dale, deputy commissioner at the state's Division of Motor Vehicles.

Studies show that drivers using cell phones are four times more likely to be involved in a wreck, Dale told legislators.

Six other states have passed similar laws, and 17 — including West Virginia — ban teen drivers from using cell phones, Dale said.

Delegate David Walker, D-Clay, said he supported the measure, but worried that cell phones aren't the only things that distract drivers. People who put on lipstick and read books and newspapers while dri-

Robbery suspect tries to become a police officer

CHULA VISTA, Calif. — Authorities in California say a man wanted for a store robbery was arrested when he showed up to take a test to become a police officer.

Chula Vista police spokesman Bernard Gonzales said investigators had identified Romeo Montillano as a suspect in a Dec. 8 robbery at a Kmart.

Gonzales said investigators learned that Montillano had signed up for the February Police Department entrance exam.

The 40-year-old man was arrested Wednesday when he arrived to take the test.

Gonzales said that when Montillano was taken into custody he asked if he would still be able to take the exam.

Police said Montillano was arrested for investigation of robbery, making criminal threats and grand theft. He remained in jail Saturday in lieu of \$110,000 bail.

## Sunday Still more questions in Geyer's death

Morgantown Police officers are still trying to piece together the events of Feb. 14 and early Feb. 15 to determine how Andrew Geyer ended up on Don Knotts Boulevard, near its intersection with Dorsey Avenue. He was struck at 3:30 a.m. Feb. 15. He was pronounced dead at Ruby Memorial Hospital.

A repeat DUI offender has been charged with driving drunk. Donald Petsko, 55, of Madsville, remains in North Central Regional Jail on a \$100,000 bond. He is charged with DUI causing death.

## Some move a grade too far

Many West Virginia students get bumped up to the next grade, even though they aren't ready or able to keep up with work at the next level. Gov. Joe Manchin said in his State of the State address.

He has proposed a bill to strengthen educational development by providing certain support services for struggling students.

Monongalia County Schools officials said the school system already has a program in place to help its students who are having trouble learning, but they will comply with any new state directives.

## Monday Suspect in DUI death has no license

Donald Petsko was driving without a license when he allegedly struck and killed 22-year-old Andrew Geyer last Sunday, local officials said.

Morgantown Police charged him with felony DUI causing death — not the first time the Madsville man has been arrested on a DUI charge. And one prosecutor said state lawmakers need to look at

changing DUI laws.

Petsko, 55, has been convicted of DUI at least twice and has been charged with DUI-related offenses at least two more times, including the DUI with death charge written up by Morgantown Police for last Sunday's crash, court records show.

## Kingwood copes with declining finances

KINGWOOD — When the city of Kingwood lost a major user of its transfer station last year, it had to do some budget trimming.

Among the departments that suffered cutbacks was the city police force, which lost two full-time and three part-time police officers.

Chief of Police Dale Davis said staffing remains the department's biggest challenge.

## Tuesday

### Pappas ordered to pay

A Monongalia County judge again denied a Morgantown attorney's request to overturn an order reducing the fee he could charge to a client's estate for executor services.

Circuit Court Judge Russell Clawges stressed to Keith Pappas, executor of the estate of Trula Capps, that his order is final.

Pappas asked Clawges in a December motion to reconsider his refusal to overturn a previous order ruling that Pappas could only charge a 7.5-percent fee to Capps' estate, and no expenses above that.

### WVU faculty: Don't change PROMISE

Restricting the state's PROMISE scholarship funding is a bad idea, WVU Faculty Senate leaders said Monday.

## Wednesday

### Mon to get \$17M in road money

Monongalia County will receive more than \$17 million to pay for road construction and paving projects funded by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, according to a list presented to state lawmakers Tuesday.

Marion County will receive \$1.5 million for paving along Interstate 79, and Preston County will receive no funding for highway projects.

### Police find teacher, boy in motel

The 15-year-old Massachusetts

boy found at a Morgantown motel Monday night with a 24-year-old teacher told police that they were just passing through Morgantown, not really sure where they were heading.

The boy, who has not been identified by authorities, was driven back to Massachusetts on Tuesday afternoon by police. West Virginia State Police troopers met Massachusetts authorities halfway.

State Police Cpl. T.W. Goodnight said police in Holyoke, Mass., told them that the teacher, Lisa M. Lavoie, of Ludlow, Mass., was apparently staying at the Super 8 Motel in the Glenmark Centre in Morgantown.

### Petsko jailed for DUI

The Madsville man accused of driving drunk and killing a Delaware college student Feb. 15 was sentenced Tuesday to six months behind bars on a previous DUI offense.

Donald Petsko, 55, of Bethel Church Road, was charged with first-offense DUI Oct. 20, 2008, after he crashed his car in Monongalia County.

The conviction enables the county to charge him with third-offense DUI in the Feb. 15 case, said Monongalia County Assistant Prosecutor Ami Schon. At a trial Tuesday in Monongalia County Magistrate Court, Magistrate Darris Summers found Petsko guilty of the October DUI and ordered the maximum sentence — six months in jail and a \$500 fine.

## Thursday

### Officer admits to bribery

A U.S. Bureau of Prisons correctional officer at U.S. Penitentiary at Hazelton pleaded guilty to bribery for selling heroin, marijuana, tobacco and cell phones to prison inmates, according to the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Northern District of West Virginia.

William E. Brantner, 24, of Friendsville, Md., faces up to 15 years in prison and a fine of \$250,000 after entering a guilty plea Friday in U.S. District Court in Clarksburg.

## Friday

### Lang petition unsealed

Monongalia County Circuit Court Judge Susan Tucker unsealed the petition late Thursday that was filed by former WVU Provost Gerald E. Lang to stop the university from holding a "final hearing."

According to the court documents, the "final hearing" before a "hearing panel" scheduled for Lang and others on March 16-20 is connected to the Bresch scandal investigation.

Tucker had sealed the "Verified Petition for Writ of Prohibition" on Tuesday at the request of Lang's attorney, J. Michael Benninger.

# Paul Harvey dies at 90

CHICAGO — Paul Harvey, the news commentator and talk-radio pioneer whose staccato style made him one of the nation's most familiar voices, died Saturday in Arizona, according to ABC Radio Networks. He was 90.

Harvey died surrounded by family at a hospital in Phoenix, where he had a winter home, said Louis Adams, a spokesman for ABC Radio Networks, where Harvey worked for more than 50 years. No cause of death was immediately available.

Harvey had been forced off the air for several months in 2001 because of a virus that weakened a vocal cord. But he returned to work in Chicago and was still active as he passed his 90th birthday. His death comes less than a year after that of his wife and longtime producer, Lynne.

"My father and mother created from thin air what one day became radio and television news," Paul Harvey Jr. said in a statement.

the time, "were controlled, supervised and managed by Alexander Macia."

The petition also says that Lang has been denied due process. Because of these issues, it says, "the entire proceeding is procedurally corrupt and invalid."

Lang refers to the hearing's timing in his petition, noting that it is set for spring break, the week of March 16-20.

"McDiarmid was advised that due to Petitioner Lang's previously-planned, scheduled and paid-for trip out of the country during the spring break period, and due to his counsel's previously-planned and scheduled trip out of state during the same time period, they would be unavailable for the hearing," it says. "In response to initial communication from the undersigned, Respondent Marjorie A. McDiarmid advised that the scheduled hearing over Spring Break could not be changed."

But a document — attached as evidence to the petition — from McDiarmid to "emba respondents" suggests three possible periods for the hearing: March 16-20; "dead week," April 27-May 1; and exam week, May 4-8. The e-mail letter asks the respondents if they have any conflicts for any of these dates and the nature of the conflict.

The e-mail begins: "One of the parties to this action has advised me that he has a previous out-of-town commitment which will make it extremely inconvenient for him to attend a hearing during the week of March 16-20."

Lang's petition alleges:

■ That WVU "arbitrarily and unilaterally scheduled a hearing during Spring Break, March 16-20, 2009," when Lang and his counsel are unavailable.

■ A "blatant conflict of interest which exists as a result of the various acts of the members of the General Counsel's office at WVU adverse to Petitioner Lang."

■ From July 2007 to August 2008, Mary Roberta Brandt, Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel at WVU, and Beverly D. Kerr, Deputy General Counsel for WVU, as members of the General Counsel's Office, "were controlled, supervised and managed by Alexander Macia, who was then the Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel at WVU."

■ Alex Macia, former WVU general counsel and vice president for legal affairs, and members of Macia's office "were directly

involved with the events and participated in the meetings and communications among the various WVU personnel," including Lang, who were requested by WVU Administration to respond media inquiries into the Bresch affair.

■ Macia "was asked to and provided specific legal advice and direction" to Lang and the others who were requested by the Administration to respond to Bresch matters.

■ On May 27, 2008, former WVU President Michael Garrison spoke with Marjorie Anne McDiarmid — a law professor serving as the Academic Integrity Officer for WVU — "regarding his purported concerns over how the HB [Heather Bresch] matter was handled by the administrators he had requested to examine the matter" following the media inquiry.

■ On May 30, 2008, Garrison "submitted a letter regarding

the allegation of potential academic misconduct to Respondent McDiarmid."

■ "In spite of the fact that the Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel, Alexander Macia, had actively participated in the meeting of Oct. 15, 2007 [where the decision was made to award Heather Bresch an mEBA degree], as noted above, and provided legal advice and counsel to Petitioner Lang and others who were in the meeting and, in spite of the fact he also was involved in other communications concerning the HB matter during the period of Oct. 11-23, 2007, the Screening Subcommittee found "there is no testimony or documentary evidence known to the subcommittee at this time that indicates Mr. Macia or Mr. Garrison knew of or were involved with the generation of the records sent to admissions and records."

■ "No reference at all was made

by the Screening Subcommittee as to the fact that General Counsel had given legal advice and actively participated in the meeting of Oct. 15, 2007, and also participated in communications regarding the HB matter both before and after said meeting."

■ "Thus, each of the Respondents have communicated and counseled with, and have been advised and assisted by members of WVU's General Counsel's office throughout this entire matter. Likewise, Petitioner Lang and the other WVU personnel involved originally in the HB matter also communicated and counseled with, and have been advised and assisted by members of WVU's General Counsel's office."

■ "Respondents have acted arbitrarily and capriciously and have violated the due process rights of Petitioner and others who are unavailable during the Spring Break period for the Hear-

ing and that the Court should prohibit Respondents from forcing Petitioner, his counsel and others to the hearing under the circumstances presented here."

■ "The contact and interaction among Respondents Kerr and McDiarmid and Mr. Macia and President Garrison regarding this matter also constitutes a conflict of interest under West Virginia law and arbitrary and capricious state action which violates Petitioner Lang's procedural due process rights and taints the legal efficacy of this proceeding."

■ "Lang's procedural due process rights, ostensibly being provided under the Policies and Procedures for Responding to Allegations of Academic Misconduct at WVU, have been violated and that the entire proceeding is procedurally corrupt and invalid."

WVU has declined to comment on the petition, except to say the university's attorney will respond within the time frame required by law.

WVU Spokesman Dan Kim said on Friday that academic integrity hearings are not open to the public because they are confidential and personnel-related, and he could provide no further information.

"I wouldn't know who or how many others are involved in the final hearings," Kim said. "That has all been very confidential."

McDiarmid said she could not say who else was scheduled for a hearing.

"The [academic integrity] policy precludes me from commenting on pending matters," she said.

Lang has declined to comment on the petition. He did not return calls to *The Dominion Post* in time for this report to explain who else might be scheduled for a hearing.

Calls to former College of Business and Economics Dean R. Stephen Sears and Lang's attorney, J. Michael Benninger, also were not returned in time for this report. Though he

contacted *The Dominion Post* by telephone on Thursday, Benninger is out of the country.

Garrison and Macia, who both work for the law firm Spilman Thomas & Battle, responded to questions from *The Dominion Post* in separate one-sentence e-mails on Friday. Both men indicated that they had not been contacted by the

Academic Integrity Committee.

Bill Case, Garrison's executive officer for communications, now serves as the health policy and research information director for WVU Hospitals' planning, marketing and communications department. He referred questions about the academic integrity hearings to Kim.

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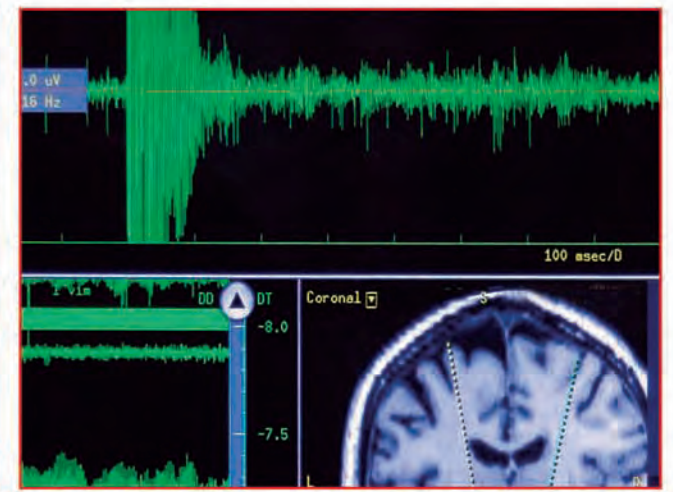

and privately chartered flights to get to and from events that aren't within driving distance.

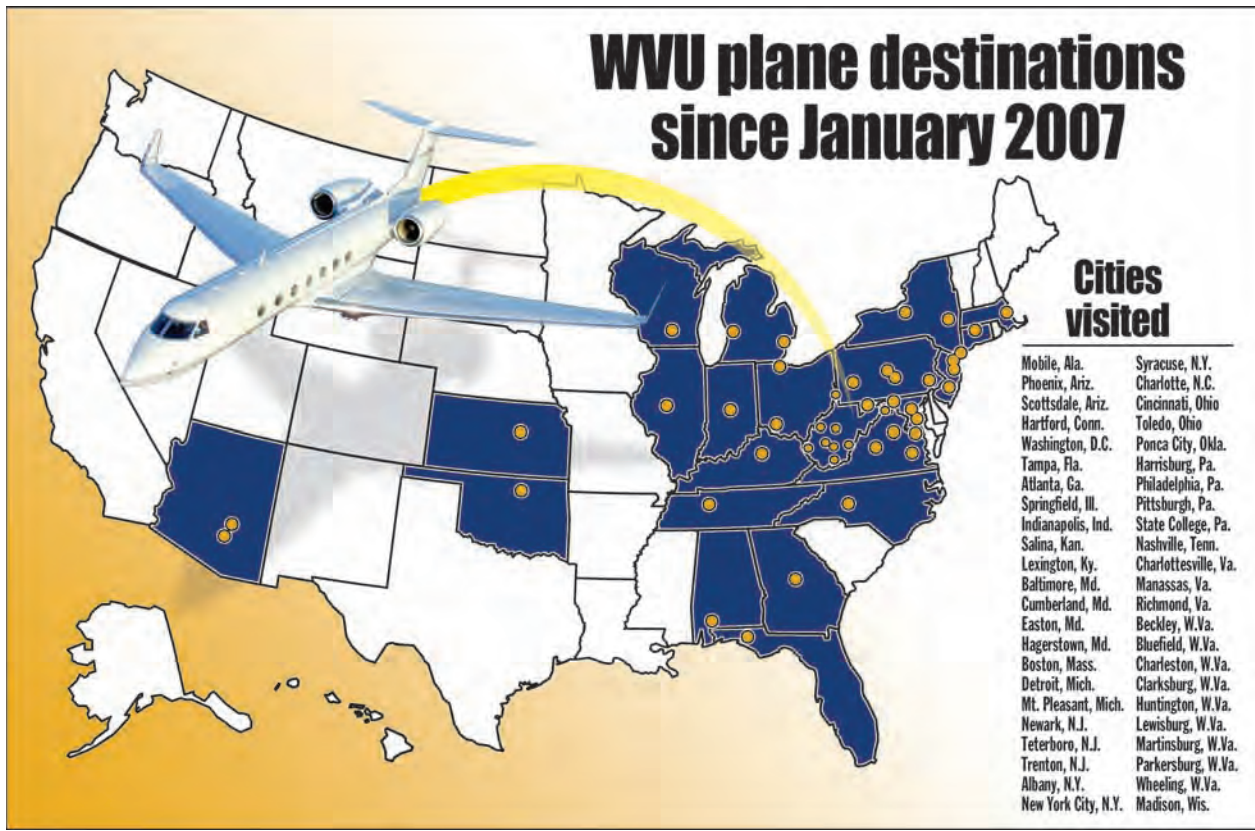
But William Morison, Louisville's open records officer, said he couldn't provide an estimate as to how much the university has spent on those flights, and Stanton was unable to provide an estimate in time for this report.

Millree Williams, executive director of public affairs strategy for Maryland's Office of University Communications, said administrators take commercial flights, but he did not respond to an e-mail request to provide the approximate cost of airline travel.

Lofstead noted that a school's proximity to a major airport or commercial airline might affect its business travel arrangements.

"With no commercial service from Morgantown to any destination in West Virginia, where the bulk of our flights go, and limited flights to other frequent regional destinations — D.C., for example — engaging in the air travel services contract I described becomes the most financially economical, time-efficient and safest option for WVU," Lofstead said.

She said faculty, staff and officials at WVU also take commercial



flights "when it's more practical and economical."

**Destinations**

The most common destination for the WVU plane was Charleston.

WVU officials traveled there, with or without stops, a total of 196 times.

Lofstead said university business conducted in Charleston often includes meetings with alumni and donors, state and government officials,

and education officials.

WVU officials also attend meetings at the university's Charleston area divisions — the WVU Institute of Technology and the Charleston branch of the WVU Health Sciences Center.

Narvel Weese, vice president of administration and finance for WVU, has been a passenger on 16 flights that have stopped in Charleston dating back to January 2007.

"Having the divisional campus in Montgomery, in terms of WVU-IT, probably creates a little more traffic to Charleston, [as well as] legislative issues, interacting with government officials and alumni, and sporting events every now and then in Charleston," Weese said.

Other in-state destinations include Lewisburg, Martinsburg, Beckley, Parkersburg, Wheeling, Huntington and Clarksburg.

The most common out-of-state destination was Washington, D.C. WVU officials have taken a total of 37 trips to the nation's capital since January 2007.

Interim WVU President C. Peter Magrath — who lives in nearby Glen Echo, Md., and works as a senior presidential adviser to the College Board in Washington, D.C. — has been a passenger on 15 of those flights, and his wife has been a passenger on two.

Lofstead said the trips to and from Washington, D.C., were for university business and trips to Magrath's home.

"When President Magrath was selected as the interim president, it was made an element of his employment agreement that air travel to and from his home in Washington, D.C., would be provided by the university," Lofstead said.

The agreement also allows Magrath's wife — *Washington Post* ombudsman Deborah C. Howell — to use the plane for university business.

Other out-of-state destinations for the WVU plane include Pittsburgh, Philadelphia, Atlanta, Phoenix, New York City, Cincinnati, Indianapolis, Detroit and Baltimore.

Curt Peterson, vice president of research and economic development for WVU, said the plane helps him attend multiple meetings and get more work done than he could if he had to drive or take a commercial airline.

"Another reason I use the plane is if we're trying to accomplish

something in a single day," Peterson said.

On one recent trip, Peterson said he and other WVU officials took the plane to Charleston, picked up state officials there and traveled to Lexington, Ky., for a meeting at the University of Kentucky. If he hadn't taken the plane, Peterson said he would have spent more than six hours driving and likely would have had to stay overnight.

But it's not always WVU employees who are on the plane, Lofstead said. The plane is also used to transport attendees and guests to Morgantown for WVU events.

In May 2007, for example, WVU flew country music star Kathy Mattea to Morgantown from Nashville to participate in Honors Convocation during the university's 2007 commencement activities.

**Travel costs**

WVU signed a 10-year lease agreement with LJ Associates of Latrobe, Pa., for airplane service in 1999, but Lofstead said the contract has been extended through 2014.

The university's leased aircraft is a seven-passenger Beechcraft Super King Air B200, though another plane is sometimes used as a substitute. Plane records show that it typically flies from Latrobe to Morgantown before heading to its destination, and returns to Latrobe after each trip.

The university pays a base fee of \$798,750 annually for about 450 hours of plane use. Federal taxes, landing fees and fuel surcharges can increase the cost. WVU spokeswoman Janey Cink said WVU paid about \$998,542 for plane use between June 1, 2007 and May 31, 2008.

The cost of the contract is budgeted annually and paid for using centrally allocated university funds, Lofstead said.

She also noted that senior administrators must approve air travel for employees, and Weese said it must be for a valid reason.

"It has to be for business purposes," Weese said. "You cannot use the airplane for personal reasons."

**Jurors return guilty verdicts in ex-pastor's trial**

CHARLESTON — A former clergyman has been convicted in Kanawha Circuit Court of sexually abusing teenagers who attended his church in the 1990s.

Jurors deliberated just over two hours Friday before returning their verdict against 49-year-old Sandy Martin Cook, the former pastor at Shrewsbury Church of God.

Three men testified during the four-day trial that Cook sexually abused them on numerous occasions when they attended his church in the 1990s.

Jurors found Cook guilty on multiple counts of third-degree sexual assault and sexual abuse by a parent, guardian or custodian.

**Front of old hotel falls, crushes theater facade**

BLUEFIELD — Pieces of Bluefield's history were scattered on the street as the front section of an historic hotel collapsed and took with it a section of an old theater.

The collapse Friday night of the old Matz-Milner Hotel crushed the art deco entrance and lobby of the Colonial Theater. No injuries have been reported.

A witness said he saw a "big cloud of dust" in the moments after the front of the landmark hotel crumbled.

The owner of the theater, Steve Tibbs, said the 1916-vintage showplace was built for silent movies and is one of the last remaining examples of art deco in downtown Bluefield.

The Matz-Milner is listed in the National Register of Historic Places.

ving are much more dangerous, he said.

"I'm not trying to be funny," said Walker, who is a crane operator.

If the law passes, using a cell phone while driving would be a "secondary violation," meaning an officer could only cite someone for violating the law if they're pulled over for something else.

That would make it similar to West Virginia's seatbelt laws. The number of West Virginians who wear their seatbelts has risen dramatically since the state implemented a secondary seatbelt law in the early 1990s, Dale said.

"Just the fact that there is a law on the books, most individuals will use that as a guide," he said after the meeting.

Under the proposal, motorists could still use their cell phone during emergencies, and could use hands-free phones at any time. Emergency responders would be exempt, and cabdrivers, school bus drivers and law enforcement could still use radio devices.

Violators wouldn't rack up any points on their driver licenses.

Delegate Charlene Marshall, D-Monongalia, said she would support the bill.

"I think the bill is a good idea because [talking on a cell phone while driving] is a distraction," Marshall said.

Delegate Alex Shook, D-Monongalia, a co-sponsor of the bill, said in his legal practice he has seen a lot of injuries resulting from crash-

es caused by a driver on a cell phone. In one instance, he said, a man hit by a driver on a cell phone had to have his leg amputated, Shook said.

"It's a good step in the right direction," Shook said. "It's obviously a public safety issue."

Shook said making talking on a cell phone while driving a secondary offense was a compromise amongst legislators, but one he still thinks will be effective.

"Hopefully, it will serve as a deterrent," Shook said.

Sen. Michael Oliverio, D-Monongalia, said, currently, he's leaning toward voting against the measure.

"I think all of us recognize that we're probably safer drivers while not talking on a cell phone, but I just don't know if it's the will of the people right now to ban cell phone use [while driving]," Oliverio said.

He said the legislature did make the right move last year when it banned cell phone use among younger drivers, pointing out that young drivers make up 5 percent of all drivers in West Virginia but are involved in 20 percent of crashes.

Delegate Daryl Cowles, R-Morgan, wanted to amend the bill so drivers could still talk on their phones but not text message or use the Internet.

Cowles said people who drive well while talking on the phone shouldn't be punished, and that the change would be a "good compromise."

But other members rejected that amendment, saying it would kill the purpose of the legislation.

## City gets \$147K from stimulus

Will fund projects to develop areas with less affluence

Some of the federal stimulus money is headed to Morgantown, and city officials are deciding which projects it should fund,

so work can begin as soon as the money is available.

Morgantown will receive \$147,419 from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, according to a press release issued by Sen. Robert C. Byrd's (D-W. Va.) office.

The money is being administered through the Community Development Block Grant For-

mula Program, which provides funding for community development projects, such as infrastructure repairs, that will benefit low- and moderate-income families and neighborhoods.

According to HUD's Web site, www.hud.gov, the projects must meet at least one of the three national objectives for the program: to benefit low- and moderate-income persons, to prevent or eliminate slums or to address

community development needs that have a particular urgency because existing conditions pose a serious and immediate threat to the health or welfare of the community and other funding is not available.

City Manager Dan Boroff said city staff is going through various community development projects the city did not have the

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## Event tackles clinical depression

Clinical depression's effects extend over weeks rather than days and interfere with a person's ability to perform even basic daily activities. While clinical depression is not a part of normal aging, it is estimated that as many as 15 percent of all elders will experience some type of a depressive episode. Consequently, clinical depression is a very real concern for older adults and may lead to significant psychiatric complications and even serious health problems if overlooked or left untreated.

Rankin will discuss the characteristics of clinical depression as it pertains to older adults including its signs and symptoms, risk factors, common behavioral disturbances and likely psychiatric complications, as well as care options. Attendees will learn how to distinguish

normal depressive moods in older adults from clinical depression, identify high risk groups and factors to consider when assessing them for more serious complications like suicide potential.

tion. He was taken to the hospital as a precaution and was treated and released Saturday, Koon said. He did not know the family's name.

The fire was fully involved when firefighters arrived on the scene and took about two-and-a-half hours to put out, Koon said.

Koon said the fire was not suspicious in nature and looks to have been caused by something electrical. They could not pin down

the exact cause because of heavy damage in the back of the house, where the fire likely started. The state fire marshal's office was not called in to investigate, he said.

Koon said the home is mostly destroyed — particularly in the back area — and is unlivable. The family is staying with other relatives, but the American Red Cross was called in to assist them, Koon said.

money to start and identifying the projects that are priorities.

He said projects that are "ready to go" and could be started immediately will be given top priority.

Projects the city is looking into include razing or repairing dilapidated properties, and making improvements to streets, curbs and sidewalks in low- or moderate-income areas of the city, Boroff said.

He said one of the city's priorities is making all the curbs, sidewalks and pedestrian walkways handicapped accessible and in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.

Peter Minter, HUD's Charleston Field Office director, said the use of the money is at the discretion of the city.

The projects should produce or maintain jobs, he said, because that was the intent of the stimulus legislation, and should also support low- or moderate-income families and neighborhoods.

"The monies are really intended to benefit the community as a whole," he said. "Traditionally, the city of Morgantown has done a good job with the formula funding."

As *The Dominion Post* reported earlier, HUD identified Morgantown as an "entitlement community" for its community block grants.

Boroff said the term "entitlement community" means that Morgantown has an urban population that is over 50,000 people.

The urban population of Morgantown, which includes areas such as Westover, Star City and Cheat Lake, is about 56,000 people, he said.

According to the most recent census — taken in 2000 — Morgantown's population is 26,809.

Boroff said the figure represents the population within Morgantown's city limits.

Boroff said he does not know when the funds will be available to the city.

Representatives from Byrd's office contacted Boroff earlier in the week to let him know about the funding, he said.

"This is very good news for the city of Morgantown," Boroff said. "We're very appreciative of Sen. Byrd and the other individuals who worked on this."

According to the press release, West Virginia was awarded more than \$4.5 million to spend throughout the state.

Eight cities, including Morgantown, were given additional funding of their own.

Other cities that received the funding are Charleston, Huntington, Martinsburg, Parkersburg, Vienna, Weirton and Wheeling.

"These monies being made directly to our local communities will help improve the standard of living for the West Virginians who need it most," Byrd said in his release. "In our current economic crisis, many communities need help, and I am pleased to be able to tell them that help is on the way."

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# Polar Plunge raises cool \$28,000

## Proceeds benefit Special Olympics

West Virginia Special Olympics is \$28,000 richer, thanks to 151 individuals who braved the 30-some degree temperature of the Monongahela River in the fifth annual Polar Plunge.

With the motto "Freezin' for a Reason," plungers embraced a dip in the Mon just as readily as they did the wade in the Cheat in earlier years, said Janet Scarcelli, plunge coordinator. The first four events were held at Sunset Beach on Cheat Lake.

Honors went to Crystal Nayles, with \$1,300, as the individual collecting the most money, and the team from KLM Realtors, with \$4,200, as the team collecting the most money, Scarcelli said.

KLM also won the team costume award, with members using Michael Jackson's "Thriller" as their theme.

This year, two groups received special commendation for being with the Plunge since it began, and collecting more than \$12,000 over that period, Scarcelli said.

One was KLM, who "make an effort each year to increase the amount they collect," she said. "It's always a team of four, and they're always costumed. That's their goal, to outdo themselves each year."

The other is the WVU School of Pharmacy.

Team members from the school willingly "plunged" twice the first year — once at 9 a.m. for a press release, and then again at 2 p.m. "for the real thing," she said. They had to cut the ice in Cheat Lake for that 9 a.m. plunge.

"We certainly appreciate their efforts on behalf of West Virginia Special Olympics," Scarcelli said. "This money goes to the state to assist in underwriting all of the state games. Every community that participates in some way in Special Olympics benefits."

In addition to the big summer games, there are the winter games, the basketball tournament, the fall games and Summer Sports Camp, she said.

Because the state's terrain makes travel expensive, the summer games "rotate" among the regions, spending several years at one location before moving to another to help with expenses.

Winter games are held every January at Canaan Valley, and the basketball tournament is at WVU in March.

Scarcelli said the Morgantown Polar Plunge is able to send 100 percent of the money collected to the state Special Olympics because the local expenses are underwritten by corporate sponsors.

**Spring forest fire season begins today**

The Division of Forestry reminds West Virginia residents that the spring forest fire season begins today. No outdoor fires will be allowed from 7 a.m.-4 p.m. Fires to burn brush or other vegetative debris may be started after 4 p.m. and must be extinguished by 7 a.m. Outdoor burning is restricted to evening hours when cooler temperatures, increased humidity and calmer winds reduce the likelihood of fires spreading.

Fire Staff Assistant Ben Webster said that since Jan. 1, the state has already had nearly 100 fires that have burned about 800 acres.

Webster said that almost all forest fires in West Virginia can be prevented, especially if residents use common sense.

He recommends keeping a rake, shovel and water hose nearby in case the fire does escape and urges people to call 911 if they can't easily extinguish the escaped blaze. Webster said that any violation of the outdoor-burning restrictions, including allowing a fire to escape containment, may result in a misdemeanor charge, a fine of up to \$300 plus liability for costs of fighting the fire and the damage caused by the fire to property.

Other requirements for burning outdoors include clearing a safety strip of at least 10 feet around burning materials and attending the fire at all times until it is fully extinguished.

The council will provide important information, including early signs of depression and suicide and

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# Drive near New River means adventure

**STONECLIFF** — The hardtop ends and the adventure begins when state Secondary Route 25 crosses Stonecliff Bridge over the New River a few miles south of Thurmond and follows the river upstream.

The New River Gorge's road less traveled, also known as McKendree Road, begins 60 miles southeast of downtown Charleston, and travels only about 15 miles up the right descending bank of the New River before connecting with W.Va. 41 near Prince.

But it's a memorable, travelogue-worthy 15 miles.

Besides providing travelers with dozens of breathtaking views of the New River, the narrow, cliff-hugging, guardrail-free road provides them with dozens of breathtaking driving challenges. They range from sure-death drop-offs just inches from the road's tire ruts to rare encounters with oncoming traffic on one-lane-wide sections — or pretty much the whole road.

If you are driving a standard-clearance passenger vehicle, your ability to avoid becoming high-centered or oil pan ruptured will be put to the test on numerous rocky, rutted and water hazard-equipped sections, particularly the stretch between Thayer and Prince. There, the use of pickups and SUVs is highly recommended.

Heading south, or upriver, from Stonecliff, the road is dusty and pocked with hundreds of potholes, but much of it can be driven at 20 or 30 mile per hour. It is a relative freeway, compared with the road to come.

