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# Justice to run for Sena

# Fleischauer no longer listed as candidate

Former Morgantown Mayor Ron Justice announced he plans to run for the West Virginia State Senate for the 13th District, a seat vacated by Mike Oliverio's decision FOR A complete list of candidate filings, Page 1-B.

not to run for re-election.

"I think I can bring good leadership to Mon and Marion counties," said Justice, a Democrat.

The 13th District seat represents Monongalia and Marion counties. Friday, Michael Oliverio announced he would not seek re-election. Delegate Robert Beach, D-Monongalia, and former Monongalia County Republican Delegate Cindy Frich also filed papers to run for the seat.

Delegate Barbara Evans Fleischauer, D-Monongalia, filed papers and was listed on the secretary of state's Web site as a candidate Friday. She was no longer listed as a candidate for the 13th District on Saturday evening. Calls to Fleischauer were not returned in time for this report.

Justice said he sent in his candidacy papers Saturdav. Candidates had until midnight to have them postmarked. He said as long as he filed the paperwork correctly, he will be on the ballot for the May 11 primary.


In spring 2009, Justice announced he would not seek reelection for Morgantown City Council after more than 18 years of service, the past seven as mayor.

When he resigned, Justice said he had plans to seek another office because of his experience. But, he had no idea it would be this soon.

With Oliverio's announcement. Justice said he decided to run for election.

Justice is from Logan and currently resides in the Woodburn

# Critics raise specter of foreign campaign spending

WASHINGTON — The Supreme Court's decision on campaign finance has jumbled a seemingly simple rule of American politics — foreigners should play no role in U.S. elections.

President Barack Obama and other critics said the court's decision to let corporations spend their money to directly influence elections opened the floodgates to foreign involvement. In last week's address to Congress and the nation, Obama asserted the court had allowed special interests, "including foreign corporations, to spend without limit on our elections.'

That was a step too far. At the moment, foreign corporations may not spend any money in U.S. elections under a provision of federal election law that was untouched by the high court.

The court's majority opinion by Justice Anthony Kennedy specifically left for another day "whether the government has a compelling interest in preventing foreign individuals or associations from influencing our nation's political process.'

But Justice John Paul Stevens said in his dissenting opinion that the reasoning underlying the ruling "would appear to afford the same protection to multinational corporations controlled by foreigners as to individual Americans.'

The more complicated question is how to treat U.S. subsidiaries of foreign companies or American corporations that are controlled by foreign investors.

Before the court ruling, the issue was much more clear. Corporations, including some with foreign ties, could form political action committees (PACs), funded with voluntary and limited contributions from their executives and employees. But they could not spend money from their general treasuries to advocate for or against candidates for federal offices.

Morgantown officials use "common sense" to enforce a city law that requires property owners to repair their own sidewalks, City Manager Dan Boroff said.

Citations are rarely given, he said. And the city only requests repairs when the sidewalk is in a state that is a clear threat to public safety —especially if it is in an area through which many pedestrians travel.

"The city does not routinely go out and cite people for a crack in the sidewalk," he said.

The Dominion Post asked Boroff for the number of citations the city has given for sidewalks, how many complaints it has received about sidewalks and how many times the city has repaired a sidewalk and then charged a property owner for the repairs.

Boroff said the city did not keep specific records of those numbers. City employees could compile them. he said, but they weren't available

# Police nab suspected shoe thief

NEWARK, Del. — Newark Police arrested a 46-year-old man they said is responsible for the theft of thousands of shoes after recovering much of the stolen property at the suspect's house.

Walter J. Rubincan, of Newark, was arrested Friday. He is charged with 25 counts of second-degree burglary and 77 counts of theft. Police said he's been stealing shoes for about 20 years.

Police said they recovered three truckloads of stolen property from Rubincan's house, including 150 boxes of shoes and photographs, eight guitars, a mandolin, eight snowboards and a surfboard.

Officers said of hundreds of shoes in duffel bags found along a creek in Elkton, Md., last weekend were also part of the shoe burglar's stash.

Rubincan is being held on \$138,000 cash-only bail.

#### Sunday WVU retires Hot Rod's No. 33

As a high school senior in Charleston, Rodney "Hot Rod" Hundley was initially sold on playing college basketball at North Carolina State.

He spent part of a summer in Raleigh, N.C., before changing his mind and winding up at WVU, beginning in 1953.

"I ended up going back to West Virginia because of recruiting problems there," Hundley, 75, said. "It was my second pick at the time, so it made me think, 'You know, this happened for a reason."

He hasn't looked back since. The impact of that decision to return home was a bit overwhelming Saturday, when Hundley's No. 33 WVU jersey was retired during halftime of the WVU-Ohio State men's basketball game.

"This is one of the greatest days of my life," Hundley

After the ceremony and before leaving the Coliseum floor, Hundley, the school's second all-time leading scorer with 2,180 career points, was persuaded by fans to attempt one final shot.

In fitting fashion, Hundley, who played all his WVU games at the Mountaineer Field House, rattled in a righthanded hook shot.

#### **Board wants to** build 150 sidewalks

The Morgantown Pedestrian Safety Board believes it could take about 150 sidewalk, crosswalk and lighting improvement projects to get the city in proper order for its pedestrians.

Projects are proposed in each of the city's neighborhoods — from Jerome Park to Evansdale and from Suncrest to South Park.

"We want to promote walking, safe walking," said Christiaan Abildso, chairman of the Pedestrian Safety Board. "We want to connect everyone to work or school or shopping or entertainment — all that good stuff. We want to make it as automatic to walk as it is to get in your car and turn your ignition now."

A mapped network of sidewalks, pathways and trails guides the Pedestrian Safety Board's plan, which has not yet been approved by the Morgantown City Council.

Abildso said the board created the network so pedestrians could have continuous walkways anywhere in Morgantown — from downtown to the residential neighborhoods.

#### **Monday DOH** weighs options for Hartman bridge

West Virginia Division of Highways (DOH) officials are leaning toward one plan to replace the Hartman Run Bridge, but five other alternatives are also being considered.

The preferred plan would replace the southern abutment at its present location and shift the northern abutment to the west, using city streets to maintain traffic. It will cost about \$5,231,000.

The southern abutment is the Sabraton end of the bridge. The Richwood Avenue end would be the abutment moved toward Mineral Avenue.

But the preferred plan combines two other options. The first involves replacing Hartman Run Bridge at its current location, using the existing city streets to maintain traffic during construction, at a cost of \$5,073,000.

#### **Canyon PSD finally** gets sewer service

After about 15 years, a \$6.5 million project to extend county sewer service to Canyon Public Service District (PSD) customers is finally finished.

The project extended public sewer lines to about 600 customers within the Canyon PSD, which includes homes and businesses from the Cheat Crossing area on Canyon Road to Dairy Mart on Point Marion Road.

Sam Bossio, chairman of the Canyon PSD board, said crews with Rover Construction are still putting the finishing touches on the project, but the system has been fully operational since late November.

He said the project was delayed by right-of-way acquisition, state Public Service Commission rulings and other issues associated with the government agencies involved.

#### **Tuesday** 30 years in jail for **District stabber**

Kerry Jackson was a good student and a good son who shocked his family when he was accused of murder, family members said Monday at Jackson's sentencing for the 2007 shooting/stabbing death of Luis "Joey" Paige.

"He just got hooked up with the wrong crowd," his mother told the court.

"When I heard about what happened, I was so shocked because it was so totally out of character," his grandmother testified.

Monongalia County Circuit Court Judge Russell Clawges sentenced Jackson, 24, of Philadelphia, to 30 years in prison Monday for Paige's death. A medical examiner determined that both the gunshot wounds inflicted by codefendant Jamar Fortt and the stab wounds inflicted by Jackson led to the massive blood loss that killed Paige.

Clawges said that, although he sees potential in Jackson, the crime he committed was serious and tragic.

#### Ex-treasurer loses grievance

A grievance board has denied a grievance filed by Dawn Bishop, former treasurer of the Preston County Board of Education, According to attorney Greg Bailey, of Bowles Rice McDavid Graff and Love LLP, a decision was issued Jan. 21.

"The Grievance Board concluded that Ms. Bishop was a probationary employee and that she failed to prove the non-renewal of her contract was arbitrary and capricious," Bailey said in an email to *The Dominion Post*.

According to Bailey, the board also found that Bishop's attempt to challenge her suspension "was not timely."

#### **Wednesday** Mollohan probe ends

CHARLESTON — The U.S. Department of Justice (DOJ) has ended its probe of Rep. Alan Mollohan, said Ben Friedman, spokesman for the U.S. Attorney's Office for the District of Columbia.

Friedman told The Dominion Post that the investigation is over, and no charges will be filed.

Friedman said he couldn't comment on any other questions

House Speaker Nancy Pelosi's office told The Dominion Post on Tuesday Mollohan delivered a letter to her relating the Justice Department's actions and saying he would no longer recuse himself from Justice Department-related matters in the House Appropriations Committee subcommittee on Commerce, Justice, Science and Related Agencies, which Mollohan chairs.

Mollohan was a member of the House Ethics Committee, but was asked to step down in 2006 because of the investigation.

### **Counties will set** school start dates

CHARLESTON — The school calendar bill is set to become law.

In a rare move, the state Senate passed House Bill 4040 unanimously in one fell swoop — suspending its rules to do all three readings in one day, without sending it to committee.

"We've already had the debate," Senate President Earl Ray Tomblin said Tuesday after the morning session. "There was no sense sending a bill like that to committee."

**Education Committee** 

Chairman Robert Plymale, D-Wayne, explained before the vote that the Senate had already passed similar bills several times - bills that failed in the House. Since the House passed this one, it seemed wise to speed it through.

Plymale noted there are still problems to address. For instance, when snow forces a two-hour delay and a twohour early dismissal, that still counts as a full instructional day.

"I think we have to look at what is a full instructional day," he said. "This is a good first step in assuring 180 days of instruction."

#### **Thursday** Kingwood OKs rate hike

 ${\tt KINGWOOD-Kingwood}$ City Council agreed to increase sewer rates by 15 percent. Council first proposed the rate increase two months ago. But when the bill reached a second reading and public hearing, council voted it down. The measure reappeared on its Dec. 22 agenda as a first reading. Council approved it, and Tuesday passed the second reading — at a second public nearing.

The rate increase is intended to help the city keep up with rising operations and maintenance costs on the aging system and to pay down a bond for engineering on the proposed expansion. City attorney Sheila Williams and Mayor James G. Lobb have said the increase is necessary now because the city failed to keep rates in line with costs.

The 15 percent increase means the minimum sewer bill will go up by \$4.93 to \$37.67, according to City Clerk Martha Moore.

### School officials: Law needs tweaking

The bill allowing school districts more control over their school calendars passed in the state House and Senate this week aims to help counties keep students in the classroom for 180 days, as mandated by

state law.

However, area school officials said because lawmakers didn't consider certain employee contracts, the proposed law gives local school boards little control over those calendars.

County Monongalia Schools Board of Education (BOE) Vice President Joe Statler said many service personnel — such as bus drivers, maintenance workers and cooks — work under a 43week maximum schedule.

This requirement restricts how much districts can change their schedules.

Those workers' contracts were not changed with the bill's passage.

#### **Friday** Del. Shook arrested, charged with DUI

CHARLESTON — Delegate Alex Shook, D-Monongalia, was arrested Wednesday evening and charged with first-offense DUI.

Shook, 40, a Morgantown attorney with the firm of Hamstead Williams & Shook PLLC, was arraigned and released on a \$1,000 personal recognizance bond, according to the Kanawha County Magistrate Court clerk's office.

According to the police report, Charleston Police Senior Patrolman R.H. Coleman spotted a vehicle going the wrong way on Virginia Street, a one-way street downtown. Coleman observed the car turn left onto Hale Street and then turn onto Kanawha Boulevard — a four-lane thoroughfare that runs along the Kanawha River.

Coleman pulled Shook over at the corner of Laidley Street and Kanawha Boulevard downtown. Shook presented his driver's license, vehicle registration and proof of insurance.

When asked, he told Coleman he was coming from the Summit — a downtown conference center — after a party, and had consumed "several" beers. The event was a dinner for the House Judiciary Committee hosted by the state.

#### Health department may cut programs

The Monongalia Health epartment may have to cut services in order to pay its share of money for its employee retirement pro-

For the 2011 fiscal year. the employer-contribution rate to the Public Employees Retirement System (PERS) will increase from 11 percent of a member's gross monthly salary to 17 percent. For the health department that means an increase of \$144,000.

The employer-contribution increase affects all state agencies.

"Last year, it increased from 10-and-a-half percent to 11 percent and that was concerning," said Board of Health Chairman Sam Chico III. "This is just dumbfounding.

He said there are two ways to come up with the money: Increase revenue or reduce staff, which means a reduction in services.

#### Saturday Oliverio won't run for Senate again

CHARLESTON — Sen. Mike Oliverio, D-Monongalia, announced Friday he will not run for re-election. What would have possibly been an unopposed race for Oliverio has so far turned into a face-off between a current and a former delegate.

Delegate Barbara Evans Fleischauer, D-Monongalia, and former Monongalia County Republican Delegate Cindy Frich both filed Friday to run for Oliverio's 13th District Senate seat. Oliverio said, "It's time for me to begin a new chapter in my life." In the coming days, he'll announce what course he intends to pursue.

Another reason he decided to move on, he said, is family — leaving his wife and children in Morgantown during the 60-day session and for nearly a week each month during interims is difficult. During the session, he returns home to see them on weekends.

"With two small children, it has become increasingly more difficult to leave them each week," he said.

#### Security of WVU data breached

WVU student information was compromised this month during a routine upload of tax data, but officials don't think any fraud occurred.

WVU spokesman John Bolt attributed the security breach to an operational error. He said it affected 53 students whose information was visible to others for less than 90 minutes.

The data was uploaded to WVU's 1098-T Web site, from which students can download their 1098-T tuition statement. According to the IRS, colleges and universities are required to file a 1098-T form for each student who pays tuition. Eligible taxpayers can use it to claim a tax credit.

The form contains a student's name, Social Security number, tax identification number and the amount of tuition paid during the previous tax year.

"We don't think there was any fraud involved," Bolt said. "It was a mistake that was made. As soon as the error was discovered, it was shut down."

There are letters from children and grandchildren in Hartman's file. Most talk of visiting Kingwood and eating breakfast with their grandmother.

"There is nothing like the written word," Hartman said.

How are you? Fine I hope. Guess you are studying hard. Well don't do it too much, or too long in fact, don't do anything that will change you in any way ... for as you know I love you very much just the way you are and I am very proud of you ... With all my love

Linda Gabb, 71, said she used to have boxes of letters and cards she received from family and friends over the years. But when she moved from New Orleans to Morgantown four vears ago, she simply had to condense.

Two letters she did keep are ones her father wrote to her when she was in college in the mid-1950s that made her feel safe and loved when she was away from home. Now she writes to her own children and grandchildren. She writes to family and friends.

"I spend a fortune in postage. I wrote four letters today to four of my friends. And if I don't send a letter to them," Gabb said, "I send them a card once a month just to tell them I'm thinking about them.

"My little granddaughter who is 12 asks me all the time, she says, 'Grandmom, tell me again, how is it you are still friends with some of your friends for 60 years?' Kids today don't have that. I'm still friends with some of my friends from grammar school."

Letters contribute so much to a friendship, she said. "I think it's just the difference in a personal touch." They don't have to be long. What's more important is sharing thoughts and emotions. Gabb always writes with a black flair pen.

"They hardly carry stationery anymore, so I'll tell you exactly what

I do? I go to Walmart, and they have these writing tablets. I buy the ones that are light blue and have these beautiful clouds in the background. I buy angel stickers and I put them up in the righthand corner above the date, just to sort of decorate it.

"And if my penmanship does not look exactly the way I want it to, believe it or not, I start over again.'

Gabb said that for as long as she can remember, she has written letters. She had pen pals in school. She wrote letters to colleagues from work that she met over the phone. She said she receives plenty of letters, too, but not as

many as she writes. "It's funny but what people say when I do get a letter is, 'Oh, I'm so sorry I haven't written sooner. I know I'm three letters behind.' When I write them back, I say, 'You don't need to apologize. You write when you have time and you feel like it. So long as you don't care that I might send you three letters to your one. You know how I am, I just love to write letters."

"People are on the computer and they're on this twittering or tweetering or whatever it is. And they're doing all this messaging and texting.

"And something along the way that is very important has gotten lost," Gabb said.

Hope you're well. I had a Christmas crisis, so I'm only now able to thank you for cards, Christmas and sympathy ... I have a calendar for you, which I will get off this coming week ... I could only get a large one and should have used a smaller one that fits a regular envelope ..

Cold weather today, snow on Christmas Day, and some airports needed to close down for a spell ...

Okey Simmons, 70, a retired postal worker from Daybrook, was reading a letter he just received from his friend Mary Mulligan, from Dublin, Ireland.

He writes to two friends in Ireland, two in Scotland and another in England.

His correspondence with them began when he started doing some research into his family history. He placed an ad in the local newspapers from the towns where he

Comments from local letter writers on the art of handwritten correspondence:

Gay Kline, 74, of Morgantown, has been writing to her friend Enid Malone, of Sydney, Australia, for 25 years. They met in Athens, Greece, while on a European tour with their husbands. They haven't seen each other in person since.

"Enid is a wonderful letter writer. I feel like I have known her family even though I never met them. Usually, we answer each other's letters and we always write at Christmas. We've exchanged gifts over the years.

"She writes quite long letters, and when I read them I can hear her voice because we toured for those three weeks. I can see her turning around on the bus and talking to me.

"E-mails are fast becoming the way to communicate, but I treasure the printed word. Holding a letter in your hand and knowing that that person touched it ...

"It took me several months after my husband died to get his old letters out and look at them again. I had saved them. And I knew where they were. But I just ... I couldn't ... it was painful."

Peggy Cox, 73, of Grafton, writes to her son Brent Keith Cox, in Afghanistan. After serving in the U.S. Marine Corps for 20 years, he is working overseas as an adviser.

"My son says he likes letters much better than he does e-mails.

"He's been all over the

world. One period, he was so discontent that I wrote to him every day. He has all my letters. I suppose I have most of his, too, but I don't have them organized like he does.

"I send a lot of cards out to people on special occasions. I write letters all the time. I have a file cabinet with all kinds of special stationery. I've always loved stationery. I save my cards. I never throw a card away.

"I think we're coming to [a time when people will stop writing letters] because I noticed at Christmastime I didn't get near as many cards as I used to. I think people correspond by computer. They have all those things like Facebook. And stamps have gone up. A lot of people just don't write anymore."

Ruth Shagula, 83, of Morgantown, has been writing letters since she was 15. Her brother, Noah, was in World War II, so she started with him.

"I wrote letters to cousins in Florida, to my brother, to my aunts in Baltimore. I wrote a lot of letters. The postman said to me one day when he was putting mail in the box, he said, 'Ms. Shagula, I have never seen anybody write so many letters.

"Mostly today it's these computers and online things. People don't take the time anymore. They just pick up the phone. Or they get on the computer and write a fast letter to go. I think it's a shame, though.

"The letters started dropping off when computers started being used," he said. "You saw fewer and fewer.



# Not wearing a seat belt could be a primary offense

Senate committee takes up issue during session

CHARLESTON — A bill to make failure to wear seat belts a primary offense one you can get pulled over for — cleared its first hurdle Tuesday.

The Senate Transportation and Infrastructure ComState Capitol

mittee approved the bill and sent it on to the Judiciary Committee.

Senate Bill 130 would change state code to remove the provision that makes driving or riding without a seat belt a secondary offense — one you can be cited for after you're pulled over for another offense.

The bill reduces the fine

Sen. Corey Palumbo, D-Kanawha, is the bill's primary sponsor, and said he's tried to get it passed for several years.

"In my view," he said, "it will save a lot of lives, it will prevent a lot of injuries and it will save a lot of money."

He said it could also bring in federal grant money available to states with primary seat-belt laws. In the last couple of years, he said, it could

from not more than \$25 to a have brought in an additional \$1 million to \$2 million.

> Committee Chair John Unger, D-Berkeley, said the bill is more of a publicawareness bill than a lawenforcement bill — it encourages people to wear seat belts and maintain control of their vehicles. It passed overwhelmingly by voice vote.

> Asked why the bill failed in previous years, Palumbo said some people cite personal liberty, the "Moun

taineers are always free mentality."

Sen. Clark Barnes, R-Kanawha, voted against the bill in committee.

"It's certainly an issue of safety," he said, "but it's personal safety."

It's different from driving under the influence of alcohol, texting or using a cell phone while driving. "It has to do with personal choice.

"I'm very concerned," he said, "that over-regulation crosses the line between our constitutional rights and

government regulation." He noted that grant money

isn't free money. 'Federal grant money is all paid for by our children and grandchildren. It's not necessarily a gift to us, but a bill to our children."

The House of Delegates has a similar bill, HB 4005, sitting in its Roads and Transportation Committee. The major difference is the fine-4005 makes it a flat \$25.

# W.Va. takes steps to reduce prison population

CHARLESTON — An average of three new inmates a day entering the state's correctional system has left West Virginia with a stark choice: Build new prisons or change the way it thinks about crime and punishment.

The first option is unattractive in a time when state agencies are trimming their budgets and revenue is drying up. A new prison would cost up to \$200 million, according to Corrections Commissioner Jim Rubenstein.

That leaves the second choice, which politicians have long feared will expose them to the charge of being "soft on crime," a tag no one wants during an election year in a conservative state.

Gov. Joe Manchin, though, is proposing policies he said will save the state hundreds of millions in the long run and do a better job of rehabilitating prisoners with the best chance at being productive members of society.

With a proposal to create an accelerated parole program for the least risky inmates, and plans to boost the funding for work release programs in

Charleston and Beckley. Manchin said he wants to be seen as "smart on crime."

"For 20 or 30 years, Democrats and Republicans alike have tried to be tougher on crime than the next person," Manchin said. "The attitude was, 'You're giving someone 20 years in prison? Hell, I'll give that person life."

Those attitudes have contributed to West Virginia's current situation, Manchin said, in which a prison system designed for 5,000

inmates has 6,300 and counting. The overflow is accommodated by housing prisoners in the regional jails, which themselves are now burdened, and which were not designed as long-term facilities for convicts.

Based on recommendations by a commission he created in 2008, Manchin wants to boost funding for work-release programs by over \$1.2 million, and spend \$450,000 to hire 10 new parole officers. The latter are seen as crucial for

Manchin's accelerated parole program, currently before the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Accelerated parole, as Manchin explains it, is a way to get nonviolent, low-risk inmates out of the system quickly, leaving room in prison for convicts who pose an immediate threat to society. To qualify, offenders would be rigorously screened and have to complete an advanced rehabilitation program.



# Pentagon starts clock on lifting gay ban

WASHINGTON — The Defense Department starts the clock next week on what is expected to be a severalyear process in lifting its ban on gays from serving openly in the military.

A special investigation into how the ban can be repealed without hurting the morale or readiness of the troops is expected to be announced Tuesday by Defense Secretary Robert Gates and Adm. Mike Mullen, chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff.

While the review is likely to take the better part of this year to complete, and even more time to implement, its initiation will advance President Barack Obama's goal of repealing the ban and bring a divisive issue for the military back to the fore.

At the White House, officials continued reviewing options to repeal the Clintonera policy that the president vowed to repeal. The administration still believes that any repeal should start in Congress and have the backing of top military leaders.

To that end, Obama and Gates planned a meeting next week to discuss, among other topics, ending "don't ask, don't tell" policies. The president was also likely to speak with Mullen, who has signaled he would carry out a repeal if ordered by Obama and Congress.

Lifting the ban poses some emotional questions that go to the heart of the military's command structure and the trust relationships within military units. Among them: Will U.S. troops and leaders tolerate openly gay members in their midst? And if they don't, what should the Pentagon do about it?

The military's "don't ask, don't tell" policy was imposed by a 1993 law intended as a compromise between President Bill Clinton, who wanted to lift the ban on gays entirely, and a reluctant Congress and military that said doing so would threaten order.

Under the policy the military can't ask recruits their sexual orientation. In turn, service members can't say they are gay or bisexual, engage in homosexual activity or marry a member of the same sex.

Between 1997 and 2008, the Defense Department discharged more than 10,500 service members for violating the policy.

The review to be announced next week was expected to delve into practical issues that surround changing the law: Can a soldier be forced to room with someone who is openly gay if they are the same sex? Would the military recognize civil unions and how much would it cost to extend benefits to a service member's partner? Would quotas be imposed to ensure openly gay service members aren't passed over for promotions?

Obama has promised to repeal the law, but did little to press the issue in his first year as president. In his national address Wednesday, Obama received a standing ovation from some members of Congress and Gates when he suggested that would change.

"This year, I will work with Congress and our military to finally repeal the law that denies gay Americans the right to serve the country they love because of who they are," Obama said during his State of the Union address. "It's the right thing to do."

While his promise is being hailed as a good start by gay rights' activists, Obama is finding resistance in several corners. Some high-ranking military officers are reluctant to embrace the change while the forces are stretched thin at a time of two wars.

According to city code, property owners adjacent to a sidewalk are responsible for keeping that sidewalk in good repair.

Any concrete sidewalks that are broken or deteriorated to the extent of needing repair should be repaired by the property owner, the code states. The city manager, on his own or through City Council's direction, can require any property owner to make needed repairs.

Suncrest resident Carol Spears said when the Pedestrian Safety Board showed photographs of the city's sidewalks cracked and crumbling, she wondered why the city didn't just enforce that

"Why have a law if you're not going to enforce it?" she said. "They should just take if off the books."

Spears said she questions if the city will enforce the law if the improvement plan is implemented since the law isn't enforced now. If it is not, the cycle will just continue, she said.

# WVU in favor of city sidewalk fee

WVU supports the city Pedestrian Safety Board's comprehensive improvement plan and won't hesitate to pay the fee that supports the plan, WVU spokesman John Bolt said.

"We endorse what they're doing," he said. "We think it's a good concept."

The board's plan also fits together with WVU's own plan to improve transportation and parking on campus, Bolt said.

The Pedestrian Safetv Board proposed that all property owners within the city limits pay \$1 per foot of their property frontage annually. For example, property owners

who have 50 feet of frontage will pay \$50 per year.

Residential and commercial property owners alike would be expected to pay the fee. Tenants would not have to pay the fee, but their landlords would.

Even those typically exempt from paying taxes — such as WVU, churches and charitable organizations — would have to pay the fee.

Bolt said WVU had not looked at how many feet of property frontage the university had in Morgantown yet, but "we aren't going to be difficult about paying."

A representative for WVU did not attend Thursday's public forum on the fee.

But Bolt said there are several members of WVU's faculty and staff that are on the city's Pedestrian Safety Board and the university tracks the plan's progress through them.

For example, Christiaan Abildso, the board's chairman, is a sports sciences program coordinator; Bill Reger-Nash, the board's vice chairman, is a professor of community medicine; and board member Hugh Kierig is WVU's director of transportation and parking.

None of them are on the Pedestrian Safety Board to represent WVU, Bolt said.

city asks the property owner to repair a sidewalk, the property owner takes care of it, he said.

makes no attempts to repair the sidewalk within 20 days — depending on certain situations, such as the weather — the city can repair the sidewalk and charge the property owner for those repairs.

Boroff said he doesn't know of any instance where the city had to make the

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repairs and then bill the property owners for them. Also, in the past, the city

has worked with neighbor-If the property owner hoods that have requested sidewalks or sidewalk repairs, Boroff said. If neighborhoods — or

neighbors on one city block — can pool their money and cover the cost of supplies and materials, the city will provide the labor and build the sidewalks.

Boroff said the city hasn't done that for at least 10 years, but it is a standing offer.

On Thursday, The Domin*ion Post* sponsored a public forum to allow city property owners a chance to question the Pedestrian Safety Board



about the plan.

Several property owners at that forum expressed frustration that, in the past, they've had to pay for repairs to sidewalks in front of their properties, but now, city officials are saying they can't make everyone do that and they've come up with a way to make everyone pay for the Pedestrian Safety Board's improvement plan.

Christiaan Abildso, chairman of the Pedestrian Safety Board, said Boroff gave the board four possible options to fund a sidewalk, crosswalk and lighting improvement plan when the city first asked the board to come up with such a plan.

Abildso said the board recommended a fee that would require the city's property owners to pay \$1 per foot of their property footage because the board thought it would bring the least burden to the property owners.

The board hopes to bring in at least \$1 million a year with the funding option, he said.

Other possible options include a special levy, a city assessment program and a public works service fee similar to a service fee proposed for road improvements that failed in a February 2008 election.

Abildso said residents could vote for a special levy in either a regular municipal election or a special election. In order for it to pass, 60 per cent of the voters would have to approve it.

A property's fair market value would determine how much a property owner's property tax would increase through the levy, he said, but according to city estimates, taxes would increase by about \$53.64 on a property with a fair market value of \$100,000.

Property owners would pay for the sidewalks in front of their property as part of the assessment program.

The city could construct new sidewalks and then bill adjacent property owners 100 percent of the construction costs, Abildso said. Boroff said the assess-

ment program is something the City Council has the authority to do now, according to the city code. 'But that would be a real

financial hardship to some people," he said. It costs between \$80-\$100 to

construct one foot of sidewalk, Boroff said, depending on the topography of the area and the needed rightof-way. The \$100-per-foot estimate

the Pedestrian Safety Board

uses is the "upper end, worstcase scenario," Boroff said. "It's best to be conservative in your estimates. Then, if it turns out to be less, good news, you can build more sidewalks."

Property owners would have the option to start a payment plan in order to repay the city for the construction. According to city documents, the plan could be financed for a 10-year period at a 6 percent interest rate.

The public works service fee would charge people who work in Morgantown \$1 per week.

The fee would come out of wages and salaries. People who work in Morgantown, but don't live in the city would be charged the fee, Abildso said, and people who live in Morgantown, but work outside of the city would not be charged.

The Pedestrian Safety Board recommended using an annual fee that would require property owners within the city limits to pay \$1 per foot of their property frontage.

Abildso said he didn't know if the board would change its recommendation for how the improvement plan should be funded because the board hadn't met as a whole to discuss feedback it received at Thursday's public forum. "We do want to make it

as fair as possible to everyone," he said. Abildso did agree that a

second forum could be held, possible within 30 days, to get more information out to the public.

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# **Anticipation High as Ohio Valley Gold and Silver Refinery Opens for Business Tuesday in Morgantown!**

Been following the gold and silver market lately? Well if you have a jewelry box or lock box full of gold or a coffee can full of old coins you should be according to Ohio Valley Refinery spokesperson John Miller. "The gold and silver markets have not been this strong for over 30 years" said Miller. Typically when the U.S. dollar is weak and the economy is flat gold and silver markets soar. "That's good news if you are setting on a few gold necklaces or an old class ring" says Miller.

Typically selling direct to a refinery is reserved for larger wholesale customers like jewelry stores, pawn shops, and laboratories" says Miller. "We are changing how business is done" he explains "we want to do business with everybody so we took our business to the streets". "Our teams visits various cities around the country hosting 5 day events allowing the general public to take advantage of our services. The turnout has been overwhelming" says Miller. "Usually each day is busier than the previous day. It seems once people come to us and sell something they are so amazed what an old ring or gold coin is worth they go home and start digging around for more and telling relatives, friends and neighbors. It's like a feeding frenzy by the third day. People line up with everything from

gold jewelry to sterling silver flatware sets to old coins. I think during this bad economy everybody can use extra money but most people say they are taking advantage of selling direct to our refinery because of the higher prices we pay".

During this special event anyone is welcome to bring all types of gold, silver and platinum to the refinery and turn it in for instant payment. The types of items they will accept include all gold jewelry, gold coins, gold ounces, dental gold, old coins made before 1965 including Silver Dollars, halves, quarters and dimes, anything marked "sterling" including flat ware sets, tea pots, silver bars, silver ounces and all industrial precious metals.

What should you expect if you go to the event to sell your gold and/ or silver? Just gather up all gold silver and platinum in any form. Got Coin? It might be just the time to cash in. This week starting Tuesday and continuing through Saturday the International Collectors Association in conjunction with the Ohio Valley Gold & Silver Refinery will be purchasing all types of silver and gold coins direct from the public. All types are welcome and the event

Collectors will be on hand to identify and sort your coins. Then the quality or grade will be determined. The better the grade the more they are worth according to collectors I talked to. With the silver and gold markets high prices of older coins are too. Any coins minted before 1965 in the U.S. are 90% silver except nickels and pennies.

The coins worth is determined by the rarity and the grade. Old silver dollars are worth a great premium right now even well worn heavy circulated ones are bringing good premiums. Franklin and Kennedy halves, Washing ton quarters, Mercury and Roosevelt dimes are all worth many times the face value. While older types like Seated Liberty, Standing Liberties, and Barber coins are worth even more.

