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# Flu cases on the rise

Officials: Local activity outpaces national data

Local hospitals officials are reporting an increase in influenza activity, as the state is reporting regional influenza occurrences.

David Lawrence, Monongalia General Hospital Emergency Department medical director, said while the federal numbers may paint an OK-looking picture, it's not what is being experienced locally.

"It seems to hit with much fervor this year than most flu seasons," he said.

Recently, Mon General had 199 people in the department with reported flu symptoms. Of those, 38 patients that tested positive for influenza type A and 36 tested positive for H1N1 — or swine flu.

In 2009, H1N1 made national and local news with a nationwide pandemic. During that time, the Monongalia County Health Department handed out roughly 13,000 vaccinations.

Lawrence said it's difficult to predict how this year will be

in terms of the number of people with the flu. If people get vaccinated or don't spread the disease, then the season will be fairly mild.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention reported regional activity for West Virginia in its influenza summary released late last week.

For low-end influenza the symptoms are like a bad cold, Lawrence said. More serious

## Case: Abortion clinic protest-free zone

BOSTON — Eleanor McCullen clutches a baby's hat, knit in pink and blue, as she patrols a yellow semicircle painted on the sidewalk outside a Planned Parenthood health clinic on a frigid December morning with snow in the forecast.

The painted line marks 35 feet from the clinic's entrance, and that's where the 77-year-old McCullen and all other abortion protesters and supporters must stay under a Massachusetts law, that is being challenged at the U.S. Supreme Court as an unconstitutional infringement on free speech. Arguments are set for Wednesday.

Outside the line, McCullen and others are free to approach anyone with any message they

wish. They risk arrest if they get closer to the door.

With her pleasant demeanor and grandmotherly mien, McCullen has become the new face of a decades-old fight between abortion opponents asserting their right to try to change the minds of women seeking abortions and abortion providers claiming that patients should be able to enter their facilities without being impeded or harassed.

In 2000, the Supreme Court upheld a different buffer zone in Colorado, in a decision that some free speech advocates, who also support abortion rights, heavily criticized. Noted First Amendment lawyer Floyd Abrams recently called the decision in Hill v. Colorado "what may well be the most indefen-

sible First Amendment ruling so far this century."

The three dissenters in that case — Justices Anthony Kennedy, Antonin Scalia and Clarence Thomas — remain on the court. They have been joined by Chief Justice John Roberts and Justice Samuel Alito, who may be willing to provide the two additional votes in support of the protesters.

McCullen and other abortion opponents sued over the limits on their activities at Planned Parenthood health centers in Boston, Springfield and Worcester. At the latter two sites, the protesters say they have little chance of reaching patients arriving by car because they must stay 35 feet from the entrance to those buildings' parking lots.

## Safety first for retired professor

Della-Giustina set up drills at hospital

Some professions are built on feistiness, because the job demands it.

That's why Dan Della-Giustina can still bristle when he thinks back to what happened 22 years ago, in rural North Carolina.

Check that. Della-Giustina, WVU's internationally known professor of public safety and environmental management, who retired in December, doesn't just bristle.

More than two decades later, he can still get downright mad when he thinks about a series of events that left life forever changed for a group of workers in Hamlet, N.C., on the sunny morning of Sept. 3, 1991.

Hamlet, a town of about 6,000 that sits near the South Carolina border, was home to Imperial Foods, a company that prepared frozen, breaded chicken for fast food restaurants and federally

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# 80-year-old W.Va. artist shows work for first time

MARTINSBURG — Neal Martineau has been drawing and painting practically his entire life, from buying off schoolyard bullies in the first grade with sketches of war planes to painting giant abstracts for his home.

But mainly, the 80-year-old has kept his art to himself, sharing it with family and some friends or doing some commissions.

"My work over the past two years has sort of exploded," he said in a recent interview as the first public exhibit of his work was being hung at the Exhibitions Art Gallery in Martinsburg.

Martineau, who with his

wife of half a century, Patty, retired to Shepherdstown after a successful career in advertising with Ogilvy Advertising in Manhattan, was painting with a group and feeling schizophrenic about his paintings.

"My pencil drawings are detailed, but when I get my paints, I go off into abstract," he explained. "Why can't I paint as I draw?"

A friend, Becca Jones, told him to simply paint as he draws, and that was his opening. He has been producing paintings every two weeks for the past two years.

"I decided not to suffer anymore and I am having myself a blast," Martineau said. "I'm turned on by color. I can't get enough color.

I'm like an 18-year-old with color."

His latest paintings are a veritable explosion of boldly rich colors, sensual shapes and intricate compositions depicting animals, plants and heavens.

"I can't get away from circles," Martineau continued. "Circles are what we're made of. The universe is a circle. We're a circle. I love to do circles."

He describes himself not as an artist or a painter, but as a teenager who paints. He disappears into painting, losing track of time and forgetting to eat.

Martineau still did not show his works publicly.

"I had a little formal

training at Princeton," he said. "There was one artist in residence, Steven Greene, a super guy. He told me, 'Neal, you cannot make a living as an artist and have a house in Westchester (an upper middle-class suburb of New York City) and a station wagon.' That kind of put me off. I never intended to make a living as an artist and I still don't."

However, when people would see his work, they were impressed and delighted.

The exhibit includes works from 1961 through 2013, some of which have never been seen before.

Martineau's exhibition runs through Feb. 2.

## Weather stops plane crash recovery

BOISE, Idaho — Bad weather Saturday morning turned back a recovery team attempting to reach the wreckage of a small airplane that went down in the central Idaho mountains in early December, killing a Silicon Valley executive and four of his family members.



There are no plans to make another attempt today, but a meeting will be held Monday to consider options for reaching the remote crash site and removing the five bodies, Valley County Sheriff Patti Bolen said.

"We're confident they're all right there," she said, but declined to comment if positive identifications have been made at the site. She also declined to release a more precise location of the crash.

Bolen said the site has about 3 feet of snow and was likely receiving more on Saturday. She said snowmobiles will be needed to reach the area, and various routes in the rugged terrain are being considered. She didn't rule out the use of a helicopter.

The aircraft was carrying 51-year-old pilot Dale Smith, a software executive from San Jose, Calif.; his son, Daniel Smith and his wife, Sheree Smith; and daughter Amber Smith with her fiancé, Jonathan Norton, officials said.

The plane was flying from eastern Oregon, where the family had been spending the Thanksgiving holiday, to Montana, where Daniel and Sheree Smith live, when it disappeared Dec. 1 in the mountains 150 miles northeast of Boise.

Officials suspended the official search for the aircraft in mid-December, but an intensive hunt by family and friends located the badly damaged aircraft Friday.

## Dog helps kids talk about abuse

SARASOTA, Fla. — The girl was sweet, smart, just 9 years old. She had been sexually abused by her stepfather, and her mother had abandoned her to live with the man and his monstrously abhorrent secret.

No one seemed to want Big Red either. A lady found the Labrador mix wandering up Proctor Road one day, the scars on his mangy side mysterious and sad, but there was something wise and gentle about him, too.

When it came time for the girl to give a deposition in the case against her stepfather two years ago, she withdrew and grew frightened and wouldn't talk to anyone about it.

Prosecutor Dawn Buff tried playing a fun game with her. It didn't work. They sat at a kid's table and colored. Not a sound.

Over on the couch, next to some pillows, watching all of this, was Big Red.

He was a proud therapy dog now — among the vehicles prosecutors use to assuage the fears of abused children — but he was scared, too, of elevators.

So scared, in fact, his handler had to hold him in her arms as they rode up to the deposition room that day.

Buff leaned over to the girl and said softly, "I know this is really scary and a lot has gone on, but Red's really scared to be here, too."

"He's afraid of the elevator, but he came because he knew you were going to have to talk about this today. He came to be by you. He knew you needed him."

The girl rose from her chair, walked to the couch, put her arms around Big Red and snuggled up to the gentle brown therapy dog with the scars on his side.

"I almost started to cry," Buff said.

They all moved to the floor and the girl started talking, apprehensively

at first, and then saying just enough to send her stepfather to prison for the rest of his life.

There are framed pictures of therapy dogs — including Big Red — hanging on a wall at the Child Protection Center, right across the hall from Danielle Hughes' office.

There are also photos of the dogs on the wall in the lobby of the State Attorney's Office in Sarasota.

Hughes began the program that uses dogs to help comfort abused children during depositions and trials. The program is called PAWS.

She began with three dogs. There are now 11. The example of the interaction between Big Red and the 9-year-old girl — and the result it created — is the pinnacle.

"That's it for me," Hughes said. "That's incredible."

Sarasota and Manatee counties may be the only counties in the state that have used dogs to help children in court, she said.

## Expectations low for Syrian peace talks

WASHINGTON — In its last-ditch attempt to get moderate Syrian opposition groups to the negotiating table, the U.S. faces the prospect that a no-show wouldn't be such a bad thing.

As the Jan. 22 peace meeting in Switzerland nears, the main Western-backed moderate political group trying to oust Syrian President Bashar Assad has not decided whether it will attend.

It's the latest frustration for the U.S. and allies who have spent the past 18 months trying to negotiate a transition of power from Assad to a new, representative government.

In a meeting this weekend in Paris, Secretary of State John Kerry will push the Syrian National Coalition's newly re-elected leader to bring his group to the Swiss conference.

But even if the coalition agrees to attend, analysts say it does not have enough credibility with other Syrian groups to sit as an of-

ficial counterbalance to Assad's government.

"If the expectations to begin with are very low, then you can't really fail — can you?" Kamran Bokhari, a Toronto-based expert on Mideast issues for the global intelligence company Stratfor, said Friday. "The constraints that the U.S. has are clear to the international community, and it's not going to be a surprise."

"What would be a surprise is if they are able to make a difference," Bokhari said. "So nobody has too high of expectations."

The coalition's leader, Ahmad al-Jarba, heads a shaky alliance of opposition groups. They are sharply divided on whether to attend the conference, which is intended to begin a negotiated peace after three years of civil war.

Most of its leaders are in exile and have been accused by rebel fighters and other activists inside Syria of being ineffective and out of touch.

egy, People United for Rescue and Rehabilitation (P.U.R.R.) holds adoption days at PETCO the first two Saturdays of each month.

Judging by Saturday's crowd and the nonprofit's adoption numbers, it's working.

Margaret Glenn has volunteered with P.U.R.R. for two years.

She said P.U.R.R. Found homes for more than 700 cats in 2013, which is a record, up from about 500 adoptions in 2012.

"That's not even the final count," Glenn said. "It's probably going to end up somewhere around 750."

Glenn said that along with the cooperation of partners such as PETCO, there were several other

reasons why P.U.R.R. was able to get so many cats adopted.

"Our shelter is free-roaming, meaning the cats are well socialized and not terrified of people," Glenn said. "Another thing is that all of our cats are tested for FIV and leukemia. They have all their shots. They've had parasite treatments. So, for \$25 for a cat or \$50 for a kitten, you're saving about \$200."

Of course, Connor isn't worried about something as silly as money. He's looking for a new best friend.

"I like this one," Connor tells his mom, reaching a hand through a cage to pet an appreciative black and white calico.

When mom reminds him that he already has a kitty, he's ready.

"Yeah, but I need another one."

rious influenza has symptoms such as joint pain, muscle aches and cough. Most of these cases can either be treated with over-the-counter

medicines or an antiviral prescribed by someone's primary care physician.

If someone has severe influenza, problems will include an extreme headache and a fever, Lawrence said. Then it might be time to visit a doctor, he added.

There could also be problems for people with chronic illness as their immune system can't fight the disease as well, Lawrence said.

The best way to stave off influenza is for someone to get a flu shot. Lawrence said it takes 7 to 10 days for the vaccine to become effective in a person. This year's vaccines are prepared to help prevent H1N1.

"I do feel the vaccine is pretty effective," he said.

WVU Healthcare Chief of Infection Disease Rashida Khakoo echoed Lawrence's comments and said the flu shot is the best defense.

"Everybody should get a flu shot, no excuses," she said.

Other prevention tactics include hand washing, covering a mouth when coughing or sneezing and cleaning work areas, Khakoo said.

At WVU Healthcare they have seen an increase in influenza just like the state and the country, Khakoo said.

The hope is that the flu numbers don't reach pandemic levels, Khakoo said, but they keep seeing an increase. Most of the increase happened in late December into January, she said.

Flu season typically runs from October until the early spring, Khakoo said.

**Group auctions permit to hunt rhino**

DALLAS — Hunt the black rhino to save the black rhino.

That's the Dallas Safari Club's approach to a fundraiser for efforts to protect the endangered species. The group hoped to raise more than \$200,000 Saturday by auctioning off the right to shoot and kill a black rhinoceros in the African nation of Namibia.

But the auction has drawn howls from critics, including wildlife and animal rights groups, and the FBI earlier this week said it was investigating death threats against members of the club.

Ben Carter, executive director of the Safari Club, defended the auction. He said all money raised will go toward rhino conservation efforts. He also said the rhino that the winner will hunt is old, male and nonbreeding — and that the animal was likely to be targeted for removal anyway because it was becoming aggressive and threatening other wildlife.

Carter added that wildlife experts say culling

a herd is an acceptable habitat management practice.

"In most cases, this animal is detrimental," Carter said. "He's past his prime."

But critics have questioned that logic. Officials from the Humane Society and the International Fund for Animal Welfare have said that while culling can be appropriate in abundant animal populations, all black rhinos should be protected, given

their endangered status.

An estimated 4,000 black rhinos remain in the wild, down from 70,000 in the 1960s. Nearly 1,800 are in Namibia, according to the safari club.

Critics have also said any hunting of a rhino sends a bad message to the public.

"This auction is telling the world that an American will pay anything to kill their species," Jeffrey Flocken, North American

regional director of the Massachusetts-based IFAW, said earlier this week. "This is, in fact, making a spectacle of killing an endangered species."

The auction was to take place Saturday night in downtown Dallas under tight security and behind closed doors. Organizers hoped to at least break the previous high bid for one of the permits in Namibia, which is \$223,000, and had said the amount could be as high as \$1 million. The nation offers five permits each year, and the one being auctioned Saturday was the first to be made available for purchase outside of Namibia.

The winning bidder could come from anywhere in the world, and at least some bidders are expected to enter by phone.

About 40 protesters gathered early Saturday evening outside the convention center where the auction and a pre-auction dinner were to take place. They held signs and chanted. Most dispersed by just after 7 p.m.

**Neiman Marcus is latest victim of security breach**

NEW YORK — Luxury merchant Neiman Marcus confirmed Saturday that thieves stole some of its customers' payment card information and made unauthorized charges over the holiday season, becoming the second retailer in recent weeks to announce it had fallen victim to a cyber-security attack.

The hacking, coming weeks after Target Corp. revealed its own breach, underscores the increasing challenges that merchants have in thwarting security threats. Neiman Marcus didn't say whether the

breach was related to the massive data theft at Target, but some security experts believe they could be part of the same scam. Nevertheless, the recent security breaches at two major retailers threaten to scare shoppers who worry about the safety of their personal data.

Ginger Reeder, spokeswoman for Dallas-based Neiman Marcus Group Ltd., said in an email Saturday that the retailer had been notified in mid-December by its credit card processor about potentially unauthorized payment activity following customer purchases at stores. On Jan. 1, a forensics firm con-

firmed evidence that the upscale retailer was a victim of a criminal cyber-security intrusion and that some customers' credit and debit cards were possibly compromised as a result.

Reeder wouldn't estimate how many customers may be affected but said the merchant is notifying customers whose cards it has now determined were used fraudulently. Neiman Marcus, which operates more than 40 upscale stores and clearance stores, is working with the Secret Service on the breach, she said.

"We have begun to contain the intrusion and

have taken significant steps to further enhance information security," Reeder wrote.

Robert Siciliano, a security expert with McAfee, a computer security software maker, says it is possible Neiman Marcus doesn't yet know the extent of the breach. He says he believes that the two thefts were likely committed by the same organized group, based on his experience and the fact that the incidents happened at around the same time.

"It's a knee-jerk reaction that the security industry has right now," he added.



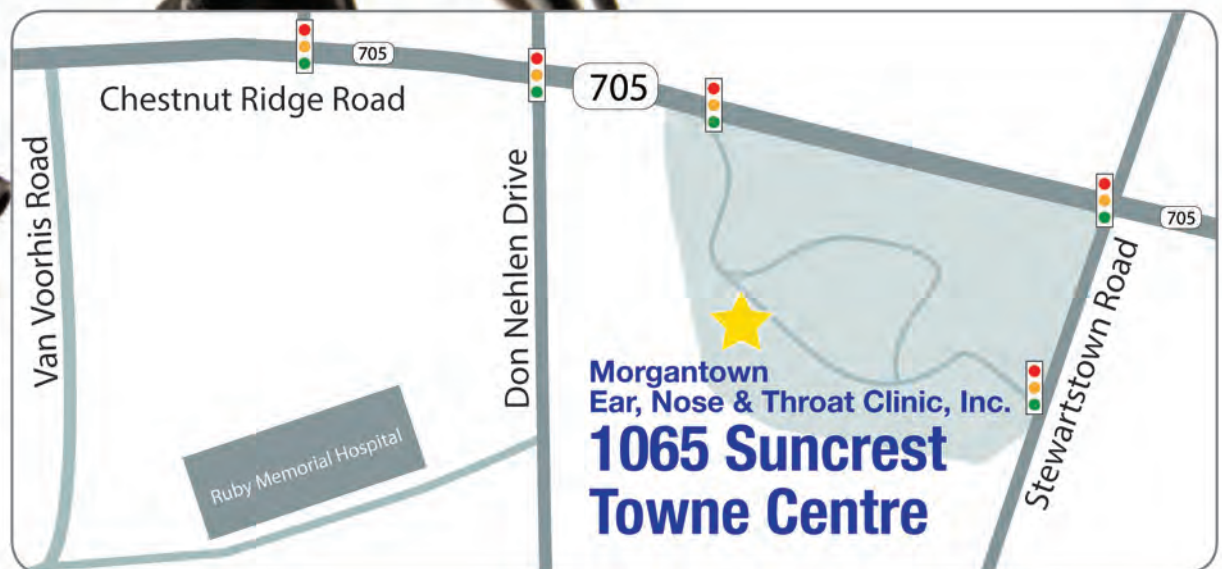

mandated school lunch programs.

Workers on the morning shift weren't too long into their day when the smoke started roiling. Oil in a deep fryer spontaneously ignited, sparking a blaze that turned into a fatal inferno.

Twenty-five people died in the flames. Fifty-four others were injured, suffering everything from severe burns to lung and neurological damage from toxins borne by the flames.

The plant's fire escape doors had been padlocked. From the outside.

That was an order that came down from the front office.

Company officials told investigators afterward that the move was made to cut down on incidents of vandalism and theft, which they said had been running through the plant in the months before a vat of oil turned into a cauldron of chaos and death.

All Della-Giustina can see are 79 people who had nowhere to run.

"They didn't have a chance," he said, shaking his head. "They were locked in. Unforgivable."

**'What do you think a drill is?'**

Before Della-Giustina joined academia, he was someone the front office people either embraced — or tried to avoid.

He was the safety guy, and he sweated the details. If a bulb was burned out in one of your exit signs, he let you know about it.

If a piece of machinery on your shop floor didn't have a protective guard in place, he let you know about it.

If you didn't have an evacuation plan clearly posted, and you didn't regularly conduct fire drills, he definitely let you know about it.

Della-Giustina smiled as

he looked back on a recent Thursday while cleaning out his office.

Shredding 4 tons of student papers and documents — "I'm not exaggerating," he said — was only part of the deal.

If the memories in head had to be physically stored, the Benjamin M. Statler College of Engineering and Mineral Resources would have had to build a new wing to accommodate them all.

Besides all that paper, there were all those books. Nineteen of them on his shelves have his name on the spine. Textbooks he authored are used in college courses across the country.

There are all those framed certificates and commendations, also, including a signed letter from then-Sen. John F. Kennedy, recommending his fellow New Englander for an appointment to the U.S. Naval Academy.

And lots of sports-themed photographs, too. Della-Giustina was a star athlete who went on to be a championship high school basketball coach in and around his native Springfield, Mass., where his parents settled after crossing the Atlantic from Italy to forge a new life in a new country.

Thinking back to those aforementioned drills is what made him chuckle on this day. Those exercises were what made some administrators annoyed — at first, anyway — after he had logged his first year on the

Evansdale campus in 1976.

That's when he began regularly instituting the fire drills and other mock-disaster drills at the former WVU Hospital, now the site of the Robert C. Byrd Health Sciences Center.

A Della-Giustina disaster drill was a blend of Hollywood, the hospital and just plain hard work.

Everybody got involved, from dispatchers to emergency room doctors to theater students who

came up with the makeup depicting gruesome injuries among the "victims" in the exercise.

What was it that initially chafed those administrators?

The orchestrator of the drills never told them when the safety-themed craziness was coming down.

"People used to say, 'Well, it's a little inconvenient. We need to know exactly when the drill will be.' I used to come back and say, 'What do you think a drill is?' I mean, it's all about training, in unexpected situations."

And, he said, it's also about prevention, which is why he still reacts the way he does to the Imperial Foods fire. Most of those casualties,

he contends, wouldn't have happened if workers hadn't been locked inside.

For nearly 40 years, his professional universe has been pared down to two absolutes: Those things you can prevent, and those things you can't. Either way, he said, one needs a safety plan.

And that's how he got to be internationally known.

**'All we can do now is have a plan in place'**

Gun violence, and other kinds of violence carried out with the specific goal of wounding and killing as many people at once is nothing new in America.

Bursts of gunfire began crackling in public places with a regularity of dread in the 1980s. Della-Giustina watched with growing unease, because he thought he had a pretty good idea of what was coming.

How soon will it be, the safety professional and academic in him asked, before a gunman walks into a school and starts pulling the trigger?

He wasn't looking at crumbling schools in crime-riddled inner cities. He was thinking about the shiny, new "good" schools in the suburbs, where students have all the advantages and go to college after they graduate.

In 1988, 11 years before the deadly massacre at Columbine High, he authored the study, "Planning for School Emergencies," which offered responses to scenarios of shooting incidents with semi-automatic weapons that bordered on terrorist attacks.

He interviewed school principals, teachers and others while researching the study. He found that while schools collectively knew how to deal with floods, tornadoes, bleacher collapses and the like, they had, up to that point, never drawn a bead on guns.

Assault weapons wielded by disaffected students with fatalistic attitudes never entered their thinking, Della-Giustina said.

His plan called for emergency telephones in each classroom (those walkie-talkie-looking cell phones of 1988 weren't that practical or effective then), plus a host of other contingencies.

The measures took in everything from metal detectors to student mediators to prevent bullying that can lead to the revenge factor.

Della-Giustina also wanted uniformed police officers either physically in the

school or stationed close by.

After Columbine, safety people blew the dust off the plan that had been buried in their bookshelves for a decade.

Sept. 11 beget the Boston Marathon bombing and Columbine forged the bloody path to Newtown, Conn. Della-Giustina calls it "the way of the world," even if he doesn't like saying it out loud.

"The unfortunate thing is that this stuff isn't going away," he said. "Terrorism and gun violence are going to be with us for the rest of our days. All we can do now is have a safety plan in place to deal with it so you can help people after it happens."

**'I hope I'm going like that when I'm 84'**

Della-Giustina's work and research paid his induction in Safety and Health Professional Hall of Fame International, an honor he shares with such luminaries in the field as Dr. Robert Heimlich, inventor of the famed life-saving maneuver for people who are choking.

While he appreciates the company, he likes the legacy of his students who are now earning their own notoriety in the safety profession.

Alumni of "Dr. Dan," as his students know him, hold key safety posts everywhere from Arizona to the United Arab Emirates.

One of them, Zach LeMasters, 30, is already known nationally for his work as a safety engineer with Alliant Technologies, a defense contractor in Mineral County.

LeMasters still has lengthy telephone conversations with his mentor every few weeks, he said.

"Dr. Dan is funny and intense, and he's a little intimidating at first," LeMasters said. "Then you find out he's got this wealth of knowledge and that he's done everything in the field."

Including scaring the daylights out of whole classes of students by tossing a lit cigarette into a bucket partially filled with gasoline for a memorable lesson on the ratios of gas vapors and the explosive properties they may (or may not) contain at any given time.

Dr. Dan, LeMasters said, is a Mythbuster from way back.

"The liquid puts the fire out," LeMasters said, with a chuckle of his own.

"Gets your attention. I just hope I'm still going like that when I'm 84."

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## Utah man may leave family to colonize Mars

FARMINGTON, Utah — If men are from Mars, as the popular relationship book has suggested, Ken Sullivan just wants to go home.

Sullivan, a Farmington resident, is one of eight Utahns who recently got a bit closer to their ultimate dream of one day colonizing Mars. Sullivan is one of 1,058 people worldwide, chosen from a pool of more than 200,000 applicants, who were recently informed that they passed the initial screening process and are in the running to participate in the Mars One project ([www.mars-one.com](http://www.mars-one.com)), a nonprofit private venture to establish a human settlement on Mars.

These thousand-plus hopefuls will eventually be whittled down to a couple dozen folks who will train to be among the first four-member crew to leave for Mars in 2025.

Sullivan first heard about the project last August, when he saw a story on the Internet about the open application process for Mars One.

"I became enthralled with it," Sullivan said of the project. "I'd always had an interest in going into space, like most children, and this really

spurred that."

Born and raised in Utah, the 38-year-old Sullivan graduated from Woods Cross High School and then attended Dixie State College. He became interested in EMS training, and eventually moved to Salt Lake City to work for an ambulance company.

"But then I thought it would be more fun to fly an ambulance than to drive one," he said.

So Sullivan first be-

came a helicopter mechanic, and then began flying the machines. Today, he's the lead pilot for Care-Flight, an air ambulance service based out of Truth or Consequences, N.M. He commutes there from Utah, on a seven-days-on, seven-days-off schedule.

Sullivan applied for a spot on Mars One — along with a couple hundred thousand other Martian wannabes — and on Dec. 30 got the news that he'd made the first cut.

Sullivan has been doing a number of media interviews since he cleared this first hurdle toward Mars, and everyone is asking the same thing. How could a guy with a wife and four children — including a 6-month-old — even consider leaving them with no hope of return?

"There's always pros and cons," he told the *Standard-Examiner*. "And the most difficult thing will be leaving my family behind."

## Entrepreneur says to boost Calif. wages

LOS ANGELES — Democrats across the nation are eager to make increasing the minimum wage a defining campaign issue in 2014, but in California a proposal to boost the pay rate to \$12 an hour is coming from a different point on the political compass.

Ron Unz, a Silicon Valley multimillionaire and registered Republican who once ran for governor and, briefly, U.S. Senate, wants state voters to endorse the wage jump that he predicts would nourish the economy and lift low-paid workers from dependency on food stamps and other assistance bankrolled by taxpayers.

A push for bigger paychecks for workers at the lower rungs of the economic ladder is typically associated with Democrats — President Barack Obama is supporting a bill in Congress that would elevate the \$7.25 federal minimum to more than \$10 an hour.

But entrepreneur Unz, 52, is a former publisher of *The American Conservative* magazine with a history of against-the-grain political activism that includes pushing a 1998 ballot proposal that dismantled California's bilingual education system, an idea he later championed in Colorado

and other states.

Two decades ago, as a 32-year-old, the theoretical-physicist-turned-software-developer tried to unseat then-Gov. Pete Wilson, a fellow Republican. After a long break on the political sidelines, Unz's reappearance has startled members of both major parties, and his proposal — if it goes to voters in November — could unsettle races from governor to Congress.

"He is a wild card in the deck of California politics," said Bill Whalen, a research fellow at Stanford University's Hoover Institution and former Wilson speech writer.

Republican National Committee member Shawn Steel praised Unz for his 1998 initiative, which abolished most bilingual education programs for students who speak little, if any, English and replaced them with English-only instruction. But Steel predicted a jump in the minimum wage would eliminate jobs, penalizing young people who often hold them.

Unz "is an innovator, he's extremely bright and he's a lone wolf," Steel said.

To Unz, who's spoken out over the years on issues as varied as campaign finance to IQ and race, the proposal simply makes sense.

## N.J. town caught in scandal loves, hates that bridge

FORT LEE, N.J. — When Mayor Mark Sokolich's annual Christmas card showed up in mailboxes a few weeks ago, some residents took careful note of the photo selected for the front: The steely silhouette of this borough's treasured, and sometimes detested, George Washington Bridge — and a Revolutionary War cannon firing off a shot, as if to warn off unseen enemies who might try to threaten it.

"My opinion, just as a recipient of the card, I think the photo speaks for itself," said Tom Meyers, a fourth-generation resident, town cultural officer and student of Fort Lee's history, chuckling at the thought.

Until a political scandal centering on New Jersey Gov. Chris Christie enveloped this town of 37,000, many people knew little more about Fort Lee than do the thousands of drivers whose cars speed — or, too often, crawl — across its landmark bridge each day. The town was just the blur of glass high-rises and brick Cape Cods on the other side of the guardrail.

But to people who live in this New York City bedroom community defined by both a feisty pride and frustration over the mixed blessings of its chokepoint locale, the scandal is the reminder they did not need of how the bridge dictates the rhythm of everyday life — and the lack of recog-

nitization the town gets for the challenges that poses.

"We endure combat here every single day dealing with that bridge traffic," Sokolich said Thursday, when he stepped before television cameras to respond to allegations that Christie's top aides orchestrated a plan to clog the borough streets with traffic as a form of political payback. "So ... to deal with it from a man-made standpoint, yes, it's very frustrating. It is."

To those who know Fort Lee, rather than merely pass through it, the borough boasts a distinct identity, shaped by location and history. The borough distinguished itself first as the site of a Revolutionary War

encampment used to stage a crucial, but unsuccessful attempt by George Washington's forces to turn back the British. A century ago, Fort Lee briefly reclaimed fame as the nation's pre-Hollywood capital of movie-making, where celluloid dramas shot atop the rocks of the Palisades gave birth to the term "cliffhangers." And it has long defied stereotypes of suburban sameness as a settling place for immigrant up-and-comers, with aging Italian and Jewish populations now giving way to Koreans and other Asians.

But the bridge to Manhattan is what puts the "gateway to New Jersey" on the map every waking day, and defines its modern-day consciousness.

The bridge's outline stretches across the insignia of both Fort Lee's fire department and its sister ambulance corps, as well as the police department's Web page. Each of the 20 cabs at Babe's Taxi, which has operated from the foot of the bridge since 1947, crosses the bridge at least 10 times a day, ferrying residents to and from New York's hospitals, nightclubs and museums.

People know here to set the clocks early to leave time to get their kids to school in the morning because of rush-hour New York-bound traffic. On their way to stop for coffee at Washington Bridge Plaza, they pass the Bridge Hand Car Wash and the

just-opened G.W. Grill, where a DJ sets up on Fridays and Saturdays in front of a 10-foot air-brushed mural of the bridge twinkling at night.

In the shadow of the world's busiest river crossing, owner Don Sposa stood at the window of the bridge-themed restaurant Thursday, marveling at the majesty and frustrations of the span and now, the unseemly notoriety it has delivered to this often overlooked town.

"We need it. I guess we have to love it," he said of the bridge. "We have no choice."

When the marvel of engineering over the Hudson River opened in 1931, it was touted for its promise, soon colored by political reality.

## Mars rover photographs featured at Smithsonian

WASHINGTON — Ten years after NASA landed two rovers on Mars for a 90-day mission, one is still exploring, and the project has generated hundreds of thousands of images from the planet's surface.

Now the Smithsonian's National Air and Space Museum is presenting more than 50 of the best photographs from the two rovers, known as Spirit and Opportunity, in an art exhibit curated by the scientists who have led the ongoing mission.

"Spirit and Opportunity: 10 Years Roving Across Mars" opens Thursday and includes many large-scale photographs of craters, hills, dunes, dust clouds, meteorites, rock formations and the Martian sunset. The Smithsonian's first exhibit of art from the Martian rovers marks the 10th anniversary of the ongoing mission.

John Grant, a planetary geologist at the museum who is part of the rover mission team, organized the exhibit, in part as a travel log with images on one side from Spirit and images from

Opportunity on the other. The rovers landed in January 2004 on opposite sides of Mars and began exploring volcanic deposits and plains, as well as meteorites and impact craters, so the exhibit also focuses on the science, Grant said.