Old rail sidings, holding ponds and the foundations of coal loading sites can be seen on both sides of the road, before it begins to climb up the eastern wall of the Gorge about 2.5 miles out of Stonecliff. About 3 miles from the end of the pavement, the road crosses Buffalo Creek, one of several native brook trout streams feeding into the New River Gorge National River. Small signs posting catch-and-release regulations can be seen along a pull-off overlooking deep pools in the lower section of the cold-water creek.

After crossing Buffalo Creek and continuing uphill, the road passes a slide-repair area and the ruins of an old masonry building, its chimney still standing, overlooking a long stretch of the New. A few switchbacks past that open-sided building, the turnoff into the community of Thayer appears near a small white church, about 4.5 miles into the journey.

The only settlement along this stretch of the Gorge, Thayer is reached by a steep spur road that descends to a small bench of flat land just above the river. The town, with a year-round population of about 20 that doubles during the warmer months when the owners of vacation homes and fishing camps return, is bisected by an active set of railroad tracks.

Below the tracks and along the New River, the National Park Service maintains a picnic area and primitive boat launch site. Bring your own food, as there are no stores in Thayer

— although one hand-made sign advertises fresh eggs.

Named for Charleston coal operators and industrialists Otis and William Thayer, who leased coal land in the area in the 1880s and opened the Slater mine at Thayer in the 1890s, the town once had a population of more than 400. In addition to having several mines in the area during its heyday in the 1920s, Thayer was the site of the state's only glass sand quarry and crushing plant. The town once had a theater, an amusement hall and a bowling alley as well.

Back on Route 25 and heading south, the road soon passes a spooky-looking, kudzu-covered, weather-beaten abandoned home and a residence made from a school bus. The road's condition deteriorates dramatically, to the point that stretches accommodating speeds of even 10 miles per hour are rare. Mud hole crossings and traverses of eroded sections of rocky roadbed have to be thought out before proceeding.

Thick vines dangle from roadside hardwoods. Cove-shaded cliffs are draped with giant icicles. Narrow side streams tumble over waterfalls and into ice-rimmed pools. One mud-

hole crossing with a rock obstacle requires driving within four inches of a sheer cliff.

If you can take your eyes off the road, there are great views of the Gorge, including an aerial view of Ledges Rapids. About 7 miles into the trip, a spur road veers downhill and to the right, into the road's namesake, McKendree.

I parked and walked, but the road didn't appear to be in much worse condition than the "main" McKendree Road — although a ripped off muffler at the side of the road suggested otherwise.

In 1899, the state Legislature authorized the construction of three hospitals to provide free health care to coal miners and their families. Miners Hospital No. 1 was built in Welch, No. 3 was built in Fairmont, and No. 2 was built on a bench of flat land overlooking a bend in the New River at McKendree.

The four-story stone hospital building built here in 1902 changed its name to McKendree Hospital in 1916. The hospital had landscaped grounds, a rose garden, a small farm where vegetables and hogs were raised, and a nursing school.

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# Preston County Commission prepares to hire litter officer

## Commission has Q&A on horse park

**THERE IS NO** Preston County Commission meeting Monday. The next one will be at 9:30 a.m. March 9.

The Preston County Commission passed the first reading of an ordinance Thursday to create a county cleanup committee and establish the position of litter control officer.

Commissioner Vicki Cole said \$15,000 has been set aside for salary for the part-time position.

The cleanup committee, according to the ordinance, will consist of:

- the county surveyor or a county officer employee or con-

sultant who holds an engineering degree or an engineering license, or who has completed all technical requirements necessary to obtain an engineering license";

■ a county health officer in an executive position or with a professional license;

- a fire chief;
- the litter control officer;
- and two at-large members selected by the commission.

Under the ordinance, the County Commission may initiate civil action against violators of the ordinance to recoup cost for cleanup and for attorney and court costs.

The litter officer can investigate complaints of violations of the ordinance, which will be reviewed by the commission, and, after completing West Virginia Department of Environmental Protection training, will have the authority to issue citations.

"We've needed this for a long

time," said Commission President Craig Jennings. "Having a litter control officer will help us keep roadside dumps cleaned up and make this a better place to be."

A public hearing will be set to allow citizen input on the ordinance.

### Horse-themed park

Steve Garvin showed commissioners an outline for his horse-themed park, proposed to be built near Bruceton Mills.

Garvin held three town meetings in the county — in Bruceton, Kingwood and Terra Alta — to discuss the facility, which would include horse racing, video slots, bingo, an amusement park and a water park, veterinary facilities, a clinic and more — all indoors.

He said it is a \$900 million facility.

"We don't have to have video slots to put this racetrack in,"

Garvin told commissioners, "but we'll be missing out on a lot of money."

He estimated the park would bring in \$8 million in hotel/motel taxes and \$4 million in slots.

Cole asked if Garvin had applied for a racing license. "We talked with senators and delegates in Charleston," Cole said, "and they seem to think that might be one of your prerequisites before anything."

He said he hadn't but "we can comply with the statutes" to get one.

Commissioner Dave Price asked if the order of the hurdles ahead for the park were the racing license, then the voters, then the Legislature.

Garvin said the process was application, publication of the request and a 30-day or 45-day comment period, and then if any major objections are raised, signatures of two-thirds of the county's registered voters must be collected to put the measure on the ballot to allow him to hold races and parimutuel wagering.

The Nevada Gaming Commission defines parimutuel bets as wagers placed in a wagering pool overseen by an approved third party, in which the participants are wagering with each other and not against the third party.

Legislation would be required to allow another video slots license in the state.

Garvin will address the Preston County Board of Education

Monday.

"There's one thing I'd caution you about in relation to the schools," Jennings told Garvin, "is that even if we bring in a billion dollars in property taxes, the school's aren't going to get one more dollar."

State funding for schools, he explained, is population-based.

"Whatever money comes from you goes directly to Charleston," Jennings said, "and comes back on a per pupil basis." Jennings said without a population increase, funding would not increase.

Garvin said he learned from the town hall meetings that residents "seem to think there should be five K-8 schools in the county. Your school issue is your No. 1 issue with the county," he said. He plans to include a new school for Bruceton in his project because "these are our future employees," he said.

Cole asked if he'd considered taking the gambling out of the mix for the park. She said commissioners have heard opposition to that aspect of the proposed facility.

Garvin showed the panel 2,300 signatures collected in support of the venture on an online petition, 900 of which he said were from Preston County.

He said 50 percent of bingo proceeds at the park were earmarked for county emergency services, but without the video slots, that money would need to go for purses.

"This is such a humongous undertaking," Price said, "It's hard to get your arms around it."

### Juvenile justice grant

Carol Riley, attendance coordinator for the Preston County Board of Education, asked the commission for a letter of support for a juvenile justice and delinquency grant she is applying for.

Accompanied by Probation Officer Crystal Thomas and the schools' behavior specialist Kevin Duckworth, Riley outlined the mission and goals of the project for which she is seeking funding.

Included would be programs "to decrease juveniles' problem behavior by working with children, their parents, teachers and community members to provide an intervention" to fight the causes of truancy, addiction and other destructive behaviors.

The goals, she said, are "to reduce the number of referrals to the juvenile justice system; reduce the number of referrals to Alternative Education programs, help juveniles learn from their mistakes through early intervention and to positively impact youth's self-esteem to be reflected in community involvement and volunteerism."

The grant, which is seed money for such programs, would include a director's salary. Riley said it was "around \$50,000."

Jennings said the commission would consider the matter at the next meeting.

# Obama's budget: huge ambitions, huge obstacles

WASHINGTON — Breathing in its scope and ambition, President Barack Obama's agenda for the economy, health care and energy now goes to a Congress unaccustomed to resolving knotty issues and buffeted by powerful interests that oppose parts of his plan.

Perhaps the only things as high as Obama's goals are the hurdles they must clear.

While tackling the economic crisis, he is asking Congress to enact contentious measures that have been debated, but not decided, in calmer times: cut subsidies for big farms; combat global warming with a pollution tax on industries; raise taxes on the wealthy; make big changes to health care, including lower reimbursements for Medicare and Medicaid treatments and prescription drugs.

Standing alone, any one of these proposals would trigger a brawl in Congress and fierce debates outside Washington. Obama wants the proposals done largely in concert, as an interrelated plan to undo major elements of Ronald Reagan's conservative movement.

Obama outlined the approach in a budget proposal Thursday, a sprawling road map that will require several hard-fought pieces of legislation.

He launched his campaign for the package Saturday with a fiery, populist radio and Internet address that depicted his critics as champions of "the interests of powerful lobbyists" and "the wealthiest few."

"I realize that passing this budget won't be easy," the president said, because it "represents a threat to the status quo in Washington."

"They're gearing up for a fight,"

he said. "So am I."

If his rhetoric was tough, the challenges he faces are downright daunting. The economy contracted by a stunning 6.2 percent in the final three months of 2008, its worst showing in a quarter-century. Obama said the crisis calls for gutsy actions, and many groups feel he has delivered.

"We're struck with how bold and courageous a budget it is," said James Horney of the liberal Center on Budget and Policy Priorities, which supports the president. "There are a whole lot of things that are going to be extremely difficult because there are very powerful vested interests out there that will fight them."

Obama is not simply proposing a budget that assumes a jaw-dropping deficit of \$1.75 trillion this year, a quadruple increase from the year before. He's trying to redirect strong currents in American society.

The wealthiest 5 percent would pay a whopping \$1 trillion in higher taxes over the next decade, while most others would get tax cuts. Industries would buy and trade permits to emit heat-trapping gases. Higher-income older people would pay more for Medicare benefits. Drug companies would receive smaller profits from the government. Banks would play a much smaller role in student loans.

Obama's climb is steep. Even with solid Democratic majorities in the House and Senate, he secured a \$787 billion stimulus package only after accepting compromises that irked liberals but won the support of three Republican senators.

Not a single House Republican backed it. Judging from House GOP leaders' immediate condemnation of his budget blueprint, Obama can expect more of the same.

# U.S. Supreme Court looks at prisoners' right to DNA test

ANCHORAGE, Alaska — William Osborne says he's a victim of mistaken identity and a DNA test would prove it. Alaska prosecutors say his rape and attempted murder convictions are as solid as can be, and would be pointless to revisit.

Osborne's attorneys will argue before the U.S. Supreme Court on Monday that DNA testing is not something states can choose to allow when they have doubts about a conviction, but a constitutional right.

They note that 232 prisoners around the country have been exonerated by such tests, and that Alaska is the only state that hasn't even tried to use the ever-evolving technology to see if it might have gotten a conviction wrong.

"Most prosecutors, judges and states recognize that while DNA testing in these crimes may not always protect a conviction, it protects our system of justice by revealing the truth," said Peter Neufeld, co-director of The Innocence Project. "Alaska is the exception."

Neufeld's group, which works to exonerate those who are wrongfully convicted, argues that the U.S. Constitution guarantees Osborne access to the DNA test when it says no state shall "deprive any person of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law."

The state of Alaska argues that

Osborne got a fair, error-free trial, and that he is trying to use nothing more than a claim of innocence to reopen a case in which there is ample evidence of his guilt.

Osborne, 36, was convicted of raping and trying to murder a woman in 1993. She identified him as one of her two attackers, he was incriminated by the other man and Osborne confessed in a detailed written statement in 2004.

Ken Rosenstein, the state's lead lawyer for the case, said Osborne chose not to use options available to him if he had wanted to argue his innocence, including asking the governor for clemency.

"Osborne is not a very likely candidate for maintaining an innocent claim because he has confessed to his crime and he won't declare his innocence under oath. There is otherwise no other reason to doubt the validity of his convictions," he said.

# 2 months into 2009, American deaths spike in Afghanistan

KABUL — U.S. deaths in Afghanistan increased threefold during the first two months of 2009 compared with the same period last year, after thousands more troops deployed and commanders ramped up winter operations against an increasingly violent insurgency.

As troops pour into the country and violence rises, another sobering measure has also increased: More Afghan civilians are dying in U.S. and allied operations than at the

hands of the Taliban, according to a count by The Associated Press. In the first two months of the year, U.S., NATO or Afghan forces have killed 100 civilians, while militants have killed 60.

President Barack Obama recently announced the deployment of 17,000 additional troops to bolster 38,000 already in the country, increasing the U.S. focus on Afghanistan while a drawdown begins in Iraq. The latest casualty toll among U.S. forces could portend a deadlier year

in Afghanistan than the U.S. military has experienced since the Taliban's ouster in 2001.

Twenty-nine U.S. troops died in Afghanistan the first two months of 2009 — compared with eight Americans in the first two months of 2008.

Part of the increase is due to the influx of troops. In early 2008 there were about 27,000 forces in the country, some 10,000 fewer than today.

But U.S. troops are also operating in new, dangerous areas. A brigade of 10th Mountain Division soldiers

deployed to two insurgent-heavy provinces outside Kabul in January — Wardak and Logar. And American forces are increasingly operating in Taliban heartland in the south.

"It has a lot to do with the fact that we have a presence in places and going into places and disrupting insurgents in areas where they haven't been bothered much," Col. Greg Julian, the top U.S. spokesman in Afghanistan, said Saturday. That, he said, means more battles and more attacks.

### Car with 5-year-old inside sinks in icy Utah river

SALT LAKE CITY — Police in Utah say a car plunged 60 feet into a canyon and sank in the icy Colorado River with a 5-year-old girl trapped inside.

Utah Highway Patrol Sgt. Darrel Mecham said the car driven by the girl's grandmother — 60-year-old Evelyn M. Maestas — went off the road Friday south of the city of Moab.

Maestas and her 11-year-old adopted daughter Tori were able to escape from the car through a broken window and get out of the river.

They told authorities they saw 5-year-old Danica still inside the car as it sank.

Search crews were not immediately able to find the car and the girl in the deep water.

Maestas and Tori were taken to a hospital for treatment of hypothermia. They are from Mancos, Colo.

### Tammy Lee Gibson told Pierce County Superior Court Judge Susan Serko that laws were needed to keep convicted sexual predators away from children.

Gibson, 40, who has two daughters, pleaded guilty to a reduced charge of third-degree assault in January. She initially was charged with second-degree assault and felony harassment, which could have meant an eight-month jail sentence if she'd been convicted.

Court papers said Gibson hit William Allen Baldwin, a 24-year-old sex offender, with the bat after accusing him of molesting her children in June 2008 even though he had not. Baldwin was living in a trailer park near Gibson.

### Avalanche kills 3 on Wyoming-Idaho line

JACKSON, Wyo. — Authorities in Wyoming say a mile-long avalanche has killed three snowmobilers near the Wyoming-Idaho state line.

Lincoln County officials said the three victims were among four snowmobilers caught by the snow slide Friday near Alpine in the Snake River Range.

Sgt. Shane Tindall said the fourth person walked out and used his cell phone to call for help.

The slide was about 100 yards wide and a mile long.

TACOMA, Wash. — A judge has sentenced a mother to three months in jail for hitting a convicted sex offender with an aluminum baseball bat.

# American attacked in Egypt

CAIRO — Police arrested an Egyptian man who attacked an American teacher in the same Cairo tourist site where a bomb killed a French teenager a week earlier, said local media Saturday.

Abdel-Rahman Taher, 46, used a pocket knife to leave a one inch cut on the teacher's face when he attacked him Friday near the famous Khan el-Khalili bazaar, said the state-owned *Al-Gomhuria* newspaper.

Taher told police after he was arrested Friday that he hated foreigners because of Israel's recent offensive against the Gaza Strip, the paper reported. Opposition newspapers said Taher was recently released from a mental hospital.

The teacher who was attacked was visiting Cairo with his wife from the northern city of Alexandria where he worked at an American school, said the *Al-Gomhuria* report.

Attacks against tourists are relatively rare in Egypt. But a bomb outside the Khan el-Khalili bazaar killed a French teenager and

wounded 24 others on Feb. 22.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility for the deadly attack. Several experts on Islamic militants said the bombing may have been carried out by extremists angry at what some in the Arab world viewed as Egypt's failure to help Palestinians during Israel's devastating offensive against Hamas in Gaza.

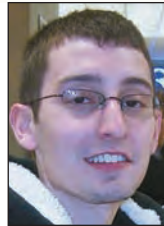

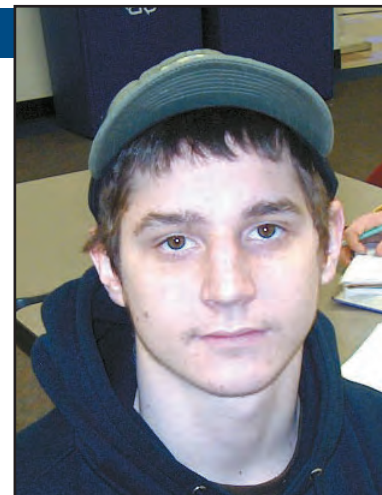

## Finding the right fit with football foes frustrating

**SCHEDULING** major-college football games can be one tricky business, as WVU Deputy Director of Athletics Mike Parsons understands quite well.

In the world of most other college athletic programs, when two schools decide they want to play, chances are they're going to play within a couple years.

A simple wish, however, just doesn't cut it in the world of college football, and sometimes a few talks don't mean much, either.

WVU has had discussions with Virginia, Virginia Tech and Kentucky, to no avail but the frustration of WVU coach Bill Stewart.

"I've talked with UVA, and every time we start talking and they get us excited, UVA bails out," Stewart said. "Every time. I'm tired of it. We could drive five hours over the mountain, yet they are going to play TCU and Southern Miss. It's very frustrating."

"Can you imagine playing UVA at home, UVA away and UVA at FedEx Field [the Washington Redskins' home stadium], or Virginia Tech away, Virginia Tech at home and Virginia Tech at FedEx Field? There would be 90,000-plus [fans], and the first time the ACC gets the money, and the second time the Big East and WVU gets it. It would be packed to the gills."

Stewart wasn't overly pleased with Maryland's decision to drop the Mountaineers in favor of California for 2008-'09, either, but said WVU is ready to play any of those border schools any time they are. Until, or if, that time comes, expect more of the Colorado (2008-09), LSU (2010-11) and Michigan State (2014-15) matchups, which Stewart calls Parsons a "whiz" in landing.

It's not that way all over the country. Part of why the rest of WVU's upcoming schedule hasn't been released is because a couple Big East schools still haven't landed a 12th game.

Still, thanks in large part to ESPN, the process of finding the right team to fill the void has become easier, Parsons said.

The ESPN programming department keeps a running tally of schools' schedules and holes. In some instances, they help put two prospective schools together, and often times those matchups turn into telecasts. Win-win for all three sides.

Finding potential teams to fill voids is perhaps the hardest part of the process, Parsons says, and that's why ESPN's involvement is so helpful.

It's beneficial because ESPN understands there's a basic list that all schools need to meet each fall for their financial well-being. First, since the NCAA approved a 12th game to the schedule, pretty much every major BCS school's aim is to have seven home games. The difference of that one extra home game, Parsons says, could be as much as \$2 million at WVU, in addition to the jolt local eateries, hotels and businesses receive.

On a side note, Parsons said WVU plans to "maintain ticket prices as they are."

The Big East occupies seven games, giving the Mountaineers five to play with. Of those non-conference dates, Parsons says WVU likes to have two fellow BCS-level teams (Colorado and Auburn from this upcoming season), two non-BCS Division I teams (East Carolina and Marshall) and one Division I-AA team (Liberty). From a competitive standpoint, it wouldn't make sense, nor would it probably be feasible, to schedule five BCS teams.

The eight-team Big East Conference doesn't help scheduling matters, because WVU is given just three conference home games every other year. All five other BCS conferences guarantee their schools at least four league home games a season. It further throws Big East schools for a loop because all other BCS teams need just four nonconference games, not five.

"We needed the right [ninth] team yesterday," Stewart said.

GHS head coach Rod Auvil gushed about his star, Gallaher.

"I've had him since he was 6 years old," Auvil said. "I've watched him mature and develop work ethic, attitude, obedience, leadership — he has so many attributes. He's really a one-of-a-kind kid. He's a champion on the mat and he's a champion off the mat, and the way he is off the

mat is what really matters to me." Winning doesn't get old for Gallaher.

"It feels great," he said. "I may have won it three times, but every time it feels like the first time. There are always doubts. I always wonder if I've worked hard enough. Apparently, I did."

Gallaher finished the season 44-0 and wound up his career an incredible 175-3, with his last loss coming in his freshman year.

Gallaher has been so good that he has even helped make those around him better.

"This was my third time to states and my first time placing," Bartlett said. "A lot of it has to do with hitting the gym and working hard all

year in practice, and a lot of it has to do with practicing with Cameron Gallaher every day."

Clearly Bartlett has made strides, which helped him nearly come back in the final moments of his match. Trailing 5-2, Bartlett got a take-down with 20 seconds left, but was unable to get another late score and lost, 5-4.

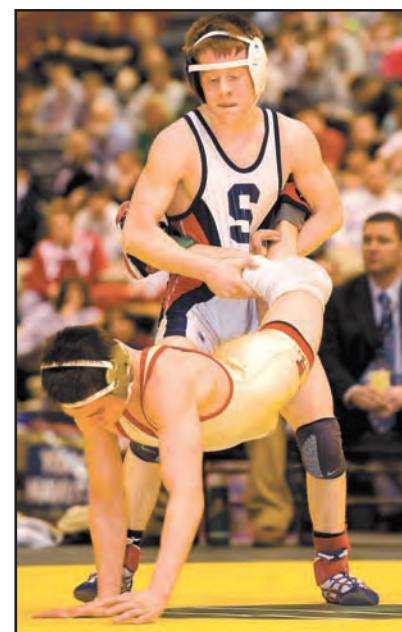
However, Bartlett was still relatively pleased with his efforts.

Holmes, the area's high school basketball leading scorer, who averages just under 25 points, made both free throws, giving C-B a 46-42 lead.

"For my team, I'm supposed to be the scorer and one of the leaders," Holmes said.

Anthony Henline quickly answered for Tygarts Valley, making a lay-up shot that brought the score to 46-44.

With seven seconds remaining on the clock, Holmes was fouled and headed back to the free throw line. Again, he sank both foul shots, putting the Cee-Bees up for good, 48-44.

"Down there in crunch time, we certainly did execute pretty well," said Frank Skubis, C-B head coach. "I'm glad they decided to foul him [Holmes]. That's who should have the ball for us."

Holmes said, "I knew it was a close game and if I hit both of them, I'd put it out of reach, so I just had to make them."

Skubis said teams have been defending Holmes extremely hard.

"Tonight, they were playing a diamond-and-one on him. When we were screening for him, he was coming off the screens and they immediately jump-switched out on him," Skubis said. "They're just making it extremely difficult on him."

# Sorry, 'Cuse: WVU catches break

## Orange miss buzzer shot; 4 Mountaineers wind up with double-figure points

**WVU 69, SYRACUSE 68**

WVU women's basketball coach Mike Carey couldn't bear to watch as the ball left the finger tips of Syracuse's Nicole Michael just before the game clock expired Saturday afternoon.

Carey's Mountaineers were clinging to a 69-68 lead, but the trajectory of Michael's shot left Carey with a sinking feeling.

Was WVU about to lose its regular-season home finale on a 3-pointer at the buzzer?

"That ball looked right on line," Carey said later. "I said, 'Surely to goodness, we're going to get at least one break this year.'"

Well, the Mountaineers got it. Finally, they got it.

Michael's shot bounced harmlessly off the rim to preserve the one-point Big East Conference triumph before an enthusiastic Coliseum crowd of 3,257, on Senior Day.

"I was just praying it wouldn't go in," WVU senior guard Takisha Granberry said. "I felt a quick silence from everyone in the arena. We were just so happy it didn't go in."

Granberry's clutch shooting ultimately made the difference for the Mountaineers (16-12, 5-10 Big East) on a day in which they likely secured a postseason WNIT berth.

She scored six of her team-high 17 points in the final 3:17. Her last basket — a short jumper in the lane with 21.4 seconds remaining — put the Mountaineers on top, 69-68.

"She was just doing what she does well," said WVU senior point guard Ashley Powell, who scored 16 points and doled out 10 assists in recording her first career double-double.

"She's an exceptional player and an even better teammate. I was so happy she was able to do that in front of family and friends. She was doing what she's been doing for us all season long."

It was an emotional day for Granberry, whose father, Gregory, sang the National Anthem before the game. Granberry didn't even know her father would be attending Saturday's game until he surprised her in a local restaurant Thursday night.

Granberry sat out 10 minutes of the first half after picking up two quick fouls. She had only three points at intermission as the Mountaineers trailed, 37-32.

She scored 14 critical points in the second half to help WVU stave off the pesky Orange (15-13, 4-11).

"I couldn't believe I hit those shots," Granberry said. "I was desperate."

Granberry and Powell were two of four WVU players scoring in double figures. Freshman center Natalie Burton registered her first career double-double with 10 points and 10 rebounds. Sarah Miles finished with 10 points and nine boards. Alex Sanabria came off the bench to score nine points.

"Give all the credit to the players," said Carey, whose team rallied from a 12-point second-half deficit. "I think we had four people in double figures for the first time all season. Ashley Powell showed a lot of leadership. Natalie Burton had a double-double. Takisha

## Man-to-man can't stop Gates, so Mountaineers forced into 1-3-1 zone

TAMPA, Fla. — When asked about playing the 1-3-1 zone defense this past college basketball season, former WVU standout Joe Alexander simply laughed.

"We thought [Bob Huggins] was kidding," Alexander said. "We all kind of looked at each other and started smiling." Huggins built a 27-year coaching rep-

utation on playing tough man-to-man defense. His players knew that last year. They know it this season.

When the Mountaineers (19-9, 8-7 Big East) first broke out in the 1-3-1 this season — in the 26th game, against Notre Dame — it was somewhat of a novelty.

"I saw watching film of last year's game that the 1-3-1 slowed them down," Huggins said following the Notre Dame game, a 79-68 Mountaineers victory.

A year ago, Huggins used the 1-3-1 to try to ease the transition for his players while they learned his system.

This season, there was no call for that, and in the first 25 games, the Mountaineers had become an almost exclu-

sive man-to-man team that switched on all screens.

That all changed in WVU's 65-61 loss to Cincinnati, in which the Mountaineers began the game playing man-to-man, but quickly switched to the 1-3-1 and stayed in it for much of the game.

The reason? The Bearcats were able to throw the ball in the post to 6-foot-9 center Yancy Gates and Gates scored almost at will.

"They had a real big guy and they were getting him the ball on the block," WVU forward Da'Sean Butler said. "He was scoring anytime he wanted to."

On this night, WVU forwards Wellington Smith and Kevin Jones could do lit-

tle to stop Gates, who finished with 22 points and 11 rebounds.

"It wasn't very good, was it?" Huggins said about WVU's defense on Gates. "We were going to front him like [Pitt center] DeJuan Blair and [UConn center] Hasheem [Thabeet]. We didn't fight it very hard, to be honest with you."

The 1-3-1 had its moments. The Bearcats' Dion Dixon hit a jump shot near the end of the shot clock on their first possession against the zone, but followed that up with three turnovers and took two timeouts in less than a minute to position their offense.

lose on the biggest of state stages, UHS head coach Ken Maisel probably summed it up best: "It's just not our night."

Perhaps the most difficult part was that it was so incredibly close for both UHS wrestlers. Schiffbauer's match, in particular, was much closer than the score.

Early on, Schiffbauer held a 2-0 lead, but later surrendered three questionable points near the end of the second, allowing Jeffrey to stand and immediately take him down. The call could have easily been a two-point reversal. Schiffbauer later gave up three more points in desperation with only seconds remaining, to give Jeffrey the 6-2 win.

Either way, Schiffbauer was bound to have his hands full. All three of his losses this year came at the hands of Jeffrey.

"Jeffrey may be the best wrestler in the state, not just at 112, but of every wrestler at every weight class," Maisel said. "We know he can beat that kid, but he didn't. He worked hard and did everything right, but that kid is just good. Give him credit, it's nothing Jesse did wrong, that kid is just good."

Nonetheless, Schiffbauer had trouble seeing things that way after his defeat.

"I know I'll look back and not be satisfied," he said. "I know I won't."

Schiffbauer, a sophomore, still has a chance to eventually get himself a state title, but Maisel isn't taking anything for granted.

"You know, a lot of [former] state champions didn't even make it to the finals this year," Maisel said. "So, he should embrace this, because you never know when you're going to get another shot."

That was the case for Panico, who missed out on his final chance at a state title.

"He's upset, and he should be. He's a senior," Maisel said. "But like I told him, you can't let one match define who you are, as a wrestler or as a man. He was a huge part of this program, not just in the last four years, but for all time."

The loss came as a result of Panico surrendering four quick points on two takedowns in the first period. From then on, Panico slowly climbed back, but was never able to generate enough offense and lost, 4-3.

"Those two early takedowns killed him," Maisel said. "Then the kid did a nice job blocking and not letting Victor score."

Parkersburg South won the Class AA state team title with a score of 237, followed by Wheeling Park (132) and Ripley (110).

Still, as the Mountaineers enter today's 4 p.m. game, against South Florida (8-19, 3-12), and then their final two regular-season games after that, there is a concern about WVU's ability to play its man-to-man defense.

"Across the board, we had too many mental lapses in the man-to-man," Butler said. "They were lobbing the ball in, so we should have been fronting the guy. He gets the lob and lays it up and there is no one coming over to help."

"There were other times they would lob the ball in and we did front him and he still layed it up, because there was no help. You can't have those mental lapses."

It's not like the Mountaineers haven't faced big teams before this season and they'll face another big man today, in South Florida fresh-

man center Gus Gilchrist (6-10, 235 pounds).

Will the "3 zone" continue to show up in games? If it does, it means the Mountaineers' man-to-man staple has come very loose.

"It's not something we want to use," WVU guard Alex Ruoff said. "We've been having to use it, because our man-to-man has been so bad. We haven't been able to play man-to-man like we're used to. We can't play it like we did at the beginning of the season. Coach has been forced to use it."

Ruoff added that if a freshman (Gates) can destroy WVU's man-to-man, then there's a big problem.

Butler said Gates was a problem, because Smith had no help in defending him.

"I couldn't tell you about the 'help' defense," Butler said. "It wasn't there. As a team, we have to help Wellington, because he's not a center. He has to guard centers, but he's not a center. He can get out-matched on size alone."

## Johnson a joy in gym now

Shakes blues to become a force on bars and floor

WVU gymnastics coach Linda Burdette couldn't shake the feeling that Naja Johnson wanted to hop on the first bus back to her Austell, Ga., hometown.

Johnson had seemingly developed a case of the true-freshman blues during her first months of training, in the fall of 2007.

"She walked around the gym and looked at the ground most of the time," Burdette said. "She didn't look at people eye-to-eye until we got to compete. Once she started competing, she started enjoying it. Every meet, she liked it a little bit more."

She became a contributor on bars for the Mountaineers this past season, despite suffering a knee injury late in the year. The sophomore has added floor exercise to her repertoire this season, after a dislocated elbow sidelined senior Erica Watson, on Feb. 9.

Johnson ranks 14th regionally and fifth in the East Atlantic Gymnastics League on bars with a 9.775 regional qualifying score. She's also been strong on the floor, turning in a 9.775 in WVU's quad meet at Oklahoma, this past weekend.

"Compared to last season, I would rate this one a 10," said Johnson, whose No. 20-ranked Mountaineers (7-4) entertain Kentucky at 2 p.m. today, at the Coliseum. "Last season, I didn't get to do a lot because I was hurt."

"This season, I knew I was going to be on bars, but floor was definitely a surprise. I didn't think I was good enough. Erica being hurt just kind of made me step up my game a little bit more just to do it basically for her being a senior and getting hurt."

Thoughts of heading home to Georgia rarely cross Johnson's mind. She's become more comfortable in the gym. Teammates

and coaches enjoy Johnson's personality and her dry sense of humor.

"I tease her now," Burdette said. "I say, 'Naja, I know you love gymnastics now,' and she laughs. When she gets out on that floor, what she does is amazing. She's a very talented athlete."

Johnson comes from an athletic family. Her father, Bobby, is a former power lifter who once excelled at basketball before a knee injury cut his career short at the prep level.

