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

Press release from the office of Tribal Chairman Dave Flute –  
**SWST acts to stop the meth epidemic**

Agency Village, SD – Aug. 2, 2017 – In 2013 and 2014, many headlines were created that recognized the methamphetamine problem in Indian country. The Lake Traverse Reservation also created headlines that echoed the problem and there was an attempt to take assertive action but resulted in little to no impact on reducing the methamphetamine endemic on the Reservation.

people from our Reservation that contribute to the methamphetamine problem.

In 2016, Tribal leadership took an active and aggressive approach against hard drugs in our community by requesting assistance from the Bureau of Indian Affairs Mobile Enforcement Team to assist Tribal law enforcement and their efforts combating meth. This action resulted in tens of arrests, large quantities of meth taken off the Reservation and community awareness that the SWST is active in combating meth coming onto the Lake Traverse reservation.

The 2016 Tribal leadership also began building a foundation for a new code that would strengthen the SWST Tribal Court and give them the ability to deliver sentences that reinforce the Tribe's and Tribal elders' request for exclusion. This initiative continued with the

newly elected 2017 Tribal leadership.

Today, the Sisseton-Wahpeton Sioux Tribe's Tribal Council passed a new Tribal law, the Controlled Substance Act.

This new law will give SWST Tribal Justice Department the ability to execute sentences from six months up to three years depending on the offense, and require mandatory treatment for those that continue to manufacture, distribute, possess and ingest hard drugs.

Also, on a third offense of possession, distribution, manufacturing or ingestion Tribal members will be excluded from all Tribal properties. Third offenses carry a minimum three-year jail sentence, a fine of \$15,000, mandatory one-year treatment, 320 hours of community service and exclusion from the Tribe and all Tribal property.

However, upon completion of serving time, completion of treatment, completion of community service hours and all fines paid in full the Tribal member will be given an opportunity to be accepted back into the Tribal community and allowed on Tribal properties.

Public safety is a top priority on the Lake Traverse Reservation, and on behalf of the Sisseton-Wahpeton Sioux Tribe, we will continue to do our part, as a sovereign nation, to assert our authority and jurisdiction on the Lake Traverse Reservation, and continue our efforts combating controlled substances that are destroying our Tribal community and surrounding communities in Northeast South Dakota.

**Tribal Council 2015 resolution called for banishment option**

(Editor's note: The following is taken from our September 2nd, 2015 issue of the Sota. Despite being passed, the resolution has never been followed up with code for implementation – until now.)

The Elderly went before Tribal Council on August 4, 2015 with a request to banish meth dealers from the Tribe.

Tribal Council, pursuant to the amended Constitution of the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate Art. VII Sec 1 (a) is empowered to negotiate with Federal, State, and local governments and others on behalf of the Oyate, and

WHEREAS, the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate pursuant to the amended Constitution of the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate, Art. VII Sec. 1 (h) is empowered to promote and protect the health, education and general welfare of the members of the Oyate, and

WHEREAS, the trafficking and use of methamphetamine on the Lake Traverse Reservation has skyrocketed, and

WHEREAS, the increased drug use has resulted in increased domestic abuse/violence, child abuse/neglect, assault and property crime, and

WHEREAS, without focused, purposeful action by the people of the Lake Traverse Reservation, the

social costs of drug trafficking and use will spiral out of control,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, any individual 18 years or older convicted in Tribal, State or Federal Court of dealing, distributing, manufacturing, or trafficking methamphetamine or any narcotic drug, including any substance containing opium, heroin, isonipecalne, amidone, isoamidone, ketoemidone, lysergic acid, diethylamide, coca leaves, any opiate or any compound or derivative of a controlled substance will be immediately excluded and banished according to the customary laws of Oceti Sakowin: and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate Tribal Council hereby enacts the customary and unwritten laws, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate Tribal Code will be amended with

provisions that impose the penalty of banishment, and BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Chairman and Secretary of the Oyate are hereby authorized and instructed to sin this resolution for and behalf of the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate.

\*\*\*\*\*

In passing the banishment resolution, the SWO Tribe joins sister tribes Cheyenne River and Standing Rock Sioux Tribes that have called for a similar solution for ending the meth epidemic on the reservations in South Dakota and North Dakota.

The measure, which may seem extreme, is being undertaken in step with Dakota tradition according to the SWO resolution: Banishment is being used "according to the customary laws of Oceti Sakowin."

**Calling Oyate: Community meeting on self-governance of health service**

SWST Chairman Dave Flute has called for a community meeting to be held next week, on Wednesday, August 16th, on tribal self-governance of health services.

The Oyate are invited to attend and participate in what should be a wrap-up of the past two years of meetings on this issue.

The meeting will take place at the Tribal Elderly Nutrition Center at Agency Village, from 1:00-3:00 p.m. There will be snacks, juice and coffee provided.

On the agenda:

\*What does self-governance mean?

\*What could it mean for the Oyate if the Tribe chooses to self-govern IHS?

\*How will this transition benefit Tribal members at

IHS?

If you have any more questions regarding self-governance, this is the time to ask them.

Because of the critical nature of this decision, last week the Sota published of the SWO Self-Governance Working Group's summary of its research.

Report to Oyate Veterans from SWO Veterans Service Officer Geri Opsal



\*PURPLE HEART RECOGNITION DAY: MONDAY, AUGUST 7, 2017: At the request of the South Dakota Department of Veterans Affairs, Gov. Dennis Daugaard has proclaimed this Monday, Aug. 7, 2017, as "Purple Heart Recognition Day," calling on all South Dakotans to honor those men and women who are recipients of the Purple Heart Medal. "While we are grateful to all of those who have served our nation, the 7th of August is a day designated to remember and recognize the sacrifices endured by those members of the Armed Forces of the United States who have been awarded the Purple Heart Medal," said Larry Zimmerman, Secretary of the South Dakota Department of Veterans Affairs. "It is fitting to set aside a day to recognize those who have been awarded for their extraordinary sacrifices." The Sisseton-Wahpeton Sioux Tribe has many Purple Heart Recipients and many of them you cross paths with on a daily basis. If you recognize the purple shaped heart ribbon, shake their hand. It denotes that they were injured in the war while serving our country. They may continue to have loss of limb or shrapnel in their bodies yet - reminders

of what they endured in the protection of our Great Nation the United States of America! I would like to acknowledge and name them but they are very private and I learned I cannot do that without prior approval - but you all know there are many amongst us!