Gold coins are really worth a lot right now according to Brian Eades of the International Collectors Association. This country didn't start minting coins until 1792 says Eades. Before that people would trade goods using gold dust and nuggets. Some shop keepers would take more gold than needed to pay for items purchased. There was no uniform

system of making change.

The government opened the first mints and began distributing the coins in 1792. By the beginning of the 19th century coins and paper currency were wide spread and our monetary system was here to stay. In 1933 Roosevelt required all banking institutions to turn in all gold coins.

Once all banks turned in this gold the president raised the gold standard from \$20.00 per ounce to \$33.00 per ounce. This was his way of stimulating the economy during the great depression. However gold coins were never redistributed after the recall. Not all gold coins were turned in. Many folks during that time didn't completely trust the government and choose to keep their gold.

These gold coins are sought after collectors today and bring many times the face value. Any gold coins with the mint marks of CC, D or O will bring nice premiums. Collectors at the event will be glad to show you where to look. Other types of coins will also be purchase including foreign coins, Indian head cents, two cent pieces, half dimes, three cent pieces and buffalo nickels to name a

Collectors warn people against trying to clean their coins as significant damage can be done and the coins value lessened.

# Miss Virginia wins 2010 Miss America

LAS VEGAS - Miss Virginia Caressa Cameron won the 2010 Miss America title Saturday night after strutting in a yellow dress, belting Beyonce's "Listen" from "Dreamgirls" and telling kids they should get outside more often.

Cameron, a 22-year-old from Fredericksburg, Va., won a \$50,000 scholarship and the crown in Las Vegas after a pageant that started with 53 contestants. She outlasted her opponents in swimsuit, evening gown, talent and interview competitions.

Cameron is a broadcast journalism student at Virginia Commonwealth University, and wants to become an anchor. Miss California Kristy Cavinder was the first runner-up, winning \$25,000.

The young women who came out on stage at the beginning of the pageant and danced to "I Gotta Feeling" by the Black Eyed Peas are from all 50 states plus the District of Columbia, Virgin Islands and Puerto Rico. After a week of prelimi-

nary competition, they each introduced themselves to the crowd Saturday at the Planet Hollywood Resort & Casino. The judges, the public and contestants themselves then trimmed the field. Actor and "Extra" host

Mario Lopez hosted the 89-

vear-old pageant with help from Clinton Kelly of TLC's "What Not to Wear." The pageant was broadcast live on TLC.

The panel of judges included radio talk show host Rush Limbaugh, actress Vivica Fox, musician Dave Koz, Miss America 2002 Katie Harman, gymnast Shawn Johnson and former "American Idol" finalist Brooke White. Comedian Paul Rodriguez was set to be a judge, but organizers said he pulled out because of a family emergency.

The winner, crowned by reigning Miss America Katie Stam, embarks on a yearlong run with the title to represent the organization and raise awareness for her chosen platform.

Cameron, Cavinder and Miss Michigan Nicole Blaszczyk each won \$2,000 earlier in the week for winning talent competitions among three split fields of contestants. Miss Oregon CC Barber, Miss New York Alyse Zwick and Miss Puerto Rico Mimi Pabon each won \$1,000 in nightly swimsuit competitions.

Miss Oklahoma Taylor Treat won the \$6,000 Quality of Life award, given to the contestant judged to excel most in volunteerism and community service.

Scores based on a week of

preliminary competitions were added to Saturday's swimsuit, talent, evening gown and interview competitions to determine the winner. Each judge ranked their five favorites in order, and their ballots will be used to pick the winner.

In all, the Miss America Organization plans to award \$340,000 in scholarships at the national level. The organization says its national, state and local chapters gave more than \$45 million last year in cash and scholarships.

The pageant was preceded by a one-hour television special on TLC, "Miss America: Behind the Curtain."

The contestants picked 12 women from their own ranks who faced a public vote for a spot among the 15 finalists. Stam, a Seymour, Ind., native, was one of four finalists chosen by viewers last year.

The crowning of a Miss America began in 1921 as a publicity stunt to persuade tourists on Atlantic City's Boardwalk to stick around after Labor Day.

The bathing revue blossomed in the age of television into an American pop icon before fading in later years and losing it place on network TV in 2004. It moved to the Las Vegas Strip in 2006 in an attempt to reinvent itself and has found a home on cable television.



# W.Va. Senate fights drugs

# Task force to combat abuse of prescriptions

CHARLESTON — The state Senate has taken up the fight against prescription drug abuse with a new task force and a package of bills intended to combat the problem.

Nationally, drug poisoning is the second-leading cause of unintentional deaths after automobile

# **State Capitol** accidents, said Sen. Evan Jenkins, D-Cabell, a member of the

task force. He addressed the Senate about the package of bills and the group assembled by Senate President Earl Ray Tomblin.

Fifteen million Americans abuse prescription drugs, Jenkins said, and West Virginia has the highest per capita prescription use in the nation.

"The time to act is now while we have an opportunity to act," he said. Two WVU physicians agree that the problem is dire and action

is needed.

Prescription pain medicines are "becoming the drug of choice for individuals," said Dr. Rick Vaglienti, director of the WVU Hospitals (WVUH) Pain Clinic. "The demand for these drugs for illicit use has gone up.'

callers to doctors and counselors.

And Dr. James Berry, inpatient addiction-services director at WVUH's Chestnut Ridge Hospital, said, "For the last five years, there's been a gigantic problem

with a lot of people overdosing and dying. ... A lot more people are being treated for dependence and abuse."

While a small percentage of patients on opioid pain medications will face addiction and abuse issues, they said, the problem is chiefly "diversion" and "doctor shopping" — illicitly obtaining prescriptions from various doc-

There is also heavy competition for the U.S. House of Representatives seat representing the state's 1st district. Six republicans are trying to unseat incumbent Democrat Alan Mollohan

# File taxes smoothly with tips

While the tax filing deadline is more than three months away, it always seems to be here before you know it. The Internal Revenue Service's (IRS) top 10 tips will help your tax filing process run smoother than ever this year.

1. Start gathering your records. Round up any documents or forms you'll need when filing your taxes: receipts, canceled checks and other documents that support an item of income or a deduction you're taking on your return.

2. Be on the lookout! W-2s and 1099s will be coming soon from your employer you'll need these to file your tax return.

3. Try e-file. When you file electronically, the software will handle the math calculations for you. If you use direct deposit, you will get your refund in about half the time it takes when you file a paper return. E-file is now the way the majority of

returns are filed. In fact, last year, two out of three taxpayers used e-file.

4. Check out Free File. If your income is \$57,000 or less you may be eligible for free tax preparation software and free electronic filing. The IRS partners with 20 tax software companies to create this free service. Free File is for the cost conscious taxpayer who wants reliable question-and-answer software to help them prepare a return. Visit IRS.gov to learn more.

5. Consider other filing options. There are many different options for filing your tax return. You can prepare it yourself or go to a tax preparer. You may be eligible for free face-to-face help at an IRS office or volunteer site. Give yourself time to weigh all the different options and find the one that best suits vour needs.

6. Consider direct deposit. If you elect to have your refund directly deposited into your bank account, you'll receive it faster than

waiting for a paper check.

7. Visit IRS.gov. The official IRS Web site is a great place to find everything you'll need to file your tax return: forms, tips, answers to frequently asked questions and updates on tax law changes.

8. Remember this number: 17. Check out Publication 17, Your Federal Income Tax on IRS.gov. It's a comprehensive collection of information for taxpayers highlighting everything you'll need to know when filing vour return.

9. Review! Review! Review! Don't rush. We all make mistakes when we rush. Mistakes will slow down the processing of your return. Be sure to double check all the Social Security Numbers (SSN) and math calculations on your return as these are the most common errors made by taxpayers.

10. Don't panic! If you run into a problem, remember the IRS is here to help. Try IRS.gov or call our customer service number at 1-800-829-1040.

tors and selling the drugs on the black market.

The incentive to sell the drugs is huge, Jenkins said: 100 10-mg Valium tablets cost \$300, and can be resold at a street value of \$1,000; 100 80mg OxyContin pills cost \$1,100, and can sell for \$8,000.

So far, the task force which also includes Sens. Ron Stollings, Clark Barnes, Larry Edgell, Dan Foster, Roman Prezioso, Robert Plymale and Corey Palumbo has introduced seven bills, and more are expected.

Among the bills on the table:

■ SB 330 codifies the Partnership to Promote Community Well-Being, a group previously created by executive order. Jenkins said senators worked with various stakeholders - including law enforcement, substance abuse counselors, providers, pharmacists, the courts — to formulate the package and then took it to the partnership as the bestequipped agency to coordi-

nate the efforts. ■ SB 361 places the painkiller tramadol (Ultram) on the Schedule IV list of controlled substances along with 49 other depressants and painkillers, and a number of other drugs. Berry said this is a good move because tramadol is potentially addictive.

■ SB 362 amends existing law prohibiting obtaining prescriptions by fraud. It adds providing false information to the code, and increase the fine from \$1,000 to \$2,500 and raises the jail time from six to nine months.

■ SB 364 adds the chief medical examiner to the limited list of officials who can view the Controlled Substances Monitoring Act Database — which collects information from every prescription for a controlled substance.

■ SB 365 requires all pharmacies to grant personnel access to the database. Right now. Jenkins said. some chain pharmacies don't allow this, and it's a necessary tool



to track doctor shopping.

One bill, regarding methadone clinics, was taken off the table Friday because it violates federal law; the senators involved in that decision said it needs more work.

People who've used prescription opioid pain medications in the proper way know that the drugs can relieve pain, but they can also make you sleepy and cause nausea and constipation, among other side effects, doctors said.

And the motivation for the black market sellers is obvious, as Jenkins pointed out — money.

But what's the attraction for users? Vaglienti said that when it's taken in an alternate manner ground up and snorted, for instance — the opiatelike effect is intensified, producing a high.

Ignorance plays a part in the problem, Jenkins said. A study showed that teens believe opioids must be safer than illegal drugs because they're prescribed by a doctor, and they're easy to get from their parents' medicine cabinets.

Vaglienti said the proposed package is a good start. He is concerned that good intentions could go bad, and warns against overregulation. Some states have enacted laws that limit the dosage doctors can prescribe. He disagrees with this decision because every patient is different, and doctors need lat-

itude to decide how much

to prescribe. If legislation is passed, he said, "make sure people who need medicine can get it."

Berry runs the inpatient and outpatient addiction clinics at Chestnut Ridge. He said there are two keys to tackling the problem.

One is education. He travels the state speaking to care providers and the public, to make them aware of the problem.

The other is lack of personnel. More counselors and professionals who can supervise treatment are needed, he said. Chestnut Ridge, for example, is at capacity and has a waiting list.

"Many rural areas have no one to send people to," he said.

Jenkins agrees with that point. "We are woefully inadequate in our ability to provide proper counseling treatment" across the state, he said.

More bills are on the way, he said, and even then the battle has just begun. "This is a start, this is not a finish."

### Area business hosts cook-off

I sat in the tent at Triple S Harley-Davidson for more than an hour. The smell of ground meat, chili powder and tomato sauce was overwhelming.

The excruciating wait was too much.

So, I grabbed my clipboard and began my turn as a judge, at the Triple S Harley-Davidson Chili cook-off Saturday.

My plan was set — eat a small cup of chili and write down my thoughts. Then, use saltines and Sprite to cleanse my

palate. I was going to give each chili a fair chance. But, my objective was to find the best one, to my own tastes and standards.

But, in the back of my mind, there was a voice reinforcing a groupthink ideal. "Don't be the weird one" it told me. "Please God let me pick ones others like."

While I was never going to stray from picking my favorite, I had a new goal: To not be the judge with the weird tastes.

Each chili entree was tomato-based, included some type of ground meat, usually kidney beans and an assortment of spices. But they varied on how much of each ingredient was used and if other elements — like pepperoni, beer or jalapeno peppers were added.

Some had a souplike constancy; others looked like I could have caulked my shower with them. In certain chilis, it was hard to get past the spices.

In others, the spices were so mild they were hard to distinguish.

As a person who is not a big fan of spicy food, I fully expected there to be some recipes that made my eyes water and that others would make my taste buds feel like they were in a campy 1960s "Batman" fight. A Pow...Zap..and even a *Zoink* would be felt.

But, it didn't happen. I was able to stomach all the samples without the need for antacid or to stick my head into a snow drift outside. I was relieved, but also a bit disappointed.

In the end, I decided to give my vote to the chilis I thought most resembled "proper" chili flavor. It should be strong in that chili powder zest, but not overpowering. There should be ample meat, and the sauce should be thick, but not so much that it moves slower than molasses.

With the snow, organizer Tristin Miracle said she was surprised the turnout was so high. Hundreds of people braved the cold and falling flakes for warm chili. She estimated they raised roughly \$1,500 for the Make-A-Wish foundation through the event.

Miracle said this is the third time they have held the event, but it is not an official tradition yet.

But, in the end, the other judges and people in attendance disagreed with my assessment. Victor Williams was named the judges' choice and Ralph Dennis was the people's choice for best chili. Neither received

In the bake-off, Linda Friend was the judges' winner and Elena Dennis earned people's choice.

When I finished my ballot, I was secure in my choices. They were good chilis that represented my opinion of proper taste. Other people had to agree with me, right?

As I handed in my judge sheet, Miracle said the one phrase I didn't want to hear:

"Yours is much different then everyone else's." Ughh — I was the one with the weird tastes.

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

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#### **Celebrating excellence** in our schools

Step Out on Nothing: An Evening with Byron Pitts


Known for his thought-provoking coverage and his commitment to exceptional storytelling, Byron Pitts is the chief national correspondent for CBS Evening News with Katie Couric. Pitts covered the Iraq War and was the lead correspondent for CBS at Ground Zero immediately following the September 11th attacks. A news veteran with over 20 years of experience, he was named a contributing correspondent to 60 Minutes in 2009.

Raised by a single mother in a working class neighborhood in Baltimore, Pitts was illiterate until the age of twelve and had a stutter. Capitalizing on his desire to play football, his mother mandated he receive Bs or above In school in order to play. With that focus, Pitts learned to read and went on to attend Ohio Wesleyan University. With the help of his roommate and a professor, he pursued a career in broadcast journalism—a field that demands excellence in writing and speaking. He graduated in 1982 with a BA in journalism and speech communication.

Pitts tells his story in his memoir Step Out on Nothing: How Family and Faith Helped Me Conquer Life's Challenges. He shares how his faith saw him through many struggles and how a few key people helped him change his life.

Pitts earned a national Emmy for his coverage of the Chicago train wreck of 1999, a National Association of Black Journalists Award, and second national Emmy for his reporting of September 11th. He also received four Associated Press Awards and six regional Emmy Awards. He shares his story of perseverance and strength and inspires audiences to reach for their dreams. Pitts lives with his wife in Upper Montclair, New Jersey.

more accidents Saturday than a typical snowy day, operators said.

Morgantown Police Sergeant Eric Powell said the day crew responded to 19 accidents during their shift and he didn't know how many his officers had responded to since they began.

"We've had a lot of them," Powell said.

A majority of the wrecks were due to slippery conditions on hilly roads, Powell said.

The WVU home basket-

ball game probably contributed to the number of accidents because more people were on the road, Powell said. He also agreed that the number of fender benders Saturday was higher than usual for inclement weather.

A storm that was expected to stay south of the area ticked a little bit to the north, said Tom Green, a meteorologist with the National Weather Service. This left the area with anywhere from a half inch to an inch of snow.

Today's forecast calls for the high to be around 25 degrees, but there should be no precipitation, Green said.

# Study abroad, service learning trip to Bolivia changes writer's perspective

**EDITOR'S NOTE:** This is part one in a two-part series about freelancer Casie Fox's trip to Bolivia in 2009. Next week, Fox will write about the cultural and academic part of her trip.

Even on the plane rides on our way to Cochabamba, I tried to imagine what I was headed for.

I knew by this point that we would be working in a Bolivian orphanage, and I imagined a lot of sad, crying babies lumped together in a room full of cribs.

"I was really excited at first when I found out we were work ing at an orphanage," said Daniel Summers, one of my traveling companions.

He wasn't fully prepared for the emotions that surfaced, either. On the first day several of the older children were jumping on him shouting, "Mi papá, mi papá!"


"I don't even speak Spanish, and I knew what that meant," he said. "It broke my heart."

For me, I could physically feel the longing for special attention coming from some of the children. I expected some of it, but as Cari Carpenter, our English professor and trip leader said, the experience of volunteering in an orphanage complicates simple pity.

Summers, Carpenter and I, along with Matt Clemens, a WVU student, and David Richie, a Duquesne student, traveled to Bolivia for a study-abroad experience — Caitlin Peters traveled solo and joined us for half of the trip.

The purpose was twofold. As an Amizade study-abroad program, it was a service learning trip. One part of our course credit was earned through performing community service, and the other part, in a more academic sense.

When we signed up for this experience, we weren't sure what our service assignment would be, but when I found out that we were going to work in an orphanage, I thought of constantly hungry kids, waiting for someone to come along and fix things, with little hope. I thought

our group would move from crib to crib, changing diapers, giving bottles and rocking the particularly sorrowful ones.

I imagined cribs on the verge of breaking down, thin, unsupportive mattresses, dirty floors, sad, exhausted nurses, weak, skinny kids, likely with a lot of health problems, and maybe a small grass area for outside play.

Some of it was right, and some of it was wrong.

The cribs weren't in excellent condition, but they were certainly better than what I imagined — red and yellow, not gray and each child had his or her own. The mattresses needed work, but they weren't horrible, either.

Twice our group was asked to clean the mattresses, which involved soap, water from a hose, scrub brushes and drying. The process served as an example of

what our physical contributions seemed to be — cyclical stuff

that anyone could have done. Dr. Carpenter said sometimes it felt frustrating to think any group could have done the work

we were doing. "In a lot of ways we had room to make a difference, but at the same time, our hands were tied,"

she said. Summers and Dr. Carpenter both put in a lot of effort cleaning out a room filled with old toys and clothes. After two or three days of steady work, they seemed to feel accomplished in having completed something that could make a lasting difference. They waited and waited, but no one ever came to haul the

old things away. It's just a different world in Bolivia, and that's not to say it's right or it's wrong, but merely that we definitely experienced a difference of cultural expectations in terms of what did and didn't qualify as a job well done.

On the other hand, perhaps it was "just our presence as people" that was the most important thing we could offer, as Dr. Carpenter said.

Certainly, that's what rang most true with me on the trip. I helped bust weeds out of cement, trim palm tree branches and clean garbage off the sidewalks.

Our group, on hands and knees, sanded a wood floor that covered three rooms and a hallway with steel wool, and then put down wax using a mop. Before we could sand it down, we had to chisel away dried urine and feces with a paint scraper.

I felt that these jobs made a difference, but the times I felt I was doing the most was when I was actually spending time with the kids.

Over ice cream one evening at the ever-famous Globos with Dr. Carpenter and our Bolivian program director, Jean Carla Costas, I listened to them discussing how, on average, for every one month a child spends in an orphanage, he or she will be developmentally delayed by two months. I wasn't really participating in the conversation. I was in another world by this time, watching five or six Bolivian children playing on swings, musing over how these children's lives would be different from the lives of the children in the orphanage simply because they had their own families to love and support them.

So, when I was at the orphanage, I dedicated my time indulging whatever whims the children might seem to have for the day. I loved giving myself to them for a few hours each day, to try to provide one-on-one attention for a little bit. Somebody wanted to play on the swing set. Someone needed a little help finishing up breakfast. Someone wanted to be held.

Joselito was my first little amigo. He came up to me the first day and was a ball of energy. He was the first child to challenge my idea that all kids in orphanages are miserable and sorrowful. Minus a few seasonal colds, the kids were generally lively and full of energy — especially the older kids.

The orphanage where we worked, Millennium, houses both orphaned and abandoned children ages newborn to five years. In Bolivia, orphanages are referred to as cradle houses, or casas cunas, even though there is a Spanish translation for orphanage: orfanato. The idea is that these cradle houses are places of nurturing, not of despair.

And, as I played with the children, it wasn't a sense of despair I experienced. The children at Millennium were much like children in the U.S. They laugh. They play. They cry. They fight with each other.

There were some differences, though. I, and most of the group, noticed that children were generally much less unruly than the children we'd interacted with in our own country. Even when the workers weren't present, they sat quietly until given the command to do something else. That's where we came in — to provide extra stimulation while workers were busy matching up a pile of two hundred little socks or hanging bibs to dry.

And, as Dr. Carpenter suggested, maybe it isn't important for the children to remember us individually for our time to have made a difference.

Maybe the real value was in being human beings and showing up.



# Butler bows to no one at working hard

There are people who tell  ${f Bob}$ Huggins it appears one player seems to always evade the wrath of his fury on game days.

There's good reason: It's true. At least the times that we see. "Why would I get mad at **Da'Sean [Butler]**?" the WVU men's basketball coach said Saturday afternoon, after his senior scored a season-high 27 points. "He's the first one in the gym and the last one to leave. He knows everything that's supposed to go on, he studies, and he's very committed to being a good player.

"There's nobody that wants to win more than Da'Sean does. Nobody works harder at it than Da'Sean does."

In a game that featured just about everything — Huggins' first technical of the season, for jabbing too much at the refs; WVU's students decked out in white tuxedo T-shirts to mimic the all-white suit made famous by Louisville coach Rick Pitino; a stretch where the Cards hit 16 of 21 shots to build a 12-point lead, only to see WVU bust out the 1-3-1 defense in time to end the game on an 18-4 run — Butler once again, well, did it.

The senior guard/forward/doit-all player for the Mountaineers made his third game-winning shot this season in the closing seconds to lift No. 9 WVU past the Cardinals, 77-74, at the Coliseum.

Butler took the inbounds play designed for him and hit the game-winner — giving WVU a 75-74 lead with 16.3 seconds left - just as he did against Cleveland State and Marquette.

"I want it a lot," Butler said of demanding the ball in those crucial situations. "I really want the ball, and we knew what the play was going to be."

Then, after a bizarre sequence where Butler appeared to have knocked the ball out of teammate Devin Ebanks' hands and out of bounds, the refs awarded WVU the ball with 6.7 seconds left. Butler was fouled, hit two free throws, and now WVU (17-3, 6-2 Big East) enters Wednesday's Backyard Brawl, against Pitt, on a muchneeded four-game win streak.

In doing all that, Butler played in his 128th career game - tied with J.D. Collins, Kevin Pittsnogle, Joe Herber and Patrick Beilein for second alltime to Darris Nichols' 141 and recorded his 93rd career double-figure scoring game — a school record.

How's he do it all? Depends on whom you ask.

"He has a great point guard like me who gives him the ball and passes it to him all the time when he's open," said WVU redshirt junior guard Joe Mazzulla, who manned the post

at the bottom of the 1-3-1.

"No, he's the same guy who is here an hour before practice. He's there 30-45 minutes after practice, and he goes a million miles per hour during practice," Mazzulla continued. "This is just a reward for him, for how hard he works in the offseason and before and after practice. He works so hard even when he is shooting poorly or things aren't going well for him. His work ethic will get him out of that.

But I was serious about the point guard," he said, smiling.

The Mountaineers keep saying they can't depend on unbelievable game-ending runs to win games, but they keep doing it so well. Not surprisingly, Butler was never alarmed Saturday, even when the Cards took a 70-59 lead with 6:55 remaining, and even when he was setting up to take a last-second shot.

"I am not going to lie, I have pretty much seen every kind of comeback possible in college, and I have been a part of a couple," Butler said. "Unless it's five seconds left and we're down 10 or something, then I know it's going to be a good chance we can come back."

# Pirates owner turned down Lemieux offer to buy team

PITTSBURGH — Pirates owner Bob Nutting declined to listen to separate proposals to buy the team in 2009, including a surprise bid from Pittsburgh Penguins owner Mario Lemieux, officials with knowledge of the talks told The Associated Press.

The officials spoke Saturday on condition of anonymity because the talks were private.

Pittsburgh lawyer Chuck Greenberg, a successful minor-league team owner whose holdings once included a Pirates farm club, made several inquiries about the Pirates before joining Hall of Fame pitcher Nolan Ryan in a successful bid to buy the Texas Rangers. That deal

was completed this past week. The Pittsburgh Post-

Gazette first reported Saturday that Lemieux and Ron Burkle made an unsolicited offer for the Pirates four months ago — one that was substantial and serious, a person with knowledge of the offer told The Associated Press. That offer came after Nutting declined several times to discuss selling to Greenberg, who subsequently turned his attention to the Rangers.

Several years ago, Dallas Mavericks owner Mark Cuban also was told the team wasn't for sale when he sought to buy it.

Nutting gave all the interested parties the same answer: The Pirates aren't for sale, and the discussions went no further.

All of those interested in the Pirates have lengthy

backgrounds in pro sports. Greenberg has been a successful minor-league owner, and his teams included the Pirates' Double-A affiliate in Altoona, Pa., which was partially owned by Lemieux until being sold two years ago.

Lemieux, the Hall of Fame player, bought the Penguins in federal bankruptcy court in 1999 — a year later, he came out of retirement and became pro sports' first owner-player - and has since seen them become one of the NHL's most successful franchises.

Burkle is a California billionaire investor and supermarket operator.

# Serena tops Henin to win 5th Australian Open title

# It's 12th Slam championship for Williams

MELBOURNE, Australia Serena Williams won her second straight Australian Open championship, ending Justine Henin's hopes of a Grand Slam title in her return from retirement with a 6-4, 3-6, 6-2 victory Saturday.

Williams withstood a determined challenge from Henin before securing her fifth Australian Open title overall and 12th Grand Slam singles championship, tying Billie Jean King.

King was at the stadium on Saturday night to take part in a pre-match ceremony to honor the 40-year anniversary of Margaret Court's four Grand Slam tournament wins in 1970. "Billie, we are tied." Williams said. "So I've reached my goal."

Williams' five Australian titles is the most by any woman in the Open Era, since 1968, surpassing the four held by Court, Evonne Goolagong Cawley, Steffi Graf and Monica Seles. Court holds 11 Australian Open titles overall, most coming before 1968.

Henin, who had most of the crowd support at Rod Laver Arena, couldn't match her fellow Belgian Kim Clijsters' feat of winning in her Grand Slam comeback tournament. Clijsters won the 2009 U.S. Open in her return from a two-year retirement after getting married and having a daughter.

Williams won the last four games to clinch the championship in just over two hours, falling on her


back in celebration after match point.

"It was definitely a tough match mentally and physically," Williams said. "We were both out there to prove something, and I think we did at the end of the day."

It was an impressive run by Henin. She lost in the final of the Brisbane International tournament to Clijsters two weeks ago.

The unranked and unseeded Henin then beat four seeded players en route to the Australian Open final, including No. 5 and Olympic gold medalist Elena Dementieva, in the second round.

'It's been a very emotional two weeks for me," said Henin, who put her hand on her heart as she thanked the crowd for support. "I thought it would never happen to me again. I'd like to congratulate Serena. She's a real champion."





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

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there like, 'Oh, my God. This is so boring.'

Kilicli (pronounced kuh-LEETCH-luh) served the suspension because he had played with a professional teammate while playing for a club team in his hometown of Istanbul, Turkey. Saturday's game, against Louisville, was the 20th game he missed.

Playing with a pro in an organized league - foreign or domestic — is a violation of NCAA amateur standing.

It hasn't been easy. As part of the suspension, Kilicli was not permitted to travel with the Mountaineers. He could practice, but could only sit at the end of the bench in street clothes for home games.

When the team first went on the road, Kilicli tried to watch the games on TV, but couldn't finish. He eventually kept watching for updates on the Internet.

"When you're powerless to change anything, it's frustrating," Kilicli said. "You can't do anything, and it's hard to watch the games. I got used to it and it's less frustrating now."

Yet Kilicli isn't interested into getting into a debate of right or wrong, fair or unfair. He doesn't want any part of a conversation about the NCAA rule book.

"People here have tried to explain the rule to me and have talked to me about the rule," Kilicli said. "After a while, I just didn't really care.

"I did not accept any money. It was another person on the team who took money. I only wanted to play basketball. I had no idea at the time there was such a rule. Now it's over. so I can just go back to playing basketball. That's all I need to know.'

#### From Turkey, with love

Once, when Kilicli was 11 years old, he was hanging out with some friends in Istanbul when a man went running past them. Seconds later, another man with a pistol in his hand was in chase.

Not giving it a second thought, the boys went back to hanging out.

'That stuff did not happen every day," Kilicli said. "But it did happen."

It does give some idea of the vast differences between where Kilicli came

from and where he is today.

"People in my country are very aggressive," Kilicli said. "It is much different over here. I love the people here. People have made me feel very comfortable. They have made me feel at home here."

Kilicli's love for basketball began at a young age, and he also dabbled a bit with soccer.

"Soccer is the big sport where I come from," Kilicli said. "People love soccer. The fans go crazy for soccer, and sometimes there may be fights in the crowd. Sometimes that happens during the basketball games too, but not so much."

In 2008, playing with the Turkish junior national team, Kilicli averaged 11.1 points and 5.8 rebounds during the European Championships.

His play impressed some American scouts, and he was invited to play in an adidas camp in Dallas that summer. That was his first trip to the United States.

Following the camp, he went home with some small mid-major scholarship offers and a decision to make.



to leave."

basketball," Kilicli said. "My father told me to follow my dream and that was it."

Well, not exactly.

"My mother was a little sad. She didn't want to see her son leave and go so far away," he said.

#### Heading for the U.S.

Rob Fulford, now the head coach at Huntington Prep, was Kilicli's head coach at Mountain State Academy (MSA), in Beckley, this past season.

"I didn't see him in Dallas, but I had heard some good things," Fulford explained. "I had some film sent to me. The funny thing is, the film they sent me was him only shooting 3-pointers.

"I wasn't sure at first, because we had had a big 7foot German kid the year before who only wanted to shoot 3-pointers. I didn't know if I wanted to do that again. That shows you how smart I am."

Kilicli's return flight to the United States went from Turkey to Chicago and then to Charleston, and then he drove from Charleston to Beckley.

"It was like 20 hours," said Kilicli, who taught himself to speak English by watching American TV. "I went straight to the gym and I practiced and after, [Fulford] was like, 'OK, I'm giving you a scholarship. Here's your dorm.''

Until that point, he knew very little about col-

lege basketball in the U.S. "I just knew North Carolina because of [Michael] Jordan," Kilicli said.

He soon got to know Bob Huggins.

"I knew Cincinnati because I'd seen Kenyon Martin stuff and I knew he was the first [NBA] draft pick," Kilicli said.

"They showed me Huggins, too, and Huggins came to see me the first time, but what they showed me was from 2001 or something. He was younger and skinnier."

# The Turk doesn't talk

WVU point guard Joe Mazzulla gets on Kilicli in practice every time he doesn't call out a screen, usually because it's Mazzulla who ends up on the floor.

"The Turk doesn't like to talk much on defense,"

Mazzulla said. Still, a smile comes to Mazzulla's face when asked about Kilicli, who is simply known as "The

Turk" to his teammates. In his days at MSA, he was "Uncle Deniz."

"That's because he looks so old," Fulford said. "I kept telling him when he first got to college, I was going to find out how old he really was."

No matter where he goes, it seems, people just fall in love with Kilicli.

"I asked him one time if he was going to leave the dorms after his freshman year," WVU Director of Basketball Operations Jerrod Calhoun said. "He said

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he loved the dorms so

much he was never going

"The people love me in the dorms and I love it there," Kilicli said. "I've become the big 6-foot-9 guy walking down the halls. People look up to me and always talk to me."

And what's not to like? "He plays guitar and he sings," Fulford said. "He's a very mature kid, but he is also a very fun-loving kid. He was always fine. He would always stop and talk to the vounger kids at our school and he would sign autographs and things like that.'

#### He's ready to play

Not long after Kilicli enrolled at MSA, the NCAA sent a questionnaire to the school.

"I helped him through it," Fulford said. "It was four questions, but then they sent, like, seven or eight more with the same four questions asked a different way. I knew they were fishing for something.'

Kilicli said he didn't know of any rule violations until he had already enrolled at WVU. The NCAA can't launch a full investigation until a player enrolls in a university.

"To me, it's just unfortunate," Fulford said. "It's not his fault a player from the A team isn't good enough to stay on the A team, so they send him down to the B team. That's all that hapnened and then that player is getting reimbursed for travel expenses. It's just unfortunate."

As a policy, the NCAA does not comment on suspensions.

That's all behind Kilicli now, and he's all set to make his debut against the Panthers.

