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Alum still hopeful following WVU loss to Baylor

'Eers fan is looking forward to TCU game

One year ago today, WVU upset No. 4 Baylor, 41-27, in Morgantown. Mountaineers fans were hoping for a repeat performance Saturday, in Waco, Texas, but it wasn't to be. The No. 2 Bears remained unbeaten after turning a 10-point halftime lead into a 62-

38 victory. The loss drops WVU to the .500 mark at 3-3, 0-3 Big 12, heading into a bye week. Baylor improved to 6-0, 3-0 Big 12, with the victory. The Bears' high-octane offense came into the contest with college football's most potent attack, averaging 686.6 yards per outing. They didn't disappoint Saturday, rolling up 693 yards of offense. Through two quarters, however, WVU only trailed by 10, and

missed a 35-yard field goal attempt late in the second quarter that would have pulled them a touchdown behind at intermission. WVU alum Karen Wang watched the game at Kegler's Sports Bar & Lounge with her boyfriend. She said she was feeling good about WVU's chances at the half. "I thought we had a fighting chance. I thought it may be our day, just like this game last year,"

Wang said. "I was thinking in the second half that we were going to come back. I was hopeful." The couple said they try to get out to watch every game. Wang said they'll be pulling for the Mountaineers just as hard when WVU returns to Texas for a 7:30 p.m. kickoff against TCU, on Oct. 29. "I just want them to play well," Wang said. "I just want them to play their best."

Senior al-Qaida commander killed in airstrike

BEIRUT — An airstrike killed a top al-Qaida commander and two other fighters in Syria, activists said Saturday, but it was not immediately clear whether it was carried out by the U.S.-led coalition or Russian warplanes.

The Britain-based Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said Abdul Mohsen Abdallah Ibrahim al-Charekh, a Saudi better known as Sanafi al-Nasr, was killed Thursday in an airstrike near the northern Syrian town of Dana, along with another Saudi and a Moroccan member of al-Qaida's local affiliate, known as the Nusra Front.

Russian warplanes have been carrying out airstrikes in Syria since Sept. 30. A U.S.-led coalition has been targeting the Nusra Front and the Islamic State group for more than a year.

The Observatory's chief, Rami Abdurrahman, said it was not clear if al-Charekh was killed by U.S. or Russian warplanes. The Observatory, which relies on a network of activists inside Syria, said an Egyptian commander escaped the bomb-

ing. It said all four men had been dispatched to Syria by al-Qaida leader Ayman al-Zawahri. Jihadist activists on social media say al-Charekh was killed by a U.S. drone strike. A U.S. official said an American drone targeted and struck al-Charekh but the U.S. was waiting for confirmation that he was actually killed in the attack. The official was not authorized to dis-

cuss the strike publicly so spoke on condition of anonymity. Al-Charekh, the alleged leader of al-Qaida's operations in Syria, was one of six men that the U.N. Security Council imposed sanctions on last year. He was 49th on a list of 85 most-wanted militants by Saudi Arabia who are outside the kingdom. The list, issued in 2009, includes 83 Saudis and two Yemenis.

Women's role is growing

Agriculture swells in female farmers

The face of agriculture in the Mountain State is changing as women's role in farming becomes more prominent.

According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, 29 percent of the farmers in West Virginia are women, or 9,320. They farm more than 1.25 million acres of land and contribute \$62.4 million to the economy.

Doolarie Singh-Knights, an assistant professor with the WVU Extension Service, said the rate of women in West Virginia entering farming is three times the national average. She said there are several reasons more women are engaging in farming. Some have inherited farms, while others take up agriculture to support their families.

"We do see a growing trend in students in the social sciences going into agriculture for the sustainability aspect," Singh-Knights said. She added that the Extension service noticed a spike in female farmers beginning in 2007.

W.Va. struggles with treatment demand for substance abuse

CHARLESTON — West Virginia is struggling to provide enough clinics and long-term treatment programs to help substance abuse addicts, health professionals say.

Bureau of Behavioral Health and Health Facilities deputy commissioner Kim Walsh said state treatment facilities are equipped with about 750 beds, including more than 300 that have opened in the last two years.

West Virginia University School of Behavioral Medicine and Psychiatry vice chairman Carl Sullivan says the state doesn't have enough clinics and therapists to help addicts. "If you have an opioid dependency, unless you have lots of money, you're in trouble," Sullivan said.

According to the West Virginia Behavioral Health Providers Association, about 15,000 people received drug or alcohol abuse treatment in 2014. Department of Health and Human Resources figures show nearly 60,000 West Virginians were identified

as in need of substance abuse treatment.

Walsh said the state has 130 beds are in detoxification/crisis stabilization centers with an average stay of seven to 10 days. About 100 beds are in residential programs that are 28 days or longer, and the rest are in recovery residence programs usually catering to those who have gone through detoxification and need long-term recovery support.

Walsh said about 140 new facility treatment beds will be ready in the coming months.

In September, Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin announced the launch of a statewide 24-hour substance abuse and mental health call line. Callers are connected with staff to help determine the most appropriate treatment option.

A month ago, WVU Medicine's call center started putting callers on a waiting list for opioid abuse treatment. Before, the center had a first-come, first-served policy. The waiting list is now one year for treatment.

"And we don't advertise

that we treat opioid addiction," Sullivan said. "This is all word of mouth."

Walsh said the state's largest long-term treatment facility, Recovery Point of Huntington, has more than 100 beds but has a waiting list of up to six months. Recovery Point plans to open a women's treatment facility in Charleston next spring with up to 30 beds.

After a 2010 arrest, Aaron Chaffins entered Recovery Point and has been sober since February 2013. He now serves as a peer mentor there.

"I was born in Kentucky, but West Virginia saved my life," he said.

President Barack Obama plans to visit Charleston on Wednesday to discuss prescription drug and heroin abuse.

West Virginia has the highest drug overdose death rate in the nation at nearly 34 deaths per 100,000 people — more than twice the national average. Nearly 90 percent of those deaths since 2011 have been caused by heroin and prescription pain pills.

Search warrant unveils gang drug activity in Preston

The execution of a search warrant Saturday in Preston County revealed gang-related drug activity was being conducted out of a Kingwood trailer park, but no arrests were made.

This according to a press release from the Preston County Sheriff's Department.

The search, at Lot 7 of Four Seasons Mobile Home Park — commonly referred to as Grape

Thicket Trailer Park — turned up thousands of dollars, crack cocaine and heroin. The search was the result of an undercover investigation.

The trailer belonged to Robert Davis, 45. Also in the residence was Davis' wife, Carolyn Price, 52, and Akram Hatem, 25, of Detroit. The investigation revealed Mr. Davis was allowing various members of the Detroit Boyz gang to temporarily stay at his home while they sold

controlled substances.

While the release states that the occupants of the residence were distributing crack cocaine, no arrests were made at the time of the search warrant "as positive identification of other gang members is still pending."

According to the release, the case will be presented to the Preston County Prosecuting Attorney's Office for consideration.

Logan teacher accused of sexual abuse

LOGAN — A Logan County vocational school teacher faces a sex abuse charge involving a former student.

Media outlets report that West Virginia State Police arrested 49-year-old John Cain of Mallory on Friday after the alleged victim came forward. Cain is charged with sexual abuse by a guardian or custodian and enticing a minor using obscene material.

Cain is a teacher at the Ralph R. Willis Career and Technical Center in Logan. He's listed on the school's website as a carpentry and building construction teacher.

Logan County Schools Superintendent Phyllis Doty says Cain has been placed on leave from the school.

2 killed, 4 hurt in crash in W.Va.

LAVALETTE, — Police in Wayne County say two people have died and four others were injured in an accident.

Media outlets report the two-vehicle crash occurred around 6:30 p.m. Friday along state Route 152 in Lavalette.

The names of those involved weren't immediately released. The road was closed for more than three hours after the accident.

The cause of the accident remains under investigation. A call to the Wayne County Sheriff's Office went unanswered Saturday.

Judge moves chemical spill sentencing

CHARLESTON — A federal judge is moving back sentencing dates for six men who pleaded guilty in a chemical spill that sullied 300,000

people's water supply.

In a Charleston federal court filing Friday, Judge Thomas Johnston pushed back sentencing hearings until February for the former Freedom Industries officials.

Robert Reynolds will be sentenced Feb. 1 and Michael Burdette will be sentenced Feb. 3.

William Tis' sentencing will be Feb. 8, and Charles Herzing's will take place Feb. 10.

Dennis Farrell will be sentenced Feb. 11, while former Freedom President Gary Southern's hearing will be Feb. 17.

Six men and Freedom itself have pleaded guilty to crimes related to the January 2014 chemical spill.

Freedom's spill of coal-cleaning chemicals in January 2014 spurred a ban on tap water for 300,000 residents for days.

Judy Stewart, of Stewart's Farm & Greenhouse in Pentress, said she and her husband have been taking their goods to market in Morgantown for 10 years. While husbands help with the farming, Stewart said the vendors at many farmers markets are almost entirely female.

"I just kind of think of myself as a big gardener," she said. "I just think we have the opportunity to do it because guys often have to keep working until they're 65."

Singh-Knights says the WVU Extension Service has made educating and training women in agriculture a priority. The agency will host the second annual Women in Agriculture Conference Oct. 23-24 at Canaan Valley Resort.

She said female farmers face a lot of challenges in the area of training to be proficient at a historically male-dominated profession. The conference will provide workshops and training to help women de-

velop production, management, business planning and risk management skills along with valuable networking opportunities.

Stewart said she doesn't plan on attending the conference in Canaan Valley, but said that going to farming conferences would be beneficial for those looking at going into farming.

"They're very helpful," she said. "I went to the [West Virginia] Small Farmer's Conference 45 years in a row and I learned a lot."

Singh-Knights said 155 women attended last year's conference and she hopes at least 200 will attend this year. Registration for the conference is \$75, but partial conference attendance rates are also available. Hickam's book uses family legends to reveal true characters

BECKLEY — In his forthcoming book "Carrying Albert Home," Homer Hickam weaves together family lore, historical accuracies, comedy and a touch of sadness as he tells the story of his parents' journey from Coalwood, West Virginia, to Orlando, Florida, to return home a pet alligator named Albert.

The book is subtitled "The Somewhat True Story of a Man, His Wife and Her Alligator," and it is those blurred lines between truth, the unreliability of memories and the way stories become stretched and exaggerated over time that give this novel its charm.

Albert was a wedding present from the Holly-

wood actor and dancer Buddy Ebsen to the author's parents, Homer and Elsie Lavender Hickam. The reptile grew under the loving and watchful eye of Elsie, but Homer becomes preoccupied with Elsie's affections for Albert, which he believes reveal her secret affections for Ebsen. He gives his wife an ultimatum — It's him or the alligator — and they begin their long journey to carry Albert home to Florida in 1935.

At constant odds with one another and facing dangerous adventures, the two travel 1,000 miles before learning how to come home together.

Writer, retired NASA Engineer and West Virginia native Homer Hickam is best known for his

memoir "Rocket Boys," which is a New York Times Best Seller and was the basis for the movie "October Sky." Although "Carrying Albert Home" stands on its own as a work of fiction, Hickam said it could not have been written before the movie.

In this most recent work, which went on sale recently, Hickam tries to paint a more accurate depiction of his parents.

"I felt people had the wrong idea of who my parents were," he explained. "My dad was supposed to be this harsh, unrelenting authoritarian figure and Elsie is a wimp. That is not the way they are in the book, but most people see the movie. I wanted people to know who my parents really were."

He said that while his father was an authoritarian in the coal mines, his mother was in charge at home and always got her way with her husband.

"In Coalwood, Mom was considered eccentric. The fact that she used to own an alligator would not have been surprising, but she had a love of animals that was passed on to me and my brother. My mom had a green thumb for animals. No matter what kind of animal it was, that animal would thrive," he said.

It was not uncommon for alligators to be given as gifts or brought home as souvenirs from Florida during the 1930s, but they rarely survived. For Albert to grow to 5 feet in length and enjoy both the coal camp house bathtub

and a special concrete pond in the yard is a testimony to Elsie's devotion, ability and, perhaps, stubbornness.

In addition to Albert, Elsie had a pet fox named Parkyacarcass and a squirrel named Chipper while the author was a young boy.

Hickam said he grew up hearing snippets and stories about Albert and his parents' trip to Florida when they were in their early 20s. The stories were offered offhandedly. While referring to Elsie's lead foot in the car, his dad might mention her driving moonshine on the "thunder road," a tale Hickam expounds in the novel.

"They just liked to tell funny stories about their trip. I think it was the

longest period of time in their lives when they were never apart," Hickam said. "I couldn't name a town from Coalwood to Florida that they had not been through. I'd name any town and they'd say, 'Oh, I've been there,' and I'd say, 'Let me guess, it was when you carried Albert home.'"

While the story is filled with outlandish tales, Hickam explains the novel is "all true except the parts that are not true, and they are true, too."

Even when the character of his father fights off smugglers and jumps into the ocean to save Albert during a storm, that story reveals the true character of his dad — a brave man willing to do anything to protect an alligator for Elsie, Hickam explained.

Police: Warrant issued for woman who falsely reported abduction

False reporting can be punished by a fine of up to \$200 and five days in jail.

Ex-Blue Man Group director now making music at Marshall

HUNTINGTON — When Jesse Nolan was 2 years old in New Jersey, his dad Joe would go to work, and his mom, JoAnn, who was deaf, would turn off her hearing aids, open the cabinets, and let Jesse pull out the pots and pans and laugh and drum joyously like the Muppets' Animal.

Well played, mom, well played.

Fast-forward 30 years later, and Jesse Nolan is still making a joyful noise learning and teaching rhythms daily in his walk of life.

A new visiting assistant professor of music with the MU College of Arts and Media, Nolan is one of just more than 100 new hires at Marshall this fall, and chances are he's got one of the most "colorful" pasts.

The young educator and drummer has spent the past five years as a resident music director, drummer and percussionist with the world famous Blue Man Group.

In fact, since 2011, Nolan has chalked up more than 400 performances with the

North American touring cast of BMG — more than 250 gigs with the Chicago and Orlando casts, and an additional 150 dates with the avant-garde percussion group aboard Norwegian Epic Cruise Lines during a European tour of the Mediterranean.

While Nolan wouldn't trade those — or any of his other national Broadway tour experiences — for the world, with his wife Amy expecting their first child in November, he was praying for the right chance to exit the blurred lines of the road, to simplify their lives and to get back to where he once belonged — immersed in his first love of jazz.

It's for those reasons that Nolan, who was with fellow Marshall music professor Jeff Wolfe during his schooling at Indiana University, is diving back into the classroom at Marshall and hoping to be the kind of inspirational music instructor which he says he was blessed with.

"I have been fortunate to have always had amazing teachers no matter what

stage I have been in. Elementary school, middle school, high school, camps, college — it has been this 33-year love affair with drumming that kind of started very organically. I was born, I learned to walk, then I learned to talk and then to drum. That was sort of the progression of things."

While his family pinballed back and forth twice between New Jersey and Illinois growing up, he said it was his time in high school in Naperville, Ill., that got him fully immersed in music as a career option. A band director at that Illinois high school pushed him to sign up for everything, and he did — marching band, concert band and jazz band.

From then on he began looking at drumming as a career.

"Drumming — it's always my love but ... I realized how serious it could be as an art form. That forged the idea this could be a career — that people play music for a living, and write music for a living and teach music for a living," Nolan said.

Texans return to homes in fire-ravaged area

AUSTIN, Texas — Firefighters in Central Texas are still several days away from controlling a wildfire that's destroyed dozens of homes but authorities said Saturday that enough progress has been made to allow some residents to return to their neighborhoods.

The Hidden Pines Fire has consumed about 4,600 acres and razed nearly 50 homes and seven businesses, most of them just north of Buescher State Park.

Steve Pollock, chief regional fire coordinator with Texas A&M Forest Service, said during a news conference Saturday that about 40

percent of the fire is contained, but added that stronger fire lines have been established to prevent it from spreading.

About 200 firefighters from across Texas have battled the blaze during daylight, and Pollock said a DC-10 jet tanker flown in from Tennessee that dropped nearly 12,000 gallons of retardant on the smoldering area Friday was effective in closing gaps in the fire line.

Bastrop County Sheriff Terry Pickering said plans call for some people to be allowed to return to their homes by the end of Saturday.

No injuries have been reported since the fire began

Tuesday. A preliminary investigation has determined a farmer mistakenly started the fire as he dragged a shredder through tall grass, causing an overheated bearing to ignite grass clippings.

The wildfire has scorched more than 7 miles of forestland in an area about 40 miles southeast of Austin. But Bastrop County Emergency Management Coordinator Mike Fisher said firefighters "have got the upper hand on this thing."

Kari Hines, spokeswoman for the Forest Service, said that the fire had not made any large gains in acreage over the last 24 hours.

She said a primary concern for firefighters is em-

bers blown into areas where there are large patches of unburned vegetation, creating more flames to fight.

The fire is chewing much of the same area that was devastated in 2011 by a far more massive wildfire that wiped out 1,600 homes and killed two people. But this time, winds have paled to the 50 mph gusts that overwhelmed firefighters four years ago.

About 400 homes have been evacuated since the Hidden Pines Fire began. About 200 residents have checked into local shelters, though authorities said few have stayed overnight as most slept in motels or the homes of friends.

Small creeks became deadly torrents from S.C. flooding

COLUMBIA, S.C. — Sampson Pringle stood on the roof of his stalled truck on an unfamiliar road in the pouring rain. With water rising around him, he told his fiancée not to worry because he saw help coming.

Two days later, after the historic flood waters started to recede, his body had washed up on someone's lawn, hundreds of feet away from his truck.

Pringle was one of 10 people who drowned in the flash floods in the Columbia area from Oct. 3-5. Their common denominator: All were in their cars, caught off guard by rising water in places they likely didn't expect to flood. Some were out trying to help others.

"Some were going to work. Some were going to someone else's aid. Some people were just caught by surprise. Unfortunately, they all ended up the same place," said Richland County Coroner Gary Watts, who inves-

tigated nine of the drownings. "Just stay off the roads when it might be flooding. Water is much more powerful than you might think."

The victims drowned on little-known waterways like Crane Creek or 25-Mile Creek. A few died on waterways so small they have no name. Their bodies weren't found for hours or sometimes days in the chaos happening across Columbia where an inch of rain fell every 30 minutes for hours and hours. Several smaller earthen dams broke, but engineers still haven't been able to piece together which ones failed first and started the chain reaction.

Pringle, a sweet, devoted family man who planned to go back to school and hoped to open a restaurant, was on unfamiliar Decker Boulevard just before the sun came up on Sunday, Oct. 4. He was driving home from the bar where he worked as a DJ, according to his fiancée, Aneesah Smith.

Colonial church emerges from Mexican reservoir

MEXICO CITY — Leonel Mendoza fishes every day in a reservoir surrounded by forest and mountains in the southern Mexican state of Chiapas. But in recent days, he also has been ferrying curious passengers out to see the remains of a colonial-era church that has emerged from the receding waters.

A drought this year has hit the watershed of the Grijalva river, dropping the water level in the Nezahualcoyotl reservoir by 82 feet.

It is the second time a drop in the reservoir has revealed the church since it was flooded when the dam was completed in 1966. In 2002, the water was so low visitors could walk inside the church.

"The people celebrated.

They came to eat, to hang out, to do business. I sold them fried fish. They did processions around the church," Mendoza recalled during a telephone interview Friday.

The church in the Quechula locality was built by a group of monks headed by Friar Bartolome de la Casas, who arrived in the region inhabited by the Zoque people in the mid-16th century.

The church is 183 feet long and 42 feet wide, with walls rising 30 feet. The bell tower reaches 48 feet above the ground.

"The church was abandoned due the big plagues of 1773-1776," said architect Carlos Navarete, who worked with Mexican authorities on a report about the structure.

It depended on the near-

by monastery of Tecpatan, founded in 1564. Navarrete believes that based on architectural similarities, it is the work of the same builder at very nearly the same time. Its importance was derived from its location on the King's Highway, a road designed by Spanish conquistadors and still in use until the 20th century.

"At that time we still found the wood from the chorus loft and the roof beams," he said. "Also a large ossuary of the victims of the plague that depopulated the area."

"It was a church built thinking that this could be a great population center, but it never achieved that," Navarrete said. "It probably never even had a dedicated priest, only receiving visits from those from Tecpatan."

Typhoon Koppu strengthens as it heads toward the Philippines

MANILA, Philippines — Typhoon Koppu grew stronger but was moving slower toward the northeastern Philippines late Saturday as the government urged local authorities to issue forced evacuations of residents in flood-prone areas.

Local officials have been advised to conduct the "forced evacuation" of communities historically hit by flash floods and landslides as well as coastal villages at risk from destructive storm surges that could reach as high as 10 feet, civil defense chief Alexander Pama said.

"The situation is critical because the winds are getting stronger and it will get stronger as (Koppu) moves closer," he said.

Regional civil defense chief Norma Talosig said villagers had been voluntarily moving to safer ground or emergency shelters since early Saturday. She could not immediately give the number of evacuees.

Heavy rains are expected to inundate many areas on the main northern island of Luzon even before the typhoon makes landfall early Sunday, acting weather bureau chief Esperanza Cayan said.

Cayan said another typhoon farther east and a high pressure area north of the country would hold Koppu in a "semi-stationary" position and shroud most of Luzon with an enormous band of thick rain clouds.

"We are looking at the possible worst scenario, not to scare but to allow us to prepare," Cayan said. "If it stays 24 hours ... and the downpour is sustained, we will surely have floods and landslides."

Forecasters said the typhoon's cloud band had expanded to about 406 miles in diameter by late Saturday,

unleashing the most intense rain close to the center.

By 6 p.m. Saturday, the typhoon was about 125 miles east of Aurora province, where Koppu is expected to make landfall. It was packing sustained winds of 109 miles per hour, and gusts of up to 131 mph. It slowed to a crawl from 9 mph Friday to 6 mph Saturday.

AccuWeather said the combination of a typhoon's slow movement and its powerful winds "could spell a disastrous situation for residents and communities in its path."

President Benigno Aquino III appeared Friday on national television to warn Filipinos about the typhoon and appealed for cooperation to prevent casualties.

It was the first time Aquino had personally issued a storm warning on television since super Typhoon Haiyan barreled through the central Philippines in November 2013, leaving more than 7,300 dead or missing.

Aquino said an estimated

1.5 million families, or about 7.5 million people, would need relief assistance.

Metropolitan Manila, the sprawling Philippine capital of 12 million, about 91 miles southwest of Aurora, will be spared from the brunt of the typhoon but it is expected to be drenched with intense rain starting late Saturday, forecaster Adzar Aurelio said.

Koppu will likely be equivalent to a Category 3 or 4 hurricane, which could cause devastating to catastrophic damage, according to AccuWeather Meteorologist Adam Douty.

Douty said that 12-24 inches of rain is expected to be widespread on Luzon, but that certain areas could be inundated by over 36 inches, which would be "sure to trigger severe and life-threatening flooding and mudslides."

Koppu will be the 12th storm to hit the Philippines this year. An average of 20 storms pummel the country annually.

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Mexican drug lord was flown to Sinaloa mountains after escape

MEXICO CITY — Fugitive drug lord Joaquin “El Chapo” Guzman was flown to a mountainous region of his home state of Sinaloa following his daring July 11 escape from prison through a mile-long tunnel, a federal official said Saturday. Based on this information, the search for the world’s most wanted drug lord has focused in recent weeks on a rugged area that stretches from Sinaloa into neighboring Durango state, part of Mexico’s famed Golden Triangle drug-producing region that is considered Guzman’s home turf, said the official, who spoke on condition of anonymity because the investigation is ongoing. The official said that after

his escape from the maximum-security prison where he was being held not far from Mexico City, Guzman was taken to the central state of Queretaro. From there, he was flown in a small plane to the Sinaloa mountains, the official said. Several days ago, Mexican Attorney General Arely Gomez told Congress that authorities had captured a pilot who aided Guzman after his escape. The federal official said Saturday that it was the pilot who flew the escaped drug lord in the small plane. Late Friday, Mexico’s government said Guzman had avoided capture in an operation in the mountains of northwestern Mexico. A statement by Mexico’s Security Cabinet said officials think the legendary

drug lord injured a leg and his face fleeing Mexican marines in the rugged terrain. It provided no details on when or exactly where the operation took place, but the area of mountains of Sinaloa and Durango is in northwest Mexico. The statement cited information-sharing with international agencies for leading authorities to the area. Guzman previously escaped from another maximum-security prison in 2001, and evaded capture for years in the mountains of Sinaloa. His most recent escape strained relations with Washington, which had formally requested the drug kingpin’s extradition just weeks earlier. A variety of U.S. officials, including lawmakers

and law enforcement officials, had called for Guzman’s transfer to the U.S. since his arrest in February 2014. Mexican officials, however, said Guzman wouldn’t be sent to the U.S. until he had served time for all of his crimes in Mexico. Guzman escaped through a sophisticated tunnel that opened in the floor of his cell’s shower. A surveillance video of Guzman’s cell shows him walking to the shower — where there was a blind spot in the security camera’s view — crouching down and then vanishing. Mexico has issued arrest warrants for 23 former officials, guards or police officers for allegedly participating in his escape. In addition, 10 civilians are being held under a form of house arrest.