\*Congress has spoken with a strong voice in support of our veterans. The Forever GI Bill expands the success our veterans have had with the GI Bill providing opportunities that otherwise would not be possible. In particular, it restores benefits to veterans who were impacted by school closures since 2015 and has special benefits for our reservists, surviving dependents, and Purple Heart recipients. This nation is stronger when our veterans are studying and working next to their civilian counterparts. Passage of this bill is a win for veterans and their families.

\*This week, Sen. John Thune urged the United States Department of Veterans Affairs (VA) Secretary David Shulkin to more prominently feature the Veterans Crisis Line (VCL), a suicide crisis tele-phone line for veterans, families of veterans, and military personnel, on VA.gov. Specifically, it recommends

that the VCL be given a dedicated button that is immediately identifiable upon visiting the VA's website, including its mobile version, or displayed in the first of four rotating banners (as opposed to the second). Thune hopes this modest change could make the VA's resources more readily identifiable to veterans who have decided to turn to help, when seconds count the most, and reduce the rate of 20 daily veteran suicides. 

## International treaty can help protect indigenous women from violence

Indianz.com – Aug. 4, 2017 – The Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women is an international treaty aimed at protecting and promoting women's human rights.

So why hasn't the United States, where Native women suffer from extremely high rates of violence, signed on? Professor Karen Melissa Hannel and researcher Eric Hannel, a former Congressional staffer, explain how the agreement can be implemented in America:

In 1979, the United Nation adopted the Treaty for the Rights of Women, also known as The Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women (CEDAW). This treaty, Amnesty International explains, "provides an international standard for protecting and promoting women's human rights."

Every nation in the world has ratified CEDAW, except for a very small few...less than 10, such as Iran, South Sudan, Somalia, and...the United States.

For the record, the European Union recently renewed human rights-related sanctions against Iran, while both South Sudan and Somalia have remained in chaos as years of war have gripped both countries, respectively.

While the United States signed CEDAW in 1980, it has not ratified it. In fact, it seems the issue has never even been presented to the full Senate for a vote.

While the treaty appears to be consistent with current U.S. laws, there are those who proclaim ratifying it would give the international community power over America; however, there is no truth to such an allegation and no such evidence has ever been provided to support it.

Contrary to fear-mongers, CEDAW does not undermine the family, support abortion, mandate gender neutral textbooks, legalize prostitution or sanction same-sex marriage, all uninformed excuses presented to undermine CEDAW.

In fact, the treaty has no bearing on these factors for Americans because it's not self-executing, which means Congress must develop legislation that implements the treaty; therefore, any concerns about its implementation can be flushed out in the legislature where any "reservations, understandings and declarations" may be expressed.

In other words, if some of the language of the treaty even appears confusing when compared to current federal laws or governing documents, it is clarified so that America is not adopting a provision that it cannot support.

CEDAW is not just a treaty pertaining to Native American women; rather, it supports the rights of all women by acknowledging an international standard of comprehensive rights across the spectrum of life socially, politically, economically and culturally.

## SOTA IYA YE YAPI On and Off the Rez Brief commentaries from the Sota editor

Tribal Council acted assertively last week to halt the continuing epidemic of meth addiction, other drugs, and related crime.

Not everyone supports banishment, but most of the Oyate are frustrated with the out-of-control spiral of addiction and crime.

Even with increased law enforcement measures and arrests – read Chairman Flute's news release – the epidemic continues.

We want to publish the meth code as soon as it becomes available.

On Friday the Tribe's legal department informed us the code needs to be signed and set with a seal before being released.

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Chairman Flute has called for a community meeting next Wednesday, August 16th, on the Tribe assuming self-governance of IHS.

Now is the time to ask any further questions about what self-governance means, how it might benefit Tribal members, and how the Tribe can make the transition.

Members of the self-governance task force will be available to answer your questions.

Please come, if at all possible.

If you cannot be there, tune in to KXSW-FM, as announcer Tom Wilson will be broadcasting live as well as streaming the meeting live on Facebook.

We published a special feature on self-governance in last week's Sota. And copies will be available for distribution at the public meeting.

These documents are the culmination of public meetings on the Lake Traverse Reservation over the past two years to determine the pros and cons, and whether or not for the SWST to embark on this self-determination, or self-governance, route with health care.

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The Tribe's Supreme Court last week Friday heard oral arguments in an appeal by former SWST Vice-Chairman Donovan White against his removal from office.

We attended as an opportunity to glimpse a process we've never seen before.

If you imagine the hearing to be a replay of the entire timeline of events, from suspension through removal, in Council and in Tribal Court, you would be mistaken.

The purpose of this appellate hearing is to determine whether or not Donovan White was afforded due process during his suspension and removal.

And that is what the three-judge panel will be

ruling on while deliberating during the next couple of weeks.

It comes down to how well the Tribe followed its Constitution and By-Laws in Donovan's removal from office, according to the three judges.

The SWO Supreme Court is comprised of: Chief Justice Hoyt, Olympia, Wash.; Associate Justice Patrick Donovan; and Associate Justice Erin Shanley (who is temporary while the Tribe's Judicial Committee advertises for a permanent replacement for former Associate Judge Russell Zepher, Oglala Sioux Tribal Attorney).