"I'm a big guy. I can push people around and do whatever I can," he said. "I'm not going to say, 'Offensively I'm this and defensively I can do that and I'll block a bunch of shots.' I'm not that kind of guy. I don't like to talk about myself. I like to let it happen and see how I play."

Fulford has an idea of what will happen.

"I guarantee someone from Pitt is going to get a hard foul," Fulford said. "He's been sitting around for three months just thinking about this first game. Someone is going to get fouled pretty hard early."

Cardinals countered to take the lead. There was a technical foul called on Huggins — his first of the season – a record-setting layup by Butler and 12 3-pointers all in the first half.

It would get better.

The Mountaineers scored on their first five possessions, but the Cardinals punched right back with a 16-10 run over seven minutes and then a 12-5 run to finish the first half with a 44-40 lead.

In the process, Louisville went 7-of-9 from 3-point range and shot an amazing 61 percent (17-of-28) from the floor.

Louisville "shot the 3 well," WVU point guard Truck Bryant said. "They were 7-of-9 from 3 in the first half. They only missed two. That was tough."

It was also forced the Mountaineers to try a number of defenses to slow the Cardinals.

"We went matchup on two possessions in the first half and they shredded it," WVU guard Joe Mazzulla said. "They have so much size that we couldn't really switch on their screens."

"We played a lot of manto-man and played a little of our matchup zone," Ebanks added. "It didn't work as well as we hoped."

None of it seemed to work. Louisville finished the first half by connecting on 11 of its final 15 shots, then opened the second half by hitting five of its first six.

A 3-pointer by Peyton Siva gave the Cardinals a 63-51 lead with 10:50 left in the game.

That set up a wild WVU comeback featuring a string of big shots from Kevin Jones, who scored 10 of his 16 points in the final 10:40, a controversial look at instant replay by the referees, Ebanks' rebound, and then the switch to the 1-3-1 defense.


That last one came with five minutes left, after Mazzulla missed two free throws with the Cardinals leading, 70-62.

"We were running out this season. defenses to play." Huggins said. "We had decent success with the point drop, and then we went to the 1-3-1, but it wasn't a conventional 1-3-1. We had changed it in practice the other day."

"That was a crucial decision," said Butler, who set a school record by recording his 93rd career double-digit scoring game with a gamehigh 27 points, passing Chris Brooks. "If we had run it earlier, they would have had time to make adjustments. That was a crucial point of the game and it was a great decision. I'm happy we went to it."

The minute the Mountaineers switched to the unconventional defense, the Cardinals were stuck. In those final five minutes, Louisville was just 1-of-8 from the floor and 0-of-5 from 3-point range, and turned over the ball twice.

"Toward the end, we didn't do a tremendous job at executing against the 1-3-1," Louisville associate head

coach Ralph Willard said. "We didn't get the shots that we were looking for."

An and-one 3-point play by Jones tied the game at 70, then an and-one 3-point play by Ebanks gave WVU a 73-72 lead with two minutes remaining.

Ebanks came up big again moments later. After Jerry Smith connected on two free throws to give Louisville a 74-73 lead, Ebanks hauled in Wellington Smith's misfire with 42 seconds to play, giving the Mountaineers an extra possession.

"It was huge, absolutely huge," Huggins said.

"Devin was everywhere," Butler said. "Every time we had a chance for a second chance, it was either Devin, Kevin or Wellington. Even in the first half, I shot this one crazy 3, and Devin came out of nowhere to get the rebound. Devin was everywhere."

The Mountaineers made the extra possession count when Butler hauled in an inbounds pass from Mazzulla and canned a 10-foot jump shot with 19 seconds remaining for a 75-74 lead. Butler also hit game-winning shots against Cleveland State and Marquette

"Da'Sean has been unbelievable," Huggins said. "I wish he wouldn't wait to the end."

A controversial out-ofbounds call highlighted the final seconds. Louisville's Reginald Delk missed a 3point attempt and Ebanks appeared to have the rebound before the ball was smacked out of bounds.

Referees huddled and then spent two minutes watching instant replay before awarding the ball to the Mountaineers. (NCAA rules say instant replay may not be used to decide plays like this.) For a while, Butler thought he was the last one to touch the ball.

"That was crucial they had the replay, because I thought I had smacked it out of Devin's hands," said Butler, who was fouled on the ensuing play and made two free throws for the final score. "I didn't know if it had gone out on either me or Devin. I thought one of us had touched it. I didn't know what happened after that. Apparently it hit someone else on the way out, so thank you."



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

# WVU's Clara Grandt earns McCoy Award

# Writers name her state's top female athlete

During her high school career, Doddridge County's Clara Grandt built up



an outstanding resume - a fourtime Class AA-

A allstate cross country per-**Grandt** former and so many individual

track titles it would take too long to list. Despite all the success, there was one question looming in the runner's mind: Could she compete

on the big stage — NCAA Division I? WVU head women's track coach Sean Cleary believed she could and offered her a full ride to become part of the Mountaineers' cross country

and track and field squads. It's a decision the veteran coach will never regret.

"I have to admit, there were doubts," Grandt explained. "But, I really wanted to give it a shot and I'm very happy with the way things have turned out."

They've turned out fine.

A 2009 campaign which saw her earn All-America honors at the NCAA cross country nationals and lead the Mountaineers to a sixth-place team effort were impressive enough feats to earn selection by the West Virginia Sports Writers Association as its McCoy Female Athlete of

the Year Award winner. Winning the award "means a lot," said Grandt. "It's a West Virginia award and I've always tried to represent the state well.

"I'm a West Virginian and everybody knows that."

Beginning with an eighth-place effort at the **USA Cross Country** Nationals (8K), she's rolled up accomplishment after accomplishment for the past year.

She went on to lead the USA team to the championship at the (North America/Central American and Caribbean cross country championship winning the 6K race. Later, she set a school record of 16 minutes, 21 seconds in the indoor 5K and finished third overall at the Big East indoor track championships in the 5K run.

During the outdoor season, Grandt ran a personal best 33:16 in the 10K at the Stanford Invitational, then won the 5K title at the Big East meet, in 16:07.

She was the Mid-Atlantic Region Track Athlete of the Year for 2009.

Grandt was far from finished, however.

A fourth place (All-America) finish at the NCAA outdoor nationals earned her a spot in the USA nationals for the 10K.

She closed out the year by placing fifth at the Big East cross country championships, then leading the old gold and blue to a runner-up finish and placed eighth as the Mountaineers took third place at the East Regional championships.

"I was somewhat surprised by how well I've done, but not surprised," Grandt said. "I've always been goal driven and coming to WVU allowed me to run with girls who I knew would make me a better runner.'

One of those who helped in that improvement was former North Marion High standout Keri Bland, who finished second in the voting for the McCoy Award.

'Earning All-America honors was what I really wanted, but to see our team improve like it has since I've been here is awesome," Grandt said.

Placing third was Hurricane High's Alex Dent, followed by Taylor Brown, of Jefferson High, and Jennifer McFarland, of St. Marys High.

# WVU's Rooney is still growing as a wrestler

# 197-pounder is late to the sport but coming on

The first time WVU wrestling coach Craig Turnbull eyeballed Kyle Rooney,

istered on

Turnbull's radar after joining the Mountaineers as a walk-on from Division III Heidelberg (Ohio) College, in 2008. "He wasn't very fluid or highly skilled," Turnbull

said. Turnbull devoted little attention to Rooney until assistant coach Greg Jones approached him with a startling revelation after the conclusion of the 197-pound weight class in the West Vir-

ginia Open. "Rooney won the tournament," Jones said.

Turnbull was dumb-

"Rooney?" he asked, glancing at the bracket.

Jones nodded. "Wow!" Turnbull said.

"Rooney won the tournament!" Turnbull began paying more attention to him. Rooney wrestled his way into the lineup in the early part of this past season, going 3-3 in his first taste of Division I wrestling.

He's earned the starting nod at 197 pounds this season. Rooney and his Mountaineers (1-7, 1-1 EWL) return to the mat at 1 p.m. today, hosting Eastern Wrestling League rival Lock Haven, at the Coliseum.

Rooney (6-10) broke a twomatch losing streak Jan. 22, earning a 3-1 victory against Clarion's Brian Shaw with a takedown in the final 15 seconds. His win and heavyweight Brandon Williamson's pin brought WVU its first win of the season.

"I've lost a couple of matches this year by one or two points," Rooney said. "To finally get a close match like that was nice. For the team, that just brings new energy to the room and motivation and excitement."

Rooney becomes more certain of his ability to compete each time he steps onto the mat. He didn't know quite what to expect a year ago when he unexpectedly cracked the starting lineup.

"I kind of went out there with a nonchalant attitude that actually might have helped me last year," Rooney said. "At the beginning of this year, I wrestled a little bit nervous.

"As I've gotten more matches under my belt, I've calmed down a little bit and have been able to keep my head level. As I've gone on, I've gained confidence and awareness of the match and stuff like that."

Rooney didn't take up the sport until he was 11, five or six years later than most of WVU's wrestlers. His teammates are more advanced in their technique and knowledge of the sport.

Rooney is closing the gap, although progress is not always as fast as he and Turnbull would prefer. Turnbull often finds himself on the edge of the mat, shouting instructions at Rooney dur-

ing practices and matches. Rooney's teammates

sometimes call him "Rooney Tunes.'

"We joke that he does it in his own Rooney way," Turnbull said. "He's become more skilled. He's starting to do some things that look right to me, and it's really a cred-

"He's becoming more confident. He'll stay after practice and put extra work in. You can see his whole demeanor rising up. He sees he's just off a little bit in a few different areas and he has four-five losses turned around into wins. It's a rewarding thing as a teacher or coach when you see the light bulb start to turn on for someone."

Rooney wasn't sure he could succeed at the Division I level coming out of Anderson High in Cincinnati. He enrolled at Heidelberg for his freshman year, going 22-12 on a good team.


Still, he couldn't shake the idea of wrestling at a Division I school. Rooney jumped at the opportunity to walk on at WVU and pursue a major in human nutrition and foods.

"I probably could have gone to a Division I school right off the bat, but I didn't believe I'd be able to compete," he said. "I thought, 'Let's try it for a year. If it works out, I'll stick with it. If not, at least I tried.' I'm happy with the decision I made."

Rooney is eager to see how far he can raise his game in the final month of the regular season.

"My record doesn't really show it right now, but I've improved over the year," he said. "I feel I can wrestle with anybody in the league right now. That's what I'm pushing for. I'm working as hard as I ever have this year, just trying to see what I can do at the league tournament and hopefully make it to nationals.'

For The Dominion Post Trinity's girls' basketball team made a valiant comeback against Valley High on Saturday, but fell short in the end, losing, 42-41.

The Warriors (12-3) found themselves down by just three points with less than 10 seconds remaining, but were unable to hit a 3-pointer to tie the game.

At halftime, Valley led, 28-16, and it appeared as if Trinity wouldn't get its offense into gear anytime soon. Valley held Trinity to nine points in the first quarter and seven in the second.

However, Trinity shot out of the halftime break with a 9-0 run, which cut the Valley lead to a manageable three points. As the third quarter finished, Trinity held a 34-32 lead. The Warriors held Valley to four points in the quarter while scoring 18.

With 8.6 seconds remaining and his team still down by three, Trinity coach Cary Woods drew up a play to set up a 3-pointer. A player got open to take the shot, but it fell well short. A teammate grabbed the ball and put it in for two points, but the clock expired as she did.

It was a tough way to go down after coming all the way back.

"We did an excellent job of battling back" in the second half, Woods said. "When we had an opportunity to get back over the top, we reverted back to our old habits."

Woods listed not taking care of the ball on offense, and not having any player stepping up to take a big shot. He added that the team wouldn't have been in this situation if it had played better in the first half.

"We didn't show up in the first half. We didn't do the things we're coached to do," Woods said.

'We got some fire under us and made some crucial shots," Trinity's Hayden Giuliani said of the rally. "Those had a snowball effect for us."

The Mountaineers needed House's perimeter punch to offset Louisville's strong frontcourt play. Cardinals forward Monique Reid tormented the Mountaineers all night, pouring in a careerhigh 29 points and pulling down eight rebounds.

Louisville (11-10, 3-5) also got eight points and nine rebounds from center Ashley Rainey. The Cardinals tallied 32 points in the paint and 17 second-chance points.

Carey was dismayed that his team did not match Louisville's physicality.

"We knew their [frontcourt] was going to be physical," Carey said. "I'm a little disappointed in our weakside help and letting them drive to the rim. Give Louisville a lot of credit. They play hard. They were going to come in here and play aggressive."

"I've been in this business for a long time, and I've never seen somebody actually have the ball to shoot a technical free throw and they were doing a pyramid. I can't comment on the officiating. The cheerleaders did a really nice pyramid. The dismounts were fantastic. The officials may have given them a 9 or 10."

Guard Becky Burke teamed with Reid to help keep the Cardinals in the game. Burke finished with 17 points and made three 3-pointers. Burke took the ball to the basket too many times for Carey's taste.

The Mountaineers face an even greater defensive challenge Tuesday, when they battle top-ranked and unbeaten Connecticut, in Hartford.

"No matter what happens, it's one game," Carey said. "It's not the season."

Keeping all your tax documents in one location will be handy. Place all these documents into a single folder as they arrive in the mail. But you'll also want to know if you have everything you need. Get a piece of paper and jot down all the types of income you have: wages, dividends, interest and so forth. Also jot down all the tax deductions you might have: charity, mortgage interest, college tuition, moving expenses and so forth. Remember to include various tax payments you've made. This would include federal withholding from your paystubs, state tax withholding, and any estimated payments you've made. Again, for the most current tax laws consult the tax professionals listed on this page.

# Hoyas drub Duke, 89-77

Obama, Biden watch victory by Georgetown

WASHINGTON-ChrisWright and Georgetown put on a show for the commander in chief.

With President Barack Obama and Vice President Joe Biden seated in the front row, the No. 7 Hoyas literally stole the game from No. 8 Duke, forcing five turnovers in a two-minute, first-half spurt on the way to an 89-77 victory Saturday.

It couldn't have been a much bigger day for Georgetown: the president attending his first Hoyas game, the first sellout of the season in the 20,000-seat Verizon Center, a crowd mostly sporting "We Are Georgetown" Tshirts in a school-sponsored "gray out," the 200th win for coach John Thompson III, the launch of an initiative for Darfur schools, and, of course, a dominant program from the Atlantic Coast Conference in the building.

Wright seemed pumped

for it all, scoring 21 points on 8-for-9 shooting and making two defensive plays that helped ignite an 18-3 run and gave the Hoyas the lead for good in the first half. Greg Monroe also scored 21, and Austin Freeman added 20 points for Georgetown (16-4), which shot 77 percent in the first half and 72 percent for the game.

Nolan Smith scored 19 points, Kyle Singler had 18 before fouling out with 2:10 to play, and Jon Scheyer added 17 for the Blue Devils (17-4), who shot 37 percent.

Duke committed 15 turnovers — one fewer than Georgetown — but they came in bunches in a rare series of breakdowns from coach Mike Krzyzewski's team.

The kev first-half sequence began when Wright blocked Smith from behind on an outside jump shot, then seconds later stole the ball from Smith under the basket. Then came turnovers by Miles Plumlee and Smith and two by Scheyer, including a charging call. Jerrelle Benimon and Hollis Thompson each got a steal during the run, a needed boost from the thin Georgetown bench.

By the time it was over, Duke had gone nearly four minutes without a field goal, and Georgetown led, 34-20.

#### (4) Syracuse 59 **DePaul 57**

ROSEMONT, Ill. — Wes Johnson scored 16 points and grabbed 13 rebounds, and Syracuse (21-1, 8-1) rallied from 18 down to beat DePaul (8-13, 1-8) for its eighth straight win.

The Orange scored 16 straight to cut their deficit to two late in the first half, then took the lead with a 16-2 run in the second, escaping with a victory when DePaul's Will Walker missed a 3-pointer in the closing seconds.

HARTFORD, — Jimmy Butler's driving shot with 2.4 seconds left gave Marquette (13-8, 4-5) a win against Connecticut (13-8, 3-5).

Butler finished with 21 points and Lazar Hayward scored 20 for the Golden Eagles, who won their first road game of the season.

Darius Johnson-Odom added 15 for Marquette, which leads the nation in 3-point shooting and hit 9 of 24 shots from behind the arc against reeling UConn.

# Possums are nothing to play around with

A COUPLE WEEKS AGO, my wife was complaining that something was eating the cats' food out in the shed where she feeds them, and there were some strange-looking droppings next to there.

I told her it had to be a possum.

Sure enough, a few days later, **Stretch**, our Jack Russell, started barking and wanted out. He cornered a possum under the propane tank in the yard. That possum must have been a faster one than I've ever seen because it got away and up a tree. After barking at it for about an hour, Stretch decided to come back in.

The next weekend. I baited a Havahart trap and put it next to the shed. Haven't caught the possum yet, but haven't seen any more signs of it either. Maybe it decided that being around Stretch

was not a good place to be. Possums are another animal that often lives in town and can cause problems. When they live in or near inhabited buildings, they will cause a big "stink" with their smelly nesting habits coupled with the foul-smelling discharge from their anal glands. They are also destructive, especially to window screens. They can injure pets when they get in a fight over the pets' food, in addition to exposing them to diseases.

Possums are carriers of many diseases, none of them good: tuberculosis. herpes virus, salmonella, toxoplasmosis and yellow fever, among others. They also are reservoirs for leptospirosis, or hemorrhagic jaundice, in wildlife and humans. They also carry fleas, ticks, mites and lice

also carriers of disease. Possums "come to town" because of the easy access to food, shelter and water. If you make these unavailable to them, they will not come around, or they will leave. Keep the garbage can lids on tight, cut tree limbs back to at least 10 feet from the roof, and put heavy screen over any places that they may get into to nest.

Possums will eat just about anything. They are omnivorous scavengers.

They'll eat rodents, snakes, bird eggs, insects, snails, fruit, corn and other vegetables.

The possum has been around since the dinosaurs. They are also North America's only marsupial. This means they carry their young in a pouch. The gestation period is only 12 to 14 days. When the young are born, they must find their way into the marsupium, or pouch, and attach themselves to one of as many as 13 teats the mother has. Many of the young don't

make it to a teat and die. The young are weaned anywhere from 70 to 125 days depending upon when they detach from the teat. The mother will have two litters per year. They also have a relatively short lifespan of two to four years.

People may not know there are possums around unless they see them at night because they are nocturnal. They are great at hiding during the day.

One myth that has been around for years about the possum is that it will hang from a limb by its tail. This isn't true. They have prehensile tails that they use to stabilize themselves when

climbing or sitting up in a high place, but not to hang with.

One fact that many people may not be aware of is that the possum has 50 teeth. This is more than any other North American mammal.

No discussion of possums would be complete without covering the term "playing possum." When a possum is threatened, it will first hiss and show its teeth in order to scare the attacker. If the attacker doesn't leave, the possum will "play possum." It will curl up in a coma-like state and appear to be dead.

This is not a voluntary act. It's an involuntary physiological response. The lips are drawn back showing the teeth and saliva foams around the mouth. Also, a foulsmelling fluid is secreted from the anal glands.

It will remain in this state for several minutes up to several hours. It can be prodded, picked up and carried away and will not wake up. When the danger is gone, it will wake up and leave.

If you are having problems with possums, seal up where they stay and take away the food supply and water, and they will go away. If, for some reason, this doesn't work, we have professionals in the area who will come and trap them for you.

# Disease still hurting bats in the Northeast

In March 2008, I wrote a column about White Nose Syndrome affecting bats in caves all over the Northeast.

In fact, bats started dying in caves in New York in the winter of 2006. By the winter of 2007, bats were dying by the thousands, but no one knew why. A white fungus was found on the face of the bats, hence the name White Nose Syndrome. Most assumed the fungus was the key to the problem, but

no link could be proved. Warnings went out to cavers, asking them to be very cautious about entering caves because it was believed that they might transfer the disease to overwintering bats in other caves Even with lots of precautions and very little caving activity, bats still died

and the disease spread. Today, it is believed that at least 700,000 bats have died in the Northeast, perhaps as many as 1 million. It is a huge loss and may

take a century to replace. West Virginia has not been immune to the disease. In February 2009, White Nose Syndrome was found on bats in several Pendleton County caves.

Researchers everywhere have been looking for the cause, and an answer needs to be found soon because, in many caves, more than 90 percent of all overwintering bats have died. In New York caves, the little brown bat is down by 93 percent. Because this species makes up 85 percent of all hibernating bats in the Northeast, that is a lot of lost bats.

Other bat species have also been hit hard. The eastern pipistrelle bat, the big brown bat, the northern long-eared bat, the smallfooted bat — are all down by huge numbers. The Indiana bat is an endangered species and in New York, it is down 53 percent.

Clearly, if a way to stop this disease is not found, we could easily see the demise of these five species.

In recent months, researchers have found a new fungus in the soils of caves and abandoned mines. Geomyces destructans does well in cold environments. It apparently causes "epidermal erosions and ulcers that can also

progress to invade underlying connective tissue. Apparently, it rouses the hibernating bat, and once this happens the bat uses all the fat it needs to hibernate through the winter.

There is no proof this fungus is the culprit, but it sure looks that way.

Research continues on a fast track, looking for a mechanism for transmission. Because bats hibernate in colonies, the disease spreads rapidly within a cave. Almost certainly those bats also spread it from cave to cave, because from one cave in New York in 2006 it has spread to many caves in

a number of states. And because the fungus is found on the floor of caves, cavers passing through could, indeed, spread it to other caves and bats in those caves. Speculation is that cavers don't need to be in the caves when bats are there to spread the disease because the fungus persists year-round.

Researchers have noticed that bats which hibernate in warmer, wetter roosting spots are hit the hardest. The rare Indiana bat tends to roost in drier areas with lower humidity, and this may explain why its numbers are down by 53 percent, rather than 90 percent or more. However, in two New York mines, Indiana bats dropped by 97 percent in one and only 29 percent in another, with no known reason for the difference.

Cave surveys continue in two dozen states. Researchers are also looking for compounds that can kill the fungus. At one site in Pennsylvania, they are placing a substance in a dish below clustering bats to see if the vapors will kill the fungus on the bats. They are studying the ways the disease may be transmitted and potential control measures. They are looking at potential links between the disease and environmental contaminants.

In Pennsylvania and Kentucky, scientists are looking at caves where all bats died to see if the new bats that come in get the disease.

In New York, biologists have set up video cameras in a mine where the disease has killed thousands of bats to look for aberrant behavior in hibernating bats — excessive grooming, long periods of activity or winter flight, etc.

Excessive winter movements would cause bats to lose fat reserves and starve during hibernation.

Pennsylvania caves and mines house more than a million bats each winter. Most of the 5.000 abandoned mines and 1,500 caves have not been checked, simply because of a lack of manpower, but many hold hibernating bats.

I'm not sure how many mines and caves we have in West Virginia, but it is a lot, with hundreds of thousands of bats. Because of the rapid spread of this disease, it is only a matter of time until many more caves and abandoned mines get it, and when this happens, more than 90 percent (and many times more than 97 percent) of all bats there will die.

Here is the repercussion of this loss: Let's assume we have 500,000 bats in West Virginia (Pennsylvania has 1 million). Each bat eats 2,000 insects (mainly mosquitos) per night for seven months a year. Do the math. Each bat eats 56,000 mosquitos per month — 392,000 for seven months.


Now multiply that by 500,000.

Bats have an extraordinary place in our ecosystem. The loss of bats to this disease to date could take decades to replace, even if no further bats die. This is because each female bat has only one pup per year. Indeed, bats have a very low reproductive rate.

Rarely have we ever observed this rapid a loss of animal species. Hopefully, bat biologists will find an answer, and soon.

# No longer pedestrian

Issue of sidewalk fee fires up audience on a cold night

**SEE THE LINK** to the Walkway, Walkway Lighting and Traffic Calming proposal at dominionpost.com.

It didn't seem possible to break ground on anything Thursday night.

It was frozen — solid as concrete. Despite the temperature outside, more than a 110 Morgantown residents huddled in South Middle School, did just that.

At a public forum, sponsored by our newspaper, members of the city's Pedestrian Safety Board and Mayor Bill Byrne, presented the Walkway, Walkway Lighting and Traffic Calming fee plan to the public.

The groundbreaking we refer to was not only embodied in this comprehensive proposal, but by the response to it by those in the audience.

And judging by the scores of questions about this proposal and the reaction by the board and city leaders, this still should be considered a work in progress. One worth walking the walk for in the future.

We think it's important to thank the members of the Pedestrian Safety Board for their months of work on this proposal. They are to be applauded for their efforts, all volunteer, and true to their purpose.

But just as important, we also think the audience deserves an ovation.

Not only did they feel strongly enough about this issue to brave the cold and spend three hours questioning this proposal — in what was scheduled to only last half as long — they offered the kind of constructive criticism that no study could provide.

By and large, the audience was not opposed to pedestrian infrastructure improvements. However, they objected to the \$1 per foot of property frontage fee and how it would be imposed — among a list of other issues.

Our newspaper plans to host another forum in the next four to eight weeks on this proposal. At that time, we would hope the city and the board are better prepared to answer some of the questions that were raised last week.

We would hope by then to see:
■ Alternative funding ideas have


- Alternative funding ideas have been considered, including a flat fee per lot, or perhaps doubling the city's present \$100,000 line item it now dedicates in its budget for sidewalks.
- A not so aggressive and costly approach to pedestrian infrastructure. Instead of 147 projects over a 30-year timetable, why not 25 projects in the next five years, for instance.
- Some kind of initiative for enforcement or revisions of the current sidewalk ordinances, which would assure residents that this is not a waste.
- More details about how these funds will be administered.


We could continue, but we'll await the developments on this proposal at the next forum before warming up to any further decisions.

# Legislature must make at-risk kids a priority

As the Legislature begins its work, I would like to call attention to some issues that must be addressed.

Every day children are being abused and neglected. Regrettably, we are not providing the resources necessary to ensure that our Child Protective Services (CPS) workers do their job effectively.

These workers are underpaid, understaffed and can be expected to work in extreme and dangerous conditions. We are quick to criticize them when we feel they've not done their job, but we are not quick to remedy problems at hand.

Vacancies in these positions exist across the state. We must employ more CPS workers. We must raise the salaries of CPS workers so that they do not leave their employment at the first opportunity. We must pay them a salary commensurate with their respon-

sibilities and educational attainment (the law requires that they have a college degree and a social workers license).

Perhaps we could change the degree requirements to make applicants who hold degrees in related matters eligible to fill these positions.

A second gross inequity in how the child welfare system is administered is the fact that kinship (relative) foster care is totally uncompensated. This is not right.

Does it make any sense that we would ask a family of five to foster parent nieces or nephews who have been removed from their parents' home and offer them no financial assistance in doing so, but we would place those same children with total strangers and give them remuneration to assist in the care of these children? Talk about unfair.

Children will have a better opportunity to thrive if placed with familiar and safe relatives and we may be able

to expand our desperately needed foster-family base.

Not every county in West Virginia is covered by a CASA (Court Appointed Special Advocate) program, made up of unpaid volunteers, and these programs are proven winners in assisting children in achieving a safe and permanent home. We need to encourage and fund these programs. CASA, with its use of volunteers, helps to decrease the workload of CPS workers.

It is time the governor and legislators of our state put atrisk children at the top of the list, and I call upon the health and human services committees of both the House of Delegates and Senate to place these items on their immediate agenda. I also ask the public to help hold them accountable to the children in our state who have no voice.

# Another obligation of our government must be health care

In response to a recent letter to the editor (DP-Jan. 17), headlined, "There's no true right to receive health care," I would like to take a different approach to the obligations of our government in the 21st century.

Two documents written by our Founding Fathers during the late 18th century have helped to define the goals of our government for more than 200 years: The Declaration of Independence and our Constitution. Although the Founding Fathers did not debate whether or not to reform their health care system (which at the time was elementary), they did provide guidance for policy today.

For example, in the Declaration of Independence, they wrote that humans have certain "unalienable Rights ... Life, Liberty, and the pursuit of Happiness. ... The Preamble to our Constitution also outlines what the Founding Fathers thought our government's purposes were: "We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defense, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain


and establish this Constitution for the United States of America." Surely the health of our people, central to their quality of life, is not inconsistent with the intentions of the Founding Fathers to promote the "general Welfare."

And, in fact, we see that our government has done much to achieve the purposes our Founding Fathers outlined. Especially during the late 19th and 20th centuries, the federal government found it necessary to pass numerous laws to achieve the lofty goals of a democracy especially, though not only, to "promote the general Welfare."

We found it necessary through Social Security legislation to protect the elderly from dire poverty after they could no longer work, at a time when the traditional extended family found it more difficult, or impossible, to support their parents in industrialized, urban America than it had been in agricultural, rural America.

We found it necessary to pass child labor laws to protect the young from exploitation in the developing industrial economy. Labor unions were given legal protection

# The Bible gets taken to school

**FIGHTS OVER THE GOOD BOOK** in public schools have a long and ignoble history in the United States — from 19th century Bible Wars (when riots broke out over whose version of the Bible would be read in the morning) to current conflicts over Bible electives.

Now three-in-one-month legal developments in Ohio, Tennessee and Pennsylvania add fuel to the fiery rhetoric from all sides about when the Bible should come through the schoolhouse door.

This month, in Mt. Vernon, Ohio, a small town with more than 30 churches, school officials finally wrapped up a yearlong pretermination hearing involving science teacher John Freshwater. A verdict is not expected for several months.

According to *The New York Times*, Freshwater is accused of invoking the Bible to teach science, posting the Ten Commandments and Scripture verses on his classroom wall, and otherwise using his position to proselytize kids.

The most bizarre charge, one Freshwater vehemently denies, comes from two students who say the teacher burned a cross onto their arms. According to Freshwater, he was merely putting a temporary X on the skin with a device called a Tesla coil during a science demonstration — something he says he has done hundreds of times over the years.

After months of debates and hearings (which cost the school district more than a half million dollars), the town is divided between those who think Freshwater crossed the First Amendment line by pushing his faith in the classroom and those who are convinced he has done nothing wrong.

In siding with the school, the majority of a divided panel of the 3rd U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals did what courts often do when young schoolchildren are involved: They deferred to school officials' judgment about where to draw the line on religious expression in the classroom. "Parents of public school kindergarten students," said the "may reasonably majority, expect their children will not become captive audiences to an adult's reading of religious

Meanwhile, in Pennsylvania, Donna Kay Busch lost a fouryear legal battle against school officials who barred her from reading the Bible in her son's kindergarten class. On Jan. 19, the U.S. Supreme Court refused to hear Busch's appeal of a lower court ruling in favor of the school district (Busch v. Marple Newton School District).

The contretemps began when Busch wanted to read a passage from Psalm 118 in response to the teacher's request for parents to share something with the class about their child's interests. Concerned that Bible reading in the classroom would violate the First Amendment's prohibition against school-sponsored religion, school officials said no to Busch's choice.

Busch might have fared better had her son attended school in Wilson County, Tenn., where officials don't bar outside adults from presenting the Bible to kids—they welcome them. But this month, the practice of allowing the Gideons to distribute Bibles to Wilson County students during the school day ended after the American Civil Liberties Union threatened to sue on behalf of a fifth-grade student.

Despite this flurry of legal decisions, the tug-of-war over the Bible in public schools will likely continue, with one side pulling the Scriptures in and the other side straining to keep them out.

# Marriage a la mode for women

**THIS ONE'S FOR ALL** the college-educated lonely hearts out there, just in time for Valentine's Day.

It's for the women who gobble up books with titles like "He's Just Not That Into You," who sign up with multiple matchmaker Web sites, who maybe even thumb through well-worn copies of the Mars and Venus books.

Ladies, you seem to be focusing on matrimony as the answer to your worries — and overlooking a key truth about marriage today: That tying the knot is becoming more of a boon for men than it is for women.

A recent Pew Research Center report confirms what the recession is bringing home all too clearly, with more men being laid off than women. Men, not women, now receive the greatest economic boost from marriage.

Other studies show that men, not women, are more likely to report work conflicts with family life.

This has to do with the fact that women are marrying later, that more of them are earning college degrees and that pay scales for women are rising.

An educated, working wife is a valuable asset. And if you're a bright sin-

gle woman of a certain age with a career, you ought to consider yourself a catch. Not that I expect to see that message embossed on heart-shaped candies anytime soon. "Will u be my sugar mama?" The recession, added to longstanding trends such as deindustrialization and the decline of union jobs — which have affected male workers disproportionately — is hastening this cultural shift away from traditional ideals of married families.

Median household income rose 60 percent from 1970-2007 for married men, married women and unmarried women. But for those wifeless chaps, it rose only 16 percent. Ouch.

