- Scirpus acicularis.
 Scirpus minimus capitulis equifeti. Raii Syn. p. 429.
 Scabiofa columbaria. Mountain Scabious.
 Scabiofa minor vulgaris. Raii Syn. p. 4
 Which runs from the ebbing and flowing Well.
- 1. Eriophorum vaginatum. Single-headed Cotton-grafs. Juncus alpinus cum cauda leporina. Raii Syn. p. 436.
 - On Peat Bogs frequent, in the afcent to Ingleborough Hill.
- 12. Melica Montana. Mountain Melic Grafs. In Skirrith Wood, near Ingleton, and in Grafs Wood, near Kilnfay, not uncommon.
- 13. Festuca ovina var. vivipara. Viviparous Sheep's Fescue-grass.

 - On the crags near the fummit of *Ingleborough*, and and on the rocks of *Long fledale*, about ten miles from *Kendal*, plentifully.

 19. Scabiofa columbaria. Mountain Scabious.
 Scabiofa minor vulgaris. Raii Syn. p. 191.
 Frequent on all the lime-ftone rocks.
 20. Plantago maritima. Sea Plantain.
 - Plantago, an alpina angustifolia. Raii Syn: p. 315.
 - I found this plant very unexpectedly in the road leading from Kilnfay to Arnchiff, in great abundance; and afterwards difcovered it on the fides of many of the mountains thereabouts. I could difcover no difference betwixt it and the Sea Plantain growing at Gravefend.
- 21. Sanguiforba officinalis. Great or Meadow Burnet. Sanguiforba major flore spadiceo. Raii Syn. p. 203.
 - Common in most of the pastures; in some of which it is the principal plant. The farmers were much divided in their opinions respecting its goodness. It produces a large, but late crop; grows frequently

 - Rubeola vulgaris quadrifolia lævis, floribus purpurantibus. Raii Syn. p. 225.
- On the lime-ftone hills about Conzic, near Kendal. 23. Galium montanum. Mountain Ladies Bed-straw.
- Mollugo montana minor Gallio albo fimilis. Raii \$ Syn. p. 224.
 - The most general plant on all the Northern mountains. The fummit of Ingleborough is principally covered with it and the Juncus Squarrofus.
- 24. Galium boreale. Cross-leaved Ladies Bed-fraw. Mollugo montana erecta quadrifolia. Raii Syn. p. 221.
 - Plentiful on the hills betwixt Kilnfay and Grafs Wood, more efpecially among fome rocks in Grafs Wood.
- 25. Alchemilla vulgaris. Common Ladies Mantle. Alchimilla, Raii Syn. p. 158. There is fcarce a pafture or moift bank in Yorkfhire on which this pretty plant does not occur.
- 26. Alchemilla alpina. Mountain Ladies Mantle. Alchimilla alpina pentaphyllos. Rail Syn. p. 158. This fpecies, which far excels the other in beauty, is by no means fo frequent. I first found it on a hill called Lime-ftone Knot, in Long fledale, a place mentioned by WILSON, in his Synopfis, further on in Long fledale, or, as it is there called, Long fleddel, on the high and romantic rocks about Buckbarrow Well the Botanist will find it in . abundance.
- 27. Potamogeton Setaceum. Setaceous Pond-weed.
- In the ditches on Brigstear Moss, with the Utricu- \$ 39. Pimpinella Saxifraga. Burnet Saxifrage. laria plentifully.
- 28. Anchusa sempervirens. Ever-green Alkanet. Bugloffum latifolium fempervirens. Raii Syn. p. 227.
 - From the paucity of places in which this plant was \$ 40. Parnaffia palustris. Grass of Parnaffus. faid to have been found wild, and the fufpicion which refted on fome of those, I had entertained \$ doubts of its being a native of this country : 41. Drosera rotundifolia. Round-leaved Sun-dew. those were entirely removed on my finding it tolerably plentiful in the lanes about Gigglefwick, and \$ 42. Drofera longifolia. Long-leaved Sun-dew. in the road between Settle and Ingleton.
- 29. Primula farinofa. Birds Eye.
- Verbafculum umbellatum alpinum minus. Raii Sin. p. 285.

