**Blankenship tries again**

Seeks Senate seat via 'sore loser' law

Constitution Party U.S. Senate candidate Don Blankenship is ex-

pected to file his certificate of nomination with the West Virginia Secretary of state on Tuesday.

Then the question of whether he can really run under the state's "sore loser" law is likely to be settled in court, said Steve Connolly, legal counsel for the secretary of state's office, and

Phil Hudok, state Constitution Party vice chair.

Because the Constitution Party isn't a recognized party — it hasn't — gained enough votes in previous elections to qualify — candidates have to gather signatures and file certificates.

Hudok said Blankenship ex-

pected to have already filed his certificate, but they had a lower percentage of validated signatures than expected — they need 6,600 valid signatures — so he'll be filing "a little later than anticipated." Hudok wouldn't specify a day but Connolly said they

**Vigil held for wounded girl**

More than 50 people gathered Saturday at Mylan Park Elementary in a vigil for Chloey Neely, an 8-year-old girl who was shot in the head when a gun went off in her home.

"We're here to offer prayer, sing as humans and lift her in spirit," organizer Tonya Hawkins said.

Hawkins, a friend of the family, said Neely is in a medically induced coma and in critical condition at J.W. Ruby Memo-

Finding solutions to a drug overdose problem that claimed 64,000 Americans in 2016 isn't easy.

The problems are complex, multi-faceted, and range across multiple agencies that deal in law enforcement, mental health, health care and the political spectrum.

And while thousands die — more from drug overdoses in 2016 than every American death in the Vietnam War — the nation's law enforcement community is taxed, overworked and desperate for solutions.

"Some of us are dealing with heroin, some of us are dealing with fentanyl, some of us are dealing with meth, some of us are dealing with cocaine," Morgantown Police Chief Ed Preston said. "But we are all dealing with a multitude of drug addiction issues."

That was what Preston learned when he joined three other active

**Survivors recount deadly boat sinking**

BRANSON, Mo. — "Grab the baby!"

Those were the last words Tia Coleman recalls her sister-in-law yelling before the tourist boat they were on sank into a Missouri lake, killing 17 people, including nine of Coleman's family members.

A huge wave hit, scattering passengers on the vessel known as a duck boat into Table Rock Lake near Branson, Coleman said, recounting the ordeal from a hospital bed. When the Indianapolis woman came up for air,

she was alone. She prayed.

"I said, 'Jesus please keep me, just keep me so I can get to my children,'" Coleman told television station KOLR.

She spotted a rescue boat and swam as fast as she could.

Coleman's husband and three children, ages 9, 7 and 1; her 45-year-old sister-in-law and 2-year-old nephew; her mother-in-law and father-in-law and her husband's uncle all died Thursday night in the deadliest accident of its kind in nearly two decades. Others killed included a Missouri couple who had just

celebrated a birthday; another Missouri couple who were on what was planned as their last extended vacation; an Illinois woman who died while saving her granddaughter's life; an Arkansas father and son; and a retired pastor who was the boat's operator.

State and federal investigators were trying to determine what sent the vessel, originally built for military use in World War II, to its demise. An initial assessment blamed thunderstorms and winds that approached hurricane strength, but it wasn't clear why the am-

phibious vehicle even ventured into the water.

Coleman said the crew told passengers they were going into the water first, before the land-based part of their tour, because of the incoming storm. The area was under a severe thunderstorm watch for hours and a severe thunderstorm warning for more than 30 minutes before the boat sank.

Suzanne Smagala with Ripley Entertainment, which owns Ride the Ducks in Branson, said it was the company's only ac-

cident in more than 40 years of operation. The company hasn't commented on Coleman's account of the tour, which usually begins with a tour of downtown Branson, known for its country shows and entertainment, before the vessel enters the lake for a short ride on the water.

Company President Jim Pattison Jr. said the boat captain had 16 years

of experience, and the business monitors weather.

Twenty-nine passengers and two crew members were aboard.

Fourteen people survived, including two adults who remained hospitalized Saturday. Coleman and her 13-year-old nephew were the only two of the 11 members of her family who boarded the boat to make it out alive.

Another survivor was 12-year-old Alicia Dennison, of Illinois, who said her grandmother, 64-year-

old Leslie Dennison, saved her from drowning. Alicia's father, Todd Dennison, told the Kansas City Star that his daughter recalled feeling her grandmother below her, pushing her upward after the boat capsized.

Another young survivor was 14-year-old Loren Smith, of Osceola, Ark. She suffered a concussion, but her father, 53-year-old retired math teacher Steve Smith, and her 15-year-old brother, Lance, died.

Others killed included 65-year-old William Bright and his 63-year-old wife, Janice. The couple had recently celebrated their 45th wedding anniversary and had talked about Branson being one of their last big trips, recalled neighbor Barbara Beck.

The couple moved to Higginsville from Kansas City, Mo., three years earlier to be closer to a daughter and grandchildren and quickly embraced small-town life.

and former police chiefs from varying cities of diverse sizes all across the United States as part of a report issued by the Police Executive Research Forum, called "Ten Standards of Care: Policing and the Opioid Crisis."

"Addiction is a type of disease and requires long-term treatment," Preston said. "But we don't treat addiction like that, typically. We get them clean in a 14- or 28-day process, and we send them right back to the same circumstances where they were using or got addicted or were exposed to it, with the same people that were using with them, exposing them to it, and expecting them to stay clean because we dried them out for 28 days."

The report offers 10 standards for law enforcement to potentially follow.

Preston said each standard offers something important, but most focus on the same common theme: Preventing a tragedy.

The current model, which often focuses on short-term care, doesn't check every box, Preston said.

"We didn't get them sober," Preston continued. "We dried them out for 28 days. So, now, we have a greater chance of recidivism and overdose because now they are dried out, their body is not as adjusted to taking the doses they were before. They take the dose they took before, and now it kills them."

The current healthcare infrastructure needs to include more massive, long-term care — treating opioid use disorder like any other disease.

"We don't have a system set up in this area where we could put them directly into rehab right there," Preston said. "We have to find bed space available for them. Sometimes we have to find out if insurance is available to pay for it and those kinds of things."

**Continuum of care**

Douglas M. Leech, founder and CEO of Mor-

gantown-based Ascension Recovery Services and West Virginia Sober Living Inc., agrees with Preston that the current system is flawed. The success rate for 28-day rehab stays is low.

"The more the continuum of care that exists, the better," he said.

He and his colleagues opened Sober Living in Morgantown to extend that continuum.

First comes detox, he said, where the person comes clean under close supervision. Then comes residential treatment for 28 or 90 days.

Then instead of putting the person back in their old environment, they enter a sober living setting with intensive outpatient programming so they can become stable.

Right now, Leech said, the missing link in Morgantown is residential treatment, but that will soon change. As previously reported, WVU Hospitals is building a substance disorder treatment center at Mylan Park. Leech said it's set to open next March. "In Morgantown we'll have the full continuum of care."

And with the Ryan Brown grant program, he said, more treatment centers will be opening around the state.

A recovering addict The Dominion Post is identifying as "Morgan" for her privacy also agreed with Preston.

"Anytime I went into treatment," she said, "I could expect to be there for 30 to 90 days. The first attempt I took at recovery, I did nothing for aftercare. I simply returned to the same environment and got high within 20 minutes of being back in my hometown."

"My attempts after that I lived in sober living environments and got to experience what a recovery community was like, which gave me a lot of hope and planted a seed of where to go when I was ready."

**Drug trends**

Preston said these issues aren't strictly police

issues. "But the police end up having to deal with it because nobody else can or will." Meanwhile, alarming new drug trends are fast developing.

"There is a very high probability that in the near future that we're going to be dealing with other types of drugs, such as methamphetamine," he said. "And we're going to see meth addiction, and with that we'll see a different type of crime that will go with that because the effects of the stimulation of the central nervous system. Fights, assaults, batteries, we'll see much more of those kind of things."

Charleston Police Chief Steve Cooper recently told MetroNews "Talkline" host Hoppy Kercheval that he's already seeing that trend come to life.

"We were seizing more heroin than meth for years, and now the scales have really tipped to the point where we don't believe we're on track to even seize 1,000 grams of heroin compared to possibly 25,000 grams of methamphetamine," he said.

Preston and Cooper both agreed that this isn't just ordinary meth, or "bathtub meth" that rocked the state during the early to mid-2000s. Rather, this is "ice" — a high-grade quality meth cut with fentanyl.

"(Mexican) cartels are flooding the market with very cheap crystal meth," Cooper said. "And the purpose is to get as many people addicted as possible so as to grow their client base back up. The profit margin was not good on marijuana for the cartels. So, they all started mass-producing this crystal meth."

**'Save your life'**

In Morgantown, Preston only hopes it's not too late to get out ahead of this newest drug trend.

"We're not just looking at what's going on now," he said. "We're looking at what's coming down the future and how can we intercept and stop it before it comes to crisis that we've had with the opiates."

Leech said he's seen this evolution. "It's scary. It's a lot different than it was five years ago, 10 years ago. It's killing people so rapidly."

The Dominion Post asked Leech and Morgan if it's possible to help someone who isn't ready. They have different views.

Morgan said, "I've seen people who are forced into recovery and end up sticking around and turning their lives around. I be-

lieve it is up to that individual and their desire.

"I've also seen the flip side where people get a bad taste in their mouth and they hold resentments on recovery communities. From my personal experience, I've been forced several times and nothing changed in my life until I was completely broken down and ready for a change in my life.

Leech believes it's possible, and sometimes necessary. Sometimes waiting for someone to hit rock bottom means they'll die first.

His services, he said, specialize in intervention. They get the family on board and willing to give up enabling or ignoring. The family can then approach the person with addiction.

In cases where the addict committed a crime as a result of their addiction, they help the family understand that bailing the person out of jail isn't the answer. They keep them locked up until treatment is arranged, along with direct transport to the facility.

The person might go grudgingly at first, he said, but through detox and treatment — and a choice between that and criminal charges — they may see the light and have a breakthrough.

This is a solution the courts like, he said, because it helps stop the revolving door of freedom-crime-arrest-jail.

Leech commended Preston for the work he and his colleagues are accomplishing nationwide. "They really care and they're doing a lot of good. ... We're very lucky to have him in our town."

Morgan had a parting thought for people who are where she's been. "If I could say anything to anyone who is struggling: Reach out, even if you are not sure on if you want to be clean or sober yet. Try something new that you have never done before. I truly believe you will be amazed by the results of what recovery has to offer. Get connected with positive people, get involved in your community, and start living! Too many people are dying due to this disease. Save your life."

rial Hospital. Hospital officials did not confirm her condition in time for this report.

According to MECCA 911 dispatchers, a 9mm hollow-point round went through a wall and struck the girl behind the right ear Friday night.

"It might bring a little brightness to her," Neely's grandmother Tina Nichols said of the vigil.

She said the show of support was beautiful and overwhelming.

Betty Nichols, Neely's great-grandmother, said it's been really heard for the family lately. The girl's dad, C.J. Neely, passed away July 6 and her grandfather James Harper was buried Thursday.

"I keep asking myself how much she can take," Betty said of Chloey's mother, Kristie.

Teachers and friends unanimously described Chloey as a sweet girl.

"She has a very good heart," 9-year-old Gracelyn Efaw said.

Efaw said she cheers with Chloey and knows her from school. She said her mother told her about the accident Saturday morning and said they needed to keep the family in their prayers.

She said she hopes

Chloey feels better.

"Chloey is special, vibrant and beautiful," Christina Pizatella, one of her second-grade teachers, said. "We support, love and pray for her and we're here in any way they need."

Hawkins said she is organizing a fundraiser and meal plan for the family so that Kristie can focus on what's most important — her daughter.

Kristie was not at the vigil, but Hawkins said she would tell her about the support everyone showed and make sure all their wishes got back to her.

Anyone who is interested in helping the family should reach out on Facebook or call her at 304-290-2251, she said.

Pastor Junius Lewis, of Greater Love Family Outreach Ministries, started the vigil with a prayer before leading the attendees in "Amazing Grace."

Several people cried as they sang.

"When tragedy occurs, good people need to gather together like you did tonight," he said.

He said he had no doubt that Chloey would pull through with God's help and he was praising God as if the miracle had already happened.

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# Democratic socialism surging in the age of President Trump

PORTLAND, Maine — A week ago, Maine Democrat Zak Ringelstein wasn't quite ready to consider himself a member of the Democratic Socialists of America, even if he appreciated the organization's values and endorsement in his bid to become a U.S. senator.

Three days later, he told The Associated Press it was time to join up. He's now the only major-party Senate candidate in the nation to be a dues-paying democratic socialist.

Ringelstein's leap is the latest evidence of a nationwide surge in the strength and popularity of an organization that, until recently, operated on the fringes of the liberal movement's farthest left flank. As Donald Trump's presidency stretches into its second year, democratic socialism becomes a significant force in Democratic politics. Its rise comes as Democrats debate whether moving too far left will turn off voters.

"I stand with the democratic socialists, and I have decided to become a dues-paying member," Ringelstein told AP. "It's time to do what's right, even if it's not easy."

There are 42 people running for offices at the federal, state and local levels this year with the formal endorsement of the

Democratic Socialists of America, the organization says. They span 20 states, including Florida, Hawaii, Kansas and Michigan.

The most ambitious Democrats in Washington were reluctant to embrace the label, even as they embrace the policies defining modern-day democratic socialism: Medicare for all, a \$15 minimum wage, free college tuition and the abolition of the federal department of Immigration and Customs Enforcement, also known as ICE.

Vermont Sen. Bernie Sanders, Congress' only self-identified democratic socialist, campaigned Friday with the movement's newest star, New York City congressional candidate Alexandra Ocasio-Cortez, 28, a former bartender who defeated one of the

most powerful House Democrats last month.

There is little distinction made between the terms "democratic socialism" and "socialism" in the group's literature. While Ringelstein and other DSA-backed candidates promote a "big-tent" philosophy, the group's constitution describes its members as socialists who "reject an economic order based on private profit" and "share a vision of a humane social order based on popular control of resources and production, economic planning, equitable distribution, feminism, racial equality and non-oppressive relationships."

Members during public meetings often refer to each other "comrades," wear clothing featuring socialist symbols like the rose.

# Trump finds it 'inconceivable' lawyer would record a client

BRIDGEWATER, N.J. — Donald Trump said Saturday he finds it "inconceivable" that a lawyer would tape a client, as the president weighed in after the disclosure in the weeks before the 2016 election, his then-personal attorney secretly recorded their discussion about a potential payment for a former Playboy model's account of having an affair with Trump.

The recording was part of a large collection of documents and electronic records seized by earlier this year by federal authorities from Michael Cohen, the longtime Trump fixer.

In a tweet, Trump called such taping "totally unheard-of & perhaps illegal." He also asserted, without elaborating, in post: "The good news is that your favorite President did nothing wrong!"

Cohen made a practice of recording conversations, unbeknownst to those he was speaking with. Most states, including NY, allow for recordings of conversations with only the consent of one party; other states require all parties to agree to a recording or have mixed laws on the matter. It was not immediately clear where Trump and Cohen were located at the time of the call.

Cohen's recording adds to questions about whether Trump tried to quash dam-

aging stories before the election. Trump's campaign had said it knew nothing about any payment to ex-centerfold Karen McDougal.

Transparency groups and Democrats argued the secret efforts to silence Trump accusers, including a payment to adult film actress Stormy Daniels, should be investigated by the Federal Election Commission as potential violations of campaign finance laws, which require disclosure of campaign expenditures. Trump's attorneys argued that any payments to accusers would be made regardless of his presidential candidacy, and that no violation occurred.

The recording could also further entangle the president in a criminal investigation that targeted Cohen for months.

The erstwhile Trump loy-

alist hired a new attorney, Clinton White House veteran Lanny Davis, and disassociated himself from the president as both remain under investigation. Cohen was charged with a crime.

Current Trump attorney Rudy Giuliani said the payment was never made and the brief recording shows Trump did nothing wrong.

"The transaction that Michael is talking about on the tape never took place, but what's important is: If it did take place, the president said it has to be done correctly and it has to be done by check" to keep a proper record of it, Giuliani said.

Davis said "any attempt at spin cannot change what is on the tape."

"When the recording is heard, it will not hurt Mr. Cohen," Davis said in a statement.

### Terrorist not stripped of citizenship

COLUMBUS, Ohio — The government can't strip a terrorist of his U.S. citizenship, a federal judge ruled this month in a decision siding with a Pakistan-born man serving the last few years of a 20-year prison sentence for his guilty plea to plotting to destroy New York's Brooklyn Bridge.

The case involves Iyman Faris, who was sentenced in 2003 for aiding and abetting al-Qaida by scoping out the bridge as part of a plot to cut through cables that support it. His case was among the first and highest-profile terrorism cases after the Sept. 11 attacks.

Faris met with Osama bin Laden in Afghanistan and worked with Sept. 11 architect Khalid Sheikh Mohammed, although some critics questioned how realistic the plot was, given post-Sept. 11 security in New York.

A court filing last year in U.S. District Court in southern Illinois argued Faris lied on immigration papers before becoming a naturalized U.S. citizen in 1999 and his terrorist affiliations demonstrated a lack of commitment to the U.S. Constitution.

"The U.S. government is dedicated to ... preventing the exploitation of our nation's immigration system by those who would do harm to our country," Chad Readler, acting assistant attorney of the Department of Justice's civil division, said in a statement at the time.

### 'Stand your ground' law prevents arrest

CLEARWATER, Fla. — A

Florida sheriff said he will not arrest a man who killed a man during an argument over a parking space.

A media outlet reported Pinellas County Sheriff Bob Gualtieri made the announcement Friday about Michael Drejka, 47. Drejka shot and killed Markeis McGlockton, 28, a day earlier in a convenience store parking lot.

Authorities say that Drejka confronted McGlockton's girlfriend about parking in a handicapped space without a permit. Gualtieri said that McGlockton slammed Drejka to the ground, who then pulled out his gun and shot McGlockton in the chest.

Gualtieri said the incident falls under the state's 'stand your ground' law that allows someone to use deadly force if they believe it necessary to prevent death or great bodily harm.

### 70-year-old was bitten by a bear

ALAMOGORDO, N.M. — Officials say a 70-year-old southern New Mexico man who regularly fed wildlife at his home suffered multiple injuries when he was bitten by a bear as he stepped outside.

The state Game and Fish Department said conservation officers went to the man's Cloudcroft home Friday after his wife drove him to an Alamogordo hospital for treatment of injuries including arm puncture wounds and leg scratches.

According to the department, the man acknowledged feeding cracked corn to wildlife and that multiple bears routinely entered the residence.

Department Director Alexandra Sandoval says it's good that the man will recover quickly from his injuries but feeding wildlife "is never an acceptable practice."

SAN DIEGO — Riz Ahmed, who shattered glass ceilings as the first Asian man to win an acting Emmy, is celebrating fellow trailblazer Sandra Oh.

The "Grey's Anatomy" actress became the first nominee of Asian descent in the leading drama actress category when Emmy nominations were announced this month.

"I'm incredibly happy for her. Massively well deserved," Ahmed said Friday at Comic-Con. "I think we're living in a moment where we are all realizing that it's not enough to just carry on with business as usual. If we just sleep walk forward, we can end up walking off a cliff, and I think a lot of people think we've done that politically, both in Europe and in America."

Last year, Ahmed took home an Emmy for "The Night Of." Oh received five bids for "Greys" and earned critical praise as a spy hunter in BBC America's "Killing Eve."

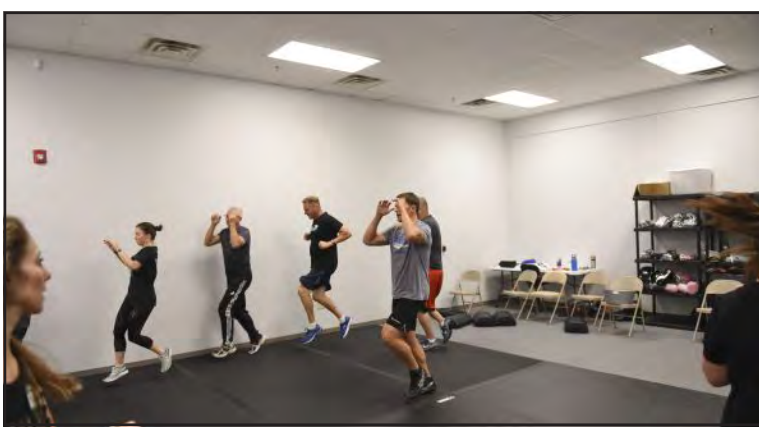
Imagine walking down the street, and someone accosts you with a gun demanding your wallet and all of your money.

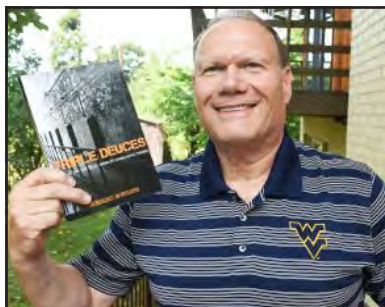
class and a women's empowerment class.

## Warden Cam Lindsay tells career story

Authors book about his time in Kennedy Center

No one was selling wolf tickets for this one.

When the call came in, every correctional officer on the block, including the warden, took off in the direction of the tumult:

"All radio units! Triple Deuces! Say again, TRIPLE DEUCES! Location, outdoor area of A Unit!"

Triple deuces: 2-2-2, on the telephone.

The jail equivalent of calling 9-1-1.

Blood was everywhere. So were inmates, it seemed.

Fourteen or so of them, curled on the floor, or slouched against the wall, or walking in circles. They were crying, cursing and raging.

None of the wounds were life-threatening — "sissy shanks" being the weapons of choice — but the shirt of one inmate was tied with blood from a vicious slash wound to his face.

He would be left with a permanent scar and a lasting warning: *You're on notice. It'll be worse next time.*

### 'OK — do your thing'

Cameron Lindsay, the warden, immediately called for a lockdown. It wasn't so much the fight by itself.

By prison standards, this one was on the tame side, even if the floor of A Unit looked like the soundstage of a slasher movie.

Contrary to what's depicted in the movies and on TV, there isn't a riot or a murder every five seconds behind bars.

A lot of the time, it's posturing with (in prison parlance) the above-mentioned "wolf tickets" — that is, when an inmate, or inmates, talk tough with no intention of backing it up.

And the "sissy shanks" referred to earlier? Another example of inmate-ingenuity.

A disposable razor is heated just to the point where the plastic becomes pliable enough to loosen the sliver of blade encased therein.

The blade, in turn, is wedged into the head of a toothbrush, also heated to make the plastic give.

What had Lindsay, a genial former cop who lettered in three sports at Morgantown High School, really worried was the racial tension that caused this one.

Black inmates vs. Hispanic inmates.

A lot to sort out.

With the injured being bandaged and receiving other medical attention, he turned to the lieutenant in charge of process-

## W. Va. elk herd adds new calves to area

HUNTINGTON — West Virginia's elk project leader says it appears 10 to 15 elk calves were born between late May and mid-June in the state.

Randy Kelley, elk project leader for the Division of Natural Resources, tells a state media outlet the exact number isn't yet known.

DNR officials knew from blood tests that 24 of the cow elk imported this year from Kentucky and Arizona were pregnant. They anticipated at least some of the 12 cows stocked in December 2016 would be pregnant, too. However, stresses of captivity apparently cost some of this year's imports their calves. Two calves born in captivity also died.

If all pregnant cows borne the calves they were carrying, West Virginia's elk herd would grow to more than 100. Kelley's new estimate is in the 90s.

## Wrestling slams in Fairmont for charity

FAIRMONT — When he was a kid, the only time "Ron Mathis" stopped bouncing around was when wrestling was on TV.

He honestly can't recall a time in his life when he didn't want to be one of the wrestlers he saw on TV, recreating the essence and the moves of his heroes from his childhood.

"The way my dad tells me the story is when I was little, can't get a kid to stop bouncing off the wall except for during that hour of wrestling," Mathis said. page at a gas station. These types of things happen. So the reason it's important for people to train is so that you can be able to take care of yourself in any situation."

Mark Nesselroad, of Morgantown, had his first exposure to Krav Maga during the weapons defense demonstration class in the morning.

He had the opportunity to learn about various Krav Maga techniques that can be used against someone that confronts him with a gun or knife.

"It was fun and engaging," Nesselroad said. "It'll probably take a couple classes to get used to it and to get comfortable."

"I want to be able to protect my family, protect other folks, protect myself and feel safer in an awkward

situation."

According to Harris, Krav Maga is an Israeli-based martial arts system that includes real-world training.

It pulls a lot of different techniques from other martial arts styles and combines them into a fast, effective system. For example, Krav Maga uses Muay Thai striking techniques and combines it with Jujutsu groundwork, boxing and wrestling.

Harris says the biggest differences between Krav Maga and other popular martial arts is that it's not rule-based and there are no rituals.

"The motto of Krav Maga is 'So that one may walk the streets in peace,'" Harris said. "That's what we try to get people to do. You come here, you train hard and you go home safe."

She said she was never lucky enough to get one before.

"I thought I was going to cry, I was so excited. I'm still so excited," she said.

## The warden writes a book

Now 53, retired and back in the Morgantown area, Lindsay says these days is also wearing the badge of book author.

The above recounting of the prison fight comes from his book, "Triple Deuces: A Day in the Life of an American Correction Worker," which hit stores and online earlier this summer.

You'll find it at Amazon, Barnes and Noble, and other major outlets.

Other episodes are scary, raunchy and mean. A few are poignant and surprisingly funny. The language often lands on the other side of PG-13.

Lindsay said he wanted to give "an honest accounting" of the people on both sides of the bars just trying to get by.

"I didn't necessarily set out to write a book," the warden-turned-author said. "But at the same time, I was keeping a journal and getting this stuff down."

He definitely set out to go into law enforcement.

## Working the graveyard shift

After Morgantown

High, Lindsay went down the road to Marion County and then-Fairmont State College, where he majored in criminal justice during the day while working the graveyard shift as a State Police dispatcher at night.

He became a town cop in Star City, powering through State Police Academy training along the way.

He was a patrolman and motorcycle cop for the Morgantown Police Department, where he also made detective. He earned a master's degree in counseling and guidance from WVU while carrying his Morgantown PD badge.

Lindsay turned in that badge for academia. He was hired as a tenure-track instructor at Fairmont State, where he taught a full load of criminal justice courses.

The cop also went back to grad school at WVU, earning another master's in safety management.

When visiting officials from the U.S. Department of Justice's Federal Bureau of Prisons spoke to his Fairmont State classes one day, they also hired him away from his alma mater.

What followed was a 25-year career in federal prisons and privately owned correctional facilities, from Brooklyn, N.Y., to

Lompac, Calif., with postings in West Virginia and Pennsylvania, in-between.

As jobs changed and his experience grew, so did his attitudes about incarceration, much like the plastic made pliable in the homemade weapons of that above prison fight.

"I probably started out being a hard-line conservative," he said.

"Back then, I was just calling balls and strikes, and that was it."

## 'Right in their front yard'

As a former police officer and prison warden, Lindsay says he knows there are cases where the punishment has to fit the crime.

There are also cases, he said, where incarceration only adds to America's sociological woes related to impulsive, hurtful behavior and lawless behavior.

"At any given time, there are 1.2 million people locked up in this country," he said.

"And 95 percent of them are going to be released. What are they going to be like when they get out? Are they going to be any less angry or hostile? Are they going to be equipped to get a job?"

The idea, he said, is to keep people from going back to jail once they're

out, which is what one-third of all inmates do.

He's calling for an emphasis on GED and vocational training in the nation's correctional facilities, with heavy doses of counseling and other treatments addressing the decisions that put them in prison coveralls in the first place.

Some facilities in the U.S. do that quite well with inmate rehabilitation, he said. Most, however, he said, don't.

"Say you've got a person with no prior record who gets addicted to opioids and he pulls an armed robbery," Lindsay said.

"Well, then he's behind bars for five, seven, eight years. If we don't try to help those people, then we're just warehousing them before putting them back out on the streets."

It didn't take Lindsay long to see the quiet cooperation with which some people live their lives.

It was his first call as Star City officer.

"My first call, ever," he said. "It was a domestic. I roll up, and there's an individual beating up his wife. Right in their front yard."

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## Suspect in standoff at L.A. supermarket

LOS ANGELES — A man shot his grandmother and girlfriend Saturday and then led police on a car chase that ended when he crashed into a pole and ran inside a busy supermarket as bullets from officers shattered the front doors. He took hostages as scores of firefighters and police converged on the scene.

Officers with riot gear, armed with rifles, stood along the side of the Trader Joe's in the Silver Lake area on Saturday afternoon and used mirrors to try to look inside as hostages periodically came out the front door with the hands raised. At least one person was injured but expected to survive.

Investigators believe the suspect, whose name hasn't been released, had shot his grandmother and girlfriend around 1:30 p.m. in South Los Angeles and then fled in a 2015 Toyota Camry, Sgt. Barry Montgomery, a Los Angeles po-

lice spokesman, said.

Officers spotted the suspect's car near Hollywood and tried to pull him over, but the man refused to stop and led officers on a pursuit, he said. During the chase, the suspect shot "multiple rounds" at officers, though no officers were struck by the gunfire, he said.

At least one officer is believed to have returned fire, Montgomery said.

The suspect eventually crashed his car outside of the Trader Joe's supermarket and then ran into the store. An Associated Press employee who lives in the area reported seeing a car crashed into a utility pole outside the store.