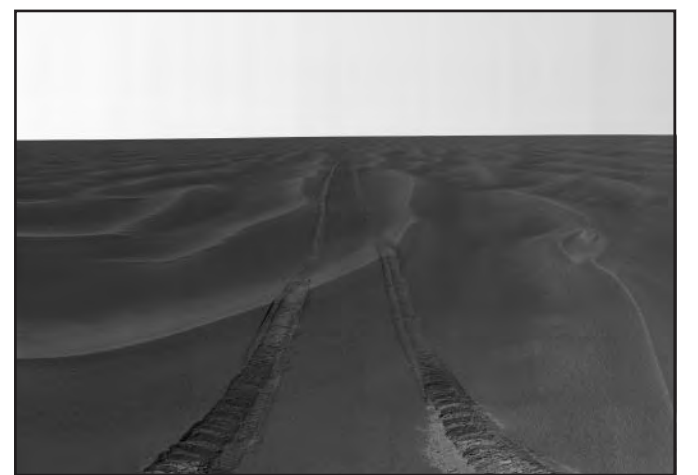
"Every one of the images you see here tells a story of discovery that goes along with the story of beauty on Mars," Grant said.

It's a look at an alien planet through the rovers' eyes, he said.

Uncovering signs of the past presence of water and a

more habitable environment are among the rovers' most important discoveries. Some were made by accident.

After about 800 days, one of Spirit's front wheels stalled and stopped functioning. So the engineering team decided to continue driving it in reverse, dragging the broken wheel across the Martian surface. That dragging dug a trench behind the rover that soon uncovered a new material as white as snow. It turned out to be silica material that would normally be found in habitable environments.

Charles M. Vest, beloved husband, father and grandfather; passed away peacefully at his home in Arlington, VA, on Dec. 12, 2013, with his family by his side.

His death, at the age of 72, followed a courageous battle with cancer.

Chuck was born Sept. 9, 1941, in Morgantown. Throughout his life, Chuck credited much of his professional success to the simple values and emphasis on family that he learned as a boy growing up in Morgantown.

He received a degree in mechanical engineering from WVU. While at the university, he met Rebecca McCue on a blind date, who would go on to be his beloved wife of 50 years.

After graduating in 1963, Chuck and Becky made their way to the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, where they lived, worked and raised their family for 27 years. After earning his Ph.D. from the university in 1967, Chuck joined the Michigan faculty where he rose through the academic ranks, eventually being named Dean of the College of Engineering in 1986 and Provost and Vice President for academic affairs in 1989.

In 1990, Chuck was elected the 15th president of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology in Cambridge, Mass., where he served with great distinction for nearly 14 years. Serving from 1990 to 2004, he led the Massachusetts Institute of Technology through sweeping changes.

The student population was more diverse when he left and the endowment had more than tripled. MIT had established centers for expanded research into areas such as biological engineering, engineering systems, new media, and brain and cognitive sciences. Chuck rose to be an important national and international figure in higher education, helping to influence policy and to set the national agenda for science and technology at the very highest levels of government.

During his MIT presidency, he also instructed a committee to examine how the Internet could foster the school's mission. That led MIT to establish OpenCourseWare, which essentially placed all course materials and curriculum online, free of charge. That initiative "would not have been possible without his singular vision, courage, and leadership," said Dick K. P. Yue, the professor who led the committee.

Personally and professionally, Chuck Vest set an exceptional standard of intellectual clarity, moral courage, and generosity of spirit," said L. Rafael Reif, MIT's president.

"Chuck Vest was, above all, an extraordinary human being: Not only was he perhaps the most respected figure in higher education, he was a man of extraordinary decency, integrity,

and grace," said Lawrence S. Bacow, who was chancellor at MIT under Dr. Vest before serving as president of Tufts University.

After stepping down from his position at MIT, Chuck and Becky moved to the Washington, DC, area where, in 2007, Chuck assumed the presidency of the National Academy of Engineering. He completed his tenure at the National Academy in 2013.

Despite his distinguished professional career, Chuck's greatest love and accomplishment was his family. In the later part of his life, his most cherished time was spent at his home on Lake Winnepesaukee, NH, where he enjoyed paddling in his kayak, pursuing his passion as a voracious reader and, most importantly, spending time with his wife, children and grandchildren. Travel and long walks with Becky were also amongst his favorite pastimes.

He is survived by his wife, Becky, of Arlington, VA; daughter and son-in-law, Kemper Vest Gay and John Gay of Arlington, VA; son and daughter-in-law, John and Christina Vest of Boston; and grandchildren, Mary and Robert Gay, and Ameri and Charles Vest. He will be forever loved and held closely in our hearts.

**Sharon, Israel's bulldozer in politics, dies**

JERUSALEM — It was vintage Ariel Sharon: His hefty body bobbing behind a wall of security men, the ex-general led a march onto a Jerusalem holy site, staking a bold claim to a shrine that has been in contention from the dawn of the Arab-Israeli conflict.

What followed was a Palestinian uprising that put Mideast peace efforts into deep-freeze.

Five years later, Sharon, who died Saturday at 85, was again barreling headlong into controversy, bulldozing ahead with his plan to pull Israel out of the Gaza Strip and uproot all 8,500 Jewish settlers living there without regard to threats to his life from Jewish extremists.

His allies said the move was a revolutionary step in peacemaking; his detractors said it was a tactical sacrifice to strengthen Israel's hold on much of the West Bank. Either way, the withdrawal and the barrier he was building between Israel and the West Bank permanently changed the face of the conflict and marked the final legacy of a man who shaped Israel as much as any other leader. He was a farmer-turned-soldier, a soldier-turned-politician, a politician-turned-statesman — a hard-charging Is-

raeli who built Jewish settlements on war-won land, but didn't shy away from destroying them when he deemed them no longer useful.

Sharon died eight years after a debilitating stroke put him into a coma. His body was to lie in state at the parliament today before he is laid to rest at his ranch in southern Israel on Monday, Israeli media reported.

Vice President Joe Biden will lead the U.S. delegation. His death was greeted with the same strong feelings he evoked in life. Israelis called him a war hero. His enemies called him a war criminal.

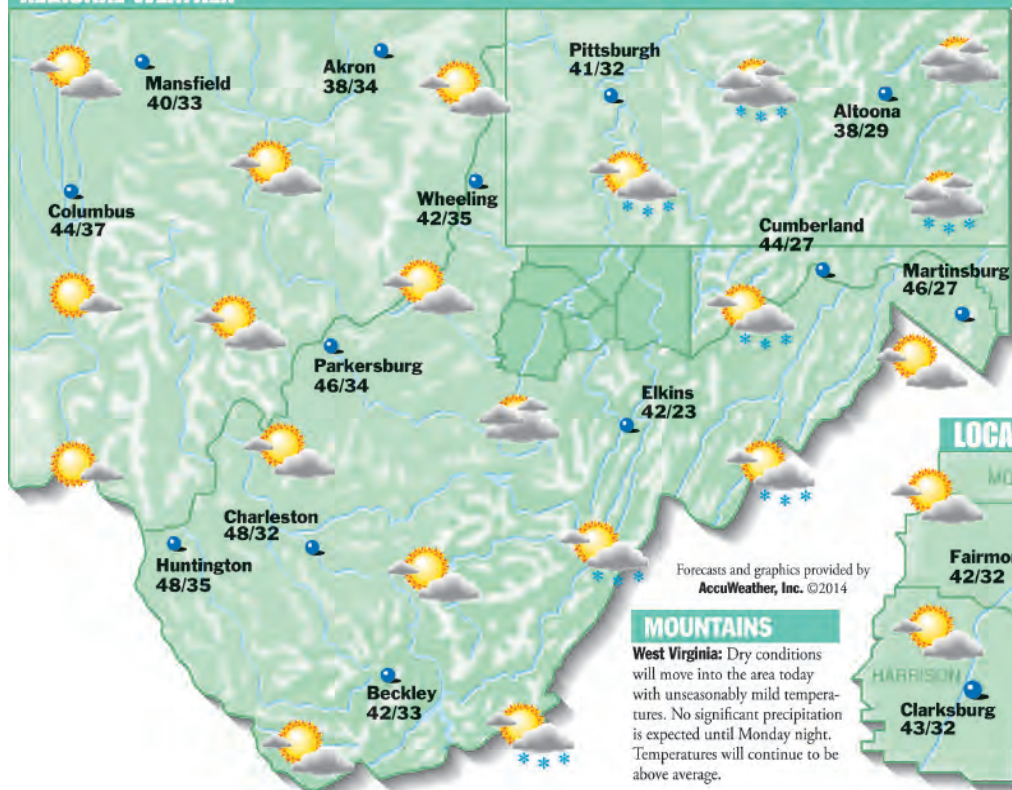

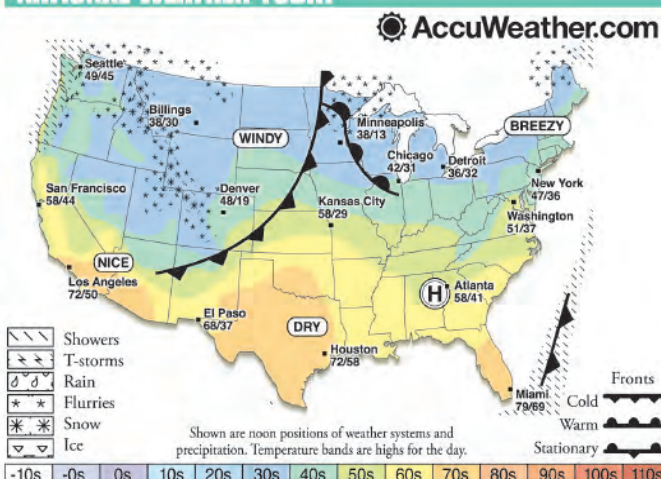

## Neighbors lend a hand during crisis

**WE TAKE** care of our neighbors. That's one of the great things about West Virginians.

We look out for one another. It's what we do.

We heard about it — and lived it — after the derecho and Superstorm Sandy.

When the going got tough, Mountaineers stepped up to help, not only friends and family, but complete strangers.

So imagine how much it pained me to see photos coming out of Charleston this week of people packing their cars with bottled water while others had none, or to hear that people are fighting over water?

That's what the nation saw. But that's not who we are, and we know it even if the rest of America may not have photographic evidence at their fingertips.

The situation in a nine-county area of the state is dire. The water that is coming out of taps is only good for flushing toilets. Water is an essential, not a luxury. The company responsible, Freedom Industries, held a press conference Friday that must have embarrassed corporate talking heads from coast to coast.

Even as I write this, people are finding out that what they once took for granted — clean water at their fingertips — is gone and they have no idea when it will return.

When I visited Africa in November, I encountered a similar situation. There was water on tap, but those of us who weren't accustomed to it were cautioned not to drink it. We could (fortunately) shower with it, since there was no risk to our skin, but we were told to keep our mouths closed in the shower.

It was a challenge to remember not to dip a toothbrush in the running water, or to wash our hands with it, or to grab a glass at the first sign of thirst.

I know people in those nine counties are learning those lessons now.

I keep thinking about all the dogs I've lived with over the years who made a habit of drinking from toilet bowls. I pray people are remembering to close off those avenues to their pets.

This is a harsh test for the people of those counties and I've been tracking their resilience on Facebook and Twitter.

Two friends have come up with a dry formula to clean their hair since there was a quick sell-out of spray products in the area. They posted the recipe — which includes dry oats, baking soda and baking powder (corn starch is also an option) — to share with friends.

Numerous churches and civic organizations across the state mobilized water drives and collected paper plates and cups to take to the affected areas.

I can't tell you how many of my Facebook friends (I'm proud of you all) offered showers to friends and strangers in those nine counties. All they need to do is drive to Fairmont, Morgantown, Grafton and other areas to get them. Those people have offered to deliver water, food and coffee to friends without.

As soon as the rain started, people began collecting rainwater to boil to wash dishes and such like. No sense wasting what (we hope) is clean water.

Sharing resources and information — that's what counts, my friends. That's how you help those in harm's way. That's how West Virginians do. Those images of water hoarders ... they're not what we're about. We're about remembering how fortunate we are and offering what we have to those who need it, about sharing our expertise and about reaching out instead of shutting down.

# Suit filed over debit card

## Lawyer: Bank did not refund stolen money

A Morgantown lawyer is suing Huntington Bank because of money stolen from his mother.

David Grunau seeks punitive damages of \$50 million. Grunau, a Morgantown lawyer,

is also suing a West Virginia resident who is accused of stealing a debit card from his family.

He is suing Huntington Bank for failing to cancel the compromised card and compensate lost funds, according to the lawsuit which alleges "egregious acts of fraud and other misconduct."

According to the lawsuit, Grunau opened a checking account with Huntington Bank "initially containing five or six thousand dollars" to help his mother with incidental and daily living expenses. Grunau's mother was the only authorized user of the card.

On Nov. 18, 2010, Grunau's brother died, and sometime shortly after, someone "purporting to offer comfort and solace rifled through the plaintiff's mother's purse, located the ATM card and stole it," according to the lawsuit. Grunau said this happened while he tried to revive his brother before medical personnel arrived.

David Grunau reported the theft to Huntington Bank. He was told the missing ATM card would be cancelled and a new one issued. The lawsuit says the bank failed to cancel the original card and instead sent a duplicate ATM

card bearing the same account number. During the next 30 days, the card was used to empty and overdraw the account.

West Virginia State Police arrested Dee Brannon for stealing the money. Brannon admitted to stealing the money, according to the lawsuit.

Grunau spoke to the Huntington Bank fraud agent, who was described in the lawsuit as "nasty, apathetic, rude, unprofessional and insulting." The fraud agent denied the ATM card

## Oakview/Poplar Woods flooding fix in progress

### Homeowners to make decision on annexation

Progress continues on a solution to the Oakview/Poplar Woods neighborhood sewer and flooding problems. A plan is in the works, and homeowners could be weighing in soon on a key decision: Possible annexation.

Morgantown Utility Board (MUB) General Manager Tim Ball explained the plan in a series of email exchanges.

The flooding in this section of Suncrest stems from an unnamed creek that runs in a valley between Poplar Woods Drive and the Windsor Estates development. The creek ends immediately behind the Forest Drive home of Richard Brooks and Susan Morgan, where it con-

nects with a 24-inch stormwater culvert that runs about 2,000 feet under several properties, then along Morgan Drive and into Burroughs Run.

It affects five subdivisions: Oakview, Poplar Woods, Windsor Estates, Greenbrier Village and Morningside — 223 homes in all.

As previously reported, the problem is threefold. One is the once-buried, now exposed sewer lines in the creek bed keep breaking. The second is the erosion that exposed the lines — from poorly controlled stormwater runoff caused by the upstream development. The third is the flooding: The 24-inch pipe can't handle the runoff. The water backs up and runs across the road and into homes.

Because the stormwater

line is outside MUB's jurisdiction, the Monongalia County Commission agreed to foot the bill for that portion of the work. Commission President Eldon Callen previously expressed the commission's support for the project.

Ball said the sanitary sewer replacement and stream restoration will cost MUB about \$270,000. "The work is budgeted and preparations are well under way." The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers recently visited the site and clarified its jurisdiction in the matter.

Ball said the stream restoration will involve rip rap on the banks, but the Corps may ask for something else on the stream floor. Rip rap is rock or other material used to protect shorelines from erosion.

## Construction crew saves Mon \$250K

Team to work on courthouse job

The Monongalia County construction crew did a little bit of everything in 2013.

The five-man crew tackled a variety of projects from turning a single space into two Magistrate Court offices, running electric, building a training "shoot house" for the sheriff's department and doing remodeling work in many of the county's parks.

Most taxpayers would likely agree, however, that the crew's most impressive contribution came in the work it did to build the county's bank account.

During last week's Monongalia County Commission meeting, facilities director Bobby Doyle presented the commission with a project-by-project breakdown of the crew's year.

Doyle said he spoke to a few different contractors and came up with a conservative rate to use for comparison. He also said that benefits were not factored in on either side.

All told, the county's crew completed 23 jobs at a cost of \$194,582. Those same jobs bid out to contractors would have likely cost about \$446,158, Doyle said, saving the county more than \$250,000 in 2013.

"A quarter-million dollars is a lot of tax dollars saved," Commission president Bill Bartolo said, asking Doyle to pass along his appreciation.

Of course, saving money is what the crew was built to do.

In 2009, when bids for a new Camp Muffy dining hall put the project at about \$1.7 million, the county decided to rethink its strategy.

"[Commissioner] Aasel [Kennedy] came to me and asked if we could do that dining hall. I told him we could, but we were going to need some more manpower," Doyle said.

The commission decided to put together a county crew to tackle the job, and while it did take some time to get rolling, the dining hall cost the county about \$580,700.

"Once they saw the work our guys were doing they realized we could do the job right and save the county money," Doyle said, explaining that once the dining hall was complete, the crew's schedule

## Pedestrian-vehicle accidents still under investigation, most awaiting analysis

The Morgantown Police Department continues to investigate multiple pedestrian-vehicle incidents.

According to a police press release, officers responded to a reported traffic crash on the 400 block of High Street, shortly before 3 a.m. Thursday, near the Casa D'Amici pizzeria. When police arrived, they found the victim lying on the street still conscious and communicating with officers.

The woman was later identified as Brittany Shalla. According to the release, Shalla was going east on High Street and was struck by a vehicle, described as a dark colored sedan. She was hit by the front bumper of the vehicle and she rolled up onto the front of the car, the release stated. The

driver of the vehicle initially stopped but fled the scene after Shalla rolled off the front of the car.

She was later taken to Ruby Memorial Hospital for treatment. According to the Morgantown Police Department, Shalla has since been released from the hospital.

Police Chief Ed Preston said there were "numerous witnesses" to the incident and the investigation continues. He also added that two prior cases of pedestrian fatalities are still being investigated.

On Sept. 15, WVU student Joseph Dzuris was killed on Patteson Drive by a hit-and-run shortly before 5 a.m., *The Dominion Post* previously reported. Preston said his department is still awaiting forensic analysis of the evidence from the West Virginia State Police Crime Lab in

Charleston.

"There were different dates as evidence was collected, but we began sending it within days after the incident occurred," Preston said. He also said the Morgantown Police pulled video surveillance footage from every feeder going onto the stretch of Patteson Drive to identify the vehicle. "At this point, we make no predictions," he said.

According to a previous police press release in August, Robert McClain was crossing South High Street and failed to see a 2008 Nissan Altima driven by Levi Alexander Sooy and was hit. McClain died as a result of the accident. Sooy later submitted blood samples for forensic testing.

Preston said the county prosecutor's office is still awaiting the results of toxicology tests.

## N.J. teacher to celebrate 100th birthday

**NORTH PLAINFIELD, N.J.** — A woman believed to be America's oldest working teacher is marking her 100th birthday this week.

Students, teachers and family members of Agnes Zhelesnik gave her a birthday celebration Friday at The Sundance School in North Plainfield.

Zhelesnik, who is known to her students as "Granny," works 35 hours a week teaching Home Economics, conducting after-school cooking and sewing lessons, and making costumes for school plays. She started working at the school at the age of 81.

Students in a packed

school gymnasium sang "Happy Birthday" and presented her with a cake Friday before putting on a school performance wearing costumes that Zhelesnik had helped sew.

Born Jan. 12, 1914, in Thomas, W.Va., to Lithuanian immigrants, Zhelesnik was one of five children. Her father worked in the mines until the family moved to a small farming town in Illinois before relocating to Bayonne, N.J., when Zhelesnik was in the 3rd grade. She had to drop out of school during the Depression to work in a can factory, and her \$16 per week salary sustained her family for a time.

She was married for

61 years before her husband passed away in 1999. The couple had three children and four grandchildren, and Zhelesnik has four great-grandchildren, one of whom joined her, with one of her daughters and granddaughters, at the school celebration Friday.

"She is just the happiest person, and stress free, and enjoys life, that's really it — simple," said her granddaughter, Nina Lord.

Zhelesnik, seated in a velvet throne, received hugs and gifts from her students, as she reflected on the secret to her longevity.

"As long as you're healthy and you're active, keep busy," she said. "To me, you have to keep busy."

"Rip rap is OK for the banks, but they are asking us to look at something more hospitable to the aquatic environment on the stream floor," he wrote. "Our concern is that such an approach remains susceptible to erosion. We need to find an acceptable approach that accomplishes both goals. Those discussions continue, and may take weeks."

For the stormwater pro-

ject, the county decided it wants a 48-inch pipe to handle current and future flows.

The plan, Ball said, is to leave the existing pipe in place to collect and transport the local flows. The proposed 48-inch culvert will be used exclusively to convey the stream from where it meets the pipe to Burroughs Run.

The project is estimated at \$450,000.

MUB has estimated, worst case, an additional \$135,960 for street restora-

tion beyond the immediate construction zone. MUB has offered to share half the cost, putting the county's total project cost at \$517,980.

"If the streets do not suffer degradation from the construction traffic, then they will be left as is, and these estimated paving costs will not be incurred or charged," Ball wrote.

MUB is working on permits, and staff prepared a draft inter-governmental agreement between MUB and the county, which will

be presented to the MUB Board on Tuesday. The county also has a copy to review.

"Once the County completes its review of the agreement, they may identify and request changes requiring re-submission to the MUB Board," Ball wrote.

One last piece of the puzzle falls to the homeowners — particularly the Oakview Homeowners Association. That piece is ongoing stormwater management, requiring either annexation into the city so it becomes MUB's responsibility, or

creation of a stormwater Public Service District (PSD).

MUB has since learned that, for complicated legal reasons, the area does not qualify for the county to create a Municipal Separate Storm Sewer System (MS4) PSD.

Ball said this doesn't hamper completion of the project, but leaves the homeowners still to decide, for stormwater management, whether they want to seek annexation or leave further stormwater management as a fu-

ture goal.

If the latter, he said, homeowners may wish to convey the finished stormwater facilities to a private entity such as a duly formed not-for-profit homeowners association; or to the county commission.

Zach Mendelson, president of the Oakview Homeowners Association, said they have been pondering the issue for months. A meeting is planned in the near future to discuss the options.

began filling up.

Today the crew is made up of a master electrician, two apprentice electricians and two certified carpenters.

"This is a really a great crew. With these guys, the

county can do anything we have the manpower to do," Doyle said. "I would put these guys up against anybody."

Commissioner Eldon Callen said the combination of Doyle and the construction crew is huge asset for the county.

"Please pass our thanks on to them. What has come about since we first talked about putting together an organization that actually could save a lot of tax dollars has come to fruition," Callen said. "You're saving dollars each and every day and I want to give [Doyle] my personal thanks as well for your leadership of that department."

Commissioner Tom Bloom picked up where Callen left off.

"I think this is great," Bloom said. "What you all are doing, the whole county is benefiting from it."

Going forward, Doyle said, the county construction crew looks to play a large role in the reorganization of the county's facilities.

"Once the new justice center is built, it will be the county crew that remodels the courthouse," Doyle said. "That's the plan right now."

was reported stolen, declared there would be no reimbursement from the bank and accused the plaintiff of fraud, the suit read.

The plaintiff then spoke with Katie Garrison, the manager of the bank's Morgantown branch. Garrison confirmed Grunau had reported the original card stolen and that it was never cancelled. According to the lawsuit, the bank still hasn't reimbursed Grunau.

Grunau seeks compensatory damages for the

stolen funds, compensation for mental and emotional anguish and attorney's fees. He also seeks damages in the amount of \$50 million stating the banks poor conduct after his brother's death as the reason.

"You should have heard the conversation I had with the fraud agent. She mocked my brother's death," Grunau said. "There's only one way to wake up a big corporation like that: A big settlement."

Media representative William Eiler said, "Huntington Bank will vigorously defend against the allegations in the lawsuit."

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## New plans for Alaska gas pipeline unveiled

JUNEAU, Alaska — Gov. Sean Parnell on Friday announced a new way forward on a long-hoped-for natural gas pipeline that includes scrapping the terms of a 2007 law he said no longer works well for the situation.

In a major policy speech in Anchorage, Parnell said the state and Canadian pipeline builder TransCanada Corp. have agreed to terminate their involvement under the Alaska Gasline Inducement Act. He made clear, however, that TransCanada would remain a partner in the project, just under new terms.

Parnell said he would seek legislative approval for the state to participate in a new commercial agreement with TransCanada; the North Slope's three major players, Exxon Mobil Corp., BP PLC and ConocoPhillips; and the Alaska Gasline Development Corp. He said he expected a set of terms to be signed soon.

Natural Resources Commissioner Joe Balash called the commercial agreement a "broad roadmap" and state-

ment of intent. He said in an interview that legislation would have to be passed to accomplish what is being contemplated and the state plans to enter a separate, more narrowly defined agreement with TransCanada for pipeline services.

The terms of the inducement act will remain in force for the time being, though the parties envision transitioning into the new arrangement once enabling legislation is passed, Balash said.

"Nobody's letting go of the rope just yet," he said, but he noted the state and TransCanada had "pre-agreed" to make the transition. A TransCanada spokesman said the company would continue working to advance the pipeline project.

Parnell said he would propose legislation that would allow the state to enter into shipping agreements to move and sell gas. The legislation also would ask lawmakers to switch to a flat gross tax and allow for certain leases to pay production taxes with gas. Parnell previously said he would not

propose gas tax legislation unless he saw demonstrable progress on the line.

"The bottom line: We will have an investment-quality project when that's complete," he said Friday.

Balash said he thinks the Legislature can act on the proposal this session — which is what the commercial agreement contemplates — "in large part because what we're asking the Legislature to do essentially is set some of the specific terms that would then go into a contract to be negotiated over the next 18 months or so and would then come back to the Legislature for approval."

"It's not like we're asking the Legislature to make the big decisions this year, but we're asking them to make some pretty important ones," Balash said. The next set of agreements would set out specific equity terms, he said.

Parnell said having the state participate in a line is a way to protect the state's interests, and as a partner, Alaskans stand to gain more.

## Violation issued after W.Va. gas well explosion

MIDDLEBOURNE — State environmental regulators have issued a pollution violation notice to an oil and gas drilling company after a tank explosion at a Tyler County well site injured one worker.

The Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) said Jan. 8 that the tank ruptured on Jan. 2 at Jay-Bee Oil & Gas' Lisby gas well pad. Fluids leaked from the tank onto grounds surrounding the well pad.

The DEP's Office of Oil and Gas issued the violation notice to the company Jan. 7, along with a cease and desist order to stop well operations at the site.

The notice said there is a danger the fluids that leaked could contaminate a fresh water supply. The DEP did not say what kind of fluid was in the tank.

Supervisors at Jay-Bee's office in Cairo didn't immediately return a telephone message Wednesday.

Jay-Bee must abate the pollution and submit a report to the state by Tuesday. In the report, the company must demonstrate its ability to safely resume operations and its understanding of what caused the rupture. The report also must include prevention measures to avoid similar problems.

The company also faces a Tuesday deadline to submit proposals for soil and surface water sampling and a remediation plan. The company also is required to submit to the state a best management practices plan for flow-back tank systems at all of its operations in West Virginia.

## N.Y. energy plan calls for clean technology

ALBANY, N.Y. — New York's newly released energy plan calls for increased use of renewable energy and clean technology and anticipates reduced utility bills and a more flexible distribution grid, but takes no position on hydraulic fracturing for natural gas in the fertile Marcellus shale.

While the proposal of the State Energy Planning Board calls for expanding the use of natural gas, instead of oil, for heating and power generation to reduce emissions of climate-changing carbon dioxide, it also notes that state officials are reviewing health and environmental concerns regarding fracking.

The shale formation extends from southern New York to West Virginia and has made abundant, low-cost natural gas available to New York through pipelines from gas fields in Pennsylvania. But New York has had a moratorium on fracking since the state launched an environmental review in 2008.

## Sierra Club case ends in settlement

COLUMBUS, Ohio — An environmental group's public records case against state regulators has ended

in a settlement agreement, with Ohio turning over documents related to the alleged illegal dumping of oil and gas drilling wastewater in northeast Ohio and paying a fine.

The Ohio Supreme Court on Jan. 7 dismissed the Sierra Club's case against the state Department of Natural Resources in the wake of the deal. The department paid \$2,500 in attorneys' fees and penalties and produced the records the Sierra Club's Ohio chapter was seeking related to the department's investigation of D&L Energy and Hardrock Excavating LLC in Youngstown.

The Natural Resources Department revoked the companies' permits in February amid a federal investigation into the dumping of up to 40,000 gallons of wastewater from hydraulic fracturing into a storm sewer that drains into the Mahoning River.

The Sierra Club alleged in a lawsuit filed in September 2013 that the state failed to produce public records it had requested six months earlier. The group's attorney, Richard Sahli, said Jan. 7 that the club received the documents not long after the legal action was taken; they contained few new details.

A spokeswoman for the Natural Resources Department declined to comment.

## Court upholds approval of BP oil spill settlement

NEW ORLEANS — Over BP's objections, a federal appeals court on Friday upheld a judge's approval of the company's multibillion-dollar settlement with lawyers for businesses and residents who claim the massive 2010 oil spill in the Gulf of Mexico cost them money.

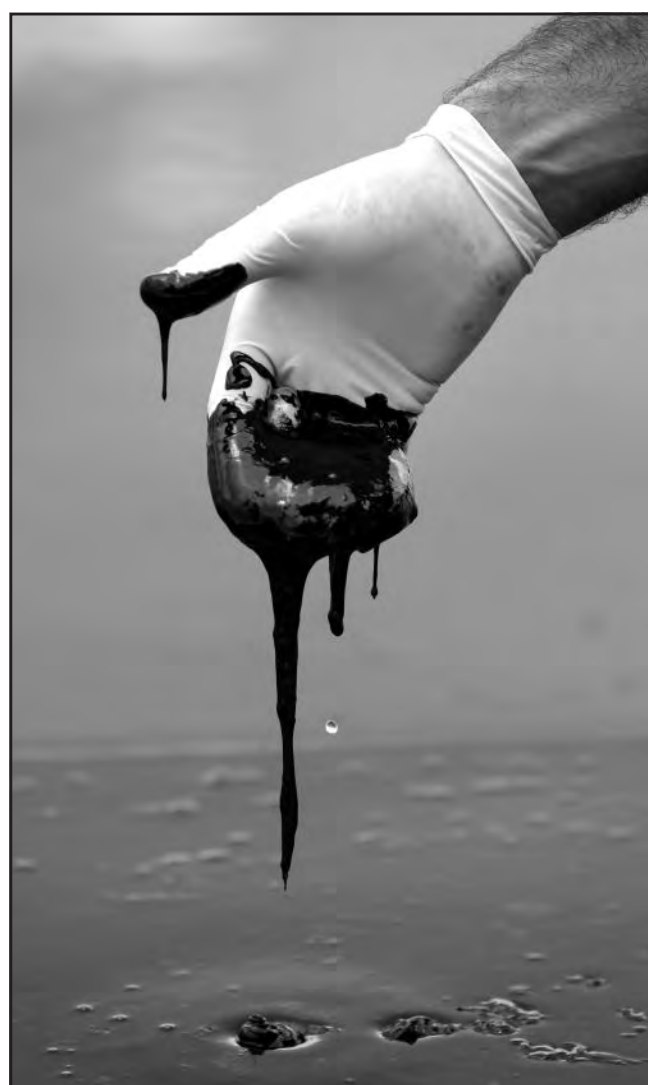
BP has argued that U.S. District Judge Carl Barbier and court-appointed claims administrator Patrick Juneau have misinterpreted settlement terms in ways that would force the London-based oil giant to pay for billions of dollars in inflated or bogus claims by businesses.

During a hearing in November before a three-judge panel of the 5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals, a BP lawyer argued that Barbier's December 2012 approval of the deal shouldn't stand unless the company ultimately prevails in its ongoing dispute over business payments.

But the divided panel ruled Friday that Barbier did not err by failing to determine more than a year ago whether the class of eligible claimants included individuals who haven't actually suffered any injury related to the spill.

Affirming Barbier's initial ruling in 2012, the court said in its 48-page majority opinion that it can't agree with arguments raised by BP and others who separately objected to the settlement.

"No case cited by BP or the Objectors suggests that a district court must also safeguard the interests of the defendant, which in most settlements can protect its own interests at the negotiating

table," the ruling says.

The majority rejected BP's request for the panel to "find an intraclass conflict of interest because the claimants allegedly include persons and entities that have suffered no injury."

"In support of this allegation, BP presents us with a series of economists' declarations that had not been provided to the district court when the class was certified," the ruling says.

One of the three appellate judges, Emilio M. Garza, disagreed with the majority in a 14-page dissent. Garza said the "attempted global settlement fails in a narrow, but significant, regard" and should be vacated so it can be fixed.

Plaintiffs' lawyers have argued that BP simply undervalued the settlement and underestimated how many claimants would be eligible for payments.

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# Health care push for those in Calif. illegally

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — A California lawmaker wants to use a state version of the Affordable Care Act to provide health care access to immigrants who are in the state illegally.

Sen. Ricardo Lara, D-Bell Gardens, said if the goal of the

federal health care law is to provide coverage to the uninsured, then immigration status should be irrelevant.

Lara, the head of the Legislature's Latino caucus, plans to introduce legislation that would allow people who are not legal residents to get coverage, the *Los Angeles Times* reported Friday.

"Immigration status shouldn't bar individuals from health coverage, especially since their taxes contribute to the growth of

our economy," he said.