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We were surprised last Friday afternoon to learn that Superintendent Wally Leipart has resigned from his position with Sisseton Public Schools.

You can read the notice of his resignation elsewhere in this Sota.

We have no information about reasons for his departure, but were very pleased to have the Sisseton School Board plan its consultation with the Sisseton-Wahpeton Sioux Tribe this Monday at the Tribe's administration building. It seemed such a noticeable sign of much-needed cooperation.

We hope that Monday's meeting is well-attended. Watch for a report next week.

Millions of U.S. residents take proton pump inhibitors which are widely prescribed to treat heartburn, ulcers and other gastrointestinal problems. The drugs also are available over the counter under

brand names that include Prevacid, Prilosec and Nexium.

For the study, the researchers examined medical records of some 275,000 users of PPIs and nearly 75,000 people who took another class of drugs -- known as H2 blockers -- to reduce stomach acid. The research is published online July 3 in the journal *BMJ Open*.

"No matter how we sliced and diced the data from this large data set, we saw the same thing: There's an increased risk of death among PPI users," said senior author Ziyad Al-Aly, MD, an assistant professor of medicine. "For example, when we compared patients taking H2 blockers with those taking PPIs for one to two years, we found those on PPIs had a 50 percent increased risk of dying over the next five years. People have the idea that PPIs are very safe because they are readily available, but there are real risks to taking these drugs, particularly for long periods of time."

Both PPIs and H2 blockers are prescribed for serious medical conditions such as upper gastrointestinal tract bleeding, gastroesophageal reflux disease and esophageal cancer. Over-the-counter PPIs are most often used for heartburn and indigestion.

PPIs have become one of the most commonly used classes of drugs in the United States with 15 million monthly prescriptions in 2015 for Nexium alone, according to WebMD.

A kidney doctor by profession, Al-Aly has previously published studies linking PPIs to kidney disease, and other researchers have shown an association with other health problems. Al-Aly, first author Yan Xie, PhD, a data scientist, and colleagues reasoned that since each of these side effects carries a small risk of death, together they may affect the mortality rate of PPI users.

To find out, the researchers sifted through millions of de-identified veterans' medical records in a database maintained by the U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs. They identified 275,933 people who had been prescribed a PPI and 73,355 people prescribed an H2 blocker between October 2006 and September 2008, and noted how many died and when over the following five years. The database did not include information on cause of death.

Al-Aly and colleagues found a 25 percent increased risk of death in the PPI group compared with the H2 blocker group. The researchers calculate that, for every 500 people taking PPIs for a year, there is one extra death that would not have otherwise occurred. Given the millions of people who take PPIs regularly, this could translate into thousands of excess deaths every year, Al-Aly said.

The researchers also calculated the risk of death in people who were prescribed PPIs or H2

blockers despite not having the gastrointestinal conditions for which the drugs are recommended. Here, the researchers found that people who took PPIs had a 24 percent increased risk of death compared with people taking H2 blockers.

Further, the risk rose steadily the longer people used the drugs. After 30 days, the risk of death in the PPI and H2 blocker groups was not significantly different, but among people taking the drugs for one to two years, the risk to PPI users was nearly 50 percent higher than that of H2 blocker users.

Although the recommended treatment regimen for most PPIs is short -- two to eight weeks for ulcers, for example -- many people end up taking the drugs for months or years.

"A lot of times people get prescribed PPIs for a good medical reason, but then doctors don't stop it and patients just keep getting refill after refill after refill," Al-Aly said. "There needs to be periodic re-assessments as to whether people need to be on these. Most of the time, people aren't going to need to be on PPIs for a year or two or three."

# Open Letter to the Oyate

Hau Mitakuyapi.

On June 17, 2017, the Oceti Sakowin prisoners in the main prison in Sioux Falls put on one of the finest powwows ever experienced by our families and guests.

Our singers sang from their collections of personal songs given to them by the old masters. Their drumming took our microphones and subwoofers to the distant edges of thunder's timeless immortality.

The dancers moved in strategic rhythms of balance and timing. They came out in adornments of beads, sacred eagle feathers, leather with fringes, painted shields, selected bones and shells, copper bells, and ribbon shirts. The women carried their shawls and stepped gracefully inside the protection of their kindness and excellence.

Daya Returns from Scout gave us numerous performances dancing in traditional, fancy and in a jingle dress, in outfits, all made by her mother. Hundreds of cheers and compliments went up for this young Lakota woman.

Buffalo soup, Indian tacos, fried potatoes, wojapi, and fresh gourmet coffee were on our menu. Our foods always nourish us with natural blends of pure energy.

A defender and emissary of our Lakota people from the Sicangu homelands was in our presence. Rita Means is a powerful woman who believes in our civil rights,

As compared with the H2 blocker group, people in the PPI group were older (64 years old, on average, versus 61) and also somewhat sicker, with higher rates of diabetes, hypertension and cardiovascular disease. But these differences cannot fully account for the increased risk of death since the risk remained even when the researchers statistically controlled for age and illness.

Over-the-counter PPIs contain the same chemical compounds as in prescription PPIs, just at lower doses, and there is no way to know how long people stay on them. The Food and Drug Administration recommends taking PPIs no longer than four weeks before consulting a doctor.

Al-Aly emphasizes that deciding whether to take a PPI requires a risk-benefit calculation.

"PPIs save lives," Al-Aly said. "If I needed a PPI, I absolutely would take it. But I wouldn't take it willy-nilly if I didn't need it. And I would want my doctor to be monitoring me carefully and take me off it the moment it was no longer needed."

A Native writer was amongst us. Karen Testerman sat with us as a prominent journalist. Her eyes witnessed our thoughtfulness, emotions, concerns, and humor. She writes about our people because she possesses a silent determination to tell the truth.

Being a prison volunteer takes a lot of initiative and doesn't come easy. Mark Sanderson and Mary Montoya were recognized for spending their lives with us in service to our meetings and cultural events.