Don Kohles, 91, was walking into the supermarket when he saw a car being chased police crash into a pole just outside. Police fired at the driver, shattering the store's glass doors and Kohles and others inside took cover and laid on the floor as the

suspect ran into the store, he said.

He could hear others around him sobbing as the man ran toward the back of the store and yell at people, but Kohles said he never heard any more gunshots. After about 30 minutes, police came inside and rushed some of the customers out, he said.

People frantically tried to flee from the store and some were seen climbing through windows, jumping down about 8 feet (2.44 meters), and others darted through the back door.

Christian Dunlop, a real estate agent and actor who lives nearby, said he was watching from the corner when he saw four people flee out the front of the store. An employee was dragging an injured woman by the hands out the front door, he said.

One woman who was injured was taken to the hospital in stable condition, according to David Ortiz, a fire department spokesman.

## Buzz Aldrin expected to be no-show at Apollo gala

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla. — Apollo 11 moon-walker Buzz Aldrin is expected to be noticeably absent from a gala kicking off a yearlong celebration of the 50-year anniversary of the first moon landing even though his foundation is a sponsor and he typically is the star attraction.

Organizers haven't heard one way or another if Aldrin is attending Saturday evening's Apollo Celebration Gala at the Kennedy Space Center in Florida, but they expect him to be a no-show.

Aldrin's expected absence comes just a month after he sued two of his adult children and a former business manager, accusing them of misusing his credit cards, transferring money from an account, and slandering him by saying he has dementia.

Just weeks before, his children, Andrew and Jan, had filed a petition claiming their 88-year-old father was suffering from memory loss, delusions, paranoia, and confusion.

Andrew and Jan Aldrin, as well as business manager Christina Korp, are on the foundation's board and were expected to be at Saturday evening's gala.

"We haven't heard one way or another," Jeff Carr, a spokesman for the foundation, said Friday about Buzz Aldrin. "At this point, it's a little too late to include him in the program. He hasn't reached out or let anybody know his plans."

Aldrin's ShareSpace Foundation is one of the sponsors of the annual gala, which raises money for space education and Astronaut Scholarship Foundation scholarships.

The black-tie gala held under a Saturn V rocket at the Kennedy Space Center features a panel discussion by astronauts, an awards ceremony and an auction of space memorabilia. Tickets range from \$750 to \$2,500 per person.

Among those being honored with an award is Virgin Galactic founder Richard Branson. Former Apollo astronauts in the lineup were Walt Cunningham, Harrison Schmitt, Rusty Schweickart, and Tom Stafford.

Aldrin, along with Neil Armstrong and Michael Collins, was part of the Apollo 11 mission that landed the first two humans on the moon on July 20, 1969.

In Aldrin's lawsuit, the former astronaut asked a judge to remove Andrew Aldrin from control of his financial affairs.

expect it to be Tuesday.

Once Blankenship files, Connolly said, the secretary of state will likely deny the candidacy, leading to a lawsuit to settle the question of the recently revised sore loser law, which prohibits a primary election loser from filing with another party to re-run in the general.

Blankenship came in third in the May 8 Republican primary, garnering 19.97 percent of the GOP vote, compared to 29.21 percent for Rep. Evan Jenkins and 34.9 percent for winner Attorney General Patrick Morrisey.

Morrisey will challenge and Blankenship hopes to challenge Democrat Sen. Joe Manchin in November.

The sore loser law comes in state code 3-5-23.

Paragraph (a) of that section says, "Groups of citizens having no party organization may nominate candidates who are not already candidates in the primary election for public office otherwise than by conventions or primary elections."

Many felt that the paragraph is unclear concerning the time between the primary and the general, because it says "are not already candidates."

So the Legislature passed HB 4434 last session. Sponsored by House Judiciary chair John Shott, R-Mercer, and vice-chair Roger Hanshaw, R-Clay, and amended during its passage through both chambers, it adds paragraph (g).

The new paragraph clarifies the confusion by saying: "For the purposes of this section, any person who was a candidate for nomination by a recognized political party as defined in §3-1-8 of this code

may not, after failing to win the nomination of his or her political party, become a candidate for the same political office by virtue of the nomination-certificate process as set forth in this section."

HB 4434 passed on March 7, was signed by the governor March 22 and took effect June 5 — after the May 8 primary.

Connolly said they expect to challenge the law for unconstitutionally depriving Blankenship of ballot access by retroactively applying the new law to the May primary.

The secretary of state will counter that Blankenship couldn't have filed any earlier than Friday, and was in effect before he filed.

"We believe that the law is fairly settled and clear in this regard," he said. "We believe that the law is pretty clear in not only West Virginia but in other states, that the legislature is given the authority and the mandate to regulate the elections process, to prevent chaos."

(Only three states lack some type of sore loser law, according to a study published by professors from the University of Wisconsin and Emory University in Georgia.)

This isn't an antagonistic situation, Connolly said. Blankenship's campaign has been openly talking with the office.

The secretary wants a juridical determination on the constitutionality of the law, he said. "If a judge comes down on his side, then we're going to put him on the ballot. If a judge comes down on our side, then we're not."

Morrisey can't represent the state because he's running for the office in question, so the secretary will be represented by outside counsel. Once Blankenship files suit,

they expect to file a response and a request for an expedited hearing within a week.

The Constitution Party announced Blankenship's nomination for the candidacy in May, and said this at the time: "We look forward to Mr. Blankenship overturning the state's poorly drafted 'sore loser' law and being on the ballot so that the West Virginia people — not the Establishment — are able to choose their Senator."

Asked about a lawsuit, Hudok said on Friday, "I would say that's pretty certain."

When Blankenship ran in May, he said, only Republican voters got a say. "When the Constitution Party runs a candidate, everyone in the state gets to express their feelings."

He said it's unfair to call 3-5-23 a sore loser law. What it does is restricts the democratic process and what the people as a whole would like.

Hudok also objected that only Republicans and Democrats had a hand in shaping a law that affects all the other parties. "We had no say in that."

The general speculation has been that a Blankenship candidacy would serve as a spoiler — draining off votes from Morrisey and assuring Manchin's re-election.

"I don't believe that's why he's running," Hudok said. "I know that's not why we nominated him."

Hudok has run for office twice: U.S. Senate in 2014 and governor in 2016. He's seen how the establishment impedes third parties — denying them spots in debates and on the ballots.

"History has shown if you battle, if you don't give up, you can persevere and be successful."

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## Kingwood PD gets new officers, chief

KINGWOOD — Kingwood's new police officers have backgrounds that give them insight into working in a small town.

Chief Charlie Haney started work in June and Officers Justin Knotts and Cody Kroll joined the force this month.

Kingwood was left without a police department when Chief Todd Nestor and Officer Felix Thorn resigned without explanation in April. They since sued the city and the mayor, saying they were told to resign or be fired because they were investigating "high profile" residents.

Chief Haney has nearly 40 years of law enforcement experience. For 32 years, he was with the Preston County Sheriff's Department, starting as a jailer/dispatcher and retiring after serving as chief deputy.

Then he worked about two years with WVU Police. Since 2008, though, he has been out of law enforcement and, when his former boss Jim Fields called on behalf of the City of Kingwood, wasn't sure he wanted to return to the field.

Fields had been recruited by the city to help rebuild the department.

"I said well, I probably could do it," Haney said. "They need somebody." There's also the fact that, "It's my home."

A lifelong resident of Kingwood, Haney said small town policing isn't as busy as at the county level, but, "it's more hands-on," and "a little more one-on-one."

"I just want to project a good image and be available to the citizens and be responsive to their calls and their issues," Haney said.

His fellow officers echo those thoughts. Knotts, 27, grew up in Kingwood.

"Both my parents worked at the sheriff's department. Growing up, the most influential people in my life were police officers," Knotts said. "I know what they did for me, and I'd like to try and do the same for others."

He started in law enforcement as a federal correctional officer at

USP Hazelton. After six years there, he went to the Morgantown Police Department.

"And now I'm here. Kingwood's home," Knotts said. "I just like solving problems. If it's hard, it's more fun for me."

Kroll, 33, is an Oakland, Md., native. He knew at about 14 he want-

ed to enter law enforcement and joined the Maryland State Police Explorer program. He also became a volunteer firefighter and EMT, and has done that for 16 years.

"I've always just had a passion for public service since I was young," Kroll said.

While getting his degree in criminal justice, he did ride-alongs with various departments. After graduation, he worked nine years as an officer in Allegany County, Md., then a year as a Taylor County Sheriff's deputy.

When the job at Kingwood became available, it was close to home and he liked the family-oriented mind slant of Haney and Fields. The father of two, family is important to him.

"My forte has always been working with kids and warrant service," Kroll said. He likes the thrill of the chase in hunting down someone with an outstanding warrant.

In Kingwood he looks forward to working at the community level again.

ROWLESBURG — Rowlesburg area residents will have another opportunity to comment on their community's plan for the future at a public meeting Wednesday.

## Judges uphold ouster of Richwood mayor

CHARLESTON — Bob Henry Baber, whose removal from office as Richwood's mayor was upheld by a three-judge panel, says history will absolve him.

Baber used his iPhone to email reaction to the judges' decision.

"I don't have internet service at my home — it's been turned off. I'm broke," he wrote to reporters.

"So I have not yet read the court findings in detail. The City Council has broken me, financially. But I am not a broken man. I AM STRONGER THAN what passes for governance in RICHWOOD. I condemn the Council for their shocking waste of energy and money on nothing but a witch hunt."

Judges who ruled on Baber's mayorship did not see it the same way, calling his behavior "the epitome of an improper abuse of one's political position to gain personal favor, advantage, or gain."

The panel concluded he should immediately turn over all papers, records, equipment, property of his office or property belonging to the City of Richwood.

The Richwood council asked Baber to resign last September over undocumented spending on his state-issued purchasing card. He contended the council did not have the right to remove him, which sparked impeachment.

Baber filed a lawsuit in Kanawha Circuit Court against the Richwood council and the state Auditor's office, which was investigating the town's spending.

The lawsuit then moved to Nicholas County, and in May, the case transitioned to an appointed three-judge panel which included Fayette Circuit Judge Paul Blake, Randolph Circuit Judge David Wilmoth

and Judge Robert Richardson, whose judicial district is in Greenbrier and Pocahontas counties.

The judges issued their ruling Friday, upholding the council's removal of Baber. Media first reported the ruling.

It concludes Baber "committed one or more instances constituting maladministration, official misconduct, and/or financial mismanagement."

The misdeeds that really landed Baber in trouble were his willy-nilly use of a state-issued purchasing card and his pursuit of reimbursement for bills on his property and cell phone.

On the purchasing card, Baber had argued that he

hadn't properly read the requirements because he was stressed and busy because of the historic floods that stuck around his election as mayor. He also contended some aspects of the purchasing card requirements were vague.

The panel ruled that Baber's "ignorance argument" was not well taken considering he is a former college professor "of better than average intelligence."

The panel also said he clearly crossed the line with by seeking reimbursement for his private bills. Baber received payments from city funds over three months for electric bills amounting to \$931.82.

The electric bills were for a building with a lower business front with an overhead apartment. The apartment was occupied by Baber's daughter, Cara Perkins, 27, and the lower section was unoccupied business space.

Baber had items that had been donated for flood relief be placed in the lower space. Baber contended that required the use of fans, heaters and dehumidifiers — and the power to keep them running.

One of the bills, however, applied to power used before the flood date.

## 'Great progress' reuniting families separated at border

SAN DIEGO — A federal judge on Friday applauded Trump administration efforts to meet a deadline to reunite more than 2,500 children with their families after they were separated at the border.

Justice Department attorneys said in federal court in San Diego that 450 children 5 and older had been reunified, up from 364 a day earlier.

"I'm just very impressed with the effort that has been made," U.S. District Judge Dana Sabraw said. "It really does appear that great progress has been made."

Hundreds of children are still awaiting reunions with their family.

In a court filing Thursday, the administration said about 1,600 parents were believed to be eligible for reunification and about 900 were not eligible or "not yet known to be eligible."

Nearly 700 of the ineligible parents are being vetted. Another 91 have been found to have a "prohibitive criminal record" or been deemed ineligible by U.S.

Immigration and Customs and Enforcement.

Another 136 waived reunification, according to the Justice Department.

It appeared unlikely that all the children would be reunified by the July 26 deadline. More than 200 parents have been released into the U.S. and parents of an unknown number of children have been deported.

Friday's hearing was the sixth in three weeks and two more are scheduled next week, a sign of how closely the judge is monitoring the process.

His praise for the administration was a sharp turnaround from last week, when he said he was having second thoughts about whether the government was acting in good faith. The government submitted a revised reunification plan two days later that was well received by the judge.

In late June, Sabraw set deadlines of July 10 to reunify dozens of children under 5 with their families and July 26 for reunifications involving 2,551 children 5 and older.

## Intel official said he meant no disrespect to Trump

BRIDGEWATER, N.J. — The top U.S. intelligence official said Saturday he meant no disrespect to President Donald Trump in a televised interview discussing the summit with Russian President Vladimir Putin.

Director of National Intelligence Dan Coats said his Thursday comments at the Aspen Security Forum in Colorado were not intended to be critical of the president's decision to invite Putin to a meeting in Washington later this year.

"Some press coverage has mischaracterized my intentions in responding to breaking news presented to me during a live in-

terview," Coats said. "My admittedly awkward response was in no way meant to be disrespectful or criticize the actions of the president."

Coats has been under scrutiny since he said he wished Trump had not met one-on-one with the Russian leader and expressed dismay that the president had publicly undermined U.S. intelligence agencies.

Coats issued a rare statement rebutting the president's Monday comments during a press conference with Putin doubting the findings of the intelligence community on Russian election interference. White House aides were fearful that the former lawmaker might re-

sign over the president's comments, and the president spoke positively of Coats in a television interview Wednesday. But Coats' display of surprise upon learning that Trump had invited Putin to Washington this fall for a follow-on meeting drew the president's ire.

"Say that again," Coats said, cupping his hand over his ear on live television. He took a deep breath and continued: "OK. That's going to be special."

Coats also revealed in the interview with NBC's Andrea Mitchell that he was unaware of what transpired in the private meeting between Trump and Putin in Helsinki, and re-

stated without equivocation his belief that Russia continues to pose a threat to the American electoral system.

"Basically, they are the ones that are trying to undermine our basic values and divide with our allies," Coats said of Russia. "They are the ones who are trying to wreak havoc over our election process."

Coats, who oversees the nation's 17 intelligence agencies, also said that if he had been asked, he would have advised Trump against meeting Putin alone, with just interpreters.

"That's not my role. That's not my job. It is what it is," Coats said.

"I look at this as giving back," Davis said. "I'm the next generation giving back, seeing how it's changed and learning the new. I really enjoy it."

Ryan Cool is another former 4-Her who now volunteers at camp. A Preston High science teacher by profession, he has taught air rifle and pistol safety and use for about seven years. The lessons include schooling on self discipline.

"The biggest thing I learned is to be a little bit better of a person," Cool said of his time in 4-H.

Parents also volunteer

at camp. Dave Cerbone grew up in southern California and was never involved in 4-H. In West Virginia, his son has been involved since third grade, and Cerbone taught photography last week at camp.

His son, "has learned how to be a leader," through 4-H, Cerbone said. "He just loves being in 4-H. He loves his projects."

All 4-H members must complete projects during the year. These can range from raising farm animals to learning about rockets.

"I think 4-H is a real nice organization. It's very community oriented. It's very skill oriented," Cerbone said. "I like that 4-H is not set up to be competitive."

Instead, he said, 4-Hers are in a cooperative environment where they help one another, teach one another and become friends.

Younger campers rotated through eight workshops: STEM, crafts, geocaching, swimming lessons, songs and traditions, photography, shooting sports and recreation/team building.

## Cuba approves new leader's Cabinet with old faces present

HAVANA — Cuban lawmakers on Saturday approved the Cabinet named by new President Miguel Diaz-Canel, keeping most of the ministers from Raul Castro's government in place, except for in the key post of economic reform.

At the same time, the national assembly received a proposed reform of Cuba's 1976 constitution that would reshape its government, courts and economy, and pave the way for same-sex marriage, although it would maintain the Communist Party as the sole political force in the country. The charter will be put to a national referendum in the coming months then return to the assembly.

Among the ministers kept in place in Diaz-Canel's Council of Ministers were three historic vice presidents: revolutionary commanders Ramiro Valdes, Ricardo Cabrisas and Gen. Ulises Rosales del Toro. Foreign Minister Bruno Rodriguez, Foreign Trade Minister Rodrigo Malmierca and Finance Minister Lina Peraza will also remain in their posts.

The main change was the absence of economic reforms minister Marino Murillo who had accompanied Raul Castro for a decade while he implemented modest openings to private enterprise in the socialist economy.

Diaz-Canel replaced Castro in April in a historic changing of the guard in Cu-

ba, but Saturday's Cabinet suggests continuity rather than immediate change.

Cuban officials have proposed a reform of the constitution, saying the current one does not reflect changes made in the country in the decades since 1976.

The new charter would create the position of prime minister alongside the president, splitting the roles of head of government and head of state.

It would enshrine new recognitions of the free market and private property in Cuban society, though the communist state would remain the dominant economic force. It also creates a new presumption of innocence in the justice system and makes explicit the principal of not discriminating based on gender identity.

"We are before a total reform within the framework established by the principles of socialism," said Homero Acosta, the secretary of the Council of State in charge of presenting the reforms.

The current constitution was adopted at a time when Cuba was a potential Cold War flashpoint and a pillar of the Soviet Bloc. The document proclaims Cuba's adherence to Marxist-Leninist socialism.

Experts say the on-and-off economic reforms promoted by Raul Castro, which have sought to allow the limited introduction of private enterprise within the communist system, have been carried out in spite of the constitution.

sults at the state and federal levels.

They took on the challenge after Rowlesburg failed to obtain a grant to have a plan prepared. And having a plan is important for the town when it applies for grants in the future, Weaver said.

The 30-day comment period ends Aug. 9. Comments made will be included with the report, along with any corrections.

The final report will be presented to town council Aug. 27. Council will be asked to adopt the plan then.

"Increasingly granting agencies, particularly the federal agencies like the Appalachian Regional Commission, they will not consider a proposal for implementing action or a project unless a community submitting the grant has a master plan," Weaver said.

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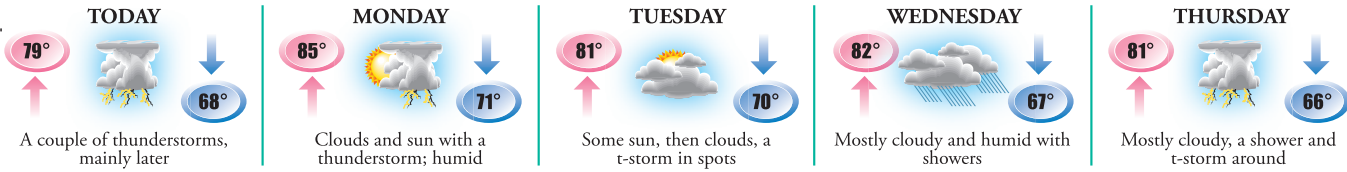
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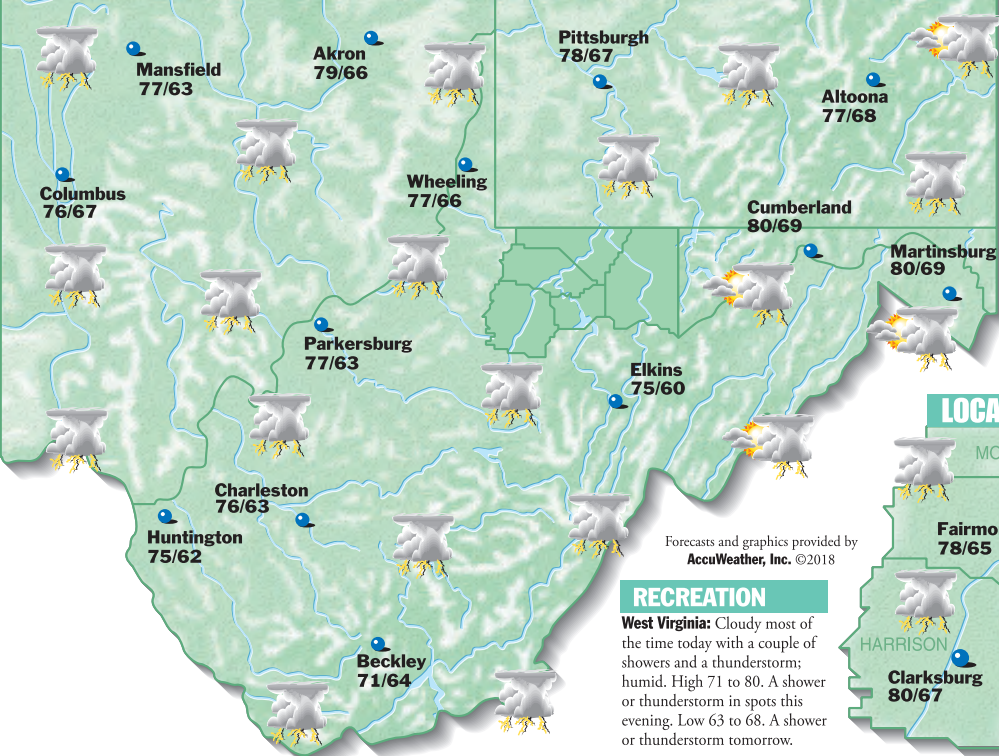

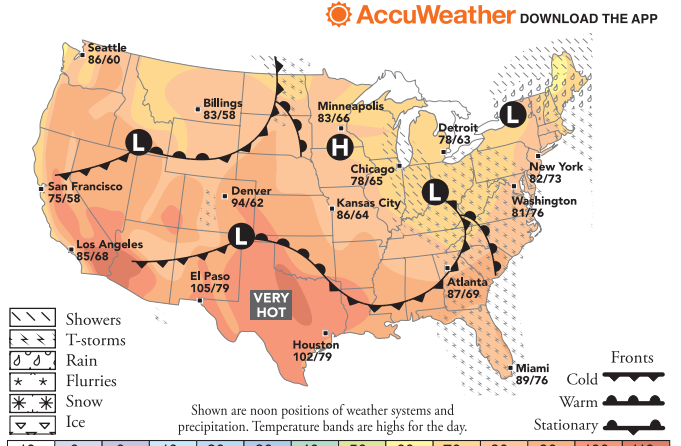

On a British Open leaderboard full of big names, there was only one star. And that could lead to a lot of disappointed golf fans in the final round when it really matters.

For Woods, Saturdays have been the easiest part of his latest comeback. The real test comes today, when he'll have to find a way to come from behind and actually win the Open — something he didn't do even in his prime.

He's four shots back of Spieth and two others after a sparkling 5-under 66. It's the closest he's been to the lead in a major championship since he was two back at Muirfield in 2013.

But there are five players between him and the outright lead — and what amounts to two threesomes tied with him.

At age 42, finding a way to win is going to be a tall task.

"It would be, as you said, better on Sunday," Woods said in response to a question afterward. "But I'm right there. I've got a chance at this, which is great."

Woods isn't the only one who thinks so. The possibility of him vying for the lead today is as tantalizing for at least one of his competitors as it is for golf fans.

"I've always wanted to battle it out in a major with Tiger," Spieth said. "Who hasn't? It's kind of a dream come true just to have the opportunity."

Spieth believes there will be a much different golf course in front of players today than there was in the third round, when the greens were holding, the wind was non-existent and the temperature was as warm as it gets this time of the year in Scotland.

That will make it more difficult on the opening stretch of holes for everyone in the later groups, including Spieth, who hit a driver onto the first green and made eagle on his way to a 65 that tied him with Kisner and **Xander Schauffele**.

It could also lead to early players leapfrogging over the group of players — and there are seven in all — tied with Woods for sixth place and making it even more difficult to move up the leaderboard.

"That's certainly doable with hopefully the weather that comes in tomorrow," Woods said of his chances. "If it doesn't come in and we get conditions like this, then we know we're going to have to shoot between 6-, 7-, 8-under par tomorrow to have a chance."

Woods surely hasn't forgotten how to win, but he hasn't been able to will himself to a win as he might have in the past. And the fact remains it's been 10 years since he last won a major championship, no matter how much he still excites a crowd.

Still, on Saturday he did his best imitation yet of Tiger Woods in his prime.

Best yet, he's feeling a bit like the Tiger of old.

"It's been a few years since I've felt like this," Woods said.

He's got to make a statement.

## Trust *in* Cajuste

Thanks to a nagging mentor, **Yodny Cajuste** finally tried football as a senior. Good thing for WVU that he did.

His future rested with basketball, Yodny Cajuste was certain of it.

And no matter how many times the football coach at Miramar High approached him in the hallways — insisting to Cajuste that, "You're a future offensive tackle" — the 6-foot-5 kid wasn't willing to trade sneakers for cleats.

Then Damon Cogdell made one final push.

"I told Yodny this was the last time, that I wasn't going to ask him anymore," Cogdell said.

Their conversation during the spring of 2013 hinged on a dare.

"He kept nagging me, probably like nine or 10 times," Cajuste said. "Then he made me a bet: If I go out for spring football and get one offer, I'd have to stay and play football. If I didn't get an offer, I could go back to basketball."

This is where Cajuste flashes a smile wider than Broward County and adds, "I ended up getting five."

WVU is glad Cogdell proved so persuasive. It's preseason all-Big 12 left tackle is about to enter his fourth year as a starter.

### Fast learner

Thinking back five years, to that first day of spring practice, in fact, a Kentucky assistant kept sizing up Cajuste, who wondered, "Why is he looking at me when I've never played football before?" The coach knew a big-framed project when he saw one, telling Cajuste the Wildcats would offer him if he was serious about sticking with football.

Genetics aside, how would Cajuste adjust to the physicality and footwork required of linemen, particularly against the elite talent produced in south Florida?

"I'm a fast learner," he said. "And the guys on our team at Miramar, you just wanted to go out and play hard for them. You couldn't be a slouch out there."

"I had the mind set that I'm not going to let anybody embarrass me."

Cogdell didn't have to coach softness out of Cajuste, who played with natural aggression. Even the technical side came relatively quickly.

"Yodny was raw, but it was easy to correct his mistakes," Cogdell said. "It's like teaching a baby, because he hadn't developed any flaws yet."

Cajuste became a two-way player on the lines, helping Miramar start 12-0 and obtain a top-20 national ranking. When an upset loss in the Class 8A state quarterfinals spoiled the playoff run, Cajuste opted to give up basketball, where he had been contacted by Old Dominion and other mid-majors.

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# Spieth, Kisner, Schauffele all even at British Open

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland — Jordan Spieth has a share of the lead in the British Open and a big edge in experience. Still only 24, he already has won three majors and his name is the last one etched on the base of the silver claret jug.

One name in the mix makes it all feel so new.

"I've always wanted to battle it out in a major with Tiger. Who hasn't?" Spieth said after seizing upon a calm Carnoustie for a 6-under 65 to tie for the lead with Kevin Kisner and Xander Schauffele. "It's kind of a dream come true just to have the opportunity."

Woods feels the same way.

Never in the mix at the Masters, gone by the weekend at the U.S. Open, the 14-time major champion surged into contention Saturday with a 66, his lowest

round on weekend at a major in eight years. He didn't have the best score. He was four shots behind.

But he's Tiger Woods, and it felt like that again to thousands of fans who crammed along the fairways and behind the greens as Woods ran off three straight birdies around the turn and then two-putted for birdie on the par-5 14th to work his way into a tie for the lead, even if that lasted for only 20 minutes.

"I've shown that I've been there close enough with a chance to win this year," Woods said. "Given what happened the last few years, I didn't know if that would ever happen again. But here I am with a chance coming Sunday in a major championship. It's going to be fun."

It was every bit of that Saturday, a rare day when Carnoustie had little defense.

Justin Rose, who made

the cut on the number with a birdie on his final hole, matched the Carnoustie record for the Open with a 64. Spieth set the tone in the afternoon when he decided on the way to the first tee to hit driver on the 396-yard hole. He sent it bouncing and rolling along the firm turf, down a hill and onto the green to about 10 feet away for an eagle.

Moments later, Woods began his charge to get into contention at a major for the first time in five years.

It never stopped. Seven players had a share of the lead at one point. Kisner, who started the third round tied for the lead, was never far away but had to work hard to stay there. He made a tough par save on the 17th, and then got up-and-down from behind the 18th green for a 68.

Schauffele, the PGA Tour rookie of the year last season, holed a 30-foot putt from behind the 18th green

for a 67.

They were at 9-under 204. "We've got pretty much a new tournament tomorrow," Spieth said.

A dozen players were separated by four shots, which is nothing considering that the last two British Open champions at Carnoustie rallied from 10 shots (Paul Lawrie) and six shots (Padraig Harrington) on the final day.

## Barbasol Championship

NICHOLASVILLE, Ky. — Brittany Lincicome missed the cut, shooting a 1-under 71 and failing in her bid to become the first female golfer since 1945 to make the cut at a PGA Tour stop.

She faced a huge hurdle: An opening 78 left her near the bottom of the field.

# Stars push for 'new' to improve state of racing

LOUDON, N.H. — NASCAR has been reluctant to make more than modest tweaks to its schedule. That hasn't stopped its drivers this summer from wondering about possibilities in hopes of luring more fans:

A Cup race on Eldora dirt. More races at short tracks. No more two races at the same track. Try Iowa; go back to Rockingham.

The idea of blowing up a schedule that largely remained unchanged for most of the last decade is hardly a novel idea, and drivers long lobbied NASCAR to try something new and mix things up over the staid summer months.

