## Transition team breaks huddle

The Federal Way First! Transition Team is ready to go to work.

Team members announced Friday that their membership is almost complete and they're on the verge of securing funding, setting a budget, renting an office and hiring a small staff and consultants. The self-appointed team is made up of 25 members so far — several others may be asked to join — and consists primarily of

residents and representatives of local taxing districts such as the fire district and utilities.

The team hopes to gather information that will be useful to the still-to-be-elected Federal Way City Council, study issues facing the new city and even make recommendations to the council on some issues.

"We want to be as supportive of the council as we can," said Maryann Mitchell, team member.

TEAM MEMBERS have heard criticism that they are trying to make city policy without being elected by residents, Mitchell said. That's not true, she said. The team only hopes to provide several options to council members so they can get the new city going as quickly as possible.

The team hopes to meet with the 14 candidates who survive the May 16 primary. Only seven will be elected to the council in

the Sept. 19 final election, but the team hopes to get started studying the issues before the council members take office.

Members stressed the team is non-partisan and will not endorse any council candidates. No council candidates, or anyone who plans to seek employment with the new city, is allowed to be a team member.

## Mad mom

Release of suspect questioned

Helen Rios believes the system that was set up to protect her and her 11-year-old daughter has let them down.

She is disturbed that a man accused of stalking and then trying to kidnap her young daughter was released on bail in March from the King County Jail and she was not notified. The 18-year-old man lives just blocks from her home. "I don't think it's right they let him out for something as serious as this. And then not to notify us...where is the justice?" Rios asked.

A March 9 police report states that Rios reported a man in a car had been following her daughter to and from school all week. That was a Thursday. On Friday, March 10, a second police report states that as the girl walked home from Lake Grove Elementary School, the man pulled alongside her in his car and ordered her in.

THE GIRL told police she walked away from the car and the man got out and grabbed her and tried to drag her to his car. She said she kicked him, he let go, and she was able to run the last few yards into her home. She locked the doors and hid until an adult friend of her mother's arrived home to call police 2½ hours later.

Rios said her daughter was traumatized by the incident and still has nightmares about the attempted abduction.

Police traced the man through a license plate number the family provided in earlier reports and arrested him later that night. The girl identified him from photos as the man who had been following her and had tried to abduct her.

## Fred Meyer deal closer

Fred Meyer and Quadrant Corp. officials announced Friday they have reached tentative agreement on a deal to sell a 19-acre parcel of land in West Campus to Fred Meyer for a new store site. The price was undisclosed.

Officials of the Portland-based retailing giant had announced earlier they were negotiating with the Quadrant Corp. to buy the land at the southeast corner of Southwest 336th Street and 21st Avenue Southwest behind Albertson's.

If the sale goes through, Fred Meyer will build its store in West Campus instead of at a site near Mirror Lake that had been opposed by many Federal Way residents.

However, Fred Meyer will buy the West Campus site only if it receives a hassle-free approval on the store construction from King County's Building and Land Development Division (BALD), said Cheryl Perrin, vice president of public affairs for Fred Meyer.

That means getting approval from BALD to build on the West Campus site without having to prepare an environmental impact statement (EIS). Fred Meyer consultants are currently completing an EIS that had been required on the Mirror Lake site at Southwest 312th Street and First Avenue South.

"We don't want to be in a position of owning two sites in Federal Way," Perrin said. Fred Meyer plans to sell the original site if the West Campus deal goes through.

## Community council vote fails to remove Hale

Federal Way Community Council President John Hale has survived an attempt to remove him from office.

The council voted on Hale's removal from office Thursday. At least two-thirds of the 27 members present would have had to vote against Hale to remove him from office, according to rules the council set. Less than two-thirds voted to remove Hale, but the council decided not to reveal the exact vote totals of the secret ballot.

Hale became the target of criticism from some members soon after he took office in January. Some members said Hale lacked leadership skills and did not conduct meetings in a "positive, impartial manner," according to a statement issued to members before Thursday's vote.

That statement, signed by members Jim Cron, Mary Ehlis, Sue Font, Lisa Grimes, Dave Kaplan, Dale Roper and Pat Woodey, and another statement issued by Hale, were not to be

given to the press or other non-members, but the Federal Way News obtained copies.

Hale said in his statement that the charges against him were too vague to defend himself against.

Despite Thursday's vote allowing Hale to remain in office, Hale said in a private interview after the meeting he will resign soon anyway. Hale was not present at the meeting, because he was asked by several members not to attend, he said.

"I see the council is split in

half," Hale said. "But, I hope it will hold together."