Her mother, Jeanine, played college basketball at Eastern Kentucky. Her sister Ashante, 16, and brother Dyan, 15, play basketball in high school. Dyan also plays baseball.

"They don't like gymnastics at all," Johnson said of her siblings. Johnson can't recall a time when she wasn't in the sport. She started when she was 5, but the family has home videos of Johnson doing flips at age 2. "I guess I was doing it out of the womb," she said.

She developed her skills at the Atlanta School of Gymnastics, a club made up primarily of African-Americans.

"We had one or two Caucasians," Johnson said. "We didn't look at it like that. We would go to meets, and everyone would stare at you like, 'Your whole team is black.'"

African-Americans are not heavily represented in collegiate gymnastics. Johnson attributes that to the demanding nature of the sport more than skin color.

"It's a different sport, and not many people can stick with it," Johnson said. "It's expensive. That's why it's hard for not just African-Americans but people to stay in it."

Johnson admits there were times when she pondered leaving gymnastics, particularly when she started high school and wanted to hang out with her friends.

"I just couldn't quit," she said. "I knew if I quit I'd miss my gym friends. If I quit, I would have regretted it. Not everyone makes it to [the college] level."

When WVU began recruiting her during her junior year, she knew little about Burdette's program. Johnson said she thought West Virginia was in Virginia. She hadn't considered doing gymnastics in college until WVU came calling.

"My parents always said this is the reason I was doing it for so long," she said. "When they actually recruited me, I was like, 'OK, this is something I can do.'"

The diversity in the WVU gymnastics program helped attract Johnson to Morgantown. Burdette has had at least one African-American on her team every season since 1988, when Yvette Clark came aboard.

Lajuanda Moody was a second-team All-American on bars, in 1994, and TeShawne Jackson became a Region 2 champion on floor, in 2000. Dinorh Boyd qualified as an all-arounder for the NCAA championships, in 2001.

"We've had quite a bit of diversity," Burdette said. "I've often said, 'I don't care if you're pink; I look at the gymnastics. I look at the skills.' Whatever the [skin color] is, it is."

Johnson's skills won Burdette over. She's close to cracking the Mountaineers' beam lineup. She'd like to begin doing exhibition vaulting next season and possibly compete as an all-arounder during her senior season, in 2011.

"I'm very pleased with the progress she's made from last year to this year," Burdette said. "As her confidence increases, she can achieve anything she wants to achieve."

## STATE WRESTLING TOURNAMENT

HUNTINGTON — Saturday wasn't just about championship matches at the state high school wrestling tournament. The morning session determined the third-through sixth-place finishers, and six area wrestlers placed, along with the four in the finals.

Three of the six came from Grafton High. Senior Aaron Wood (215) took fourth, losing a 4-2 decision to Weir's Derrick Rovira. Fellow senior Chris Muller (171) took sixth, dropping a 7-4 decision to Calhoun County's Caden Arnold. Junior Markus Griffin (119) also took fourth, losing a 13-2 major decision to Petersburg's Dustin Kimble.

University High senior Nathan Turner (152) took third, with an 11-2 major decision of Hedgesville's Mike Cordello, and junior Jeff Weng (215) finished sixth, losing a 2-1 decision against Robert C. Byrd's Michael Secret.

Senior Christian Hartsell (145) was the lone Morgantown High wrestler to place. He took sixth, dropping a 4-1 decision to East Fairmont's Steven Robe.

Four of the six — Hartsell, Griffin, Muller and Wood — were in the semifinals Friday but were all humbled a bit in the late rounds.

"The competition," Hartsell said, "it started out a little easier for me and then just kept getting harder and harder every match."

But for a senior who had never been to a state tournament, it's hard to be disappointed.

"I'm not sad at all, I'm happy. I wasn't even supposed to be here,"

Hartsell said. "I'm not ranked as one of the state's top six; I just came out and wrestled hard."

Muller had similar feelings. "I'm happy. Coming in, I thought I had a good chance to win in the first round, but I wasn't so sure in the second," Muller said. "Really, I was one match away from the state title [match], and that's nuts. That's what I keep thinking."

The only other time Muller had made the state tournament was during his sophomore year. He went 2-2 and failed to place.

It was Griffin's second straight fourth-place finish. Of course, a year ago he was two weight classes lighter and wrestled as a 103-pounder.

"I'm pretty glad, but I thought I could've done better," he said. "I just got on the bottom and couldn't do anything. Obviously, I wanted to win states, but if not, I wanted to at least place and make sure I never quit, and that's what I did."

Turner turned his career around and became one of the most dominating physical specimens in his weight class.

"What a wonderful career," UHS head coach Ken Maisel said. "When he was a freshman, he was terrible. But, he just decided to dedicate himself and he got so much better. Some guys are just natural athletes. What he accomplished, he accomplished through work."

Weng was somewhat disappointed by his performance. It was his second straight sixth-place finish.

"My goal coming in was to do better than last year," Weng said. "Of course, my ultimate goal was to win a state championship, but obviously, that didn't happen. I guess that means I have a little more work to do."

Wrestling in the same weight class as Weng but at the Class AA-A level, Wood will definitely remember his fourth-place after taking sixth as a 189-pounder a year ago.

## Is hunting changing genetics of wild sheep?

**THIS PAST WEEK, WE LOOKED** at the situation relative to the breeding behavior of antlered mammals, refuting an article ("Survival of the Weak and Scrawny") in the Jan. 12 *Newsweek* magazine.

To summarize what was said about deer, as an example: Hunters take only the biggest bucks and since these bucks do the breeding, this means that genetically inferior animals now do the breeding.

I find no truth in this sentence. Hunters don't harvest all the big bucks; in fact, they harvest very few. Secondly, the biggest bucks do not do all the breeding; in fact, some do none of the breeding. Truth is that breeding is spread out among many different-aged, different-sized bucks. New studies conclude that "there is no clear relationship between antler size and breeding success."

One other point on deer that I didn't mention that relates to this question on genetics: Bucks don't stay where they were born. Most disperse to new areas, sometimes as far as 25 miles from their birth place. The result? Genetic variability increases.

Let's move on to what was said about wild sheep.

The article quotes a study done on Ram Mountain in Alberta, Canada, where 30 years of data showed a decline of 25 percent in the size of the horns and both the male and female sheep got smaller.

The article goes on to say that bigger-horned males sire larger offspring, and the bigger-horned males win the fights with other males and, thus, do the breeding. It notes that hunting season takes out the big males before they get a chance to breed, so the smaller, younger males do the breeding, leading to inferior offspring. I've done some research on this Alber-

ta study. My twin brother, who was a wildlife professor at the University of Alberta for 35 years, provided me with some research and I dug out some other research via the Internet.

It seems that this 30-year research project has been subject to tons of criticism by wildlife scientists. Few of them support the conclusions.

**Dr. Valerius Geist** is one of Canada's most highly regarded wildlife scientists. He notes that taking trophy animals has been going on since the Upper Paleolithic times, when cave painters chose trophies as their subjects. And in medieval central Europe, the biggest red stags were targeted by the nobility.

Indeed, this harvesting did lower the antler quality of red stags for many years. But around the time of the second world war, there was a desire to get the trophy antlered stags back, so protein-rich feeds were provided to the stags. Habitat quality was improved and, within a few generations, huge stags were again being produced.

The conclusion was that declines in body size and antler size were not permanent, and could be reversed.

The sheep biologist for the state of Alaska also criticized the conclusions of the sheep study, and cited research showing that, on Ram Mountain, there was density-driven nutritional scarcity and

that caused the sheep to decline in horn and body size.

In other words, there were too many sheep for the habitat, and they were suffering nutritional problems. That's basic wildlife management.

He goes on to say to wildlife researchers, "Be circumspect in communications with the press because what comes out isn't going to look very much like what you put in."

In other words, the sheep researchers should have been more careful about drawing the genetic conclusions from their data, because anti-hunting writers

would give it an "anti" twist.

He wrote this several years ago and, relative to the *Newsweek* article, it is pretty prophetic.

Biologists in Montana also checked in on the conclusions from this sheep research and quoted another study on sheep which found that younger rams sired half of the ewes. Even when older rams were there, younger rams sired ewes — same results we've noted for whitetails. The Montana biologists noted that, indeed, the potential for horn size is tied to genes, but to reach that potential one has to look at environmental issues

that limit horn growth. Weather, habitat, disease, all limit the genetic potential of sheep to achieve big horns.

Wildlife managers know that killing big male sheep can reduce horn size. Maybe that's why state and province managers limit harvests to 3-10 percent of available rams, and that's been going on for many years.

I found other studies that refute the conclusions cited by the *Newsweek* article, but enough of that. However, when media folks take such research and twist the words of the authors to suit their own agenda, this misleads citizens. When large numbers of urban citizens read such articles, they get upset with hunters, and they then get politicians involved and laws get changed that do harm to wildlife. It's happened with mountain lion hunting on the west coast and with grizzly bear hunting in British Columbia. The apparent motive of this *Newsweek* article was also aimed at stopping certain forms of hunting.

Hunters pay for almost all the research done on wild sheep. The Wild Sheep Foundation and Safari Club International pay for almost all research done on sheep habitat, disease, etc. There is no question that without these hunting organizations, in many regions our wild sheep would be in major trouble. The hunters in these organizations contribute millions of dollars every year to help guarantee the future survival of our wild sheep.

These sheep are elegant, wonderful animals, and without hunters and hunting organizations, it's hard to tell where they would be.

## The Call of the tame on his pond

**MY NEIGHBOR BOYS** have always been very considerate and giving when it comes to things they think we need on the farm. My pond was supposed to be for bass, bluegill and catfish. Thanks to them, it now has crappie and perch in it.

But the best thing they ever did was get some Call Ducks and put them on the pond. If you live out of town, have a pond and would like some ducks, these are a delight to have.

I mention living out of town because these ducks are very boisterous and loud — the comedians of the duck family. They are also very tame. When I drive my Polaris Ranger down the lane in the evening, they come running and quacking because they know they're going to get fed.

It wasn't always this way. Our Jack Russell, Stretch, loved to chase the ducks and the neighbor's chickens. If the ducks were in the yard around the pond and they heard me coming in the Ranger, they'd fly onto the pond because they knew that little white dog was coming. When I caught Stretch with a live chicken, I knew it was time for another session with the shock collar. He won't even look at a duck or chicken now.

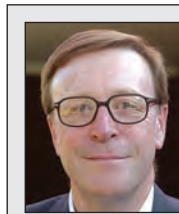
The Call Duck is smaller than a Mallard and comes in a variety of colors. It is also a very old breed of duck. The first recordings of them were in the Netherlands in the 1600s. It is believed they came from the Far East, but there is no record of it. Some think the Dutch ship captains brought them in from Japan.

In the Netherlands, these ducks were known as Coy or Decoy ducks. As the name implies, they were used to lure wild ducks into funnel traps, where they were

caught and eventually slaughtered for the market.

Later, hunters would tether these ducks out on the water to bring the wild ducks within range of their guns. These, too, were market hunters.

It is also thought that these early Call Ducks were not like the ones we have today. These early ducks were probably trained to be tame and to call.

By the 1850s, these ducks were in England, where they were used for calling in the wild ducks. In

1865, it was one of the first six breeds to be "standardized" there. However, by the middle of the 20th century these ducks were very rare. Through the efforts of a few breeders, the breed is now very popular.

They actually have duck shows like they have dog shows. The Call Duck is a very popular breed and wins more duck championships in North America than any other breed.

What makes a good duck? I have no idea. The extent of my knowledge is that if it looks like a duck and sounds like a duck, it must be a duck, be it a good one or a bad one.

In captivity, these ducks will produce from 25 to 75 eggs per year. The breeders hatch the eggs in incubators.

The ducks on our pond have

laid eggs and a few have hatched. However, the norm is that a skunk, coon or possum will get the eggs before they hatch. The few that have hatched usually don't last long. Large bass love to eat baby ducks.

The neighbors' grandson, Zack, hatched a few last year in his incubator. When they got big enough, he brought them out to the pond. I'm not sure if any of the six that are on the pond now were from them or not. The longevity of these ducks is always in question with the number of hawks and owls around.

If you'd like to try a few of these ducks, call the various livestock sales and look in the want ads. You can also order them from catalogs.

### GO FISH! (WEST VIRGINIA DNR)

#### Cheat Lake

The lake is ice-covered in most areas and unsafe for fishing. However, a 6-pound channel catfish was caught by a bank angler from an ice-free opening in the Morgan Run cove this past week. Walleye anglers should be able to launch boats at the Chat Park winter ramp.

#### Monongahela River

The river is ice-free. Recent high flows have caused fish to move into tributary mouths, particularly Buffalo, Paw Paw, Prickett and Whiteday creeks. Fish will also be attracted to currents in the tailwaters and heated discharges at the power plants. Start fishing for sauger and walleye about an hour before sunset because they will begin feeding at dusk. Jigs with minnows or worms are particularly good baits but 3-inch plastic grubs will also be productive. White or chartreuse is a good color.

#### Tygart Lake

The lake is about 55 feet below the summer level, ice-covered and unsafe for fishing. Bank anglers might drive to Cove Run at the head of the lake and fish the river for walleye and white bass. The best fishing is now in the tailwater for walleyes and trout. Walleye fishing is best when flows are above 1,500 cfs and trout fishing at lower flows. The constant high flows during the past month have caused lots of walleyes to move through the dam to the tailwater. The tailwater temperature is 35

degrees. Call (304) 265-5953 for daily lake and tailwater conditions.

#### Stonecoal Lake

The lake is at winter pool and ice-free. For bass, try slow presentations of different baits in 12-15 feet of water. Crappie will be moving up to structure when the water temperature starts to warm.

#### Stonewall Jackson

The lake is at winter pool and ice-free. For bass, try slow presentations of different baits in 12-15 feet of water. Crappie will be moving up to structure when the water temperature starts to warm. Trout were stocked in the tailwaters Feb. 9. Before heading to the lake, contact the Corps of Engineers at (304) 269-7463.

#### Summersville

The lake is at winter pool, clear and covered with ice. Trout were stocked in the tailwaters Feb. 9. Info: (304) 872-5809.

#### Sutton

The lake is at winter pool, clear and ice-free. For bass, try slow presentations of different baits in 12-15 feet of water. Crappie will be moving up to structure when the water temperature starts to warm. Trout were stocked in the tailwaters Feb. 9 (950 pounds). Before heading to the lake: (304) 765-2705.

## Government transparency builds trust

Public's right to know includes business on/off campus

As the events of the past year or so have taught us, skepticism can equate to wisdom in some dealings with West Virginia University.

There was a time when the public could simply trust that activities associated with the state's flagship university were on the up and up. Then again, there was a time when the public could trust that someone holding a degree from WVU had actually earned it.

The *Dominion Post* recently received a copy of a Feb. 7 e-mail sent by Brenda Walker, director of development for the College of Business and Economics (B&E), that begins:

"I am e-mailing you from my home computer as we have been advised to avoid this information in College e-mails."

A few years ago, an e-mail referencing the use of a home computer to avoid university equipment likely would have prompted a curiosity call to the university public information officer or the sender to ask what was going on.

It was a time when it would be ludicrous to think anyone on the university payroll might try to skirt the public's right to know by communicating about university business outside the confines of WVU property. But that was then.

Walker said Friday the wording — "advised to avoid this information in College e-mails" — was because she was being "oversensitive" and that she could not recall ever being told to avoid certain topics in WVU e-mails.

The Walker e-mail primarily concerned this newspaper's publication of information contained in a draft copy of the internal executive MBA program audit that was, according to the e-mail, "leaked to the paper."

The e-mail was sent to the B&E Board of Advisors, a group comprised of alumni and others interested in the school, with copies to interim B&E Dean William Trumbull and WVU Director of Alumni Affairs Vickie Trickett.

Walker also attached the letter that Heather Bresch asked be read aloud at the Feb. 6 WVU Board of Governors meeting. The BOG, however, considered her letter in executive session and university officials announced that a copy would not be released to the public. As the letter concerned a former student, the university was not about to breach her privacy — despite Bresch's desire for public exposure. The university also knew that day that the letter had been provided to the media.

Walker's e-mail ended in part with: "I will be in touch with News and Information Service as well as Larry and Bob on Monday morning to consider next moves."

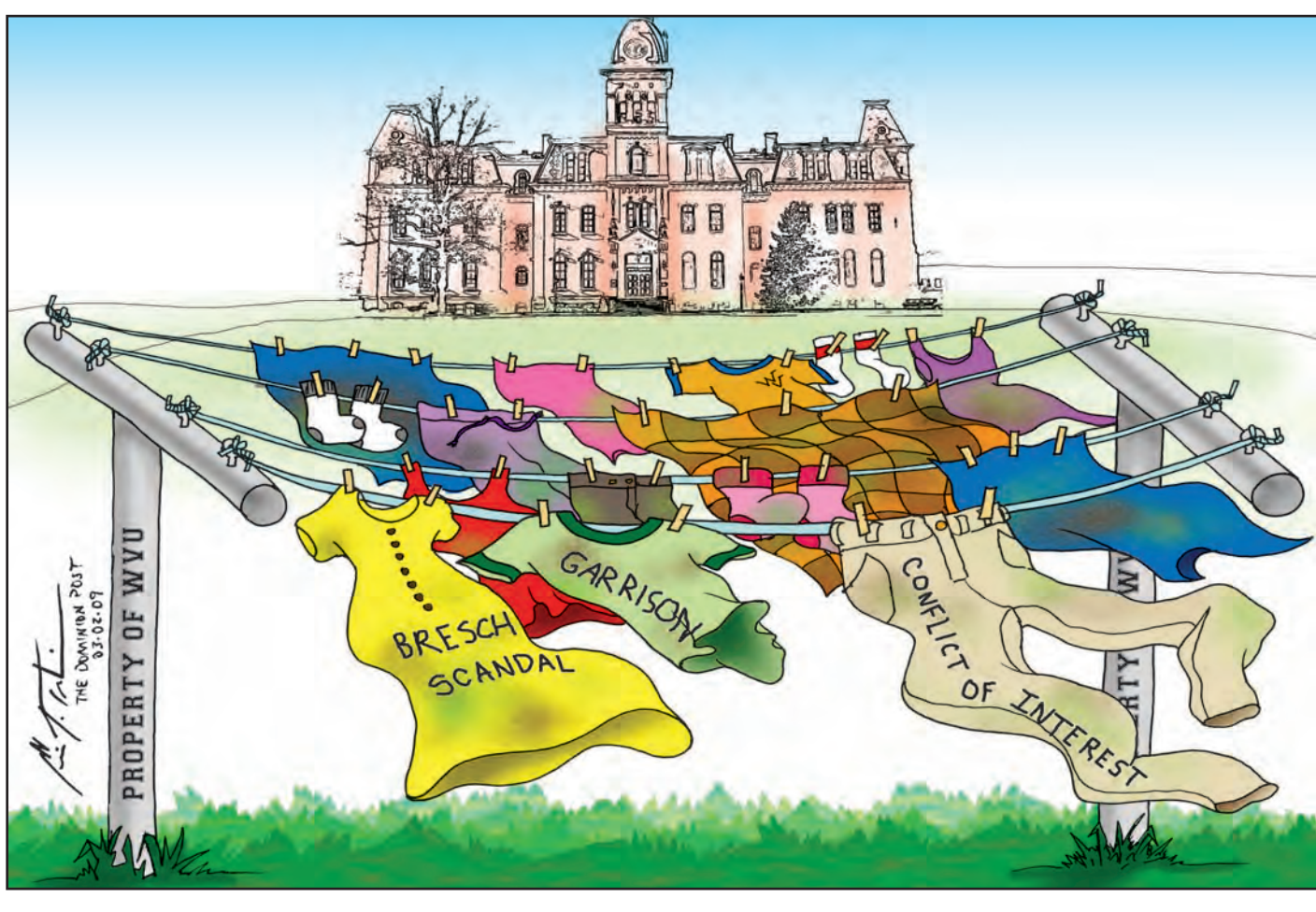
On Friday, Becky Lofstead, WVU assistant vice president of communications, said she knew nothing of the e-mail and that her advice has been to provide the B&E board with public information not protected by [the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act] or other privacy laws.

The response makes us wonder who gave Walker the letter and who authorized her to send it to individuals outside the BOG the day after WVU announced it would not provide it to the public.

Also on Friday, *The Dominion Post* filed Freedom of Information Act requests for access to the personal and university e-mails of WVU employees who may be communicating about university business outside university brick and mortar.

WVU is the custodian of public information and if its representatives use equipment outside the brick and mortar to conduct university business, it still falls under the public's right to know.

If it were otherwise, government entities could simply use personal e-mails to conduct business out of the public eye, thereby cloaking WVU and other state agencies in secrecy.

#### Science and faith can co-exist with education

I am chagrined when I read letters to the editor which create conflict between science and faith [religion] such as expressed in a recent letter to the editor (DP-Feb. 22), which questioned the DarwinFest at WVU because of the perceived conflict of evolution with creation.

I have taught physics in high school and at WVU for more than 40 years (36 at WVU). Let me begin with a basic premise: The role of science is to determine the "laws of nature."

Inherently there can be no conflict between the laws of nature and the creator of such laws. Thus, if you see a conflict, you might want to learn about the laws of nature and/or be willing to question your religious beliefs. I, as a Catholic

scientist, see no conflict between evolution and creation.

A little bit of science: Pre-1900 physics, the laws of Newton and Maxwell, were essentially deterministic laws. They could give one the impression that God had predetermined our destiny in his creation. Since most high school physics texts only teach pre-1900 physics, it is easy to see why many have deterministic views of nature and their religion.

Post-1900 science, in the development of atomic theory and quantum mechanics, found a different paradigm. Modern science is based on probability and uncertainty as fundamental laws of nature.

This probability and uncertainty is inherent in the big bang theory and in Darwin's theory of evolution which was published in 1859 and is fully accepted in the scientific community.

So, I believe in a God who created a universe with a *BIG BANG* and put laws of probability and uncertainty into its evolutionary development, whose beauty we enjoy today.

It is the quantum theory, embodying this paradigm, which has led to the fantastic beauty of chemistry and molecular biology and medicine and technology which we experience. I do not believe in a faulted God who must "correct" his creation by interfering with its development.

Of course, probability and uncertainty allow for the existence of bad things happening, even through our actions. Let us all enjoy and contribute to the development of this universe. The probability and uncertainty of our actions are improved by good education.

## State should keep its PROMISE

### Benefits of scholars span the classroom and the boardroom

A few students sit slumped in their chairs at the back of the classroom, faces hidden under ballcaps and appearing nonchalant, yet these same students get a 96 percent or higher grade on every one of the very difficult exams. Some never miss a class, or a class assignment, while working 20-plus hours a week to earn money to survive as a student.

Others write research reports that are so interesting that a classroom conversation is sparked due to their insightful comments. Often, these students explain something to their peers with more clarity than an experienced professor.

Who are they? They are West Virginia's PROMISE Scholars, and they help to make my classroom a magnificent place to teach and to learn.

More than half of WVU's incoming, full-time freshmen from West Virginia are PROMISE Scholars. Just five years after the first class of PROMISE students arrived on campus in 2002, retention rates rose dramatically.

The data indicate that PROMISE awardees are retained at nearly a 90 percent rate, while non-PROMISE in-state students are retained at a 75 percent rate.

It is well known that there is a positive relationship between a student's ACT scores and his/her predicted college success. PROMISE awardees have both higher ACT scores as well as higher grade-point averages than other students at their high schools. Our PROMISE students are expected to perform better in college, and indeed they do.

With this program, students have the added incentive to achieve stated goals in high school in order to receive the benefits of the program. The attractiveness of a PROMISE Scholarship keeps them on track by taking the required "PROMISE core" coursework in English, social sciences, laboratory science and mathe-

PROMISE motivated to continue to achieve once they enroll in our institutions of higher education. A PROMISE Scholar must retain a 3.0 average after a certain point — or lose their funding.

Because of the PROMISE program, with the guarantee of merit-based support at the state public institutions, many of our best and brightest students stay in West Virginia for their college years.

This also raises the likelihood that they will remain in the state after college. If a student begins at an out-of-state school, it may be more difficult to encourage that student to remain a West Virginian upon graduation.

Higher Education Policy Commission data indicates that PROMISE may have had a positive impact on reducing the outflow of our college-age students to nearby states. You can trust me on this: West Virginia surely wants to retain the kind of students that have earned the PROMISE awards.

PROMISE Scholars also intensify the academic experience for fellow students both within the state and from out of state.

The PROMISE program is a factor in making WVU a better university. The PROMISE Scholarship Program contributes to a higher quality educational experience in both high school and college across West Virginia and in the long term is paying back by educating high quality teachers who will remain in the state to educate the next generation.

The video lottery was passed in order to fund the PROMISE Scholarships, and I hope that it continues to be used for this purpose in the future. Although the program's costs have been escalating, the video lottery revenues have been escalating at an even faster rate.

The benefits from this program will last over decades, and the biggest benefits of this program are the intan-

## The global assault on free speech

THE LATEST DEATH KNEEL for freedom of speech comes not from Iran, but from that bastion of democratic freedom known as the United Kingdom.

Earlier this month, British authorities deported Dutch lawmaker Geert Wilders, declaring him a danger to "public security."

Wilders' offense is that he offends. He stirs outrage by comparing the Quran to "Mein Kampf" — and disseminating his film depicting Islam as a terrorist religion. Although invited to the U.K. by a member of the House of Lords to screen his screed, Wilders is too hot for Britain to handle. Meanwhile, back home in Amsterdam, the Court of Appeals has decided to prosecute Wilders for "hate speech."

Like many assaults on free speech, the actions of the British government and Dutch courts get a pass in many quarters because Geert Wilders is such an unsavory target. Many Europeans find his message crude and dangerous — and view him as little more than an attention-seeking bigot.

British officials defend the deportation of Wilders by appealing to public safety. And given the violent protests after the Danish cartoon controversy several years ago, they have reason to worry. But the answer is to protect the speaker and prosecute the lawbreakers — not to allow a heckler's veto.

If the censorship of Wilders was an isolated incident, then I might be less alarmed. But it comes at a time when freedom of speech is losing ground in nations across the globe, most disturbingly in the democracies of Europe.

Last fall, the United Nations General Assembly adopted a resolution calling on all countries to pass laws prohibiting "defamation of religion." Introduced by Muslim states with support from nations like Venezuela and Belarus, the statement passed 85-50 with 42 cowardly abstentions.

The irony, of course, is that the chief sponsors of the U.N. resolution are the governments with anti-blasphemy laws that protect only the majority faith and ban religious dissent. Hillel Neuer of UN Watch, an independent human rights group, charges that the resolution legitimizes "the criminalization of free speech in countries like Sudan, Egypt, Pakistan, and Saudi Arabia."

The U.N. action and efforts within European nations to prohibit "hate speech" are Orwellian signs that human rights are being redefined to permit violations of human rights. As Neuer points out, "human rights were designed to protect individuals — to guarantee every person free speech and free exercise of religion — but most certainly not to shield any set of beliefs, religion included."

Of course, verbal attacks on Islam and Muslims by people like Wilders do have a negative impact on the lives of European Muslims by creating a climate of fear and intolerance. But attempts to put a lid on free speech make the problem worse, deepening anger and resentment toward Muslims.

The solution is more freedom, not less: Freedom to proclaim the truth as you know it, freedom to confront differences openly, and freedom to counter the voices of hate. Those who don't like the speech of Wilders (and count me in that number), should drown him out with speech we do like — and not use government to shut him up.

Governments in Europe or anywhere else are deluded if they hope to appease radical Islamists and avoid violence by banning speech. Extremists within Islam — or within any religion — will not be mollified by "hate speech" laws. They will not stop until they silence all dissent.

History teaches that when people surrender their freedom to keep the peace, they end by losing both.

## Allow moms to decide on vaccinations

Every fiber of my being changed the day I got pregnant. My entire focus changed, from one of self-preservation to one of being completely dedicated to maintaining the life force of another — or in my case, two others.

I was only 24 when I found out we were having twins, but somehow, biologically, I became a mother of two. Spiritually I became a mommy, a protector, a provider, a guardian. There is no feeling like being a parent, the all-encompassing and consuming, instinct to protect and nourish another even to the point of self-sacrifice.

I remember the first time my babies were taken out of my arms and a well-intentioned and trained nurse held my babies' legs down and stabbed them with long needles to vaccinate them. I remember crying for a long time afterward because I felt deep in my soul that this was wrong. I had failed to protect my children in the first moments of their life in the outside world. But at the time I didn't know that I had the right to say no.

I was born and raised near Charleston. I attended Marshall University and got a degree in physical education. I have always been interested in health. I was considering going to medical school and finished most of my prerequisites.

I was self-educated on the benefits of natural childbirth and raising my children in a more natural and "healthy" way. My husband's job transferred us out of state, and we wound up in Georgia. That is when I started chiropractic school. I love chiropractic philosophy and feel blessed that we welcomed our third child into this world, and I knew that I did have the right to say no. My third son was actually born in West Virginia.

I wanted to be close to my family and my OB/GYN that had performed a Caesarian with my twins, helped me have a successful VBAC. I was pleased to find out the doctors and nurses honored my wishes to not vaccinate my son at birth. My older sons have not had any more vaccinations since they were 1 and my youngest has never been vaccinated.

I could repeat the "scientific" evidence about vaccinations. I could even tell you that I feel that my children's bodies are pure, as God intended and I feel it is violating their own religious choice to forcibly vaccinate them. This raises all kinds of arguments about the research and whether I belong to a specific religion in order to qualify for an exemption. However, I am a mother first, and a doctor in training, second.

My greatest frustration is the absurdity of the entire argument. We allow women to choose to have abortions in this country and in West Virginia; but a mother or father that thinks it is in their child's best interest to postpone or avoid vaccinating does not enjoy the same right of choice.

Luckily I still live in Georgia and when my twins start school in the fall, I have the right of choice here. I think it is time for all West Virginians to stand up.

Our best and brightest already have to leave the state to pursue an education or career. I hope to return once I have obtained my degree, but how can I make that choice if I believe it is harmful to my children's well being? I suppose I will be forced to live close to the border to school my children out of state as most of the parents do that oppose forced vaccinations.

I love West Virginia and plan to do all that I can to help fight and change the laws so that I, as a mother, have the right to choose what is best for my child.

To answer all the fear talk about my unvaccinated child endangering others — If your vaccinations are so effective and you and yours are vaccinated, then you should have nothing to fear.