Denny Hamlin, a 31-time Cup winner, mulled over a few potential schedule shake-ups until he splashed cold water on the campaigning: "None of this is ever going to happen. Not until these tracks and NASCAR get together and are willing to make changes."

That seems unlikely in the immediate future for a variety of reasons — from sanctioning agreements with tracks that run through 2020 to safety upgrades and even the threat of litigation should a track lose a race.

The sport resisted even fan-friendly schedule changes, like running weeknight races or rotating the site of all-star weekend.

"It's going to have to take someone way high up saying, 'We're making changes and this is what we're going to do,' for it to happen," Hamlin said. "But it definitely won't happen in the next few years until that contract's over with."

One of the few fun additions over the last decade came when NASCAR added a Truck Series race on the half-mile Eldora Speedway dirt track in Ohio. The series made its annual stop on the dirt last week for the only time this season. Retired NASCAR champion Tony Stewart owns the track and used his forum to push for the sport to at least bring the second-tier Xfinity Series to the dirt.

Like most issues facing NASCAR, few agree on any topic. Kyle Larson, a noted sprint car racer, said NASCAR should stay above the muck.

"I wouldn't like to see Cup on dirt," he said. "Cup belongs on pavement and real road course tracks. If we went to Eldora, yeah, I mean I would be excited because I would be really fast and I feel like I would definitely have the best shot to win. But at the same time, I think we are fine not going there."

The race winner at Eldora is awarded a Golden Shovel, which seems fitting because these days every-one is piling on NASCAR.

How low can they go? The ratings reports could win a limbo contest with the regular bottoming out of all-time lows or decade-worst for most races. Kentucky had 2.3 million viewers on NBC Sports Network, and Sportsmediawatch.com reported it was the 15th of 17 Cup races this season that had its ratings decline double-digits to

multiyear lows.

It's no longer jarring to see empty swaths of grandstands at the track, and long-time corporate giants such as Lowe's and 5-hour Energy that helped fund championship drivers are set to sever ties with NASCAR at the end of the season.

Kentucky was NASCAR's shiny new toy when the Cup series moved there, in 2011. The first race was a sellout, though it was marred by traffic jams that turned thousands away from the track. Last week, plenty of good seats were still available for a ho-hum race. The luster had worn off just as it has at Indianapolis Motor Speedway — which had its date moved this season from July to early September and the final "regular season" race.

The competition has been reduced to three dominant drivers: Martin Truex Jr., Kevin Harvick and Kyle Busch combined to win 14 of 19 races. Clint Bowyer is the only other driver to win a non-restrictor plate race this season.

No surprise, Truex, Harvick and Busch went 1-2-3 on the leaderboard in the final Cup practice Saturday, at New Hampshire Motor Speedway.

The real fun in NASCAR comes in 280-character bursts on social media instead of 200 mph speeds on an oval.

Dale Earnhardt Jr., the 15-time most popular driver-turned NBC analyst, posed this question to consider, and it had nothing to do with who can beat the Big Three at New Hampshire:

"Can a driver wear his own throwback gear? I always get weird wearing stuff with my own image or name on it. But it gets murky when it's a 20 year old throwback. Opinions please?" he tweeted.

More than 1,500 replies later — including a few from active NASCAR drivers — Earnhardt still wasn't sure if he should throw on his own throwback.

With little buzz at the track, the tremor on a mobile device of a tweet notification from a driver might be the best part of a race weekend for fans.

Tracks are trying anything to replicate that instant gratification. New Hampshire — which lost its fall race to Las Vegas — launched a "College Corner" this weekend "where the racing is loud and the party is lit!"

Cool. But don't expect those 20-somethings to easily vote in any Twitter fashion polls — the track doesn't have WiFi.

It's up to NASCAR to repair its lost connection with a fading fan base.

# Chatwood, Cubs deck Cards

CHICAGO — Tyler Chatwood pitched into the sixth inning and made a key defensive play in his first win in two months, helping the Chicago Cubs beat the St. Louis Cardinals, 7-2, on Saturday, in the opener of a day-night doubleheader.

Chatwood (4-5) issued six walks and hit a batter, continuing a season-long problem with control issues. But the right-hander allowed just one hit in 5 1/3 innings — Matt Carpenter's fourth homer in the last two days.

Ben Zobrist went 4 for 4 and scored twice as NL Central-leading Chicago bounced back nicely from an 18-5 loss to St. Louis on Friday. Javier Baez had three hits and two RBIs, and Tommy La Stella also drove in two runs in the makeup of an April 16 rainout.

The Cardinals pulled a run behind on Yadier Molina's sacrifice fly in the seventh, but the Cubs responded with four runs in the bottom half.

Baez drove in Jason Heyward with a bloop double, Victor Caratini had a sacrifice fly and La Stella capped the scoring with a two-out, two-run single.

## Yankees 7, Mets 6

NEW YORK — Sonny Gray (7-7) won consecutive starts for the first time since the Yankees acquired him last summer, holding down a depleted Mets lineup again missing Yoenis Cespedes in a Subway Series victory.

Aaron Judge homered for the Yankees, who survived a wild ninth-inning in which closer Aroldis Chapman forced in two runs and failed to get an out. Chasen Shreve relieved with the bases loaded and a two-run lead, induced Devin Mesoraco's run-scoring, double-play grounder and retired Wilmer Flores on a slow roller in front of the mound for his second big league save, his first since August 2016.

The Yankees trailed after Michael Conforto's second-inning home run but rallied against Steven Matz with a four-run fourth that included Didi Gregorius' tying triple, run-scoring doubles by Miguel Andujar and Greg Bird, and Austin Romine's RBI single.

Mets center fielder Matt den Dekker had trouble with three balls that went for hits that inning and struck out three times, leaving him hitless in 17 at-bats this season.

A day after saying he

may need surgery on both heels that would require an eight-to-10-month recovery, Cespedes was out again, and the Mets' front office did not publicly comment on his health revelation.

## Blue Jays 4, Orioles 1

TORONTO — Marcus Stroman (3-7) pitched seven sharp innings, Aledmys Diaz had two hits and Toronto beat Baltimore 4-1 on Saturday for its sixth straight win over the Orioles.

Baltimore right-hander Alex Cobb picked up his major league-worst 13th loss as the Orioles dropped to 1-8 against Toronto this season.

Stroman allowed one run and five hits. He threw a season-high 107 pitches, the first time this season he has topped 100.

Stroman is 3-2 with a 3.03 ERA in five starts since returning from a shoulder injury that caused him to miss more than a month.

## Tigers 5, Red Sox 0

DETROIT — Jose Iglesias homered and drove in four runs, and Mike Fiers (7-6) pitched impressively into the seventh inning to lead Detroit over Boston.

The major league-leading Red Sox lost for just the second time in 15 games, and their AL East lead over the New York Yankees slipped to 4 1/2 games.

Fiers worked his first scoreless outing since his Tigers debut April 8, when he beat the Chicago White Sox, 1-0, for Detroit's only other shutout this season.

Brian Johnson (1-3) gave up two unearned runs and five hits in five innings for Boston. He struck out five.

Fiers threw only two balls through the first two innings, and he allowed three runs or fewer for the ninth time in his last 10 starts. He struck out Xander Bogaerts for the third out of the fifth with runners on first and third.

## Marlins 3, Rays 2

ST. PETERSBURG, Fla. — Rookie Pablo Lopez (2-1) gave up three hits in six innings, Cameron Maybin homered and Miami beat Tampa Bay.

Lopez struck out six in his fourth major league start, helping the Marlins match their longest winning streak of the season at four games.

Maybin's third home run came in the seventh, off Rays reliever Hunter Wood.

Martin Prado drove in the game's first run, with a double in the fourth, off Ryan Yarbrough (8-5), and scored on Miguel Rojas' ground ball.

Joey Wendle led off the Tampa Bay fourth with a home run, his fifth, after Lopez pitched three perfect innings.

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# Stewart aims to help others by sharing her story

The last nine months have been a whirlwind for Breanna Stewart. In that time, she shared her story of sexual assault in an article for The Players Tribune, discussed her assault in an "E:60" episode and posed for ESPN's Body Issue.

It has been a time of vulnerability, opening herself up for the world to see the most intimate parts of her life. In that vulnerability, Stewart has shown incredible strength. For years, she rarely discussed her assault, even with her family, but in the last nine months she's been able to find the strength to talk openly about what she experienced. It's a triumph for Stewart — something she sees as a sign of maturity and growth, something she sees as a way to move forward and help others.

"I've definitely grown and matured just because even being able to talk about it, I didn't really talk about it with my family as much," Stewart said. "Obviously, everybody knew what had gone on, but it wasn't something that I liked to talk about, so to now be able to be here and talking about it and to have that 'E:60,' I'm just really doing it for other people instead of myself."

The UConn alumna and WNBA all-star shared her story of sexual assault last October, after the #MeToo movement began. Stewart was in China at the time and decided it was the right time to tell her story. In her story for The Players Tribune, Stewart revealed she was assaulted by the husband of a relative for two years as a child. He was arrested after Stewart told her parents what had happened.

After years of keeping her experience to herself, Stewart was anxious the day the article was pub-

lished. Her worry was soon washed away as support began pouring in, assuring her that she had chosen the right time to share something so personal and painful with the world.

Months later, Stewart is still seeing the effect her openness has had. She's become known not only as a basketball star, but as a survivor. She has been approached by people who say her story saved their lives and made them feel like they weren't so alone anymore. These encounters can be sobering.

"This is my life, and obviously I'm trying to be the best I can be on the basketball court, but also how can I let my life experiences help other people who are going through other experiences and kids that right now are in the same position that I am? It's unfortunate, but it does still happen," Stewart said.

Stewart knew that sharing her story could aid those in need of encouragement to speak up or feel like they had someone to relate to, and when she decided to pose for the Body Issue her

thoughts were in a similar place. She was making a statement, taking ownership of how her body is viewed and showing pride in the endless work she puts in as an athlete to make her body what it is.

"It's a message that, yeah, I have gone through a form of abuse, but I'm not afraid of my body or how I am," Stewart said. "I'm comfortable in my own skin through everything that's happened."

Stewart is proud of her body and what it can do on the court. Teammate and fellow UConn alumna Sue Bird believes the maturity Stewart has gained from sharing her story has translated into every aspect of her life. There's something different about Stewart this season, Bird said.

"It's amazing," Bird said. "I think there's this connection between what she's opened up about, things that have happened to her in her childhood, and then the maturity she's shown, it's one and the same. ... But if I was just to talk about the on-court part, there was just something different about her this year. She came in a little more confident, a little more mature and way more motivated. When you're in the early parts of your career, you're just like, 'I'm here, I'm playing, yeah, I'm pretty good.' But then there comes a moment where you can see in a player where it switches

and they're actually trying. ... That switch, you can see it got flipped, just in conversations and in her actions. Even when we were around each other in April, heading into training camp, you could see something was different. She was taking it more seriously."

Stewart is having a tremendous season, scoring in double digits in all but one game and recording five or more rebounds on an almost constant basis. It was recently announced that she'll play in her second WNBA all-star game.

On Wednesday, Stewart was on her way to Connecticut in preparation for Friday night's game against the Sun and was unable to watch the "ESPY Award Show" live. She's since watched clips, seeing hundreds of survivors of sexual assault take the stage and stand together in the same spot she stood just two years ago, accepting the award for Best Female Athlete. The moment was one of pride for Stewart.

"(It was great) seeing how USA Gymnastics really came together in spite of Larry Nassar, and just really representing women as a whole and people who have gone through that form of abuse," Stewart said. "(They) used their strength to come together and make it a subject that people aren't afraid to talk about and something that a lot of people need to hear."

Blue to finish third.

Platt said a lacrosse tournament was one of the first projects he began work on after taking the position at Mylan Park, in April.

"One of the first calls I made was to Thomas Moore — he's a big lacrosse guy both in Morgantown and internationally. We got to talking and a tournament came to mind," he said. "I'm a big baseball guy, and tournaments are a big thing in baseball. So I had the tournament experience and he had the lacrosse experience, and we got together and said let's do it. It all came together in about six weeks — really, about May is when we got everything started."

Moore, a long-time coach

at MHS and for the WVU women's club, serves as the executive director for New Jersey-based Soft Lacrosse, an organization he describes as dedicated to "fighting childhood poverty, hunger and obesity, all using lacrosse as a vehicle."

"One of the background reasons of soft lacrosse is growing participation in the sport as early as pre-K and kindergarten. You have flag football and tee-ball for other sports — we want to grow that early development for our sport as well," Moore said. "It's beneficial to the development of these young athletes, and getting them involved with the sports."

Moore brought Soft Lacrosse to the mountains of West Virginia, and hopes to work with Platt to establish it at Mylan Park —

along with other lacrosse-centric events.

"Mylan Park has recently come to the forefront in the area with their facil-

ities and support, so we hope to hold everything out there with soft lacrosse up through fifth grade, and do camps, clinics, leagues and

the like," Moore said. "Mylan Park is really trying to support lacrosse in north-central West Virginia."

Platt described the focus on lacrosse at Mylan Park as an investment for Morgantown. Moore — who spent time as a coach with the Turkish national team during the 2014 World Lacrosse Championships — shared a similar sentiment.

"Growing up here, there wasn't much lacrosse. I didn't get many opportunities with the sport until later in life. Now, it's taken me all over the world," he said. "With lacrosse growing across this country — the rate it is growing is absolutely amazing — we want West Virginia to be at the forefront of that. These kids deserve that opportunity as well. The only way to do that is to get better at a

younger age."

Mylan Park has established itself as the de facto center of baseball in Monongalia County — hosting both MHS and UHS baseball and softball as well as Morgantown Post 2 Legion baseball in the summers.

Platt hopes he can do the same with lacrosse.

"Really, we have some big aspirations. One of the big phrases Thomas and I started bouncing around is that Mylan Park could be the home of lacrosse in Morgantown," he said. "We would like to play high school games there, we would like to have a league. We'll be hosting more clinics, and we'd like to do an all-girls clinic. We'd like to bring in a pro lacrosse player. Really, the sky is the limit for us."

and where it could take him," Cogdell said.

It also hammered home the realization that 6-foot-5 power forwards weren't sought-after by schools.

"Not unless you're like Kobe," Cajuste said, "and I wasn't like Kobe."

### Snowy Morgantown

Will Muschamp and Florida hosted Cajuste in mid-January 2014 and might have landed him on the spot if not for Cogdell coaxing a follow-up visit to his alma mater, WVU.

Cogdell was joining Dana Holgorsen's staff — for what became a two-year stay — and numerous Miramar players had become Mountaineers.

But Cajuste had grown up a Miami fan and was only mildly aware of the West Virginia connections. Upon taking the lineman to Morgantown a week later, Cogdell was petrified to see the campus blanketed by a snowstorm.

"I thought, 'Oh no, not snow!' But Yodny didn't look at that," he said. Instead he bonded with offensive line coach Ron Crook and believed WVU could develop him.

Having grown from 215 pounds to 240 as a high school senior, Cajuste reached 280 during fall semester of his redshirt year. "I was eating every hour," he said.

And he was starting at left tackle the next season.

### Blitz and battered

WVU outscored its first three opponents, 130-23, during 2015, leading up to the Week 4 conference opener, against Oklahoma. Cajuste hoped he was prepared to face linebacker Eric Striker, but it didn't pan out.

"I had heard Norman is going to be crazy, and Striker is the top D-lineman in the conference," Cajuste said. "But I'm not going to lie, when I went up against him this guy was fast off the edge. When the ball snapped, wheeeew, he was off the line."

The ensuing week's match-up against Oklahoma State's Emmanuel Ogbah also provided painful moments. By the time WVU lost its third straight game the next week, at Baylor, Cajuste was hobbled by an injury that sidelined him for six of the final seven games.

Cajuste's sophomore year vanished within an hour of kicking off thanks to an ACL injury in the first quarter of the 2016 opener, against Missouri.

By season's end, he was coping with staff changes that led to the departures of Crook and Cogdell They wound up at Cincinnati and USF, respectively.

"Yodny liked Crook a lot, but Dana promised me he'd take care of Yodny — and he has," Cogdell said. "West Virginia was a great decision for him, and I think he'll have a great senior year as part of a great offense."

While considering early entry into the NFL draft, Cajuste graduated last December. Now he's the blind-side protector for Heisman candidate Will Grier and a big reason WVU is picked to challenge Oklahoma for

the Big 12 crown.

"So much is expected," Cajuste said, "we can't just go tank."

Whatever trajectory the season takes, he'll frequently be texting about it with his mentor Cogdell, grateful for the relationship that began between classes at Miramar.

"I tell the man thank you so much — thank you, thank you," Cajuste said. "Without him, I wouldn't be here. That man he gets all my respect."

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# DNR snagging geese by the gaggle to band them

## IT'S THE ODDEST LOOKING

roundup you'll ever see, but a team from the West Virginia Division of Natural Resources (DNR) has been busy herding Canada geese in various parts of the state this summer.

"Mid-June to mid-July, believe it or not, Canada geese are flightless," said biologist Mike Peters, who is Migratory Bird and Small Game Project Leader for the DNR. "They molt their primary flight

feathers and it lends them to be pretty vulnerable to predators and to us."

The DNR takes advantage of the vulnerability and traps the birds, placing a leg band on each and then releasing them a short time later.

"We put uniquely numbered leg bands on each

bird," Peters said. "It helps us to determine the harvest rates of geese in West Virginia."

Since harvest information is the goal, Peters added they don't always take the easiest birds to band.

"If we band birds in a city park, it really doesn't give us any information if they're never harvested or never leave," he said.

"We'll go to larger bodies of water, since that's where geese take their goslings to raise them. We'll target places like the Ohio River

or Stonewall Jackson Lake or some of the bigger bodies of water."

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, which oversees protection and regulation of migratory game birds, requires states to place a certain number of leg bands every year. That requirement also extends to doves, which is a much bigger challenge for the banding teams.

"They're not flightless," he said with a laugh. "We use ground traps to trap doves during this time of

the year. We bait them with millet and sunflower seeds and we catch them that way."

Doves are also a migratory bird, and the bands help to monitor the harvest of those birds as well. Often, bands will wind up being returned from other states on the doves.

Hunters who kill a dove, goose or some other bird with a band are asked to report the information contained in the band to the Fish and Wildlife Service. The reports were

once made via telephone, but technology has advanced past the toll-free number days. Today, hunters can report their harvest online at reportband.gov.

The Canada goose and dove hunting seasons are due to open around Labor Day weekend in West Virginia.

# Few good options for owners on player protests

The controversy over NFL players protesting during the national anthem isn't going away, despite — or perhaps because of — team owners' efforts to stop players from using the forum to speak out on political causes.

The league's attempt to turn responsibility for disciplining protesters over to individual teams backfired Thursday when the Miami Dolphins tried to categorize raising a fist or kneeling during the anthem as "conduct detrimental to the club." That gave them the right to punish a player with a fine or up to a four-game suspension — one game more than Buccaneers quarterback Jameis Winston got when he was accused of groping an Uber driver.

Hours after The Associated Press reported on Miami's rules, the NFL and the players union issued a joint statement saying they were putting any anthem conduct policy on hold to see if they could come up with a compromise. But the owners aren't left with many good ways to defuse the controversy — especially with President Donald Trump fanning the flames by subtweeting Commissioner Roger Goodell on Friday: "The \$40,000,000 Commissioner must now make a stand."

Here's a look at some of the options:

### Leave it to the teams

**The Plan:** The league's solution, which the NFL Players Association challenged, was to allow each team to determine whether to punish its own players for protesting during the anthem. The policy adopted in May subjected clubs to fines and required players to stand if they are on the field during "The Star-Spangled Banner," though players could choose to stay in the locker room.

This would have given hard-line owners in conservative regions a chance to clamp down while allowing teams in more liberal areas to let their players speak more freely. (Trump called for a season-long suspension for a second violation, a penalty that would violate the collective bargaining agreement.)

But the league quickly backed off after the Dolphins' rules leaked.

**The Winners:** None.

**LAST YEAR:** Steelers won second straight AFC North title and third in four years as "Killer B's" trio of QB Ben Roethlisberger, WR Antonio Brown and RB Le'Veon Bell received plenty of help from rookie WR Juju Smith-Schuster and defense that gave up big plays but also led NFL with 57 sacks. And they couldn't find way to beat Jacksonville, which

Fichtner doesn't expect to give offense massive overhaul, though he will be forced to experiment during camp at running back with Bell unlikely to show while he waits to sign one-year franchise tender. One year after finding potential star in Smith-Schuster, Steelers hope they've done it again with Washington after record-setting career at Oklahoma State. Race to fill injured inside linebacker Ryan Shazier's spot is wide open, with Bostic and Tyler Matakevich getting first crack at lining up next to Vince Williams. Secondary is also being overhauled

with Mitchell, Golden and Gay gone.

**EXPECTATIONS:** Steelers once again expected to be class of AFC North. easing up on his criticism. And it would cost them the connection to the flag and country they worked hard to cultivate.

### Compromise

**The Plan:** Other sports worked with their players so that they didn't have to protest to be heard.

Maybe the owners make a donation to the players' pet projects, play a video on the scoreboard, or otherwise give them a forum for their concerns.

**The Winners:** Players. It's not about the protest, it's about the cause.

**The Losers:** NFL owners. Even if they could stomach the loss of control, the political intrusion on the sport is bound to alienate some fans.

### Stop playing the anthem before the games

**The Plan:** Join almost every other country in the world and skip the forced display of patriotism that demands players stand at attention while fans check their phones, finish their hot dogs or visit the bathroom. If teams want to honor the military or local first-responders, let them do so — free from marketing deals.

**The Winners:** Fans who don't consider the anthem an integral part of the sports experience, giving them another 90 seconds to spend in game-day traffic without missing anything.

**The Losers:** NFL owners. Concessionaires. And a whole generation of "American Idol" also-rans.

With players punished in some cities and protesting freely in others, there would always be plenty to complain about for those inclined to do so. And everyone seems inclined to do so these days.

**The Losers:** NFL owners. Any punishment would be destined to divide the locker room and the fandom; should a team actually suspend a significant contributor, it would only be hurting itself. And the guarantee of unequal treatment between and within teams would surely keep

the issue in the news for yet another season.

### Go back to the old way

**The Plan:** Ask players to stand at attention during the national anthem, and hope they do.

**The Winners:** Players, who would retain the ability to call attention to causes they believe in, namely racial inequality and police brutality. And Trump, who gets applause any time he attacks the protesting players as he stumps for Republicans in the November midterm elections.

**The Losers:** NFL owners, or at least those like Houston's Bob McNair who have chafed at the notion of the "inmates running the prison." They would lose control and remain a subject of Trump's ridicule.

### Keep players in the locker room during the anthem

**The Plan:** Players can't protest during the anthem if they aren't on the field during the anthem. Or so the theory goes. But the demonstrations were never about the anthem itself. They

started as a way for 49ers quarterback Colin Kaepernick to protest racial inequality and expanded into a leaguewide us-vs.-them after Trump hollered at one rally: "Get that son of a bitch off the field."

**The Winners:** Fans who were triggered by the sight of players kneeling during the song. And players, who could surely find another forum for their protests.

**The Losers:** NFL owners. The president has already said this isn't patriotic enough for him, so there's little hope of him

# With Thomas and Froome 1-2, Sky controls the Tour

MENDE, France — With Geraint Thomas and Chris Froome sitting 1-2 in the overall standings, Team Sky has complete control over the Tour de France.

The two British riders took advantage of their powers in the hilly 14th stage in the Massif Central, allowing a large group of breakaway riders to build a lead of nearly 20 minutes then fending off the few attacks thrown

their way on the short but steep finishing climb.

"We can really just ride off each other," Froome said. "I imagine for our rivals it's making their lives quite difficult, having two guys to watch like that."

While the Welshman Thomas is attempting to win the Tour for the first time, the Kenyan-born Froome is aiming for a record-tying fifth victory in cycling's biggest race.

Fourth-placed Primoz Roglic was the only overall contender to gain time, fin-

ishing eight seconds ahead of Thomas, Froome and third-placed Tom Dumoulin. All four riders finished more than 18 minutes behind stage winner Omar Fraile, who remained far back in the standings.

Thomas leads Froome by 1 minute, 39 seconds. Dumoulin, the time trial world champion and last year's Giro d'Italia winner, is third, 1:50 behind, and Roglic is fourth, 2:38 back.

When Dumoulin attacked with 2 kilometers remaining, Thomas chased

him down with Froome towing along.

"[Dumoulin] can really pace himself," Thomas said. "You don't know if he is really suffering or just pacing himself. Hats off to him. It takes [courage] to do that with no teammate around."

Fraile escaped from a large group of breakaway riders on the finishing climb, a short but steep three-kilometer ascent that was followed by a quick descent and flat finish on an air strip.

"When I saw that the breakaway was so big, I knew

it was going to be a tough stage, but I picked my moment well and pulled it off," Fraile said. "I knew that I still had another gear. ... I have raced here before and I knew the course to perfection."

Fraile had time to celebrate before crossing the line, finishing six seconds ahead of Julian Alaphilippe, the Frenchman wearing the polka-dot jersey awarded to the Tour's best climber.

Jasper Stuyven, of Belgium, finished third, also six seconds back, and three-time world champion Peter

Sagan came fourth.

It was the first career victory at the Tour for Fraile, who rides for the Astana team. His only other victory at a Grand Tour came with a stage win in last year's Giro d'Italia. The Basque rider also won the mountains classification in the Spanish Vuelta in 2015 and 2016.

Fraile became the third Spanish winner of a Tour stage in Mende after Marcos Serrano, in 2005, and Joaquim "Purito" Rodriguez, in 2010.



## Facility to use acid mine drainage

### Rare earth elements to be extracted for use in phones, computers, TVs

WVU researchers are opening a new facility to capture valuable materials from a novel source — acid mine drainage from coal mining — turning the unwanted waste into critical components used in today's technology-driven society.

Through a collaborative research and development program with the National Energy Technology Laboratory (NETL), part of the U.S. Department of Energy (DOE), WVU is opening the Rare Earth Extraction Facility to bolster domestic supplies of rare earths, reduce the environmental impact of coal-mining operations, reduce production costs and increase efficiency for processing market-ready rare earths.

Additionally, the technology could create jobs, helping to re-

vive economies that have been historically dependent on the coal industry.

"Research on rare-earth extraction is one way that our university is fulfilling its most important mission — which is the land-grant mission — to advance the prosperity of the people of this state," President Gordon Gee said.

Representatives from WVU, NETL, DOE, representatives from West Virginia's congressional delegation and others gathered recently in the High Bay Research Lab at the WVU Energy Institute's National Research Center for Coal and Energy on campus to tour the new Rare Earth Extraction Facility and mark the start of this new phase of research.

Brian Anderson, director of the WVU Energy Institute, hosted

the event and conveyed statements of support from the members of the state's congressional delegation, including Rep. David McKinley and Sens. Joe Manchin and Shelley Moore Capito.

In addition, WVU welcomed keynote speaker Steven Winberg, DOE assistant secretary for fossil energy.

"It's a pleasure to be in West Virginia, because West Virginians understand what it really means to have an 'all-of-the-above' energy strategy," he said.

WVU is partnering with Rockwell Automation to facilitate market readiness through use of their sensor and control technologies in the new WVU facility.

Paul McRoberts, regional industry mining, metals and cement manager at Rockwell Automation, a 30-year veteran of the industry, said that this is one of the most exciting projects he has been a part of during his career and is he excited to see the results of the new facility.

The facility is the researchers'

phase-two project, worth \$3.38 million, funded by NETL with matching funding from WVU's private sector partners. It follows on an earlier, phase-one project, worth \$937,000, to study acid mine drainage as feedstock for rare-earth extraction. The goal of the pilot facility is to test the technical and economic feasibility of scaling-up the technology to commercialize the separation and extraction process.

In addition, the team will work to define a U.S.-based supply chain including the sludges created during acid mine drainage treatment and upstream to the acid-mine drainage source.

#### Neither rare nor earth

The name "rare earth elements" is a misnomer for important chemical elements that are actually neither rare nor earths.

A collection of 16 elements that hang off the bottom of the periodic table, they are moderately abundant but well dispersed in the

Earth's crust. They are identified as rare because it is unusual to find them in large concentrations.

The elements are all metals that carry very similar properties. In rare cases they are found in deposits together. Unlike an element such as gold, natural rare earth deposits never occur as pure metals, but are bonded in low-value minerals, making extraction challenging.

Conventional rare-earth recovery methods require an expensive, difficult and messy extraction process that generates large volumes of contaminated waste. China has been able to provide a low-cost supply of rare earths using these methods, and therefore, dominates the global market.

In usable form, these elements are necessary components of modern technologies. They are used in cellular phones, computers, televisions, magnets, batteries, catalytic converters, defense applications and more segments of modern society.

## Students create interactive sculpture

An interactive sculpture on display at WVU's Evansdale Library illustrates the structure and function of a particular enzyme and can charge your smartphone.

The metal, wood and ceramic work, titled "Cytochrome C," is the creation of a team of artists, chemists and engineers from WVU and two other universities assembled as part of the Community Engagement in Science through Art (CESTA) program.

"The four-week summer program brings together students in the science, engineering, and art disciplines to design and build an interactive chemistry-art installation in Morgantown with the goal of improving cross-discipline communication and collaboration among the students while also bringing science to the community in a format that is fun, interesting and beautiful," said Jessica Hoover, an assistant professor of chemistry, Eberly College of Arts and Sciences.