There's a big roadblock, however: Federal law bars those in the country illegally from obtaining coverage through Covered California, the state health insurance exchange.

Lara said he's looking for other options, including expanding Medi-Cal, the state's health program for the poor, or creating a separate program within or outside of Covered California that might provide sub-

sidies from the state but not the federal government.

The senator is also considering modeling his plan on local programs like Healthy Way LA Unmatched, which pays for care for Los Angeles residents who aren't covered by Medi-Cal, including those who don't qualify because of immigration status.

*The Times* said California has for decades covered legal immigrants not eligible for the federal Medicaid program, such as those who have

been in the country less than five years. The state pays all of their Medi-Cal costs instead of splitting the cost with the federal government as it does for most Medi-Cal patients.

"The same logic could apply to other populations" such as noncitizens, said Anthony Wright, executive director of Health Access, an advocacy group working with Lara to fashion a bill. "There is precedent for California to be a leader. There is precedent for California to piggy-

back on federal programs but take an extra step to expand to additional folks."

Lara's plan was criticized by some Republican lawmakers, including Assemblyman Tim Donnelly of Twin Peaks, who's running for governor.

"California cannot afford to create another incentive to attract people to come to our state illegally in pursuit of taxpayer-subsidized benefits," Donnelly told the *Times*.

### Some hospitals restrict visitors due to the flu

MARQUETTE, Mich. — Some Michigan hospitals are restricting visitors due to a rise in influenza cases.

Marquette General Hospital has implemented such restrictions until further notice. The medical center said it's doing so as a precaution to protect patients and staff from the spread of the flu.

*The Mining Journal* said that at Marquette General Hospital, only essential family visitors were permitted to visit patient rooms, children under the age of 14 were not allowed into the hospital unless for a medical appointment or an emergency room visit and visitors in the Family Birthing Center were limited to parents and grandparents.

In Kalamazoo, Borgess Medical Center on Friday also began restricting who can visit patients.

According to the *Kalamazoo Gazette*, Borgess visitors must be 12 or older unless they're a patient's sibling.

### Free vaccinations to be offered in R.I.

PROVIDENCE, R.I. — Rhode Island Health Director Michael Fine is reminding residents it's not too late to get vaccinated against influenza and said additional free immunization clinics are being held in the coming weeks.

Clinics are being held during the week in Portsmouth, Warwick, Warren, Scituate, Bristol, Tiverton, Jamestown, West Warwick, Cumberland, South Kingstown and Burrillville.

Health officials said flu is considered widespread in the state now and flu activity is expected to pick up. The virus has caused more than a dozen hospitalizations in Rhode Island this season.

Health care workers who are not vaccinated will be required to wear masks when in contact with patients because flu is widespread.

### S.C. offers to help smokers quit

COLUMBIA, S.C. — State health officials are offering an option to help uninsured South Carolina smokers quit.

The Department of Health and Environmen-

tal Control (DHEC) said that it is making free nicotine replacement therapy available to smokers who don't have health insurance through the agency's tobacco quit line at 1-800-784-8669.

All South Carolinians who call the quit line are guaranteed at least one free session with a trained quit coach and a referral to local resources. Free nicotine replacement therapy like gum, lozenges or patches is available for callers without health insurance.

### Preschool program seeks more funds

LAWRENCE, Kan. — A northeast Kansas program that teaches hundreds of preschoolers and child care providers each year about growing and eating healthy food is facing a sustainability problem.

Healthy Sprouts, a three-year-old farm-to-preschool program run by the Douglas County Child Development Association, has been operating on \$50,000 to \$75,000 a year in grants from several health foundations. But the organization put out the word in November that the grants were expiring in 2014, putting its future in doubt.

## Utah officials working through 24,000 glitched healthcare.gov applications

SALT LAKE CITY — After months of delays, Utah officials are finally beginning to grind through about 24,000 Medicaid applications that have been hung up by the federal government's online insurance marketplace.

Among other glitches, the website has had problems interfacing with Utah's system, delaying the applications of those who could be eligible for coverage under a state-federal program for low-income people.

The online marketplace, a hallmark of President Barack Obama's health care law, has been hamstrung by technical problems since its October launch. If someone shopping for coverage on the federal website appeared to be eligible for Medicaid, their application was supposed to be seamlessly transferred to Utah offices.

But the process has been gummed up for months, leaving thousands of applicants stuck in the pipeline and un-

able to get coverage by Jan. 1. Officials have finally developed a workaround, but it's a temporary, time-consuming process.

Staff at Utah's Department of Workforce Services, which administers Medicaid, can now view data the applications but still have to manually enter them into their systems.

"We're now playing catch-up," DWS spokesman Nic Dunn told *The Salt Lake Tribune*.

Because the federal health care law requires almost all citizens to have health coverage this year, Dunn said that Utah residents who think they may qualify for Medicaid should apply directly with DWS.

Kevin Burt, the associate director of eligibility at DWS, said his staff is working through about 12,500 Medicaid applications that came in during October and November.

By the end of next week, Burt hopes his team will be able to churning through another 11,500 applications from December.

"They've been waiting long enough so we want to work through the backlog of applications as quickly as possible," Burt said.

Beyond the workaround, DWS officials said communication between the state and federal systems is improving, but there are still enough glitches that it can't be relied upon.

Burt said applications moving in the opposite direction are still halted as well.

About 1,600 Utah residents applied for Medicaid with DWS but were determined ineligible.

Their information is supposed to be transferred to the federal website so those individuals can shop for private coverage.

But those 1,600 applications are stuck until the systems are fixed.

Federal officials said they're working to address the problem, which has been reported in other states.

Mike Fierberg, a regional spokesman for the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, said other states have been able to receive the applications seamlessly.

"The situations are as different as the states are," Fierberg said. "We're working with Utah Medicaid on a daily basis to work through the backlog and get people the insurance they need."

## Governor treads carefully on medical pot

NEW YORK — Gov. Andrew Cuomo made a political splash by introducing a medical marijuana plan in the State of the State speech, but his cautious approach has been met with skepticism from pot advocates who question whether the proposal is mostly for show.

While nearly two dozen states have OK'd marijuana for medical purposes and Colorado and Washington have legalized its use for pleasure, Cuomo is tapping a 1980 state law to allow as many as 20 hospitals to dispense the drug to people with certain severe illnesses as an exper-

imental research project.

"I'm absolutely thrilled that he's actually verbalized the words 'medical marijuana,' but he's just got to go further," said Susan Rusinko, a 52-year-old central New York resident who said a hit of pot is a "wonder drug" that relaxes immobilizing leg spasms from her multiple sclerosis. It's unclear whether she would even qualify for Cuomo's initiative or whether there would be a participating hospital near her.

The governor's office has yet to detail how the program would overcome key hurdles, including the lack

of a legal, unadulterated supply of marijuana in the state and a federal law that still makes it illegal for doctors to write a prescription.

While advocates are frustrated, Cuomo's limited embrace of medical marijuana may be both politically astute and scientifically sensitive.

Some medical experts say that while the marijuana plant holds tantalizing possibilities for treating problems ranging from chemotherapy-related nausea to chronic pain, popular enthusiasm for the drug has outpaced a weak body of medical research.

**Truck strikes overpass after water delivery**

MALDEN, W.Va. — Police said a tractor-trailer hit an overpass on U.S. 60 after it delivered water for people affected by a chemical spill.

Kanawha County Sheriff's Office spokesman Brian Humphries said the accident occurred shortly after noon Saturday at the Malden overpass. The crash damaged the trailer's top.

Humphries said the tractor-trailer was able to travel beneath the overpass when it was loaded because of the water's weight. After the water was delivered, the body of the empty trailer was higher.

**Bowling alley owner admits role in arson**

BRIDGETON, N.J. — The former owner of a bowling alley in southern New Jersey has admitted he orchestrated the arson fire that destroyed a rival alley four years ago.

Steven Smink, of Philadelphia, pleaded guilty Friday to a charge of arson for hire. The plea came just days before he was due to stand trial on numerous charges stemming from the fire that destroyed Loyle Lanes in Vineland.

Cumberland County prosecutors said Smink

faces a 12-year state prison sentence when he's sentenced March 7, and will have to serve five years of probation once he's freed. In return, prosecutors will move to dismiss charges of aggravated arson, conspiracy to commit arson and two counts of employing a juvenile in commission of a crime.

**Mental evaluation sought in slaying**

SUNBURY, Pa. — The lawyer for one of two defendants charged in the death of a man they allegedly lured through a Craigslist's ad is seeking a psychiatric evaluation of his client.

PennLive.com said in a story published Friday — the court-appointed lawyer for a 22-year-old Elytte Barbour wants the evaluation to determine whether Barbour is competent to stand trial.

Barbour and his 19-year-old wife Miranda are being held without bail on charges they killed 42-year-old Troy LaFerrara of Port Trevorton on Nov. 11. The Barbours were newlyweds who had recently moved to Pennsylvania from North Carolina.

Police say Miranda stabbed LaFerrara in her car while Elytte held a cord around his neck, then dumped the body. Elytte told investigators the couple committed the crime because they wanted to kill someone together.

**Attendance dips at 2014 Pa. farm show**

HARRISBURG, Pa. — Icy temperatures were largely blamed for a dip in attendance at this year's Pennsylvania Farm Show, which closed Saturday, but the many thousands of hardy souls who made the trip enjoyed the annual celebration of farm life and certainly didn't go away hungry.

In the ever-popular food court, visitors bought more than 275,000 doughnuts, nearly 40,000 servings of French fries and 27,000 baked potatoes during the eight-day show, according to organizers of what is billed as the nation's largest indoor agricultural event.

The Pennsylvania Livestock Association sold more than 10,000 roast-beef sandwiches and 13,000

sausages, while Penn Ag Industries sold more than five tons of pulled pork, 60,000 chicken nuggets, 10,000 fish sandwiches and 6,000 whoopie pies.

Overall attendance at the 98th annual show was

about 17 percent lower than the record 585,000 estimated to have attended last year's show, said spokeswoman Nicole Bucher.

Bucher speculated that this week's unusually harsh cold spell likely dis-

couraged many prospective visitors. She cited an uptick in the daily census of parked cars since temperatures began to warm Thursday as evidence that weather is always an important factor.

**Police provide new details of Pa. highway shooting**

CHAMBERSBURG, Pa. — Police investigating the shooting death of a Maine motorist in the dead of night on a Pennsylvania interstate last weekend said Friday they did not think it was related to another roadway shooting about seven hours earlier some 50 miles away.

Members of a team trying to solve the Jan. 4 killing of 28-year-old Timothy Davison along Interstate 81 also said they did not think it was linked to the unsolved shooting of a Kentucky state trooper along a highway in May.

Pennsylvania State Police Capt. Steven Junkin said at a news conference a few miles from the shooting scene that the assailant is believed to have been a man driving a dark-colored Ford Ranger XLT pickup truck that likely has damage to its front driver's side. That model of pick-

up has not been made for about a decade, he said.

Because the shooting occurred around 2 a.m., the color of the pickup is not certain, but police said it may be blue. Investigators have asked body shops in Pennsylvania, Maryland and West Virginia to look out for such a vehicle.

Davison died of multiple gunshot wounds, although authorities are not disclosing the type of weapon used.

Junkin said the suspect apparently pursued Davison on Interstate 81 northward for about 15 miles, from Interstate 70 in Maryland to a few miles into Pennsylvania. He said the driver is believed to have then turned around and headed south.

There is no evidence that Davison, who made several calls to 911 while being pursued, did anything to provoke the attack.

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# Tap water may be out for days after W.Va. spill

CHARLESTON — Several hundred thousand people in West Virginia remained without clean tap water for a third day Saturday following a chemical spill and a water company executive said it could be days before uncontaminated water is flowing again.

Water sample test results must consistently show that the chemical's presence in the public water system is at or below 1 part per million, the level recommended by federal agencies, before residents can turn on their taps again, West Virginia American Water President Jeff McIntyre said Saturday at a news conference.

The company told residents in nine counties to not drink their tap water or use it to bathe or wash dishes or clothes after a foaming agent used in coal processing escaped from a Freedom Industries plant in Charleston and seeped into the Elk River. The only allowed use of the water was for flushing toilets. The order applies to about 300,000 people.

Thirty-two people sought treatment at area hospitals

for symptoms such as nausea and vomiting. Of those, four people were admitted to the Charleston Area Medical Center. Their conditions were not immediately known, Allison Adler of the Department of Health and Human Resources said Saturday.

Federal authorities, including the U.S. Chemical

Safety Board, opened an investigation into Thursday's spill. The Chemical Safety Board said Saturday that its investigative team is scheduled to arrive in West Virginia on Monday.

"This incident continues to impact the people of West Virginia — our goal is to find out what happened to allow a leak of such mag-

nitude to occur and to ensure that the proper safeguards are in place to prevent a similar incident from occurring," Chemical Safety Board chairman Rafael Moure-Eraso said in a news release.

About 7,500 gallons of the chemical escaped from a storage tank and a containment area, said Michael

Dorsey, chief of the state Department of Environmental Protection's Homeland Security and Emergency Response office.

Just how much of the chemical leaked into the river was not yet known. But Dorsey said during the news conference that state officials do not believe waterways downstream, including the Kanawha and Ohio rivers, will be affected because of dilution.

On Friday, the company's president issued an apology to West Virginia residents.

"We'd like to start by sincerely apologizing to the people in the affected counties of West Virginia," company President Gary Southern said. "Our friends and our neighbors, this incident is extremely unfortunate, unanticipated and we are very, very sorry for the disruptions to everybody's daily life this incident has caused."

Some residents, including John Bonham of Cross Lanes, were willing to accept Southern's apology.

"Yeah, I understand that stuff can happen," said Bonham, who also works in the chemical industry. "I don't think it's

going to get him out of legal liability. OSHA is the one they're going to have to answer to."

The leak was discovered Thursday morning from the bottom of the tank. Southern said the company worked all day and through the night to remove the chemical from the site and take it elsewhere.

"We have mitigated the risk, we believe, in terms of further material leaving this facility," Southern said. He said the company didn't know how much had leaked.

The tank that leaked holds at least 40,000 gallons, said state Department of Environmental Protection spokesman Tom Aluise, although officials believe no more than 5,000 gallons leaked from the tank. Some of that was contained before escaping into the river, Aluise said.

Freedom Industries was ordered Friday night to remove chemicals from its remaining above-ground tanks, Aluise added.

The company was already cited for causing air pollution stemming from the odor first reported Thursday, Aluise said.

### AG provides spill price gouging tipline

CHARLESTON — The West Virginia Attorney General's office is asking residents to report any incidents of price gouging related to a chemical spill in Charleston.

The office has opened a tipline that residents can call to report price gouging. The tipline number is 800-368-8808. Residents also can report price gouging on the office's Facebook and Twitter sites.

Attorney General Patrick Morrisey said price gouging isn't limited to water and ice. He said it also could apply to hand sanitizer, baby wipes, disposable plates and silverware, and other household products.

### Officials work to reopen facilities

CHARLESTON — Health officials in Kanawha and Putnam counties are working to reopen restaurants, daycare centers and other facilities that have closed because of a chemical spill.

Dr. Rahul Gupta is health officer for the Kanawha-Charleston and Putnam County boards of health. He said Saturday that the health departments are taking applications from facilities for conditional approval to reopen.

Gupta said these facilities must submit a plan to provide potable water for activities such as cooking, serving and washing. Once the plans are approved, county sanitarians will in-

spect the facilities to verify them.

Gupta said health officials will work around the clock to reopen as many businesses as possible.

State officials have told West Virginia American Water customers in nine counties to not use tap water because of the spill.

### Nearly 800 call W.Va. Poison Center

CHARLESTON — The West Virginia Poison Control Center has received nearly 800 calls from concerned residents since a chemical spilled in the Elk River.

The center's director, Dr. Elizabeth Scharman, said 737 calls involved possible human exposure to the chemical, while 54 were related to pets and other animals.

The center normally receives about 100 calls a day.

Scharman said some callers reported symptoms such as nausea, vomiting, headaches, diarrhea, reddened skin and rashes. She said the calls were a mix of likely spill-related symptoms, stress-related responses to the spill and unrelated conditions.

The center recommended that a handful seek treatment at hospital emergency rooms. Scharman said other callers also went to emergency rooms after contacting the center.

### Lawmakers propose business relief fund

CHARLESTON — West Virginia House of Delegates leaders are proposing a relief fund to help small businesses during emergencies.

Majority Leader Harry Keith White said House

leaders plan to draft legislation that would provide a limited, zero-interest loan to small businesses in areas where a state of emergency is declared.

White and other House leaders announced the proposal Friday in a news release.

Speaker Tim Miley said the state can't risk losing any small businesses because of an emergency such as Thursday's chemical spill into the Elk River. He said small businesses are the backbone of the state.

### Groups: Spill shows need to protect water

CHARLESTON — Environmental groups said a chemical spill in the Elk River shows West Virginia's drinking water sources need better protection.

Ohio Valley Environmental Coalition executive director Janet Keating said she hopes state leaders realize that clean water can't be taken for granted.

West Virginia Rivers Coalition executive director Angie Rosser said the spill shows that people depend on clean rivers for health and security.

Keating and Rosser said in news releases that the state needs to examine how to better protect drinking water sources.

### Threat reported at chemical company

CHARLESTON — The Kanawha County Sheriff's office said it responded to a threat at a Charleston company that is at the center of a chemical spill.

The sheriff's office said Freedom Industries reported the threat shortly before 2 p.m. Friday. A

worker said a male called and said he was "on his way to teach everyone there a lesson."

Deputies went to the company as a precaution. The sheriff's office said they will remain there to ensure investigators from outside agencies and Freedom workers can work safely.

### OSHA investigates chemical spill

CHARLESTON — The Occupational Safety and Health Administration is investigating a chemical spill in Charleston to assess potential worker health and safety issues.

The agency said it began inspecting Freedom Industries' facility Friday.

A chemical used in the coal preparation process leaked from a tank at the facility into the Elk River on Thursday.

OSHA said in a news release that it doesn't have a history with Freedom.

OSHA said its sanitation standard requires employers to ensure workers have potable water for drinking. Employers also must ensure that workers have water for hand washing and showering when necessary.

### Water company warns of hoax

CHARLESTON — West Virginia American Water is warning customers about a hoax involving a chemical spill in Charleston.

The company said customers reported receiving an automated call that claims it's shutting off water service.

West Virginia American Water said the call did not originate from it and the

claim is false.

The company is asking people who have any information about the false call to report it to the Attorney General's Consumer Protection Division at 1-800-368-8808.

Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin has ordered West Virginia Water customers in nine counties not to drink, bathe, cook or wash clothes with tap water. The chemical leaked from a Freedom Industries operation into the Elk River on Thursday. Tomblin's order remains in effect.

### West Virginia spill draws lawsuits

CHARLESTON — At least half a dozen lawsuits have been filed over a chemical spill in West Virginia that contaminated water supplies.

The Kanawha County Circuit Clerk's Office reports that two lawsuits were filed Friday against Freedom Industries. Four others named Freedom Industries and West Virginia American Water as defendants.

The plaintiffs include several Charleston restaurants and two individuals.

West Virginia American Water spokesman Laura Jordan said the company is aware of the lawsuits but has no comment.

Freedom Industries didn't immediately respond to a request for comment.

### Delegation watching chemical spill

CHARLESTON — Members of West Virginia's congressional delegation are asking people affected by a chemical spill to help one another.

U.S. Sen. Jay Rocke-

efeller, U.S. Sen. Joe Manchin, Rep. Shelley Moore Capito and Rep. Nick Rahall said Friday that they are monitoring the situation.

The lawmakers urged people to abide by Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin's order to not use tap water for drinking, bathing, cleaning or washing clothes.

Rockefeller said he expects a full accounting of what happened and how to prevent incidents, once the affected counties return to what he calls "a semblance of normalcy."

A chemical used in processing coal spilled Thursday from a Freedom Industries operation into the Elk River in Charleston. The chemical has contaminated water supplied by West Virginia American Water to nine counties.

### W.Va. distributes water in areas

CHARLESTON — West Virginia Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin said water is being distributed in areas affected by a chemical spill in the Elk River.

Tomblin said the main focus is hospitals, nursing homes and residents who are the most vulnerable. The distribution will continue until the issue is resolved.

Seven water distribution sites opened in Kanawha County on Friday.

Wal-Mart Stores Inc. spokesman W.C. Wertz said the company will provide several truckloads of water for distribution.

Putnam Aging assistant nutrition director Luann Willis said her agency is distributing drinking water through its nutrition program to residents in Putnam County.

## Staten stacks up well in shootout with OSU's star

**THERE CAME A** moment Saturday when **Juwan Staten** and **Marcus Smart** looked like two heavyweights battling each other.

Staten pulled off a cross-over move that forced Smart to jump back or else get taken to the rim, then Staten calmly knock down the open foul-line jumper.

Smart countered with a 3-pointer. Staten beat an entire three-quarters-court press by himself and made two free throws.

Smart answered with one of his six offensive rebounds and powered it back in for a basket.

When the dust finally settled Saturday, at the WVU Coliseum, the 11th-ranked Cowboys had come away with an important 73-72 victory.

But Staten may have come away with a victory of his own.

Smart finished with 22 points. Staten had 20.

Smart had 13 rebounds, Staten finished with five.

Smart had five assists and three turnovers. Staten had eight and two.

Smart had two steals. Staten had three.

If Smart is one of the best players in the country — and there were five NBA scouts in attendance to see if he is — then Staten made a statement that he isn't far behind.

Not that WVU coach **Bob Huggins** is interested in that sidebar at the moment.

"Who cares?" Huggins said. "Who cares. We're trying to win games. Juwan is trying to win games. I wish everybody else would follow suit sometimes."

Staten's play this season and stats — he's averaging 17.0 points, 6.1 rebounds and 6.1 assists — are nothing short of eye-popping.

They're also remarkable compared to what he did this past season.

And so you watch him play this season and kind of wonder if it is just some smoke screen or if Staten is the real deal.

If you can do it against Smart — and Staten played so well that OSU coach **Travis Ford** switched Smart off of Staten at different times — then you are the real deal.

So, too, is Smart, though, which ultimately may have led to the Cowboys' win on this day.

"He's a great player and he gets a lot of hype," Staten said of Smart. "It's well deserved. He runs his team well. He makes plays when they need him to make plays. I take my hat off to him, he did the things he needed to to get his team the win."

Staten did not set out to play this game as a one-on-one matchup against Smart.

Was it somewhere in his mind? You bet your basketballs it was.

"Any time you consider yourself a good player and there is a player who is definitely a great player playing against you, you want to play well," Staten said. "You want to see how you stack up."

On this day, Staten stacked up just fine.

In fact, he may have just turned a few heads from those NBA scouts.

And, if this group of Mountaineers can somehow find a way to win some of these close games against good competition, Staten just may have put himself on firm footing to win Big 12 Player of the Year.

That may be too big of an "if" right now, though.

He took over the starting job in the third game, against Georgia State, and threw for 359 yards, three touchdowns and one interception in his debut. The following week, against Maryland, Childress suffered a torn pec-

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# Seahawks rumble past Saints, 23-15

SEATTLE — Marshawn Lynch overpowered the New Orleans Saints in the postseason — again.

Lynch ran for 140 yards and two touchdowns, Steven Hauschka kicked three field goals in blustery conditions, and Seattle's defense flustered Drew Brees and New Orleans in a 23-15 victory Saturday, in the NFC divisional playoff game.

The top-seeded Seahawks advanced to the NFC championship game for the second time in franchise history and will host San Francisco or Carolina next Sunday. Seattle last reached the conference title game in the 2005 playoffs.

Seattle shut out the Saints in the first half, got Lynch's first 100-yard game since Week 10 of the regular season and received a spark from the brief return of Percy Harvin before he left with a concussion. Lynch scored on a 15-yard run in the first half and capped the victory with a 31-yard scoring run, with 2:40 left, that coach Pete Carroll celebrated by jumping into offensive line coach Tom Cable's arms. Lynch stiff-armed Keenan Lewis on his way to the end zone for the clinching score that left CenturyLink Field swaying.

While the clinching score lacked the stunning explosiveness of Lynch's

"Beast Quake" touchdown run against the Saints in the 2010 playoffs, this one was more important. It ensured Seattle would not be the latest No. 1 seed to get upset by a No. 6 seed in the divisional round.

Lynch finished with 28 carries and made up for another shaky day passing by Russell Wilson. Seattle's offense was a concern heading into the postseason and, outside of Lynch, did little to quell those worries.

Wilson missed on five of his first six pass attempts to start the second half but

came through with a vital 31-yard completion to Doug Baldwin with 2:57 remaining. On the next play, Lynch got a key seal block on the edge from Jermaine Kearse and raced down the sideline for his second TD.

Wilson finished 9 of 18 for a career-low 103 yards. His leading receiver was Harvin, making his second appearance of the season after nearly getting put on injured reserve less than two weeks ago. Harvin had three receptions for 21 yards in the first half and one rush for 9 yards, but left

the game late in the first half with a concussion.

Hauschka hit field goals of 38 and 49 yards with the windy, rainy conditions at his back and hit a 26-yarder into the wind late in the third quarter.

Brees finished 24 of 43 for 309 yards and put a scare into Seattle in the closing seconds. After Lynch's touchdown, Brees took the Saints 80 yards in nine plays, capped with a 9-yard TD pass to Marquise Colston with 26 seconds left that made it 23-15.

Colston then recovered

the inside kick when it caromed off the chest of Golden Tate and directly to the Saints' receiver.

Brees took over at his 41 with 24 seconds left, and Jimmy Graham caught his first pass of the game, an 8-yard completion. Brees spiked the ball to stop the clock, then found Colston near the sideline. Instead of stepping out of bounds to have one more play, Colston tried to throw across the field to Darren Sproles. The pass was forward, and the penalty for an illegal forward pass ran off the final 10 seconds.

# No QB has Manning's playoff experience, heartbreak

## Leads Denver vs. San Diego in AFC game

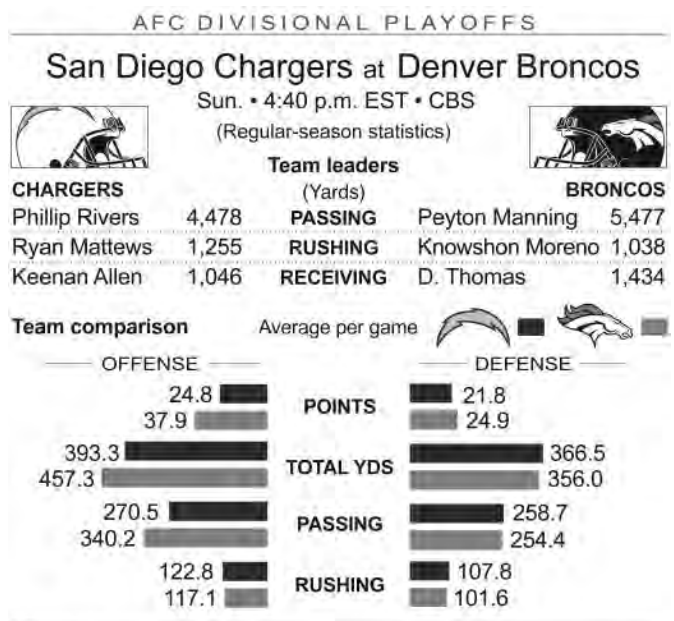
DENVER — No quarterback has been to the playoffs more than Peyton Manning or experienced more heartache there, either.

Only once in his previous dozen trips to the postseason party has Manning put his fingerprints on the Lombardi Trophy.

His 9-11 postseason record stands in stark contrast to his 167-73 regular season mark and includes eight first-round exits, none more scarring than last year's AFC Divisional round-home loss to Baltimore as the AFC's top seed. He also lost his first playoff game in Indianapolis as the No. 1 seed after the 2005 season, then bounced back to win it all the next year. Since then, he's won just two of seven playoff games and lost his last three.

The meticulous quarterback renowned for his unrivaled work ethic and painstaking preparation doesn't believe that's because he grinds too much in January.

"I really don't believe so," Manning said as he prepared for today's showdown between his Denver



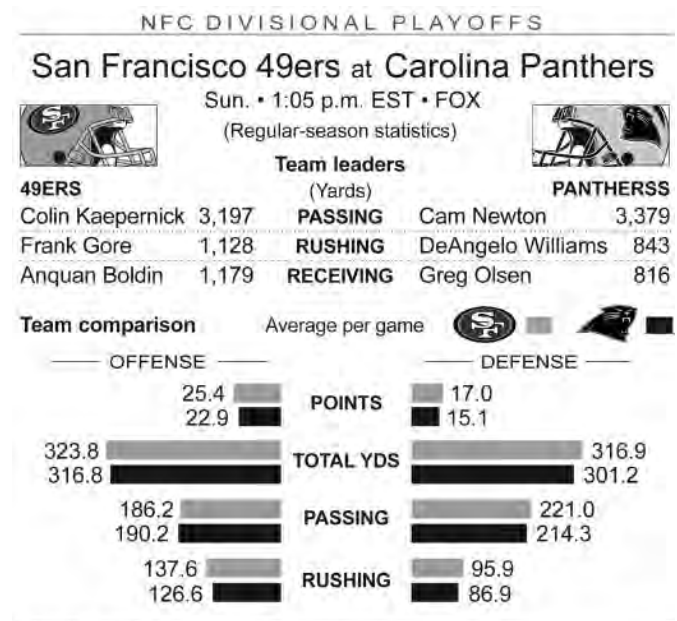
Broncos (13-3) and the San Diego Chargers (10-7). "I know people — it's easy to summarize, to take a whole bunch of football seasons and lump them together. I personally don't believe in that theory."

"I think each season takes on its own identity and different things occurred along the way at different points of my career. This is the 2013 season, 2014 postseason, and it's its own chapter. We're looking forward to hopefully writing it for a number of more weeks."

Manning set a slew of records this season, including 55 TD passes and 5,447 yards through the air

as the Broncos became the highest-scoring team of the Super Bowl era. Five players scored 10 or more touchdowns. No team in history had ever had more than three players accomplish that feat.

Yet for all his records and all his greatness, Manning's fault-finders point to his cold-weather record — it's 4-7 in sub-freezing temperatures at kickoff — and his playoff pratfalls — his 11 losses are tied with Brett Favre for most in NFL history — to suggest he won't cap it all off with a championship in the first outdoor Super Bowl in a cold-weather city next month.



Here's the thing about the cold: In many of those games, Manning had the lesser team. That's why he was on the road. And sometimes, he only played a series or two because his team had already clinched its playoff slot, but the loss went next to his name nonetheless.

And in the playoffs, you could point the finger at his supporting cast as much as you could at him, if not more.

If Rahim Moore doesn't make one of the biggest blunders in playoff history last year, Manning would be hailed for his fourth-quarter touchdown toss to beat

the Ravens and not lambasted for his interception in overtime. And maybe now he'd be trying to defend a Super Bowl title instead of seeking atonement.

That scarring defeat has driven Manning for 365 days.

So doggedly determined to rectify that disappointment, Manning at times this season seemed in a hurry just to get back here. The regular season took on an air of being 20 preseason games with the real opener coming Sunday afternoon.

Yet, all week, he was relaxed, embracing the pressure of this time of year.

"If it's just miserable this whole time, then why are

you really doing it? I mean, there are other things you can do that might make you feel less miserable than if it's just an absolute grind," Manning said. "And maybe, as you get older, you think more in those lines, that, 'Hey, this is a pretty unique opportunity to be in this position, to be one of just a few teams playing.'"

Manning is coming off his best statistical season at age 37, just two years removed from the neck surgeries that weakened his throwing arm but strengthened his resolve.

Yet, no matter how many more years he has left, he knows he won't get many more chances. And so, he's embracing this latest trip to the playoffs and enjoying the journey, relishing his chance to chase redemption and another ring.

"It's going to be a great atmosphere on Sunday, playing a good football team, and there is nothing else I would rather be doing," Manning said. "And so that is certainly my goal to enjoy the preparation, not just the game, to actually enjoy the preparation part of it, enjoy being around the guys."

"Because certainly, the light is at the end of the tunnel for me, no question. And so, I think you enjoy these things maybe even more."

# Penn State hires Vandy's Franklin

STATE COLLEGE, Pa. — Penn State has hired James Franklin as its next head football coach.

Franklin, 41, who led Vanderbilt to bowls in all three of his seasons there, replaces Bill O'Brien, who left the Nittany Lions after two years to coach the NFL's Houston Texans. Penn State made the announcement Saturday, after the school's compensation committee met to finalize the contract.

That committee approved the hiring by a 6-0 vote Saturday morning.

Franklin won 24 games with the Commodores and is a Pennsylvania native with strong ties in-state. Penn State officials met with him

this past week in Florida. He will be asked to build off a foundation that O'Brien set amid scandal. Despite a lack of scholarships, a bowl ban and player defections from the late Joe Paterno's roster, O'Brien led the Nittany Lions to two winning seasons (8-4, 7-5) while restoring some tempered enthusiasm in Happy Valley.