German mayoral candidate stabbed

BERLIN — A leading candidate to be mayor of Cologne was stabbed and seriously wounded Saturday by a man who claimed anti-foreigner motives, an attack that Germany’s interior minister said underlined growing concerns over hatred and violence in the refugee crisis. Henriette Reker was stabbed in the neck at a campaign stand set up by Chancellor Angela Merkel’s Christian Democrats at a market. Her condition was stable, police chief Wolfgang Albers said. Reker is an independent candidate in Sunday’s election for the new mayor of Germany’s fourth-biggest city, but is backed by Merkel’s conservatives and two other parties. The 58-year-old currently heads Cologne’s social affairs and integration department, and is responsible for refugee housing. Another woman was seriously wounded and three people had minor injuries from the attack, senior police investigator Norbert Wagner told reporters. The suspected assailant, a 44-year-old German national and Cologne resident who said he had been unemployed for several years, told officials that he targeted Reker and that “he wanted to and did commit this act because of anti-foreigner motives,” Wagner said. He added that the man appeared

to have acted alone and had no police record. Prosecutor Ulf Willuhn said officials will now investigate whether that was in fact the man’s primary motive or whether his health played a role. They plan to carry out a psychiatric examination. Asked whether the suspect had specifically mentioned Reker’s or Merkel’s policies on refugees, Wagner said: “No. He made general statements in that direction — he didn’t mention Ms. Merkel at all.” City officials said Sunday’s election would go ahead as planned. Interior Minister Thomas de Maiziere described the stabbing as “an attack on our democracy” and said he had long been “concerned by the hate-filled language and violent actions that accompany the refugee debate in Germany.” “This cowardly attack in Cologne is further evidence of the increasing radicalization of the refugee debate,” he said in a statement. Germany has taken in more refugees and other migrants than any other European Union country, and the influx is stretching its capacity to house newcomers. Most Germans have been welcoming, but there have been repeated attacks this year on refugee shelters, ranging from arson to racist graffiti. Attacks on politicians are rare in Germany, but there have been prominent cases.

German woman freed following Afghan kidnap

BERLIN — Germany’s foreign minister says a German woman who was kidnapped two months ago in the Afghan capital, Kabul, has been freed. Frank-Walter Steinmeier said in a statement Saturday that he was “very relieved” the German was free and that she is “doing well considering the circumstances.” He gave no details of the woman’s release but thanked the Afghan government, its security forces and Germany’s partners in the NATO-led Resolute Support mission in Afghanistan.

VW commercials getting a new view in light of emissions scam

WASHINGTON — "Aren't diesels dirty?" asks the grandmother in the passenger seat of the gleaming new VW Golf SportWagen.

"Diesel in Latin means 'dirty,'" chimes in another friend in the backseat.

To prove them wrong, the gray-haired driver gets out and holds her white scarf up to the tailpipe of the purring car.

"See how clean it is!" she exclaims, holding up the spotless shawl.

The Federal Trade Commission is now reviewing whether that 30-second spot and others like it touting Volkswagen's "Clean Diesel" engines amount to fraud, adding a new avenue for U.S. regulators to punish the German automaker for its emissions-rigging deception.

FTC spokesman Justin Cole declined to comment Friday beyond confirming the commission's coordination with other federal agencies conducting a criminal probe into VW's use of a "defeat device" to hide emissions of smog-causing gases at up to 40 times the legal limit.

For years, the company had used well-funded national ad campaigns to boast its vehicles had the perfect balance of peppy acceleration, 40-mile-per-gallon gas mileage and low greenhouse-gas emissions. The pitch helped lure environmentally con-

scious customers who wanted to help save the planet without sacrificing driving performance.

While the FTC can't send anyone to jail, it can go to federal court to protect consumers and negotiate settlements with wide-ranging penalties. Those could potentially include paying cash restitution to the affected car owners and forcing VW to buy new national ads admitting the company lied to customers.

"This is exactly the type of case you would expect the FTC to look at," said Lee Peeler, a former FTC official who is president of the Better Business Bureau's Advertising Self-Regulatory Council. "When it comes to false advertising the agency actually has a pretty broad range of authority."

VW hastily took its "Clean Diesel" ads off the air following last month's admission it had cheated on emissions tests. The ads have also been removed from the company's websites and YouTube channel.

Volkswagen spokeswoman Jeannine Ginivan said airing the spots no longer made sense after the company withdrew its diesel cars from the market. VW is now coordinating with the Environmental Protection Agency on an expected recall of the nearly 500,000 sold in the U.S. since the suspect software first appeared in its 2009 diesel models.

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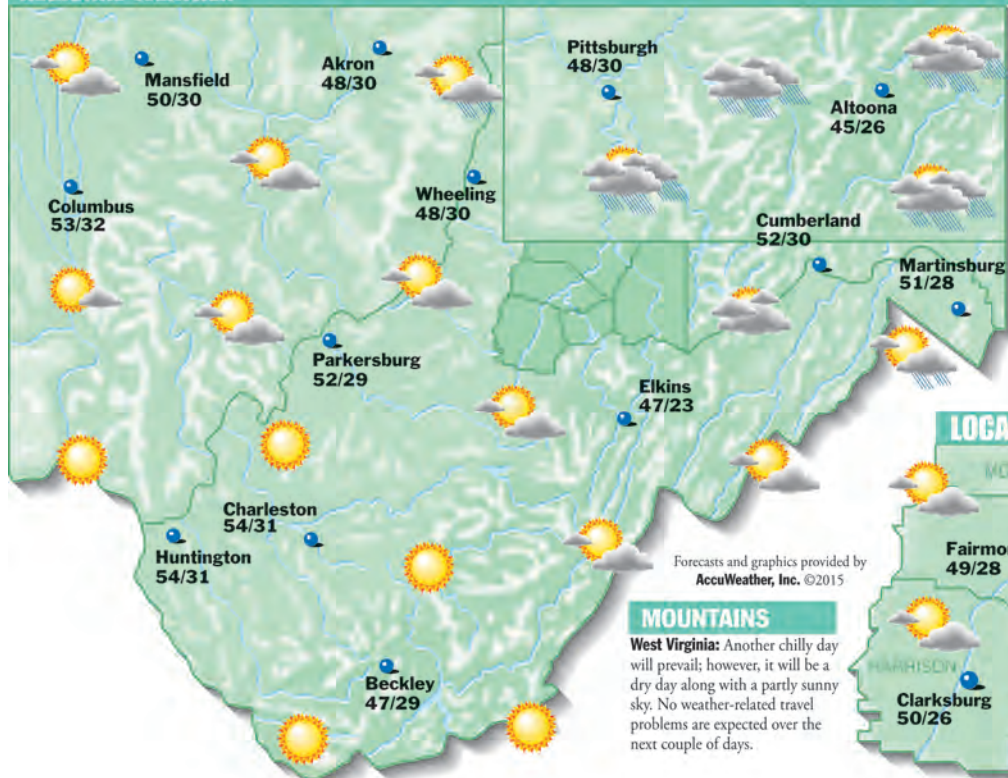

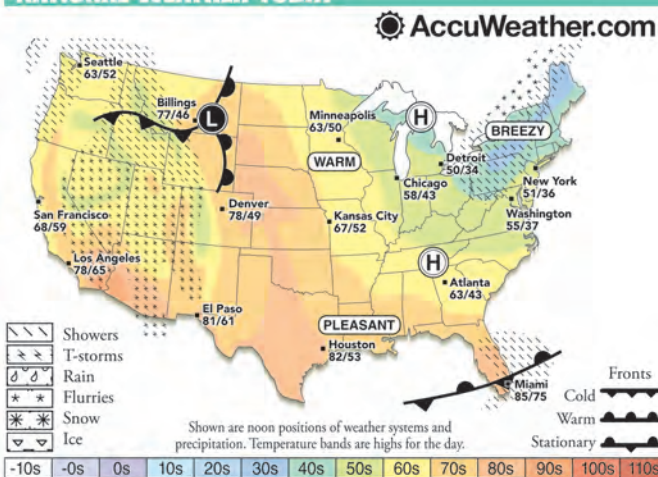

Hunt estate needs mediation

Mon clerk to reach out to surrounding counties in search

Monongalia County Clerk Carye Blaney plans to reach out to surrounding counties in an attempt to locate a special fiduciary commissioner to handle the estate of Jody Hunt.

A fiduciary commissioner is appointed to mediate between

the personal representative of an estate and the heirs or claimants of the estate when there is an issue.

Blaney explained that Monongalia County has three fiduciary commissioners — George Armistead, Lynne Crane and Cynthia Stafford — but each had a conflict regarding the parties involved with this estate.

Hunt shot and killed four people at three locations on the morning of Dec. 1, 2014, then took his own life.

"We tried to do our due diligence through all of our chan-

nels ... and we have not been successful," Blaney told the county commission during its most recent meeting.

Blaney said that in instances when the county's three fiduciary commissioners cannot take on an estate, it is opened up to past fiduciary commissioners or other attorneys from the Monongalia County Bar Association — once again, to no avail.

Blaney told the county commission that she would likely reach out to representatives of the bar associations in Preston

and Marion counties. Commissioner Ed Hawkins suggested including Taylor and Harrison counties as well.

"There may be an attorney in another county that may be able to that's not within our bar association," Blaney said, adding "We've just sort of sat on it in light of some other things that are happening in that estate right now."

Hunt, the owner of J&J Towing, shot Doug Brady at Brady's Dunkard Avenue towing shop,

The scenario will involve one or more shooters.

"We will set up an active shooter in the school, and then we will hit the participants with a few surprises," Bickerstaff said. "I can't say any more. People don't believe it could happen here. But it has already happened in West Virginia."

A 14-year-old boy held numerous students and a teacher hostage in August inside his Barbour County high school.

Bickerstaff said Preston's call will be paged out as a drill. He said the drill will give county officials a chance to test their emergency systems and capabilities.

"We try to over burden hospitals to see how they work. We make it as real as possible," he said.

He said it will take four to six months for the drill to be put together.

LEPC Chairman Dave Price said he believes it is important for the media to be involved during the entire drill procedure, including planning meetings.

"We want them involved," Bickerstaff said. "There will be a place for them the day of the actual drill. We also want the school to have a really big part."

The first person on the scene will set up a unified command center.

"We want to make sure PHS Principal Dave Pastrick is one of the people at the command center," Bickerstaff said.

Price said during the last drill there were problems with agencies asking "whose turf is this?"

“If there is a conflict of who is in charge it needs to be addressed in this situation and not in a real one,” Bickerstaff said. “Our goal is to get everyone to play together. We want to see if everyone's plans work together or not.”

Pastrick said he would also like to see a smaller drill on a school day.

Bickerstaff said the drill won't be expensive. “Some agencies might

have to pay some overtime. That's one of the disadvantages,” he said.

After the event, Bickerstaff said, everyone will get together to assess response. “It's not to blame anyone. It's to find the good and see what needs to be improved,” he said.

Rodger Bolyard volunteered to coordinate the planning meetings but said he would need help.

After the drill, every agency must submit a report. Copies of the reports goes to the E911 center and to Homeland Security.

The whole family benefits from physically active quality time

AT THE BEGINNING of the year I vowed to stay physically active and in that process I lost 47 pounds. Losing that weight had a lot to do with my choice to become more active with my family. However, the lure of the couch (chocolate milk + macaroni and cheese) can be strong and became the tracker beam for me and I gained back 23 pounds of the 47 that I lost.

I realized that I lost my motivation or really never had one clearly identified. Motivation other than losing the weight wasn't even thought of. Sometimes, in order to make fitness maintainable and motivational it has to be fun for everyone, and you need to go "Mountaineer" about it and kick it up a notch. Try one of these motivators that seem to work for me.

1. Make it a (friendly) competition. Some kids (and adults) are inspired by the chance to strut their stuff and prove their

proWess. Turn walks into friendly races or backyard ball-tossing into real games like a revised version of "corn hole" with score-keeping. Make a dance party into an American Idol-style event with points awarded for the best moves.

We use our gaming console to lead us in our dancing. Who in your crew can take the most steps in a day, do the most push-ups, or twist into the most complicated yoga pose? You might be surprised. Do keep your child's temperament in mind, though; this strategy will backfire with kids who are sensitive about their abilities, or who simply don't care about winners and losers.

So, make score keeping optional, because in my house it has to be. I'm a poor sport, but I'm a work in progress.

2. Step up the silly factor in your activity. If you're dancing, go all out with crazy costumes and crazier moves. If you're taking a family walk, tell jokes or sing goofy songs as you go. If someone needs a new winter hat, pick up one of those funny fleeces that make the wearer look like a court jester or a spiky-headed dinosaur.

Who wouldn't want an excuse to go outside in get-up like that? Once my family dressed like super heroes and went to the local video rental and ran throughout the store fighting late fees.

4. Be "New to the Game" together. As a family, choose a new sport and learn it together. Martial arts, horseback riding, and dance are especially well-suited to vary-

ing ages and skill levels. Or teach each other your favorite fitness activities. Kids love to reverse roles and be the instructor as my daughter says "in charge." Set aside a family workout time once or twice a week and take turns taking the lead.

A pre-requisite for change is the desire to change. With summer right at our doorstep the opportunities are endless regarding the activities that we can be involved in to increase and motivate that desire.

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Ex-members of church where teens beaten talk of decline

NEW HARTFORD, N.Y. — Former members of the upstate New York church where two teens were viciously beaten paint a picture of a once vibrant and joyous house of worship that had declined into a place of fear and intimidation under new leadership.

“When I first arrived, it was warm and welcoming. It was encouraging. It was helpful,” said Chadwick Handville, a massage therapist in Phoenix, Arizona, who left the Word of Life Christian Church in June 2000 after 10 years that included a stint as a worship leader and trustee. Things went downhill after founder Jerry Irwin returned from some time away and reclaimed his position as pastor, Handville said.

“What was off the wall was his attitude toward others,”

Handville said. “It wasn’t happy. He accused every male of lusting after his wife.”

Handville said Irwin’s preaching was filled with personal attacks on parish-

ioners, whom he forced to work long hours renovating the Irwin family’s apartment on the third floor of the former school building that houses the

church in New Hartford.

“He did have good points,” Handville said. “Through him I was able to memorize half the Bible. He taught me a lot. What he failed to teach me was how to use what I read, how to treat people.”

Handville said many current and former church members are afraid to talk publicly about the church for fear of recriminations.

In a letter to the Post-Standard of Syracuse, former congre-gand Nathan Ames said the church started out as a fast-growing Pentecostal church, but declined after Irwin reclaimed leadership. Ames described Irwin as controlling and intimidating.

Since Irwin’s fatal stroke several years ago, his wife, Traci, and their children — Tiffanie, Daniel and Joseph — have been in charge. Ames said they continued in the style of the founder.

‘Extensive’ cleanup underway in wake of California storms

LOS ANGELES — Homeowners in northern Los Angeles County communities were spending their Saturday digging mud out of their houses as crews continued extensive work to clear tons of dirt that clogged roadways and buried hundreds of cars.

The cleanup follows thunderstorms that unleashed flash flooding and debris flows on Thursday, damaging dozens of homes and trapping hundreds of cars on area highways and roads. No injuries were reported. The thunderstorms were powered by a low pressure system pulling in moisture from the south. As much as 1.45 inches of rain fell in a quick span of time near where the most intense flooding occurred.

The storms unleashed flash flooding and debris flows along State Route 58, Interstate 5 and throughout the area.

Those who witnessed

the worst of the flooding describe it as terrifying.

“It was a raging river of mud,” said 51-year-old Rhonda Flores, who was in her car when the flooding overtook State Route 58. “I’ve never experienced anything like it, ever.”

She and hundreds of others on the roadway at the time were rescued about 10 hours later and spent the night at area shelters.

Sgt. Mario Lopez, a spokesman for the California Highway Patrol, said it will take days to reopen State Route 58, a mile of which is choked with mud between 2 and 6 feet deep. About 200 cars and semi-trucks were trapped in the now-hardened mud, frozen in place at odd angles.

Heavy equipment and workers were in the process of freeing the vehicles and clearing the mud Saturday.

Hundreds of cars also were stuck on Interstate 5, a major artery, but those cars were cleared and the freeway reopened by late Friday.

Cool QB Russell and Bears bear up under WVU blitz

WACO, Texas

BAYLOR'S McLANE STADIUM is to college football what the Chrysler Building is to Art-Deco skyscrapers, or the Taj Mahal to palatial mausoleums, or the Eiffel Tower to old towers that make people kiss while standing atop them.

You get the point. Constructed from 2012 to 2014 and now a month past its first birthday, Baylor's is a beautiful stadium, with the waters of the Brazos River making for a lovely vista beyond the south end zone.

In fact, it seems the only feature the architects neglected to imbue it with was defense.

And for a team like this year's WVU group that prides itself on stopping just as much as scoring, that's about as glaring a design flaw as that vulnerable trench on the Death Star (the first Death Star, if you were wondering).

On Saturday, WVU's defense imploded like it was hit by proton torpedo named **Corey Coleman**. Coleman vaulted himself into the Heisman Trophy conversation with 10 catches for 199 yards and three touchdowns against the Mountaineers.

By the time it was done, Baylor's offense had racked up 693 yards, which surpassed its absurd game average of 686.6 yards per contest.

When faced with an attack that operated with such ease, WVU defensive coordinator **Tony Gibson** tried to make things as difficult as possible, as he dialed up every blitz known to Mountaineer-kind.

"It probably didn't look like it, because they were getting rid of and delivering the ball so fast," Gibson said. "But we tried to hit them with every blitz, every zero blitz, every cover-1 blitz, we were run-blitzing. And yeah. It was just one of those things."

In fact, Gibson sought out Baylor quarterback **Seth Russell** on the field after the game to say something along the lines of, "Congrats, I dug into the deepest footnotes of my playbook for something that would knock you on your butt, but unfortunately, your jersey seems pretty clean" (which probably isn't the case, since Russell ran for 160 yards on 14 carries).

What Gibson actually said was, "Look we've rattled a lot of quarterbacks. You're the first kid I've seen in two years that it didn't even faze you."

The Baylor offense's sustained success carried ripple effects for its counterpart. The Mountaineers knew they were engaged in a shootout a mere 58 seconds into the game, when Russell broke a **Jarrold Harper** tackle to score the Bears' first touchdown, on an option keeper.

They felt like they had to keep up, blow for blow.

"We knew they were going to score, and we had to match it," wide receiver **Shelton Gibson** said. "We just couldn't match them."

But this loss doesn't fall on either Gibson. One's a capable deep threat and the other, an adept coordinator.

Injuries hurt the Mountaineers: The obvious wound, **Karl Joseph's** torn ACL, lingers, while senior Terrell Chestnut, the team's starting left corner, left the game with a left shoulder injury in the first half (that's a lot of lefts for one sentence).

But more than anything, Baylor is simply a better team than WVU, at least 24 points better and probably more if it weren't for **Marvin Gross Jr.'s** shoestring tackle inside the 5-yard line on a kick return inside the game's final minute.

"It's a bad situation right now with our kids," Tony Gibson said. "Sitting here at 3-3, with the way we started and expectations we had. To come here and go through that? We're at a good time right now for a bye week."

WACO, Texas — Shane Lyons sat alone, his lanky form cramped in accordance with the angles of a two-tiered metal bench located on the visitor's sideline of Baylor's McLane Stadium.

From his perch, the first-year WVU director of athletics enjoyed quiet isolation, inasmuch as the eight minutes leading up to the kickoff of a Big 12 football game can be considered quiet, or an environ in which he was surrounded by 45,730 card-carrying Bears fans, isolated.

Lyons rested his head in his hands in what could be taken as a gesture of pensive reverie.

But for the Mountaineers, any daydreams devolved into a nightmare in just 58 seconds Saturday — the matter of time it took No. 2 Baylor to march 80 yards and score the first of its six passing touchdowns in a 62-38 win.

"I knew we couldn't outscore these guys," WVU head coach Dana Holgorsen said. "We needed to have them have a bad day and miss some throws and create some turnovers. And we didn't."

Instead, Corey Coleman broke Kendall Wright's Baylor record for receiving touchdowns in a season (14) with an 11-yard scoring connection from quarterback Seth Russell early in the second quarter.

Coleman, who caught 10 passes for 199 yards and three touchdowns (he now has 16 on the season), terrorized WVU cornerback Daryl Worley early, victimizing the junior to the extent that Mountaineers defensive coordinator Tony Gibson elected to pull him from the game following the Bears' second drive.

"Number 1 is the best player in college football," Holgorsen said of Coleman. "You can put me on the record with that."

Four plays that changed the game

Russell’s 50-yard pass to Corey Coleman

This play set the tone for Baylor’s awe-inspiring offensive output.

Russell found Coleman for the big-gainer that moved the ball to the WVU 15 on Baylor’s second offensive play. The Bears scored their first touchdown two plays later.

Russell’s 16-yard TD run

Talk about another tone-setter. This was Russell’s first carry, and it resulted in the Bears’ initial touchdown.

Russell ran for a game-high 160 yards on 14 carries, averaging a whopping 11.4 yards per attempt.

“We felt like coming into this game he would have to run some,” Baylor coach Art Briles said.

“We hadn’t been running him much, but he has that ability and that’s an X-factor we haven’t had in a couple of years. He’s really good at it.”

Coleman’s 2-yard scoring grab

This was the first of three touch-

down receptions for Baylor star wideout Corey Coleman.

He finished with 10 catches for 199 yards and three touchdowns.

That led to this Holgorsen assessment of Coleman:

He’s “the best receiver in college football,” he said. “You can put me on the record for that.”

Sills’ 35-yard touchdown catch

Mountaineers fans have been eagerly anticipating David Sills’ debut since he enrolled at WVU in January.

They just didn’t expect him to debut as a receiver.

Sills, a highly touted quarterback in high school, got WVU’s supporters talking with a two-catch afternoon that included an over-the-shoulder grab for a third-quarter touchdown.

“He makes plays,” Holgorsen said. “That’s kind of the point of being a receiver.”

Rushing offense

C It’s clear WVU has one viable player at the running back position, and his name is Wendell Smallwood. Despite clearly still hobbled by a high-ankle sprain, Smallwood gained 89 yards on 12 carries, including a 52-yard burst up the middle during the second quarter.

Passing offense

C Skyler Howard enjoyed a bit of a bounceback game, throwing for 289 yards and four touchdowns to just one interception. Still, the junior completed less than 50 percent of his passes.

Shelton Gibson remains a deep threat, and freshman quarterback-turned-wide receiver David Sills (two catches 64 yards, one score) brings physicality and an ability to make catches in traffic that wasn’t previously present

in this offense.

Rushing defense

C If you had told the Mountaineers they would hold Baylor’s running backs to 130 yards before Saturday’s game they would have been thrilled. So why weren’t they? Bears quarterback Seth Russell rushed for a game-high 160 yards, averaging 11.4 yards per carry.

Passing defense

D Russell picked the Mountaineers apart, completing 20 passes for 380 yards and five touchdowns. WVU brought pressure in the secondary.

WVU had no answer for Baylor’s superstar wideout, Corey Coleman. He pulled in 10 passes for 199 yards and three scores. Jay

Lee had two scoring catches.

Special teams

C Shelton Gibson’s 100-yard kickoff return was the obvious highlight. The Mountaineer surrendered an 84-yard kickoff return by Chris Platt that did not go for a score. Nick O’Toole turned in his usual solid performance, averaging 47.5 yards on four punts.

