President's Message

Sheriff Scott pledges service to citizens

I doubt you have ever given much thought to the twin responsibilities of your local sheriff, so I would like to call your attention to both of the very important roles he must be able to fill simultaneously.

On the one hand a sheriff must be a professional law enforcement officer because the sheriff is the chief law enforcement official in the county. At the same time he must also be a politician in order to be elected and four years later be reelected.

Over the years, as the public has become more familiar with the complex problems faced by law enforcement officers, the electorate has demonstrated an increased awareness of the need for training and experience on the part of candidates for the office of sheriff. Professional qualifications seem to be very much on the minds of citizens when they go to the polls.

Yet, when the election is over, and a citizen has a problem or a concern he wants the sheriff to help him with, he has no interest in degrees or how many years the sheriff has been in law enforcement — he just wants help. The most qualified sheriff in the state cannot afford to ignore the people he was elected to serve. Indeed, if he does not make it his business to help and serve, he is not doing his job and should not be sheriff.

My contention is that while these twin responsibilities make the job of being sheriff a demanding one, it is to the benefit of the citizenry to have both a professional law enforcement officer and a politically responsive official serving as sheriff.

This politically attuned law enforcement professional has, in my view, several important roles to play which he is uniquely equipped to handle.

A sheriff needs to be concerned with, and to some degree involved, in the selection of the Governor and Cabinet members. Where does the candidate stand on capital punishment, state police forces, funding for crime laboratories, the need for more prisons and on and on? At the Mid-Winter Conference of the Sheriffs Association the candidates for Governor were asked very pointed questions about their stance on several issues. We need more of this and we need to get more people involved.

Candidates for the Florida Senate and House of Representatives should also be given opportunities to express themselves

on law enforcement issues. When a legislator takes his or her seat in the House or Senate chamber in Tallahassee, it's too late to find out if that person is more worried about the rights of criminals than about the suffering of crime victims.

Then, when our elected representatives come together to revise old laws and fashion new ones, the sheriffs of Florida again have a unique role to play. They have had a direct exposure to law enforcement problems, a sensitive understanding of public attitudes, and the professional background to offer advice to legislators on what is needed, what will work, and what would be a hindrance. Each year sheriffs and the Sheriffs Association take an active, and I believe vital, role in the legislative process.

Another important role for the sheriff, to which I alluded earlier, is that of being the one local law enforcement official responsive to the needs of the people who elected him.

Without intending to be critical, I see an appointed police chief being responsive only to the appointed city manager who hired and can fire him. The people have but an indirect voice through the city commission which hires the manager. State and federal law enforcement officials, although assigned to local areas, must first be responsive to their superiors in Tallahassee or Washington, D. C. and are far removed from any direct responsibility to the public they serve.

Because a sheriff is elected by the people, it is directly to them he must remain close and responsive. The sheriff is better equipped than anyone else in the criminal justice system to take the pulse of the community and translate that which he senses in terms of what people want and expect from the law enforcement officers who are there to serve and protect them.

Before I'm accused of trying to oversell the importance of sheriffs in Florida, let me point out the law enforcement picture in Florida is a complex blend of local, state and federal law enforcement agencies — each with an important role and a need to cooperate with one another.

The number of agencies does not bother me because it results in authority being distributed between several depart-

ments instead of concentrated in just one which wants to run the whole show. This diversification of responsibilities provides a very important check and balance system which safeguards our individual freedom.

Having begun my law enforcement career with the Florida Highway Patrol, I know from first-hand experience the vital role this agency plays in the Florida law enforcement picture. The FHP needs a degree of autonomy and sufficient funds to carry out its job of enforcing the traffic laws in the state.

I also want to acknowledge the importance of the Florida Department of Criminal Law Enforcement (FDCLE) to our law enforcement picture. Every day my department makes use of the computerized Florida crime information center operated by the FDCLE. Many have been the times I've utilized the Department's statewide system of crime laboratories, and FDCLE agents are invaluable when it comes to coordinating the investigation of a multi-county drug or theft ring.