That torch has now been passed to Franklin, who played at Division III East Stroudsburg (Pa.). He set seven school records as a senior, and also has coached at Washington State, Idaho State, Kansas State and Maryland. With the Terrapins, he was offensive coordinator and assistant head coach.

Members of Penn State's trustee committee on compensation met with athletic director Dave Joyner and others Saturday morning

to discuss the contract, which the group called "excellent" for both Franklin and the Nittany Lions.

"Dr. Joyner and I have stressed that our No. 1 priority in hiring a new coach was to hire an outstanding leader for our football program, one who will continue our long tradition of student-athlete success on the field and in the classroom," Penn State President Rodney Erickson said. "We have achieved that goal. On behalf of the University and the entire Nittany Lion nation, I am proud to welcome James Franklin as Penn State's 16th head football coach."

Much of Saturday's meeting, at which specific terms of the contract were laid out for trustees, was done privately. The actual vote was public, lasting roughly a minute.

toral muscle and missed the Mountaineers' final eight games.

Seniors Clint Trickett and Paul Millard split time at under center the rest of the way, with Trickett starting seven.

Trickett led the team with 1,605 passing yards, seven touchdowns and seven interceptions, while Millard threw for 1,122 yards, six touchdowns and six picks. In two games, Childress averaged a team-best 210.5 passing yards and completed a team-best 57.1 percent of his passes.

All three quarterbacks were expected to compete for the starting job when WVU opens spring practice.

Holgorsen also signed junior-college quarterback Skyler Howard, who passed for 3,153 yards and 33 touchdowns at Riverside (Calif.) City College this season, and four-star recruit William Crest, out of Dunbar High School, in Baltimore, is expected to sign with the Mountaineers in February.

With Crest and Childress, WVU would have had five scholarship quarterbacks on its roster.

As of Saturday night, Childress was still listed on WVU's online football roster and the university's online student directory.

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# Arbitrator cuts A-Rod suspension to 162 games

NEW YORK — Alex Rodriguez's drug suspension was cut to 162 games from 211 by arbitrator Fredric Horowitz, a decision the New York Yankees third baseman vowed to fight in federal court.

Rodriguez also would be sidelined for any postseason games this year under the ruling announced Saturday, which costs him \$25 million of the \$86 million left on his contract.

"The number of games sadly comes as no surprise, as the deck has been stacked against me from day one," Rodriguez said in a statement. "This is one man's decision, that was not put before a fair and

impartial jury, does not involve me having failed a single drug test, is at odds with the facts and is inconsistent with the terms of the Joint Drug Agreement and the Basic Agreement, and relies on testimony and documents that would never have been allowed in any court in the United States because they are false and wholly unreliable."

The three-time AL MVP was given the 211-game penalty by Commissioner Bud Selig on Aug. 5, following Major League Baseball's investigation of the Biogenesis of America anti-aging clinic, which was accused of distributing banned performance-enhancing drugs.

The Major League Baseball Players Association filed a grievance saying the

discipline was without "just cause"

Horowitz, who became the sport's independent arbitrator in 2012, heard the case during 12 sessions from Sept. 30 until Nov. 20. Technically, he chaired a three-man arbitration panel that included MLB Chief Operating Officer Rob Manfred and union General Counsel Dave Prouty.

Despite the ban, baseball's drug rules allow Rodriguez to participate in spring training and play in exhibition games.

While Rodriguez, 38, could fight the ruling in court, judges rarely overturn arbitrators' decisions.

"While we believe the original 211-game suspension was appropriate, we respect the decision rendered by the panel and will

focus on our continuing efforts on eliminating performance-enhancing substances from our game," MLB said in a statement.

The union said in its own statement that it "strongly disagrees" with the ruling but added "we recognize that a final and binding decision has been reached."

"We respect the collectively-bargained arbitration process which led to the decision."

Rodriguez, however, plans to continue the fight.

"This injustice is MLB's first step toward abolishing guaranteed contracts in the 2016 bargaining round, instituting lifetime bans for single violations of drug policy, and further insulating its corrupt investigative program from any variety of defense by accused

players, or any variety of objective review," he said.

"I have been clear that I did not use performance-enhancing substances as alleged in the notice of discipline, or violate the Basic Agreement or the Joint Drug Agreement in any manner, and in order to prove it I will take this fight to federal court. I am confident that when a federal judge reviews the entirety of the record, the hearsay testimony of a criminal whose own records demonstrate that he dealt drugs to minors, and the lack of credible evidence put forth by MLB, that the judge will find that the panel blatantly disregarded the law and facts, and will overturn the suspension."

Rodriguez has claimed

Selig was on a vendetta to smear him as a way of burrowing the commissioner's image following the Steroids Era. Both sides have admitted paying for evidence as they prepared for the hearing.

Fourteen players were penalized following the Biogenesis probe, and they all accepted penalties. Milwaukee outfielder Ryan Braun sat out the final 65 games of the season, the other players were given 50-game suspensions.

A-Rod's drug penalty was for "his use and possession of numerous forms of prohibited performance-enhancing substances, including testosterone and human growth hormone over the course of multiple years," MLB said this past summer.

# Australian Open begins another Grand Slam year

MELBOURNE, Australia — The Australian Open begins Monday, the first Grand Slam of the year.

Here are five things to know about the tournament at Melbourne Park, which is within minutes of the city center and situated along the banks of the Yarra River:

### Reigning champions

Welcome back Novak Djokovic and Victoria Azarenka. Djokovic, who has won the last three titles here, went on from Melbourne Park to win seven titles in nine finals in 2013 and finished the season with a 24-match winning streak. He lost the No. 1 ranking to Rafael Nadal on Oct. 7. Azarenka, the two-time defending women's champion, won two additional titles in 2013, at Doha and Cincinnati. Azarenka was one of only three players to beat Serena Williams in 2013.

### The weather

Always a factor — it can be intensely hot one day, cool and wet the next. The tournament's Extreme Heat Policy gets invoked most years, meaning matches can be moved indoors, or suspended or prolonged by extra breaks given to players.

To combat the weather, the Australian Open continues to lead the way with covered venues. Rod Laver and Hisense arenas both have retractable roofs. A roof over Margaret Court Arena, Melbourne Park's third featured arena, is under construction and will be fully retractable by next year.

### Show them the money

In October, Tennis Australia said it would increase prize money by \$2.8 million to bring overall player compensation to \$31 million. In keeping with player demands for a larger slice of Grand Slam revenues, all four of the sport's major tournaments have greatly increased their prize money in the past two years.

Wimbledon now offers about \$36.5 million, while the U.S. Open increased its purse to \$34.3 million and the French Open went up to \$29.7 million.

This year, the singles champions in Australia

will receive \$2.35 million.

### Who's hot, who's not

Serena Williams beat Victoria Azarenka in the Brisbane International final a week ago to continue where she left off last year. She won 11 titles in 2013 — the most by a player on the WTA tour since Martina Hingis' 12 in 1997. She compiled a 34-match winning streak and earned more than \$12 million in prize money. She comes to Melbourne on a 22-match winning streak. Martina Navratilova has predicted Williams can equal her total of 18 Grand Slam singles titles by winning the Australian Open this month, and then eclipse Steffi Graf's 22 major titles in the Open era. "If she can stay healthy there is no doubt she can go into the 20s," Navratilova said. "The sky is the limit."

Defending Australian Open champion Novak Djokovic won four consecutive men's titles to finish last season, including the World Tour Finals in London. On the not-so-hot side is Roger Federer. The 17-time major winner failed to reach a Grand Slam final last year for the first year since 2002, certainly a poor year by his standards. Federer lost the Brisbane International final last week to Lleyton Hewitt and comes into the Australian Open seeded sixth.

### Who's here, who's not

Pete Sampras, a 14-time Grand Slam winner, will be at the tournament for ceremonies to mark the first of his two Australian Open titles 20 years ago; Six-time major winner Boris Becker, making his first visit to Australia in 15 years, arrives as Novak Djokovic's new coach.

Among those missing in Melbourne will be Nicolas Pietrangeli, who finished No. 13 in the rankings last year, and No. 27 Jurgen Melzer. And definitely not Bernard Tomic's father, John. Tomic Sr. was suspended from Grand Slam events following his conviction for assaulting his son's hitting partner, Thomas Drouot. John Tomic did make an appearance at the Sydney International this week, with the tournament's knowledge, but purchased his own ticket and was not given access to the restricted areas for players and officials.

# Avoiding stress during a big game: Some advice from a cardiologist

Dr. Geoffrey Rose is the chief of cardiology at Carolinas HealthCare System. He knows from experience the emotional stress involved in watching a sports event can be significant.

"The big game is a stress test," Rose said. "One of my patients had a cardiac arrest at a Panthers game several years ago. He was resuscitated by a medical team there and is doing fine. But it can and does happen."

Rose pointed to a study done about German soccer fans before, during and after the 2006 World Cup, which was held in Germany. The study showed an increase in cardiac-related episodes for fans during the event.

And there is anecdotal

evidence stretching back for decades. In 1975, NFL quarterback Fran Tarkenton's father — Dallas Tarkenton, a minister — died in Georgia of a heart attack while watching his son play on TV. The elder Tarkenton passed away a few minutes before Dallas quarterback Roger Staubach threw a Hail Mary pass to beat his son's Minnesota team.

So what would be some of Rose's top recommendations for fans who are getting stressed out about the Panthers or another favorite sports squad?

■ Frequent exercise. Ideally, do it five times a week for 30 minutes a session. "People who are exercising regularly reduce risk of abrupt sudden death," Rose said. "It is extremely important."

■ Relaxation. "Try not to take these games as se-

riously as we tend to do," Rose said. "Deep breathing helps. You want to avoid a heated reaction."

■ Walking away. As tough as it can be to do, Rose said sometimes you have to walk away from the TV or the seat at the game if you are getting too hot and bothered.

"If you were running and you had chest pain, you would stop running," Rose said. "So if you are exposing yourself to intense emotional stress and you continue to do so, you are putting yourself in harm's way. You don't want to do that."

■ Don't ignore symptoms. If you do have chest pain or shortness of breath while watching a sports event — even if it goes away — get yourself checked by a doctor quickly. Better safe than sorry.

# Hield, Spangler, Sooners hand Cyclones first loss

NORMAN, Okla. — Buddy Hield scored 22 points and Ryan Spangler added 16 points and a career-high 15 rebounds to help Oklahoma knock off previously unbeaten Iowa State, 87-82, Saturday.

Isaiah Cousins added 17 points for the Sooners (13-3, 2-1 Big 12), who ended No. 9 Iowa State's school-best winning streak at 14 games.

The Sooners won despite a rough day for Cameron Clark. The Big 12's leading scorer finished with 12 points on 4-for-16 shooting. The Sooners were fine because they matched a season high with 13 3-pointers and outrebounded the Cyclones, 41-34.

Oklahoma had lost two of three and was coming off a 90-83 loss to Kansas, on Wednesday.

DeAndre Kane had 23 points and nine rebounds, and Melvin Ejim added 21 points and six rebounds for Iowa State (14-1, 2-1). Georges Niang scored 14 points and Dustin Hogue 13 for the Cyclones.

Ejim's 3-pointer with 2:39 remaining gave Iowa State its first lead since early in the second half. Spangler came right back with an old-fashioned three-point play to give the Sooners a 79-77 lead. After Oklahoma got a stop, Hield scored on a layup to bump the lead to four.

Ejim missed a putback dunk on the other end and O.U. rebounded. Cousins made two free throws with 57.9 seconds to play, pushing the Sooners' lead to six.

Hield missed a pair of free throws to leave an opening for the Cyclones, but they couldn't take advantage.

#### (7) Baylor 88, TCU 62

WACO, Texas — Taurean Prince scored 15 of his career-high 23 points off the bench when Baylor (13-2, 1-1 Big 12) took control before halftime and went on to victory against instate rival TCU (9-6, 0-3).

The Bears won their 13th consecutive home game, the latest in the streak coming four days after they lost their conference opener, 87-72, at No. 9 Iowa State.

Baylor went ahead to stay against TCU with a 16-3 run midway through the first half. Prince had a pair of layups in the five-minute spurt that Brady Heslip capped with a 3-pointer that made it 25-14.

They got everything at the end to win that game."

Out of the timeout, Alexis Schoolcraft applied defensive pressure and Karlee Good stole the ball and was fouled on her breakaway layup. She made two free throws to give the Knights a 37-34 lead with 2:43 to play.

The Knights earned defensive stops on Bridgeport's next two possessions, thanks to Good grabbing a rebound and another steal.

The Indians (3-5) were forced to foul, and Kaitlyn Workman and Schoolcraft combined to close the game by going 5 of 6 from the line.

Good said two vivid memories fueled the Knights' furious final minutes.

One was a recent 53-51 loss to John Marshall. Preston had a chance to tie it at the end, but couldn't get a shot off. The other was a last-second, two-point loss to Bridgeport, on a buzzer beater from the hands of state Player of the Year Miki Glenn, on the Knights' homecourt this past season.

"It hurts," Williams said. "That ball slipped through my hands and it was right there. I had it in my head before [Staten] even went that I was going to get it and make the play. But sometimes it just doesn't work out the way you want it to."

If Williams continues to progress at his current rate, he's confident that those missed opportunities will be to transform into game-changing plays.

Williams, who has started 15 of WVU's 16 games as a true freshman, entered Saturday's contest against Oklahoma State tied for second in the Big 12 with four double-doubles. And with another 12 points and a career-best 13 rebounds against the Cowboys, Williams added another superlative to his growing resume.

"He's second in the league in double-doubles," WVU coach Bob Huggins said. "Now we just have to get him to be more consistent, that's all. He has to be more consistent from play to play."

Williams agreed with his head coach's assessment and said consistency is his primary focus as the Mountaineers head deeper into conference play.

"I've been trying to have focus and be prepared from the day we get the scouting report," Williams said. "I really try to focus and go as hard as I can, and I really did this week. I pushed myself as far as trying to be into it and trying to be a leader from behind. I have to continue to focus and prepare like I need to [in order to] play at that level."

Williams logged a career-high 38 minutes against OSU, scored in double figures for the ninth time (and third game in a row), and grabbed at least 10 rebounds for the sixth time this season. But Williams said he feels like he is only scratching the surface of his potential.

"Me and [assistant coach Erik] Martin talk about that: [13] is my high in rebounds and that's nothing, really," Williams said. "That's what I do and that's what I was recruited for: To rebound the ball. I have to continue to get in shape and continue to listen."

"I have to be a sponge. And I've been trying. I'm trying to soak everything up. As long as I keep doing that, everything is going to

go through the roof. I mean, [13] rebounds? We're [16] games in and I should be grabbing 20, or 25 [rebounds]. And I really feel like I can do that."

Williams' declaration was music to Huggins' ears. Coming off the team's first conference loss of the season, WVU will host Texas on Monday before playing three road games — at No. 25 Kansas State (12-4), No. 11 Oklahoma State and No. 7 Baylor (13-2) — in a four-game stretch.

So the faster Williams can continue his development, the better.

"That would be nice," Huggins said. "I'd take that. And if he's going to do it then we might as well get started. I don't know why we're waiting."

Every big game we have, we almost win."

This loss was not a result of Staten's miss. The junior point guard was near brilliant in his play, finishing with 20 points, eight assists, five rebounds and three steals.

"I felt like we got the shots we wanted," Staten said. "There were just some key plays we didn't execute on. That cost us the game."

It was indeed the little things that mattered the most.

Little things, and the fact that Oklahoma State guard Markel Brown hit one heck of a 3-pointer with 11 seconds remaining in the game to give the Cowboys the 73-72 lead.

"He hadn't really done nothing to that point," Harris said of Brown's shot. "Sometimes that happens in basketball. He made a good shot. That was a scrappy play. He got past the first guy and Nate (Adrian) still got out there. He still hit that shot."

WVU coach Bob Huggins again stressed afterward that the Mountaineers are close to winning a game like this.

"I don't know why the ball didn't go in. I don't know why we didn't tip it in once the ball didn't go in," he said. "If that ball goes in, we're all sitting here talking about how far we've come."

As it stands, the Mountaineers, who host Texas at 7 p.m. Monday, have lost 15 consecutive games to top

25-ranked competition.

Why?

"I think the answers will be found in the small things," Harris said. "It's free throws or boxing out. It's not X's and O's. It's not effort. We're giving great effort."

"It's little bitty things we're not doing. At the end of the day, it's on us. All coach Huggins can do is bring us to the water well. He can't make us drink it."

Lost rebounds and bad turnovers countered all of the positives the Mountaineers collected.

Oklahoma State (14-2, 2-1) lost the rebounding battle, 38-35, but held WVU without an offensive board in the final five minutes.

The Cowboys also went the last 7:32 without a turnover, while the Mountaineers had three.

"You've seen it," Harris said. "The game is right there for us. We had the game. Think about what they did. They hit the shot to win the game. We missed the shot to win the game. That's it. That team didn't beat us, we beat ourselves."

As good as Staten was for WVU, Oklahoma State's Marcus Smart was just as impressive.

The reigning Big 12 Player of the Year finished with 22 points, 13 rebounds and five assists.

It was Smart who drove to the foul line and found Brown with a pass for the game winner.

"They tried to go inside," Huggins said of Brown's play. "They went to the high post and tried

to duck in (LeBryan) Nash. Our guy on the wing was supposed to drop and didn't. Not sure what happened there."

Nash finished with 18 points and Brown 12.

WVU freshman Devin Williams recorded his fifth double-double of the season, with 12 points and 13 rebounds.

Terry Henderson scored a season-high 21 points and added six rebounds and four assists for WVU.

"The worst loss is a loss you almost got," Harris said. "This is a bad one."

## Trappers benefit from an increase in prices for fur

**ECONOMIC GROWTH** in China, Russia and Korea is one apparent reason for rising fur prices. At a recent Canadian fur sale, there were 470 buyers from China, and more than 200 trappers sold \$685,000 worth of furs.

Yes, the market is up, and trapping is, too. The word is that 2013 brought the highest fur prices in 30 years. Most predict that 2014 will continue to show an increased demand for fur by the fashion industry.

Fur prices dictate trapper activity, and West Virginia trappers are benefitting from higher fur prices. Muskrat fur is soft and similar to the more expensive mink. For that reason, the demand for muskrat is high, and has grown each of the past three years. At the March 2013 West Virginia Trappers Association fur auction, 1,900 muskrat pelts were sold for \$10.19 each. Raccoon pelts were \$15.

An area fur buyer listed his December prices for finished fur. (Finished furs are those that are skinned, scraped and dried.) Bobcat pelts are bringing \$75-80, red fox \$40, coyotes \$20-25 and beaver \$21-26.

Trapping furbearers has been an element of our culture since prehistoric times. Man used pit traps, snares, dead falls and nets to capture animals for fur, food, bedding, clothing and shelter for most of human history. Trapping led to the western expansion during colonial days in America. Obviously, the need for using furbearers for food and shelter has passed (for most cultures), but apparently there is still a fashion demand for fur.

When I was a kid, back in the 1950s, I had several friends who ran trap lines before they caught the morning school bus. After school, they'd go home and scrape and stretch their hides.

One of the benefits of trapping was, and still is, the knowledge gained about animals, and their habitats. If you wanted to learn about wetlands, one great way was to follow a trapper into the muskrat marshes. As a college wildlife student, I read a classic book ("Of Men and Muskrats") written by Iowa wildlife professor **Dr. Paul Errington**. It was the definitive text on the ecology of muskrats and marshes.

Trapping furbearers does create an economic incentive to manage their populations. Even so, furbearers are facing three major issues. Habitat loss is critical, especially the loss of wetlands. Regulated trapping does not threaten furbearers, but habitat loss does. Public intolerance is another issue for some furbearers. The loss of traditional trapping has come with human/animal conflicts. Beavers cause flooding in suburban settings, where some towns have eliminated all trapping. Coyotes killing pets, and raccoons taking up residence in buildings and bringing in diseases, are also problems for humans. A third issue for furbearers is animal rightists calling for an end of trapping, when trapping is the only method available to manage furbearer populations.

Modern foothold traps are used to protect endangered species. Examples where this has been done, or is being done, are to protect pitcher plants by trapping beaver, protect Allegheny wood rats by trapping raccoons, protect prairie chickens by trapping coyotes, and protect whooping cranes by trapping coyotes and red fox.

We also use trapping in various restoration programs, not the least of which has been the reintroduction of river otters in 18 states. Between 1984 and 1997, 284 river otters were trapped, then released in various locations in West Virginia. Today, we have a thriving population of otters that would not have been possible without the use of specially designed foothold traps.

### GO FISH! (W.VA. DNR)

#### Monongahela River

Sauger and walleye usually begin feeding at dusk in the tailwaters but will be active during the day when the water is turbid. They will also concentrate at the mouths of larger tributaries, such as Buffalo, Paw Paw and Pricketts creeks. Jigs with minnows are always good baits, but 3-inch plastic grubs will also be productive. Muskies can be caught by trolling large crank baits along the shoreline throughout the river or casting from shore in the Morgantown area.

#### Cheat Lake

The winter boat ramp at the Cheat Lake Park is open. Water levels can fluctuate 13 feet until March 30. Channel catfish can be caught at Cheat Lake Park when ice melts. Radio telemetry tracking of walleye shows they are concentrated in the lake upstream of Sunset Beach and move up the lake during high flows. Canoeists can launch at the Ices Ferry Bridge Public Access Site and fish for yellow perch around the bridges.

#### Tygart Lake

The lake is about 50 feet below the summer level and falling slowly. This is a good time of the year to fish for walleyes if the lake is not ice covered. Walleye can be at any depth but will move into shallow water to feed at dusk. Walleye have started moving through the dam during the recent high flows. Walleye fishing is best during higher flows (1,500 to 5,000 cubic feet per second) and trout fishing is best at low flows (less than 1,000 cfs). Call 304-265-5953 for daily lake and tailwater conditions.

#### Stonecoal Lake

The lake is at winter pool and was frozen this past week. You may be able to fish today if the ice melts.

#### Stonewall Jackson

The lake is at winter pool and was frozen this past week. You may be able to fish today if the ice melts. Before heading to the lake, call 304-269-7463.

#### Sutton

## Budget steps into a puddle

Tying draw on Rainy Day Fund to pay raises a slippery slope

The state finally popped open its umbrella.

But the last time we looked it wasn't really raining.

Last week, Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin announced his budget proposal will tap the state's Rainy Day Fund.

The actual draw from the emergency fund will be about \$83.8 million.

"This is a year of tough financial choices for our state. Our budget is strained," Tomblin said in his annual State of the State Address.

The administration will also sweep up leftover money in agency accounts; divert some specific tax and fee revenues into the general fund; and impose another 7.5 percent budget cut on most agencies, with some exemptions, including public schools; and only a 3.75 percent budget cut for higher education.

Balancing this proposed budget in total will call for about \$148.7 million in "one-time" moves, including that draw off the Rainy Day Fund.

To the governor's credit, he has consistently been a fiscal conservative throughout his years in public service, who draws the line on spending money we don't have.

Also on the positive side of his fiscal ledger, he compromised on further budget cuts to higher education to spare more tuition hikes.

And we are glad to see that he insists these measures he's employing to balance the budget are "one-time" actions.

But that being said, how can such a budget with such tough choices provide pay raises for anyone?

Furthermore, how can pay raises — 2 percent for teachers and school service personnel and an annual \$504 bump up for all state employees — be a one-time cost?

Do teachers, school service personnel and state employees deserve and need a raise?

Absolutely. Anyone who would argue otherwise is being shortsighted.

Finally, when did pay raises constitute an emergency?

Despite the state's Rainy Day Fund being ranked third best in the nation — flexing \$920 million of fiscal muscle — what's to stop such draw downs from becoming a habit?

It's important to note that these raises will increase spending by about \$42 million annually.

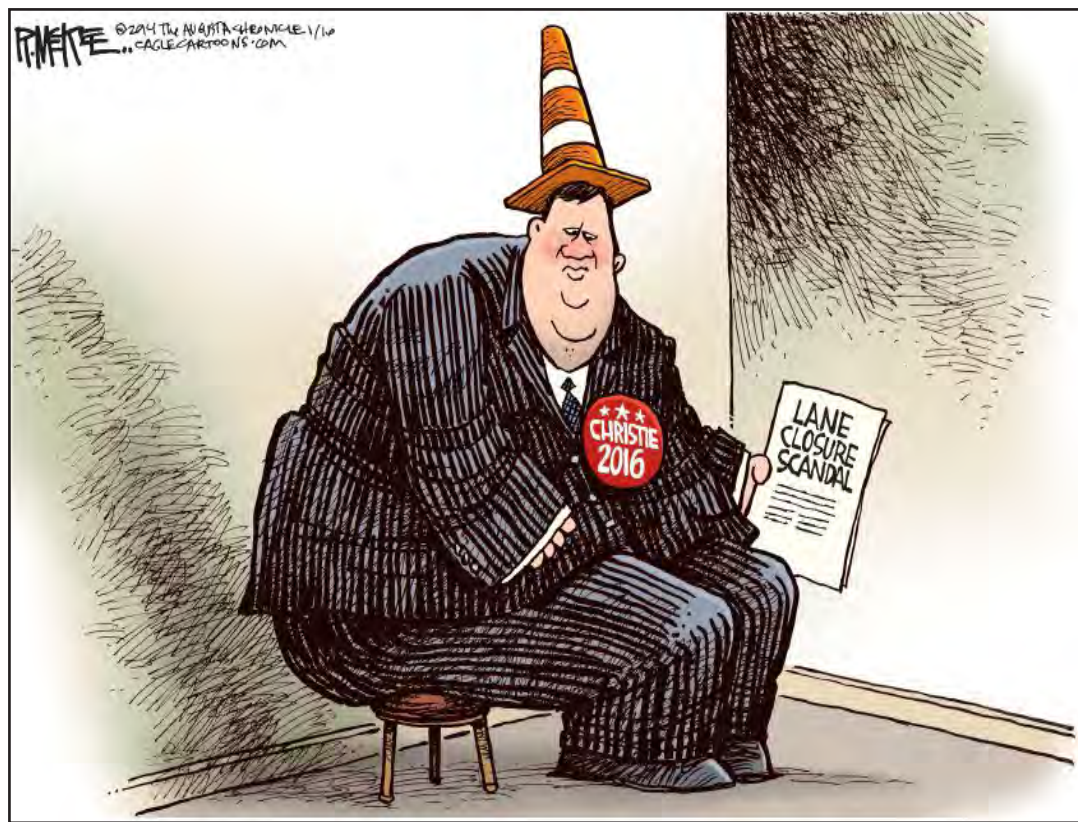
If revenue collections don't turn around how do we cover that \$42 million in other fiscal years?

Our state's revenue collections are already off more than \$60 million this fiscal year, last time we looked.

The additional budget cuts being proposed are in addition to the 7.5 percent cuts most agencies, including higher education, operate under now.

Teachers deserve raises and budgets must be balanced.

But doing so in these circumstance lends neither proposal much traction. Indeed, it puts both on a slippery slope.

## Bitter bill to swallow

The health care system that swallowed a city

Hospital bills will be the death of us yet. The Diane Sawyer nightly news program recently showed how these hospital charges are creating major problems, including personal bankruptcy. I have my own story.

I am a physician. For my entire professional career, I was a hospital-based, salaried, clinical pathologist. A move from the University of Pittsburgh Medical Center (UPMC) was occasioned by my reluctance to turn our laboratory into a corporation, billing patients for our services. The department found a willing faculty member and did that. I left UPMC and went to WVU Hospital (WVUH).

In 2009, I had a non-threatening heart arrhythmia (episodic rapid heart beat).

Because WVUH had a long wait for the procedure, I went to UPMC. The procedure worked well. I was on the X-ray table for one and a half hours and had an overnight hospital stay.

**The city of Pittsburgh has a lawsuit pending to change UPMC's "nonprofit" status to a "profit" status. No wonder, the city estimates that \$20 million is being lost in Pittsburgh's property and employee taxes, through UPMC's nonprofit status.**

The sticker shock was the bill for \$53,252.75. Medicare paid \$8,318.33. I had \$100 co-pay and that with Medicare's payment was accepted as a complete payment. I asked for and received an itemized bill.

Even as a physician, I was not familiar with many charges, however one item stood out. I take an anti-depressant Sertraline (Zoloft). I was given one 100mg tablet on the morning after surgery. It was billed for \$48. A generic form costs about 48 cents.

Some complain about an aspirin tablet costing \$1 or slightly more in the hospital setting. Drugs in the hospital require more than going to a local pharmacy and buying, for example, a bottle of 100 aspirin tablets for about \$1.

Hospitals must maintain their own pharmacy. Doctors order the drug and Nurses transmit the order to the hospital pharmacy. The pill(s) are delivered to the nurse's station and the nurse administers the pill(s) to the patient.

Nurses then chart their administration to the patient. A \$1 plus charge is not unreasonable for an aspirin tablet, but somehow it seems \$47.52, is an unreasonable charge for my one Zoloft tablet. There were many other excesses.

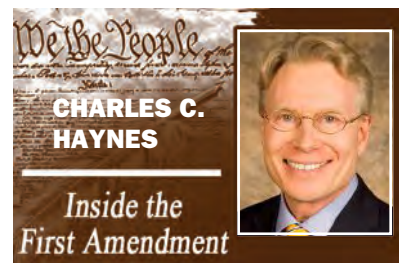
Time magazine in the March 4, 2013, issue, devoted the whole magazine to an article by Steven Brill, entitled, "Bitter Pill."

It's a long article, but a worthy read. He lauded Medicare, in that they make a serious attempt to determine the actual costs and have a low overhead — 3 percent to 4 percent when compared to insurance companies, which have up to 20 percent plus overhead.

Brill's article was not well received by the hospital industry. An article rebutting his article appeared in the Wall Street Journal. The author of that, Holeman Jenkins, agreed that hospital bills do not make sense, but he points out, "hospitals collect only 18 percent of what they pretend to bill" (my emphasis).

## In 2014, let's free faithful across globe

It's ANYTHING BUT a happy New Year for Christian pastor Saeed Abedini, an American citizen who has spent the past 12 months in an Iranian prison because of his faith.

In December 2012, the Idaho minister was visiting his native Iran to help start an orphanage when he was arrested for "undermining the Iranian government," according to the American Center for Law and Justice, a legal group working on Abedini's behalf.

Despite torture, denial of medical care, and a painful separation from his wife and two small children, Pastor Abedini steadfastly refuses to renounce his faith — a condition reportedly set by the Iranian authorities for his release.

Abedini's case has received media attention and high-profile support from many sources, including the White House and Billy Graham (thus far to no avail). But hundreds of other prisoners of conscience — people of many faiths — languish in jail cells across the world largely unknown and unheralded.

Last month, the plight of people imprisoned for practicing their faith got some much-needed attention in a report entitled "Freedom of Religion or Belief" issued by Human Rights Without Frontiers, an international advocacy group with offices and affiliates throughout the world.

The report highlights 24 countries that arrested and jailed people in 2013 for violating laws that prohibit freedom of religion. Five nations — China, Eritrea, Iran, North Korea and South Korea — are cited as "countries of particular concern" with large numbers of prisoners of religious conscience.

The dismal human rights records of totalitarian regimes like China and Iran are, of course, well known. In China, for example, members of "house churches" are routinely harassed and often arrested.

Iran oppresses all minority religious groups, but gives special attention to Baha'is — a religious tradition condemned by the government as heretical and dangerous. More than 100 Baha'is are in Iranian prisons.

It's somewhat surprising and disappointing, however, to find South Korea — a democratic country and close American ally — high on the list of countries denying religious freedom.

According to the report, 599 young South Korean Jehovah's Witnesses were serving 18-month prison sentences in 2013 for conscientious objection to military service.

An astonishing 17,549 Witnesses have been sentenced to a combined total of 34,100 years in prison for refusing to perform military service.

Behind the mind-numbing statistics, of course, are individual human beings — each one with a heartbreaking story of being forced to choose between upholding their faith and going to prison.

Akemanjiang, to cite just one example, is a Muslim in the Aqsu district of China arrested in 2008 for not following government policy requiring restaurants to stay open during the month of Ramadan. For this simple act of conscience, he remains in prison to this day.

Akemanjiang, Saeed Abedini, and the hundreds of other prisoners of conscience urgently need Americans to do at least two things:

First, urge the American government to move religious freedom higher on the list of priorities in our dealings with other nations. Where the United States has leverage we should use it to make the case for liberty of conscience.

And second, call attention to the imprisoned so that they cannot be forgotten. By shining the spotlight of public awareness on the plight of people of faith, Americans can hold these governments accountable — and embarrass them into releasing those they hold captive.

In 2014, let's resolve to do whatever we can to free the faithful.