The CESTA 2018 team includes WVU students Nysha Hongpaisan (WVU, engineering), Sarah Starcovic (Fairmont State, chemistry and biology), Erin McCarty (WVU, M.F.A.) Samuel Dickson (Youngstown State University, chemistry), Kyleen Kelly (WVU, B.F.A. art education) and Pamela Saidoni (WVU, engineering) and Pamela Saidoni (WVU, engineering) and Sarah Starcovic, Fairmont State University, chemistry and biology; and Samuel Dickson, Youngstown State University, chemistry.

The students worked collaboratively throughout most of June to design and construct "Cytochrome C" and then install the sculpture on the second floor of Evansdale Library.

Hoover said the underlying theme of this year's piece is community and connection,

and the charging capabilities of the sculpture play with the concept of Cytochrome C's role in the biological electron transport chain.

"The students were also intrigued by the conservation of Cytochrome C across the kingdoms of life and included reference to this trait in the four panels containing ceramic reliefs of organisms from each of four kingdoms," Hoover said.

Hoover started CESTA with

Todd Hamrick, teaching associate professor of engineering, Benjamin M. Statler College of Engineering and Mineral Resources, and Jason Lee, an associate professor sculpture, College of Creative Arts.

The program is funded by Hoover's National Science Foundation CAREER award. The goals of the program are to engage the community in chemistry through art and to teach WVU science, engineering, and art stu-

dents to work and communicate effectively across fields.

The installation is also part of WVU Libraries' Art in the Libraries initiative and will remain on display at Evansdale Library through June 2019.

"We're very happy to welcome the CESTA sculpture to Evansdale Library for a second year," Creative Arts Librarian Beth Royall said. "The student teams have been wonderful to work with."

## Heart center earns award from ELSO

The WVU Heart and Vascular Institute provides ECMO (extracorporeal membrane oxygenation) to support patients with failing organ systems. ECMO is one of the most advanced forms of life support available to patients experiencing acute failure of the cardio-respiratory system. It allows time for the patient's lungs or heart to heal by using a heart-lung machine to oxygenate the blood outside the body over a period of time.

"After commencing our thoughtfully planned evidence-based program in January 2018, we have managed complex patients from our region and around the state with excellent outcomes," said Dr. Vinay Badhwar, executive chair of the WVU Heart and Vascular Institute. "This has been a close collaboration between the Heart and Vascular Institute, the WVU Trauma and Critical Care Institute, and WVU Medicine Children's. Consistent with the mission purpose of WVU Medicine, we are proud to be able to provide another state first for West Virginia by helping provide high quality access to ECMO services to the sickest of the sick from around our state."

"The Silver Award is the highest possible quality ranking achievable for a program established for less than three years. To receive this recognition so early in our progress is a true testament to the outstanding multidisciplinary team members of physicians, perfusionists, ECMO specialists, nurses, administrators, and critical care providers that has been directed by Dr. J.W. The Excellence in Life Support Award recognizes those centers that demonstrate a commitment to evidence-based processes and quality measures, staff training and continuing education, patient satisfaction, and ongoing clinical care.

A designated Center of Excellence has demonstrated achievement in the following three categories:

- Excellence in promoting the mission, activities and vision of ELSO;

- Excellence in patient care by using the highest quality measures, processes and structures based upon evidence; and

## Team to study overdose risk in rural areas

Drug overdose deaths are on the rise in rural areas, and in some cases are overtaking death rates in urban areas. But unlike urban areas, there is little data about overdose prevention in rural America.

Based at WVU's Eastern Campus in Martinsburg, Joy Buck, a WVU School of Nursing professor, and her collaborators will gather real-time data about overdose trends and assess the cultural barriers to — and facilitators of — overdose prevention. The findings gleaned from her pilot project may prove useful in other rural areas across the nation.

The team will examine how opioid distribution and its use in a rural or urban setting can affect the risk for overdose. Then they will use the findings to strategize a coordinated response to overdoses and support a network of peer recovery coaches to improve overdose and harm-reduction outreach in rural areas of Berkeley County.

The 12-month pilot project received a \$135,000 grant from the University of Baltimore's Center for Drug Policy and Enforcement. Project partners include

the Berkeley County Recovery Resource Center, the Berkeley County Harm Reduction Program, the Berkeley County Day Report Center and Healthcare Advocates for Recovery, Inc.

"There are differences in response times to overdoses in the city and the county," Buck said. "Nationally, we also don't know much about how to ramp up overdose-prevention models in rural areas. Everything is based on urban models."

The project will include the formation of a steering committee with representatives from Martinsburg as well as rural Berkeley County because, although most harm-reduction and recovery services are concentrated in Martinsburg, many overdose deaths occur farther out in the surrounding area.

"Our primary goal is to identify and bridge the gaps, so people don't fall through the cracks," Buck said.

The committee will include public health professionals, law enforcement, emergency medical services, lawyers, people in recovery and other community members. Members will come to the committee with different per-

spectives on the issue but will share the goal of reducing the damage that opioids and other drugs inflict on users.

Additionally, interviews and focus groups that include the local police department, emergency medical services, state law enforcement and others working in the community will provide more insight into the urban versus rural disparity, patterns of substance use and barriers to overdose prevention and access to treatment and recovery services.

The researchers and community partners will review data from multiple sources to identify areas in Berkeley County that should be prioritized for outreach. In particular, they will consider ODMAP, a real-time map of overdose data that comprises parts of Maryland, Virginia, Washington D.C. and West Virginia. The map is produced by the High Intensity Drug Trafficking Areas program.

"If we're looking to expand services and outreach, those are the areas we would prioritize because that's where the most overdoses are occurring," Buck said.

The resulting outreach efforts will take into account geographical and technological limita-

tions that members of the steering committee bring to light. For instance, areas in Berkeley County lack reliable internet or cell phone coverage.

"So, if you're using social media to push that information out, it may not reach people," Buck said. "How do we get information out to people? Do they have internet access? Who do they communicate with? What are their social networks?"

The key to overcoming communication challenges will be people in recovery who mentor individuals who are considering giving up opioids. As part of the pilot project, more peer recovery coaches will be trained to reach "hidden populations" of individuals actively using drugs to help them access harm-reduction and other important services, and to act as what Buck called a "bridge to recovery."

Peer mentors are "critical to this because they have been there. They know what the walk is; they know that it's a tough walk. They're really important in keeping this project honest," Buck said. "Hopefully what we'll end up with is a more coordinated and comprehensive response to overdose."

PUMPING THE (TAX) BRAKES

Electric car supporters have been willing to wait for years to buy a Tesla, but now some of them are looking at a tax headache. In July, Tesla sold its 200,000th vehicle since the start of 2010, and that means a \$7,500 federal tax break for rechargeable electric vehicles will be phased out. A Model 3 Tesla sedan starts at \$35,000, so the tax break made for a significant discount. Buyers will continue to get the full tax credit through the end of 2018. The credit will shrink in 2019 and expire altogether at the end of the year. Worldwide, there are about 420,000 people on a waiting list for a Tesla.



DOG DAYS OF SALES

Amazon seems to have mostly laughed off its Prime Day technical problems, and Wall Street did, too. Shoppers complained on social media that when they tried to buy items in the first hours of Prime Day, they couldn't complete their purchases and received error messages that included cute dog photos. The snags were an embarrassment for the tech company on the much-hyped shopping holiday it created. "We had a ruff start," Amazon said in a statement. While Amazon doesn't disclose sales figures for Prime Day, Deborah Weinswig, CEO of CoreSight Research, estimated before it began that it will generate \$3.4 billion in sales worldwide, up from an estimated \$2.4 billion last year.



HOLD THE JOCK

The last two Blockbuster video stores in Alaska closed this week, leaving only one U.S. location of the former chain still open. The owner of the Anchorage store isn't ready to sell the Russell Crowe memorabilia he received from HBO host John Oliver as part of a comedic bid to save the business. Oliver bought the items, which include a jockstrap Crowe wore in the movie "Cinderella Man," in what Crowe called his "divorce auction." General Manager Kevin Daymude said the jock wouldn't be sold at this time, and owner Alan Payne said the fate of the items is up in the air. The stores are no longer offering rentals and will sell off their videos through August. The last Blockbuster store is in Bend, Oregon.

Food makers transform

In a bid to thrive, old-guard food companies such as J.M. Smucker and General Mills are rapidly swapping out or recalibrating what had for decades been reliable products. They continue to wrestle with rising costs and sometimes stagnant sales of tried-and-true brands, even as they add new and high-growth products to the mix. At the core of the transformation now underway are American preferences, which have shifted from processed foods to healthier fare. The change has led to volatility in the leadership ranks at some food producers in the hunt for a revival. That includes bringing

under the tent high-end pet foods. J.M. Smucker Co. recently bought Ainsworth Pet Nutrition for nearly \$2 billion, and then sold off its bakery division, which includes the iconic Pillsbury brand. General Mills this year spent \$8 billion on Blue Buffalo, another upscale pet food brand. Stifel analyst Christopher R. Grove maintains a positive, but cautious, view on General Mills as it tries to reposition itself for growth. "The shares will remain range-bound as it seeks to establish the consistency and growth potential this business showcased for many years," he said.

Company Spotlight Vans' results off the wall

V.F. Corp., the Greensboro, North Carolina-based owner of Vans and other hip fashion brands, saw its stock leap to an all-time high after it reported strong growth in sales and profits in the first quarter. Sales of Vans, the iconic southern California maker of skateboarding shoes and other apparel, soared 35 percent in the April-to-June quarter. Overall sales, which includes other



VF-owned brands such as Timberland and North Face, grew 23 percent in the quarter. VF acquired Vans for nearly \$400 million in 2004. Steven Rendle, VF's chief executive, told analysts Friday that the brand has benefited from VF's consumer insights and brand-building focus. "They have just gotten stronger and stronger, more focused on who they are and more importantly who they are not," Rendle said. VF shares jumped 4.1 percent to \$92.94.

Quick Fix Back-to-school deals

Sharpen your pencils and take notes for school supply savings

Back-to-school shopping can be daunting with long school supply lists that may mean big bucks. Here are a few ways to manage costs:

- Go it alone** Bringing your children to the store when you shop could lead to more items in your shopping cart or more pressure to buy specific items. Some 65 percent of back-to-school shoppers said half or more of their purchases are a direct result of their children's influence, according to a National Retail Federation survey. To avoid this, get your children involved in the process ahead of time. Have them browse store ads at home and point out things they like before you shop, recommends Deborah Meyer, a certified financial planner and owner of WorthyNest financial firm in Missouri. When it comes time to hit the stores, leave the kids at home so you can make the final call on what to buy or leave on the shelf.
- Let the kids help** If you'd rather take your kids with you, it's a good chance to teach them about budgeting and prioritization, said Jill Fopiano, CEO and president of O'Brien Wealth Partners in Boston. "They should get what they really need, of course, but

maybe also one or two things that they really want," Fopiano says. "And perhaps they put some of their allowance money toward that." Indeed, students have begun contributing more of their own money toward back-to-school purchases in recent years, according to Katherine Cullen, director of retail and consumer insights at the National Retail Federation.
- Work slowly** Don't feel compelled to purchase everything at once. "What we've seen is that more people are starting their shopping two months before classes start," said Cullen. "And one of the primary reasons they are doing that is to stretch out their budgets and capture deals all season long." There are deals throughout the summer. For instance, Amazon.com has hosted a Prime Day sale in July, and other retailers offer deals at the same time. Some states offer tax-free weekends in late July and early August, when consumers can purchase some back-to-school items without paying sales tax. Another money-saving strategy? Subscribe to monthly supply deliveries during the school year. Cullen says retailers like Target and Amazon offer a discount when you sign up for recurring deliveries of items like computer paper and other office supplies.

## Politics not a cure-all

Senate leader's tweets, acts not healthy for PEIA panel

Think of it as another kind of the trickle-down theory.

This one did not emanate from the White House but it probably was inspired from there.

That is, the need to inject politics into every debate about everything by — what else? Tweeting.

Last week, state Senate President Mitch Carmichael just couldn't help himself.

On Tuesday, he tweeted, "AFT's socialist agenda doesn't represent values of WV families, students & educators. Republican Leadership in WV gave teachers, school service personnel & state employees their largest pay increase in state history ..."

In a series of other tweets he challenged Democrats to reject the AFT's "Obama-styled socialist agenda."

This is the same Senate president who occupies a seat on the PEIA Task Force alongside the presidents of the state's two teachers' unions.

And not just a seat on that task force, but on its Public Outreach Subcommittee, which, you guessed it, those two unions' leaders are on.

We're not for a moment suggesting that we agree with the American Federation of Teacher's agenda, passed at its annual convention recently in Pittsburgh.

But for Carmichael to post that tweet above, blast the AFT in a news release and then confront the WV-AFT president about that agenda at the subcommittee's meeting Wednesday is ridiculous.

Carmichael specifically brought up a plank of the AFT's that members only endorse candidates who back universal health care.

He also ranked many by suggesting the state's "Republican Leadership" gave public employees, including teachers, a 5 percent raise.

Thousands of teachers protesting at the state Capitol for days on end get the credit for winning that raise.

Meanwhile, this subcommittee's mission is to report what it heard from town hall sessions across the state on how to best shore up the state-run health insurance program.

It also conducted online surveys to get feedback from state employees on how to do this.

Simply put, its charter is to summarize and recommend in its report what it heard from public employees — like it or not — not what it thinks.

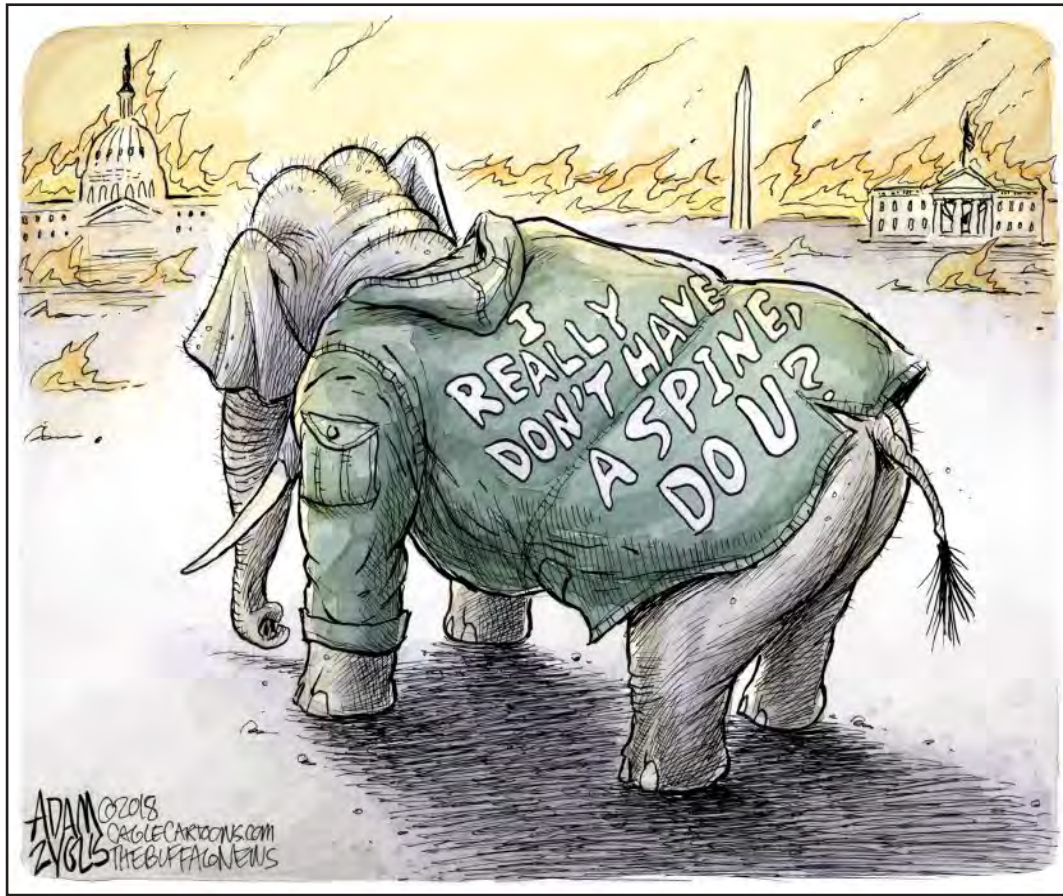
Nowhere should the Senate president's opinions and thoughts, or the union leaders' play any such role in its findings.

We urge Carmichael and others to not politicize this important initiative and instead simply fulfill their goal on this panel.

There will be plenty of time to turn to politics later when candidates begin vying for public offices.

To stir the pot of a nonpartisan task force's subcommittee with politics is wrongheaded, at best.

But with luck, the trickle-up effect from all this may yet be affordable health care for public employees.

### Amendment 1 will halt state abortion funding

On July 15, Rose Casey's letter to the editor totally misrepresented the facts and the law about Amendment 1.

Amendment 1 will stop taxpayer funding of abortion in West Virginia. It will not ban abortion in all cases, as claimed by Casey. It will remove abortion and state funding of abortion from the state Constitution and return control of the abortion issue to the Legislature where it belongs.

In 1993, the Legislature passed State Code §9-2-11, which banned taxpayer funding of abortion except in the cases of medical emergency, reported rape and incest, fetal anomaly and when the woman's life is threatened. The law was challenged and the state Supreme Court overturned

implementation of the law on the grounds that the state Constitution contained the right to taxpayer funding of abortion. Three of the five Supreme Court judges determined taxpayer funding for the people of West Virginia.

No one believes the state Constitution passed at the time of the Civil War contains any such provision. Indeed, a law passed in the late 19th century outlaws abortion in the state and it has never been removed or amended by the Legislature. It was voided by the 1973 Roe vs. Wade and Doe vs. Bolton decisions of the U.S. Supreme Court, and women have been having abortions in West Virginia ever since under the

provisions of federal law.

In the last legislative session, legislators passed the resolution for Amendment 1 by a bipartisan majority of more than two-thirds of both houses. The legislators have given the people the opportunity to vote directly on their right to avoid paying for elective abortions in West Virginia. Since 1977, we have paid \$10 million for around 35,000 abortions. It is time to end this abuse of the taxpayer.

When Amendment 1 passes, State Code §9-2-11 will again be in effect and none of the horror stories claimed by Casey will occur. Women who want elective abortions will have to pay for them themselves. Don't be fooled by misrepresentations. Go to the webpage YESon1wv.com for accurate information.

MY FAMILY HAS RESIDED IN MONONGALIA COUNTY for over 70 years and feels very blessed to have done so. As I waited for my family to get ready for church last weekend, I read the comments on the front page attributed to Mark Brazaitis with utter dismay.

His quotes and unfounded assertions in the newspaper are a sad and embarrassing commentary for our community and the Morgantown City Council:

"We don't have a relationship as a city with WVU. We have a relationship that's more akin to owner/servant with WVU," Brazaitis said.

Next he was encouraging local residents to be wary of the "illusion" of Mylan Park's nonprofit status without checking into how much its executives are paid.

Let me try to help you with a few facts.

None of the Mylan Park Foundation's Board members have ever been paid a dime by the 501(c)3 organization, just like many other great charitable organizations in our town, including the United Way, Milan Puskar Health Right and the Hazel Ruby McQuain Charitable Trust.

This community has been blessed with the charitable spirit of many people's time and gifts; it should not be assailed for this volunteerism. The Mylan Park

Foundation's bylaws clearly state the organization was formed "to advance educational, recreational, social and economic benefits, [and] to improve the quality of life" of our residents.

Is Brazaitis aware the city of Morgantown worked with Mylan Park to obtain the gift for the Hazel and J.W. Ruby Community Center and actually owns the property upon which it sits?

I would invite you to do a little research on the aquatic and track facility under construction, and you will find there were several published opportunities for community input and, in fact, Mylan Park invited every city in our county to participate in the planning.

The project will provide the only indoor Olympic size pool, diving well, community pool and track facility in the state of West Vir-

ginia. Without a \$15 million gift from the Ruby Foundation, land and infrastructure from the Mylan Park Foundation, the support of WVU, the Convention and Visitors Bureau and the County Commission, the facility would never have been possible.

In addition, it would not have been remotely affordable for use by the general public, which will have access to the community pool 100 percent of the time and the balance of the facility (competition pool and track) 90 percent of the time at my best guess. This facility has been embraced by the local and regional schools and teams.

You also need to understand that this facility, as well as all the facilities at Mylan Park, bring hundreds of thousands of people and millions of dollars to our community. It is time the city of Morgantown embrace the economic benefit Mylan Park provides to the community as a whole, which is received without any city tax dollars at all.

In addition, I am proud that Mylan Park built the third Miracle Field in the USA, is the home of Pace Enterprises, Stepping Stones, Pro Performance's indoor facility, Mylan Park

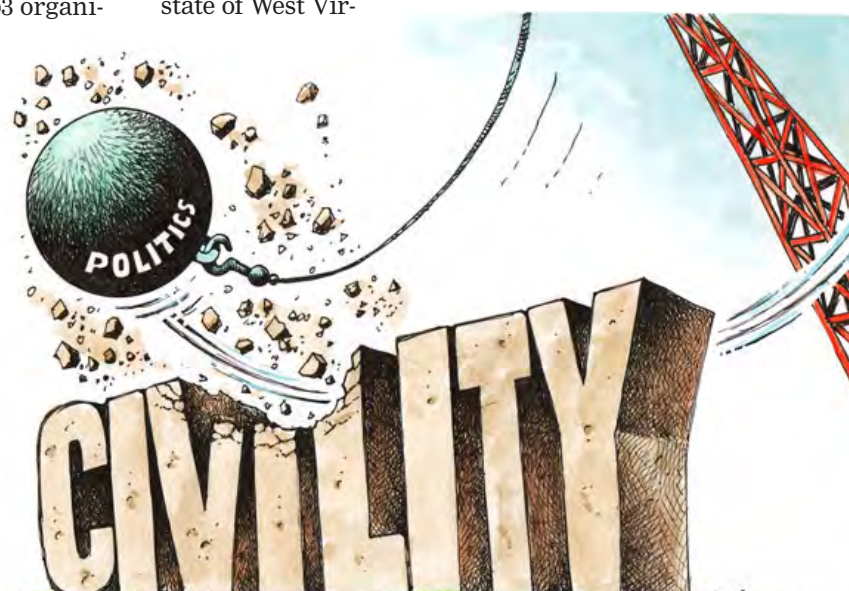

## The danger of Trump, others is real obvious

PRESIDENT DONALD TRUMP TRAVELED ABROAD and you almost wanted him to stay there because he put himself first and America last. His playing footsie with a murderous tyrant known as Vladimir Putin was the worst of it, and it's no excuse that too many on the left are up to something as bad or worse.

But while no one should be saying that botches on one side make botches on the other OK, no one should be ignoring the way in which too many in the anti-Trump, anti-conservative, anti-free speech, anti-checks-and-balances, pro-administrative state, autocratically bewitched crowd are endangering so, so much of our precious culture and system of government.

The overriding issue is whether we can preserve the best of maybe the most liberating political invention in history, this America of ours. It's true that Trump did the idea no favor when he said our government's finding of Russian intervention in the 2016 election had met its match in Putin's denial. Here is a Russian president abetting inhumane slaughter and international disruption retreating not an inch while our president's adulation knew few boundaries.

Trump talked about Russia's nuclear might, and its power is frightening. Maybe, in some as yet unnoticed way, he's disabling the worst possibilities. It seems more likely that he is disabling Republican chances in the midterm elections as voters worry whether Republicans will fight hard enough against election interference that might make a difference the next time.

Even a usual Trump supporter like Newt Gingrich is saying here was "the most serious mistake of his presidency," and you wonder whether "mistake" was a tough enough word. National Intelligence Director Dan Coates says Trump was simply wrong.

Of course, then you have the slippery former CIA Director John Brennan saying Trump's remarks were "treasonous," implying impeachment is justified. Some people figure there are always ways to worsen the worst, and that's not so sure because how do you worsen the FBI's disregard of rule of law and checks and balances? It is refusing to share records with Congress that might show how every rule in the book was broken by officials spying on an American, and Democrats don't care.

Under the Obama administration, Russians were accused by intelligence officials of hacking computers at the White House, the State Department and the Joint Chiefs of Staff without a lot of concern. China stole all kinds of technical information from us and got personal data on 4 million federal employees, past and present. Remember President Barack Obama's firmness? No?

Trump's sanctions on Russians for suspected election interference have been tougher than anything Obama did, and, where Obama refused to supply Ukraine with weapons to defend itself against Russia, Trump came through. ## Amendment 1 is not pro-life; elect women

On Nov. 6, West Virginia voters will have a serious decision to make, so it's important we know the facts. Let's start with the actual wording of Amendment 1 — seventeen words, to be exact:

"Nothing in this constitution secures or protects a right to abortion or requires the funding of abortion."

For the first time in our state's history, West Virginia voters will decide whether or not to strip a constitutional right from its citizens. Regardless of where an individual may lie when it comes to the sensitive topic of abortion, all citizens should be concerned when a state legislature takes action and precious time from their 60-day sessions to create a pathway to remove an established right from its people, rather than work to pass legislation that benefits them and the land on which they live.

Some back story on how this amendment came to be: Prior to the passing of what was then referred to as Senate Joint Resolution 12 (SJR12), an amendment was proposed to lessen the severity of the legislation and create exceptions for cases of rape, incest, or complications that threatened the life of the mother.

That amendment was voted down by Republican legislators — and even several Democrats — making this proposed legislation the most extreme attack on reproductive rights of West Virginians in our state's history.

Point blank, nothing that refuses to make exceptions for young girls who are raped and impregnated at the hand of a relative can be, in any way, pro-life. Nothing that condemns a woman to die on the table, rather than live, breathe and work another day is pro-life.

Last time I checked, the individuals who push these acts of legislation are the same who bemoan the danger of big government in our lives, and who, time and time again, hack away at funding for the programs that keep living, breathing children and their families alive and well.

The real reason for this push to strip rights over such a controversial topic is clear — to turn out conservative voters in the general election, in hopes of holding on to as many seats as they can.

This may be a good time to also remind our legislators that choosing to pass an amendment that would take aim at a woman's personal medical choices may not be the wisest strategic tactic when also engaging in stunts (see: provoking the teachers' walk out) that impact the insurance options and job stability of a profession that is approximately 80 percent female.

After years of watching our Legislature waste time and energy on bills centered around reproductive rights, it is clear that the only real way to keep dangerous amendments like these from harming women, is to strip amendments like these off the ballot, and put women's names on it.

It is time to send a message to our Legislature that we've had enough of our bodies being repeatedly placed on their legislative agenda.

Seventeen words. I propose two very different words. Elect women.

I thanked each of them not only for assisting me but also for choosing to make my country theirs. Each one broke into a big smile and told me how much he or she loved America. I am sure there were many, many other unseen immigrants, behind the scenes, who eased my way.

An effective, non-vindictive immigration policy would be a win-win proposition for immigrants seeking a better life for themselves and their families and for those of us who benefit regularly from the gifts they bring. Those gifts keep on giving. One day those immigrants too may have native born grandchildren who gratefully say, "Thank you dear grandparents for your bravery and thank you America for opening your arms to my family."

I am a single mom with two sons who have extensive medical needs, and I value affordable health insurance. I've had many health issues, including ovarian cysts, miscarriages, heavy menstrual cycles and ectopic pregnancies.

In 2016 I finally had a physician listen and hear my anxiety, pain and concerns of 28-day menstruation with clotting. After an ultrasound confirmed a cluster of cysts, a referral to an OB/GYN and a biopsy, we concluded a hysterectomy was my best option.

My decision time was limited because my youngest son was scheduled for a foot surgery. It was also time for my annual review of Medicaid, and the physician's office and hospital were in the process of getting a Medicaid approval.

Neither of my two jobs offered health care, and my gross in-

come was \$14 over the qualifying income for Medicaid. My case worker cried with me over the phone — she knew the trials and tribulations my family was going through. Thankfully, my sons were still eligible for Medicaid.

When I found out I didn't qualify for Medicaid my family and I were on our way to an appointment at UPMC Pittsburgh for my oldest son. While a friend drove, I started making calls to learn about the Affordable Care Act (ACA). My biggest concern was pre-existing conditions and if my physicians were in-network providers. My plan option was affordable, and all of my physicians were on the list. I didn't have the burden of my post-surgery care expenses.

ACA is not a handout. ACA provided me with women's health care. ACA insures everyday working people, but U.S. Supreme Court nominee Brett Kavanaugh threatens to take this all away. I urge Sen. Joe Manchin to stand up for his constituents like me and protect the ACA, particularly for people with pre-existing conditions.

## Nonprofit status of Mylan Park is not an 'illusion'

Having read the article regarding Morgantown's town hall meeting and the Deputy Mayor's comments regarding Mylan Park, I am compelled to respond.

In 1999, I served as the original treasurer for the predecessor of the Mylan Park Foundation — the Monongalia County Schools Foundation. Over the years, I also served as vice president and president for the Foundation.

In 1999, the Foundation was granted nonprofit status by the IRS. The foundation was established for the purpose of providing assistance to Monongalia County Schools. Through a generous gift of land by Anker Energy and donated materials and labor, 7 acres on Chaplin Hill Road were developed into baseball and softball fields.

Over the years, the 7 acres have grown to over 300 acres and the scope of the park has grown to include recreation, education, social services and community support. Included in the park are Mylan Park Elementary School, Monongalia Schools Alternative Learning Center, Monongalia Schools Transportation Center, Stepping Stones, Miracle Field, Pro Performance, PACE Enterprises and Operation Welcome Home — and soon to be the home for Monongalia County Extension Service and Mountaineer Aquatic and Track Complex.