- Campanula maxima foliis latifiimis. Rait Syn. p. 276.
- Extremely common about Settle and elfewhere, under the ftone-walls and hedges. The country people improperly call them Fox-gloves.
- Ribes vulgaris flore rubro. Rati Syn. p. 456.
- On the edges of the wet ditches, and in the Woods about Carr End, Wenfleydale.
- 35. Gentiana amarella. Autumnal Gentian.
 - Gentianella pratenfis flore lanuginofo. Raii Syn. p. 275.
 - Common on lime-ftone hills and pastures.
- 36. Ulmus campestris var. y Hudson. Wych Elm.
 - Ulmus folio latiffimo fcabro. Raii Syn. p. 469.
 - Common in Hedges and Woods. It is much fuperior in fize and beauty to the common Elm, and deferves to be more generally cultivated.
- 37. Oenanthe crocata. Hemlock-water Drop-wort.
 - Oenanthe cicutæ facie lobelii. Raii Syn. p. 210. In the wet ditches betwixt Kendal and Long Redale, and in fimilar fituations, in many parts of
 - Yorkshire.
- 38. Scandix odorata. Sweet Cicely.
 - Cerefolium magnum five Myrrhis. Ger. emac. p. 1039.
 - This plant is not mentioned by Mr. RAY in his Synopfis; and Mr. HUDSON introduces it as a doubtful native. The fituations in which I found it clearly convinced me, it had a good title to be confidered as a native of Great Britain; and I was confirmed in my opinion by the common people, who find it wild in many places in the greatest plenty, and call it by the name of Sweetcifs, an abbreviation of Cicely. They rub their furniture with it, to give it a gloss. It is common under the stone-walls about Settle, at the entrance into Kilnfay, and in Whitfell Gill, near Alkrig.
 - - Pimpinella faxifraga minor, foliis fanguiforbæ. Raii Syn. p. 213.
 - Very frequent in the fifures of the Lime-ftone Rocks about Settle.

 - Parnaffia vulgaris et paluftris. Raii Syn. p. 555. Very common in Bogs and wet Meadows.

 - Ros folis folio rotundo. Raii Syn. p. 356.
 - - Ros folis folio oblongo. Raii Syn. p. 356.
 - I found there two species plentifully in the North; but no where in greater plenty, or perfection, than on Brig flear Mofs, near Kendal, where
- Grows every where with the Pinguicula. A variety, with white bloffoms, has not unfrequently been \$ found ; in a Bog in Skirrith Wood, near Ingleton, I gathered specimens a foot and a half high.
- 30. Anagallis tenella. Bog Pimpernel.
 - Nummularia minor flore purpurascente. Raii Syn. p. 283.
 - Common on the Bogs. The largeft and fineft plants I ever faw of this species, grew in a bog betwixt Kendal and Long fledale.
- 31. Polemonium cæruleum. Jacob's Ladder.
- Polemonium vulgare cœruleum et album. Raii Syn. p. 288.
 - In tolerable plenty at Malham, or, as it is there called, Maum Cove, by the fide of the rivulet which fprings from the bafe of that flupendous rock. I found this plant also in much greater plenty in Conifione Dib, in a low wood, under \$ thelter of fome high and romantic rocks, a fituation it feems to affect. Alfo on Arnber Scar, on \$ the left-hand between Kilnfay and Arncliff.

32. Samolus valerandi. Water Pimpernel. Samolus valerandi. Raii Syn. 283. Observed a few specimens on Brig stear Moss. they grow to twice or thrice the fize they ufually acquire with us; but in other respects appeared to me to afford no truly specific character. It is very proabable, that the three fpecies enumerated in RAY, in addition to the above, will be found to be varieties only.

43. Allium arenarium? Sand Garlic.

Allium fylvestre amphicarpon foliis porraceis, floribus et nucleis purpureis. Raii Syn. p. 370.

44. Allium oleraceum? Herbaceous Garlic.

Allium fylvestre bicorne flore ex herbaceo albicante cum triplici in fingulis petalis stria atro-purpurea. Rau Syn. p. 370.

Thefe two species of Garlic being out of flower when difcovered, I dare not be positive about them. The first grew sparingly, in a pasture at the back of the stables belonging to the Dun Horse, Ingleton, kept by Mr. Wariner, at whose houfe every traveller finds himfelf at home. The latter grew alfo fparingly among rocks, in the Girling Trough, near Constone, Kilnfay.