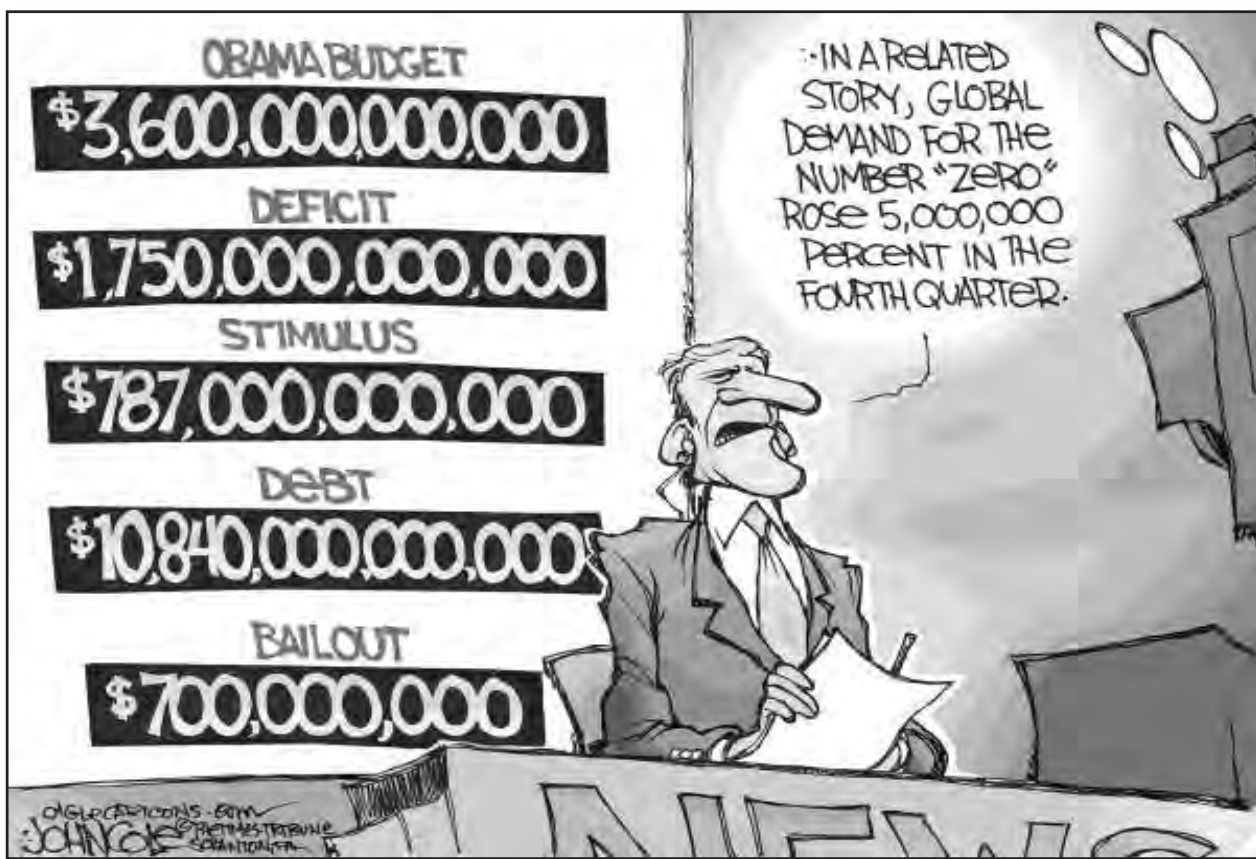

### Time to replace line, not just fix a leak

Over the last few months, the Morgantown Utility Board has been busy repairing numerous water line breaks throughout the city. On Dec. 31, 2008, they repaired a break on Spruce Street. The week of Jan. 26, they repaired three breaks on Beechurst which caused major flooding to the apartments in that area and damaged the road. On Feb. 11, there was yet another water line break on Center Street.

On Dec 3, 2008, I noticed a large amount of water lying in a section of my basement that is a crawl space.

This was in the same time frame when Morgantown received about 5 inches of rain in one week.

I assumed this water was the result of the ground not being able to absorb any more rain water.

I placed a portable sump pump

and hose in this area and began pumping the water from the crawl space under my house. I pumped the water three times a day and pumped approximately 450 gallons of water each time.

Around the end of December, when the rain and snow finally subsided, I noticed the water problem was not getting any better. After eight weeks of pumping water three times a day, I finally contacted MUB on Jan. 24 and asked them to check their water line on Richwood Avenue for a possible water line break. They came to my house the week of Jan. 26 and took a sample of the water to verify whether or not it was city water.

On Feb. 6 when I returned home from work I noticed lines painted on the road in front of my house indicating MUB had located the possible area of the water line break, or so I thought. On Feb. 9, MUB excavated two holes in the road. I thought they were finally going to repair this leak, but after excavating these two areas, they simply filled the holes in and left. According to MUB, they were simply looking for a possible leak. MUB has returned to my home and obtained four additional samples of water. I suggested to them that they should check farther up the road for the leak. I informed them that this happened about four years ago, and the leak was located there.

Needless to say, four weeks after contacting MUB about this problem, I am still pumping water from my basement. Knowing the capacity of the pump I am using, I have determined that during the past 83 days I have pumped 112,050 gallons of city water from my crawl space into my basement floor drain. I collected a sample of this water and the chemist where I work had a chlorine test that showed the water was positive for chlorine.

This section of line, about 200 feet in length, has been repaired four times in the past several years. Common sense tells me that if you are having that many failures in one area that it would probably be advantageous to replace that section of line instead of continually digging holes in the road and placing patches on it.

# Spending on state courts in line with government's growth

Concerning the story (DP-Feb. 13) headlined "Manchin requests study of state court system," had the Associated Press reporter bothered to ask me about the purported 57 percent increase in the court's spending during the last five years, I would have responded with a few clarifying facts.

In his story, the reporter doesn't tell us who said that "Rapid growth in spending ... helped spur Gov. Joe Manchin's State of the State proposal for a commissioned study of the judicial branch." Perhaps it is just his opinion passing for news.

No matter whose notion it is, it's absolutely incorrect. In fact, the increased spending to operate the state's Supreme Court, circuit courts, family courts, magistrate courts, probation officer corps, law libraries and mental hygiene commissioner services — not to mention several specialty functions such as drug courts, juvenile referees, etc. — totals between 25 percent and 30 percent.

That's right: The five-year growth in spending was approximately the same rate of growth as the rest of state government.

Let me explain. During three of those budget years, the budget itself was insufficient to cover the costs — and the court had to spend from its reserve in what is typically referred to as "deficit spending." The budgets that I prepared since I became administrative director of the courts have been large enough to cover the costs. In fact, in neither of those two budget years did the court even spend its entire budget.

The court budgeted \$74,126,003 in 2004, but spent \$77,654,342, using approximately \$3.5 million from its reserve. Last year, the court's budget was \$105,693,482, but \$100,919,206 was spent.

I don't know why the costs were not anticipated in the court budgets for three years, which necessitated deficit spending. I can say that, after I arrived in July 2005, I did my best to provide an adequate



budget to run the system while simultaneously looking for ways to be appropriately frugal.

No conscientious court administrator takes any pleasure in increasing the budget, but legislative mandates — such as the addition of special supervision for sex offenders to the duties of the probation division — cannot be ignored. Well more than 90 percent

of the increase in spending has been the result of such mandates.

I would not, however, want to mislead anyone: In its quest to provide the best possible service to West Virginians, the Court itself sought a number of those mandates, such as the addition of 10 family court judges and four circuit judges.

The point of noting that virtually all of the increased spending was the result of legislative mandates is not to say that the "Legislature made us do it." Instead, the point is that legislators and the governor worked with judges and court staff to find ways to provide these vital services — which resulted in increased costs. None of those increases, therefore, have been incurred without the vote of the Legislature and the signature of the governor. They have certainly not been the result of some sort of judicial fiat or back-room secretiveness as one could reasonably infer from the AP article.

Indeed, besides the lengthy process of bringing the computer system up to date, most of the court's own initiatives have been

almost entirely funded through federal grants. When I arrived in 2005, the court was receiving about \$250,000 in federal grants. Today, the court is in the midst of receiving approximately \$6.1 million in grants that fund everything from the nationally-recognized Child Abuse and Neglect database to the establishment of nine additional drug courts covering 24 counties.

The limits of space prohibit a full list of state-of-the-art initiatives and accomplishments by the court, let alone any substantive explanations.

But stay tuned! With the recent announcement by Gov. Joe Manchin that he will sign an executive order appointing a commission to study the state's judicial system, the Court will have the opportunity to showcase what has been accomplished to make it truly a post-modern, 21st century court system.

## Some mutual fund managers feel your pain

Jeff Auxier plowed all his retirement savings into Auxier Focus Fund when he launched it nearly a decade ago. He also vowed to never sell any of his initial \$1 million investment.

That pledge has paid off. Through last year, his nest egg — along with his initial clients' stake — has grown a total 47 percent. And Auxier has made additional investments along the way.

But the 49-year-old's commitment has become tougher to uphold lately. His \$80 million large-blend mutual fund (AUXFX) lost nearly 25 percent last year but still ranked in the top quartile of its category, thanks to some investments in recession-resistant stocks like Wal-Mart Stores Inc. The downturn reduced what had been a \$2.2 million investment at its peak to \$1.6 million. This year, the fund is down another 9 percent.

With retirement decades away, Auxier still has no

plans to reduce his stake. He says he couldn't face up to his investors if he didn't stick with it.

"There has to be a hook, where they can feel like, 'OK, this manager has got skin in the game, they're going to pay attention to my money because they've got money in there, too,'" said Auxier.

But managers like Auxier who "eat their own cooking" — the industry expression for managers who invest in their own funds, and eat the consequences along with their investors — aren't necessarily the rule.

Fifty-four percent of U.S. stock funds reported their managers held ownership stakes, according to research by Morningstar Inc. that examined disclosures through Oct. 1. That means nearly half the funds' managers hadn't invested as much as a single dollar.

Manager ownership is less common in other fund categories: 41 percent of foreign stock funds reported manager ownership, with 35 percent for taxable-bond funds; 30 percent for funds with a mix of stocks and bonds; and 22 percent for municipal bond funds.

To learn whether fund managers are joining them for the bumpy ride, investors may want to pay more attention to fund annual reports due out around this time of year, and documents called Statements of Additional Information that may accompany fund prospectuses. Some reports will trumpet the fact that a fund manager is personally invested, and the additional statements disclose how much a manager invests.

Russel Kinnel, director of Morningstar's mutual fund research, will be watching to see how many managers lately have maintained or increased their stakes, and how many jumped a sinking ship.

"It's more important in a difficult time that you step up and have a major commitment to your fund," Kinnel said.

But Kinnel, an "eat your own cooking" advocate, advises investors shouldn't put a manager's level of personal investment ahead of other more important factors in making buy-or-sell decisions in funds. Considerations such as a fund's expense levels, long-term performance, and manager experience rank higher.

Manager investment "doesn't guarantee a manager won't make a mistake; it's more about a manager aligning their interests with yours," Kinnel said.

A manager of a fund that could be a core holding — one that's broadly diversified in stocks designed to perform well over the long haul — should be expected to invest at least \$500,000, Kinnel says, and ideally \$1 million or more.

"In salary terms, most managers of big mutual funds are making multiple millions a year, so that million-dollar investment hurdle is not all that daunting," Kinnel said.

For more volatile niche funds designed to supplement core holdings, Kinnel suggests a manager hold at least \$100,000.

There are exceptions: A manager of a fund investing in a single state's municipal bonds shouldn't be expected to invest in the fund if they don't live in that state. That's because such funds' tax benefits only apply to that state's residents.

Factors such as age are also worth considering. Lippert fund analyst Jeff Tjornehoj said. An investor close to retirement may have less of a stomach for volatility than a young manager who can withstand ups and downs from their fund stake.

### Dow30 Stocks

In what has become a familiar turn for the Dow industrials, the blue-chip average ended lower this week. However, two of its three biggest losers over the past year — General Motors Corp. (GM) and Bank of America Corp. (BAC) — actually gained. GM's shares rose even as the automaker reported a \$9.6 billion fourth-quarter loss and warned that its auditors are reviewing whether it can continue to survive.

## Are Treasuries in a bubble?

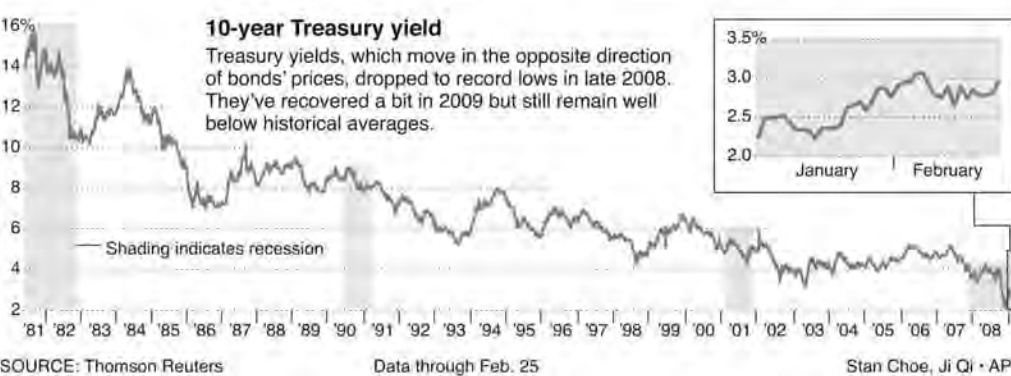
At what price, safety? When the stock market was tumbling in late 2008, investors piled into Treasuries. Such bonds do offer safety, as they're backed by the federal government. But their yields — which fall as Treasury prices rise — were near historic lows. So far in 2009, Treasury prices have weakened, hurting investors who bought late last year. Is this a sign that Treasury prices got ahead of themselves?

### Yes

"The concerns about Treasury bonds being in a bubble make sense," says Tobias Levkovich, a strategist with Citi Investment Research. Prices look stretched when looking at Treasuries' historical relationships with home and oil prices. He thinks yields are too low to offer much reward to investors. Other strategists say a wave of new federal debt set to hit the market will also pressure Treasury prices. The government will need to issue the debt to pay for its stimulus programs.

### No

Treasury prices are likely set for additional, modest gains, says John Praveen, chief investment strategist for Prudential International Investments Advisers. The federal government has talked about buying Treasuries as a way to keep long-term interest rates low, a move called "quantitative easing." That would help support Treasury prices. Also, the itch to hide out in high-quality investments, such as U.S. government debt, will likely remain for some time, with the global economy mired in a deep recession.



### INDUSTRY FOCUS Telecommunications

Telecommunications stocks have performed best over the past month. The industry got a boost recently as the federal government pushes to spread high-speed Internet access across rural areas as part of its stimulus package. Several stocks in the sector also offer relatively healthy dividends, making them attractive amid the downturn. Just as important, many of those dividends still look relatively safe, analysts say. Sprint Nextel Corp. (S) has been one of the better-performing industry stocks over the past four weeks. It has struggled for years amid customer losses, but the nation's third-largest wireless carrier reported better-than-expected quarterly results earlier this month.

#### Manufacturing blues

Demand for both automobiles and housing is still in the doldrums, and that spells trouble for the manufacturing industry.

The Institute of Supply Management's manufacturing index had been clawing back from its record low set in December, when it sank to

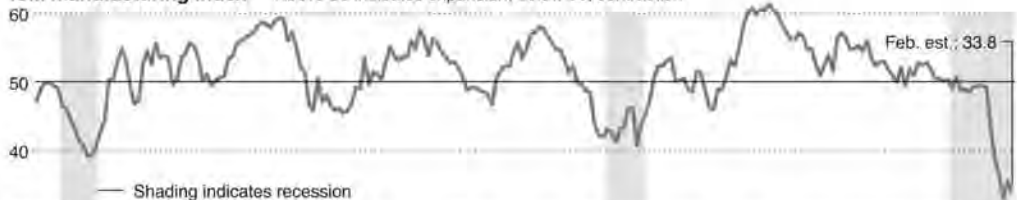
32.9. But economists think Monday's report will show another drop down for February, to 33.8, according to a poll by Thomson Reuters.

A reading of below 50 indicates the manufacturing industry is contracting. If the index holds to forecast, it would be the 13th consecutive month of contraction, the longest streak since an 18-month stretch

that ended in January 2002.

Credit Suisse economist Jonathan Basile says several regional manufacturing reports in recent weeks offer little optimism. He's expecting an index reading of 33.5 for February. Such readings in the low to mid-30s correlate with "a very sharp contraction" in the overall economy, he says.

## Getting kids to think about money

Parents should play an active role in teaching kids about saving and spending wisely, says Laura Levine, Executive Director of the JumpStart Coalition for Personal Financial Literacy. The non-profit targets school-age students. "America Saves" week, which ends March 2, is as good a time as any for parents to begin — especially since only 20 states in the U.S. require some form of personal finance instruction.

### Is JumpStart getting more interest due to the recession?

We see more questions from the public and the media. I think there is an increased awareness... on how personal finance works and how to manage our own finances.

### InsiderQ&A Could better financial education have helped us avoid some of the current problems we're seeing, like mortgage defaults?

The condition we are in now — there is no one thing that caused it. We are not blaming the victim who fell prey to inappropriate practices. On the other hand, if all of us as consumers were more aware of how mortgages worked, how credit and investing worked, I think we could have mitigated the situation.

### What are the most important issues for people to understand?

We hear an awful lot about credit, saving and investing — these are the basics. Budgeting is also really important — it's just about having a plan. Identity protection is very important. But a young adult out of college is going to (need to know) different things from what a middle-aged career person or a senior citizen who still retired needs to know. It changes throughout our lives — financial literacy isn't a static thing.

### What should a graduating high school senior know?

Our standards entail everything from basic savings to budgeting to income and maximizing your earnings potential, insurance and economic decision making. For most folks, that's the last point at which students are going to get a formal education in personal finance.

### Isn't that a lot for a young age?

Graduating high school students aren't too young. They are (old) enough to get credit card offers — and they sometimes don't make the right decisions.

### Are schools doing enough?

No. Most students still don't receive financial education during their school years. We think it needs to start as early as elementary school — how does money work, how do banks work. By high school, the student is mature enough to learn the topics at a more sophisticated level. But if you start with high school — for some kids that might be their introduction if they are not getting it at home — it's hard to give them everything they need.

### What's a good place for parents to begin?

Talk to them about money. It's just like we hear about the campaigns about smoking or drinking. Parents of younger kids, get them a piggy bank. Older kids, take them to the bank or credit union — saving is something basic and it's about developing a habit. Kids by and large still rely on their parents for information.

### But what if the parent isn't confident about their money management skills?

Even if you have made mistakes in the past — vow to do better, starting now. If you haven't saved enough, you haven't paid your bills on time or your credit card use is out of control — say "I'm going to start doing better now, to set a better example for my kids."

### Is financial literacy more important these days?

I don't think it's more important. People have always had to deal with their money.

**VERIFIED PETITION FOR WRIT OF PROHIBITION INTRODUCED AND BRIEF SUMMARY OF CASE**

Now comes Petitioner/Relator Gerald E. Lang, Ph.D., by this Verified Petition and by counsel, J. Michael Benninger, pursuant to *West Virginia Code* 53-1-1, *et seq.*, and Rule 65, *West Virginia Rules of Civil Procedure*, and relates and alleges the following factual information and legal conclusions drawn therefrom in support of his request that the Court prohibit and enjoin Respondents, under the Policies and Procedures for Responding to Allegations of Academic Misconduct at West Virginia University, approval date April 10, 2000, from: (1) arbitrarily and unilaterally scheduling a hearing during Spring Break, March 16-20, 2009, when Petitioner Lang and his counsel are unavailable; and (2) prosecuting Petitioner Lang in the underlying case of alleged academic misconduct because his procedural due process rights have been violated by the blatant conflict of interest which exists as a result of the various acts of the members of the General Counsel's office at West Virginia University adverse to Petitioner Lang.

**THE PARTIES**

1. Petitioner Gerald E. Lang, Ph.D., is a tenured Professor of Biology and long-time employee of West Virginia University Board of Governors.
2. Petitioner Lang served as the Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at West Virginia University from 1986-1996.
3. Petitioner Lang served as Provost of West Virginia University from 1995-2008.
4. Petitioner Lang resigned his position as Provost effective June 30, 2008, at the request of the President of West Virginia University.
5. Respondent West Virginia University Board of Governors is the institutional governing board appointed by the Governor as authorized by West Virginia Code 18B-2A-1.
6. Respondent West Virginia University Board of Governors has the powers and duties conferred upon it

by West Virginia Code 18B-2A-4, including the control, supervision and management of the business and educational policies and procedures and affairs of West Virginia University.

7. Respondent West Virginia University Board of Governors has the specific power and duty to, "acquire legal services that are necessary, including representation of the governing board, its institution, its employees and officers before any court or administrative body," conferred upon it by *West Virginia Code* 18B-2A-4(y), and has chosen to do so by creating and staffing the General Counsel's office, which, in reality, is West Virginia University's own law firm.

8. Respondent C. Peter Magrath is the duly appointed President of West Virginia University, and he is employed by Respondent West Virginia University Board of Governors and is under its direct control, supervision and management and the policies and procedures approved by it.

9. Respondent Magrath is the Chief Administrator at West Virginia University and is the current supervisor of Petitioner Lang and all individual Respondents identified and named in this Verified Petition.

10. Respondent Mary Roberta Brandt is the Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel at West Virginia University and is employed by Respondent West Virginia University Board of Governors, and she is directly controlled, managed and supervised by Respondent Magrath.

11. Respondent Brandt is a lawyer who is licensed in the State of West Virginia by the West Virginia State Bar, and her license is currently in the active status.

12. Respondent Brandt has served continuously in various legal positions in the "General Counsel's Office" at WVU since first being employed in November 1998.

13. Respondent Brandt became Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel at West Virginia University when Alexander Macia resigned his position as Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel effective 2008.

14. Respondent Beverly D. Kerr is the Deputy General Counsel for West Virginia University and is an employee of Respondent West Virginia University Board of Governors.

15. Respondent Kerr is a lawyer who is licensed in the State of West Virginia by the West Virginia State Bar, and her license is currently in the active status.

16. Respondent Kerr, in the course of her employment as Deputy General Counsel, is directly supervised, controlled and managed by Respondent Brandt.

17. Respondent Kerr "joined the General Counsel's office in 1993" and has been so employed at West Virginia University continuously since that time.

18. From July 2007 to August 2008, Respondents Mary Roberta Brandt and Beverly D. Kerr, as members of the "General Counsel's Office," were con-

trolled, supervised and managed by Alexander Macia, who was then the Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel at West Virginia University.

19. Respondent Marjorie Anne McDiarmid is the Steptoe and Johnson Professor of Law and Technology and is serving as the Academic Integrity Officer for West Virginia University, and she is an employee of Respondent West Virginia University Board of Governors. She was appointed by Provost Lang after consultation with the President.

20. Respondent McDiarmid is a lawyer who is licensed in the State of West Virginia by the West Virginia State Bar, and her license is currently in the active status.

21. Respondent McDiarmid conferred with and she has been assisted in the underlying academic misconduct investigation by various members of General Counsel's office.

**JURISDICTION AND VENUE**

22. This Court is vested with original jurisdiction to hear this Verified Petition and the instant controversy under the authority granted it by the provisions of *West Virginia Code* 53-1-1, *et seq.*

23. Venue for this proceeding is proper in this Court by virtue of the authority granted under *West Virginia Code* 14-2-2a.

**BACKGROUND FACTUAL INFORMATION**

24. As reported publicly in the media, on or about Oct. 11, 2007, the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette* contacted West Virginia University for the purpose of inquiring as to whether a particular student (referred to here and throughout as "HB") completed and earned an eMBA degree at West Virginia University. See the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette* article of Thursday, March 27, 2008, with the attached "WVU Chronology," attached hereto and marked as "Exhibit 1."

25. As reported publicly in the media, a series of events unfolded thereafter involving a number of WVU personnel, including Petitioner Lang and others, concerning the determination as to whether HB had earned her eMBA degree at West Virginia University. The specific events have been described and reported publicly by the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette* in its articles and in the "WVU Chronology" attached as Exhibit 1.

25. As reported publicly in the media, a series of events unfolded thereafter involving a number of WVU personnel, including Petitioner Lang and others, concerning the determination as to whether HB had earned her eMBA degree at West Virginia University. The specific events have been described and reported publicly by the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette* in its articles and in the "WVU Chronology" attached as Exhibit 1.

26. From the time the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette* made its initial inquiry concerning HB on Oct. 11, 2007, through at least Oct. 23, 2007, the date West Virginia University sent the newspaper a letter in response to its inquiry about HB, the Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel and members of Mr. Macia's office were directly involved with the events and participated in the meetings and communications among the various WVU personnel, including Petitioner Lang, who were requested by WVU Administration to respond to the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette's* inquiry.

27. At all times relating to this specific time period from October 11, 2007, through October 23, 2007, including the meeting held on October 15, 2007, Alexander Macia, the Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel was asked to and provided specific legal advice and direction to Petitioner Lang and the others who were requested by the Administration to respond to the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette's* inquiry concerning HB.

28. On October 15, 2007, a meeting was held to review the issues concerning HB and whether she had earned her eMBA degree at West Virginia University. The meeting was moderated by Petitioner Lang and attended by a number of other persons from the Administration and the College of Business and Economics, including the Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel, Alexander Macia.

29. At the October 15, 2007, meeting, the attendees determined that HB had been told that she had earned her eMBA degree by the then-Program Director and that a review of the Program's records showed a number of significant discrepancies and, given the

significant lapse of time and the lack of specific recall and available documentation, it was determined to acknowledge HB's belief that she had, in fact, earned her degree in 1998.

30. On October 23, 2007, the Dean of the College of Business and Economics sent a letter to the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette*, in response to its recent inquiry and advised that HB had earned her degree at West Virginia University.

31. On December 21, 2007, the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette* published an article, which is attached hereto and marked as "Exhibit 2," and disclosed what appears to be confidential information concerning HB. The source of this specific information appears to remain unknown at this time.

32. On the same date, December 21, 2007, the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette* filed the first of three specific Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests made to West Virginia University for all documentation and communication among West Virginia University personnel concerning HB and whether she had earned an eMBA degree and its inquiry in that regard.

33. The *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette's* FOIA requests were handled by West Virginia University's Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel, Alexander Macia, and the lawyers and staff in his office who were directly under his control, management and supervision.

34. As reported publicly by the media, Petitioner Lang, then serving as Provost at WVU, after consultation with WVU's President and in accordance with the knowledge of and acting upon the advice and counsel of the Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel, called for "the creation of a team of independent educators to investigate, audit and attest to the accuracy of WVU's recent decision regarding a retroactively issued degree" to HB.

35. Petitioner Lang, also with the knowledge of and acting upon the advice and counsel of Alexander Macia, the Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel, prepared and submitted a "Charge to the Special Investigative Panel for Review of Executive MBA (eMBA) Program Records" to the "Special Investigative Panel" selected

in accordance with the vociferous demands of the West Virginia University Faculty Senate.

36. The "Charge to the Special Investigative Panel for Review of Executive MBA (eMBA) Program Records," a copy of which is attached hereto and marked as "Exhibit 3," encouraged and called for the Panel to utilize and consult with "the University's Academic Integrity Officer, Steptoe and Johnson Professor of Law Marjorie McDiarmid" and others as the Panel deemed necessary.

37. As reported publicly in the media, on or about Jan. 14, 2008, the Dean of the College of Business and Economics charged the Associate Dean of the College of Business and Economics and a specific professor within the college with the assignment to conduct a complete and thorough review and audit of the West Virginia University eMBA Program and each of its students and their records from the Program's inception.

38. In April 2008, the Special Investigative Panel completed its work and issued the "Report of the Special Investigative Panel for Review of Executive MBA Program Records," and same has been reported publicly and made available in the public domain.

39. As reported publicly in the media, on or about April 24, 2008, the West Virginia University Board of Governors disclosed to the public the Report of the Special Investigative Panel for Review of Executive MBA Program Records called for by Provost Lang, and specific statements were made by the Chair of the Board of Governors concerning the contents of the Report and the awarding of the eMBA degree to HB.

40. On May 27, 2008, the President spoke with Respondent McDiarmid regarding his purported concerns over how the HB matter was handled by the administrators he had requested to examine the matter following the *Pittsburgh Post-Gazette* inquiry.

41. On May 30, 2008, the President submitted a letter regarding the allegation of potential academic misconduct to Respondent McDiarmid.

42. On June 6, 2008, the President submitted his resignation, effective Aug. 31, 2008.

43. On June 16, 2008, the Office of General Counsel sent a memorandum, a copy of which is attached hereto and marked as "Exhibit 4," to Petitioner Lang and others, stating that the Academic Integrity Committee had requested the cooperation of General Counsel's office into the HB investigation. The memorandum instructed Petitioner Lang and others to make available any and all documents relevant to the HB investigation, thus, giving specific legal advice and directions to these West Virginia University employees.

44. On June 23, 2008, a number of professors submitted a letter complaint to the Academic Integrity Committee also raising concerns over the handling of the HB matter. The professors' written complaint specifically identified Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel, Alexander Macia, and President Michael Garrison as persons who should be reviewed with regard to the

45. Respondent McDiarmid, acting as the Academic Integrity Officer and as Chairperson of the Screening Subcommittee, named a number of individuals, including Respondent Kerr, then Deputy General Counsel at West Virginia University, to serve as members of the Screening Subcommittee.

46. As evidenced from a careful review of the July 17, 2008, report of the Screening Subcommittee, Mr. Macia and other persons acting in the General Counsel's office submitted certain documents for review by the Screening Subcommittee, which included Respondent Kerr, who was also employed in the General Counsel's office at that very time.

47. In spite of the fact that the Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel, Alexander Macia, had actively participated in the meeting of

October 15, 2007, as noted above, and provided legal advice and counsel to Petitioner Lang and others who were in the meeting and, in spite of the fact he also was involved in other communications concerning the HB matter during the

period of October 11, 2007 to October 23, 2007, the Screening Subcommittee found "there is no testimony or documentary evidence known to the subcommittee at this time that indicates Mr. Macia or Mr. Garrison knew of or were involved with the generation of the records sent to admissions and records."

48. No reference at all was made by the Screening Subcommittee as to the fact that General Counsel had given legal advice and actively participated in the meeting of October 15, 2007, and also participated in communications regarding the HB matter both before and after said meeting.

49. Following the submission of the Screening Subcommittee Report, Respondent McDiarmid, again acting as Academic Integrity Officer, named a Discovery Subcommittee Hearing Panel under the applicable policies and procedures.

50. Attending the hearings of the Discovery Subcommittee and serving as its legal counsel was Respondent Kerr, who actually participated in Petitioner Lang's hearing held on October 2, 2008, as noted in Discovery Subcommittee Final Report Amended February 3, 2009.

51. The Discovery Subcommittee stated, among other things, in its Final Report Amended February 3, 2009, received by the undersigned on February 12, 2009, that:

The Discovery Subcommittee in review of the documents noted that Provost Lang was not directly involved in any change of student records for the former student. Testimony by Dean Sears indicated he believed the Provost directly sanctioned his actions ... Provost Lang although not directly involved in the preparation of the grade modification forms, would have been aware that the records would need to be prepared to justify the granting of the degree. [Emphasis added.]

52. The Discovery Subcommittee further stated, in reference to Mr. Macia, that:

Based upon review of the evidence the Discovery Subcommittee concurs with the conclusion of the Screening Subcommittee and did not find evidence sufficient to justify the inclusion of Counsel Macia as a respondent.

It made the same conclusion with regard to President Garrison.

53. Thus, each of the Respondents have communicated and counseled with, and have been advised and assisted by members of West Virginia University's General Counsel's office throughout this entire matter. Likewise, Petitioner Lang and the other WVU personnel involved originally in the HB matter also communicated and counseled with, and have been advised and assisted by members of West Virginia University's General Counsel's office.

54. As reported in the media, WVU publicly disclosed, on February 2, 2009, the report of the independent review of the procedures for the management of the academic records of all eMBA students by AACRAO (American Association of Collegiate Registrars and Admissions Officers).

55. As reported in the media, the AACRAO report did not fully address the many discrepancies found in the student records of the eMBA Program as reported in the August 14, 2008 eMBA Audit Report that was requested by the Dean of the College of Business and Economics.

56. The AACRAO report clearly establishes the context and limitations under which the attendees of the October 15, 2007 meeting were working in an attempt to determine whether HB had earned her degree.

57. At the current time, Petitioner Gerald E. Lang, Ph.D., and others are scheduled for final Hearing before a "Hearing Panel" in accordance with the Policies and Procedures for Responding to Allegations of Academic Misconduct of West Virginia University, a copy of which is attached hereto and marked as "Exhibit 5."

#### PETITIONER LANG'S DUE PROCESS RIGHTS

58. Petitioner Lang, as a tenured professor, has a constitutionally protected property interest in his position which raises constitutional due process considerations as a result of being faced with a charge of academic misconduct. *Trimble v. West Virginia*

*Board of Directors*, 209 W.Va. 420, 549 S.E.2d 294 (2001).

59. The due process clause, Article III, Section 10 of the West Virginia Constitution requires procedural safeguards against State action which affects a constitutionally-protected property interest. *Waite v. Civil Service Commission*, 161 W.Va. 154, 241 S.E.2d 164 (1977).

60. The Court said: The extent of due process affordable for a property interest requires consideration of three distinct factors: first, the private interest that will be affected by the official action; second, the risk of an erroneous deprivation of a property interest through the procedures used, and the probable value, if any, of additional or substitute procedural safeguards; and finally, the government's interest, including the functions involved in the fiscal and administrative burdens that the additional or substitute procedural requirement would entail.

*Trimble v. West Virginia Board of Directors*, 209 W.Va. at 427, 549 S.E.2d at 301 (2001).