The Park has served as host for Mountainfest, which has brought millions of dollars of economic benefit to the Greater Morgantown area, as well as the annual Monongalia County Fair.

A cornerstone of the Park is the J.W. & Hazel Ruby Community Center. This building was made possible by the generosity of the Hazel Ruby McQuain Charitable Trust and provides a home for many diverse community events.

The deputy mayor was attributed with saying he encouraged local residents to be wary of the illusion of Mylan Park's nonprofit status without checking into how much its executives are paid. The fact, not illusion, is simply that the Mylan Park Foundation is a nonprofit recognized by the IRS and West Virginia.

The Foundation's annual IRS Form 990's have been readily available to the public since inception in 1999. I can ensure you that the Park has been managed over the years with a most modest payroll for its few employees and has been managed for the past several years by PACE Enterprises by contract.

Every Mylan Park Board member — past and present — has donated their time, talent and treasure to the Park as volunteers without any compensation whatsoever.

Perhaps, the deputy mayor, the city manager and the other members of Morgantown City Council can look for ways to improve the greater Morgantown area by cooperative means as opposed to a constant adversarial approach — everyone in and around Morgantown will be much better served with the former approach.

## There can be tiers to the Bible's truths

**Q:** I look forward to your column in Saturday's New Haven Register and read it faithfully. However, recently I'm afraid I found you missed the mark on the meat-eating issue.

True, Adam and Eve ate only the fruit of the trees in the Garden of Eden, and that was perfection. When God cast them out because they sinned, they then had to work for a living, and vegetables were added to their diet. There was no fear of man among the animals, for how else could Noah have gathered them all into the Ark? They were not yet eating each other, as Noah was able to maintain them for a year onboard without killing some to feed others.

However, Genesis tells us that after the flood, God declared that the fear of man will fall on the beasts, birds, fish, etc. And that "everything that lives and moves will be food for you ... as I gave you the green plants, I now give you everything. But you must not eat the meat with the lifeblood still in it." Not that they were not to eat the meat, but that the blood must be drained out first. It's the preparation, not the product! And isn't that what makes it Kosher? — from E

A: You are exactly correct in your summary of the Bible's teaching about eating meat. I presented in my column what you presented in your question: People were only given permission to eat fruits and grains. The permission to eat meat does not come until the covenant with Noah after the flood in Genesis 9. You are also correct that the permission comes with a caveat. Any meat to be eaten must first be drained of blood, and this remains a requirement for kosher meat today. Immediately after the permission to eat blood-drained meat, the Bible includes a strange "blood reckoning" for the blood of all the animals we do eat. Then, in another strange connection, the Bible requires a blood reckoning for every person we murder. This blood reckoning includes capital punishment for murder, but it is also stated in reference to blood, "Whoever sheds the blood of man by man shall his blood be shed." (Genesis 9:6).

In any event, the point of all these biblical laws is clearly to indicate that eating meat, though permitted, is nevertheless clearly a concession to human weakness. Let me say this another way. Some things permitted in the Bible are low-level virtues, and the Bible also shows us how to live on a higher level of compassion and moral virtue. It is as if God is saying to us, "You can do this, but you can also do better." This teaches us that the Bible offers us a multi-level truth. Some things are OK, and some things are better than OK. It is just far too simplistic to say that something is permitted or forbidden.

We see this multi-level biblical ethical system in other areas. Waging war against an enemy, for example, is a low-level permission. One must be allowed to defend one's country and family and person, but when waging war the Bible does not allow cutting down an enemy's fruit trees (Deuteronomy 20:19-20). Fruit and olive trees take years to bear fruit and cutting them down was considered a type of war crime. So waging war is permitted, but that does not mean that any act is permitted in war time.

I am deeply moved by this biblical ethical attitude. It parallels the way we raise children, teaching them low-level truths when that is all their young minds can comprehend, and then teaching them higher-level truths as they grow. For example, we first teach children to do the right thing just to avoid punishment in the hopes that someday they will learn to do the right thing just because it is the right thing.

So eating meat is permitted, but not causing the suffering and death of a living thing is clearly a higher way in the two-tiered ethics of the Bible.

## Handling ex's bad-mouthing

**Q:** My ex had an affair and we divorced as a result. It was humiliating when he married the woman, and not long after I met her ex for coffee. We married a year later. So, essentially, we've traded partners. My ex is incredibly manipulative and has bad-mouthed me so badly that my husband's middle school-age daughters will not even come to visit. He's made it look like we were the ones who had the affair and the girls despise me. I try to be accepting and do special things for them on their birthdays and around the holidays, but it doesn't seem to matter. Should I continue? What's good ex-etiquette?

A: I would never tell anyone to just give up, particularly if they are doing their best to follow the rules of good ex-No.5 and 6. You're doing the best you can — and that's difficult when all you want to do is come right out and tell the kids that their dad is the liar. But, you have to ask yourself how will that make things better? At this point, will the kids siding with you and your husband be better than the status quo? For you, maybe. But, since the kids deserve both their parents to be active in their lives, they are the losers any way you look at it.

My suggestion is to continue to do exactly what you are doing. You could look for pay-backs, plot and, plan, and get your revenge, but the danger in doing that is that it may not even phase the girls and your

devotion to getting revenge may be the demise of your current marriage. If all you think about, all you talk about, is stopping your ex and swaying the girls to your side, there will be little room to build the love and devotion your marriage needs to flourish. Your kindness is a positive example and even if the girls don't see it at this point, your husband does.

Some feel that you should never discuss an affair with the children, however, as you can see, if the information is not presented properly, it can cause huge problems. Although too much information can also be detrimental, rather than the need to set the record straight, it may be more productive to concentrate on the love your husband has for his daughters. Make sure THEY know THAT will never waiver.

While the following may not be helpful in all situations, I often suggest you use the word "mistaken" to describe an ex's misinformation.

For example, "Mom said you left us because of Janeen."

Your comment could then be: "Your mother is mistaken. I met Janeen a year after your mother and I split up." No need to editorialize further. You have found a way to state the truth without calling mom a liar. "No bad-mouthing!"

## Fatherhood is full of surprises

### ASK MR. DAD

**Q:** I just found out that my girlfriend is pregnant. I have no idea what to expect. Can you give me a few hints?

A: Congratulations — you're in for a long, wild ride! Becoming a dad involves new responsibilities, new pressures, and new expectations to live up to. For some of us, this little jolt of reality comes early, before we leave the hospital. But for others, it may not kick in for a few days. Sooner or later, though, you're going to realize that your life has changed forever. Sometimes the changes are subtle, sometimes not so subtle. But they're almost always surprising.

■ **Confusion.** In the early days, you'll experience a variety of confusing and often conflicting emotions. On the one hand there's the virility, power, and pride at having created a new life. On the other, the feelings of helplessness when you can't satisfy (or sometimes even understand) your baby's needs.

■ **A new way of loving.** There's no comparing the all-consuming love you'll have for your child with the love you have for any other human. Maurice Sendak captured the feeling perfectly in a scene from "Where the Wild Things Are," where the monsters plead with Max not to leave them: "Please don't go," they say. "We'll eat you up we love you so."

■ **New ways of being loved.** As you slowly master your baby's cues and meet his needs, your baby will learn to love you — and to express that love in the most amazing ways. And the first time that your baby

coos as you or hugs you or falls asleep on your chest while absentmindedly stroking your shoulder, you'll discover the true meaning of life.

■ **Depression.** Even though most people think that postpartum blues are a mom thing, plenty of guys get depressed after their babies are born. There's the grind at work, plus the bills, the exhaustion, the extra laundry, and the lack of sex. That's enough to depress anyone.

■ **Fear.** The first few months of fatherhood are littered with fears: that you won't be able to live up to your fatherhood expectations; that you won't be able to provide for or keep your child and family from harm, that you don't know what to do with your child, that you'll be too much — or not enough — like your own father, that you've made a horrible mistake. These fears and many others are completely normal. Some will go away as your skills increase, others will go away with time.

■ **Changing relationship with your partner.** Right now, you and your girlfriend spend a lot of time together, nurturing each other and making your relationship stronger. But once your baby shows up, he or she will become the focus of everything you do. Starting tonight, carve out some time — even if it's only a few minutes a day — to spend talking about something other than the baby.

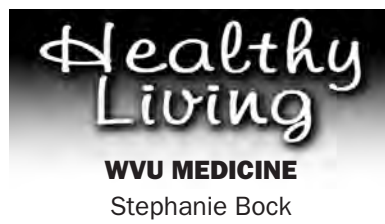

**DURING SUMMER**, my favorite time of year, you're outside more often, facing the heat, humidity, chlorine at the pool, or salt water at the beach. And you want your skin to look its best. What steps should you take? WVU Medicine dermatologist Dr. Erica Ghareeb tells you how to reduce the toll that summer exposures can have on your skin.

■ **Drink more water.** Did you know that drinking plenty of water benefits your skin? By hydrating properly, you'll look refreshed, and you'll benefit your internal body, too. If plain water isn't your thing, try adding fresh fruit or cucumbers to a pitcher of water; and let the flavors infuse for a few hours in the fridge.

■ **Remove dead skin.**

Regular exfoliation of your skin will produce softer and fresher results. If your skincare routine involves exfoliating with a scrub at home, be sure to use light pressure. Consider this homemade option: Mix one part coconut oil with two parts sugar.

■ **Use the right cleanser.** First, don't over wash your face. If your face is too squeaky clean, it means the protective barrier has been stripped away. And you don't need an expen-

sive cleanser. Choose one based on your skin type, and use tepid or lukewarm water to remove your cleanser.

■ **Be choosy about sunscreen and reapply.**

For proper skin protection, it's important to choose the right kind of sunscreen. Read the ingredients, and look for zinc oxide and/or titanium dioxide in the list of active ingredients. Use at least SPF 30 sunscreen, and apply liberally to any exposed skin 15 minutes before going outdoors. Reapply sunscreen every two hours and after swimming. Wear a hat or swim shirt for added protection.

## Tips on how to keep your dog safe in the pool this summer

Contrary to popular belief, the dog paddle may not come naturally to all dogs. While some dogs are natural-born swimmers, others may not be, and even the best swimmers can use some training when starting out.

The American Kennel Club offers the following tips to help dog owners keep their four-legged friends safe in and around the pool.

■ **Supervision.** First and foremost, never leave your dog unsupervised while in the pool. She

may need your help and be unable to bark to grab your attention.

■ **Build confidence.** It's important to build confidence in your dog around the pool. Even the breeds that are natural swimmers tend to be afraid the first time they enter the water, so be sure to take it slowly and praise your dog every step of the way.

■ **Moderation.** Don't let your dog overexert herself. Swimming is great exercise, but as with any workout, it should be increased in small increments. Your dog is using new muscles to swim and

may get worn out quickly. Also keep in mind that smaller breeds tend to get tired faster due to their short limbs.

■ **The dog paddle.** If your dog begins to dog paddle with just the front legs, lift your dog's hind legs to help her float. Your dog should quickly catch on and will then keep her back end up.

■ **Learn the ladder.** Helping your dog learn to use the ladder to exit the pool is an important skill to ensure your dog's safety, but it can cause your dog to panic. Dogs are not used to climb-

ing a ladder and will need to be taught how to use it. Direct your dog toward the ladder and help her climb out of the pool.

■ **Rinse off.** The chemicals from the pool can irritate your dog's skin. Spray off your dog with the hose after she gets out of the pool.

■ **Clean the ears.** Most ear infections in dogs with floppy ears are caused by too much water and dampness. Dab your dog's ears with a dry towel or use a blow dryer set to "cool" to get rid of excess moisture.

## New treatments available for dry-eye problems

**Q:** I've been using some artificial tears for years when my eyes felt dry or scratchy, but I'm hearing about some new eyelid treatment to actually cure the problem. Can you tell me more?

A: You, like most people, may be surprised to learn that recent studies show that using common artificial tears or eye lubricants actually worsened chronic dry eyes. This has been the quick and easy recommendation for many patients by most eye doctors, but research has found better treatments to actually cure the underlying problem.

We have learned now that the oil component of our tear film is very critical in maintaining moist eyes from one blink to the next. And to make matters worse, we now know that our normal blink rate of about 18 times per minute drops to about

4 times a minute when we read digital screens. These days most of us spend hours many hours every day on our laptop or tablet or smartphone — and are aggravating our dry eyes.

Today, we are able to gently warm up our eyelid oil glands in the office which allows us to painlessly clean the oil glands and express common blockages. These oil glands should secrete thin oil into our tears with every blink. Inflammation and aging makes these secretions become thicker to point that the glands simply cannot express the needed oil into our tear

film. Melting those blockages with very specific temperatures and mild pressure can eliminate those blockages and restore normal oil secretion. This provides more normal tears to keep our sensitive eye surfaces coated and comfortable all day long!

We have recommended eyelid heating masks for years to our patients, and still do so. But the new in-office systems are more effective and should provide about six months relief for most patients. This may mean that just like we all have our teeth cleaned every six months by our dental hygienist, many patients should have these eyelid glands cleaned twice a year by their ophthalmic hygienist.

Home care is still important, so we still recommend moist heat masks for use once or twice a day. And new ultra refined omega-3 fatty acids from fish oil may also help re-

duce inflammation in those oil glands. Patients seem to find more comfort with moderate levels of those supplements, taken with food, or to eat more salmon in their diet. Lastly, some patients need to include a lid cleanser in their daily facial cleansing to keep the eyelid margins clean of cosmetics and metabolic waste. So as you can tell, much has changed. We take dry eyes more seriously because we now know that this is a progressive disease and can cause all the oil glands to die eventually if not treated. To keep your contact lenses comfortable all day, or to keep your computer vision sharper, or just to eliminate the need for eye drops, new treatments are available and proving very beneficial.

# Definition of happiness elusive, individual

The subject was intriguing enough to start me searching for articles and books about happiness. I found much more information about this concept than I had time or inclination to explore. It turns out there is even a branch of psychology (positive psychology) dedicated to studying happiness in all its aspects.

How do we define hap-

piness? Certainly it's not a constant. No one is happy every moment of every day. Everyone alive suffers from doubts, grief, emotional and physical pain off and on. Perhaps it can be more easily defined by studying happy people.

**David G. Myers**, writing for Psychology Today, notes three important traits of people who are happy.

They have good self esteem, optimism in their outlook on life and personal control over

the direction in which their life is going. Such simple concepts, but their importance should not be underestimated.

I suspect if we actually gave the question of defining happiness some serious thought, each one of us would come up with a different and very personal definition. Yet these definitions would surely have some commonalities.

Do happy people actually experience a constant flow of satisfactory positive emotions or do they look at negative emotions and sad experiences in a different light, perhaps process them in a different way?

As the years roll on it can happen that some overpowering events set

our lives spinning out of their usual comfortable orbit. It can be a health issue, a relationship gone beyond repair, a death of someone close to us or any number of other things that can come crashing into our lives like a massive runaway freight train.

After the dust settles and the shock wears off can we work our way back from darkness to light; can we achieve happiness? According to the researchers who study this concept of happiness, a great deal depends on individual response and how much a person truly wants to be happy again. In the words of **Abraham Lincoln**, "Folks are usually about as happy as they make their minds up to be."

Perhaps we've all met

someone who is consistently morose, complaining and devoid of joy. I certainly have. Wealth, job security, loving relationships; none of these seemed to bring happiness, contentment, peace. These people were on a constant search for more ... of what? Of everything. Nothing and no one seemed to be enough.

Perhaps happiness is contentment, satisfaction with life, the ability to deal with all its aspects. None of us can live in an impenetrable bubble of joy, safely encased and shut away from pain and trouble. Pain and trouble will come. The bubble will burst, of this we can be sure. Much depends on how we deal with whatever comes along.

Research clearly makes the point that we must accept responsibility for our own happiness. That may mean a change of attitude, or a change of circumstances, relationships. It may mean going from darkness into the light of optimism.

How we work toward happiness is purely individual, but surely if there is not much hope of achieving it in our present situation, it's time to change some aspects of our lives. The wise words of the **Dalai Lama** bring it home: "Happiness is not something ready made. It comes from your own actions."

## Disney a likely pairing for Fox

NEW YORK — The Mouse House is getting close to catching the Fox.

Comcast's decision to drop its bid for the bulk of Twenty-First Century Fox means Disney's \$71.3 billion offer for Fox is likely to prevail. Fox shareholders vote on the offer Friday. Meanwhile, Comcast is pursuing Sky, a European pay-TV operator Fox partially owns.

The moves come as the media landscape is shifting dramatically. Cable and telecom companies are acquiring content makers to better compete with the likes of popular streaming services like Netflix and Amazon. Last month, AT&T bought Time Warner, getting the Warner Bros. studio and such channels as TBS and HBO.

X-Men and other movies from Fox's studios could be added to Disney's upcoming streaming service. Fox's film studios, with "Avatar," X-Men, the Fantastic Four and Deadpool, would pair well with Disney's studios. This includes reuniting the Marvel franchises X-Men and the Avengers, as some of those characters were already in Fox's hands when Disney bought Marvel in 2009. Disney also has the Muppets, Pixar and "Star Wars."

BTIG analyst Richard Greenfield estimates the combined studios make up 45 percent of worldwide box office revenue. A larger studio could use its power to keep its movies in more theaters longer and squeeze out rival movies.

Fox's TV productions include "The Americans," "This Is Us," "Modern Family" and "The Simpsons." Its networks include FX Networks and National Geographic. The Fox businesses would add to Disney's roster of channels like ABC, the Disney Channel and Freeform. "Modern Family" already airs on ABC.

Disney would have to sell Fox's 22 regional sports networks to satisfy

the government's antitrust concerns, as Disney already owns a national sports network, ESPN. Buyers haven't been announced yet. The regional networks hold TV rights to professional hockey, basketball and baseball games and show hometown sports in several cities including New York, Los Angeles, Dallas, Cleveland, Detroit and Kansas City.

Disney would get controlling stake in streaming service Hulu. Comcast, Disney and Fox now own 30 percent apiece, with AT&T owning the other 10 percent through Time Warner. With Fox's share, Disney would have a controlling 60 percent stake.

## Stocks waver as banks fall, companies climb

NEW YORK — U.S. stock indexes were mixed last week as weakness in banks and larger companies is partly canceled out by gains for smaller companies. In testimony before Congress, representatives of the auto industry are speaking out against tariffs on imported cars and car parts proposed by the Trump administration.

The S&P 500 index slid 11 points, or 0.4 percent, to 2,804 as of 3:15 p.m. The Dow Jones Industrial Average fell 124 points, or 0.5 percent, to 25,075. The Nasdaq composite gave up 32 points, or 0.4 percent, to 7,822. The Russell 2000 index of smaller-company stocks recovered from an early slide and rose 9 points, or 0.5 percent,

to 1,700. Smaller retailers did especially well. More stocks rose than fell on the New York Stock Exchange.

Second-quarter results and forecasts from U.S. companies continued to dominate trading. eBay slumped 9 percent to \$34.53 after reporting revenue that missed forecasts.

American Express fell 2.4 percent to \$100.47 after setting aside more money to cover potential bad loans. Bank of New York Mellon lost 4.4 percent to \$53.17.

Companies that make heavy machinery and industrial products continued a strong run over the last few days. Manufacturing company Dover climbed 4.6 percent to \$77.62 and tool and diagnostic equipment maker Snap-on picked up 8.4 percent to \$171.61.

Those companies were hit hard as investors worried that tariffs will hurt their business, but Lindsey Bell, investment strategist with CFRA, said many of the companies are raising their profit forecasts and plan to increase their spending. However, Bell said, it's possible the companies are trying to avoid the future effects of the tariffs and that they'll see a slowdown later this year.

The U.S. imported \$335 billion in autos and parts in 2017, so those tariffs could dwarf the taxes the administration placed on imported steel, aluminum and goods from China.

General Motors slid 1.1 percent to \$39.42 and Tesla dipped 1.2 percent to \$319.86.

## Whiskey summit hopes to defuse conflicts

FRANKFORT, Ky. — Concerned that global trade disputes could escalate — with Kentucky bourbon makers caught in the crosshairs — the industry invited whiskey associations from across the world to discuss ways to defuse the conflicts.

Representatives from eight whiskey trade groups will meet next week in Louisville, Ky. Distillers' Association President Eric Gregory said Thursday. The goal is to forge a united strategy in making their case to world leaders in promoting free and fair

trade, he said.

"We're all one big world whiskey family, and it's time for us to ... communicate directly and hopefully we can speak with a unified voice," Gregory told a state legislative panel.

Participants will include groups representing the Irish whiskey and Scotch whisky industries, as well as spirits producers in Japan, Canada and Europe, Gregory said in a release. The group will meet Wednesday and Thursday, he said.

Trade disputes resulted in tariffs imposed in some key overseas markets for

bourbon, including the European Union — where Kentucky spirits producers exported nearly \$200 million of their products in 2017. American whiskey makers also face retaliatory tariffs in Canada, Mexico and China.

EU tariffs targeting American whiskey were a response to President Donald Trump's decision to slap tariffs on European steel and aluminum. Those duties amount to a tax, which producers can pass along to consumers through higher prices or absorb at risk of shrinking profits.

**NextGen rewarded contract for drone**

NextGen Federal Systems (NextGen) was recently awarded a Small Business Innovation Research (SBIR) Phase I contract by the U.S. Army. Under this Research and Development (R&D) contract, NextGen will design and develop a micro drone that utilizes an imaging sensor and advanced autopilot system to support autonomous operation, intelligence collection, and information processing within a small geographical region.

During the Intelligent Multirotor Autonomous Glider for Relocatable Sensors (IMAGRS) R&D project, the team will design a drone system that addresses the U.S. Army's needs for next generation, relocatable (i.e. movable) Intelligence, Surveillance, and Reconnaissance (ISR) sensors. These micro drone sensor systems must be highly mobile, autonomous, and capable of being packaged and remotely deployed to uncontrolled staging positions.

In other applications, IMAGRS could be tasked to deliver supplies, dynamically bridge communication networks, and perform remote observations. Organizations around the world continue to aggressively pursue drone-related capabilities. IMAGRS can be adapted to markets including security (banks, etc.), first responders, law enforcement, and agriculture.

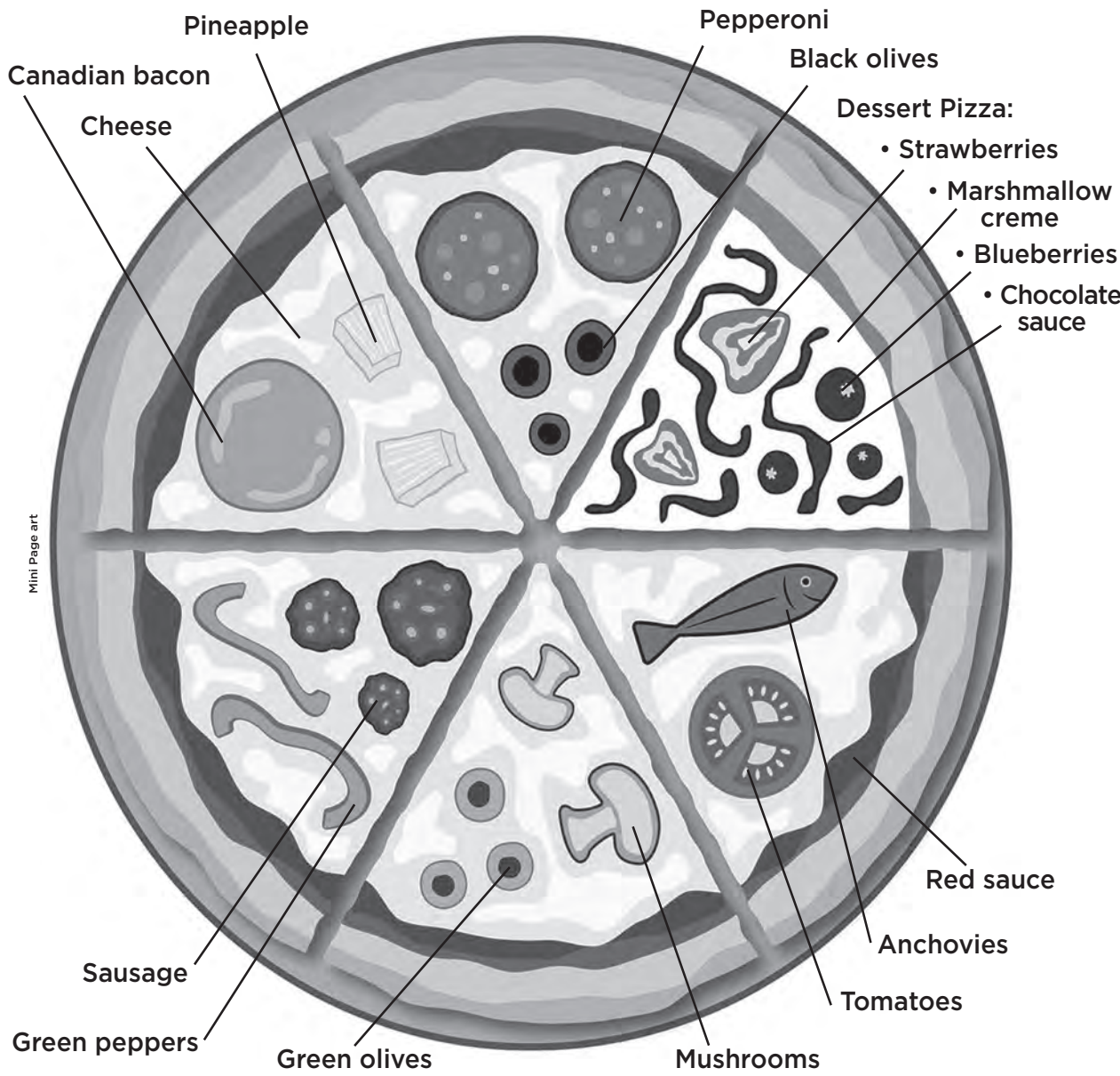

CHARLESTON — Applications are now being accepted for a second round of FY2018 Historic Preservation survey and planning grants through the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) of the West Virginia Department of Arts, Culture and History (WVDACH).

About \$50,000 will be awarded from funding appropriated by the United States Congress for preservation efforts through the National Park Service Historic Preservation Fund.

State or local government agencies, not-for-profit organizations, for-profit organizations or firms, educational institutions and Certified Local Governments (CLG) are eligible to apply.

Eligible projects include architectural and archaeological surveys, preparation of National Register of Historic Places nominations, her-

## Protect home when you go on vacation

**YOU PACKED UP YOUR** suitcase and booked your itinerary, but before you board the plane, take the time to protect your home while you're on vacation. July and August are popular vacation months, and not surprisingly, they're also the months when home burglaries peak.

To fully enjoy your trip, plan appropriate home security and maintenance with this checklist.

### Inside the house

- Set timers on interior lights. This goes a long way in deterring burglars, who often look for crimes of opportunity. Don't allow your house to appear as if no one is home.

- You never know if a power surge can occur, so be prepared. Disconnect the computer, TV, stereo and other electronics, or make sure they are plugged safely into a surge protector.

- Never broadcast your location on Facebook or Twitter. Even if you think that it's only your friends or colleagues viewing your online profiles, it's safest not to leave any sort of opening for a possible burglar.

- If you have an automatic security system in place, call your representative, announcing you'll be away from home for an extended period of time. Make sure the alarm is set properly when you leave.

- Secure valuables. If you don't already have your jewelry or other valuables in a safe deposit box, now might be the time to do so. Doing this also ensures that you don't leave out anything valuable in plain sight that a burglar might be able to see from a window.

- Set the HVAC. Set a programmable thermostat to lower your heat or air-conditioning use, and remember to change the thermostat's battery.

- Make sure pipes in vulnerable areas such as attics, basements, and crawlspaces are insulated. In unusually cold weather, set your thermostat at 55 degrees or above. Ask a neighbor or trusted friend to stop by and check on the house and periodically turn on the faucets to ensure the pipes don't freeze.

- It might seem obvious, but double-check just to be sure. Lock all doors and windows.

### Outside the house

- Arrange for lawn care. Have your landscaping tended to by a friendly neighbor or local service. Before you leave, trim tree branches that might allow access to a climbing burglar.

- Stop mail and newspaper deliveries or have them regularly picked up by a neighbor. Again, you don't want to easily clue in a burglar to your absence by the mounting newspapers on your doorstep.

- Plan some exterior lighting. Set these lights on timers.

- Don't leave spare keys outdoors.

- Lock the garage. Even if there is no entrance to your house from the garage, there's still a chance for numerous things to be stolen. Secure the door and any entrances to the garage.

## Safety isn't child's play

### It's important to kid-proof your home

Whether you are a parent or a grandparent, childproofing your home can help avoid injuries.

According to the National Safety Council (NSC), childproofing should be expanded beyond toddlers. More than a third of child injuries and deaths happen at home. Household injuries are among the top reasons kids younger than 3 end up in the emergency room, according to the NSC.

Kay DeWitt, director of Starting Points in Kingwood, said there are a number of ways to help keep the home safe for children. She said safety latches and locks for cabinets and drawers help prevent accidental poisonings and injuries.

"The door will only open far enough for an adult to release the latch," she said.

Starting Points is a nonprofit organization that includes a baby pantry, playgroups, the baby

safety shower program, spring and fall giveaways and other programs for the children and families of Preston County.

DeWitt said furniture anchors can prevent furniture and TVs from tipping over and possibly injuring a child. According to the American Academy of Pediatrics Studies, one child is treated ever 30 minutes for a TV-related injury.