- 45. Anthericum offifragum. Lancashire Asphodel.
- Phalangium anglicum paluftre Iridis folio. Ran Syn. p. 375.

Extremely

Extremely common in all Bogs and moorifh Grounds, which in July and August are beautifully decorated with its bloffoms.

- 46. Convallaria Polygonatum. Sweet Solomon's Seal. Polygonatum floribus ex fingularibus pediculis. Raii Syn. p. 263.
 - In the rocky part of Sykes Wood, near Ingleton, fparingly.
- 47. Juncus fylvaticus. Great bairy Wood Rufb.
 - Gramen nemorofum hirfutum latifolium maximum. Raii Syn. p. 416.
 - In Whitfell Gell, near Afkrig, plentifully : also near ¥ the bottom of a mountain called the Rye-loaf, near Settle, where no wood was growing, but \$ 64. Arenaria verna. Mountain Sandwort or Chickweed. probably had grown.
- 48. Triglochin paluftre. Arrow-beaded grafs. Common in marshy places.
- 49. Rumex digynus. Mountain Sorrel.
- Acetofa rotundifolia repens Eboracenfis, folio in § 65. Sedum anglicum. English Stonecrop. medio deliquium patiente. Ran Syn. p. 143.
 - Found fparingly in the fpot mentioned by RAY, close by Buckbarrow Well, in Longsledale, on \$ the edge of a deep rivulet abounding in waterfalls. The Rumex fcutatus of LINNEUS is very common in the gardens in Yorksbire: I have \$ 66. Sedum villosum. Hairy Stonecrop. fometimes feen it in fituations which have tempted me to think it an indigenous plant.
- 50. Colchicum autumnale. Meadow Saffron. Colchicum commune. Raii Syn. p. 373. Not uncommon in the meadows in Yorkshire, 1 found it in a pasture close by Milfcur Lush, near \$ 67. Spergula nodofa. Knotted Spurrey. Kilnfay, Mr. WM. FOTHERGILL, of Carr End, informed me, that it grew plentifully in a meadow near West Witton, Wensleydale.
- 51. Alifma ranunculoides. Small Water Plantain. Plantago aquatica minor. Ran Syn. p. 357-In Gigglefwick Tarn plentifully.
- 52. Epilobium angustifolium. Rofe-bay Willow-herb. Lyfimachia speciofa quibusdam Onagra dicta filiquofa. Rai Syn. p. 310. In Grafs Wood, near Kilnfay, among the rocks,
- plentifully in one particular fpot. 53. Epilobium alpinum. Alpine Willow-berb.
- Lyfirnachia filiquofa glabra minor latifolia. Ran Syn. p. 311. On the moift rocks about Buckbarrow Well.
- 54. Vaccinium Myrtillus. Blea-berry. Vitis idæa angulofa. Raii Syn. p. 457. Common on all the Heaths, Rocks, and Mountains.
- 55. Vaccinum Vitis idæa. Red Bil-berry. Vitis idæa sempervirens fructu rubro. Raii Syn. P. 457.
 - Not uncommon on Heaths, yet feldom found in 72. Rubus faxatilis. Stone Bramble. bloffom.
- 56. Vaccinium Oxycoccos. Cran-berry. Oxycoccos f. Vaccinia paluftria. Raii Syn. p. 267.

- On the craggy rocks of Ingleborough and Pennigent plentifully, in particular spots.
- 62. Saxifraga autumnalis. Autunnal Saxifrage.
 - Saxifraga alpina angustifolia, flore luteo guttato. Raii Syn. p. 353.
 - On the moift rocks of Ingleborough fparingly. In the greatest plenty in Long Sledale ; also in Whitfell Gill, near Afkrig, most beautifully in bloffom.
- 63. Saxifraga bypnoides. Trifid Saxifrage Ladies Culbion.
 - Saxifraga muscofa trifido folio. Raii Syn. p. 354.
 - On the mountains about Settle plentifully, and most of the mountains in the North.

 - Alfine pufilla pulchro flore folio tenuissimo nostras: Raii Syn. p. 351. Generally with the last mentioned plant. I always
 - found it a fure indication of elevated ground.

 - Sedum minimum non acre flore albo. Raii Syn. p. 271.
 - On fome rocks in Long fledale, on the left hand fide going down the vale; obferved it on a few rocks only.