AN INCREASING workload, college classes and the bitterness generated by the removal effort are the reasons Hale said he will resign.

"This is a volunteer job," Hale said. "It's not like being in the U.S. Congress. There should be some pleasure in it and a chance to accomplish something for the community."

"That's something I haven't been able to do." Neither Jim Cron nor Dale

Roper, who first proposed the removal in a petition drafted in March, would comment on the issue after Thursday's vote.

The community council is a volunteer group of residents who advise the King County Council

on issues in Federal Way. The group has no official decision-making power. Most of the council's members are elected, but some are appointed. Council

## Citizen-soldiers get bigger quarters

Along Military Road in Kent sits a quiet base full of citizen-soldiers ready to protect the state or the nation in a time of crisis.

Military Road, built in 1857, was a two-horse dirt road designed to transport troops in case the Northwest Territory was threatened with war. Although a war never occurred, the Northwest militia was ready.

Today, Military Road is overshadowed by Interstate 5, but

the part-time soldiers in Kent still are ready for a crisis on a minute's notice, even if it means leaving their full-time jobs as carpenters, teachers or engineers. Although there have been many names for such soldiers over the years, such as the Minutemen, militia and the Washington Territorial Volunteers, they are known now as the National Guard.

CAPT. BOB Stafford of the 161st Infantry describes them as "citizen soldiers."

"The National Guard en-

compasses the entire commercial market," Stafford said. "We are the equivalent to the Minutemen of the 1700s."

The Kent National Guard base, which consists of about an acre of buildings, houses the headquarters for the Third Battalion, 161st Mechanized Infantry. There are approximately 450 soldiers on the site, which is scheduled to be remodeled to the tune of nearly \$3 million.

The National Guard opened bids for the job April 18, and the apparent low-bidder was

Eberharter Construction Group Inc. of Seattle, at \$2,779,000. Coupled with a 2 percent contingency fund for unexpected overruns and engineer and architect fees, the total project costs come to \$2.97 million, said Arnie Urlocker, construction officer for the project.

The bid hasn't officially been awarded yet. That should happen sometime around May 30, with work to begin soon after, Urlocker said.

## It's time to put lid on tideflats teapot

On the tideflats of Commencement Bay, a \$48 million teapot may soon be steaming — unless Gov. Gardner hears that residents of Federal Way don't want to pay for a tea party.

Preoccupied by the city council race here, both voters and city leaders may fail to see the urgency of the matter. That leaves the lobbying effort to veteran campaigners for the City of Tacoma.

They haven't missed the chance, but have buzzed Gardner's staff repeatedly with their message, which suggests that "only a few" have griped about the failure to demand an environmental impact statement for the project.

They couldn't be more misleading. In fact, the naysayers on this project include King County, the Federal Way Community Council, citizens' groups on Browns Point and Dash Point, and Sen. Peter von Reichbauer of the 30th District. On Gardner's desk, in fact, is a piece of legislation authored by von Reichbauer which would make an EIS mandatory. It only needs the governor's signature — and already has earned almost universal approval from legislators.

Meanwhile, the City of Tacoma has mounted a blitzkrieg public relations effort to sway the governor and the public. That effort, which includes considerable time and money, has been justified in the name of controlling cost, a paradoxical kind of logic.

It would make more sense if the city would acquiesce to citizen demand for the EIS, the ultimate public relations gesture, one that spends ratepayer dollars to protect ratepayer safety and to decide whether the teapot was worth buying in the first place.

Unless you request an absentee ballot from King County Records and Elections (296-1600) by May 10, you must vote in person at your regular polling place.

You are eligible as long as you are a registered voter, even if you did not vote in the cityhood election.

About the candidates: They are running at-large, not by district. There are seven council seats up for grabs. The top two votegetters in each position will go onto the ballot this fall. The primary is crucial. It will eliminate all but 14 candidates.

To help you make your decisions, we will publish a comprehensive 20-page candidate profile (delivered to subscribers and in newsstands on Wednesday, May 10).

Our endorsements will be published separately on the same day (see Comment page).

For your convenience, endorsements will be repeated on Sunday, May 14 in a sample ballot. But we hope you will study the candidate profile carefully, and will make your own thoughtful decision, for the sake of your new city.

