

WHAT WE **focus**

Fish is the main source of protein for the people of Sao Tome and Principe, an island nation in the Gulf of Guinea over 200 km off the coast of Gabon. The fisheries sector provides jobs for thousands of people and represents the most important revenue source for low-income families after cacao.

Fisheries in Sao Tome and Principe are largely artisanal and focused on coastal pelagics. Catches are sold mostly fresh on the domestic market where demand is strong because of demographic growth. In addition, the species targeted – flying fish, little tunny, frigate tuna, bigeye scad, decapterus nei, blue runner, balao halfbeak, skipjack tuna - represent a source of affordable and safe animal protein.

FISH4ACP aims to strengthen the coastal pelagic sector in Sao Tome and Principe to contribute to food and nutrition security.

FISH4ACP's activities focus on improving stock management, professionalizing fishers and traders, improving the safety of boats, while also strengthening the cold-chain and transportation services, and support development of new fish products for the domestic market.

Facts figures

Sao Tome and Principe's fish consumption has increased over recent years, reaching 30 kg per capita per year, the highest among the coastal countries of Central Africa.

Fish provides more than **50 percent** of protein
consumed in Sao Tome and Principe.

All all coastal pelagics caught in Sao Tome and Principe's are **destined** for **domestic consumption.**

Coastal pelagic fishing employs some 4 100 artisanal fishermen and 2 800 female fishmongers. At least 37 coastal communities depend on it.