61. The Court also said: There are certain fundamental principles in regard to procedural due process embodied in Article III, Section 10 of the West Virginia Constitution, which are [:] First, the more valuable the right sought to be deprived, the more safeguards will be interposed. Second, due process must generally be given before the deprivation occurs unless a compelling public policy dictates otherwise. Third, a temporary deprivation of rights may not require as large a measure of procedural due process protection as a permanent deprivation.

*North v. West Virginia Bd. of Regents*, 160 W.Va. 248, 233 S.E.2d 411 (1977).

62. In West Virginia, due process is a flexible concept which requires courts to balance competing interests in determining the protection to be accorded one facing a deprivation of rights. *Clarke v. West Virginia Bd. of Regents*, 166 W.Va. at 710, 279 S.E.2d at 175.

63. Constitutional due process protections are to be defined by the facts

of a particular case. However, it is generally recognized that if it is determined that constitutional due process rights apply, as in the instant case, "the question remains what process is due." *Trimble, id.*

64. All West Virginia courts recognize that arbitrary and capricious behavior on the part of a public employer is synonymous with lack of procedural due process.

#### COUNT ONE

65. By correspondence dated February 9, 2009, received by Petitioner Lang and his counsel on February 12, 2009, Respondent Marjorie A. McDiarmid, acting in her official capacity as Academic Integrity Officer for WVU, first advised that, "I am proposing to schedule the hearing over spring break, March 16-20," and asked that such time be reserved in the schedule.

66. Through telephone communication from the undersigned and in written communication from Petitioner Lang, Respondent Marjorie A. McDiarmid was advised that due to Petitioner Lang's previously-planned, scheduled and paid-for trip out of the country during the spring break period, and due to his counsel's previously-planned and scheduled trip out of state during the same time period, they would be unavailable for the Hearing.

67. In response to initial communication from the undersigned, Respondent Marjorie A. McDiarmid advised that the scheduled hearing over Spring Break could not be changed.

68. Since that time, Respondent McDiarmid has provided the e-mail, which is attached hereto and marked as "Exhibit 6," asking for comment on the scheduling of the Hearing.

69. Petitioner Lang and his counsel assert that, in the absence of any specific provisions contained in Policies and Procedures for Responding to Allegations of Academic Misconduct of West Virginia University, establishing the manner and procedures in which the final Hearing will be scheduled, Respondents have acted arbitrarily and capriciously and have violated the due process rights of Petitioner and others who are unavailable dur-

ing the Spring Break period for the Hearing and that the Court should prohibit Respondents from forcing Petitioner, his counsel and others to the hearing under the circumstances presented here.

#### COUNT TWO

70. Petitioner Lang realleges the statement of facts recited in paragraphs 1 through 64, above, and incorporates such allegations into this specific count.

71. Under Rule 1.13 of the *West Virginia Rules of Professional Conduct*, a lawyer employed or retained by an organization has certain duties to the organization and any of the officers and employees of the organization who also may be represented by the attorney.

72. The duties imposed upon a lawyer by Rule 1.13 apply to government organizations.

73. At all times relating to Petitioner Lang's involvement with the HB matter, he reasonably believed that he was being advised and counseled by the Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel, Alexander Macia, as evidenced by Mr. Macia's statements and actions during the October 15, 2007 meeting and thereafter.

74. Thus, Petitioner Lang was General Counsel's client for purposes of considering the conflict of interest at issue in this matter.

75. Under Rule 1.10 of the *West Virginia Rules of Professional Conduct*, lawyers associated in a firm are prohibited from representing a client when any one of them practicing alone would be prohibited from doing so under any of the specific conflict of interest rules.

76. Specifically, Rule 1.10(b) states: When a lawyer becomes associated with a firm, the firm may not knowingly represent a person in the same or substantially related matter in which that lawyer, or a firm with which the lawyer was associated, had previously represented a client whose interests are materially adverse to that person and against whom the lawyer had acquired information protected by Rules 1.6 and 1.9(b) that is material to the matter.

77. Under the terminology section of the *West Virginia Rules of Professional Conduct*, the term, "Firm" or "Law Firm" denotes a lawyer or lawyers in a private firm, lawyers employed in the legal department of a corporation or other organization and lawyers employed in a legal service organization.

78. As a result of the attorney-client relationship which existed between Vice President for Legal Affairs and General Counsel, Alexander Macia, and Petitioner Lang concerning the HB matter, as reflected by the clear and unequivocal evidence relating to the Oct. 15, 2007 meeting and thereafter, the entire office of General Counsel of West Virginia University, including Respon-

dent Mary Roberta Brandt and Beverly D. Kerr, are disqualified as a result of application of Rule 1.10 of the *West Virginia Rules of Professional Conduct*.

79. The actions of Respondent Kerr, in serving on the Screening Subcommittee and serving as counsel for the Discovery Subcommittee, constitutes a conflict of interest under West Virginia law and further constitutes arbitrary and capricious state conduct which violates Petitioner Lang's procedural due process rights.

80. The contact and interaction among Respondents Kerr and McDiarmid and Mr. Macia and President Garrison regarding this matter also constitutes a conflict of interest under West Virginia law and arbitrary and capricious state action which violates Petitioner Lang's procedural due process rights and taints the legal efficacy of this proceeding.

81. The undersigned has advised Respondent Marjorie A. McDiarmid, acting in her role as Academic Integrity Officer, of the assertions that there is a conflict of interest actually present and that, as a result of same, Petitioner Lang's procedural due process rights, ostensibly being provided under the Policies and Procedures for Responding to Allegations of Academic Misconduct at West Virginia University, have been violated and that the entire proceeding is procedurally corrupt and invalid.

WHEREFORE, Petitioner and Relator Gerald E. Lang, Ph.D., respectfully requests that the Court apply the applicable standards of review and hold, as a matter of law, that Respondents, acting individually and in concert, have acted in an arbitrary and capricious manner and have violated his constitutionally-protected due process rights in the manner in which they have conducted the investigation and handling of the complaint of academic misconduct filed against him. Petitioner further requests that a Writ of Prohibition issue against the Respondents, terminating the instant academic integrity proceeding and enter an Order requiring Respondents to initiate, if they care to do so, alternative procedures to insure that Petitioner's due process rights are protected. Petitioner further requests that such other and further relief be afforded under applicable West Virginia law.

# ADAPT WV serves as an advocate for citizens with disabilities

**THE COMMUNITY COALITION** for Social Justice is made up of many individuals and several organizations focused on advocating for social justice in the Morgantown area. One of these member organizations is ADAPT WV. ADAPT WV is a chapter of the national ADAPT, a civil rights organization that achieves positive change for people with disabilities by working with lawmakers and policy makers. ADAPT achieves its goal by writing letters, making phone calls, and talking to the media along with civil disobedience actions.

The national ADAPT was founded in 1977 by Wade Blank as a civil rights organization that advocated for accessible transportation in America.

Besides advocating for accessible transportation, ADAPT was very instrumental in the passing of the Americans with Disabilities Act of 1990. This act granted civil rights to people with disabilities in the area of accommodations, employment and access to government. Currently ADAPT is

concerned with attendant care laws and enabling people with disabilities to live within their own communities and not be forced to live in nursing homes or institutions. ADAPT WV has been working with Gov. Joe Manchin in passing the Community Choice Act. This act would allow Medicaid funding to follow a person with a disability instead of being given to a nursing home or institution, thus enabling that person to live in their own house in their own community and use the Medicaid funding to hire attendants to assist them in their daily living needs.

ADAPT WV was founded 10 years ago by Ken Ervin, Christopher Sunseri and Vicki Shaffer. The original goal of ADAPT WV was to assist any person with a disability in West Virginia who

needed an advocate for civil rights. Currently, ADAPT WV is focused on accessible housing in the Morgantown area. Morgantown has seen tremendous growth in housing over the past few years. However, much of this housing is not accessible to people with disabilities. ADAPT WV is working with local and state law makers to bring affordable and accessible housing to the Morgantown area.

Housing is controlled by the Fair Housing Act, which states that any multi-family dwelling with four or more units must have

a portion of these units accessible to people with disabilities. Furthermore, all units must be built with a universal design so they can become accessible if needed. However, the Fair Housing Act is only a civil rights law and not a municipal zoning ordinance. Therefore a developer is not required by any state or local government to build accessible housing, but if a developer builds an apartment building that is not in compliance with the Fair Housing Act, that developer is vulnerable to being sued by a person with disabilities in state or federal court.

ADAPT WV would like to have local municipalities pass ordinances that require developers to build accessible apartment buildings in order to avoid multiple lawsuits.

Over the past 10 years, ADAPT WV has advocated for better health care, education and housing for people with disabilities throughout West Virginia.

ADAPT WV is currently headed up by Vicki Shaffer and Darla Ervin.

# Kenseth eyes 3rd straight win

He got his wish, and then some. Kenseth has a chance at auto racing history today, at Las Vegas Motor Speedway, where a victory would make him the first NASCAR driver to win the first three races of the season. He started his streak by capturing the season-opening Daytona 500 to end a 36-race winless streak and followed with this past week's victory at California.

“It took us a whole year to win a race, so everything has got to line up just right,” he said. “But if it happened, that would be pretty wild. That would be pretty crazy and something I’ve never really thought about.”

Although a poor qualifying effort has him starting 40th, and he’s been fighting the flu all week, his rivals think Kenseth can complete the sweep. “It could be an incredible feat if they do it. I believe that they can,” Jeff Burton said. “I am not saying that they will, but I believe they certainly can.”

It’s a position Kenseth hardly imagined he’d be in during a stressful two-season span in which he slowly faded as a weekly contender. He won two races in 2007, one at the start of the year and then the season finale to snap a 34-race winless streak.

Longtime crew chief Robbie Reiser stepped into a management role at Roush Fenway Racing following their final win at Homestead, and his absence was felt during his winless season in 2008. Chip Bolin, Kenseth’s lead engineer, was elevated to crew chief but the promotion cost the team in Bolin’s old position.

Kenseth sat down with Bolin at the end of the season, and the two agreed they should find a new crew chief. They turned to Drew Blickensderfer,

who sparked teammate Carl Edwards to a second-half surge in the Nationwide Series, and Blickensderfer has done the same thing for Kenseth.

“I hope it’s magic. I hope it keeps going,” Kenseth said, referring to the undefeated Blickensderfer. “We were just lacking that guy last year. We all knew it. Chip knew it. He was trying to be the engineer and the crew chief and that was just way too much, so to let him go back and work on the cars has been as big a deal as anything.”

“And to bring Drew in as crew chief with his leadership abilities and experience, and to be able to work side-by-side with Chip to help each other make us perform has been a big deal.”

It’s put Kenseth back on top, and he admitted following his Daytona victory he had grown increasingly frustrated by his lack of competitiveness.

He vented to his wife as recently as the day before the season-opener, wondering what it would take to get the No. 17 team back among NASCAR’s elite.

“Last year was pretty stressful on him and he was pretty displeased with how his season was,” rival Kyle Busch said. “I think this year, for him starting out the year strong like he did ... it wouldn’t be a shock to see Kenseth win here, too.”

# Chiefs deal for Cassel, Vrabel

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Matt Cassel, who stepped in for an injured Tom Brady in 2008 and led New England to an 11-5 record, was traded to Kansas City on Saturday with linebacker Mike Vrabel for the Chiefs’ second-round draft pick.

Cassel emerged as a solid quarterback in his fourth season with the Patriots after Brady hurt his knee less than eight minutes into the opener, against Kansas City, and was done for the season. A career backup, Cassel threw for 3,693 yards and 21 touchdowns in 15 starts.

The Chiefs, coming off a 2-14 season, sent the 34th pick in April’s draft to New England.

While Brady began rehabbing a severe knee injury, which required

a second operation because of infection, the Patriots put the franchise tag on Cassel. That meant the team would have to pay him \$14.5 million to keep him as insurance.

■ The New York Jets acquired two-time Pro Bowl cornerback Lito Sheppard from the Philadelphia Eagles for undisclosed draft picks. The deal was completed after New York re-signed guard Brandon Moore and signed former Baltimore linebacker Bart Scott on Friday.

■ The New York Giants bolstered their defense, signing former Atlanta Falcons linebacker Michael Boley to a five-year, \$25 million contract. Boley, 26, is excellent in pass coverage and is expected to be given a shot at winning the weakside job.

■ The Dallas Cowboys acquired quarterback Jon Kitna to back up Tony Romo. The Cowboys sent cornerback Anthony Henry to Detroit.

## Budget travel popular with waning economy

Everyone needs an escape at some point, whether it's from snowy weather, piles of unfinished school work or just the daily grind. Thus the need for spring break. But is spring break still feasible in a slumping economy?

Even when money's short, students and families are still traveling, local travel agents say. With spring break just a couple weeks away, many college students and families have already planned their getaways or are in the process.

While people are indeed still traveling, travel agents say they're taking a closer look at the budget this year and looking for the best deals possible.

### College students

Gary Wong, manager of Travel Network in Suncrest, said he hasn't seen a decrease in student spring break travel this year, since most students already have the money set aside for their trips.

"Demand hasn't really gone down. They already have this budget to go on spring break," he said.

Some popular college student spots are Punta Cana, Jamaica and Cancun, where students will pay on average \$1,200-\$1,500 per student to stay at an all-inclusive resort. Travel Network uses Apple vacations a lot to book trips and get special deals for its customers.

Wong said if students really want to save money this year, one of the best ways to scale back is by driving yourself to your destination, instead of flying. So, rather than leaving the country, he said students could drive to destinations, such as Panama City, Fla.

### Family travel

While student travel remains largely unchanged, families are being a little

more frugal this year, said Jill Robinson, manager of National Travel on Chestnut Ridge Road.

"They're doing a little bit more investigation, putting more thought into it this year," she said. "That family vacation is still very important to people, but they're looking into it a little more."

Whereas in past years, a family of four might have spent \$6,000 on a vacation, this year the budget may be at about \$4,000.

Wong said he's noticed a drop in family spring break trips, and instead of high-end hotels, "this year, they're looking for average to moderate hotels." He said family travel has dropped about 25 percent to 30 percent this year.

### Good deals

"Every year, spring break is changing," Wong said. "This year the all-inclusive type of package is more popular than any other year we've seen." He said 95 percent of his sales this year have been all-inclusives.

All-inclusive resorts give the vacationer one price, which includes his or her hotel stay, as well as food and activities. That way there are no hidden costs, Robinson said.

Both Wong and Robinson said Punta Cana, Dominican Republic, is a good place to go if you want a Caribbean experience at a cheaper price.

While a student might spend \$2,400 on a seven-night, all-inclusive stay at a first-class resort in the Bahamas, the student could spend \$1,400 to stay in a first-class resort in Punta Cana. Want to save even more? Stay a week in a stan-

dard all-inclusive resort in Punta Cana and spend just \$799.

Punta Cana has the sun and white sand, Wong said, without the expense you find in other Caribbean destinations, such as St. Lucia.

And, for a family, Punta Cana is reasonable as well, Robinson said. Recently, she sold a family of four a six-night all-inclusive stay in Punta Cana for \$3,300. Although that was a special price, Robinson said deals like that one are always available.

Cruises also offer a lot of the same benefits as an all-inclusive resort stay, only with a constant change of scenery. Robinson recently sold a family of four a five-night cruise out of Tampa, which visited Grand Cayman and Cozumel, Mexico, for a little more than \$2,000.

"Cruises are offering some fabulous rates," she said, adding that Carnival Cruise Lines even has an early savers program for people who book their trips at least 60 days in advance.

Cruises also cater to families; while children can enjoy programs set up on board just for them, parents can have a little freedom, she said.

Robinson said one important thing to keep in mind is that many of the resorts have dropped their prices and are running specials because of the economy.

"Everyone's aware of the situation," she said, so there are definitely some good deals available out there.

## Travel tips

■ Be wary of booking trips online.

Sometimes online companies will quote cheap prices for trips, but know ahead of time that often the reason they can do this is because they can change your departure dates, airline schedule or even hotels, Wong said. The deals may be real, but you must give the companies a lot of flexibility.

■ Be aware that airline prices are higher during spring break.

spring break, airline tickets can cost \$900 per person. To avoid the high cost, stay inside the country and drive yourself to your destination, Wong said.

■ Plan your trip early.

Robinson said spring break is already heavily booked and airspace is tighter. To get the best deals, plan early; you won't save much with last-minute deals anymore, she said. If you're planning a summer trip, don't wait, plan it now.

■ Think about all-inclusive resorts or cruises.

All-inclusives and cruises are popular because you pay one price, which includes your trip, activities and meals, Wong and Robinson said. And, if you want to save money on airfare, cruise ships are now leaving out of ports in Newark, N.J.; Baltimore, Md.; and New York, all places you could drive to instead

of fly.

■ Have a passport if you're leaving the country.

Although you may still be able to cross the border by car or on a cruise ship without a passport, Robinson said when traveling outside the United States, you should have a passport. If someone were to get sick while outside the country and needed to be flown back in an emergency, having a passport already in hand would make it much easier.

■ Find a good travel agent and know who you're getting involved with.

Both Robinson and Wong said it's important to investigate travel agencies to pick the best one. Find out what suppliers agencies use to book their trips.

With a travel agent, Robinson said you pay the same price as you would online, but you get a physi-

## 'Slumdog' actors return to heroes' welcome

MUMBAI, India — The child stars of the Oscar-winning "Slumdog Millionaire" returned to India on Thursday to a chaotic but rousing heroes' welcome.

Hundreds of well-wishers waited for them at the Mumbai airport, where dozens of police, some heavily armed, were needed to escort the children through the cheering crowds.

The film, a rags-to-riches tale set in Mumbai's slums, was the darling of the Academy Awards, winning eight Oscars, including the

award for best picture.

The four children came out with arms around each others' shoulders. The only girl, Rubina Ali, 9, clutched a small fluffy brown toy bunny.

They waved and blew kisses to the crowd, showing off their newly acquired red carpet skills.

Ayush Mahesh Khedekar, 8, who plays the youngest version of Jamal, the main character in the film, was hoisted onto someone's shoulders before the children were whisked away in waiting cars without talking to waiting reporters.

It was not immediately clear where they were taken.

With the film's success, the children have become instant celebrities in movie-crazy India, particularly Ali and Azharuddin Mohammed Ismail, 10, who were plucked from slums to play parts in the film.

The movie's two Indian Oscar winners, composer A. R. Rahman and sound engineer Resul Pookutty also were met by cheering throngs who showered them in flower petals as they arrived in their home towns.

Rahman, who won Oscars for musical score and the best song "Jai Ho" — "Be Victorious" in English — led the dancing crowd in chants of "Jai Ho!"

## Roots gear up for 'Late Night'

LOS ANGELES — Fans of The Roots can rest easy. The Philadelphia-based band has started work on a new album and still plans to tour. But the Grammy Award-winning group's primary focus right now is its new gig as the house band for "Late Night with Jimmy Fallon." The show debuts on NBC on Monday.

During a telephone press conference recently, original Roots members Ahmir "Questlove" Thompson (drums) and Tariq "Black Thought" Trotter (vocals) said the group is looking forward to this mainstream career step.

Having logged 17 years on the road touring, Thompson declares, "This isn't the end of a sentence. It's just another step; time for another challenge. This will show that there is absolutely no challenge or obstacle we can't master. It's just part of the ongoing, linear voyage of The Roots."

Armed with advice from several corners, including Conan O'Brien's drummer Max Weinberg, The Roots have been pulling long days (up between 6 a.m.-7 a.m. and back home at midnight) as they rehearse for the show. So far, they have worked up a wide range of songs, encompassing rock, disco, soul, hip-hop and what Thompson describes as "cheesy '80s pop. We're probably the most over-prepared group in hip-hop. We just like to make certain we're well covered."

The Roots' late-night move follows the group's stint as musical supervisors for a couple of seasons on Dave Chappelle's Comedy Central show "Chappelle's Show." It was "Chappelle's Show" co-creator Neal Brennan who recommended The Roots as Fallon's house band.

The entire seven-piece band including Owen Biddle (bass), Kamal Gray (keyboards), Frank "Frankie Knuckles" Walker (percussion), Kirk "Captain Kirk" Dou-

glas (guitar) and Damen "Tuba Gooding Jr." Bryson (saxophone) will perform on the show. For the time being, the Philadelphia-based group is commuting back and forth to New York on a tour bus, about a 90-minute ride.

In addition to playing walk-on and bumper music, the group will back the show's musical guests. The first week's music lineup includes rapper Ludacris. The Roots is also planning to feature guest players with the band, including Blue Note pianist Robert Glasper and Heads Up International bassist/vocalist Esperanza Spalding. "We're pretty much open to the idea of having artists on who wouldn't necessarily be put on a late-night talk show," adds Thompson.

As for the group's participation in various skits and routines, Trotter says, "There are a few things we're trying to work out now that might be established as recurring bits. None of the Roots members object to taking part in any of that. We're totally open to working our new routines and establishing things on our own."

Recording for the next Roots album began a couple of weeks ago. But Thompson and Trotter both say they probably won't get knee-deep into the recording process until a month or two from now. Plans are to release the album this year. Debuting in 1993 with "Organix," The Roots have sold 4 million albums in the U.S. per Nielsen SoundScan. The group's biggest seller: 1999's "Things Fall Apart" (915,000 units).

In the meantime, the group will continue to tour and perform weekend shows. Thompson and Trotter say the band is already booked for the six weeks it will have off from the show. On the heels of Fallon's late-night debut, The Roots are performing at Power Shift '09, the national youth summit in Washington, D.C. through Monday.

## Taj Mahal to be inducted into Blues Hall of Fame on May 6

NEW YORK — Taj Mahal, the blues legend whose vibrant, worldly music encompassed African-rooted sounds of all kinds, will be inducted into the Blues Hall of Fame.

Mahal, whose real name is Henry St. Clair Fredericks, has been selected along with New Orleans soul singer Irma Thomas, Chicago bluesman Son Seals and ragtime guitar player Rev. Gary Davis to join the Blues Hall in Memphis, Tenn. They will be inducted in a ceremony May 6, which will be followed the day after by the Blues Foundation's 30th annual Blues Music Awards.

"I'm very happy that a group of my peers think it's something I deserve after the years I've put into the music," said Mahal, 66, speaking by phone from the San Francisco Bay area.

California is one place Mahal has spent a lot of time, though the nearly nomadic singer-guitarist notes: "I pretty much move around wherever I like."

The same could be said of Mahal's music, which has for four decades dug deeply into sounds of many places, particularly Africa, the Caribbean and Hawaii. The breadth of Mahal's influences came partly from his heritage and partly from a nurtured openness.

"He was into globalization long before the rest of us," says Jay Sieleman, executive director of the Blues Foundation. "With Taj, it's not just the music — although that's of course the big thing. It's the whole social history and musicology and awareness that comes with listening to his music."

Mahal was raised in Springfield, Mass. His mother was a school-teacher from South Carolina and his father, of Caribbean roots, was a jazz pianist. Later, his stepfather came from Jamaica.

"As a youngster, my parents made me aware that all that was from the African Diaspora belonged to me," said Mahal. "So I came in with Caribbean music, African music, Latin music, gospel music and blues."

Mahal, a two-time Grammy winner, in 1968 released his self-titled debut, which included contributions from Ry Cooder, an early collaborator. It included the great "Leaving Trunk" (in which he sings "I ain't never seen no whiskey, but the blues made me sloppy drunk").

One of his most famous tunes is "She Caught the Katy (And Left Me a Mule to Ride)," which ended up in the 1980 film "The Blues Brothers."

With a full-bodied voice and predilection for blues that made people dance, Mahal's continuous output through the '70s, '80s and '90s was always with an adventurous spirit. One of his most acclaimed albums came in 1999 on "Kulanjan," a collaboration with Malian kora legend Toumani Diabate.

The international influences, Mahal says, aren't from his constant travels, but from always being fully invested in such music. He sees blues as running far beyond the Mississippi Delta and back through music.

"I was always taught that Latin, Caribbean people were cousins to me, as well as blues was a cousin to me, as well as Africans were direct relatives to me," he said. "It was all a part of my language."

Still, Mahal's music was always blues at its foundation: "Sometimes the blues is like the whole meal. ... Other times it's like a spice that's thrown in there."

"The blues is played everywhere," says Mahal. "There's no place I've been where they don't have blues or aren't interested in blues."

## Thin Lizzy raids vaults for 'Dangerous' album

DETROIT — Thin Lizzy, the celebrated Irish hard rock band, returns March 3 with "Still Dangerous: Live at the Tower Theater Philadelphia 1977," a long-lost classic concert recording.

Guitarist Scott Gorham — who relaunched the band in 1996 as a tribute to former bass player and singer Phil Lynott — is hoping the stash of recently discovered tapes that contained the upcoming "Still Dangerous" masters will yield even more archival treasures.

"There's so much of it in there," Gorham says about the collection of material found in a London vault. "I was actually surprised by the amount. When I got to the 'Still Dangerous' stuff I got stopped in my tracks and started concentrating on that, but I'm going to go back in to see

what else is there."

In addition to live shows, Gorham expects to find some unreleased Thin Lizzy studio sessions. "There has to be stuff in there," he says. "I don't remember us having a (lot of) outtakes, but there's stuff that didn't get finished or didn't get on this album or that album. It just takes the will to get into the studio and start digging deep into this catalog of stuff you haven't heard in years. I'm gonna do that, just see what this little goldmine is holding."

The "Still Dangerous" tape, which was remixed and remastered by Glyn Johns, was found in a box marked "Philadelphia 2," which contained a tape made for the King Biscuit Flower Hour — actually the group's second performance for the radio show on its "Bad Reputation" tour. Thin Lizzy let King Biscuit record the first night of the tour with the caveat that it would


also tape another show once the group had been on the road and warmed up a little.

"For the second (show) we actually put out the word to all our fans, so it was our people rather than a King Biscuit audience," recalls Gorham.

In addition to the vault material, Gorham hopes to record some new Thin Lizzy music to release in the near future. He plans to bring his latest incarnation of the band to North America this year, and he and fellow guitarist and Lizzy alumnus John Sykes hope to hit the studio for the group's first studio album since 1983's "Thunder and Lightning."

"That's probably the No. 1 question that I get — 'When are you guys gonna get out there and recording something new?'" Gorham acknowledges.


"I have the feeling we will do that. John and I do have quite a bit of material that we've written together."



## Beanery serves up a relaxing atmosphere

AFTER A LONG DAY at work or a hard day of classes, sometimes you just need a good drink to help you relax and forget about it. I've been there, and I know you have too.

When another one of those days comes your way, consider stopping by the Boston Beanery for happy hour. There are two Beanery locations: One on the corner of University Avenue and Patteson Drive and the other on High Street.

I stopped by the Evansdale location of this bar and grill Friday with a group of friends for happy hour deals, and we certainly had a happy hour while we were there.

If you're looking for some grub to go with your cocktail, the Boston Beanery has some fantastic food to choose from. The con queso dip appetizer, grilled turkey and Swiss sandwich and seafood chowder are my personal favorites. Burgers, salads, pasta, ribs, wings and more are on the menu too.

## Despite shot, some flu strains abound

**FRESNO, Calif.** If the flu bug has landed in your home or office, doctors say, it will hang around for awhile. People who got a flu shot this year may escape the fever, sore throat, headache and body aches that are bringing people to doctors' offices.

The vaccine offers a good protection for influenza A, the most identified strains that are circulating this year, said Dr. Dee Lacy, an infection specialist at the Kaiser Permanente Medical Center in Fresno, Calif. However, it doesn't protect as well against influenza B, the less common strain, she said.

Antiviral medications can help if given within 48 hours of the start of symptoms, but some cases of resistance to the medications have been reported worldwide.

Lacy said the drugs are being reserved for those who are more likely to get complications from the flu — the really old or really young and people with chronic health conditions.

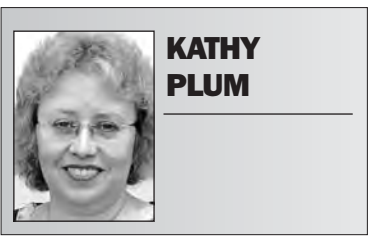

## Trout in the Cheat River sign of spring

**IT'S A SURE SIGN** of spring when you see the trout stocking trucks along the Cheat River. Or is that stalking, as a news release I edited once reported? If you're familiar with trout anglers, you'll probably agree it's both.

This is the eighth year that Trout For Cheat has been sliding fish into the river for our catching and eating pleasure. It all started when the State Division of Natural Resources refused to add the Cheat to its stocking list. The state said the river was too hard to access and the water wasn't suitable for trout.

But to a hardcore angler, hard to access just means fewer people have been throwing hooks at those beauties, and water quality has been improving on the Cheat, thanks to the efforts of dedicated people.

So some Prestonians organized a public meeting, and Trout for Cheat was born.

From the beginning, it's been the same core group of workers: **Art George, Bob Martin and Jim White** of Kingwood; and **Warren Coker, Gerald Newsome and Gerard Newsome**, all of Masontown, and the cadets of the Mountaineer Challenge Academy.

The cadets pass large, plastic buckets of flopping fish from the stocking truck at the road to the river. For some it's their first experience with fish, and they have a blast.

"They've done it for us every time, and we'd be dead without them," Art said.

He also gets calls from Fairmont, Clarksburg, Pennsylvania and Virginia regularly.

Earlier this month Trout For Cheat had its first stocking of 2009, putting 1,800 pounds of 2-6-pound trout in the river. Six more stockings are to come. The dates aren't announced, but word spreads fast, so keep your ears open.

"I had a guy call me from Virginia last night who is coming in to fish," Art said. "It brings people in because of the size of the trout."

Store owners along the river, from Rowlesburg to Tunnelton, have told me they have sold more bait and trout stamps since the stocking effort began.

Through the years, the program has gained recognition from more than just the anglers whose vehicles you see parked along the river. WVU donated some fish left from a research project, and several private companies have made donations.

The state legislature now funds the project. This year Trout For Cheat has applications in for \$22,500 to do eight stockings during the course of the year. Art praises state **Sens. Jon Hunter and Dave Sypp**, and **Dels. Larry Williams and Stan Shaver**, for their support of the effort.

It's a lot of work, but Art has said it's all worth it when he can watch his granddaughter catch a fish just a few miles from her home.

"I love it," he said.

## New record set in Lakeside's 'Around the World' competition

It's a record-breaking year for Lakeside Physical Therapy and Life Enhancement Center's "Around the World in 60 Days" competition. Jim Johnson of Morgantown had 60 days to exercise his way around the world, but set a new record by completing the trek in just 19 days. And the competition isn't over as 20 others continue to sweat it out to finish their amazing race around the world.

Johnson is part of Lakeside Physical Therapy's third annual "Around the World in 60 Days" competition, a motivational competition where fitness club members exercise their way around the world in a 60-day race, without ever leaving Morgantown.

Each competitor earns miles for working on the treadmill, elliptical machine, as well as for time spent in yoga and Pilates classes and resistance training. Their progress is charted on a world map on the gym wall, moving each competitor's little flag along a 35,100 mile course.

It's all part of the I Lost It at Lakeside! program, an eight-week motivational weight loss program designed to help new members achieve success in their individual fitness pro-

grams and to kick-start the renewed exercise programs of existing members. Measurements for beginning weight, body fat percentage and flexibility were recorded for each competitor at the beginning of the program. A final measurement will be taken at the end of the competition on Thursday.

Johnson, a former physical therapy patient who joined Lakeside Physical Therapy's fitness program this year was determined to win "Around the World." He worked out every day for at least two hours. "Second place is only first loser," Johnson joked. "It's really been good competitive fun that's helped me lower my blood pressure and my cholesterol."

## If your legs are uneven, it can cause problems

**Q: I found that my back pain originated from a difference in my leg lengths. Once it was corrected, I have been pain free. How common is this?**

**A:** Because humans are bipedal, we walk on two legs instead of four, it is quite common for chiropractors to notice a difference in leg length and it be related to pain. sacroiliac joints (those are the ones that connect your pelvis to your spine) is slightly off kilter. Muscles in that area will adjust to counter the imbalance and may, as a result, pull bones just slightly out of place.

People experience a large amount of symptoms that they never relate to this. Sciatica can even be caused by the tightening of certain muscles around an uneven pelvis. The spasms create irritation to the nearby sciatic nerve and pain is the result.