When we get into specialized investigations, the sheriffs of Florida can call on the Division of Alcoholic Beverage and Tobacco, the Fire Marshal's Office, the Game and Fresh Water Fish Commission, the Marine Patrol and several others. The federal agencies have demonstrated repeatedly their willingness to cooperate with local law enforcement agencies when their assistance is needed.

Obviously, *your* sheriff is but one element in this complex picture of law enforcement in Florida, but the point I want to make is that he is *your* element — he belongs to you, the citizens who elected him. He will listen to what you have to say. He will try to help you with your problems. He will share your concerns. He will respond to your needs. He will do these things or you will elect a new sheriff.

You, the citizens of Florida, do not have that much influence with any other law enforcement official, so I am sure you join my fellow sheriffs and me in wanting to maintain the present effectiveness of the office of sheriff.

After sentencing youth to chair Judge urges schools to fight crime

Following the recommendation of a jury, Circuit Court Judge Clifton M. Kelly, of Sebring, sentenced 16-year-old Frank Ross to the electric chair for the murder of Mrs. Helen Dixon. Testimony in the case revealed the 64-year-old widow, who lived alone in Avon Park, had been stomped to death during a daylight robbery attempt. When the youth was sentenced, Judge Kelly added to the death sentence order a lengthy footnote which has been condensed for publication.

In view of the ultimate punishment administered in the Ross case as recommended by the jury and provided by law, this court feels impelled to add this conclusion to the decision entered therein: our lawmakers, the Legislature, should, in their deliberations, make adequate provision for educating our youth in the public school system not only to respect, understand and obey the law, but also to develop a respect for other people and their property.

Such a procedure, in my judgment and belief, is the most pragmatic and effective way to bring about a needed, substantial and lasting reduction in the crime rate. Taking into account the rate violent crimes (murder, forcible rape, robbery, and aggravated assault) as well as non-violent crimes are committed and the fear and concern many people have about being criminally assaulted and their property taken from them by force or stealth, it plainly appears that the government is not fulfilling its obligations to provide domestic tranquility as intended by the state and national constitution.

It's clear and certain that it's time for new and innovative changes to be made in the traditional revolving door methods now being used in the fight against crime. It's time to realize that education can be an alternative dynamic method to control and reduce crime ...

At the present time there are more than 19,000 persons in Florida's correctional facilities, and the yearly cost of incarcerating and supervising each inmate is about \$4,745. Whereas, the total costs and expenses incurred in teaching a child on a school year basis is approximately one-fourth of this amount. Further, the Department of Offender Rehabilitation has about 7,500 employees who are responsible for the custody and care of more than 57,000 offenders, either in state correctional facilities or under community supervision ...

The most practical period to build a foundation of obedience to the law and respect for the law among all young people

is during their impressionable years when they can effectively learn and understand that they should obey the law and do unto others as they would have others do unto them.

Therefore, the Legislature should require all students in the public school system to be knowledgeable about the following (depending, of course, on the age of the child as to what should be required and expected): (1) the state's criminal laws and the penalties for violating the law, including death in certain cases, and other consequences such as being required to pay restitution to victims; (2) how laws are made and how they may be changed; (3) why each particular criminal law is made and how it relates to the child and his or her home and family; (4) that laws are made for the benefit and advantage of everybody; (5) how to report the commission of a crime to the proper law enforcement agency and how to testify in court; (6) that it is everyone's duty, children and adults alike, to obey all laws no matter how they may feel about them, and that the law is supreme in our country; and (7) that there is no excuse or reason for anyone willfully to violate the law regardless of his race, color, creed, or his station or position in life.

Theodore Roosevelt, who is widely recognized as one of our greatest presidents, said during an age and time when permissiveness was not the vogue as is true today, "No man is above the law and no man is below it; nor do we ask any man's permission when we require him to obey it."

I am not referring to a one-shot, instant success approach to the age-old problem of crime but instead to a massive, determined long-range effort by the schools to reduce crime and protect all people and their property with results to be measured in terms of years and not in weekly or monthly progress reports to the school boards and/or the press.