Many a family budget has been salvaged by the woman's income after the male is laid off. Other studies show that men, not women, are now more likely to report that work conflicts with family life. Talk about role reversals.

Still other studies (including one conducted for the Council on Contemporary Families) have shown that women who marry later, and those with higher education, are more apt to stay married and report their relationship to be fulfilling. And households with a sole breadwinner who is male — that long-held ideal — well, they are more apt to shut down in divorce.

Studies like these cast withering light on the constant complaining we hear from conservatives who fancy themselves defenders of the traditional family. It seems all that feminist agitation for equality might have been beneficial to marriages—and men—after all.

These findings also ought to lead us to shed outdated cultural assumptions about women who reach a certain age without marrying — namely, that ladies who wait too long are bound for disappointment and spinsterhood.

Apparently, these old assumptions die hard.

Look for the next breakthrough best-seller in dating self-help to be "Marry Him: The Case for Settling for Mr. Good Enough," due for release in February.

The book — which reportedly has already been optioned for film — is premised on the notion that a woman's value as a marriageable entity declines as she ages.

Best grab Mr. OK while you can, ladies!

I envision a somewhat different title: "Marry Up, Men: The Case for Choosing Accomplished Wives and the Happiness (and Paycheck) They Bring."


This all comes down to one phrase we seldom use anymore because it's free — no education needed. That phrase is common sense.

# School districts should offer healthier options

Last week, first lady Michelle Obama called on the U.S. Conference of Mayors to help her fight the national scourge of childhood obesity. She noted that a third of children are overweight or obese. She proposed healthier school lunch fare, increased physical activity and nutrition education.

Traditionally, the National School Lunch Program has served as a dumping ground for USDA's surplus meat and dairy commodities. Not surprisingly, USDA's surveys indicate that 90 percent of American children consume excessive amounts of fat, and only 15 percent eat the recommended servings of fruits and vegetables. Their early dietary flaws become lifelong addictions, raising their risk of diabetes, heart disease and stroke.

In the past few years, several legislatures have asked their schools to offer daily vegetarian options. According to the School Nutrition Association, 52 percent of U.S. school districts now do. Last fall, the Baltimore City Public School system became the first in the United States to offer its 80,000 students a complete weekly break from meat.

Parents and others who care about our children's health should demand healthful plantbased school meals, snacks and vending machine items.

by the government to enable them to organize, ensure safer working conditions and earn a living wage. Further labor protection was legislated for mine safety after the tragic Farmington mine disaster, which so horrified West Virginia, in 1968.

As evidence mounted that escalating medical costs were impoverishing many of the elderly, in 1965 the government passed Medicare to provide health care for them. The government also passed CHIP (the Children's Health Insurance Program) to provide poorer children with similar assistance.

These are only a very few of the actions which our government has taken to "promote the general Welfare." As our country has grown in area and population and as it became more complex, individual citizens could not, unaided, cope with the challenges of a rapidly changing society. Government stepped up to the plate and faced its obligations to protect the "general Welfare" in the face of these realities. Today, few of us would wish these actions had not been taken.

Since we are a university town, it is fitting to mention two education-related examples of government initiatives to promote "the general Welfare." The first in point of time are the two congressional bills, (the Morrill Acts of 1862 and 1890) which created and established land grant colleges of which WVU is one.

Every state received 30,000 acres of federal land to use for the establishment of higher education institutions for special-

ized and general education.
Later monetary grants were awarded. These bills not only established a land grant university in every state, they also encouraged the states to expand into higher education, contributed significantly to scientific and technological progress in numerous fields from agriculture and engineering to the liberal arts, and established the practice of extending federal assistance to education.

The G.I. Bill of Rights of 1944 is credited by historians with transforming America and changing it from a class-society to a more truly democratic nation. It provided about 15 million veterans returning from World War II education/training benefits, loan guarantees for homes, farms, business and unemployment pay.

Over the years these federal payments were returned to the government in the form of tax revenues many times more than the original government appropriations thanks to increased skills and knowledge of the veterans. The middle class grew substantially as the veterans, whose average educational level at leaving the services had been one year of high school, became college graduates, home and business owners — previously "unreachable dreams" to them.

Ironically this bill which many consider one of the most beneficial and wide-ranging ever passed by Congress almost failed to pass because of opposition to the provision of a small unemployment payment, which only 20 percent of the veterans applied for subsequently.

These are just a few of the laws which the government

over the past two centuries decided were needed to "promote the general Welfare." The next question is: How does health care reform play a part in promoting our country's general welfare and "Life ... and the pursuit of Happiness?"

Can any of us claim our country's "general Welfare" is sound if 47 million (15 percent) of us do not have the medical insurance that provides affordable access to health care? All of us have probably at one time or another had a family member or friend whose life depended on medical care; certainly, "Happiness" is impossible if the necessary medical care is unavailable throughout our families' lives except by means of the hospital emergency room.

During a time of economic recession it is not unreasonable to ask if we have the resources to undertake health care reform. A better question to ask is if we can afford *not* to undertake reform. How long do we want to spend twice as much (or more) per person for health care than any of the other industrialized countries that already provide health care for ALL their citizens.

The United States spends about \$6,000 per person on health care annually (Germany and Canada spend \$3,000). The U.S. spends 15 percent to 17 percent of its gross domestic product on health care (Germany, 11 percent, and Canada, 10 percent). Our life expectancy is lower than these two countries who support health care for everyone (unlike the U.S., where 47 million are uninsured). We are spending more and getting less. This does not make economic sense.

While we all regret that our recession continues, though the economy is gradually improving, we must not forget that the United States is the richest country in the world.

In a recent year we produced approximately \$13-14 trillion dollars in goods and services (Gross Domestic Product) — about 20 percent of the total value of goods and services produced in the entire world with less than 5 percent of the world's total population.

In 1944, our government initiated the G.I. Bill of Rights for 15 million veterans after we had fought World War II for four years in two theaters of war separated by thousands of miles: Asia and Europe. The G.I. Bill vastly improved the general welfare (and wealth) of our country. Do we have less commitment to the welfare of our people and less confidence than we had in 1944? I hope not.

After WWII, President Truman became the first of several presidents to introduce a health care reform bill to Congress. He failed. That was 60 years ago.

The United States has the human and material resources to help the U.S. government do what our Founding Fathers outlined: "to promote the general Welfare," and to secure "Life ... and the pursuit of Happiness" through one of the most basic ways — keeping us as healthy as possible.

add the company to the index, possibly within a couple weeks. S&P 500 funds that own all the index's components will snap up Berkshire shares and remove Burlington Northern Santa Fe.

That's the railroad that Buffett's conglomerate is acquiring, a move that will expand a stable of Berkshire properties ranging from insurance to jewelry to corporate jets.

Since the split, you can get a piece of Berkshire for about \$74, rather than the previous \$3,500.

Berkshire's membership in the

world's most closely tracked market index will give millions of small investors exposure to a company led by the best-known advocate of price-conscious "value" investing. Nearly 40 percent of all assets in U.S. index funds track the S&P 500. That's some \$324 billion, and the anchor of many retirement portfolios.

Until now, short of buying Berkshire's expensive stock directly, investors' could buy Buffett by getting into funds that held Berkshire.

With Berkshire's debut in the index, S&P 500 funds will have to

quickly buy Berkshire shares. Anticipation of that binge triggered a 4 percent jump for Berkshire's newly affordable Class B shares on Wednesday. That was after S&P announced its decision to add a stock that had hovered within a split-adjusted \$64 to \$68 from August through mid-January.

"The stock has gone nowhere for a long time now," said David Winters, of the Wintergreen Fund (WGRNX), which invests in Berkshire stock. "So we've been looking forward to an upward bump."

# How to play rising interest rates

One of the big fears for 2010 is the effect of higher interest rates.

They would help savers through better money-market rates, which have been scraping close to zero. But they could ding stock prices by siphoning investors from equities to bonds. Higher rates would also make borrowing more expensive for companies, limiting their growth.

Deutsche Bank strategists forecast the yield on the 10vear Treasury to rise steadily through the year, to 4 percent by the September and 4.5 percent by December. It sat at 3.7 percent Thursday.

Investors shouldn't lose hope. Rising interest rates don't hurt all industries' stocks. Credit Suisse checked 10 years of records to see which industries have historically done best during rising-rate periods.

Stocks in economically sensitive industries, such as auto makers, have traditionally risen with bond yields. That makes sense, because rising rates often correspond with an improving economy. Inflation, rate hikes by the Federal Reserve and worries about the federal government borrowing too much could also boost rates.

Utilities, meanwhile, don't benefit. Utility stock owners are traditionally conservative investors interested in dividends. When bond interest payments rise enough to rival utilities' dividend in-



# Still bleeding

The economic recovery so far has been a jobless one.

More than 7 million jobs have vanished since the recession began, including 85,000 last month. On Friday, the government will release its January update, and economists are looking for yet more losses.

The figures are crucial because Americans won't soend much until they feel comfortable in their paychecks. Despite growth in the overall economy and a rebounding stock market, consumer confidence is still below its long-term average.

Several big companies announced layoffs of 1,000 or more jobs during January. Hiring of temp workers also stalled during the month, a discouraging sign.

# **Blending art** and science

echnical traders look at how stocks have moved in the past to predict where they will be next. Unlike "fundamental" investors, who pay attention to sales and profit growth, technical traders talk about a stock's historical pricing pattern. Richard Ross, global technical strategist for Auerbach Grayson, suggests investors pay heed to both schools of thought.

#### Why should people pay attention to the movement of a stock, rather than fundamentals? My approach is that I don't think that

technical and fundamental are an either/or. The strongest approach takes both into consideration. Technical



Jeremy Grantham, the chief investment strategist of GMO, says stocks are expensive today. Here's why you should care: He predicted the collapse of a major bank and a big fall for stock prices in 2007. That was months before stocks peaked and before most anyone had thought to pair "toxic" and "mortgage" in a phrase. In a quarterly letter posted on GMO's Web site, Grantham wrote that the S&P 500 index is now worth about 850, 20.8 percent below its closing price Friday. He predicts "seven lean years" of below-average economic growth and says low-quality stocks have risen too far. Grantham sometimes gets criticism for being a "perma-bear." But he isn't always pessimistic. In March 2009 - right when the market bottomed - he said that stocks looked cheap.



HOW ARE YOU, REALLY? Americans are feeling better, but they're still far short of well. Last week, the Conference Board said its consumer confidence index hit its highest level since Lehman Brothers collapsed in 2008. Its rise to 55.9 was its third straight month of improvement. But consumer confidence is still way below its long-term average of 95, says Paul Dales, an economist with Capital Economics. That hesitancy in the face of economic growth and a rebounding stock market could mean shoppers remain thrifty for a while. Such behavior could cause the economic recovery to fade as the year progresses.

Now, the tide is turning, Callaway Golf CEO George Fellows said this past week. His company, which makes the Big Bertha line of drivers, enjoyed its first quarter of annual growth in nearly two years. And Asia is leading the way, showing the strongest sales growth in the fourth quarter. Indeed, that tracks with economists' forecasts, which have Asian nations leading the global recovery.

Galanti didn't apologize for the company's aggressive price cutting, even if it did momentarily hurt margins. "We are being better served and shareholders better served as we come out of this economy maybe in a couple of years, maybe a year from now, because of the things we are doing right now," he said at the time.




# **Growing baby clothes**

N o matter the economy, babies and tod-dlers will keep outgrowing their clothes. That has Carter's well positioned, analysts say. It owns two of the country's oldest and biggest clothing brands for children: its namesake Carter's line and OshKosh B'Gosh. The company recently posted a third-quarter profit of \$49.4 million and is enjoying growth well above analysts' expectations. Its lower prices attracted parents


pinched by the recession. BMO Capital Markets analyst Gerrick Johnson calls the stock one of his top picks in the industry. It offers "compelling opportunities for growth at an inexpensive price," he wrote in a recent report. Four of the six analysts that track the stock rate it as a "buy."

To be sure, the company is still regaining investor trust. Last year it discovered some sales staff hadn't properly disclosed "accommodations" made for customers, which affected its revenue accounting. It has since restated earnings going back to 2004, which

lowered its retained earnings by \$7.5 million. The company also remains in the midst of reviving the OshKosh brand. Its sales grew 4 percent from the prior year in the third quarter, compared with 12 percent growth for the Carter's brand.



Carter's shares stumbled in October on questions about its accounting practices. But the stock has bounced back.







# No estate taxes will be owed this year

IN ESTATE planning circles, the year 2010 stands out since the Economic Growth and Tax Relief Act of 2001 was passed. This is the year in which federal estate taxes are zero.

For those who pass away this year, their estates will not owe the federal taxes, which were as high as 45 percent in 2009. Many joked about this situation being advantageous to heirs.

While no federal or West Virginia estate taxes will be owed, the recipients may owe income taxes when they sell assets received from the estate. In the past, estate assets were valued as of the date of death (except on certain types of income) or six months later for various purposes. The recipient received the assets with that new cost basis and could avoid income taxes at the time of sale on the full predeath value.

In 2010, the increase in cost basis is more limited.

Surviving spouses can receive the higher cost basis on \$3 million in assets to protect them from income taxes when they are sold. Other heirs can receive up to \$1.3 million in estate assets with the higher cost basis. All other assets will retain the deceased person's cost basis. Some financial advisers expressed concern about determining those values when assets were purchased years or

even decades before. The 0 percent estate tax is slated to last for 2010 only. In 2011 and later, the estate tax will again be imposed with an exclusion of \$1 million. Further,

assets that pass to a spouse or charitable organization are also estate tax free. As in the past, the assets in the estates of

those who die in 2011 and afterward will receive a step-up in basis so that the recipient will not pay income taxes on the predeath value.

Current estate tax legislation waiting to be passed by Congress establishes \$3.5 million as the permanent amount of an estate that can be transferred tax free. Many conjecture that the law will be made retroactive to Jan. 1, 2010, overturning the 0 percent estate tax rate now in effect.

Estate planning requires extra diligence when changes in the law are anticipated. Working with knowledgeable advisers can avoid expensive mistakes.

That's good planning.





# Watchdog: Bailouts created more risk in system

WASHINGTON — The government's response to the financial meltdown has made it more likely the United States will face a deeper crisis in the future, an independent watchdog at the Treasury Department warned.

The problems that led to

been addressed, and in some cases have grown worse, says Neil Barofsky, the special inspector general for the trouble asset relief program, or TARP. The quarterly report to Congress was released Sunday.

"Even if TARP saved our financial system from driv-

the last crisis have not yet ing off a cliff back in 2008, absent meaningful reform. we are still driving on the same winding mountain road, but this time in a faster car," Barofsky wrote.

Since Congress passed \$700 billion financial bailout, the remaining institutions considered "too big to fail" have grown larger and failed to restrain the lavish pay for their executives, Barofsky wrote. He said the banks still have an incentive to take on risk because they know the government will save them.

Barofsky also said his office is investigating 77 cases of possible criminal and civil

fraud, including crimes of tax evasion, insider trading, mortgage lending and payment collection, false statements and public corruption.

Barofsky renewed a call for Treasury to enact clearer walls so that such apparent conflicts are less likely.

Treasury said it welcomed

Barofsky's oversight but resisted the call to erect new barriers. The new rules "would be detrimental to the program," Treasury spokeswoman Meg Reilly said in a statement. The existing compliance rules "are a rigorous and effective method of protecting taxpayers," she said.

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# Doctor: Quake victims dying without U.S. airlifts

MIAMI — The U.S. military has halted flights carrying Haitian earthquake victims to the United States because of an apparent cost dispute, though a doctor warned that some injured patients faced imminent death if the flights don't resume.

The evacuations were temporarily suspended Wednesday, said Capt. Kevin Aandahl, spokesman for U.S. Transportation Command. The flights were halted a day after Florida Gov. Charlie Crist asked the federal government to help pay for care.

However, Dr. Barth Green, a doctor involved in the relief effort in Port-au-Prince, warned that his patients needed to get to better hospitals.

"We have 100 critically ill patients who will die in the next day or two if we don't Medevac them," said Green, chairman of the University of Miami's Global Institute for Community Health and Development.

At a temporary field hospital at Haiti's international airport, set up with donations to Green's institute, two men had died of tetanus and a 5-year-old girl suffering from tetanus in a small leg wound would likely die within 24 hours unless evacuated, doctors said.

"If we can't save her by getting her out right away, we won't save her," said Dr. David Pitcher, one of 34 surgeons staffing the field hospital.

There were some states that would not accept patients who needed care in the U.S., and they could not be transported without a hospital to accept them, Aandahl said.

Aandahl declined to specify which states declined to accept patients, and he referred further questions to a Pentagon press office, where an after-hours answering service could not accept incoming messages Saturday.

Florida officials said Saturday that they were not aware of any hospital in the state refusing to take in the patients. However, in a letter Tuesday to Health and Human Services Secretary Kathleen Sebelius, the governor said "Florida's health care system is quickly reaching saturation, especially in the area of high level trauma care."

# Obama seeks \$200M to help cities host 9/11 trials

Obama administration is proposing a \$200 million fund to help pay for security costs in cities hosting the trials of accused terrorists such as Sept. 11 mastermind Khalid Sheikh Mohammed.

A congressional aide familiar with the plan said the money will be included in the president's budget being released Monday. The aide spoke on condition of anonymity because the spending blueprint hasn't been announced.

The administration said late last year the trials would take place in federal court in lower Manhattan, near where the World Trade Center once stood. But there's growing it now seems likely that the White House will decide to

KABUL — A NATO official said an Afghan interpreter killed two U.S. service members before he was killed at a combat outpost in eastern Afghanistan.

The new details emerged Saturday, a day after the deaths were announced in a brief statement.

The official, who spoke

on condition of anonymity because he wasn't authorized to release the information, said the attack occurred in Wardak province.

First reports indicated three Americans were killed but the official said one of the dead was an Afghan.

It wasn't immediately clear why the interpreter opened fire.

### **Bombing in Pakistan** kills nine

KHAR. Pakistan — A government official said a suicide attacker has targeted a police checkpoint in northwestern Pakistan, killing at least seven civilians and two officers.

Bakhat Pacha said 10 people were also wounded in Saturday's attack in Khar, which is the main town in the Bajur tribal region.

The attack came a day after officials said security forces had killed 44 militants in three days of battles on the outskirts of Khar.

#### **Regulators: New rules** coming to Swiss banks

DAVOS, Switzerland — Government regulators from the United States and Europe laid out their financial reform plans Saturday before a skeptical banking industry, asking financiers for input but adamant that change was coming with or without their support.

Emerging from the twohour meeting as its unofficial spokesman, U.S. Representative Barney Frank made it clear that governments were now calling the shots after spending billions to bail out the industry.

Top bankers, by contrast, who came into this week's World Economic Forum buoyed by signs of economic recovery, left somewhat subdued even as they called the closed-door meeting constructive.


"No one got up and said, 'Don't regulate us,' " said Frank, a Massachusetts Democrat who heads the U.S. House Financial Services Committee.


#### China suspends U.S. military exchanges

BEIJING — China suspended military exchange visits with the United States on Saturday in protest over \$6.4 billion in planned U.S. arms sales to Taiwan and warned the U.S. ambassador that the sales would harm already strained ties.

The state-run Xinhua News Agency cited the Defense Ministry as saying the suspension is due to the "severe harm" of the arms sales on the two countries' military relations.

China took a similar step in 2008 after the former Bush administration announced a multibilliondollar arms sale to Taiwan — the most sensitive issue in U.S.-China relations.





# Celestial stories

# The myths behind the familiar constellations

or a couple of weeks now. The Dominion Post lifestyles staff has been gazing into the heavens, breaking down some of the night sky's mysteries for our readers, looking a bit closer at those twinkling stars above.

We've told you how to find them, and even what may ultimately be written in them for each of us. But what about the mythology behind them? The stories behind the constellations, the meanings for their names?

The night sky is full of stories — of heroism, vengeance, doomed lovers and more. So next time there's nothing on TV, try turning your eyes upward, and marvel at some of the drama going on just above your head.

#### The Big Dipper, or Ursa Major

According to Dr. Ray Mainenti, a member of West Virginia University's foreign language department who is teaching a course on mythology this semester, this constellation, arguably the most recognizable, has a tragic background.



Though married, the god Jupiter fell in love with a nymph named Callisto, who gave birth to his son, Arcas. But Jupiter's wife, Juno, was jealous of the affair, and exacted revenge on Callisto by turning her into a bear, doomed to roam the forest forever.

One day, Arcas set out on a hunting expedition, coming upon a bear he intended to kill. Immediately, Jupiter recognized the bear as Callisto, Arcas' birth mother, so to avoid further tragedy, he turned his son into a bear, and placed both bears in the sky together.

"So the mother bear, Ursa Major, is

forever pointing toward Polaris, the important star that is part of her son, Ursa Minor," also known as the Little Dipper, Mainenti explains.


Some astronomy Web sites tell the same tale, starring (no pun intended) Zeus as the unfaithful husband, and Hera the spurned wife.

#### **Orion (The Hunter)**

Perhaps the most well-known constellation, Mainenti says there are two versions as to how Orion wound up in the night sky.

The first, he notes, was as punishment for his boastful claim that he could kill any animal, so great were his hunting skills. The gods, resentful of his pride, and also fearful for the extinction of the world's wildlife, sent a giant scorpion to challenge Orion. However, the scorpion's outer skin was so thick, Orion's attempts to slay the creature were futile and he was dealt a deadly sting. Thus, the constellations of Orion and Scorpio were placed opposite each other in the sky, Mainenti said.

#### **MYTHS**

Another tale tells of Orion's drunken rape of Merope, a granddaughter of Dionysus, states astronomv Web site heavens-ab ove.com. Following the rape, Orion was blinded then cured, and as he set out to exact revenge, he met the goddess Artemis, herself a great huntress. Knowing of Orion's reputation, Artemis' brother Apollo feared his sister would become another of the hunter's hunted, and challenged his sister to hit a speck in the sea with her arrow. The speck turned out to be Orion swimming and he was thusly killed.

In both stories, Artemis is said to have been so saddened by Orion's death that she begged he be immortalized in the stars.

#### **Canis Major**

Canis Major contains the star Sirius, also known as the Dog Star, the brightest star in the sky. According to both Mainenti and heavens-ab ove.com, there are several stories pertaining to this constellation.

Both sources note that

the dog was believed to be one of the favorite hunting dogs of Orion.

He was also believed to be the swiftest dog in the land.

Sources vary as to whether the dog was hunting a fox, or the hare known as Lepus, but in all accounts, the dog's prey was just as swift as he. To settle the stalemate, Zeus turned both animals to stone, but honored the dog's efforts and his loyalty by placing him in the sky.

#### **Andromeda**

If you've seen the 1981 movie "Clash of the Titans" starring Laurence Olivier and Harry Hamlin, you've seen Andromeda's stories played out on the big screen.

Because of Andromeda's mother's pride — her mother was Queen Cassiopeia of Ethiopia — the girl was doomed to be sacrificed, chained to a rock to be taken by the sea monster Cetus. However, Andromeda's luck wasn't entirely out, and while riding home on the winged horse Pegasus, heavens-above.com explains, she was spotted by Perseus, who had just slayed the monster

Medusa. Seeing Andromeda's predicament. Perseus held Medusa's head in the air, turning Cetus to stone, rescuing the fair maiden and falling in love with her forever.

#### Cassiopeia

As mentioned above, Cassiopeia, along with Cepheus, were they Queen and King of Ethiopia. When Cassiopeia widely and loudly declared herself to be more beautiful than the Nereids nymphs in the service of the god Neptune, Mainenti explains — Neptune was angered and insulted. He insisted the couple chain their daughter to the shore, to become dinner for the sea monster Cetus. If they refused, the monster would instead dine on their entire kingdom. The couple relented, and Andromeda was offered up, only to be saved by Perseus.

#### **Gemini (The Twins)**

Like many others destined to spend eternity in the heavens, the Gemini twins' story is one of grief. Though brothers, Castor — a great horseman — was mortal, while Pollux — a boxer — was

immortal, Mainenti explains. When challenged by an evil king to a boxing match, Pollux proved victorious, killing the king with his fists. But when the brothers fought together against another set of twins over two women, naturally — mortal Castor was killed. Pollux was so broken hearted over the loss of his brother that he begged the pair be allowed to share his immortality by being placed together in the heavens, for eternity.

#### **Taurus (The Bull)**

Perhaps one of the more upbeat, fun stories in the stars, Mainenti explains that this bull wound up in the sky after Europa, a Greek beauty, enticed the attentions of the god Jupiter, he was so entranced he turned himself into a white bull to join her in her travels. Europa was so impressed that she immediately jumped upon Jupiter-thebull's back. Zeus carried the pair across the sea, and to commemorate the event, the Greeks named a continent after the beauty and placed a "monument to the snowwhite bull in the stars."

#### Cafe Bacchus: A quiet retreat with plenty to offer downtown

**SEVERAL BLOCKS AWAY** from the bright lights and noise of the High Street bars and clubs sits an excellent restaurant with a wonderful little bar area. Cafe Bacchus may be known more for its food, but it is a wonderful place to sit back and relax with one of its many drinks.

I was in the downtown area this past week and thought I'd relax for a while with a drink while I did a little writing. Since it was close by, I decided to stop by Cafe Bacchus, remembering the wonderful Scotch collection the place has — long-time readers of this column may remember my bourbon, scotch and beer piece.

Stepping in through the front door, and then through the drapes that separate the foyer from the rest of

the restaurant, I turned left into the bar area. It may not be the largest bar in town, but it has one of the best liquor and wine selections to be found, and if you're looking for some

quiet and cozy to sit back with a book or to have a romantic meal with your drinks, you won't

find a better place to go.

I sat at the bar, the three bar stools were all empty at the time, and while there were diners at two of the tables, the waiter/bartender came up and asked what I would like right away. After doing through the Scotch list, I chose Glenmorangie 10 year. To be honest, I like Scotch but don't have a lot of experience with it. I chose this one simply because I a never naa it before, and I wasn't disappointed. It was a very warming Highland whiskey that went down smooth on that cold night. Once I had my drink, I sat back to check out the rest

The cafe's wine list takes up five pages, and is impressive with the scope of grape varieties offered. The list is split up fairly evenly between whites and reds, and the prices also vary quite a bit. You can get a very nice wine for \$15 dollars a bottle, with the average cost being about \$25-\$30.

If you really want to try something grand, however, Cafe Bacchus does offer some high-end wines that are more than \$100 a bottle. You don't have to purchase a whole bottle, either, as there are several styles by the glass and half-glass.

The liquor menu is also impressive. The Scotch (whiskey) and Irish whiskey selection are second to none, ranging from Bushmills and Jameson up to Macallan 18 year, with 20 brands all together. There are also several American/Canadian whiskeys and bourbons to choose from, as well as tequila, rum, gin, vodka and cognac. There are also several liqueurs to choose from, including one of my favorites, Lemoncillo.

Nearly any mixed drink you would like can be made, but Cafe Bacchus does have a rotating seasonal mixed drink menu

that is worthy of a look. At the moment the restaurant is featuring winter drinks, with candy cane martinis, pumpkin pie saketini and the cranberry snowdrift — and instead of giving the ingredients away, I'll leave it up to you to stop in and check it out for yourself. Beer is offered as well, with Yuengling lager and black and tan, as well as a pilsner imported from

Czech Republic. Although Cafe Bacchus is a restaurant, and you can order off its regular menu if you want, it does offer a few smaller items called bar bites. There are pot stickers, cheddar and onion potato cakes, olives, spiced almonds and homemade pickled

vegetables. If you're looking for a place to host a get-together, Cafe Bacchus does have an area on the second floor that can seat up to 50 people, and there is a bar up there that can be

stocked to suit your needs. Even though I ended up spending most of my time looking over the drink menu, I did get a little writing done. Cafe Bacchus has a great little bar area where you can relax with a drink, and food as well, if you'd like. 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## Starr relishes new challenges, but he's forever a Beatle

LOS ANGELES — The 69-year-old visitor to the downtown Grammy Museum strolled with fascination through its new exhibit of Alfred Wertheimer's celebrated 1956 photos of Elvis Presley at 21, just as the impossibly handsome young singer was on the threshold of stardom.

Like most other visitors taking in the remarkably unguarded photos, this bearded gentleman exhibited affection and appreciation for the black-andwhite portraits of Presley's quiet moments — lunching at a diner; teasing, and being teased, by a female fan — some of the last such moments he would enjoy before exploding as the biggest star in the pop music universe.

But occasionally came an expression that none of the others wandering the gallery could offer: understanding.

"The start of all our careers was quiet like that," said Ringo Starr, the former Beatle enjoying a relatively quiet few minutes of his own, perusing the Elvis photos before a question-answer

session and performance a short time later. "We didn't expect any problems, and then suddenly it

gets wild — and it did." Things are, of course, less wild today for Starr than they were 45 years ago when the Fab Four supplanted Elvis at the top of the pop heap.

The world's most famous drummer was a Beatle for eight years, and he's been an ex-Beatle for five times that long now. But hardly a minute goes by when the

topic doesn't come up. After making his way through the photo display, Starr headed straight for the museum store in search of an Elvis T-shirt

but quickly found himself faced with apparel bearing his own visage along with those of John Lennon, Paul McCartn and George Harrison. Eventually, though, he found what he was after and slipped on the Presley shirt for his evening session, an event he took on in conjunction with the release last week of his latest album, "Y Not."

It's a milestone for him in a couple of respects: It's the first time in his halfcentury career he's taken the wheel as producer, in addition to singing, drumming and co-writing most of its songs. He'll be singing some of those

songs during his next All-

"No — not as big as 40 was," he said, looking a good 15 years younger than you might expect.

He's trim — like McCartney and his late pal Harrison, he's an avowed vegetarian — and outfitted in a black bandcollar peacoat, black jeans and the ever-present dark glasses. His hair and beard are close-cropped, only a few wrinkles on his

neck betraying his age. "Y Not" doesn't vary greatly from the approach he's taken through much of his solo career: lots of collaborations with highprofile musician friends, some lightweight rockers that give him the opportunity to exercise his wellhoned chops behind the drum kit and a couple of meatier numbers that let the man of a thousand quips touch on the matters of the spirit that mean the most to him.

"You can be serious in a good up way," Starr said. "I think this record has captured where I'm trying to be musically and as a writer. My spirits are high."

"Being on this quest for

a long time, it's all about finding yourself," Starr said. "For me, God is in my life. I don't hide from that. ... I think the search has been on since the '60s. ... I stepped off the path there for many years and found my way (back) onto it, thank God."

# Giving new life to her native language

Aims to revive Ojibwe, along with oral history

CHICAGO — When

Dorene Wiese was a young girl she would listen to the stories her family members told as they gathered around her kitchen table.

Relatives often reminisced about harvesting rice, or more precisely manomin, from the marshes of northern Minnesota. They told stories of getting into canoes and using hand paddles to knock the grains into their baskets. It was an annual event, filled with ceremony that brought their Ojibwe community together as they worked to parch, separate and clean the rice, before bagging it for storage.

Wiese (pronounced WEEsee), who's now 60 and is the president of the American Indian Association of Illinois, said that although the stories were robust — as a child she easily lost herself in them — she realized years later that because her family no longer spoke the Ojibwe language, their stories may have lost meaning and color by being told in English.

So Wiese, who has a doctorate from Northern Illinois University, has been working for the past three decades to revive the language. Her research is in oral history, and she has studied the ways in which learning is passed down through generations.

Revival is necessary, she believes, because for so many years, native languages withered for various reasons. Among them is that generations of Native American parents stopped speaking in their native tongues, believing their children needed a mastery of English to succeed economically.

In addition, Native-American children who were taken

from their homes and placed in boarding schools from the late 1800s to about the 1940s were punished for speaking anything other than English.

"But language is the thread that keeps culture together," said Wiese. "Language is woven into our brains and psyches and memories. Today when we say the word 'medicine' in English, we think Walgreens. But in Ojibwe, the word is 'midewin' (pronounced ma-DAY-win), meaning 'from that takes place directly from mother earth.

"That seems like a minor detail, a definition of a word, but when you look at how it means that medicine isn't just something from a pill or a bottle but from a cornucopia of plants from the Creator, it makes a difference in the way you see it, feel it and remember it."

Reviving the Ojibwe language hasn't been an easy undertaking. Wiese said that there are 60 tribes and bands of Ojibwe people throughout the United States and Canada. The language also was mostly not written down, and the dialects along with word usage and meanings vary depending on geographical areas.

Wiese is the former president of Chicago's Naes College, which had been the country's only urban Amerthe earth.' It's the healing ican Indian college until it lost its accreditation for funding reasons and closed in 2007.