If a muscle imbalance has caused a tightening, chiropractic treatment will eventually ease the situation

and restore a leg to its proper length. That is a functional problem. If the problem is anatomical, one leg is measured by use of an x-ray to be shorter than the other; it could be corrected through use of orthotics. These are inserts that go in the shoe and can have added to them an appropriate heel lift to correct the difference in leg length. ## 'Secret Life' has potential to be big hit

**"THE SECRET LIFE OF THE AMERICAN TEENAGER"** airs at 8 p.m. Mondays on ABC Family.

**It's OFFICIAL.** I must be 13 years old. The only explanation for my current behavior is that I've literally reverted to my teenage years.

That would explain my newest TV obsession, "The Secret Life of the American Teenager." Although I'm hanging my head in shame to have to admit that I'm hooked, I've also come to the realization that I am, indeed, hooked. And I need to know why.

It's not particularly a television masterpiece; in fact, it's pretty much on par with just about anything else that's out there. But I'm still hooked.

Somewhere between a drama and comedy, the show, directed by Jason Priestly (yes, Brandon from "Beverly Hills: 90210"), takes a long, hard look at teenage pregnancy, adoption, divorce and sexual abuse.

Some of the writing seems a bit trite and the young actors are definitely learning on the set, but there's just something about it that draws me in.

Eleven episodes of season one premiered last summer to rave reviews, and the rest of the season is now airing on ABC Family. Recently, it was announced that season two will indeed become a reality; studio executives say it will begin airing this summer.

The story focuses on somewhat naive 15-year-old Amy Juergens (Shailene Woodley), who found out she was pregnant last season with Ricky Underwood's (Daren Kagasoff) baby. Ricky, on the other hand, doesn't really seem to care as he's already sleeping with smart, but promiscuous, Adrian Lee (Francia Raisa), and chasing after super-Christian Grace Bowman (Megan Park).

Amy's parents (Mark Derwin and Molly Ringwald) are in the middle of a nasty divorce, which sometimes provides more comic relief than anything. (It's extremely strange to see Ringwald in the role of the parent, considering last time I noticed her she was trying to catch the interest of Jake in "Sixteen Candles.")

Amy's sister Ashley (India Eisley) is another oddball who's constantly making snarky comments and telling Amy that adoption is not the way to go.

Oh, and Amy's in love with Ben Boykewich (Ken Baumann) who's friendly father is played by Steve Schirripa ("The Sopranos").

While most of the young actors need several more acting lessons, I'm intrigued by bad boy Ricky, who's shown the most character development this season, ranging from his girl-chasing ways to being abused by his father as a kid. This is Kagasoff's first foray into the acting world, and he seems to have a knack for it. Ricky's storyline has been expanded this season, allowing Kagasoff to immerse himself in the deepest, and most troubled, character on the show.

"Secret Life" also has a solid base of adult actors (Josie Bissett of "Melrose Place," John Schneider of "The Dukes of Hazzard," Ringwald and Schirripa). And it's refreshing to see them interacting with these younger actors who are just starting out.

That actually makes me feel old, because I used to watch Bissett on "Melrose Place" and Ringwald when she was starring in infamous John Hughes' films.

What would be really strange is if in 15 years, I'm watching a character from "Secret Life" on a new show where he or she plays the older, wiser parental figure. OK, I just need to stop thinking like that. Maybe this show doesn't make me feel 13 after all.

## Splitting boys, girls in school gains favor

ST. LOUIS — As they worked, they channeled their inner Hannah Montanas: "It's the beest of both worlds," their little voices sang.

Next door, in Sylvia Bronner's class, the group of only boys teetered on stools at their tables, if they sat at all. They blurted possible answers in a raucous numbers guessing game. "A billion?" Bronner responded to one boy's guess. "It needs to be lower than a billion."

"One hundred sixty-two!" another boy blurted out.

An experiment in single-sex classrooms that started two years ago at Carman Trails school in the Parkway School District in the St. Louis area is winning over parents, students and teachers. And even though the school doesn't have test data to prove its success, the program is growing.

Last year, the school limited the same-sex classrooms to first grade. This year, it started them in second grade. And just last week, after meeting with enthusiastic parents, the teachers and principal Chris Raeker decided to offer the option in third grade.

Private schools in St. Louis have offered single-sex education for decades. But more public schools are giving it a try and liking the results. A charter school in St. Louis, the Imagine Academy of Academic Successes, and the high school and middle schools in East St. Louis are among the 500 or so public schools across the nation to try single-sex classrooms.

### Getting started

The U.S. Department of Education noted in 2005 that the jury was still out on the effectiveness of same-gender classrooms, due to "a dearth of quality studies" on the topic. But a lack of data hasn't slowed the popularity of the approach, which has been triggered by recent research that suggests the brains of boys and girls develop differently at young ages.

Raeker turned to single-sex classrooms while trying to figure out why younger boys were getting lower test scores and getting sent to the office more frequently. The boys were also going to the nurse's office more often, not coming to school as often and not participating in clubs as much as girls.

"There were so many different indicators that said we need to look at these guys and see what's going on," she said.

School leaders sought advice from Leonard Sax,

founder of the National Association for Single Sex Public Education. When the group started in 2002, it counted 11 public schools that offered single-sex classes. Today, it counts at least 518.

Groups like the American Civil Liberties Union and the National Organization for Women have spoken out against separating boys and girls in schools, saying such classrooms are illegal and discriminatory. Others say the approach promotes gender stereotypes and fails to prepare students for a world where both sexes work together.

Raeker is familiar with those arguments. "We are absolutely committed to just the opposite, to letting girls know there's nothing they can't do," she said. She points out that parents get to choose whether to send their child to a mixed or single-gender classroom.

Sax said there are advantages to continuing to offer single-sex classes to students as they get older. As girls mature, he said, some show less interest in subjects such as computer science, though fourth-grade girls actually outperform fourth-grade boys in math.

As boys get older, for some it becomes "cool" to not like school and to disrespect the teacher,

Sax said. "It's great to start in the younger years, as Carman Trails has done, so you can create a different culture where boys think it's cool to be smart," he said.

But even in first and second grades, Sax said, the gender differences are apparent.

For boys this age, he said, it's not easy to sit down and be quiet like a typical teacher might ask of them. Which is why the boys move around from activity to activity, stand at their desks or teeter on stools, and love to compete and take on challenges.

"Now, I want to see if I can trick you," second-grade teacher Diandra Maguire recently told her class of boys during an activity on telling time.

Such tactics won't necessarily work for girls, the school's teachers say. Girls' second-grade teacher Cindy Rudman dares not tell her class she is going to "trick" them. "I know five that would be in tears," she said.

The teachers present the same information to the boys and girls, but present it differently. Advocates of single-gender instruction say boys seem to learn better if they are presented a concept first, then allowed to experience it before coming back as a group to discuss it. Girls, they say, learn better if they talk about the concept first and then attack an activity on their own.

### Checkup coming

Supporters of single-gender instruction also point to research suggesting that girls underestimate their own abilities, while boys have unrealistically high expectations of what they can accomplish.

"Boys think they have the answer right away, I say, prove it for me," said Maguire. "Now I think they're thinking about how they get the answers."

"I definitely see a self-confidence thing," said Alicia Wall, the first-grade teacher. "The girls are ready to learn and ready to work. In other classes, they're afraid to say something. They're afraid to be wrong."

While Carman Trails has no empirical data to show that single-gender classes are improving student performance, the school is confident it's on the right track.

School leaders say students in the same-sex classrooms are enthusiastic. The boys are becoming better writers, which is something boys that age aren't particularly strong at, says principal Raeker. Next year, they will tackle some research, have some standardized state test scores to look at in third grade and will hopefully see results, Raeker says.

## Crate-training could help calm anxious pooch

**Q:** My 3-year-old Havanese is basically housetrained, except occasionally he'll poop in the house. Twice a year, while we're away, he spends a week with friends. He also poops in their homes and occasionally urinates there, too. I'm running out of friends to watch him. Any suggestions? — L.W., Tarrytown, N.Y.

**A:** "I wonder how happy your dog is to be dropped off at these homes," asks Dr. Brenda Griffin, assistant professor at Cornell University College of Veterinary Medicine, Ithaca, N.Y. "For some dogs, there's tremendous anxiety being left in an unfamiliar place, even if the people are familiar. And it's unclear if the people are familiar. If there are other animals in these homes, that makes matters more complex. Also, the dog has learned to pee and poo in other people's homes. Now, we have to prevent that cycle from continuing."

Griffin suggests crate-training your little guy. Restricting him inside a crate when you can't supervise will prevent accidents because dogs don't like to foul their sleeping area. (Only one caveat: If your dog is having accidents only when people aren't home, the problem is likely separation anxiety and professional assistance is recommended). Ask your pet-sitting friends to take the dog out on a leash and reward him for going potty with praise and a special treat, as if he were a puppy. If he doesn't do his business, back into the crate he goes.

Meanwhile, it can't hurt to plug in a diffuser called Dog Appeasing Pheromone (a kind of relaxing aromatherapy for dogs). Play (Havanese generally love to play) is also a great antidote for stress.

Perhaps for your dog, another alternative to consider is to have a friend or professional pet sitter live at your house when you're away. Your pup will likely feel more comfortable in his own surroundings.

**Q:** I'm a 91-year-old lady with a cat I love. My cat has spasms, jerks and then licks at the area for no particular reason. My vet can't find anything wrong. The spasms seem to be getting worse. What's the problem? — F.B., Appleton, Wis.

**A:** If your veterinarian hasn't already done so, Chicago, Ill., feline veterinarian Dr. Colleen Currihan suggests checking for external parasites and determining if your cat's anal sacks are full, which could cause discomfort. X-rays may indicate there's a problem with the cat's vertebrae. And if your cat is older, a simple test for hyperthyroidism is advised.

From here, diagnosis is a bit more challenging. Your cat could be suffering from epilepsy, hyperesthesia syndrome, or both. This syndrome is more a description of associated symptoms rather than a specific disease. The cat's eyes may dilate, its skin may ripple, sometimes the cat may act manic and its limbs may twitch (as you describe). Hyperesthesia is little understood but may typically be an oversensitivity to touch, specific sounds, or even certain textures.

If your cat acts aggressive during these episodes, stay away from him. You don't want to be scratched or bitten.

If the spasms are at all predictable, ask a friend with a camera to videotape your cat, then e-mail or take the video to your veterinarian.

Currihan says if your veterinarian rules out metabolic diseases, parasites and other likely causes, a prescription for Prozac or anti-seizure medication might offer relief.

## Be truthful about abuse from ex

**A:** First, good for you for leaving. We know that was a tough decision. Here's what we think you think you are up against: There's no proof that he hit you. Your friends know you're still in love with him, and telling his new girlfriend that he hurt you may be perceived as an "If I can't have him, no one can have him" act of desperation. They will think that you hope scaring her off will free him to come back to you. You'll look like an idiot.

We say, "So what?" Tell her. She's a friend. "A huge bruise" may indicate he may have already hit her. Rather than looking like a fool, you may be a hero. Finally, get some counseling! You did the right thing.

## ASK MR. DAD

## Should teenager get a job?

**Dear Mr. Dad:** I'm 15 years old and in the 10th grade. I will turn 16 just after school lets out for the summer, and I want to get a job. However, my father won't let me. He says that I'm too young and that he works to support his family. I think I understand his point, but I don't like to ask my parents for money, and I want to have my own.

**A:** Wow. I must commend you for your desire to work during your summer vacation — and for starting to think of it so far in advance. It shows maturity and level-headedness that many kids your age (and older) lack. So kudos to you. Be careful, though, there are parents all over the country who would love to have you come to their house to give their teens a pep talk.

At the same time, I have to applaud your father for his sense of responsibility and devotion to his family. You have a wonderful dad who clearly would like to offer you all the financial advantages, while allowing you to enjoy your teenage years without the burden of working. Plus, he's got another point. Depending on where you live, you may be legally too young to have a job — and even if you are able to work, there may be some restrictions on the number of hours you can be employed.

But none of that really makes much of a difference because you're almost 16 and you want to earn some money of your own. So the big question is, "How do you go about convincing dad?" Well, as in many situations where two people disagree, communication and negotiation are the best approaches.

Here's what you do. Sit down with your father and tell him why you want to work and the kind of jobs you'd apply for. Then listen carefully. If he's concerned about your safety, assure him you won't be working nights or evenings and that you'll confine your search to jobs that are within an easy and safe commute to your home.

Beyond the safety issue, your father might also be worried that a job could create added stress and affect your school performance. Obviously, your education comes first, so reassure your dad you'll maintain your GPA — and keep that promise. As a kind of preemptive strike, make sure you don't slack off on your regular household chores. Your job should fit in around your other responsibilities, not replace them.

You might also be able to sway dad to your way of thinking by telling him why having a part-time job would be beneficial to you. A few reasons you could bring up:

■ A job will help you develop a sense of responsibility, self-esteem, discipline, feelings of competence and independence — all qualities that will serve you well in the future.

■ Working will teach you a variety of useful skills — getting along with bosses and co-workers, following instructions, dealing with public, and managing money.

■ You'll develop a better understanding of the value of money and hard work — you'll appreciate the fruits of your labor all the more because you earned it, not because it was given to you.

Once you get dad's permission and get a job (and I'm sure you will), make sure it doesn't take over your whole existence. The key to a healthy and balanced life — especially for someone your age — is to make time for school, work, family, friends, and to allow yourself plenty of time to have fun and just be a kid.

**TWO GAMES GOT A BREATH** of fresh air with highly anticipated downloadable content packs when "Fallout 3 Operation: Anchorage" and "Grand Theft Auto IV: The Lost and Damned," both Xbox 360 exclusives, were released this past month.

### "Grand Theft Auto IV: The Lost and Damned"

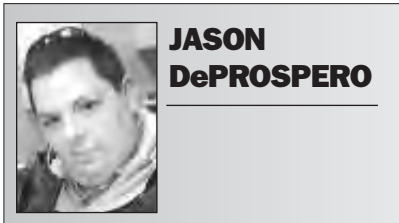
"GTA IV:TLAD" takes you back to Liberty City as Johnny Klebitz, a member of the biker gang The Lost. The new story interweaves with the main quest story of Niko Bellic, as you take on rival gang the Angels of Death. Johnny has been running The Lost while club president, Billy Grey, has been away at rehab. Once out, he is ready to stir up violence and debauchery throughout the city.

Here is the thing. This was originally supposed to be released, as I recall, sometime in August or September of last year and Rockstar Games kept pushing it back. I personally wish that they would have killed the project altogether. It is totally unplayable.

In the first missions you just ride around Liberty City on your motorcycle. I have done that hundreds of times in multiplayer and during story mode. I don't have to spend the \$20 on the content to do so. Once you start to fight against the Angels, you are just fighting big groups of the bikers in open spaces.

I am sure there are more exciting missions, but I just could not play it any further. That is hard to admit since I am a diehard fan of the series and have been so since the original "GTA" on the PlayStation.

Developers and Xbox did not do themselves any favors the way the game was released, either. You were able to buy the DLC from stores a week before you could actually download it. So when I went and bought it, I was quite surprised to see in fine print on the back that I had a game I couldn't play for a week. It is not that hard, just release the content or do not. It is not right to collect

money for a week, and not let your customers play the product.

At least Rockstar Games will get another chance to get things right, with other "GTA IV" episodes in the works.

### "Fallout 3 Operation: Anchorage"

In "Operation: Anchorage," you play through the fictional liberation of the city from the Chinese that is often alluded to in the main quest. Bethesda Softworks ties this seamlessly in with the main story: A group of wastelanders are trying to hack into a weapons cache, and they need you to "play" the simulation with your Pip-Boy 3000 with the promise of a lion's-share of the armaments.

The missions are challenging, but fun. At times, you are fighting through the war zone on your own, and then there are times where you are leading a team of three other soldiers.

Despite that it only takes between three and five hours to complete, it is a fun trip into the past. The scenery change from the desolate ruins of Washington, D.C., to the scenic mountains of Alaska is a nice switch. Developers were quick on the draw with the DLC, and it is at the right price for \$10.

The download does have its drawbacks, though. If you already have completed the main quest, you have load up an older save to play the board. If you are near the end and have leveled up all the way, you cannot take full advantage of the content since it gives you an exclusive perk you can choose.

This month, The Pitt download will be released, which takes place in a semi-destroyed Pittsburgh. And developers are working on a download that will add additional content to "Fallout 3's"

### Last year's best game gets another add-on

Bethesda Softworks has released new screen shots for "The Pitt," a downloadable add-on for its blockbuster game "Fallout 3" that will be available in March for the Xbox 360 and Games for Windows for \$10 (aka, 800 Microsoft points).

"Fallout 3" is an amazing game, and for those who can't get enough of it (admittedly, myself included) "The Pitt" promises more post-apocalyptic adventure. "The Pitt" unfolds in the ruined remains of Pittsburgh, where players can thrust themselves into an ongoing conflict between slaves and the raiders who are exploiting them. Bethesda promises a sprawling settlement filled with new stories, enemies and difficult, morally gray choices.

The story begins with a radio message that players will receive after they download "The Pitt" and load up "Fallout 3." The message leads to an escaped slave, who claims the leader of "The Pitt" has created a cure for mutations (a serious problem in the "Fallout" universe), and the player's quest is to go in and retrieve it. From there, Bethesda says, players can unfold the plot in several ways depending on their choices, ranging from fighting their ways in guns blazing to disguising themselves as a slave and infiltrating the operation.

"The Pitt" screens look promising, and I'm looking forward to trying out the new adventure when it goes live. To date publishers have released a lot of uninspired downloadable content for videogame console systems, but I'm confident Bethesda can help turn this trend around.

## Health Notes

### Foods You Should Be Eating Daily

**Spinach** - This muscle builder is a rich source of plant-based omega-3s and folate, which help reduce the risk of heart disease, stroke, and osteoporosis. It's also packed with lutein, a compound that fights macular degeneration. Aim for 1 cup of fresh spinach or 1/2 cup cooked spinach daily. Mix it in with a salad or scramble it with eggs to help pack in this green, leafy vegetable.

**Yogurt** - Fermentation spawns millions of probiotic organisms that serve as reinforcements of beneficial bacteria in your body. That helps boost your immune system and provide protection against cancer. Not all yogurts are probiotic, so make sure the label says "live and active cultures." Aim for 1 cup of yogurt a day.

**Tomatoes** - Red tomatoes are the best because they're packed with more of the antioxidant lycopene. Studies show that a diet rich in lycopene can decrease your risk of some cancers and the risk of coronary artery disease. Aim for 22 mg of lycopene a day, which is about eight cherry tomatoes or a glass of tomato juice.

**Blueberries** - These little berries not only boost cardiovascular health, but they are also rich in fiber and vitamins A and C, and have more antioxidants than any other North American fruit. Aim for 1 cup of fresh blueberries a day or 1/2 cup frozen or dried.

**Black Beans** - All beans are good for your heart but none can boost your brain power like black beans. A daily 1/2 cup provides 8 grams of protein and 7.5 grams of fiber. It's also low in calories and free of saturated fat.

**Oats** - Oats are packed with soluble fiber, which lowers the risk of heart disease. Even though oats are loaded with carbs, the release of those sugars is slowed by the fiber, and because oats have 10 grams of protein per 1/2 cup serving, they deliver steady, muscle-friendly energy.

## Are home inspections really needed?

**Q: I just put a house under contract with a Realtor, and they are pushing me to get a home inspection. It seems like a waste of my money, and I really need all I can save now. Do you think I really need to have the home I am buying inspected?**

**A:** I am not one to push unnecessary inspections on anyone. However, I do not think that a home inspection is unnecessary. In fact, this might just be the biggest money saver in the long run. The home inspection covers many aspects, including structural integrity, electrical systems and plumbing systems, just to name a few. Major problems detected through the home inspection may be extremely costly to repair in the future. You would not want to purchase a property and then have to replace the hot water heater soon after because of a pre-existing issue with the appliance.

It is also important to realize that Realtors call a home inspection many different things and often do so interchangeably. You might work with someone who calls a home inspection a property inspection or structural inspection.

**Q: How do I find a home inspector?**

**A:** Your Realtor can give you names and numbers of local home inspectors to contact. You can also ask your Realtor who they recommend to do home inspections. They will most likely give you the names and numbers of three inspectors and let you choose. They can make arrangements for the inspection on your behalf as well as per your direction.

It is important to look for a home inspector that is a member of a trade organization — just like your Realtor is a member of the National Association of Realtors. The more popular and/or common home inspector trade organization is the National Association of Certified Home Inspectors. If an inspector is a member of NACHI, they usually have it printed on their business cards and other documents.

In addition to membership with a trade organization, you will want to see what other credentials your potential inspector has, such as being a general contractor, a developer, an engineer or, in some instances, an architect. You would not want to choose an inspector who was a marketing executive just last week. Prior knowledge of building practices, building codes and structural aspects will be of importance to you as you trust them to give the house you are purchasing the once-over.

## 'Luxurious lakefront estate'

Greystone Estates, an upscale section of Greystone on the Cheat, is offering up one of its own. Built in 1992 by local NFL legend Jeff Hostetler, and most recently occupied by former WVU coach Rich Rodriguez, 3960 Eastlake Drive is truly a vast estate.

Kathy Martin, owner of KLM Properties Inc., and listing agent of the home, said that if she had her way, she'd be buying the house instead of selling it.

"It's really just a beautiful place, and the views [of Cheat Lake] are spectacular everywhere you go," she said.

The two-story home includes eleven rooms, including a fully finished basement, two full kitchens, a library, massive living room, five fireplaces, and a downstairs family/party room totaling a healthy 10,325 square feet of finished living space.

The house itself sits on a bit over two acres of steep, lakeside property. In order to combat the sharp angle of the backyard, the land has been terraced, forming multiple levels of very flat space.

"When Hostetler had the place built, he wanted yard space where his kids could play ball, so he had all the landscaping flattened out," Martin said.

The first terrace, under the large rear balcony, features a stretch of flat grass and an in-ground swimming pool built in a grotto style. The level below offers an Olympic-sized tennis court and a stretch of yard leading toward the private access dock.

The main entrance of the home opens to a grand living room that, with its enormous windows, offers an immediate, sprawling view of the lake.

Complete with a fireplace and overlooking deck access, the living area spills into a roomy kitchen and dining area.

Recently remodeled, the kitchen consists of the usual arrangements of appliances, cabinetry, and counterspace one would expect to find in a modern home.

However, the area also has chandeliers and a fully functional fireplace, adding a sense of elegance to the dining experience.

On the opposite side of the living room is what Martin called a "cross between a library and a den."

With a fireplace of its own and built-in dark wood bookcases from floor to ceiling, this space would be hard pressed to fit another bill.

A curved, carpeted staircase sweeps from very near the entrance to the second floor and affords an

even higher panoramic view of the lake through the rounded glass of the far wall. The second story contains three bedrooms, each of generous proportions, along an open hallway that overlooks the living room and rear portion of the house.

The master bedroom, also on the second story, features a built-in corner entertainment center over a gas-log fireplace. The bedroom's main walk-in closet, entered through double "pocket doors," is roughly the size of one the smaller bedrooms, and is only one of the two large closets in the master bedroom.

The master bath — another room entirely — is perhaps the most elaborate element of the home. With a large vanity, separate walk-in closet, multihead glass shower, and elevated hot tub, the room offers plenty of relaxation potential.

The tub itself sits high against a bay window with a view of Cheat Lake, too.

While already grand in terms of living space, the home becomes even more generous with the application of high ceilings — nine feet high, to be exact.

"It really gives you the feeling that there is more room to move around in, to live in," Martin said.

And the completely finished, full-size basement below is no exception. With two large family style rooms, a glass-encased sunroom, and a full kitchen, this space becomes an entertainer's dream come true.

A large fireplace set across the room from a pool table and wood-adorned kitchen/wet bar gives an instant impression of the capacities of the space.

"There have been dinners and parties in this area where the whole football team, coaches and all, sat comfortably," Martin said.

The basement, though invisible from the front of the house, offers multiple walk-out access points and a one car garage that doubles as storage for lawn or pool equipment.

Above the lower garage, and attached to the ground floor, is a spacious two-car garage.

As for safety, Michelle Duda, business administrator for Greystone on the Cheat, said all of the community's subdivisions, which includes Greystone Estates, have security personnel staffed around the clock. Greystone estates is even a gated community.

Duda said other perks of Greystone on the Cheat include a hik-



ing/walking trail nearby, a boat dock group for residents and a homeowner's association. The living community also encourages residents to participate in gardening clubs, wine clubs and group events such as picnics.

Greystone on the Cheat also encourages new residents to become involved.

"We try to make [residents] feel a part of not only Greystone, but the whole Morgantown community if they're not from the area," Duda said.

And Duda said Greystone residents see new faces often.

"There's a lot of turnover here, but things don't seem to sit on the market long."

Duda said more than 30 home transfers had occurred in 2008.

"That must mean that people find it an attractive area, I think," she said.

All-in-all, 3960 Eastlake, with its reduced price tag — from \$2 million to \$1,800,000 — is exactly what KLM Properties bills it as: a "luxurious lakefront estate."

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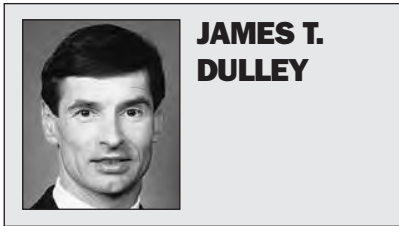

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# Conservatories and sunrooms are household cousins

Dear Jim: We need some additional living space and I was thinking of installing a sunroom. My wife prefers the appearance of a conservatory. What are the actual differences between the two and which is better?

Dear Al: Building a typical sunroom or conservatory is not inexpensive, but it certainly is less expensive living space per square foot than adding another room to your house. All of the glass area offers the possibility of free solar heating for your house and other uses such as growing plants.

A conservatory is actually just a type of sunroom, but with some specific style characteristics. Neither is inherently better than the other. As with most home-related products, there are various qualities of each available.

Conservatories often have

more sides than a typical rectangular sunroom and are more ornate. A pitched roof with an ornate roof ridge and decorative or leaded glass are also common features of a conservatory. With these features, a conservatory usually costs more than a typical sunroom of the same size.

There are several general designs and styles of conservatories. Before selecting one, try to determine how it will be used. If you plan to use it for living space, but to also capture the sun's heat to help warm the rest of your home, it should face within plus or minus 15 degrees of true solar

south. In most areas, true solar south is different than compass south.

If the conservatory will be used for growing plants or for a spa or pool, make sure the flooring is

strong enough to handle the additional weight. Also, it would be wise to install a vapor barrier in the common wall with your house to block excess moisture from migrating indoors.

When most people think of conservatories, they picture traditional Victorian-style ones from Europe. This style is still very common in Europe and many of the highest quality Victorian conservatories available in the United States are manufactured in Europe.

There are several options for purchasing one of the European conservatories. Some are made entirely in Europe in a modular form and delivered to your building site. Others are delivered in various stages of partial completion. Still others import just the frames and ornate roofing from Europe and use domestic windows, doors and glass.

Efficiency is always a concern

with any sunroom design and the type of glass has the greatest impact. At a minimum, install double-pane glass with a low-emissivity coating. You will also need some type of ventilation and shading to minimize overheating during summer. Solar-powered vents are effective because the sun's heat actuates them.

# Folk art has loose definitions, but thousands of antique possibilities

If you look up the definition of "folk art," you'll run into confusion. That's because the term's meaning has changed since the 1920s, when it gained widespread use, thanks to Abby Aldrich Rockefeller (1874-1948). She was a collector of crude but charming paintings, sculptures and other folk art. Her husband, John D. Rockefeller Jr., helped restore Colonial Williamsburg. Abby's fame and her art selections determined what followed in the world of folk art. The paintings she collected were done by untrained artists whose works lacked perspective, used bright colors and simple lines, and often did not flatter the subject. Carvings were large cigar-store figures, carousel figures or weather vanes. Also considered folk art in those early days were everyday items like furniture, embroidery, baskets and ironwork if they were homemade in regional styles by talented people. Many art experts thought these everyday items were just crude copies of upper-class originals. But collectors began to see

value in the folk-art tradition. More and more objects were included in the definition: mourning pictures, scrimshaw, quilts, carved parts of ships, handmade store signs, carved eagles, woven coverlets, pottery animals and face jugs. A 1980s book on folk art extended the definition to include tattoos, gravestones, firefighting tools like decorated buckets and belts, and even machine-made, metal mechanical banks and windmill weights. Even though you may not be able to define folk art, you can identify it. Carnivals are filled with examples, including tip-over comic figures and handmade game targets, like open-mouthed clowns. The sideshows offer painted banners advertising weird animals and acts. Arcade games often have animated figures like "Laughing Sal," who chuckles and shakes outside the funhouse. Shooting galleries have metal figural targets, some with moving

parts. Today, even the patterns used by tattoo artists are collected. To be a folk-art collector, you need the courage to buy what you like and the ability to recognize the talent of the maker. The best pieces are worth thousands of dollars.

Q: Please tell me something about the maker of my small, round, wooden table. Its label reads "Dean C. Woodard Furniture Co., Owosso, Mich."

A: The Dean C. Woodard Furniture Co. made good-quality coffee and end tables from the 1940s to the 1960s. Dean Woodard was the grandson of Lyman E. Woodard, who founded another furniture manufacturing company in Owosso in 1866. Lyman's company switched from making wood to making wrought-iron furniture in the 1930s. Now the company is called Woodard Furniture and makes wrought iron, cast-aluminum and wicker furniture and accessories. It's headquartered in Chicago but still has a factory in Owosso.

Q: My great-grandmother left me a glass plate that I would like to learn more about. It's made in two parts. The central milk-glass piece, 6 1/2 inches in diameter, is embossed with the figures of three women and the phrase "Three Graces." That piece fits into a 9-inch-diameter clear glass frame with handles that's embossed with "Faith Hope" at the top and "And Charity" at the bottom. What is this kind of plate called, and how was it used?

A: Your great-grandmother left you a "bread plate." We suspect that the two pieces are meant to be permanently attached. The plate is titled "Faith Hope and Charity," or "Three Graces." The figures in the center symbolize Faith and Hope putting a laurel wreath above the head of the central figure, Charity — the "greatest" of the graces, according to the Bible. Three Graces plates originally were made in 1872, but they were single pieces of clear glass. So your plate is a copy made later.

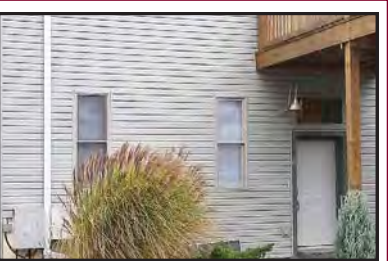

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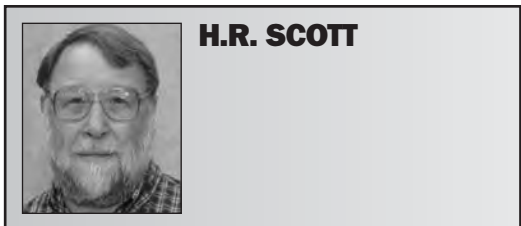

As a result of substantial premium subsidies provided by the USDA, AGR-Lite can be a very affordable way to guarantee an income flow from your farm operation.

AGR-Lite, which covers livestock, has a limitation of \$1 million in coverage. AGR-Lite offers certain features not available under our regular Adjusted Gross Revenue program. For example, farmers who derive more than 35 percent of their income from animals or animal products may be eligible for coverage under AGR-Lite. In addition, farmers and ranchers will not be required to purchase individual crop insurance policies in addition to AGR-Lite; however, they may obtain such additional protection if they so desire.

Farmers and ranchers are strongly urged to contact a local crop insurance agent, as soon as possible, for more information and premium

## FIXIT

**Q:** Yesterday, my neighbor left a note requesting that I no longer feed the birds and squirrels with hopper feeders. He says they're attracting mice. The feeders are filled with sunflower seeds and are 25 to 50 feet from his house. The neighbor on the other side of me does not have problems with mice, nor do I. As a friendly gesture, I have taken down the feeders for the moment. What are the odds that the feeders are the cause for my neighbor's mice and squirrel problems? Any suggestions?