 - Sedum purpureum pratense. Raii Syn. p. 270.
 - On the fide of Ingleborough fparingly, in the Bogs where the fprings originate; but in much greater plenty in fimilar fituations about Carr End, Wenfleydale.
 - - Alfine paluftris foliis tenuisfimis, seu Saxifraga paluftris anglica. Raii Syn. p. 350.
 - Common on the Bogs about Settle, and fimilar fituations in the North.
- 68. Prunus Padus. Bird Cherry.
 - Cerafus avium nigra et racemosa. Raii Syn. p. 463. In the woods about Ingleborough, and elfewhere in the North, plentifully.
- 69. Cratægus Aria. White Beam Tree.
 - Mefpilus alni folio fubtus incano, Aria Theophrafti dicta. Raii Syn. p. 453.
 - Common in the mountainous woods in the North; loves a dry fituation.
- 70. Roja villoja. Apple Rofe.
 - Rofa fylveftris pomifera major noftras. Raii Syn. p. 454.
 - In Grafs Wood, near Kilnfay, and in feveral other woods.
- 71. Rubus idæus. Rafberry.
 - Rubus Idæus spinosus fructu rubro. Raii Syn. p. 467. Plentiful in the above mentioned wood.

 - Not unfrequent in the mountainous woods about Settle and Ingleton; but no where in greater perfection than near the fummit of Helsfelnab,

Frequent on the boggy moffes about Settle, Kendal, * and elfewhere in the North.

57. Polygonum viviparum. Viviparous Bistort. Bistorta minor. Raii Syn. p. 147. On the edge of Semer Water, an extensive tarn at \$ Carr End, Wenfleydale.

58. Paris quadrifolia. Herb Paris, or True-love. Herba Paris. Raii Syn. p. 264. In Kelkoe Wood, near Settle, and most of the woods thereabout.

59. Pyrola rotundifolia. Common Winter-green. In the enchanting woods of Hackfall, near Grewelthor pe, in tolerable plenty. Sparingly in Raydale Wood, near Carr End, Wenfleydale; also in Tennants Wood, near Kilnfay.

60. Saxifraga stellaris. Hairy Kidney-wort. Geum palustre minus foliis oblongis crenatis. Raii * Syn. p. 354.

Not uncommon on the moist rocks and boggy \$ 75. Geum rivale. Water Avens. ground about Buckbarrow Well, Long fledale; a few plants in bloffom, but mostly in feed.

73. Rubus Chamæmorus. Cloud-berry.

On the fides of the highest mountains about Settle and Ingleton, efpecially on the Rye-loaf, within a few miles of the former, where I gathered its berries in the greatest perfection, and found the caterpillar of the Emperor Moth (Phalæna pavonia) feeding on its foliage.

74. Potentilla verna. Spring Cinquefoil.

Pentaphyllum parvum hirfutum. Raii Syn. p. 255: My very obliging friend Mr. WM. FOTHERGILL, of Carr End, shewed me this plant growing sparingly on an old ftone-wall at Carlow-nick, adjoining the west-end of the Crag Pasture, about half a mile from Carr End. I have the best authority for believing, that the Potentilla opaca of Mr. HUDSON is no other than this plant.

- 105. Satyrium viride. Frog Orchis.

 - Frequent on the most hilly pastures about Settle, in full bloom.
- 106. Ophrys muscifera. Fly Orchis.
 - Orchis myodes galea et alis herbidis. Raii Syn. 399.
 - On the hilly lime-ftone paftures at Stackboule, near Settle, plentifully; in Skirrith Wood; fparingly. Mr. ROBERT KIDD, of Albion near Gargrave, shewed me one he had gathered in a wild state. two feet and a quarter high, with fourteen bloffoms on it. He also shewed me a great number of the Ophrys apifera, or Bee orchis, a rare plant with them; but whofe place of growth he did not care to divulge.
- 107. Cypripedium Calceolus. Ladies Slipper.
 - Calceolus mariæ. Raii Syn. 385.
 - The beauty and extreme fingularity of the bloffoms of this plant, joined to its great fcarcity, have occasioned it to be universally fought after by Botanifts and others; who, not content with contemplating its beauties in its native foil, are anxious to fee it grow in their gardens, in which, however, they are generally difappointed, as it very rarely thrives on transplanting. We faw, indeed, a few inftances to the contrary in fome \$ gardens in Yorkshire. To this rage for the Ladies Slipper we may attribute its prefent fcarcity in Helk's Wood near Ingleton, where it used to be found in plenty. We were fortunate enough to discover this plant in confiderable plenty in the neighbourhood of Kilnfey, not only in the Woods with its ufual attendant, the red-flowered Helleborine, but also in hilly pasture ground, with the Opbrys ovata; but as fome gardeners in the neighbourhood had difcovered them, and were unremittingly employed in digging up every one they found, we may venture to prophecy, that in a few years they will be rarely found here alfo.
- 108. Serepias palustris.