To start over, she opened the American Indian Association of Illinois and began a partnership with Eastern Illinois University offering general education courses as well as language classes. But for those who aren't pursuing degrees, she runs free language workshops on the side.

# Give kitty somewhere to climb in the house

Q: I'm taking in a homeless cat. Is it possible to train the cat to stay off my tables and counters? All my previous cats did their climbing outdoors. Can you really teach a cat not to climb? — S.K., Macomb, Ill.

A: A better question might be, "Can you really teach a cat where to climb?" Domestic cats like to climb. Period.

Here's what you do: Say, your cat is climbing on the kitchen counter. Dissuade the pet by positioning a plastic placemat there covered with double-stick tape or a product (available at pet supplies stores) called Sticky Paws. Cats don't like sticky feet. Also, everyone in the home has to be consistent about never leaving food out on the counters.

Meanwhile, it's imperative to find a place in the kitchen where your cat CAN climb. One possibility might be the top of the refrigerator. It's warm up there, and the view of you preparing food is more interesting for cats that the deck of the Empire State Building is for us. You could even put a small cat bed up there, a periodically leave treats on the fridge to entice your pet. A kitchen window ledge might also be appealing. Any room where the family spends time should have a cozy place well off the ground for a kitty to curl up. Otherwise, the pet will find her own place - without asking for approval.

Congratulations on adopting this homeless pet!

Q: We recently rescued a cat that was hanging around our home. At first, we thought he was feral and kept feeding him because he was so thin. When we discovered he was incredibly friendly, we brought him indoors. We took him to the vet, had him neutered and given appropriate shots. There's only one problem: He's desperate for food and continually

begs. He'll even try to snatch food from our hands. Is there any way to curb his appetite? E.N., Peoria, Ill.

A: How wonderful that you've taken in this cat, who may not have survived the winter. You did the right thing by taking him for a checkup, neutering and vaccines. (For those with other cats in the house, it's also important to quarantine a newcomer for several weeks.)

As for his appetite, remember that outdoor life isn't easy. Many homeless cats don't know where their next meal is coming from, so they learn to take full advantage of any chance to eat. To curb his cravings, rather than leaving out food all the time, feed him at specific times.

If you feed kibble, use Play 'n Treat balls (or similar products which cats can push around to make food to tumble out). Begin by placing food balls near the cat's food dish, over time moving them farther away until you're "hiding" the food in various places around the house. This will activate the cat's prey drive to "hunt" for food. If you're feeding moist food, do the same by splitting the food into three or four different bowls and placing them around the house. It's best to feed this cat while you eat: if he's off searching for his own meal, he won't be begging at the table.

If the begging continues, gently take your kitty into another room and close the door until you've finished your meal.



# Matters of the heart

FEBRUARY IS A MONTH dedicated to the heart. Between Valentine's Day, National Wear Red Day in support of women and heart disease, and Random Acts of Kindness Week, matters of the heart are covered.

There are several options for doing something nice or getting a special Valentine's Day gift for loved ones. But in honor of Random Acts of Kindness consider doing something nice for a coworker, neighbor or stranger. What better Valentine is there than just trying to make someone smile or be happier?

Acts of kindness don't have to be elaborate and can be spontaneous or planned. It can be a simple gesture of holding a door for someone, sharing a smile in passing, sending a card to a family member or friend you haven't talked to in a while, or paying for coffee for the person behind you in line. Not only will the recipient feel good, but people who perform kind acts experience a sense of calm afterwards and may help improve stress-related health problems. Who couldn't use some calmness in their lives?

And now a valentine for yourself - February is recognized as American Heart Month. Cardiovascular disease (heart disease) is the leading cause of death among women and men. Take time to learn about heart disease, its signs and symptoms and things you can do to lower your risk.

Classic symptoms for women include: Nausea, vomiting, pressure or burning pain just beneath the breast bone or in the pit of the stomach, unusual fatigue, or weakness in the chest, arms or shoulders. Men's symptoms include crushing chest pain, chest pressure, discomfort in the shoulders, neck or stomach, shortness of breath, and sweating.

High blood pressure and cholesterol are two risk factors for heart disease. It's important for you to know your numbers. Your blood pressure should be below 120/80 and your total cholesterol should be below 200 mg/dL with an HDL of 60 mg/dL or more and a LDL below 100 mg/dL. People with a very high risk for heart disease, or who have had a heart attack, should have their LDL at 70 mg/dL. Other risk factors are tobacco use, diabetes, physical inactivity and poor nutrition.

# Gellman's catastrophy lessons: God and Haiti

I'VE RECEIVED SO many letters and queries about God and evil following the earthquake in Haiti that I thought it best to address them all at once.

Our response must begin with helping meet the immediate needs of Haiti's suffering people. We can all do our small part. We must give money. Give only to established organizations. You can check out any charity at the Better Business Bureau's Wise Giving Alliance: bbb.org/us/chari ty/. (Not all worthy charities are reviewed there but it's a good place to start.)

The other obvious response is for each of us to pray, not only for God to help the people of Haiti, but more importantly to give us the patient strength to help them ourselves. This will be particularly important when camera crews leave Haiti and news stories about the earthquake stop. That's when compassion fatigue can set in and dim our focus on the long, hard

As for the big theological picture, here's what I know about the theology of catastrophe. (You could call it "catastrophology," although in the discipline of theology, reconciling God's goodness with the problem

of suffering righteous people is called theodicy.)

Catastrophology Response No. 1: We know nothing about how God rules the world. This response was actually God's response to Job's suffering in the Bible. God came to Job and instead of explaining why Job was suffering, God instead spoke to Job out of the whirlwind saying, "Where wast thou when I laid the foundations of the earth? Declare, if thou hast understanding." (Job 38:4). The same approach is found in Proverbs 8:29 and Psalm 104:5. God's point seems clear enough: We know relatively nothing about how God has constructed the physical world, so how can we judge the way God has constructed the moral world?

What I like about this response is that it's true. We know nothing about God's ways, and therefore our proper response ought to be humility. Sadly, the nonhumble responses of some ignorant people of faith include the belief that catas-

trophes are punishment for sin, or perhaps a test of faith. Such ideas make no sense since they don't explain the suffering of children and other innocents, nor do they explain why an all-knowing God would need a test to know our hearts.

Sadly, the remarks of Pat Robertson about Haiti lacked humility. He seemed certain that the earthquake was the direct result of a deal with the devil made by Haitians to get rid of the French at the beginning of the 19th century. Such remarks are not just historically and theologically absurd; their worst offense is that they're cruel. They force suffering people to endure the double horror of their actual suffering and the suffering of believing that their torment is just because of their rebellion against God.

Philosopher Paul Ricoeur believed that trying to explain catastrophe only adds to the pain of the catastrophe. I agree to a point, but I don't believe we must remain mute or suspend all thought or questioning. There's much we can know, and what we know need not be cruel but can bring comfort and understanding.

Catastrophology Response No. 2: Natural evil is not "evil" at all. The earthquake, like all earthquakes and storms, reveals the natural laws of a living earth. Aristotle was the first to distinguish between natural and moral evil. Moral evil is what we cause by our own bad choices, and natural evil is what is caused by the natural laws of the world.

The earthquake was a morally neutral example of the natural breathing of a living earth. The movement of the earth's tectonic plates caused the quake. Such upheaval is simply a natural phenomenon. Of course, such phenomena can lead to tragedy when we choose to live in fault zones, near active volcanoes, or on the banks of flood-prone rivers. However, these are our choices, not God's, and it's shameful to blame God for our disregard of predictable dangers. We must prepare for natural evil, not merely curse God when it breaks into our lives.

This Aristotelian idea of natural evil entered Judaism, and then Christianity and Islam, after the rabbis took over Judaism from the biblical priests following the Roman conquests of the first century. Their revolutionary theological idea was that "The

world is led by its own laws." (from the Talmud: Avodah Zara 54b). This idea that God created the world with certain unchangeable laws limited the possibility of certain miracles but provided the foundation for a harmonization of science and religion.

The task of science was to discover the laws of the universe placed there by a God who made order out of chaos. In fact, the belief that the world is led by its own laws doesn't limit God's power. It actually increases our awe of a God who rules by law, not by caprice.

Catastrophology Response No. 3: Help 'em. The best speech I ever heard was two sentences long. A Jewish grandpa, who as a boy in Poland during World War II escaped the Holocaust by fleeing into the forest, was blessing his grandson in my synagogue on the occasion of his bar mitzvah. He looked at the boy and said quietly and tearfully, "In your life, you're going to meet people who need help. If you can help 'em, help 'em." That's all he said because that's all he needed to say.

# Art and craft therapy can help patients heal

Anne Turville knows radiation and chemotherapy killed the cancer in her daughter's ribs and lungs. But the Gahanna, Ohio, mother believes that making pottery also helped keep Sarah alive.

Sarah, now 16, discovered pottery in 2006 at a camp for sick children, and insisted on taking lessons when she returned home.

"She has done remarkably well," Turville said. "I am sure that pottery had a big part in this."

The opportunity for artistic expression often makes a meaningful difference in a patient's health, said Dr. Larry Norton, deputy physician-in-chief for breast cancer programs at Memorial Sloan-Kettering Cancer Center in New York City. Others find yoga, exercise or writing helpful.

"There's a growing awareness among people that healing is about more than what pill you take," Norton said.

Art therapy — the connection between the creative process and healing — is being explored in hos-

pital rooms and art studios around the country

Norton sees art helping patients develop a greater self-awareness, which allows them to make sounder decisions about their health and treatments. Dealing with cancer requires "knowledge of who you are," he said. "Art really helps that."

Often, art provides a way for patients to express feelings they can't put into words, added art therapist Tracy Councill, who runs a program for children with cancer at the Lombardi Cancer Center at Georgetown University Children's Medical Center, in Washington,

Creating vases and other pottery pieces made Sarah Turville feel better and worry less, she said. "I thought it was fun and wanted to continue doing it," she

Alicia Paulson used art to quell the pain she endured after being hit by a garbage truck and seriously injuring her foot in March 1998. She received an embroidery kit in a care package after her accident, and began embroidering sheets and pillow-

"It literally became a pain management technique," said Paulson, of Portland, Ore. "It became something I had to do to survive the pain I was feeling from the recovery of my surgeries."

Paulson eventually started a business selling embroidery pieces and other handmade items. Today, she works as a craft designer, author and photographer. Her reconstructed foot causes her daily pain.

During her recovery, Paulson said she was attracted to embroidery because she had control over the process. She found it "very satisfying to watch those spaces fill up with color."

Patients often are drawn to art because it is something they can control, Councill said.

"It really helps them feel like they can get their feet on the ground," she said.

Patients tend to relax when they're doing art, and that helps them process what's happening to them, she said.

"Often they figure out what questions they have," she said. "It helps them articulate (their needs and concerns) to doctors and nurses."

While being treated for leukemia, 12-year-old Daniel Shank-Rowe looked forward to going to the Lombardi Cancer Center, where he created figures out of pipe cleaners and a castle out of

"Doing art doesn't make you feel like a normal kid," he said. "It makes how you are feeling normal for once."

Daniel, who has been in remission for a year, said he was "a little bummed" when doctors said he didn't have to visit the cancer center - and its art studio as often.

Cindy Perlis, director of Art for Recovery at the University of California-San Francisco's Helen Diller Family Comprehensive Cancer Center, said the center offers an art studio, writing workshops and music programs. Patients tend to form a community where they talk about emotions and worries they can't share with loved ones, she said.

Perlis, an artist who has directed the center for 22 years, often facilitates the conversations by asking patients to discuss their artwork. For one project, she encouraged patients to remake their pill bottles.

# Take stress and back pain out of traveling

Q: I travel a lot and find that chiropractic helps to reduce the problems I get with pain in my back and neck. Can you give some tips for reducing these problems proactively?

A: Whether it's for business or pleasure, and whether it's by train, plane or automobile, travel can be a physically taxing activitv. Whatever the vehicle, it usually involves prolonged periods of sitting, a position that can be



tough on blood flow to muscles and on the structure of the back. When driving, slide the seat up so you're as close to the steering wheel as comfortably possible. Your knees should be slightly higher than your hips. Don't grip the steering wheel constantly. Loosen it occasionally and set your hands in different positions on the wheel, as well. Take periodic rest breaks. Fatigue can lead to dozing at the wheel. Be sure you do not get stuck sitting more on your right buttock — the imbalance can elicit more problems than one might think.

Always make sure your baggage can be rolled, reducing the need to carry it — especially over any significant distance. The prolonged use of the muscles needed to carry bags will lead to trigger points

and spasms. Use good posture when lifting bags into a trunk or car.

When traveling by plane, check any bags that are more than 5 to 10 percent of your body weight. Stowing a heavy bag in an overhead compartment while navigating the cramped aisle of a jetliner is an invitation to injury. When stowing something under the seat in front of you, take your time and do it slowly. A hasty shove with your lower legs or feet could strain a muscle or muscles in your leg or back.

If you come back from a trip with a nagging twinge somewhere, it's time to visit a chiropractor. It is the twinge from this trip that can stay in your body and create an imbalance that may get worse or stay there until the next trip and become an injury.

# Does my husband's child have a right to my husband's estate?

Q: My husband died suddenly last year, and I am the executor of his will. I recently found out that during a problematic time in our marriage, when my husband stayed with friends in another state until our marriage issues could be resolved, he may have fathered an illegitimate child while we were separated. Do I have to mention this to my attorney? Will my children and I be penalized for their dad's mistake?

A: First, we are very sorry for your loss. But, we have to say, we have a hard time with the terms "illegitimate" and "mistake" when talking about a baby that had absolutely nothing to do with his or her own conception. You were separated and you reconciled. He had a relationship while you were separated and fathered a child. As huge as it appears to you - and it is understandable considering the times when all this happened — it's really not that uncommon in this day and age. More than one third of all babies born in this country are born to single parents. Many people face the very same issue.

Ex-etiquette rule No. 8, "Be

honest and straightforward," seems to be the proper directive here. We believe the penalty you are talking about is financially based, and if that is the case, we're guessing that the child in question has just as much right to his or her father's estate as do your children. We suspect you know that, otherwise you would not have asked us.

The truth is, if you don't mention it to your attorney, the child may never know and you and your children can share equally in the bounty left by your husband. But, that doesn't make it right. It is also important to consider that you are not the only one who knows this child was born and there may be legal ramifications down the road if you do not contact him or her. For that reason alone, we suggest you consult your attorney.

#### Use alternatives instead of 'No'

Dear Mr. Dad: I feel like when I spend time with my 2year-old, I'm constantly telling him "no!" Is there some way I can enforce boundaries without being so negative?

A: It's no wonder that one of the first words kids learn to say is, "No." After all, it's the word they hear the most — even more than mommy, daddy, or their own name. Since 2-year olds are on a mission to destroy everything in their path, hearing "No" is important. But the problem with "No" is that it eventually becomes background noise and our kids tune us out. And when it comes to health and safety issues, that's the last thing we want.

You have all sorts of legitiate reasons for saying "No" to your son. But in most cases, there are more-positive ways to accomplish your goal. Let's say he wants a cookie right before dinner. Instead of saying "No," you could get the same point across by saying something like, "You can have a cookie after dinner.'

When responding to your child's requests (and demands), always remember the most important rule of parenting: Choose your battles. For example, if he wants to dump dirty laundry on the floor and then throw it back into the hamper, who cares? That may not be your idea of spending quality time together, but as long as he's not endangering anyone or anything, just sit back and marvel at the

things that will entertain a toddler. And if you're reading a book with your son, and he suddenly jumps off your lap and starts playing with blocks, fight the instinct to say, "No, we're in the middle of reading." As important as reading is, playing can sometimes be more fun. So keep an open mind and save those "Nos" for when you really need them.

A lot of the "Nos" we toss around are designed to prevent our kids from doing something inappropriate or dangerous. Obviously, safety should be your top concern. But is he really in mortal danger every time you bark "No?" Take the common toddler pastime of throwing food. Rather than the easy "No," try explaining why you want him to stop what he's doing ("food is for eating, not throwing" or "throwing food wastes it and makes a mess.")

Of course, sometimes you need to say "No." When you do. match your tone to the situation at hand. If you're constantly screaming, "No" when your son dumps water on the floor, what are you going to do when he's about to run into the road? Save the screaming for real danger and take the opportunity to teach your son how to use a mop.

# It's the bride's special day — and it's theirs, too

As a baby sitter and church school teacher, Liliana Galicia had no qualms about having children attend her September wedding.

In fact, Galicia, a 23-yearold from New Rochelle, N.Y., embraced the idea, incorporating about 40 young guests, mostly relatives, in the festivities. Kids — who ranged from 2 weeks old to 15 — got pizza, crayons and crafts, and many of them got a spot in the wedding party to boot.

"I told German (her husband) that it's going to be a little chaotic but it's worth it," Galicia said, adding that she was not concerned about the kids' behavior "as long as they didn't destroy anything that was not mine.'

Getting married was a chance for "a family moment," she said. "I really think that my family deserved to be there and that I deserved to have my family.'

Although modern brides are sometimes caricatured as selfish "bridezillas," there are many who believe that weddings are about celebrating family and community rather than simply being the belle of the ball.

It's an idea that is both traditional and, in some cases, trendy. For Galicia, who moved here from Guatemala, giving extended family a voice in the wedding has roots in her home country and culture. Other couples come to the same conclusion for personal, as opposed to traditional, reasons. They might hope to turn the focus of the day toward a cause or charity, or reach out to relatives, even including them on the honeymoon.

"There are so many ways for brides to involve their families or communities in their wedding day," said Karry Castillo, a Central Florida wedding planner. "We really encourage our clients to think outside the traditional wedding box."

One couple with whom Castillo worked invited guests to go with them on a postwedding Caribbean cruise. Another client, an avid runner, invited friends to take part in a charity run leading up to her wedding day.

The stress of planning a wedding can easily bring out primadonna behavior, Castillo said; sharing or doling out responsibilities to friends and family can help, emotionally and also financially.

One Mexican-American community in Los Angeles, for example, keeps alive a longstanding Mexican tradition by pitching in to cover wedding costs.

Acting as "padrino" or "madrina" — Spanish for godfather and godmother, or sponsor — family or friends take on a range of responsibilities, providing and paying for parts of the festivities including food, photos and the couple's clothing, said Araceli Ulloa, 19, of Los Angeles, whose family often helps couples in such ways.

The custom, which also applies to other big events, can take different forms depending on the people involved, Ulloa said. In one case, a bride or groom's family may ask close friends or relatives for help. In another, people offer first.

Either way, the idea is that communities pool resources to help out when friends or family need it most. Being asked to be a sponsor is considered an honor.

"It's with people that you

feel close to and comfortable," Ulloa said. "It makes me feel special. I know I will be able to count on them, and they know that I will be there for them anytime." For Tami Mount, of

Larchmont, N.Y., being included in her cousin's North Carolina post-wedding weekend felt special too. The cousins grew up shar-

ing vacations on the Outer Banks, so Mount's cousin and his bride asked the extended family to stay with them for a weekend at the beach after their wedding.

Rekindling those family beach vacations — with a new member to boot — gave special meaning to the wedding for Mount.

"We were honored and thrilled to get called back to our playground for a week together," said Mount, whose husband and daughter also joined.

"Our parents still got the best rooms in the house, but at least the newlyweds didn't have to sleep in bunk beds," she said. "They didn't care that we brought along our babies — it was the making of new memories to mix with the old that they wanted."



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

# Let the Games Begin!

Next week, the games of the 21st Winter Olympics will start in British Columbia, Canada. This Mini Page will give you a few things to watch for during this twoweek celebration of sport, skill and friendship.



#### A giant welcome

The opening ceremonies will take place on Friday, Feb. 12, at 6 p.m. Pacific time. The ceremonies are a way for the host nation and city to welcome the rest of the world and the athletes to the Olympics. Using music, dance and special effects, each opening ceremony is a **unique**, or one-of-a-kind, performance.

#### Brrr! It's cold out there

Many sports in the Winter Games take place outside. The alpine skiing and snowboarding events need a lot of snow so that athletes can achieve fast speeds and make sharp turns. The snow is **groomed**, or smoothed and packed, to prevent it from getting too icy and slick or too powdery, either of which can make athletes lose control and fall.



Cross-country skiing started as a way for people to get around during winters with

#### Skiing with a twist

Cross-country skiing is a different type of skiing that requires a lot of **stamina**, or long-lasting strength.

Skiers race not only downhill, but also move over flat land and even go up small hills. Cross-country ski races are sometimes called loppets (lawpits), which means "race" in Swedish. In the **ski jump**, a person skis

without poles down a long ramp and off a jump. He flies through the air, trying to land as far



down the mountain as he can.

#### Two sports in one

Some sports are a combination of other sports. Biathlon combines crosscountry skiing and target shooting with a rifle. Nordic combined is a dual sport of cross-country skiing and ski jumping.

The newest Olympic event is **ski** cross. It is a part of the sport of freestyle skiing, along with **moguls** (MOH-guhls), or snow bumps, and aerials (AIR-ee-uhls), or tricks and flips off a jump. In ski cross, a group of four skiers race to finish first.

#### Put it on ice

While the skiing and snowboarding events all need the snow, other Winter Olympic sports take place on the ice.

The **bobsled**, **luge** and **skeleton** are outdoor sports that use a long, fast ice track with lots of turns. "Luge" is the French word for sled.

# Competition on the Ice



Ice hockey is a popular event during the Winter Olympics

**Ice hockey** is played throughout the entire Winter Games by both men's and women's teams. This year, the men's hockey gold medal game is the last event of the Vancouver Olympics.

**Speedskating** is similar to two runners doing laps around a track for the best time. Because the inside lane of the oval-shaped track is shorter than the outside lane, racers switch lanes in the middle of the race. This is called a **crossover**.

**Short-track** is a different type of speedskating. In this event, four to six skaters race each other, not the clock. There is also a relay event, where each racer on a team skates one part of the race.



Shorttrack teams very close together at high speeds.


Speedskaters can go faster than any other human beings without the help of machines — about 40 mph. Indoor events such as speedskating will take place at the Richmond Olympic Oval.

Figure skating may be the most popular sport at the Winter Olympics. Graceful skaters use jumps, twists and spins to earn points, which are awarded by judges.

Jumps such as the Axel and the Lutz are named after the famous skaters who created them.

# 'Bayonetta' well worth its shortcomings

Any game that can pay heavy homage to "Viewtiful Joe" and "Devil May Cry" in one elegant, brimming package is simply destined to be a timeless classic.

As with "Devil May Cry," Hideki Kamiya has again taken the 3-D action genre to new heights with his newest gem, "Bayonetta." Platinum Games' second major title since the studio's inception is a wondrous breath of fresh air after the embarrassing "MadWorld" for Wii. Not only has Kamiya carried over the style, flair and addicting replayability of DMC-style action, he's managed to liberally incorporate key combat elements from one of my favorite titles of his,

"Viewtiful Joe." And while I admit the execution isn't perfect, you'll learn to forgive the game's shortcomings.

You play as the title character, Bayonetta. She's a witch with serious attitude and enough guns to make an Army surplus depot jealous. She is one of the more memorable female leads ever to be featured in a video game. She's confident, strong and witty, but most importantly, she is genuinely feminine. This took me aback considerably, as generally video-game writers inherently lack the ability to create a female character that doesn't walk, talk and act like a man.

Now, if you're not big on kooky Japanese camp, you may want to skip through the numerous cut scenes. But honestly, you'd be missing out.

"Bayonetta" contains one of the more entertaining, if highly outlandish, stories in recent gaming.

The battles are always fast and furious, never letting up for a moment.

mula in "Bayonetta" is the ability to equip weapons on both of your feet. Yes, your feet. Strap guns, claws and a variety of other weapons of mass blood-letting to your lower extremities, and bask in the glory of varied combos that range from great to outright insane.

You can mix and match most of the game's weapons in many permutations for some highly customized destruction.

Another area where the game falters slightly is in some of the boss battles. There are a few encounters that scream "God of War." If you're a fan of the series, I'm sure you'll appreciate the grand scale and utter lack of real challenge. I, however, care little for this level of fluff.

One particular fight about two-thirds through the game is one of Kamiya's best-designed one-on-one fights though. In all, bosses are a mixed bag, and leave something to be desired.

The only other detractors for me were the homage levels. Kamiya pays respect to the game's publisher, Sega, with a few side missions in the game that plays on classics "Hang-on" and "Space Harrier." These levels drag on far too long, and end up being a nuisance rather than a welcome distraction in the end.

Other than a sprinkling of shortcomings, "Bayonetta" is truly the next evolution of 3-D action. It's more bombastic, fast and furious than any predecessor in the genre. It's also packed with so much content, that even after your fourth play-through, you'll likely still not be done with all there is to offer.

# Bioware's star-faring 'Mass Effect 2' sparkles

Fans of "Avatar" rave about how immersive it is, but it has a problem: The

film only lasts 161 minutes. If you really want immersive, travel to the amazing universe of BioWare's science-fiction epic "Mass Effect 2" (Electronic Arts, for the Xbox 360, \$59.99). I've already spent about 50 hours there, and I can't wait to return. And there's no need for 3-D glasses.

"Mass Effect" introduced an intergalactic menace called the Reapers, an ornery bunch that wakes up every few millenniums and destroys all organic life. The main character, Shepard, managed to repel a Reaper attack against the headquarters of star-faring civilization, but as the dust settled, it was clear the battle was only beginning.

"ME2" begins with Shepard's death, although she's quickly resurrected by a shadowy group called Cerberus and its cryptic leader, the Illusive Man. (Shepard can be either male or female: I chose to play the game as a woman.) Cerberus awakens Shepard with the news that entire human colonies are vanishing, and provides her with a sparkly new spaceship to investigate the mystery.

Since most of Shepard's old crew don't know she's

alive, she needs to assemble a new gang from a file of dubious resumes gathered by the Illusive Man. Most of them aren't the kind of creatures you'd want to be stuck with on a spaceship: A tattooed human psychopath; a stoic, fish-faced assassin; a bloodthirsty giant lizard.

Even the most incorrigible of them has a compelling back story, something developer BioWare has mastered through the years. Most of "ME2" is spent recruiting your crewmates and then earning their loyalty by helping them resolve issues from their past.

Shepard herself evolves through the course of the drama. Throughout, you are asked to make moral choices. Act heroically and characters will treat you with respect; act like a jerk and they'll be more fearful. The choices aren't always that cut and dried, though, and options that feel right emotionally may not have the expected results.

Overall, "Mass Effect" is sophisticated, thought-provoking science fiction that makes "Avatar" look simpleminded. So soon after last year's "Dragon Age: Origins," it confirms the status of the BioWare team as the best storytellers in video games. Four stars out of four.

## Soothing the Winter Itch

# Consider a pre-inspection when selling

Q: Last week, I decided to speak to a Realtor about listing my home. The Realtor gave me some great advice on preparing my house for the market. One thing I had never heard of before was doing a "pre listing home inspection."



# Preston County's Dream Mountain Ranch has rugged potential

Outdoorsmen who dream of huge tracts of land for hunting may think they're still sleeping once they view a new Preston County development.

Dream Mountain Ranch, a 1150-acre sporting property located in Albright, off W.Va. 26, provides opportunities for hunting, fishing and several other outdoor activities.

Barbara Alexander, Howard Hanna Premier Properties broker, said the 52 miles of trails and paths are great for ATV's, snowmobiling, mountain biking, cross country skiing and hiking.

Jay Swearingen, one of Dream Mountain Ranch's three owners, said the scenic quality of the land was what sparked his interest.

"Back in 2005, we first saw the property and fell in love with it," he said. "To be honest, we weren't certain what we would do with it. We knew we liked it and it was unique. The wildlife and ecosystem that was there was interesting and fun."

Instead of working against the property, Swearingen said they spent the next two years refining what type of development would fit best.

"We went with a rustic, cabin in the woods or mountains look and feel," he said. "We tried to play off the property and leverage it, instead of being in conflict with it."

Within Dream Mountain Ranch lies The Preserve, located in the northeastern part of the property. This 150-acre private, gated community is made up of two- to five-acre home sites, which can be purchased for building. Lot prices start at \$44,900, and Swearingen said

The Preserve offers access to a large tract of land without all the upkeep.

"We've spent a lot of time creating a variety of lots. There are wooded lots, meadow lots, some near fishing ponds and others on a slope," he said. "We have pretty much tried to accommodate any sort of cabin that the owners could envision. We wanted to have a good variety for them to choose from."

Potential owners can choose from a large portfolio of cabins and homes built by Dream Mountain Ranch for the lots. Some cabin shells are priced as low as \$50,000, but there is no limit to

detail or size for potential owners. Dream Mountain Ranch offers hundreds of plans, depending on the buyers' needs, budget and time frame. They offer a variety



of natural exteriors such as logs, log siding and wood siding.

"We are builders ourselves; we have partner builders, or you can hire your own. We want the area to have a rustic, log cabin look and feel, but it doesn't have to be. We're looking for it to be a casual community," Swearingen said.

Upon purchasing a lot, owners get a membership to the property, which includes access to hundreds of acres for outdoor activities. The land also has six stocked ponds for fishing and specific areas for hunting seasons in September through January.

According to Swearingen, the environment created at Dream Mountain Ranch allows animals to grow to trophy size, whereas those living in public hunting lands may struggle in the unprotected habitat. These areas have been carefully planned and throughout, ensuring that hunting goals won't conflict with any other outdoor adventure.

For lot owners who aren't looking to build right away, or others who would like to visit, the site also has lodging available for rent. Dream Mountain Ranch has a renovated log cabin turned hunting lodge that will sleep eight to 10 people. It has a full modern kitchen, fireplace, home theater, three televisions. DirecTV satellite programming and three bathrooms.

The lodge also features wraparound front and back porches.

"Eventually, once we have enough lot owners, we will close that to the public and it will be for the lot owners to use, as they need," Swearingen said.

There are also three guest cabins located next to the lodge. These one-bedroom luxury loft cabins can be used for extra lodging if a lot owner has family or friends in. These cabins line a ridge that overlooks two fishing ponds, and allows for views in all directions. Both the hunt lodge and guest cabins are available for a minimum twonight rental.



# Consider using two short extension cords

**O**NE LONG EXTENSION CORD can do a good job, but two could do twice the work. There are lots of times when an extra-long cord is iust a waste, and it's not good to keep it coiled up when working with it. So if you have an extra-long extension cord, you could cut it in half and make two shorter cords. It might be a lot more useful this way. And, if you need the extra length again, you can always plug them back together. After cutting the cord in half, you easily can install new plugs on both cut ends. Now you will have two cords. It's just that easy to do, and will cost you only a few dollars for the new plugs.

**DEAR AL:** My wife has a ton of plants that she moves into the house every winter. We never seem to have enough drip trays for them all. In an effort to save some money

this year, I bought drainage trays from the grocery store. I found that lightweight, aluminum baking pans, pie pans and oven trays are much cheaper and work great. Also, the trays that some TV dinners come in will work too. I can't wait until spring to get this stuff back outside, though! — D.S.

Q: We have wooden paneling in our kitchen, and I would like to paint over it. What's the best paint to use? — J.G.

A: Primer is the key to a great paint job over paneling. Clean the paneling with mineral spirits paint thinner first, and then

apply a really good primer, followed by your paint. To start, you can scuff-sand the surface to help get the best adhesion. It may take several coats of paint to get the best coverage.

**DEAR KELLY:** My parents live in a retirement community that has a wonderful recreational area. I noticed that there were some magazines and books around for people to read, but nothing that great. I took a bunch of my old craft and woodworking magazines there last week, and they love them! If you have extras, you should see if there's a place where you are able to donate them. — J.W.

# Native American items can find their way onto antique markets

A RECENT AUCTION sold a 19thcentury carved and painted wooden "raven rattle" made by Northwest Coast Indians. Its shape is very unusual. Ceremonial rattles like this one tell a story and are valued pieces from the past. The main part of the rattle is shaped like a bird. An Indian with a painted face or a mask is crouching on the bird's back while holding a froglike figure. The Indian's feet are resting on a mask. The rattle represents the Indian legend of the raven that stole daylight from heaven and took it to the dark world. The man on the pipe represents a shaman initiate who is able to work with the spirit world as well as the visible world. He holds a frog and draws knowledge from the animal world through the frog's long red tongue. The mask the shaman has at his feet represents the life supported by the sea that adds to the life of man. The rattle makes noise when you shake it. An elaborate rattle with carvings

usually belonged to a highranking member of the tribe. The 19th-century rattle sold at a Skinner auction in Boston for \$9,480.

Q: I have a Lane hope chest that my mother got in 1938. It's marked inside "Altavista Va." with serial number 112331 and style number 48388X. Can you tell me when the chest was made?