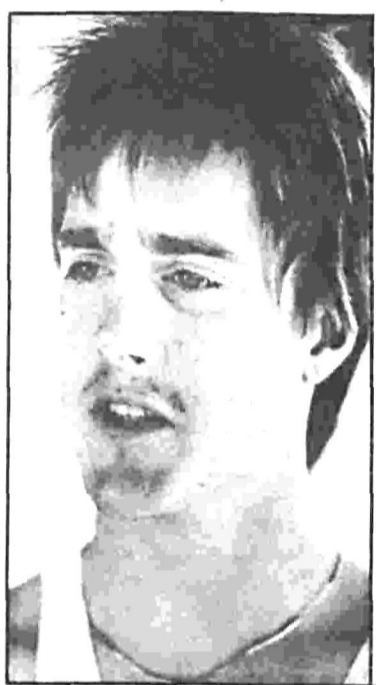

I have a neighbor who says the city council elections are an amateur horse race.

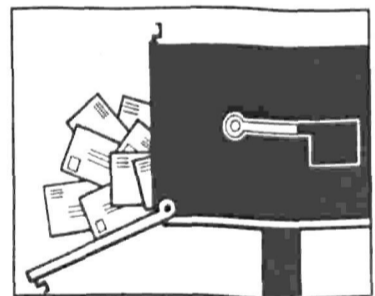

**THE TEAM** has formed committees to study the following issues: contracted services, community planning, purchasing and public works, organization and procedures, financial management, personnel, transportation, facilities and equipment, and parks. Most of the work will include

gathering information and talking to representatives of other cities and will be done on an all-volunteer basis.

However, some issues are complicated and the team plans to hire consultants to study them, Mitchell said.

That means coming up with some money to pay those consultants. The business community has been financially supportive of the team's efforts, Mitchell said.

However, team members are sensitive to any appearance of a

conflict of interest and have arranged a double-blind type of funding arrangement.

Local civil engineer Kent Stepan will receive all payments from whoever wants to donate to the group. He will in turn pass the money to the team, but will not reveal the source of the funding, Mitchell said.

That should avoid the appearance of a conflict of interest if, for instance, the team was studying the provision of a service that might be provided by a business that contributed to the

team. **ALSO, ALL** team meetings will be open to the public, with the possible exception of team steering committee meetings that are sometimes hastily called, Mitchell said.

All meetings will be held at 7:30 p.m., every Monday, at the former Federal Way Fire Station at South 312th Street and 28th Avenue South.

Two projects the team has identified include revising the existing Federal Way Communi-

ty Plan and creating a model police contract budget.

Member and local land-use activist Dick Burris will study the community plan — the King County zoning and land use document — and suggest possible changes to the plan.

Member and King County police Capt. Ollie Moore will work on creating a model of what police services might be included in a contract between the new city and King County.

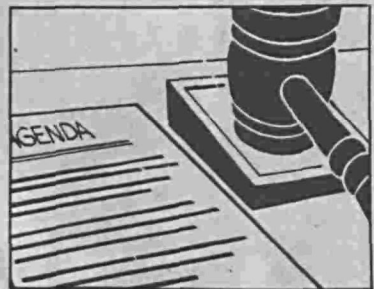

# Mother upset by suspect's release

Way, was charged the following day with second-degree attempted kidnapping, said Dan Donahoe of the King County Prosecutor's office. He entered a plea of innocent at his arraignment and was released March 22 after a bond hearing at which his bail was reduced to \$3,000 from \$25,000. No one from the prosecutor's office was at that hearing, Donahoe said.

**NORMALLY**, a victim or family members are notified when someone accused of similar crimes is released from jail, Donahoe said, but when a bail hearing is set after the initial court appearance, the prosecutor's office is not always

notified of the results.

"It's not usual, but sometimes we're not notified, either. But if we are, generally we will call the family or the victim," he said.

The girl's mother, however, finds little solace in that explanation, mostly because the man she believes tried to harm her daughter is free and not far away. She discovered he had been released two weeks after the fact when she called the courts to check on a court date, she said.

"Considering the nature of the crime, it's very upsetting. They call it second-degree kidnapping because they didn't know his intent. His intent was not to take her to church," Rios said.

But Hansen's attorney, Timothy Sell, said he believes the bail set for his client and the conditions of his release are reasonable.

"**HE IS** basically under house arrest. He can leave only to report to his two jobs and then return home. He is not allowed to drive and he is not to go within five blocks of the alleged victim and crime scene," Sell said.

Sell also said there are discrepancies between the girl's story and what he and his client view as the facts. He said an "unbiased witness" puts Hansen more than 10 miles from the scene of one of the stalking incidents at the time it was alleged to have happened.

"In light of that, and the

seriousness of the alleged crime — it's not that serious a charge — we think the bail and release are very reasonable," Sell said.