## Lot of trouble with dynasties in U.S. politics

**LIZ CHENEY**, daughter of former Vice President Dick Cheney, recently announced that she was giving up her campaign to unseat an incumbent U.S. senator in her father's home state of Wyoming. Her campaign had angered many as she had sauntered from her longtime home state of Virginia to Wyoming.

She is not unique. Today in America and around the world, families cling to power, passing the baton from one generation to another or from spouse to spouse.

We have had two Bushes in the White House and one in the Florida governor's mansion. More may be coming. Soon the United States could experience another run at the presidency by former President Clinton's spouse, Hillary. And there has been talk that Chelsea, their daughter, could consider a run for Congress in the future.

There also have been many dynasties that have not made it to the White House but have dominated state legislatures or state congressional delegations; think of the Udalls and Sununus.

The rest of the world is also afflicted. Out of the 1.3 billion people in India, it seems there is only one family that can run the country, the Gandhis. Surely India does not lack talent. In India's neighbor, Pakistan (population 190 million), the Bhuttos have dominated the landscape: Father Zulfikar was hanged by the military, his daughter Benazir fell victim to assassins, her husband, who became president, served out his term in disrepute. Their son is now at the helm of the family's political party.

The British seem to have avoided this fate, perhaps because they have a genuine monarchy. The French too. Our Canadian neighbors have proved not to be immune, though, despite their fondness for the British monarchy. Former Prime Minister Pierre Trudeau's son has assumed the reins of his father's Liberal Party, although he has run into some criticism for smoking marijuana while a sitting member of Parliament (maybe he did not inhale).

There are institutionalized republican monarchies. Bashar Assad took over when his father died; never mind that he was only 34 and the constitution (yes Syria has a constitution) stipulated that one had to be at least 40 to be eligible. Not a problem. Parliament quickly convened and magically the age limit was reduced to, not 30, not 35, but to 34 exactly. As a friend of mine remarked then, it would have been easier to simply change Bashar's age; why go to the trouble of convening parliament?

As for Egypt, among the reasons the people rebelled in 2011 was the fear that Hosni Mubarak, despite opposition from many quarters, including the army, planned to have his son, Gamal, succeed him. And, of course, there's Saddam Hussein and his sons, Uday and Qusai. Nor should we forget Moammar Gadhafi, whose sons occupied all levels of power in Libya.

In democracies, family control of political power is a real problem. In the age of multiple and diverse sources of news, information and ads, name recognition matters a great deal. The Hillarys and Chelseas and Georges and Jebbs tend to emerge as front-runners and suck up a great deal of air and contributions in political campaigns because of name recognition. They do not have to go to the trouble of introducing themselves to the electorate the old-fashioned way.

Hence, dynasties discourage and handicap newcomers. In a country of 300 million Americans, there are many who are perfectly capable of executing the responsibilities of elected office. Some do get elected but are often sidelined when it comes to the most visible races.

The most bizarre of family dynasties is North Korea's Kims. North Korea is owned and operated by the Kims. The third Kim to lead the nation has just distinguished himself by having his uncle executed. He had good reasons, we're told, including the uncle's failure to clap heartily for his leader. Let us just hope that when a new Kim assumes power, the American president is not a Clinton who will have defeated another Bush for the chance to live in the hereditary White House.

They say some of this water is recycled but really it is just re-used until it is too toxic to handle.

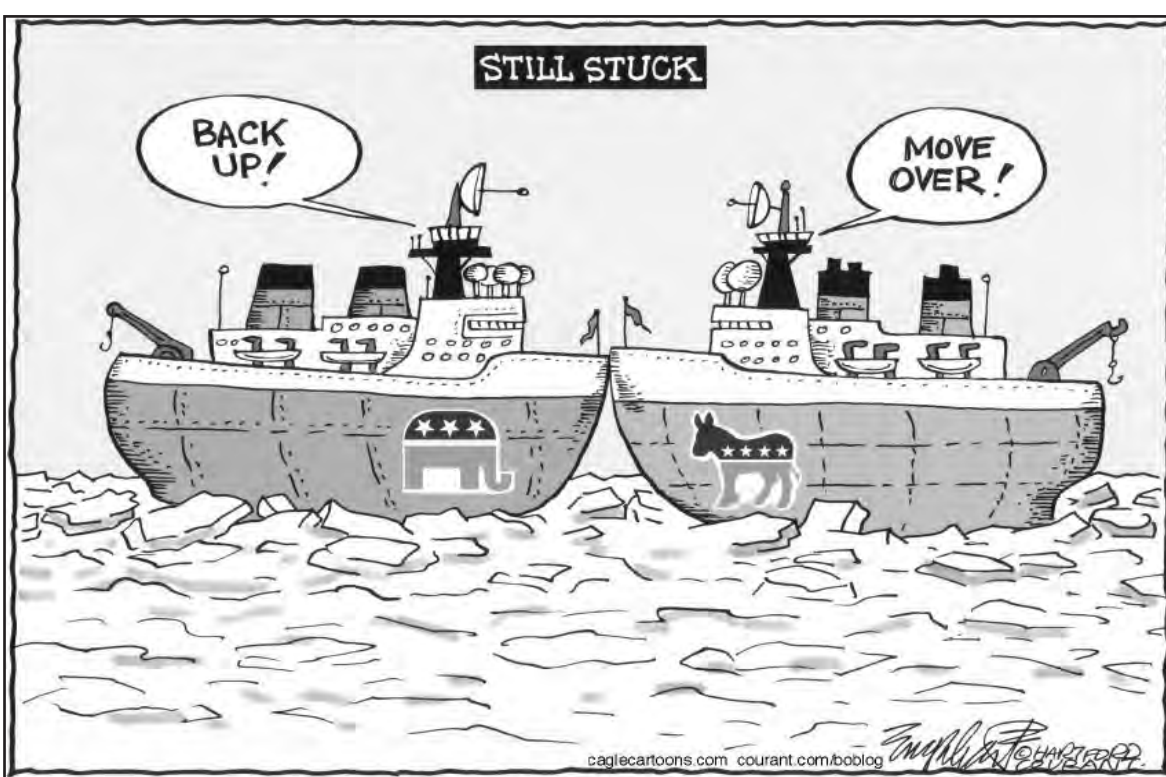
Any attempt to filter it just consumes more water, and it amazes me how reckless we are being by allowing this industry a free hand with our fresh water supply.

bill," 18 percent comes to \$9,585, rather close to what UPMC settled for (recall Medicare paid \$8,318.33.) — Interesting.

Brill cites example after example of individuals who are forced to pay, "pretend bills."

Health care bankruptcy now leads the bankruptcy list — any wonder: Brill offered suggestions — tax the hospital profit 75 percent and lower, not raise, the age of Medicare eligibility.

What changed in the UPMC system from when I left to now, being charged such an outlandish bill? It turns out a lot. UPMC now owns all Pittsburgh hospitals, save two.

They have other business ventures, such as doctors' practices, retirement homes, sell health insurance and most recently are building a practice hockey rink in conjunction with the city's NHL hockey team, the Penguins.

They will have a sports medicine complex in that facility. They also recently purchased a \$50 million corporate jet. Their CEO Jeffrey Romoff makes \$5 million, but that salary is linked to the "success of their investments."

It is the largest employer in the state, with more than 50,000 employees. The annual budget for 2012 was \$11.87 billion, according to the Becker hospital report, making UPMC the largest, "nonprofit" hospital system in the United States.

Their "profit" was hard to pin down with accuracy on the

Internet, but it is in the range of hundreds of millions of dollars.

The city of Pittsburgh has a lawsuit pending to change UPMC's "nonprofit" status to a "profit" status. No wonder, the city estimates that \$20 million is being lost in Pittsburgh's property and employee taxes through UPMC's nonprofit status.

In response to the lawsuit, UPMC alleges they have no employees. They have stated the UPMC employees are paid by the various entities they own, but not by them.

The deeper story is the out-of-sight expenditures for all of health care in our nation. We spend twice as much for our medical care than any other industrial nation in the world, which provide universal health coverage, yet we do not cover at least one-sixth of our population. Are we healthier? We rank around 36th in the world in health parameters, such as longevity, live child birth, etc.

There are many other examples of health care excesses, drugs, doctors fees, lab testing, health insurance companies, unhealthy habits (fast foods), etc. Currently health care accounts for more than 17 percent of our GDP.

It's unsustainable and rising. Up to debate is if and how the Affordable Care Act will reverse this. Unchecked we are heading for health care accounting for 20 percent of GDP.

## Pope Francis continues to afflict the comfortable

**FOR ALL HIS HUMBLE CHARM**, Pope Francis has been getting under the thin skin of some rich members of his flock.

As F. Scott Fitzgerald remarked, the rich are different from you and me. They expect deference and coddling, especially for their charitable deeds, and when they don't get it, they take their riches and go home. At least that's the message one GOP high roller has sent to the American hierarchy.

Kenneth Langone, the billionaire cofounder of Home Depot and a major Republican backer, has insinuated that Francis should lighten up on his critiques of the corrupting influence of wealth, the problems of inequality and trickle-down economic theories that too often do little to aid the poor.

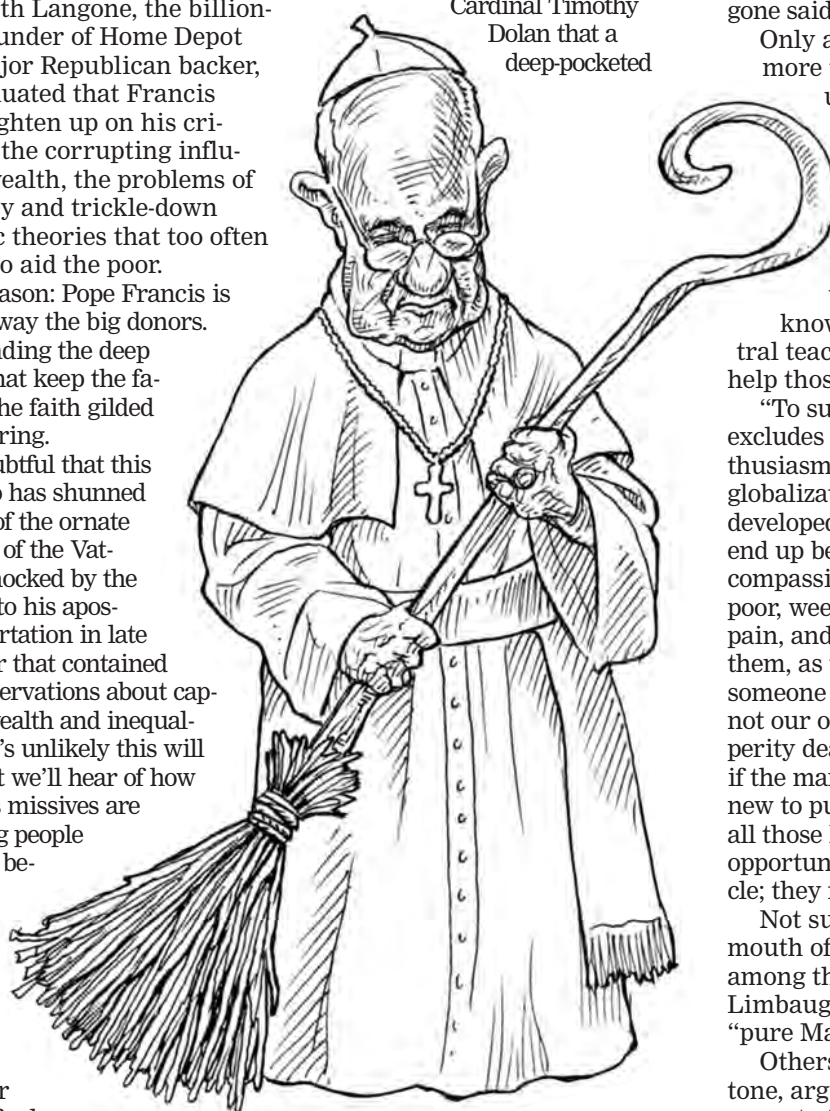
The reason: Pope Francis is scaring away the big donors. He's offending the deep pockets that keep the facades of the faith gilded and glittering.

It's doubtful that this pope, who has shunned so many of the ornate trappings of the Vatican, is shocked by the backlash to his apostolic exhortation in late November that contained sharp observations about capitalism, wealth and inequality. And it's unlikely this will be the last we'll hear of how the pope's missives are unnerving people who have become used to the protective screen of entitlement wealth affords.

Langone is leading the drive to raise \$180 million for the renovation of St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York. He told CNBC that he warned Cardinal Timothy Dolan that a deep-pocketed



philanthropist is hesitant to make a seven-figure donation because he's offended by the Holy Father's views.

You can't get any more petulant, or, shall we say "holier than thou," than that.

"I've told the cardinal, 'Your Eminence, this is one more hurdle I hope we don't have to deal with. You want to be careful about generalities. Rich people in one country don't act the same as rich people in another country,'" Langone said he explained to Dolan.

Only a small portion of the more than 200-page papal document "Joy of the Gospel" dealt with economics. But the pope raised the issue of how inequality can isolate people and harden their hearts to what any Christian

knows is among Jesus' central teachings: That we must help those in need.

"To sustain a lifestyle which excludes others, or to sustain enthusiasm for that selfish ideal, a globalization of indifference has developed," Frances wrote. "(We) end up being incapable of feeling compassion at the outcry of the poor, weeping for other people's pain, and feeling a need to help them, as though all this were someone else's responsibility and not our own. The culture of prosperity deadens us; we are thrilled if the market offers us something new to purchase. In the meantime all those lives stunted for lack of opportunity seem a mere spectacle; they fail to move us."

Not surprisingly, the crude mouth of Rush Limbaugh was among the first to spit back. Limbaugh called Francis' views "pure Marxism."

Others took a condescending tone, arguing that Francis is ignorant of American capitalism.

Catholic Rep. Paul Ryan said: "The guy is from Argentina, they haven't had real capitalism in Argentina. They have crony capitalism in Argentina. They don't have a true free enterprise system."

Francis is doing what a religious leader is supposed to do: Challenge followers to examine the lives they are leading. The fact that he's broadening the conversation to include aspects of life that go beyond throwing a few shillings into a collection plate is a good thing.

He's framing the message of the church in a modern context: Discussing inequality, the legal and social institutions that exclude the poor and that permit the wealthy to be indifferent.

The problem conservatives have with the pope is that what he's saying threatens well-codified systems of privilege.

But Pope Francis has long been about challenging power, esteem and privilege.

As a bishop and then archbishop in Argentina, Francis made priests live in the Buenos Aires slums. As pope, he's been known to attend daily mass, seated alone at the back pews, with the many domestic help that work at the Vatican.

He has literally followed the example of Christ, washing the feet of criminals, and has stroked and consoled those suffering from horrendous disease.

Pope Francis isn't criticizing the wealthy for their money. He's questioning the morality of ever-widening inequality and the way systems develop to shield some people's wealth at the expense of opportunity for others.

It's a far more insightful, a more God-filled message, than his critics are willing to hear.

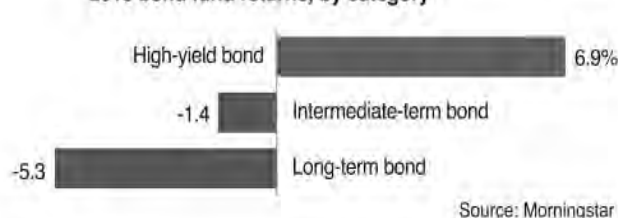

LOCKED IN

Just like homeowners rushing to lock in a low mortgage rate, companies hustled to borrow last year. Companies with poor credit ratings were particularly eager. They issued \$507 billion in junk bonds, a record high, according to Standard & Poor's. Investors gobbled them up, attracted by the higher yields that junk bonds pay compared with high-quality bonds. High-yield bond mutual funds drew \$2.2 billion in net investment through November of 2013, according to the most recent data from Morningstar. It was one of the few bond fund categories in which investors added more money than they pulled out.

HOT AND NOT

Stocks have never been this popular. Last year, investors poured a net \$352 billion into stock mutual funds and exchange-traded funds, according to TrimTabs Investment Research. That's a record high, topping the \$324 billion mark set in 2000 when the dot-com bubble was at its height.

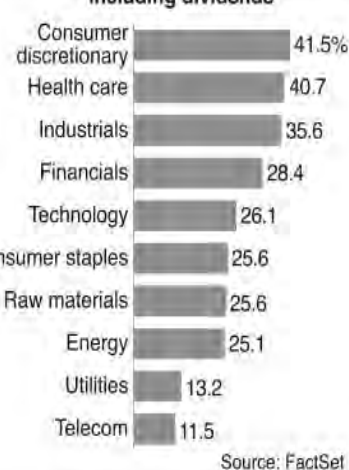
At the same time, bonds have never been this scorned. Investors pulled a net \$86 billion from bond mutual funds and ETFs, topping the prior record of \$62 billion in 1994. Investors have pulled more money from bond funds than they've put in for seven straight months, the first time that has happened since 2000.



10s ALL AROUND

How good was the stock market last year? All 10 sectors that make up the Standard & Poor's 500 index returned at least 10 percent, including dividends. The only other time that has happened was in 1995, according to U.S. Trust Chief Market Strategist Joseph Quinlan. The broad-based gains make last year's run look much different than the dot-com bubble when the winners were big but few. In 1999, for example, the S&P 500 rose 19.5 percent, but more than half the stocks in the index fell.

His insights: Stick with U.S. stocks rather than shifting to Europe.

The U.S. stock market has stuttered at the start of the New Year after closing out 2013 at record levels. The Standard & Poor's 500 surged almost 30 percent, its best return since 1997, as consumer discretionary stocks led gains. That sector could again be one of the best performers of 2014 as the economy improves, says Dan Morris, the global investment strategist at TIAA-CREF. Morris says he still prefers investing in the sectors that will benefit from an improving U.S. economy and rising consumer confidence.

**What are your favorite sectors?**  
My two favorites would be probably industrials and consumer discretionary stocks.

Industrials should have an improving growth picture in the U.S. and a pickup in trade, with a bit more growth coming out of Europe. You should see more industrial business activity in general.

There's a whole lot of pent up demand even though the recovery has gone on a long time, people haven't been able to buy what they have wanted to buy.

Generally, you have improving trends in income and improving trends in the unemployment rate, and so on.

In terms of confidence you can tie it back to the housing market. Let's say you own your home, if you know home prices are falling you'll spend less. If you know that home prices are rising, you'll feel richer and so you're likely to spend more.

**Which industries should investors avoid?**

I don't see any reason to be defensive — utilities and consumer staples — the high-dividend yielding stocks are relatively expensive. You may get an extra percentage point in yield, but if valuations normalize you're going to get hurt.

People were looking for income in stocks, so they bid up the price of anything with a dividend. But people have less reason to pay for the income now that interest rates are going up.

**Are stocks outside the U.S. more attractively valued after the big gains for the U.S. market last year?**

Even though the U.S. did outperform, I think there are reasons to stick with the U.S.

I'm not saying that European stocks aren't going to be OK, I think they'll be fine, but U.S. stocks are going to do better.

When economic growth is really high, between Europe and the U.S. there's not that much difference, it's great for everybody. But when it gets tough, like it is now, a company has got to increase its earnings one way or the other.

It's just a lot more difficult for a lot of European companies to do because of labor regulations and product regulations. That matters a lot more when revenue growth isn't that high.

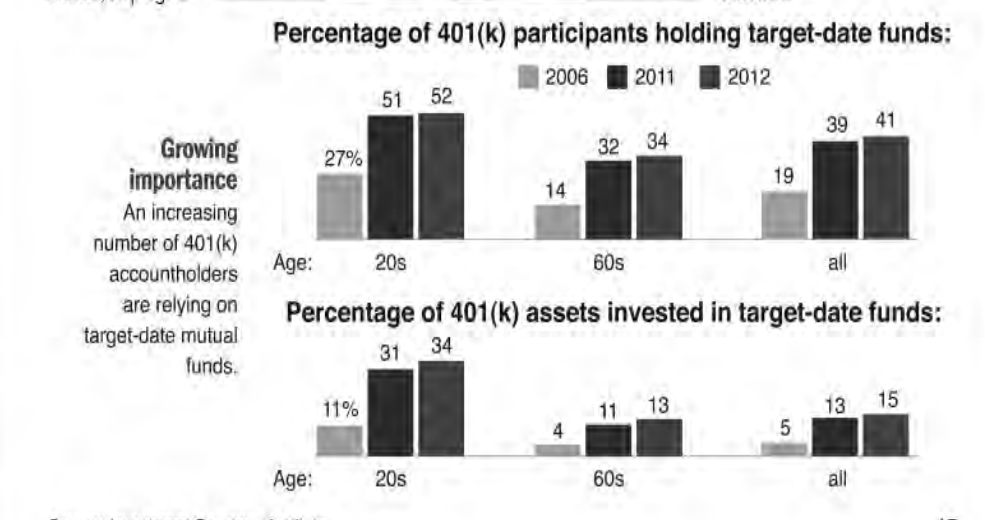
## On target

There was a time when investors had to figure out for themselves how much of their 401(k) retirement plan to put into stocks or bonds. Now, more are letting a target-date mutual fund take care of that, particularly younger workers.

Target-date funds are intended to be all that a saver will need for their nest egg through retirement. Investors pick a fund designed for the year that they hope to retire. When that date is far off, the fund owns mostly stocks, hoping to reap the strong long-term returns that stocks can provide. As the hoped-for retirement year gets closer, target-date funds rely more on bonds, which carry less risk of a sharp drop in price.

According to a recent report from the Investment Company Institute, 41 percent of 401(k) accountholders had money in a target date fund at the end of 2012. That's up from 39 percent in 2011 and 19 percent in 2006.

Below is snapshot that shows younger workers are more likely to own a target date fund that represents a larger percentage of their 401(k) balance.



Company Spotlight **Abercrombie boosts outlook**

Coming off a tough year when its stock fell 31 percent, shares of Abercrombie & Fitch soared 12 percent Friday as the company boosted its full-year adjusted earnings forecast.

On Thursday Abercrombie & Fitch lifted its adjusted earnings outlook to a range of \$1.55 to \$1.65 per share. It previously predicted \$1.40 to \$1.50 per share. The outlook does not include charges related to the company's restructuring plans and other items.



Analysts polled by FactSet expect earnings of \$1.48 per share.

Adrienne Tennant of Janney Capital Markets upgraded the retailer's rating to "Buy" from "Neutral" and raised her price target to \$49 from \$34. In a note to clients, the analyst said that the upgrade was due to several factors, including the company's cost-cutting efforts, improving domestic and international sales and its desirable brands.

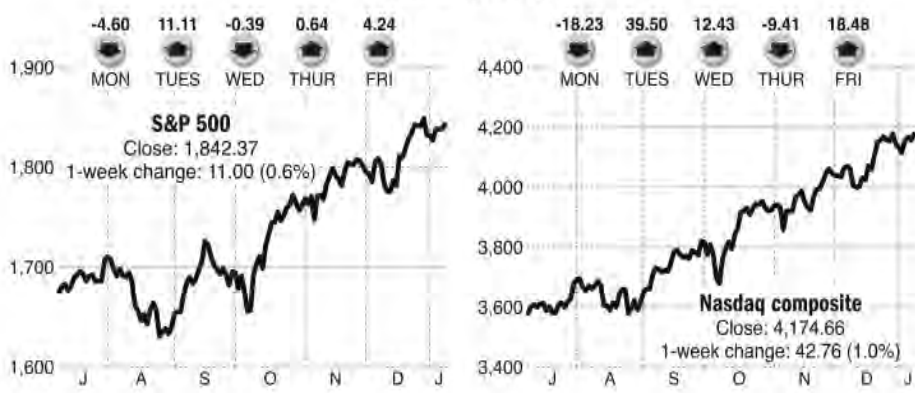

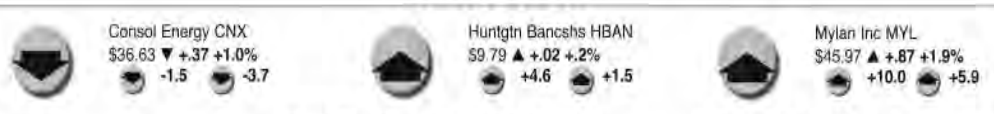

Navigational Bronchoscopy is a technology which combines electromagnetic navigation with real-time 3D CT images,

enabling physicians to biopsy and treat masses in distant regions of the lungs. This equipment will detect tumors of the lung and diagnose lung cancer. Many standard bronchoscopes cannot find or reach tumors located in the periphery of the lungs, where smaller bronchi are not wide enough to permit passage of a normal scope. But with navigational bronchoscopy, physicians can find tumors, take a biopsy and administer treatment. Additional funds received for the Navigational Bronchoscopy project will be used to purchase a therapeutic scope to accompany the navigational bronchoscopy technology. To date, \$162,000 has been raised.

3-D printing breaks out of niche

LAS VEGAS — Some of the oddest items on display this week at International CES gadget show were edible, origami-like sculptures made of sugar, their shapes so convoluted as to baffle the eye.

The treats are one of many signs that we'll all be getting a taste of 3-D printing soon — and the phenomenon won't be relegated to the realm of engineers and tech enthusiasts.

The sugar sculptures are the output of the ChefJet Pro, the first commercial, kitchen-ready food printer. It looks like an oven, and deposits sugar layer by layer in a tray, then melts the parts intended for the sculpture with water so they solidify much like sugar in a bowl will harden with moisture.

Ink can be selectively added to the water so the sculptures come out in full color — a feature sure to set the minds of wedding and party planners spinning. Next to the geometric sculptures was a wedding cake supported by a delicate lattice-work tower of sugar that would be nearly impossible to make by conventional means.

Oh, and the printer can print in chocolate too.

3D Systems Inc., a Rock Hill, S.C., company, expects to sell the full-color printer for about \$100,000 in the latter half of this year, and a monochrome version for half that price.

Last year, there were only a handful of 3-D printing companies at the gadget show. This year, there were 30, and the organizers had to turn others away because they couldn't fit them in.

The 3-D printing area of the show floor drew dense crowds that gawked at the printers and their creations, which ranged from toys to tea cups to iPhone cases.

Melissa Spencer, a jewelry designer from Los Angeles, was at the show to look for a printer: 3-D printers have been used in jewelry-making for a long time, but high prices and poor resolution have limited their use. With prices down and output quality up, it's now possible for an independent designer to buy her own printer, Spencer said.

The printers focus bright ultraviolet light into liquid resin, setting it. That takes time. One printer maker cited 7 hours for a batch of five rings. The plastic pieces are then used

to create molds for molten silver, gold or platinum.

Spencer is now toying with the idea of abandoning the reuse of molds, and instead using the power of a 3-D printer to make every piece a one-off, unique design, customized to the buyer. It helps that she can show the plastic prototypes to the customer before casting.

With 3-D printing, "we're moving to a world of mass customization," said Shawn Dubravac, an analyst for the Consumer Electronics Association, which puts on the show. What started with custom-printed t-shirts at la CafePress can now happen in all kinds of industries, he added. It's still a small field, though. He expects that just under 100,000 3-D printers will be sold in 2014.

AT&T offers Beats Music family plan

LAS VEGAS — AT&T said it will start offering customers a subscription to streaming service Beats Music in a package that gives as many as five family members unlimited streaming and song downloading for \$15 a month.

The offer, a good deal if even two people use it, is an attempt to bring down the cost of music for families that pay AT&T for cellphone service. It's part of Beats' major launch strategy since its headphone maker parent, Beats Elec-

tronics, bought streaming service MOG in 2012.

Beats Electronics is backed by hip-hop mogul Dr. Dre and former music executive Jimmy Iovine.

Beats Music works on the MOG platform, though the look and emphasis on human-curated playlists and recommendations are different.

With plans to add future promotional tie-ins with the popular headphone line, Beats Music would compete with services like Spotify, Rhapsody and Rdio. The family plan has a 90-day free trial but no

free ad-supported version, unlike Spotify.

Beats Music CEO Ian Rogers said the company decided to launch its service with AT&T rather than do an immediate tie-in with a headphone purchase to reach the widest possible audience.

David Christopher, chief marketing officer for Dallas-based AT&T Inc., said the company chose to partner with Beats Music because of a longstanding association with Iovine and the headphone line. It was also a way to get involved in transforming MOG.

## Toboggan Festival returns Saturday to Chestnut Ridge Park

**W**hile the sledding hill is open throughout the winter season at Chestnut Ridge Park, there's only one time of year in which you'll find a reindeer rodeo. Or pin the toboggan on the snowman. Or the toboggan limbo.

That day is Saturday when the park will host its annual Toboggan Festival, a three-hour sledding extravaganza featuring games and prizes for those with some serious sled-riding skills.

From 1-4 p.m. Saturday, families are invited to the slippery slope, said Justine McCoy, Chestnut Ridge Park superintendent, to compete for the top toboggan title, enjoy the wintry weather and then warm up with a hot chocolate.

McCoy and Judy Fearer, office manager at the park, are expecting at least a couple hundred people to the annual event which has been going on about two decades now.

"It's been 20 years or better at least," said Don Fearer, maintenance supervisor at the park.

And while none of them are exactly sure who started the whole thing, they make sure the Toboggan Festival is an ongoing event because it's pretty popular.

"There are lots of families that come year after year," Judy Fearer said "Their children are bringing their children now."

For the purposes of the festival, visitors may bring any type of sled they want. Traditionally, though, a toboggan is a specific type of sled with a curl at the front. While researching it, McCoy said she discovered Native Americans used them to haul their game through the snow.

"They were made of poles or bark tied together by leather thongs," McCoy said. "The Inuit (Esquimos) made toboggans from whalebone. The word 'toboggan' comes from the Algonquian word, 'odabaggan.'"

But all sleds are welcome on Saturday. In the past, families have brought everything from traditional toboggans to inner tubes. And if you need a sled, McCoy said the park has some available to rent.

Winners of the three games — pin the toboggan on the snowman, reindeer rodeo and the limbo — will be awarded Snow-Boogie sleds and Chestnut Ridge Park merchandise.

In addition to the games, participants can sip on some hot chocolate and gather around the warming hut.

While the hot chocolate is free to participants, there will also be coffee, pepperoni rolls and pizza available for purchase.

Judy Fearer said it's tricky to plan the festival

# HBO's 'True Detective' detects a truly dark tale

NEW YORK — A number of things set "True Detective" apart.

For starters, this new HBO drama series, which premieres at 9 p.m. today, stars Matthew McConaughey and Woody Harrelson, a pair of actors known not for TV but for features (Harrelson's "Cheers" run ended 21 years ago). And they tackle, in effect, not one but two roles apiece: Former Louisiana State Police detectives interrogated in 2012 about a homicide case we see them working, in flashback, in 1995.

The series was written in its entirety by its creator, Nic Pizzolatto, a novelist whose only prior TV credit was a brief turn on AMC's "The Killing."

One other thing distinguishes "True Detective." Not only does the writing draw upon a singular vision, but so does its fulfillment: The entire eight-episode season was stewarded by just one director.

Such a solo act is virtually unprecedented for a TV drama series. But it made sense for "True Detective," said Cary Joji Fukunaga, who landed the job.

"When you have one person guiding the vision all the way through, and gaining the trust of the actors, the chain isn't broken from one episode to another," he said. "It all just flows."

Fukunaga, 36, made the 2011 film "Jane Eyre," and wrote as well as directed "Sin Nombre," which won the 2009 directing prize at the Sundance Film Festival.

He began gearing up for what would be 101 break-neck days of shooting of "True Detective" back in August 2012.

The tale stems from a ritualistic murder of a woman found nude, mutilated and crowned with deer antlers in the middle of nowhere in 1995. This ghoulish crime, the hand-

work of a serial killer, is eventually solved by Detectives Rust Cohle (McConaughey) and Martin Hart (Harrelson).

Or was it? Pressed by investigators in 2012, the two former partners are forced to relive the case, as well as their stormy relationship, amid growing doubt that the right man was charged.

"But the murder mystery

is the least part of the story," Fukunaga said. "To me, what really mattered was these two guys and their journey. The murder case is a foil, a genre-based hook, to get to know them."

The real drama, he said, issues from the conflict both these men have "reconciling who they should be with who they are really are. Some men explore it, while some men prefer to

repress it."

The latter condition applies to Hart, a gregarious chap who jabbars how family will keep a guy grounded while we see, in flashback, this husband and father in a rage beating up someone he finds his mistress "cheating" with.

"Hart represents those men who don't want to ask themselves certain questions, fearing what those questions will reveal," Fukunaga said, "while Cohle can find existence bearable only by defining it."

And defining it in the darkest terms. Cohle dismisses human life as "a jury-rig of presumption and dumb will" to Hart, who only wishes Cohle would spare him the bleak talk.

By 2012, Hart is working in private security. He has lost some hair and added some pounds, along with new layers of denial.