A: John Lane bought a box plant in Altavista, Va., in 1912. His son, Ed Hudson Lane, soon began making cedar chests in the factory. The business was incorporated as Standard Red Cedar Chest Co. During World War I, the factory was converted to wartime production and made ammunition boxes. In 1922, the name of the company was changed to The Lane Co. The Lane family continued to oper-

ate the business until 1986, when Interco took over the company. Lane is now part of Furniture Brands International. The serial number indicates that your chest was made on Nov. 23, 1931. There is a recall on locks on Lane chests made before 1987. The lock on your cedar chest should be replaced because a child

could get trapped inside and suffocate. Contact the company via its Web site, www.LaneFurniture.com, and you will be sent a free replacement lock.

Q: I have a factorysealed box of "Roy **Rogers Happy Trails** Chocolate, Peanut Butter & Trail Mix." The cover is in color, with a photo of Roy in front of a desert background. There's no date on the box, but the candy was made by Colt Inc. of Nashville, Tenn. Any value?

A: You can buy a new box of Happy Trails candy today for \$14. Colt still makes it. The company was founded in 1984 by Mackenzie Colt, who was a performer on the TV show "Hee Haw" from 1978 to 1982. That's where she met Roy Rogers (1911-1998) and his wife, Dale Evans (1912-2001). They loved the candy and were happy to have Roy's name used. We suggest that if you want to save the box, empty it. Eventually the candy will attract rodents or insects.



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

# A home exercise program can cost a bundle or just a few bucks

NEWPORT NEWS, Va. — A few years ago, in January, Barb Lito and her husband decided to bite the bullet and buy some home exercise equipment.

"We both had gym memberships, but with demanding jobs and family commitments, we were not making that time to get to the gym," said Lito, who works as superintendent of recreation programs for Newport News Parks and Recreation.

Their daughter, who was 10 years old at the time, was too old for the nursery but too young to turn loose at the gym.

Working out at home was getting more attractive. There, she or her husband could squeeze in a workout whenever they found a spare 30 minutes. "It was the convenience factor," Lito said.

So they canceled their gym memberships and headed to Sears where they spent about \$2,000 on a pair of NordicTrack machines an elliptical trainer and a treadmill.

Despite what cynics might be thinking, this story has a happy ending. Today, at least two years later, those machines aren't simply gathering dust in a corner.

Lito, her husband and her daughter have all used them to burn calories and build muscle.

"I love my stationary equipment," Lito said. "I like the flexibility. And in the long run, it's worked out well for us financially."

That doesn't mean that it's necessary to spend thousands of dollars to get a good workout at home. Local experts and enthusiasts we interviewed, including Lito, told us what to look for in home exercise equipment in all price ranges.

Let's start at the bottom and work our way up, beginning with what you tie on your feet.

#### **Exercise balls**

Inflatable stability balls and old-fashioned weighted balls also known as medicine balls have rolled back into fashion among fitness experts.

The weighted spheres can be used to add resistance to a wide variety of exercises. "They're tried-and-true and

they work. I think people are realizing that," Palamarchuck said. "They're very versatile." He suggested using them with crunches or squats

They're also readily available. You'll find them at sporting goods stores as well as big box discounters such as Walmart.

Moore suggested beginners start with a 4-pound medicine ball. "Start with something lower than what you can handle, then increase."

Exercise experts also recommended using the inflatable stability balls. Look for models with an anti-burst feature and be sure to buy the right size ball for the user's height.

#### **Hand weights**

"With free weights or a stability ball, there are a lot of things you can do without spending a lot of money," said Andre Moore, senior director of wellness and membership at the Newport News

"With dumbbells, you have a choice of neoprene-covered or just iron," he said. "It's just personal preference and comfort." He said the price shouldn't be more than a couple of dollars per pound. "If someplace is asking you to pay \$5 or more a pound, go somewhere else."

For those choosing how much weight to use, Moore suggested using this test: Do two or three sets of 12 to 15 lifts, such as a curl. "If you are straining on the last couple of reps, that's probably a good weight for you."

Typically, people just starting out use hand weights of 3-5 pounds.

#### **Exercise machines**

The Brittingham-Midtown Community Center on Jefferson Avenue in Newport News is equipped with Vision Fitness brand stationary bicycles. That brand is available for home use. Fitness Resource, a shop near Patrick Henry Mall, stocks a full line of Vision Fitness bikes, both upright and recumbent, meaning they are ridden from a reclining position. Those range in price from about \$500 to \$900.

The same shop also offers treadmills and elliptical machines. Ellipticals are similar to stairstepping machines, but also works the arms.

"The elliptical is my favorite piece of equipment — you get both an upper and lower body workout," said Barb Lito, who enjoys exercising at home. "It's a good program to start on. You can change speed and incline and do interval training. But I love treadmills, too, because you can walk at first and build up slowly. But if you have any joint issues, then that might not be the right choice."

When buying exercise equipment, look for a model that comes with a heart rate monitor. Moore. from Newport News YMCA, said. "Some also have a chart that shows you where you should be for fat burning or cardio training. That will help you fine tune your workout to help you reach the goals you want to hit."

Moore said that exercise machines often end up being more of a clothes hanger than anything else, so it's important to buy a machine you might actually enjoy.

'If you're not a runner, don't get a treadmill," Moore said. "If you have knee problems, an elliptical trainer would be better. If you're going to spend that kind of money, make sure you enjoy doing the activity. If you enjoy it, you're going to get good use out of it."

# Use winter evenings to prepare for coming season

At this writing, I see snowflakes out the window where just a few days ago I saw ice giving way to milder temperatures. Although there are plenty of outdoor chores to be done, it might be a good idea to take advantage of the long evening hours to make plans for managing your forage this spring. Below are 10 items to consider as you begin preparing for the coming season:

1. Plan your forage inventory for the coming year and calculate the budget for the forage enterprises. Investigate ideas on reducing costs or increasing income from forages in your operation.

2. Plan new forage seedings and have contingency plans to meet your forage inventory needs. For example, what will you do if next year's forage growth is less than expected?

3. Order seed and supplies for spring plantings. Consider both yield potential and forage quality goals when making variety selections.



4. If you buy or sell forages, communicate with your suppliers or customers to update contracts and establish plans for the coming year.

5. If you utilize contract planting or harvesting services, meet with your service supplier to coordinate plans for the coming forage season.

6. Order supplies such as fertilizer, herbicide, pesticides and fencing. Nitrogen fertilization is especially critical to good production of grasses and should be applied early in the spring when grasses begin to grow and soils are suitable for transport of equipment. Potassium and phosphorus topdressing should wait until after the first harvest, when soils are firmer. Always base fertilizer applications on current soil test results.

7. Begin routine maintenance and repairs on forage planting and harvesting equipment. Order parts for haybines or disc mowers, choppers and rakes or tedders. Order supplies such as twine, balage wrap, etc.

8. Frost seed legumes into small grains or pastures in late February to early March.

9. If you utilize grazing, carefully consider what adjustments you will make to your grazing management during the coming season. How will you manage that spring flush of forage growth so as to maintain high-quality pastures throughout the season?

10. Keep snowmobiles and other traffic off alfalfa stands during the winter.

For more suggestions on forage planning, contact your local county extension office.

#### **USDA Service Center**

March 15 is the deadline to obtain Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) and Federal

Crop Insurance for spring seeded crops. NAP is a federally funded program that provides coverage to producers for noninsurable crops when low yields, loss of inventory or prevented planting occurs due to natural disasters. Crops eligible for NAP coverage are those for which crop insurance is not available, including fruits and vegetables, aquaculture and forage crops. # Stamps, stuffed animals or seashells: Start a collection

**Ever since** I was a child, there is one thing I have always loved to do — collect things.

The first thing you see when you step into my office is my large collection of Mr. Potato Heads. When you visit my home, you may notice my travelthemed kitchen or my elaborate collection of vintage toys and Little Golden Books.

I have always been drawn to searching for items that fit with my collections and love the opportunity to add on to a collection. According to Wikipedia, the hobby of collecting includes seeking, locating, acquiring, organizing, cataloging, displaying, storing and maintaining whatever items are of interest to the individual collector. Most collectors begin by purchasing items that are of interest to them and build on these items. Some people collect items that are antique and will build in value, while others collect items simply because they like them.

I was surprised to learn that encouraging your child to begin a collection may actually have benefits, other than only being a hobby or activity. According to *Parents*

magazine, to a child, collecting things like stuffed animals or trading cards provides an exciting way to become more independent and a common ground for socializing. Collecting a certain item may empower a child to learn about a subject that their parents just "don't get."

How often has your child returned at the end of a school day, excited about a science experiment or project that they learned about? Collecting may result in the same reaction. Oftentimes children enjoy being able to teach adults. If a child begins to collect a certain type of playing cards, for example, they may enjoy showing and explaining them to an adult.

Children can become an authority on the topic. Collecting can also instill a sense of pride among children. Collections serve as a child's most prized possession and a great way for you to foster that is to assist your children in finding a way to

display their collections. When I was a child, I collected rocks and I will never forget setting up a display and walking my family members and neighbors through my very own "Rock Muse-

um." I took pride in remembering where each rock came from and having the opportunity to show them off. Another great benefit of collecting is in the improvement of school skills.

All those hours a child puts into counting, sorting, labeling, categorizing and organizing are actually fostering math skills. Reading may also get a boost: Kids who are into dinosaurs may invest time learning more about when those creatures roamed the earth.

Webkinz can help gradeschoolers hone their computer skills while encouraging them to accept responsibility for their virtual pets. You may also want to consider encouraging your child to save his or her own money toward items in their collections. This will add more personal value to each item, since the child must make a choice on which item to purchase next.

It will assist in budget-

ing and money saving skills. The point should not be to purchase as many of your collectible as possible, but rather to save and select the one that means the most or you especially are interested in obtaining.

The final benefit suggested in the magazine included the fact that collections can be used to preserve memories. Many collectibles including magnets, pens and postcards can be purchased on vacation and can be used to help remember fun times and family vacations.

I hope that I have inspired you to consider encouraging a loved one to begin a collection. The next time your child reaches for a stuffed animal and you know they already have 50 at home, think of all the benefits that may come with adding it to the collection.



## Worry about college before investments

Q: I'm 17, and my personal finance class at high school has been watching your course. I want to begin investing early to take advantage of compound interest, so I want to start a Roth IRA. Which mutual funds would you advise investing in while I'm still trying to save for college? — Jeff

A: I love the fact that you're thinking ahead, but I want you to save for college before you worry about investing. The best investment you'll ever make is an investment in you, and that's exactly what college is all about.

Now, if having money for college isn't a big issue, you can go ahead and begin putting a little bit of money into a Roth IRA. You can put as much as \$5,000 a year into one, but the great thing is that

much into one. It would probably be pretty hard for you to invest to that extent while you're still in college, anyway.

When it comes to a first mutual fund, I'd suggest a simple growth-stock mutual fund. They're pretty calm, and they will do some great things if you can find one with a good, long track record of success.

#### Q: I'm looking at allocations for my mutual funds. What's the difference between mid cap growth and mid cap value? — Jason

A: For purposes of allocating, a mid cap is a medium-sized company. Generally, these fall into the growth stock mutual fund category. Try thinking of value funds this way: Let's say you buy an expensive home in a good neighborhood. It's okay that you paid a little more. because it's a good area, and you're just going to wait things out. It's that kind of value mentality versus bargain hunting and trying to get a great deal. When it comes right down to it, the differences in the two types are small. I'd go with whichever one has the best track record and rate of return. Regardless, always remember to spread your money across these four types of mutual funds: growth, growth and income, aggressive growth, and international.

#### Q: How do you buy a surprise gift for your spouse when you both see the budget and handle the checkbook? — **Anonymous**

A: Start by having a gift-giving category as part of your budget.

This works both ways, one for each of you. That way, you'll both know how much goes into that category, but you won't know where something was pur-

chased or what was bought. I think the gift category is the best and most fair way to give you both input and control over the budget. The idea that you're going to sneak up on your wife or husband with a \$10,000 gift is pretty unrealistic if you're working on your finances together.

does, it's going to be a long day. The contents in one's purse are of utmost importance, secondary only to the level of aes-

thetic appeal. Scigliano Designs Boutique, located at 1344-B University Ave., banks on this notion, helping everybody find their

"purse-onality." Gina Shields founded Scigliano Designs in 2006, and within two years, the company had launched its online store and was a distributor to Morgantown-area boutiques. And last autumn, Scigliano Designs Boutique celebrated its grand opening in downtown Morgantown.

Shields, a Stonewood, W.Va., native and WVU graduate, was once a fashion design and merchandising major with a big dream. She had decided back in high school that she would study fashion in college, though she was uncertain of her future in the field.

'During my sophomore year, I got the idea to attempt making a purse out of some old fabric,' she said. "From that one purse, I kept growing, developing and adding designs, and I eventually grew my merchandise into the business that I have today."

Her fast-growing bag business caters to the individual. Rather than seeking inspiration through other designers or bigbusiness moguls, Shields said she's inspired by her customers.

"When someone describes to me or shows me a picture of a handbag that they like, it is a great challenge for me to see if I can conquer the task of creating a handbag identical to what they have in mind," she said. "Then, from that new design, I add my own personal touches and end up with a new handbag

design for my line.' There is a separate room in her boutique where the designing takes place. When you walk into the room, Shields said, you can pick a style, select a color and finish of leather, choose your own lining and hardware, and even decide how many pockets you prefer on the inside of the bag. This is where personal uniqueness can be captured.

"I am there to assist in the designing process, of course, suggesting things that I think would enhance the look of the purse, but I really encourage each person to think about and examine every detail of their purse," she said.

Amanda Gill, the boutique's

intern, said a trend book, featuring designs for the fall 2009/winter 2010 season can also offer assistance for customers creating custom purses.

"It showcases some of the top trends for the season and how the leathers used by Scigliano Designs complement these trends," Gill said.

Gill also assists clients with custom orders and takes measurements for strap alterations. She said it's very rewarding to assist with the custom-design process to ensure that people are getting exactly what they want in their purses.

With over 18 different purse designs - a number that is constantly growing - Scigliano features more than an average bag. They carry women's diaper bags, men's messenger bags, leather backpacks, wristlets,

wallets and belts.

Currently, Shields' favorite bag is "Giana" because of its versatility.

"It can be carried with a dressy outfit or a more casual one, and it looks great in any color or on any person," she said. "What I love most about this bag are the straps. It has two shorter handbag straps and a longer one [which can be detached] that can be worn either over the shoulder or across the body.'

The company also offers an eco-friendly Go Green grocery bag, which is part of a fairly new, working collection. The bag is made from ripstop nylon, which, Shields says, is the same material used in hot air balloons, kits and camping equipment. The bag is virtually impossible to rip, can hold up to 25 pounds of weight, and can fold up to fit in your back pock-

"I strongly believe in going green and want to do my part to help the environment," she said. "Carrying grocery bags instead of using plastic bags is a very small step in helping the environment, but every small step helps. Carrying grocery bags is something that every individual can do."

Shields said she believes the boutique has something that appeals to everyone. Customers come in to either purchase or design a purse, and often leave with a scarf, piece of jewelry or T-shirt, too.

During the holiday season, Scigliano Designs saw many male customers looking for gifts to give the women in their lives.

'The Scigliano customer ranges anywhere in age from 18 to 80," Gill said. "There are affordable items for students on a budget, trendy clutches for the fashion forward, and timeless and sophisticated handbag styles for the fashionable woman."

Where does the future lie for Scigliano Designs? Shields said close to home, in the state of West Virginia. While a bigger city might offer a great opportunity for growth as a designer, Shields considers herself a "hometown girl."

#### More and more, physician assistants have a job duties comparable to doctors

MIAMI — Charity Ramsey has the white lab coat, the stethoscope, and the prescription pad. She spends all day treating patients. But she's not a doctor.

Ramsey is a physician assistant, a fast-growing profession whose members say they can do most of what a doctor does, but without the seven-plus years of medical school and residency.

Instead, PAs, as they are called, typically take a 27month graduate degree, after which they can take the licensing exam and jump right into practice.

After that, starting salaries in Florida average almost \$55,000, while experienced workers average almost \$100,000, according to the state labor department.

New patients are sometimes unfamiliar with PAs, but most warm up quickly, practitioners say.

"They say, 'Are you going to go on to be a doctor?' and I say, 'No, this is my chosen field," said Ramsey, who works at a small family medical practice in Boca Raton, Fla.

We really see the same type of patients with the same problems."

PAs must work under the supervision of a doctor, but beyond that they have wide latitude. They can work in any specialty, and can change specialties if they can find a doctor willing to work with them.

Miguel Garcia, who just graduated from Barry University's PA program, has a job lined up with a cardiac surgery practice in the Tampa area. He will assist the doctors at the operating table.

"You're scrubbed in, you stand across the operating table from the surgeon and you're assisting throughout the course of the surgery," he said.

Admission to PA school can be competitive. Nova Southeastern University has received more than 1,000 applications for 85 seats in its master's program, said Bill Marquardt, NSU's associate dean for physician assistant education. As with other PA programs, NSU's requires students to have

taken undergraduate science courses such as biochemistry, microbiology and anatomy.

The school strongly prefers students with some experience working in health care so they know what they are getting into.

For those admitted, the program is intense. While a master's in business administration might be 40 or 45 credits, and a law degree 90, NSU's PA program includes 140 credits. Study must be full-time. The first 15 months are spent mainly in the classroom, while the rest consists of a series of rotations working with doctors in a variety of specialties.

Barry's program is similar, but Miami Dade College has a slightly different arrangement. MDC offers a bachelor's degree program, with the PA classes and clinical training making up the second of two years of study.

After graduation and licensure, PAs can work in hospitals or doctors' offices, but not every institution uses them.

For example, some hospitals prefer to employ advanced registered nurse practitioners, who serve similar functions to PAs.

Nurse practitioners typically have undergraduate and master's degrees in nursing. Like PAs, they can prescribe drugs. Many work in primary care, while some specialize in fields like cardiology or pediatrics.



#### Find out why your worker cuts corners

Q: One of my team members often cuts corners on his projects. He is otherwise talented and is well liked. How can I get him to improve this aspect of his performance?

A: Understand the reasons, provide solutions, and then hold him accountable.

#### The inner game

Put yourself into this employee's position. What do you think is driving his behavior? He may not know expectations, he may not know how to achieve them, or he may not care. Each of these raises unique requirements for you as a leader.

Look honestly at your past management of the situation. Have you been clear about expectations for quality and process? Likewise, look at how well you've prepared him to meet your expectations.

If you believe that he doesn't see anything wrong with his approach, look at your past record for holding him accountable. Have you confirmed that it doesn't matter because you've let things slide? Also take time to evaluate whether it's just him, or if it's a more widespread phenomenon than you originally thought.

In reviewing your leadership, don't be distracted by blaming yourself. This is data collection, all aimed at improving the situation in the future. This process may raise some emotional reactions from you - disappointment or frustration, perhaps. While your feelings may seem justified, it won't help to let them get out of control.

#### The outer game

Whatever the reason for his behavior, vou'll need a plan to address it. And your approach to each dynamic will require clear communication with him.

Start by organizing your thoughts and designing the conversation you want to have. You may not know exactly what's driving his shortfalls, so consider where you'd like more insight. Be ready to adapt your ideas for improvement based on his feedback.

If he doesn't understand your expectations, explain them, and then have him explain them back until you're sure he gets it. Use typical work situations as examples to clarify your expectations in a variety of circumstances.

He may understand, but be at a loss as to how to proceed. Use his past "corner cutting" behavior as a textbook, not to blame but to teach him preferred options. Then discuss ways he can adopt these new approaches going forward.

If he doesn't care, make it clear that it matters and that there will be consequences. Many leaders struggle to be firm, but it's the right thing to do for all concerned. Decide how strong a line you want to take, then let him know and be consistent about enforcing your expectations.

You don't have to do this on your own. Find him a mentor on the team who can help him understand and execute properly.

Also, find someone to buddy up with yourself, especially to provide support if you need to learn new leadership skills.

#### The last word

Most people want to do the right thing, and you'll help by being clear and consistent in your expectations.

# Happiness may keep workers in place

FORT LAUDERDALE, Fla. — Workers found a new love for their jobs in the recession, whether they were really satisfied or not. But as the economy recovers, the unhappy worker is likely to start looking for a new job.

Employers who want to retain their talented and skilled workers should be aware of what tends to make their employees happy at work. For some, that may be flexibility with their work schedules. Others cite a friendly, collegial environment. Rarely is compensation listed as what makes people happiest at work.

But with some employers

handling layoffs poorly, the attitude is, "when this market turns and I'm no longer fearful of losing my job, I'm going to be finding a new job," said Stacy Ethun, president of Park Avenue Group, the Orlando affiliate of MRINetwork, a global search firm.

The Conference Board recently reported that job satisfaction is at a 22-year low, with only 45 percent of those surveyed being satisfied with their jobs. Almost one-quarter of respondents said they didn't expect to be at their current jobs within a year.

Management is often unaware of the level of dissatisfaction among workers and fails to take steps to prevent significant turnover, Ethun said. "There's almost

a general apathy of appreciation of them. Managers seem to have the attitude, 'If I'm going to be unhappy, than everybody's going to be unhappy," she said.

Ethun said younger workers usually want opportunities to learn and seek new challenges. "They want to feel like they're making a difference, that what I do matters," she said.

JoAnna Brandi, a specialist in customer retention in Boca Raton, Fla., asks employees in her workshops to write down "everything that makes you feel good at work."

"The two that matter most are the people I work for and the people I work with," Brandi said. "We're social animals. What matters to us are connections with other people.'

Participants also say they feel good when: "my boss notices my effort and my results," "higher-ups ask me questions," "people tell me clearly their expectations," "I can provide feedback without fear of negative consequences," and when management "gets out of my way."

"It's having faith in me," said Brandi, who is collecting data on what motivates people to be their best at work on feelgoodatwork project.com. Visitors can take a confidential survey on the site to give their feedback on what makes them happy at work.

I recently asked several

workers what makes them happy at work.

Maria Cristina Gonzalez, a strategy consultant for IBM, said she likes having the autonomy to make day-today decisions, instead of dealing with bureaucracy. She likes to work with people who are top-notch professionals but who also are caring people who give to others.

Julianne Carelli, public relations manager at MSC Cruises in Fort Lauderdale, prizes an environment where she is recognized for her efforts and communicates well with her boss and colleagues. "If your boss is flexible and willing to work with you, it goes a long way... It makes you want to work harder and builds loyalty," she said.

# Program trains manufacturing technicians

McClatchy Newspapers (MCT) MIAMI — Florida leaders are putting a lot of eggs in the biotechnology basket, betting that the fastgrowing industry will produce good-paying jobs for

state residents. They've spent millions of dollars to attract biotech research centers to the state, and local business boosters are trying to recruit more companies to South Florida. The University of Miami is even planning a Life Science Park, which is expected to employ 4,500 people.

To help produce the needed workers, educators are creating training programs, one of which is the new Advanced Manufacturing program at Miami Dade College (MDC).

The program will train skilled manufacturing technicians and other workers who can help companies make high-quality medical devices, pharmaceuticals or other biotech products as efficiently as possible.

An associate in science degree in advanced man-

ufacturing as well as two certificate programs, in automation and lean manufacturing, will be offered. The certificate programs are shorter, just 12 to 15 credits, as opposed to the two-year associate degree.

Students can begin signing up for the new concentration this semester, and many courses will be available at night or on weekends.

Many classes are in science and other technical subjects, so they should appeal to people with an aptitude in those areas.

But those aren't the only essentials for success, said Michael Whitt, head of MDC's engineering department and one of the program's organizers. "What it takes is a desire to learn, first and foremost, and creativity" said Whitt, who worked for drug giant Ely Lilly and a start-up biotech firm before he became an educator.

It was always hard to find good manufacturing workers. "It was difficult to find people who have this skill set," Whitt said.

George Godfrey, vice

president of operations for Home Diagnostics in Fort Lauderdale, agreed. His plant employs more than 400 people, making home glucose-test strips used by people with diabetes. The strips use a sophisticated electrochemical process, and they're made using advanced robotic equip-

"It's very high-tech," Godfrey said, adding that the work also must be very precise. "We talk about nanometers."

He said MDC's new program sounds like it could produce workers he might

MDC said the new program will produce workers for jobs such as manufacturing technician, which pays around \$14 to \$15 an hour.

The advanced manufacturing program joins other biotechnology programs already up and running at MDC that were developed thanks to a \$3.5 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education.

Albert Callegari is enrolled in the biotech program. He already has associate degrees in electronics and engineering, and has worked for companies making devices used in aircraft. But he was laid off in

2008 when his employer moved his work to Mexico. He decided it was a time for a change and went back to school. In recent years, biotech

companies also have moved some manufacturing jobs abroad. That raises the possibility that research functions could remain here, while the labor-intensive production work goes to countries with lower wages.

Callegari hopes that at least some manufacturing will remain here. For example, companies may want to keep at least some production capability in the United States so that manufacturing and research workers can collaborate on producing new products.

But he acknowledged that it's hard to predict what will happen in this industry or any other. "You can't predict how long any job will last," he said.



# Expect some behavioral interviewing

IF YOU'VE BEEN on job interviews, you've found big differences in the interviewers' practices. Among them, you've probably encountered a technique called "behavioral" interviewing.

As a job hunter, your clue that you're entering behavioral interview territory will be a question that begins like this: "Tell me about a time when you ..."

The theory behind that kind of question when you're asked to describe something you did in a certain situation is that past behavior is a good predictor for future action.

The interviewer is just trying to get an accurate measure of what's popularly known as your emotional intelligence.

How well do you control your emotions? How empathetic are you? Do you understand how others feel? What is your self-perception? What motivates your actions?

Employers are looking for workers who are good team players and manage stress well. They're looking for your confidence in interviews, but "I'm right/he's wrong' answers could sour your employment chances.

Emotional intelligence interviewers are trying to figure out how well you'd get along with others, how you think about vourself, and how vou'd exercise influence.

It's a way to look for the ''click'' — the indication that you'd fit in and they'd like you.

# In every office, there will be exceptions for certain tasks

Q: My manager says everybody is important, but she still treats people differently. For example, she expects me to clean out the department refrigerator and wipe up spills in the coffee area. She also tells me to keep the printer and copier filled with paper.

I have a very responsible job as an administrative assistant in this medical center. However, my boss clearly feels that the clinical staff's time is more important than mine. Although she preaches teamwork, she doesn't expect the medical people to replace paper or clean up after themselves.

Our manager often says "Remember that if it weren't for the med-

ical staff, we would not have jobs." This makes the rest of us feel unimportant. In this day and time, shouldn't everyone be expected to do these tasks?

A: There's no right or wrong answer here, but I'll gladly give you my personal opinion. Your paper replacement duties seem reasonable to me, because dealing with office equipment is typically part of an assistant's job. However, being the assistant does not make you the maid.

Refrigerator cleaning ought to be done by the maintenance staff. If that's not possible, then everyone should take a turn, using a weekly assignment roster. A notice should be posted near the coffee asking people to clean up their own

That said, my opinion does not change the fact that certain people are likely to be exempt from these tasks. Although every employee makes a valuable contribution, some positions will always have more status and therefore more leverage.

In any organization, the greatest status is given to those who are both essential for success and difficult to replace. For example, movie stars are more highly esteemed than camera operators, even though camera operators are very important.

The reality, therefore, is that physicians are not likely to start scrubbing out vegetable bins, and your manager will not be able to make them. But if you present your request in a reasonable manner, perhaps you can convince her to enlist your other colleagues in a cleaning rotation.

Q: I used to trust the woman who works next to me. My husband and I even lent her money when her family needed help. But after I complained to her about various people in our department, she apparently told them what I said. I've also learned that she lies about little things. Should I confront her about these issues? — Mistrustful

A: Instead of adding another chapter to this soap opera, try to focus on avoiding similar problems in the future. Toward that end, here are a few simple guidelines to follow.

Don't lend money to people you barely know. Never talk badly about one co-worker to another. Assume that anything you say is likely to be repeated. Try to be pleasant and helpful to everyone, even those you don't particularly like. If these rules seem too restrictive, then you may be hopelessly addicted to workplace drama.



# Google phone brings in more complaints than sales

> One seems to have fizzled. The gadget that was hailed before it debuted as Google's long-awaited answer to Apple's uber-popular iPhone has seen disappointing sales. Google sold just 20,000 Nexus Ones worldwide in the first week after it launched, according to Flurry, a company that collects data on the sales and use of smart phone applications. In contrast, Flurry estimates that consumers bought 1.6 million of the iPhone 3GS

Google's not commenting on initial sales of the Nexus One, which costs \$179 if you sign up for a two-year contract with T-Mobile or \$529 without a contract. But company officials, including Andy Rubin, who heads up Google's smart phone efforts as its vice president of engineering, have acknowledged that the company needs to improve its customer service.

"We want people to have a positive experience," said Carolyn Penner, a company spokeswoman. "We will continue to address any of the issues as quickly as possible."

The biggest complaint among users is access to the 3G high-speed data network offered by T-Mobile, Google's only domestic carrier partner so far for the Nexus One.

# There are ways to find a mentor

Recently, a friend called me, frustration in her voice. She wants to move up the career ladder but feels no one in her office has the time or interest to groom her.

'They're too busy,' she told me. So for now, she toils away in a job she's only been half trained to do and wishes she had a mentor to offer direction.

As the recession drags on, mentoring just isn't a priority. Hard-pressed employers are taking an ax to their corporate training budgets and formal mentoring programs. At the same time, managers are worried about their own jobs, saddled with more responsibilities and struggling with work-life balance.

Younger workers find they must come up with new strategies to find mentors.

"Finding a mentor today means looking inside and outside your organization and thinking creatively," says Tammy Allen, professor of psychology at the University of South Florida and author of Designing Workplace Mentoring Programs; An Evidence-Based Approach.

January is national mentoring month and even President Barack Obama has weighed in, encouraging Americans to guide a young person. Mentoring is something the Gen Y employees (18-to-25-year-olds) are particularly looking for, but it is something that employees of all ages appreciate.

Here's how to find a men-

Consider community groups. Someone on the outside of your workplace may be an ideal confidant who can guide you without feeding into the office political game.

Nicole Bared, 24, a client associate at a financial services firm, is feeling her way through the job market, trying to figure out her most satisfying career path at a time wnen sne realizes sne is lucky to be employed.

Fortunately, she has Mary Young to mentor her. Both are volunteers on the Citizens Board at the University of Miami. Recently, the board's director saw an opportunity to pair younger board members with older ones.

Young, who took an early retirement package from IBM, meets weekly with Bared, and has introduced Bared to top executives in the financial services business.

"She has been a great sounding board," Bared says. "I'm super fortunate. There are so many young people who are dissatisfied and looking for their next move and it's hard to find someone who can provide direction."

Nonprofits are a path to mentorship. Chae duPont, a Miami attorney and volunteer at Shake-A-Leg, says she has mentored people of all ages who share her interests in volunteerism and sailing. "Volunteering is the best way to find mentors," duPont says. "As volunteers become involved, everyone learns more about them and they meet people who can help and support them in other aspects of their life."

Look at what universities offer. Stacy Ethun, president/CEO of Park Avenue Group, an executive search and consulting firm in Orlando, says she saw an ad in her newspaper for a university program called Athena that offers mentoring to women business owners. Many universities offer variations. "The program is totally free and fabulous and I had no clue it existed," Ethun says.

Seek someone who has been mentored. Jeff Lee, vice president of operations for Coastal Construction says his career prospered from having a mentor. Coastal president Dan Whitman has been his mentor for 35 years. Lee says he considers it his responsibility to develop his younger employees, just as he was guided.

# Law forbids boss from docking worker for damage

Question: My 24-year-old son recently started working as an installer for a local custom-closet company. He thought it was a friendly place because the owner hired him on the spot on a handshake.

He discovered a different place when he made a mistake on the job that the owner claims cost the company \$1,000. The very next week, when my son was supposed to get paid, the owner did not give him his paycheck because he said my son had to "pay back" the mistake he made. Nor did my son get any of the overtime pay he had earned. My son, who is an hourly employee, averages about 10 hours a week in overtime, and he needs the money.

He takes pride in his work. He was very upset about his error, even though he had confirmed the proper installation method with a co-worker. And he apologized. The owner, although upset. seemed to understand, especially since he knows my son. But he later demanded payment. Can he legally do this?

Answer: The boss's behavior is blatantly illegal. New York State labor laws explicitly forbid employers from charging employees for dam-

Employers can neither deduct it from employees' checks nor can they demand separate payments.

Here is what Section 193 of the labor law says:

''Employers may not deduct from wages the cost of breakage or spoilage of materials; nor may employers make wage deductions in any indirect manner, such as requiring a worker to pay for shortages by means of a separate transaction."