LAWRENCE, Kan. — Patrick Mahomes threw for 359 yards and a score, De'Andre Washington rushed for 160 yards and a TD and Texas Tech held off a late-charging, winless Kansas team, 30-20, on Saturday.

The Red Raiders (5-2, 2-2 Big 12) racked up 225 yards rushing and a touchdown on the ground. Texas Tech's 30 points were the fewest the team has scored all season.

Five Texas Tech offensive playmakers each recorded more than 50 yards receiving. Zach Austin led the Red Raiders with

80 yards receiving, Jakeem Grant had 76 yards, Devin Lauderdale 50, Cameron Batson 58, and Reginald Davis 57 yards and a score.

Kansas (0-6, 0-3) is riding a nine-game losing streak and is 0-6 for the first time since 1988.

(19) Oklahoma 55 Kansas State 0

MANHATTAN, Kan. — Baker Mayfield threw for five touchdowns and Oklahoma (5-1, 2-1 Big 12) bounced back from its Red River upset to beat Kansas State (3-3, 0-3), the first time the Wildcats have been shut out since 1996.

Kansas State had delivered serious scares to Top 25 opponents each of the last

two weeks but the Wildcats were helpless against the Sooners. Oklahoma set the tone early, taking only 1:04 to score on its opening drive, on a 22-yard pass from Mayfield to Sterling Shepard.

(7) Michigan State 27 (12) Michigan 23

ANN ARBOR, Mich. — Jalen Watts-Jackson grabbed a flubbed punt and lumbered 38 yards into the end zone for a touchdown on the final play of the game, giving Michigan State (7-0, 3-0 Big Ten) a shocking win against Michigan (5-2, 2-1).

With the Wolverines ahead, 23-21, and 10 seconds left, Michigan punter Blake O'Neil bobbled a low snap,

and spun around to try and make the kick. But he was hit, the ball popped free and Watts-Jackson caught it, broke a few tackles in the final yards and made it into the end zone.

(10) Alabama 41 (9) Texas A&M 23

COLLEGE STATION, Texas — Derrick Henry ran for a career-high 236 yards and two scores and Alabama (6-1, 3-1 SEC) added a school record three touchdowns on interception returns to get a win against Texas A&M (5-1, 2-1).

(11) Florida State 41 Louisville 21

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Everett Golson threw for 372 yards and three touch-

downs and Florida State (6-0, 4-0 ACC) rallied in the second half to beat Louisville (2-4, 1-2). Louisville's Lamar Jackson passed for a career-high 307 yards.

Memphis 37 (13) Ole Miss 24

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Paxton Lynch threw for 384 yards and three touchdowns as Memphis (6-0) stunned Mississippi (5-2).

Memphis has won 13 straight games, the third longest streak in the nation. It was the first win for the Tigers against a ranked opponent since 1996.

(17) Iowa 40 (20) Northwestern 10

EVANSTON, Ill. — Re-

serve running back Akrum Wadley ran for 192 yards and tied a school record with four rushing touchdowns to carry Iowa (7-0, 3-0 Big Ten) past Northwestern (5-2, 1-2).

With leading rusher Jordan Canzeri sidelined in the first quarter with an ankle injury, Wadley took over for Iowa.

(22) Toledo 63 Eastern Michigan 20

TOLEDO, Ohio — Phillip Ely threw for 327 yards and four touchdowns and Toledo (2-0 Mid-American Conference) improved to 6-0 for the first time since 1997 by beating Eastern Michigan (1-6, 0-3).

The Fishing Club was formed in 2011 and among other activities, it has members who are on the bass fishing circuit representing the Mountaineers. The WVU team competes in the two major college tournament circuits: The FLW College Series and the Bassmaster College Series.

A recent Saturday found Matt and Matt (sounds like a law firm) fishing in the Poorman Bass Fishing Trail tournament on Cheat Lake with about 30 other boats. They won.

But most of the time the WVU teams compete in the FLW or Bassmaster college circuit all around the county. Combs and Marshall started their 2015 fishing year with a 39th place finish (out of 80 or so teams) at the FLW College

Series National Championships, in South Carolina, in April. Then they placed fourth at the Bassmaster College Series Eastern Regional, in North Carolina, in March, and fourth at the Ohio State Buckeye Battle, in April, in Ohio.

How about a sixth-place finish at the FLW College Series Northern Conference Regional, in May, in Virginia? This qualified them for the FLW college national championship, to be held next spring.

Does WVU have a chance to win? Apparently. Last year they placed second in the national championships, out of the 49 teams fighting for the crown.

In September, the WVU team placed ninth at the FLW College Series Northern Conference Champi-

onship, in the Chesapeake Bay. The top 10 teams qualify for the 2016 FLW National Championship, next spring (site and date not set yet).

In an effort to raise funds and awareness, they have partnered with the WVU School of Natural Resources, Dick's Sporting Goods, Jig and Tonic, and WV Bass Nation to host the WVU Fishing Team Fundraising Open, on Saturday, at Stonewall Jackson Lake.

Royals rally to take a 2-0 lead on Jays

KANSAS CITY, Mo. — The Kansas City Royals kept waiting for Toronto Blue Jays ace David Price to give them some hope.

It turned out to be Toronto's leaky defense that provided it.

The Royals had managed just one hit through six innings when Ben Zobrist's easy fly somehow fell for a hit that began a five-run rally against Price in the seventh inning Saturday. The Royals rolled the rest of the way to a 6-3 victory against Toronto and a 2-0 lead in the AL Championship Series.

"We needed to catch a break," the Royals' Alex Gordon said, "and Zobrist's ball was it."

Luke Hochevar wiggled out of a jam to keep Kansas City in the game, and Danny Duffy and Kelvin Herrera got the ball to closer Wade Davis, who had to survive a shaky ninth to preserve the win.

Davis gave up a leadoff single and walked pinch-hitter Cliff Pennington, but bounced back to strike out leadoff man Ben Revere and MVP candidate Josh Donaldson. Jose Bautista then flied out to right to give

Davis his third postseason save and the Royals another postseason comeback win.

"Our guys never quit," Royals manager Ned Yost said. "They keep going."

Even though they looked foolish flailing at Price's pitches — until the lazy fly ball by Zobrist changed everything. They proceeded to string together four singles and a double in their go-ahead inning, getting run-producing hits from Gordon, Eric Hosmer, Mike Moustakas and Alex Rios, along with an RBI ground-out from Kendrys Morales.

It was a monumental collapse for Price, who had at one point recorded 18 straight outs. He fell to 0-7 in seven postseason starts, including a loss to Texas in their AL Division Series.

"I gave up hits at the wrong time," he said. "I felt good. It's a very scrappy team. They put the ball in play. They continued to battle. It's just a tough loss."

Meanwhile, the reigning AL champs have won nine straight ALCS games dating to their memorable seven-game series against Toronto in 1985 — the year they won their only World Series. The record is 10 straight wins set by Baltimore in the 1960s and '70s.

The Blue Jays head home for Game 3, on Monday night, in dire trouble.

An overdose of attention

Prescription drug abuse epidemic becoming priority

It's almost easy to get a thousand prescriptions or more.

But it's often impossible to get a single remedy.

That was until last week when it finally appeared we might have a fix for what ails us.

No one is suggesting everyone has been sitting on their hands while prescription painkillers and heroin ravage our state.

On the contrary, common sense policies, more pragmatic laws, increased public funds and awareness and other countermeasures have all aided efforts to curb this epidemic.

Yet, we were just treating the symptoms, rather than bringing all parties' — political and otherwise — focus to bear on a cure-all.

But last week on numerous fronts, ranging from President Obama to Delegate Matt Rohrbach, R-Cabell, it seems we all might be on the same page.

This issue first leaped to the front page early last week, after our newspaper's Editorial Board met with U.S. Sen. Joe Manchin, D-W.Va.

Though he's confronted with many serious issues, from coal's downturn to the Iran nuclear deal, he turned to prescription drug abuse first.

"The most important thing ... that's happening to our state right now is prescription drug abuse. It's the No. 1 killer in our state," he said.

Manchin has long been focused on how opiates are scheduled to be prescribed and distributed. He succeeded in getting hydrocodone moved from Schedule III to a Schedule II controlled substance in 2014.

That reclassification requires patients to get a written prescription and restricts refill. It also places manufacturing quotas on these products.

Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin has also made prescription drug abuse one focus of his administration.

He has boosted funding for drug treatment centers and spearheaded legislation, ranging from a prescription drug database to track sales to wider dispensation of naloxone, which counteracts drug overdoses.

Then late last week, the White House announced President Obama will visit West Virginia on Wednesday to discuss prescription drug abuse.

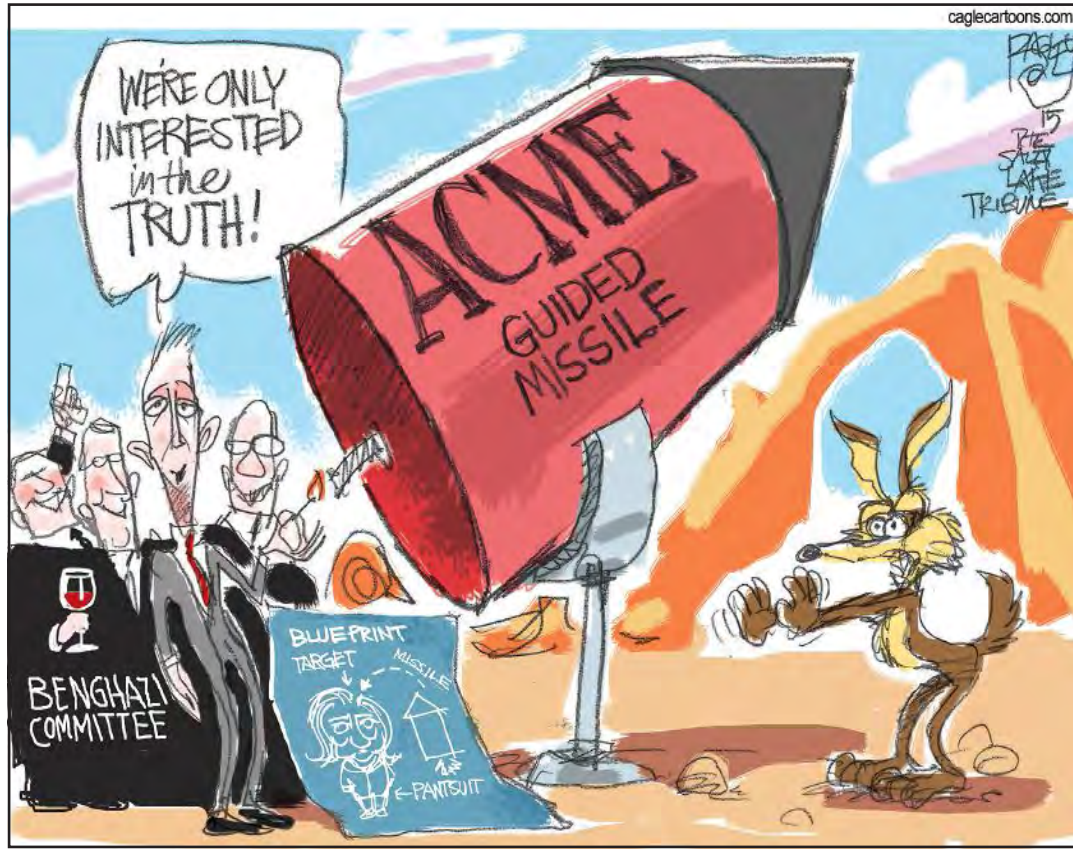
He'll meet with medical professionals, educators, law enforcement officers and others during a forum to discuss the fight against abuse of prescription and illegal drugs.

It's also important to note most Republican legislators are also outspoken about this epidemic and have supported legislation to make a difference.

"You cannot be two or three times the rate of substance abuse compared to the rest of the nation and get businesses to move here. It's just not going to happen," Rohrbach recently told another state newspaper.

There's no single antidote for this scourge, but thousands of people now realize these are not just statistics.

They are the lives of loved ones in the balance

Global effort to end polio making strides

We wanted to bring to your attention a recent major development in global public health.

In September, the World Health Organization declared Nigeria polio-free. Nigeria was the last country in Africa with endemic poliovirus, leaving only two countries, Pakistan and Afghanistan, where polio has never been stopped.

If we can root the virus out of these two last strongholds, polio is poised to be only the second human disease ever eradicated, after smallpox.

Rotary, a humanitarian service organization with nearly 34,000 clubs across the world including the Cheat Lake, Kingwood, Morgantown, Morgantown North, Newburg and Westover Rotary clubs, made polio erad-



ication its top priority in 1985. When the initiative started, more than 350,000 people were stricken by polio every year, with nearly 1,000 new polio cases every day. Since that time, cases have been reduced by 99.9 percent — with less than 50 cases so far in 2015. On Friday (Oct. 23), Rotary and UNICEF will host an event in New York City which will stream live on-

line and will provide a status update on the global effort to eradicate polio.

The update will include appearances by celebrities, health experts, journalists and more. World Polio Day is Saturday (Oct. 24).

Benefits have costs

Paid parental leave for women can also be counter-productive

IN 2013, THE UNIVERSITY OF VERMONT banned the sale of bottled water on campus.

The environmentally conscious school was seeking to reduce the number of single-use bottles in its waste stream. It installed or updated drinking fountains and bottle-filler stations around campus, distributed hundreds of reusable containers and encouraged students to carry them around.

The goal was noble, the expectations high.

But the results were not at all what the administration intended.

A study by a UVM nutrition professor found students were not using or purchasing fewer single-use bottles; indeed, since the policy change the school's plastic bottle footprint had increased.

To top it off, students were instead purchasing sugary and unhealthy

drinks and consuming a great deal more of them.

The failed UVM bottle ban illustrates a classic case of unintended consequences. A policy is proposed with a lofty objective in mind, but upon implementation, an entirely different result occurs.

It's a case study that presidential hopeful Sen. Bernie Sanders — who represents Vermont — should consider.

During Tuesday night's Democrat presidential primary debate, the self-proclaimed socialist

proclaimed the U.S. needs medical and family paid leave "like every other country on Earth."

He continued, "I think we should look to countries like Denmark, like Sweden and Norway, and learn from what they have accomplished for their working people."

It's true the U.S. represents the minority when it comes to family leave policies. It's true also the Nordic nations are among the most generous.

Manhattan Institute scholar Kay Hymowitz looked at leave policies in all three nations: Denmark gives mothers a full year of leave at full pay; Sweden allows 480 days of leave at roughly 80 percent of a full-time salary; and Norway offers up to 47 weeks off.

When compared to the U.S., northern Europe seems like a feminist utopia.

Studies show such laws help bring women back into the workforce. They also provide mothers and children bonding time research suggests is crucial for healthy childhood development.

But the benefits seem to stop there.

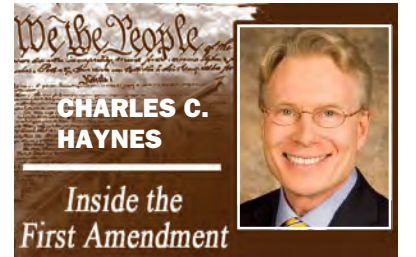
As with the UVM bottle ban, a cascade of unintended consequences makes such policies not merely less than ideal but maybe even harmful.

Cornell University economists Francine Blau and Lawrence Kahn looked at 22 countries and confirmed the expansion of family-friendly policies, including parental leave and part-time work entitlements, has increased female workforce participation.

But they found that such policies "also appear to encourage part-time work and employment in lower-level positions," not to mention lower wages and less advancement for women.

Some traditions no longer same in our schools

BATTLES THIS MONTH over holidays in public schools — from Halloween in Connecticut to Christmas in Indiana — are about far more than witches, ghosts or Jesus.

As the United States grows increasingly diverse, our perennial holiday fights turn public schools into a microcosm of the public square, places where we debate and define what it means to be "American" across differences that are often deep and abiding.

Consider the angry backlash this month when school officials in Milford, Conn., banned the traditional Halloween parade and other activities in Milford's elementary schools.

With growing numbers of families opting out for religious or cultural reasons, the district decided the time had come to axe the holiday. "School-day activities must be inclusive," administrators explained in a letter sent home to parents.

The keep-Halloween crowd sprang into action. Halloween, it turns out, is one of those "growing up in America" traditions that some insist be celebrated in schools.

"These are our American customs and traditions," argued the parent who organized the petition drive to save Halloween, "and we should not give them up because others find them offensive!"

After hundreds of parents signed the petition, the school district backed down and re-instated Halloween celebrations at the schools.

Halloween may have survived this year in Milford, but the trend in many other school districts is to substitute "fall festivals" for Halloween or at least dial back the Halloween parties, lessons, parades and art — which can last for weeks in some schools.

Despite the objections of some Christians, Muslims and others, Halloween isn't a First Amendment issue because the holiday as celebrated in schools is purely secular with no direct connection to the complicated religious origins of the holiday in distant history.

Christmas, however, is a more challenging holiday dilemma. School activities in December not only stir debates about preserving "American traditions," they implicate the First Amendment.

Recently, the ACLU and Freedom From Religion Foundation filed suit on behalf of a student and his father who object to the annual "Christmas Spectacular" program at the high school in Elkhart, Ind.

Most of the program each year would appear to be legally unobjectionable with a variety of seasonal music, religious and secular. But the event always ends with a 20-minute re-enactment of the birth of Jesus — a live Nativity scene complete with scriptural readings and sacred music.

Most people in Elkhart want to fight to keep the Nativity pageant, arguing that it is a time-honored tradition that reflects the beliefs and values of the majority.

But religious freedom in America, which requires that government not take sides in religion, is not up for a vote.

Under the First Amendment, officials may not turn the local church into the local church at any other time of year. Public school programs may include religion — what would a music curriculum be without any sacred music? Following First Amendment guidelines, religion may be included in school programs if, and only if, the purpose is educational and not devotional.

The conflicts in schools like in Milford and Elkhart are reminders that Americans are no longer united — if we ever were — by Halloween parades or Nativity pageants.

But if we care about our life together as citizens, we should be united by a shared commitment to the principles of religious freedom that ensure fairness and respect for people of all faiths and beliefs.

Beyond our diverse holidays and customs, that's what it truly means to be an American.

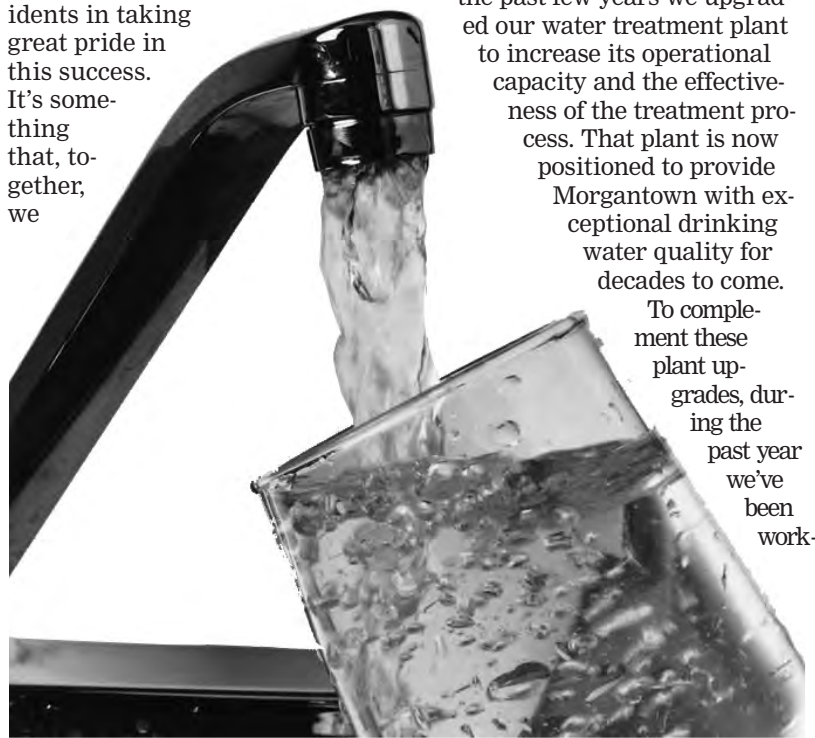

Area's momentum contingent on water, sewer infrastructure

How fortunate we are to live in the Morgantown area. Even during the recent economic downturn, our area experienced unparalleled growth. So unique is our situation that during the past decade Morgantown has been featured in numerous national media publications as one of the best places to live and work.

As our state's largest publicly owned utility, Morgantown Utility Board (MUB) joins residents in taking great pride in this success. It's something that, together, we

have achieved as a community.

Now, we must turn our attention to maintaining this momentum. We must do things that not only continue this growth but develop the infrastructure to support it. Without proper water and sewer systems, growth will not be possible.

This is why MUB leadership has been busy planning for the future. As you may recall, during the past few years we upgraded our water treatment plant to increase its operational capacity and the effectiveness of the treatment process. That plant is now positioned to provide Morgantown with exceptional drinking water quality for decades to come.

To complement these plant upgrades, during the past year we've been working

diligently at updating and improving our source water protection plan. By partnering with Morgantown-based Downstream Strategies, we have developed a world-class plan that includes watershed monitoring, raw water testing, contingency planning and crisis communications. While state and federal laws require that much of this information be kept confidential, we are exploring how we can make as much data publicly available as possible.

Along with source water protection, we are addressing other critical community needs. One involves construction of a second raw water reservoir, farther up Cobun Creek from our current secondary water source in White Park. The proposed reservoir is critically important.

It will provide additional capacity should our primary raw water source — the Monongahela River — become unusable for an extended period of time. Currently, our secondary water source will provide enough emergency water for only about three days. The new reservoir will stretch this timeframe to more than a month.

Simply put: We have outgrown the existing reservoir. To prevent, as best we can, interruption of water supply caused by contamination of our primary source in the Monongahela River, we need a new and significantly larger reservoir system. This will better protect our growing population from a water

supply disaster such as that suffered in Charleston (in January 2014).

Another area requiring investment is our wastewater treatment plant. It was constructed in the early 1960s with upgrades to the treatment process occurring 33 and 25 years ago. Much of the equipment used there is outdated and difficult to service. While our staff has done an extraordinary job of extending the life-span of the plant, much of it is operating at full capacity.

Increasingly stringent federal and state laws require that the plant be modified to treat more wastewater and to remove more pollutants. In addition to ensuring regulatory compliance, the proposed improvements will provide more effective and efficient means for protecting our water resources. Equally important, they will ensure our ability to continue to meet the needs of Morgantown's sustained growth.

What this means for our citizens and ratepayers is that additional investments in water quality protection are required. Naturally, this will necessitate rate adjustments. As a publicly owned utility, what we're asking for is not additional funding for MUB. We are asking for investments in our common future.

For years, MUB has boasted of providing high quality services at some of the most affordable rates in the state. We do not take the impact of the proposed rate adjustments

lightly. But now, it's time to reinvest in our system. We must ensure that community infrastructure can support local growth, remain reliable under all conditions, and meet new regulations. And the good news is that, even with these proposed improvements, our rates will remain among the lowest in the state.

Our goal in communicating this is straightforward: To be proactive in maintaining a system that meets current customer needs and future community infrastructure requirements.

We simply cannot fall behind. Doing so may harm our future economic strength, the quality of our waters and the public health.

Additional information on the rate adjustments will soon be provided. Throughout the next few weeks, we will host a variety of public meetings on these critical community investments.

At these meetings, we will describe what is being proposed and why it is necessary; we will engage in Q&A; and we will receive your comments. This will be your opportunity to be heard.

Together, we are the solution to ensuring Morgantown remains one of the best places in America to live and work. We look forward to your feedback and participation.

In fact, Blau and Kahn concluded that U.S. women — a relative few of whom enjoy paid parental leave — “are more likely than women in other countries to have full-time jobs and to work as managers or professionals.”

Generous leave policies may handicap working women, decreasing their attachment to the workplace and thus opportunities for promotion as well as income potential.

You might even say they increase workplace inequality.

As Hymowitz puts it, these laws “have a tendency to harden a country's glass ceiling.”

And it's not only Europe where such “women-centered” policies are eroding female careers.

In Chile, the government sought to increase female participation in the workforce by altering the labor code to require companies with 20 or more female employees to provide and pay for child care at a nearby location.