"Be aware of what is in your home," DeWitt said. "Make sure the floors are picked up. If there is a speck on the floor, a child will find it." She said this includes pet food and any sharp objects.

The NSC recommends keeping button batteries and any devices that contain them out of reach of children. They can be fatal if swallowed.

DeWitt said cribs should be kept far enough from windows to prevent a child from reaching the blind cords. Babies and young children can get the cords around their necks and strangle.

She said another good investment is knob covers. The covers snap over door knobs to prevent young children from turning them.

Corner and edge bumpers can help prevent injuries from falls against sharp edges on walls, furniture and fireplaces.

"If you have plants in your home, make sure they are up high enough they are out of reach of children," DeWitt said. "Some house plants are poisonous. Keep the number of the Poison Control Center near your phone in case of an emergency."

Doctor, local police and volunteer fire department numbers should also be kept near the phone.

DeWitt said it's important to keep a first aid kit on hand. She also recommends parents and grandparents take first-aid classes, including CPR and age-appropriate Heimlich maneuver training.

"In our parenting class, we play a game with sad face and happy face," she said "We have

items like a med bottle, a dish liquid bottle (both empty) and a cookie. We have the children pick out the ones that are safe to touch from the ones that aren't."

She said scissors should be kept out of the reach of children.

"Teach children they are only for use when an adult is present," DeWitt said.

Keep guns out of reach of children. A 2005 study on adult firearm storage practices in U.S. homes found that more than 1.69 million children and youth under the age of 18 are living in homes with loaded and unlocked firearms, according to an NSC post from SmartGunLaws.org.

Your renovation agenda? Enacting a little reform in the kitchen. Our roster of designers has the sage advice to keep you on track.

**Julia Buckingham: Founder, Buckingham Interiors + Design, Chicago**

Do take advantage of the latest technology in electrical systems, audiovisual

and mechanicals. Newer systems save time, money, and increase the renovation's return on investment. The latest trends are in LED lighting, radiant flooring, televisions that pop up and move down, appliances integrated with smartphones and tablets or a refrigerator with an internet connection, touchscreen and camera to save recipes, watch cooking

videos, compose shopping lists. For healthfulness, consider a steam oven.

Don't enlarge the square footage if that means using lesser-priced, inferior materials. Keep the job small to add to the room's tastefulness, durability, sustainability. Timeless classics survive trends.

**Mick de Giulio: Founder, De Giulio Kitchen Design, Chicago**

Do heed the domino effect. One simple change may affect others. Consider all the ramifications. Example: You changed your double ovens to a free-standing range. Are you compensating for the loss of pot and pan storage at the cooking area?

Don't limit the dreaming process. Put together a wish list, prioritize goals, and consider dif-

ferent ways to achieve them. The most expensive line item of any project can be regret. You can cut back at the end before you proceed.

**Fred Wilson: Morgante-Wilson Architects, Chicago**

Do make the work space separate without traffic circulating through it. Visitors to your kitchen should be comfortable and

able to sit down, either at an island or breakfast table and be able to talk with you while you work in the kitchen.

Don't skimp on kitchen equipment. The price to upgrade to better appliances in the overall scheme of the cost of the kitchen is minimal. Get the appliances you want because you will use them every day.

# Spoutless watering can was invented around 1580

**EVER WONDER WHO INVENTED** the first watering can? When were small gardens numerous enough to have customers willing to pay for a better way to carry water to their plants?

Historic records say the first was a watering pot made in about 1580. It was a container with a handle and small holes in the bottom for the water to flow out. It was another 50 to 100 years before someone thought of adding a spout.

The earliest mention in print was in 1692, in Timothy Keeble's diary.

Early watering cans were made of pottery, then zinc, brass, copper, tin and other metals. They were bucket-shaped, then milk-can shaped and then funnel-shaped. More recently, there were small watering cans that hold liquid in a round ball shape with a spout.

Twentieth century watering cans can be plastic, tin or even canvas. Every shape includes a round hollow part that empties through a spout with tiny holes. It is called a "rose." It was the early 1900s before sprinkling cans were mass-produced and had a metal company's logo included on a tag or impression. And small collectible children's tin sprinkling cans with colorful decorations were first popular in the 1930s.

The most artistic sprinkling cans were made in the

Aesthetic style in the 19th century. The painted cans had decoupaged or painted birds, flowers and other outdoor designs. One sold at a Rago auction for \$214. It probably was used indoors.

**Q: I have a set of eight plates with center pictures of different flowers and gold trim. The plates are about six inches across. The letters on the back look like an "O" and "L." "Prove. Saxe" over the initials "E.S." I'd like to know who made these plates and how old they are.**

**A:** The initials "E.S." stand for Erdmann Schlegelmilch, and the mark on your plates is "Prov. Saxe," which was used by the Erdmann Schlegelmilch Porcelain Factory. The factory was founded by Leonard Schlegelmilch (1823-'98) and named for his father, Erdmann. It was in business in Suhl, Thuringia, Germany, from 1861-1937. The company made decorated and undecorated porcelain. The "Prov. Saxe" mark was used beginning in 1902, and was one of several marks used

by the company. The country of origin was required on items imported into the United States beginning in 1891. Since the mark on your plates doesn't include the word "Germany," they may have been made for local use. Some small plates with floral decoration have sold online for less than \$10.

**Q: We inherited an inventory of handwritten and typed jokes and scripts from Lucille Klinker, wife of Zeno Klinker, the head writer for Edgar Bergen and Charlie McCarthy. We would like to donate this material to someone interested in the collection or to a museum. Please let me know any information you can provide.**

**A:** Zeno Klinker (1900-'85) wrote jokes for two of Edgar Bergen's movies in the 1940s and for his radio program in the 1950s. He also wrote jokes for other radio shows. He and his sister designed a series of humorous greeting cards in the 1930s. He wrote the text and his sister did the illustrations. Charlie McCarthy, Edgar Bergen's dummy, is in the National Museum of American History at the Smithsonian Institution in Washington, D.C. (americanhistory.si.edu). The American Radio Archives at the Thousand Oaks Library

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# A modern remodel creates a geometric home

BELLEVUE, Wash. — On the crest of one of Bellevue's highest hills, a mesmerizingly modern form rises above treetops, horizontal lines stretching sideways from an exposed double-height stairway of diagonals and zigzags.

Floating, glowing, beckoning, there and in the covered entry court: more than a dozen unexpected, suspended spheres.

When enticing orbs invite you in, you really should go.

Given its lofty perch, "The approach needed to be dramatic," said architect Andrew van Leeuwen, who worked with the team at BUILD to design this inspired whole-home remodel

for a busy, lucky, family of four: Danny and Allison, and their two kids, ages 5 and 3. "A narrative of spheres was designed into the concept, and they create a sequence of experiences leading up to the front door and through the house. It sets up a rhythm of threes."

In the stairway: Six Graypants recycled cardboard lights lead visitors up the driveway and to the house. In the entry: Nine celestial glass spheres radiate above a welcoming Zen garden. Then, once inside: "A collection of 36 glass pendants draws the eye across the common areas and celebrates the dining area," van Leeuwen said.

There is a lot here to celebrate — including a refreshing approach to the more-challenging aspect of

that tall, steep Bellevue hill.

"The house reuses an existing foundation and reduces the footprint of the previous house," van Leeuwen says. "We built up rather than out, giving 650 square feet of land back to the yard, while capturing better views and daylight. There are so many views, you want to make sure the design doesn't eclipse any of them."

It does not. With three levels, 5,700 square feet, five bedrooms, five bathrooms and lower-level space for an aging parent, "The floor plan takes full advantage of a striking site while accommodating all the needs of a growing family," van Leeuwen said.

Danny and Allison "looked for years for the ideal property," Danny

said. "We were just starting a family and wanted a place that was kid-friendly." High up on the hill, they found fantastic neighborhood schools, quick highway access, all those views in every direction — and one rather imperfect, dark, T-shaped, split-level home from 1967.

"All the bedrooms were on the back side, with no view," says Danny. "We moved in for 1 1/2 years and got to know the property. But we became impatient in the creaky old house, and the kids kept tripping and falling on the sunken living and dining room."

In their newly light and bright, higher-up hilltop home, though, everything works with all shapes and for all sizes.

In the great room, a cen-

tering, shared space to enjoy views and family, an adaptable area between the living and dining areas serves as "a lounging place when we have company," says Danny and, otherwise, a play area often anchored by their daughter's portable pink castle. Exposed structural steel columns are striking design features — and, at kid level, handy magnetic boards. That otoman is soft and forgiving because, "The kids kept hitting themselves on the coffee table," Danny said. (Plus, inside, Allison reveals: light sabers.)

In the texture- and character-filled kitchen, Mistertio countertops from PentelQuartz "are marker-tested," Danny said. "We couldn't go with marble with the kids."

Right outside the kitchen, at the edge of a courtyard-like, low-maintenance yard with "lots of usable space for the kids to run around and play," Danny said, they grow their own plants and vegetables in three COR-TEN planters. "These are situated so we have been able to step outside and pluck some herbs in the middle of cooking."

On the lower level, the must-have playroom leads straight out to a backyard play area, and a little-bitty Fisher-Price exercise bike joins the grown-up gear in the gym.

There's one more critical rectangle, up high, to one side, open to the sky and deeply meaningful. Here, on the glorious upper-level ipe deck, design shapes what matters.

## Artist turns rundown auto shop into urban oasis home and studio

Then she stumbled into an apprenticeship that led her to start her own decorative painting and faux finishing company, Art Star Custom Paintworks, in 2002. Today her work can be seen in such places as the Sagamore Pendry hotel, Cinghiale restaurant and the new Hotel Revival.

Perhaps it is unsurprising that she lucked into her Mount Vernon home and studio, too.

"Luck has played a huge part in my life," said Walker, 42. "I'm still so blown away by my life and how this all happened."

An avid cyclist, Walker was out for a ride when she bumped into a friend who set it all in motion. At the time Walker was living in Hamilton, but her basement studio was too small for her large-scale works. The friend told her of a former auto garage that had already been semi-converted into a home.

"As soon as I walked in, I knew this was the place," Walker said. "It had everything I needed — showroom space, storage space, production space and parking, because we drive my trailer and two cars right into the building."

In 2013, she bought the property out of foreclosure. It had been abandoned for four years. Holding the keys, Walker panicked. Behind a screen of weeds there were some bullet holes in the walls, and the roof needed replacing. Although a portion of the interior was renovated, it was cut into two oddly configured apartments. All the exterior brick needed to be repointed and painted.

Luckily, Walker works in the trade and knew plenty of architects and designers who could give her advice. She removed the vestiges of the old apartments, creating a loft-like space with high ceilings and interesting niches. She did much of the renovation work herself with the help of a contractor friend, Brennan Gunther.

Bringing it all together is a point of pride: "I know where every part of this house came from. I saw it all come together, every detail," Walker said.

The once nondescript, even ramshackle, exterior is now a bright spot on the block, with its striking charcoal-colored brick painted Benjamin Moore's "Cheating Heart." The entry foyer is just as dramatic, featuring a mural by Walk-

er's favorite tattoo artist, who inked his design over gold foil Walker applied to the wall.

The entry empties into Walker's vast and busy studio. (In yet another karmic win, business has doubled since the move.) There's also a comfortable showroom seating area featuring a vintage sofa Walker silver leafed and side tables salvaged from the former Pazo restaurant. A spiral staircase leads to a rooftop oasis shaded by a large canvas canopy and protected by a 15-foot, horizontal wood privacy wall.

With her voluminous reserve of artistic energy, Walker finds it beneficial to have the studio next door. Yet when she crosses the threshold to the home portion of the building, that is a sanctuary for her, her partner, Tess Mosley, and their BARCS rescue kitty, Fern.

"This house is a work of art," Walker said. "It took a lot of creativity, including repurposing things that were already here."

In the master bath, for example, she kept an existing claw-foot tub and turned an inexplicable hole in the wall into a laundry chute. She also kept an accent wall in the front sitting room that's reminiscent of one of her own creations. Her new additions are a combination of splurges (new kitchen countertops) and bargains from Ikea (the kitchen cabinets). The powder room tile came from Home Depot, but Walker had it installed in a herringbone pattern that gives it a luxe look.

Walker also painstakingly hand-painted the floors. The guest bedroom features a lacry medallion pattern that is a feminine foil to the room's salvaged lumber accent wall. In the master bedroom, Walker painted the floor fuchsia, the same vibrant pink found in the Parkway Theatre lobby. Yet the walls are intentionally neutral to create a backdrop for the art the couple has begun collecting, like the large work overlooking the kitchen by New York-based Penn Eastburn. Another favorite work, the racy cowboys in the living room, Walker obtained in a trade with artist Renee Trevino for one of her original artworks.

With its concrete floors and exposed air ducts, the home has the feel of an industrial loft, so Walker added softening touches like the custom round dining table. A wood stove and firewood boxes, all built and installed by O.E. Custom, warm the space that, with its comfy red wing chairs, is Walker's favorite place to meditate, often with Fern.

In those moments when she isn't stressed or restless, she feels awe as she looks at her home. There's a methadone clinic just around the corner from her house, a reminder of how far she came.

LOS ANGELES — Zsa Zsa Gabor's longtime Bel-Air estate is on the market at \$23.45 million — more than twice what it sold for a year ago, \$10.45 million, public records show.

The French Regency-style mansion, built in 1955, sits on a 1-acre gated hilltop with views of downtown Los Angeles, Catalina Island and the ocean. It's being offered with permitted plans for a new 24,020-square-foot mansion designed by Los Angeles-based company Harrison Design.

Fronted by a large motor court, the mustard-yellow house has about 6,400 square feet of living space and 28 rooms that include a circular foyer, scaled formal rooms, staff quarters, an office and a butler's pantry off the kitchen. The living room features an antique French fireplace with a mirror surround.

Outside are a swimming pool, a gazebo and brick patios. A red-carpeted staircase leads up to a rooftop terrace.

Gabor, who died in 2016 at

99, bought the house in 1973 for \$280,000.

Reclusive magnate Howard Hughes and Elvis Presley are among former residents. Guests of the storied home, according to Frederic Prinz von Anhalt, Gabor's ninth husband, included Ronald and Nancy Reagan, Frank Sinatra, Henry Kissinger and both former Presidents Bush.

Gabor, remembered as a darling of the tabloids, was the best-known of three acting and socialite sisters from Hungary. She had scores of television and film appearances, including a star turn in the 1952 film "Moulin Rouge."

## Return from a listings hiatus

The lavish Century City penthouse of Jeffrey Klarik and David Crane, writers and producers who together co-created the Showtime series "Episodes," returned to market at \$29.9 million, the same price it originally listed for two years ago.

Klarik and Crane purchased the residence at the Century building eight years ago for about \$11.06 million and created an elaborate living space that evokes the Art Deco movement popularized during the 1920s and '30s.

Handpicked antiques and pe-

riod details pay homage to early ocean liners, including glass panels reclaimed from the Normandie.

Other features include bronze and alabaster sconces by French artist Albert Cheuret, Belgian black

marble floors and rosewood paneling. In the living room is a piano once owned by jazz bandleader Paul Whiteman.

The 5,320-square-foot penthouse, offered fully furnished, comprises seven rooms

that include a center hall, a library/study, a formal dining room, two bedrooms and three bathrooms. There are fireplaces in the master bedroom and living room.

An expansive terrace of about 600 square feet extends the living space outdoors. Views take in the city lights and mountains. Klarik has writing and producing credits that include the shows "Mad About You," "Half & Half" and "The Class." Crane is known for his work on the long-running sitcom "Friends" as well as the spinoff series "Joey" and the show "Veronica's Closet." The couple are selling the property because they now work primarily overseas.

## 'X' marks the sale above Sunset

Producer-screenwriter Simon Kinberg, whose credits include the most recent "X-Men" films, has cut a deal above the Sunset Strip, selling an East Coast-inspired home for \$7.87 million.

Split between the main home and a guesthouse are five bedrooms and 7.5 bathrooms in 6,300 square feet. Out back, the two structures border a gated pool area with a lawn, infinity pool and spa.

Modern chandeliers and wide-plank wood floors set a sophisticated tone in the foyer. Further in, a bright open floor plan encompasses a living room with a fireplace, an eat-in kitchen with marble and quartz countertops, a formal dining room and

an indoor-outdoor family room.

There are plenty of other amenities as well, including a wood-paneled wine room, a theater and a second-story office. Also upstairs is the master suite, under beamed ceilings, which opens to balconies from the sitting area and bathroom.

Kinberg bought the property through a trust three years ago for \$8.4 million, records show. The 2015 house was most recently listed for \$8.4 million.

Kinberg, 44, grabbed an Oscar nomination for producing "The Martian" in 2015 and produced "Mr. & Mrs. Smith," "Jumper" and "Elysian." His directorial debut, "Dark Phoenix," is set for release early next year.

## Back, back up the moving van

A.J. McLean, of Backstreet Boys fame, offered up his spot in Westlake Village. The asking price is \$2.495 million, about half a million more than what he paid for the Mediterranean-style home three years ago.

The property spans three-quarters of an acre in a gated community. Through the 2001 home's arched entry, a formal foyer filled with wrought-iron rails opens to the common areas.

First-floor living spaces — which include a large living room with a fireplace, a chandelier-topped dining room and a center-island kitchen — are lined with wood molding.

A curved stairway with steps of Spanish

tile leads upstairs, where there's an indoor-outdoor bonus room with pocketing doors and a stone fireplace.

The second story also holds the master suite, one of five bedrooms and 5.5 bathrooms in the 5,330-square-foot interior. It boasts a step-up tub and sitting room.

The backyard, a grassy space populated with palms, is taken in from an upper balcony. In addition to a pool and spa, the grounds contain a fountain, a covered patio and a deck that offers mountain views.

McLean, 40, co-founded the Backstreet Boys in 1993, and the five-piece boy band went on to find worldwide success in the 1990s and early 2000s.

The group has hits that include "Don't Go Breaking My Heart," "As Long as You Love Me" and "I Want It That Way."

## Making an out in the valley

Los Angeles Dodgers outfielder Yasiel Puig let go of a base in the San Fernando Valley, selling his gated home in Sherman Oaks for \$1.98 million.

The Mediterranean-villa-style home, built in 2003, has six bedrooms and six bathrooms within its more than 4,600 square feet of living space. Among features are high ceilings, stone floors and a two-story entry with a sweeping wrought-iron staircase. Open-plan living and dining rooms share a wet bar.

A second-floor balcony and ample patio space extend the living space outdoors, where the grounds hold a built-in barbecue and a swimming pool with a spa. Lush landscaping and privacy hedges fill out the 7,800-square-foot lot.

Puig bought the place through a trust four years ago for \$1.8 million, records show.

Puig, 27, has hit .262 with nine home runs in 73 games for the Dodgers this year as of Friday. The Cuban-born player was an all-star in his second season (2014). Last year, he won the Wilson Defensive Player of the Year honor after finishing tied for first among National League right-fielders, with 18 defensive runs saved.

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# Designers looking skyward for their inspiration

Designer Lee Broom was vacationing at a friend's house in the Cotswolds, an idyllic bit of rural England.

"I'm a city boy, brought up in the Midlands and living in London for the past 25 years, so had never really experienced that intense blanket of stars that you find on a beautiful, clear night in the countryside, with the constellations so clearly marked," he said.

Broom was so captivated that when he got home, he began designing a lighting collection named Observatory. It debuted at Salone di Mobile in Milan in the

spring, then Broom brought the collection to NYCxDesign 2018. It goes on to London's Design Festival in September.

The designs interpret the characteristics of sun and star reflection and light refraction in sculptural, spherical forms. Mirror-polished stainless steel and gold spheres are incorporated with concealed LEDs and acrylic discs and tubes, creating light sculptures in the form of pendants, table lamps and wall sconces. The names pay homage to the heavens: Eclipse, Orion, Tidal, Aurora.

The firmament has often

been a source of inspiration for decor and furniture designers, and we're seeing lots of examples right now. Part of the appeal lies in a moody, dramatic palette of blues, blacks and spectral hues, as well as silhouettes that evoke a modernist elan.

London-based designer Katja Behre presented a new wallpaper at the International Contemporary Furniture Fair this spring in New York for her Elli Popp line. A matte black background is dotted with vertical, metallic threads, like a meteor shower, or falling rain against a night sky.

New Yorker Sarah Merenda

did a clean, crisp, eight-point-star-patterned wallpaper that's offered in several colorways on a white or black background.

Brooklyn, N.Y.-based Calico Wallpaper offers several celestial-themed designs. Lunar is has fog, smoke- and midnight-hued backgrounds with silver overlay that evoke the moon's surface as seen through a telescope. Aurora, with a soothing palette in an ombre pattern, depicts the sky's constant transformation from dawn to dusk. And Inverted Spaces, a collaboration with Amsterdam's BCXSY

studio, transforms telescopic imagery of constellations into abstracted, matte-painted images. Even this collection's color names take us on a journey into the universe: Corona, Andromeda, Ursa, Cassiopeia.

Health Ceramics, a studio in Sausalito, Calif., has a new glaze — Cosmos — that evokes deep space and star-filled galaxies for a vase collection. The swirling mixture of dark and light blues and glossy black create the effect.

There are more starry ceramics at West Elm: A collection of inky blue salad plates is scattered with pin-

points of gold constellations.

Avant-garde Italian design house Seletti collaborated with Diesel Living on a porcelain plate collection, Cosmic, with patterns evoking Jupiter, Venus, the sun and the moon. Also from Seletti: The whimsical Lunar brass tabletop storage containers shaped like retro spaceships.

Luceplan took home an NYCxDesign award in May for Norwegian designer Daniel Rybakken's Amisol, an oversize pendant fixture composed of translucent white film or metallized mirror stretched inside an aluminum circle.

# Bungalow displays couple's beautiful, eclectic collections

ST. LOUIS — Twenty-three years ago, when John Nellesen and Craig Burfield were looking for a house to move into together, they looked at about 100 houses.

Nothing seemed right.

Months later, they ended up back at the first house they toured, a bungalow along Bellerive Boulevard in St. Louis' Carondelet neighborhood that they thought was out of their price range. When the price came down, they returned.

Nellesen loved the stonework and tile roof. Burfield loved the porch. In warmer months, they spend their time relaxing on the front porch, greeting neighbors and enjoying the trees in the park-like median.

The house, about 2,200 square feet, was built in 1926 and designed by prominent St. Louis architect Preston Bradshaw, who designed the Mayfair Hotel in downtown St. Louis and the Chase Hotel. He designed this house for personal friends. Bellerive was developed as a residential subdivision beginning in 1910.

The house had been renovated over the years. The wood trim and picture rails remained, and hardwood floors had been preserved under blue shag carpet. Nellesen and Burfield stripped wallpaper, ripped out drop ceilings and painted over bright, "Pepto Bismol colors," as Nellesen puts it. "It just needed tender, loving care," he said.

Stained-glass windows with a grape motif had been removed from the dining room to make room for an air conditioning unit. They replaced the windows when they added central air conditioning; original floor plans to the house note the windows originally cost \$5.

Both men collect antiques, artwork, statuary and anything interesting that strikes them. Nearly every piece has a story: the clay vessel Burfield's mom, a flight attendant in the 1950s, brought back from Peru. The single, brass bed with the flowers and cherubs that used to be Nellesen's baby crib. The marble bust of a little girl (they nicknamed her "Nancy") found at an estate sale that Nellesen cleaned with Aim toothpaste because it was covered in nicotine.

They enjoy shopping estate sales and antiques stores but not as much as they used to — the house is full. "I

bring home things, and I don't let him know," Burfield says. "But he doesn't know that I know," Nellesen stage-whispered.

There are about 35 clocks in the house, and even with daylight saving time, they keep them ticking. "The 'fall back' is the horrible one," said Burfield, laughing, noting that it's harder than simply moving the hands forward one hour.

The house is warm and inviting, and the pair want it that way. They enjoy hosting dinner parties and bought a dining room table that seats 10 in order to accommodate a 10-person supper club they were once a part of. They still host holidays and other get-togethers and can serve significantly more than 10: they have 32 sets of China, and each set can feed 10 or more. The kitchen, which they renovated three years ago, has a large pantry that stores the china.

The house has three upstairs bedrooms, a bathroom with a tub and shower, a central hallway large enough to accommodate a table in the center and a sleeping porch. One bedroom is the master and another has a couch and television and is their more relaxed hangout area.

A third, smaller bedroom is the "Royal Room," Burfield's favorite, where he keeps his collection of royal-family-themed memorabilia. His father was from England, and he still has family there. One of the oldest collections is a set of Queen Victoria glazed metal cups from her jubilee in 1887. One of the newest items is a ceramic container for Prince William and Catherine Middleton's wedding. Burfield was in London at the time but will be in New York for the next royal wedding in May.

Nellesen's favorite room is in the back of the house, a former upstairs sleeping porch now known as the "Orchid Room." Several of his orchid plants thrive in the south-facing windows, including a huge plant that's 35 years old and produces huge purple corsage blooms every September. Nellesen enjoys naps on the room's couch, and crystals hung in the windows catch the sunlight and send its rays dancing across the room.

Now that Nellesen is newly retired, the couple is looking forward to hosting more dinner parties. They're also looking forward to warmer weather, so they can sit on the front porch and enjoy what drew them to their home in the first place.

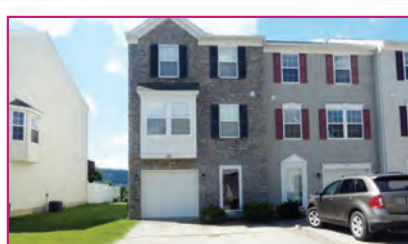

## Perennials need care too

The great attraction in growing perennial flowers is that you never have to replant them, at least in theory. This doesn't make all perennials care-free, though. Few of them let you just sit back to enjoy them year after year once they're planted.

Take coreopsis, for example, a wonderful perennial that ends its first flush of bright yellow blossoms around midsummer. Like a number of other perennial flowers, coreopsis can be overly exuberant in some gardens — mine, for instance. Right now, the plants are threatening to take over the whole flower bed in which they were planted.

Coreopsis spreads very effectively by self-sown seeds and by roots that travel underground and then send up shoots ("suckers") some distance from the mother plant. Both seedlings and root suckers are beginning to elbow out dianthus and other more sedate neighbors.

Agastache (sometimes known as anise hyssop), also in that bed, is one plant that can stand up to coreopsis. As a matter of fact, agastache is so aggressive that I might call it a weed, tempting me to remove it altogether once and for all. Like coreopsis, it spreads by seeds and suckering roots. As I pull on those licorice-minty stems, though, their aroma beckons me to

leave in at least a few plants. I give in.

Fortunately, keeping agastache, coreopsis, and similarly exuberant perennials in line is satisfyingly easy. A quick tug on a stem or two will wrench a wayward plant from the ground, roots and all, causing little disturbance to nearby plant roots. (Tug on too many stems at once and they don't release so easily, or they pull along too big a clump of soil.)

If I did want to plant more of any of these perennials, those dislodged stems re-establish quickly at a new site or in flower pots to plant out later.

Oriental poppy is another perennial needing some attention in summer. Excess plants may need to be weeded out, but — more important — this plant needs tidying up. Oriental poppy dies back in summer, so I cut back the sad-looking, dying flower stalks and leaves and cart them over to the compost pile.

I mentioned that dianthus is well-behaved, yet even this plant needs some attention. Shearing back the stems now that the first flush of bloom is past helps coax another flush of bloom this season or, at least, better bloom next year.

Shearing stimulates growth of new, flower-bearing stems and diverts energy that otherwise would go into ripening seeds to new growth and blossoms.

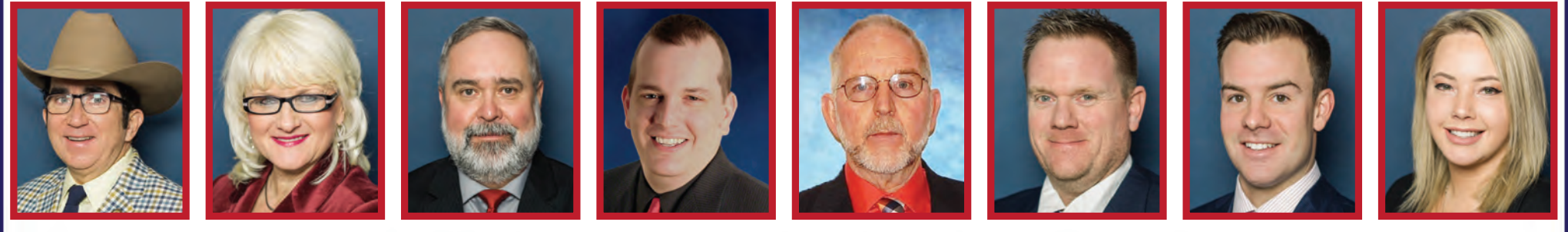

## QX80 Gets New Look

### Massive Infiniti SUV Updated Inside, Out For 2018

Infiniti's gigantic, smooth-riding SUV, the QX80, gets a new look that makes it slightly less polarizing this year.

Long defined by its love-it-or-hate-it snub nose, Infiniti is hoping refreshed styling will move the QX80 into the "love" column for more buyers.

The hood is longer and higher now, giving it a more upright, truck-like look, and its previously rotund curves have been replaced by gentle, sleek creases. Its overall look is more contemporary now.

Still, you don't have to look hard to see within those pretty new lines echoes of its close corporate relative, the Nissan Armada. And that raises the chief question about the biggest Infiniti: is it worth the premium over its Nissan cousin?