The teaching of these stated facts about the law should have the same standing and receive the same attention and considera-

tion as that given to any other subject in school such as reading, writing and arithmetic. I realize that at this time there is little classroom material available for such an in-depth program of instruction and that the schools will need time and additional funds; but once it is decided for the schools to embark upon such a venture, these problems can be solved. Necessity is still the mother of invention, and the resources that are available to the schools and the help that they would receive from the various elements of the criminal justice system as well as from organized society and concerned parents would be significant.

The first question that comes to mind is why should this be the responsibility of the public school system rather than that of the parents and/or the churches?

Referring to the schools, there is a powerful threefold answer: (1) the schools have the children to work with through compulsory school attendance; (2) the schools have the power to tax and spend for educational purposes; and (3) there is the constitutional mandate to provide free public schools as the needs of the people may require.

Added to this is the thought that a child may not be properly prepared to take his rightful and responsible position in society with its many fast-moving and changing complexities if he does not know and understand what the criminal laws and penalties are.

Being a parent, I am quick to point out that the true and best answer to crime prevention and control lies in the home; but there is no prescribed rule, regulation or law that requires parents to teach their children anything or provide them with any particular type of training.

It would be foolhardy to expect those parents, who make it a practice to violate the law themselves, to teach their children to obey the laws. But even if all parents have been teaching or trying to teach their children right from wrong where the law is concerned, they certainly need help from other sources because there is a youth crime plague. We have the phenomenon of kids who kill for no apparent reason other than for the thrill and excitement of it.

The July 11, 1977, issue of TIME magazine, pages 18-23, demonstrates and explains the seriousness of the situation but offers no real solution to the problem except to point out that “if society is to be protected from the violent young, respect for punishment must be restored. Youngsters should know just what to expect if they commit a particular crime. An adult crime — like robbery, rape or murder — deserves adult treatment.”

What better vehicle could there be to get this message across to all children, regardless of who their parents are, what kind of upbringing they have had or what type of home they came from, than through the people’s tax-supported, public school system where everyone is treated equally? What other viable workable way is there available to be sure and certain that every child knows what to expect if he commits a crime? ...

Other countries use their public school system to great advantage to teach, with outstanding success, their children various philosophies, doctrines and ways of life in addition to the regular prescribed academic courses. I see no logical reason why the public schools in Florida should not teach our children to obey the law and respect people and their property.

When referring to such practice in the Russian school system, it is called “brain washing.” But what is wrong with educating American children to obey the laws made by the people acting through the legislative branch of the government? Perhaps if this were done and the lights should go out again as they did in New York City on the night of July 16th of this year, there would not be a similar outbreak of stealing and looting that received worldwide attention — a condition akin to mobocracy of the worst sort.

If taking such action would bring about a substantial reduction in the crime of stealing alone, it would, to borrow an expression from the Chinese, “be a great leap forward” because stealing, in its various forms, ways and methods, some of which are very insidious and hidden, accounts for at least one-half of our crimes. Robbery itself is an extreme form of stealing, since it evinces a determination to obtain the property of another with force and violence. In the Ross case, robbery was the motive for killing Mrs. Dixon. ...

We cannot hope to have a crime-free society since some people have an overriding propensity to violate the law, but that should not deter us in the least from making long-range plans to reduce the crime rate beginning with the children in our grade schools. A child, who does not respond after being properly taught in school to respect other people and their property and comply with the law, should be identified, as soon as possible, and referred to the proper social agency for whatever help there is available. This referral would be of great benefit to the court as well as to the entire criminal justice system if such child should turn out to be an habitual law violator. ...

Who knows, if defendant Frank Ross had been taught and made to understand from the time he first entered school that stealing and robbing are against the law and that if he killed someone, he too could be killed by the state even if he were a juvenile, it just could be that Mrs. Dixon would not have been subjected to a brutal and terrifying death, and the perpetrator would not be in the predicament in which he now finds himself. His background was such that the only way he could have received this kind of training would have been in the public school system.

Now is the time to include the talented, dedicated, educated administrators and teachers of our school system in the effort to make our homes, lives and great land a safe place to work, worship and dream. It’s time to use common sense and realize, taking into consideration our constitutional rights and today’s social problems, that the combined efforts of those in our educational system can be the most potent and far-reaching force ever assembled in the fight against crime.