Second-degree attempted kidnapping is a Class C felony and the standard sentencing range is three to six months, which would be served in the King County Jail, Donahoe and Sell explained.

To file first-degree kidnapping charges, the prosecutor's office would have to prove Hansen intended to hold the girl for ransom or as a hostage, or inflict injuries, Donahoe said.

The trial for Hansen, who has two previous juvenile court convictions — one for burglary in 1982 and one for assault in 1988 — is set for July 10.

# Guard will grow as armory is remodeled

**THREE SMALLER** buildings will be torn down in order to build an armory and a battalion headquarters, according to project manager Neil Kemper of Meng Associates, the architects. The 12-month project should be finished by June 1990.

The project will include an indoor firing range, classrooms and a 400-person assembly hall, which will be made available to the public upon request.

"The new armory will include a mess hall with enough space available for civic meetings and banquets," Stafford said. "After all, this is being paid for by taxpayers' dollars."

The Tacoma National Guard Armory also will get a new look. In fact, the fortress-like armory no longer will be used to keep people out, but to keep people in. The guard will lease its armory to house 140 prisoners from the overflowing Pierce County jail.

Although the Tacoma National Guard chased the likes of Pancho Villa in New Mexico and fought in two World Wars, the Kent Armory has a less colorful history. The base sits on what used to be a Nike missile site. The post-World War II buildings that need to be torn down housed radar for air defense. The new buildings will mean an extra 60-soldier unit can move in from Puyallup.

**THE STATE-COMMANDED** "citizen-soldiers" in Kent and throughout the nation are supposed to be ready for a crisis or disaster at any time. They have been called out for forest fires, floods and the eruption of Mount St. Helens. Although the guard is responsible to the state governor, President George Bush could call out the National Guard after conferring with Gov. Booth Gardner.

The guard also is ready for war, whether it is Vietnam or the new war on drugs. Bush has allocated \$369,880 to the Washington National Guard to back up law enforcement agencies in their fight against the current drug problem.

Guard members receive benefits that include the G.I. Bill and the Student Loans Repayment Plan, which pays soldiers

up to \$20,000 plus interest on outstanding student loans. The National Guard requires that all soldiers put in six years, active time, serving one weekend a month and going to annual two-week summer camps. For their services, these soldiers are paid a starting salary of about \$1,500 per year.

Critics of the National Guard object to the "weekend warrior" status of the soldiers. They complain that soldiers are in it only for the money and benefits, but if faced with a serious crisis they would not be well-prepared.

During the presidential campaign, Vice President Dan Quayle received much criticism for joining the National Guard and not serving in the Vietnam War.

members live both inside and outside the boundaries of the new city of Federal Way.

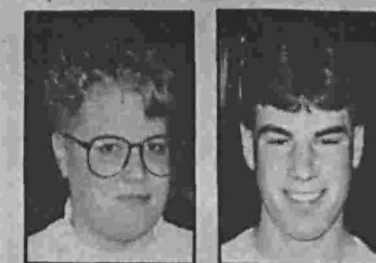
**IN ACCORDANCE** with rules the council's executive board set last month, there was no discussion about Hale's removal at Thursday's meeting.

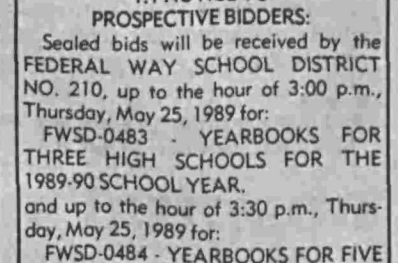

# Nautilus math wizards log big win

If it takes eight minutes to saw a log in five pieces, how long would it take to saw the same log into 10 pieces?  
Stumped?  
Well, so were members of the Nautilus Elementary School fifth-grade Math Olympiad team. But not for long.  
"It was my problem and I looked it over and I said it couldn't be as easy as it looked," recalled Brian Merritt. "I asked Allen (Pelley) and I asked everybody. It was one of the last problems we solved on that test."

Brian, Allen and teammates Charlie Minarsich and Marc Reyhner resorted to a tactic they had learned from their teacher, Penny Merriman. They drew a sketch.

The sketch revealed that dividing a log into five pieces would require four cuts. If the total job took eight minutes, that means each cut took two minutes.

They then deduced that cutting a log into 10 pieces would require nine cuts. At two minutes a cut, that's 18 minutes.

"There were lots of trick questions," said Charlie.

APPARENTLY, they were not tricky enough to fool the Nautilus team very often.