If the Armada Platinum, priced at \$59,190, weren't such a competent product, the decision would be easier. With the similarly polished base QX80 priced at \$64,750, and considerably more once you start adding content packages, it's a tougher choice.

Infiniti makes its case to keep buyers off the Nissan lot — not to mention Lincoln, Cadillac and GMC — with two key selling points: a premium feel and sumptuous cabin.

Every time I drive a QX80 I'm struck by just how brilliantly it nails how a luxury SUV should ride. It unapologetically isolates

you from the road in the tradition of Rolls-Royce or the great American luxury barges of the past. It's not trying to be sporty or thrilling. There's no pretension of athleticism.

Instead, there's just silence. It really is one of the quietest, smoothest riding vehicles I've ever been in. Combine that with its chromed and creased body of heroic proportions, and it carries

the aura that any good luxury car needs to stand out.

Its cabin plays the upscale role to perfection, too.

Soft, perforated and quilted leather on the seats, door panels

and armrests give it the air of a hand-crafted English sedan, despite being a body-on-frame SUV built in Japan with that country's characteristic mechanical perfection.

The refreshed cabin includes more storage space, including much-appreciated smartphone and tablet stowage in the center console.

Just as before, power comes from a gigantic V8 engine, something that gives me mixed feelings.

On one hand, I can't complain about the performance. Acceleration is brisk and effortless with 400 horsepower at your disposal, and towing capacity of 8,500 pounds means it can do a lot more than run errands around town.

On the other hand, big V8s are going extinct for a reason. The QX80's two-wheel-drive fuel economy ratings of 14 mpg in the city and 20 on the highway explain why many competitors are putting smaller, often turbo-charged, engines in their full-size SUVs.

For an over-the-top driving experience, though, it's hard to beat the feeling of a rumbling eight cylinders under the hood of a supple, incredibly roomy, luxury machine like this.

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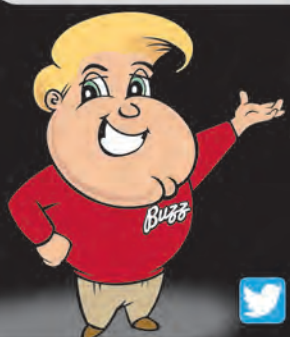
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# Know Your RV's Limitations

To have a fun and safe trip in your recreation vehicle, it's crucial to understand its limitations. When traveling, you will likely encounter potential hazards regarding an RV's height, width or weight. Stay alert while driving to avoid dangerous situations that could cut your trip short or cause expensive repairs.

## KNOW YOUR HEIGHT LIMITS

You may have no problems with clearance levels in your local area; perhaps each overpass or bridge is clearly marked with height limitations. But traveling in an RV is about creating memories in new and exciting places. Some of these new areas you explore may not be so gracious to drivers and leave their overhead obstructions unmarked.

Make sure you understand the exact height of your RV — including the air

conditioning unit if it is mounted on top. If you second-guess having enough room to pass safely, don't chance it; try and find an alternate route to get to your destination. It's also a good idea to be wary of pulling your RV into lines at the drive-thrus of banks, fast-food restaurants and gas stations. The risk of serious damage to your vehicle or structures can put a quick stop to your vacation.

**KNOW YOUR WEIGHT LIMITS** DMV.org suggests the storage capac-

ity in most RVs offer a number of possibilities for proper weight distribution. Be careful to not overload and ensure the weight on both left and right sides are equal. It can be easy to tell if an adjustment is necessary while turning and maneuvering in traffic. DMV.org also reports that dangerous consequences like a tire failure is possible when an RV is overloaded. They recommend weighing your vehicle on a commercial scale before departure and pay attention to proper inflation pressures stamped on your tires.

## KNOW YOUR WIDTH LIMITS

When purchasing an RV, the allure of a plush and spacious interior can make you fall in love and invest in the model. Don't forget to consider how these large cabins affect the overall size of a vehicle.

In fact, the American Automobile Association reports most states require recreational vehicles to be under eight-and-a-half feet wide or less to travel legally. If your vehicle is larger, you may have to carry an over-size-load limit.

# Does changing one tire mean changing them all?

**Q. I remember years ago when we had a flat tire, we were told we had to purchase three new tires to match the new one or the car would be unstable. This was a great burden to us as young marrieds, and I was always suspicious of that advice. I've not heard that advice for years. Now my granddaughter in Denver is being told the same thing. Is that valid advice, or just the tire businesses hoping to make more money? Thanks so much for your attention!**

A. This recommendation may be valid in some cases but not all. All-wheel drive vehicles require all four tires

to be very close in diameter and identically inflated to avoid causing heat, stress and wear of driveline components. Depending on the manufacturer, the maximum tread depth deviation between tires is approximately 2/32 inch and 4/32 inch. Let's say your four tires are worn to 50 percent of their original 13/32-inch tread depth and one becomes damaged beyond repair. Purchasing an identical new tire

is the best choice, but you'd be out of specs on the tread-depth difference. Rather than being hustled to renew the other three, it is possible to have the new tire shaved to match the others (it may take some searching to obtain this service). This hurts but is preferable to buying four new ones.

On a typical two-wheel drive vehicle, it's best to have all four tires be the same size, speed and load rating, tread style and compound to insure optimum road handling. In cases where an exact match (brand and model) can't be obtained for a single replacement tire, some will opt for as close a copy as possible. Others will tell you

to replace in pairs, or all four. I don't believe the difference in tread depth is an issue unless the remaining three are worn below 50 percent tread. If you replace a pair of tires, mount the new ones on the rear. The reasoning is if driving in rain and hydroplaning becomes an issue, it's better to have the front tires lose traction than the rears. This seems counterintuitive, but understeer is easier to correct for than oversteer. Releasing the throttle and perhaps braking lightly helps restore front traction, along with additional turning effort in order to stay on track. Should the rear tires lose traction, the vehicle is more likely to

spin, which is difficult if not impossible to manage.

**Q. My driver's side power window has stopped going up at times. This has me worried as I might not be able to lock my truck, which I work from. Any ideas? It's a 2011 GMC with 174K miles. New window motor? Switch? Thanks.**

— Adam B.

A. Try this the next time it quits: Hold the switch in the up position continuously and slowly sweep the opened door throughout its range. If nothing happens, try repeatedly operating the button as you move the door. If the window begins to function, even briefly, it's likely

one of the wires in the plastic conduit bringing wires to the door is breaking and intermittently making connection. This is not uncommon in vehicles that see a lot of door action, particularly the driver's door. If the window reliably goes down, and up is the only concern, it's not the motor. A scan tool test would be the next step, to prove out the switch request. Also, any other faults with other windows, mirrors or such at this same time? This might also hint at the broken wire theory.

# Engine braking best for hills, regular braking better for everyday driving

**Q: My friend was telling me how he went down a mountain using only engine braking on an automatic transmission car. Is that wise? Seems like a lot of stress is put on a lot of expensive transmission and engine parts versus the brakes, which were designed to slow down and stop the car.**

A. Actually, engine braking saves wear and tear, especially on the brakes. When the brakes are constantly applied, they get very hot — in some cases hot enough to make the brake rotors glow red. Engine braking, on the oth-

er hand, turns the engine into a pump that operates not unlike a storm door closer. Air is pumped into the cylinders and out the exhaust and, above a predetermined throttle-off speed, no fuel is injected. The transmission remains in a lower gear so the clutches suffer no wear. Modern, multispeed (eight, 10 or more) transmission cars even use engine braking to maintain

the cruise control.

**Q: A couple of years ago I remember reading one of your columns where someone asked you whether it was better to slow down a car by putting it in a lower gear or by using brakes. Your response was that brakes are much cheaper, so use the brakes. I've never seen any studies that show that trans braking has an effect on the life of a transmission. Have you? If you live where there are serious hills or mountains, you can overheat your brakes and they'll stop working. Going down a hill of more than a half mile, it's always a good idea to use**

both the trans and brakes.

A: As you may have noted from the previous item, you're right. In traffic and stop-and-go situations, we suggest using the brakes only. You may need to stop suddenly. Although we have not seen any studies on transmission wear, we have seen it firsthand back in the days when we were turning wrenches for a living. A brake job is far cheaper than a transmission job. However, modern electronically controlled transmissions are far more robust.

**Q: Back in the '90s, many Dodge Caravans and other Chrysler mini-**

vans seemed to have rear tires that were not perpendicular to the road. The lower part of the tire splayed outward and the top of the tire/wheel was a bit inward. Just saw it again on a foreign sports car. Is that my imagination or not? And if I am accurate, do not such tires wear off on the inside very, very fast?

A: The condition you refer to is called negative camber — inward tilt of the top of the tire.

There are plenty of discussions about negative rear camber for performance driving, but for

those of us schlepping the kids from school to practice to violin lessons there is a safety concern. In a turn, the vehicle body rolls and, when it does, negative camber increases the tire's contact patch — the amount of rubber touching the road. This helps stabilize the vehicle and reduce oversteer. Excessive negative camber does wear the inner shoulders of the tires, but some think it looks cool.

# Government report accuses agency of inadequate recall monitoring

DETROIT — An investigation has found that the U.S. government's highway safety agency failed to act quickly on a consumer complaint, and that could have delayed recalls of dangerous Takata air bag inflators.

A report by the Transportation Department's Inspector General also found that the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration process for monitoring car and truck recalls isn't adequate. And the report released Wednesday says the agency isn't verifying recall completion rates reported by automakers or

making sure manufacturers file proper documents.

"Overall, inadequate controls and processes for verifying and collecting manufacturer-reported information have hindered NHTSA's ability to oversee safety recall implementation," the inspector general wrote.

The safety agency responded with a statement Wednesday saying that it had taken "unprecedented actions to ensure public safety is prioritized," including improvements to search functions on its Takata recall website, and that it continues to improve its processes.

Sen. Bill Nelson of Florida, the ranking Democrat on a committee that over-

sees NHTSA, said the report is cause for the Senate not to confirm Deputy Administrator Heidi King as NHTSA's leader.

"This is further evidence that the federal auto safety regulator isn't doing enough to protect the public," he said in a statement.

The report is one of at least three in recent years criticizing the agency for its oversight of recalls. Investigations have discovered NHTSA shortcomings in the large recalls involving faulty General Motors small-car ignition switches and unintended acceleration involving Toyota vehicles. A 2011 report by the Government Accountabili-

ty Office recommended that NHTSA develop plans to use data collected on recalls to analyze patterns and trends. That recommendation is still open, according to the inspector general's report.

In the Takata case, the inspector general said that NHTSA managers did not make sure their staff sufficiently monitored repairs or the size of recalls before the agency and Takata reached a broad recall agreement in May of 2015. The agency did not act quickly on an August 2013 consumer complaint that indicated the Takata recalls didn't cover enough vehicles. The inaction "may have

delayed recalls of affected vehicles," the report said.

Takata uses the chemical ammonium nitrate to create a small explosion and inflate air bags in a crash. But the chemical can deteriorate when exposed to high heat and humidity and burn too fast, blowing apart a metal canister designed to contain the explosion. That can hurl shrapnel into drivers and passengers. At least 23 people have been killed and about 300 injured worldwide because of the problem, which forced Takata into bankruptcy protection.

The problem touched off the largest series of recalls in U.S. automotive history covering 37 million vehi-

cles and more than 50 million vehicles.

The inspector general found that NHTSA's "minimal action" to address low Takata recall completion rates "may have contributed to the slow implementation of these recalls between 2008 and 2015."

The report recommendations include having NHTSA develop a process to monitor reporting of recall repairs, the size of recalls and the risk of the defects. It said the process should include taking "appropriate steps" with manufacturers that don't obey recall rules, "including enforcement actions when necessary."

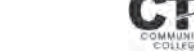

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# Out on a limb

Because I have acrophobia, which means I am afraid of being any higher off the ground than the top of my head, I could never imagine being a tree trimmer.

It's a condition I share with Ralph Serrano, who owns a tree company but is, unlike his brave and acrobatic employees, afraid of heights.

Even though I was standing on terra firma, which is Latin for "the ground you will land on, and then be buried under, if you fall out of a tree," I was dizzy just watching one of the crew members from Aspen Tree Service of Long Island, N.Y.,

who came over recently to trim some dead branches from a couple of big oaks in my backyard.

The man on the flying trapeze was Lucio, a sinewy and fearless 19-year-old who attached a pair of spikes to his boots and breezed up the larger of the trees until he reached a height that would give a squirrel vertigo.

As I jerked my head to look up, which made me not only a jerk but a pain in my own neck, Lucio waved for me to get out of the way. And no wonder: I was standing directly beneath a branch so massive that if it crashed onto my dense skull, I would have had a year's worth of firewood, the result being

that the house would have burned to the ground because, unfortunately, I don't have a fireplace.

After I had backed safely away, Lucio revved up his chainsaw and started cutting the branch.

Sawdust rained from the sky, covering my noggin and giving me a bad case of woody dandruff.

A minute later, the branch fell, its descent slowed to a gentle thud by a rope that was attached and handled by one of the other four crew members.

Lucio, a rope around him, too, swung to another branch and then to the adjacent oak, felling more lifeless limbs before gliding

back down, a smile on his face and nary a drop of sweat on his brow.

I fainted.

"He's good," said Miguel, the foreman of the crew, which cut up the downed limbs.

"Aren't you afraid to be up so high?" I asked Lucio. He shook his head and said, "I like it."

When I met Ralph, I told him that his workers were fantastic.

"They're braver than I am," he said. "The first time I saw them go up, I said, 'You guys are nuts.' You couldn't pay me to do that."

Ralph, who worked for another tree company before founding Aspen 20

years ago, recalled the first time he did a pruning job.

"I started to climb," he said. "It took me about an hour. The homeowner was staring at me. 'What are you trying to do?' he asked. I couldn't even get up the tree. I had to come back with a regular climber. I was petrified. Now I leave it to my guys to do the job."

"If tree climbing were an Olympic sport, Lucio would win a gold medal," I said.

"It's definitely a circus act," said Ralph, who's 57.

"And the height of your profession," I noted.

Ralph nodded and said, "We have plenty of puns. When people ask how business is, I'll say, 'We're

branching out.' And we always go out on a limb for our customers."

"You don't," I reminded him.

"Not literally," Ralph said. "But I make sure to give them good service."

"So you're not a bump on a log," I said.

"No," he replied. "But we do haul logs away. And we offer free wood chips."

"Is that your stump speech?" I asked.

"Now it is," Ralph said.

I thanked him for a great job and told him to give Lucio and the other guys a raise.

"When it comes to tree trimming," I said, "they're a cut above."

# Meet the neighborhood's Clean Team

COLUMBIA, S.C. — If you live in the Rosewood neighborhood or commute along Rosewood Drive, you may have seen Clayton Woodward on his morning rounds.

He's the man dressed in a yellow shirt emblazoned with "Clean Team" on the back, picking up trash on Rosewood Drive from Harden Street to South Kilbourne Road.

Woodward likes to get started early in the morning, around 6 or 7 a.m., and walks the 3-mile round-trip route armed with a bucket and grabber. He picks up all sorts of litter — from cigarette butts and food wrappers to pieces off automobiles that have wrecked and garage sale signs.

"People like to put signs up, they just don't take them down. That's where I

come in."

Woodward began doing his clean-up duty about three years ago, after returning home to Columbia.

The daily route along Rosewood was under way for several months before Dave Britt, executive director of the Rosewood Merchants Association, was told about Woodward and offered to pay him for his work. In addition to picking up litter, Britt said Woodward reports and removes any un-permitted signs and notifies the Merchants Association of any graffiti in the area.

Woodward has been officially working for the Rosewood Merchants Association for about two years, around 10 hours a week, a couple of hours each day.

Woodward grew up in the Rockbridge area in northeast Columbia — he

and his twin sister attended Richland District 2 schools. She graduated from Spring Valley High School in 1975.

An admitted "goofball" in school, Woodward went to Camden Military Academy for his senior year, where he says he learned a lot. The class size at Camden was considerably smaller than at Spring Valley — 34 young men at the military school compared to a class of 760 at the public school.

While his sister went on to college, Woodward said he'd had enough and started work, driving delivery trucks of building materials. He joined the Air National Guard in 1978.

The Woodward children lost their father in a fire in 1980, and Clayton left the Guard for a little while.

He joined the U.S. Army in 1982 and was stationed at Fort Benning, Georgia. ("A

great place," he says).

"I did my three years of service and then I got out."

Woodward decided to move out of state for a while, "just to do something a bit different." He met some other former servicemen but the job prospects weren't panning out as he thought they might. While in Pittsville, Maryland, Woodward was hit by a truck while riding his bicycle and almost died.

"They had to (re)start my heart. I had a collapsed lung. I woke up five days later in the ICU... after a month, I recovered from that and told my sister that I'd like to come home to Columbia."

Before he could do that, though, Woodward had to take care of himself.

He admits that he has had trouble with alcohol.

He ended up spending

some time at his sister's house at Pawleys Island. "They didn't believe that I'd quit drinking," Woodward said.

He stayed there about a month, sober, and hasn't had a drink since April 1, 2013, he said. He came back to Columbia to help take care of his mother, moving into the family home on Heyward Street.

"She couldn't believe that I was sober and a Christian," he said.

Woodward and his mother had six months together before she passed away in her sleep, on April 1, 2014. "She'd never really seen me sober in a long time," he says. "It was just such a blessing that I had six months with her before she went to be with the Lord."

Woodward has been working along Rosewood for about three years. "I like being outside," he said, "I

like being around people.

"When I first started working, the shirt said 'Dream Team' and a lot of folks would stop and say 'Hey! Dream Team, I want to get on that. What do y'all do?' I'd tell them I'm the only person on the team and it was a dream job for me to get it, so I guess that's where the 'Dream' came from.

"After about six months, my boss noticed the back of the shirt and said 'that's supposed to be Clean!'"

Woodward said that not as many people approach him since Dream became Clean, but that's OK.

On his Wednesday morning rounds, Woodward had a couple of people honk and wave from passing cars.

Woodward is close to the end of his route when he turns and says, "I'll do this as long as they let me.

"It's been a blessing."

# Homegirl Cafe has 'platos' by ex-gang members with hope

LOS ANGELES — In a different time, at another place, and under other circumstances, you might have run away from Latisha Valenzuela and Glenda Alvarenga. But at Homegirl Cafe, a Los Angeles breakfast and lunch spot with a Latino twist, the two waitresses welcome you with smiles and friendship.

"You alone?" Valenzuela asked when I recently visited. "Don't worry. We'll keep you company." After seating me, she tells me, "you'll want our cinnamon coffee. We make it ourselves." She says it as if we've been friends since middle school.

Here, in the City of Angels, Homegirl Cafe offers a unique dining experience with food prepared by former gang members gaining new skills. It's a haven for them, to be sure. But the popular cafe in the city's Chinatown is a special place for visitors, too, providing carefully crafted meals along with inspiration from ex-inmates who willingly tell stories about how they are seeking a better life.

And where these hands once hurt others, now they are steering their energies to serve pleasurable, satisfying dishes made with love and perseverance.

The hip cafe is an offshoot of the Homeboy Industries social enterprises founded by Jesuit priest Greg Boyle. After working in one of the city's poorest and most gang-plagued regions, he quickly found out that businesses wouldn't hire former gang members and inmates, even when they had marketable skills. So, he formed nonprofit businesses aimed at giving jobs and training to the "least of these," as the poor and vulnerable are described in Scripture.

He formed Homeboy tortillas, Homeboy bakery and then, Homegirl Cafe.

Trainees learn all aspects of culinary arts while developing social skills that create tender encounters with visitors. In addition to job training, the

former gang members can take advantage of tattoo removal, anger management classes and drug treatment.

Former enemies become friends. Instead of trading gunshots, they shoot playful texts to each other. That tenderness is passed along to customers, who include writers, lawyers, actors and teachers.

When a new staffer shows up, "you can tell she's scared and ready to fight," Alvarenga told me during my visit. "We make sure we hug her and show nothing but love. Most of the time, they just start crying."

Plates like the chilaquiles — fresh crisp tortilla chips tossed with warm tomatillo salsa, egg, crema fresca, and queso cotija — are made from ingredients that come from urban farms. The Manoy's, a sandwich made of braised shredded chicken prepared Central American-style with pickled cabbage, onions and mayonnaise, is another unique option. The homegirls can tell you exactly how it's prepared.

In addition to the food are the stories.

Boyle has told this one many

times in speeches, interviews and his latest book: Actress Diane Keaton once came in for brunch with a guest. A waitress, a former gang member who'd spent time in prison, went to serve her. Keaton asked for advice on platos and the waitress gave her suggestions. Then, it hit the waitress. "Wait, I feel like I know you," the waitress reportedly said. "You so look familiar."

"Oh I don't know," Keaton said. "I must have that face."

"No. Now I know," the waitress said. "We were locked up together!"

The story always gets a laugh, but Boyle retells it to highlight the power of kinship, and how a former gang member and an Oscar winner connected in a most unlikely place.

Boyle has authored two books, and his inspirational quotes are on T-shirts and fliers around the cafe. To some of the homies, he's the first person who ever showed them unconditional love without judgment.

"Ah man, when Father Boyle walks down the street and into this place ... people follow him like Jesus," said Erika Carlos, a woman who spent eight years in prison who now helps run the gift shop. "All the homies want him to give them a blessing."

At the gift shop, visitors can buy an array of Homeboy Industries or Homegirl Cafe shirts, hoodies, hats and bags. The clothing is designed by former gang members who are being taught new job skills. Workers like Carlos are happy to share their stories, or those of others who inspired them.

After my first visit, I returned for a Mother's Day special with my Texas-born mother, father and sister. My mother, who was abandoned briefly as a baby before being adopted by an immigrant woman from Mexico, recognized immediately that she was among the forgotten and feared.

"This feels like home," she told Valenzuela.

Valenzuela smiled, then replied, "You are home."

## Hiring right person calls for diligence

Dear Dave, I own a small business with two employees, and I have a bit of a hiring conundrum. I'm looking at two candidates for a position, and on paper they're evenly matched. I've interviewed each of them four times, and I'm still undecided. I was hoping you had an idea for determining which is best for the job.

Dear Bryan, As an entrepreneur, that's a great problem to have. I'm glad you understand the wisdom of interviewing potential hires more than once. Sometimes business owners hire a person after just one meeting. That's a really bad idea.

Sometimes other people — especially those who might be someone's co-worker — will pick up on things you missed during a formal interview. You might also think about scheduling a meeting with each of the candidates off-site. People tend to be more at ease in an informal setting, like a coffee shop, and this could lead you to discover new things. Sometimes, a more relaxed setting allows you to see the whole person, and decide if you like who they really are. It can also lead someone to say things that might cause you to hire them — or not hire them.

Something we do at my company is a final interview over dinner. Spouses are invited to this meeting, and we encourage them to speak into the situation. I'm not talking about a big test, just conversation and a friendly, family atmosphere. You can tell a lot about a person by how they talk to, and interact with, their spouse.

I'm impressed that you're taking this seriously, and devoting some real time and energy to hiring. Your thoughtfulness leads me to think you'll make the right decision!

# Disney wins bidding war for Fox

News channel, broadcast network will remain under Murdoch's rein

LOS ANGELES — The high-stakes drama over who would capture much of Rupert Murdoch's media empire came to a close after Comcast Corp. said it was dropping out of the hunt for 21st Century Fox's entertainment assets.

The announcement Thursday hands a major victory to Walt Disney Co. Chief Executive Bob Iger, who has championed the \$71-billion purchase of the Fox assets, which include Fox's prolific television and movie studios, cable channels FX and National Geographic, the controlling stake in streaming service Hulu, and international properties in India and Latin America.

Comcast's pursuit of Fox had threatened to derail a deal that is considered essential to Disney's future and Iger's legacy — and one that is expected to transform Hollywood. The bulked-up Disney would have unparalleled clout.

For Comcast, continuing to chase the Fox assets just became too expensive — and a big stretch for wary shareholders. Comcast would have had to offer more than \$80 billion to stay competitive with Disney's sweetened \$71-billion bid. Comcast has separately offered \$34 billion for Sky, the European pay-TV service.

"From the very outset, Comcast has looked to be wrong-footed in its quixotic pursuit of Fox," said Craig Moffett, a prominent cable analyst.

Comcast decided to devote its full attention to acquiring Sky, according to a person familiar with the company's thinking who was not authorized to comment. And bidding for Fox would only have raised the price of London-based Sky, because Fox owns 39 percent of the satellite TV service that Murdoch co-founded in the late 1980s.

But Burbank-based Disney also wants Sky because it controls valuable programming rights, including popular soccer matches, and it provides pay-TV and internet service to more than 22 million customers in Britain, Ireland, Germany, Austria and Italy. Iger recently called Sky a "crown jewel," so Disney and Fox may team up to top Comcast's \$34-billion proposal.

The decision was a blow to Comcast Chief Executive Brian L. Roberts,

who aggressively pursued Fox, creating a showdown that frustrated Iger. It marked the third major retreat for Roberts. Comcast in 2004 was forced to abandon its hostile takeover of Disney amid a Comcast shareholder revolt. Then, in 2015, the Philadelphia company pulled the plug on buying Time Warner Cable after the Justice Department indicated that it would sue to block the merger. Charter Communications bought Time Warner Cable (now Spectrum) the following year.

"I'd like to congratulate Bob Iger and the team at Disney and commend the Murdoch family and Fox for creating such a desirable and respected company," Roberts said in a statement.

Disney is taking the big swing because it feels it needs more scale, and more entertainment firepower, to compete with tech titans such as Netflix, Google, Facebook, Amazon.com and Apple, which have deep pockets, global businesses and direct relationships with consumers.

"Our incredible enthusiasm for this acquisition and the value it will create has continued to grow as we've come to know 21st Century Fox's stellar array of talent and assets," Iger said in a statement. "We're extremely pleased with (Thursday's) news, and our focus now is on completing the regulatory process and ultimately moving toward integrating our businesses."

Disney shares gained 1.3 percent to \$112.13 on Thursday. Comcast shares rose 2.6 percent to \$34.91; Fox closed down less than 0.1 percent to \$46.65.

Fox

shareholders are scheduled to vote on the \$71-billion Disney deal July 27.

For Murdoch, the sale will substantially shrink the empire he has spent more than half a century building. However, the 87-year-old mogul from Australia plans to hold on to core businesses: Fox News Channel, the Fox broadcast network, two national cable sports channels and a string of television stations, including KTTV Channel 11 in Los Angeles.

Most analysts speculated that Disney had the edge mainly because its deal posed fewer regulatory hurdles than a Comcast-Fox merger. Last month, the Justice Department gave a quick OK to Disney's bid as long as it sells Fox's 22 regional sports networks, including Prime Ticket and Fox Sports West in Los Angeles. The Disney-Fox merger review lasted just five months.

Although Disney and Fox have a similar asset mix, Comcast has the complication of owning pay-TV and internet services. Comcast is the nation's largest broadband internet provider — a fact that has troubled the Justice Department before. When antitrust regulators said last week they would appeal the merger of AT&T Inc. and Time Warner Inc., the door slammed on Comcast's chances of persuading Murdoch and his executives that a regulatory review of a Comcast-Fox tie-up would be speedy.

Comcast, which owns NBCUniversal, concluded that it had little chance of wresting Murdoch's entertainment properties away from Disney. In late June, Disney upped its ante with an offer of \$71.3 billion for the Fox businesses.

Comcast had made a \$65-billion all-cash bid.

Ultimately, Comcast could not overcome the head start enjoyed by Iger, who began courting Murdoch last summer over wine at Murdoch's vineyard above Bel-Air. Talks heated up in the fall and, in December, Fox agreed to sell to Disney.

Murdoch twice rebuffed Roberts' advances. He preferred Iger's stock-and-cash proposal that would allow the Murdoch family to become major shareholders in Disney.

It was Murdoch who last year concluded that Fox may not be large enough to thrive in the digital age. Those same concerns drove AT&T to acquire Time Warner, which owned CNN, HBO and the Warner Bros. film and TV studios. That deal was finalized June 14, but has been challenged by the government. Similar concerns about adequate scale drove Discovery to purchase Scripps Networks Interactive, the home of HGTV and Food Channel, in March.

For Disney, the Fox properties would

deepen its trove of movie franchises and children's titles, including Disney's hit Pixar Animation films such as "Toy Story" and "Finding Nemo"; most of the Marvel comic book universe; "Star Wars" characters; "Ice Age"; "Avatar"; and "Alvin and the Chipmunks." Disney — which already boasts such gems as Mickey Mouse, Elsa and Olaf from "Frozen," and Winnie-the-Pooh — wanted to stockpile more content for a streaming service it plans to launch next year.

Comcast originally planned to use its shares to buy the Fox assets, but shareholders got skittish. Comcast's stock has dropped nearly 20 percent this year.