The law also significantly increased the cost of hiring female employees.

It shouldn't come as a surprise when three economists found the law resulted in a decline in women's starting salaries of between 9 percent and 20 percent.

There are good reasons for companies to consider expanding parental leave or implementing more family-friendly policies on their own.

But holding up the mandatory, one-size-fits-all policies of Scandinavia as beacons of equality and fairness ignores the unforeseen consequences such policies often create.

Whether banning bottles on campus or mandating generous paid parental leave, all policies that create benefits have costs, and it doesn't appear that the costs of such policies mean much to Sanders.

I appreciate that the BZA was able to correct this injustice.

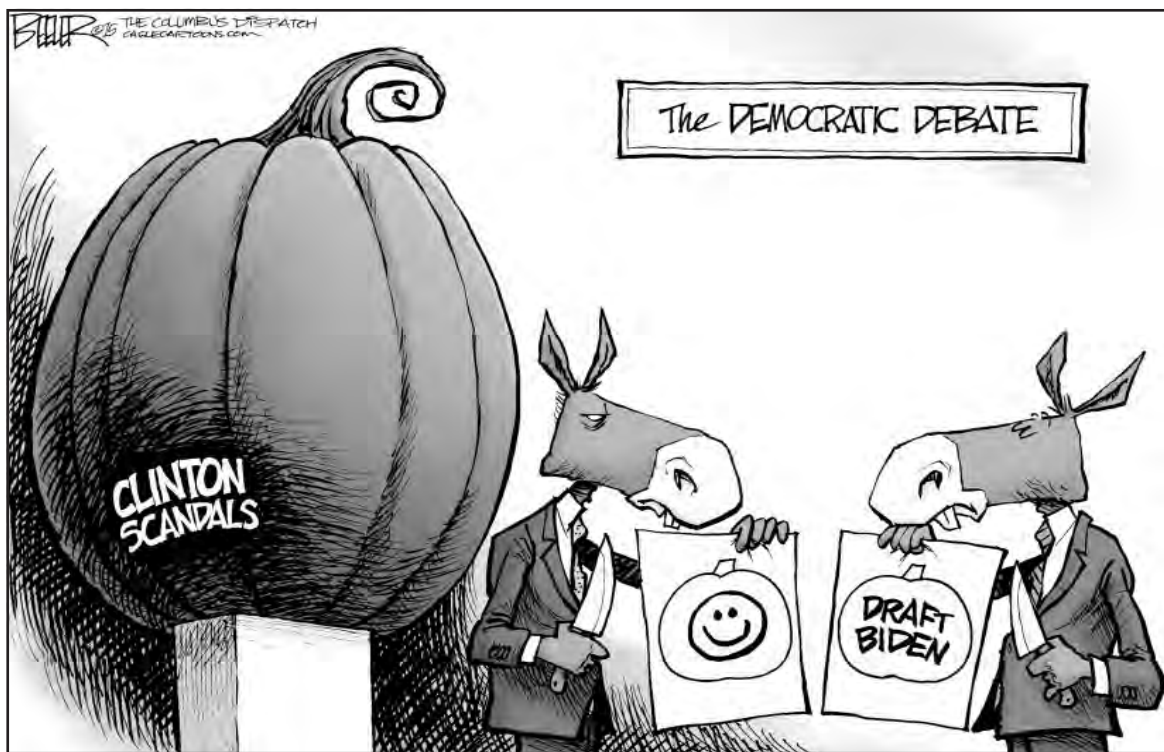

Morgantown's growth needs a comprehensive plan? We have it already

A great plan might as well be no plan at all if it isn't used.

To accommodate its population boom, Morgantown should follow its Comprehensive Plan. To do otherwise is to risk — and perhaps even guarantee — chaotic sprawl, intolerable increases in traffic, unsupportable stresses on infrastructure and the loss of precious green spaces.

During the past 15 years, the population of greater Morgantown — or, as the WVU College of Business and Economics characterizes it, the Morgantown Metropolitan Statistical Area — has grown by more than 22,000 people. This is an enormous and rapid influx of people — the largest we have seen here in any comparable period of time.

It's an opportunity. But it's also a potential disaster.

A growing population means we can support bigger and more dynamic commercial and social districts. But it also puts us at serious risk of being overwhelmed.

The Morgantown Comprehen-

sive Plan is a thoughtful, smart document that outlines how we should grow as a city. It designates areas that are appropriate for new development and areas that should be reserved for community parks and recreational areas.

The Comprehensive Plan is the city's implicit promise to all of us. It says: We are going to accommodate growth in a way that preserves — and even enhances — everyone's quality of life.

Our city officials must be encouraged to fulfill the vision and detailed blueprint of our solid Plan.

Unfortunately, sticking to the Plan isn't as easy as it might seem. Our City Council members and our city manager are under enormous pressure from developers who want to cash in on Morgantown's population boom.

This is especially true of developments at the city's borders (and therefore legally in the county rather than in Morgantown).

The city should have expanded its borders long ago so that all development now at its edges would fall within the city's strong planning and zoning control rather than the county's looser purview. But even given the handicaps to controlling growth, the city should stick to the Plan.

Developers will propose to build what they see as profitable to build. Whether their projects would impact the well-being of Morgantown citizens, and whether their projects defy the city's Comprehensive Plan, isn't necessarily part of their calculations.

But it must be part of the city's calculations — and its plans moving forward. To fulfill its Comprehensive Plan, the city should move expeditiously to:

- Work with the county on a five-year plan to expand the city's borders. The county isn't equipped to handle a booming urban population and would presumably welcome Morgantown's expansion.

- Work with major players in Morgantown, including WVU

and businesses large and small, to encourage development in areas the Comprehensive Plan designates as suitable for such a purpose. WVU President E. Gordon Gee has expressed a strong commitment to maintaining Morgantown as a livable city.

- Work with federal, state and local agencies, as well as environmental groups, to purchase as much of the space designated by the Comprehensive Plan as “reserve” or otherwise set aside for public use as possible. Numerous public and private grants are available to communities such as Morgantown. The WVU College of Law's Land Use and Sustainable Development Law Clinic could help in this effort.

- Think creatively. On the latter point, here's an example: The half-square-mile of forest behind the Circle K on Dorsey Avenue is the site of a proposed housing development. I detailed the problems in a previous op-ed (DP-Sept. 13).

- If, via grants, tax incentives, private donations and other mea-

sures the city bought the property — the developers are apparently willing to sell — it could keep the upper half of the forest green (creating picnic areas and trails) and make the bottom half available to build what our community has long wanted: An indoor public recreation facility, which would encompass a year-round ice rink and a swimming pool.

If the charming but outdated Morgantown Ice Arena can net \$200,000 a year; a state-of-the-art recreation facility, which already has a promise of financial support from WVU, could quintuple this.

A beautiful recreation facility with picnic areas and trails above it would enhance our city — and, by extension, all our property values.

But we must empower our city officials to follow and fulfill our Comprehensive Plan. We must say: We want this. And we're behind you.

GENDER INVESTED

Can companies led by women CEOs deliver shareholders a bigger return on their investment than the broader market? Investment advisory firm EQIS Capital Management is betting on it. The San Rafael, California-based firm has rolled out the Women CEO Focus portfolio, which is made up of Fortune 1000 companies whose CEO is a woman. The firm cites research showing that companies with women CEOs tend to be more profitable and outpace the S&P 500. The portfolio, part of EQIS' fee-based asset management platform, is available through the firm's national network of unaffiliated independent financial advisers.



THE SEASON OF SHOPPING

Consumers have been spending more this year dining out and at auto dealerships, thanks partly to steady job growth and falling gas prices. Those trends bode well for more consumer spending this holiday season, too, according to the International Council of Shopping Centers. The trade association is forecasting that holiday shoppers this year will spend an average of \$702 this season, up from \$677 last year. Overall, the ICSC predicts that holiday sales will rise 3.3 percent from 2014. Retailers are already gearing up. Last month, Macy's Inc. said it planned to hire about 85,000 seasonal workers, about the same as a year ago.

SLOWER GROWTH IN 2016?

Morgan Stanley is looking ahead to what 2016 will bring for the U.S. homebuilding market. Analysts Haendel E. St. Juste and Ryan Gilbert anticipate that housing will grow at a slower pace next year. While they expect that demand for new homes will remain strong amid improved affordability, the analysts forecast that sales will be held back by shortages of land, labor and tight mortgage credit. All told, the analysts predict 12 percent growth in new home orders for homebuilders next year, down from an estimate of 16 percent this year.

Easing the way to cash shares

Regulators and policymakers describe America's financial markets as the world's most efficient and fairest. And the most liquid - meaning that U.S. markets unite enough buyers and sellers to enable trades to be made quickly and at desirable prices. But regulators have grown concerned that at times of market stress, liquidity could dry up, leaving people with money in investment funds unprotected. The fear isn't just theoretical. During the 2008 financial crisis, an investor stampered from a huge money market mutual fund pushed the fund into collapse. The government intervened and temporarily guaranteed U.S. money fund assets to protect investors from losses. But the episode stoked concerns that funds that fall under stress could magnify market turmoil and threaten the financial system.

The Securities and Exchange Commission has floated rules intended to help investors redeem their fund shares before much damage is done. Funds would have to determine, for each asset they hold, how long it would take to be sold and turned into cash. Each asset would be assigned to one of six categories, ranging from those requiring one business day to those requiring more than 30.

Wal-Mart shares suffer as it retools

Wal-Mart Stores' shares ended the week at their lowest level since 2012 after the world's largest retailer warned investors that it is bracing for a profit drop.

Company Spotlight



The company says it plans to invest in business improvements that will cut its profit by as much as 12 percent in its next fiscal year. It also expects sales for this fiscal year to be flat, hurt by unfavorable currency exchange rates. Its stock had its biggest one-day drop in

nearly three decades, following the announcement at its annual meeting on Wednesday. Shares dropped 10 percent that day and continued to decline in following days. Wal-Mart is facing increased pressure from rivals such as grocery stores, dollar stores and Amazon.com. In response, Wal-Mart has increased the number of small stores it operates, is expanding its online grocery service and plans to improve the cleanliness of its stores and customer service.

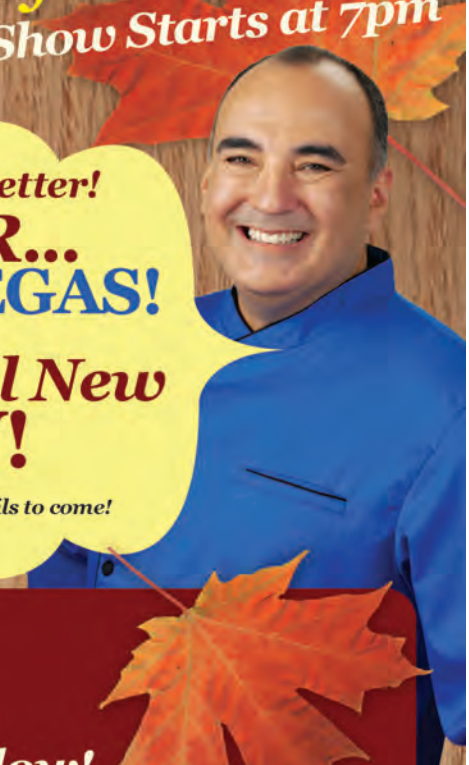

Five ways to scare the craft outta kids

1. Seeing things

Our easy-to-make bats are defrightful! Paint a wooden clothespin black using acrylic paint. While it’s drying, go to familyfunmag.com/printables, download our wing template, and cut it out. Use a pencil to trace two wings onto black cardstock. Cut them out. Fold over a tab on the base of each wing where shown and glue them to the sides of the clothespin.

3. Wonder webs

Oh, what a web we weave when making these for Halloween! Paint three craft sticks silver and let them dry. Glue them together at the center, forming an asterisk shape. Tie one end of a length of yarn (we used about 2 yards for one web) to the center of the sticks. Wrap it around the other spokes, then move outward, wrapping the sticks as shown. Tie off the yarn and add a plastic spider.

4. Feline frights

Black paper transforms a string of lights into a sinister group of cats. Download our template from familyfunmag.com/printables. Trace the shape onto black cardstock, marking the placement of the eyes. Cut out several heads and use a hole punch to make eyes. Insert bulbs from a string of electric lights into the holes.

5. Pretty pumpkins

Plastic bottles give these everlasting squash their shape. Cut the bottom 2 or 3 inches from 2 plastic bottles, with one bottom about a half inch taller than the other. Discard the tops. Cut 4 1-inch slits into the taller section. Crumple orange tissue paper and place it inside both sections. Slide the shorter section over the taller. Cut a triangle from a brown paper bag and twist it into a gnarled stem. Glue it to the top.

Randy Quaid, wife released from jail

ST. ALBANS, Vt. — Released from Vermont custody, actor Randy Quaid and his wife said Thursday they will now turn their attention to resolving 5-year-old criminal charges in California that they squatted in a home they once owned and vandalized the property.

A Vermont judge dismissed fugitive-from-justice charges against the couple and released them, citing discrepancies in some dates and saying she couldn't find probable cause to support the accusations.

The Quaid family is wanted in Santa Barbara, California, on felony charges filed in 2010 after they were found living in a guesthouse of a home they previously owned. Court papers said the Quaid family damaged or destroyed furniture, a fireplace and a mirror. The couple fled to Canada and were arrested in Vermont last Friday while trying to re-enter the U.S.

After they left the courthouse Thursday, the Quaid family said they'll stay in Lincoln, Vermont, to care for Evi Quaid's ailing father and address the California charges. She grew up in Vermont.

"I never worried about being found guilty or any of

along and played a lot of cribbage and Sudoku.

"The food wasn't so bad," he said.

The Quaid family said they were pleased to be in Vermont, and he joked about possibly becoming a firefighter.

"I knew the people of Vermont, the judge and this lawyer would understand our situation," said Evi Quaid.

In court, Langrock argued for the couple's release saying that Evi Quaid was threatened by a fellow inmate, who put feces in her cell.

Judge Alison Arms reduced bail for the couple from \$500,000 each to \$50,000 on a fugitive-from-justice charge that the Quaid family failed to appear in court in California. She said she didn't find probable cause to support fugitive-from-justice charges related to the California vandalism and squatting counts.

But after reviewing her decision during a short break, the judge called the Quaid family back into court and said she had to release them. She said she could not find probable cause to support any of the charges because of a discrepancy in dates in paperwork from California.

that for any of these charges because I know the truth, and I know the facts are going to come out at some point, and today was a good sign of that," Randy Quaid said.

"And we're still going to have to deal with the California situation," the Quaid family lawyer, Peter Langrock, said. "And we plan to, not as a fugitive from justice but the standpoint

of a citizen."

In a statement Thursday, the Santa Barbara County District Attorney's office said it will seek a governor's warrant to mandate the Quaid family's return to Cal-

ifornia, a process that can take months.

Outside court, Randy Quaid spoke about his stay in jail. He told reporters he was on a wing with three other men, and they all got

Who makes this beer? Brands owned by big brewers

The King of Beers is expanding its kingdom: Anheuser-Busch InBev, the company behind Budweiser, said recently that it plans to buy rival SABMiller for \$106 billion, bringing together the world's two largest beer makers. Combining the two will shake up the global beer market, giving the company control of a third of the market.

The move comes as drinkers increasingly prefer to guzzle beer from small craft brewers instead of giant companies. Sales of craft beer made up 11 percent of the U.S. beer market last year, up from 7.8 percent in 2013, according to the Brewers Association.

Here's a look at the world's biggest brewers and what beers they make:

Anheuser-Busch InBev NV

Brands: Budweiser, Bud Light, Corona, Beck's.

Latest annual revenue: \$47.06 billion.

Size: World's largest brewer. According to Euromonitor, AB InBev has a 21 percent share of the global beer market. The company makes almost half the

beer sold in the U.S.

History: The company traces its lineage to a brewery in Belgium in 1366. In 2004, Belgian Interbrew combined with Brazilian Ambev to make InBev, and in 2008 InBev bought U.S.-based Anheuser-Busch. The company later acquired Mexico's Grupo Modelo, but sold Modelo's U.S. business.

SABMiller PLC

Brands: Miller, Peroni, Milwaukee's Best, Grolsch.

Annual revenue: \$26.29 billion.

Size: World's second-largest brewer, with a market share of almost 10 percent.

South Africa treasury will consider national interest in beer merger

LONDON — South Africa's National Treasury said it will consider the economic impact of a proposal by the world's biggest beer maker to buy SABMiller — a company with South African roots.

The treasury said Thursday that the finance minister must ap-

prove Anheuser-Busch InBev's \$106 billion takeover of SABMiller and noted that the government imposed conditions when the ex-South African Breweries moved its headquarters to Britain in the 1990s.

It said "the Minister of Finance will apply his mind to any such application, to ensure compliance with existing

conditions and the impact on the South African economy."

Erik Gordon, of the University of Michigan's Ross School of Business says the statement suggests South Africa will consider broader economic concerns rather than simply whether the merger meets regulations.

Forbes: 'PewDiePie' top YouTube earner

LOS ANGELES — YouTube's top-earning celebrity is a 25-year-old video-game-playing joker who took in \$12 million during the last year.

Forbes magazine said Sweden's Felix Kjellberg, better known by his handle "PewDiePie," tops its first list of people who have spun short online videos into huge piles of cash.

YouTube stars make money mainly by getting paid to interact with products on their channels and sharing ad revenue with YouTube. Some also star in movies, write books, go on tour, sell music

or cut endorsement deals. They're a hit with younger audiences and brands trying to reach the next generation of consumers.

Two acts tied for second on *Forbes'* list, both earning \$8.5 million: Comedy prankster-duo Smosh — Ian Hecox and Anthony Padilla — and the Fine Brothers, Benny and Rafi Fine.

Dancing violinist Lindsey Stirling ranked fourth with \$6 million. Tied for fifth were comedians Rhett and Link — made of Rhett McLaughlin and Charles Lincoln Neal III — and video game commentator Olajide Olatunji, known as "KSI," with \$4.5 million.

Make-up artist Michelle Phan was seventh, at \$3 million.

The No. 8 slot was a three-way tie, at \$2.5 million, shared by comedian Lilly Singh, or "Superwoman," prankster Roman Atwood; and chef Rosanna Pansino.

Forbes is best known for its list of billionaires and the list appearing in its Nov. 2 issue marks its first stab at ranking YouTube stars. It said it measured earnings before management fees and taxes and came up with the figures based on data from online sources such as Nielsen, IMDb and interviews with managers, lawyers, industry insiders and the stars themselves.

To curb cat anxiety, be sure to administer drugs before symptoms start

Q. My 4-year-old cat is afraid of his own shadow. During the winter, he fly south, taking the cat along with us in the cabin of the plane. The first time, I gave him a tranquilizer, which worked. The second time, the same drug made him crazy; he scratched and his eyes rolled back in his head. The third time, we didn't give him anything and he was fine. On the most recent flight, we gave him nothing, and he cried most of the way. Any advice? — J.C., St. Paul

A. "There are many types of drugs that fall into the category you're calling a tranquilizer, and may include a true sedative or anti-anxiety medication," said Dr. Heather Loenser,

of Lebanon, N.J.

Since you describe your cat as anxious under the best of circumstances, a true anti-anxiety drug might be the best option. However, some of these drugs take weeks to kick in.

Loenser, a board member of the American Animal Hospital Association, also notes that regardless of the category of drug you use, you need to administer it before the cat becomes anxious or fearful, or the effects will be greatly reduced.

First, confirm that your

cat is not anxious about his carrier. Does he readily go inside? You can encourage him to like (or at least tolerate) the carrier by leaving it out, and periodically tossing treats inside. Feed your cat from inside the carrier. Keep something soft inside the carrier for your cat to sleep on.

Instead of giving your pet medication before a flight, you might try a gentler approach. Spray his carrier with Feliway or rub the inside with Feliway wipes.

Q. My arm is getting longer every day as my little beagle takes me for walks. We enrolled Sophie in obedience training, but it hasn't helped. Any other ideas? — J.C., Westchester, N.Y.

A. "Passion" is the

word certified dog behavior consultant Sarah Hodgson, of Westchester, N.Y., uses to call a beagle's pursuit of smells. I call it determination. Beagles are hard-wired to follow their noses. And, as you've learned, the more you pull one way, the more Sophie pulls the other.

To continue satisfying Sophie's nose, hold a treat above her head as you walk. If she's looking up toward you for a goodie, she can't be sniffing the ground. Over time, you won't have to offer a treat every couple of steps.

If these solutions don't help, you may need to consult a dog trainer or certified dog behavior consultant.

Q. We adopted Caleb, a Maine Coon cat, when

he was 4. He's now 10. He previously lived in four other homes. Recently, we took him to the veterinarian for a minor surgical procedure. Typically, Caleb allows people to pick him up, but when I went back to get him after surgery, he started hissing and hasn't stopped since. What's going on? — J.W., via cyberspace

A. Based on your description, Caleb's change in demeanor occurred after the vet visit. You don't say what this "minor surgical procedure" involved. Feline veterinarian Dr. Vicki Thayer, of Lebanon, Ore., wonders if Caleb may be in pain, either from the surgery or something else that oc-

curred at the clinic. The change might also be explained by the anesthesia, the emotional trauma of visiting the veterinarian, or both.

"It's not usual for stress to cause cats who'd normally never lash out at people or other cats to do so," said Thayer, executive of the Winn Feline Foundation, a nonprofit funder of cat health studies.

How to avoid injuries when playing sports

EACH YEAR, 2 million high schoolers are injured while playing sports.

While all sports have a risk of injury, more contact increases the risk of a traumatic injury.

These injuries can vary from sprained ankles to dislocated shoulders to torn ACLs. Two common types of sports-related problems are:

1. Sprains/Strains: As the most common sports-related injury, sprains or strains can happen during nearly every physical activity. A sprain is the partial or complete tearing of ligaments which causes pain and laxity of the involved joint. Some ligament injuries heal without surgery with proper protection and rehabilitation while some are best treated with surgery. A strain is the tearing of a muscle as a direct result of the muscle being stretched beyond its physical limit.

2. Overuse injuries: Repetitive activity can produce soft tissue problems, such as partial tears and tendonitis in soft tissue and can produce stress fractures in bone.

For most children and teens, a variety of sports and some periods of relative rest makes the most sense. If one sport is the primary focus of a young athlete, vary training methods to prevent overuse injuries.

How to avoid injuries?

- Warm up properly before any physical activity.

- Alternate exercising different muscle groups and exercise every other day.

- Cool down properly after exercise or sports.

- Stretching can improve the ability of muscles to contract and perform, reducing the risk for injury.

- Shoe support may correct certain foot problems that can lead to injury.

- Take time off. Plan to have at least 1 day off per week from a particular sport to allow the body to recover.

- Wear the right gear.

Players should wear appropriate and properly fitting protective equipment such as pads (neck, shoulder, elbow, chest, knee, shin), helmets, mouthpieces, face guards, protective cups, and/or eyewear. Young athletes should not assume that protective gear will protect them from performing more dangerous or risky activities.

- Strengthen muscles. Conditioning exercises during practice strengthen muscles used in play.

- Increase flexibility. Stretching exercises before and after games or practice can increase flexibility. Stretching should also be incorporated into a daily fitness plan.

- Use the proper technique. This should be reinforced during the playing season.

- Take breaks. Rest periods during practice and games can reduce injuries and prevent heat illness.

- Stop the activity if there is pain.

- Avoid heat injury by drinking plenty of fluids before, during and after exercise or play; decrease or stop practices or competitions during high heat/humidity periods; wear light clothing.

- If you do sustain a sports injury, make sure you participate in adequate rehabilitation before resuming strenuous activity.

No matter your religion, let's enjoy our journey up the mountain to God

Q: My Presbyterian wife and I (a Unitarian Universalist Christian) love your column and have a question for you. Like you, we've long held the metaphorical view that the world's religions can be viewed as many paths up the same mountain. A few years ago, we read "God is Not One" by Stephen Prothero, of Boston University, which is a very helpful introduction to many of the world's religions. We have been struck, however, by Dr. Prothero's fairly sharp critique of the "many paths/one mountain" metaphor, and his assertion that in fact the various world religions are fundamentally based on different mountains and that it is a mistake to think otherwise. Of course I don't know if you've read the book at this point, but we'd be very interested in your take on Dr. Prothero's point of view. I, for one, am uninclined to let go of the metaphor notwithstanding the fact that his argument

is at least somewhat persuasive. What do you think? Warm regards — E from Racine, Wis.