Our giveaway went off real smooth. We made sure everyone took something home. Chief Warden Dooley from the prison at Springfield sent bicycles in for our

children who eagerly received them.

An invitation to dance went out to our men and they did a long intertribal warrior special in their boots and particular clothing. A few summoned the spirit of relentlessness and kicked open lots of elaborate footwear. Some moved with absolute dignity and blew whistles with their fingers. The artistry of their tattoos and long braided hair looked outstanding.

Our women answered this call and did a ladies freestyle exhibition in their skirts, blue jeans, sandals, and jewelry. They did this as a sentiment of elegance to let the whole world know of their fearlessness and beauty.

The center of our circle was blessed with many of our children. McKenna Wendel always enriches us with a courteous smile and lots of precious harmony. Easton Cummings hailed in from the Pine Ridge Reservation with his family to be with his dad. We took up a collection of cash and gave it to him.

Gene Yellow Eagle and his family are lifetime contributors of buffalo meat and financial assistance for our gatherings. His son Thomas is imprisoned with us and we look after him. Gene is an adopted brother to our older prisoners.

We are now working on bringing Neil Young into prison to perform a concert for us sometime before the year is over. I'm inviting Rita Means, Waziyatawin, Myrna Thompson, Stephanie Autumn, Ernestine Chasing Hawk, Natalie Hand, and Cyndi Weddell to help us. We want him to perform here and then at the Royal River Casino in Flandreau on the same night. Our artists are ready to make a poster of Neil and his concert for us. I want to work with these women as a team of promoters and benefactors.

I wrote a chapter in the Handbook For Indigenous Minds Only as a tribute to Eldred "Nisko" Iron Moccasin and I'd like for all tribal prisoners and prison support systems to have this handbook. Nisko did a lot of time in the federal prison system. I'm searching for Willie Eagle Chasing who is his relative. The Handbook is available at [sarpress.sarweb.org](http://sarpress.sarweb.org) in Santa Fe, New Mexico.

On September 16, 2017, we invite Ione McCloskey and the family and friends of Marietta Pacheco to our powwow in Lakota memorial for this woman who was our greatest supporter. She made her final journey into the spirit world on July 4, 2017. We want the privilege of meeting Keith Rich Sr. and hearing his words.

We invite our Sisitunwan and Wahpetunwan people to bring Gabe and Diane Desrosiers, Bryan Akipa and his flutes, and the Vietnam Veterans in as security and our color guard.

## New tools to combat suicide in Indian country

Washington, DC – July 31, 2017 – Rep. Kristi Noem joined Reps. Raul Grijalva, Tom Cole and others in introducing H.R.3473, the Native American Suicide Prevention Act. The suicide crisis in Indian Country has had heartbreaking impacts on many tribal communities in South Dakota. Nationally, suicide is the second leading cause of death among 10-34 year-old Native Americans and Alaskan Natives. For ages 15-34, suicide occurs at a rate 1.5 times higher than the national average for that age group.

“Lakota Instructions for Living teaches ‘the hurt of one is the hurt of all,’” said Noem. “Tribal

communities in South Dakota have had to experience the hurt of losing a loved one to suicide far too many times in recent years. While I understand there are no words that can wipe away this pain, I want to make sure we have the tools in place to better prevent such hurt in the future. By supporting a more collaborative approach, I’m hopeful this legislation will lead to more effective interventions going forward.”

The Native American Suicide Prevention Act supports stronger collaborations between state and tribal governments in crafting and implementing suicide intervention

and prevention strategies.

This legislation follows work Noem did last Congress to promote mental health services within tribal communities. In 2015, Noem brought one of Congress’s leading voices on mental health, Rep. Tim Murphy – a psychologist, to Pine Ridge to meet with those fighting the tribal suicide epidemic. Because of their partnership, new provisions were drafted to help support and prioritize Native American suicide programs. These provisions were signed into law as part of the 21st Century CURES Act.

## Bills to combat human trafficking pass Commerce Committee

Washington, DC – Aug. 2, 2017 – U.S. Sen. John Thune (R-S.D.), chairman of the Senate Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation, today applauded the committee’s passage of his bipartisan legislation to combat human trafficking, the No Human Trafficking on Our Roads Act (S. 1532), and the Combatting Human Trafficking in Commercial Vehicles Act (S. 1536), of which he’s a cosponsor. They now head to the Senate floor for consideration.

“We must take action to combat the deplorable act of human trafficking in the United States,” said Thune. “The two bipartisan bills that passed the Commerce Committee today represent an important step toward achieving

that goal, and the sooner they get to the president’s desk, the sooner we can send a strong message to anyone who might consider engaging in this horrendous criminal activity.”

The No Human Trafficking on Our Roads Act would disqualify individuals from operating a commercial motor vehicle (CMV) for their lifetime if they used a CMV to commit a felony involving human trafficking. The Combating Human Trafficking in Commercial Vehicles Act would focus on the prevention of human trafficking by designating a human trafficking prevention coordinator at the U.S. Department of Transportation and would increase outreach, education, and reporting efforts at the Federal Motor Carrier Safety

Administration.

Thune introduced S. 1532 last month with Sens. Bill Nelson (D-Fla.), ranking member of the Commerce Committee, and Amy Klobuchar (D-Minn.), a member of the Commerce Committee, and cosponsored S. 1536, which was also introduced last month. The committee held a hearing on July 12 to explore the role that transportation providers play in combating human trafficking.

S. 1532 is supported by the National District Attorneys Association, Humanity United Action, the South Dakota Trucking Association, Schneider, UPS, the Retail Industry Leaders Association, and the National Retail Federation.

Sex Trafficking,” which found that Backpage.com knowingly facilitated criminal sex trafficking of vulnerable women and young girls and then covered up evidence of these crimes in order to increase its own profits.