What's more, except in cases of taxes or governmental rulings, employers can't deduct from an employee's pay without the worker's permission.

The boss is not only violating state labor law, he could also be violating state and federal overtime rules by not paying your son for overtime.

Those laws state that employees must earn overtime when they work more than 40 hours in a workweek. On the federal level, employees must earn at least 1 times their hourly rate for every hour over 40 in a week. Employees subject only to New York State overtime earn 1 times the state minimum wage — \$7.25 an hour — when they work more than 40 hours a week.

The federal overtime rate is also \$7.25 an hour.

So the boss could be facing both federal and state Labor Department fines. Your son would be doing the boss a favor by apprising him of his labor law violations.

One thing to bear in mind: Even though the boss can't demand payment from your son for the damage, he can fire him. Like most states in this country, New York is an employment-atwill state. That means that without the protection of union or employment contract, a worker can be let go at any time and for any reason, unless the reason involves discrimination.

# Social enterprise born from man's Dumpster dive

VANCOUVER, B.C. — Ken Lyotier was a recovering alcoholic and drug addict looking for a way to make more money from Dumpster diving when he hatched the idea to organize a group of people like himself and provide a service.

Now United We Can, the enterprise he started in 1995, is distributing about \$2 million a year to hundreds of people working as "binners" in the city's Downtown Eastside.

social-enterprise model helps homeless and low-income people to be productive, while cleaning up destitute neighborhoods and promoting recycling.

A line of people pushing shopping carts full of cans and bottles forms early outside of United We Can's storefront warehouse along one of the most impoverished neighborhoods of the developed world.

About 700 people a day earn cash by bringing in recyclables to the nonprofit's warehouse, where they are paid the amount of the deposit. United We Can's

150 employees sort the recyclables and truck them to a processing center, earning a small handling fee from beverage companies that pays for its operations.

'People who are engaged in this activity are looking to earn some money from the work they're doing,' Lyotier said. "We're talking about people in a community where that's been very hard and challenging to accomplish."

Most binners make about \$10 a day, which helps them eke out a living or supplements fixed income from social welfare or retirement. But binners have also become employees of United We Can.

A job with the nonprofit helped Christine Smallenberg, 40, who had been homeless, move from the Downtown Eastside into an apartment of her own.

"That old idea of a lazy bum on welfare not willing to earn a living — mostly I've found that not to be the case," Lyotier said. "People feel like they want to be productive. It's a question of creating an environment where that works for them and also for society in general."

United We Can expanded into a business program to send workers to collect donated recyclables from downtown hotels and restaurants, and the nonprofit was awarded a grant from the city to serve downtown recycling sites during next month's Winter Olympics. It will be able to employ at least 60 more people and double the amount of business normally done this time of year.

The nonprofit designed special carts for the purpose with colorful bins and noiseless rubber wheels that can hook to the back of a bicycle.

Lyotier, 62, started out like many entrepreneurs: trying to solve a problem in business. It just so happened that his business was rummaging through trash.

He ran into barriers when stores didn't want him com-

ing in, wouldn't take back bottles or wouldn't pay the full deposit, and he had no place to store what he collected.

"I was dirty, the stuff was dirty and they were trying to do business," he said.

One day Lyotier was in a coffee shop talking with a minister from a local church who told him how to apply for a source of funding to start a small operation. Lyotier soon had a purpose and \$1,500 in seed capital.

He made fliers and spread the word to street people that he was going to set up a one-day recycling depot at a downtown park and would pay them for empty bottles. People lined up for blocks, produced a mountain of containers and helped Lyotier launch his venture.

Lyotier said seeing so many people without hope come together was one of the happiest experiences of his life.

'People were motivated by the prospect of making \$10 for bringing in cans and bottles," he said. "Up to that time, they had been quite invisible, but they were coming together because we had engaged them in this event.'

# Typewriter shops hanging on in tech-savvy world

MAPLEWOOD. Mo. — There's no Twitter or Facebook in Vernon Trampe's life. In his world, all "texting" should only be done with a typewriter.

Though the typewriter may be part of a bygone era, Trampe's Jones Typewriter Co. and a handful of other businesses are hanging on through a combination of niche need and nostalgia.

"People come in here and say, 'Oh I'm so glad I found you. Please don't close on us," said Trampe, 67. "Because there are so many of us closing."

The St. Louis area still has at least a half-dozen businesses that fix and sell typewriters. And like Trampe, evolving technology, business needs and consumer tastes have forced them to expand service to printers, copiers,

counting machines, fax machines, cash registers and calculators.

Today, Trampe and his business partner, Charlie May, 62, say their survival depends largely on contract work for businesses, including law firms, doctors' offices and nursing homes that still use typewriters for special documents not meant for inkjet or laser printers.

The AAA Auto Club of Missouri still has several typewriters at its St. Louis headquarters, said spokesman Mike Right. Nearly every department has access to a typewriter for specific cards or labels unsuitable for the computer. Right promised that AAA isn't going back to the typewriter.

"My God, no," Right said. "There's no spellcheck on a typewriter."

A few companies are

still producing typewriters. Among them is New Jersey-based Swintec, which sells the majority of its machines through long-term contracts to government agencies, said Ed Michael, a sales manager for the company.

Swintec's clients include police departments and prisons, where inmates can be barred from computer and Internet access. One of their most popular machines is a typewriter with a transparent case designed to prevent inmates from hiding contraband inside.

Michael says there also is still demand for typewriters from writers and older people who tend to avoid computers.

"Some people really like the feel of a typewriter because it's a warmer, more tactile way of doing things," Michael said.

# Franchise appeal grows during down economy

McClatchy Newspapers (MCT) MIAMI — After being unemployed for a year, Pauline Hamian ditched the resume and bought herself a

The former Burger King employee had no luck finding a job after being part of a corporate restructuring in 2008. While at an outplacement center, she stumbled on a webinar about franchising.

"I felt I had to do something," Hamian said. "It provided an opportunity for me to do something I've never done before and never really envisioned myself doing."

With the help of a franchise broker, she decided to invest in ShelfGenie — a company that installs sliding shelves for kitchen and bathroom cabinets. She didn't need to buy a storefront — it all can be done from home. There were no fixed costs and her two part-time employ-

ees work on commission. Jobs are still scarce, so the unemployed are reinventing themselves and becoming the majority of new franchise owners, industry sources say. The troubles in commercial real estate are making it easier by driving some landlords to negotiate — sometimes offering several months' free rent or paying for remodeling.

While banks continue their tight grip on lending, some franchisors are seeing a dip in investors and are responding by lowering fees and offering internal financing deals. But without a loan, a homebased franchise like Shelf-Genie becomes an affordable option for those wanting a fresh start on their careers. Areas that are expected to increase in popularity: quickservice restaurants, real estate, senior care, eco-friendly businesses and health.

'When the economy slows, people think opportunities become harder to find," said Jason Mattes, a franchise development advisor in Coral Gables, Fla. "If you have an entrepreneurial spirit, now

could be the best time.' He's currently director of franchise development at Cruise Planners, where the fee is about \$10,000 to start the home-based travel agency. Cruise Planners has added 200 new franchises in 2009. with 52 new units in Florida.

"I think people just aren't aware of all the opportunities out there," Mattes said. "They think of a Subway shop or a hamburger joint, so they feel it's not a path to look at because it's just too expensive."

The lack of funds is what sent Hamian to the services sector. After being denied a business loan, she financed her future career with a home equity loan. The fee to cover one territory — that's 250,000 households — was \$40,000. But when you add up the costs of home show fees and product materials, she invested about \$65,000.

"It was the biggest check I've ever written in my life," Hamian said.

MatchPoint franchise consultant Jim Sebastiano is advising people without a nest egg to head for homebased businesses because of the credit crunch. He has seen investors use their 401(k)s or IRAs to help finance stores.

"I get a lot of calls from people that either lost their job already, or they're scared to death," Sebastiano said. When you're in a service industry, "you're out there promoting the business more and the costs are substantially less," Sebastiano said.

## Ultrasound technologists provide vital service

MIAMI — On a typical workday, Luis Pairot may help guide a needle to a joint, measure a tumor or check the narrowing of an artery, all using sound waves as the tools of his trade.

Pairot, a lead ultrasound technologist at University of Miami Hospital and Clinics, enjoys the interaction with patients and doctors, as well as the technological and investigative aspects of the job.

"It's very rewarding. It's very challenging," said Pairot, 42, who made a career change into the ultrasound field several years ago. "You develop good relations with your radiologist. They depend on us, and when they trust you it makes a big difference."

Ultrasound technologists, also called diagnostic medical sonographers, operate ultrasound machines, using high frequency sound waves to create images of the inside of the body for diagnostic purposes. While ultrasound technology is perhaps best known for its use in pregnancy, it is also used to make images of the abdomen, vascular system and heart.

Ultrasound technologists are a kind of medical imaging technologist. Others specialize in X-rays, CT scans or MRIs.

"Imaging sort of marries the opportunity to use technical knowledge and use it on real, state-of-the-art equipment, and combines that with the ability to still interact with patients," said Carol Miller, dean of the School of Health Sciences and Academic Affairs at Miami Dade College Medical Center campus.

Demand for the job is growing, as ultrasound technologists are increasingly needed not just at hospitals, but at clinics, doctors' offices and other healthcare facilities, Miller said.

'With the expansion of outpatient centers and ambulatory care centers, there is a need for imaging technologists, so there is more need because of more opportunities," she said.

The U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics projects that demand for diagnostic medical sonographers will grow 18 percent from 50,300 in 2008 to 59,500 in 2018.

It's a Mercedes-Benz tradition to use letter and number combinations for car names. But somewhere along the line there came to be too many models starting with the letter "C."

So, the Mercedes CLK coupe disappeared for 2010 and is now the refined and comfortable E-Class Coupe, with new styling and features that tie it to the long-popular Mercedes E-Class sedans. Evidently, there's no problem with expanding the number of cars using the letter "E."

With the same V-6 and V-8 engines that are in the E-Class sedans, the E-Class coupes are pretty-looking models with a roomier back seat — sculpted for just two people — and more trunk space than you'd expect.

The test E550 felt substantial, nonetheless, with a solid thud as the doors closed and the windows snugged up automatically to seal in the quiet. The car didn't feel particularly small, either.

Even getting into the back seat was less of a chore than I expected. The front seats automatically glide forward to provide easier access and then glide back automatically to their original posi-

tions — unless they hit something, like a rear-passenger knee. In this latter case, they adjust forward a bit automatically.

The E550 has the 5.5-liter, double overhead cam V-8 that I've enjoyed in other Mercedes models. Mated to a modern seven-speed transmission that can be shifted manually without a clutch pedal or operated as a regular automatic, the engine had a low rumble during the test

drive that was awesome.

There's lots of safety equipment, including Mercedes' Pre-Safe Collision preparation system that automatically cinches seat belts tight and ensures maximum braking should a coming crash be detected.

The E Coupes also have nine standard air bags — one is a driver's side knee bag to help keep the person properly situated behind the steering wheel.

A novel system called Attention Assist is supposed to monitor drivers to see if they are drowsy. If the system activates, a small, illuminated coffee cup appears in the instrument panel. But the test car arrived with the coffee cup already illuminated, and no matter who drove the car, the drowsy monitor kept saying a fatigued driver was at the wheel.

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

# In extreme cold, block heaters should be used

Dear Tom and Ray: I live in interior Alaska, and it gets cold. How cold, you ask?

It's been -40 F for the past week or so.

My husband and I go back and forth as to whether to keep the car's block heater plugged in all the time, or whether to use a timer and run it only some of the time.

I've heard that too much heat is bad for the oil.

This morning I used the timer, and my car decided it was too cold for the transmission to engage.

I was stuck.

At -45, I don't have to go to work. At -40, I do (administrative

I want to use this as leverage to get my husband to let me keep my car plugged in more of the time.

What do you think? — Christie RAY: I'd use the timer. Christie a timer that turns the block heater on around Oct. 1 and turns it off around June 30.

When you subject your engine to extreme conditions like that, it can run hotter than it's supposed to.

TOM: In fact, you may want buy a trailer with a diesel generator bolted onto it, so you can stay plugged in while you drive around, too.

RAY: When it's that cold out, just leave it plugged in all the time if that's what the

car needs. The only cost is electricity. You won't do any harm to your oil.

**TOM:** Right. When people talk about heat being an enemy of motor oil, they're talking about oil that's being overworked under hard driving conditions — like driving a car at high speeds for long distances in the heat of the summer, or pulling a trailer up the Rockies.

**RAY:** When you subject your engine to extreme conditions like that it can run hotter than it's sun posed to. That can shorten the life of the oil. That's why manufacturers recommend that people who use their vehicles for such "severe duty" change the oil more frequently.

TOM: But in your block heater's wildest dreams, it never could get the engine oil hot enough to do it any damage. Not even close. In your case, it's just warming it up to the point where it's no longer cement.

**RAY:** So for weeks like the one vou just had, vou can run the block heater as much as you need to. And when it gets so cold that the block heater needs its own block heater to get started, it's time to move to San Juan, Puerto Rico, Christie.

## Mercedes scores highest rate in retention survey

More than two-thirds of Mercedes-Benz owners replace their vehicles with another Benz — the highest rate of retention in the industry.

A recent study by J.D. Power and Associates found that Mercedes-Benz increased its retention rate this year by 8 percentage points, to 67 percent. The next two highest rates were 64 percent for Honda and 61 percent for Toyota.

The industry average was 48 percent, approximately what it was in

As the auto industry becomes increasingly competitive, retention rates are critical to manufacturers.

'Mercedes-Benz has steadily improved its customer-retention rates during the past five years and in 2009 achieved the highest rate ever attained by a manufacturer since the inception of the study,' said Raffi Festekjian, director of automotive product research at J.D. Power.

# Safety of keyless systems questioned

#### Federal regulators looking at adopting standard program

LOS ANGELES — The sleek Infiniti G37 Cindy Marsh bought last August was the car of her dreams, equipped with the latest keyless electronics technology that allows her to start the engine with the touch of a button.

But right away, the system gave her trouble. To get the engine started, she would sometimes have to tap the power button repeatedly. Sometimes it wouldn't start unless she opened and closed the car doors, Marsh recalled.

She eventually adapted to the system's quirks but said that even now she isn't sure how to shut off the engine in an emergency.

"I don't know if I ever read it in the owner's manual or not," said Marsh, who lives in Columbus, Ohio.

Old-school car keys appear headed for extinction, as automakers rush to install wireless systems that allow drivers to unlock their doors and start their engines with an electronic fob that they never have to take out of their purse or pocket.

Introduced less than a decade ago on luxury models, the pushbutton systems are rapidly spreading to all segments of the market, including bargain-priced Kias. The number of models with them as standard or optional equipment has quadrupled in the last five years.

Many drivers don't fully understand how the systems work, however, leaving them vulnerable to potentially serious safety problems.

In complaints to federal regulators, motorists have reported that they were unable to shut down engines during highway emergencies, including sudden acceleration events. In other cases, parked vehicles accidentally rolled away and engines were left running for hours without their owners realizing it.

And although traditional keys all work the same way and are universally understood by consumers, automakers have adopted different procedures for operating the keyless ignition systems. As a result, owners may not know how to operate their own cars in an emergency, let alone a rented or borrowed car.

'Where you have a second to make an emergency maneuver, you shouldn't have to search around for the right procedure to use on a switch," said Henry Jasny, general counsel at Advocates for Highway and Auto Safety, a nonprofit group based in Washington that pushes for laws to make roads safer.

The risk is considered serious enough that federal regulators and an auto industry trade group are looking at adopting standard procedures.

All of the systems rely on a similar architecture that uses a fob, which is a small transmitter that communicates with the vehicle's computer. The fob can automatically open door locks when the owner is near the vehicle, and the engine can be started with the push of a power button on the dashboard.

But to shut down the engine while the vehicle is moving, drivers must hold down the power button for between one and three full seconds, depending on the make. In some cases, two or three successive taps on the button will work. Mercedes-Benz allows drivers to kill the engine with a single push.

Question: I've got a 2001 Range Rover with a leaking head gasket. It's leaking externally, and you can smell it while driving. I have to add only a few ounces of antifreeze a week, and I know I cannot let the car overheat. I can't afford the \$2,500 cost of the repair, so I was thinking of using a stop-leak/gasket repair product. The mechanic is strongly against this, saying it may clog small openings in the radiator and heater, which will cost a lot to replace.


Answer: I've had remarkably good success at slowing or stopping coolant leaks with stop-leak products. Mendtite, Silver Seal and Solder Seal have been very effective in stopping intake manifold and external head gasket leaks on several of my vehicles. I would not hesitate to try one of these on your vehicle. I'm not concerned with any type of radiator or heater core blockage — the products are designed to work in modern cooling systems — and the alternative is a major repair bill. Stop-leak products may not be a complete or permanent fix, but they're worth a try.

Question: About twice a year, my 2000 Chevy Silverado 1500 won't completely turn over for exactly 8 minutes — then it will start right up. The mechanics say they can't diagnose it, and the dealer wants about \$1,000 to put a new fuel pump in.

Answer: If the engine cranks over normally but won't start, the fuel pump, fuel pump relay and ignition switch are possible culprits. Next time this occurs, just turn the key to the "run" position and listen carefully for the sound of the fuel pump running for about 2 seconds, then stopping.

Does the vehicle's security light illuminate when is occurs? If so, the security system might also be disabling the fuel injectors for 10 minutes before resetting. A scan tool might identify fault codes for the





# GMC Terrain looks beefy, is refined

I was prepared to hate the 2010 GMC Terrain.

It has square wheel arches, a graceless styling device that, while unique, makes any vehicle look like Michael Jordan wearing size 6 shoes. Furthermore, I had heard this vehicle was a slug.

Then it arrived — and although I still haven't warmed to the square wheel arches, I do like just about everything else.

Under the skin, the GMC Terrain is related to the new Chevrolet Equinox. But the GMC trades the Chevy's handsome, conservative lines for a chunky, purposeful stance that won't have anyone second-guessing a guy's masculinity. The Terrain seems to scream, "Only those with Y chromosomes need apply."

But that doesn't mean this is some rough-and-tumble, hairy-chested SUV. Like the Equinox, the Terrain uses a new car-based plat-

all-wheel drive.

A 2.4-liter double-overhead-cam four-cylinder engine is standard; a doubleoverhead-cam 3-liter V6 is optional. A six-speed automatic transmission is standard with either engine.

Unlike most vehicles automakers supply for review, the GMC delivered by GM was a base model. one lacking any options. This made for an interesting conlet Equinox V6 model that I drove a couple months ago.

For starters, the fourcylinder returned better mileage. The V6 is rated at 17 mpg in city driving, 25 mpg on the highway. Not bad, but not as good as the four, which is rated at 22 mpg city, 32 mpg highway.

Yes, you'll give up some power to get the fuel savings: 264 horsepower with six cylinders, 182 horsereality of driving these vehicles belies those numbers.

The V6 makes its presence known when pressed, and there's not as much oomph as you'd expect. Frankly, the four is more than adequate for most daily driving. Given the congestion common to city roads, the four-cylinder is more than adequate to keeps up with traffic and squirt here and there when needed. The four's noise isn't any worse than the six's, and the transmission seems happier.

Like the Equinox, the Terrain did a good job of soaking up road irregularities without much fuss, and the vehicle remained stable. Some body lean becomes apparent in corners, but it's minor. The cabin is fairly quiet.

The steering is quick, and maneuvering the Terrain over terrain is like driving an obedient servant. That said, the braking, while very good, has a bit of a spongy feel at the end of the pedal travel.

# Experts expect more computer viruses to target social networks

MIAMI - Social networkers of the world, it's time to amp up your security software and put on your cynical cap before clicking on friend requests and links to "funny videos." Facebook and Twitter will be the top targets for cyber attacks in 2010, according to several security firms.

Networks like Facebook are a gold mine of information for identity theft scams. You may have stumbled upon a cyberattack or two before on Facebook. It's usually an inbox message from someone you don't talk to often, with the message: "Hey is this you in this video? LOLZ!!!" followed by a strange link with random letters in it.

Click on the link, and it can take you to a site that will download a program designed to steal your personal information and spread the malicious link to all your Facebook connections, without you even knowing it. The Koobface worm was one such program. In 2009, the CA **Internet Security Business** Unit found more than 100 mutated strains of that worm.

But it's more than just inbox links. It can be a friend request from a fake account, or an invitation to an event that takes you to a page that looks like a Facebook event, but instead takes you to a page to download something.

Dave Marcus, director of security research and communications at McAfee, has seen a few of those tactics on Facebook, as well as sites

with advertisements for fake products that steal your credit card info when you think you're just buying something.

Those that recognize fakes are in the vast minority of users, Marcus said. This is because on social networks, people are more trusting of links and get click happy. Users may think twice about clicking something unusual in an e-mail, but they are more likely to click without thinking on Facebook or Twitter.

The growing popularity of URL shorteners adds to the problem. Sites like http://bit.ly or http://tinyURL.com let you paste in a really long URL and then generate a link that is just a few characters long usually just random letters and numbers. URL shorteners are widely used on Twitter, which limits how many characters you can type. Some shorteners also let you track how many clicks that link got.

These URL shorteners mean users are getting used to clicking links, not knowing where they are going, and trusting that nothing bad will happen.

"I think people need to look at the Internet with a little more skepticism and stop always accepting things being sent to them as real," Marcus said.

Since cybercriminals are constantly changing their tactics, Marcus said the best way to keep protected is to keep your computer security software up to date — and if you're not sure about a link, just ask the IT folks in vour office.

# Study: Automakers should focus on China

ers and suppliers believe the road to riches runs through Brazil, Russia, India and China, but some of those countries are growing more smoothly than others, according to a study released Thursday by the Boston Consulting Group.

In a broad perspective, these nations — now known as the BRIC countries - are where the action will remain. The BCG study estimates that global auto sales will grow from last year's 62 million — which was down from 70 million in 2007 — to between 78 million and 87 million vehicles in 2014. Of that growth, an estimated 31 percent will come from the hot four BRIC nations.

But China, which surpassed the United States as the world's largest auto market in 2009, is the "must be" location for investment.

Russia, where new-car sales plummeted by about

half in 2009, is the most volatile. While the BCG DETROIT — Automak- study's authors, Nikolaus estimate that Russia will rebound this year and sustain a 15 percent annual growth rate in car sales through 2014, they warn that "Russia is the BRIC countries' roller coaster," because its economy is extremely dependent on prices of raw materials and oil.

Even China's torrid growth rate — new vehicle sales rose 42 percent in 2009 — will cool to a modest 5 percent annual pace through 2014, the study estimates.

Most Western automakers are running their joint venture plants in China at full capacity. Changan Ford Mazda Automobile Co. plans to open a second assembly plant in Chongqing in 2012 that will be able to produce 150,000 vehicles annually. Changan Ford Mazda already can make 450,000 cars a year at existing plants in Chongqing and Nanjing.

# With show over, can tablet PCs live up to all the hype?

SAN FRANCISCO — Of all the hype generated by the Consumer Electronics Show in Las Vegas last week, few products generated more headlines and heat than tablet PCs.

Technology-industry executives showed off their newest table wares to varying degrees of excitement.

Microsoft Chief Executive Steve Ballmer got a hohum reaction as he showed off a new H-P Slate tablet, while executives from Dell Inc. gave a look at what they called a tablet-concept device that features a 5-inch screen.

Graphics chipmaker Nvidia Corp. boasted of the 500 engineers it took to design that company's new Tegra microchip, which Nvidia claims will revolutionize the capabilities of tablet devices.

Then there was Apple Inc. or rather, there wasn't Apple, which didn't attend CES but introduced the iPad earlier this week.

Indeed, Apple's shadow led some analysts to assert that no one would even be talking about tablets were it not for the anticipation over what the Cupertino, Calif.based company has planned.

The popularity and success of the iPhone in launching a new wave of smart phones is considered a prime example of why rivals need to get into the tablet market before Apple comes out with a device that could have consumers thinking any other

tablet is second-best. 'You can talk about new tablets and applications, but it's still not enough to make anyone forget Apple," said David Daoud, analyst with IDC.

#### Toyota recall may alter your new-car buying plans

For a company known for its reliability, Toyota's suspension of sales of eight of its most popular models this week — for accelerator pedals that could stick in an open position — is more than a black eye. It's more like a chest wound.

The recall covers 2.3 million models, including: 2009-2010 RAV4, 2009-2010 Corolla, 2009-2010 Matrix, 2005-2010 Avalon, 2007-2010 Camry, 2010 Highlander, 2007-2010 Tundra, and the 2008-2010 Sequoia.

If you have one of these vehicles and find the throttle sticking open, Toyota advises stepping on the brake and shifting the transmission to neutral. If you can't shift the car to neutral, turn the key to the "ACC" position to shut off the engine. Do not remove the key. If your car has a push-button starter, hold it down for at least 3

On the other hand, if you were considering buying one of these vehicles and the recall has given you cause for concern, there are alternative vehicles to consider.

COROLLA/MATRIX

There are plenty of good choices among compact cars, but three stand out: the Mazda3, available as a sedan or hatchback, and the Honda Civic, available as a coupe or a sedan. Both are more fun to drive than the Toyota and offer similar reliability. For those looking for a more Corolla-like feel, try the Hyundai Elantra.

**CAMRY** Camry fans should consider the midsize Ford Fusion and Mercury Milan, which have balanced ride and handling, include advanced safety features and are offered as gas-electric hybrids.

Another interesting choice is the Hyundai Sonata, which is not very exciting to drive, but it's comfortable, has good reliability and boasts conservative looks. A totally revised Sonata is about to be released, so the old model may be a good deal.

Other good choices include the Nissan Altima, Chevrolet Malibu, Volkswagen CC, Honda Accord and Subaru Legacy.

AVALON

Those who like living large in a vehicle with grace, pace and space should consider the Nissan Maxima, which offers stellar performance and good looks. The redesigned Ford Taurus is a state-of-the-art sedan, while the slightly more expensive Hyundai Genesis is a perfect Avalon substitute.

RAV4

The rival Honda CR-V is a good place to start, although the new Chevrolet Equinox and GMC Terrain offer superior fuel economy, good build quality and attention to detail.

**HIGHLANDER** 

The Honda Pilot boasts similar accommodations at a similar price. Some may be put off by the Ford Flex's looks, but its superb balance of ride and handling, not to mention its size, make it worthy. The sporting Nissan Murano is a compelling choice.

**TUNDRA** 

Full-size pickup buyers will want to consider a domestic pickup from Ford, Chevrolet or Dodge. All three offer similar performance, comfort and reliability. However, only the Chevrolet offers a gas-electric hybrid. **SEQUOIA** 

There aren't many fullsize SUVs on the market, but the Chevrolet Tahoe and GMC Yukon have impressive build quality, good towing ability and a wonderful ride, not to mention gas-electric hybrid models.

OTHER TOYOTAS

Not all Toyota models are affected, so many remain on dealer lots that are perfectly safe. However, if you have your doubts, other vehicles will give you piece of mind.

# Chrysler returns to Super Bowl to advertise Dodge

Chrysler is advertising during the Super Bowl for the first time since 2004, making it the first U.S. automaker in the world's most expensive advertising showcase in two years.

Chrysler will feature its Dodge Charger in a 60-second ad in the first half of the NFL championship game on Feb. 7. According to TNS Media Intelligence, CBS is selling 30-second ads for between \$2.5 million to \$2.8 million.

None of the U.S. automakers — Ford, General Motors or Chrysler — advertised in the game amid a sharp industry downturn in 2009 that saw both Chrysler and General Motors seek bankruptcy protection and government aid.

Italian automaker Fiat took control of Chrysler after it emerged from Chapter 11 reorganization in June. The U.S. government gave Chrysler LLC about \$15.5 billion in aid and now owns nearly 10 percent of the company.

But now the company is out and wants people to know it, said Chrysler spokeswoman Dianna Gutierrez, who declined to disclose the cost of the commercial.

"Most American consumers do not realize we have emerged from bankruptcy so the Super Bowl is a great way to reach out to our consumers to let them know we are still here," she said Thursday.

The company also added that, although the move could be criticized as a big expense, Chrysler feels it is justified considering the viewership, which reached nearly 100 million people last year.

"In fact, it would be more costly to achieve the same number of viewers in traditional media placement and ensure the high viewership attention span that the Super Bowl delivers," the company said.

Chrysler has not been advertising much, so it

needs to make a bold statement — but with a humorous, eye-catching spot if it wants people to pay attention, said Peter De Lorenzo, a former ad executive who publishes autoextremist.com, a Web site that follows and is often critical of the auto industry.

"They've been flying under the radar now for so long I think they're desperate for a little attention," he

Foreign automakers Toyota, Volkswagen and Hyundai were the only auto presence in last year's Super Bowl — shrinking the presence of auto advertising dollars to just 8.5 percent of the \$213 million in revenue the game generated, according to TNS. That's down from nearly 17 percent in 2005, a year when both Ford and GM advertised.

GM, sitting out for a second year in a row, is the third-largest Super Bowl advertiser in history, having spent \$80.5 million for 15 years' worth of ads, according to TNS.

The foreign automakers, who have been taking market share away from domestic companies, continue to have a heavy presence, with ads by Volkswagen, Audi, Honda and Hyundai.

German brand Volkswagen returns to the Super Bowl for the first time in nine years, with a 30-second commercial in the third quarter that highlights all 13 of its vehicles and takes the "Das Auto" campaign in a new direction. Gone will be Max the Beetle, the talking Beetle who helped launch the campaign, but the company declined to be more specific.

Volkswagen has been increasing its market share and sees a presence in the Super Bowl as a way to continue that, said Tim Ellis, vice president of marketing for Volkswagen of America, speaking from a site where the company was filming its Super Bowl commercial on Thursday.

He said the increased

presence of automakers this year signals more business for the industry this year.

"I think that they sense that there's more confidence out there and that people are going to be coming into the showrooms," he said of fellow automakers. "So we expect it will be highly competitive year."

Hyundai will have two ads, both 30 seconds long in the first quarter. For the second year in a row the Korean automaker will sponsor the "Hyundai Kick-Off Show" before the game and air three 30-second ads during that show. The company declined to say what it was spending or which products will be fea-

Volkswagen's sibling brand Audi will be in the Super Bowl for the third year in a row, with a 60second fourth-quarter commercial for its A3 TDI, a new diesel hatchback. with music by rock band Cheap Trick.

#### Ford Flexes its muscle with **EcoBoost**

My wife shakes her head when I force a last squeeze out of a tube of toothpaste. Hey, nothing wrong with getting the most from a product.

Ford and I see eye to eye on this one. Its new EcoBoost engines, available in the higher-end Ford Flex models for 2010, are designed to squeeze every last horse out of a V-6 engine by marrying a turbocharger with direct injection. So what you get is 93 more ponies and a torque boost to 340 pound-feet, which is 50 or so more than a naturally aspirated V-8 engine.

Are you kidding me? More power than the V-8? So as I cruise Florida's turnpike with great confidence in my passing power, I'm also grinning that my fuel economy is better by 20 percent than the V-8 and since it's a smaller engine — there's a 15 percent reduction in carbon-dioxide emissions, according to Ford.

An EcoBoosted Flex accelerates with strength and really does feel like the 4.6-liter V-8. And it will gallop to 60 mph in around 7 seconds. Mileage is rated at 22 highway, 18 city, and I won't argue with the figures. I was in the vicinity.

Ford plans to plop this EcoBoost engine in around 500,000 vehicles through this year. Oh, Ford knows this isn't in the same mileage league as hybrids and electric concepts. But it is another step forward in efficiency: Better mileage, lower emissions without the sacrifice of power. Not a bad deal.

How does it all happen? Well, to put it in relatively simple terms, the turbo and direct injection do a better job of controlling the air-fuel mixture that fuels the engine, and that results in better efficiency but equally good power.

Do know that the Eco-Boost will cost you up front. While the base SE goes for around \$29,000, the fully loaded Limited with all-wheel-drive and the EcoBoost can reach \$50,000. Still, Flex prices are in the ballpark with competitors Chevy Tra-

verse and the Honda Pilot. Admittedly, I fell in love with the Flex the first time I saw it as a concept at the auto show in Miami Beach. "The station wagon is back," I remember telling friends.

We've come full circle from the minivan and SUV; we're back to the wagon.

# Lotus Evora: The car dreams are made of

Every time I write about a high-performance sports car, I'm guaranteed to get letters from readers to this effect: "How can you possibly glorify the Badminton Dual-Cowl 87B? No one needs a car that goes 200 mph, costs \$300,000 and gets 5 miles per gallon. With all that's going on in the world [climate change, war in the Middle East, balance of trade etc.]For shame. For shame!"