A: I am sticking by my tent in the theological base camp at OMMP (One Mountain, Many Paths) rather than Prothero's MMMP (Many Mountains, Many Paths). In the world of the academic study of religions there is a lively debate about whether the religions of the world are basically similar or basically different, and Huston Smith ("The World's Religions") and Prothero are roughly at opposite ends of that debate.

The way I see it from my perch in the real world, the debate is silly in an important way. Of course in some ways the religions of the world are different. Buddhism doesn't believe in a creator God, Hinduism be-

lieves in many gods, Judaism and Islam believe in one God and Christianity believes in one God who is also three. These differences are real and lead to different understandings of salvation and prayer and sin. However, even these striking and foundational theological differences do not prevent each and every one of these religions (and more I have not included) from generating virtually identical ethical codes of conduct for their adherents.

For example, it is absolutely striking to me that religions who had absolutely no contact in their formative periods (like Buddhism/Hinduism on one side of the world and Judaism/Christianity/Islam on the other) all have generated virtually the same version of the Golden Rule of doing unto others what you would have them do unto you. Somehow the different paths all led to the same ethical summit and that is the key to understanding world religions in a way that will help produce unity and harmony in the world.

It is our shared ethical beliefs that mark our various journeys as a journey up the same mountain. Atheists who can also endorse the Golden Rule are also with us on the trek up the same mountain. They do not see it as a climbing to God, but that is fine by me. At the top of the mountain the view will be so breathtaking, that nobody will care about the different ways we have chosen to name the truth of what we will see there.

Tommy (Fr. Tom Hartman, my pal) created the God Squad mission statement that guided our shared ministry for almost three decades. He said, "We know enough about how we are all different, but not enough about how we are all the same." This statement of our mission is not as simple as it seems. We are different and our differences matter. We are not fans of what we called "vanilla religion" in which we elide all our differences and pretend that we all practice just one amalgamated faith. Our differ-

ences provide the different textures of our lives and our religious calendars and cultures. They give us our home in faith.

However, the ways we are the same are so much more important and so much more in need of lifting up. We all teach compassion and forgiveness and generosity and gratitude because the religious impulse is at its root an impulse for the good. The rise of religious extremism and violence is tragic because it perverts this universal ethical core of faith. The impulse to tarnish all the good teachings of a religion with the violent zealotry of its few extremists is ultimately just a modern form of bigotry.

So, in some ways we are the same and in other ways we are different. So let us lift up the overlapped answers that almost always are ethical teachings and let us enjoy the journey up the same mountain to God — apart but in the same direction.

PEIA proposes \$120M in benefit cuts

With no likelihood of additional funding from the West Virginia government, and with its Reserve Fund already spent down to the minimum balance, the Public Employees Insurance Agency (PEIA) has no options but to make "draconian" cuts in benefits for active employees and retirees, executive director Ted Cheatham told the PEIA Finance Board on Thursday.

The board Thursday adopted a proposed 2016-'17 plan that would cut benefits for active employees by \$82.96 million, and cut retiree benefits by \$40.99 million, primarily through sharply higher deductibles and out-of-pocket maximums.

It also would increase retiree premiums by 8 percent, and increase premiums for non-state employees (participating cities, counties, and governmental agencies) by 3 percent.

"These are fairly draconian cuts to the plan that are being made," Cheatham said. "We can't tweak \$2 here or there to get where we need to be."

State and public schools employees would see deductibles increase by \$500 for single coverage and \$1,000 for family coverage, while annual out-of-pocket maximums would increase by \$1,500 for single coverage and \$3,000 for families.

Depending on the plan, out-of-pocket maximums

for family coverage would increase to as much as \$9,000 a year.

In addition to higher premiums, retirees would have higher deductibles and out-of-pocket maximums, although not as severe as the increases for active employees.

Additionally, the proposed plan increases deductibles and out-of-pocket maximums on prescription drugs for active employees and retirees.

"It's going to be very difficult for some people on

this plan if they get sick," Cheatham commented.

Unlike last year, when PEIA went out to public hearings with a menu of about \$70 million worth of options to come up with roughly \$40 million in benefits cuts, the proposed 2016-'17 plan has very few alternatives for stakeholders to consider, board member Josh Sword noted.

"For the most part, we're truly at a point where the board's hands are tied on this," said Sword, who represents ed-

ucation employees.

(Last year, the board approved a plan, currently in effect, that cut benefits for active employees by \$33 million and for retirees by \$8.5 million.)

Gov. Earl Ray Tomblin did not propose any additional state funding for PEIA next year, beyond the current \$422.4 million for the employers' share of PEIA premiums.

Because state law requires that employers pay 80 percent of premiums, and employees pay 20 per-

cent, that took away the option of premium increases for state and public schools employees, who make up the majority of PEIA insurees.

"It needs to be made clear here that the only way we can get away from \$120 million in benefit reductions is if we get additional money from the Legislature," Sword said.

Board members approved a motion by Elaine Harris, who represents labor, to send a letter to the Legislature asking that it provide additional state funding for PEIA in the 2016 legislative session.

Sword also said the need for additional funding from the Legislature should be emphasized at the six public hearings around the state on the proposed plan, which will take place from Nov. 2 to Nov. 17.

For active state and public schools employees, the bulk of the benefit cuts would come from the higher deductibles (\$30 million), reductions in prescription drug benefits (\$17.12 million) and increased out-of-pocket maximums (\$16 million), according to PEIA.

The board will meet Dec. 3 to vote on final approval of the 2016-'17 plan.

How to get the most from your eye exam?

Q: It seems I always get home from my doctor visit and remember a couple concerns I forgot to bring up. How can I get the most from my eye exam?

A: This is a common issue for many reasons. First, most of us are a little rushed and often a little behind schedule because patient exams often involve more concerns than was initially anticipated. To help get the most from your eye exam, here are some suggestions:

1. If you wear glasses, bring ALL your glasses with you. This means your regular indoor glasses, your reading or computer glasses, and your sunglasses. Whatever you use, bring them with you. We

will read the prescription in each, and it really helps us in prescribing for your lifestyle and vision needs.

2. If you use any eye drops, whether by prescription or just an over-the-counter drop, bring them with you. Bring the actual bottles, not just a list. There are many "store brand" products with various names we may not know, so reading the actual label is the best way for us to really know what drugs or agents you are putting in your eyes.

3. If you wear contact lenses, wear them into the office. And ... plan your visit so that you will have worn your contacts at least 4 hours when you arrive. This allows us to evaluate your current lens "fit" and to see if your eyes are having any ill effects from your current lenses. And even if you seldom (or never) wear glasses, take any pairs you have to the office as well.

4. As with any medical visit, know exactly your current medications, or take a written list with you. Even though this is an eye exam, many oral medications can affect your eyes and tell us what general health issues you have.

5. Feel free to bring a list of your questions or

concerns with you. We all become forgetful and we are anxious or stressed (as in most medical visits), so writing things down at home ahead of time is very helpful. And most of us do not mind if you care to write down briefly our answers or advice as we talk.

Finally, it is always a good idea to have two sets of ears to listen. Certainly for older patients and children, we prefer to have another family member in the room to listen. But really for anyone, if you would like someone to accompany you, that is fine. And for eye exams, many people like to have their spouse with them to help select new eyewear. Today we often take a photo with

the patient's phone or iPad so they can show the eyewear "finalists" to their spouse remotely.

There is a lot to evaluate in an eye exam, not only a number of vision disorders but also many disease concerns. So there can be a lot of information to gather quickly, which often diminishes the quality of our communication. Many medical offices offer a "patient portal" where you can go online to access and review your exam results. In this high-tech world today, many times communication is the most valuable tool we have.

More than 200 years ago, a young American Indian woman, Sacagawea (sah-KAH-guh-WEE-uh), helped a team of explorers make their way across the American West. Meriwether Lewis and William Clark, with about 50 men, began their journey near St. Louis, Missouri, and passed through what is now Missouri, Kansas, Iowa, Nebraska, South Dakota, North Dakota, Montana, Idaho, Oregon and Washington. The 8,000-mile trip took more than 2 1/2 years. They returned to St. Louis on Sept. 23, 1806.

This week, The Mini Page learns more about this historic trip and the woman who helped make it a success.

A young guide

Sacagawea was a member of the Lemhi Shoshone (LEM-high show-SHOW-knee) tribe that lived in an area that is now western Montana. When she was about 11, Sacagawea was captured by another tribe, the Hidatsa (hi-DAHT-zah). She was carried more than 600 miles east to what is now North Dakota. She learned the Hidatsa language in addition to the Shoshone language she already spoke.

When Lewis and Clark arrived at the Hidatsa villages, Sacagawea, age 16, was married to a French Canadian fur trader named Toussaint Charbonneau (shar-bone-OWE). Lewis and Clark hired the couple as interpreters. Sacagawea was pregnant and

gave birth to her son, Jean Baptiste, soon after she joined the group.

The exploration

You might call Sacagawea our first woman ambassador. On the trail, she represented the Lewis and Clark group as a symbol of peace. Without her along, suspicious Indians might have attacked this band of strange white men. When they saw Sacagawea and her baby, they knew the group was peaceful. She was a great help finding plants to eat or use as medicines, and she helped Lewis and Clark make trades for things they needed, such as horses.

Her own coin

There are no pictures of Sacagawea drawn from life. In 2001, the United States issued a gold dollar coin with her image. The art was based on a modern Shoshone woman.

A presidential project

At the time of the expedition, our country was made up of an area east of the Mississippi River. There were 17 states and several territories that would later become states.



In 1798, the port of New Orleans was closed to American shipping, but shipping goods down the Mississippi and through the port of New Orleans was important to Americans.

President Thomas Jefferson wanted to buy the port of New Orleans from the French. The French wanted to sell not only New Orleans, but also all of the Louisiana Territory for \$15 million, or about 3 cents an acre. The Louisiana Purchase almost doubled the size of our country.

Jefferson wanted to find out more about the lands, plants and animals in the Louisiana Territory and beyond. He wanted to establish peaceful relations with the American Indian tribes, and he hoped to find a good way to reach the Pacific Ocean. He selected Lewis to lead the expedition, and Lewis asked Clark to join him.

Cook's Corner

Granny Smith Apple Dessert

You'll need:

- 4 medium Granny Smith apples, peeled and sliced
- 3/4 cup brown sugar, divided
- 3/4 cup whole-wheat flour
- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/4 cup quick-cooking oats

- 1 teaspoon baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 6 tablespoons butter or margarine, melted
- low-fat vanilla ice cream or frozen yogurt (optional)



What to do:

1. Combine sliced apples with 1/4 cup brown sugar. Place in an 8-by-8-inch baking dish.
2. Mix flour, 1/2 cup brown sugar, cinnamon, oats, baking powder and salt in a medium bowl. Stir in melted butter or margarine and mix until just blended.
3. Spoon mixture onto apples. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 to 35 minutes until apples are tender. Serve warm with low-fat vanilla ice cream or frozen yogurt. Makes 4 to 8 servings.

Should ex go on Halloween trip with kids?

EX-ETIQUETTE

Q. Halloween is one of my favorite holidays, but since I've broken up with the kids' dad, I hate when October rolls around. I've been letting their dad go trick-or-treating with us for the last two years, but this year he's taking them to Disneyland over the weekend and I won't see them. I'm so angry! I have included him, but he's not including me! What's good ex-etiquette?

A. Halloween is a big deal at Disneyland, and if he has tickets for Halloween night, the kids are probably so excited they don't see the internal family conflict this may cause. Thank goodness. This is the parents'

problem, not the kids'. There are major red flags to be taken into consideration: First, The fact that Dad is not including you this year is not bad ex-etiquette. It may make your Halloween sort of lonely, but if the parenting plan designates holidays with the kids to one parent or another, it's that parent's decision to make plans for that day. Of course, Ex-etiquette for parents rule No. 1, "Put the kids first," is an important consideration, but it says "the kids first," not the ex, first.

That said, it sounds as if you both have been doing your best to use good ex-etiquette as your guide when co-parenting the kids — and that's great. You have, "Looked for the compro-

mise," in the past, which is Ex-Etiquette for Parents rule No. 10, and have spent Halloween together, but that doesn't mean that Dad taking the kids to Disneyland just this once is a personal affront to you. The need to compromise is ongoing. Ex-etiquette for Parents rule No. 5 and No. 6 are "Don't be spiteful" and "Don't hold grudges." Next year, if it's in the best interest of the kids to again share the day, don't let your anger and hurt about this year color future decisions.

Finally, there's a fine art to sharing the holidays with an ex. The main concern is what does all this togetherness say to the kids? On one hand, kindness and consideration are contagious, and not holding a grudge demon-

strates that people who do not get along can make the decision to interact kindly if it is necessary.

However, exes being too friendly in front of the kids can also be very confusing, and confusion often translates into anger. Parents find themselves wondering, "What's wrong with Billy?" when it could simply be that his parents were giggling on the couch at a holiday celebration while reminiscing and then he could go home with only one of them. So if you notice your children acting up the day after a holiday, check your behavior at that holiday celebration.

Father cannot wash his hands of 12-year-old daughter's lack of hygiene

ASK MR. DAD

Dear Mr. Dad: My 12-year-old daughter won't shower, she won't brush her teeth, and she wears the same clothes every day — and sometimes even sleeps in them. Honestly, she's not very pleasant to be around. Is this normal? Either way, how can I motivate her to be a little cleaner?

A: This probably won't help you feel any better — and it certainly

won't do anything about the smell emanating from your sweet daughter — but what you're describing is very common among pre-teens. Unfortunately, there's no easy fix.

There are a number of possible explanations. First, disregarding personal hygiene is sometimes a symptom of depression. Think about other areas of her life: Does she seem withdrawn socially? Have her friendships changed? Are her

grades dropping? Have her diet or sleep patterns changed? If any of those are true, call her pediatrician. He or she will know whether to call in the mental health professionals. Plus, a few words about showering from a non-family member might make a difference.

Second, she may be too busy — at least in her mind. From your perspective, she probably spends way too much time on her computer or her phone — time that

might be better spent with a bar of soap. From her perspective, she's just staying in touch with her friends.

Third, she may be trying to get your attention. Clearly, she has.

Fourth, this could be a power play. At 12, your daughter is relatively powerless. You may get her involved in family decisions and you may give her choices, but the final decisions are yours.

Here's what you can do to help.

■ Ask. One common pre-teen and teen refrain is "you just don't understand me!" There's some truth there. Pre-teens have a lot going on in their head, and we rarely ask about it. A few non-judgmental questions will show her that you care and might help you get to know her better.

■ Explain. Adolescence is a time when kids want to be liked and fit in. It's also prime time for bullying and teasing. Nobody

gets picked on, bullied or socially excluded more than kids who are visibly or olfactorily different. Explaining to your daughter that she may be jeopardizing her social life might make a difference.

■ Do nothing. Actually being excluded or teased by her peers will get the point across more effectively than anything you say.

Couple to celebrate 40 years of marriage, even after 'Dad' made transition into woman

CHICAGO — The bride and groom wed in a traditional Catholic church ceremony in the mid-1970s, vowing to remain true to each other until parted by death.

They settled in a northwest suburban Lake Zurich tri-level, the wife taking on most of the homemaking, the husband working as a construction project manager. On Jan. 12, 2006, while cleaning up after dinner, the wife offhandedly asked what kind of gift her husband would like for an upcoming birthday.

"A little black dress and pumps," the husband said. The wife laughed. Her spouse did not.

The husband came out as transgender that evening, explaining that her name was actually Erica and that she had felt like a woman for as long as she could remember. The revelation shocked her wife, Ellen Maurizio,

who had known her spouse as a man since they were high school sweethearts.

But the Maurizios stayed together, despite the shift in gender in their partnership, and plan to celebrate their 40th anniversary in May.

"In a sense, I transitioned, too," said Ellen Maurizio, 62. "We transitioned together. You have to work together."

While sustaining a marriage through a gender transition might sound implausible to many, the Maurizios aren't alone in their nontraditional union. Although 45 percent of transgender or gender nonconforming people said coming out ended their marriage or partnership, the other 55 percent either stayed together or broke up for unrelated reasons, according to the 2011 National Transgender Discrimination Survey by the National Center for Transgender Equality and the National LGBTQ Task Force.

Get your HVAC system inspected, cleaned

Just as you wouldn't drive your car 100,000 miles without changing the oil, regular preventative maintenance is the best way to ensure trouble-free operation and peak performance from your home's heating and cooling system.

Preseason maintenance can help you avoid a system failure in severe weather, when you need it least, and it can keep your energy bill from getting you hot under the collar.

"It is recommended that homeowners have the HVAC system inspected and cleaned at least once in the cooling season and once in the heating season every year. Maintaining your HVAC equipment by having a maintenance agreement with us

will make sure that the system operates at peak efficiency with fewer break-downs," said Josh Hinerman, service manager for Advanced Heating and Cooling.

A complete cleaning should include replacing the filter and cleaning the ductwork, from where the air enters the return duct, through the air handler (blower, coil and head exchange), to the exit, where the air is released to condition the home. Contaminants are pulled into the HVAC system and recirculated five to seven times a day, on average. Over time, this causes a buildup of contaminants in the ductwork.

Dirt may contribute to health issues, especially in people with respiratory conditions, autoimmune disorders or certain allergies.

A: Clean the entire surface thoroughly with trisodium phosphate, which is available in your paint store. After it is completely dry, use a primer made for masonry followed by a paint also made for masonry. If you have time, you can seal the inside with a concrete sealer to prevent moisture from leaching through the bricks on the outside. This will help the finish last longer.

DEAR SUPER HANDY MOM: I have a pretty super craft room. One of the ways I store rolls of ribbon is on the spindles that a stack of DVDs come on when you buy a large package of them. They are really great because you also can put the top back on and trans-

A: Your police motorcycle was made by Hubley Co., founded in 1898 in Lancaster, Pa., by John E. Hubley. The company originally specialized in toy trains. It reorganized in

1909 and started to make cast iron toys — horse-drawn wagons and circus wagons, fire engines, miniature coal stoves and toy guns. As the automotive industry grew, Hubley added more and more models. The company stopped making cast iron toys in 1942 due to the war effort. After the war, it made diecast metal and plastic toys. The name was changed to Gabriel Industries in 1965, and in 1978, the company was bought by CBS. From about 1934 to 1936, Hubley made electrical toys, like your motorcycle, with battery-operated headlights. The motorcycles also made an exhaust sound. They're rare, and your motorcycle could sell for \$350 to \$500, depending on its condition.

Q: What is the sheet music for "Will You Remember (Sweetheart)" from the movie "Maytime" worth? It has a picture of Nelson Eddy and Jeanette MacDonald on the front.

A: Jeanette MacDonald and Nelson Eddy performed together in eight

movies between 1935 and 1942. "Maytime," a 1937 musical distributed by MGM, was their third movie together. They were dubbed "America's Sweethearts," and they also had an off-screen romance. Most sheet music sells for \$5 to \$10. The better the cover pictures and the condition, the higher the price.

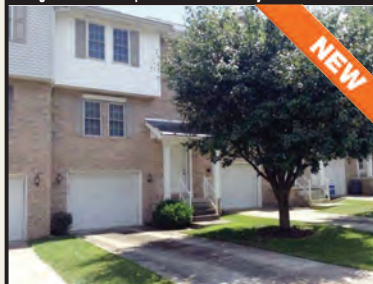

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A garden of tips, tools for bulb-planting season

It's the bulb-planting time of year for gardeners who want spring flowers.

In Poquoson, Va., Master Gardeners plant bulbs each fall at the Poquoson Learning Garden — thanks to the donation of 10,000 bulbs over the past few years from Brent and Becky's Bulbs — brentandbeckysbulbs.com

The garden features tulips, daffodils, dwarf irises, anemone and crocus.

"A lot of tulips planted in the ground are susceptible to voles and hungry deer," Poquoson Master Gardener Noel Talcott said.

"All of our tulips have been planted in our empty raised beds, which held vegetables and cut flowers dur-

ing the gardening season. We have had great success and so far have not had any issues with deer coming in to sample the foliage or blooms."

Root-eating voles can also bother bulbs, especially tulips, which Talcott recommends planting in pots or raised beds.

"At our home, we layer tulips in large plastic pots, top with soil and plant violas or pansies on top," he said.

"Then we sink the pots in the ground up to the rim. In spring, the tulips come up through the flowers. After they are finished blooming, we swap out the pots with summer flowers. We put those pots back in the holes and those plants are protected from voles too."

For planting bulbs, the Master Gardeners use the method recommended by Brent Heath, of Brent and Becky's Bulbs.

The process is simple: Scrape back any mulch, place the bulbs on the ground and cover with 6 inches of mulch.

"This method works great in our mulched beds as well as in the raised beds," Talcott said.

"In the raised beds, we remove about 4 to 6 inches of soil, place the bulbs and then cover them with the removed soil. This year we planted most of the crocus in the lawn and they bloomed before the grass started to grow and needed cutting. We will see how well those return next year."

Bulb care 101

After the bulbs finish blooming, Talcott and other Master Gardeners suggest you:

- Allow the daffodil foliage to die back. Do not cut the foliage back because the

bulbs need that foliage to rebuild the energy stored in the bulb for next year's blooms.

- For tulips, dig them up and give them away or add them to the mulch pile. Bulb experts like Brent Heath said the Hampton Roads climate is not conducive to tulips producing masses of flowers year after year, so it's best to treat them as annuals.

- Feed the bulbs with a balanced fertilizer specified for bulbs.

Problem-free bulbs

Daffodils, snowdrops and snowflakes are said to be deer- and rodent-proof because they contain lycorine, a bitter alkaloid that's toxic when eaten, according to a news release from Color Blends, a Connecticut-based bulb supplier at ColorBlends.com.

Other bulbs that deer tend to dislike include: Al-

lium, camassia, glory-of-the snow, winter wolf's bane, crown imperial, snake's head, starflower and blue squill.

Rodents tend to avoid: Glory-of-the snow, winter wolf's bane, crown imperial and blue squill.

Power planter

Bulbs can be planted as groupings in large holes that you dig with a shovel; just be sure to dig the hole the required planting depth for the bulbs.

They can also be planted individually with the help of tools such as a bulb planter auger that fits into a standard power drill. Simply drill to the maximum depth of the auger and lift the auger out of the hole; about an inch of loose soil will remain in the planting hole. The Bulb Planter Auger, from Power Planter

(model 307), is 3 inches in diameter and 7 inches long, and comes with a 3/8-inch non-slip hex drive for use with any cordless or corded drill. \$22.99 from Power Planter.com.

It will be emceed by Monte Durham from TLC's "Say Yes To the Dress: Atlanta."

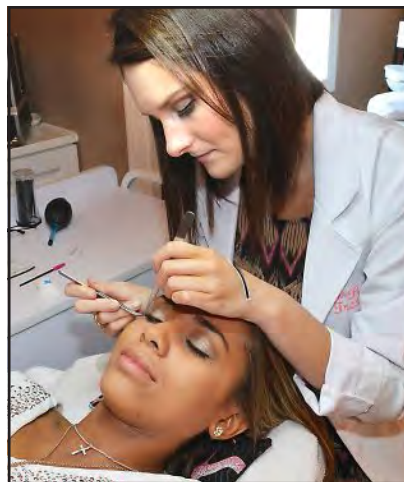

The company's analysts predict how smart machines will change the way we comparably simple humans function at work, and they use ominous phrases such as "dramatic rise of smart machines and autonomous devices" and "urgent need to define and develop harmonious relationships between

people and machines."

Gulp. The report is actually quite fascinating, and it hints at issues we would be wise to consider before the predictions become reality.

For example, the Gartner analysts believe that by 2018, "6 billion connected things will be requesting support." That means companies that provide support services will have to start viewing things — like smart machines — as customers.

Per the report: "They will need to develop mechanisms for responding to significantly larger numbers of support requests communicated directly by

things. They will also need to develop strategies for responding to them that are distinctly different from traditional human customer communication and problem solving."

There are other interesting prognostications, such as one that says 20 percent of all business content will soon be authored by machines. (I assure you, this column was written by a locally sourced, 100 percent organic human. Bleep blorp.)