By scoring 100 out of 120 points, Brian, Charlie, Allen and Marc, aided in spirit by alternate Willie Chang, took first place in the fifth-grade division of the statewide Math Olympiad, which attracted 299 teams in grades five to eight to Blaine

last month.  
"I was sort of pessimistic," said Willie. "I thought someone would work harder than us."  
That would have taken some doing.  
Beginning in October, the team, aided by Merriman and volunteer parents Maryann Pelley and Mike Garver, practiced together twice a week after school and on their own at home.  
"It wasn't easy for them to come every Tuesday and Thursday after school," said Merriman.

MERRIMAN, who has been taking teams to the Math Olympiad for several years, picked this year's team members based on their performances on various tests and classwork earlier this year.

The Math Olympiad challenges students in six different categories: algebra, geometry, probability and statistics, calculator, potpourri and arithmetic.

What category was the hardest?  
"I think calculus was the hardest," said Brian.

"You mean calculators," corrected Allen. "Big difference."  
Each team had 15 minutes to answer six questions on each test. The questions were worth varying amounts of points, depending on their difficulty.

The Nautilus team divided each test's questions among its four members.

"The team would look at the makeup of the team and they would decide among themselves who would do what problem,"

said Merriman. "They then all kind of checked it to make sure it was right."

"Some of these kids don't get along really well in class or on the playfield, but for the Math Olympiad they really pulled together as a team. They just seemed to put aside their personality problems and recognized their abilities in math."

They also recognized when another team appeared to be cheating.

"There was a team sitting behind Allen and Marc who were always looking at our answers," recalled Brian.

If that team indeed was cheating, it certainly didn't prosper because the Nautilus team began writing wrong answers on its practice sheets, saving the correct answer for a well-hidden final answer sheet.

THIS YEAR'S Math Olympiad was different than in other years. Instead of awarding ribbons to the top teams in each of the six categories, ribbons were awarded on the basis of the combined scores from all six categories.

Merriman said previous Nautilus teams have placed first in individual categories, but this year's victory is special because it required an excellent performance in all six categories.

Nautilus team members said they are interested in math because they are planning careers that require advanced skills.

In some cases, they may have come by their interest naturally.  
"I kind of think some of us

have inherited math skills," said Marc, whose mother, Margaret, is a first-grade teacher and whose father, Ted, is a Boeing engineer with a doctorate from Stanford in fluid mechanics.

Merriman confirmed that a lot of her students already are planning careers, many of them in fields such as medicine, engineering and physics.

"I don't know if it's because we live near Boeing or because science is in the news a lot," said Merriman.

Explained Allen, "I'm going to be either an accountant or an aeronautical engineer and you need quite a lot of math skills and you don't want to pull out your calculator every second of the day."

"Yeah, what if your battery goes dead?" agreed Marc.

"What if there's not enough light to use solar power?" added Allen.

The Birthing Event will conclude with a short performance by Show Biz Kids, a Federal Way children's performing team.

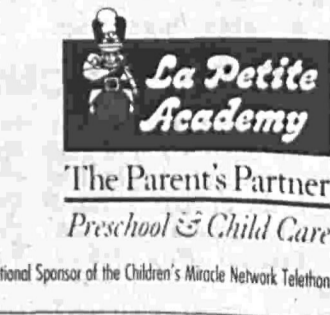

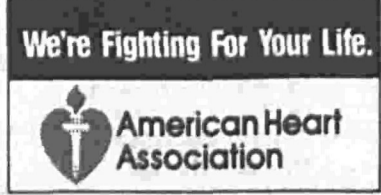

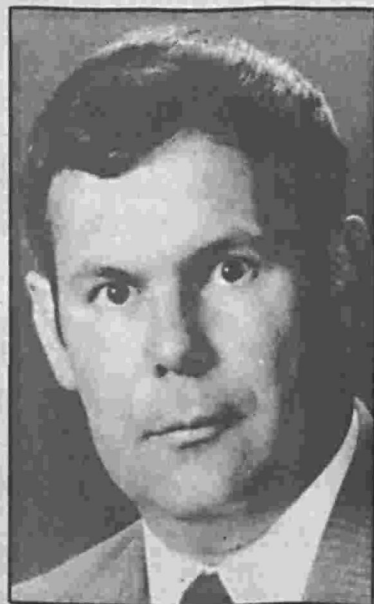
top two vote-getters in the May 16 city council primary.

# Gas-tax increase stuck in gridlock

Fifty-five percent of voters in the 33rd state legislative district support a gas tax as a way to pay for a commuter rail system.