The measure has been endorsed by the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children and other anti-trafficking advocates and law enforcement organizations.

Senator Portman: “Stopping trafficking is one of the great humanitarian and human rights causes of the 21st century. Our bipartisan investigation showed that Backpage knowingly facilitated sex trafficking on its website to increase its own profits, all at the expense of vulnerable women and young girls. For too long, courts around the country have ruled that Backpage can continue to facilitate illegal sex trafficking online with no repercussions. The Communications Decency Act is a well-intentioned law, but it was never intended to help protect sex traffickers who prey on the most innocent and vulnerable among us. This bipartisan, narrowly-crafted bill will help protect vulnerable women and young girls from these horrific crimes.”

Senator Blumenthal: “Our narrowly tailored legislation would give victims of sex trafficking their day in court. For too long, countless young people have been victims of prostitution, human trafficking, and horrendous violence through ads on websites like Backpage.com. This is not an abstract debate: these advertisements come with a real, unconscionable human cost.”

Senator McCain: “For years, Backpage.com has knowingly facilitated online sex trafficking and child exploitation, destroying the lives of innocent young women and girls,” said Senator McCain. “It is disgraceful that the law as written has protected Backpage from being held liable for enabling these horrific crimes. Our legislation would eliminate these legal protections and ensure companies like Backpage are

brought to justice for violating the rights of the most innocent among us.”

Senator McCaskill: “Until our investigation showed Backpage was actively facilitating sex trafficking, the company had repeatedly used the federal law that protects online platforms to escape accountability for the disgusting crimes it aided. But even as we’ve helped deny Backpage its legal shield in these cases, we need a broader effort to stop the next Backpage, before it starts. And that’s what this bipartisan bill is all about—better protecting Missouri’s families from sex trafficking by making clear to any company considering going into business with sexual predators, that the law won’t protect them from responsibility.”

Senator Cornyn: “We must do all we can to ensure victims of human trafficking receive the justice they deserve, and the first step is holding those who facilitate this heinous crime accountable. Child sex traffickers and their enablers should not be able to hide on the internet any longer.”

Senator Heitkamp: “For too long, websites like Backpage.com have profited from knowingly facilitating the sex trafficking of minors and others through the use of their online platform – in many instances, helping traffickers skirt law enforcement and their own standards to advertise minors for sex. And what’s worse: they’ve been able to continue doing this without penalty by claiming protection

under the First Amendment.

That’s a disgusting and cowardly invocation of one of our nation’s most cherished freedoms – neither the First Amendment nor the Communications Decency Act was written to shield those who help enslave and sell children for sex. It’s past time to hold websites that make money from sex trafficking accountable, just as our laws already do for traffickers, for the enslavement and abuse of men, women, and even children – who have been reportedly trafficked at a near 850 percent increase since 2010 largely because of the anonymity internet sales provide – and our bipartisan bill would work to do that by cracking down on these horrific crimes online.”

Senator Blunt: “Websites that turn a profit off the sexual exploitation of trafficking victims should not be afforded protection under the Communications Decency Act. This bill would make narrow but critical changes to the law to better protect victims and hold perpetrators accountable. I urge all of my colleagues to support this bill and provide law enforcement an important tool to combat human trafficking.”

Senator Brown: “We need to bring all traffickers to justice – no matter how they carry out this heinous crime. With evolving technology, we must ensure the law keeps pace with this modern-



Senator Lankford: “Heinous crimes like sex trafficking deserve to be met with the fullest extent of the law. We must eliminate loopholes to prevent any entity from avoiding

Senator Nelson: “Despite a myriad of laws designed to crackdown on child sex trafficking, it’s clear our work is not done. We must not only continue to aggressively go after the traffickers themselves but do more to curb online sex ads exploiting these young and innocent victims.”

Senator Rubio: “Perpetrators of human trafficking and websites like Backpage.com that knowingly facilitate sex trafficking of children must be held accountable. Sex trafficking is an ongoing issue in Florida and across our nation, and this legislation is an important step forward in ensuring that those engaging in and helping to facilitate these crimes are held responsible and all victims receive the justice they deserve.”

NOTE: The bipartisan Stop Enabling Sex Traffickers Act would clarify Section 230 of the Communications Decency Act to ensure that websites that knowingly facilitate sex trafficking can be held liable so that victims can get justice. This narrowly-crafted legislation offers three reforms to help sex trafficking victims. The bipartisan bill would:

- Allow victims of sex trafficking to seek justice against websites that knowingly facilitated the crimes against them;
- Eliminate federal liability protections for websites that assist, support, or facilitate a violation of federal sex trafficking laws; and
- Enable state law enforcement officials, not just the federal Department of Justice, to take action against individuals or businesses that violate federal sex trafficking laws.

## IHS to end some care at SD hospital

Wall Street Journal – July 28, 2017 – The Indian Health Service said Friday that it would permanently close critical medical services at a troubled hospital it operates in South Dakota a year after federal regulators found poor care at the facility.

The IHS, which provides health care to 2.2 million tribal members, will no longer offer emergency or inpatient services at its Sioux San Hospital in Rapid City, one of numerous facilities operated by the agency that have failed to meet basic standards for U.S. hospitals over the past few years. The agency said it would begin shutting down the services for good at Sioux San next July.

The IHS has faced mounting criticism from members of Congress and tribal leaders over conditions at its hospitals, which have been beset by unnecessary deaths, misdiagnoses and neglect, according to public documents and numerous interviews by The Wall Street Journal.

IHS had temporarily stopped offering emergency services at the Rapid City hospital last September following a May 2016 report by federal regulators that found dangerous problems there. But Friday’s announcement both expands and makes permanent the

closures.