A robo-boss would be capable of evaluating a person's performance without bias, basing its conclusions solely on quantifiable data. That strips away our humanity and overlooks the skills we possess that can't be quantified. But it would likely do a better job than a human of analyzing the measurable aspects of our performance and finding ways we can work better.

It's easy to see the advantages of this kind of micro-analysis, but it's also easy to dismiss it as too robotic. It's one thing for a machine to evaluate an-

other machine and find ways to increase efficiency, it's another entirely to evaluate a human based on nothing but raw data.

What the report suggests is that allowing smart machines to handle the data side of worker evaluation can free up humans to focus on — you guessed it — the human side.

I bring this up because it hints at the need for balance. Companies today are paying much closer attention to workers as human beings, recognizing the need to put people in positions where they feel happy and engaged and, in turn, do their best work.

But companies will always be tempted to use technology to more thoroughly evaluate how their workers are performing.

That's why it's important for companies to look ahead, to consider the efficacy of smart machines and balance that with the needs of human employees.

What to do when there's no guidance

Q: My boss just threw me in the deep end of the pool on a new project; he has a lot of expertise in the area, me, not so much. Is this tough love, or is he setting me up to fail? Either way, how do I handle it?

A: Ask good questions, find others to learn from and don't let it get in your head.

My bias is that it's helpful to stay positive, so in the absence of other hints, I recommend you take it as "tough love." He may have developed professionally through sink-or-swim opportunities and grown a great deal from it. In that case, time may have eased the pain — or he just doesn't have other management alternatives in his tool kit. If, however, other evidence suggests that he wants you gone, I recommend starting to form an exit strategy before your confidence is undermined or you develop a negative track record.

In the meantime, you have this project to get through.

Start by giving yourself a crash course on the theory and practice of the project area. Find a book or articles online to read. Reach out to your network and talk to people in your field with that experience. If you don't know anyone directly, tap into your LinkedIn connections. This is not a time to be shy, and remember that people are typically flattered to be asked and are usually generous with their time. With any luck, things will click well enough with someone that you can get some ongoing mentorship on this work.

Make a plan, detailing every step you need to take, and noting where you feel like you'll need or want signoff. Be sparing with these, because the message you're getting is to make decisions on your own, so you can't be going to him for all the minor directional issues you'll face.

Meeting No. 1 with your boss is to review your plan, get feedback and finalize it. Have some questions for him, particularly to find out what level of regular status reports he wants so that you communicate at the right level. Get his agreement to engage at the milestones you've identified, too, so that he is expecting to weigh in.

When you get to each milestone, it's essential that you go in with a point of view. If you're not sure what the right decision is, lay out your alternatives, do a pros-and-cons assessment of each, and be able to summarize the benefits and risks of each. Without a lot of experience, you may have difficulty deciding which risks are worse (or which benefits are better). That's where your boss comes in — he can add the most value and be most impressed by your approach if you're thorough and thoughtful. And you'll get the most learning, too.

Bottom line, think of this as a test — and one that you can pass. Your boss may be trying to assess your persistence, your creativity, your problem-solving skills or your initiative. Stay focused on the business need, keep your confidence up and communicate consistently to ensure that this works in your favor.

Worker feels unsafe after reassignment

DEAR CARRIE: My daughter-in-law works as a social worker for an agency. For 18 months she treated patients in the office. Recently, her office-based position was terminated and she was assigned to treat patients in their homes. This was considered a new position, and she received a small raise, which she doesn't care about. She walks alone to patients' apartments in some rough areas. She remains in their residences for up to an hour, and she feels unsafe. Others at the agency who were likewise reassigned feel the same way. If she quits, will she be eligible for unemployment benefits?

fits? — Worried In-Law
Dear Worried: She may be eligible. It's hard to answer with a definitive "yes" because the issue turns on several variables. For help, I turned to employment attorney Sheree Donath, who works in the Uniondale, N.Y., office of the Cory J. Rosenbaum law firm.

Employees generally qualify for unemployment benefits if they lose their job through no fault of their own, Donath said. On the other hand, employees who voluntarily quit their jobs are generally ineligible for benefits.

Those are the basic rules for unemployment benefits eligibility.

"Of course, there are exceptions, wherein an

employee quits his/her employment and still collects unemployment benefits," Donath said. "In those situations, it is determined that the employee quit with 'good cause.' Your daughter-in-law's situation may fit into this category."

The unsafe working conditions you mentioned may constitute a good cause for quitting, but employees have to make the case, Donath said.

"In alleging good cause for termination, the employee must first have made good-faith efforts to try and resolve the concerns," she said. "That means that before quitting, you must report the concerns to your em-

ployer (i.e. your supervisor, management and/or through any internal grievance hotline) and your employer must fail to resolve the issue."

"Without attempting to resolve the problem," Donath said, "it may be determined that the employee did not have a true desire to remain employed, and therefore the employee may be denied unemployment benefits."

Also, employees have little room for a good-cause argument when they accept the terms of a job, even some they later regret, she said.

Some retailers stop on-call scheduling

WHEN I'VE BEEN out reporting on workers' protests for a higher minimum wage, fast food and retail workers repeatedly have told me three things:

■ Their hourly pay rate isn't enough to pay basic living expenses.

■ They're not getting enough hours on the job.

■ They can't get a second job because they're required to be available for their first job whenever called.

All three issues are embroiled in layers of political and economic discussions. Outside of unionized environments, compensation and shift assignments for most jobs are whatever the employer believes is right, based on costs, competition, skill levels, available talent pool and other free market forces.

In early October, though, hundreds of thousands of low-wage retail workers got results they wanted on their third point. Partly spurred by aggressive action in New York state, several major national retail companies have eliminated on-call scheduling — a requirement that workers be available to work whenever called.

The practice, also known as just-in-time scheduling, is a logical business practice that allows companies to staff up or staff down when business demands and not have workers standing around with nothing to do or not have the company understaffed at peak times.

From the workers' point of view, though, it's a hardship that makes it difficult for them to manage transportation, child care and education (as in taking classes to work toward a degree), much less take a second job.

New York Attorney General Eric Schneiderman looked into scheduling practices of 13 large retailers, notifying them that on-call scheduling likely violated a New York wage law. In response to the probe and to groundswell action, several major brands have announced an end to on-call scheduling in their New York stores and, for some, nationally.

The Gap, Banana Republic, Old Navy, Bath & Body Works, Abercrombie & Fitch, Hollister, Victoria's Secret, Urban Outfitters, T.J. Maxx, Marshalls and Starbucks are among major brands that have said they don't use or won't use on-call scheduling at some point in the near future.

According to recent reports, Schneiderman's office also has sought scheduling information from J. Crew, Burlington Coat Factory, Target, Sears, Williams-Sonoma, Crocs, Ann and J.C. Penney.

Professional spaces can get 'childish'

Making a face behind a co-worker's back may not be the most professional way to express annoyance, but it beats throwing a temper tantrum.

The modern workplace has left most of its gray suits in the closet and cheered the arrival of pets and the occasional basketball hoop. But that less-formal atmosphere may have opened the door to other less-welcome behavior in the office, as well.

A survey by Chicago employment services firm CareerBuilder earlier this year found 77 percent of employees have witnessed some form of childish behavior in the office. That ranged from playing pranks to refusing to share resources to forming a lunch crowd that only the cool kids can join.

Those surveyed offered specific examples of actions that the rest of the office recognized as immature, even if the perpetrators were oblivious. Like the company owner who threw tantrums, yelled and slammed doors. And the manager who gossiped about staff, then pretended to be their advocate.

Almost anyone who has ever held down a job would recognize the worker who

hid to avoid doing work, although the one who blocked parking spaces to keep a colleague from getting a spot close to the door might be rarer.

The online study done for CareerBuilder by Harris Poll between late May and early June included a representative sample of more than 3,000 U.S. workers and 2,000 hiring and human resources managers.

This is the first time the company has done this particular study, but the findings seem to fit with other trends, said Rosemary Haefner, chief human resources officer of CareerBuilder.

"Other research we've done shows the workplace becoming more casual in many areas — such as dress

code and their rigidity around schedules — which may be contributing to the prevalence of 'childish' behavior in the workplace," she said.

It's not always a bad thing to get a little goofy. "It can be a harmless way to let off steam and/or bond with co-workers," Haefner said in an email.

But it can go too far. "If the behavior starts to get in the way of work or achieving big picture goals — or if it leaves others feeling excluded, offended or bullied in some way — that is crossing the line into potentially detrimental territory," she said.

Plus it can be a bad career move, showing an employee as someone not quite ready for more responsibility.

A separate study in late

February and early March found 62 percent of employees disinclined to promote staff with a negative or pessimistic attitude. CareerBuilder interpreted that as a synonym for whining or even pouting.

Haefner suggested asking the right questions in the job interview can help employers avoid hiring those who haven't quite grown up yet. She said interviewers might want to ask for examples of how the applicant dealt with a difficult co-worker and listen closely to the answer.

Responding in the moment to inappropriate behavior is a different challenge.

Haefner suggested calmly breaking up disruptive activities and then talking later with the offender to learn more about what was going on. She said managers shouldn't jump to conclusions that might put the worker on the defensive.

"Keep in mind," she said, "it's also possible these behaviors are as a result of some sort of dissatisfaction." Maybe the matter can be resolved.

But managers should also signal that some things just aren't acceptable, she said.

Base a big career move on facts, not hunches

Q: I recently learned through the grapevine that an account manager who is assigned to work with me has said he would much rather work with someone else. Supposedly, he feels this other person is a lot more professional. I have no idea why he would say that, because for 20 years I have been praised for my professionalism. Now my supervisor

says that I'm being reassigned to a different group of accounts. This really depresses me, because I have always worked hard and tried to go the extra mile. If the account manager had problems with me,

I wish he would have talked to me directly.

I assume this means the writing is on the wall, so I have begun to look for other employment opportunities. I would like to leave gracefully, but I also want to tell someone what this individual said about me. Is that a good idea? — Dazed & Confused

A: You seem to have made a huge leap from "I heard it through the

grapevine" to "I've got to quit my job." Before jumping to any more conclusions, you need to back up a step and get some actual facts.

Start by meeting with your supervisor to determine the reason for your reassignment. This decision may have nothing to do with your performance, but if management does have concerns, you need to know about them.

As for the allegedly

unhappy account manager, your upcoming transfer makes his opinion much less relevant. If you still wish to check out the truth of these rumors, ask him for some feedback. But if you prefer to avoid that conversation, then you need to recognize that all you have right now is gossip.

Steel maker considering layoffs at Ky. plant

LOUISVILLE, Ky. — AK Steel is considering idling some operations at an eastern Kentucky plant and laying off hundreds of workers because of competition from imported steel.

The company on Friday said it intends to temporarily shut down the blast furnace and related steelmaking operations at its Ashland plant, which has 940 workers. The steel from the plant in northeastern Kentucky near the West Virginia border is primarily sold to auto manufacturers.

“We are taking this necessary step due to the onslaught of what we believe are unfairly traded imports of carbon steel that have been flooding our shores,” AK Steel CEO and President James Wainscott said in a

release Friday.

The company says it is petitioning the International Trade Commission “in an attempt to combat these foreign imports.”

The notice given to workers on Friday is required by federal law 60 days ahead of layoffs. The release from AK Steel did not say how many workers at the plant would be affected.

The company says it will continue to operate its hot-dip galvanizing line at the Kentucky plant.

Scott Conley, president of the United Steelworkers Local 1865, says more than 600 union workers will be out of a job if the shutdown occurs. Salaried, non-union workers will also likely be affected, he said. The foreign steel coming into the country is coming from China, he said.

Conley, a welder at the

Ashland plant for 15 years, said the uncertainty of the layoffs is leaving workers without a clear future.

“They’re in a situation where they don’t know whether to leave the area to find employment somewhere else or try to hang it out,” he said.

The potential layoffs in Kentucky are landing a week after U.S. Steel Corp. proposed layoffs of 2,000 workers at its plant in Granite City in southern Illinois. The Pittsburgh-based company also cited foreign competition for its struggles.

AK Steel said the layoffs would not cause any interruptions in shipments to its customers. The company, based outside Cincinnati, has about 8,000 employees and 12 facilities in six states.

State lags in the U.S.; region lags in the state

Anyone looking for good economic news at the New River Gorge Regional Development Authority’s Thursday Business and Economic Summit was likely disappointed when told the U.S. economy is growing steadily while West Virginia’s growth rate remains flat.

Not only that, but the New River Gorge region’s economy is predicted to lag the state, mostly due to the declining coal industry.

The West Virginia University Bureau of Business and Economic Research pulled no punches in delivering the news, and emphasized that economic diversification is key to the state’s future.

“We should feel some sense of urgency,” said Dr. John Deskins, BBER director. “We have to make sure West Virginia is tapped into the opportunity that exists.”

Deskins listed the state’s economic deficiencies:

■ Rapid job losses, particularly in mining, where one-third of the jobs have been lost since 2012.

■ The state’s per capita income is near the lowest in the nation (West Virginians earn 79 percent of the national average).

■ The population is dwindling and is expected to fall by 20,000 over the next 20 years.

■ Gross domestic product without mining flattens “to no growth whatsoever.”

“I can’t imagine a more compelling case for industrial diversification,” De-

skins said.

■ Workforce participation is still the lowest in the nation, although it has risen to 53 percent, up from 49 percent.

Deskins said that number, while unsettling, is not new.

“We’ve had the lowest rate of labor force participation since 1976,” he said.

■ Education levels remain low, largely because college-educated young people leave the state.

“I don’t expect a kid who graduates (from college) to take a job offer for \$35,000 in West Virginia if she can get a job offer for \$45,000 just across the state line,” he said. “Kids should do what’s in their best interest.”

But he said the state should focus on making the state attractive, to make it in their best interest to stay here.

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Professor joins new security research team

Thirimachos Bourlai, assistant professor of computer science and electrical engineering at WVU, is part of a team of researchers charged with finding new ways to strengthen national security through the development

of biometric-based technologies.

The new Center for Borders, Trade and Immigration Research, a Center of Excellence housed at the University of Houston, was established with a

\$3.4 million grant from the Department of Homeland Security Science and Technology Directorate, Office of University Programs.

The Center includes researchers from 10 universities and a San Antonio, Texas-based consulting firm.

The Homeland Security Act of 2002 created a framework for DHS to establish university-based Centers of Excellence throughout the United States to focus on security issues. Bourlai, who leads the Multispectral Imagery Lab at WVU and is considered to be an expert in the area of unconstrained face recognition, will be the technical lead on this project.

Bourlai will work in partnership with Dimitris Metaxas, distinguished professor of computer science at Rutgers University. Bourlai and Metaxas will work to develop face-based screening technologies at points of entry along U.S. borders. Their plan is to use variable portable devices with the capability to acquire face images at operational conditions, including variable standoff distances and illumination conditions.

Art scholars co-sponsor conference

WVU faculty will get a chance to share their work as scholars and artists at an upcoming conference. WVU's School of Art & Design will co-sponsor the 2015 Southeastern College Art Conference, "Confluence," Oct. 21-24 in Pittsburgh.

The Southeastern College Art Conference, or SECAC, is "one of the largest organizations devoted to faculty who teach studio art and art history," said Kristina Olson, associate director of the School of Art & Design.

Part of that preparation has included arranging a WVU faculty exhibition at Artists Image Resource (AIR) at 518 Foreland Street in Pittsburgh. WVU and AIR have been partners for some time, with AIR offering printmaking internships to students.

More recently, WVU faculty have been working with AIR experts to produce the original works that will be included in the exhibition, called "Conjunction." That title speaks to the creative intersection between a variety of media, including sculpture and ceramics, with traditional and experimental printmaking processes.

Faculty in WVU's non-printmaking disciplines — photography and digital media, painting, sculpture, ceramics, and graphic design — have challenged themselves to engage their aesthetics with the processes of printmaking.

The work with AIR was made possible by funds from the Colonel Eugene E. Myers Foundation.

The show at AIR will be part of the evening gallery crawl Friday, Oct. 23, from 5:30-9 p.m. The exhibition will remain at AIR through Oct. 29, and it will be mounted in the Paul and Laura Mesaros Galleries in WVU's Creative Arts Center Jan. 25-Feb. 26, 2016.

The School of Art & Design will co-sponsor the conference with Slippery Rock University of Pennsylvania. WVU previously co-sponsored SECAC in 2007 with Marshall University.

NSF grant allows student pulsar program to expand nationwide

WVU and the National Radio Astronomy Observatory (NRAO) together received a nearly \$2 million, three-year grant from the National Science Foundation (NSF) to expand the reach and impact of the highly successful Pulsar Search Collaboratory (PSC) student science education initiative.

Approximately \$700,000 of the grant will go to the NRAO; WVU will receive approximately \$1.3 million. The PSC is a joint project between the NRAO and WVU to give high school students real-world experience doing pulsar astronomy research. The grant will enable these two leading research organizations to take the existing PSC model and establish PSC hubs throughout the country.

The expanded program will rely on local university support and a large online presence to link all of the hubs into a much

larger, more effective STEM (science-technology-engineering-math) consortium.

High school students who participate in the PSC help analyze a portion of more than 130 terabytes of data collected by the Robert C. Byrd Green Bank Telescope at the NRAO in Green Bank, W.Va., to hopefully uncover the telltale signal of a previously undiscovered pulsar.

The sought-after signal, however, is hidden like the proverbial needle in a haystack of data. Students who participate in this program take on the task of sifting through the data using newly acquired knowledge about pulsars and radio astronomy.

To date, this program principally targeted students in West Virginia and surrounding states. The new NSF funding will expand the program to other states, thanks to the participating colleges and universi-

ties, including the California Institute of Technology, Pasadena; Cornell University, Ithaca, N.Y.; El Paso Community College, Texas; Howard University, Washington, D.C.; Montana State University, Bozeman; Pennsylvania State University, State College; Texas Tech University, Lubbock; University of Vermont, Burlington; Vanderbilt University, Nashville, Tenn.; and Morehead State University, Kentucky.

In 2015 the National Science Foundation provided \$14.5 million over a five-year period to create a Physics Frontier Center that will use the Green Bank Telescope and the Arecibo Observatory to study low-frequency gravitational waves.

The National Radio Astronomy Observatory is a facility of the National Science Foundation, operated under cooperative agreement by Associated Universities Inc.

Simulations teach service leaders about poverty

Experts at the WVU Extension Service are helping service leaders better understand underprivileged workers through poverty simulations at the Faces of Leadership conference on Oct. 13 in Charleston.

More than 200 AmeriCorps and AmeriCorps VISTA members and volunteers gained a unique view of life in poverty through three-hour simulations at the event. The leadership conference is the state's largest gathering of volunteers using service as a strategy to improve communities.

The goal of the simulations is to create an immersive experience that helps participants increase their knowledge and understanding of the dynamics of poverty. The simulations have historically helped volunteers deal with service opportunities in the Mountain State, according to Tony Michael, associate professor and program leader for WVU Extension Service's Institute for Labor Studies and Research.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics' 2015 data revealed West Virginia had with the highest unemployment rate in the nation, with nearly 20 percent of West Virginians living in poverty and a quarter of children residing in homes with an annual income of \$24,000 or less.

According to Michael, low-income and disadvantaged workers are constantly faced with the burden of how to best care for their families with such limited resources and financial support.

Public invited to view Blanche Lazzell mural depicting Morgantown scenes

Morgantown area native and WVU alumna Blanche Lazzell received a grant in the 1930s from the Public Works of Art Project (PWAP), a precursor of the Works Progress Administration, to create a mural featuring scenes of Morgantown. It hung in a courtroom in the Monongalia County Courthouse for many years.

Later transferred to WVU, Lazzell's mural — completed in 1934 and titled "Justice" — is now a part of the opening exhibition of the new Art Museum of WVU and will be the subject of the next "Art Up Close!" event at the museum. The public is invited to come out and view the mural up close in the upper gallery of the Art Museum at 5:30 p.m. Tuesday.

WVU Art History Professor Bernie Schultz and Art Museum Curator Robert Bridges will talk about the mural's significance and the conditions under which Lazzell created it during

the Great Depression. The program will be followed by a question-and-answer session and light refreshments will be served in the Museum Education Center Grand Hall, adjacent to the museum.

The Art Museum of WVU holds the largest public collection of the work of Blanche Lazzell (1878-1956), a pioneering painter and printmaker who played a significant role in shaping abstract art in America. Lazzell was born in Madsville, near Morgantown, and graduated from WVU in 1905 with a degree in fine arts. She went on to study in New York and Paris with notable artists of her day.

The imagery captured popular landscapes from her native West Virginia and around her studio in Provincetown, Massachusetts. In the late 1930s, she studied with German-born modernist Hans Hofmann and returned to abstraction, joining Hofmann's Provincetown drawing class and later attending his New York

school. The Lazzell works in the WVU Art Collection span her entire career and include paintings, prints, decorative items, and drawings that come largely from Lazzell's bequest to the University. When Lazzell's mural of Morgantown was acquired by the museum, it was darkened by a layer of coal soot and had to be sent away to art conservators to be cleaned.

The mural is approximately 8 feet high and twelve-and-a-half feet wide. Lazzell took 14 weeks to complete it. The Art Museum also has all of Lazzell's preliminary drawings for the mural. Art Up Close! events are held several times each year and present WVU faculty from various disciplines discussing a single work of art from the perspectives of their disciplines.

Art Up Close! is co-sponsored by the Art Museum of WVU and the Friends of the Museum, a membership group for people who enjoy the arts and social, educational and cultural activities revolving around art.

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2016 Toyota Tacoma is quiet, impresses off-road

After three days of city and highway driving, I was ready to dismiss the 2016 Toyota Tacoma pickup as a nice, tall sedan. One of those city trucks.

It's so quiet, cushy and comfortable that it hardly seemed to be a truck at all. The plush seats, lush suspension, refined interior and single-finger steering lulled me into a Barcalounger-like state of relaxation. Floating above traffic, I imagined the best use of this midsize truck might be a drive-in movie. Or a nap.

An afternoon off the pavement convinced me otherwise. With a couple of motorcycles in the bed, and a couple of hundred pounds of equipment in the rear seats, I tested the mettle of the TRD Off-Road Double Cab on some ragged dirt roads and trails.

I was mightily impressed. The Tacoma skipped over the rough patches and potholes, staying comfortable and maintaining a bank-vault sense of secure silence. Even in two-wheel-drive mode, the Tacoma had no difficulty with the uneven surfaces and elevation changes. It plowed through the sandy patches and soaked up the washboard.

When I slipped it into four-wheel-drive mode and gave it a steep hill, the Tacoma climbed like a cat, mocking the elevation, mak-

ing a molehill out of a mountain.

The souped-up, dressed-up version we tested had a burlier 3.5-liter, six-cylinder fuel-injected engine. Making 278 horsepower and 265 pound-feet of torque, it featured a smooth six-speed automatic transmission, Bilstein high performance shocks and a high-end JBL audio system — bringing the tab to \$37,665.

"The interior is more refined, but our internal reference for the exterior is 'badass styling,'" George said. "That's a technical term."

The Tacoma TRD with the double cab and 6-foot bed is a little over 10 feet long and weighs 4,500 pounds. All that heft makes it a worker. The TRD can carry 1,300 pounds in the bed, and can tow up to 6,500 pounds off the hitch.

Toyota and the EPA say the Tacoma fitted with four-wheel drive and the six-cylinder engine can get 23 miles per gallon on the highway, and 18 mpg in the city, for a combined 20 mpg.

That's unladen, pulling nothing but its own weight, and it may

be ambitious. Babying the truck around town and on the freeway, I was never able to get the in-dash average mileage indicator to show any number above 17.

That probably won't matter much to the consumer drawn to the Tacoma. Gas prices are stable, and truck sales are rising.

This year, overall truck sales are up 10 percent. But transactions in Tacoma's class are up 15.8 percent over the period of January to August 2014, according to online auto sales company TrueCar.

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Drivers need to verify quality of their battery

PARKERSBURG — When preparing a vehicle for the upcoming winter, making sure it has a good battery can save some problems down the road, especially when temperatures really drop.

Mike Sutton, general manager at Pete and Libby's Auto Repair in Vienna, said batteries in general — especially in today's newer cars from about model year 2000 on — play a more important role in a vehicle's operations.