Helleborine palustris nostras. Raii Syn. 384. In the boggy part of Syke's Wood plentifully; alfo \$ 119. Salix arenaria. we fit

- This most variable Carex we found in almost every fituation. on the edge of Gigglefwick Tarn it grew with the panicea plentifully. I also found it on dry ground near the tops of the higheft mountains. Some specimens, in particular, a yard in height, I gathered near the fummit of a lofty rock in Long Sledale.
- 113. Carex veficaria. Bladder Carex.
 - Gramen cyperoides polyftachion majus, spicis teretibus, erectis. Raii Syn. 419.
 - We do not recollect finding this species nearer London than Virginia Water. In the North it is a common Carex on the edges of tarns and rivulets. It abounds in Gigglefwick Tarn, a fpot fertile in Carices; and on the borders of Semer Water, Wenfledale.
 - 114. Carex gracilis, Fl. Lond. Slender-Spiked Carex.
 - Gramen cyperoides majus angustifolium. Raii Syn. 417.
 - In great plenty on the borders of Conzic Tarn near Kendal.
 - 115. Salix Pentandra. Sweet Willow.
 - Salix folio laureo, feu lato glabro odorato. Raii Syn. 449.
 - About Kilnfay, and more efpecially about Carr End Wenfledale, this is the most common species of Willow, and is much used for making the larger fort of bafkets. Its leaves are gloffy, and exhale an odoriferous perfume in hot weather, which, joined to the beautiful appearance of the maletree when in bloom, and the female when in feed, render it one of the most defirable trees our island naturally produces.
 - 116. Salix belix. Spurge-leaved Willow.
 - Salix humilior, foliis anguftis fubcceruleis ex adverfo binis. Raii Syn. 448.
 - Equally common with the foregoing, and used for making the finer forts of bafket-work.
 - 117. Salix rofmarinifolia.
 - We have no doubt but the Willow, to which we affign this name, is a fpecies perfectly diffinct. It approaches nearest to the vitellina. Its twigs are remarkably tough. We found it on the edge of a rivulet which runs into Semer Water; Wenfledale. As cuttings of this and the two following Willows, introduced into our garden, have grown, we hope to be able to fpeak more decifively on them at fome future period.
 - 1 18. Salix myrfinites?
 - One finall thrub of this fpecies, which corresponds with the defcription Mr. LIGHTFOOT gives of the Myrfinites, we found with feveral of the following on the flope of a high hill betwixt Kilnfay and Arncliff.

This fpecies is found in Syke's Wood, and is common to most of the woods in the North, especially fuch as are mountainous and rocky ; it produces a long fpike of red or purplish flowers, the beginning of August. This species is frequently miftaken for the Ladies Slipper!

110. Sparganium natans. Small Burr-reed.

122. Acer Pseudoplatanus. Sycamore Maple. Acer majus. Raii Syn. 470.

Very common in woods, hedges, and round gentleman's feats, the latter from its quick growth, its great fize, and power of refifting the most violent. forms without injury, it is admirably calculated to preferve. Its wood, though feldom ufed in build-

ing, is applied to many æconomical purpofes. 123. Ophiogloffum vulgatum. Adders-tongue.

In the course of our excursions we could not avoid noticing, en passant, an almost infinite number of Moss, Lichens, &c. which particularly abound in most of the spots we visited; but as few of them were in fructification, and as the larger plants were altogether fufficient to engrofs our attention, we must defer gratifying the curious Cryptogamist till an opportunity presents itself of revisiting these delightful regions at a different period of the year.

We may remark, that the Allium, which we fuppofed to be the oleraceum, proved, on flowering, to be the carinatum; and that the Potentilla, which has not yet flowered, feems, from its foliage, as if it would prove either 7 fingular variety of the verna, or a diffinct species.