In one case cited by regulators at the hospital, a six-month-old baby with an upper respiratory virus was sent home from the emergency room without any medical history taken or laboratory tests conducted. When the baby’s mother brought him back the next day, his conditioned having worsened, a provider found the baby had

been born about three months premature and had experienced serious respiratory problems for months. The baby was transferred to a different facility and ended up suffering a seizure.

In a statement, the IHS said it made the decision to permanently close the hospital’s emergency room and inpatient departments because of the age of the facility and its close proximity to Rapid City Regional Hospital, a non-IHS medical center where patients can be diverted.

The IHS said it would continue to offer nonemergency urgent care and outpatient services at Sioux San and had plans to build an outpatient health-care clinic to ultimately take the hospital’s place.

“Sioux San Hospital has a strong commitment to urgent care and we will continue to focus on improving patient care to meet

the needs of our patients and to enhance their quality of care,” said Jim Driving Hawk, the acting director of IHS’s Great Plains service area. “By providing the services the vast majority of our patients require, we will be able to serve those patient populations more efficiently and effectively.”

Tribal leaders were taken aback by the announcement, noting that the IHS hospital in Rapid City served people from dozens of tribes who live in the area, which is close to several large reservations.

“It’s a pretty significant decision about a major IHS facility, and there was no consultation with tribes,” said Jerilyn Church, chief executive of the Great Plains Tribal Chairmen’s Health Board.

In its statement, the agency said it had consulted with tribal leaders about how best to serve patients in the area and on plans to build a new clinic.

Willie Bear Shield, a tribal councilor with the Rosebud Sioux, said tribes in the Great Plains region had been working on plans to reopen the facility’s emergency room and improve its inpatient capabilities—but those plans were now uncertain.

Mr. Bear Shield said the Rosebud tribe planned to push both members of Congress and the IHS to reverse the agency’s decision to shut down the hospital’s main services.





If one have clearly instructed my doctor and my family on the matter. If I do not recognize my children and cannot or will not swallow fluid, and if there is no reasonable chance of recovery, then let nature take its course. No tubes.

## No Tubes (On End-Of-Life-Care and Hospice)

*By Richard P. Holm, MD*  
Twenty-five years ago or so, my 96-year-old Grandma refused to eat after her hip fracture surgery. Multiple strokes had lessened her mental function, but she knew enough to realize she was dying. Despite my dad and aunt's objections, the nursing home doctor put the feeding tube down her nose and then Grandma pulled it out. It went back in, then out again. The

horrible truth is that some three or four weeks later she died, arms restrained, feeding tube in place. There is no question that hydrating a sick patient who has a reasonable chance of recovery can sometimes bring them back to life. But the paradox of fluid replacement is that when a person is certainly dying, it only prolongs pain and suffering. This point is clarified with

the famous nationwide 1995 SUPPORT study which showed, time and time again, patients who had absolutely no chance of recovery were too often kept on fluids and in the ICU for many more days than appropriate, prolonging their suffering for naught. What's more, 50% of the conscious dying patients were later reported by family to be in moderate-to-severe pain at least half of the time.

Artificial hydration is defined as IV fluids or fluids given by feeding tube to someone who cannot or will not drink. Families and even some doctors struggle with the idea that not giving artificial hydration to a dying patient causes thirst and discomfort. But just the opposite is true.

During the dying process, as dehydration occurs, the body produces natural endorphins that numb the pain and bring comfort. If a person cannot drink or swallow and is not artificially hydrated, then that human being will slip

# #NoDAPL

## Sen. Heitkamp defends law enforcement's response to #NoDAPL movement

Indianz.com – Aug. 2, 2017 – Sen. Heidi Heitkamp (D-North Dakota) is known as an outspoken advocate for Indian Country's most vulnerable, particularly youth, but her efforts don't extend to the #NoDAPL movement.

In a letter to Attorney General Jeff Sessions, Heitkamp defended the way local and state law enforcement responded to the movement. Even though officers repeatedly employed aggressive tactics and relied on assistance from non-licensed security firms, she said they "performed admirably."

"North Dakota law enforcement performed admirably under immense pressure and scrutiny to maintain the peace and protect public property, including federal land," Heitkamp wrote on Monday.

As a result, she believes the state is entitled to \$13.85 million in "compensation" from the federal government. She called on the Department of Justice to award a grant under an "emergency" assistance program that excludes tribes.

"Despite the location on federal land and stress to local resources, federal support was extremely limited throughout the engagement," Heitkamp wrote in the letter, which her office released on Tuesday.

The so-called "engagement" lasted from late July / early August 2016 through the middle of February 2017. During that time, the state claims it spent \$40 million to keep up with anti-pipeline activities.

Even though the state is flush with billions of dollars in energy

production taxes, Gov. Doug Burgum (R) asked President Donald Trump for an emergency disaster declaration in hopes of recovering some of the costs. The request was denied in May.

But the state didn't seem to be too bothered because Heitkamp and Sen. John Hoeven (R-North Dakota), the chairman of the Senate Committee on Indian Affairs, secured \$15 million for the Emergency Federal Law Enforcement Assistance Program in an appropriations bill that Trump signed into law that same month.

The provision was buried deep in the H.R.244, the Consolidated Appropriations Act. It's found in Section 542, on page 233 of the 1,665-page measure.

To get the money, the two lawmakers had to dig even deeper. They went all the way back to a law passed in 1984 that authorizes states -- but not tribes -- to seek "emergency" assistance from the federal government for law enforcement crises.

The unique provision allows the state to obtain reimbursement for events that occurred in "fiscal years 2016 and 2017," which would basically cover the 233 days that the governor said were spent by law enforcement. The #NoDAPL encampment, parts of which were located on federal land, was officially shut down in February after hosting tens of thousands of people.

According to the Bureau of Justice Assistance, an agency at the Department of Justice, the Emergency Federal Law Enforcement Assistance Program has been used by states to deal with earthquakes, hurricanes, the standoff

at Waco, Texas, in 1993 and the Rodney King and Reginald Denny cases in California.