In earlier models, the main purpose of the battery was to provide power for starting the engine and not much more, he said. Batteries are now much more integrated into a vehicle's systems and operations, providing power for system diagnostics and other operations which often occur even with the engine is not in use for driving.

Sutton estimated about 20 percent of the vehicle problems Pete and Libby's Auto Repair fixes now are related to battery failure.

"If a battery is four years or older, it needs to be checked ... Anything after five years, you're on

borrowed time and it can fail without warning," Sutton said.

In addition to the battery's life, Sutton said another main problem is improperly secured batteries, which can be subject to vibrations cause misalignment of the battery's internal components.

In preparing for the winter season, vehicle owners want to check for any corrosion or build-up on battery terminals. The older the battery, the more it should be checked professionally, he said.

Any time temperatures go down, the battery can't provide as much power so having good quality and life is needed, Sutton said.

According to information from the Federal Emergency Management Agency it is important to make sure vehicles are prepared for cold and inclement weather.

A number of steps can be made to winterize a vehicle, most of which can be handled without assistance from a mechanic. Those steps include:

- Check antifreeze levels
- Check batteries (terminals should be clean)

- Check brakes for wear and brake fluid

- Check exhaust system for leaks, clogs and crimped or otherwise damaged pipes

- Check heater and defroster

- Check head and tail lights, turn signals and hazard lights. Make sure they're working and are visible.

- Check engine oil levels. If the oil needs to be changed, car experts recommend using a lighter oil, which lubricates better at lower temperatures and doesn't congeal like heavy oils.

- Check thermostat

- Check wear and condition of windshield wipers, as well as levels of windshield washer fluid. Use a winter formula of windshield washer fluid.

- Check tires. Make sure the tread is adequate and that snow tires or chains are in use if required. Also make sure there is adequate tire pressure, including the spare.

- Keep the gas tank as full as possible to prevent the fuel line from freezing.

Subaru Crosstrek review: Small SUV a great value

The 2015 Subaru XV Crosstrek (I give it three out of four stars) is formidable competition for established compact SUVs like the Chevrolet Equinox, Ford Escape, Honda CR-V, Nissan Rogue and Hyundai Tucson. It's such a good value that the Crosstrek, which stops going by its initials for the 2016 model year, also deserves a look from shoppers considering smaller subcompact SUVs like the Honda HR-V, Chevrolet Trax, Fiat 500X and Mazda CX-3.

Subaru has set sales records every year since 2008. Barring a catastrophe the magnitude of Volkswagen's diesel disaster, Subaru will set its sixth consecutive annual U.S. sales record this year.

Executives at other automakers shake their heads and ask how Subaru does it, but the formula is simple. Subaru always delivered all-wheel drive, reliability and good resale value. In recent years, it added value and high fuel economy. Throw in brilliantly executed marketing and advertising that make a Subaru seem more like a badge of honor than mere transportation, and you're talking about a phenomenon, not a brand.

Crosstrek prices start at \$21,195 for a base model with a five-speed manual transmission and 148-horsepower 2.0-liter engine. All-wheel drive is standard on the Crosstrek and all Subarus

except the BRZ sporty coupe. The least expensive Crosstrek with Subaru's continuously variable automatic transmission, CVT, goes for \$23,295.

I tested a nicely equipped Crosstrek with the CVT, voice recognition, Bluetooth phone and audio compatibility, automatic front braking, adaptive cruise control, lane departure alert, front seat side air bags, satellite radio, CD player, USB port and more. It stickered at \$24,590. There's also a hybrid Crosstrek that starts at \$26,395.

You'd be hard-pressed to find a compact SUV that offers more than the Crosstrek for that price. It's a good value, thanks in part to Subaru's decision to offer the same safety systems, using the same components, across its model line.

U.S. versions of the Crosstrek drop the XV initials for the 2016 model year. Subaru uses letters for the names of its SUVs in the rest of the world, but the U.S. gets words: Crosstrek, Outback, Forester.

The Environmental Protection Agency rates the Crosstrek all-wheel-drive with Subaru's fuel-saving CVT at a very good 26 mpg in the city, 34 on the highway and 29 in combined driving. The key "combined" rating beats comparable that of compacts like the Chevrolet Equinox, Ford Escape, Honda CR-V, Hyundai Tucson, Kia Sportage, Nissan Rogue and Toyota RAV4. It also tops smaller subcompact

SUVs like the 500X and Jeep Renegade.

The Crosstrek has less power than most compact SUVs. It's fine around town, but labors a bit passing on the highway. The CVT is unobtrusive.

The adaptive cruise control, which uses radar to maintain a set speed and distance from other vehicles on the highway, is smooth and nicely tuned. The steering is direct and responsive.

At 175.2 inches long, the Crosstrek is one of the smallest compact SUVs. It's maneuverable and easy to park.

The Crosstrek's passenger compartment is also at the small end of the compact SUV class. Despite that, there's plenty of passenger space. The front seat offers good storage, head- and legroom. The rear seat is accommodating.

The cargo compartment is smaller than that of other compact SUVs, but it has plenty of space for groceries, luggage and the like.

The touch screen Subaru uses to control audio and some other features isn't as quick or responsive as what the best competitors offer. The Crosstrek's voice recognition and audio quality for phone calls are both good.

The Crosstrek's styling is mainstream SUV with few flourishes. Its grille features Subaru's chrome crossbar and badge. The Crosstrek's color palette is its most unusual visual feature. My test car came in a muted traffic-cone orange.

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Under the Hood: Turbocharged engines explained

Q: Back during the oil crisis of 1973, many automakers came out with small (1.8-liter and 2.0-liter) turbo engines. Many of these vehicles experienced massive engine failure around 70,000 miles due to bearing failure, a lack of lubricant, overheating and various other issues.

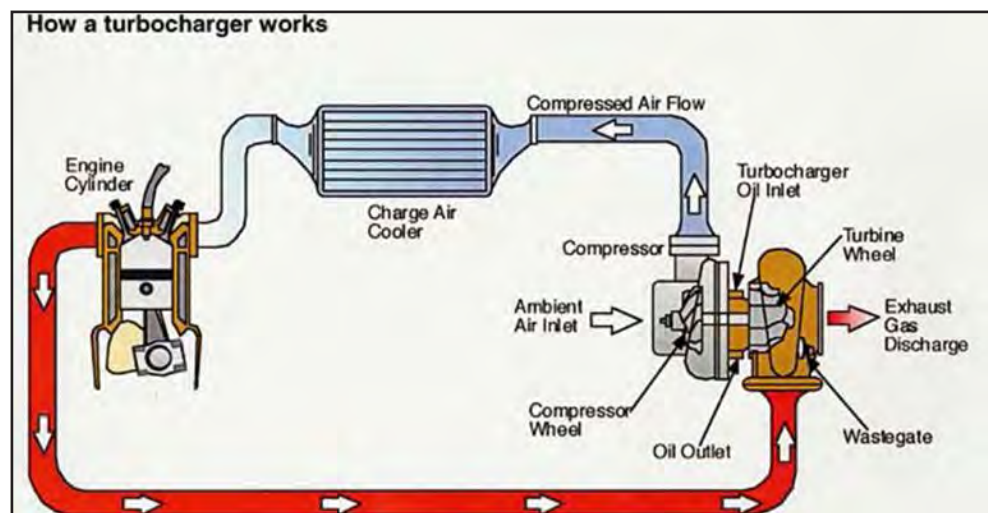
Have these issues been addressed and corrected with the current crop of small turbo engines? How long should a newer turbo last? What does it cost to replace such an engine?

A: Good stuff, Robert! Before answering your question, perhaps we should take a quick look at what engine turbochargers do and how they work.

Turbochargers pump air into an engine at a higher rate than would occur if the engine was naturally aspirated. Power can be boosted by about 25 percent on a gasoline engine and about 40 percent on a diesel, allowing a smaller, more efficient engine to be used in place of a larger one.

A turbo broadens the torque curve, meaning the engine doesn't have to be



running at a high speed to generate good power. This improves drivability and allows more efficient low-speed engine operation.

Driven by hot and expanding exhaust gasses, a turbine wheel rotates at up to 200,000 rpm depending on exhaust flow. At the opposite end of a connecting shaft, a compressor wheel draws in air and pumps it through a cooling radiator and then to the engine's intake manifold. Variable geometry and a waste gate may be used to adjust boost pressure to effective-yet-safe levels, maximizing performance while preventing engine-damaging detonation (an explosion, rather than a burn of com-

bustion gasses). Another valve mitigates surge, which is a potentially harmful condition that can occur if the throttle is rapidly closed with the turbo spooled up. An attractive feature of turbochargers is they utilize wasted energy, rather than consuming it, like a belt driven supercharger.

The turbos of the 1960s and '80s typically used journal bearings and did not utilize liquid cooling. This resulted in notable friction and operating temperatures frequently above the point at which lubricating oil begins to coke (solidify into charcoal-like particles). Many of the engines were carbureted and lacked

smart computer controls to manage operation and protect the turbo and engine from damage. Modern turbos utilize ball bearings, liquid cooling, better metallurgy, and in many cases variable geometry, managed by computer smarts. A movable vane or nozzle allows the turbo to adapt to low and high engine speeds, reducing lag on acceleration and maximizing engine torque across the board.

Modern turbocharged engines are often equipped with direct fuel injection, which allows a higher compression ratio to be used, without damaging detonation, and variable valve timing, taking better advantage of the turbo's benefits.

MSRP: \$22,995

Why it's notable: For those who consider petroleum extraction and refinement the source of all evil, an affordable electric car is the ideal solution. Why it's rare: If the 62-mile range or its mere 66-horsepower aren't turnoffs, no doubt its looks are. This hatchback was developed for Japan, not America.

■ Honda CR-Z
Number sold (January-September 2015): 2,205
MSRP: \$20,145-\$23,490

Why it's notable: For those who want to drive a gas-electric hybrid, but do not want to look like an eco-weenie when driving one.

Why it's rare: Its raison d'être, fuel economy, isn't as high as you might expect for a hybrid, at 36 mpg city, 39 mpg highway.

■ Lincoln MKT
Number sold (January-September 2015): 3,409
MSRP: \$43,210-\$45,205

Why it's notable: Boasting three rows of seats,

acres of spacious comfort, luxury amenities, all-wheel drive, an optional refrigerator, and as much as 365-horsepower.

Why it's rare: The MKT's looks never caught on with buyers, and it has done little to enhance Lincoln's image, although limousine companies appreciate its positive attributes.

■ Volkswagen CC
Number sold (January-September 2015): 4,490
MSRP: \$32,995-\$43,575

Why it's notable: The CC was among the first sedans with coupe-like styling, which endows it with a luxury car look.

Why it's rare: When it debuted in 2009, the CC cost more than a Passat. And the styling, while appealing, didn't justify the Audi-like prices for a VW-badged vehicle.

■ Hyundai Azera
Number sold (January-September 2015): 4,639
MSRP: \$34,000-\$38,200

Why it's notable: Hyundai's Avalon competitor caters to the same audience, with a large midsize sedan, a V-6 engine and front-wheel drive.

Why it's rare: Large midsize sedans like these are finding fewer buyers these days, and the resulting price wars make attracting buyers difficult.



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Motoring Q&A: Double-check your warranty

Q: I purchased a 2012 Honda Accord with 39,890 miles. It now has 41,458 miles. The first few hundred miles I heard a slight and infrequent noise upon startup. Now the noise is present on startup every day. The sound has been diagnosed as being related to the variable valve timing actuator.

The dealership where I purchased the auto was unable to hear the noise during its inspection. I believe the Honda carries a five-year/50,000-mile warranty. I received a free lifetime warranty from the dealership where I purchased the auto.

A Honda customer service rep told me the timing actuator was not covered by the warranty. Upon contacting the dealership where I

purchased the Accord, I was told that they would have to inspect the auto and determine who is responsible for the repair.

Can or will the noisy variable valve timing actuator cause damage to the engine, valves or timing chain?

A: Honda's 2012 new car powertrain warranty covers, among other components, "cylinder block and head and all internal parts, timing gears and gaskets, timing chain/belt and cover" for five years/60,000 miles.

I would think that the variable valve timing actuator on the camshaft would be included in the "all internal parts."

My automotive database pulled up a Honda service bulletin dated September 2014 covering

"engine rattles on cold start." It describes a loud rattle on a cold start as indicating a faulty variable valve timing control actuator in need of replacement.

I doubt that noise from this actuator would cause any damage or concern for long-term reliability. With that said, it seems clear that replacement should be covered by the original Honda powertrain warranty.

Q: I have a 2005 Land Rover LR3 with 94,000 miles on it. About two years ago, I periodically started getting "transmission fault" warnings, which prompted the vehicle to go into limp mode: All the dashboard warning lights came on, the gauges would stop

working, the suspension would sink down to the lowest setting and it only had limited gears available.

This would happen about once a month or so, but usually a restart or letting it sit for a short time would reset it.

This has gotten more frequent, and restarting or letting it sit would no longer clear it up. The car has been in the dealership nine times for a total of 103 days in the shop. At each service they would try a new solution, including clearing the faulty communication codes, fixing some broken wire splices and replacing the compressor.

The last time it happened, they were unable to reset it and it remains in limp mode. The dealership suggested replacing the anti-lock braking system

module, which is a \$4,000 repair. I'd be tempted to do the repair if I knew it would fix the problem.

However, I am reluctant to keep throwing away money to fix something that is appearing to be unsolvable.

A: I found a Land Rover service bulletin dated March 2006 that may apply to your vehicle.

It closely describes this scenario and points to a software or mechanical problem with either the transfer case clutch motor or electronic torque managed rear differential motor. If diagnostic fault code P186D is recorded, either of these motors may have become stuck.

When the ignition is switched on, the transfer case clutch motor is initialized by running through its full range of travel. If volt-

age is low or interrupted, the motor will stop somewhere mid-travel.

When voltage returns, it will try to initialize again but restarts from its stalled position. It will then experience an unexpected early stop, stall and trigger the P186D code.

If the ETM motor is actuated while the brake is partially applied, it can cause the motor to stick and generate the fault code.

If the problem is not software-related, the warning light will be on permanently and the fault code will be recorded at every startup.

This might be corrected by reprogramming the transfer case control module and/or the ETM rear differential control module.

Death comes to school

'Scream Queens' parodies slasher flicks from the '80s and '90s

With Halloween just around the corner, you're probably being inundated with monsters, gore and everything else typical of the horror genre.

It's the perfect season to get into "Scream Queens," the latest series from the creators of prime-time juggernauts "Glee" and "American Horror Story." Despite blood and murder aplenty, the horror-comedy anthology lightens things up by combining terror and violent slayings with humor in an over-the-top parody of the genre — while serving up a mystery to boot. "Scream Queens" premiered last month and a new episode airs Tuesday, Oct. 20, on Fox.

The series opens with a Kappa Kappa Tau sorority party in 1995. In an "I Didn't Know I Was Pregnant" situation, one of the sisters is discovered in the tub, covered in blood, with her new baby — "I thought it was the freshman 15," she wails. Her callous sisters abandon her to go dance to TLC's "Waterfalls," and she succumbs to blood loss. Tragic.

Twenty years later, Wallace University's Kappa Kappa Tau is still going strong, and is currently lorded over by the rich, beautiful and impeccably dressed Chanel Oberlin (Emma Roberts, "We're the Millers," 2013), a.k.a. Chanel No. 1, who's every bit as nasty and heartless as her '90s predecessors. To her horror and disgust, the school's new dean, Cathy Munsch (Jamie Lee Curtis, "Halloween," 1978), is declaring the highly exclusive sorority open to the unwashed masses — that is, anybody who wants to join, no matter how undesirable they may seem to Chanel and her ilk.

As if that isn't bad enough, on the 20th anniversary of the 1995 death, terrible things start to happen again. A devil-

masked killer is targeting Kappa Kappa Tau, and the bodies start to pile up not long into the first episode.

The show's feel is a blend of "Scream" (1996) and "Mean Girls" (2004), or, as co-creator Ryan Murphy put it in '80s terms, "Heathers" (1988) meets "Friday the 13th" (1980).

"[Co-creators] Brad [Falchuk] and Ian [Brennan] and I, all three of us, were always obsessed with the '80s/early '90s slasher genre that was always about young people and always about coming of age," he said in an interview with Entertainment Weekly.

Like the Heathers, Chanel and her posse all have the same name. Ariana Grande ("Victorious") plays doe-eyed Chanel No. 2, newcomer Billie Lourd plays earmuff-wearing Chanel No. 3, and Abigail Breslin ("Little Miss Sunshine," 2006) plays kowtowing Chanel No. 5. Chanel No. 4 is conspicuously absent.

The Chanel's aren't the only ones being targeted by the Red Devil; the sorority's batch of strange and quirky pledges aren't safe either. Far from endearing us to these misfits' quirks à la "Glee," the show makes most of them pretty irritating so that, in their own way, they're not really preferable to the vicious Chanel's — presumably so that we're not too distressed when one of them is decapitated by a lawnmower, which adds to the first episode's body count.

If the show sounds violent — and it is, at times — the blood and gore are toned down by the funny, clever script and sheer outrageousness of the over-the-top attacks. And the screaming. There's a lot of screaming. A LOT. Falchuk discussed the comedy/horror balance in an interview with The Hollywood Reporter:

"The way you find the balance is understanding that, when you're missing some ingredients, certain ingredients are super strong, and the flavor is so strong that if you use too much, it ruins the whole soup. Horror is some-

thing that is a really strong flavor, so just little drops of it is the best recipe."

The actors haven't been told who the killer is or if and when they themselves will be offed, so really, they're just as in the dark about their characters' fates as the audience is.

"We don't want to tell the actors because it's more fun if they don't know, because then they all think that either they're the killer or that they could be killed," said Falchuk. "Everyone is a suspect — and they should be. Every one of those characters absolutely could be the killer. It's designed that way. Anyone could do it."

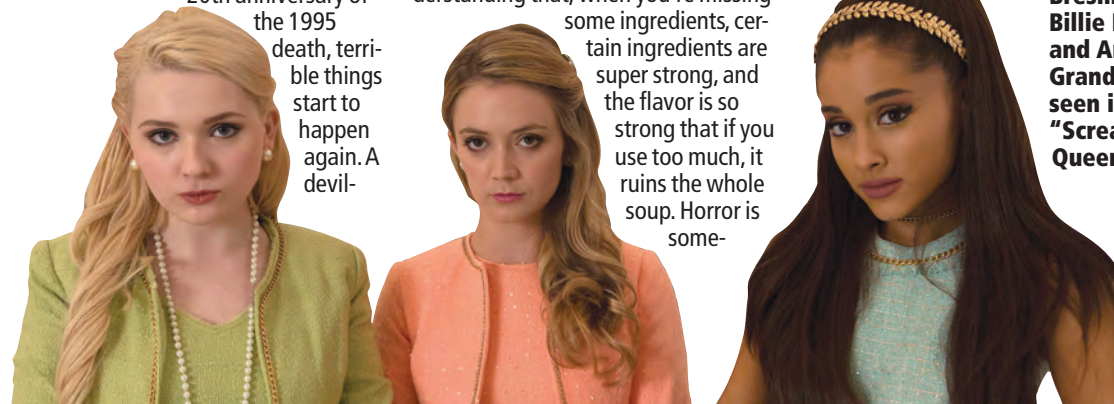
According to Falchuk, only five people know the identity of the killer: the three co-creators and two assistants. Every episode will have at least one death, as well as a new clue as to who the Red Devil really is. His or her identity won't be revealed until the final episode.

Unlike "American Horror Story," which fully reboots every season with a different cast of characters, "Scream Queens" isn't a true anthology, though it's listed as such. Of course, with so many corpses by season's end, the next season will require an awful lot of new characters. The survivors, however, will still be present.

"In horror movies, particularly in that era [the '80s and '90s], there was always the last girl, the final girl," Murphy told EW. "So we're playing with that. Whoever survives — and there will be people who will survive — they will go on next season to a new location and a new terror."

An 'Impossible' mission

New 'Chopped' crossover may be the most challenging yet

They said it was impossible. They said it couldn't be done. But they weren't expecting the combined star power of Ted Allen and Robert Irvine. OK, so that may be making things seem way more dramatic than they actually are, but with a name like "Chopped: Impossible," I'd say it's darn near impossible to not treat this like a Tom Cruise action movie. The special "Chopped" series — one of two premiering this month — premieres Thursday, Oct. 22, on Food Network.

"Chopped," of course, is the never-ending hit that's the backbone of Food Network's cooking competitions. Four

chefs are given the nigh-impossible mission of preparing restaurant-quality dishes in a woefully tiny amount of time using a basket of mystery ingredients that don't often work well together.

"Restaurant: Impossible," on the other hand, features Robert Irvine (who always looks like he's on the brink of bursting out of his shirt) going into failing restaurants and performing the impossible — namely, yelling at people until they run their business better.

Well, "Chopped: Impossible" isn't in the restaurant improvement business, but nonetheless, chef Robert will be on hand with Ted Allen in this very special "Chopped" series. He'll be sitting in as a judge for what might seem at first blush

to be a normal episode of "Chopped" — until the competitors open up their baskets of ingredients.

Food Network is describing the baskets as "mind-blowingly impossible," which, considering some of the bizarre ingredients that have been in the baskets in the past, does not bode well for the contestants.

Cooking edible food with the most far-out ingredients that "Chopped's" producers can find — it's a tough mission, but is it impossible?

Of course, since this is an "impossible" mission, there has to be another twist. As is usual for "Chopped," the competitors cook over three grueling rounds until one is declared the winner, and that lucky chef gets to take home \$15,000.

This time, though, there's a fourth round. In this wild-card round, the winner faces off against Irvine himself with the toughest basket yet. If the champion can manage to beat Mister Impossible himself, he or she will pocket an extra \$25,000.

"Chopped" is already legendary among chefs for being a grueling competition, but "Chopped: Impossible" sounds, well, impossible. The special tournament premieres Thursday, Oct. 22, on Food Network.

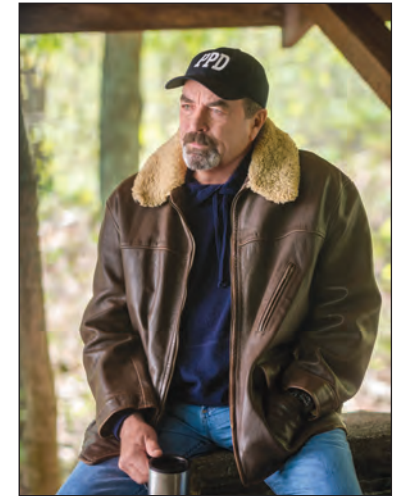

Megan Fox is heading to 'New Girl' in 2016

Fox on Fox: Looks like Fox's "New Girl" is getting a ... well, it's getting a new girl. A new girl named Fox. How about that? Hollywood actress Megan Fox has boarded Fox's single-camera comedy for the upcoming fifth season, in which she'll have a recurring role in a multi-episode plot arc.

Fox brings her considerable star power to a sitcom that was already strong in that area. She's probably best known for starring in both "Transformers" (2007) and "Transformers: Revenge of the Fallen" (2009), but she's no stranger to comedy, either. She starred in the 2009 black comedy "Jennifer's Body" and in 2012's dramedy "This is 40."

In "New Girl," she'll be playing a disruptive force in the loft when she rents out Jess's (Zooey Deschanel, "Elf," 2003) room while she's sequestered for jury duty.

Of course, Fox won't be the only guest star in "New Girl's" upcoming season. Other actors who are lined up to make an appearance include Henry Winkler ("Happy Days"), Fred Armisen ("Portlandia"), Taran Killam ("Saturday Night Live"), Rob Riggle ("The Daily Show"), Nasim Pedrad ("Scream Queens"), John Cho ("Star Trek Into Darkness," 2013) and Damon Wayans Jr. ("Happy Endings"), who left the series last year after two seasons as a regular.

Along with series stars Deschanel, Jake Johnson ("Jurassic World," 2015), Max Greenfield ("American Horror Story"), Lam-

orne Morris ("Glitch," 2015) and Hannah Simone ("Oldboy," 2013), that's a lot of faces to pack into just one season. But there is a very special event to celebrate: this fifth season of "New Girl" will feature its landmark 100th episode — quite the accomplishment!

A special 100th episode, a bona fide bevy of guest stars and the ferociously talented Megan Fox: it all adds up to a season that "New Girl" fans can look forward to. The hit comedy is due to return to Fox in January 2016.