Governor

REUBIN O'DONOVAN ASKEW

The Honorable Reubin O'Donovan Askew was elected the 37th Governor of Florida in 1970 as essentially a tax reform candidate.

After inauguration day, he sustained this image by winning legislative approval of a referendum on a corporate profits tax. Then he campaigned for the tax from one end of the state to the other against what he called the "shadow government" of lobbyists and powerful special interests in Florida.

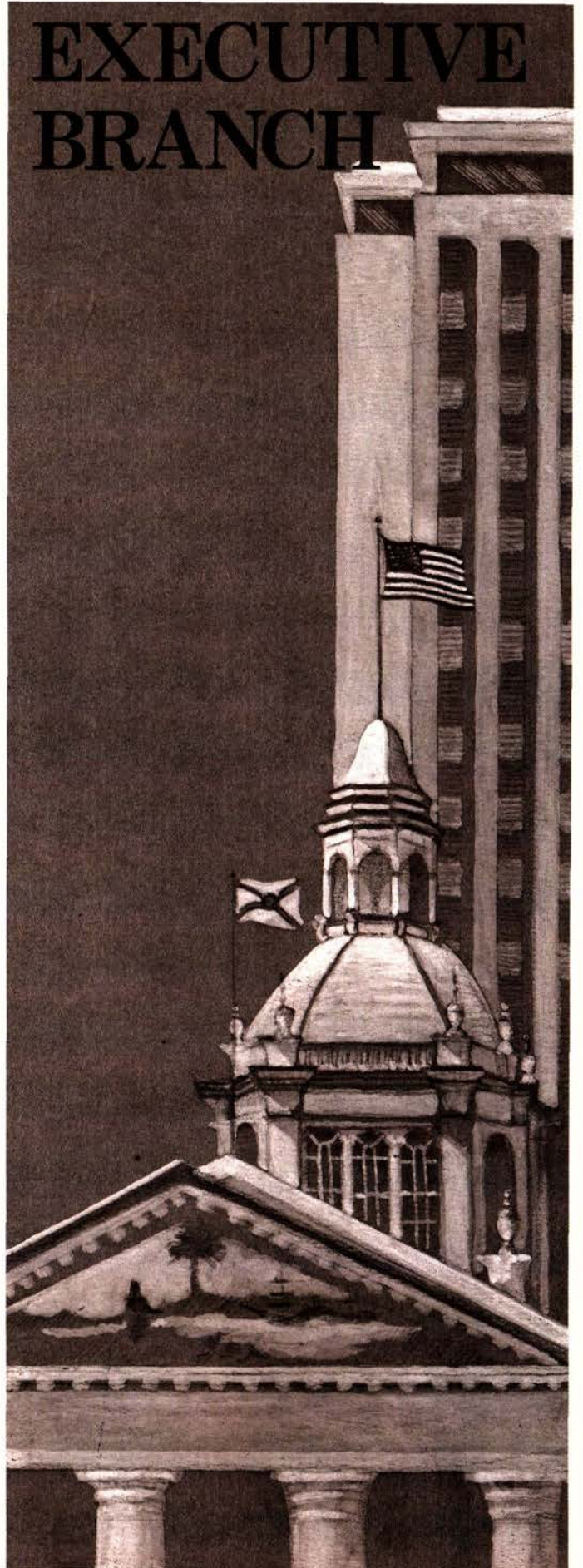
His tax reform won voter approval by a 70 percent margin. Taxes on household utilities and apartment rentals were quickly repealed. Loopholes were closed and other reforms enacted. He became the first Florida Governor reelected to a second full term when he easily won reelection in 1974 over Democratic and Republican opposition.

Governor Askew also has been successful in fostering improvements in law enforcement, prison reform, court reform, benefits for the working man, environmental planning and ethics in government.

He has been a stout defender of equal educational opportunities and was, as a result, awarded the 1971 John F. Kennedy "Profiles in Courage" award by B'nai B'rith. His fight to protect Florida's environment has been cited in several conservation awards, including the special award of the National Wildlife Federation.