In her letter, Heitkamp said the state spent so much time on the #NoDAPL movement because the Obama administration never made a decision on the final portion of the pipeline in North Dakota. That changed right after Trump took office -- he directed his team to "expedite" the project and it was approved two weeks later over the objections of the Standing Rock Sioux Tribe and the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe.

A federal judge has since ruled that the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers failed to consider the tribes' concerns about treaty rights, water resources and environmental justice. But the decision came after oil started flowing through the pipeline on June 1.

The tribes are hoping to shut down operations while the case continues. The wealthy backers of the pipeline, with support from the energy industry, is strongly opposing their request.

Judge James Boasberg ordered the Army Corps to conduct a more thorough review of the final portion of the pipeline, which crosses federally-managed land less than a half-mile from Standing Rock. But the Trump team has indicated it will take months before it gets there.

"The Corps is actively evaluating the issues remanded to it by the court and expects to complete its review of those issues by late December 2017," government attorneys wrote in a July 17 brief.

Heitkamp reinforced that the Corps failed to take action to limit the size of the camp, damage to the land, and to make a timely decision on whether to issue the final permit to build the pipeline.

"Throughout the many months of the Dakota Access pipeline protests, North Dakota law enforcement worked around the clock to keep communities, protesters, tribes, and workers safe -- hoping federal agencies would step in to reinforce their efforts to keep the peace. But for months, no relief came, allowing local tensions and camps to swell as once-strong local relationships frayed, lands were damaged, and local law enforcement struggled," said Heitkamp. "Now that Congress has opened a potential avenue for emergency

funding, as I pushed for, it's time for the Attorney General to make sure the federal government does its part by approving North Dakota's

application for the funding so that as our state and local enforcement do not have to continue to bear the repercussions of the costs associated

with managing the protests. The last thing we need is to have to cut law enforcement funding because of the high costs already incurred."

## New report reveals water threats posed by the "Dirty Three's" pipeline routes

Commondreams.org – Aug. 4, 2017 – A recently released Greenpeace report found four proposed pipelines that would transport diluted bitumen extracted from the Canada's Alberta tar sands to the United States pose grave threats to water resources along the pipelines' routes.

The three companies—TransCanada, Kinder Morgan, Enbridge, and their subsidiaries—that would construct the pipelines already operate a vast pipeline network that transports fossil fuels throughout North America, and they have a well documented history of spilling hazardous liquids and polluting natural resources.

In fact, "a recent review by oil industry trade organizations found that pipeline incidents 'impacting the public or environment' (IPE) have increased in the past 4 years." Since 2010, according to the Greenpeace report (pdf), the

three companies "have seen 373 hazardous liquid spills from their U.S. pipeline networks," releasing a total of "63,221 barrels of hazardous liquids"—including thousands of barrels of diluted bitumen, which is more difficult to remove from water than conventional crude oil because it sinks. Researchers also mapped the past seven years of spills, illustrating the wide reach of the pipeline network's environmental destruction.

Based on recent spill rates, Greenpeace researchers predict that TransCanada's 1,179-mile Keystone XL pipeline—which has received support from the Trump administration after hitting roadblocks during the Obama era—would likely see at least 59 significant spills in its 50-year lifetime.

Of the three other proposed pipelines—TransCanada's Energy

East, Kinder Morgan's Trans Mountain, and Enbridge's Line 3 Expansion—researchers estimate that the 1,031-mile Line 3 project would also experience about one significant spill per year for 50 years.


Enbridge, the company responsible for the Line 3 project, spilled more than 20,000 barrels, or an estimated 843,000 gallons, of diluted bitumen into the Kalamazoo River in Michigan in 2010, contaminating almost 40 miles of the river.

"The spilled bitumen sunk to the bottom of the river triggering a years-long, billion dollar clean-up operation that required dredging the river bottom," the report noted.

Last year, the Environmental Project Agency and the Justice Department reached a \$177 million settlement with the company over the spill.

Greenpeace and other environmental advocates—including many indigenous people who live along the proposed routes—are urging the pipelines' financial backers to pull out, in hopes of

## Urges A.G. to approve ND's application for DAPL reimbursement

Washington, DC – U.S. Sen. Heidi Heitkamp has urged U.S. Attorney General Jeff Sessions to approve North Dakota's application to recover a portion of the nearly \$40 million that state and local governments in North Dakota spent to keep local residents, protesters, tribes, and workers safe throughout the months-long protests surrounding the Dakota Access pipeline.

Heitkamp has long been pushing congressional leadership and appropriators for federal resources to compensate North Dakota's outlay in relation to the protests, focusing earlier this year on funding and making available assistance through the U.S. Department of Justice's Emergency Federal Law Enforcement Assistance

(EFLEA) Program, which had not had sufficient funds available for several years.

In May, Heitkamp helped secure an additional \$15 million in funds for the EFLEA program.

At the end of June, North Dakota applied for \$13.85 million for reimbursements to compensate for law enforcement expenditures – of an estimated \$40 million in costs the state incurred to keep communities protected and clean-up the protest site.

Now that the state has formally applied, Heitkamp is pushing to make sure North Dakota receives the reimbursements it deserves.

Underscoring to Sessions the wide scope of the protests – with the main protest camp located on U.S. Army Corps of Engineers land –

delaying or effectively ending the projects.

"The costs of these pipeline projects, all being fronted by banks like JPMorgan Chase, TD, Wells Fargo, and Citi, each run into multiple billions of dollars," Greenpeace said in statement. "Greenpeace USA and Greenpeace

Canada are part of an international coalition of civil society and Indigenous organizations campaigning to urge financial institutions to pull their investments in tar sands pipelines and the Dirty Three because of the financial and reputational risks they pose."

(Pierre) – South Dakota State Treasurer Rich Sattgast announced a record \$27.5 million in Unclaimed Property was returned last year.