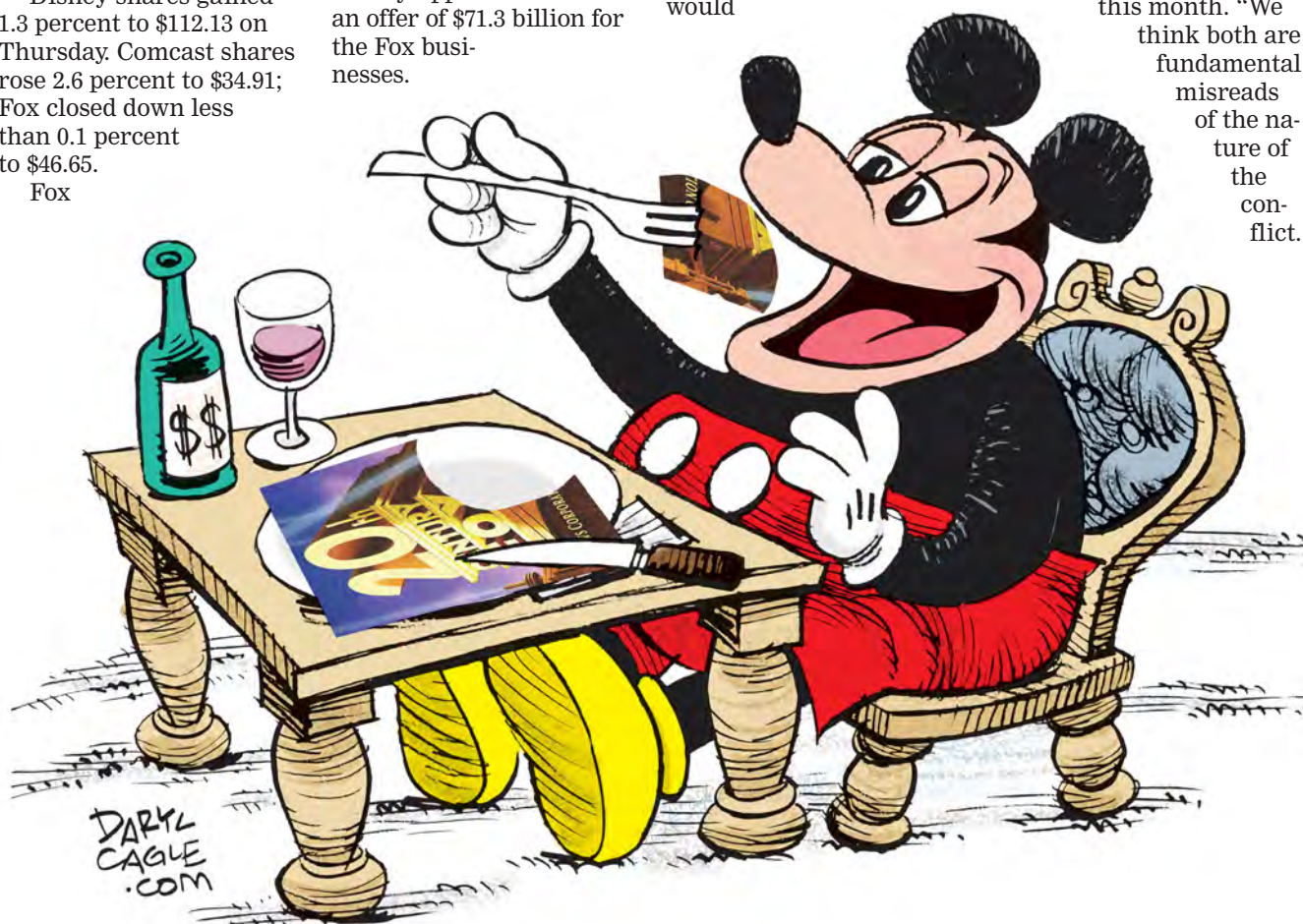
Because of that volatility, Comcast changed its approach and offered cash, which provided Murdoch and his family less upside long-term.

Relying on cash also made Comcast's deal highly leveraged: The company faced the prospect of shouldering more than \$100 billion in new debt to finance the purchase if it also lands Sky.

Doug Creutz, a media analyst with Cowen & Co., questioned both companies' willingness to pay so much money for assets that might have already peaked, and why two media giants needed even more content to battle Netflix and Amazon.

"In our view, arguing that acquiring Fox will help win the war in the fight for the direct-to-consumer market is similar to Bob McNamara arguing in 1965 that he could win in Vietnam if he had more troops," Creutz wrote in a research note this month. "We

think both are fundamental misreads of the nature of the conflict."



## Big move for Big Bird: Sesame Street entering classrooms

SEATTLE — Sesame Street is taking its beloved, critically acclaimed brand of educational television into the highly profitable world of classroom curriculum — a move that experts say could open the door for other companies to move into the sensitive learning space with possible influence on children.

Sesame Workshop, the company behind Big Bird and Elmo, and McGraw-Hill Education, a billion-dollar for-profit company known for school textbooks, announced their partnership Thursday. Both declined to disclose the financial terms for their new line of classroom instructional materials.

"Sesame Workshop probably can be trusted to do this in an ethical way, but the door opens for other companies to do it in a less ethical way," said Heather Kirkorian, a University of Wisconsin professor who studies the effects of media in young

children.

The TV program and Sesame Workshop's other educational pursuits have long been lauded for their record of helping kids learn, portraying diverse characters and offering sensitivity in addressing childhood experiences.

The new classroom materials include videos featuring social-emotional and literacy lessons delivered by its famous characters and meant to be used at "circle time," when young children typically gather to sing songs or hear stories. They also are offering resources for teachers and parents to help reinforce the lessons.

The instructional materials are on the market for children in preschool through fifth grade, and they are expected to be used in classrooms as early as fall 2019. Educators now have access to review the materials but they haven't been piloted in a classroom yet. They must be approved by school princi-

pals and administrators.

Dr. David Hill of the American Academy of Pediatrics, which urges parents to be cautious and selective about screen time for children, said that by age 3, kids can learn from a limited viewing of high-quality TV programs like Sesame Street but that little research exists on such regular media use in the classroom.

Hill, a pediatrician, said a young child's brain cannot distinguish between programming and advertising, which could raise questions about the precedent that Sesame Street is setting.

"When you introduce a commercial influence on a nonprofit endeavor, I think everyone naturally has some concerns about the tension that ensues," Hill said.

Sesame Workshop is a nonprofit and would have to invest its

revenue back into its educational mission.

"With a proven whole-child curriculum that serves as a framework for everything we do, Sesame Workshop has put children first for nearly fifty years," said Akimi Gibson, company vice president.

A much-discussed study in 2015 indicated that preschoolers exposed to the show gained immense

benefits, which were compared to that of the Head Start program for low-income children, though the authors of that study later rebuked the idea that the show alone could or should replace any actual school program.

The researchers declined to comment on Sesame Street's latest classroom endeavor.

Sesame Street has been a household brand since debuting in 1969 on public television. In recent years, it lost federal funding to produce the show and has partnered with HBO.

Its name recognition is so high that it is equally known for its broad array of licensed merchandise, from bibs and backpacks to toys and games. It's also achieved cult status for its celebrity appearances and satirical humor that serves as a hook for parents.

## Stay in loop when team is elsewhere

**Q:** I'm part of a team that I like a lot. The problem is that I only see them in person a couple of times a year. The rest of the time they are in one place and I'm in a different city. My boss is a good guy, but doesn't really follow through on team-building ideas. What can I do to keep from being out of the loop?

— Alex, 41  
IT test lead

**A:** The strong base you have established is a great starting point for continuing to build your work relationships.

Let's start with the obvious: Are there ways for you to be at your central location more often? If you could work together in person even two or three more times in a year, it would make a difference.

Typically, though, companies don't want to pay for travel unless there's a specific reason for you to be there.

That's where some creativity may pay off. Consider your team's role and the specific contributions you make to the company.

Then assess whether you can demonstrate efficiency, better results, or faster turnaround time if, for example, you meet in person with team members at key points in a project's life cycle.

Also keep your eyes open for corporate special projects that interest you, and that may justify a trip to town.

Look for affordable ways to keep travel costs down. That could make a pre-defined travel budget go further so that you could add some additional time on site.

The easier you can make this for your boss, the more likely it is to happen. This is especially true in a case like yours, where your boss may be willing but it's probably not a high priority for him.

On the more formal side, set up check-in calls with colleagues every week or two. Even if it's just for 15 minutes, creating this practice will build day-to-day connection. If your boss has set up team meetings, make a priority of attending and participating.

Use your company's messaging system to connect more informally. For example, ask for people's opinions if there's a new corporate strategy or key executive hire. Since they are on site, your co-workers could tell you what the scoop is around the office. Same with seeing what folks are saying about big news in your business sector. People love sharing their thoughts and it gives you yet another connection point.

Pay attention to the details of people's lives. Knowing that they have kids in activities, that they run or golf, or that they have other interests and hobbies will help you find common ground.

The main thing to remember is that, while you will all benefit from knowing each other better and being more connected, the onus will be on you.

Make a priority of this, having at least a general plan on what you will do, and don't let it slip. Just like external networking, vibrant relationships take effort but bring great personal and professional value.

## Avoid adding drama to misunderstandings

**Q:** One of my coworkers is lying about a task she was supposed to complete. "Dawn" is responsible for renewing everyone's membership in our industry's professional association. However, last year she had a problem with my password, so I processed the renewal myself.

This year, I assumed that Dawn would renew my membership. I expected her to ask about the password, but she never did. Recently, Dawn submitted a report stating that all memberships had been renewed except mine. She indicated that I was supposed to handle it.

I am upset not only because Dawn lied about my renewal, but also because she is dumping her responsibility on me. Should I just ignore her and let my membership expire, even though I need it for my job?

**A:** If you get this worked up over a simple misunderstanding, your reaction to serious issues must be something to be-

hold. Before making further accusations about "lying" and "dumping responsibility," you need to do a quick reality check.

While you assumed that Dawn was processing your renewal, she apparently believed you were following last year's plan. Perhaps she should have verified this with you, but on the other hand, you also could have checked with her. Therefore, no one is to blame for the resulting mix-up.

Sadly, you seem to be progressing from irrationally angry to absurdly self-destructive, since allowing a useful membership to lapse will hurt no one but you. So it's time to put on your adult hat, have a talk with Dawn, and clarify future expectations.

For example: "Dawn, there was apparently some

confusion about my association membership this year. Since you're finished with the others, I'll go ahead and renew it, but next year please include me with the group. I've resolved the password issue, so that shouldn't be a problem."

The lesson to be learned, for the sake of your own career, is to avoid complicating simple situations with unnecessary drama.

**Q:** My company seems like an "old boys' club" when it comes to pay. A few years ago, for example, I was asked to take over an underperforming branch. After doubling the profits, I received a substantial raise, yet I was never paid as much as my less successful male predecessor.

During a recent reorganization, I was laterally transferred to a corporate position, and my branch manager job was given to a regional vice-president. Although he was actually being demoted, the vice-president was allowed to keep his salary, which

is more than I was making. What do you think about this?

**A:** While I understand your frustration, I have no way of knowing whether your conclusion is correct. Although companies have been known to pay women less than their male counterparts, many factors can affect compensation, so the first pay disparity could have several explanations.

As for the demoted vice-president, a pay reduction does not always accompany a reduction in title. While this may not seem fair, it is not necessarily discriminatory.

But whatever the cause of your dilemma, the solution is the same. Historically, women have been much less assertive than men in talking about pay, quietly assuming that outstanding effort will be recognized and rewarded. So prepare a valid business case and go ask your boss for a raise.

# Software Developer

The technology industry is booming, which is good news for jobs. Whether you are trying to pick a college major or considering a career change, becoming a software developer could be a great career move. It is well paying, secure and values passion and creativity.

### JOB DESCRIPTION

Software developers help shape the technologies we use on a daily basis. They are part dreamer and part creator. Many developers conceptualize new ideas and have the technical expertise to make that concept a reality. They work across a broad set of industries on projects of computer systems design and practical application.

### EDUCATION REQUIREMENTS

Many software developers can land a well-paying position with a bachelor's degree. When building your resume, keep in mind that employers are also looking for relevant side projects.

### EMPLOYMENT STATS

Software developers will see more than 30 percent in



employment growth over the next 10 years, according to the Bureau of Labor Statistics—a rate higher than all other occupations. The bureau estimates more than 250,000 jobs

will be created. This is due to the increasing advancements in technology and demand for software innovation. The United States Department of Labor reports

that software developers earned a median salary of just over \$100,000 as of 2016—with developers earning upwards of \$157,000 on the high end and about \$58,000

on the low end, which depend mostly on geographic location. This is considerably higher than most other occupations that don't require a college education.

## Colleges eye share of future salary in lieu of loans

**MONTPELIER, Vt.** — As more students balk at the debt loads they face after graduation, some colleges are offering an alternative: We'll pay your tuition if you offer us a percentage of your future salary.

Norwich University announced Tuesday that it will become the latest school to offer this type of contract, known as an income share agreement. Norwich's program is starting out on a small scale, mainly for students who do not have access to other types of loans or those who are taking longer than the traditional eight semesters to finish their degree.

"Norwich University is committed to offering this new way to help pay for college in a way that aligns incentives and helps reduce financial barriers to degree completion," said Lauren Wobby, the school's chief financial officer.

In contrast with traditional loans, in which students will simply pay down the principal and interest until there is nothing left, students with income share agreements pay back a percentage of their salary for a

set period of time. Those touting the programs say they give colleges greater incentive to help students find high-earning jobs after graduation, because a higher salary means the school may recoup its investment in a shorter period of time.

For some students, income share agreements are seen as less risky, especially if they end up in a lower-paying job or struggle to find work after graduation. While students are unemployed or earning below a certain threshold they don't have to pay anything back.

"Taking on the debt through a contract, where you don't take on a debt per se but instead will repay a portion of your future income, has a certain appeal to students when the concept is fully explained to them," said Clare McCann, deputy director for education policy at the New America Foundation.

But because employment and salary determine repayment, it's possible providers could be seen as discriminating against recipients who choose lower-paying professions.

"If income share agreement providers aren't care-

ful, they can definitely see unintended consequences in discriminatory terms toward students. This is one of the biggest differences between income share agreements and federal student loans," McCann said. "Federal loans offer the same terms to all borrowers."

Income share agreements were first proposed by Milton Friedman in 1955. In the past decade, technical training programs, such as coding boot camps, have used this type of funding largely because participants do not have access to federal student loans.

In 2015, Oakton, Va.-based Vemo Education began working with accredited colleges and universities. The company now works with nearly 30 public and private colleges and universities across the country, including Norwich University.

Vemo's first partnership was with Purdue University. It began financing the school's "Back a Boiler" income share agreement program in 2016.

Andrew Hoyler, 22, graduated from Purdue last year with a degree in profession-

al flight with the goal of becoming a pilot. Now he is working as a pilot for American Airlines regional carrier PSA Airlines.

"One of the biggest pros for the income share agreement was the fact that out-of-college pilots do not make a lot of money, especially looking at the costs for an educational program," Hoyler said.

The terms can vary, notably the length of the agreement and they salary percentage. Since future salary is generally unpredictable, it can be difficult to forecast how much a student will pay back over time, although most agreements do place a cap on the amount paid back.

Hoyler took out federal loans but said the income share agreement helped him avoid working multiple jobs while starting out last year as a flight instructor. Hoyler said he may end up paying more for the income share agreement in the long run as his salary rises, but deemed it a worthy trade-off.

## Canada firm has the first U.S. pot IPO

**SEATTLE** — A Canadian company is the first marijuana business to complete an initial public offering on a major U.S. stock exchange, raising \$153 million to expand its operations as Canada prepares to legalize the drug nationwide.

British Columbia-based Tilray Inc.'s shares began trading Thursday on the Nasdaq stock exchange. Initially priced at \$17, the stock quickly jumped, closing for the day at \$22.55 — up about one-third.

Tilray isn't the first pot company to trade on a major American stock exchange, but it is the first to do so with an IPO, a step that could boost credibility and confidence in the industry, said John Kagia, an analyst with the marijuana market research firm New Frontier Data.

"It's another high-profile marker of how the cannabis industry is maturing and professionalizing," he said.

Two other Canadian marijuana companies began trading on major U.S. exchanges earlier this year — Cronos Group on Nasdaq and Canopy Growth on the New York Stock Exchange. Those companies already were publicly traded in Canada.

Nine U.S. states and Washington, D.C., have legalized the recreational use of marijuana and about two-thirds have legal medical marijuana. But American cannabis companies have been unable to list on major U.S. exchanges because of the drug's illegal status under federal law. Instead, some have gone public in Canada by being acquired by companies there.

Medical marijuana is legal in Canada, and on Oct. 17, the country will become the first major industrialized nation to legalize its production and sale for recreational use. Uruguay is the only other country to do so.

Tilray doesn't do business in the U.S., but has been licensed to produce cannabis for medical use in Canada and Portugal. In documents filed with the U.S. Securities and Exchange Commission, it said it has sold marijuana to "tens of thousands of patients in 10 countries spanning five continents through our subsidiaries in Australia, Canada and Germany and through agreements with established pharmaceutical distributors."

Chris Barry, a partner at the Dorsey and Whitney law firm in Seattle, handles marijuana investment deals and mergers in the U.S. and Canada. He noted that major institutional investors, including the century-old New York investment bank Cowen, were involved in Tilray's IPO.

"You wouldn't be able to do an offering of that size without institutional participation," Barry said. "The lesson is that the institutions will be there if you have a good business plan and your business is 100 percent legal in the jurisdiction you're in."

Tilray plans to use the money to build additional marijuana growing and processing capacity in Ontario, and to repay Privateer Holdings, the Seattle-based private equity firm that controls it.

The IPO "signifies tremendous validation for Tilray as a company, but really for the entire sector," Tilray Chief Executive Brendan Kennedy said in a phone interview Thursday. "It gives us access to large pools of capital, capital that feeds the global paradigm shift taking place."

That said, analysts will be watching to see how the Canadian marijuana stocks perform in the U.S. Many are concerned that the companies may be overvalued amid excitement around what amounts to a newly legitimate industry with vast growth potential, Kagia said. Canada's recreational marijuana market is expected to be worth between \$5 billion and \$9 billion.

## Scene of the crime: Inspector Morse continues his investigations in 'Endeavour'

Literary detectives are right at home in PBS's "Masterpiece," especially the British ones. When "Sherlock," the hit series about the legendary Sherlock Holmes, made its way to this side of the Atlantic, it fit right in among the channel's other British imports, and Det. Const. Endeavour Morse has done the same.

British crime drama "Endeavour" returns to PBS with a new episode on Sunday, July 22. The series follows the most recent television incarnation of Endeavour Morse, a detective popularized by author Norman Colin Dexter's Inspector Morse novels. Sunday's episode sees Det. Sgt. Morse, portrayed by actor Shaun Evans ("The Last Weekend"), continue to investigate an assassination attempt in Oxford after his probe is unexpectedly cut short, while his partner Fred Thursday (Roger Allam, "V for Vendetta," 2005) looks into a related case.

"Endeavour" is not the first TV adaptation of Dexter's famous detective, though it is chronologically the first. Set in the 1960s, "Endeavour" is a prequel to the long-running detective drama, "Inspector Morse" which ran on British television from 1987 to 1993 and continued airing specials until 2000. A spinoff of "Inspector Morse," called "Lewis," was created in 2006 and centered on Robert Lewis (Kevin Whately, "The English Patient," 1996), Morse's sergeant from the original show. The current series has seen Morse begin as a young, disillusioned constable about to quit the force until he is taken under the wing of veteran Det. Thursday, who sees his potential. Under his tutelage, Morse thrives as he successfully investigates the crimes of Oxford and eventually becomes a sergeant after a long road toward passing his exams.

Evans certainly can relate to his character's rise through the ranks as he quickly found success as an actor once he put his mind to the task. He began appearing on stage and in film after making the decision to act at a young age, telling Express Sunday, "I just thought, 'I think I will do that.' That's why I feel quite lucky that it's always been quite clear to me what I should do." One of Evans' first roles was in the comedy series "Teachers," which was also one of the first roles for current "The Late Late Show" host James Corden. The two both later starred in the biopic "Telstar: The Joe Meek Story" in 2008.

Evans has spent more than 15 years stacking his filmography with varied roles in British television, like those in miniseries "The Take," legal drama "Silk" and TV movie "The Scandalous Lady W," making him a natural choice to take over such an iconic role as Morse in "Endeavour."

Evans is not the only "Endeavour" actor bringing a wealth of screen and

stage experience to his performance in the show. Allam is one of those British actors that you've seemingly seen in everything. He has appeared in episodes of notable crime dramas "Midsomer Murders," "Waking the Dead" and "Foyle's War" as well as on film in movies such as "Pirates of the Caribbean: On Stranger Tides" (2011) and "The Lady in the Van" (2015). He notably portrayed Illyrio Mopatis in "Game of Thrones," and in a time-bending appearance, he played character Denis Cornford in an episode of "Inspector Morse."

The long list of memorable film credits attributed to him is something of a new development in his career as Allam began his screen work rather late. Not initially predisposed to building a career on screen, he told the Irish Times, "I had to make a conscious decision to do more on screen ... I never thought it was something I could actually do because it wasn't obvious to me how it was made." Allam began his acting career in a feminist theater troupe in the 1970s before spending a decade with the Royal Shakespeare Company. Though proud of his film and television work, Allam admitted to The Guardian that his greatest achievement was performing as Falstaff in the 2010 production of "Henry IV" at Shakespeare's Globe in London.

Credit for the success of "Endeavour" is not solely due to its performances, compelling though they are. Screenwriter Russell Lewis has written every single episode of the series since its debut. Though now a prolific television writer, Lewis began his career as a child actor performing in films and on stage in a 1972 production of "Young Winston" directed by Richard Attenborough. Lewis gave up acting to pursue music before joining fringe theater to begin his writing career. Lewis has written episodes of both "Inspector Morse" and "Lewis" and adapted Agatha Christie's 1961 novel "The Pale Horse"

for an episode of "Agatha Christie's Marple."

As proof of the series' popularity, the current fifth season has expanded to six episodes from the four that previous seasons had, an expansion that's meant many sleepless nights for the man helming the script. The pace apparently

not only works for Lewis but for viewers as well, as the popularity of "Endeavour" has already secured a sixth season, to begin sometime next year.

Don't miss Morse's latest investigative adventure in a new episode of "Endeavour," airing Sunday, July 22, on PBS.

### Still 'Standing': Revived comedy loses two of its stars

**Still 'Standing':** "Last Man Standing" may have been saved from an early demise, but two of its stars have decided not to stick with it. The ABC sitcom was canceled back in May 2017 after six seasons despite its steady ratings, but it didn't take long for the fan outcry to convince Fox to snap up the series and add it to its comedy slate.

Series star Tim Allen, who starred in the huge 1990s comedy hit "Home Improvement," will be back headlining the cast when "Last Man Standing" premieres in its new home on Fox this fall, but a few of his colleagues have decided not to make the move. Both Molly Ephraim ("Paranormal Activity 2," 2010) and Flynn Morrison ("Pretty Little Liars") have bowed out in the year since the series' cancellations, and their roles are being recast. Ephraim played Mike Baxter's (Allen) middle daughter, Mandy, and Morrison his grandson, Boyd.

The rest of the core cast is on board with the revival. "Last Man Standing" focuses on the life of Mike, a conservative outdoorsman and the senior executive of a sporting goods store with a wife and three daughters. Nancy Travis ("So I Married an Axe Murderer," 1993) stars as Mike's wife, Nancy, and Amanda Fuller ("Grey's Anatomy") and Kaitlyn Dever ("Detroit," 2017) star as his other two daughters, Kristin and Eve, respectively. Christoph Sanders ("Ghost Whisperer"), Hector Elizondo ("Pretty Woman," 1990) and Jordan Masterson ("Greek") also star.

Although rumors persist that "Last Man Standing" was canceled due to Allen's more conservative political views, ABC has maintained that it was simply due to scheduling changes and a reworking of the network's Friday night lineup. Whatever the reason, it seems the

show must go on for Mike Baxter and his family. "Last Man Standing" premieres on its new home this fall.

**30 years in the water:** Sharks have been on this planet for hundreds of millions of years, prowling the ocean's depths and feasting on whatever they can find. Shark Week, the annual summer event on Discovery, hasn't been around for quite that long, but it's still hitting a milestone this year that's pretty impressive.

In a huge crossover event, the human "sharks" from ABC's "Shark Tank" are giving their namesakes their due in "Shark Tank Meets Shark Week," which is airing through the week. Venture capitalists Mark Cuban, Barbara Corcoran, Daymond John and Kevin O'Leary are each getting out of the tank and visiting a different oceanic organization fighting to protect at-risk sharks and their habitat. They're joined by fellow shark Robert Her-

javec in the finale where, as a group, they'll decide which group is most deserving of a \$50,000 donation.

Other highlights this week include a search for super-sized sharks off Cuba's coast, a dive into the deepest depths off Guadalupe Island, a return of the popular "shark cam" and a test of survivalist Bear Grylls' ("Running wild with Bear Grylls") mettle when he goes head to head with sharks in "Bear vs Shark."

Sharks both fascinate and terrify us, and they definitely make for fantastic television. The 30th anniversary of Shark Week gets underway Sunday, July 22, on Discovery.

**Funny family:** CBS is beefing up its comedy lineup. The network already has two of TV's biggest comedy hits with "The Big Bang Theory" and "Young Sheldon," but it isn't resting on its laurels, with a slate of new comedies ordered for the upcoming TV season, including a "Murphy Brown" revival and new series "The Neighborhood," headlined by Cedric the Entertainer ("Barbershop," 2002).

"Fam" is another sitcom recently given a full-series order and scheduled to premiere this fall. It focuses on a young woman who gets engaged to a wonderful man with an upstanding family and who begins building a perfect, upstanding life with him — that is, until her train wreck younger sister comes to live with her to get away from their equally off-the-rails father.

Nina Dobrev ("The Perks of Being a Wallflower," 2012) headlines a standout cast that also includes Tone Bell ("Whitney"), Odessa Adlon ("Nashville"), Sheryl Lee Ralph ("Sister Act 2: Back in the Habit," 1993) and Brian Stokes Mitchell ("Mr. Robot").

CBS's comedy lineup will have a number of new offerings this fall, including new sitcom "Fam." Watch for it once the new TV season gets underway in September.

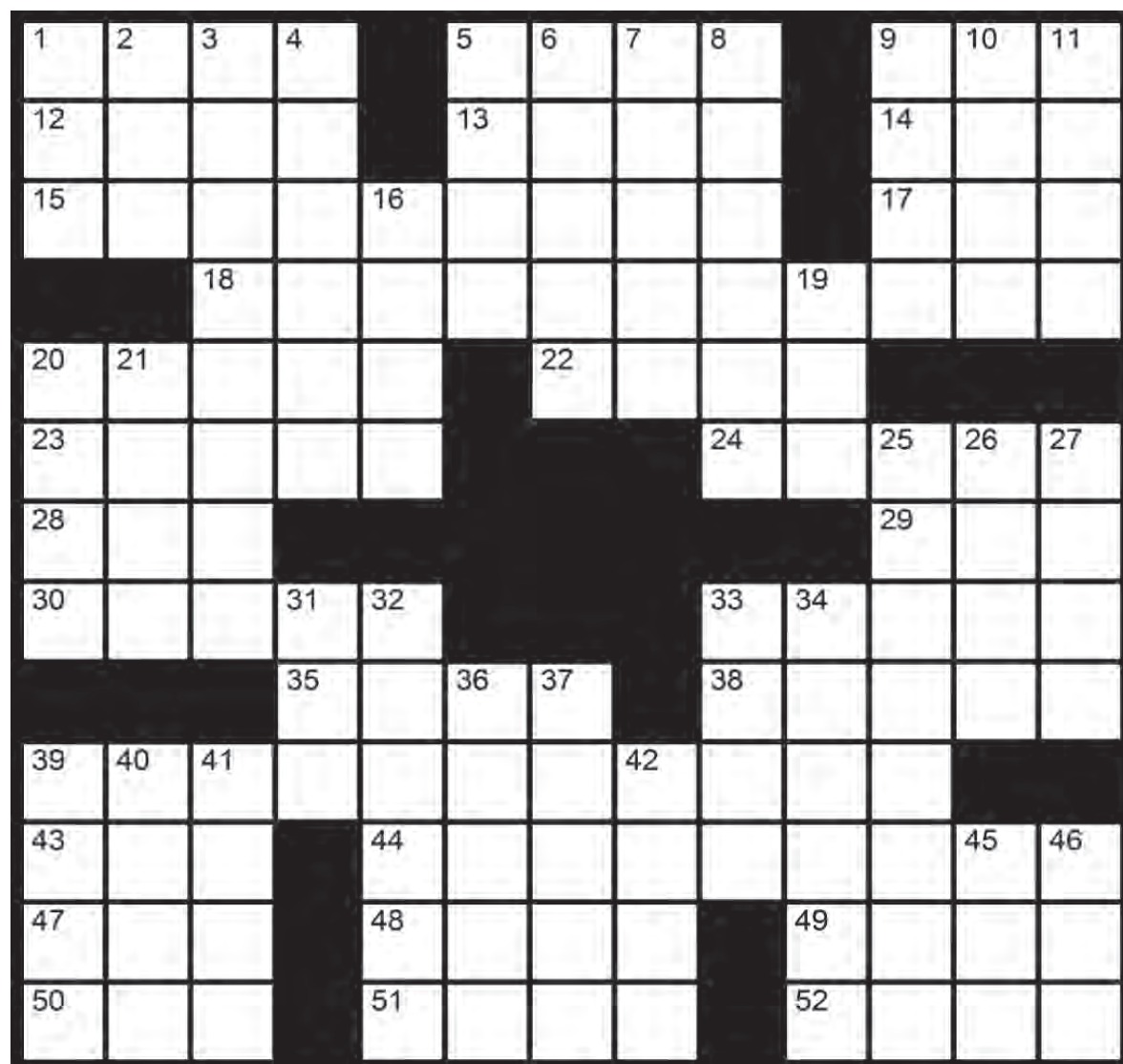