**A:** The odds are very good that the feeders are contributing to the neighbor's mice and squirrel problems. Abundant food supplies can cause rodent populations to explode. These rodents need shelter, and so they try to enter homes. The trick,

then, is to keep your house in tip-top condition and impervious to the interlopers. That may be why you and another neighbor don't have mice problems — at least, not yet.

Here are some tips collected from readers and wildlife experts for feeding birds without also feeding mice and squirrels:

■ Don't spread birdseed on the ground.

■ Add a tray or basin to the feeder to catch seed and prevent it from falling to the ground. Empty frequently.

■ Switch feeders to a type that keeps squirrels out. (Several versions are available at stores that sell bird seed and feeders.)

■ Don't use mixed bird seed. Birds with special tastes will dig and toss seed around until they get what they want. If you want to feed different birds, use more than one feeder, such as one feeder with safflower seed, another with sunflower seed and another

with thistle seed.

■ Douse your seed with cayenne pepper. It's a chemical irritant that affects mammals such as squirrels, but not birds. (Hint: Spray the birdseed with vegetable spray oil as you mix in the cayenne pepper. The pepper will stay on the seed rather than fall to the bottom. Just be sure to clean the feeder regularly to prevent rancid oil problems.)

■ Mount the feeder on a pole and add a baffle to keep critters from climbing it.

■ Store birdseed in metal containers.

■ Fill feeders in a place where you can clean up what spills.

# Dream home with energy-saving realities

**LAS VEGAS** — Just a few miles south of 6755 Agave Azul Court, in suburban Henderson, Nev., there were, at last count, 6,300 homes in some stage of the foreclosure process.

Yet here at the edge of the Strip, in one of this desert resort's oldest neighborhoods, stands the National Association of Home Builders' pricey annual showcase of products and building techniques — perhaps looking forward to a time beyond record foreclosures and falling prices, when residential construction will start up once again.

This year's \$4.5 million, 8,000-square-foot New American Home, built on a half-acre site, has already been sold to an unidentified buyer. It is the result of more than a year of work by Bill Nolan, a native Philadelphian and chairman of the task force that created it.

Nolan, who built houses in Delaware County, Pa., before moving to the then-booming Orlando, Fla., market almost 30 years ago, cautions that this is a show house, designed to offer builders a vision of a future more sustainable and energy-efficient than anything built before.

"Builders, architects, engineers — anybody with an interest in housing construction — will be fascinated by the natural-gas-powered heating and cooling system, the photovoltaic cells, and the solar water heating," he says. "Even the insulation in this home is exciting."

"The whole package of energy-efficiency products work together to make this a near-zero-energy home," says Nolan, who runs the Nolan Group, a housing-industry consulting firm in Altamonte Springs, Fla.

The design of the house, by the architectural firm Danielian Associates,

appears to borrow heavily from Frank Lloyd Wright's Fallingwater near Pittsburgh — which, as it happens, Wright created for the owner of that city's Kaufman's department store during the Great Depression.

Nolan acknowledges that Fallingwater was the inspiration. Officially, though, the style is known as "desert contemporary."

Still, he says, "the design concepts, construction techniques and materials used in the New American Home 2009 can be adopted for use in any home. In a sense, this showcase ... is a collection of ideas for the industry to take away and put into any new or remodeled home."

As environmentally friendly as the builders made this house, visitors tend to focus on the look of it, especially the way indoor and outdoor spaces blend so seamlessly.

Designer Connie Edwards of Timberlake Cabinets, which provided the abundant dark-cherry cabinetry, leads a small tour group through the show house (a signature event of the International Builders Show, which ended last Friday). A bad knee forces her to use the elevator that travels to all four floors, from the spectacular subterranean courtyard to the north-facing roof deck overlooking the Strip and McCarran International Airport.

"You would think that the sound of the planes taking off and landing would be deafening, but the way the house was sited, the noise travels away from the house and not at it," Edwards says. A jumbo jet takes off in an unscripted effort to prove her point.

Outdoor spaces are sometimes more important than indoor in those parts of the country where there are few days you can't play outside.

That's why this house even has an

outdoor bedroom, a "casita" with a wood-framed canopy over the bed that affords an unobstructed view of the starlit desert sky. (It rains in Las Vegas occasionally, so the bed can be disassembled quickly for transport inside.)

The "casita" is off the pool area, adjacent to a koi pond and an outdoor spa.

The pool itself, of the "endless" variety, can be lowered four inches automatically when in use (via overflow pipes that run along the edges), so no water is displaced when someone is swimming, Edwards says. You can swim up to the bar, if you wish.

Below the pool area, the subterranean courtyard has a waterfall and a gas-fueled open fireplace.

The nearby great room has three big-screen televisions, a fireplace and seating areas. There are a large dining room, a kitchen prep room, a large state-of-the-art kitchen, and even a place where you can wrap gifts.

Most of the bedrooms are indoors, of course, while connected to the outdoors in some way. Yet because this is officially a zero-energy home, when daytime summer temperatures reach 110 degrees, energy-efficient glass doors can be closed automatically and curtains drawn to reduce the effects of the broiling sun.

The task force in charge of New American Home 2009 tried to balance off-the-charts design features with energy efficiency, so architect Art Danielian and builder Tyler Jones sought to do as much as technologically possible.

To minimize the quantity of materials used and reduce waste, Jones employed advanced framing techniques, including premanufactured trusses and floor systems, as well as building materials that did not require additional on-site finishing resources.

## Boost a career with branding

**Lisa McGill** is a South Florida commercial banker who mixes and mingles in community organizations and charities. But even while she passes out a business card with her company logo, she is not entirely sure how to position her own personal brand.

Today, in the new world of work, our community service and superb skills are not enough. We all need to treat ourselves like a brand that needs to be marketed. One of the best ways to succeed is to craft a compelling image that lets the world know just how good you are at what you do.

"I don't know how anyone can afford not to do it," said Kellie Kuecha, president of Women that Win. She believes personal branding is the only form of job security, whether you work for an employer or yourself. "You must have a personal brand and market it."

The good news is that in this age of Web sites and social networking, everyone has a chance to stand out and be brand-worthy.

Brand Cindy. I like the sound of it. Now, how do I figure out what Brand Cindy should stand for?

Jerry Wilson, senior vice president of Coca-Cola and author of "Managing Brand You," asks, "What's your image now, and what do you want it to be? What niche do you want to own?"

Experts tell me that when I develop Brand Cindy, I need to be specific — not just soda, not just Diet Coke, but Diet Coke with lemon. I need to find my competitive edge that cannot be duplicated by anyone else.

Tom Peters of Fast Company writes: "You've got to become relentlessly focused on what you do that adds value, that you're proud of — and most important, that you can shamelessly take credit for."

Only 25, Dan Schawbel has branded himself as the expert in personal branding. Even more, he's found a competitive edge: He's the expert in Gen-Y personal branding. Schawbel writes an online personal branding magazine. He has a personal branding Web site. In April, he releases Me 2.0, about personal branding for millennials. He says personal branding will help college students land jobs, entrepreneurs get financing, even managers earn promotions.

"Every one right now at every business is charged with marketing," Schawbel said. "There's an opportunity cost of not doing it when your competitors are. When your brand is not there and someone else's is, you lose."

Wilson of Coca-Cola says there are many opportunities each day to position your brand, regardless of whether you are a stay-at-home mom, business owner or college student. Figure out your target audience and what benefit you bring them, he says. Then, make your plan to get in front of that audience.

Wilson says making your plan could include taking classes to learn skills to become more of an expert. It might also include withdrawing from activities that detract from your brand or take you off course.

Meanwhile, Lisa McGill of Fifth Third Bank in Sunrise plans to make time to come up with a brand statement for herself. "It's an investment in myself."

## More laid-off men means more mommy breadwinners

SAN JOSE, Calif. — Meet Paul and Terry Bacon — portrait of a marriage reframed by recession.

He's 48, laid off from Hewlett-Packard after 11 years, and suddenly chief cook and bottle washer. She's 53, manager of a medical clinic, working 35 hours a week, and suddenly Ms. Breadwinner.

Paul: "I was making \$120,000. We're now relying on my wife's \$3,000 a month, and we're barely able to pay our mortgage. My wife's stressed and tired, so I try and have a good dinner waiting when she gets home. I guess that's what a good wife would do. I guess I'd make a good wife."

Terry: "Women are still underpaid, and I don't have the education Paul has, so there's no way I'll ever bring in his income. So I'm suddenly feeling a lot of pressure."

As the recession grinds on, men are being laid off at a far greater clip than women, spawning a historic American emigration out of the cubicle and into the kitchen.

The numbers are startling: More than 80 percent of pink slips handed out since the recession began in December 2007 have gone to men, thanks to their disproportionate slice of jobs in hard-hit fields like construction and manufacturing, according to government data.

In November, women held more than 49 percent of jobs. And since many are with more stable employers such as schools and hospitals, U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics suggest women soon

could outnumber men in the workplace for the first time in the nation's history.

"The whole structure of the American job is changing," said Jill Ater, co-founder of the national part-time job-placement service 10 til 2. "This trend could change the way we look at traditional gender roles. Women represent a super-educated but underutilized workforce. Now

many of these women are saying, 'He might not be able to get a job. But I can.'"

In Silicon Valley, where the global downturn fuels a weekly exodus from startup sites and office parks, home life for many couples is undergoing its own seismic shift — with Mommy Breadwinner, Daddy Daycare and life as they knew it now flipped upside down. Even as

they hunt for a new job, trying to get by on what is often a spouse's more meager pay, men are learning to simultaneously polish resumes, change diapers, set up interviews and teach teenagers to drive.

"I'm beginning to feel like Mr. Mom," said Mark Mistor, 46, laid off last month as purchasing manager for a Hayward, Calif., tech firm. "I pick

up my daughter from kindergarten at noon. But if I'm out interviewing or have resumes to submit, I'll drop her off at day care — a 6-year-old needs a lot of attention."

Mistor, like other laid-off men interviewed for this story, says his stay-at-home status "is a mixed blessing. My job took a lot of time out of my life, so my kids have received their daddy back. I'm helping my son with driver's training, and helping him on the computer getting ready for college, so there's definitely a silver lining to all this."

Heather Boushey, senior economist at the Center for American Progress, says the gender gap in layoffs during tough economic times is not new, but this time it's far more dramatic.

"Men losing more jobs than women has been the case in every recession since the early '80s, which was the first time we saw this massive structural switch away from manufacturing," said Boushey, pointing out that in December the unemployment rate was 7.2 percent for men and 5.9 percent for women. "The losses are much sharper now, and the gap between men and women's unemployment rates has never been as high" in the past quarter-century.

Both in the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics and anecdotally in her own life, Boushey says she is seeing "more and more American families where women are taking on the primary income role. The big question is: Are their husbands' lost jobs ever coming back?"

## Plenty of holes exist in the safety net of unemployment benefits

**THE UNEMPLOYMENT INSURANCE** safety net, stitched together more than 70 years ago to provide income to the jobless, is frayed.

Check that. It's full of holes. It's hanging by some strained cyberthreads. It has, in some cases, disintegrated.

The stimulus package signed recently by President Barack Obama is going to take a stab at mending and modernizing the system that provides cash benefits to out-of-work job hunters.

It intends to upgrade states' computer systems, broaden workers' eligibility for funds, extend emergency benefits for more weeks because of the high jobless numbers and add \$25 to weekly payouts.

But, at least for the near term, those mandates may further rip apart some states' ability to pro-

vide reasonably prompt income to jobless workers.

In Missouri, for example, many workers already are waiting six to eight weeks to get their benefit claims approved. And some eligible recipients have waited for weeks to get the state's new debit cards that allow them access to their already approved jobless benefits.

Unemployed workers around the country also are finding that employers are more likely to chal-

lenge their claims, thus holding up or blocking payments entirely.

And those may be the lucky ones. They're part of a minority of out-of-work people who are even eligible to collect jobless benefits.

Start with this basic fact about the unemployment system: The money to pay jobless benefits is collected by taxing employers.

Thus, all the state and federal rules for collecting unemployment depend on a worker's status as a former employee.

Right off the top, that means that self-employed individuals, freelancers and independent contract workers whose own income streams fail aren't likely to be eligible for benefits.

And take a look at just this partial list of other workers who gener-

ally aren't eligible to collect a dime: Those who left a job voluntarily; those who were fired "for cause"; those who are getting workers' compensation benefits; those who didn't work enough hours or earn enough before they lost their

jobs; those who worked part time; those who attend classes during the day; those who aren't able to work for a physical or mental reason; those who are collecting pensions or are considered retired; those who fail to report in to the unemployment office as required.

Eligibility rules vary slightly from state to state, so not all exclusions apply everywhere.

But add in the claimants who are "in queue" waiting for their benefits.

Then add in the workers who have exhausted all the state bene-

fits weeks due them without finding work. That's an estimated one in five unemployed workers.

In all, only about 4.78 million of the more than 11 million unemployed workers were collecting unemployment benefits last month.

And, when evaluating the strength of the safety net, consider this, too: The average weekly unemployment check in the United States is slightly less than \$300.

That sum does, indeed, provide a safety net for some job hunters. As for the rest?

They need to crochet their own net.

## Keep smoke to yourself

**NEW RESEARCH SHOWS** second-hand smoke is just about as bad as smoking itself — but only 24 states have banned smoking in bars and restaurants.

To keep healthy, what should employees in smoke-filled environments do?

Find a new job, said Richard Hurt, director of the Nicotine Dependence Center and professor of medicine at the Mayo Clinic's medical school.

"There's no lower limit of exposure to secondhand smoke that is safe," Hurt said. Even workplaces with state-of-the-art ventilation systems don't protect employees if smoking is going on inside the building, he said.

According to the American Cancer Society, 24 states have instituted a ban on smoking in bars and restaurants, while 31 ban it in private workplaces, says the Action on Smoking and Health, a nonsmokers' rights organization. A number of remaining states are considering bans on smoking in indoor public places.

Secondhand smoke has long been known to harm the heart and contribute to respiratory illnesses, but a recent study in the *British Medical Journal* found that exposure to secondhand smoke may increase a nonsmoker's risk of cognitive impairment and dementia — in some cases by up to 30 percent.

High levels of exposure to secondhand smoke may also be close to actual smoking in terms of increased risk of lung cancer, diabetes and other tobacco-related maladies, according to the BMJ study.

## Helping job seekers

Job hunts are stretching even longer for the growing number of unemployed. Try not to be ashamed of losing a position, urges Jamaica Eilbes, a recruiter for staffing company Manpower Inc. "Everybody knows somebody who's been let go," she said.

Friends and family can help ease the anxiety of a long search for work, said Eilbes, whose husband looked for five months before finding a job.

Don't nag a loved one who has been laid off, or ask him what he accomplished that day. Instead, reiterate that things will eventually get better, let the job seeker vent and try to bring up other subjects to distract anxiety.

She urges someone on the job trail to spread the news of unemployment long and far. Friends and family should get involved also; the more people who know you are looking for work, the better, Eilbes said.

She also recommends updating a resume with volunteer work you've done since getting laid off and staging mock interviews with a job recruiter or someone you trust.

## Worries, worries

Plunging stock prices and rising health care costs have Americans fretting, but it's job security that worries us most.

A survey earlier this month asked U.S. adults what issues most concerned them, and 38 percent said the state of their job, while 23 percent cited stock market performance, 20 percent said the cost of health care and 12 percent said saving for retirement.

However, those concerns varied markedly for people of different ages, race, income and education level.

Older Americans — those ages 55 and up — were less concerned about jobs and worried more about how markets were faring, while half or more of people aged 18 to 44 were most worried about their employment status. The ethnic group most concerned about their jobs was non-Hispanic African-Americans, 55 percent of whom worried about job security.

While only 11 percent of those who had not finished high school worried most about the state of the Dow Jones industrials, 30 percent of college graduates cited markets as their top worry.

The telephone survey, by financial services firm Edward Jones, polled 1,000 U.S. adults randomly selected from Feb. 6 to Feb. 9. The margin of error was 3 percentage points.

## Workers willing to stay wedded to jobs

SAN FRANCISCO — Do you love your job enough to marry it? That's the somewhat tongue-in-cheek question of an annual survey that seeks to find out much people love their work.

Apparently, this year more people than last year are ready for a long-term commitment with their cubicle: 15 percent of working adults said they love their job enough to marry it.

That's up from 9 percent a year ago, according to a survey in February of about 1,240 U.S. adults 18 or older, working full- or part-time, conducted by Taleo, a Dublin, Calif.-based consulting firm and staffing-management software maker.

That's not such a surprising finding, given this labor market: Plenty of people probably feel lucky to have

paid work of just about any kind. "We may be seeing a little bit of 'I love having a job this year,'" said Alice Snell, vice president of Taleo Research.

Still, Snell said 15 percent is a relatively low figure. For companies, "I still think there are some alarm bells there," she said. "We're still looking at workers who, if we use the Valentine's Day metaphor, are not really feeling that deep commitment."

Given the relentless news of layoffs nationwide, and the overarching sense that this is an employers' labor market, workers may be surprised to hear that some companies are worried about holding onto workers. But Snell said retention is a concern for some firms.

"In a sense it's counterintuitive, but in fact what we see with our

customers and in other surveys, we see retention really as the No. 1 focus," she said.

Even at companies that have cut their work force, the workers that remain, Snell said, "are critical to being able to sustain during this recession and definitely to be prepared for the upturn."

Plus, the increased productivity that's likelier when workers are highly engaged may be "more critical in this economy even than in a robust economy," Snell said.

Thus, she said, companies ought to be worried that, even though 87 percent of those surveyed said they "enjoy" or "like" what they do, two out of five workers still said they're open to looking for a new position and 13 percent said they're actively pursuing new opportunities.

Holding onto top-performing

employees entails a number of strategies, such as clearly communicating the company's goals — which may have changed drastically in this economy compared with just a year ago — and what it expects of workers, Snell said.

Also, companies need to clearly identify to workers how they can advance their careers within the company, she said. "Is it easier for your workers to find out about new jobs in other companies than in your own? If so, that's a red flag," Snell said.

Not surprisingly, the survey found that workers' feelings about their jobs varied depending on their position and industry.

Those workers who have a college degree were likelier than those who don't to report being "highly engaged" at work — 62 percent of col-

lege graduates versus 48 percent of those without a degree.

And those with higher income were more likely to love or like their work: 59 percent of workers earning more than \$50,000 a year reported being highly engaged compared with 45 percent making less than that.

Meanwhile, people in professional-services or public-sector work were more likely to love or like their job than those in other jobs; 14 percent of the workers who said they don't feel engaged at work are in the financial-services industry.

"If you look at the industry specific data, it's pretty clear, the emotional mindset of these industries," Snell said. Financial services "is the industry that's gone from the peak to the trough in the most extreme way."

## Air traffic academy offers swift climb to a job

DENISON, Texas — In an economy where good-paying jobs with security and long career prospects seem few and far between, a new school is offering students a fast track to just that kind of career opportunity.

Link Simulation and Training, an Arlington, Texas-based defense and aerospace contractor, has opened an air traffic controller training academy at the North Texas Regional Airport outside Denison.

Link officials say that in just 10 months of classroom and hands-on training, they can prepare students to meet Federal Aviation Administration standards for entry-level controller jobs at beginning salaries of about \$33,000 a year in a profession where the average annual pay is \$122,000.

Facing a wave of retirements, the FAA expects to hire 17,000 controllers over the next decade to keep the nation's air travel system flowing.

The bulk of the FAA's new hires come from two- and four-year college programs, with only classroom and some simulator instruction. The FAA then provides more-intensive simulator and control tower training.

Link officials say they saw an opening for the company, which specializes in putting together military aviation training pro-

grams, to offer a vocational school approach that would get students trained and into a paying job much faster.

"I think this program is heads above any other program," said Dale Raatz, director of the Link academy.

"The kids are immersed in it eight hours a day, five days a week. In a college environment, you're not immersed in it."

Raatz is an FAA-certified air traffic controller and trainer recruited by Link from the University of North Dakota to run the program.

Link could not even advertise the school — two years in the planning and costing almost \$3 million — before getting FAA approval and certification as a vocational school from the Texas Workforce Commission.

That last step didn't come until mid-December.

Link immediately began radio, newspaper and television advertising in the region and had 12 students enrolled by the time the first class began, in the last week of January.

Carl Wilson, Link's advanced-education and training director, who has shepherded establishment of the program, says the company has received more than 100 inquiries from all over the country about the program. It hopes to start a class every 90

days. Students must pass physical and medical examinations and a security check to qualify for the program.

A major difference between the Link program and academic ones is price: The Link program costs \$41,000. At this point, it does not qualify for government-backed student loans, but Wilson said the company is working with some private lenders and is talking to Grayson County Community College about a possible tie-in.

Helped by Grayson County, Texas, and airport officials, Link leased and renovated an old airport building and installed the same kind of simulator systems used by the FAA. Link also agreed to staff the control tower at the old military base, Perrin Field, in Denison. It will be used in the training program, will open the airfield to more traffic and, county officials hope, encourage economic development.

The Link facility has three classrooms and two high-tech control tower simulators with 240-degree and 360-degree fields of view, respectively.

The simulators, which Link does not make, use state-of-the-art programming and graphics to replicate real-world conditions.

The students can also be taught to recognize and deal with the stress that often drives

air traffic controllers out of their jobs or into early retirement.

Controllers must learn how to recognize different aircraft and their capabilities, learn how far apart to space each type of aircraft and adjust for speeds.

English is the official language of air traffic control the world over, and the simulators' voice recognition software forces students to use correct phraseology and pronunciation.

Students who graduate from the program and pass FAA certification exams will be able to step right into \$33,700-a-year control tower jobs with potential for rapid advancement and pay increases with additional training and experience.

The FAA has agreed to hire the Link school's first 100 graduates.

Link officials say the timing is right for both the company and students.

Thousands of air traffic controllers hired by the FAA in the wake of the 1981 strike by the Professional Air Traffic Controllers Organization, which was broken when President Ronald Reagan fired the striking workers, are now approaching retirement age.

Nearly 85 percent of FAA controllers will reach mandatory retirement over the next 10 years.

"It's a demanding field," Wilson said. "But it can be rewarding."

**Q: I have a question concerning a noncompete agreement. I work for a medical-billing facility, and I've been told that unless I sign such an agreement, I will not receive my annual raise. I am a low-level employee, not management, so the tie-in caught me off guard. Also, the main part of the agreement is unsettling. If I leave or am terminated, I cannot work for a competitor for a year. How is this fair?**

—Competing Minds

**A:** It's legal for your employer to tie your raise to your signature on a noncompete agreement. Companies require employees to sign such accords to try to prevent workers from jumping to a competitor.

If a salary increase isn't part of a contract, the company can set the terms for the increase, including making it contingent on having your John Hancock on a noncompete agreement.

"Unless you are guaranteed the raise by contract ... the company has no legal obligation to give you a raise," said employment attorney Ellen Storch, counsel at Kaufman Dolowich Voluck & Gonzo. "It is legally permissible for them to make the raise — and even your continued employment in some cases — contingent on you signing the agreement."

Even still, companies can't just throw anything into noncompete agreements and expect to make them stick.

"You should note," Storch said, "that the agreement, as you have described it, will not necessarily be enforceable under all circumstances, as courts tend to disfavor noncompetition agreements where they would prevent an employee from earning a living."

Here are some specific situations in which courts would take issue with your noncompete: If you are terminated "without cause," the employer would probably not be able to enforce the agreement, Storch said; if the accord has "no reasonable geographical limitations," it is probably not enforceable; and, finally, if the court questions a company's motives, the contract may not be worth much.

"There would be a question as to its overall enforceability simply because a court would question whether the company had a legitimate business interest to protect by asking you to sign it in the first place," Storch said.

The bottom line is, however, that your employer is probably asking all employees to sign it, Storch said. So you might consider signing it if you want the raise.

## Human resources manager shouldn't be playing Cupid with office singles

**Q: Our human resources manager recently asked if I would be interested in dating another employee who is also single. I told her that I have no interest in asking this woman out. I am a midlevel manager in a small company, so having a social relationship at work would be very awkward.**

**It makes me uncomfortable that an HR person is trying to plan my social life. Should I tell management about this or just hope that the subject isn't raised again?**

—Concerned

**A:** Your overly chummy HR manager clearly doesn't understand the boundaries of her role. HR people should not pry into employees' personal lives, much less encourage romantic encounters.

However, this matchmaker may not have a professional human resources background. In small companies, owners often designate an untrained but "people-friendly" employee to handle personnel tasks.

Relaying your concerns upward could put an end to the HR manager's social engineering. On the other hand, if she's well connected politically, it might also harm your own career. So before lodging a complaint with management, weigh

the benefits against the risks.

If you're approached again, clearly state your position on workplace romance. For example: "I know that you're trying to be helpful, but I have a personal policy against dating co-workers. I just don't believe in mixing work with social relationships." A firm refusal should dampen her desire to fix you up.

**Q: In the department I manage, we have recently experienced a sudden increase in turnover. What concerns me is that none of the supervisors knew that their employees were planning to leave.**

**I encourage supervisors to have monthly one-on-one meetings with employees, but this apparently isn't working the**

**way it should. What can we do to make people open up to management?**

—Frustrated Manager

**A:** You seem distressed that your former employees never confessed their desire to depart. But smart people don't tell management when they're considering other opportunities.

Instead of trying to ferret out secret job-search plans, you should determine what is motivating your employees to look elsewhere. For this purpose, you need some additional tools in your communication toolbox.

Continue the supervisory one-on-ones, but add quarterly skip-level meetings in which you talk with each employee individually. Even if people are cautious with their comments, you will

have a firsthand opportunity to spot red flags.

During these conversations, employees may be willing to tell you why some staff members have chosen to leave. When people resign in the future, make it a practice to do exit interviews.

Finally, conduct an annual employee opinion survey using an outside vendor.

When people believe their responses are confidential, they tend to be more open and honest. Then, once you've diagnosed the reasons for turnover, you can start to develop realistic retention plans.

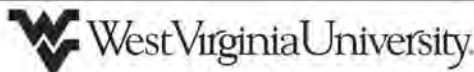

Time to reveal myths about milk

I JUST LEARNED that March is National Nutrition Month.

I think it is important to understand that there is no such thing as a "good" or "bad" food.

All foods have characteristics and a clear understanding of these characteristics helps us to build a healthy diet.

Animal products contain many excellent characteristics that make them a wise choice to make up part of a healthy diet.

Yet, every day we read and hear about how "bad" milk, cheese and meat can be for us.

The National Nutrition Month campaign, designed by the American Dietetic Association, has been designed to focus attention on the importance of making informed food choices and developing sound eating and physical activity habits.

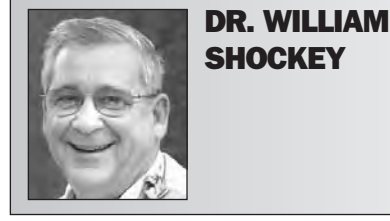
One focus is to help the public distinguish between myth and fact, and highlight the expertise registered dietitians have in communicating nutrition based solely on sound science.

The American Dairy Association Mid-East supports this effort by providing us with some information about some common myths that surround dairy products.

MYTH: Minority groups such as African-Americans should avoid milk and other dairy products because of lactose intolerance. In reality, it is unnecessary for individuals with lactose maldigestion or intolerance to eliminate milk or other dairy products from their diet.

Lactose maldigestion (also called lactase nonpersistence) is a normal genetically determined decline in lactase, the intestinal enzyme necessary to digest lactose or milk sugar. Lactose intolerance is the occurrence of gastrointestinal symptoms associated with ingestion of lactose-containing foods.

Minorities and others with lactose maldigestion can adopt strategies, such as drinking milk with meals or eating aged cheeses, that allow them to comfortably consume dairy products, the major dietary source of calcium.

MYTH: Drinking milk leads to heart disease and stroke. There is no scientific evidence that consuming milk or other dairy foods, as recommended, leads to heart disease or stroke.

On the contrary, including milk and other dairy products in the diet may help to reduce the risk for these diseases. Dietary guidelines to reduce heart disease recommend a population-wide decrease in total fat, saturated fat, and cholesterol.

To meet these guidelines, emphasis on consuming foods low in these nutrients is advised. Reduced fat and low fat milks and other dairy products are available. Although milk fat is an important source of saturated fatty acids, its content of stearic and short and medium chain fatty acids (which do not raise blood cholesterol levels) may minimize the expected increase in blood cholesterol levels.

MYTH: Intake of dairy products causes some cancers. There is no credible evidence that consumption of milk or other dairy products plays a role in the etiology of cancers such as those of the prostate and breast.

In fact, some studies indicate that dairy intake may reduce the risk of cancer. Epidemiological studies, by their very design, indicate associations, not cause-and-effect relationships.

According to a recent review of risk factors for prostate cancer by the American Council on Science and Health, "drinking milk is not an established — or even reasonably suggestive — risk factor for prostate cancer."

Myths about milk and other dairy products not only are unfounded but, if acted upon, can also jeopardize health.

MYTH: Early exposure to cow's milk increases the risk of Type 1 diabetes. There is no persuasive scientific evidence that

drinking cow's milk in childhood causes Type 1 or insulin-dependent diabetes. The American Academy of Pediatrics recommends breastfeeding or iron-fortified cow's milk-based formulas during the first year of life, with transition to whole milk after 12 months of age. Health professionals do not advise that infant feeding recommendations be changed or that cow's milk be avoided during childhood to reduce the risk of Type 1 diabetes.

MYTH: Calcium-rich foods such as milk should be avoided to reduce the risk of kidney stones. In reality, the opposite appears to be true. Adequate intake of calcium from calcium-rich foods such as milk may actually reduce the risk of kidney stones in most people.

Traditionally, patients with calcium oxalate stones, the most common type, have been advised to reduce calcium intake. However, there is no evidence that intake of calcium from foods such as dairy products, promotes calcium oxalate kidney stones.

Increasing calcium intake reduces urinary excretion of oxalate, which is found in rhubarb, teas, nuts, beans, spinach and chocolate. Low calcium intake may not only increase risk of calcium oxalate kidney stones, but also may lead to negative calcium balance and low bone density or osteoporosis in stone formers.

MYTH: Consuming cow's milk contributes to milk allergies and causes mucus production in the throat. Milk allergy, an adverse immunological reaction to one or more of cow's milk proteins, is uncommon. Although parents may assume that a child's symptoms are due to milk allergy, cow's milk allergy affects only about 2 percent to 7 percent of infants when tested under controlled conditions.

Genetic predisposition and too early exposure to cow's milk (i.e., when digestive and immune processes are immature) can increase an infant's susceptibility to cow's milk allergy.

MYTH: Early exposure to cow's milk increases the risk of Type 1 diabetes. There is no persuasive scientific evidence that

for infants through the first year of life or longer. For infants with milk allergy or at risk for this condition who are not breast fed, hypoallergenic formulas (i.e., extensively hydrolyzed or free amino acid-based) are available.

There is no scientific evidence to support the myth that consuming cow's milk increases mucus production in the throat and that avoiding milk will alleviate respiratory symptoms such as those commonly associated with colds.

Nor is there any evidence that consuming milk contributes to breathing difficulties due to bronchoconstriction in adults with asthma.

Garden tips Spider mites are apt to thrive in warm, dry houses. Frequent misting under the leaves of houseplant will discourage them.

A solution of 1 cup flour, 1/4 cup buttermilk, and a gallon of cool water, applied in a mist, is a good organic deterrent.

Test buds of peaches and other sensitive fruits for freeze damage. Bring in a few twigs cut from the trees and place them in a vase of water.

If the twigs bloom in a week or two, expect blossoms in the spring and a crop next fall.

Jewelry business loses luster in hard times

MIAMI — Freddy Strauss can gauge the economy by the decline in the size of the diamond engagement rings he's selling at his store here. These days, happy couples are opting for smaller diamonds.

"I'm probably selling a similar amount, but they're lower-priced," Strauss said. His business was down low double-digit percentages during the holiday season, normally one of the most popular times for engagements. But Strauss actually is in a better position than many in the jewelry industry. Couples still get married in recessions, and most guys wouldn't think of skipping the engagement ring if they want a happy marriage.