Cohle, who in 1995 still fought to keep his demons in check, is now a scraggly boozehound who boasts of

staying plastered between shifts tending bar. During his interrogation, he chases Lone Star beer with hooch from his pocket flask.

In their respective dual roles, McConaughey and Harrelson are galvanizing.

"But they have very different approaches to acting," said Fukunaga, explaining that McConaughey takes a cerebral, analytical approach — "he's Method. And Woody is completely sensory and moment-to-moment."

On "True Detective," they mesh as smoothly as their characters clash.

"This is a multi-layered police procedural whose truest investigation is into the nature of its two protagonists," said Nic Pizzolatto from his home in Ojai, Calif. "Its best moments come from those men just speaking straight into the camera, or riding in a car together, or when one of them comes to eat dinner at the other's house."

because it's always a little dependent on the weather. Too little snow, it's a no-go. Too much snow or cold, and sledding becomes difficult and uncomfortable.

"If it's a powder type of snow, we need four or five inches," she said.

She's also hoping the weather will hover around the lower 30s.

And while the park will keep all the roads nice and clear, in case of inclement weather — or not enough snow — the alternate date is Jan. 25.

Outside of getting the date right for the weather, there's not much else to

do to plan for the festival, Judy Fearer said. It mainly involves promotion, setting up signs and so forth, McCoy added.

As for the sledding hill, that's all dependent on how much snow comes.

"Mother Nature normally takes care of the sledding hill for us," Judy Fearer said. "If the snow is there, we can do it."

# WWE set to launch own 24/7 network in February

WWE is moving outside the ring to mesh the best of Hulk Hogan, The Rock and John Cena all in place — its own network.

It's time to lay the smack down 24/7.

The WWE Network launches Feb. 24 as a streaming service for \$9.99 per month with a six-month commitment and will include all 12 pay-per-view events.

The network is available on desktops and laptops via WWE.com. WWE Network will also be available through the WWE App on: Amazon's Kindle Fire devices; Android devices such as Samsung Galaxy; iOS devices such as Apple iPad and iPhone; Roku streaming devices; PlayStation 3 and PlayStation 4; and Xbox 360.

"WWE Network will provide transformative growth for our company and unprecedented value for our fans," WWE Chairman and CEO Vince McMahon said Wednesday.

WWE joins the NFL, NHL, NBA and MLB as the latest sports-based organization that has its own around-the-clock network. The network will air original content, including pregame and postgame shows for its flagship "Raw" on Monday nights, classic events, reality shows, documentaries and

other forms of smashmouth programming. The on-demand content is the main selling point for an older audience looking to reconnect with the product.

"We believe that is the future," WWE chief revenue and marketing officer Michelle Wilson said.

Fans can relive matches from the Attitude Era or simply catch up on today's franchise players like Daniel Bryan and C.M. Punk.

From their own home or parts unknown, WWE believes it has the loyal fan base needed to support the project.

Up against the BCS national championship game, Monday's "Raw" averaged a sturdy 4.537 million viewers on USA Network for the three-hour show.

WWE has aired some of its biggest events on PPV dating to The Wrestling Classic on Nov. 7, 1985. WWE's signature WrestleMania show in April drew 1,039,000 buys on pay-per-view, though numbers for the other 11 cards are nowhere near that gaudy number, in part because of the steep price.

The Royal Rumble on Jan. 26 goes for about \$50 on PPV.

George Barrios, WWE's chief strategy and financial officer, said about 800,000 to 1 million homes buy an average of two to three PPVs a year. About 1 million sub-

scribers would allow the network to break even. Barrios said research showed "it's within the realm of possibility" that WWE could have between 2 million and 4 million subscribers.


WWE said it planned to hold the price at \$9.99 even after the initial six-month commitment.

The PPVs are still available in their current format through cable or satellite providers.

"I'm just not convinced the pay-per-view platform is in it for the long term," Wilson said. "It's not the best consumer experience."

"Raw" and "Smackdown" will remain on cable television. "RAW" airs on USA Network and "Friday Night Smackdown" is on SyFy. WWE's TV rights will soon be up for grabs and new deals are expected to be in place by March 4. Encores of those shows, however, will air on the network.

WWE has teased its fans with a network announcement since promotional spots aired in 2011, but nothing ever happened until now, though some programming aired on Hulu and Netflix. Wilson said WWE considered running on an ad-supported network station or as a premium pay channel in a model like HBO before deciding the economic and distribution package it wanted was best suited as a streaming network.

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# Traditional radio still popular as streaming grows, study says

LOS ANGELES — Streaming music apps may be hot these days, but it will be a long time before they top the old-fashioned radio dial.

Traditional AM/FM radio is still the most popular way for people to listen to music, news and talk, even as digital music offers more control and becomes easier to use on the go, according to a study by media agency MediaVest and Clear Channel Media & Entertainment, the nation's biggest radio company.

According to the study, in which 2,000 people in the U.S. were surveyed from April to June, just over half said they listen to regular AM / FM radio at least once a day, more than any other platform.

"New outlets are not coming at a cost to traditional forms of consumption," said Radha Subramanyam, Clear Channel's executive vice president of insights, research and analytics. "Now you have more opportunities to consume content and the overall pie has grown."

Still, it's clear that recent technology has made its mark.

About 24 percent said they watch music videos online every day through services such as YouTube. Streaming AM/FM radio through computers and mobile apps is a factor, at 13 percent and 11 percent, respectively. Customized streaming music, including Pandora, Spotify and Rdio, got about 22 percent, while 14 percent of people use satellite radio. Clear Channel and MediaVest said those services have increased listening overall.

"It's not about cannibalization; it's about growth," said David Shiffman, executive vice president of research at MediaVest.

In the growing digital music industry, Pandora Media Inc. easily beats its rivals, according to the study. More than a third of those surveyed (37 percent) said they used Pandora regularly, compared with 11

percent for Spotify and 10 percent for iHeartRadio. The study also noted that users of Pandora and Spotify were more satisfied with those services than those who access iHeartRadio and other outlets.

Most people listen to more than one platform a day. In fact, 63 percent of teens said they spread their consumption over multiple platforms, more than any other age group.

The study also tried to illustrate how different age groups use audio. Younger listeners see their music choices as a form of self-expression and "social currency," whereas adults are more inclined to see audio as an escape or to focus at work.

The place where traditional and satellite radio really dominate is in the car. That's why services like Pandora and iHeartRadio are trying to get into more automobile models, and Pandora said on Monday that it was starting to play commercials on its in-car version in order to capitalize on this big market.

## Libraries become tech hubs for digitally inclined

MINNEAPOLIS — Ridwa Yakob knew what libraries had: Books.

Then she saw the Teen Tech Center at the Minneapolis Central Library. This digital playground, which opened in 2013, has rows of new computers, iPads, the latest video equipment and even its own soundproof recording studio.

"Growing up, I used to be super into reading. That's what I thought libraries were for," said Yakob, 18, of Minneapolis. Now she's a member of the Teen Tech Squad at the library, helping her peers with all sorts of high-tech resources, learning as she goes. "It gives me access to tools I don't have at home."

Shhhhhhh. You may not know it, but libraries have quietly become community tech hubs where the digital tools go far beyond computer terminals with free Internet. Across the metro area, their offerings are expanding as libraries help patrons tinker with 3-D printers, e-readers and social media. A growing catalog of e-books and e-magazines, combined with other online tools, extend resources far beyond the library walls.

Librarians, once masters of the card catalog, have learned to mine information online, offering help with everything from basic computer skills to Facebook and LinkedIn. When it comes to e-readers, in particular, librarians

ians have become the go-to people for answers.

"We're still teaching literacy. Now it's digital literacy," said Kim Johnson, manager of Anoka County, Minn.'s Rum River Library. Library patrons wouldn't have it any other way.

At the most basic level, library users value Internet access almost as highly as books, according to a 2013 Pew Research Center study. Eighty percent of library-goers surveyed said the ability to borrow books was "very important." A nearly identical amount said free Internet access also was a "very important" library service.

### Teaching tech

The library's role as a tech connection really kicked into gear during the recession, when job seekers needed to brush up on

tech skills, search online for jobs and get help with résumés. Library staff members quickly learned to help set up email and LinkedIn accounts, teach basics of Microsoft Word and Excel, and guide patrons toward the most useful information online.

"If you were laid off in the last few years, you have to apply for unemployment online," said Maureen Gormley, information services manager for the Dakota County, Minn., Libraries. "We're the place to go to learn that and basic skills."

About the same time, e-books hit the virtual shelves. Patrons started walking in with e-readers — and questions.

"They come and ask me for e-book help. They usually end up with a little bit more," Anoka County li-

brary services assistant Andrea Egbert said of the litany of tech-related quandaries that library patrons bring to her. Some walk in with new e-readers, still in the box, unsure how to switch on the devices. Job seekers ask for help formatting résumés. Others ask how to share photos and videos online.

Usually, Egbert knows what to do. If not, well, there's nothing like a question to motivate a librarian to search for answers.

"We all have that thirst for the hunt," she said.

While most library staffs are happy to help with downloading e-books, browsing the Internet and computer literacy, there are limits to a librarian's tech support expertise. If you show up with a hardware problem — your tablet won't turn on or a

screen is cracked — the librarians will likely direct you elsewhere.

"We're not the (Apple) Genius Bar. If somebody drops their iPad in the bathtub, I can't help you," said Ben Trapskin, assistant director for Anoka County Libraries. "We try to focus on how the technology interacts with our resources."

### 'Unseen' libraries

In some cases, technological advances mean less face-to-face interaction at the library. Patrons can download e-books without ever setting foot in their local branch and students can get free homework help by live-chatting with tutors on the library's website.

Rather than lamenting these changes, librarians like Bernie Farrell see them as a way to expand access to information.

"What the library can do for you is not bound by bricks and mortar," said Farrell, senior librarian at the Minneapolis Central Library. "This size of the unseen library is pretty immense."

Despite all of the technological advances, librarians say, there will always be books.

Barbara Stripling, president of the American Library Association, said there is still ample evidence that people largely prefer reading the old-fashioned way, ink on paper.

"We're not throwing away the relationships and the conversations and the reading of printed books," Stripling said. "We are adding on and maybe deepening the reading experience through technology."

## Careful training can solve pet behavior problems

**THE FOLLOWING** reader questions about dog behavior were answered by veterinary behaviorist Dr. Debra Horwitz, of St. Louis, Mo., an editor (with Dr. John Ciribassi and myself) of "Decoding Your Dog" (Houghton Mifflin Harcourt, 2014, \$27) written by members of the American College of Veterinary Behaviorists.

**Q:** Until two weeks ago, our Chihuahua/Terrier rode in the car with no problem. She gets excited when we ask if she wants to go "bye bye," but now she pants as soon as she gets in the car, climbs on our shoulders and yawns a lot. I've tried to take her only for short rides to the park, but her reaction is the same. Any advice? — H.A., Las Vegas, Nev.

**A:** Horwitz said to begin by changing your dog's association with the car. Begin by offering her treats for merely jumping in the car, but go nowhere. Don't even start the engine. Once your dog can do this with no signs of stress, drive a short distance, return home, and offer your dog a meal. The idea is to associate car rides with something your dog likes: Food.

Some tools you could use to ease anxiety include an Adaptil collar, which emits a copy of a calming pheromone, and/or Anxitane, which contains L-Theanine, a calming nutritional supplement.

**Q:** My Australian Shepherd lies on her stomach to have her belly rubbed, then shortly after, she raises a rear leg and starts to hit herself in the head just before her left ear. Is this a nervous tick, or is she trying to tell me something? — C., via cyberspace

**A:** When dogs' bellies are rubbed, it's not unusual for one leg to move back and forth, over and over, "but (what you describe) seems more intense and vigorous," Horwitz said. "It would be interesting to offer much shorter belly rubs, then see if your dog asks for more. Maybe this is like how it's OK to tickle someone for a few seconds, but not for many minutes; it's no longer fun."

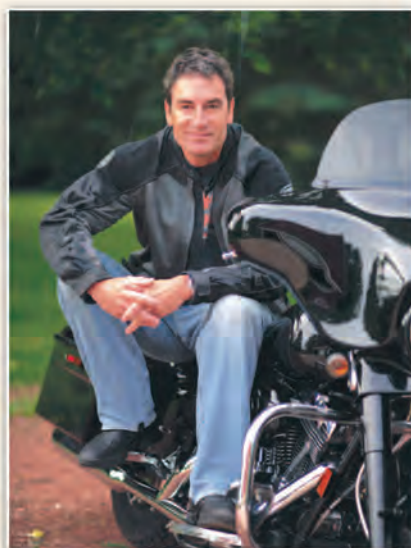
Clearly, you don't think this behavior is normal. If you have a smartphone, videotape the behavior and email it your veterinarian.

## Medication helped by optimism?

### Study: Positivity aids pill's effect

WASHINGTON — Talk about mind over matter: A quirky new study suggests patients' expectations can make a big difference in how they feel after treatment for a migraine.

Boston researchers recruited 66 migraine patients in an attempt to quantify how much of their pain relief came from a medication and how much was due to what's called the placebo effect, the healing power of positive belief.

More than 450 headaches later, they reported recently that it's important for doctors to carefully choose what they tell patients about a powerful medicine — because the message could help enhance its benefits, or blunt them.

"Every word you say counts, not only every gram of the medication," said Harvard professor Ted Kaptchuk, who led the new study with a team at Boston's Beth Israel Deaconess Hospital.

Here's how it worked. First, the patients who suffer regular migraines agreed to forgo pain relievers for several hours during one attack, recording their symptoms for comparison with later headaches.

Then for each of their next six migraines, the patients were given a different pill inside an envelope with a different message. Sometimes they were told it was an effective migraine drug named rizatriptan, a positive message. Other times they were told it was a placebo, a dummy pill, suggesting no benefit. Still other times they were told the pill could be either one, a neutral message.

Sometimes the doctor's message was true — they were told they got rizatriptan and they really did. Sometimes it was false because researchers had secretly switched the pills.

Mixing up the possibilities allowed researchers to tease out how the same person's pain relief differed from migraine to migraine as his or her expectations changed.

Of course the real migraine drug worked far better than the dummy pill. But remarkably, people who knew they were taking a placebo still reported less pain than when they'd left their migraine untreated, the researchers found.

The surprise: Patients' reports of pain relief more than doubled when they were told the migraine drug was real than when they were told, falsely, that it was a fake, the team reported recently in the journal *Science Translational Medicine*.

In fact, people reported nearly as much pain relief when they took a placebo that they thought was the real drug as they did when they took the migraine drug while believing it was a fake.

But scientists don't know why the placebo effect works or how to harness its potential benefit.

The new research is an interesting attempt to answer some of those questions, at least for one kind of pain, said Dr. Mark Stacy, vice dean for clinical research at Duke University Medical Center, who wasn't involved with the work. And learning how much of an impact it makes could help design better studies of new drugs, to ensure the phenomenon doesn't skew the results, he added.

For now, it shows "the power of positive thinking may be helpful in taking care of your migraine," he said.

## Friendship only remedy for disease of hatred

**Q: Why is there anti-semitism? What is it about the Jewish culture that causes this to occur? — B., via god squadquestion@aol.com**

A: You've asked me why some people hate other people, and I wish I could answer you in a way that might both explain and end hatred of any person. I'll try, but hatred, like love, is a deep and recalcitrant human instinct.

The first explanation for hatred in general is that we're taught to hate by our families. This is the Rogers and Hammerstein answer. Their great musical "South Pacific" features a song about prejudice, including the words, "You've got to be taught to hate and fear.

You've got to be taught from year to year. It's got to be drummed in your dear little ear. You've got to be carefully taught."

Of course, this doesn't explain hatred of Jews, blacks, Christians or anyone else; it just explains where the hatred comes from and why it's so hard to eradicate. We're sometimes taught to hate by the same people who taught us to love. This makes it very hard to reject parts of what we were

brought up to believe and embrace other parts.

Another explanation, particularly for anti-semitism, is our religious teachings. The Christian teaching that the Jews killed Christ has produced two millennia of anti-semitism. The Catholic Church rejected this "teaching of contempt" in the mid-1960s at the second Vatican Council and its transformational document, *Nostra Aetate*.

The facts are that the Romans killed Jesus, and blaming anyone living today for this act is historically and morally misguided. I love our sacred Scriptures, but I must admit that they're filled not only with inspirational moral teachings that have

civilized the world, but also with problematic texts that have made life difficult for women, Jews and homosexuals.

I don't believe that the use of Scripture to bolster prejudice is consonant with the main thrust of our revealed scriptures to treat our neighbors as we would wish to be treated.

Finally, I urge you to be careful in wording your question as you did: "What is it about the Jewish culture that causes this to occur?" This is like asking, "What is it about blacks that causes racism?" The answer is: Nothing. Victims of prejudice are not responsible for the prejudice that wounds them. The question to ask is: "What is it

about haters that causes them to reject innocent people?" Dear God, I wish I knew.

What Fr. Tom Hartman and I learned in our work together as the God Squad was that the end of prejudice comes from the bottom up, not the top down. It doesn't come from big institutions making pronouncements to other big institutions. Hatred ends when, as Tommy would always say, "We look across the fence at our neighbor who's a different religion or color or anything, and we become his or her friend." Friendship is the only medicine I know for the disease of hatred.

## Just 1 in 4 young teens meet U.S. fitness guidelines

CHICAGO — Young teens aren't exactly embracing the government's Let's Move mantra, the latest fitness data suggest.

Only 1 in 4 U.S. kids aged 12 to 15 meet the recommendations — an hour or more of moderate to vigorous activity every day.

The results are based on about 800 kids who self-reported their activity levels and had physical exams as part of the 2012 National Youth Fitness Survey.

Government researchers won't call the results disappointing, but lead author Tala Fakhouri of the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) said, "There's always room for improvement."

The CDC released partial results recently from the fitness survey, which involved kids aged 3 to 15. Other results from the same survey are pending and include fitness data based on more objective measures including treadmill tests.

Fakhouri said the nationally representative results provide useful information for initiatives that aim to increase kids' fit-

ness, including the Let's Move anti-obesity campaign launched by first lady Michelle Obama in 2010.

Kids in the survey reported on which physical activities they did most frequently outside of school gym class — basketball for boys and running for girls.

While few met guidelines established in 2008 for activity that raises the heart rate and makes you breathe harder, most said they did at least an hour of exercise at that level during the previous week. Overall, about 25 percent said they got an hour of that kind of exercise every day.

Obese kids were less active than normal-weight girls and boys. Overweight girls were slightly less active than normal-weight girls, but levels were similar among overweight and normal-weight boys.

"It's definitely very concerning to see that our kids are engaging in such a lim-

ited amount of physical activity each day when we are still battling" an obesity epidemic, said Dr. Stephen Pont, an Austin, Texas, pediatrician and chairman of the American Academy of Pediatrics' section on obesity.

Data suggest obesity may have decreased slightly among some kids but the overall rate for children aged 2 to 19 is 17 percent, or about 12.5 million obese kids.

Pont said schools can do more to help by not cutting recess and giving kids more time for physical activity. He said research suggests kids who get physical education at school may do better academically.

Recent national data on kids' fitness levels is limited. A 2009-10 CDC survey involving kids ages 6 to 11 found about 70 percent met the physical activity guidelines, although levels dropped off among older kids in that age group. The results came from parents, who may be inclined to over-report how active their kids are because of "social desirability," the researchers said.

## LG jumps into wearable fitness gadget market

LAS VEGAS — Korean electronics maker LG is jumping into the wearable fitness market. The company is making earbuds that will measure your heart rate from inside your ears.

LG Corp. is also making a wristband that goes further than the Nike FuelBand SE unveiled in November. LG's version

sports an organic light-emitting diode display that allows the user to control music, accept incoming calls and be alerted to text messages. Nike Inc.'s FuelBand has a dot matrix display that has more limited readout capabilities related only to fitness.

The wearable gizmos were unveiled at the International CES gadget show in Las Vegas last week.

## Study reveals food industry has cut calories four-fold over pledge

WASHINGTON — Some of the nation's largest food companies have cut daily calorie counts by an average of 78 per person, a new study says, more than four times the amount the industry pledged to slash by next year.

The study sponsored by the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation found that between 2007 and 2012, the estimated total cut in food product calories was in the range of 6.4 trillion.

Seventy-eight calories would be about the same as an average cookie or a medium apple, and the federal government estimates an average daily diet at about 2,000 calories. The study said the calories cut averaged out to 78 calo-

ries per day for the entire U.S. population.

The 2010 pledge taken by 16 companies — including General Mills Inc., Campbell Soup Co., ConAgra Foods Inc., Kraft Foods Inc., Kellogg Co., Coca-Cola Co., PepsiCo Inc. and Hershey Co. — was to cut 1 trillion calories by 2012 and 1.5 trillion calories by 2015.

The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation signed on to hold the companies accountable, and that group hired researchers at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill to painstakingly count the calories in almost every single packaged item in the grocery store. To do that, the UNC researchers used the store-based scanner data of hundreds of thousands of foods, com-

mercial databases and nutrition facts panels to calculate exactly how many calories the companies were selling.

The researchers aren't yet releasing the entire study, but they said recently that the companies have exceeded their own goals by a wide margin.

Dr. James Marks, director of the Health Group at the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation, said the group is pleased with the results but the companies "must sustain that reduction, as they've pledged to do, and other food companies should follow their lead."

The Robert Wood Johnson Foundation is a non-partisan philanthropic and research organization that works to improve the nation's health.

## Study of the effects of nutrients on eye health, diseases is still evolving

**Q: I have heard that some vitamins can help prevent cataracts and other eye diseases as we get older. What should I take?**

A: This is a confusing, and constantly evolving, area of medical study. Fortunately just this past spring, the AREDS 2 study was completed. This large study followed the eye health of about 5,000 people with moderate to advanced macular degeneration. The guidelines have now been in-

corporated into some new over the counter These are available at most pharmacies.

It is true that increasing certain nutrients in our diet, whether by food or supplements, can reduce the likelihood of progression in macular dis-

ease. This recent study did not look at people with early or mild retinal disease, and does not give any new guidance for those people. We suspect the same nutrients would benefit those earlier in the process, or with milder signs in the eye, but it is not technically proven yet.

Most patients who have watched their own mothers or fathers lose vision with macular disease want to do something. In our practice, we recom-

mend the same nutritional supplements for those patients as well.

Unfortunately, no study has yet proven that vitamins or any dietary change can stop or reverse cataract formation. And while you may hear stories, there is no evidence yet of vision improvement with dietary supplements.

Lastly, because we all tend to get plenty of vitamin A in our normal diets, there is no real benefit to your vision by

eating more carrots. In fact, green leafy vegetables, such as spinach, collards, kale and the like, would benefit our eye health if we could eat more of those food groups.

If you have macular disease in your family, talk to your eye doctor about thorough evaluation and possible preventative options.

**NEW YORK** — The Super Bowl will be played in New Jersey, but folks coming in for the big game Feb. 2 are likely to spend time across the Hudson River in New York City, if only to check out a 14-block "Super Bowl Boulevard" set up along Broadway.

There will also be two-for-one theater tickets and several museum exhibits, including a show of vintage football cards at the Metropolitan Museum of Art. Here are details on ways for football fans to enjoy the Big Apple.

### 'Super Bowl Boulevard'

More than a million people are expected to visit Super Bowl Boulevard, from noon-10 p.m. Jan. 29-Feb. 1, along Broadway between 34th and 47th streets, nfl.com/superbowl/48/events/boulevard. Entry will be free, though sliding down a toboggan run at 40th Street will cost \$5. The toboggan will operate with or without snow.

In honor of the 48th Super Bowl, giant Roman numerals XLVIII will be set up at 42nd Street as a backdrop for photos. Fans can also stop by for autograph sessions with current and former NFL players, noon-6 p.m., at a stage at 39th Street. The stage will also display the Vince Lombardi Trophy, awarded each year to the Super Bowl champions, and named for the man considered one of the sport's most successful coaches. Concerts will be held on the stage each

evening, 8 p.m.-10 p.m.

A 10-minute video celebration of football will be projected on Macy's facade at 34th Street, every 30 minutes between 5 p.m.-9:30 p.m. Macy's will also host an NFL shop on its fourth floor, Friday-Feb. 4.

Kids ages 6-13 can check out the animated "NFL PLAY 60 Field" experience, noon-5 p.m. in the NFL Rush Zone in heated tents between 34th and 35th streets. Fans of all ages can take part in interactive games and enjoy Video Park, a video that looks at the host region, from noon-10 p.m. in tents between 35th and 36th streets.

For sightseeing advice, the city's tourism agency, NYC & Company, has a tent between 43rd and 44th streets and an information desk on Macy's mezzanine; nycgo.com.

### Football at the Met

The Metropolitan Museum of Art is more likely to be associated with Egyptian artifacts and Renaissance paintings than football. But the museum on Fifth Avenue and 82nd Street is getting into the Super Bowl spirit with an exhibit of vintage football cards called "Gridiron Greats," Jan. 24-Feb. 10, metmuseum.org/exhibitions/listings/2014/gridiron-greats.

About 150 cards printed between 1894 and 1959 will be shown, from the first football cards ever produced to cards featuring

Calling all hipsters: Take the L train to Bedford Avenue in Williamsburg, Brooklyn, to hang with the cool kids.

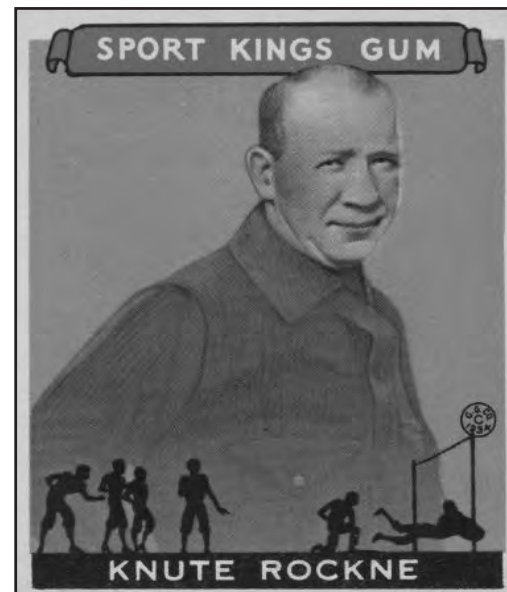
### Hockey at a stadium

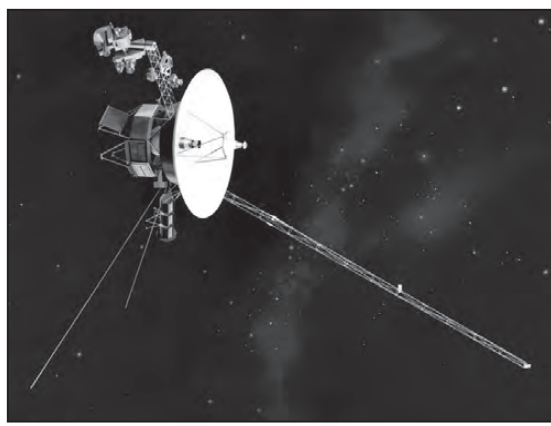
## Where No Craft Has Gone Before

# Starcraft Voyager

On Aug. 25, 2012, the Voyager 1 spacecraft became the first human-made object to leave our solar system. It could continue sailing between the stars for billions of years.

It took about a year before scientists had proof that the craft really had crossed the solar system boundary. They had to analyze data Voyager sent to Earth before they knew for sure. Its twin, Voyager 2, is expected to leave our solar system in about three years.

The Mini Page talked with the Voyager chief scientist to find out more about these spacecraft that are exploring billions of miles beyond Earth.



The Voyager spacecraft were launched with technology that seems primitive 36 years later. Their radio transmitters operate on only 23 watts, about as much as a refrigerator light bulb. By the time the signals reach Earth, they are less than one-billionth of a watt. Although there are three computers onboard each craft, the total computing power seems tiny today. A smartphone has about 240,000 times more memory than all the Voyager computers put together.

The Voyager spacecraft launched from Cape Canaveral, Fla., aboard Titan-Centaur rockets. Voyager 2 launched on Aug. 20, 1977, and Voyager 1 launched on Sept. 5 that year.



### The little missions that could

In the summer of 1977, NASA launched identical spacecraft, Voyagers 1 and 2. The craft were on an exciting mission to explore Jupiter and Saturn. Scientists hoped the Voyager mission would last five years.

But five years later, after finishing their exploration, the spacecraft were still going strong. NASA scientists increased the mission to 12 years.

They reprogrammed Voyager 2 to continue on to Uranus and Neptune, where no spacecraft had flown before. Voyager 1 was reprogrammed to travel to the boundaries of the solar system.

### Going and going

Twelve years into their journeys, the Voyagers had completed their new explorations. They were still working. Scientists set even greater goals for the spacecraft.

This time, they reprogrammed both Voyager spacecraft to fly into the space between the stars.

They renamed the exploratory journey the Voyager Interstellar Mission, or VIM. ("Inter" means between, and "stellar" means stars.)

Experts believe the Voyagers have enough power left to continue sending data until about 2025.

## Rookie Cookie's Recipe Hamburger Soup

### You'll need:

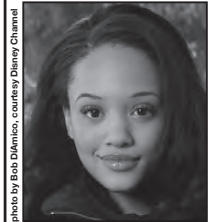
- 1 pound lean ground beef

2. Put ground beef in large soup pot with all other ingredients.
3. Bring to a boil; cover and reduce heat. Simmer for one hour. Serves 8 to 10.

# Messenger in Space

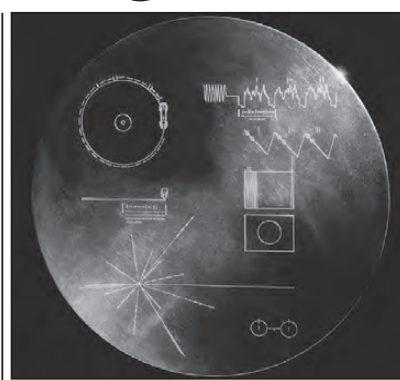
### Joyful messages

The Voyager missions have thrilled the world and filled people with hope. These spacecraft are continuing the human tradition of taking great voyages to explore the unknown.

The Voyager spacecraft carry messages to any intelligent life who might someday come across the spacecraft. But the messages are really more of a tribute to the power of human achievement. NASA scientists don't actually expect aliens to encounter the Voyagers.

Each Voyager craft has a gold-plated, or gold-coated, copper record onboard filled with sounds and pictures from Earth. These are known as the Golden Records. The long-playing, double-sided phonograph records onboard the Voyagers were state-of-the-art at the time.

A cartridge and needle to play the record were included on each craft.



The cover of a Golden Record carries directions for playing the record and shows the location of our solar system.

### Earth sampler

Scientist Carl Sagan and other experts chose what information to include on the Voyager records. The records have 115 images of people, scenery and animals. Sounds include greetings in 55 languages, music from many cultures, thunder, surf, a dog barking and a whale singing.

### Planetary discoveries

Many Voyager discoveries have surprised scientists, such as an active volcano on Jupiter's moon Io. Close-ups of Saturn's rings showed billions of tiny particles making up its rings. Experts believe most of them are bits of water ice. The spacecraft measured winds of 1,100 miles per hour at Saturn's equator.



Three images of Saturn taken by Voyager 2 were joined to make this photograph. The false-color computer image helped experts see ring details.

## Goldie Goodsport's Report Supersport: Odyssey Sims



Height: 5-8 Birthdate: 7-13-92 Hometown: Irving, Texas To her Baylor teammates, Odyssey Sims is simply "O." That letter in her first name also could stand for "Outstanding."

After all, the talented senior guard is a two-time All-American and the team's co-MVP the last two seasons. She is shining again this year. Sims averaged more than 27 points in the first six games, while continuing to play tenacious defense.

Besides starring for the powerful Bears, Sims has helped lead the U.S. to two gold medals at the World University Games. Before college, she excelled at MacArthur High and is the only athlete to have her jersey (No. 3) retired. At Baylor she wears "O."

Opponents no doubt would like to see this Lady Bear hibernate. Don't count on it. Sims wants to help her team have another big year and then play professionally.

# Exploring a New Frontier

### Bubble around the sun

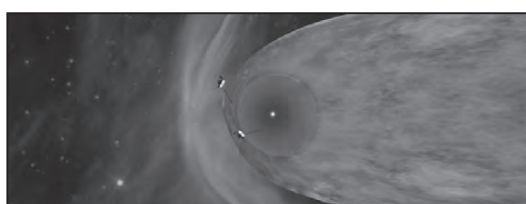
Our solar system is in a kind of bubble surrounding the sun. This bubble is called the heliosphere (HEE-lee-uh-sfeer). "Helio" comes from the Greek word for the sun.

The heliosphere is filled with gases from the sun's atmosphere. The gases expand, or spread out, as they move away from the sun. The sun's magnetic field is also inside the bubble.