Forty-seven percent of district voters prefer to pay for highway improvements with a statewide gas tax.

If they could devise their own tax system, 56 percent would include a gas tax. Only 32 percent would include a personal income tax.

So, when Gov. Booth Gardner tells legislators that he won't vote for a 7-cent per gallon gas-tax hike unless they give a nod to his tax-reform package — which includes a personal income tax — it's clear where local voters stand.

State Sen. Eleanor Lee (R-33rd) said the 3,000 people who answered her cross-party survey convinced her to do something she's never done before.

"It's the first time I've ever voted for a gas-tax increase in my 15 years in the Legislature," she said.

THE STATE Senate has approved a 7-cent per gallon increase in addition to the current 18 cent per gallon tax. State Transportation Secretary

Duane Berentson has said it will take a 7-cent hike to pay for needed projects.

Rebuilding the treacherous First Avenue South Bridge is one of those projects, said state Sen. Phil Talmadge (D-34th). The 7-cent plan approved by the Senate would allocate three-quarters of a cent to construction of a new bridge, Talmadge said. An increase of 3 to 3½ cents — which Gardner says is the most he would support — would only pay for a portion of design costs, said Talmadge.

The cost of a new bridge is estimated at \$100 million.

But Rep. Jean Marie Brough (R-30th) says she opposes the 7-cent increase because "there's very little in it for suburban gridlock."

Most of the increase would go to projects like the bridge and other construction around the state, she said.

THE PLAN, upon which the House of Representatives has yet to vote, does not provide enough matching state money for locally funded projects, Brough contends.

She also objects to the approach taken by the entire transportation budget, which was passed by the Senate and

has yet to reach the House. She says that it ties improvement of trouble spots to major construction projects rather than "rifle shooting" it into local governments for use on problems like gridlocked intersections.

One such place is an intersection at Interstate 5 and South 348th Street that has been tied to construction of a four-lane thoroughfare to Edgewood, Brough says.

A bill to allow local governments to raise taxes for carpool lanes (without a vote of the people) and rail or other mass transit (vote required) passed the House and has support in the Senate, Talmadge said. But Gardner has yet to indicate sup-

port for that plan, either, the legislators say.

Brough says it's taking so long for the transportation budget to get to the House that "amendments are getting yellow around the edges."

Additionally, the Legislature has yet to agree on an overall budget for the state for the next two years. Lawmakers say something may break this weekend.

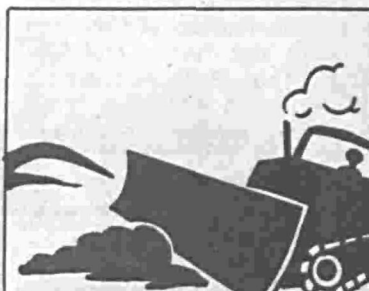
Regardless, Lee and Brough say the governor's strategy of using the gas tax to get tax reform is not working. Those who want the gas tax the most — Puget Sound area legislators — are more likely to support the tax package anyway, Lee says.

## No EIS required for Unocal station

King County officials have determined that the construction of a Unocal Quick-Lube station at 31858 Pacific Highway S does not require preparation of an environmental impact statement (EIS).

The construction of the new 30-foot by 49-foot building will include new pump islands, a canopy and installation of a 12,000-gallon single-wall steel tank for lube oil and waste oil storage.

King County Building and Land Development Division (BALD) is requiring Unocal to install a system to monitor tank

# Police arrest man for savage beating

Police arrested a 28-year-old man Tuesday for investigation of an assault that included burning his ex-girlfriend with a cigarette, slapping and pinching her and kicking her in the head.

The 20-year-old woman told police the attack occurred in the early morning hours Monday but she did not make a report until Tuesday because she was afraid of her ex-boyfriend. She said she and her attacker had lived together off-and-on for the past five years and had two children together with a third on the way.

She told police her ex-boyfriend came to her Woodmont-area home shortly after midnight and began verbally and physically abusing her in front of the children. He burned her on the chest and arms with a cigarette, then threw the cigarette onto the foot of her 8-month-old daughter, burning her, too, the woman said.

She said when she tried to help her daughter, she was slapped and pinched by her ex-boyfriend, who also began twisting her leg. During the fight he kicked her in the head several times, hard enough to cause her to black out, she said.

The woman said her ex-boyfriend was in her home beating her, for about two hours before he finally left. He return-

ed a short time later and asked their 3-year-old son if he wanted to leave with him, and when the boy refused, her ex-boyfriend left again, she said.