"Our purpose is to reunite South Dakotans with their lost property," said Sattgast. Even with a banner year, 1 in 4 South Dakotans still has Unclaimed Property. The Treasurer strongly encourages all residents to check the state's database to see if they are owed money. It's easy, free and only takes a minute to search online at [www.sdtreasurer.gov](http://www.sdtreasurer.gov).

Most people don't even realize the state is holding their money because it comes from a variety of sources dating back many years. Unclaimed property includes money from inactive bank accounts, uncashed paychecks or unclaimed utility deposits from a previous residence. Once these accounts become stale, it is up to the State

Treasurer to try to return the money to its rightful owner.

"This is money that belongs to average citizens and never reverts to the state," Sattgast said. "Outreach is so important. If I can return this money, it eventually enters the local economy which is good for all of South Dakota."

The South Dakota Unclaimed Property program has returned \$62 million over the past three years.

The State Treasurer's office works to return the money by advertising in newspapers and at fairs and events across the state.

There is no time limit to claim property and since new properties are added all of the time, Treasurer Sattgast encourages everyone to routinely check the Unclaimed Property website at [www.sdtreasurer.gov](http://www.sdtreasurer.gov) or call toll free in South Dakota at 1-866-357-2547.

### MYTH

**Children who are being sexually abused will always exhibit fear of their abuser.**

Perpetrators will often convince the child that the abuse is an expression of 'love' to encourage the child to submit, participate willingly and maintain secrecy. Children often do not tell because the person abusing them is someone they know well, trust, and often love, and are not even aware that what is happening to them is wrong.

When these children realize later that the behavior was inappropriate, they are often overwhelmed by feelings of guilt and shame, and suffer on account of their abuser's manipulation, struggling to come to terms with their own innocence and naivete as a child.

### Non Directory Records Permission

The Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA) (20 U.S.C. §1232g; 34 CFT Part 99) is a Federal law that protects the privacy of student education records.



# Trauma Informed Training opportunities come to the Lake Traverse Reservation

Students and faculty from the University of Virginia, Project Rise, Global Grounds and Global Studies facilitated a week-long Trauma Informed Training at Sisseton Wahpeton College for those who work with youth and families on the Lake Traverse Reservation.

The training was developed with the following in mind:  
 "Despite the increased exposure we have to one another's lived experiences via social media, we often are unaware of the actual circumstances each of us endures day to day. We can safely assume, however that the vast majority of us has endured at least one direct cause of traumatic stress and possibly much more indirectly.

As helpers and supporters we must:  
 Develop the skills to recognize signs of trauma, to teach coping skills to those impacted by it, and to utilize a trauma-first framework to understand behavioral challenges present in many youth and families."

The five days of training consisted of:  
 \*Introduction to Trauma-informed Practices & Creating Opportunities for Understanding Experiences Youth supporters of the Lake Traverse Reservation.

\*Considerations of Trauma-informed Educational Practices. Cultural Linkages between Black and Native forms of culturally embedded coping through Trauma.

\*Exploration of cultural practices and traditions of the Dakotah people as mechanisms of healing to trauma.

\*Consideration of current coping strategies of Youth Supporters. Learn new skills for managing stress and trauma as a means of self-care and caring for others. Reflection on implementation of workshop training and development of next steps.

In addition to the training four students stayed for the month of

July to help apply the trauma informed techniques into the different departments they were placed with, the Youth Department, Meth Outpatient, Crisis Response Center and the Education Department.

Each student also stayed with a host family to learn more about the communities and share their college experiences with local youth.

The Trauma Informed Training is one of the steps of developing a Trauma Informed Mentorship/Peer Program for youth on the Lake Traverse Reservation.

The Trauma Informed Training is one of the emerging partnership projects of the University of Virginia and Nis'to Incorporated, a local non-profit to bring opportunities to the Lake Traverse Reservation.

### Comments by participants

This training has been described as "a much-needed step towards creating a healthy mentorship program for our youth and young adults."

Oyate are asked to "help us build and develop the mentorship programming."

"Writing our own narrative and traumatic shifts so we understand why our own trauma, critical issues and coping skills are the way they are and who how what is something that will be discussed."

"We drafted what we think our own individual well-being model could look like with a few changes after discussion of family and where it would fit."

"Exploring what is ideal vs reality and how we work from reality to what we feel is ideal."

"For those that work in these spaces with our youth and families, this trainings approach is unique because we are writing our own vs. being told what is known about us."

"As a young person in our communities we need to stand up and know when to stand up. It's not always easy to put ourselves in a position to help

and it's not always hard. We must believe in ourselves, stay in school and discipline ourselves. Believe in ourselves and what we think of ourselves matters, and don't worry what others think or say of us because they are not us."






Today our ongoing 2 year/month long project transitions into long distance working. The UVA students are flying home to their tiwaha's to recharge before their intense academic schedules begin. They've spent a month working on helping us change our work to include the trauma informed approaches that we definitely need. 



**Two more defendants plead guilty in casino blackjack scheme**

Aberdeen, SD – KSFY-TV (AP) – Aug. 3, 2017 – Two more defendants have admitted playing roles in a blackjack scheme that authorities say involved the theft of \$10,000 from the Dakota Sioux Casino near Watertown.

The American News reports that 44-year-old Lito Bolocon and 29-year-old Jordan Rondell both pleaded guilty this week in federal court to conspiracy.

Four people were indicted in the case in February, including Jeremy Brown, who pleaded guilty in May to conspiracy. Fern Gill has pleaded not guilty and is scheduled for trial later this month.

Court documents indicate Brown and Gill were blackjack dealers at the casino, Rondell was a

card player and Bolocon was the pit boss supervising the blackjack area.

Authorities allege Brown and Gill payed Rondell for bets on losing hands. Bolocon is accused of knowingly allowing the payouts.