After his reform programs gained national recognition, Governor Askew was selected to deliver the Keynote Address at the 1972 Democratic National Convention in Miami Beach.

Earlier honors included his selection by the Florida Jaycees in 1960 as "One of Florida's Five Outstanding Young Men"; the State Jaycee Good Government Award in 1971; and a num-



ber of citations as an "outstanding" member during his 12 years in Florida's legislature.

Born in Muskogee, Oklahoma, on September 11, 1928, Governor Askew was one of six children.

In 1937 his family moved to Pensacola, where he entered the Escambia County public school system and, beginning at the age of nine, worked in his free time to help his mother support the family. When he was graduated from high school at 17, he entered the Army as a Private in the Paratroopers and rose to the rank of Sergeant. He then entered Florida State University where he was a member of ROTC and served as student body president. He was graduated with a B.S. degree in Public Administration and was commissioned a Second Lieutenant in the Air Force. After two additional years of active duty in the Air Force, Captain Askew was admitted to the University of Florida Law School. In 1956, he received his LL. B. degree.

Almost immediately, he began his public service career by accepting an appointment as Assistant County Solicitor of Escambia County. He was elected to the Florida House of Representatives in 1958 and to the State Senate in 1962.

In the Senate, he was Chairman of the Appropriations Committee and the Senate Committee on Constitutional Amendments and Revision and worked vigorously for fair apportionment in both the House and Senate.

His many community services include membership in the Western Division of Children's Home Society of Florida (Past President); Florida Association for Retarded Children (Past member, Board of Directors); The Farm Bureau, Escambia County Tuberculosis and Health Association, YMCA, American Legion, Heart Association and United Fund. He is a Mason and Rotarian.

He is married to the former Donna Lou Harper of Sanford, Florida, and the couple has two children, Angela Adair and Kevin O'Donovan. Governor Askew is an elder in the First Presbyterian Church of Pensacola.

Lieutenant Governor

JAMES H. WILLIAMS II



The Hon. James H. (Jim) Williams II is a native of Ocala and lived there until his election as Lt. Governor in 1974.

Born June 17, 1926, he enlisted in the U. S. Air Force upon graduation from high school in 1944.

After the war, and following the death of his father, Williams went into business, which included cattle, agricultural, limestone and mining interests in Florida and Georgia. After several years in the mining business, during which time the business was merged with five other companies, he liquidated his interests and, at the age of 36, returned to school. A Florida Sheriff derives his authority from the state constitution and is the chief law enforcement officer in each county. In addition to his responsibility for law enforcement and criminal investigations, the Sheriff is the keeper of the jail, an officer of the courts, and serves as a public protector in a wide variety of emergencies and disasters that do not involve any law violations. Sheriffs are elected to four-year terms in presidential election years, and they are not limited in the number of terms they may serve.

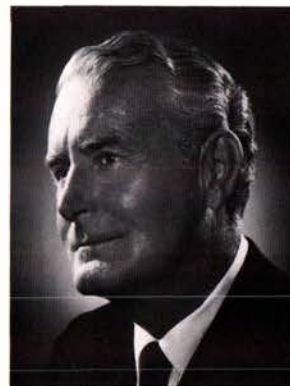

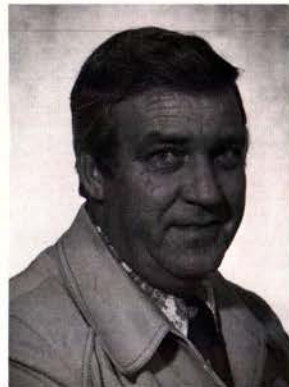

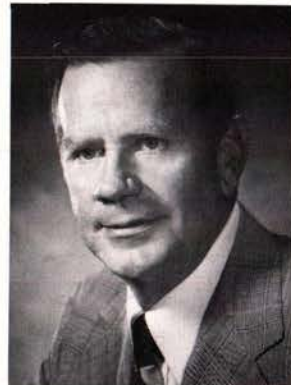