Police reports said the woman had bruises on her legs and two black eyes, apparently from the beating. They went to the man's Angle Lake area apartment and arrested him and booked him into the King County Jail for investigation of second-degree assault.

Association officials said Pease did not vote on the endorsements.

Claudia Naibert, an association Realtor.  
However, the association did not interview 11 of the 37 candidates.  
**SOME CANDIDATES** could not make time to be interviewed by a panel of seven association members, others declined endorsement and some could not be reached, said Crowell.  
However, the association made several attempts to contact each candidate, Crowell said.  
The candidates not interviewed were Ethan "Rick" Allen, Bill McConnell, Lew Drohman, Dave Froyalde, Larry Jones, Vance Lelli, Tom Trigg, Michelle Lewis, Dave Wallace, Richard Feutz and Lynn Templeton.

The panel asked each candidate several questions, though not all candidates were asked the same questions, Crowell said. Most candidates were asked why they were running, their background, who their supporters are, and several growth-related questions.  
**THE QUESTIONS** about growth included who the candidate thought should pay for costs associated with development such as traffic. They also were asked what they thought of development.  
The panel decided not to support candidates who were against government compensation for property owners who had their land "down-zoned" or zoned from a higher density to a lower density, according to

Naibert.  
She said Realtors are not for "helter-skelter" growth, but they want people to be compensated when they are likely to lose money on their down-zoned property.  
After the candidates were interviewed, the panel made recommendations to the association's Political Affairs Committee. That committee then voted on the endorsements and made recommendations to the association's Executive Committee. The Executive Committee then made recommendations to the association's board of directors, which made the final vote on the endorsements.

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"All endorsements are impartial," said David Crowell, association spokesman.  
In some positions, the board decided not to endorse any candidate.

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## Jefferson, Decatur crowned co-champs

The way it worked out both the Thomas Jefferson and Decatur boys' soccer teams came out winners following Friday night's hotly contested match at Federal Way Memorial.

Even though defending Class AAA state champion Thomas Jefferson edged cross-town rival Decatur, 3-2, in a shootout to win the regular season finale, 2-1, the two local teams were crowned co-South Puget Sound League champions and are both headed to the state playoffs.

Based on a point system in which SPSL teams were awarded two points for each win, one point for a loss in overtime or a shootout and no points for a loss in regulation time, Jefferson and Decatur tied for first place with 16 points.

The Raiders, who finished with the better record at 8-2 while the Gators wound up at 7-3, take the league's top seed into the state tournament because they won the head-to-head competition. The Gators, meanwhile, draw the SPSL's No. 2 berth to the state tourney.

As the SPSL's No. 1 seeded team, Jefferson will host the Narrows League No. 2-Olympic winner, while the No. 2 seeded Gators will travel to play the Southwest No. 1 team. The open-

ing round playoff games are to be played on or before May 16.

Lakes had its playoff hopes disappear with a 3-0 loss to Clover Park. The Lancers wound up at 7-3 and trailed Decatur and Jefferson with only 15 points.

"The biggest part about this tonight is we're in," said Thomas Jefferson coach Jim Judson. "We're in the state tournament. That's precisely where we wanted to be."

"Co-champions, can't complain," said Decatur coach Rick Dennison. "The talk at the start of the season was if we get the title, we take home the banner for the school as the true South Puget Sound League champions. We get half of it."

**THE GATORS** nearly took home the title for themselves after putting Jefferson in the hole for the third straight game, 1-0, on a first-half goal by Sean Young on an assist from Dan Heidal.

Decatur played the aggressor for the early part of the second half and appeared to have the upper hand when TJ's Aaron Van Dusen drew a red card with 22:38 left in regulation after entering the game at the 25:51 mark of the second half.

But moments later, the momentum swung the other way

when Jefferson's Brad Kolbo drew a tripping foul on a Gator in the penalty box and was awarded a penalty kick. Kolbo fired the shot into the left corner to tie the game at 1-1 with 20:41 remaining in regulation.

With the score still tied, attention was momentarily diverted off the playing field when smoke was spotted in the east concession stand. Fire trucks were summoned to the scene to respond to the smoke emanating from what later was determined to be a refrigerator.

**MEANWHILE**, regulation time expired with the score still tied at 1-1. The game advanced into two 5-minute overtimes and still there was no score, which sent the match into a shootout.