Electrically charged atomic particles from the gases join with the magnetic field. As these charged gases expand, they carry the magnetic field with them. The partnership of the expanding charged gases and magnetic field creates the bubble, or heliosphere.



This illustration shows a supernova, or exploding star. When dying stars blow up, most of their matter flies into interstellar space.



### Showing their age

The sun is 4.5 billion years old. Electrically charged particles from the sun are also that old.

When stars are dying, they can blow up, scattering their matter through space. Eventually, after millions of years, the matter comes together again and forms new stars. This happens again and again.

The matter in interstellar space has not yet come together to form new stars. This means that some of the matter may be only a few million years old. Particles inside the heliosphere are about 4.5 billion years old.

### The proof

Interstellar space is filled with the matter from supernovae, or stars that blew up. In interstellar space, there are about 80 times more ionized atoms\* per cubic foot than inside the heliosphere.

When Voyager 1 started finding the greater numbers of ionized atoms, NASA scientists jumped for joy. This was the proof they needed. Voyager 1 had entered interstellar space.

\*An ionized atom is an atom missing at least one electron.

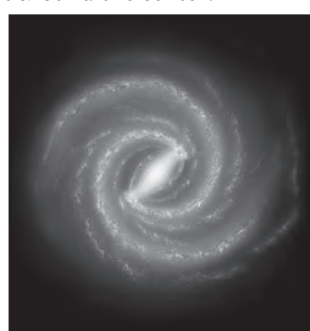
The Voyager 1 spacecraft left the heliosphere in August 2012. The long blue bubble to the right in this art is the heliosphere.

Voyager 1 is now billions of miles from Earth, traveling through interstellar space.

### The future

We can't imagine how huge space is. It will be about 40,000 years before the Voyagers encounter another star besides the sun.

Stars are so far apart in space that it is unlikely that the Voyagers will encounter anything to stop them. Voyager 1 has now joined the stars orbiting around the center of the Milky Way. It takes about 240 million years for stars to make one orbit around the center.



This illustration shows our Milky Way galaxy. It is likely that Voyager 1 and 2 will be orbiting the galaxy center for billions of years.

Sometimes, bringing up the past is a must

EX-ETIQUETTE

**Q: I was married for 5 years. I have been divorced now for three years, and I have been dating someone else for a year. We made a pact when we started dating that we would not talk about our pasts, so we know very little about what went on prior to meeting. He has no idea I was married before. On Christmas Day my guy asked me to marry him and I accepted. He wants to get married next New Year's Eve. My former anniversary was New Year's Eve. Do I have to say something? What do you think about getting married on the same day for marriage Nos. 1 and 2? What's good ex-etiquette?**

**A:** Although I have had a client who thought he was a genius to be married multiple times — all on the same day — so he would never forget his anniversary, I would suggest you take this far more seriously and pick a different date for marriage No. 2. I would also suggest that you come clean with some of your history. Notice I said "some." I understand the philosophy of not airing so much dirty laundry, but being married for five years — there is bound to be proof somewhere, whether it's your parents slipping in a conversation or a wayward picture here or there. It could all backfire if your fiancé finds out from someone else, so based on heading off a disaster, I'd say something sooner rather than later.

If you are embarrassed, it's not essential to offer every little detail. There are those who have had quite a few past partners and volunteering all the

names and dates may paint the wrong picture, especially if you are trying to change your ways.

But, that's not what I am hearing from you. It appears you simply made a pact not to talk about the past and you've stuck by it, only to have it catch up to you in a completely unplanned way. Based on that, I suggest you refer to Ex-Etiquette rule No. 7, "Be honest and straight forward," which translated means, "honesty is the best policy." Try something like, "Honey, I love you and I'd love to marry you. When we first met we made a pact not to talk about the past and out of respect for you I held to that pact, but before we go forward I believe we do have to talk about the past for a moment." And, then drop the bomb. If he doesn't understand, you've got the wrong guy.

You could look at it like this: Although wanting to keep some info to yourself is understandable, the experiences that went before are what made you who you are today. If you are kind you have learned to be kind. By the same token, if you are distrusting or jealous, you may have learned that from past experience as well. Knowing that about each other is an important component to loving and respecting someone for exactly who they are (which can certainly contribute to the longevity of marriage No. 2). Good luck.

Experts share tips on having winter wedding

GRAND FORKS, N.D. — Subzero temperatures may not be ideal for a wedding day, but a snowy scene can make a beautiful backdrop for those brides who choose to brave the cold. We talked to experts in the wedding industry in the Grand Forks, N.D., area and gathered some tips for couples who chose a chilly month to exchange vows.

Here's their advice:

■ **Dress:** When choosing a dress for a winter wedding, Nancy Zalewski, owner of Kristen's Bridal,

said luxurious satins and brocades are wonderful. She also recommended that brides buy a fur stole or cape to keep warm.

For the entire bridal party, she recommended using a static guard. "The winter is so cold, and it keeps fabrics from sticking to you, especially for the guys."

■ **Hair:** Alyssa Kaye, a hair stylist at Regis Salons in Columbia Mall, said soft loose up-dos are in this winter, along with simple down hairdos. But, whichever you choose, Kaye advises using a hair oil to tame static caused by cold, dry

weather. "Right after you shower, use an oil and let your hair completely dry before you curl it," she said. She also suggests using hair spray before curling to further help with static and hold the curls longer.

■ **Event styling:** For centerpieces and other decoration details, Zalewski said metallic accents and jewel tones are perfect. She suggested buying metallic ribbon at a craft store and incorporating it into the centerpieces and bouquet.

■ **Photos:** For winter wedding photos, photogra-

pher Shawna Widdel, owner of Shawna Noel Photography, suggests bringing accessories. "A lot of brides will wear winter boots, so their shoes don't get destroyed in the snow," Widdel said. Shawls, scarves, mittens and hats also make cute accessories and keep the bridal party warm during photos.

■ **Bouquet:** "If you are going to take photos outside, we usually recommend that people don't bring their flowers with them," Widdel said. "If it's colder than 10 or 15 degrees the flowers will wilt."

Woman blames son's bad behavior on ex-husband

ASK MR. DAD

Dear Mr. Dad: I'm a single mom with a 10-year-old son who's with me half the time. Before the divorce, he was a sweet kid and a pleasure to be around. But lately he's become a terror, throwing tantrums when he doesn't get what he wants — and I think it's because his father is spoiling him. How do I deal with him? What can I say to his dad to get this behavior to stop?

**A:** As you well know, divorce is tough on everyone involved: You, your ex, and your son. And among the many problems divorce creates, one of the most common is children being spoiled by mom or dad. The one doing the spoiling is usually the non-custodial parent, who's making a well-intentioned attempt to do something to make up for how hard the divorce has been on them. But the same thing can happen in cases like yours, where both parents have the kids the same amount of time.

No blaming

When your son says something like, "But Dad lets me do that!" it's awfully tempting to respond with a snide comment about your ex. However, as much as you may want to vent your anger, it's important that you restrain yourself from criticizing your ex in front of your son. The best you can do right now is remind him that in Dad's house, Dad sets the rules. In your house, you do. End of discussion.

Talk with Dad

Set up a time to talk with your ex about what's going on. Sooner rather than later. Again, you may be angry and tempted to lash out or start slinging accusations and criticisms. Don't. Any discussion that starts that way is doomed. Make sure you're calm when you make the

call or meet in person, and make sure the conversation itself stays as low-key and low-volume as possible. Focus on your son's behavior. Ask whether your ex is seeing the same things at his house. If so, you're instant allies. If not, ask for his support in helping your son understand the different-houses-different-rules thing.

Maybe it's not Dad

Just because your son says his dad lets him get away with something or that he buys him cool stuff doesn't mean that's what's actually happening. Children are generally pretty good at playing mom and dad off each other. But children in divorced families are masters. You also need to consider that even though he's only 10, your son is quickly lurching towards the teen years and his ornery behavior may be a preview of coming attractions. It's also possible that your son is angry and trying to punish you for what he sees as you ruining his life. Hey, no one said this was going to be easy.

Don't give up — or in

Regardless of whether your son is lying through his braces or telling the truth about what goes on at Dad's house, don't give in. Instead of trying to soothe him with money, offer something a lot more valuable: Time. At the end of the day, the parent who tries to buy a child's love by spending money always loses, while the one who spends quality time wins. But it's not about winning and losing, anyway. It's about raising your son to be a responsible, healthy, emotionally stable adult. Right?

## What to expect when making a property offer

**THIS WEEK, I WOULD** like to talk about what your Realtor needs from you, the buyer, when you're ready to make an offer on a property.

One of the first questions you'll be asked is, "Have you been to a bank to see what type of loan you will be able to get, and the amount for which you will be qualified?"

Why is this important? This helps your Realtor determine the price range in which you should be looking, and the type of loan helps determine the kind of property — condo, rural, townhouse, single-family, investment — that will work with a specific loan.

A letter of pre-qualification from a bank simply says that the borrower/buyer is pre-approved for a mortgage loan and that it is based on figures that the borrower/buyer has provided to the bank.

It may go on to say that final approval is subject to a fully executed sales agreement, that the borrower's financial condition or credit worthiness does not change, and that there is an acceptable appraisal and title search of the subject property and other guidelines of the lender. A pre-qualification letter will not guarantee that the borrower/buyer will obtain the loan. This is only a starting point for the loan process.

So, now you have a pre-qualification letter from a bank and you're ready to tell your Realtor that you want to look at properties and what you would like to see. Your Realtor will begin to find properties, and you'll be on the road to home ownership.

In no time, you will find a home and write an acceptable offer. The next step will be to go back to the bank and make a formal loan application. At this time, the bank will gather more personal information from you and collect an application fee. This now begins the process of getting an appraisal, home inspection and any other inspections necessary for this purchase. The bank will order a title search and an appraisal. Your responsibility will be to make arrangements for a home inspection and any other inspections that your sales agreement contains.

Once all inspections are complete and you're satisfied with the results, you must wait for appraisal results, title findings and underwriting approval. It may seem like forever, but most of this takes about 60 days. Of course, there are always exceptions.

You'll get a call from your banker telling you that you have a loan approval and that the closing will be set up with the title and closing attorney. A date will be agreed upon, and you'll make moving arrangements, get homeowners insurance and put all utilities in your name.

The big day finally arrives, and you'll officially be a homeowner.

## Designers share in vogue colors, textures, inspirations

With a new year come new trends in home design and decorating. Among them: Paler walls contrasted with colorful furniture, and plenty of personal expression, design experts say.

### Cooler colors

Whisper-soft, ultra-pale shades of pink —described by designers as "blush tones"— are back. But the '80s haven't returned, designer Brian Patrick Flynn said, at least not entirely.

"What's different about blush this time around is what it's paired with. In 1985, you'd find it paired with mauve and black with tons of shiny brass accents. Flash forward to today and blush is likely to be paired with preppy, masculine tones," said Flynn, founder of Flynnside Out Productions. His favorite blush paint is Barely Blush from Glidden, which he contrasts with navy blue: "The deep, rich personality of the navy actually washes out the blush, almost causing it to look white, and the overall effect is fresh and gorgeous."

Speaking of white walls, Los Angeles-based designer Betsy Burnham sees those coming back in a big way.

"I used to think white walls looked unfinished," she said. "But I've completely come around on this one, because white is the ultimate palette cleanser. It gives every space — even the most traditional — a modern edge, and sets the stage wonderfully for layers of color in upholstery, accessories, area rugs and art."

But while wall colors are getting softer and paler, the oppo-

site seems to be happening with furniture.

"Strong colors on upholstery are becoming more of the norm," said Kyle Schuneman, founder of Live Well Designs, who spent a chunk of 2013 designing his first line of furniture, in collaboration with retailer Apt2B.

He opted to create sofas in bright blues and shades of orange just for a creative office waiting room," he said. "People are bringing them into their homes."

One bold color to approach carefully this year: Red-violet. "Red-violet is the Pantone color of the year for 2014," Flynn said. "As a designer whose specialty is using color, let me tell you something: Red-violet is about as complex as it gets."

"My trick for using it right is pairing it with black, white and

brass," he said. "It's not all that overwhelming, since it's balanced by the neutrality of the black and white, and made a bit more chic and regal with the brass."

### Top textures

"For accessories, the trend seems to be getting away from color and going more into rich textures like horn, aged metallics and linens," Schuneman said. "The absence of color is becoming chic for smaller items."

One texture Flynn said will have a big moment in 2014: Felt.

"Have you looked at Pinterest lately? It's like every fifth photo you see involves felt! Ever since the handmade movement kicked in back in 2010, felt has been used in unexpected ways and in a modern fashion," Flynn said. "What makes it such a favorite for designers is how easy it is to work

with. It's amazing for door upholstery due to its stiffness. It makes for awesome craft material, since it's easy to cut and stitch, and it's awesome for kids."

### Fresh inspirations

"The idea of personalization is becoming stronger and stronger," Schuneman said. "People are wanting their homes to reflect a more unique perspective."

So rather than assuming that everyone will be buying the same popular items, "stores are doing limited runs on items more often, like art in series or a special brand collaboration for just a season," he said.

Burnham agreed. Homeowners are increasingly looking to "large-scale wall hangings" and other pieces of art to express themselves, she said, rather than doing it with bold wall color.

"Boy, am I sick of accent walls. I really believe that trend is out! I vote for art every time," Burnham said.

She also recommends hunting for vintage posters that speak to you. Find them through online dealers and auction houses, and then frame them in a group.

"For years I've seen taxidermy make its way into mainstream design, yet reinvented in new ways. Lately, I've been looking to Ralph Lauren-like cabins of the Western United States for inspiration in my own home. I think a lot of cabin-inspired colors such as pea greens, hunter greens and camouflage-inspired prints will become super popular."

Flynn's cabin in the north Georgia mountains is decorated in pea green and accented with heavy, masculine fabrics, Western hats and antlers.

**DEAR KELLY:** My husband and I are re-doing our old dining-room table. We are stripping it down to the original wood surface. I love the orange strippers because they are safer and smell a lot better, but you still have to get the gooey paint off.

We were using small putty knives but switched to my dustpan. It's a lot wider, so it gets a wide swath off all at one time. Plus, the old paint ends up in the pan, so it's easy to dump out. This was a super-fast way to clean off the old stuff, so we thought we'd pass it along to you to use in your column. Thanks for all of your help. We sure could use it. — J. & T.S.

**Shoptalk**

When it comes to repairing damaged wood on things like frames or intricately carved items, QuickWood Epoxy Putty Stick is a super and fun option. This putty is a true epoxy and has a two-component formula, although it looks more like a piece of candy. It comes in a tube and you

just open the package and cut off what you need. Then you knead it in your hands to mix the two compounds to form a pliable putty. You can push it into the damaged area and shape it with your hands or other tools. It eventually will set up to a super-hard, woodlike material that is sandable and paintable. It even comes in colors, so you might not have to do much in the way of finishing. It won't shrink or pull away, either. # Canes fashionable as well as functional in 18th, 19th centuries

**CANES WERE USED** NOT only to aid in walking, but also as part of European and American fashionable dress in the 18th and 19th centuries. Many canes had an extra function, too. Some held swords, guns, flasks, telescopes, cameras, fans, seats, perfume, poison, drugs or hidden papers.

Many had silver, gold or jeweled handles or even handles that were modeled heads of presidential candidates. Elegant but fragile handles were made of porcelain. In the late 19th century, the famous Meissen porcelain factory in Germany made elaborate cane handles that look like small figurines. They were shaped to be easy to hold and carried, but would break if dropped or hit. Few of these cane handles have survived, and they often are sold without the cane shaft.

A three-quarter figure of a woman extending into

a curved cane handle was auctioned by Cowan's Auctions of Cincinnati in October 2013. The handle, with Meissen's blue crossed-swords mark inside, sold for \$800.

**Q:** I own an old wooden desk with a flip-down top hiding several pigeonholes. A paper sticker on the back reads "Maddox Tables." Please tell me something about the maker and the desk's value.

**A:** Maddox Table Co. was founded in Jamestown, N.Y., in 1898 by English immigrant William Maddox. He had invented several furni-

ture-making and finishing machines before he started his own company. The company made tables, desks, secretaries and other case furniture. The company was sold in 1919 and again in 1978. It closed in the mid-1980s. Your desk, if in good condition, is worth \$400 or so.

**Q:** I inherited an old cider press from my uncle. Stenciling on it reads, "The Higganum Mfg. Corporation Manufacturers, Higganum, Conn., USA." It still works. We made cider with it the other day. Can you tell me anything about its history and value?

**A:** Higganum Manufacturing Co. was founded by brothers George and Thomas Clark in 1867. The company made cider mills, wine presses, lard presses, wagon jacks and agricultural equipment. It was incorporated by about 1880. In 1892, the company was renamed Clark Cutaway Harrow, after its most successful product. Several of the factory buildings burned down in 1914, but the company continued to operate for several more years. The rest of the property was sold in 1942. Your cider press was probably made in about 1880, before

the company name was changed. Value: About \$100.

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# Va. foundation focuses on keeping the garden native, integrated

Ecology is on many gardeners' minds these days. Gardeners who value the science of relationships between living things and their environments increasingly want to know more about those connections — how toxic chemicals worsen a yard's overall health and why bees, birds and butterflies are crucial to our daily lives, for example. To help gardeners sort through the options for

gardening naturally and responsibly, the Virginia Horticultural Foundation spotlights the theme "Natural Gardens" during its annual Home Gardener Day this year. "We have a responsibility to support the land that we depend on for our own survival, and that responsibility includes thoughtful choices about how we landscape our own tiny spot of Earth," said Carol Heiser, habitat education coordinator with the Virginia Department of Game & Inland Fisheries. During Home Gardener Day, she discussed "Habitat at Home: Landscaping for

Wildlife." The conservation program, outlined in great detail at [www.dgif.virginia.gov/habitat](http://www.dgif.virginia.gov/habitat), encourages public, private and corporate landowners to provide habitat for songbirds, mammals, amphibians and other native wildlife. Free, downloadable information for home yards and schools is available at the website, as well as lists of native plants, water features and shelter options. In Carol's viewpoint, naturalist Doug Tallamy makes the best case for habitat gardening in his book, "Bringing Nature Home," about the critical connections between insect

and plant communities. "Insects and plants co-evolved for millennia and have developed intricate inter-relationships. 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# EPA moves to cut woodstove pollution starting in 2015

DULUTH, Minn. — The smell of wood smoke wafting on a cold winter's night may be a hallmark of life in many states, but the federal government says it also may be a health hazard. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) recently moved to reduce pollution from new woodstoves, wood boilers and pellet stoves used for heating purposes starting in 2015. The new nationwide rules would not affect fireplaces or wood burners already in place's homes and businesses but would restrict the sale of new wood burners to those that emit about 80 percent less pollution than old models — namely particulate matter, carbon monoxide and organic compounds. The new rules, in the works for more than two years, also do not apply

to campground or backyard fire pits or wood-fired barbecues. Particle pollution, or soot, is linked to a wide range of serious health effects, including heart attacks, strokes and asthma attacks. Several studies have linked wood smoke to premature death among people who suffer from heart and lung disease. Many wood furnaces and stoves burn inefficiently, sending a lot of smoke, creosote and soot up the chimney. That particulate matter builds up to cause smog, sometimes in levels unhealthy to people in places like Denver, Albuquerque, N.M., and Fresno, Calif. "Smoke from residential woodstoves and heaters is a significant source of harmful, fine-particle pollution in many areas of the country," said Janet McCabe, acting assistant administrator for EPA's Office of Air and Radiation.

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# Ready, set, get organized

SACRAMENTO, Calif. — Get organized! It's near the top of every New Year's resolutions list.

"It's just exactly like dieting," said author and organization expert Deniece Schofield, referring to another popular resolution. "Organizing doesn't happen overnight. It's one bite at a time, one step at a time. Just like those extra pounds, you added on stuff a lot easier than it comes off."

Nicknamed "America's most organized woman," Schofield is all too familiar with such resolutions. What makes her different is she's figured out ways to make them work.

"My first book came out in 1982, before organizing was an industry," said Schofield, who has written five books on home management. "I really was an organizing pioneer. These res-

olutions come from things I've learned from years and years of experience."

A simple January declaration isn't going to make mountains of paper disappear or make sure you never misplace your keys again. But it can start a new mindset and perhaps launch some constructive lifelong habits.

Schofield brings her organization skills to in-person workshops, and gets the same questions.

"How can I get my husband and kids to buy into this?" she said with a laugh. "That's the No. 1 question. Then, they'll ask about paper."

In the digital age, would-be organizers continue to be overwhelmed by paper.

"Half my workshop is devoted to managing time and getting rid of paper," Schofield said. "Paper is everybody's nemesis. It never stops coming."

All that clutter adds up

to stress, which is why organizing is so popular. People want to de-stress their lives as much as possible.

As an industry, organizing has exploded, more than doubling in size in the past decade. The National Association of Professional Organizers (NAPO) boasts about 4,000 members. Annual sales of organizational products and services are close to \$1 billion.

The most-requested areas for professional help? Home office or den ranks at the top, followed by the kitchen, closets and master bedroom.

"So, I came up with six resolutions for organizing," Schofield said. "The trick to making it work: You choose only one — the one you really need. Just by following that one resolution, you can make a huge difference in your life and home."

Here they are:

■ Never ever buy something new unless you know exactly where to put it in

your home and what you'll use it for.

■ Never start today with yesterday's work. We're talking procrastination, the enabler of disorganization and clutter.

■ Eliminate from your vocabulary the phrase, "for now."

"For now" becomes forever," Schofield said.

■ Let go of clothes you won't wear.

■ Plan menus. Advance planning also allows for shopping for all the ingredients at once and having them on hand.

■ Ask yourself: Would you let someone walk through your home unattended? What would you hate for them to see? Then, deal with it.

Every home has a trouble spot, be it a messy office, closet disaster or whole house. This walk-through exercise can focus your organizing energies.

### Use emergency fund in extreme circumstances

**DEAR DAVE:** My wife and I are working the Baby Steps, and we have our budget in place. Sometimes the budget gets busted because of home improvements and various other things. I think we should take money from our emergency fund when this happens, but she says it should come out of our restaurant and fun money. What do you think?  
— Joshua

**DEAR JOSHUA:** I hate to break this to you, but overspending is not an emergency. So, I'm siding with your wife on this one. If you budget a set amount in one category and you go over that amount, you've got to have something you reduce or cut out completely to stay within your budget for the month.

You'd be surprised at what some people call an "emergency." But here's the deal: If something happens on a pretty regular basis, it's a predictable event. That means you need to budget a larger amount for home improvements or whatever the problem area may be.

Overall, on a month-to-month basis, if you find you have \$200 budgeted for car repairs and the repair turns out to be \$250, I'd rather you cut back on eating out to make up the difference. That's the way my wife and I did it back in the day. We never touched the emergency fund for anything except big, unexpected, scary stuff.

**DEAR DAVE:** I have a lot of student loan debt, and I can't afford the payments right now. Should I send them what I can, even if it's not the minimum payment, or should I not send anything at all?  
— Tina

**DEAR TINA:** They're not going to stop bothering you no matter which option you choose. The benefit of sending them \$5, even if the minimum payment is \$50, is that you're forcing yourself to start living on a budget and do all you can to honor your commitment. That's the moral, spiritual and legal thing to do in this situation.

Lots of times when people say they can't afford something, what they really mean is they don't want to give up other stuff in order to honor their obligations. If that's the case, I'm not going to be on your team. You accepted this responsibility, and if that means you don't eat out or go on vacation until the debt is paid off, then that's the way it is.

But if you're already living on a beans-and-rice, scorched-earth budget and \$5 is all you can squeeze out, then give them \$5 and let them know with a clear conscience it's all you can afford. All you can do is all you can do.

There's a bright spot in all this though. If you're scrimping and saving and paying all the money that you have first toward running your household, then secondly toward your creditors, you'll start finding ways to stretch your dollars even further.

Not only will that help you clean up your student loan mess, but it will enable you to have a little bit better life in the process.

### Writing your work narrative

**IT'S IMPORTANT TO START** each year with a carefully thought out list of pragmatic resolutions. My list includes:

- Start a dynasty of ducks.
- Ride a narwhal (preferably while nude).
- Watch more TV.
- Learn how to write a newspaper column.

I'm sure you all have resolutions of your own, narwhal-related or otherwise, but I suggest workers and job seekers consider one additional item: Figure out the story of your career.

I've touched on this issue before, but it's an ideal moment to revisit it: What better time to start considering your narrative than during the opening chapter of a new year?

The idea is that the work you do, the degrees you earn, the blog posts you write all weave into a narrative that tells the world your professional story. Our careers are no longer contained on a one-page resume.

As Pamela Slim writes in her new book, "Body of Work: Finding the Thread That Ties Your Story Together":

"Like it or not, Google is telling a story about you right now. Go ahead, Google your name. Hopefully you have narrated part of your story and are happy about what people have written or shared about you. If you aren't, the good news is that you can change it. Words, images and videos make up a multicolored tapestry of your life on the Web. ... As you create your body of work, you need to package it, to illustrate it, and to tie it together in a cohesive story."

Now take a deep breath, because this is not as complex as it sounds, and not everyone's career story will be an elaborate multimedia tale.

The core point is to examine what you have done in and around your professional life. Treat those experiences like chapters. Then ask, "How do I put those chapters together in a way that makes sense?"

Step back for a moment, and think about how we communicate with friends and family. We tell stories and relay anecdotes of our successes and failures.

But our work lives tend to be one-dimensional side notes.

I asked Slim why she thinks people fail to discuss their careers in a narrative way.

"I think it's the way that we are socialized and the way we think about career tracks," she said. "We think of work as something that's there to support us so we have a strong, secure foundation. This is your job and your vocation and not so much your craft or a part of who you are."

A few of the key steps Slim offers for establishing what she calls your "body of work" include:

- Define your root. (Figure out whom you want to help, what kind of changes you'd like to make in the world and what ideas drive you emotionally.)
- Name your ingredients. (These are your skills, life experiences and ideas — the things that make you unique.)
- Choose your work mode. (Think about the work you've done and when you've been at your best, and then consider what you want to be doing in the next phase of your career.)

These are important things to think about, whether you're job-searching or happily employed.

Use the start of a new year to figure out your work story. It may take time, but it will help. And I'm willing to bet it will be easier than riding a narwhal, nude or otherwise.

# Health care providers expected to ramp up hiring

One thing’s for sure when it comes to the impact of the Affordable Care Act: Health care and related industries are going to be on a hiring spree in the years to come to meet the demands of the law.

While critics say the law will cause companies to cut jobs or work hours so they will not be penalized for not offering health care coverage — actions that are already under way, accord-

ing to anecdotal reports — other observers say the law will create scores of jobs.

Health care providers will need more nurse practitioners and physician assistants, and companies that are required to offer insurance to employees will need more human resources staffers to keep track of their compliance. Experts also expect more jobs for computer programmers and other information technology professionals, customer service representatives, insurance agents, and wellness and fit-

ness coaches.

Susan Mesa, president of the job placement service AdvancedPractice.com, said the Affordable Care Act will only increase demand for nurse practitioners and physician assistants, who are already in demand because of a physician shortage and the growth of accountable care organizations, which are networks of doctors and hospitals that share responsibility for patient care to keep costs down.

“Nurse practitioners and

physician assistants are attractive options because they can do 75 to 85 percent of the work a physician does at 55 to 65 percent of the cost,” Mesa told *The Atlanta Journal-Constitution*. “Research has also shown that use of advanced practice practitioners can improve patient satisfaction and health care delivery efficiency.”

According to the Obama administration, more than 2.1 million people have enrolled in private health insurance plans by signing up on new state and federal web-

sites since they were launched in October. The federal site, [HealthCare.gov](http://HealthCare.gov), handles sign-ups for 36 states. The remaining 14 states and the District of Columbia have their own sites.

“More insured people means an increase in the need for different types of health services, ranging from direct care to research and maintenance of medical records,” Tony Lee, publisher of CareerCast.com, said in releasing a recent study on the need for more health care workers.

## Office aims to provide work-life balance for women

When young lawyers go to work for Mayanne Downs, they’re in for a shock.

Downs, a former Florida Bar president, has established four guidelines for her staff at GrayRobinson in Orlando, Fla.

First, they are free to work the schedule that suits their home life. Second, they may leave the office whenever necessary for a family commitment. Third, before taking a case, they must meet with Downs to decide how much responsibility they’re comfortable accepting.

And last, if there’s some errand cluttering their to-do list — think “pick up dry cleaning” — they’re encouraged to ask the office concierge, Downs’ college-age daughter, to handle the job.

“She comes in once a week,” said Downs, Orlando’s city attorney. “Does stuff like goes to Whole Foods to get milk, buys makeup, picks up prescriptions.”

The policies are part of Downs’ attempt to help her staff members — the women in particular — strike a balance between their

work and home lives. The effort reflects a growing sense that, historically, most companies have done little to acknowledge that many women work two full-time jobs: One in the office and one at home.

Downs said it’s an experiment in reality-based management.

“I don’t want expectations to chew on our souls,” she said.

The approach remains relatively rare, according to a 2012 poll from the Society of Human Resource Managers. It found that, although about half of all companies take small life-work-balance steps, such as discouraging employees from working while on vacation, just 10 percent offered formal flex-time programs.

“There’s still an element of rewarding ‘showing up,’” said Anne Perschel, an organizational psychologist who has worked with organizations such as CVS and the Girl Scouts of America. “They

still want to see you at the desk.”

Charles Tews, president of the Tews Co., a Central Florida staffing company, agrees.

Tews said he hasn’t seen a rush to adopt practices such as flex time. Many jobs, he said, simply don’t lend themselves to unconventional schedules.

That said, Tews sees value in the effort. He lets his business-development staff — both mothers — work a modified schedule. Three days a week, they’re visiting clients or working in the office. The other two, they’re free to work from home. Tews recruited one of his top people by offering that flexibility.

“It works well for us,” he said. “It’s been fairly seamless.”

Women, by and large, are America’s domestic managers. More men than ever share household and child-care duties, but women are the crew chiefs. The Pew Research Center says women handle most decision-making in 43 percent

of all couples. Men do so in only 26 percent of couples.

Serving that role while managing a career is exhausting, as evidenced by the results of a recent LinkedIn survey.

It found that 63 percent of women define career success as having a job that allows them to balance their personal and professional lives. More than half said that early in their careers, they defined professional success as “earning a higher salary.”

Jenny Sullivan, 33, once fell into that category. As a young lawyer, Sullivan said she wanted to be a partner, have a “huge book of business” and make a lot of money. That changed when she had a baby. Now she defines career success as having a job she enjoys “and having some control over my future.”

She has found that working for Downs at GrayRobinson.

Sullivan gets in about 9 a.m. and tries to leave just before 5 p.m. When she wants to, she works from home. It’s not radically different from what she did at her previous firm, with one important exception: “I’m working that schedule with permission.”

## Job hunters need digital proficiency

**DO YOU HAVE** an electronic resume? It could help your job search, particularly if it isn’t just a PDF of your paper resume.

Digital formats can give potential employers far more information than anything you could provide on a typed sheet of words.

Online, you can create links to portfolios that illustrate your work. You can include a video that conveys your presentation style, assuming it’s dynamic and worth watching. You can add color that catches the eye.

Using electronic technology will help convince prospective employers that you’re not a dinosaur. Furthermore, most mid-sized to large businesses are using applicant-tracking software and online hiring processes that are more likely to find and click on your posted resume.

Also, many employers use LinkedIn to search for candidates. In fact, LinkedIn’s “apply now” function, built into some employers’ job listings, may be the only place where those employers swim through the applicant pool.

Even without an electronic resume, you’re probably using online job-application forms required by employers. Now, be prepared for a possible next step: A video interview.

Remember, too, that your digital footprint is a big deal. Many employers scour the Web to find information about you — your credit scores, Facebook postings, group memberships and other profiles. Search your name and see what you find. Are you hireable?

Finally, reassess your email address. Make sure it’s a version of your name and not something sketchy, cutesy or detrimental, like [olddog@aol.com](mailto:olddog@aol.com).

## Playing politics could smooth a colleague’s ruffled feathers

**Q: My cubicle is right beside the office of a high-level manager who is constantly making some kind of noise.**

“Jackie” is a loud, gregarious woman who spends most of her day on the phone or chatting with colleagues. Sometimes she even talks to herself. She frequently hums along with the radio, which is always on.

Working around Jackie is like trying to sleep with a mosquito buzzing. After a year of this, I politely asked if she could at least tone down the humming. She got upset and yelled at me, which brought me to tears. Jackie later apologized profusely, but I refused to accept her apology. I have complained to her boss,

but that didn’t help. What should I do now?

A: For starters, you should pay less attention to the noise and more attention to the politics. So far, you have insulted a high-level manager, rejected her apology, and complained to management about her personal habits. This is hardly the best way to handle someone in a power position.