Stone's not dead: A fan favorite isn't done yet. The Jesse Stone franchise of TV movies could have faded into the sunset after 2012's "Jesse Stone: Benefit of the Doubt." Despite premiering with a respectable 12 million viewers, the eighth film in the CBS franchise failed to keep the series alive, the victim of an ongoing trend — major television networks have been moving away from original movies for years now.

Luckily, Hallmark still sees the potential. The channel that's known for its high-quality movies picked up the rights to the Jesse Stone franchise, and a ninth film, "Jesse Stone: Lost in Paradise," is premiering Sunday, Oct. 18.

Longtime "Jesse Stone" fans will be relieved to know that the network change should be the only noticeable difference. The titular character himself will still be played by the irreplaceable Tom Selleck ("Magnum, P.I."), who's held the

leading role for all eight previous films.

Robert Harmon, who directed all but one of the previous movies (2011's "Jesse Stone: Innocents Lost" being the exception), has also signed back on for the film.

The Jesse Stone movies are based on a series of detective novels by crime writer Robert B. Parker. Selleck's Stone is the chief of police in Paradise, Massachusetts, a troubled man who struggles with alcohol and his relationship with his ex-wife.

"Jesse Stone: Lost in Paradise" premieres Sunday, Oct. 18, on Hallmark.

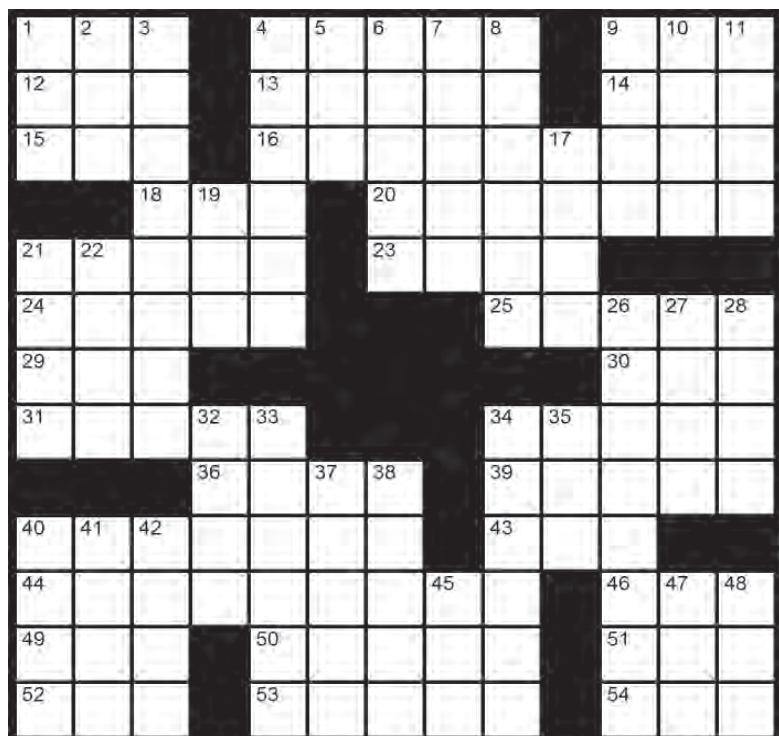

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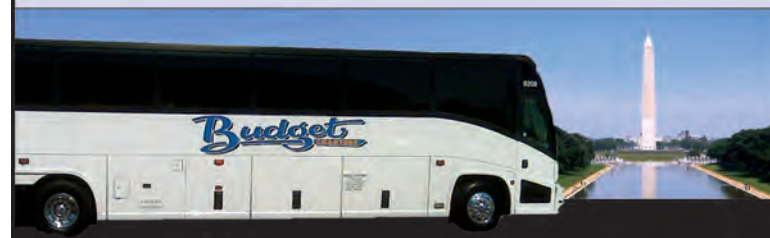

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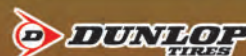

Protecting assets key for retirement

Having the correct insurance essential

An important aspect of retirement planning is asset protection. No one can be certain of their future medical needs, which tend to increase with age, making appropriate insurance coverage ever more important to protect assets.

For those age 65 and older, Medicare covers many medical and surgical situations, but payment of nursing-home costs is available only on a short-term basis and usually only following a hospital stay.

Medicaid is an alternative for long-term nursing home and related care costs, but generally provides coverage only for those with lower income levels. Also, the patient must meet specific medical requirements for Medicaid to apply.

When facing nursing-home costs, many find that their personal assets and resources will not be enough. Making sure that the spouse of the nursing-home

patient will have sufficient income and assets is also important.

Long-term-care coverage through an insurance company is one way to handle these costs, but coverage should be secured while a person is in his or her 50s or early 60s, when the cost is most economical and to avoid medical ineligibility for the insurance.

The policy's terms should be carefully selected. Consideration of both in-home services and nursing home coverage can extend the time a person can remain in the home.

A free booklet, "A Shopper's Guide to Long-Term Care Insurance," by the National Association of Insurance Commissioners, explains the options for coverage. It is available to download for free, at naic.org/prod_serv_consumer.html and from insurance agents who handle long-term-care policies.

To qualify for Medicaid, some decide to transfer some or most of their assets to an irrevocable trust that can benefit family members also. Under federal law, the trans-

fers must occur at least five years before the person is admitted to a nursing home.

When a trust is not appropriate, the couple or individual will likely be required to spend the majority of their own assets to reach the asset level needed for Medicaid coverage. Certain things, such as a home and automobile, are exempt from the calculation of what must be spent or transferred to the spouse who is not in the nursing home.

U.S. wartime military veterans and spouses can receive a special monthly benefit for unreimbursed medical expenses when in a long-term-care facility or receiving in-home care. The current benefit of more than \$2,800 for a married couple usually cannot cover the full cost of monthly care, but is a helpful supplement.

These protective measures can be complex and are best handled through working with an elder law attorney to avoid costly mistakes.

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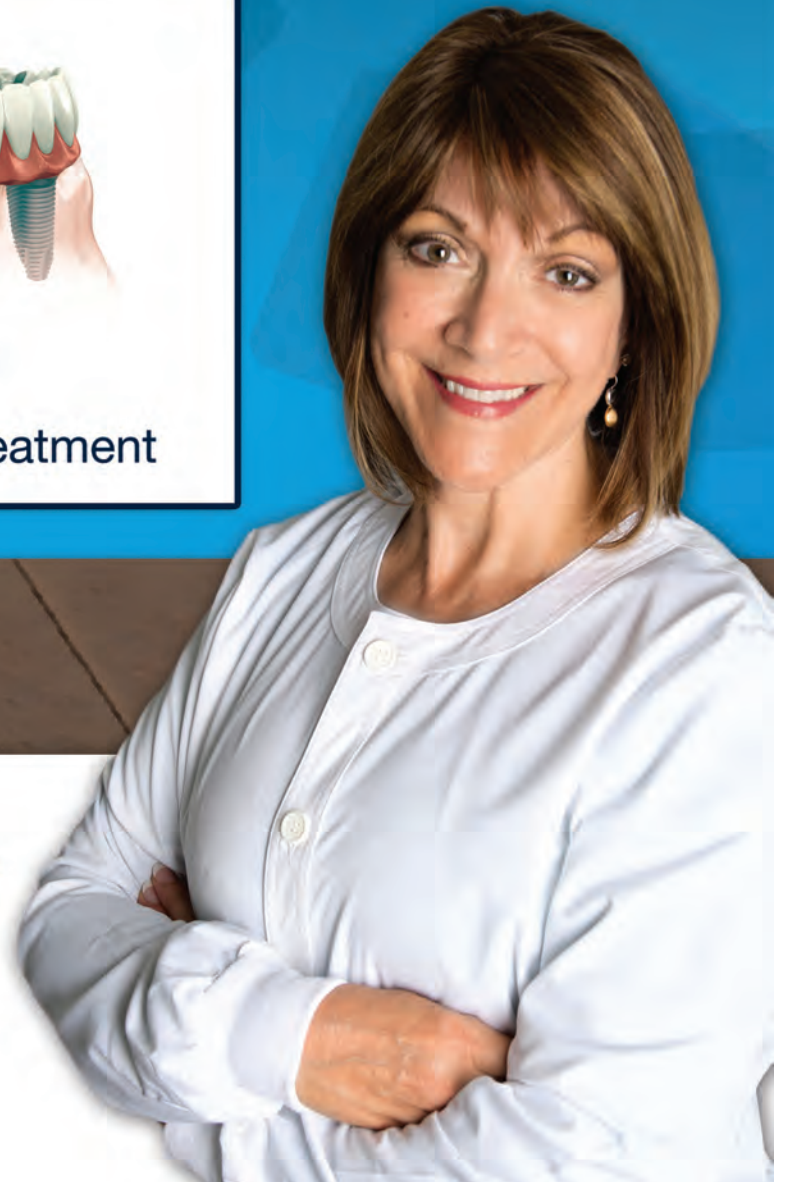
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A will is important, but more is needed

Medical and financial decisions play role, too

There are more aspects to estate planning than just signing a will. Medical, current financial and other decisions play an important role also.

The differences between the similar-sounding living will and living trust often cause confusion. The first is for medical purposes; the other is for financial needs.

A living will provides authority for certain last-medical measures when in a terminal condition. It has nothing to do with transferring assets or property after death.

A living (or revocable) trust is a financial method that provides for the after-death transfer of ownership of trust assets much like a will does. It also allows lifetime and after-death control of the trust's assets by a professional manager, when appropriate.

Another important estate-planning document is the power of attorney. These

documents deal with the authority given to others to make medical and financial decisions under specific conditions.

The documents will assure that someone will always have the power to act on your behalf, which can prevent having to go into court to secure such authority at a crucial time.

It also pays, while you are doing your estate planning, to check on the beneficiary you have chosen for your life insurance and retirement funds. Neither will be controlled by your will unless your estate is the beneficiary, which is not always the most financially appropriate choice to make.

For example, naming your estate as the beneficiary of your retirement funds can lead to more income taxes being owed



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because of the short payout period when an estate receives such funds. Extra income taxes to be paid by your estate may not be what you had in mind.

Something else — while you are free to provide nothing for your children from your estate, you cannot cut out your spouse. Most states' laws allow a spouse, who has received nothing or an inadequate amount, to claim a percentage of

the deceased spouse's estate.

The percentage the spouse receives can be based on the number of years married. In West Virginia, the percentage goes up to a maximum of 50 percent of the estate for 15 years, or more, of marriage.

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What you need to know about a will

Based on West Virginia law, a properly drawn last will and testament assures that a person's plans for the assets accumulated over a lifetime will be carried out and should simplify the administration of the estate.

Many people avoid thinking about it, much less meeting with an attorney and making a will, because they are unwilling to face the question of death.

When a person dies without leaving a will, there is a higher chance of conflict erupting among the deceased's loved ones. The family's grief is often made worse by disagreements among the heirs over the division of the estate.

A will is a legal document which sets forth clearly and legally the manner in which you want your property to be distributed following your death.

Since estate taxes are not a concern for most Americans, many think they do not need a will. But they are ignoring the important aspect of making sure that their hard-earned assets help those who deserve and need them most. Their planning provides the requirements for the distribution.

During 2015, estates of less than \$5.43 million will not face federal estate taxes. Also, West Virginia does not have an estate tax. For married couples, if both spouses pass away during the year, any of the \$5.43 million tax-free amount not used by the first spouse's estate can be applied to the other's.

Who can make a will?

The maker of a will must be at least 18 years old, of sound mind and free from improper influence.

How should a will be made?

The will should be written, witnessed and signed strictly in accordance with West Virginia law. No beneficiary under the will or the beneficiary's spouse should act as a witness.

It is important to have the testator's and witnesses' signatures attested by a notary public. Handwritten wills are recognized in many states, including West Virginia, if certain statutory requirements are strictly fulfilled.

Can a will be changed?

People may change their wills as often as they desire. Changes can be simply and easily made by drafting a new will or by the addition of an amendment called a codicil. However, any change or codicil must comply with the same laws that pertain to the making of a will.

How long is a will valid?

A properly drawn and executed will remains valid until it is changed or revoked. However, changes in circumstances after a will has been made, such as new tax laws, marriage, divorce, the birth of children or grandchildren, or even a substantial change in the nature or amount of a person's estate, can affect the adequacy of the will or change the manner in which the estate will be distributed.

All changes in circumstances require a careful analysis and reconsideration of all the provisions in a will and may make it advisable to change the will or conform to the new situation.

It is a good idea to review your will at

least every four or five years to be sure it is still appropriate.

Does a will increase expenses at death?

No. It usually costs less to administer an estate when a person leaves a will than when the person does not.

A properly drafted will may reduce the expense of administration in a number of ways. For example, posting bond by the executor can be avoided and provisions can be placed in wills which take full advantage of the marital deduction allowed under federal and state tax laws.

How large an estate is necessary to justify a will?

Everyone who owns any real or personal property should have a will, regardless of the present amount of the estate. Your estate grows daily in value through the repayment of mortgages, appreciation of real estate, stocks and other securities, inheritances from relatives and other factors.

May a person dispose of property in any way?

Almost, but not quite. For example, a married person cannot completely exclude a spouse. Also, insurance proceeds, retirement funds and jointly owned property are examples of assets that usually are controlled independently of a will.

What happens when you don't make a will?

When a person dies without a will, or dies intestate, as the law calls it, the property of the deceased is distributed according to a formula fixed by law. In other words, if you don't make a will, you don't have any say as to how your property will be distributed.

For example, if a person dies without a will, West Virginia's intestacy statute, like those of other states, first looks to a surviving spouse as a recipient.

The share to the surviving spouse will be 50 percent, 60 percent or 100 percent of the deceased person's estate, depending upon whether the decedent and/or the surviving spouse have children by that or a prior marriage.

Any portion of the estate not passing

on to a surviving spouse goes to the decedent's surviving children. If no such descendants exist, the property will pass to the first of the following groups in which living individuals exist: The deceased person's parents, brothers and sisters, nieces and nephews, grandparents, aunts and uncles, or cousins.

Also, no specific gifts to individuals and others, including your favorite charitable organizations, can be made without a will.

Most importantly, relatives do not automatically receive custody of children who do not have a surviving parent. Your will should specify the individuals you would like to designate as guardians of your children.

Who will manage your estate?

When you have a will prepared, you may name the person you want to manage the administration of your estate. If you do not make a will, then the court will appoint someone, whom you may or may not know, to handle the affairs of your estate.

Does a will avoid estate taxes?

A properly drafted will may reduce the amount of taxes that have to be paid. Many

wills written without consideration of recent federal and state tax laws should be re-examined with reference to tax problems if it seems likely that the estate assets will be worth more than \$5.34 million.

What happens to property held in the names of both spouses?

Joint bank accounts and real property held in the names of both husband and wife with rights of survivorship usually pass to the survivor by law and not by the terms of the deceased's will. If the property is owned as tenants in common, one-half of it will be transferred by will at the owner's death.

There are many cases, however, in which it is not to your advantage to hold property as joint owners, especially in situations where one or both estates will likely owe federal estate taxes.

Is a life-insurance program a substitute for a will?

No. Life insurance is only one kind of property a person may own. If a life insurance policy is payable to an individual or nonprofit organization, the will of the insured has no effect on the proceeds.

If the policy is payable to the estate of the insured, the payment of the proceeds may be

directed by a will. The careful person will have a lawyer and a life insurance counselor work together on a life insurance program, particularly in the area of estate planning.

Who should draft a will?

The drafting and signing of a will is a delicate operation and must be done in accordance with the requirements of state law where you reside (your legal domicile).

It requires professional judgment which can only be developed through years of legal training and study of your particular situation. It is a crucial way to protect all that you've worked so hard to earn. Therefore, it is highly recommended that you have an experienced attorney draft your will.

Can I prepare my own will?

While a person is free to prepare his or her own will by consulting free or purchased resources about wills or using pre-printed forms, this is a complex area of the law.

Without a legal background, it is difficult to determine whether the information or forms will adequately meet your needs and provide the least administrative costs and taxes overall.



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You can put your trust in a trust

Can protect funds of the disabled and cover college costs

Historians can tell you that the concept of holding property and other assets in trust started in the 12th and 13th centuries, when nobles went off to fight in the Crusades. In their absence, they turned over their property to a trustee for beneficial handling.

Trusts can play an important role in both lifetime financial management and estate-planning efforts. Use of a trust can provide control of property or assets for an extended period of time while also transferring ownership through the terms of the trust document.

Controlled by each state's laws, a trust is formed when a trust document is signed by the grantor — the person trans-

ferring cash, stocks, real estate or other assets to the trust's ownership.

The terms of the trust govern who will serve as the trustee — the person or financial institution which will manage the assets for the benefit of the trust's beneficiaries. The trust agreement outlines the trustee's responsibility for handling and investing the trust assets and paying income to specified persons.

Trusts, which begin to operate during the grantor's lifetime, can be set up on either a revocable (can be changed) or an irrevocable (cannot be changed) basis. Trusts created through the terms of a will are irrevocable.

In the typical estate-planning situation, a trust will provide for the transfer of assets after death, management of the assets by the trustee and payment of income to the surviving spouse for life. At the second spouse's death, the assets in the trust can be distributed to the children outright or the trust

can continue to pay income to them for their lifetime with distribution of the assets afterward to others.

There is also the option of creating trusts to provide future income for children or grandchildren who may not be adept at financial matters. The provisions can assure that funds for financial and medical needs will be available, thanks to professional management of the trust assets.

The trust assets can be protected from the income recipient's creditors through spendthrift provisions. Those terms block a creditor from being able to remove the assets from the trust, but a creditor can be authorized to receive the trust income in place of the recipient until the debt is paid.

Trusts for minor children or grandchildren can also provide funds for higher education. As an alternative, state-operated savings programs for college expenses (called 529 plans) can be a smart

direction for this type of planning.

An additional benefit of trusts can be the financial protection of a person with special needs who also receives government program benefits for the majority of their financial needs. A special-needs trust can provide extra funds for expenses not generally covered by those government benefits, such as personal travel, certain medical expenses and other quality-of-life needs.

Further, charitable trusts can pay income to specified persons and yield future support for favorite nonprofit organizations. A tax-exempt charitable trust operates without paying income taxes on its assets, allowing more flexibility in investing and permitting the assets to grow more over time.

Guidance in determining the type of trust needed and the steps involved is available through financial institutions with trust departments and attorneys.

Consulting with your financial advisor about the use of such funds can lead to less income taxes being owed by your estate. Even though the majority of estates currently will not have an estate tax liability, most will have to pay income taxes.

Many executors are shocked to learn that the top rate of 39.6 percent starts at \$12,300 of estate income. Minimizing income taxes

through better control of the transfer process and its timing is a worthwhile effort.

Retirement-fund accounts, including IRAs, and life insurance and annuity policies have beneficiaries listed to show who will receive the funds after the owner's death. Often the beneficiary will be the person's estate (as a default), but anyone can be listed, including a favorite nonprofit.

To update the beneficiary on such accounts or policies at any time, the company's change of beneficiary form is all that is needed. Changing the beneficiary does not affect current use of the account or policy.

These accounts and policies can be the way to support your favorite nonprofit after you die. When a nonprofit is listed as the beneficiary, no income or estate

taxes will be owed by the estate, allowing more funds to be available for other uses. That makes using retirement-fund accounts the smartest choice for charitable gifts made through your estate.

Having the transfer of these types of assets controlled by the beneficiary form can also lower estate administration costs.

In West Virginia, the executor must charge a lower fee on this type of account if a specific recipient (a person or a nonprofit) is named than on the assets and accounts controlled by the terms of the will. Also, using the beneficiary form to handle the transfer of those assets generally means they will be transferred more quickly to the recipient because a simpler process is involved.

U.S. Savings Bonds are also assets that can benefit others through an estate gift. A family member or friend can be made the surviving beneficiary of one or more bonds with a form available on the Department of the Treasury website.

The future beneficiary does not become a co-owner of the bond or have any control over it during the owner's lifetime. While Treasury Department regulations do not permit nonprofit organizations to be named as the surviving beneficiary on savings bonds, a gift provision included in a will (or a codicil to a will) can make a charitable (tax-free) gift of the bonds happen.

Understanding how different assets are controlled can also help you complete your estate plans more efficiently.

Charitable support is not just for millionaires. Everyone can be a philanthropist (meaning "a desire to benefit humanity").

Philanthropy is about a person's attitude toward giving. It involves passion and planning.

Giving money to support nonprofits might seem easy. To be certain your giving really matters, there are a number of considerations.

Giving proactively is a way to separate the wheat from the chaff. It seems that everyone receives a lot of mail and phone calls asking for money for one worthy cause or another. But do you have to respond?

Turning off completely isn't satisfying either to those who truly appreciate how



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important nonprofits are in today's world, and how they provide services and benefits that could not happen otherwise. Receiving unsolicited items does not create an obligation to give. Think about what you want your gifts to accomplish, and that probably isn't a pile of address labels or trinkets.

Giving with impact happens when you choose your "top three" or "top five" organizations to support that reflect your

personal values. Do you want to make a difference locally? Regionally? Nationally? Internationally? Will it be in the area of education? Health? The arts? The environment? Social services? World peace?

Give generously so that you can see the benefits of program growth. If you are considering a large gift, target your money for a special purpose.

Giving time, when possible, also permits

you to evaluate an organization more closely. Become a volunteer to see how the mission you feel is important is carried out on a daily basis. Your service will help the organization accomplish more, just as your gifts do.

Giving smart means you are aware of the federal income tax deduction you will receive and how it will affect your taxes for the year.

Some whose annual gifts are not large enough to itemize double up their charitable gifts to increase their deduction. That involves making double gifts in one year and none the following year. What would have been spread out over two years is concentrated in one.

If you feel your financial situation permits that, consult your tax adviser to see if it is an appropriate choice and what gift amounts would be beneficial. Others who want to contribute a large amount break it up into equal payments, say over five years, knowing that each year their tax deduction will be at the same level.

■ Contact your financial adviser (a financial planner, lawyer or accountant) and ask for help in establishing a charitable gift.

■ Think beyond cash — you can leave stocks, real estate, insurance policies and personal property to charitable organizations.

■ Make your favorite nonprofit organization a beneficiary of your life in-

surance, pension plan or IRA.

When people are hurting, animals are endangered or the environment is threatened, you help. Your charitable gift touches those in need today. The world's problems aren't easy to solve, but your gifts build solutions.

The nonprofit and educational organizations you support also touch the future. They will be creating your vision for a better world long after your lifetime. Their work, and the lives they touch, can be your legacy.

Those who put off their wills are only generating excuses

People come up with all sorts of reasons for not having a will.

Do any of these sound familiar to you?

■ I don't want to think about death.

■ Only rich people need wills.

■ I can't afford a will.

■ I don't have time now.

■ My family will divide things when I'm gone.

■ I will do it just before I die.

You may be able to think of other reasons as well. The point is that these are only excuses. None of them are really valid for putting off one of the most important financial plans anyone ever makes.

Every adult needs a will, if for no other reason than to officially close out his or her affairs and to make sure that whatever assets you have go where you want them to go. Perhaps an even greater reason is to make life easier on the grieving loved ones left behind.

For those who ignore this crucial type of financial plan, West Virginia law will control and will distribute the estate's assets in this way:

■ If you have one or more children with your current spouse only, then your spouse will inherit 100 percent of your estate.

■ If you have no children (or none survive you), then 100 percent goes to your spouse.

■ If you have children with your spouse and your spouse also has children from a previous marriage, then your children will inherit 40 percent of your estate and your spouse will receive 60 percent.

■ If you had children in your current marriage and during previous marriage(s), 50 percent will be inherited by all of your children and 50 percent by your current spouse.

■ If you have no living spouse or living children, then your estate will be inherited by (in order of priority) (1) your parents, (2) your brothers and sisters, (3) nephews and nieces, (4) grandparents or their descendants, or (5) the State of West Virginia. The first group in which there are living individuals will receive the estate's assets, and no one in later groups will receive anything.

In many respects, having a will prepared simplifies what happens to your estate.

Also completing medical and financial agreements to cover situations when you are unable to handle your own affairs is essential. Having that back-up authority permitting others to act in support of your needs is another vital step in providing the best results for all.

Think about it — planning takes very little time in relation to the opportunity to assure the outcome you feel is most important.