Jefferson goalkeeper Brian Wallace was the star of the shootout period, as he made brilliant saves on attempts by Decatur's Sito Pina, Dan Heidal and Jeff Hamling. Gators Jeff Johnson and Sean Young were successful on their tries. Jefferson's Jason Bowers and Daryn Ditmore were off the mark on their attempts. But John Pouley, Dan Parnell and Kolbo found the net past Gator goalkeeper Ryan Berg. Kolbo's shot clinched the Raider victory.

What started off as a great baseball game wound up with both teams feeling like they got the shaft.

Federal Way and Decatur played to a 4-4 tie through eight innings Thursday before the lights shut off at Sacajawea Park, suspending the action until Friday.

The Eagles won the game, 5-4, in the bottom of the ninth, as Allen Hensley, Jeff Wagner and Floyd French all walked in order and Marty Mogensen hit into an error for the run.

Federal Way went into the game thinking that if it won and tied Rogers for second place in the South Puget Sound League North Division with a 10-5 record, it would go to the playoffs.

But a review of the league's tiebreaker rules adopted for this year revealed that the Eagles lose out to the Rams on the sixth tiebreaker.

Rogers and Federal Way had split in head-to-head action, and had identical records within the North Division. Both teams lost both games to first-place Puyallup, and the second and third place teams were each other.

That brought it down to how the teams did against fourth-place Sumner, and the Rams took both games from the Spartans while the Eagles split with them.

"It was a great win, but it's sad knowing tiebreaker-wise we're out of it," said Eagle head coach Gary Mogensen, who pointed out that league coaches had decided to break ties for final berths with playoffs but the league principals voted to go with the tiebreakers instead.

Also left out of the playoffs for the first time in six years is Decatur, which finished in a two-way tie with Thomas Jefferson for fifth place in the division at 6-9.

The Gators were not only frustrated with the loss, but with the fact they had to come back and play Friday rather than tomorrow, when ace pitcher Brady Nelson could have returned to the mound (and when French could have thrown again for Federal Way).

"If those guys started it, they should be able to finish it," said Decatur head coach Gary Holmboe after Thursday's action was stopped.

It was ruled that the game had to be finished Friday, however, because of a statement in the

rule book that such games must be completed on the next available date.

**THURSDAY'S** portion of the game was a tight battle between two of the best pitchers in the SPSL — French and Brady Nelson.

Nelson struck out 13 through the eight innings of play and French had 12 on the Gators.

"Both of them were really going at it," said Holmboe. "Both got tougher as it went along."

The game started off on the wild side, however, and the Gators scored three in the top of the first.

Tony Lockhart and Kevin Caldwell both singled into the hole between third and shortstop, then Nelson went to the same spot but Lockhart was called out when the ball hit him.

## Candidates take food challenge

City council candidates from Federal Way and Sea-Tac were pitted against each other Thursday in a good-natured food challenge issued by the Federal Way Food Bank. The Federal Way candidates won by a landslide.

To be fair, it must be noted that Federal Way City Council candidates outnumber Sea-Tac City Council candidates 37-28, and the roughly 33 candidates who showed up to hear about social and human services in South King County were proportionately split between the two new cities.

Federal Way candidates brought in 258 food items as well as more than 100 pounds of onions and potatoes, and Sea-Tac candidates contributed 76 food items, reported Shirley Karli, food bank manager.

The candidates, besides bringing food donations, were on hand at the food bank to hear a presentation by Deanna Dicomies, South King County

Multi-Service Center (MSC) director, who wanted to remind them of or introduce them to the role her agency plays in their new cities.

The MSC, a non-profit agency, serves South King County from Interstate 90 to the north, to the Pierce County line to the south, and includes everything west of the Cascades.

Dicomies outlined the agency's numerous programs (food, clothing, heat and energy assistance, literacy, transportation, shelter and other emergency services) and stressed to the candidates that their new cities will need to have some type of working agreement with the agency, since it serves people within their city limits.

She also discussed the problems facing South King County, such as a growing number of poor families, and said the demand for the agency's services is destined to increase dramatically.

"Just because you aren't step-

ping over homeless bodies here doesn't mean we don't have them," Dicomies said.

Sharon Atkin, director of emergency services for the MSC, suggested to council candidates they copy Kent and create a Human Services Commission, which coordinates social services within the city.

Dicomies said she was pleased with the turnout and hoped her presentation would keep the multi-service center foremost in the minds of those who will be helping with the transition to cityhood.

The poor and disadvantaged are not going to go away once Federal Way and Sea-Tac officially become cities, Dicomies said, and cities, unless they are going to be prepared to create their own social agencies, should be ready to enter into a working agreement with the MSC.

"We need those agreements cemented," she said.

The primary election for city council candidates is May 16.