You must also understand that Jackie is not doing anything wrong. In fact, your own sensitivity to sound is also contribut-

ing to this little drama. Some people are not bothered by background noise, because they possess an innate ability to screen out sound. Others, like yourself, are acutely aware of every noise in the room.

Had you been more politically astute, you would have recognized Jackie’s apology as the perfect opening for a calm, friendly discussion of this issue. Guilty feelings about her inappropriate outburst would have made her more receptive to your concerns. Unfortunately, your sulky response negated that advantage, and the ill-advised complaint to her boss only made things worse.

If you approach Jackie again, start by offering your own request for forgiveness. For example: “Jackie, I’m

really sorry for rudely rejecting your apology. I often have trouble concentrating here because I’m extremely sensitive to background noise. Since you have a very interactive job, I know this will never be a quiet spot. Do you think management might consider relocating my cubicle?”

If you can shift the dialogue from personal criticism to a plea for assistance, Jackie might agree to help you find a reasonable solution to this problem.

**Q: After being laid off from a middle management position, I took a job with an independent grocery chain just to make ends meet. I was shocked to learn that this company does not offer annual pay increases based on merit**

or tenure. As a manager, I was always encouraged to promote staff retention, but companies apparently no longer care about keeping employees. I find this extremely disheartening. What’s your opinion?

A: I hope you eventually find a more generous employer, but in the meantime, try not to overreact. The compensation practices of this particular business do not reflect a national trend. And even though your company has no regular increase schedule, raises undoubtedly do occur. For clarification on when and how, just ask your human resources manager.

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## Astronomers discover triple star system

An international team of astronomers, including researchers from WVU, using the National Science Foundation's Green Bank Telescope (GBT) discovered a unique stellar system consisting of two white dwarf stars and a superdense pulsar.

Detailed studies of this system may provide a key clue for resolving one of the principal outstanding problems of fundamental physics — the true nature of gravity.

Former WVU graduate student Jason Boyles, now a faculty member at Western Kentucky University, originally uncovered the pulsar in 2012 as part of a large-scale search for pulsars with the GBT.

Pulsars are neutron stars that emit lighthouse-like beams of radio waves that rapidly sweep through space as the object spins on its axis. The pulsar Boyles discovered lies about 4200 light-years from Earth, and spins at nearly 366 times per second. Such rapidly-spinning pulsars are called millisecond pulsars, and can be used by astronomers as precision tools for studying a variety of phenomena, including searches for the elusive gravity waves.

Subsequent observations showed that the pulsar is in a close orbit with a white dwarf star, and that pair is in orbit with another, more-distant white dwarf.

"Following the discovery observation, we routinely carry out follow-up measurements of the pulsar to characterize its properties," Boyles said. "In this case, our measurements of the spin frequency revealed a complex orbit that could only be explained by invoking the presence of two orbiting white dwarf stars."

Boyles, along with his research advisers, Duncan Lorimer and Maura McLaughlin, associate professors in the WVU Department of Physics and Astronomy, collaborated with an international team led by Scott Ransom, of the National Radio Astronomy Observatory; Anne Archibald, of the Netherlands Institute for Radio Astronomy; and Ingrid Stairs of the University of British Columbia to report their findings in Jan. 5's online edition of the journal *Nature*.

"This triple system gives us a natural cosmic laboratory far better than anything found before for learning exactly how such three-body systems work and potentially for detecting problems with General Relativity that physicists expect to see under extreme conditions," Lorimer said.

The scientists began an intensive observational program using the GBT, the Arecibo radio telescope in Puerto Rico, and the Westerbork Synthesis Radio Telescope in the Netherlands. They also studied the system using data from the Sloan Digital Sky Survey, the GALEX satellite, the WIYN telescope on Kitt Peak, Arizona, and the Spitzer Space Telescope.

"The gravitational perturbations imposed on each member of this system by the others are incredibly pure and strong," McLaughlin said. "The millisecond pulsar serves as an extremely powerful tool for measuring those perturbations incredibly well."

The research on this system used techniques dating back to those used by Issac Newton to study the Earth-Moon-Sun system, combined with the "new" gravity of Albert Einstein, which was required to make the precise measurements. The system gives the scientists the best opportunity yet to discover a violation of a concept called the Equivalence Principle.

This principle states that the effect of gravity on a body does not depend on the nature or internal structure of that body.

"While Einstein's Theory of General Relativity has so far been confirmed by every experiment, it is not compatible with quantum theory. Because of that, physicists expect that it will break down under extreme conditions," Ransom said. "This triple system of compact stars gives us a great opportunity to look for a violation of a specific form of the equivalence principle called the Strong Equivalence Principle."

## WVU students launch lifestyle, clothing brand

Most sophomores at WVU are busy just trying to juggle their classes, a social life and maybe a side job. Kyle Gillis, a sophomore industrial engineering major, and his cousin, Garrett Yurisko, a sophomore television journalism major, have decided to add starting a company to their plate as well.

Day One is an urban clothing brand that aims to inspire those who wear it. But Gillis wants people to know that their brand isn't just about the clothes. "We want to inspire people to do what they love," explained Gillis, a Wheeling native. "We want them to like the style, and then be inspired."

Gillis and Yurisko want people to be the "same old kids from day one" and to pursue the things they've always loved doing. This also led the duo to turn their company from just a clothing brand to a lifestyle brand.

The Day One website, set to launch later this month, will feature the clothes, but will also focus equally on music videos and mini documentaries produced by Yurisko and a blog that will tell the stories of people who wear their clothes and are inspired to do what they love.

"We want people to put on our clothes and create their own identity," said Yurisko, from Moundsville.

The idea started in December 2012, and the two have been working with friends to make it happen. They first started to just make T-shirts they thought were

cool, but it snowballed and became a way to inspire people to "do what they love from the get-go," similar to how Gillis and Yurisko live their lives. The apparel is meant to be the catalyst for living the wearers' dreams.

For Gillis, part of that dream includes the opportunity to study abroad.

"When I arrived in Morgantown for my freshman year, great things began to happen for me," he said. "Seeing a larger, more active city really brought out a different side of me. A few months into the school year, I thought that if Morgantown could do this to me what would happen if I was to go to one of the largest cities in the world?"

Gillis will be spending the spring 2014 semester in Hong Kong, studying at Hong Kong Baptist University. But his work with Day One won't end just because he's out of the country. "Running the business with a 13-hour time difference will really build our communication skills as a small, new company," he said. "We will be holding weekly conference calls online for everyone involved to keep the ideas flowing."

Yurisko comes up with the ideas for the designs and helps craft them to look the way he wants them to. He works with a graphic designer back in Wheeling on this function. He also produces much of the website content, especially the videos that feature Day One lifestyle brand members.

Gillis, on the other hand, us-

es the skills he's learning as an industrial engineering at WVU to lead the business and production side of the venture.

One of his many functions is to choose the fabrics for the shirts. "I pick out the best quality; I don't think of the price," he said.

Gillis said this experience has taught him a lot about management and leadership. He also said he learned more about logistics and budgeting than he could have ever learned in a class. The hardest part, he said, was starting, which required a business plan.

"I learned that business plans change," he said. "I actually came up with a business map. It's a general idea that becomes more specific as we move along. A business plan would have restricted growth."

Gaining the capital to start was also difficult. Gillis recounted that they suffered four loan denials before his dad put in a line of credit for them.

"We actually ran out of money before we got the loan," Gillis said. "We rethought it and started to involve more people. We probably got ahead of ourselves."

"We realized we had to go 100 percent," Yurisko said.

Gillis, however, said that his goal is not to make money in this venture.

"Honestly, if I look back on this and don't make any money, I won't regret it. It's not about that. I love doing this and I love inspiring people to do what they love."

## Drive collection reaches more than 1,900 books

## Physics student awarded NASA scholarship to study geomagnetic storms

The 1859 "Carrington Event," the largest solar storm on record, went down in history as a beautiful display of nature where people could read that evening with the words illuminated only by the unusually bright night sky. It also knocked out communication wires worldwide.

Today, what was once dazzling could wreak havoc on an increasingly electric-reliant society, scientists say.

Tessa Maynard, a junior in the WVU Department of Physics and

Astronomy, received a \$1,000 stipend to study under research assistant professor Amy Keese, as they explore the effect of geomagnetic and solar storms on the magnetosphere of Earth.

"If a storm like that happened today, depending on the orientation of the ejection it could do nothing, or it could be an absolute disaster," she said.

The effect of these storms, Maynard said, can cause a number of problems for Earth. When an ejection of electrons, ions and atoms from a solar storm hits the

Earth's magnetosphere, it disrupts electronics on Earth and can ultimately lead to a loss of power altogether.

The result? A release of currents strong enough to knock out power grids, satellites and pipelines.

The project uses data from the IMAGE mission launched by NASA in 2000, specifically from the Medium Energetic Neutral Atom (MENA) instrument.

NASA terminated the mission after losing contact with the satellite in 2005, but scientists still have access to the data.

Through the study, Maynard and Keese are analyzing the geomagnetic and solar storms and looking at the speed and temperature of ions within them.

"We can take in just a few particles with this instrument on this satellite that's orbiting around the planet, and we can learn so much about what's happening and how it affects us," Maynard said.

"It's that's (sort of) this intermittent point that's so important."

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## Cube looks odd but is fun to drive

As funny as it looks — some of my co-workers call it a “clown car” — the Nissan Cube just might be the perfect car for today’s motorist.

The asymmetrical design at the rear, with the back glass wrapping around only on the passenger side, isn’t for everyone. (My OCD son says that drives him nuts.) But I like it enough that I have to admit that I bought a Cube for myself.

To me, it looks great, it’s fun to drive, and it’s quite comfortable, even for bigger people, even though on the outside, it’s a compact car with a subcompact length.

Originally introduced for 2009, the Cube returns for 2014 with a beginning price of \$16,760 for the base S model with a six-speed manual transmission, and \$17,760 for the S with a continuously variable automatic. The third model offered is the SL, at \$18,860, and an SL Preferred Package dresses that one up for an additional \$1,890.

My SL tester was quite well-equipped, too — with even a backup camera that displayed the view to the rear on the color monitor in the dash, part of the Preferred Package. The package also added navigation, audio upgrades and front fog lights.

Other extras included a chrome trim package, previously standard

on the now-discontinued Cube Krom model. We also had the 16-inch silver-alloy wheels, and the splash guards for the rear wheels. Total sticker price was \$22,040, excluding destination charge.

But you don’t have to spend that much to have a nice Cube. I would have been happy with the S model with the CVT, with no extras, for under \$19,000.

I’m partial to roomy SUV-type vehicles, particularly ones that let you sit up above most of the cars on the road, as the Cube does. It’s funny that this vehicle is actually a compact, but it’s so tall that I was seated at the same altitude as most of the minivans and larger SUVs.

The driver’s seat is much more comfortable than that of other, much more expensive cars I’ve driv-

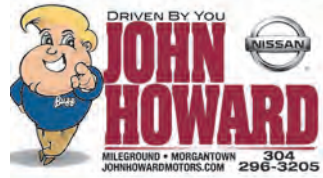
en lately. There is room for up to five people, and 11.4 cubic feet of cargo space behind the back seat. But that opens up to more than 58 cubic feet with the rear seat folded down.

Nissan describes the Cube, which is aimed at young men (18-25), as yet another “mobile device” to help them connect with their friends, billing it as a “social space” that is in actuality a “lounge on wheels.”

# Selection, purchase of garden plants

**NOW THAT WE HAVE** gotten through the holidays, it is time for garden lovers to start preparing for the coming growing season. Seed catalogs should have arrived and folks are getting anxious to see what is new for this year. **Alex Straight**, WVU Extension Service Doddridge County Agriculture and Natural Resources Agent, offers the following advice to begin planning for 2014 gardens.

Gardening can be done by anyone in any situation. A successful gardening experience does not require lots of space, time or money. After beginning a garden plan and starting site preparation, it's time for the fun part — plant selection!

## Plant selection

When deciding what plants to put in your garden, consider your space and what you want to use your garden for. If you want to preserve your garden's bounty or sell at a local farmer's market, you may want to plant extra. Virginia Tech has developed a hand-out on how many plants will give expected yields.

You also need to think about the gardening system you will use. Some plants are more suitable for different situations, such as containers or small spaces.

## Navigating a seed catalogue

When flipping through a seed catalogue or walking through a local greenhouse, there are several terms you need to become familiar with before buying your plants or seed.

■ **Resistance** — refers to a specific trait a plant variety has that makes it resistant to a certain disease or insect.

■ **Tolerance** — refers to a specific plant trait that makes the plant tolerant to a disease or pest. The plant is not adversely affected by the disease or pest and can thrive while it is present.

■ **Determinate** — refers to tomato plants that are more compact and produce

one or two fruit crops a season; they do better in small places or cages.

■ **Indeterminate** — refers to tomato plants that have a vining habit and produce a moderate amount of fruit throughout the growing season.

■ **Annual** — a plant that completes its life cycle in one year (includes most vegetable plants).

■ **Perennial** — a plant that comes back year after year (example: Rosemary).

■ **Biannual** — a plant that takes two years to complete its life cycle (example: Parsley).

■ **Hardiness zone** — refers to the particular climate in your area. Some plants can only grow in certain areas; check with your WVU Extension county office to see which climate zone you are in before making any plant orders.

■ **Hybrid** — varieties that are produced by the controlled crossing of parent plants. Hybrid plants usually exhibit the best characteristics of both parents.

■ **Heirlooms/Open pollinators** — plants that are not bred with a controlled crossing of parents. They may not be the most uniform or have the best resistance, but they are often fun, unique and full of wonderful flavor.

■ **Days to harvest** — refers to the time it takes before you can harvest the plant. This is good to know if you have a growing season that is shorter than the amount of time it takes the plant to produce fruit.

## Varieties

There are thousands of plant varieties. Variety refers to the particular traits of a plant. For example, there are tons of va-

rieties of tomatoes — those that are green when ripe, small, large, striped, bushy, round, pear-shaped and even purple.

Once you have decided which vegetables to plant, half the fun is getting to experiment with varieties. When deciding which varieties to choose, read the descriptions and pick out a few that interest you. Consult with friends, neighbors and the WVU Extension office for a list of varieties that do well in your area.

When planting several new varieties, remember to make a map so you know where each variety is planted. This is useful when you find something that does well, or that your family enjoys, and you want to plant it again next year.

## How to plant

After you have decided what to plant, how do you go about it? Do you want to grow from seeds or buy pre-grown transplants? Here are a few tips to help you decide.

Growing from seeds requires time, patience and space. You will need to seed all plants weeks before their planting date (usually in March). You will need a place to start the seeds that has a good light source and is warm; you'll need to be able to water them easily. Young plants require lots of constant water and attention. New gardeners should try a few plants from seed and buy most of their vegetable plants as transplants. Starting from seed may seem cheaper, but you must also factor in the cost of soil, planting materials, seed trays, water, light and time.

Buying transplants is the easier, less time-consuming route. Transplants are plants that are ready to be planted after the last frost date. They can be purchased at local greenhouses, local big-box stores and even some feed stores. When selecting transplants, examine every plant in the pack, look-

ing for signs of disease and insects. You want to bring home only healthy plants to put in your garden.

Some plants require direct seeding. This means you plant the seeds directly in the soil where you want them to finish their life cycle. These plants are usually quick to germinate and mature and have fairly hardy seedlings. Examples are corn, peas, squashes, pumpkins, cucumbers, melons, zucchini and beans. When direct seeding plants, you seed and then thin them to a specified spacing. This means that you will pull up plants that are too close together to make sure the plants get adequate spacing.

Anytime you plant in your garden, you want to pay attention to the spacing and depth of the planting, as specified on the package. This will ensure that each plant gets adequate moisture and sunlight and there is good air flow between plants. Correct spacing will help cut down on disease problems and increase the overall quality of the fruit on each plant.

The most important thing about gardening is having fun. If you make a mistake, you always have next year to try again. Get your family involved — it's a great way to encourage kids to eat vegetables and spend time outdoors.

## Tips on fruit and vegetable gardening

■ Always disinfect tools and stakes after every season, and remove and burn any diseased plant material.

■ Rotate crops around the garden from year to year.

■ Use pantyhose to tie tomatoes, and slip them around melons to keep them free of blemishes.

■ Put mulch around plants to retain moisture and cut down on weed problems.

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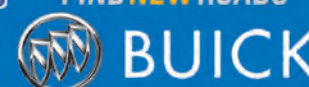
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## UAW VP faces charge in shooting

HARRISON TOWNSHIP, Mich. — United Auto Workers vice president General Holiefield has been named in a misdemeanor arrest warrant following the accidental shooting of his wife in their Harrison Township home, northeast of Detroit.

The Macomb County sheriff's office said Holiefield faces a reckless use of a firearm charge, which carries up to 90 days in jail and a \$500 fine upon conviction.

Holiefield was not in custody Friday. He is retiring this year from the UAW.

A Jan. 22 arraignment is scheduled in Clinton Township.

The 60-year-old Holiefield was cleaning a handgun on Dec. 30 when one shot fired, striking 50-year-old Monica Morgan in the abdomen. Morgan is recovering.

Holiefield's attorney, Rob Tuth, told WXYZ-TV that his client is "way more devastated by what happened to his wife, Monica, than any criminal proceedings."

## Judge orders auction for Fisker

WILMINGTON, Del. — A Delaware bankruptcy judge on Friday ordered a competitive auction for the assets of Fisker Automotive, rejecting a proposal by a group led by Hong Kong billionaire Richard Li to assume control of the failed electric auto manufacturer in a private sale.

U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Kevin Gross refused to accept Hybrid Technology LLC's plan to use \$75 million it said it is owed as Fisker's senior secured lender as a credit bid for Fisker's assets.

Agreeing with Fisker's official creditors committee that a competitive auction was the best way to maximize recoveries for Fisker creditors, Gross capped Hybrid's credit bid at \$25 million.

Chinese auto parts conglomerate Wanxiang Group Corp. had offered an alternative cash bid of \$35.7 million as the starting point for a competitive auction, contingent on Hybrid's credit bid being eliminated or capped.

Pin Ni, president of Chicago-based Wanxiang America Corp., had no immediate comment on the

judge's ruling, saying he needed to talk to attorneys.

Caroline Langdale, a spokeswoman for Hybrid, said in an email that the company was "deeply disappointed" by Friday's ruling.

"Despite the court's decision, Hybrid will participate in the auction, as we still feel Hybrid represents the most competitive and viable bid for

Fisker's future," Langdale said.

Anaheim, Calif.-based Fisker, which had planned to build cars at a former General Motors plant in Delaware, filed for bankruptcy protection in November.

The move culminated a long downward spiral that began after Fisker received a \$529 million loan commitment from the U.S. Department of

Energy.

Hybrid recently paid \$25 million for DOE's outstanding loan balance of more than \$160 million, which resulted in a loss to U.S. taxpayers of \$139 million.

It then moved to take control of Fisker using a \$75 million credit bid based on what it claimed it was owed as the company's new senior secured lender.

## Chinese biz to put plant at ex-GM site

COLUMBUS, Ohio — A Chinese company will build an automotive glass-making plant in southern Ohio, creating about 800 jobs and revitalizing a former General Motors factory site, officials said Friday.

The chairman of the Fuyao Glass Industry Group Co. and the owner of the site signed an agreement at the Ohio Statehouse in Columbus. The company is making a \$200 million investment at the site in Moraine, near Dayton.

State officials said it's the biggest Chinese investment yet in Ohio. The plant is expected to begin operations late next year, employing about 800 people within three years. The General Motors assembly plant employed 1,100 workers when it closed, in late 2008.

"Ohio has been through some difficult times, but we are doing better," Gov. John Kasich told Fuyao's chairman, Cao Dewang.

Kasich said the deal reaffirms the state's leadership role in the automotive industry.

Fuyao plans to buy more than 1 million square feet of space in a deal worked out with the state's private development arm, JobsOhio, with involvement by local and regional development officials. Details of incentives offered the company have not been finalized and were not immediately disclosed. Ohio said other Midwestern states and some in the South also completed for the plant.

The company said Ohio's location, workforce and business environment were key factors in the decision.

## Tesla sending new adapter due to overheating worry

PALO ALTO, Calif. — Tesla Motors said it will offer Model S customers new adapters to assuage safety concerns of overheating.

The electric auto maker said Friday that corrosion, faulty wiring of an electrical outlet and other issues could cause an existing

adapter to overheat while the vehicle is charging.

There had been consumer complaints to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) of smoke or fire while the car was plugged into the adapter for charging.

Tesla already provided a software update in Decem-

ber to address the problem. The new software is designed to reduce the charge current by 25 percent if it senses conditions that could lead to overheating. The Palo Alto, Calif.-based company said it does not believe the new adapter is necessary, but is providing it as another layer of assurance to customers. The improved wall adapter,

available in a few weeks, has a thermal fuse to prevent current from flowing to the device if an electrical socket heats up.

The NHTSA could not be reached immediately for comment. Tesla did not return a request for more information on incidents related to the adapter.

Tesla is also under in-

creased scrutiny for safety following several battery-related fires last year.

No one was hurt in the fires, which began in the batteries and happened along freeways near Seattle and Nashville, Tenn. In the Seattle case, the Model S hit a trailer hitch in the Tennessee crash.

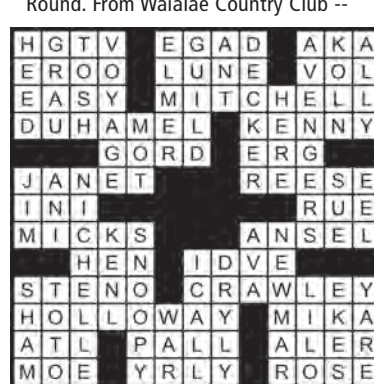

# Here come the laughs

## Tina Fey and Amy Poehler return to host the Golden Globes

Awards season has officially begun for Hollywood's film and television elite.

The nominations are in, and the 2014 Golden Globes are shaping up to be a swanky, star-studded affair. America's favorite funny women, Tina Fey and Amy Poehler, will return to host this year's ceremonies, which will air Sunday, Jan. 12, on NBC.

Unlike the Oscars and other awards ceremonies, the Golden Globes honors the best in both film and television, making Fey and Poehler — who have had plenty of experience in both worlds — the perfect fit. As they opened last year's show, Poehler quipped, "only at the Golden Globes do the beautiful people of film rub shoulders with the rat-faced people of television," winning big laughs from the crowd, a feat that can be difficult to achieve. Hosting any Hollywood awards show is a tough gig (just ask Anne Hathaway or Ricky Gervais, two former Hollywood hosts who were the butt of some of the funny ladies' jokes), but Fey and Poehler were a huge hit. The 2013 awards pulled in 19.7 million viewers — 17 per cent more than the previous year, and the best ratings the show had seen in six years — so no one was surprised when they were invited back for round two.

When asked what the world can expect from the 2014 Golden Globes, Fey told "Entertainment Weekly," "You know when you're typing

something and it's really screwed up, but you keep typing because you think auto-correct will probably fix it? That's what the show is going to be like." So you can expect this year's hosts to bring the funny — and the nominations list is taking care of the star power.

The nominations announcement itself was quite a show: A-list celebrities Zoe Saldana ("Star Trek," 2009), Olivia Wilde ("Rush," 2013) and Aziz Ansari (NBC's "Parks and Recreation") were on hand at the Beverly Hilton Hotel in Beverly Hills, Calif. — where the awards ceremony will also take place — to reveal the nominees.

Two movies lead the pack in the film categories this year, tied at seven nominations each. "12 Years a Slave" (2013), the true story of a free black man in pre-Civil War America who is sold into slavery, is up for Best Motion Picture — Drama, Best Actor (Chiwetel Ejiofor), Best Actor in a Supporting Role (Michael Fassbender), Best Actress in a Supporting Role (the incredible Lupita Nyong'o), Best Director (Steve McQueen), Best Screenplay (John Ridley) and Best Original Score (Hans Zimmer). "American Hustle" (2013), the tale of a con man and his beautiful partner caught up in a complex web of crime and punishment, is up for Best

Motion Picture — Musical

or Comedy, Best Actor (Christian Bale), Best Actress (Amy Adams), Best Actor in a Supporting Role (Bradley Cooper), Best Actress in a Supporting Role (Jennifer Lawrence), Best Director and Best Screenplay (both for David O. Russell). These two films alone showcase Hollywood's best and brightest, and both are favored to win most of their categories.

However, there have been lots of standout performances this year that are sure to make an impact on the competition. The unstoppable Tom Hanks is nominated in the Best Actor category for his role as a cargo ship captain besieged by Somali pirates in "Captain Phillips," another true story nominated for four awards total. America's sweetheart Sandra Bullock is nominated for her portrayal of an astronaut in crisis in the film "Gravity," while America's other sweetheart, Julia Roberts, is nominated for "August: Osage County." Roberts plays the troubled daughter of an even more troubled mother — who is, in turn, played by the formidable Meryl Streep, also nominated for her efforts.

In the television categories, one show has pulled ahead of the others, and it's not even from a major television network. Netflix's "House of Cards" raked in four nods: Best Drama Series, Best Actor in a Television Drama Series (Kevin Spacey), Best Actress in a Television Drama Series (Robin Wright) and Best Supporting Actor in a Series, Mini-Series or Motion Picture Made for Television (Corey Stoll). Hot on "House of Cards"' heels, though,

is CBS's "The Good Wife," with three nods, including Best Actress in a Television Drama Series (Julianna Margulies), and "Breaking Bad," which is also nominated three times — including the Best Drama Series category — for its dramatic final season.

The dark horse in the TV drama categories this year is actress Tatiana Maslany, nominated for her starring role as multiple clones in the BBC America sci-fi/drama "Orphan Black."

While the other contenders in the Best Actress in a Television Drama

Series category are strong, many argue that only Maslany is tasked with carrying an entire show, often appearing as four or five different characters in each episode. While it's rare for a sci-fi series to even be nominated in this category, there's a very real possibility that the young Canadian actress could walk away with the honors

at the end of the night.

In the TV comedy arena, the freshman sitcom "Brooklyn Nine-Nine" did surprisingly well with two nominations. The show boasts some big competition as the new cop-comedy is up against old favorites "The Big Bang Theory," "Modern Family" and "Parks and Recreation."

# Dynamic duo

Luke Bryan and Blake Shelton set to co-host the ACMAs

**Back for more:** Country music's biggest night of the year may still be a few months out, but last year's hosting duo is already getting set for an encore.

The 49th Annual Academy of Country Music Awards will be broadcasting live from the MGM Grand Garden Arena in Las Vegas on Sunday, April 6, on CBS, and last year's hosting duo will be leading the ceremonies again this time.

ACM Entertainer of the Year Luke Bryan and four-time ACM Award winner Blake Shelton really hit it off with audiences last year, so it's no mystery why they've been invited to return to the job this time around. Both men have an easygoing style that's perfect for television, and with those awards under their belts, it's clear that they sure know their country music, too.

This will be the fourth consecutive year that Shelton's hosted the annual awards show, and over that time his popularity and screen presence has only grown. Shelton, of course, has been one of the four coaches on every season of NBC's "The Voice," where he's been the target of frequent praise by critics for his skill at coaching his team of musical hopefuls. It's a style that's paid off for him, too, as he's led one of his protégés to vocal victory on three of the show's five seasons.

Bryan may be a bit of a newcomer to the country music scene — at least when compared to Shelton — but he's no whipper-snapper, either. With a string of hits behind him and the aforementioned Entertainer of the Year award, Bryan is one of the hottest young stars in Nashville today.

There are a heck

of a lot of movies out there that have been critically acclaimed box office bombs. The opposite happens, too. There have been many films that professional critics hated, but paying audiences flocked to.

"Legion" was one of the latter. The 2010 film was almost universally panned by critics (it sits at a dismal 20 per cent rating on review aggregator website Rotten Tomatoes), but that didn't stop audiences from flocking to this violent supernatural action flick. It was a box office success, bringing in a respectable \$56 million worldwide.

With that kind of money flowing, it's no surprise that Syfy is moving forward with a spinoff TV series. "Dominion," set 25 years after the events depicted in "Legion," has gone into production for an expected premiere later this year.

In the aftermath of a devastating war between angels and humankind, a rebellious soldier learns that he's destined to be humanity's savior. The actor who's set to play the unlikely hero might be a familiar face to fans of the genre. Christopher Egan has starred in another supernatural thriller on the big screen, 2007's "Resident Evil: Extinction," along with the young adult fantasy epic "Eragon" (2006).

**Let down thy hair:** Yet another classic fairy tale character is headed to Story-

brooke.

The lady with the epically long hair will finally be revealed in an upcoming episode of ABC's "Once Upon a Time," further expanding the population of this famous fairy tale community.

Alexandra Metz has been cast in the role of Rapunzel, the girl with the famously long hair who's trapped in a tower. Whether or not she'll be locked up in a tall building has yet to be revealed, but no doubt she'll be keeping shampoo companies in business.

Metz is something of a newcomer to the TV and film industry, first popping up in a 2010 episode of "Law & Order: Criminal Intent." Since then, she's had appearances in "Law & Order: Special Victims Unit," "Blue Bloods," "The Good Wife" and "Gossip Girl," along with some meatier roles in "Chicago Fire" and "The Originals."

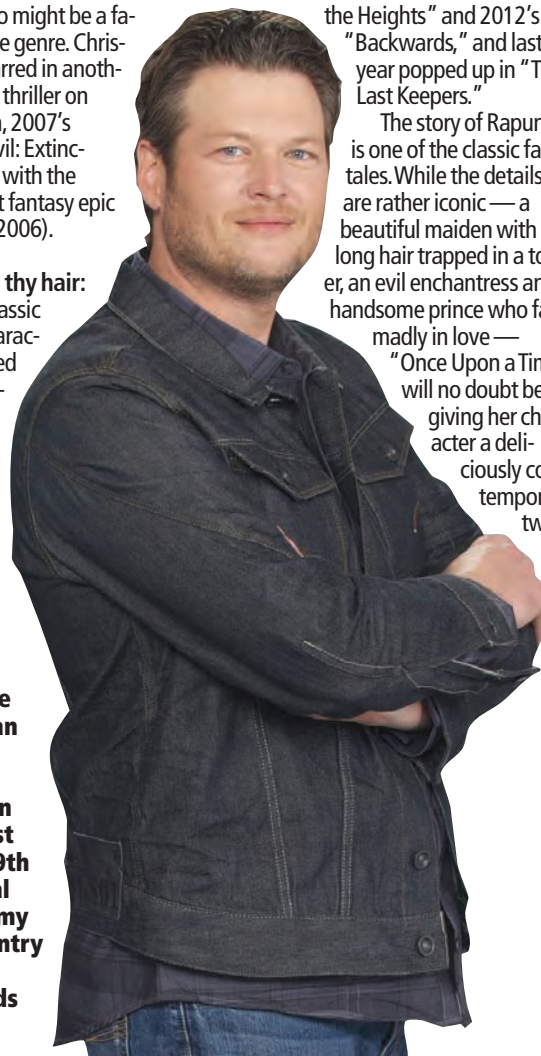

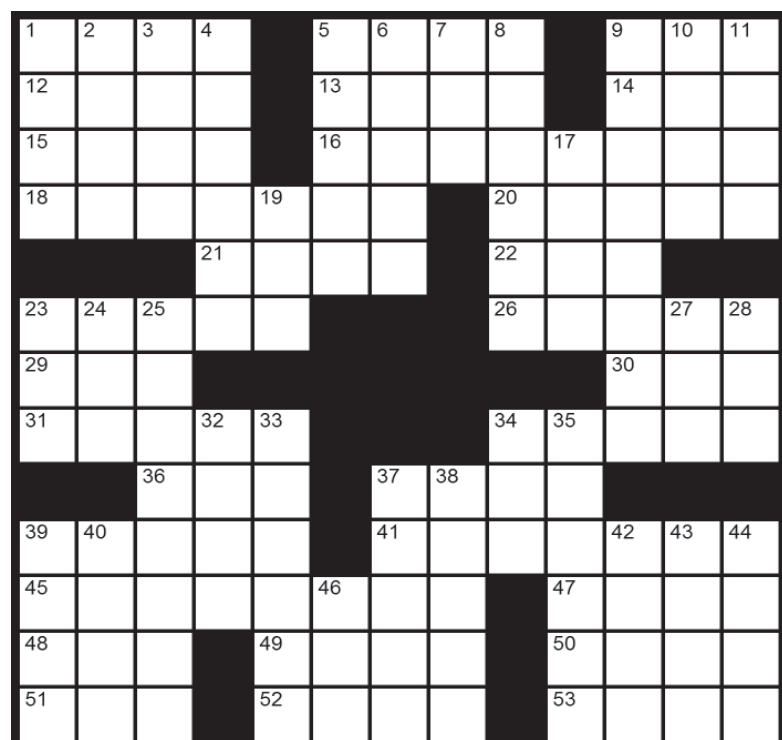