All right then. I present to you perhaps the most fun available on four wheels: The 2010 Lotus Evora. No, not fun. Joy. Inexpressible, diamondshowering, running-nakedthrough-a-field-of-virgins ecstasy. Handling perfection. This is transit gloria, and it is sick.

In my career as an automotive journalist, I've never written these words: I am going to buy one.

Oh, and it gets about 30

miles per gallon.

A ruptured fire hydrant of pleasurable endorphins, the Evora is the first all-new car from Lotus — a small sportscar company in Hethel, England — since it was reborn with the Lotus Elise in 1995. The company goes back to the 1950s and founder Colin Chapman, whose guiding principle in fast cars was extreme lightness. Lightness cures what ails sports cars like Lourdes cures scabies.

All other things being equal, lighter cars change direction more quickly (less mass and therefore lower moment of inertia). Likewise, lighter cars have better cornering grip (the vehicle's weight doesn't overwhelm the tires). A lighter car accelerates harder and stops quicker. Meanwhile, all the stresses on the components

are reduced — the tires, brakes, suspension and gearbox. It's one big, beautiful, positive spiral.

Lotus' feathery, carbideclawed sports cars (all under 1 ton) are superb driving machines, famous for their easy compromise between road holding and what is actually a pretty survivable if not exactly supple ride quality. It's not surprising that when electric carmaker Tesla went looking for a platform upon which to build its Roadster, it came to Hethel. On board an EV, where every amp counts, lightness is nonpareil.

And yet I've never been tempted to own a Lotus. Why? Because even my masochism has its limits. The mid-engine Elise and its many variants are absurdly tiny and impractical cars (9 inches shorter than a Mazda MX-5 Miata) that one enters much the way dressing enters the backside of a Thanksgiving turkey. The doors are small and low to the ground, and there's this prodigiously tall and wide door sill — part of the car's aluminum structure — that you have to shimmy over before you land, gratefully if gracelessly, in the car's Recaro racing buckets. As for storage space, there is exactly none.

Meanwhile, Lotuses offer cockpits with sailplane-like amenities - bare aluminum, runty carpets, cheesy aftermarket sound systems and an overall malign indifference to sound-deadening and passenger sanity. You want to make those al-Qaeda low-lifes talk? Make them commute in a Lotus Exige S for a week. They will sing like Pavarotti.

The Evora takes all the guiding design principles of modern Lotus cars and writes them bigger and in more elegant script: The bonded/riveted aluminum monocoque chassis (weighing a mere 441 pounds in the Evora and pro-

viding torsional stiffness 1.5 times that of the Ferrari F430); transverse mid-engine layout, here hosting a reprogrammed 3.5-liter, 276-hp V6 sourced from Toyota; and a supreme commitment to lightweight (3,046 pounds).

The Evora is, first of all, a 2+2, which is to say there are back seats, of a sort. Call them Romulans, for these tiny squares of upholstery reject all human life. Like the seats in the Porsche 911, they're good for parcel storage and, of course, improved insurance rates. In any event, the Evora is vastly easier to get into and out of — the doors are larger and the threshold is lower and narrower — and the cockpit practically echoes with spaciousness compared with the Elise.

And yet, this is still, comparatively, a small stunt plane of a car. The Evora (170.9 inches) is 4.3 inches shorter than a 911 on a wheelbase (101.4) that is 9 inches longer.



# Student chosen to attend USDA forum

ranchers." The 2010 Outlook Forum titled, "Sustainable Agriculture: The Key to Health & Prosperity," is USDA's largest annual event and will be held Feb. 18 and 19 at the Crystal Gateway Marriott Hotel in Arlington, Va.

Parsons is a senior pursuing dual majors in WVU's Davis College of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Design and Eberly College of Arts and Sciences.

He will graduate in 2011 with majors in animal and nutritional sciences, and political science, and minors in agribusiness management and rural development and economics.

"I am looking forward to the sessions on climate change and global commerce," Parsons said. "After graduating from WVU, I am going to law school with the hope of eventually entering a career in international environmental law or agricultural trade and sustainable development, so hearing from experts that work in these fields is a great way to gain both knowledge and career

Parsons said a session titled "Modernization of China's Agricultural Economy" is especially important to him because in March he will compete for

the second time at the National Model United Nations Conference in New York City representing China on the Commission for Sustainable Develop-

"The first topic on the Commission's agenda at the competition in New York is 'Sustainable Agricultural and Rural Development,' expert analysis on China's agricultural development will give me a huge advantage when researching China's development policies," Parsons

Parsons has already held a number of leadership roles in WVU student organizations. He is president of Davis College Student Council and the Collegiate Farm Bureau; a member of the WVU Model United Nations Team, which just returned from

a conference in Quito, Ecuador; and is treasurer of Block & Bridle. He was recently selected for a summer internship in the U.S. State Department in the Bureau of Oceans and International Environmental and Scientific Affairs.

The 22 university juniors and seniors majoring in agriculturalrelated studies were selected based on their essays, "Agriculture as a Career," and recommendations from their deans.

In addition to USDA leaders, this year's forum will feature U.S. Trade Representative Ronald Kirk and guest speakers from the private sector.

#### WVU's executive MBA goes online

Busy professionals seeking an MBA degree to advance their careers will have a flexible option this fall, as WVU's College of Business and Economics recently announced it will offer the executive MBA online.

"This is the first online executive MBA in the state by a college or university accredited by AACSB International," said William Trumbull, interim dean of the College of Business and Economics. AACSB is the "gold standard" for accredi-

While the majority of the program is offered online, four residencies are required during the two-year program. The residencies will last three or four days and will allow students to build a connection to the WVU network and their classmates.

While three of the residencies are on WVU's main campus in Morgantown, one residency, The Washington Campus, gives students an inside look at the intersection of business and government in Washington, DC.

'This highly interactive, online program will provide these MBA students opportunities to learn from experts," Trumbull said. "Many of our faculty have earned doctorates from leading business schools and have extensive business experience. This expertise will enable students to bridge the gap between theory and prac-

Each course in the 48 credithour program lasts from four to eight weeks, and students take one course at a time. As an option, students have the opportunity to study abroad in Germany, Ireland, China, Poland, Prague or Italy.

The executive MBA program has been taught in distance-education centers throughout West Virginia for more than a decade. AACSB International, the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business, is the longestserving and largest global accrediting body for business schools, with more than 1,100 educational institutions and other organizations in 70 countries.

# Alum helps Afghanistan's future

Many WVU students and alumni work in the US Armed Forces to build security and pros-

perity in Afghanistan. One of them is doing so from the ground up.


Lt. Col. Carney Jackson, a DVM and 1973 graduate of the WVU Davis College of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Design, is focusing his efforts on Afghanistan's agricultural sector. Jackson is an Air National Guard Lieutenant Colonel with the Army National Guard's Kentucky Agriculture Development Team (ADT).

"The ADT is tasked to implement an agricultural strategy for provinces [including] Bamyan, Kapisa, Panjshir and Parwan," Jackson said. "We are to provide direction and focus of agricultural resources. Our effort is to increase agricultural sector jobs and productivity."

The team is working on various projects from grape trellising, oomegranate marketing, bee keeping, forage development, wheat production, potato storage and marketing, better crop planting and harvesting techniques, battling plant disease and improved irrigation tech-

"I am developing training materials on pasture management, animal health, parasitology and necropsy techniques for training local Afghan veterinarians, paravets and animal veterinary care workers," Jackson said. "Army Veterinary Corps officers, Army enlisted personnel and I are providing continuing education to veterinary students at Kabul University's Faculty of Veterinary Science and Nangarhar University veterinary

"We are also coordinating veterinary medicine training with the director of training for the Charikar veterinary training center of the Dutch Committee for Afghanistan (DCA)," Jackson said. "The DCA has veterinary field units throughout Afghanistan which provide veterinary care via veterinarians, paravets and veterinary care workers. We have provided teach-

ing on sanitary slaughter and food safety for local Afghan butch-

Richard Holbrooke, US ambassador to Afghanistan, has praised the performance of the National Guard's ADTs.

"It was remarkable to me how every candidate we called on, every Afghan in the provinces, everyone had heard about it already," Holbrooke told the National Guard's news bureau in July.

"Eighty percent of Afghanistan

depends on agriculture for its livelihood," said Army Col. Marty Leppert, who oversees the effort. "So it's incredibly important that if we're going to attack all the challenges and ills that involve Afghanistan it's important that we attack agriculture as a need."

In his civilian life, Jackson is an associate professor and veterinary pathologist with the University of Kentucky's Livestock Disease Diagnostic Center.

# WVU students travel overseas to study design in Italy

Whether it be observing Italian shoemakers in a Milan design house, styling a fashion photo shoot or creating a still motion video — the Disegno Italia study abroad program at WVU provides students with eyeopening experiences in a country filled with beauty and cul-

"Our goal for this program is to have students break out of their shells and develop a broader way of thinking and looking at the world," said Nora MacDonald, a professor of fashion design and merchandising in WVU's Davis College of Agriculture, Natural Resources and Design.

Disegno Italia, a term coined from the Italian renaissance, encompasses the philosophies of art and design. The program

teaches students the importance of the creative thought process.

Heather Papouscheck, a fashion design and merchandising major, studied abroad with Disegno Italia during the summer of 2009. The first two weeks were spent living and taking Italian language and art history classes at Il Sillabo in San Giovanni Valdarno in Tuscanny, Italy, supplemented with day trips and a long weekend trip to Rome. The students then moved on to Milan, Italy, which is known as one of the fashion capitals of the world.

"I fell in love with the culture, the food, traveling and seeing new things," Papouschek said. "The trip gave me a sense of confidence. I feel like now I can do whatever I want to do as a result of this experience."

The Disegno Italia program is open to students majoring in art, fashion design, fashion merchandising, interior design, design studies, landscape architecture, journalism, marketing and theatre. While in Milan, students have a wide variety of classes from which to choose that will enhance their major.

Students have the opportunity to earn six credit hours, and though they must take survival Italian language during their two weeks in Tuscany, the classes are taught in English.

Unlike most study abroad programs where students stay in the dorms of a college or university in the country they are visiting, students who participate in the Disegno Italia program stay in apartments a short distance from the schools they attend.

Professors from WVU accompany the students and serve as mentors. They also organize field trips and events for the students, which includes an Italian cooking lesson and excursions to Florence, Siena, Pisa, a Chianti vineyard, the Pantheon and the Villa Medici Garden and an archaeological museum.

If there is anything that the professors want students to take away from their experiences in Italy, MacDonald said it is the ability to think independently with a new perspective on life in general and a broader view of design.

Disegno Italia serves as a foundation for students from a variety of majors to experience Italy and learn to interact with different disciplines.

# Journalism students take blogging course

Students and faculty at WVU's P.I. Reed School of Journalism aren't just talking about the future of their profession — they're helping to redefine it.

A new class, "Blogging and Interactive Journalism," is giving students the opportunity to explore and experience the impact of Web 2.0 and user-generated content on journalism. Using a variety of social media tools and Web-based applications, students will learn to become effective online journalists, facilitating news as a twoway conversation rather than a one-way transmission.

"Once you write a blog post, it doesn't end there," said Bob Britten, assistant professor of visual journalism. "Others respond, you respond to them and information grows. Students will realize the work they are doing is just a starting point for that conversation. They will build a web of information with their blogging and social media work as the connective tis-


During the course, students create personal blogs on a variety of topics. The exercise will teach different approaches to writing professional online content and provide the opportunity for students to publish their work. Students will regularly update their posts, moderate comments and create web-based connections in an effort to maintain a public presence. Students will also work in groups to serve as "mini-newsrooms" and manage and maintain a Morgantown-based blog of local interest. Students will produce original reporting for the sites, make community connections and integrate associated links useful to the readers.

According to Britten, blogs have become much more mainstream now that traditional media are using them to gather and share information with their audiences. As a result, blogging is a skill that students will likely need in the newsrooms of the future.

"There aren't many [journalism] schools that are teaching blogging," Britten said. "Colleagues tell me part of the reason is that some believe blogging and social media aren't journalism. These students will show how they can be. When you see so many people using this new form of communication, it's difficult to ignore its poten-

As a final project, students will produce proposals for the 2011 John S. and James L. Knight Foundation's News Challenge competition. Part of the Knight Foundation's Media Innovation Initiative, the competition is providing \$25 million in funding over five years to select innovative projects that help to inform and transform community news and social media experiments. Next year will be the fifth year of the competition.

#### Q: Did you anticipate how the Grammy nominations might go for you? A: I didn't exactly. I knew what I wasn't going to get


nominated for, but I tried to stay focused on the implications of the music, in terms of what it means to be a Lady Gaga fan - as opposed to being rewarded in a particular way.

# Garbage goals produce sweet smell of success

With superstars Nicklas Lidstrom, Henrik Zetterberg and Pavel Datsyuk usually hogging the headlines on the Detroit Red Wings, the lunch-pail-carrying role players doing the dirty work almost always get buried in the game story.

Not this season in Motown, however, where among other lesser-lauded Wings the lead has included Tomas Holmstrom's name more often than not. At the halfway point he led Detroit in goals with 15, one more than he had last season in 53 games, and he was fourth on the team with 21 points. Not striking numbers, for sure, but as injuries and ineffectiveness took their toll on Detroit, Holmstrom's goal scoring picked up the slack, and he was perhaps the team's offensive MVP through its first 42 games.

That's quite an accomplishment for a player known for his no-frills approach, one who has always earned his paycheck by playing a northsouth game and paying a steep physical price directly in front of the opposition's goal. That's where he scores the majority of his goals and wreaks most of his havoc, screening goalies, deflecting shots and generally making life miserable for the other team. His coach, Mike Babcock, admires Holmstrom's determination, how he keeps going back in front of the net no matter how much punishment he takes.

Because of how well the 37-year-old
Holmstrom has played, he won't get a
rest during the NHL's mid-February
Olympic break. The Swede will
join teammates Lidstrom,
Zetterberg and Niklas
Kronwall on their
country's team for
the Vancouver
Winter Games.

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


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It's early January, and "Lost" star Jorge Garcia is back in Hawaii after spending Christmas in Wisconsin. He still has a little time before filming begins on the final group of episodes of the island castaway drama's last season – which begins airing on Tuesday, Feb. 2, on ABC – but thoughts that the end is nigh are creeping in.

"It feels good still," he says. "We know that sadness is on deck, but we're not going there just yet. But you're starting to see the list of lasts. It's like, 'This is the last New Year's on the island.'

And, of course, there's the packing. Says Garcia, "Now, you're starting to look around the house, thinking, 'How am I going to pack up all I've amassed over six years?' "

Since this is true for many of Garcia's fellow cast members, one wonders if there might be a "Lost" garage sale.

"There might definitely be some Craigslist-ing," Garcia says. "I don't know. It's a lot. I'm just looking at my bookshelf. We're talking about possibly a bunch of us going in on one of those shipping containers. Everyone gets a fraction, and we all start filling it up."

Before "Lost," Garcia was best known for doing 13 episodes of the CBS series "Becker," so his role as unlucky lottery winner Hugo "Hurley" Reyes has not only changed his career but also his life.

"Totally, completely," he says. "When I got the pilot, I didn't even have a script yet to read. I just knew it was (producer) J.J. Abrams, and it shot in Hawaii. So I figured, if anything, I'd have a little Hawaiian vacation out of it, and that was good enough for me."

And a nice vacation appeared to be all he was getting, as the original plan called for Hurley to be offed early on.

"I remember seeing an old breakdown," Garcia says, "where Hurley was in his 50s and wasn't going to survive the pilot. So I'm glad I was able to change their minds.

"They had a rough list of some people to put in the show, but when they were casting us – and it was late in casting season – they ended up really concentrating on finding actors they wanted to work with and not worrying too much on how it's all going to fit just yet.

"So they ended up creating the part for me, after they met me. I had read for Sawyer, and they chatted with me for a little while. They ended up writing scenes for me, when I actually tested for the role.

"So, in that sense, because I was the only Hurley that they tested, as far as I know, that makes you feel pretty good."

As to what will change immediately after the director calls the final "That's a wrap!" Garcia says, "I probably will give a nice close shave. Periodically it's just nice to feel real clean in the face."



# Erin Hannon from 'The Office'

No matter how young or broke one is, working in an office means hewing to certain rules, even if you have a lousy job at Dunder Mifflin.

Erin (Ellie Kemper) on "The Office," airing Thursdays on NBC, isn't fashion-forward or able to spend much on clothes, but she's representative of how newbies to the work force dress.

"The first time we met her was last season, and her look was not remarkable," Kemper says. "It looked pretty, and she blended in pretty well, with sweaters and skirts. This year they are dressing her in maybe not funkier, but less savvy costumes. She is wearing things that don't necessarily work but Erin thinks looks really cute together.

Like most young recruits to the work world, Erin has to rely on a limited wardrobe, and she wears one skirt often.

"It's a denim skirt, and Steve Carell says it looks like a bell and my legs go out like the Liberty Bell," Kemper says. "Among the characters, Erin has the least fashion sense.

Costume designer Alysia Raycraft says Erin "went through a couple of different phases. She has innocence and a naivete and openness to her character. She was brought in for the other characters to be bounced off of. One of the words used by one of the producers was 'country.' What I interpreted that as is simple, not high- or even medium-fashion.

Raycraft finds clothes for her at Macy's, Nordstrom and Bloomingdales. She acknowledges these stores are more expensive than Erin's budget would allow but adds that the cheaper clothes are often more adorned, and Raycraft shops in the juniors department.

Many of Erin's skirts are from Banana Republic. Cardigans are from Martin and Osa. Long-sleeved T-shirts are from J. Crew, and other tops are from H&M and Forever 21.

Her shoes are clunky flats from Nine West. She wears denims, and the patterns are plaids. Even Erin's palette is basic - ochre, greens, browns

Though Erin wears few accessories, she does sport a locket from Urban Outfitters.

Since the series is set in Scranton, Pa., Erin needs outerwear. Her coats are a Calvin Klein Raycraft found at the Burlington Coat Factory, where she also bought hats.

NEW YORK — Many brides positively know what their wedding gown will look like long before they meet their groom, and they're not going to let a little thing — OK, actually a huge thing — known as the economy dash their dream dress.

lifestyles, none of which, however, were obviously pareddown. There might have been a little less beading and fewer exotic trims, such as feathers, to keep costs down, but there wasn't an

industry-wide movement toward gowns on the cheap, the insiders said.

"When I try to think of one overriding theme, it's that brides still want the options for the wedding they want to have," said Darcy Miller, editorial director of Martha Stewart Weddings. And of course, she added, each bride wants a different kind of wedding; it's a traditional, formal blowout for one, a more casual beach bash for another.

"Because of the economic climate, a lot of brides are willing to get a DJ instead of a band, do it on Sunday instead of a Saturday night, but they still have the wedding and still have the dream of what they wanted their dress to be," Miller said.

Designer Monique Lhuillier said she feels almost protective when crafting wedding gowns, which is different than the trendsetter role she might play when working on red-carpet gowns or readyto-wear clothes.

"It's a wedding, a celebration, a new life, a new love, a new chapter. I'm honored to be a part of it and rework the dress to make sure it's perfect in my own eye," said Lhuillier.

"I thought about the ultimate bride and how much we could give her," said another designer, Reem Acra. "The perfect look is that she wants to stay young, stay fresh and be able to travel with the dress.'

Acra captured modern and airy silhouettes influenced by a trip to Japan, where she was impressed with gardens, Zen and an aesthetic of purity.

There's no "flash" in the gowns, Acra explained, since she was aiming for a sweeter sort of beauty, when a bride gets caught up in the romance of the occasion.

"You want the bride to feel like she's getting married that it's pure and real," she said. "After all, you're not getting married to throw a party or even to wear the dress. You are getting married to get married — for you, for him, for the both of you — and

these dresses are supposed to reflect that."

Trends are barely a blip on Nicole Miller's radar as she does her bridal collection, nevermind that she also designs fashion-forward cocktail frocks.

A good, flattering gown that can be worn by different ages and body types is another story, though. "If I have a really good-selling evening gown, I'll do a version for bridal because I already know the silhouette is selling. I might add beading or longer train," she said.

Her favorite from her new collection is a crushed metaltaffeta dress with a pleated bottom and tucks up the front.

What brides want most is to look fantastic, and what they think about is how gowns flatter their figure and appear in photographs, Nicole Miller said. That's why corsets sell so well in bridal, she added with a laugh.

Michael Shettel, de of the Alfred Angelo collection, said sleek and slim is one popular direction for brides; the other, at the opposite end of the spectrum, is the modern ballgown.

"We approached this season with the inspiration of jazz on a summer's day," said Shettel, who watched a 1958 documentary about the Newport Jazz Festival as part of his process. "What was striking was how modern the casual sort of dresses looked in 1958 with the juxtaposition of the jazz-world glamour."

# Slideshows put a personal stamp on your wedding day

Jennifer Cocchiara wants guests at her wedding next November to understand how she and her fiance fell in love, so she plans to present a slideshow with photos of them growing up and growing together as a couple.

It also will include shots of the people who are important to the couple the people who will be viewing the photos.

"We want it to be more interactive for the guests and interactive for all of us — it's a group celebration," said Cocchiara, of Ewing, N.J.

Slideshows have become common at weddings. Experts say they must be done properly to

succeed, but are generally a fun and simple way to personalize the day and help guests get to know the couple better.

"It's an extra way to remind you, as a guest, where you are and how special it is you are there," said Anja Winikka, editor of TheKnot.com, a wedding planning Web site.

A slideshow can be included in any part of the wedding weekend rehearsal dinner, cocktail hour, post-wedding brunch or reception, she said. If a couple is uncomfortable stopping the festivities to show the slideshow, it can be played in the background, on a loop, for guests to view at their leisure. Some couples run a slideshow on digital photo frames near the guest book or even in the restroom area.

Winikka cautions that slideshows should be "crafted in a meaningful manner." They should be organized chronologically or by theme, and should feature photos that don't embarrass anyone and are appropriate for guests young and old. The equipment used to display them should be tested beforehand to avoid any glitches.

And, Winikka agrees, there should be photos of more people than just the bride and groom.

"It's great to see pictures of the two of you, but (guests) really are there to enjoy themselves with your friends and family, not just the two of you,' she said.

Photo slideshows can be created through various Web sites, for free or a small fee, and on common computer software such as Microsoft PowerPoint. You can rent a projector or audio visual equipment to show it.

Couples may create the slideshow themselves, or let a family member or friend do it. For those who aren't good with computers, professional photographers can craft a slideshow that features artfully edited photographs and video clips. Rates can run from hundreds to thousands of dollars.

Phoenix videographer and disc jockey Cameron Carpenter, owner of Three Oceans Entertainment, says it can take a few days in the studio for him to put together a wedding slideshow. Some of his clients choose to tell only their love story, while others include photos of themselves growing up as well.

"It's a neat way to watch somebody grow up right in front of your eyes, and that's the big appeal for it," he said. "For out-of-town relatives ... it kind of fills in those gaps.'

Some wedding planners are against the whole idea.

Cristina Verger, owner of Cristina Verger's Tasty Thoughts, a high-end wedding planning and event design service in New York and the Hamptons, said she's never done a photo slideshow at a wedding.

"I would discourage it actually because a slideshow, no matter how short, it really requires everyone's attention, and you are interrupting," she said. "... You have to stop to make everyone sit down and pay attention to the slideshow, which is kind of an imposition to your guests."

If a couple feels strongly about including a slideshow, Verger said she would suggest it be shown with no sound during the cocktail hour.

Carpenter and Winikka agreed that slideshows should complement the wedding activities, not make everything come to a standstill or delay the dinner, dancing or speeches. Both said that a good time for viewing is during dinner. "Before the fast eaters are done and starting to mingle around again, there's a nice window there," Carpenter said.

Slideshows also should be no more than 10 or 15 minutes, he and Winikka

Cocchiara said she and her fiance, Damien Glonek, 37, are horror movie fans who attended horror movie conventions as youngsters and eventually met at one of them. Their slideshow, she said, will likely include pictures of them in Halloween costumes and posing with the actors from some of their favorite scary flicks.

Not only will the slideshow be personal and a little nontraditional, it also will help them avoid something they truly dread: Dancing.

"We don't like to dance, most of our friends don't like to dance, and we were trying to think of what type of entertainment we could incorporate in the reception," Cocchiara



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# Discussing money before the wedding pays off

When Missy Gillen met her future husband, Mike, she hadn't given much thought to a rainy day fund or investing money. But as the Westlake, Ohio, couple got serious, she started paying attention to their finances, something Mike Gillen encouraged.

'We're both very aware of our goals," said Missy, who married in July, but not before creating a budget and starting to save for a house

Talking about money before marriage is essential for wedded bliss, according to financial experts, since it can eliminate a lot of surprises and arguments. Conversation can help a couple understand each other's financial standing, spending habits and savings goals.

Financial stress is one of the main causes of divorce, said Gail Cunningham, spokeswoman for the National Foundation for Credit Counseling, in Silver Spring, Md.

"People bring financial baggage into a relationship and often don't deal with it until problems arise," she said.

Many newlyweds do not foresee that money can be an issue, added Julie Baumgardner, executive director of First Things First, which offers financial education classes to couples in Chattanooga, Tenn.

"It's not a topic that people tend to put a lot of weight on," she said. "Learning how to manage your money together is a big deal."

These experts and Denver-based financial counselor Taffy Wagner offered some tips for addressing finances before exchanging wedding vows:

1. Sit down with your partner and discuss your finances. Bring copies of your credit score; pay stubs; credit card bills; details about loans, child support payments or debt; and any other relevant financial information. This will help both parties develop a picture of their financial responsibilities

2. Examine one another's credit scores. If one person's score is below 700, consider keeping your finances separate. Work as a couple to help the person with the low credit score improve it by paying off debt and taking care of

after marriage.

overdue bills. Do not apply for any joint credit cards. Instead, put the cards in the name of the person with good credit and make the other person an authorized user.

3. Decide which of you will be in charge of managing the money and paying bills. It's important to develop a system so the bills are paid on time. Make sure the other partner has a basic understanding of the system and is aware of all bank accounts and investments.

4. Develop a budget the two of you can live on. Make sure allocations for groceries, clothing, etc., are reasonable. No more than one-third of your gross income should go toward a mortgage. Don't spend more than 25 percent of your gross income

on rent.

5. Set limits on spending. Determine how much money you are comfortable spending without consulting your spouse. For example, agree to discuss any purchase over \$100, \$500 or \$1,000

6. Find out how your partner handles unexpected expenses, and decide whether you agree with the approach. After you're married, you may decide that turning to mom and dad or using a credit card to cover emergencies is unacceptable.

7. Agree to create an emergency fund. Financial experts recommend setting aside enough money to cover living expenses for three to six months. Start by setting aside 10 percent of your paycheck.

8. Develop a policy

about lending money. Decide whether you would be willing to give a loan to a friend or relative. If you're comfortable doing that, discuss whether you would charge interest and how much you could afford to lend. Always put the details of a loan in writing.

9. Discuss whether one of you will stay home after the birth of a **child.** If that is a goal, start planning how you could live on one income.

10. Share details about the way your parents ran their household. Did they employ a housekeeper, landscaper or other help that you would expect in your household? Was charitable giving or religious tithing an important part of your upbringing and what are your attitudes toward it?






NEW YORK - Soon after I got engaged this summer, my well-meaning BFF pulled me aside and said, "I think you're making a big mistake."

And it was stressful at times — but it was the kind of stress I would have had even with 18 months to plan. Looking back, I now know you don't need a year to pull of a dream wedding.

Of course, you can't waste






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# Trends to marry by: Photo booths, cupcakes and some specialty lighting

DETROIT — The rows and rows of displays by photographers, cake decorators, floral designers and everything else you could possibly want for a wedding nearly overwhelmed Rana Mansour of Sterling Heights, Mich., and her fiance, Rashad Saleh of Dearborn, Mich.

Fortunately, they knew exactly what they'd come to check out at the Bridesto-Be Expo in Dearborn photo booths.

The couple, who plan to marry on May 30, stepped behind the curtain of ShutterBooth, owned by Nolan and Kimberly Gottschalk of Royal Oak, Mich. Out popped a print of Saleh as he planted a kiss on Mansour's cheek, a keepsake that looks like a book mark.

Photo booths will be big at weddings in 2010, says Cyd LaChiusa, producer of the Brides-To-Be Shows, one of several presenters of bridal expos that get going in January.

Other trends sure to be popular, according to wedding planners and couples: Cupcakes, lighting that shines the couples' names or initials around the reception hall, live entertainment and danc-

ing to or from the altar. Expect brighter, richer colors too, a reflection of the brighter economic forecast expected in 2010, says Tom Schoenith. owner of the Roostertail,

on Detroit's riverfront.

Brides are requesting jewel tones, Tiffany blue and other brighter colors — a marked contrast to the more subdued browns and beiges popular last year, says Schoenith, whose establishment has hosted weddings and reception for 52 years.

Julie Raimondi, editor of Brides Michigan magazine and brides.com, says gray will be a popular. "Higher-end grays and neutrals can be incredibly elegant," she says. "I think you'll also see patterned and printed bridesmaids' dresses."

Expect to see brightly colored shoes, she says red and bright blue with the white and ivory gowns.

Couples still want beautiful weddings on a budget, but they're going for special touches that reflect who they are and offer lots of fun and memorable moments.

That's why Mansour, 29, and Saleh, 31, plan to have a photo booth.

"It's a great way for everybody who comes to enjoy themselves and get a keepsake from the wedding," says Mansour, a doctor, who met Saleh, a chiropractor, at a get-together with friends about a year and a half ago.

Shayna Goodman, 24, of Livonia, Mich., is also excited about having a photo booth at her wedding to Brandon Kummer, 25, though it won't be

until January 15, 2011. "The photo booths are

really awesome and they make a great party favor as well," says Goodman, who won a battle of the bouquet toss at the Brides-to-Be Show and won a three-hour ride from Luxury Limousine of Dearborn.

Generally, guests enter into the booth under the direction of a host at the reception. Two photos pop out — one for the guest and another that the company compiles into a scrapbook for the bride and groom.

Renting a photo booth and the use of a Web site for posting photos that can be ordered costs about \$800.

At lots of weddings this year, look for cupcakes, once seen primarily at kiddie birthday parties.

Donna Anderson, who operates Celebrate with Cupcakes out of her Flat Rock, Mich., home, started baking cupcakes for weddings last year and has done four. She does cupcake trees, cupcake bouquets and cupcake keepsakes, all decorated and filled based on each couple's request.

"Couples like them because they're fun, different and unique," she says.

Cupcakes are under consideration by Katie Zack, 23, of Highland, and Mike Keeler, 25, of Rochester, Mich., for their Oct. 9 wedding.

"Since we're on a budget," Zack says, "I like that cupcakes can be made in our wedding colors and double as centerpieces."

For another possibility to represent something "old," Franke suggests implementing a table of wedding photographs collected from family and friends attending the reception. The photos will honor the marriages of couples close to the bride and groom as well as provide a wonderful center for conversation.

Something new: Optimism and hope for the bride's life ahead. "Renewable is the new 'new,' " says Franke. For a fresh approach to something new, Franke suggests environmentally responsible decisions such as selecting potted perennials for centerpieces. "Potted wildflowers will create a vibrant setting for the reception and can later be planted in the garden at the newlywed's home.

Franke also suggests seed satchels as favors to serve as a long-living connection to the wedding.

Even guests can get into the game. "If you're invited to a wedding this year, consider presenting the couple with a gift that offers a new spin on traditional gift options. Franke suggests antiques carefully selected for the couple or

Traditionally, a bride can borrow anything from her best friend's punch bowl to her grandmother's pearls, but Franke suggests fulfilling the adage by creating a buzz. "Why not borrow an antique car and create a dramatic exit from your

wedding?" Franke asks. Another emerging trend is the borrowing of the cake knife from one bride to another within a family. Starting a tradition now of passing along your cake knife or other wedding essentials is not only costsaving, but also creates a legacy that future generations will treasure.

Something blue: A color suggesting purity and fidelity as evidenced



in the 19th century phrase "Marry in blue, lover be true." Building blues into the wedding color scheme is an option for completing your old, new, borrowed and blue checklist, and at the same time, developing a color scheme for your reception.

"Think like a graphic designer," says Franke. "Consider your wedding colors as a controlled

palette." Franke encourages the bride to visit a paint store or check a Pantone system and define a series of colors, never more than three.

Once selected, the bride can keep the color chips with her throughout the planning period so that the exact colors are always available when decisions are made about bridesmaids' gowns, table linens,

floral arrangements and other decorative elements.

According to Franke, blues are an elegant choice for any season. He suggests pairing royal blues with yellow for a classic summer wedding; blue and pink for spring; and icy blues with whites or silver for a winter wedding.