Skipping the gold bracelet or pair of diamond earrings is a different story. As job losses and the stock market crash take their toll on consumer confidence, jewelry has become a luxury many people can't afford. Even those who can are scaling back.

Retailers are finding ways to cope. Some are bringing in new, lower-priced merchandise, while others are marketing heavily to the ultra-wealthy.

Nationally, the picture is not pretty. Holiday jewelry sales during November and December were down 31 percent at Mayors stores, the bulk of which are located in

Nonprofit petitions for federal protection for area

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Driving through the backyard of Yolo County, Bob Schneider seems to sense every plant, every animal and every nuance of the land here.

He can tell you how the tectonic plates of the Earth collided long ago and erupted upward into the Coast Ranges and its foothills creased with velvety folds.

"Change is coming to this area; there's going to be a lot more people here," said Schneider as he guided his Subaru Outback through the Capay Valley's prolific orchards and verdant farms.

He wants someone passing this same way 100 years, even 500 years, from now to see the same stunning vista where tulle elk roam and the finicky yellow-legged frog manages to thrive.

Without a monumental effort to preserve the diverse environment in a 100-mile swath of California's interior, buildings and roads could obliterate it acre by acre, he said.

Schneider is board president of Tuleyome, a Woodland, Calif.-based environmental nonprofit organization working to establish a National Conservation Area — the third in California — encompassing nearly half a million acres in six counties.

The country's 13 existing National Conservation Areas create a single, cohesive plan to preserve and manage vast landscapes typically managed by a patchwork of public agencies, including counties.

The designation, which must be approved by Congress, provides a more logical way to properly care

for an ecosystem, which doesn't acknowledge political boundaries, Schneider said. Even fire management would improve, he said.

What would be called the Berryessa Snow Mountain National Conservation Area stretches from the Lake Berryessa region through Solano, Napa, Yolo, Lake, Colusa and Glenn counties to Snow Mountain. No private land is included unless landowners opt in.

Representatives of Tuleyome, which means "deep home place" in Miwok, are appearing before county supervisors and appealing to environmentalists and recreation enthusiasts, including hunters, to form a consensus that would eventually become federal legislation later this year.

Some farmers and ranchers, particularly in Glenn and Colusa counties, oppose the conservation area because it could exacerbate existing problems, said Ashley Indrieri, executive director of the Family Water Alliance in Colusa County.

A massive preservation bill that combined dozens of other proposed bills — some that had languished for years in Congress — recently passed the U.S. Senate.

In the proposed Berryessa Snow Mountain National Conservation Area, serpentine soils that once covered the ocean floor are now hills rippling through the region, supporting unique plant life, Schneider said.

"This part of California is really special with respect to the plants and animals who live here," Schneider said.

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## Chevrolet Aveo: A thrifty car for tough times

Tough economic times call for frugal transportation so it's no wonder that Chevrolet's smallest car is getting a new look for 2009.

Mildly restyled inside and out in hatchback form and with four-cylinder power modestly boosted, the 2009 Aveo subcompact ranks sixth best in fuel mileage among 2009 gasoline-only powered small cars, as defined by the federal Environmental Protection Agency. The Aveo also is fourth lowest among all new 2009 vehicles in starting retail price.

Specifically, the Aveo's federal government-reported mileage of 27 miles per gallon in city driving and 34 mpg on the highway with manual transmission is better than that of most other vehicles, including the Hyundai Accent, Nissan Versa, Scion xD and Kia Rio small cars.

Yet, the Aveo's starting manufacturer's suggested retail price, including destination charge, is \$12,625, which amounts to just 55 percent to 65 percent of the starting prices for the industry's most sophisticated fuel sippers these days. These include the diesel-powered Volkswagen Jetta TDI and the 2009 Honda Civic Hybrid with

gasoline-electric powertrain.

Still, it has to be said that the Aveo isn't glamorous or sporty. Nor is it trendy or high-tech the way gas-electric hybrids are. It is simply inexpensive transportation, and the best

way to spice it up is to select bright paint for the exterior and add some good amenities.

This is how the test Aveo5 hatchback arrived, bathed in a playful, bright blue paint and with a 180-watt,

six-speaker audio system with XM satellite radio. Also, the more plebeian cloth upholstery was replaced by a charcoal-colored, perforated, leatherette material that looked a lot like leather.

I immediately appreciated the higher-than-usual seat position that gave me good views outside. I sat higher than I would in a regular car, and this made it easier to get in and out, too.

The Aveo is a nimble handler. It makes U-turns without fuss, thanks to a 33-foot turning circle.

The nearly 13-foot length — for the hatchback — helps it neatly fit into nearly any parking space. Note the sedan is 15 inches longer than the hatchback, which helps account for the roomy trunk.

The Aveo hatchback can hold a lot, too — 42 cubic feet of space when the rear seats are folded. But be aware that the seatbacks, which split into one-third and two-thirds sections, don't fold down exactly flat.

The Aveo is a lightweight car and, unfortunately, it feels like it. Doors on the test car had a tinny sound as they closed, and in windy weather I had to stay alert and keep a strong hold on the steering wheel.

Handling is fine when the Aveo travels in a straight line. There can be some jitteriness in the road handling and less-than-precise feel to the steering on twisty roads. Body lean in the Aveo was more than I expected in a small car.

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# Harley dealers ride out recession

MILWAUKEE — It's been a long winter for some Harley-Davidson dealerships.

Battered by the economy, as well as the cold, they're praying for spring to come in a hurry.

Demand for Harleys was down 10 percent to 15 percent in January and early February compared with the same period a year ago, according to a survey of 72 dealerships by Robert W. Baird & Co.

The majority of surveyed dealers reported that credit conditions worsened as banks continued to tighten lending policies.

Harley dealers expect about a 10 percent drop in new motorcycle sales this year, although it could be closer to 23 percent, according to Baird analyst Craig Kennison.

Also, fewer bikes are selling at or above the suggested retail price.

Still, sales volumes for January and early February didn't fall as much as expected, according to Kennison, partially the result of a promotion that guarantees the trade-in value of some Sportsters when traded for a more expensive bike.

Harley riders who either buy a new Sportster or trade in their recently purchased one will get the bike's original manufacturer's suggested retail price credited toward the purchase of a qualifying Harley Big Twin or VRSC motorcycle.

It's similar to previous promotions Harley has used to stimulate motorcycle sales through trade-ins.

For dealers, the down side is it cuts into profit margins — although Harley-Davidson helps cover their costs.

The program doesn't diminish the brand's value and reinforces used motorcycle prices, according

to Kennison.

A few Harley dealerships have gone out of business this winter, including a family owned dealership in Dubuque, Iowa, that had been in operation nearly 50 years. Average dealer inventories were down about 19 percent from a year earlier, according to the Baird survey, but were still slightly higher than dealers wanted.

Some Harley dealers say they've weathered the economic downturn but are anxious for spring to breathe new life into bike sales.

"I think the biggest fear is that we aren't at the bottom of this recession yet," said Rob McDonald, sales manager at House of Harley-Davidson in Milwaukee.

"There are a lot of people unaffected by the recession and are buying bikes, but there are some people hanging on to their motorcycle for another year or two."

# RV dealers feel left out of stimulus plan

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — Some recreational vehicle dealers are worried the government's \$787 billion stimulus bill may not stimulate many sales in their troubled industry.

A key provision of the bill grants a federal tax deduction applicable on the first \$49,500 paid for a new car, truck or motor home.

But language was stripped from the bill that would have extended that tax break to non-motorized trailers, fifth wheels and other towed camper units. Those units make up 85 percent of the industry's annual sales, which plummeted 32.9 percent nationally last year to their lowest level since 1993.

"We are being left out," said Preston Filger, owner of Liberty RV in Liberty, Mo. "It would help. It absolutely would benefit our sales."

At the same time, Filger acknowledged sales of costlier motor homes sorely need the break. "The motor home market has taken more of a beating than travel trailers," he said.

Figures released by the National RV Dealers Association bear that out. According to the association, manufacturers' shipments of motorized home units fell 49 percent last year compared with 2007, while 2008 shipments of non-motorized units were off just 3.8 percent.

"We worked to get that in, but it didn't make the cut," Phil Ingrassia, an association spokesman, said of the tax break for non-motorized units.

The good news is that other tax breaks that aid the industry are still standing, including the deductibility of interest paid on "second home" RV loans, Ingrassia said.

Brad Outersky, the owner of Show

Me Campers & Boats in Grain Valley, Mo., said he would love to have the tax break for his dealership, which sells only non-motorized units.

"My manufacturers are dying," he said. "One of them just laid off nine salesmen."

Outersky said that despite the stimulus snub, sales so far this year were surprisingly strong — starting with the 34 boats, campers and trailers his store sold at the recent Mid-American Boat & RV Show.

Show promoter Pat Riha said that while attendance was off about 9 percent, it was better than pre-season shows elsewhere, which have reported 30 percent dips.

"People who could afford to buy came to negotiate and make deals," Riha said.

The Recreation Vehicle Industry Association estimates nearly 8 million U.S. households own an RV.

## Students have chance to dig history

### Archaeology trip part of study abroad offering

WVU students have the opportunity this summer to get their hands dirty in Middle East history and uncover ancient artifacts on an archaeological dig in Bethsaida with the Israel Study Abroad Program.

Any student interested in exploring ancient cultures can literally

get their hands on a piece of history and earn course credit through this one-of-a-kind program.

“Students participating in the dig get a type of cultural immersion that is unique to any other study abroad program on campus,” said Aaron Gale, associate professor of religious studies, who heads the course associated with the program. “They’re standing at the crossroads of ancient and modern history and gaining valuable, first-hand experience that can’t be taught in the classroom.”

From May 30 to June 15, participants of the program will travel to

Bethsaida, near the Sea of Galilee, to learn the methods and practices involved in modern archaeology, dig up artifacts, perform lab work and participate in various lectures.

Archeologists, who have been digging at the Bethsaida site since 1987, have uncovered less than 10 percent of its artifacts, which date back at least 5,000 years. The ancient city of Bethsaida is mentioned many times in the Bible and has been linked to both the Old and New Testaments.

Students in the program explore the religions and cultures associated with ancient Israel from the Old Testament period through the Roman

Era, as well as the contemporary practices and interactions taking place among Jews, Christians and Muslims. They also travel to ancient cities such as Nazareth, Sepphoris and Cana on the weekends and conclude the dig by visiting Jerusalem to tour well-known religious and historical sites such as the Church of the Holy Sepulcher, the Wailing Wall and the Dome of the Rock.

Curtis Conrad, a junior religious studies major and anthropology minor from Elkins, volunteered at the Bethsaida dig in 2007 after Gale told his Religion 102 class about the excavation site. He unearthed many

artifacts, including the floors of a Roman house, tools from the Bronze and Iron Age, arrowheads and spear points nearly 2,300 years old, bones and pottery. He enjoyed it so much he plans to return this summer thanks to WVU's collaboration in the program.

The course, Religion 306: Biblical History/Archaeology in Israel, is open to all majors, and no prior archaeological experience is necessary.

The cost of the trip is \$4,500 and includes six WVU upper-level credits, round-trip airfare, housing, extended learning fees, trans-

portation, many meals and some field trips.

The WVU Office of International Programs requests applications for the course be submitted by the end of the month.

Photography students will have the opportunity to explore the remote region of northwestern Wyoming through a new summer photography workshop offered June 18-28 by the WVU College of Creative Arts.

The Jackson Hole Photography Workshop is a 10-day intensive field course in collaboration with the Jackson Hole Center for the Arts in downtown Jackson, Wyo. Michael Sherwin, assistant professor of photography and digital imaging in WVU's Division of Art and Design, will teach the course.

The size of the workshop is lim-

ited. Registration deadline is May 1.

Daily photo excursions exploring this stunning region of Wyoming will be complemented by darkroom and digital work sessions, critiques of works in progress, gallery visits and evening presentations.

The workshop will cover a broad range of photographic practices and principles, with an emphasis on instruction targeted to the individual level of the student.

Among the locations to be visited will be the Grand Teton National Park; Yellowstone National Park; National Elk Refuge; the towns of Afton, Freedom and Kelly; the his-

toric Mormon Row homestead site; a working ranch; and a variety of neighboring locations.

Surrounded by pristine wilderness and iconic American landscapes, the Jackson Hole area has attracted photographers from around the world. A number of well-known landscape and wildlife photographers have successfully established galleries in downtown Jackson.

In 2005, the Oswald Gallery opened, featuring an extraordinary collection of historic photographs of the American West and a diverse showing of contemporary works by many renowned artists. Work-

shop participants will get a firsthand look at master prints from the gallery's collection.

Enrollment is limited to 12 students to ensure a significant amount of one-on-one instruction and attention. To be considered for the workshop, an application and \$500 deposit are required prior to the May 1 registration deadline.

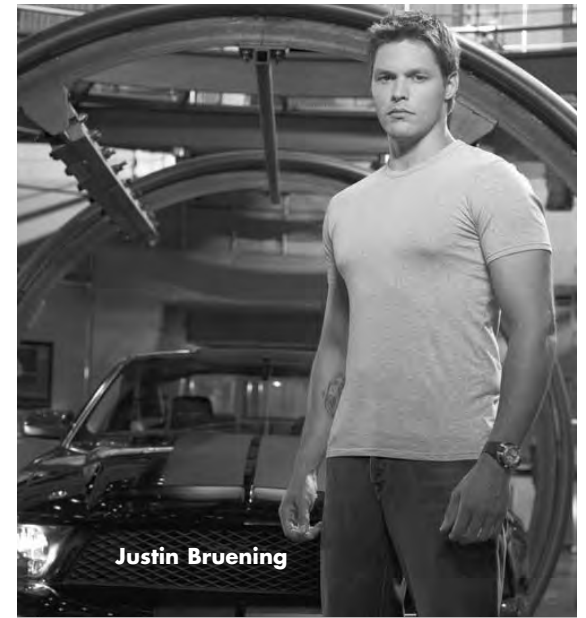

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# Fallon stays up 'Late' on NBC

Thanks to his "Saturday Night Live" years, Jimmy Fallon knows a lot about doing late-night television.

But he's in for a re-education, starting this week.

The comedian becomes part of a rare club as he joins the network talk show fray, succeeding

Conan O'Brien — who, in turn, succeeds Jay Leno on "The Tonight Show" in June — with the NBC debut of "Late Night With Jimmy Fallon" Monday, March 2. Among scheduled opening-week guests: Robert De Niro, Cameron Diaz, Tina Fey and Jon Bon Jovi.

"I think I'll feel a lot of pressure," the self-effacing Fallon admits. "You know, those are big shoes to fill. David Letterman did it first (before moving to CBS), then Conan; now I'm the third guy to try this show out. I'm nervous, but I actually just want to get it going. The first week is all about calling on favors to have people come by, and everybody's going to be learning, not just me. A lot of people will go into making this show what it is."

With "SNL" mentor Lorne Michaels as his executive producer and the Roots as his house band, Fallon will occupy historic Studio 6B at NBC Studios in New York, and he's been revving up for several months. Since early December, he's been posting a weekday video blog to introduce viewers to his new plans, even letting them weigh in on certain creative choices.

"There couldn't have been a better thing for us to do," Fallon maintains. "It was Lorne's idea, and

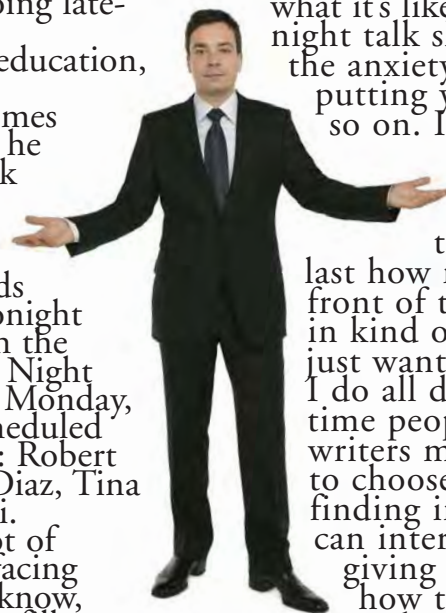
we didn't want so much to do sketches or funny bits but to show what it's like to put together a late-night talk show ... the excitement, the anxiety, the hiring, the putting your office together and so on. It hasn't been as much funny as it's been informative.

"You can see from the first webisode to the last how much calmer I am in front of the camera. It was done in kind of a guerrilla way, and I just wanted to show people what I do all day. When was the last time people got to go into a writers meeting? (Viewers) got to choose the show's logo; I'm finding interesting ways they can interact with the show. I'm giving them more options of how they can enjoy late-night television."

Acknowledging he was given "my break" by Michaels, Fallon is glad to have the veteran comedy-variety producer backing him again.

"I was 23 and nervous, and I just wanted to be the guy who did impressions on the show ('Saturday Night Live'). He saw something there, maybe the hunger. I got to do characters, I got to do 'Weekend Update,' I even got to do music on the show — but I just wanted to fill out my contract, which was six seasons. I don't like it when cast members stay too long, but I had no goal after that."

"As I was leaving, Lorne said, 'Just remember that in 2009, we're going to be looking for a replacement for Conan. Keep that in the back of your head.' I went, 'Well, yeah, you never know.'"

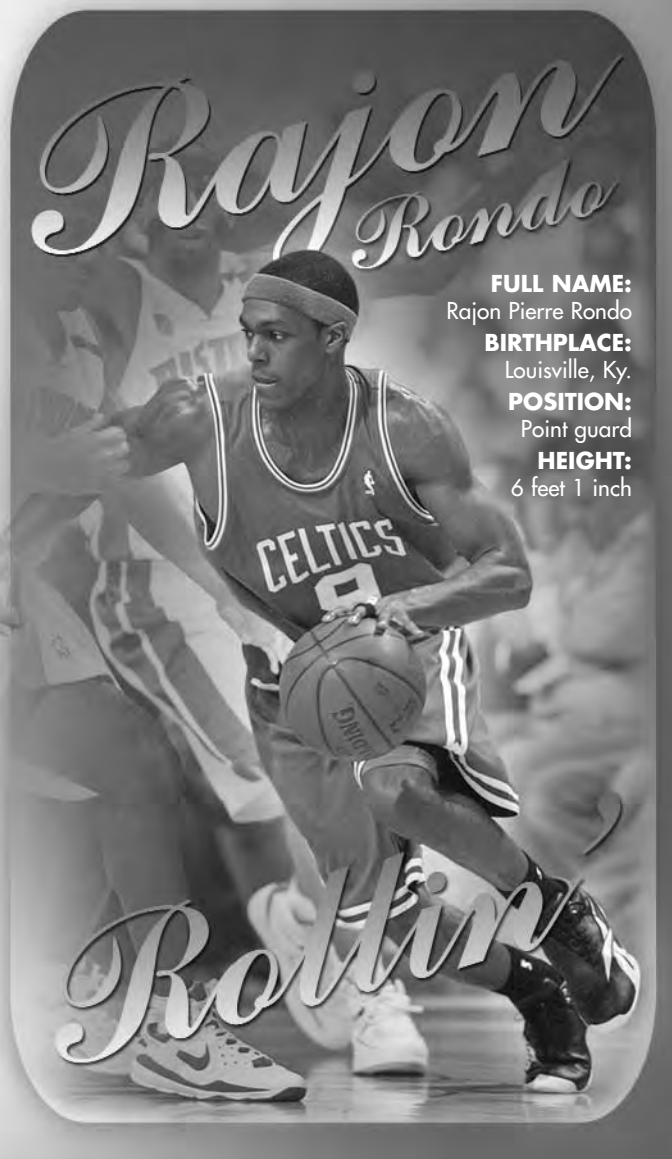

Rolling along as he literally does in his spare time, Rajon Rondo made the deft transition from semianonymous second stringer to championship contributor despite doubts whether he could do exactly that.

In acquiring Kevin Garnett and Ray Allen prior to the 2007-08 season to team with fellow All-Star Paul Pierce, the Boston Celtics knew they had solidified their frontcourt and shooting guard position to make a run at a title. What they weren't sure about was who would man the point, and with three gifted scorers on the team, it was a mighty big question mark. That is until Rondo answered it by starting 77 games and providing the steady hand and court vision every NBA team needs to be successful. The lanky 6-foot-1-inch floor general averaged almost 11 points and more than five assists in the regular season before stepping up his game in the playoffs, which culminated in a 21-point, eight-assist, seven-rebound and six-steal performance in the Celtics' NBA title-clinching win over the Lakers.

While not a great outside shooter, Rondo does a lot of things very well, especially defensively — he has long arms and great quickness — and in transition on offense. And with the NBA's best record at this writing, Boston is again on a roll, something Rondo can identify with. His offseason hobby is roller skating, so much so that you're likely to find him perfecting moves at the rink than in a local club on a Friday night.

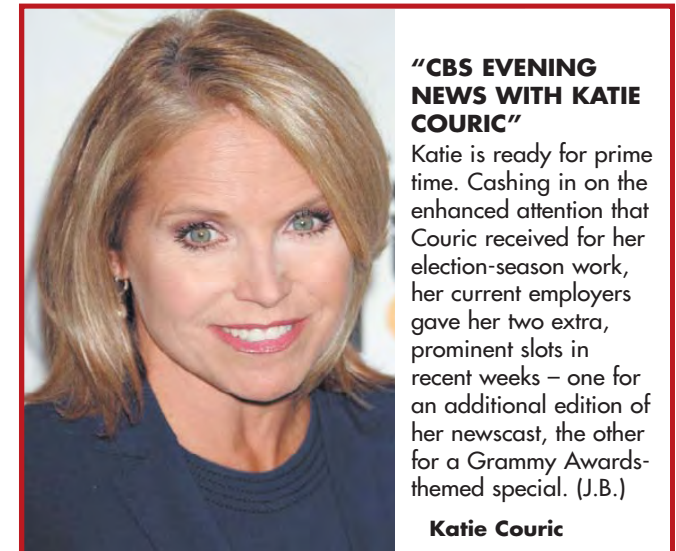

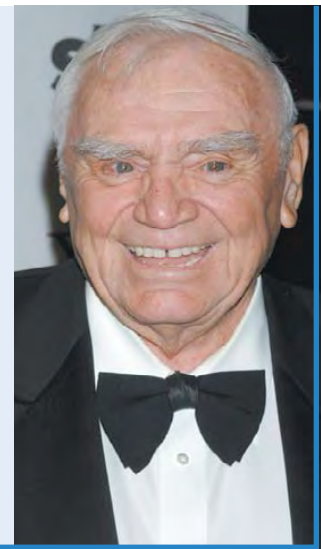

# Nothing 'New,' nor especially good, about Zellweger film

**Memo to Renee Zellweger: Think about new representation. Seriously.**

A great Hollywood story of the mid-1990s was the overnight success of the actress who made her mark with a revelatory performance opposite Tom Cruise in "Jerry Maguire."

After that came her "Bridget Jones" movies, "Chicago," "Cinderella Man" and her Oscar-winning turn in "Cold Mountain." So how else to explain something as utterly predictable and relatively joyless for her as "New in Town"?

The alleged comedy could fit any actress – particularly one trying to build a film career rather than one who

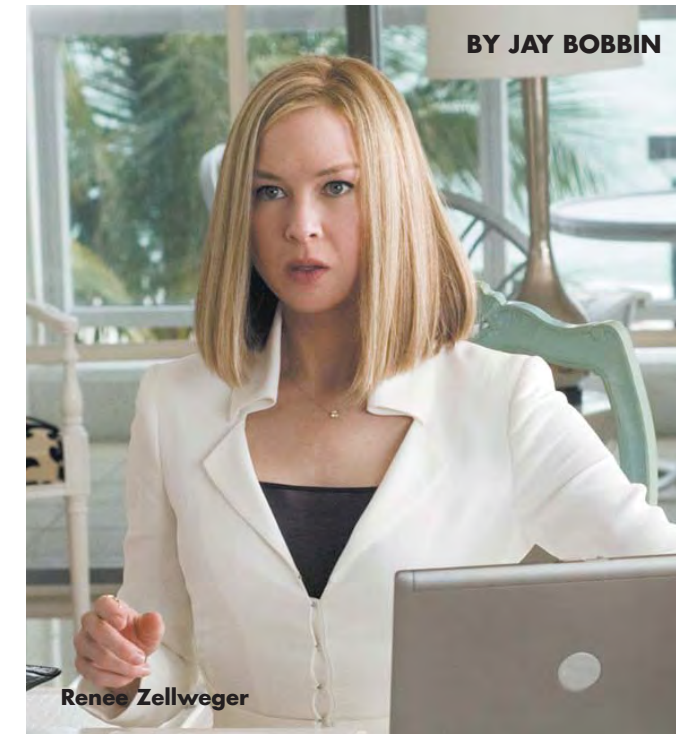
already has established that – so it's more than mildly disappointing to see a talent such as Zellweger step into something so flat and formulaic.

She gets the standard-issue role of a Miami business executive sent to a Minnesota town to preside over the dismantling of one of the company's units. In the current economy, it goes without saying she won't be the most sympathetic character in movies these days; thus, it's even more incumbent on Zellweger to win over moviegoers. Never happens.

And it isn't Zellweger's fault alone. The filmmakers give her absolutely no help in convincing a viewer of the personality arc her alter ego is meant to go through. Harry Connick Jr. does the amiable job he's becoming ever more expert at, playing a union rep who does what anyone else will be hard-pressed for here: He falls for Zellweger.

Beyond the problems with its central figure, the story dotes on every "rube" and "city slicker" slam it can incorporate. Just how expected is THAT from a setup such as this? You'd like to think a script that would attract the likes of Zellweger has more on its mind than the thumbnail sketch might suggest. Sadly in this case, no.

Perhaps another "Bridget Jones" chapter would be a quick fix for the star. Clearly, she needs to do some career repair – and fast – if she wants to continue placing her new work in any town's theaters. Or even in its video stores.

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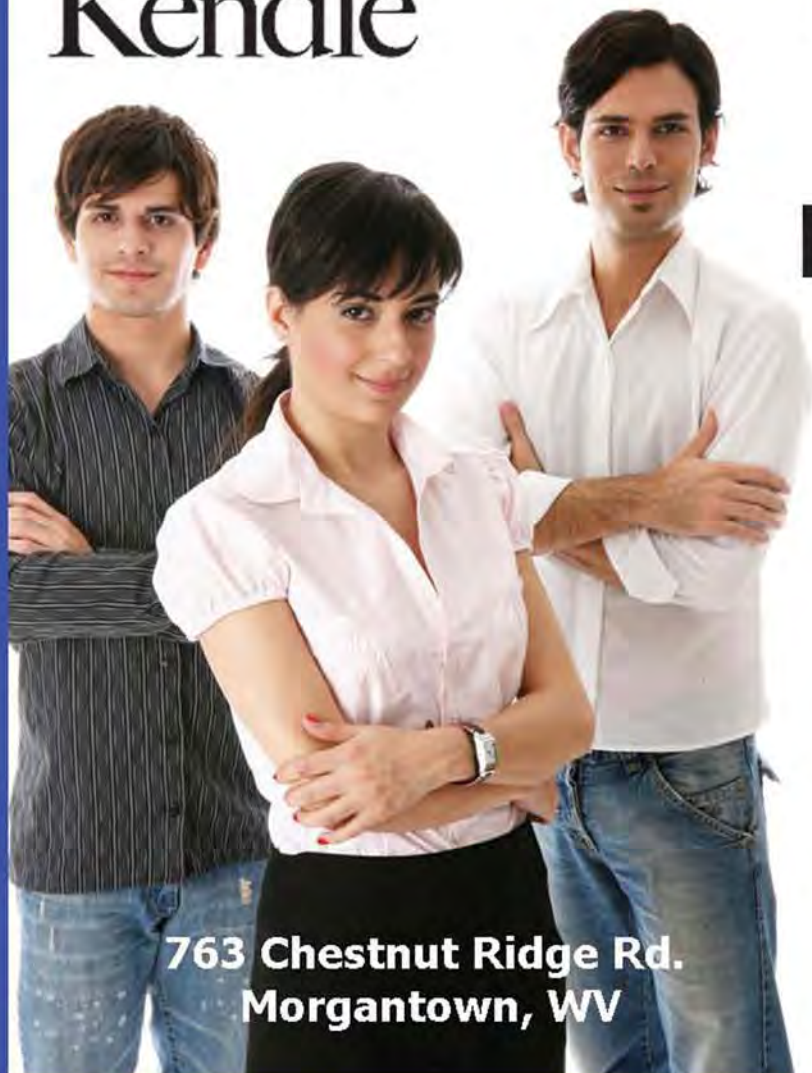

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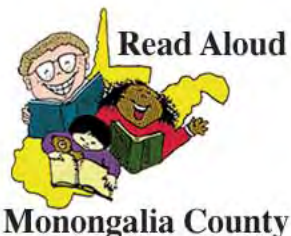
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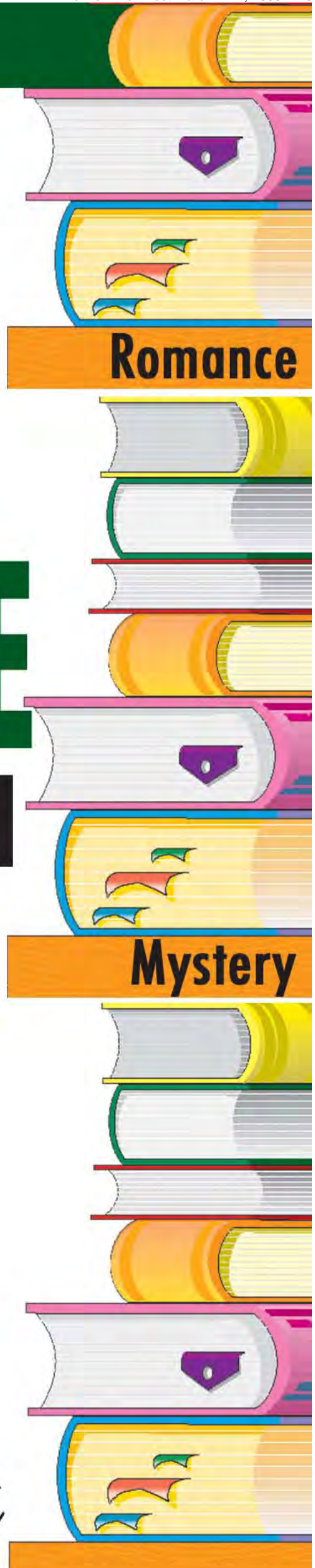

### How the Earth Was Made 9 p.m. on (HIST)

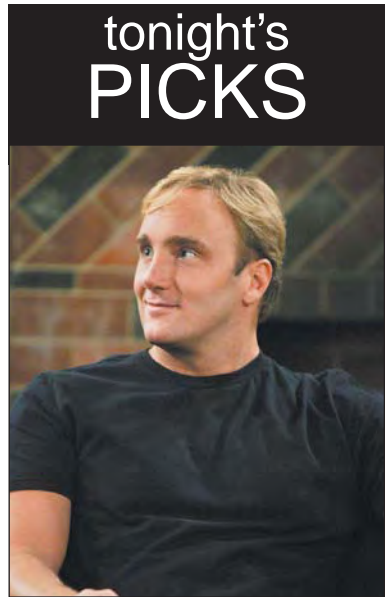

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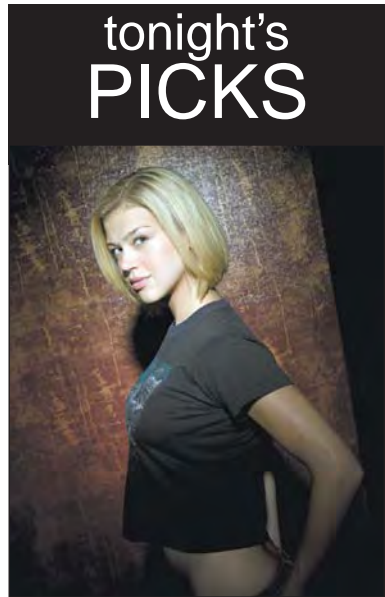

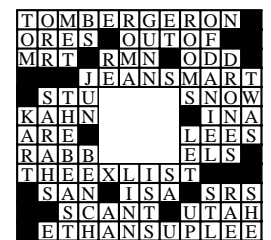
